## Head Coach Katie Meier

Katie Meier enters her eighth season as the head coach of the Hurricanes' women's basketball program in 2012-13. A well known and respected figure
in women's basketball, Meier has worked tirelessly to put her mark on Miami's program and to build a winning tradition.

All of her hard work was rewarded after the 2010-11 season as she was named the Associated Press National Coach of the Year - sharing the award with Connecticut's Geno Auriemma and Stanford's Tara VanDerveer.
Meier led the Hurricanes into the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2004 and its win over Gardner-Webb in the first round was the first tournament win fo he 'Canes since 1993. Miami entered the 2010-11 season with high internal ff a season in which it was the No. 12 seed in the ACC Tournament.

However, the Hurricanes exceeded all of the outside expectations and at one point, won 17 straight games. They were a perfect 20-0 inside the BankUnited Center and finished 12-2 in ACC play - earning their first regular season conference title since joining the league in 2004. As a reward, Meier was named the ACC Coach of the Year and later would be selected as the WBCA/RUSSELL ATHLETIC Region 2 Coach of the Year, as voted on by her peers.
Hired on April 19, 2005, then UM Athletics Director Paul Dee announced the appointment of Meier in front of national and local media, fans, alumni and support staff, signifying the beginning of a new era.
In her first season, Meier wasted little time in making the first steps towards those goals. After receiving little attention in the ACC preseason polls, the Hurricanes posted an impressive overall record of 17-13. After fighting through a conference that in ACC play en route to earning a berth into the second round of the 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournament.

Throughout the season Miami posted wins over ranked teams such as Mississippi (No. 25), Boston College (No. 21) and Virginia Tech (No. 25)-and nearly knocked off then-No. 1 Duke in double-overtime. The Hurricanes also recorded wins over two eventual conference champions in Hartford (America East) and Oakland (Mid-Continent). Under her direction, standout Ta mara James produced one of the greatest seasons ever seen by a UM player in 2005-06, including becoming the University's all-time leading scorer before being taken as the No. 8 overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics.
In Meier's second season in 2006-07, the Hurricanes got off to a strong start, winning seven of their first eight games-including a 79-70 win over Indiana to claim the UM Thanksgiving Tournament title. On Dec. 1, Meier picked up her 100th career victory as the Hurricanes defeated Jackson State, $77-50$. However, with only eight healthy players to call upon by the start of
the ACC schedule, Miami faced challenge after challenge competing in a league that ranked among the top-three strongest women's basketball conferences nationally and produced two of the NCAA Tournament's four No. 1 seeds in 2006-07.

Regardless, Renee Taylor emerged as the ACC's leading scorer-upholding Miami's streak of producing the league's leading scorer in all three years it had been a member. The All-ACC Second Team selection set school records in single-game scoring with 42 points at Houston and became the 19th Hurricane to score at least 1,000 points-and just the sixth to do so in her first two seasons. In addition, transfer Maurita Reid emerged as a defensive threat, tying the school record with 10 steals versus Wake Forest and finishing among the ACC's leaders and NCAA's top 10 in steals per game.

The 2007-08 season, Meier's third with the Hurricanes, saw Maurita Reid continue her rise among the ACC elite. The senior was nothing short of impressive shooting beyond the arc and picking opponent's pockets. She hit four or more three-pointers on 10 different occasions and finished the season with 110 steals, good for second in the conference and fifth in the NCAA. The Queens, N.Y. native led the team in points ( 15.3 ppg ) and rebounding ( 5.6 rpg ) and was also named the ACC All-Defensive Team.

With a No. 21 incoming recruiting class, Meier and the Hurricanes saw significant improvement during the 2008-09 season. The freshman class was highlighted by McDonald's All-American Shenise Johnson - out of Henrietta, N.Y. and Riquna Williams from nearby Pahokee, Fla.
Johnson lived up to the hype as she was the team leader on the season in points, rebounds, assists and steals. Under Meier's guidance, Johnson was named the ACC Rookie of the Week on three occasions and was named to the ACC All-Freshmen team guidance, Johnson was named the ACC Rookie of the Week on three occasions and was named to the ACC All-Freshmen team World Championships in Bangkok, Thailand.

The 2009-10 season was one of the most successful in program history. Under Meier's vision, the Hurricanes advanced to the WNIT Championship game. Miami posted a 22-14 overall record - the first 20-win campaign since the 2002-03 season and just the eighth all-time.
In her sophomore season, Johnson was joined by a healthy Riquna Williams and the duo racked up accolades throughout the season. Johnson was named First Team All-ACC, while Williams garnered second-team honors. The tandem led Miami to a 5-1 WNIT record - the deepest postseason run in team history - with both earning all-tournament honors along the way.

Following the 2009-10 campaign, then University of Miami Director of Athletics Kirby Hocutt announced that Meier signed a contract extension through 2015.

We are excited about the tremendous progress our women's basketball team achieved this past season," said Hocutt. "Coach Meier continues to assemble a special group of talented young women at the University of Miami and we look forward to the future success of our program.
Miami's success proved to be immediate, as it earned a conference regular season title in 2010-11 and returned to the NCAA Tournament for the first time in seven seasons.
Johnson and Williams proved to be the All-America candidates that they were expected to be. In fact, Johnson was named to four different All-America squads, including the prestigious WBCA/State Farm Coaches' All-America Team. She also earned AP the year (Frances Savage - BIG EAST - 1992). Johnson also garnered All-ACC Defensive Team honors for the second straight season and was named to the ACC Tournament Team. Williams, along with Johnson, was named First Team All-ACC and was the conference scoring champion, pouring in 21.7 points per game.

The duo combined for seven ACC Player of the Week accolades on the season as Williams took home the award on four occasions. No other team in the league was recognized more than twice for the weekly honor.
The season also saw the emergence of sophomore forward Morgan Stroman. The 6-1, 2009 McDonald's All-American matched Johnson for the team lead with 11 double-doubles on the season, as she scored 13.6 points and grabbed 8.2 rebounds per game. For her efforts she was named Third Team All-ACC

Miami's success continued into the 2011-12 season. The Canes finished second in the conference standings with a record of 14-2 and were 26-6 overall. UM also defeated the eventual conference tournament champion - Maryland - both times they faced in the regular season.

Seniors Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams continued to live up to the hype of them being one of the best backcourt duos in the nation, as they were second and third in the league in scoring and each were again named First Team All-ACC. The accolade was the third straight honor for Johnson and the second for Williams. Johnson was also named to the All-ACC Defensive Team for the third consecutive season. Johnson earned a place on five different All-America teams, including the WBCA squad for the second straight year. Williams eanred AP All-America Third Team recognition in her final collegiate campaign as well.

Unfortunately, Morgan Stroman suffered a season-ending injury midway through the conference schedule, leaving a seemingly insurmountable void in the lineup. However, junior guard Stefanie Yderstrom stepped up to the occasion. The native of Sweden ended the season with more three-pointers than any other player in the league as was rewarded with a Third Team All-ACC selection.

Miami once again advanced to the NCAA tournament as a No. 3 seed. The Canes traveled to Spokane, Wash. and defeated the No. 14 seed, Idaho State in the first round but fell to host Gonzaga in the second.
Though the departure of Williams, Johnson and Sylvia Bullock cannot be ignored, there is plenty of talent returning for the Canes for the 2012-13 season, including four players that have started a significant amount of games and All-ACC performers in Yderstrom and Stroman. Pepper Wilson, the 6-6 center, also entered her name into the fray of players that will look to garner conference and even national recognition with her play late in the 2011-12 campaign.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Maria Brown is a consistent contributor on the court for Miami's women's basketball team.
The junior provides a lot energy and aggressiveness on defense, mixed in with a talented mid-range game offensively. Despite being an important player for Miami, Brown is most proud of her off-court work.
Brown is very active in the Miami community, helping with a variety of charities, but she recently spent time with Miami native Deja Webster and the experience made a big impact on Brown.
"My experience with her was amazing," Brown said. "She's such a great kid. Her smile is amazing. How could she be going through so much, doing chemo and just the thought of having cancer and still keep a smile on her face and being so positive about life?"

Webster, who is battling Stage III Hodgkin's lymphoma, spent two days as an honorary member of the women's basketball team. She is the first person to be recognized by the University of Miami in conjunction with the Austen Everett Foundation. Everett was a soccer player at Miami before succumbing to non-Hodgkin's lymphoma in August 2012.
"She was with us for two days and she just hung around the team and watched us practice. Before shoot around, she ate with us for our pre-game meal," Brown said. "I asked the guy she was with if she wanted to stay with me before the game. She said she wanted to stay, so we just went to the lounge and watched TV. A few of the other players were in there so we were talking and just having fun, just enjoying each other's company and sharing stories."

Miami coach Katie Meier knows that Webster enjoyed her time with the team, but Meier is confident that her players benefitted just as much from spending time with Webster as she did by being with the team.
"The day was a blessing for us," Meier said. "We thanked her for letting us spend time with her and I truly meant it. We did nothing for her. She did everything for us. That's usually the case when you choose to give instead of complain. You end up receiving without knowing it."

Like Meier, Brown feels the team benefitted immensely from spending time with Webster.
"She was really an inspiration to me and I let her know that," Brown said. "I told her that she inspired me to be great and to be the best person I can possible be everyday. My experience with her was very touching because I have a personal connection with that. My grandmother had ovarian cancer, so I really enjoyed connecting with her, and I made sure we spent quality time together and she enjoyed herself."

A Louisiana native, Brown has always been involved in community service. The daughter and granddaughter of nurses, she was taught at a young age about the importance of helping others.
"It's just my character," Brown said. "My family has always been a very helping family. My grandmother always took people in and helped them get on their feet when they had nowhere to stay or no job. She would let them come in and she would cook for them. It's always been helping, helping, helping. That's just how my family is. My mother and grandmother are nurses so I guess it's kind of instilled in me. I am a giving person. Ilove positive energy and seeing people smile."

Brown spends a lot of her free time making people smile at the Yes Institute. The 20 -year-old has spent several months volunteering her time to make sure that others who need help are receiving it.
"Their mission is to keep children safe," Brown said of the Yes Institute."They basically focus on gender and (sexual) orientation. We talk to teachers, parents and administrators on how to approach people in that population because there are a lot of students that are not educated about homosexuality. It's a topic that's not talked about a lot because people don't feel more comfortable. We also talk to troubled teens and anybody who needs help getting through things. People being bullied, that may be suicidal or maybe something else is affecting them. I just go talk to people and give them my story and the experience I've had."

While Brown helps others off the court, she helps her team and coaches on the court.
"She calms me down," Meier said. "Maria and I have a good relationship. It's deep. I can usually get the pulse of them team when I look at her, she has a really expressive face. I know when things aren't right and I can know when things are good. She always says,'We got you coach, it's going to be okay.'She's one of those kids that really thinks about the coaches and let's us know'we're good and we've got it.' She's a very caring individual, and I really appreciate that about her. She honestly cares about people."

Brown uses her energy and magnetic personality to get the most out of herself and her teammates.
"I'm a very energetic person," Brown said. "I like seeing smiles on peoples faces and just making people happy. That's just my character. For me to be able to give that to my team and get it back from my team, it's important to me."

While stars like Morgan Stroman and Stefanie Yderstrom get most of the accolades, Meier feels players like Brown are instrumental in Miami's success.
"We can't win big time basketball games without her. We just can't","Meier said. "She brings physicality off the bench, keeping our spirits up, making sure everybody settles and she has a tremendous amount of poise. Most nights, if we're having a special game and we're clicking or playing with passion or intensity it usually goes back to something Maria did."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Freshmen make mistakes
Newcomers to the college game, freshmen often make their teammates and coaches cringe at some of the ill-advised decisions they make on the floor.
Inexperienced and error-prone freshmen rarely are expected to play key roles on a team, but Caprice Dennis is not a typical freshman. The 5-foot-8 point guard has earned Miami coach Katie Meier's trust by playing a key role in the Hurricanes' early success this season.
"It means a lot because for freshmen, it's tough to come in and get a lot of minutes," Dennis said. "You have a lot of upperclassmen and coaches trust them because they've been around and the coaches know what they're going to do. To gain Coach Meier's trust in such a short period means so much to me. I love that she trusts me."

While Meier has been impressed with Dennis' performance on the court, it's the 18 -year-old's hard work off the court that has helped her become a key member of Miami's rotation.
"I really enjoy when we're in film, whether it's one-on-one or with the guards or the entire team, she has the answer", Meier said. "I will rewind something and ask what they see and she knows it and has a solution for it. Players are going to make mistakes. They may dribble the ball off their foot sometimes, but I haven't seen her make a lot of choice mistakes or a lot of thought mistakes. For a freshman, that's a big deal."

Making the right choice is something Dennis has been trying to do for much of her life. Growing up in Detroit, Mich., Dennis honed her on-court decision-making skills on a daily basis.
"Detroit is a wonderful city," Dennis said. "A lot of people have different opinions on it, but being in the city day-in and day-out, I love it. It's always basketball there. Everybody is playing basketball and ever since I was a little kid, I always had a ball dribbling up and down the street. Wherever you go, you see someone playing basketball and I was one of those people."

While her daughter made great decisions on the court, Gwendolyn Gray wrestled with a difficult decision off the court. Following Dennis' freshman year at Detroit Pershing High, Gray allowed her daughter to move in with assistant girls' basketball coach Shawn Hill.
"My freshman year after high school, I moved in with my assistant coach at the time," Dennis said. "For the rest of my years, he was my head coach and he had nine children. I consider them my family so I consider myself to have 11 siblings. I moved in with him and stayed there until I came to college."

Dennis has a special relationship with Hill, whom she calls "Dad."The two speak often and she credits Hill for helping get her to where she is today, both as a basketball player and as a person.
"We still have a connection," Dennis said."He really helped me out a lot as far as getting focused on school. I really appreciate that. My mom had a lot to do with it, too. She made the decision to let me go. That was a big decision and I'm grateful for that."

Dennis made her first big decision during her senior year at Pershing. An all-state guard, Dennis was recruited by major programs like Kentucky, Texas and Kansas. She ultimately committed to the Jayhawks, but her strong decision-making skills led her to re-evaluate her choice to be sure it was the right one.
"When I was committed to Kansas, the reason I de-committed wasn't because I didn't want to go to Kansas. It was because I wanted to be sure that I made the right decision. I came out of it with the idea that I was still going to Kansas. That was my No. 1 school."

Everything changed when Dennis visited Miami. While Dennis was a Jayhawk coming into her visit, she left Coral Gables a Hurricane.
"I came on a visit here and I immediately had a great connection with Coach Meier," Dennis said. "I connected with the players, too, but the connection I had with Coach Meier so quickly was overwhelming. I was like 'wow, this is where I really want to be.'I talked to my family about it and they agreed that they loved the school and the program and we all made the decision that I should come here."

Meier noticed something special about Dennis during the guard's official visit. While the two shared time at practice and at a team function at Meier's home, Miami's coach feels the strongest bond between the two was formed over breakfast the next morning.
"We had the kids over to my house and I saw her observe the team," Meier said. "She didn't get really involved and she wasn't completely outgoing, but I definitely was watching her watch my team. I could see her smile at really quaint moments that meant a lot to me but some kids missed. Maybe it was Morgan Stroman just being silly with Suriya McGuire or having a player patting a coach on the head messing around, just that casualness that we have and I saw her see that stuff."
"So the next day at breakfast I said'I want to talk to you about some stuff I saw yesterday because people miss what's special down here.'They miss this relationship. I asked her what she saw in practice and her observations were that we build confidence and give our players a lot of power. She said she saw that we trusted them. She saw things that weren't just obvious. I thought she was a high-level thinker. She's very wise. So we talked on a higher level than our normal talks with a recruit. I wasn't selling myself or the program or the school. I was very interested in her and what made her tick and what was important to her. I think that is what started it."

That same morning, Dennis noticed Meier's genuine interest in her as a person. The young guard felt a connection similar to the relationship she had with Hill. That is when she knew she was going to be a Hurricane.
"She made me feel like I could trust her," Dennis said. "That is a big thing with me being able to trust somebody completely. She is such a wonderful person and if you're around her you know that she has this burst of enthusiasm at all times. No matter how her day is going, you won't know because she is always presenting herself with a lot of enthusiasm. From the beginning, I really liked her personality and since then, our relationship has grown a lot. I've gotten to know her better and I am always trying to pick her brain on and off the court to make our relationship better every day."

Along with her outstanding basketball talent, Dennis'strong decision-making skills have traveled with her to Coral Gables. She leads Miami's freshmen in minutes played and has made key contributions in the team's victories over No. 6 Penn State and Alcorn State.
"In our games against Penn State and Alcorn State, Caprice made huge plays for us,"Meier said. "Unfortunately, we needed those plays against Alcorn - which shouldn't have happened but we needed them - and she was in the lineup and withstood the run and answered it. In those two games, I have put her in to answer those runs and that shows a lot of confidence in a freshman."

Despite her early success, Dennis recognizes that there is room for improvement in her game and she has decided to be proactive in her efforts to mature as a player.
"There is always room to improve," Dennis said. "My shooting can get a lot better. I don't know my shooting percentage, but I know it's not the best. I'd like to get that up and I really want to focus on my ball handling. I think I can work on that a lot too."

Dennis also hopes to add muscle to make her more of an offensive force around the basket. At just 134 lbs , Dennis has struggled at times this season to get to the rim. But the freshman guard is confident her work with strength coach Alex Parr will help her finish strong in traffic going forward.
"I also definitely have to get a lot stronger," Dennis said. "You'll see some of my finishes where I get to the basket and I should be able to finish but I'm not capable because I'm not strong enough. I definitely want to get a lot stronger."

While physical strength is something Dennis lacks, her mental toughness is off the charts. Meier marvels at her ability to remain calm and composed in the most pressure-filled situations.
"She is very calm and steady Eddie," Meier said. "I remember right before Tennessee I said, 'Caprice, are you excited?'And she said, 'they play ball just like I do.'It was a straight pulse with no spiking. It has not been a roller coaster with her at all. It's just a matter of her understanding her role and playing. If you give her some freedom, she is going to make the right choices."

Relaxed under pressure, Caprice Dennis is avoiding the typical freshman mistakes and helping the Hurricanes make the right decisions on and off the court.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Adjusting to new surroundings is rarely easy.
Meeting new people and learning a new city can be challenging to anyone. But for someone shy like Keyona Hayes, that challenge can often seem terrifying.
Hayes moved a lot as a child, living all over Georgia and meeting new people more often than she would have liked.
"Growing up in Georgia was fun," Hayes said. "But I didn't really stay in the same spot. We moved around a lot so I had to make friends a few different times."
The 18 -year-old freshman is admittedly introverted and has never enjoyed talking to others, especially those she barely knows. Growing up, Hayes rarely said a word off the court. Instead, the 6 -foot- 1 forward preferred to let her stellar play on the court talk for her.
"Because I was on the basketball team, I was known and people wanted to talk to me," Hayes said. "I'm the type of person that will talk to you, but I probably wouldn't approach you first. So it was tough, but being on the basketball team helped me make friends whenever I was in a new place."

Hayes, who was an all-state selection at St. Francis High in Marietta, Ga., was not the typical superstar. People generally associate big-time players with big time egos, but Hayes never liked talking about herself or her accomplishments.

Her talent drew the attention of several universities, including Miami, South Carolina and Charlotte. While many recruits love the recruiting process and all the attention that comes with it, Hayes did not enjoy the need to converse with coaches at prospective universities.
"Recruiting was fun," Hayes said. "A lot of coaches called but I don't really like to talk to people, so I e-mailed them and talked to them on Facebook. I tried not to talk on the phone too much, but it was a fun process and definitely a good experience."

Ironically, it was conversations with Miami coach Katie Meier that drew Hayes to the Hurricanes.
"I really love Katie and she's a really good coach," Hayes said. "She makes you feel like you're important and like she needed you. She has a lot of energy and is always making you feel great. She's a very good person and has a great personality."

While on a recruiting visit to the Miami campus, Hayes got to know Meier and her future teammates. She instantly felt comfortable around the team and knew she wanted to join the Hurricane family.
"The team made me feel like I was a part of the family, even though I wasn't," Hayes said. "That's something most teams don't have. They made me feel like I had been here for a long time, even though I had just met them. It was a good feeling."

Like most freshmen, Hayes has an upperclassman that she looks up to and tries to emulate. Fortunately for Miami, that upperclassman is captain Morgan Stroman.
"We connected when she first stepped foot on campus in the summer,"Stroman said. "I stayed in the village so she came over and hung out with me and Suriya [McGuire] once. I have a close bond with a lot of people on the team. When practice was going on, the coaches would say, 'you two need to stick together. She can be really good if she looks up to you'I took that as a challenge to be a better leader, not just for her, but for everyone on the team. We hang out a lot and she's been taking it in. I really like how she plays on the court."

Stroman has been a contributor for Meier's team since the day she arrived in 2009. Now, the senior forward is contributing to the development of Hayes, whom many believe could be the next great player at Miami.
"I really wish I had the energy that Stro has," Hayes said. "I would be a whole different person because Stro has a lot of energy. I'm going to try to be that way."
Stroman, who leads the Canes in scoring, rebounding, blocks and steals, thinks Hayes can be the type of player she wants to be immediately.
"She just needs to step out of her comfort zone,"Stroman said. "I think she is a little stuck on how other people would react if she were to be more energetic. I think as long as you're out there playing basketball, you really don't need to worry about what anybody else thinks. She can do it and we've seen her do it in spurts. We just need that to be a continuous thing."

In her brief time at Miami, Hayes has forged bonds with Stroman and the rest of her teammates. Those strong relationships off the court have proven beneficial on the court, as Miami is off to a strong start this season.
"The whole team really hangs out a lot," Hayes said. "I look up to them and listen to what they have to say. They're really good people. I feel like our relationship off the court helps us play better on the court."
Hayes has been a key contributor as a freshman, providing offense and rebounding off the bench for the Canes. She has already scored double-digit points in three of Miami's first eight games, including a 14 -point, 11-rebound effort against FAU.
"I came in ready to help,"Hayes said."I knew what to expect from Coach and what she wanted from me. I came here ready to work and I earned my spot. Coach believed in me and I showed her that I'm ready to play."
Even though she has had success early in her career, Hayes admits that she would like to be more consistent. The talented forward sees plenty of room for improvement in her game.
"I'd like to improve my feet," Hayes said. "They're kind of slow. I believe that if I get that a little better, then I'll be able to move vertically and be alright. I work out with the coaches twice a week outside of practice to improve my footwork. It's already getting a little better because I can move quicker vertically now than I could before, but I still have a lot of work to do."

Hayes knows that improvement will not come easily. As someone who has always gotten by on natural ability, it has been challenging for Hayes to stay after practice and work on her game. But she has seen progress already and that has motivated her to continue to strive for excellence.
"I want to improve my work ethic," Hayes said. "I never really had to work for anything, so it's been kind of a challenge. At first, it was hard because I wasn't used to having to do extra workouts outside of practice. Now, I'm ready and always looking to get another workout in."

The freshman has big expectations for herself. While she is pleased with the way her career has begun, she aspires to be one of the all-time great Hurricanes by the time she leaves Miami.
"I think my career is going to go well," Hayes said. "I think I can become and All-American. I want to make the All-ACC team. I just have to work hard to get to that level."
Stroman sees plenty of signs that Hayes can become the star player that she hopes to be. She just needs to continue working hard to improve off her natural ability.
"There are so many people who come up to me and say they like Keyona Hayes and they like how she plays," Stroman said. "I agree with them. I think that by the time she leaves here she is going to be one of those players that is going to be remembered. She can catch anything you throw to her. She rebounds like crazy. Her field goal percentage is really good too. If she keeps it up and bumps her energy a little, she could be one of the greatest players to ever play here."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Leaving for college is tough for many athletes.
While the excitement of participating in college sports can be uplifting, many athletes struggle with leaving family and friends behind to further their athletic and academic careers.
Miami guard Suriya McGuire was a star at Roosevelt High in Minneapolis, Minn., but the 5 -foot-11 guard decided she wanted to play collegiately for the Hurricanes.
Like many college athletes around the country, McGuire was leaving her family and friends behind to pursue a college degree and athletic career. But the sophomore was leaving behind her best friend and closest confidant, her mother, Anjali.
"It's always been me and my mother," Suriya said.
The two have been inseparable, moving from city to city because of Anjali's job as an on-air radio personality. When Suriya decided she was going to attend Miami, both McGuires wondered what it would be like to be apart. Anjali admitted that she worried about how different it would be without Suriya around.
"Suriya is everything to me,"Anjali said. "My career is very important to me but my number one job has always been being her mom. I was always including her in anything that I did. She is always with me. People say we are connected at the hip. She is my best friend. She's not just my daughter."

The two did not have to worry for long, as Anjali found an opening at 95.7 The Beat in Tampa Bay. "Anjali the Queen B" moved to Florida to be closer to Suriya and she says the two of them could not be happier.
"I moved here because of her," Anjali said. "Part of me left, so I left Minneapolis to specifically be with her. Tampa was the closest I could get and it's such a blessing to be able to come see her. It was definitely worth moving and being closer to her."

The two speak daily on the phone and Anjali has come to visit Suriya at Miami "at least seven times." Anjali was in attendance for Sunday's game against North Carolina and was incredibly proud to see her daughter fulfilling her dream.
"It's such a blessing to see her succeed," Anjali said. "This is what she has worked so hard for. It's her passion. When I used to come home from work at two o'clock in the morning, she would ask if we could go outside and shoot. She would go to bed with the basketball. This is what she's always wanted and always worked for."

McGuire has provided key contributions to the Canes this season. Her tenacious defense has been instrumental in several Miami victories. Suriya has also hit a pair of game-winning shots, most recently in a win over Wake Forest on January 24.
"I think I've matured a lot," Suriya said. "I still have a lot of growing to do, but compared to last year, I've grown. I've been in a numerous situations where I could have either broke or progressed and I feel like I've been growing and progressing."

Suriya admits that she would like to be more confident on the court, but she struggles to maintain her confidence at a high level.
"It's always been that way for me," McGuire said. "It's not like I lost confidence when I got to college, I've been this way my whole life. I'm very passive. Everyone says 'you're right there, just shoot.' I've always been the player to pass first and not shoot. It's always been a confidence thing for me."

McGuire feels that a talk with her mother or some time with members of her Miami family help get her confidence back on track.
"I talk to my mother a lot," McGuire said. "The coaches try to keep me in it and so do my teammates."
Two teammates who McGuire turns to frequently are senior captain Morgan Stroman and junior guard Krystal Saunders.
"I got attached to Stro before I even got to school," McGuire said. "She kept communicating with me and trying to get me to come here. We just clicked. People say that we should be sisters. We say the same things and finish each other's sentences."

Stroman felt a connection with McGuire from the minute the two met during McGuire's recruiting visit to Miami.
"When she first got here, we noticed that we had the same personality,"Stroman said. "She wasn't even my recruit. I was just helping out, but we connected. Once she got here, we hung out more and developed that friendship and bond. That's like my sister on the team. I could tell her just about anything and be comfortable."

While McGuire and Stroman became close friends instantly, McGuire's relationship with Saunders took more time to develop.
"Me and Krystal got close with time," McGuire said. "She was my teammate and we were cool, but now, she is one of my best friends. It doesn't matter what it is, she will let you know what you need to know. That helps me. I like that she is honest with me."

Beyond being honest with McGuire, Saunders also helps keep a very emotional McGuire calm and focused.
"I'm a very emotional player," McGuire said. "When I don't make a shot, you're going to know. When I don't get a steal, you're going to know. When I do get it done, you're going to know, too. Krystal Saunders is the one that keeps me calm on the court and talks me through some things."

McGuire would like to control her emotions a bit better and improve on her jump shot. But the talented guard believes she can make the biggest contribution to Miami basketball by maturing as a player and a person.
"I hope that I keep progressing," McGuire said. "I feel like every year I have grown and I want to continue to mature. I fee I like I can do that and I want to continue to see myself progress and the team progress."

Anjali is confident that her daughter will continue to improve on and off the court and accomplish her goals.
"She is my greatest joy, my greatest accomplishment and my greatest legacy," McGuire said. "I feel like the best is yet to come."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Krystal Saunders never wanted to leave.
Family is very important to the West Park, Fla., native and she knew she wanted to play in front of them.
Saunders, who was named Florida's Miss Basketball in her senior year at South Broward High School, was recruited by nearly every major program in the country. But she always knew that Miami was where she wanted to be.
"I had a lot of schools coming after me but there was just something about Miami," Saunders said. "I loved how [head coach] Katie [Meier] interacted with her players, how much she cared about them and how much enthusiasm she had. I just felt like it was the right place for me to be and plus it was close to home. I had just moved back from Georgia, so I just felt like it was the right place for me."

Saunders originally had ACC rival Clemson as her leader during the recruiting process, but the appeal of playing close to home was impossible to turn down.
"I'm very appreciative to have my family there because most of the girls don't," Saunders said. "I'm from 30 minutes away, sol can drive home whenever I want to. I even take the girls sometimes so they can be with my family because they're away from theirs. I'm very grateful just to have them at every game. They have season tickets for a reason. They don't miss one game."'

The 5 -foot-8 guard has always had a large group of family and friends supporting her at the BankUnited Center, but her mother and biggest fan, Kala, was finally able to join that cheering section this season.
"It's great because my mom is there," Saunders said. "She was in Georgia and she just moved back this year, so it's great to see her face because she's my No. 1 fan. After a game, I get a phone call from her and we talk about basketball all the time and just to see her face cheering me on is great."

Miami head coach Katie Meier noticed a positive change in Saunders since her mother moved back to south Florida.
"I think she's a lot more aware of who she is," Meier said. "She is just a little bit more grounded now. I think she gets real good feedback from her mom, real honest feedback. Krystal puts a lot of pressure on herself and definitely expects to make every shot she takes and she expects every pass to be converted. I mean she's totally a perfectionist, which you find a lot in female athletes who have done well, and I think it's nice to kind of have her mom there and just be like, 'You did good, you did good. You know 5 for 8 is still pretty good.' think it's important for Krystal to have that sounding board too."

While Saunders' cheering section gained a key component this year, it also lost one of her biggest fans when her grandfather, Michael, passed away. The 21-year-old is dedicating her season to her lost loved one.
"It happened so soon," Saunders said. "I told myself to stay strong for my mom and just play hard whenever I go out there for him."
Meier knows that it is hard for anyone to remain focused when they lose someone they love, but she is impressed with how Saunders has handled herself after her grandfather's passing.
"I think that's just an inspiration for her," Meier said of Saunders honoring her grandfather. "Krystal's family is deeply rooted in basketball. Their family and basketball is like intertwined. That's where they do a lot of their socialization, a lot of their conversations, so it was a big loss for her. I thought she handled it really, really well, really maturely and you can kind of see Krystal has definitely grown up this season."

Saunders' path to Miami is an interesting one. Meier and her staff were aware of Saunders' play at South Broward High School, but a call from fellow South Broward alum and former Hurricane great Tamara James really jumpstarted Miami's pursuit of Saunders.
"Tamara was back working out at her high school and she called me and was like'I love this kid,"' Meier said. She said, 'she's a Katie Meier player. She competes, she's smart, she dives on the floor, she talks, she does all the things you love in a player.'

Meier valued her former star's opinion and went to get a better look at Saunders. What she saw was exactly what James described and that prompted her to invite Saunders to a Miami home game.
"It was [Shenise Johnson's] freshman year and we lost to North Carolina," Meier said. "Krystal was at the game and she figured she couldn't come back to talk. I was like, 'oh no, come back here now. I want to know you and I need you to be in these moments. I'm not only going to bring the recruits back when we win. Come in here and tell me what you saw.' She said, 'you need to get [Shenise] some help.'

So I said, 'well can you help?' And she said 'yeah.' If anyone has that much moxie that they can come in here and tell me whatever with that much confidence, I was like'well let's do it. You have the offer.' She looked me straight in the eye and said 'you need me.'I'll never forget that. It was awesome."

Meier believes the honest moment she and Saunders shared that day played a big part in her wanting to come to Miami. The transparency Meier and her staff showed
"I think that honest moment, that raw moment was big," Meier said. "She's been pretty close with all of the coaches that she's had and I think that was really important for her to have that trust factor. She was able to see that we weren't hiding anything. That was who we were."

Since arriving at Miami, Saunders has blossomed as a player. Originally a role player in her early years, she has stepped into a key role for the Hurricanes as a junior.
"Halfway through the season, I guess we sort of figured that Krystal needed more time at the point," Meier said. "She can think very quickly and she makes very quick decisions and she has a good amount of certainty when she makes them. When [Michelle Woods] went down with the flu, Krystal really stepped up and then you just saw a new side of her emerging. That's where her leadership has really been coming along. It happens a lot in basketball when you have to fill another role and you just add it to your capacity. That's been fun she seeing her just expand her game."

Saunders recognizes the importance of her development. She, along with veterans Morgan Stroman, Stefanie Yderstrom and Pepper Wilson, needs to be a consistent performer for the Canes to continue their success.
"I felt like I had to step up and be a leader," Saunders said. "We have Pep and Stro and Stef, but I feel like my role as a point guard, just being a vocal leader, that's where my progression came from and that brought confidence to my game."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Absolutely perfect.
Morgan Stroman could not imagine a better way to wrap up her Hurricane career than by beating No. 4 Duke in her final game at the BankUnited Center.
"I was glad that the Duke game was on our Senior Night,"Stroman said. "I could not ask for a better way to finish here."
Stroman had 11 points and six rebounds to help push Miami past Duke, 69-65. It was the first time the Hurricanes beat the Blue Devils in program history.
"I just said to myself and to my teammates, 'we aren't losing this game,"'Stroman said. "It didn't matter who we were playing, we were going to go out and we were going to play our hardest and our toughest game. We were going to do whatever we had to do to win this game. I knew we were going to be the best we could be, and that's what we did. We went out there and did it."

A four-time state champion, Stroman was named a McDonald's All-American in her senior year at Lower Richland High School in Hopkins, S.C. The star forward earned accolades nationally for her basketball skills and she could have played collegiately at nearly any school in the country. Instead of joining one of the traditional powerhouse programs, Stroman decided to join a Miami head coach Katie Meier and a team that had won 13 games the season before her freshman year.
"I just had that feel when I came here from the coaches,"Stroman said. It was that authentic feel, like I didn't think they were feeding me stuff just to get me to come here. I felt like it was real, and that's one of the reason why I chose this school. I also wanted to help build a program. Looking back at my time here, I feel like all of our seniors have done a really good job while we were here. That has made my career so much better to look back on."

Stroman knew playing at Miami would present challenges that she was not accustomed to. The early years of her career were tough. But she helped Miami win 96 games and counting, second-most for a senior class in school history behind the 1992-93 senior class that won 99 games.
"I came from a winning program in high school,"Stroman said. "When I came here, all I was thinking about was winning. It was kind of tough my freshman year, because we didn't win as much. When you come into that, you have to learn to transition, you have to mature and you have to stay composed. I think we did a really good job over my four years here. That's what it's about, winning, having fun and going out there and playing your heart out."

Incredible determination and a desire to be the best are just two of the many reasons why Stroman has been a phenomenal player at Miami. The senior forward eclipsed 1,000 career points this season and could finish with over 1,350 before her collegiate career ends.

Despite all of her personal accomplishments, Stroman is proudest of the team success she has been a part of and the relationships she has made while at Miami.
"This is the best thing that I've ever been a part of as a player besides playing with my best friends in high school,"Stroman said. "It's like my second family, these girls love me for me and I love them for them. I would never judge them in any kind of way. I think that the relationship between all of us is just great."

While Stroman is close with all of her teammates, she reflected on the years spent with fellow seniors Stefanie Yderstrom and Pepper Wilson and could not help but get nostalgic.
"The seniors, I love them to death," Stroman said. "Stefanie Yderstrom came in with me freshman year. She had kind of a tough start because she couldn't play her first couple of games. But it didn't matter because once she came in, she made a great impact."
"Pepper, I love her,"Stroman said. "I never played with a big girl like that before and she can actually run up and down the court, get the ball, put it in the basket. That's all the stuff you really want in other basketball players and they're both great people. You can have a heart to heart with them anytime. They are going to tell you what you need to know and they're going to be there for you."

Stroman has led the Canes to another 20-win season this year, her fourth in four years at Miami. With so many great memories, the senior star singled out two that stood out most to her.
"Beating Duke, right now, that is my favorite memory," Stroman said. "But other than that, I would have to say probably going home to Clemson for the last time and having a great game at Clemson in front of my mom and family. She brought the high school team out to see me play and my best friend was there, too. I really enjoyed, not just the game, but having everyone come support me at that game because I don't really get a chance to play home that much."

Unlike her high school career, Stroman has yet to win a championship in college. As a junior, many figured Miami would have a chance to come home as NCAA champions. A team led by All-Americans Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams, with Stroman, Yderstrom and Wilson providing support, would be a tough out in the NCAA Tournament.

But Stroman missed the final 13 games of the season due to a season-ending Achilles' injury and Miami ultimately fell short of their goal, losing in the second round of the tournament.
"Sometimes I do think last year, that could have been our year," Stroman said. "But at the same time, I felt like getting hurt was a blessing in disguise. I'm like a gym rat, so when I was hurt it was so frustrating not to be in that gym. Suriya McGuire was there with me 100 percent. She was always there asking me if I needed something."
"Once I was able to walk again and be able to be on my feet, I was in the gym with her, just working," Stroman said. "If I couldn't run, I was doing ball handling or form shooting. But I was determined to get back on the court and be better than I was before and not just get back at that same level."

Stroman's hard work paid off as she has turned in an outstanding senior campaign that saw her being selected first team All-ACC by both the conference's coaches and the Blue Ribbon Panel of media members who vote on weekly and postseason awards.
"Coming back and showing the ACC that I can still play was big for me,"Stroman said. "I'm going to play hard, no matter what and I think that gave me a confidence boost that I am a great player."
The versatile forward aspires to play professionally once her career in Coral Gables ends. Whether it is in the WNBA or somewhere else, Stroman is determined to succeed as a professional.
"I see myself playing basketball somewhere,"Stroman said. "I'm going to play. It doesn't matter where, I'm going to play. I'm going to work my butt off now so that I can play in the future."
She also sees a bright future for the program she loves so dearly.
"I see them having a very good program going forward,"Stroman said. "Coach Meier is doing everything she has to do to build this program and the seniors are doing what we have to so to make the program better than what we had it."

Stroman calls Meier one of the biggest influences on her life. The two are incredibly close and Stroman credits her relationship with Meier as one of the main reasons why she decided to attend the university. But no one has had a bigger influence on Stroman than her mother and high school coach, Debbie.
"She has been coaching since as long as I can remember," Stroman said. "She keeps the story of when she was pregnant with me and she was going to the championship game. I guess I was born to be a champion. I think I was just always in the gym, even outside. If I couldn't get to the gym, I had a hoop outside. She would always correct my form or give me pep talks or tell me what to do to get better. Also, my dad, Donnie, would be in my ear giving me that confidence that I needed. I just grew up around basketball and I credit them a lot for helping me get to where I am."

All of her hard work has helped Stroman become one of the top players in the ACC. But the humble star will not take sole credit for all of the success Miami has had with her on the roster.
"I think it's just the group coming in and learning how to adapt to each other,"Stroman said. "We learned how to come together as team and feed off of each other. We have a great coach, great assistants and great teammates. You can't do anything else but win when you're practicing well and you're doing everything else well."

The extra practice and work with her coaches and teammates went a long way towards writing the perfect narrative that Stroman hoped for. When reflecting on how Stroman got her wish, Miami's head coach could not be prouder of how her seniors finished off their final home game as Hurricanes.
"You get some special moments in coaching and you go through a grind," Meier said. "You have some disappointments and tough losses along the way and then something like this happens to people who truly deserve it. I mean these three, it's such a great script for them and I'm not sure it would have happened if we hadn't had some bitter losses along the way."
"I'm not sure it would have been as rewarding and as fulfilling for them without those bitter losses,"Meier said. "But they know they deserved it, they know they earned it, they know they played as hard as they could possibly play and it was just a matter of finishing that game when it came time to finish. It is a career-rewarding moment to have three of the favorite kids you have ever coached be a part of this."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - The Canes just beat No. 4 Duke, 69-65, to secure their first win over the ACC power in program history.
Seniors Morgan Stroman, Stefanie Yderstrom and Pepper Wilson guided their team to a marquee win in their final home game at the BankUnited Center. Fans stormed the court to celebrate the victory with the team, head coach Katie Meier and her staff.

Amid the celebration stood a 6 -foot-2 young woman in a dress. Fans may not have recognized her in the moment, but they will next season, when Jassany Williams makes her Hurricanes debut.
Williams has had an interesting first year in Coral Gables. A transfer from Auburn University, she was forced to sit out the season due to NCAA transfer rules.
While she knew she could not play in games this year, Williams planned to make the most of her time by improving her game and helping her teammates improve in practice. But her plan was derailed when she tore her Achilles' tendon shortly after arriving at Miami in the summer.
"When I got hurt, I felt like somebody had tripped me on the court,"Williams said. "I was not sure of what was going on. I just I knew I fell and I didn't experience any initial pain but I couldn't get up really. People get hurt all the time in the game of basketball. I never had a major injury that kept me away from basketball, not even for a day, so lam just thinking I got a little bump and I'll be ready to go."

But the staff knew this was much more than the typical bumps and bruises that athletes often endure in a practice. Williams was not in Miami when Stroman tore her Achilles' tendon last season but everyone else in the gym that day knew exactly what the newest Hurricane was about to experience.
"When they finally told me, it was devastating blow,"Williams said. "Everyone around me knew the situation and knew that feeling and what was going on because of Stroman's situation. For me, I was completely oblivious. I was thinking'give me some Tylenol and I'll be back tomorrow.' It was definitely a shocker and I just had to take it all in and just know that everything was going to be okay."

So while the Hurricanes were working tirelessly to prepare for the Duke game, all Williams could do was sit and watch. A fierce competitor, Williams has struggled with being confined to her rehab. There is nothing she wants to do more than be on the court with her teammates.
"The most challenging thing for me is patience,"Williams said. "They always preach patience and taking it one step at a time and how that is very important. It is the biggest thing I am trying to focus on, learning to be patient. It is coming around but I still have many lessons to learn."

Williams has worked hard with trainer Alana Eichman and strength coach Alex Parr to ensure that she will be ready to contribute next season like Stroman did this year.
"They all have been in this predicament before with Stroman's injury so I feel like they are very capable of helping me get back to where I was, especially seeing how productive Stroman is now."
Williams has noticed a significant increase in her overall strength and she credits Parr for helping her attain that gain.
"I can tell he is definitely getting me stronger,"Williams said. "I can tell because when I first got here, I could not even do one pushup and now I am doing multiple pull-ups and lifts so I can definitely see the results."
Her work with Eichman has been equally as important.
"As far as me being stronger with my legs and everything, Alana has been helping me get better at stretching and I just feel so much better all-around," Williams said. "I feel like I am going to be so ready to play when I get the chance to get back on the court."

Williams has also gotten help on dealing with the injury from Stroman. The two live together and have been brought closer by their common injury.
"Stro provides me with tons of support,"Williams said. "This whole experience has been new to me and, of course, she has been through it before so she has been very helpful. She has told me what to expect next and has been someone I can just talk to. Not everyone understands the situation you are in. Granted, a lot of people have been hurt before, but to have the same exact injury in the same way, she has been able to walk me through things and has been there as a support system through this journey."

Despite the difficult rehab, Williams sees positives from the situation she is in. The redshirt junior feels she has grown immensely since arriving at Miami.
"I look at it now as a blessing in disguise because there were a lot of aspects of my game that I needed to work on that were not necessarily physical aspects," Williams said. "Coach [Meier] spoke a lot to me about being poised on the court and taking my time and doing what I know how to do. I used to always be very jittery or antsy type of person, but this injury has helped me realize that I need to take everything as it comes to me. I think it is going to translate to court because I am more patient and more calm and collected. Overall, I think that has been the biggest thing that has come out of this injury."

The Davie, Fla., native nearly chose Miami as her college choice when she was coming out of Nova High School. Williams struggled with the decision for a long time
"It was tough because I loved Coach Meier and I loved both schools,"Williams said. "The deciding factor for me came when Coach Meier told me that she was not sure if her contract would be renewed and that was a tough pill to swallow."

So Williams went to Auburn, where she played in 62 games over two seasons. But her situation changed and she decided to transfer. Williams remembered how fond she was of Meier and the Hurricanes were coming off a 26-6 season, so Miami became an intriguing option.
"It definitely made it easier to leave for the simple fact that I knew someone else really wanted me,"Williams said. "That is always the biggest case when transferring. Where do you want to go? Do you have options? Knowing that Katie was here waiting with open arms definitely made the situation so much better. It was definitely a long process. I had to do a lot of soul searching. I talked about it with my family and we realized it was the best situation for me."

Once Williams returns to action, she anticipates being an impact player for the Canes. A versatile player that can perform in the post and on the wing, She has set lofty goals for her tenure in Miami.
"The first thing for me is to dunk consistently in games,"Williams said. "It is something I want to do. I have stressed to Coach Meier that I have tendency to try that at least once per game, so that is something I am looking forward to doing. I want to also at least have a double-double every game. I feel like there are certain things that I am supposed to contribute to the team, especially being an upperclassman and being somebody who has had experience at multiple positions. I am supposed to come and do everything I can to help this team. I think that is one of the things I need to contribute, averaging a double-double and being a leader and accepting my role on the squad."

Williams will join Krystal Saunders, Suriya McGuire and the rest of the Hurricanes on the court next season and she expects the wins to keep coming in Coral Gables.
"I definitely feel like we are in a position to do that,"Williams said. "Coach is phenomenal. She works with you all the time to strengthen your game and add more weapons your arsenal, so I feel like we are going to be good and continue to establish a winning tradition. We have a lot of incoming freshmen that are capable of doing that and we have returning players that are just as capable. We are going to be very strong. Everyone here has a positive attitude and a great work ethic. I think that is what I am going to help continue to bring to the team. I love to work and see my teammates get better. I just know it is going to be a good experience."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Overcoming seemingly insurmountable odds may seem impossible for most, but Shawnice Wilson has been doing just that for as long as she can remember.
Wilson, who was nicknamed "Pepper" as a child by her grandmother, grew up in a difficult situation. Pepper spent much of her youth in foster care, but she always worked hard to be the best she could be at everything she did.
"I had a tough life growing up,"Wilson said. "I grew up in a low-income neighborhood. When I was younger, I was in foster care. I really wasn't family-oriented like most people are used to growing up. There really weren't opportunities for me as a child."

The 6-foot-6 center always had the size for basketball, but she admits that she was never the most skilled player. But her uncle played professionally overseas and that ultimately led her to the game. In typical Wilson fashion, she committed herself fully to be the best player she could be.
"Once I chose it, I committed myself to it," Wilson said. "I'm not one of those people that was born with great skills; I had to work at it for a long time to get to where I'm at. I started watching college basketball and the WNBA and I realized the potential opportunities basketball could give me. Then I had 100 scholarship offers, so I just continued to commit myself to basketball and to school, as well. I said to myself, 'Once I get out of my neighborhood, I do not want to go back.'That's always been my motivation."

A Pittsburgh, Pa., native, Wilson excelled on the court at Westinghouse High School. She was named District Player of the Year in her junior and senior seasons and scored 1,540 points in her career at Westinghouse.
Wilson was ranked 23rd out of the top 50 high school seniors in 2008 by Slam Magazine and earned an invitation to the prestigious adidas Top Ten All-America Camp.
Her success at Westinghouse was not limited to the hardwood, as she was a member of the National Honor Society and graduated first in her class. That combination of brains and basketball skill made her a very attractive recruit to colleges around the country.

Wilson could have gone to nearly any school in the United States, but her decision came down to the University of Miami and the University of Pittsburgh. After weighing her options. Wilson decided to play for the hometown Panthers.

Her two years at Pitt were solid. Wilson averaged 6.9 points and 5.3 rebounds per game and recorded an impressive 83 blocks in 57 starts. She was named to the BIG EAST All-Freshman team and was a finalist for the USA Basketball U19 squad, but she decided that Pitt was not the right situation for her.
"I started my career thinking I'd never leave Pitt,"Wilson said. "One of the reasons I transferred was because I didn't think I could reach my potential there."
The decision to leave Pittsburgh was a difficult one. She had a lot of local support in the area and would be leaving that all behind for a new place where she would probably know very few people.
"It was hard because I knew I was leaving behind the fact that my Dad was able to come to all my games and my family was able to come,"Wilson said. "I had a lot of support from my hometown, but I knew I needed to start a new journey somewhere else and help start my career."

When she was looking for her next school, she remembered a conversation she had with Miami head coach Katie Meier a few years earlier when Wilson told the Canes' coach that she was choosing Pitt over The U.
"I remembered what Coach Meier said,"Wilson said. She told me,''You are a great player. I know you will have a ton of success and I think you will win a gold medal for our country.' just remembered how genuine she was. She respected my decision when a lot of coaches didn't. As soon as I knew I was transferring from Pittsburgh, I knew I was going to Miami. Not for the school or for the environment, but for Coach Meier. I didn't even know anyone else. It was going to be a completely different team here from when I was recruited, but it didn't matter because I trusted Coach Meier."

Wilson admires her head coach tremendously. The two have a special bond and Wilson believes playing for Meier has helped her maximize her potential.
"I think Coach Meier is a great person who is helping me reach my goals," Wilson said. "I'm just glad I chose to come here and got the opportunity to play for Coach Meier because she's a great person and a great mentor. I don't look up to many people, but I look up to her."

Meier is just one of the many great people Wilson has encountered since she arrived in Coral Gables three years ago. The veteran center believes the people she has met and relationships she has built while at Miami will help her succeed once she moves on to begin her post-collegiate life.
"I think the one great thing I've experienced outside of basketball is the amount of great people I have met and all of the networking I have done," Wilson said. "President Shalala is great. Coach Meier is great. The fan base is full of great people. The number one thing that I've loved about coming here is the great people I've met and the fact that this is a very prestigious university. I think that alone, outside of basketball, will help me succeed in the future."

But Wilson is proud of her basketball success, as well. She was part of Miami's talent-filled squad that won 26 games and earned a No. 3 seed in the NCAA tournament a year ago. This season, she helped guide the Canes to 20 wins in the regular season, including a victory over No. 4 Duke for the first time in program history.
"This win will always be my favorite memory here,"Wilson said of beating the Blue Devils. "When I came here, we beat Maryland and even though I wasn't playing, that was a great memory. So was beating Florida State. I really enjoy those memories, but beating Duke on Senior Night and they're Top 5 in the country and we're in the middle of the conference, this will always be my best memory as a Hurricane."

The victory over Duke was Miami's first in 11 tries. The Hurricanes had a shot to snap their losing streak earlier this year, when they were tied at 29 at halftime. But Duke cruised in the second half to a $82-43$ win.
"That wasn't going to happen again," Meier said following her team's $69-65$ win over the Blue Devils on Feb. 28 . "If that's what needed to happen for this moment to be possible for these three seniors on their Senior Night, then maybe it was worth it because we got a lot better in a month."

Following a celebration at half court, Wilson joined fellow seniors Morgan Stroman and Stefanie Yderstrom in trying to explain what the moment felt like when the clock hit zero and the victory was official.
"I'm just in awe," Wilson said following the big win. "It's one of the biggest dreams I've ever had to beat one of the Top 5 teams in the nation. I know there were a lot of people who doubted us and I know how important this one was for us. Right now, I'm just happy. I'm happy that my last game on our home court ended this way. I'm happy that I got to play it with a group of girls who love me and care for me as a person, on and off the court, and I couldn't ask for a better team and a better coaching staff. It's just great."

Wilson's time at Miami may be nearing its end, but the senior sees a very bright future for the program.
"I think this will be a great program,"Wilson said. "I think the program might have to shift its style of play based on personnel, but a lot of teams go through that. I think there will be more success because we have one of the top recruiting classes coming in next year. I'm sure a lot of people didn't expect us to have even over 15 wins this year but we did it, even though we had some tough losses. I know they will bring in players to help the program be great."

Pepper loves Miami and Miami loves Pepper. Wilson has no intentions of forgetting about the Canes after she graduates in May. In fact, she could see herself returning to Miami as a student or a coach one day.
"I still want to play professional basketball,"Wilson said. "The WNBA has been my dream. If I don't get drafted now, I will work hard to get in there. Even if I don't, I want to play professionally and travel the world. But once I am done playing, I am interested in going back to school to get my master's degree and maybe end up coaching one day."

Whether she is playing basketball or in a classroom or doing something else, Wilson will likely be successful in whatever she decides to do.
Her determination and commitment have always helped her achieve her goals and she has proven time and time again that she will not give up until she attains her goals.
That is how you overcome seemingly insurmountable odds.
That is how you fulfill your dreams.
That is the only thing Pepper Wilson knows how to do.
And she couldn't be happier.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Michelle Woods may not be the most talkative player, but her game makes a lot of noise on the court.
The sophomore guard leads the Hurricanes in 3-point percentage, while ranking second in assists and minutes, and third in scoring.
Woods, 20, has been successful playing point guard for Miami despite lacking the outgoing personality that most great floor generals naturally have.
"I'm a quiet person,"Woods said. "The coaches want to see me talk more on the floor but I don't talk that much."
Miami coach Katie Meier and her staff constantly reminds Woods to be more vocal on the floor. When the young guard is not being verbal enough, Meier is quick to give Woods a reminder of what she needs to do.
"If I'm not talking, she'll probably make me run and that reminds me to talk," Woods said. "They'll pull me aside and talk to me about what they want me to do. If I still don't talk enough, I know I'll probably be running."

Woods admits that she could be more vocal but Meier has already seen the sophomore improve as a leader from when she first arrived on campus prior to last season.
"She's made a significant improvement in that area," Meier said. "She knows the game. When someone is in the wrong spot for her, that upset her but she wasn't communicating it. She was just being upset and leaving it alone. We're pretty frank around here and we told her'what do you think is going to change?'We only have five timeouts a game so if you need something to change, you can't wait for the coaches to fix it for you. She realized that she needed to take charge and she's done a great job with it."

## Silent recruitment

Communication was a struggle for Woods during her recruitment, as well. A two-time Class 2A Player of the Year in Florida, Woods guided her team to a pair of state titles and five district titles while playing for her father, Mitch Woods, at Naples Community School.

All of her accolades made her a highly attractive prospect to schools all around the country and Woods was bombarded with letters and phone calls from college coaches trying to get her to join their programs.
"My dad would get phone calls from coaches and he was always telling me to call coaches,"Woods said. "I didn't really listen though because I don't like to talk. I got bombarded with letters, but I wouldn't open most of them up. The schools that were too far away I wouldn't even open their letters."

Woods' father, who played collegiately at Rollins College in Winter Park, Fla., played a key role in forming Woods as a basketball player.
"I look up to him,"Woods said. "He always tells me stuff to do like put up extra shots or work on my ball handling and study my plays. He is always trying to help me improve as a player and a point guard."
Playing for her father for most of her career, Woods looked for a coach that she could connect to like she did with her father. Though Meier is more animated than Coach Woods, Michelle felt a connection to Miami's coach similar to what she had with her dad.
"My dad is really calm and she is very different,"Woods said. "Coach Meier is very enthusiastic, animated and has a lot of energy. Coach Meier likes to yell to get her message through but it's in a good way. Off the court, she is like a mom. She takes care of us. She's always looking out for us and always willing to help us."

Woods weighed all of her options and settled on a final three of Florida State, Florida Gulf Coast and Miami.
"Gulf Coast is like 15 minutes from home but I didn't want to be that close to home,"Woods said. "FSU is kind of far away, so Miami was perfect. It was the best choice. It's only like an hour and a half away from home. But I didn't talk to the coaches and tell them that. I came on my official visit and after that, I was sure I was going to come here."

While Woods knew she wanted to be a Hurricane, Meier and her staff were not as confident.
"She made sense to us, being from a great family and local enough,", Meier said. "We were far enough away where she could get a little bit away from home but was still within driving distance. I felt good about her but we couldn't really get a read on her."

Before Woods told Meier she wanted to be a Hurricane, the talented guard scared Miami's coach into thinking she was going to play collegiately at the University of South Florida.
"She had gone to South Florida's team camp for a weekend and that had us nervous," Meier said. "She called me right after the camp and she did really well. I thought'oh gosh, that's closer to home and I didn't hear from her all weekend.' So she finally calls me and tells me'Coach, you've been recruiting me the hardest and the longest and I have so much respect for you guys that I wanted you to know that I've made my decision.'And my heart just dropped because she said, 'I don't want you to have to read this in the paper.' And I was like'no way did we lose this kid!'I had a horrible feeling and then she goes 'I'm committing to Miami.'I remember yelling at her and her parents because they had me going, but I was so excited to hear that she was going to join us."

## Overcoming challenges

Woods has always been the quiet floor general. As one of the best high school players in Florida, Woods was a star without having to say much, so becoming a more vocal leader has been a challenge for her.
"I struggled with it in high school,"Woods said. "I didn't talk much in high school and having to communicate more now is different and new to me. I've been working on it though to try and get better at it."
The second-year guard is still timid at times, but she is becoming the leader Meier wants running her offense.
"She is demanding things from her teammates now,"Meier said. "She's a very nice young lady and well raised but she is demanding when she needs to be. The team is figuring out what it takes to win and that's been fun to watch, especially in her. She's not saying'I shouldn't yell at her because she is a senior.' Someone is making a mistake on her team under her command and she is demanding more from them. That's going to make her an important player for us."

While Woods is tackling the challenge of overcoming her quiet demeanor to become a better communicator, the talented guard has always challenged herself in different ways on the basketball court and found success.

She grew up playing youth basketball with her older brother, Mitch. Early on, opposing teams did not guard Woods because she was a girl. Then they saw her play and made her a focal point as they tried to defend the future Division I player.
"It made me better,"Woods said of playing against boys."They were much faster and stronger but I could still hang with them. A lot of teams didn't want to guard me because I was a girl and they thought I would get hurt. But then they saw that I could play and they had to guard me."

After playing with the boys for three years, Woods transitioned to girls' basketball. But playing with girls her own age proved to be boring and uncompetitive so she decided to play against older, more physically mature girls.
"I had to play up because there was no competition,"Woods said. "It was easy playing against people my age. As I started playing up, it was a little bit intimidating. I was really young and worried that I would get my shot blocked all the time. But then I started to gain confidence."

Meier has seen Woods' confidence soar as the season has progressed. With every game, Woods has become more of a leader and earned more of Meier's trust. Though just a sophomore, Meier considers Woods one of the leaders on the team and someone who holds the responsibilities of an upperclassman.
"She is extremely talented," Meier said. "She's a very composed player. She definitely wants to have command of the game. In her freshman year, she didn't have to have as big of a role because of the All-Americans we had in the backcourt, but she had a very important role. I think she knows that she has worth here, but it's a matter of her taking that next huge step. So much has graduated from our backcourt. Most freshmen get a little more responsibility in their sophomore year, but it's like she has junior responsibilities right now. That's a big leap for her because we ask her to play a lot of point guard."

Following in the footsteps of stars Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams, Woods has had to take on significant responsibilities. Johnson and Williams were the primary ball handlers on a team that went to the second round in the NCAA tournament last year. This season, Meier has turned to Woods and senior Stefanie Yderstrom to make Miami's offense go and she has been pleased with how Woods has responded.
"Playing point guard for me is not easy. It's fun, but it's not easy," Meier said. "I want you to think as quickly as I do and that's a very hard thing to do. To have all the options in your brain and picking one of those options as you're going full speed down the court. Early on, I think the adjustment we made with Michelle was giving her two options instead of 20 . We give her two and then in the next time out we'll give her two more. I think you can see she is getting command of the game that way and that is going to help us in ACC play."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. - Stefanie Yderstrom's career at Miami almost never came to fruition.
Basketball is not immensely popular in Yderstrom's hometown of Östertälje, Sweden. In fact, she initially focused on equestrian, before transitioning to the basketball court.
"I was horseback riding, because we have a big farm and I started competing in that,"Yderstrom said. "I kind of miss it, but basketball is something that I really enjoy."
The daughter of Swedish hockey legend Dick Yderstrom, athleticism is in Stefanie's blood. When her mother Charlotta re-married, it was to legendary Swedish basketball player and coach Jan Enjebo. Being surrounded by athletics from a very young age, Yderstrom feels like she was destined to shine in sports.
"I think it definitely pushed towards sports,"Yderstrom said. "My stepdad was my basketball coach. We had a great relationship from when my mom first met him. And then my dad was a great ice hockey player. We can talk more mental stuff. He doesn't know a lot about basketball but he's really well educated about sports, in general, and with the mentality you need to succeed. I think growing up with that helped me a lot."

A fierce competitor, Yderstrom played for Swedish national youth teams since she was 15 . She has competed in four youth European Championships and led the U19 Swedish team to a silver medal at the 2007 World Championships.
"I think that was one of the reasons why I was so fascinated by college and wanting to come to the states and play,"Yderstrom said.
The 5 -foot-8 guard knew she wanted to study and play basketball in the United States, but she did not know where. Two friends from her club team in Sweden played collegiately in America and their stories only fueled Yderstrom's desire to play across the Atlantic Ocean. So she sent out emails to schools and began to whittle down her list.
"The University of Miami was one of the schools that I was really, really interested in," Yderstrom said. "I got a good connection with the coaching staff and I really clicked with Coach Meier. I liked how she looked at the game and how she was as a person."

Yderstrom and Meier stayed in contact and the guard sent Miami's staff some game tape for them to analyze. Meier loved what she saw on film and she knew she wanted Yderstrom to be a Cane.
But the talented guard was a hot commodity and fellow ACC rival Duke was very interested in Yderstrom, as well. So Meier decided one day before the final day of recruiting contact that she would fly to Sweden to meet with the prized recruit in person. The coach's trip to Sweden made a huge impact on Yderstrom's decision.
"She came over to watch me play in Sweden for a game and then we met for a little bit after a game,"Yderstrom said. "I came for a visit here, but I pretty much already knew this was the school I wanted to go to because of how it went when Coach Meier came to visit me."

Meier took a big risk in flying half way around the world with the hopes that she could secure Yderstrom's commitment. Yderstrom took a huge risk in leaving home for a foreign country with few acquaintances. But both are thrilled with the risks they took because they ultimately got the results they desired.
"This whole experience here has been amazing,"Yderstrom said. "When I graduate, I'll probably look back and be like'I really just left home and went to a foreign country.'Not a lot of people would do that and I think you have to be a little crazy to do that."

Yderstrom, who turns 23 in April, admits that it was a major adjustment when she first arrived in Miami. She knew a little English and only knew the basketball staff and her teammates, but she is proud of how she handled herself over the past four years.
"It's a big difference, culturally,"Yderstrom said. "The people are very different here than in Sweden. Not having your family with you is hard, at first. I lived at home with my mom and my stepdad and I didn't have them around for the first time. I had to be on my own and find my way and be my own person."

But Yderstrom's adjustment was eased thanks to her relationship with her coaches and teammates. They helped her feel welcome in her new surroundings and fall in love with the school and the city.
"That helps a lot,"Yderstrom said. "The coaching staff and the team, really everyone around here, doing everything they can to help you succeed and make it feel like home. Looking back, this is really the best place I could have come to."

Coming in, Yderstrom did not have many expectations. She did not know what living in Miami and playing for the Hurricanes would be like, so she decided to
"I actually didn't have a lot of expectations,"Yderstrom said. "I was going to take it one year at a time and see how it went. I always had the option to come back home, but it worked out really, really well."
Yderstrom joined Morgan Stroman as the headliners of the 2009-10 freshmen class and the two have led the Hurricanes to 96 wins in their careers. She has been a contributor at Miami from the start, ranking fifth among ACC freshmen in scoring four years ago, finishing 10th in the conference in three-point field goals made as a sophomore, earning third-team All-ACC honors as a junior and first team All-ACC honors as a senior.

Yderstrom, Stroman and senior Pepper Wilson have worked together to help lead this year's team to a 20-win season, the fourth in Yderstrom's four years at Miami. But her contributions to the Canes go beyond her abilities on the basketball court.
"We have had to come together and form a closer bond,"Yderstrom said of the seniors. "We had to make decisions together and figure out what is going to work on the group, what is the best way to handle something and how are people going to react to certain things. We've worked really well together. I'm talking to one player that I can really get to on the team, while Stro connects best with other players and maybe Pep can get to another player that may not respond as well to me or Stro. We've been delegating it like that and it's been awesome."

Embracing a leadership role was something new for Yderstrom. While she always tried to be a good example on and off the court, her first season as a captain brought upon new responsibilities.
"I knew I could always lead by example, but, especially this year, I had to step up and be a leader outside the court and bring the group together. It was my job to make sure everybody was okay and that has been the challenge for me. But it's a challenge I embrace because it has helped me develop and get better in every aspect as a basketball player and as a person. I learned a lot, especially from Coach Meier, about being a leader. She's a great leader and always sets a good example for us."

Yderstrom feels her time playing for Meier has been a privilege. The talented guard is confident that she is significantly better after playing for Miami's head coach.
"I look up to her so much,"Yderstrom said. "I respect that woman. It's hard for me to put it into words, but she is great. I never really had a coach who showed that they cared about me so much outside the court, as well as on the court. She just wants you to succeed. Coach Meier and her staff are willing to do everything they can for you to succeed. I'm really grateful because I don't think a lot of people get the opportunity to play for a coaching staff like that."

With Yderstrom's career at Miami nearing its end, she is trying to finish strong and lead by example so the Canes can continue the standard of excellence that she helped establish.
"I'm trying to set a good example for the players that we have now,"Yderstrom said. "I hope that they continue to work hard to be great and don't take the opportunity for granted that they have here. I hope they show the people coming in what it means to be a Hurricane. If they do that, I think they can have many more successful years here. Coach Meier and the whole coaching staff, I think they just bring out the best in people."

Meier is incredibly proud of Yderstrom and her fellow seniors. Seeing the three seniors beat Duke for the first time in program history in their final home game ever is a memory that Miami's head coach will cherish forever.
"It is a career-rewarding moment to have three of the favorite kids you have ever coached be a part of this," Meier said. "I'm telling you, these are wonderful people. They have a depth of character. They're bright. They represent the community well. They're awesome student-athletes and you just pray for moments like this for kids who have given you so much."

Meier feels Yderstrom, Stroman and Wilson had a huge impact on her program and she could not be happier for having the opportunity to coach them.
"They have totally transformed this program," Meier said. "They have represented Miami in a way that I have only dreamt of, and all of them took a risk in coming here. They took a program that didn't have a lot to talk about and all of us had not beaten Duke, this was the first time that we had and it was a really great time to do it."

Yderstrom and her teammates are focused on this weekend's ACC tournament and the upcoming postseason. But once her college career is over, Yderstrom plans to continue playing basketball.
"My mindset I'm going to try and play professional,"Yderstrom said before correcting herself."I will play professionally. I'm going to see how that is and if it's for me, then maybe I'll do that for some years."
A veteran of the Swedish national basketball program, Yderstrom would be honored to represent her country in the next Olympics.
"That's the goal,"Yderstrom said. "In 2016, I'm going to Brazil."
Beyond basketball, Yderstrom does not know where her life will take her. But she is confident that whatever happens, she will be successful. She is not afraid of the unknown and not afraid to take risks. After all, taking a risk and choosing to conquer the unknown is what brought her to Miami and gave her the opportunity to have four unforgettable, incredible years as a Hurricane.
"Opportunities come up and it leads to one thing and then all of sudden you're somewhere you never thought you would end up," Yderstrom said. "It obviously worked out for me in the past, so I am very open for opportunities in the future."
