



1993-94 Hurricane Basketball Preview

There are no "quick fixes" in the BIG EAST. Improving skills takes hard work. Building a program takes patience. Winning takes time. For the University of Miami basketball team, hard work and patience have been part of the daily regimen since the program was reinstated in 1985. Now, the time to win has begun.

Last season's 10-17 record included a phenomenal 7-2 mark in home BIG EAST play as Miami enjoyed a home-court advantage that equated into the No. 3 home record in the conference.

Reaching the seven-win mark in only their second season in the BIG EAST was a tremendous accomplishment by the Hurricanes. By

comparison, it took conference charter members Providence five years and Seton Hall nine seasons just to reach the five-win plateau. And the jump from just one conference win two years ago to the seven victories last season stands as the third-largest increase in wins in the history of the BIG EAST.

For 1993-94, a cast of 13 players that combine a rare blend of youth and experience look to make it time for more wins at the University of Miami.

Experience comes in the form of four returning starters. However, no seniors and only five total lettermen are back while a group of eight redshirts and newcomers round out the UM roster.

Standing tall in the corps of returners is junior center Constantin Popa. The Bucharest, Romania native continues to spend as much time in the weight room and dining hall as he does in the classroom and on the basketball court in hopes of bulking up his frame which currently stands at 7'3" and 235 pounds. Popa continued his adjustment to the American style of play and emerged as a force in the BIG EAST last season. His 149 career blocks stands as a UM record and he was tops among league players in overall action last season with an average of 3.2 blocks per game.

Last season's leading scorer turned out to be a freshman as shooting guard Steve Edwards made the transition from Miami High School to the University of Miami with great success. Edwards averaged 17.2 points in league action which was the best average of any conference rookie and the third-highest scoring average among all conference players. Edwards displayed excellent range as he shattered the previous BIG EAST marks for three-pointers in a season, both by a rookie and all players with 59 in league play.

Running the offense for the third straight season is junior point guard Michael Gardner who started a total of 50 games in his first two seasons at Miami. Gardner set two school records last season as he recorded 14 assists in one game (vs. Pittsburgh) and finished the season with a UM-record 154 total assists.

The fourth returning starter for 1993-94 is junior forward Pat Lawrence. For the past two seasons, Pat battled his older brother Anthony for playing time at the power forward position. The elder Lawrence moved on to the USBL's Miami Tropics and now Pat hopes to blossom following a season in which he was Miami's second-leading rebounder with 5.8 boards per contest and shot 49.2% from the field.

The final returning letterman from last season is sophomore forward Lorenzo Pearson. In his rookie campaign, Pearson appeared in 19 contests, including the final 15

games. He was voted Miami's "Most Improved Player" and continued to develop over the summer by traveling with the BIG EAST All-Stars to Canada.

Injuries and academics produced four redshirts from last season's group of six freshmen. Center William Davis and guard Steve Frazier both suffered preseason knee injuries while guard Tshombe High went down with a stress fracture in his foot early in the campaign. Forward Brad Timpf developed his skills in practice the entire season, but did not see action in any contests.

Davis attended Fork Union Military Academy in Virginia two years ago, the same school several Hurricanes have attended including Popa and UM football players Stephen McGuire and Vinny Testaverde.

Timpf came to Miami from nearby Taravella High School, in Ft. Lauderdale, FL and is one of five current Hurricanes from the state of Florida.

Frazier who hails from Queens, NY, attended St. Thomas More Prep School in Oakdale, CT two years ago following a brilliant high school career at Andrew Jackson High where he led all of New York in scoring with an average of 39 points per contest.

High came to Miami from Brainerd High School in Chattanooga, TN. One of the more gifted athletes to come through the Miami program, High possesses tremendous leaping ability and is a true crowd-pleaser with his dunking skills.

All four redshirts from last season are expected back at 100% for the beginning of practice on November 1.

Coach Hamilton garnered his third consecutive Top 20 recruiting class this past season as two high school stars, one transfer and one junior college standout have committed to attend Miami this fall.

Forward Alex Fraser of Pace High School is the third UM recruit from the Miami area in as many years. Fraser, 6'8", 220, was a four-year starter at Pace, earned all-state honors and was voted "Player of the Year" by the *Miami Herald*.

Guard Torey McCormick of South Gwinnett High School (GA) set county records for assists with 9.7

per game and steals with a 5.5 average. McCormick was the only 4-A player in the state of Georgia to be a unanimous selection to the Georgia North/South All-Star Team.

One of South Florida's own decided to come home as Steve Rich transferred to Miami following one semester at Wake Forest University. Rich attended Cardinal Gibbons High School

Policies And Procedures

INTERVIEW POLICY: All interviews with UM players and coaches should be scheduled through the Sports Information Office. The best time to reach Coach Hamilton is between 9:00 a.m. and 12:00 noon on weekdays. Players are available for interviews prior to the start of practice. Post-practice interviews will be available on a limited basis. **THERE WILL BE NO PLAYER INTERVIEWS ON GAME DAYS.**

PRACTICE ATTENDANCE: The majority of UM basketball workouts will be closed. However selected workouts and scrimmages will be open to the media. For pre-practice interviews and scrimmage attendance, all media guests are required to check in with the UM Sports Information Office. **THE UM LOCKER ROOM, WEIGHT ROOM AND TRAINING ROOM ARE OFF LIMITS TO THE MEDIA THROUGHOUT THE SEASON.**

PRESS CREDENTIALS: Credentials for UM home games are to be used by the working media only and should be requested in writing on letterhead stationery at least two weeks in advance. Please direct all requests to Carol Recicar at the UM Sports Information Office: P.O. Box 248167, University of Miami, Coral Gables, FL 33124-0814.

TELEPHONES: Four court-side telephone lines will be available to visiting media for a fee of \$100 per line used payable in advance of the game by check made out to the University of Miami. The lines are restricted to credit card and collect long distance calls only. Please contact Carol Recicar at the UM Sports Information Office to reserve these lines. The flagship radio station for visiting teams will have priority in reserving line use. It is recommended that media with deadline concerns who do not reserve a line through the Miami SID office order phones by calling Southern Bell at 1-800-753-7289 or (305) 780-2830. The street address of the Miami Arena is: 721 N.W. 1st Avenue, Miami, FL 33136.

STATISTICS/SERVICES: Complete game statistics including play-by-play and shots chart will be available at all UM home games. In-game statistics are available to radio and television announcers via television monitors on press row. A meal will be served approximately 90 minutes prior to tipoff and at halftime.

PHOTOGRAPHERS: NCAA rules limit the shooting access areas to **BEHIND THE BASELINES ONLY. NO PHOTOGRAPHERS WILL BE PERMITTED TO SHOOT ALONG THE SIDELINE OR BENCH AREAS.** Photo requests should be made at least two weeks in advance to Carol Recicar in the UM SID office. Photographers desiring to use strobe lighting must notify the SID office when making their credential request.

STATISTICIANS: Personal statisticians are available at a predetermined rate of pay. Make requests to the UM SID Office at least one week in advance of the game.

POST-GAME INTERVIEWS: Miami players and Head Coach Leonard Hamilton will retire to the locker room immediately following each game for a brief meeting. Following the meeting, Coach Hamilton will be interviewed by WIOD Radio while two to three UM players are made available in the media interview room. Following the WIOD interview, Coach Hamilton will go to the interview room to address the media. Members of the media requiring specific players are instructed to inform a UM SID representative of their request. **THE UM LOCKER ROOM WILL NOT BE OPEN FOR POST GAME INTERVIEWS.**

VIDEOTAPE HIGHLIGHTS: Requests for videotape highlights of the Hurricanes must be made through AdCraft Associates (305) 284-2941.

The Knight Sports Complex, headquarters for UM basketball practice, is located next to the Hecht Center. A media workroom complete with telephone hookups, is available in the UM SID office.

FROM THE CITY AND POINTS NORTH — Take I-95 south until it becomes US 1. Continue south on US 1 to SW 57 Ave. (a.k.a. Red Rd.). Turn right onto SW 57 Ave. Make another immediate right turn onto Ponce de Leon Blvd. Turn left at the first stop light onto San Amaro Drive. The Hecht Athletic Center and Knight Sports Complex practice facility are one-quarter of a mile ahead on the right.

Hurricanes On The Air

DAILY: WIOD (610 AM) — WIOD Radio presents Hurricane reports in morning and afternoon drive time.

GAME DAYS: WIOD (610 AM) — WIOD Radio will present broadcasts of all University of Miami basketball games, home and away, with exciting pregame and postgame shows. Play-by-play announcer Sonny Hirsch and color commentator Tony Fiorentino will describe all the action for the Hurricane listening audience. Hirsch is in his ninth season of covering Hurricane Basketball having announced all the 'Canes' contests since the rebirth of the UM program in 1985.

WIOD Radio

WVUM (90.5 FM) — WVUM Radio, the University's student radio station, will broadcast all Hurricane home contests and selected away games. Sports Director Steve Friedenberg will handle the play-by-play for the majority of WVUM's broadcasts.

THE BIG EAST NETWORK — The BIG EAST Network will produce a minimum of nine Hurricane games this year, seven of which will be aired on WBFS-TV, Channel 33 in Miami. Channel 33 will also carry the two first-round games of the BIG EAST Tournament from Madison Square Garden on March 10, and all four second-round games of the tournament on March 11. The Sunshine Network will carry a minimum of four BIG EAST contests and seven non-conference Hurricane games.

ESPN — The Hurricanes will make three appearances on ESPN this year. Miami's January 12 game at Pittsburgh and home contests vs. Seton Hall on January 26 and Boston College on February 16 will be televised nationally beginning at 8:00 P.M.





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
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Academic Excellence

The recent results of this program have been very impressive. The overall graduation rate for all UM athletic programs exceeds 60% and the success rate of the Hurricane Basketball program has been at or near 100% since its rebirth in 1985.

University Facts

President: Edward T. Foote II, a former journalist, attorney and former dean of the Washington University School of Law. The University of Miami's fourth president, inaugurated in 1981.

Honors: A total of 1,676 students participate in the Honors Program which consists of 43 campus-wide honor societies, including Phi Beta Kappa.

Description: Fourteen colleges and schools offering more than 130 areas of undergraduate study and 175 disciplines for graduate study.

Enrollment: A total of 13,153 students: 8,270 undergraduates; 2,691 graduate students, 1,479 in the School of Law and 576 in the School of Medicine.

Student Body: The undergraduate body is made up of 66% Caucasian, 7% Black, 19% Hispanic and 8% Asian. Roughly 40% are from South Florida while 10% hail from other areas of Florida, another 40% are from the remainder of the United States and 10% are international students.

Quality: Approximately 60% of entering freshmen are in the top fifth of their high school class.

Class Size: More than half of the classes for undergraduates have fewer than 18 students. More than 75% have fewer than 28 students.

Faculty: There are 1,792 full-time faculty members, 95% of which have doctorates.

Research: The National Science Foundation ranks the University of Miami among the top 50 colleges and universities in terms of total federal commitments. Sponsored research totaled \$138.9 million in the 1990-91 school year.

Fund-raising: The five-year, \$400 million Campaign for the University of Miami was one of the largest in higher education when it began in 1984. The Campaign concluded with commitments of \$517.5 million.

Alumni: University of Miami alumni live in all 50 states and more than 110 foreign countries.

Athletic Excellence (1980-present)

June, 1993: Paul Dee is named UM's tenth athletic director.

June 5, 1993: Gillian Russell captures her second national title in two years when she wins the 100-meter high hurdles in 13.02 seconds at the NCAA Outdoor Championships in New Orleans.

April 25, 1993: The men's tennis team wins four out of six singles flights en route to its first Big East title at the Neil Schiff Tennis Center.

March 27, 1993: Miami diver Dean Panaro wins his third and fourth national titles, capturing the three- and one-meter diving titles at the NCAA Championships.

March 8, 1993: The Miami women's basketball team defeats Providence, 77-56, for its second straight Big East Championship title.

January 2, 1993: The Miami men's basketball team defeats Georgetown, 80-69 at the Miami Arena, for its first win over a top-10 ranked team since the reinstatement of the program.

December 12, 1993: Quarterback Gino Torretta becomes the second UM player to win the Heisman Trophy. Torretta went on to become the most-honored football player in college history.

October 11, 1992: The women's tennis team captures its second straight Big East Championship at Syracuse.

June 6, 1992: The baseball team finishes third in their 12th College World Series, qualifying for postseason play for the 20th straight time along the way.

March 26, 1992: Diver Dean Panaro captures his second consecutive national title in the 1-meter diving competition.

March 14, 1992: Freshman Gillian Russell wins the national championship in the 55-meter indoor hurdles.

March 1, 1992: The women's basketball team defeats Villanova to complete its first season in the BIG EAST undefeated. It marked the first time in the league's 10-year history that a men's or women's team had gone undefeated. The Lady 'Canes go on to a 30-2 record, making the NCAA Tournament's "Sweet 16."

January 14, 1992: The Hurricane men's basketball team wins its first BIG EAST game with a 45-42 victory over St. John's in the Miami Arena. The contest was the first home conference game in UM history.

January 1, 1992: Miami defeats Nebraska 22-0 in the Orange Bowl to cap an undefeated season and win its fourth national championship in nine years.

April 5, 1991: UM men's tennis player Conny Falk defeats the No. 1-ranked player in the country and moves into the top spot at the end of the month.

March 28, 1991: Dean Panaro wins the national championship in the three-meter diving competition.

February 5, 1991: UM joins seven other schools as a charter member of the new BIG EAST Football Conference.

December 5, 1990: Defensive tackle Russell Maryland becomes the first Miami player to win the prestigious Outland Trophy, recognizing the nation's best lineman.

November 23, 1990: UM basketball ushers in a new era under coach Leonard Hamilton.

October 22, 1990: Coach Ron Fraser is appointed head coach of the 1992 United States Olympic baseball team.

October 10, 1990: UM officially accepts a bid to become the tenth member of the BIG EAST Conference.

January 1, 1990: Under first-year head coach Dennis Erickson, the Hurricanes beat Alabama, 33-25, in the Sugar Bowl to claim their third national title in seven years.

March 15, 1989: The Lady 'Canes basketball team goes to the NCAA Tournament for the first time.

September 1988: Two Hurricane student-athletes earn medals in the Seoul Olympic Games: Mike Fiore, a gold in baseball, and Wendy Williams, a bronze in diving.

June 1988: UM golfer Tracy Kerdyk is named the Golfware Amateur Player of the Year, the Heisman trophy of women's golf.

February 25, 1988: Maria Rivera becomes UM's all-time leading basketball scorer, male or female.

January 1, 1988: UM defeats Oklahoma in the 54th Orange Bowl Classic to gain the undisputed national championship in football and complete its first 12-0 season.

May 23, 1987: Andrew Burrow becomes the first UM player to win the NCAA men's tennis singles title since Pancho Segura (1943-45).

December 6, 1986: Quarterback Vinny Testaverde receives the Heisman Trophy, the first UM player to win college football's most coveted award.

Hurricane Traditions

The Hurricanes:

It began in controversy. Some reports say that the '27 football team held a team meeting to select Hurricanes, hoping they would sweep away opponents just as the devastating storm did on September 16, 1926. Another version holds that Miami News columnist Jack Bell came out to the field the day before UM's freshmen team played Rollins in '26 and asked end Porter Norris what the team should be called. Told that the local dignitaries and University officials wanted to name the team for a local flora or fauna, Norris said the players wouldn't stand for it and suggested "Hurricanes" since the opening game had been postponed by such a storm. From time to time, opposition has arisen to the name that would "reinforce Miami's negative reputation as a weather-beaten community living constantly under the threat of destruction. "But as one UM official rationalized in the 60's, "Does anyone think Chicago is overrun by bears just because the town has a football team by that name?"

Orange Green and White:

The school colors were selected in 1926 by a committee of Ruth Bryan Owens (daughter of famed attorney William Jennings Bryan), Harry Provin and Bertha Foster. Owens was a member of the board of regents and taught speech at the University. From her suggestion, the colors of the Florida orange tree were to represent UM - orange for the fruit itself, green for the leaves and white for the blossom.

The "U":

In 1973, the UM Athletic Federation, the fund-raising arm of the athletic department at the time, commissioned a local public relations expert to develop a distinctive logo. The University had gone several years with a variety of helmet and uniform changes and the Federation noted that a number of major colleges had the initials UM. Miami designer Bill Bodenheimer suggested the "U" idea, which lent itself to inserting silhouetted athletes in the middle of the "U" to establish distinctive logos for each sport as well as slogans like "U gotta believe" and "U is great."

When presented in color, the left side of the "U" is always orange while the right side is green.

The Miami Maniac:

Serving as the official mascot at all Hurricane basketball home games is the Miami Maniac. Having been originated by UM Baseball Coach Ron Fraser in 1983, the Maniac also performs at Miami baseball games as well as special performances as the official mascot of the College World Series. The student maniacs inside the costume also portray Sebastian The Ibis, the official mascot of Hurricane football.

Sebastian The Ibis:

The school yearbook adopted the name "Ibis" with its inception in 1926, and the local marsh bird was considered UM's first unofficial mascot. In 1957, San Sebastian Hall, a UM residence hall, sponsored an Ibis entry in the homecoming celebration. The next year, student John Stormont performed at games in a glued, sewn and pinned together costume that was the forerunner of today's bird. Folklore has it that the Ibis, a symbol of knowledge found in the Everglades and Egypt, is the last sign of wildlife to take shelter before a hurricane and the first to reappear after the storm.

Hurricane Spirit

Cheerleaders:

The University of Miami cheerleaders perform at all home basketball contests and the BIG EAST Tournament as well as all home and away football games. The squad also provides a valuable public relations function for the University by promoting season ticket sales, participating in recruiting events and appearing at many charity functions. The squad, which has travelled to both Japan and Europe, is under the direction of Coach Dan Reynolds and has been nationally ranked on a consistent basis.



Edward T. Foote II

Edward T. "Tad" Foote II became the fourth president of the University of Miami in 1981. After graduating from Yale University in 1959, Foote served three years in the U.S. Marine Corps. In the early 1960s, he worked as a journalist for the Washington Star. While in law school, he worked for the Washington Daily News and later was assistant to the chairman of the Pennsylvania Avenue

Commission in Washington, D.C.

Following graduation from Georgetown University Law Center in 1966, Foote practiced trial, appellate, and labor law in the firm of Bryan, Cave, McPheeters & McRoberts in St. Louis, Missouri.

In 1970 he became vice chancellor, general counsel, and secretary to the Board of Trustees for Washington University in St. Louis, then served from 1973-80 as dean of the Washington University School of Law, where he taught constitutional law and legal ethics. Before coming to Miami, Foote was special advisor to the chancellor and Board of Trustees for Washington University, while he chaired two federal court-appointed citizen's advisory committees which helped design and implement school desegregation plans for greater St. Louis in 1980 and 1981.

Upon his arrival at the University of Miami in 1981, Foote introduced corporate-style strategic planning. Among his top priorities were reducing the number of students while increasing the number of faculty. Approximately three-quarters of the current faculty were hired by Foote, and the University's research productivity has expanded dramatically under his leadership. The 1,881 faculty members attracted \$124 million in sponsored research for the 1992-93 academic year.

Ranked among the top 50 institutions receiving federal research funding, the University of Miami is the largest, most comprehensive, private research university in the Southeast.

During the past decade under Foote's leadership, the University of Miami added the School of Architecture, School of Communication, and Graduate School of International Studies, bringing to 14 the total number of schools and colleges. He also launched an ambitious \$400 million five year fund-raising campaign, at the time the second largest capital campaign in the history of higher education. The campaign ended in 1990 with \$517.5 million in commitments, including endowments for 45 chairs in various academic disciplines.

In November of 1991, the University launched a \$15 million Cornerstone Campaign to raise funds for the library and college of arts and sciences.

Most recently, the University secured a \$10 million federal appropriation for the North-South Center, an international academic center that promotes the exchange of ideas, technology and research between the United States and the nations of Latin America, the Caribbean and Canada.

Foote also introduced the residential college concept at the University of Miami to enhance the undergraduate experience. Following a tradition established at universities in England and at a handful of institutions in the United States, each residential college is directed by a Master and faculty fellows, tenured senior faculty members who live at the college and are actively involved in planning a series of academic, social and recreational programs for resident students.

Active in a number of civic and educational organizations, Foote is a director of Ryder System, Inc. and a member of the Council on Foreign Relations. He is founding chairman of The Miami Coalition for a Drug-Free Community, a nationally recognized broad-based community organization committed to reducing the problems of illegal drugs. The Coalition has served as a model for community based anti-drug groups in over 193 cities and 41 countries, including Colombia.

Foote also serves on the President's Drug Advisory Council Steering Committee for a National Organization of Community Coalitions. Among other awards, Foote has received honorary degrees from Washington University (1981), Tokai University in Japan (1984), and Barry University (1991). In 1982, the president of Peru presented him with that country's highest honor, the Order of the Sun.

Leonard Hamilton

Head Basketball Coach

One more step.

Every day, Leonard Hamilton takes one more step towards his goal of having the finest college basketball team in the land.

When he was hired as the new Hurricane coach on April 2, 1990, Hamilton knew that to compete with the best, he must play the best. But no one could have predicted how swiftly or emphatically the best competition would appear on the Miami schedule. After just six months at Miami, Hamilton was presented with one of the most difficult challenges a collegiate coach has ever faced — to compete in the BIG EAST Conference.

In order to raise the Hurricanes' level of competition, it was obvious that Hamilton was required to raise the level of talent flowing into the Miami program. Tremendous strides were realized in this area during the

last three recruiting seasons. Having long been recognized as a brilliant evaluator and recruiter of high school talent, Hamilton continued his legacy by producing what many consider to be the finest classes in Miami history as three consecutive UM classes have been ranked in the Top 20 nationally by recruiting expert Bob Gibbons.

The rookie class of 1992-93 contained the most promise and was ranked No. 4 in the country. However, injuries took their toll as just two of last year's freshmen were able to see action.

Those two rookies, Steve Edwards and Lorenzo Pearson, made their presence known by helping the Hurricanes jump from one conference win in 1991-92 to seven wins in '92-93 (the third-largest increase in wins in BIG EAST history). All of Miami's conference victories came at home in the Miami Arena as the 'Canes' 7-2 home BIG EAST record was the third-best among all league teams.

Seton Hall and Pittsburgh were the only two conference foes to escape the Miami Arena without a loss in 1992-93 and after two full seasons in the BIG EAST Conference, only one

team, Seton Hall, has yet to be beaten by Miami.

During the 1991-92 campaign, Hamilton continued his lofty expectations in the academic realm as all four Hurricane seniors earned their degrees by June of 1992. On the court, Leonard Hamilton scoffed at the critics who claimed he would not even come close to a victory in his inaugural BIG EAST campaign as the Hurricanes defeated St. John's in their conference home-opener — a victory that would prove to cost the Redmen the outright BIG EAST Championship.

Along the way, the Hurricanes surprised their opponents, fans and media as they battled every opponent with the intensity and perseverance which their head coach both demands and instills. Miami proved to be especially tough toward the end of their first BIG EAST campaign, losing their final five conference games by an average of just seven points, including a 90-82 overtime loss to eventual No. 1 BIG EAST Tournament seed Seton Hall.

The Hurricanes earned the respect of the entire college basketball world in their first BIG EAST Tournament appearance at Madison Square Garden when they upset Pittsburgh, 83-71, in the opening round of action at The Mecca. Miami threatened to repeat the upset in the second round of action as they led co-BIG EAST champion Georgetown, 34-33, at the half before dropping a 77-64 decision to Alonzo Mourning and the Hoyas.

Hamilton was granted one year of coaching at Miami before entering BIG EAST competition. Determined to make the most of the Hurricanes' final season as an independent, Hamilton quickly laid the groundwork for the future of the Hurricanes. Off the court, Hamilton saw to it that both seniors on his 1990-91 squad would graduate by spring. On the court, he directed the development of Joe W

BIG EAST Profile

With the position The BIG EAST Conference holds in the world of college athletics, it may still be surprising to some that the league is only entering its 15th year of existence in 1993-94. The group, which became a reality in 1979, reflects a tradition of broad-based programs, led by administrators and coaches who place a constant emphasis on academic integrity.

Today, The BIG EAST Conference enjoys a leadership role nationally. Its student-athletes boast significantly high graduation rates and their record of scholastic achievement notably reflects a balance between intercollegiate athletics and academics.

Nnenna Lynch of Villanova University is a prime example of a model student-athlete in The BIG EAST. An eight-time NCAA All-American in track and cross country, she was a member of four consecutive NCAA Division I Cross Country national championship teams.

She was the 1992 NCAA Outdoor Track 3000-meter champion and finished third individually at the 1992 NCAA Cross Country Championships. Academically, she was one of 32 Americans in 1993 to receive a Rhodes Scholarship. She also was a winner of the prestigious NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship and the NACDA/Disney Scholar-Athlete Award. She was the 1992-93 Gillette BIG EAST Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year.

While the BIG EAST certainly made its splash with men's basketball as its signature program, the conference also has enjoyed a steady, wide-ranging growth. For '93-94, the league has added women's soccer to its championship list which has grown to 19. Also, the women's softball and field hockey champions will receive automatic bids to the NCAA championships for the first time.

Any successful consortium enjoys outstanding leadership. Michael Tranchese, the league's first full time employee, and for 11 years the associate of Dave Gavitt, took over as Commissioner in June, 1990, after Gavitt left to take a position with the Boston Celtics. Tranchese's list of achievements is extensive. He administered the addition of the University of Miami and the formation of The BIG EAST Football Conference. His first year at the helm was a microcosm of what the BIG EAST had become — a respected and proactive player in the world of college athletics.

The University of Miami became the league's 10th full member on October 10, 1990. The largest private institution in the Southeast, Miami is a prized addition to a conference already noted for a successful co-existence of academics and athletics.

BIG EAST sports attract the interest of followers in the nation's largest media markets within New England, the New York metropolitan area, Washington D.C., Pennsyl-

vania and Florida. Innovative concepts in promotion and publicity, particularly regarding television, have resulted in unparalleled visibility for BIG EAST student-athletes. Exclusive long-range television contracts with CBS and ESPN, as well as the unique operative known as The BIG EAST Conference Television Network, provide BIG EAST basketball with more television exposure than any other conference.

Additionally, BIG EAST championship events in track, men's soccer, women's basketball and baseball have been seen on various cable networks across the country.

While BIG EAST basketball games are regular sellouts at campus and major public sports buildings, including the annual BIG EAST Tournament Championship in Madison Square Garden, attendance figures also are significant at BIG EAST soccer, women's basketball and baseball games.




