

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

JACK HARDING

Jack Harding as athletic director of the University of Miami continues the sound progress in all branches of the University's athletic program which has marked his Miami career.

The former Pittsburgh football and baseball star came to the University of Miami back in 1936 when the enrollment was just getting safely past the 1,000 mark and the athletic program was limited to football and tennis.

This year the enrollment at Miami is over 11,000 and the athletic program includes in addition to basketball, football, tennis, baseball, swimming, cross country track, boxing, fencing and golf.

In 1936, a crowd of 5,000 was satisfactory in football for most of the games, while this year crowds surpassing that mark will see Hurricane basketball games.

Jack Harding's years at Miami have been busy years, years of expansion and the expansion still continues. This year finds further growth in the intercollegiate sports program supported by the University of Miami.

THE COACHING STAFF

DAVE WIKE...took over as head basketball coach last season when Hart Morris resigned on the advice of physicians, due to reasons of health. Illness and football duties had limited Morris' opportunity to coach the team last year to the absolute minimum. Wike enjoyed unusual success as the team won 10 and lost but three games during his tenure. Wike is a University of Miami graduate and is also head athletic trainer for all varsity teams. He entered University of Miami from Wilkinsburg, Pa., in 1938 and was a letter man in 1939 on the football team. A brilliant punter, he had his active athletic career cut short by a back injury and it was during the treatment following this injury that he became interested in the duties of a trainer. He has been head trainer at Miami since 1947 and has made many innovation in that field. He proved to be an excellent inspirational leader to his basketball charges last season and is expected to develop into an excellent coach.

SY CHADROFF...captain of the 1951-52 basketball team at University of Miami, is assistant basketball coach. Sy wound up his basketball career at Miami last year with 967 points to his credit, best for any three year athlete. Bob Campbell, highest scorer in Miami history, was eligible to play for four seasons under war time rules. Chadroff won the national free throw title last year and shattered the one game and season scoring records for Miami as well as the highest point per game average record. Sy was a three year regular at Miami and played forward, guard and center in the three seasons in which he starred.

THE OUTLOOK

Four 1951-52 regulars return for the new University of Miami basketball team, first to be coached from the start by Dave Wike.

Gone is Sy Chadroff, national free throw shooting champion and new holder of just about every one game and one season scoring record on the University of Miami books. Also lost are Jack Schneider and Roger Wrench, who provided most of what little reserve strength it had a year ago.

Miami's 1951-52 squad wasn't very tall, didn't have too much speed, wasn't particularly skilful on defense--but had lots of enthusiasm and was deadly accurate in shooting. It won 14 and lost 8 and a 10 game winning streak against state rival which netted the mythical state championship.

No one man can replace Chadroff who finished the year with 459 points in 22 games to become the first Hurricane to average better than 20 points a game over the whole season.

Howard Keene, who tallied 309 points; Mel Yanuck, 251; Dick Hoffman, 217 and Willie Schayowitz, 209, should all do better. Most improvement is expected from Schayowitz who was a nervous freshman regular the early part of 1951-52, but settled down nicely in the closing games.

Fifth man on the team at the start of the season at least will be Jim Carson; a fast and aggressive sophomore who played a little varsity basketball last season. Dick Silvis, a letterman from last year was giving him a stiff fight until a leg injury just before the first game made him a doubtful proposition for the early part of the campaign. A considerable amount of promising sophomore and freshmen talent makes the replacement picture better than it has been for a number of seasons--but in comparison with the very serious weakness in that respect in recent years.

This should be a pretty good basketball team though a stiffer schedule may mean a poorer percentage of victories than a year ago.

TEAM CAPTAIN -- Melvin Yanuck

WHO ARE THESE HURRICANES?

MELVIN YANUCK, captain and senior, graduated at John Adams in the New York area, his home town being Kew Gardens Hills, N. Y. Mel wasn't any factor in basketball in high school but he entered the service, picked up both height and weight and blossomed forth into quite a basketball player. He made the All Eastern Army team for Fort Devens, Mass. As a sophomore, Mel was a reserve and a couple of eight point efforts, against Florida State and Tampa were his high scoring efforts. He wound up with a .301 % scoring percentage from the field, 643 from the free throw line and 53 points for the season. Mel or "Nook" developed rapidly as a junior, pushing his field goal shooting percentage up to a tidy .354% and his free throw scoring to .776 as he wound up the year with 251 points, 11.4 per game. He had a 22 point night against Stetson and hit for 20 points against Rollins. He is 6 feet 3, and weighs 185. He will play forward.

HOWARD KEENE, senior center, is 6 feet 5 and weighs 205. He played for Duquesno, Pa. High and in 1948, set his high school scoring record with 23 points against Washington High. "Jaggors" has been center for most of his Miami career. As a sophomore, he tallied 192 points with a .296 shooting percentage from the field and .519 from the free throw line. He had 16 point games against Southern, both in Miami and in Lakeland. He improved considerably as an all around player as a junior. His field goal shooting rose to .373% and from the foul line, he went to .715, giving him a fine 309 point total for the year. Further improvement will put him close to the top in all time scoring for Miami.

RICHMOND HOFFMAN, senior guard, is 6 feet 2 inches tall and weighs 190 pounds. He hails from Allentown, Pa. High school where he was on the second All Pennsylvania high school team. He made 215 points in 22 games as a high school senior, including 25 points against Reading High. Dick didn't do much as a sophomore, being a reserve appearing in only 11 games and scoring 17 points. However, he took over a guard post in his junior year and became one of the team's stars. In the Florida State game, he broke things wide open by clicking on 9 long shots in a row, finishing with 10 of 12

for the night. He hit for 25 points that night and in his next game got 23 against Stetson. Later he scored 21 at Tampa and for the season, scored 217 points. His field goal average was 39.7%, after being at 44.1% in mid season. He was 58.8% from the free throw line. When he is 'on', he'll drive any foe crazy.

WILLIE SCHAYONITZ, sophomore forward, developed rapidly last season and at the end of the campaign, was scoring with the best of them. Similar improvement this year would make him a standout. The former all stater from Miami Jackson, scored 471 points in 27 games for his last high school team-and the following season, wound up with 209 as a freshman regular for the Hurricanes. His shooting, once barely over 30.7%, improved steadily to a 36.5% in the final tally but he was weak at foul shooting, finishing with a poor 48.6%. Willie is fast, has lots of bounce and should turn out to be a dead eye dick from the floor. If this Miami team should turn out to be a great one, "Wee-Wee" will be the lad who adds the extra something needed. He had a 23 point game at Tampa.

RICHARD SILVIS, junior guard is from Miami Jackson High. He lettered last year as a reserve, scoring 36 points. Dick's forte is aggressive guarding and sound floor work, though he tallied 380 points in 23 games in his senior year at Jackson, including one 23 point effort. He is 6 feet $1\frac{1}{2}$ and weighs 180 but moves well and has that fighting spirit which helps in the tight spots. He was all state in high school.

ROBERT DENTON, guard, is 6 feet tall and weighs 165 pounds. He is a junior and in high school was all city. His best effort, 15 points was reserved for Miami High. Bob, fast and capable of driving in well, played in nine games for the varsity last year scoring 17 points. He should see much more service this season.

JAMES T. CARSON, sophomore, was a fine defensive guard for Haverford Township in Pennsylvania. On the varsity squad a year ago, he played in six games and made five points. The experience should stand him in good stead this year. He is 6 feet tall and weighs 167 pounds.

DAVID PHILLIP NICHOLAS, 6 foot 4 $\frac{1}{2}$ inches tall and weighs 185 pounds, is from Upper Darby, Pa. High school. He tallied 37 points against Haverford High as he made All Delaware High honors. Although playing in brief portions of 15 games last year and scoring only 24 points, he looked to be a promising point maker. He had a 40.9% record on his field goal tries and 66.7% on free throws.

ROBERT T. KICHEFSKI, sophomore from Menasha, Wis., did all of his 1951-52 playing on the B club for which he was a steady performer at forward. He is 6 feet 3 inches tall and weighs 185. "Smokoy" should develop into a good player as he is aggressive and a steadily improving scorer.

JAY ALAN GARBER, 6 foot 4 inches tall, was a two year letter man for Miami Senior High. Jay plays forward or center. Just a fair shot, he is a good ball handler and has defensive possibilities. He played on the B team throughout his freshman year at Miami.

JAY SANDY FARBER, from Christopher Columbus High, Bronx which sent Sy Chadroff and Dick Miami to Miami, is just 6 feet tall and weighs 180. He appears to be an excellent prospect. He made 32 points for his team against Taft High and wound up his 1950 high school season with 416 points to his credit. He was on the All City team. Sandy, a fast moving athlete, is a good play maker, can shoot and drives in extremely well. He might make the first team.

FRANK KLIMA, was all city and all Big Ten for Miami Edison High school last year. He scored 250 points for his ball club in 20 games, having a 20 point night against Ft. Lauderdale. Frank is 6 foot 4 inches tall and weighs 185. He is coming along very well in his freshman year at Miami and is being counted on for a lot of service.

STANLEY LEVINE, 6 feet $3\frac{1}{2}$ inches tall, was the mainstay of the Miami Beach High school basketball team a year ago. A good floor man and a fine shotmaker, he rolled up 22 points against Riverside in his 1951-52 high scoring effort. He was all city in his senior year. "Norty" is looked upon as an excellent prospect.

RICHARD MIAMI will be a natural for the headline writers if he develops as expected. "Miami wins for Miami" is a sure thing headline. He's from Columbus High in the Bronx, following Sy Chadroff and Sandy Farber to Miami. The "Duke" was a highly regarded player in his high school days and, aided by a 23 point effort against Vocational, tallied 230 points in his senior year. He's a little green yet, but looks like a comer.
