Louisville opens its 106th season of collegiate basketball with an ACC game at the Miami Hurricanes on Tuesday. The Cardinals, which posted a 20-14 record and participated in its 39th NCAA Tournament last year, prepped for its opener with a 75-65 victory on Oct. 29 over Bellarmine, an NCAA Division II foe ranked third in the nation. Preseason All-American Jordan Nwora led the Cardinals with 28 points, five assists and three steals and two blocked shots. Dwayne Sutton (18 points, 13 rebounds) and Samuel Williamson (17 points, nine rebounds) led the Cardinals' rebounding efforts. Picked to finish ninth in the ACC in a preseason media poll, the Hurricanes posted a 14-18 record in the 2018-19 season and are led by junior guard Chris Lykes, a preseason All-ACC second team selection.

### CARD FILE

- Louisville has won its last **15 straight** season openers and 24 of its last 26. This is just the third time in the last 14 years that the Cardinals have opened the season away from home.
- Louisville has won its conference opening game in nine of the last 11 seasons and six of the last seven. Louisville has won its first conference road game in nine of the last 12 seasons.
- Louisville's Nov. 5 season opener at Miami will be the **earliest season opener** in UofL history and the first time the Cards have opened the season with a conference foe since 1981.
- Louisville's **No. 5** preseason Associated Press ranking is the highest the Cardinals have been ranked in the preseason since 2013 when UofL opened the year ranked third. It is the fifth time in the last 10 years that UofL has been ranked among the top 10 preseason. The Cardinals are also ranked fifth in the USA Today coaches poll.
- UofL will play 12 games this season against teams ranked among the nation's Top 25 or those receiving votes in the preseason AP poll, including six games among teams in the top 13.
- **Jordan Nwora** was selected to the five-person preseason Associated Press All-America team. The 2019 preseason ACC Player of the Year is the first UofL player to receive the preseason AP honor since Montrezl Harrell in 2014-15. Nwora is also a first-team choice by The Sporting News, CBS Sports, NBC Sports and Blue Ribbon.
- **Ryan McMahon, Dwayne Sutton** and **Malik Williams** were elected team captains by a vote of their teammates.
- Louisville is one of just four schools which have won 20 or more games in each of the **last 17 seasons** (also Kansas, Duke and Gonzaga).

■ **About Miami** — Louisville opens its 106th season of collegiate basketball with an ACC game at Miami on Tuesday. The Hurricanes beat Flagler 86-65 in an exhibition game on Oct. 30 as redshirt junior guard Kameron McGusty led the way with 20 points. Miami forced 20 turnovers in the game while shooting 50 percent from the field.

Picked to finish ninth in the ACC in a preseason media poll, the Hurricanes posted a 14-18 record in the 2018-19 season. Junior guard Chris Lykes (16.2 ppg, 3.2 apg in 2018-19), a preseason All-ACC second team selection, is the second-leading returning scorer in the conference behind only Louisville's Jordan Nwora. UM is No. 65 by Ken Pomeroy entering the season.

Louisville has an 11-4 series advantage over Miami, winning two of the last three matchups. In the last meeting, the Cardinals prevailed 90-73 in the KFC Yum! Center (1-6-19) as UofL erased a 15-point first-half deficit when Jordan Nwora scored 18 of his 20 points in the first period. Malik Williams produced his second double-double of the season with 19 points and 11 rebounds and Ryan McMahon added 12 points and a career-high nine assists.

■ **Season Openers** — Louisville UofL has won its last 15 straight season openers and 24 of its last 26. The Cards have posted a 72-33 record in all-time season openers (49-13 home, 10-15 away, 13-5 neutral). Tuesday's game against Miami will be just the third time in the last 14 seasons that the Cardinals have opened their season away from home. Louisville won its last opener away from home, an 81-68 neutral site victory over Minnesota in the Armed Forces Classic in Aguadilla, Puerto Rico on Nov. 14, 2014. The Cardinals won their last true road opener with an 89-79 victory at BYU Hawaii on Nov. 20, 2004. Louisville last opened its season with a conference game in 1981 when it beat Tulane 55-54 in the Wendy's Classic in Bowling Green, Ky. in a Metro Conference game. The Cardinals have won their last 18 consecutive home openers. Louisville beat Nicholls 85-72 in the KFC Yum! Center in last season's opener on Nov. 8, 2018.

■ **Conference Openers** — Louisville has won its conference opening game in nine of the last 11 seasons and six of the last seven. The Cardinals beat Miami 90-73 in last year's conference opener on Jan. 6, 2019 in the KFC Yum! Center. Louisville has won its first conference road game in nine of the last 12 seasons. The Cardinals fell 89-86 in overtime at Pittsburgh in its first road conference game last season (1-9-19).

■ **Card Clips** -- Louisville has a 43-6 record during the month of November over the last eight years, winning 23 of its last 27 games ... Steven Enoch missed UofL's exhibition game against Bellarmine with a deep thigh bruise. He is expected to play in the Cardinals' season opening game against Miami ... After undergoing an appendectomy on Oct. 17, Quinn Slazinski played in UofL's exhibition against Bellarmine 12 days later ... With the Cardinals' women's basketball team ranked No. 9 in the preseason AP poll, UofL is one of just six schools with both its men's (No. 5) and women's teams ranked among the nation's top 25 teams (also Michigan State, Kentucky, Maryland, Oregon and Baylor) ... Jordan Nwora opens the season needing 264 points to become the Cardinals' 69th career 1,000-point scorer. Nwora's 77 three-pointers in 2018-19 was ninth best in a UofL single-season ... Dwayne Sutton enters his senior year needing seven points for 500 points in his career at UofL. He has scored 901 collegiate points and grabbed 639 career rebounds, including his freshman year at UNC Asheville (he has 493 points and 377 rebounds at UofL) ... Ryan McMahon finished his junior year needing six points for 500 in his career. He has 114 career three-point goals, 55 short of the career top ten at UofL.

■ **Cards Sixth All-Time in the Polls** — Louisville is one of only five schools to be ranked in the AP Top 25 poll at least once during each of the past 17 seasons, excluding preseason polls (*others*: Duke, Gonzaga, Kansas, North Carolina). Louisville has been ranked in the Associated Press poll on 633 occasions, sixth most all-time. Louisville returned to the rankings on Jan. 21 at No. 23, its first appearance since Nov. 27, 2017, and dropped out, missing the Feb. 25 poll. UofL has been among the top ten on 288 occasions, including 11 times in the 2016-17 season. Until the first three polls of 2014-15, the last time UofL had not been in the poll was March 5, 2012 -- a year in which UofL advanced to the Final Four. UofL has been ranked among the nation's top 16 in the preseason poll five of the last eight years (unranked this year, 16th last year, 13th in 2016-17, unranked in 2015-16, eighth in 2014-15, third in 2013-14, second in 2012-13, ninth in 2011-12).

■ **Cards Chosen Third in ACC Preseason Poll** — UofL was picked to finish third in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2019-20 in a preseason media poll with Duke as the league favorite for the third straight year. UofL forward Jordan Nwora was honored as the preseason Player of the Year while North Carolina freshman guard Cole Anthony was chosen the ACC Preseason Rookie of the Year. Louisville finished tied for sixth last season, tied for ninth in 2017-18, tied for second in 2016-17 and was fourth in each of its first two years in the ACC. The 2019 ACC Tournament will be played March 10-14 at Greensboro (N.C.) Coliseum.

■ **Pair Out With Injuries** -- David Johnson had surgery on his left (non-shooting) shoulder on July 30 and is expected to return in 4-6 months. His recovery has gone well, has good range of motion and has practiced in non-contact drills since Oct. 22. Malik Williams had a screw inserted into the fifth metatarsal in his right foot on Sept. 23 and is expected to miss 6-8 weeks. Johnson showed great promise in summer workouts while Williams started the last 20 games of 2018-19 and was third on the team in rebounding and 19th in the ACC, averaging 6.1 rebounds (7.7 points), and was 11th in the ACC in blocks (41 total, 1.2 avg.).

■ **Returning Production** -- With six of its top seven scorers returning including three starters (F Jordan Nwora, F Dwayne Sutton, C Malik Williams), Louisville returns most of its production from the Cardinals' successful 2018-19 squad, including three-quarters of its scoring and rebounding. Last season, UofL's six returning lettermen accounted for 76 percent of the Cardinals' scoring (1925 of 2536 points), 74 percent of its rebounding (960 of 1297), 51 percent of its assists (232 of 458), 84 percent of its three-point goals, 89 percent of its blocked shots (88 of 99), 71 percent of its steals (106 of 149) and 67 percent of the total minutes played (4617 of 6900). Two starters departed, including a pair of graduate transfer guards in Christen Cunningham, a team co-captain who was third in the ACC in assists (4.9) and was the Cardinals' No. 2 scorer (10.1 ppg); and Khwan Fore, who started the last 20 games of the season while averaging 3.3 points per game.

■ **Cards Have 17 Straight 20-Win Seasons** — Louisville is one of four Division I schools in the nation which has won 20 or more games in each of the past 17 seasons. Reaching over 20 victories last season and extending their streaks are Kansas (30), Duke (23), Gonzaga (21) and Louisville (17). UofL has won at least 19 games in 45 of the last 49 years. However, the NCAA Committee on Infractions' vacation of 123 victories in four of those years (2011-15) negates the official results.

■ **Cards Finish Sixth in ACC** — Louisville posted a 10-8 record in its fifth season in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2018-19, finishing in a tie for sixth in the league. Virginia and North Carolina shared the ACC regular season championship while Duke won the tournament title. Louisville has won at least nine league games for 13 straight seasons. The Cardinals have finished in the top three in its conference eight of the last 15 years. UofL has won 22 regular season conference championships (American 1, Big East 2, Conference USA 1, Metro 12, Missouri Valley 6). Louisville has won its conference championship or finished second in 27 of the last 44 years, including six of the last 15 years. Louisville was the No. 7 seed in the postseason ACC tournament and fell to North Carolina in the quarterfinals of the event played in Charlotte, N.C.

■ **UofL to Open 2019-20 Season at Miami on ACC Network** -- Louisville will open its 2019-20 season with an ACC game against Miami on Nov. 5. It will be the earliest opening game ever for the Cardinals and the first time since 1981 they have played a conference opponent to open the season. The game will be among the first men's basketball events to be broadcast on the ACC Network, the new 24/7 national platform dedicated to ACC sports which launched on Aug. 22, 2019. Fans interested in learning more about the ACCN can visit [www.GetACCN.com](http://www.GetACCN.com). This is the first year of a 20-game conference schedule and UofL's sixth as a member of the ACC.

■ **Nwora Receiving Early 2019-20 Acclaim** — Louisville forward Jordan Nwora has received considerable acclaim as the 2019-20 season approaches. He has been named a first-team preseason All-American by the Associated Press, The Sporting News, CBS Sports, NBC Sports, Athlons, the Blue Ribbon Basketball Yearbook and a second team selection by Street & Smith's Basketball Yearbook. Nwora was also honored as the preseason ACC Player of the Year in a vote of league media and several national publications.

■ **Nwora, Enoch Candidates for National Awards** — UofL's Jordan Nwora is among 20 watch list members for the 2020 Julius Erving Small Forward of the Year Award, while center Steven Enoch is among the 20-player watch list for the 2020 Kareem Abdul Jabbar Center of the Year Award. The annual awards are in their sixth year being presented by the the Naismith Memorial Basketball Hall of Fame. Nwora was noted as the top small forward in the nation by NCAA.com's Andy Katz.

For both awards, a national committee comprised of top college basketball personnel determined the watch lists. By mid-February, the watch list of players for the awards will be narrowed to 10. In March, five finalists will be presented to Erving, Jabbar and the Hall of Fame's selection committee. The award winners will be presented at the ESPN College Basketball Awards Show presented at *The College Basketball Awards presented by Wendy's* in Los Angeles on Friday, April 10, 2020. ■ **Cards Elect Trio of Team Captains** — Redshirt senior guard Ryan McMahon, redshirt senior forward Dwayne Sutton and junior forward/center Malik Williams were selected as team captains for the 2019-20 men's basketball season by a vote of their teammates.

## CARD FILE

■ Louisville is ranked in the top 10 of most early preseason rankings, including as high as **No. 2 in the nation**. UofL returns six of its top seven scorers and has a Top 10 recruiting class.

■ **Jordan Nwora** has gained early accolades as a preseason first-team All-America selection. He enters his junior year needing 264 points to become Louisville's 69th career 1,000-point scorer.

■ Louisville made its 39th NCAA Tournament appearance in 2019. The Cards have reached the Sweet 16 on 17 occasions, have advanced to the Elite Eight 11 times, Final Four eight times, and won NCAA Championships in 1980 and 1986. Louisville is seventh in NCAA Tournament appearances (39), ninth in tournament victories (61) and sixth in tournament games (102). UofL Coach Chris Mack has an 11-9 record in nine NCAA Tournament appearances.

■ Louisville's 2019 signing class was ranked **ninth in the nation** by ESPN.com, 10th by Rivals.com and 11th by 247sports.com.

■ **Jordan Nwora** was the **third-most improved scorer in the nation** in 2018-19 with his 17.0 scoring average (sixth in the ACC) up 11.3 ppg from his 5.7 average as a freshman. He scored 20 or more points on 13 occasions last season and had nine double-doubles (three of the last six games). His 77 three-pointers were the 10th-most in a single season at Louisville.

■ In the Cardinals' 18 ACC games last year, centers **Malik Williams** (8.7 ppg, 6.6 rpg) and **Steven Enoch** (9.4 ppg, 5.3 rpg) combined to average 18.1 points and 11.9 rebounds while splitting the time at the position. Williams had four double-doubles, including 16 points and a career-high matching 13 rebounds against Notre Dame on March 3. Enoch was a double-figure scorer in 17 games and led the Cardinals in field goal percentage (.508).

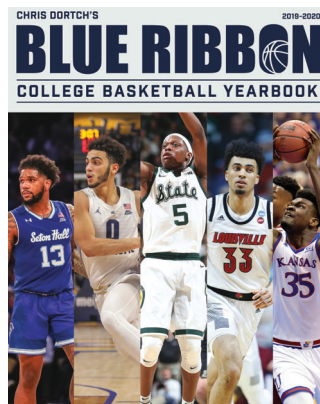
■ **Dwayne Sutton** scored in double figures on 19 occasions. He more than doubled his scoring average from a year ago, averaging 10.0 points and 6.9 rebounds (16th in the ACC). He was one of 14 ACC players with at least four double-doubles in conference games.

■ **Chris Mack** joins Denny Crum (26 wins in 1971-72) David Padgett (22, 2017-18) and John Dromo (21, 1967-68) as the only UofL coaches to have won 20 games in their first season with the Cardinals.

■ Louisville limited its opponent to under 40 percent accuracy for a half on 32 occasions in 2018-19. UofL was 25th in the nation in adjusted defensive efficiency.

■ UofL scored 80 or more points in 13 games in 2018-19 (71.9 ppg) and the Cardinals were 27th in the nation in adjusted offensive efficiency by Kenpom. UofL was fifth in the ACC in scoring offense for conference games (71.9 ppg).

■ UofL faced the fourth-toughest schedule in the nation in 2018-19 (11th-toughest non-conference schedule). UofL was one of four schools in the nation to have played at least 12 games against schools in the nation's Top 25 entering the NCAA Tournament.



■ **Challenging Schedule** — UofL will play 12 games this season against teams ranked among the nation's Top 25 or those receiving votes in the preseason Associated Press poll, including six games among teams in the top 13 (No. 2 Kentucky, 4 Duke, 9 North Carolina, 11 Virginia twice and 13 Texas Tech; Uof L opponents which received votes: Florida State, Notre Dame, Syracuse, NC State, Michigan. Louisville's strength of schedule was fourth in the nation by the final NCAA's NET rankings last season. Louisville played eight games against teams ranked among the Top 10 teams in the final AP poll. UofL faced nine teams that reached the 2019 NCAA Sweet 16.

■ **Card File** — Louisville's No. 5 preseason ranking in the Associated Press preseason poll is the highest the Cardinals have been ranked in the preseason since 2013 when UofL opened the year ranked third in the Associated Press and USA Today polls. It is the fifth time in the last 10 years that UofL has been ranked among the top 10 preseason. This marks the 127th occasion that the Cardinals have been ranked in the top five of the AP poll. Louisville is one of only five schools to be ranked in the AP Top 25 poll at least once during each of the past 17 seasons, excluding preseason polls (others: Duke, Gonzaga, Kansas, North Carolina).

Dwayne Sutton was listed second in a preseason listing of 2019-20 "Glue Guys" by NCAA.com ... Lamarr "Fresh" Kimble was noted as one of the top ten transfers in the nation by ESPN prior to the season ... Freshman Samuel William is the the 28th McDonald's All-America selection who signed with UofL.

UofL outrebounded 24 opponents in 2018-19, including 14 by a margin of nine or more boards. The Cardinals held season-best +19 margin over Notre Dame in its home finale (49-30) and outrebounded the Irish by 12 boards in the ACC Tournament on March 13 (50-38). Louisville had a 17-7 record when outrebounding its opponent.

Louisville has blocked a shot in 302 of its last 303 games, failing to swat a shot in the Cardinals' last game of the season against Minnesota. Malik Williams blocked a shot in 26 of 34 games as a sophomore and led Louisville in blocks with 41 (1.2 average, 11th in the ACC).

■ **Success vs. Top 25 Foes** -- Louisville has won 42 of its last 90 against AP ranked opponents, falling to No. 5 North Carolina on March 14 in its last Top 25 matchup. UofL has a 59-61 record against Top 25 teams over the last 11 years (4-8 last year, 1-7 in 2017-18, 5-8 in 2016-17, 3-5 in 2015-16). UofL has been victorious eight of the last 27 times it has faced an AP top-five foe. UofL has won 21 of its last 52 games when facing Top 10 teams, spanning the last 11 years. Winning at No. 12 North Carolina on Jan. 12 marked UofL's first road victory over a Top 15 team since winning 58-57 at No. 7 Cincinnati on Feb. 22, 2014.

■ **Comeback Cards** — UofL recovered from a 12-point first-half deficit to win against Boston College on Jan. 16. Over the last nine seasons, UofL has recovered from nine or more points down to win on 31 occasions, including three occasions last season and five during the 2017-18 season. UofL recovered from a 15-point first-half deficit to win its ACC opener against Miami. It was the largest deficit overcome in victory since the Cardinals came back from a 17-point deficit to win at No. 23 Florida State (1-10-18). Louisville fought back from a 12-point first-half deficit at Seton Hall and trailed by nine in the second half.

■ **20 All-American Selections** -- Twenty Louisville players have earned All-America status, the latest being consensus All-America pick Russ Smith in 2014. Six individuals have been consensus selections (Charlie Tyra, Wes Unseld, Darrell Griffith, Pervis Ellison, Clifford Rozier and Smith).

■ **Youngstown State Awaits Next** — Louisville opens its 10th season at home in the KFC Yum! Center as the Cardinals face the Youngstown State Penguins in the KFC Yum on Sunday, Nov. 10 at 2 p.m. ET (Regional Sports Networks/Fox Sports South in Louisville). Predicted to finish sixth in the Horizon League this season, YSU produced a 12-20 overall record a year ago. Under third-year head coach Jerrod Calhoun, the Penguins return 10 letterwinners, including five starters. Sophomore Darius Quisenberry, who averaged 13.8 points, 2.9 rebounds and 3.8 assists per game, was honored as a preseason All-Horizon League second team selection. He scored a YSU freshman record 441 points last year and scored in double digits on 21 occasions. The Penguins set a school single-season record with 303 three-pointers last year. This will be the first meeting for the Cardinals against a Youngstown State team. It is the first of three straight Sunday home games for UofL.

Louisville has won its last 18 consecutive home openers. UofL has won 50 straight home games in the month of November spanning the last 28 years, including a 37-0 record in the KFC Yum! Center.

Louisville has an 18-2 all-time record against Horizon League members.

## CARDINAL CLIPS

■ Louisville has finished among the nation's Top 25 teams in seven of the last nine years. Louisville has been ranked on 633 occasions in the Associated Press poll, sixth all-time.

■ Louisville has **75 NBA Draft selections**, including eight in the last six years (Ray Spalding the latest in 2018 as the 56th overall pick). Former UofL and current Utah Jazz guard Donovan Mitchell was the 2018 NBA Dunk Contest winner and was runner-up for the NBA Rookie of the Year.

■ Louisville has been the highest rated television market for college basketball for the last 17 years.

■ Louisville is **one of only five schools** to be ranked in the AP Top 25 poll at least once during each of the past 17 seasons, excluding preseason polls (others: Duke, Gonzaga, Kansas, & North Carolina).

■ Louisville is one of just four schools which have won 20 or more games on the court in each of the **last 17 seasons** (also Kansas, Duke and Gonzaga). However, the NCAA Committee on Infractions' vacation of 123 victories in four of those years (2011-15) negates the official results.

■ Louisville has attracted over **3.4 million fans** in its first nine years in the spectacular KFC Yum! Center. The Cardinals have ranked in the top six nationally in home attendance for the last 38 consecutive years.

■ Six Cardinals were named to the 2019 All-ACC Academic Team (**ACC-best 31 selections** over 5 years). UofL achieved a collective 3.352 grade-point average for the 2018 fall semester, with **11 of 14** student-athletes earning a 3.0 or better GPA. The Cardinals have produced a 3.0 or better GPA in 20 of the last 21 semesters. UofL is one of only two Division I schools in the nation to have perfect men's basketball multi-year Academic Progress Rate (APR) scores in four of the past five years.

■ Over the last four years, UofL held 62 opponents under 40 percent shooting from the field, 34 under 36 percent and 15 under 32 percent. Over the last five seasons, Louisville has held 54 opponents below 60 points, including 13 below 50.

■ Louisville's strength of schedule has been among the top 16 toughest in the nation by the RPI in 10 of the past 12 years. The 2018-19 slate was the fourth-toughest overall by the NCAA's NET.

■ Louisville has participated in postseason competition in 49 of the last 54 years.

■ Louisville is **second in the nation** with 68 1,000-point career scorers (behind North Carolina's 76). Forward Jordan Nwora is the Cardinals' next closest current player to that plateau with 736 career points in his two seasons.

■ Louisville faced nine of the top 14 NBA Draft picks during the 2018-19 season and 15 of the first-round selections.

■ Louisville has the largest margin of victory over an eventual national champion in both men's and women's basketball, beating 2014 NCAA men's champion Connecticut and 2018 women's champion Notre Dame each by 33 during the regular season. Previous records were 27 points over a men's champion and 18 points over a women's champion.

■ **Impressive Academic Performance** -- While the UofL men's basketball team has performed well on the court, the Cardinals have excelled in the classroom as well. Louisville has received an NCAA Public Recognition Award six of the last seven years for ranking among the top 10 percent in men's basketball in the Academic Progress Rate (APR), which measures academic eligibility, retention and graduation for student-athletes. Louisville is one of just nine Division I schools in the nation, including only two from Power Five conferences (Louisville and Stanford), which have earned the APR recognition in at least six of the last seven years. UofL is one of only nine Division I schools in the nation to have perfect men's basketball multi-year APR scores in at least four of the past six years.

The men's basketball team has attained a collective 3.0 GPA for 21 of the last 22 semesters, including a 3.176 cumulative team mark for the most recently-completed Spring 2019 semester. The Cardinals produced a collective 3.265 grade point average for the 2018-19 academic year. A league-high six Cardinals were named to the 2019 All-ACC Academic Team and UofL has produced an ACC-best 31 selections over its five years in the league. Prior to entering the ACC, UofL's men's basketball team earned four straight league Team Academic Excellence Awards, recognizing the highest collective grade-point averages in each of the conference sports (2014 American Athletic Conference, 2011-13 Big East).

■ **Cardinals Placed Six on 2019 All-ACC Academic Team** -- A league-high six UofL men's basketball players were honored on the 2019 All-ACC Academic Men's Basketball team. Earning the honor for the Cardinals were Christen Cunningham, Steven Enoch, V.J. King, Ryan McMahon, Jordan Nwora and Darius Perry. The six selections for Louisville were the most for any school on the 25-member team. Virginia Tech had four selections. UofL placed five members on the team last year, six in 2016-17 and seven in its first two ACC seasons, an ACC-best 31 selections in the last five years. To be eligible for consideration, a student-athlete must have earned a 3.00 grade point average for the previous semester and maintained a 3.00 cumulative average during his academic career. It was the third straight year that King earned the recognition and the second for Nwora and Perry.

■ **Six Earn Degrees in 2019** -- Six Cardinals, including three who earned advanced degrees, graduated in the spring or summer of 2019. UofL men's basketball 2019 graduates include Akoy Agau (master's in business administration), Christen Cunningham (master of science in sport administration), Steven Enoch (bachelor of arts in communication), Khwan Fore (MS, sport administration), Ryan McMahon (BS, marketing) and Dwayne Sutton (BS, sport administration). V.J. King is close to completing his degree in sport administration.

■ **Three Million Fans** — Louisville passed the three million mark in total home attendance in the KFC Yum! Center on Jan. 21, 2018. A total of 3,433,583 fans have flocked to the spectacular arena to watch UofL play in its nine seasons. Louisville's average home attendance of 16,883 in 2017-18 was the sixth largest in the nation. Louisville has ranked among the top six nationally in average home attendance each of the last 38 years. UofL has averaged 20,198 fans per game in its nine years in the KFC Yum! Center.

■ **Cards vs. Non-Conference Foes** -- Louisville has won 73 of its last 77 non-conference games at home in the KFC Yum! Center, spanning the last nine seasons. The Cardinals won 35 straight over non-conference opponents between falling to Kentucky on Dec. 27, 2014 and its previous home non-conference loss on Dec. 31, 2010 to Kentucky. The other four non-conference losses UofL has suffered in the KFC Yum! Center were a 52-46 setback at the hands of Drexel on Dec. 14, 2010; 79-77 to Seton Hall on Dec. 3, 2017; 79-56 to Mississippi State on March 20, 2018; and 71-58 to Kentucky on Dec. 29, 2018. In its ninth season in the spectacular KFC Yum! Center, Louisville has an overall 139-22 record in home games, including an 81-6 record against non-conference opponents. The Cardinals have won 37 of their last 40 home games against non-conference opponents.

■ **17 Sweet 16s for Cards** — Louisville is tied for ninth with 17 Sweet 16 appearances since the NCAA began Sweet 16 records in 1975. The Cardinals reached four additional Sweet 16s that were later vacated. (UofL years in Sweet 16: 1975, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1986, 1988, 1989, 1993, 1994, 1996, 1997, 2005, 2008, 2009; Sweet 16 appearances in 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015 were vacated). The Cardinals have won seven of their last eight regional semifinal games.

■ **Cardinals Have Reached 11 Elite Eights** -- Louisville has reached the NCAA Elite Eight on 11 occasions, tied for seventh nationally. The Cardinals reached three additional Elite Eights that were later vacated. The NCAA recognizes Elite Eight records since 1951, the first year that all teams in the tournament would be required to win at least one game to advance to the Elite Eight. (UofL years in Elite Eight: 1959, 1972, 1975, 1980, 1982, 1983, 1986, 1997, 2005, 2008, 2009; Elite Eight appearances in 2012, 2013, and 2015 were vacated). The Cardinals have a 10-4 record in regional championship games.

■ **Eight NBA Draft Picks in Last Seven Years** -- A total of 75 former Louisville players have been selected in the NBA Draft, including eight in the last six years. UofL is eighth in the nation with 25 first-round draft picks and Louisville is one of just 10 schools in the nation with 70+ draft picks. A total of 17 former UofL players have played in the NBA over the last seven years.

The Cardinals' last NBA draft selection was Ray Spalding, who was selected by the Philadelphia 76ers in the second round of the 2018 NBA Draft with the 56th pick overall. He was subsequently traded to the Dallas Mavericks, where he started the season as a rookie in 2018-19. He is currently with the Phoenix Suns.

In addition to Spalding, those recent picks include Donovan Mitchell (2017, 1st round, 13th overall selection, Denver Nuggets), Chinanu Onuaku (2016, 2nd, 37th, Houston Rockets), Terry Rozier (2015, 1st, 16th, Boston Celtics), Montrezl Harrell (2015, 2nd, 32nd, Houston Rockets), Russ Smith (2nd, 47th, Philadelphia 76ers), Gorgui Dieng (2013, 1st, 21st, Utah Jazz) and Peyton Siva (2013, 2nd, 56th, Detroit Pistons).

In addition, former Cardinal Mangok Mathiang made the Charlotte Hornets team in 2017 as an undrafted free agent following his senior season at UofL. Mitchell won the 2018 Verizon NBA Slam Dunk Contest on Feb. 18 and was runner-up for the 2018 NBA Rookie of the Year.

Louisville has produced 25 first-round NBA Draft choices, including 12 in the top ten and six among the top three picks (Pervis Ellison first in 1989; Wes Unseld second in 1968; Darrell Griffith second in 1980; Charlie Tyra second in 1957; Rodney McCray third in 1983; George Hauptfuhrer

■ **Eight Former UofL Assistants Are Head Coaches** -- Eight former Louisville assistant coaches are active head coaches. The list includes Mike Balado at Arkansas State, Mick Cronin at UCLA; Scott Davenport at Bellarmine; Kevin Keatts at NC State, Steve Masiello at Manhattan; Walter McCarty at Evansville, Richard Pitino at Minnesota and Kevin Willard at Seton Hall. Seven former UofL assistants have guided their teams to NCAA Tournament appearances over the last five years (since 2014; Cronin, Davenport, Keatts, Masiello, Marvin Menzies, Pitino and Willard).

■ **Cardinals Regularly Face Difficult Schedule** — The Cardinals have played a schedule ranked among the top 16 toughest by the ratings percentage index or the recent NCAA NET ranking in 10 of the past 12 seasons. Louisville faced one of the nation's most difficult schedules in 2018-19, with the Cardinals' schedule ranked as the fourth-toughest in the nation in the NET and its non-conference schedule was the 11th-strongest slate. Louisville is one of six schools in the nation to have played 11 games against AP Top 25 opponents entering the NCAA Tournament, including six in the Top 10. Louisville and Duke played more NCAA Sweet 16 teams (eight) and the Cardinals' 11 games against those teams was the third-most in the nation. Last year, Louisville played 21 of its 33 games entering the NCAA Tournament against teams that advanced to postseason play.

### Cardinals in the NCAA Tournament

■ Louisville made its 39th NCAA Tournament appearance in 2019. The Cards have reached the Sweet 16 on 17 occasions and have advanced to the Elite Eight 11 times. Louisville is seventh in NCAA Tournament appearances (39), ninth in tournament victories (61) and sixth in tournament games (102). UofL has a 61-41 overall NCAA Tournament record, reaching the Final Four eight times. *(Louisville had 43 NCAA Tournament and 21 Sweet 16 appearances before four of each in 2012, 2013, 2014 and 2015 -- plus three Elite Eights and a 15-3 record -- were vacated by the NCAA Committee on Infractions.)*

■ Louisville is tied for eighth with 17 Sweet 16 appearances since the NCAA began Sweet 16 records in 1975 (years: 1975, 1978, 1979, 1980, 1982, 1983, 1984, 1986, 1988, 1989, 1993, 1994, 1996, 1997, 2005, 2008, 2009; Sweet 16 appearances in 2012, 2013, 2014, and 2015 were vacated).

■ Louisville is tied for seventh with 11 Elite Eight appearances since the NCAA began Elite Eight records in 1951 (years: 1959, 1972, 1975, 1980, 1982, 1983, 1986, 1997, 2005, 2008, 2009; Elite Eight appearances in 2012, 2013, and 2015 were vacated).

■ UofL Coach Chris Mack has an 11-9 record in his ninth NCAA Tournament appearance (the last six straight years), including reaching the Sweet 16 on four occasions and the Elite Eight in 2017. All but the 2019 appearance occurred when he was the head coach at Xavier, where he guided the Musketeers to the school's first-ever No. 1 NCAA Tournament seed in 2018.

### ■ Louisville Top College Basketball

**Market** -- Louisville is consistently the highest-rated television market for college basketball on ESPN. Louisville has been the top market each of the last 17 years and every year since ESPN began tracking the data. Louisville's average 4.2 rating for the 2018-19 season led all markets and was well ahead of second-place Knoxville, which averaged a 2.9 rating. The remaining top five was Raleigh-Durham (2.8), Greensboro-High Point (2.7) and Kansas City (2.5). The Cardinals' NCAA Sweet 16 game against Kentucky in 2014 drew a 51.5 rating and 73 share, making it the second highest-rated event in Louisville television history. Louisville's 2013 NCAA Championship game vs. Michigan (later vacated) is the top-rated television event all-time in the Louisville market. Louisville was No. 3 ESPN market for women's basketball in 2019 (0.5) and was the No. 11 ESPN/ABC market for college football in 2016 (3.5 average rating).

■ **Cards Have Had Productive Defense** — Recent Louisville teams have been known for their defensive intensity and new UofL Coach Chris Mack has kept the Cardinals' strong defensively. Louisville was 22nd in the nation in Ken Pomeroy's adjusted defensive rankings. The Cardinals were 30th in the nation in field goal percentage defense (.408), 30th in defensive rebounds per game (27.9), and 57th in three-point field goal percentage defense (.320).

UofL has limited 54 opponents over the last five seasons under 60 points (69 in the last six years), including 13 times below 50 (twice in 2018-19). Seventeen of Louisville's 34 opponents in 2018-19 (half) shot below 40 percent from the field, including 10 of its 18 ACC opponents.

Louisville has ranked among the nation's top 41 in field goal percentage defense in 13 of the past 15 years, including the 2018-19 percentage of .408, which was 30th in the nation. Over the last five years, UofL has held 62 opponents under 40 percent shooting from the field (17 in 2018-19), 34 under 36 percent and 15 under 32 percent.

■ **Statistical Trends** — UofL is 203-12 over the last 18 seasons when scoring 80 or more points (11-2 last year, 12-0 in 2017-18, 11-1 in 2016-17, 10-0 in 2015-16) ... Over the past 18 years, Louisville is 153-7 when shooting 50 percent or better from the field (6-0 last year, 9-1 in 2017-18, 8-0 in 2016-17, 14-0 in 2015-16) ... UofL is 359-55 when holding its opponent below 70 points over the past 18 years (13-4 last year, 15-2 in 2017-18, 18-2 in 2016-17, 19-1 in 2015-16, 24-4 in 2014-15).

■ **Seven of Last Nine NCAA Champions Have Played in Louisville** - The eventual national champion has played in Louisville's home arena, the KFC Yum! Center, in seven of the arena's nine seasons in existence. Louisville faced eventual champions Connecticut (2011, 2014), Duke (2015) and Virginia (2019) in home games. Kentucky won a pair of games in the 2012 second and third rounds in the KFC Yum! Center, 2016 Champ Villanova won the NCAA South Regional in Louisville, and UofL won the 2013 itself. UofL played 2017 Champion North Carolina, but it was in Chapel Hill.

■ **Garcia Joins UofL Hall of Fame** — Francisco Garcia, the top scorer on the Cardinals' 2005 NCAA Final Four team who played 10 years in the NBA, was one of six outstanding individuals inducted into the University of Louisville Athletics Hall of Fame on Oct. 25. The 2019 induction class also included Wesley Korir, an All-America distance runner who holds multiple UofL records and finished third in the 5000-meter event at the 2007 NCAA Outdoor Championship; Cindy LaCrosse, UofL's first All-American in women's golf who earned the highest finish for a Cardinal in the NCAA Championship; Angel McCoughtry, the Cardinals' career leader in scoring, rebounding and steals who led UofL to its first NCAA title game in 2009; Eric Wood, a four-year starter at center on the Cardinals' offensive line and nine-year NFL veteran with 120 career starts; and Lacy Wood, UofL's first softball All-American who helped the Cardinals to three NCAA regional appearances.

Garcia (2002-05 at UofL) scored 1,413 points in three seasons (No. 26 all-time at UofL), helping the Cardinals to a combined 78-22 record. He was the leading scorer (15.7 ppg) on the Cardinals' 2005 NCAA Final Four team, UofL's first Final Four in 19 years. Louisville won its first Conference USA championship that year when Garcia was a John Wooden first team and NABC second team All-America selection. He was twice honored on the All-Conference USA team (2003-04, 2004-05) and was the C-USA Freshman of the year in 2002-03. He set the UofL single-game assists record holder with 15 against Murray State (1-3-04). Garcia was the No. 23 overall pick in the first round of the 2005 NBA Draft and played 10 years in the NBA with the Sacramento Kings and Houston Rockets, scoring over 4,000 career points.

■ **Cards Have Been Tough on the Road** — UofL has a 78-57 record over the last 13 years on its opponent's home court (.577). Louisville has posted a 22-23 conference road record in its five years in the ACC (4-5 in 2018-19). UofL had the most road victories of any school in Big East Conference games over its last seven years in that league and was a league-best 8-1 in its road games in The American during the 2013-14 season. The Cards have a 68-47 record in conference games on the road over the last 13 seasons (.591). In neutral site games, Louisville has a 39-14 record over the last six years (.736) and a 49-21 neutral site record over the last nine years (.700).

■ **Nwora Gained International Experience** -- Jordan Nwora has been a member of the Nigeria national team in two international events over the last two years. In the 2018 FIBA World Cup African Qualifiers June 29-July 1 in Lagos, Nigeria, he averaged 21.7 points and 8.0 rebounds. He totaled 36 points, five rebounds, four assists and four steals for Nigeria in a 93-53 victory over Mali on July 1, 2018. His 36 points is the most ever scored by a Nigerian player in a major tournament. He totaled 10 points and four rebounds for Nigeria against Russia in the first game of the 2019 FIBA Basketball World Cup Group B contest at the Wuhan Sports Centre in Wuhan, China (8-31-19). An ankle injury in the next game kept him sidelined for the remainder of the event. Nwora has dual citizenship with Nigeria. His father Alex, who is the head coach at Erie Community College, serves as the head coach of the Nigerian team.

#### ■ Tenth Season in KFC Yum! Center

-- This is Louisville's 10th season in the spectacular KFC Yum! Center, located on the banks of the Ohio River in downtown Louisville. The 22,000-seat multi-purpose arena was built at a cost of \$238 million and includes 71 luxury suites, 62 four- or six-seat premium boxes, over 2,000 side-court club seats and four party suites with a seating capacity of 32 each.

UofL's men's and women's teams have permanent locker rooms. There are five additional team locker rooms, two officials locker rooms, five star dressing rooms, a full-function media work room and a full-sized basketball practice court on the event level. The seven levels of the arena (including the upper catwalk) include a collective 721,762 square feet, or roughly the area of 13 football fields.

After passing through the one and a half acre landscaped entry plaza that features a basketball-themed fountain, entering fans can visit the 2,500-square foot UofL adidas store or head to their seats using one of the eight escalators or seven elevators within the building.

Lounge space is abundant within the arena. Four spacious donor rooms are available for Cardinal fans, including three that overlook the Ohio River. The 7,000-square foot main concourse restaurant overlooks the river and a main concourse sports bar has views directly into the arena bowl. Two 4,000-square foot club lounges on the event level, as well as the terrace club and premium box lounges, provide amenities for their respective patrons. The KFC Yum! Center served as the site for the NCAA Men's Basketball Tournament second and third rounds in 2012 and 2015, the NCAA South Regional in 2016 and was the site for the 2012 NCAA Women's Volleyball Championship. The 2019 NCAA South Regional will be staged in the KFC Yum! Center.



**HEAD COACH CHRIS MACK**

Chris Mack, whose teams have participated in the NCAA Tournament in nine of his 10 seasons as a head coach, was named as the head coach of the University of Louisville men's basketball team on March 28, 2018.



Among active coaches, Mack's .679 winning percentage as a head coach ranks him 25th in the nation entering the 2019-20 season and his 235 victories are the 12th most amassed by a coach in their first 10 seasons.

In his first season at Louisville, Mack guided the Cardinals to a 20-14 record and earned a No. 7 seed in the NCAA Tournament while facing the nation's fourth-toughest schedule. Picked to finish 11th in the ACC, UofL achieved a 10-8 conference record and earned a tie for sixth in the final regular season standings. The Cardinals beat four Associated Press Top 25 teams and were No. 22 in the nation in the NCAA's NET rankings. Louisville ranked among the nation's top 30 teams in both offensive (27th) and defensive efficiency (24th). Entering the season, UofL had returned one starter and about a third of its scoring and rebounding from the previous year.

Mack has built for the future as well, with Louisville's 2019 signing class ranked ninth in the nation by ESPN.com, 10th by Rivals.com and 11th by 247sports.com.

In nine seasons as the head coach at Xavier, Mack guided the Musketeers to a 215-97 record and eight NCAA Tournament appearances (the last five straight years), including reaching the Sweet 16 on four occasions and the Elite Eight in 2017. His teams won or shared three conference regular season championships while compiling a 105-49 league record over nine seasons in the Big East and Atlantic 10.

His 2017-18 Xavier squad achieved a 29-6 record, won Xavier's first Big East Conference regular season championship and earned the school's first-ever No. 1 seed in the NCAA Tournament. Mack was honored as the 2018 Big East Coach of the Year, NABC District 5 Coach of the Year, and he became the all-time coaching wins leader with the Musketeers. Xavier finished third in the final Associated Press poll – its highest ever ranking -- and last year's team was one short of the school record for victories.

Mack's contract with the Cardinals is for seven years, extending through the 2024-25 season. He is just the fourth head

coach to guide the Cardinals in the last 48 years, following Denny Crum (1971-2001), Rick Pitino (2001-17) and David Padgett (2017-18). Mack is the 21st head coach in Louisville's 104-year history and the seventh in the past 73 years.

Mack, 49, received the 2016 Henry Iba Award as the U.S. Basketball Writers Association (USBWA) National Coach of the Year while also earning the CBS Sports and Basketball Times magazine National Coach of the Year awards that season. He led Xavier to a 28-6 record in 2015-16 and achieved a No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament and a No. 5 ranking in the final AP poll, which at the time was the school's highest seed and ranking in school history.

His 2016-17 Xavier team made an NCAA Tournament run to the Elite Eight after entering the event as a No. 11 seed. His teams have reached the NCAA Sweet 16 on four occasions, in 2010, 2012, 2015 and 2017. As a player, assistant and head coach, Mack has been a part of 19 NCAA Tournament appearances.

Born Dec. 30, 1969 in Cleveland, Ohio, Mack was the 2010-11 Atlantic 10 Conference Coach of the Year in his second year as a head coach. In addition, he was the recipient of the 2011 Skip Prosser Man of the Year award, which was established in 2008 to honor those who not only achieve success on the basketball court but who display moral integrity off the court as well.

He was the 2009-10 Basketball Times Rookie Coach of the Year when, in his initial year, he guided Xavier to a 26-9 record, shared the Atlantic 10 Championship and advanced to the NCAA Sweet 16.

Mack served as a court coach for the 2016 USA Basketball Men's U18 National Team training camp in the summer of 2016 at the United States Olympic Training Center in Colorado Springs, Colorado.

Before rising to a head coaching position, Mack was a part of successful staffs throughout his career. He spent five seasons as an assistant on Sean Miller's Xavier staff (2004-09) after serving on the staff of the late Skip Prosser at Xavier as director of basketball operations (1999-01) and as an assistant coach at Wake Forest (2001-04).

In 10 seasons as an assistant or operations

director, he helped his teams produce a 229-96 record (.705), win four regular season titles and one conference tournament championship, and secure eight NCAA Tournament appearances, advancing to three Sweet 16s and one Elite Eight. Those teams won at least 20 games in nine of the 10 seasons.

Mack began his coaching career in 1993 as the junior varsity girls basketball coach at McAuley High School in Cincinnati. He was the varsity girls basketball coach at Mount Notre Dame High School in Reading, Ohio, for four years (1995-99), directing the team to four straight sectional titles and earning Cincinnati Post Coach of the Year honors in 1996.

A 1992 Xavier graduate with a degree in communication arts, Mack was a two-time team captain as a player at Xavier under then head coach Pete Gillen. He won the 1993 Midwestern City Conference (MCC) regular season championship (12-2 record) and reached the second round of the NCAA Tournament.

Mack was the 1987-88 Cincinnati Post Metro Player of the Year at St. Xavier High School in Cincinnati before going on to start for two seasons at Evansville under Jim Crews, winning an MCC Regular Season Championship and a trip to the second round of the 1989 NCAA Tournament as a freshman at Evansville. He transferred to Xavier after his sophomore season.

Mack and his wife, Christi, have two daughters, Laine (14) and Hailee (13), and a son, Brayden (4). A native of Louisville, the former Christi Hester was the runner-up for Kentucky Miss Basketball as a senior at Holy Cross High School. She played basketball at Dayton, where she scored 1,268 career points and was later inducted into the university's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2014. She served as the Director of Basketball Operations for the Xavier women's basketball team (2001-03) and more recently as the head girls basketball coach at Cincinnati's Colerain High School Cardinals.

Mack and his wife created the Mack Family Foundation in 2016, a family-centered foundation whose mission is to serve, inspire and aid less fortunate children.

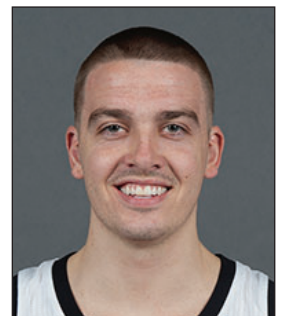
