FACTS ABOUT THE UNIVERSITY

The University of Miami, located in the quiet suburb of Coral Gables, Florida, seven miles from Miami, is headed by Dr. Jay F.W. Pearson, who has been associated with the school since its founding in 1926. Dr. Pearson became second president of the school in 1953 following the death of founder-president, Dr. Bowman F. Ashe.

It's a rare institution, this University of Miami--born in the fury of a hurricane, nurtured in the tempest of a depression, maturing now in a whirlwind of expansion.

As Ed Sullivan said of it a few years ago, it has become "a mighty university... a fabulous dream come true." Its buildings have such beauty, style and modernism that tourists flock daily to see and admire it.

To its more than 11,000 students, the U-M is a school of diversified learning, a campus with a combination of classwork and extra curricular activity that produces the kind of well-rounded citizens the world will always need.

Scattered over the 260-acre grounds are classroom buildings, residence halls and a student center--all stunning structures of glass and steel, landscaped by tropical foliage. Functional simplicity marks the architecture, with windows covering almost 50 per cent of the exterior.

No ivy need cling to the buildings to hide the cracks in the walls. Everything on the campus is modern, a proud product of a few visionary educators who had a dream just 30 short years ago.

It's an independent institution, non-denominational and co-educational. The state lends support only to the School of Medicine.

Today, its students pursue careers in science, business administration, music, education, engineering, medicine, law, the liberal arts, and graduate studies in various fields.

Its more than 700 faculty members are drawn from the nation's leading colleges and universities as well as from those of South America and Europe. Research scientists and assistants work quietly in laboratories spread out over three campuses. That work includes medical research, industrial chemistry, marine biology and oceanography, business and economics, psychology, radio and television, zoology and hurricane velocity experiments.

Its location at the crossroads of the two Americas has made the U-M a center of inter-American education and culture with hundreds of foreign students.

The University's effect upon the culture of the community is easily seen. Its annual symphony series brings the "greats" of the world of music and opera to the school as guest soloists. Productions at its flexible Ring Theatre have been consistently acclaimed as near-professional. Works of the world's top painters and sculptors, past and present, are exhibited throughout the year in the Lowe Gallery.

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

JACK HARDING

It takes teamwork to win games on the athletic field, but that teamwork extends far beyond the players themselves. The teamwork starts with the men who do the planning as well as the coaching.

Jack Harding, as director of athletics, is one of the big men in building the kind of teamwork which has made University of Miami athletic success possible.

Since taking over the full-time athletic directorship duties in 1948, Harding has continued to build better and more representative schedules in all sports for Miami. Over these years teams from the Big Ten, Big Seven, Southeastern Conference, Atlantic Conference, Southern Conference and the Southwestern Conference have been played by Miami.

A high spot in Harding's career as athletic director of Miami came when he signed Notre Dame and Georgia Tech for the 1955 campaign along with other great teams of the nation.

Harding started his career in college athletics as a football player back in the twenties under Pop Warner and Jock Southerland. He was a star halfback in the same backfield with Andy Gustafson on the great Pitt teams of the middle twenties.

After leaving Pitt, the genial Harding turned to coaching and enjoyed great success at University of Scranton, Pa. His success there led to his appointment as head coach at Miami in 1937. Harding's U-M team of 1938 defeated both Florida and Georgia, while in 1945 the Harding-coached Hurricanes knocked off Florida, Clemson, North Carolina State, Michigan State and Auburn to land in the Orange Bowl for a thrilling 13 to 6 win over Holy Cross.

Since retiring from coaching and becoming full-time athletic director of Miami in 1948, Harding has done much to develop the other sports of basketball, track, tennis, swimming, golf and baseball in addition to football. University of Miami schedules of this and future years reflect his skill.

UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI COACHING STAFF

BRUCE HALE - HEAD COACH

BRUCE HALE came to U of Miami as head basketball coach a year ago.

After a great career as a high school player, Hale entered Santa Clara and won All-America acclaim in a brilliant collegiate career. His Santa Clara team won the Pacific Coast Independent Championship three years in a row.

Hale served in the armed forces with the Army Air Corps during World War II and during his stint in the service played and coached the famous Five By Five cage team for three years at Miami Beach. He later coached the Wright Field Air Force team of Dayton, Ohio, his winning the service title each year.

The Miami mentor was in professional basketball for ten years and was selected on the All-World Professional team in 1945 while playing for the Dayton Bombers. In 1946, Hale played with the Chicago American Gears which won the World Title that year in the National League. Later, Hale coached the Indianapolis entry in the N.B.A.

In his brief connection with the University of Miami, Hale was the prime mover in organizing the new Florida Intercollegiate Basketball Conference. His team finished second in the league last year.

TONY FERRARA - FRESHMAN COACH

TONY FERRARA...is freshman basketball coach for his second successive year. Tony starred in both basketball and baseball for U of Miami in his undergraduate days. He was a guard in basketball and ranks 15th in total scoring in Miami's all time records, and he was one of the hardest hitting third baseman the Miami baseball team ever had. A fine arm completed the equipment which made him an able defender of the hot corner. He served briefly as a varsity assistant coach in basketball some seasons ago and is no stranger to the coaching field. He fits in nicely with the system Coach Bruce Hale has established at Miami.

HURRICANE PROSPECTS

Bruce Hale starts his second season as head basketball coach at the University of Miami minus both his centers from 1954-55, one of its starting guards and the most reliable replacement at this position and one starting forward.

Back are one regular forward, one regular guard, two little used letterman reserves and a pair of squad members.

Since that group when intact could win only nine of 20 games, Miami's hopes for improvement this year rest almost entirely upon the members of the 1954-55 freshman squad, which was a pretty fair outfit even though turned back twice by the University of Florida freshmen.

The newly turned sophomores will hold down anywhere from two to four first team berths, which of course insures Miami of having a green outfit, subject to all the woes of inexperience. However, they'll inject new spirit into a squad somewhat subdued after two losing seasons and the net result should mean an upturn in Miami's basketball fortunes sufficient to make the squad a strong contender for the state intercollegiate conference crown, and also enough to give Miami a chance to come up with an even break on the year.

Although most of the name schools on the schedule are crowded into the Orange Bowl tournament at Christmas holiday time, Coach Hale realizes that the caliber of the teams on this year's slate is higher than that of many of the name schools met a year ago.

Hale's coaching system will begin to take hold in this, his second Miami year, and the zestful young Hurricanes should become more and more of a handful as the season progresses and they shed their inexperience.

UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI'S

BASKETBALL SQUAD

THE LETTERMEN

DICK MIAMI, a senior guard, is a three year letterman who has shown steady improvement. He fakes and drives well and should be at the peak of his career in the coming season. He has an accurate one hand push shot which he began to exploit extensively late last year after being rather chary of taking many shots earlier in his career. He scored 134 points as a freshman, slumped to 96 as a sophomore when illness cut short his season, but came back to a fine 301 last year. Dick hit for a .385 average on his field goal tries as a freshman, fell to .333 as a sophomore but rolled back up to .398 last year. His three year percentages from the free throw line are .608, then .720 and, last year, .722. He starts his final year with a 531 point total, ninth best in Miami's all time standings. He could become Miami's second 1,000 point man, with a good year.

ED KLIMA, senior forward, has improved steadily throughout his Miami career and has the potentiality for a great year. He developed great accuracy with a jump shot last year and can rebound strongly off both backboards. A measure of his improvement last year is shown by the fact that as a junior he hit on .397 percent of his shots as against .264 the previous year. Ed got 63 points in his freshman year, added 97 as a sophomore and his 195 junior points give him 355 for a starter, 12th best in Miami's all time totals. More accuracy from the free throw lane would assure him an average in the double figures. He had a poor .437 average from the charity line as a sophomore and only .569 last year. At that, his 9.7 points per game represents the second best scoring average among the returnees.

GENE HOBAN, senior forward, is a tremendous competitor who took time out between his sophomore and junior years for a stint in the service. He boosted his sophomore scoring total of 15 points to 94 last year and is in the fight for a starting job this season. He's had lots of playing experience and Coach Hale believes he has sharpened his shooting eye to the point where he'll give the team much more scoring punch in this his final varsity year. He's aggressive, has lots of bounce and did a good job as a rebounder last year.

ERNEST PRIETO, junior guard, was injured for the first half of last season and never did hit his stride. He is the strongest man on the squad under the basket, passes well and has come up with an effective one hand shot from around the circle. As a freshman he was one of the team's better rebounders. In that year, he scored 58 points in 13 games. Used sparingly in 11 contests last season, he added 29 more...yet he should prove to be an offensive asset this year.

SQUAD MEMBERS RETURNING

BOB MURRAY, junior guard, is a capable back court man who has shown possibilities of becoming a good outside shooter. He has a keen knowledge of the game. He's the only member of the squad under 6 feet in height and will have to overcome that handicap in his fight for a position.

BRUCE LAWRENCE, junior guard, appeared in nine games last year and scored seven points. Bruce is well grounded in the Eastern style of basketball play, is a hard worker and reacts well. Could be of considerable help as a spot player.

NEWCOMERS

NICK NUGENT, junior guard, played basketball in high school and in the service. He decided to take a whirl at the game during spring practice after the close of the baseball season and he showed sufficient talent to earn a berth on the squad. He's rugged and aggressive with enough size to make his presence felt. Nick has a good two hand shot, passes well and works in well as a team player.

GENE STAGE, sophomore guard, is a good, sound ball player. He handles the back court effectively and was second high scorer on his freshman squad. He can shoot well from the outside and drives hard for the basket. He's one of the two top guard recruits from the freshman squad.

MARTY BURDETTE, sophomore guard, is known as "Golden Boy". He's well built for a basketball player, has a good one hand shot and works hard on defense. His speed carried him to many points as a freshman and he will be very hard to keep out of this year's starting lineup.

D MORRIS, sophomore forward, led the freshman squad in scoring a year ago. He possesses wonderful timing on his shots. He's a very good rebounder and gets up high off the floor, making him an excellent trip-in artist. Shoots a very accurate one handshot.

CARL PAULUS, sophomore center, is the tall man on the squad--6 feet 10. Carl was a raw, awkward player a year ago but has worked very hard and is developing fast. With his size and continued progress, he can't help but be an asset to the team. His strongest point is his defensive ability in blocking shots and gaining numerous rebounds. He can score, too, when he wants to and when he picks up the confidence he needs in his offense, he'll be quite a lad.

STAN KOJKOWSKI, sophomore center, possesses just about as keen a pair of eyes as there are on the squad. He works well on the pivot. Stan is a fiery type of player, who keeps the whole squad on its toes. He has a good shot from the side of the floor.

BOB STEINER, a sophomore forward, is a strong rebounder and chuck an effective hook shot with either hand. He played forward much of last season and developed into a fine front line player. He has the ability to be an outstanding varsity member as he can do many things well on the court.

MIKE FRIEDMAN, sophomore guard, played on the freshman squad as a reserve last year. However, in spring work, he came into his own with an effective two hand shot from the guard position. Mike always was a good ball handler and the added skill should insure plenty of action for him this year.

NICK HYLWA, sophomore forward, possesses the biggest pair of hands on the team. Potentially, he can become a top college basketball player. He is still developing but could make the grade this year.
