Three trips to national post season tournaments, six Florida Intercollegiate Conference championships and one tie, 148 victories against 79 defeats are statistics enough to prove the coaching skill of Bruce Hale at the University of Miami.

Year after year the personable Hale takes a numerically small squad and moulds it into a formidable array. He missed having a winner in his first year when he settled for a 9-11 season and two years later he broke even but his other squads have had records ranging from 14-12 on up to 23-4.

Hale is a firm believer in offense and in 1958-59 his team had the highest scoring average in the land, last year's outfit was second, several have been in the first 10.

The Miami coach did his college playing for Santa Clara. As an Air Force captain in World War II, he played on the famed Five by Five team in Miami Beach. He coached Wright Air Field Base to the service championship. Ten years of pro basketball followed. He was on the All World team of 1945, coached the Chicago Gears to the national title in 1946, later coached the Indianapolis pro team.

The Outlook

Four starters, the top reserve and a promising rookie from the frosh squad are missing from Miami's roster this year and no one expects the Hurricanes to duplicate their 23-5 mark of a year ago. How far off that record they come is something else again.

Rick Barry, who earned All America mention as a sophomore forward last year, is a shade taller, noticeably heavier than he was. A year's experience will have made him one of the nation's best players.

Of the returning veterans, Wayne Beckner is first class for a forward while Bernie Butts and Larry Kessler together have the potentiality to take up the slack at one guard spot.

Mike McCoy, 7 foot 1 inch center, will be hard to replace but Charles Grob, 6 feet 8 and Don Patrican, an inch shorter, do have more maneuverability though neither can match McCoy's shooting skill.

Coach Hale is banking heavily upon junior college transfer John Dampier, 6 feet 3, to give Miami the tall guard it has lacked. He is an excellent shot. From Stewart Marcus, Clark Connors, John Bates and Bob Green, sophomores, Hale will fashion his replacements — and perhaps pick up a surprise starter. The Miami coach is a past master at finding hidden skills on his squad and turning apparently ordinary players into front ranked stars.

The players each averaged 11.4 points or better for Miami a year ago and it does not appear possible that that condition can be repeated with the material now available.

However, the current squad does have better overall team speed and appears to be much smoother in ball handling than the 1962-63 outfit which made plenty of mistakes — but could overcome or offset them through sensational shooting.

The scoring punch may be concentrated among fewer players but there are enough of them to make it seem probable that the upcoming Hurricanes will be in the upper brackets of scoring nationally.

Though the towering McCoy is gone, the rebounding is in good hands and the Hurricanes should be able to control the boards in most of their games.

Board control, good shooting, satisfactory team speed—and Rick Barry, plus a comparatively young and eager squad could mean another winning year for Bruce Hale, who expects it that way.



Starters Don Boyt, John Pellegrino graduated. All State George Shary and starters Chuck Andrews and Jim Stephenson join two ace transfers and fine new material to make Tampa's hopes for '63 high.

University of Florida, Gainesville, Fla.

Dec. 7, Convention Hall; Jan. 9 at Gainesville. Coach Norman Sloan. Eleven year record, W 166, L 104.

1963 record—W 12, L 14. Points, 1943, Opp. 1975. 1963 vs. Miami-UM won 91-87 (OT), and 86-77. All time series, Florida leads 29-17 in games, 3091-2776 in points.

Great 1963 sophomore guards Brooks Henderson and Tom Baxley are back along with five other lettermen, plus Paul Morton, star of two years back. Sophs Richard Peek, 6-11, and Gary Keller, 6-9, add the height needed and these Gators should be Sloan's best.

Santa Clara University, Santa Clara, Calif.

Dec. 10, at Santa Clara.

Coach Dick Garibaldi. One year record, W 16, L 9. 1963 record, W 16, L 9. Points 1740, Opp. 1673.

Santa Clara won previous game, 66-65.

Santa Clara is rebuilding around Bruce Asch, forward; Joe Meagher, Russ Vrankovich, guards. Has one outstanding sophomore guard in Eric Paulson. John Turner, 6 foot 7 inch center, makes the team dangerous.

St. Marys College, St. Marys, Calif.

Dec. 12, at Richmond, Cal.

Coach, Michael Cimio. One year record, W 14, L 11. 1963 record—W 14, L 11. Points 1812, Opp. 1766. This is the first game between the teams.

Team ace Steve Gray graduated. Carosielle, 6 foot 7 inch center, may be the man around whom the team is rebuilt. Starters will be juniors and seniors but a high scoring player is sorely needed.

University of Nevada, Reno, Nev.

Coach, Jack Spencer. 10 year record, W 131, L 109. 1963 record—W 11, L 13. Points 1592, Opp. 1695. This is the first meeting between the teams.

Four lettermen return. Bill Robinson, 6 feet 5, who averaged 26.2 points but was out the second semester, and Bob Dolan, 6 foot guard, could give this team good scoring punch. However, only Robinson and Soph Bill Nicholson, 6 feet 5, have any height.

University of San Françisco, San Francisco, Calif.

Dec. 17, Convention Hall.

Coach, Pete Peletta. Three year record, W 45, L 35. 1963 record, W 18, L 9. Points 1807, Opp. 1575.

Miami won previous game, 68-56.

Nine players from the 1963 West Coast Conference champs plus eight from the frosh who had a 21-1 record are back from the team already tabbed as No. 1 in the west, one of the tops in the nation. Ollie Johnson averaged 17.3 points a game with a 56.7% field goal average as a soph and is an All America candidate. He is 6 feet 8. This probably is Miami's toughest foe.

Rollins College, Winter Park, Fla.

Dec. 19, Auditorium; Jan. 28, Winter Park. Coach Boyd Coffie. One year record, W 1, L 19. 1963 record—W 1, L 19. Points 1323, Opp. 1794. 1963 vs. Miami, UM won 120-72 and 144-75.

All time series, UM leads 31-13 in games, 2962-2442 in points.

Three starters graduated but more new material is available than for some time. Phil Hurt and Butch Hearn are capable veterans but team will be inexperienced and needs more height. It has desire.

University of Rhode Island, Kingston, R. I.

Jan. 4, Convention Hall.

Coach, Ernie Claverley. Six year record, W 71, L 75. 1963 record—W 15, L 11. Points 2067, Opp. 1992. 1963 vs. Miami, UM won 88-80.

All time series, UM leads, 2-0 in games, 168-150 in points.

Six vets return, topped by Steve Chubin, 6 foot 3 scoring ace, and Frank Nightingale, 6 foot 7 center. Jim Cymbala, lightning fast guard transfer from Navy and Mike Fitzgerald, 6 ft. 2 sophomore, are highly regarded on what should be an improved Rhode Island team.

Jacksonville University, Jacksonville, Fla.

Jan. 8 at Jacksonville, Feb. 4 in Auditorium. Coach, Richard Kendall. 3 year record, W 38, L 35. 1963 record—W 12, L 12. Points 2197, Opp. 2075. 1963 vs. Miami, UM won 103-91 and 112-105.

All time series, UM leads 11-1 in games, 1091-1026 in points.

Though Roger Strickland is lost, the Dolphins expect to be better. Ralph Tiner, 22.1 pts. per game last year, is the center of a great attack. Though the team has only three lettermen, such newcomers as Dick Pruet, 6 ft. 9, Ed Johnson and Tony Bumbico look like brilliant acquisitions.

Florida State University, Tallahassee, Fla.

Jan. 11, in Tallahassee; Feb. 29, Convention Hall. Coach, J. K. Kennedy. 15 year record, W 192, L 173. 1963 record, W 15, L 10. Points 1744, Opp. 1680. 1963 vs. Miami. FSU won 77-74, Miami won 99-70. All time series, UM leads 15-12 in games, 2198 to 2020 in points.

The Seminoles weren't supposed to be much last year, wound up 15-10. Charlie Long is only important loss. Vets who developed fast a year ago plus brilliant sophs like 6 ft. 8 inch Bob Gemming, equally tall Bill Peacock and hot shot Ken Leakey make this year's squad bigger and faster and even Coach Bud Kennedy thinks it might be his best.

Memphis State University, Memphis, Tenn.

Jan. 18, Convention Hall.

Coach, Dean Ehlers. One year record, W 19, L 7. 1963 record—W 19, L 7. Points 1967, Opp. 1798. Memphis State won previous game, 79-71.

Seven of 11 lettermen return. Chief loss, Hunter Beckman, 482 pts., 193 rebounds. Bob Neumann who averaged 22.1 points in eight games before being hurt last year, will take up any scoring slack and there are lots of good rebounders left on this fine team. George Kirk, guard, will star.

LaSalle College, Philadelphia, Pa.

Jan. 23, Convention Hall.

Coach, Robert W. Walters, first year.

1963 record, W 16, L 8. Points 1791, Opp. 1606.

1963 vs. Miami-LaSalle won 78-76.

All time series, LaSalle leads 4-1 in games, 409-372 in points.

Six lettermen return. Chief losses, Bill Raftery, Tony Abbott, Frank Corace, leading scorer and a member of the great rebounding trio which included Walt Sampson, and George Sutor, give a great rebuilding nucleus.

Stetson University, Deland, Fla.

Jan. 31, at Deland; Feb. 22, Convention Hall. Coach, Glenn Wilkes. Six year record, W 98, L 67. 1963 record—W 15, L 13. Points 1969, Opp. 1928. 1963 vs. Miami, Stetson won 66-64, Miami won, 5-60.

All time series, UM leads 30-27 in games, 3501-3370 in points.

Stetson has seven veterans back, key losses being Lamar Deaver, 6 ft. 7 leading scorer and rebounder, and Floyd Gladden, guard. Bill Pickens, 6 ft. 9 transfer from Georgia Southern, will give team height it lacked and is rated above Deaver as a rebounder.

Florida Southern University, Lakeland, Fla.

Feb. 1, at Lakeland; Feb. 18, Auditorium.

Coach, Tom Greene. 13 year record, W 169, L 133. 1963 record—W 15, L 10. Points 2035, Opp. 1911. 1963 vs. Miami, UM won 116-93 and 99-83.

All time series, UM leads 47-7 in games, 3459-2849 in points.

Seven of 11 lettermen return, headed by Tim Eisnaugle, team's most valuable player last year. With no player taller than 6 feet 6, the Mocs will have trouble against some foes.

Creighton University, Omaha, Neb.

Feb. 10, Auditorium.

Coach, John J. McManus. Four year record, W 56, L 46.

1963 record—W 14, L 13. Points 2045, Opp. 1874. This is the first meeting between these teams.

Six lettermen from 1963 plus one from 1962 return. Ace is Paul Silas, 6 ft. 7 center, leading rebounder in nation last year with 20.6 per game and 21.2 scoring average. Starting team includes Silas, Elton McGriff, 6 ft. 8; Tom Apke and Loren James, 6 ft. 5 each, and Tom Potter, 6 ft. McGriff is a transfer from San Francisco.

University of Houston, Houston, Tex.

Feb. 13, at Houston.

Coach, Guy V. Lewis. 7 year record, W 97, L 86. 1963 record—W 15, L 11. Points 1569, Opp. 1439. 1963 vs. Miami, UM won 71-70.

All time series, UM leads 4-3 in games, Houston in points 537-524.

Lyle Harger, great center and two reserves graduated. Team will be stronger everywhere except at center where Harger will not be replaced this season.

Loyola University, New Orleans, La.

Feb. 15, at New Orleans.

Coach, Bill Gardiner. 17 year record, W 204, L 218. 1963 record—W 12, L 11. Points 1577, Opp. 1543. 1963 vs. Miami, Loyola won 84-77.

All time series, Miami leads 5-4 in games, Loyola in points, 724-679.

Everybody is back from a team which soundly thumped Miami in Miami Beach Auditorium a year ago. Two fine sophomores, Don Kalowiski, 6 ft. 4, forward, and Bill Broderick, 5 ft. 10 guard, may win first team berths. The Wolfpack could use some extra height—Gene Turni, 6 ft. 7, is tallest.

Hurricane Classic

University of Miami took over sponsorship of this event in 1958 and each year it has grown in interest. Host Miami has been champion three times in past tournaments, runner up twice.

Army, which played in the 1960 tournament, makes its second appearance this year. Princeton, which has met Miami in regular season play, makes its tournament debut while Syracuse, which never has faced Miami in basketball, rounds out the field.

In the opening round in Miami Beach Convention Hall Dec. 27, Princeton will meet Syracuse while Miami faces Army. Finals will be played in the same place Dec. 28.

Rundown on the visiting teams in this year's tournament follows:—

Army, West Point, N.Y.

Coach, Taylor Locke, first season.

1963 record, W 8, L 11. Scored 1174 pts., opp. 1217. All time series, Miami leads 2-0 in games, 174-156 in points.

New coach Taylor Locke brings up the brilliant frosh squad which he coached to a 17-10 record last year. Mike Silliman, 6 foot 6 high school All America, and Bill Helkie, 6 foot 4, are sophs who seem sure to be starters. Joe Kosciusko, out of the first half of 1962-63 because of a knee operation; John Ritch, 6 foot 7 center out much of last year with a broken hand, and Dick Murray, 6 foot 4 who had a hand operation, are strong candidates. Dick Chilcoat, 6 foot 1 inch guard and captain, heads the 6 man letterman delegation. Three lettermen graduated.

Princeton, Princeton, N.J.

Coach, William van Breda Wolff. W 223, L 83 in 12 years.

1963 record, W 19, L 6. Scored 1833 pts., opp. 1574. All time series, each won once, Princeton leads 97 to 92 points.

Princeton lost starters Art Hyland, Bill Harlow from the 1963 Ivy League champions but retains brilliant Junior Bill Bradley, fourth in U.S. scoring with 27.3 average, second in free throw percentage with .893. Bill Howard, center, is captain. Bradley, 6 foot 5, and Juniors Donald Niemann and Ken Shank, 6 foot 6, are tallest men on team which may suffer from lack of height but with Bradley around, again is formidable. The team has a solid defense.

Syracuse, Syracuse, N.Y.

Coach, Fred Lewis, W 97, L 51 in 6 years. 1963 record, W 8, L 13. Scored 1302 pts., opp. 1431. Has not played Miami in basketball.

Lewis retains three of top four scorers from his first Syracuse team but has seven hot shot sophomores topped by 6 foot 9 inch Rex Trobridge, and Dave Bing, 6 foot 3 inch, all around whiz. Chuck Richards, 6 foot 8 transfer from Army is sure to get a starting spot on a Syracuse team which may keep only one or two of its five lettermen as starters.

First night attendance, 2,342. Second night, 2,450. All star team:—Ramsey, New York, Thomas, Miami, Ohio, forwards; Hickox, Miami, Florida, Hamilton, Miami, Ohio, guards. Center, tie between Wingard, Miami of Ohio, and Klinker, Tulane.

Most valuable, Hamilton.

Vern Lawson, entering as a sub, broke the Miami of Ohio-New York U game wide open. The Ohioans led only 31-26 at halftime, but Lawson hit for 15 points and their margin mounted to 75-55 despite Tom Sanders' 14 rebounds. U of Miami's sophomores had little trouble with Tulane, 94-72, as Hickox had 20 points and Harry Manushaw, 16 rebounds.

New York U walked away with the third place game, dumping Tulane 77-47 when the Greenies hit only 14 of 57 field goals as Cal Ramsey scored 27 points, took 16 rebounds.

A great second half by Ron Godfrey kept the Hurricanes in the game against Miami of Ohio for the title. Ron made 24 of his 26 points in the second half but the more experienced Ohioans broke ahead in the extra period and hung on with Jim Thomas tallying 25 points.

December 28, 29, 1959, Miami Beach Auditorium

First round: -Xavier, 86; Florida, 74.

Miami, 110; Brigham Young, 93.

Third place:—Brigham Young, 74; Florida, 65.

Championship: -- Miami, 87; Xavier, 69.

First night attendance, 3,009. Second night, 3,346. All star team:—Godfrey, forward, Hickox, guard, from Miami; Thobe, center from Xavier. Tied for other

positions:—Miller and Earnest, guards, Brigham Young; Castelle and Kirvin, forwards, Xavier.

Most valuable, Hickox.

Xavier of Ohio slugged Florida 86-74 and Miami routed Brigham Young 110-93 in easy first round games. Miami's 110 points and Dick Hickox 34 in the same game are still tournament records.

In the third place fight, Brigham Young took an early jump and gradually opened up a 74-65 gap on Florida as Eastis hit for 21 points.

Miami had a near perfect game against Xavier and Hickox made 26 more points for the tournament 2 game scoring record still standing. Miami was in front 39-28 at half time and never was in trouble.

Dec. 28, 29, 1960, Miami Beach Convention Hall

First round:—Holy Cross, 68; Tennessee, 67. Miami, 82; Army, 75.

Third place:—Tennessee, 88; Army, 71. Championship:—Miami, 77, Holy Cross, 71.

First night attendance, 4,116; Second night 4,305.

All star team:—Sager, Army and Foley, Holy Cross, forwards; Fisher, Tennessee, center; Shea, Holy Cross, Hickox, Miami, guards.

Most valuable, Hickox.

Holy Cross jumped to a 43-35 lead over Tennessee, then had to stave off a late sharp shooting rally by the Vols who were just shy, 68-67 at the finish. Thompson's 20 rebounds and Shea's 11 free throws in 12 tries did it. The Miami-Army game was just the opposite. The Hurricanes were ahead only 39-38 at half time but Ron Godfrey's 14 second half points sent Miami home an 81-75 winner.

Tennessee never gave Army a chance, winning 88-71 for third place though Sherard of the losers tried hard with 27 points.

Miami led Holy Cross 37-36 after a blistering first half with Bruce Applegate keeping in the game with six first half field goals. He tallied 13 second half points and when Godfrey added 12, Miami was home, 77-71.

December 28, 29, 1961, Miami Beach Auditorium

Most valuable: - Drysdale.

Minnesota's power and Temple's smoothness made for an opening round thriller. The Gophers led 37-32 at half time, were apparently home safe late in the game when Dave Koskinen hit a hot streak to boost his night's output to 23 points—and a 70-66 Temple win.

Host Miami and Miami of Ohio had a wild first half, with the home forces ahead 44-40. Then Ken Allen hit six second half goals and broke it open for an 83-73 Hurricane win.

The Ohioans never had a chance against the Gophers who led 34-23 at half time, added 64 second half points to win 98-64.

The green Hurricanes dropped steadily behind Temple from the start, going down 40-31 at half time and finishing on the second side of an 85-67 count. Drysdale gave a beautiful performance for 28 points. Ken Allen was hot in the first half for 15 points, Julie Cohen for 14 in the second half but the Hurricanes were never a real threat.

Most valuable, Rick Barry.

Maury Drummond made 17 first half points to keep LSU within hailing distance of Pittsburgh at 46-38 but Maury was stifled in the final 20 minutes while nine Panthers scored to run it up, 96-73.

LSU struggled to a 29-27 margin at half time over Cornell in a tight defensive duel and kept the pressure on for a 55-48 victory.

Mike McCoy for Miami and Brian Generalovich for Pitt each made 14 first half points but Miami had a little better all around scoring to lead 43-38. Dave Roman went wild in the second half with 21 points but Rick Barry took the rebounds on most of the missed and Miami hung on to win 86-85. The Hurricanes hit on 17 of 19 second half free throws, Pitt on 11 of 12. Barry got 17 of the 58 rebounds recovered by both teams.




