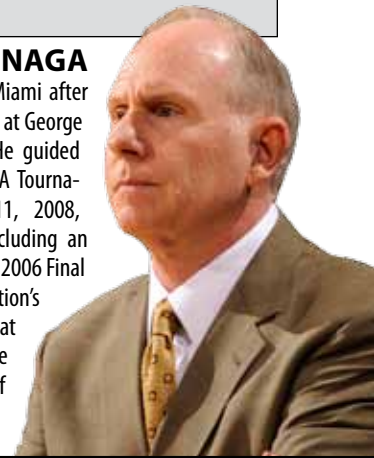

COACH LARRANAGA

Jim Larranaga came to Miami after serving as the head coach at George Mason for 14 seasons. He guided the program to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2011, 2008, 2006, 2001, 1999) – including an unprecedented run to the 2006 Final Four that captured the nation's attention. Following that run, he was selected the 2006 Clair Bee Coach of the Year.



THE GAME

Miami (16-9, 7-5) travels to College Park to face Maryland (15-11, 5-7) on Feb. 21 at the Comcast Center. The Canes defeated the Terrapins 90-86 in double overtime on Feb. 1 in Coral Gables.

THE SERIES

Miami leads the all-time series with Maryland 12-7, winning six of the last eight meetings. The Canes most recently downed the Terps, 90-86 in double OT on Feb. 1, 2012 and 80-66, last March in Coral Gables.

LARRANAGA BY THE NUMBERS

- 1** Coach Jim Larranaga is the only ACC coach not at UNC or Duke with a Final Four appearance to his credit.
- 4** In 2006, Coach Jim Larranaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the NCAA Final Four in 27 years.
- 7** Larranaga is no stranger to the ACC. In his seven seasons as an assistant coach at Virginia, the Cavaliers participated in the NCAA Final Four in 1981 and 1984, won three ACC Championships and finished in the Top 5 of the AP rankings.
- 8** In all there are eight ACC coaches with three or fewer years' experience in the league, including Larranaga.
- 12** Larranaga has made 12 postseason appearances in the past 22 years, including five NCAA Tournaments.
- 28** Larranaga is in his 28th year as a head coach and has successfully transitioned two institutions into successful programs: Bowling Green and George Mason.

MIAMI QUICK HITS

The Canes are 12-7 against the Terrapins overall. Miami was picked to finish fifth in the ACC preseason poll and Maryland was predicted to finish ninth in the league. UM is 3-2 and Maryland is 2-3 in their last five games.

Miami is 3-3 in conference games on the road this season, the first time the Canes have won three ACC road games in a season since the 2005-06 campaign, when the team was 3-5. UM was 3-5 in league games on the road in its inaugural season in the ACC, 2004-05, too.

UM is 11-3 at home and 5-6 away from the BankUnited Center this season. In ACC play, Miami is 4-2 in Coral Gables and 3-3 on the road.

UNC is the only ACC team Miami has not defeated in Coral Gables since joining the ACC for the 2004-05 season.

After the victory at Duke, the Canes have defeated 10 of 11 ACC teams on the road since joining the league for the 2004-05 season. Miami has yet to beat NC State in its home arena, and face the Wolfpack on Feb. 29.

The UM locker room is closed at all times. For home games, Coach Larranaga and a handful of Hurricane players will report to the media room for interviews following the opposing team's postgame press conference.

KEY BENCH POINTS ADDING UP

Miami's bench continues to be productive, scoring 129 points in the past seven games. The reserves have notched 22 points in a pair of those games - UNC and Maryland. In those seven games, Trey McKinney Jones leads the bench scorers averaging 6.9 ppg, followed by Rion Brown at 5.9 and DeQuan Jones with 5.0 ppg.

THE BIG REGG EFFECT

Center Reggie Johnson adds a 6-10, 284-lb presence in the paint, but also has given the Canes an offensive boost in 16 games. With defenses focusing on Big Regg inside, the perimeter has opened up for UM.

In the first nine games, UM shot 39.9 from the field, but since Johnson's return, the team has hit 45.7 percent.

In 16 games with the big man, junior Kenny Kadji has improved from 7.3 points and 4.7 rebounds to 16.1 points and 6.4 rebounds per game. Durand Scott has improved from 30.2 percent shooting to 50.9 percent and Rion Brown improved from 3.3 points at 20.0 percent to 6.9 ppg to 48.1 percent. *For a complete comparison of the Reggie Johnson Effect, see page 10 of the notes.*

COMING UP FOR THE CANES

Miami is in a stretch of facing four ranked teams in seven games. The Canes faced No. 7/5 Duke on Feb. 5, matched up with No. 15/17 Florida State Feb. 5 and No. 8/7 UNC on Feb. 15, and will battle now-No. 20/21 FSU again on Feb. 26.

STREAKING CANES

Prior to the game at FSU the Hurricanes were on their first five-game ACC winning streak in school history and won three consecutive ACC road games for the first time ever, after starting 1-3 in the league in 2011-12.

This season is the first time Miami has won three ACC road games in a season since the 2005-06 campaign when UM won at UNC, FSU and GT.

From Jan. 18- Feb. 9, Miami won six of eight league games for the first time since Feb. 9-23, 2008.

Since joining the ACC in 2004-05, Miami has won 15+ total games in seven of eight seasons, has 6+ league wins in six of those eight years and has 10+ wins at home in seven campaigns.

RECAPPIING MIAMI VS. WAKE FOREST

Starters for the game were Shane Larkin, Malcolm Grant, Durand Scott, Kenny Kadji and Reggie Johnson. That lineup is now 5-2 this season ... Head Coach Jim Larranaga said during pregame that he wanted to see the Canes make at least 10 three-pointers and score around 72 points. Mission accomplished as the Canes went 12-of-31 from distance and scored 74 points ... Second half adjustments worked to perfection as Wake Forest, who shot 13-of-25 (52.0%) in the first half was held to 7-of-23 (30.4%) in the second half, the lowest by a Canes opponent this season ... WFU also only scored 22 points and grabbed just 10 rebounds, both second-half lows for the opponent ... Miami notched a season-high 20 assists in the game, the 11th-straight game with double-digit assists. Malcolm Grant recorded a season high six assists ... Miami was 2-for-3 at the free throw line for the game, and didn't attempt a foul shot in the first half ... The Canes outrebounded the Demon Deacons by 15, the second-best rebounding margin of the season. The best was +16 against Tennessee Tech the first game of the season ... Malcolm Grant hit multiple treys against the Demon Deacons, the first time since his last multiple three point performance on Feb. 1 versus Maryland ... After successful knee surgery on Jan. 19, junior Garris Adams made his return to the court against Wake Forest. Adams played 16 minutes shooting 2-of-5, including two three-point shots for six total points ... Multiple players notched season-highs against the Demon Deacons as Durand Scott recorded three steals, Grant's six assists and Rion Brown's six rebounds, three assists and five field goals made.

SHARING THE SCORING LOAD

Six Canes have led the team in scoring in a game, and in 11 games, four or more players have scored in double digits. In eight other games, at least three players notched at least 10 points. Four Canes are currently averaging at least 10 points per game overall, and three are in league play.

GRANT AND SCOTT TOP MILESTONES

Senior Malcolm Grant notched his 200th career three-pointer in the game at Florida State on Feb. 11. With a trio of threes against Wake Forest, Grant moved into a tie with Adrian Thomas for fifth on Miami's all-time three-pointers made list with 204.

Junior Durand Scott notched his 400th rebound against UNC on Feb. 15, his 400th field goal against Wake Forest, and he is looking in on 300 made freethrows. Entering the game against Maryland, he has 289 made FTs.

Grant and Scott have both topped the 1,100-point plateau after joining the 1,000-point club earlier this season.

TEN PLAYERS WITH STARTS; EIGHT LINEUPS

Ten Miami players have earned at least one start this season, with Durand Scott as the only Cane to be on the court at tip off in all 20 games.

Coach Jim Larranaga has used eight starting lineups in 23 games so far this season. See all of the lineups at the bottom of page seven of the notes.

AGAINST RANKED TEAMS

Miami downed No. 7/5 Duke on Feb. 5 in Cameron Indoor Stadium for the first win over a ranked team since the 2009-10 season, when UM beat No. 20/20 Georgia Tech.

Miami is 43-125 against ranked teams overall and 12-60 on the road. This season, UM is 1-5 against ranked teams, 0-12at home and 1-3 on the road. Since joining the league for the 2004-05 campaign, the Canes are 14-29 vs. ranked ACC teams, 9-13 at home and 4-16 on the road.

HOLDING OFF COMEBACKS

Against No. 7/5 Duke and Maryland, Miami led by 16 points in the second half, but both games went into overtime after a comeback by the opponent. Against Duke, UM held the 16-point margin with 19:04 remaining and with 7:09 remaining against Maryland, Miami held the 16-point lead.

CANES IN THE POLLS

Following the Feb. 5 overtime upset of No. 7/5 Duke, the Miami Hurricanes received a vote in the Feb. 6 AP Poll. The last time Miami was in the polls was Jan. 11, 2010 when the

Canes were ranked No. 23 in the AP Poll and were receiving votes in the USA Today/ESPN Poll.

CANES & COACH L MAKE COMMITMENT

The University of Miami and Coach Jim Larranaga have agreed to terms on a three-year contract extension that will run through April 30, 2019. Larranaga's extension adds three years to his existing five-year contract which began in April 2011.

CANES LOCK DOWN ON DEFENSE

The Canes' goal is to hold each of their opponents to less than 40 percent shooting from the field and 30 percent from distance and Miami did just that in its 78-74 overtime win at Duke. The Blue Devils shot 38.2 percent from the field and 29.0 percent from long range, along with 59.1 percent at the stripe. Duke entered the game shooting 48.8 FG percentage, 40.0 3FG and 70.5 FT.

CANES FANS PACK THE BUC

Canes fans packed the BankUnited Center Feb. 15 when Miami faced No. 8/7 North Carolina, making it the fourth-highest attended home game since 2005-06 with 7,071. The three top-attended games since 2005-06 were against Duke (7,972 on Feb. 13, 2011), 7,200 vs. UNC (Feb. 15, 2009) and 7,189 against Virginia Tech on Jan. 31, 2010.

WRAPPING UP MIAMI AT DUKE

Miami earned its first victory ever at Cameron Indoor Stadium and just its second win over Duke since joining the ACC for the 2004-05 season. The Canes are now 3-15 all-time against the Blue Devils ... The last time the Miami Hurricanes had defeated a team ranked No. 7 in the Associated Press Poll was on Feb. 4, 2009 by a score of 79-52 over Wake Forest at the BankUnited Center in Coral Gables. The Canes defeated No. 5 Duke (96-93) on Feb. 20, 2008 at the BankUnited Center. Duke was ranked No. 4 in the Coaches Poll at that time ... The win over No. 7/5 Duke was Miami's highest ranked ACC win in school history ... Miami was only the sixth unranked team since the 1997-98 season to win in Cameron Indoor Stadium ... Miami was the second school from the Sunshine State to defeat Duke in Cameron this season, and just the second to defeat the Blue Devils at home since Feb. 11, 2009. Florida State also won in Durham this season, ending Duke's 45-game home win streak, which was the second longest streak in the nation and the second longest in Duke history ... Miami is also the second unranked team to defeat Duke at home this season. The Duke loss to Florida State was the first to an unranked team in 64 games and the first to an unranked ACC team in 20 games. Prior to the game against FSU, the last time Duke lost to an

unranked team at home was on Feb. 4, 2007 against Florida State ... With Miami's victory, the Blue Devils lost two of their last three games (at the time) at Cameron Indoor Stadium and had dropped multiple home games for the first time since going 15-4 there in 2006-07 ... Miami outrebounded the Blue Devils 48-43 and outscored them 38-26 in the paint. The Canes also forced Duke into 14 turnovers ... Miami shot 42 percent from the field and mauled Duke's high-octane offense to just .382 percent shooting. Duke set a season low for field goal percentage and the bench recorded more points (40) than the starters (34) ... The Hurricanes took a 16-point lead, lost all of it, and then went back and forth with the Blue Devils in the final three minutes, trading the lead four times. DeQuan Jones extended Miami's lead to 77-74 on two foul shots with 12.9 seconds left. Reggie Johnson scored the first basket of overtime, putting the Hurricanes ahead for good. Johnson scored five of his career-high 27 points in overtime.

PLAYERS ON A ROLL

Malcom Grant has made multiple threes in 14 games, including seven-straight games to start the season. Until the game at UNC, he had hit a three in 35-straight games, which is 11th in the ACC and ties UM's school record for consecutive games making a trey.

Durand Scott has shot 50.9 percent from the field in the past 16 games after starting the year 26-of-86 (30.2%) in the first nine games. He has scored double-digit points in 20-of-25 games and has at least three assists in 17 games.

Trey McKinney Jones is shooting 43.8 percent from the field in the past 16 games. He has hit at least two threes in 11 games.

Kenny Kadji has scored more than 11 points 17 times. He has 33 blocks in the past 18 games and has two or more blocks in 12 games this season. Since Johnson's return, Kadji has averaged 16.1 points, 6.4 rebounds, 1.7 blocks, 55.6 field goal percent and 46.3 three-point percent.

Reggie Johnson has scored in double digits in 11 games and pulled down at least seven rebounds in 12 of 16 games. He has eight assists in the past four games.

Shane Larkin has a steal in 18 of his 23 games, including 25 in the past 14 outings, six of which were at UNC. He is third in the ACC in steals as a freshman and has knocked down a three in 16-of-24 games. He has 16 assists in the past six games. Larkin is 25-of-27 at the line the past 14 games, including two to seal the win against Clemson.

Rion Brown has shot 48.1 percent from the field and 43.8 percent from three in his past 16 games. He shot 20 percent FG (5-25) and 21.4 percent 3FG (3-14) in his first seven games. He has hit 21 threes in the past 16 games after only knocking down three in the first seven games.

DeQuan Jones has scored more than four points in 10 outings and grabbed more than three rebounds seven times despite only averaging 16.1 minutes per game.

JOHNSON ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK

Reggie Johnson was named the ACC Player of the Week (Feb. 6) after leading Miami to a pair of overtime victories this week, including the Canes' first-ever win over No. 7/5 Duke at Cameron Indoor, and a double-overtime victory against Maryland.

Johnson averaged 20 points, shooting 56.7 percent from the field, and averaged 8.5 rebounds, 10 of which were offensive. He also had a pair of steals, a block and an assist in 30 minutes per game. Johnson notched 27 points, 12 rebounds

and a steal in 35 minutes against No. 7/5 Duke on Sunday. He was 11-of-17 from the field (56.7%) and eight of his 12 boards were offensive. Against Maryland, Johnson scored 13 points and grabbed five boards. He drained his first-career three-point attempt, a shot from the top of the key, and had an assist, a block and a steal against the Terps.

CANES FIRE UP THE NETS

In Miami's past 16 games, the Canes have averaged a 45.7 percent clip from the field. In those 16 games, UM has averaged 73.6 ppg, up from the 67.2 average in their first nine outings.

Against FAU, Miami hit 31-of-50 (62%) from the field and 14-of-20 (70%) from beyond the arc. At Charlotte, the Canes shot 54.0 percent (27-50) from the field and 42.1 percent (8-19) from distance. Versus Appalachian State, Miami was 54.9 percent (28-51) from the field and 43.8 percent (7-16) from the three-point line. Against UNCG, hit 31-of-59 (52.5%) from the field and 7-of-20 (35.0) from long range.

NEW LINEUP SPARKS REBOUNDING NUMBERS

With the addition of big men Reggie Johnson and DeQuan Jones, the Canes have outrebounded 10 of their past 15 opponents after coming up short in the rebounding battle in eight of the first 10 games. Miami outrebounded Charlotte 38-30, the first time the Canes outrebounded an opponent since the game at Purdue. The +15 against Wake Forest was the second-highest differential of the season, behind UM's +16 (42-26) against Tennessee Tech in the season opener.

GRANT TIES RECORD IN THREES; 11TH IN ACC

Malcom Grant made a three-pointer in 35-straight games from the Dec. 30, 2009 outing against Pepperdine until the Jan. 7, 2012 game at Virginia. His 35 tied the Miami school record with former Cane Jack McClinton. The 35 makes are the 11th-best in ACC history, tying Grant with J.J. Redick (Duke) and McClinton.

SCOTT JOINS GRANT IN 1,000 POINT CLUB

With 17 points against UNCG, junior Durand Scott joined teammate Malcolm Grant in the 1,000 Point Club, the 33rd player in Canes history to top the mark. Scott entered the game needing 15 points to reach the milestone. Malcolm Grant scored nine points against FAU to become the Canes' 32nd player to top the mark. Grant entered that game with 992 points in three seasons with the Hurricanes. In his first season, Grant notched 318 points in 33 games (8 starts), then drained 532 points last season in 36 games.

ADDING RETURNERS TO THE LINEUP

When Coach L took over the team in April, he planned on having nine returning scholarship players that accounted for 85.9 percent of the team's scoring and 88.1 of the squad's rebounds in 2010-11. But as of the first game in November, only six scholarship returners were available to play and only four played more than 15 minutes per game a season ago. Coach L also looked forward to four newcomers, but only three of those players are available this season.

When the season began in November, only six returners were available as Reggie Johnson, DeQuan Jones and Julian Gamble were sidelined. Coach L started the new year with eight scholarship returners.

After last season's NIT run, Miami had lost just one player in sixth-year forward Adrian Thomas and looked to return 85.9 percent of its scoring - including 93.7 percent of free throws and 67.1 percent of three-pointers - 93.0 percent of assists, 92.7 percent of blocked shots, 91.6 percent of steals and 88.1 percent of rebounding.

CANES INCOMPLETE ROSTER

Since Dec. 17, Garrius Adams missed five games due to a lower extremity injury, had surgery on Jan. 19 and returned for the Feb. 18 game. Julian Gamble is out for the season with a knee injury and Bishop Daniels will redshirt this season.

LEARNING THE SYSTEM

Along with understanding the expectations of the new coaching staff, the Canes are learning an entirely new system under Coach Larranaga. Miami is playing man-to-man a majority of this season's possessions after playing 2-3 zone primarily in the 2009-10 season. Larranaga has also added his Scramble defense to the Canes' playbook, which has been used multiple times this season. With injuries to the big men early in the season, the team also worked without a true back-to-the-basket center, and has played many possessions with a smaller, four-guard lineup.

CANE HOOPER NAMED TO PRO BOWL

Former Cane hooper Jimmy Graham (2005-09) was one of five New Orleans Saints to be named to the 2012 NFL Pro Bowl.

Graham, a tight end, had 12 receptions for 158 yards and three touchdowns in the postseason for the Saints. In two years with New Orleans, Graham has 142 receptions for 1,824 yards and 19 touchdowns.

With 1,310 regular season receiving yards, Graham broke Kellen Winslow's 31-year-old NFL record of 1,290 receiving yards in a season by a tight end. But New England Patriots tight end Rob Gronkowski, notched 1,327 yards this season to put his name atop the record listing.

At Miami, Graham played basketball from 2005-2009, graduated with a double major in marketing and management, then joined the 2009 football team while taking graduate classes. That season he totaled 17 receptions for 213 yards and five touchdowns. Graham averaged 4.2 ppg, shooting 49.5 percent from the field, and 4.2 rpg in 120 games in his four years with the Miami men's basketball team.

CANES WEARING LEBRON COLORWAYS

The University of Miami was one of three university basketball teams to hit the court on October 14 in their own colorways of the new Nike LEBRON 9. The Hurricanes are playing in white/white/gorge green/total orange this season. Miami's colorway shoe became available on retail on Nov. 29. Light yet powerful, like its namesake, LeBron James -- and designed in conjunction with his insight -- the LEBRON 9 is the first shoe to integrate Flywire technology and Hyperfuse construction in the upper for superior support. The shoe also combines Max Air 180 and a Nike Zoom unit for comfort and responsiveness.

MIAMI IS A TOP ACADEMIC INSTITUTION

Already the top academic institution in the state of Florida and a world-renowned research institution, the University of Miami and its Department of Athletics are building upon its reputation for developing world-class students. In the 2012 edition of the U.S. News & World Report's annual issue, the University of Miami rose to number 38 - up from 47 last year, a nine-point rise. UM remains the highest ranked school in the state of Florida.

MIAMI SHOOTS 70 PERCENT FROM LONG RANGE

The Canes hit 70 percent (14-20) from long range against FAU, topping their previous season high of 47.1 percent (8-17) against UMass on Dec. 3, 2011. Since the 2005-06 season, Miami's top three-point percentage was 63.2 (12-19) against Maryland on Jan. 7, 2006.

Miami drained 14 three pointers in the game, the most since the 2009-10 season when the Canes hit 14 against Nova Southeastern (11/16/09), then 15 against South Carolina State (12/12/09).

CANES POST SECOND-BEST TEAM GPA

In the spring of 2011, the men's basketball team posted its second-best spring team GPA in the history of the program. Senior Julian Gamble earned a 4.0 GPA for the fall 2010 semester while Eric Swoope, Adrian Thomas, Justin Heller and Ryan Quiglar registered a 3.0 or better to be named to the 55th Annual ACC Honor Roll. Swoope and Thomas were also listed on the 2011 All-ACC Academic Men's Basketball Team.

2010-11 REVIEW

The Hurricanes closed the 2010-11 season with a 21-15 overall record, having won nine of their last 15 games, and advancing to the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament for the second time in program history. The 2011 Canes finished at No. 69 in the final NCAA RPI with a strength of schedule ranked No. 41 by RealTimeRPI.com and No. 43 by CollegeRPI.com. Last season, Miami registered wins over NCAA Tournament teams West Virginia and Akron, as well as NIT teams Boston College (twice), McNeese State, Florida Atlantic and Missouri State.

TWO HIGH SCHOOL SENIORS SIGN NLI WITH CANES

High school seniors Melvin Johnson and Tonye Jekiri have each signed a National Letter of Intent with the University of Miami men's basketball program, head coach Jim Larranaga announced. Jekiri, a 6-11, 220-pound center from Nigeria, is a local product from Hialeah's Champagnat Catholic School. Johnson is a 6-3, 188-pound guard from the Bronx, N.Y., who plays high school ball at St. Benedict's Prep (N.J.).

Jekiri is rated the 17th-best center in the country by ESPN.com and No. 13 by Scout.com. The big man can play with his back to the basket or step out for a 10-12-foot shot, and he can run the floor like a guard. A native of Nigeria, Jekiri moved to South Florida in September 2010 to begin his basketball career. He averaged 14 points and 10 rebounds per game last season with Champagnat, his first year of organized hoops. On the AAU circuit, he played with Team Breakdown over the summer, where he dominated at the Source Hoops Elite Camp and led Team Breakdown to championships in the Breakdown Hoops Festival and the Big Shots Myrtle Beach I. Jekiri chose Miami over considerations from Virginia Tech, Clemson, Florida State, Auburn, Vanderbilt and Alabama.

Also complementing Miami for the 2012-13 season will be Melvin Johnson, a senior guard at St. Benedict's Prep in Newark, N.J. Johnson is rated by ESPN.com as the 44th-best shooting guard in the country in 2012 and ESPN.com ranks him No. 51 nationally, and ninth in New York, at the point guard position. He is a deadly spot-up shooter who can stretch opposing defenses and will contribute to Miami's uptempo offensive attack as a combo guard. Johnson traveled the AAU circuit with the Long Island Lightning, earning the MVP of the Hoop Group Elite Camp Session I. Johnson began his prep career with current Cane Durand Scott at Rice High in Harlem, but when the school closed last year, Johnson moved to St. Benedict's. Johnson chose Miami over Virginia Tech, Georgetown, South Florida, Dayton and College of Charleston.

LARRANAGA INDUCTED INTO NYC HALL OF FAME

Coach Jim Larranaga was inducted into the New York City Basketball Hall of Fame on Sept. 22, 2011, in a ceremony held at the New York Athletic Club on Central Park South at 59th Street. Born in the Bronx, N.Y., Larranaga built the George Mason Patriots' program into a perennial contender in the highly-regarded Colonial Athletic Association, winning more games than any other coach in program and conference history (273) en route to three conference titles (2008, 2001, 1999). Larranaga was joined at the 2011 induction ceremony by Donnie Walsh, former New York Knicks President; longtime Knicks trainer Mike Saunders; former Knick John Warren; a member of the Knicks 1969-70 NBA championship team, the late Lloyd "Sonny" Dove; Debbie Mason, the former All-America from Queens College known as "Lady Pearl"; Tom Henderson, an all-city performer from DeWitt Clinton H.S. in the Bronx; and former Fordham All-America Kenny Charles.

CANES VISIT LORRAINE MOTEL WHERE MLK WAS ASSASSINATED

On Nov. 26, the University of Miami men's basketball team visited the Lorraine Motel in Memphis, Tenn., where Martin Luther King, Jr. was assassinated on April 4, 1968. The building is now attached to the National Civil Rights Museum.

Miami stayed in Memphis after Friday's game at Ole Miss. The players and staff made an early pit stop to visit the motel on their way to the airport, receiving a quick history lesson on its way to West Lafayette, Ind., for a Tuesday matchup with Purdue.

GRAHAM RECIPIENT OF THE 2011 ED BLOCK COURAGE AWARD

The New Orleans Saints announced that second-year tight end Jimmy Graham has been voted by his teammates as the 2011 recipient of the Ed Block Courage Award. Graham, a 6-6, 260 pound native of Goldsboro, N.C., graduated from the University of Miami with degrees in both marketing and management in 2009. He was selected by the Saints in the third round of the 2010 NFL Draft after playing just one year of college football. Prior to that, Graham was a four-year letterman for the Hurricanes in basketball. Graham spent portions of his childhood living in a group home before being taken in by a legal guardian, Rebecca Vinson. Despite putting herself through nursing school and overcoming financial struggles of her own, Vinson helped mentor and stress the importance of education to Graham while providing him with a caring home. The Ed Block Courage Award Foundation is dedicated to improving the lives of neglected children and ending the cycle of abuse. The purpose is to raise Awareness and Prevention of child abuse.

UM ALUM WILL ALLEN RECEIVES NCAA'S HIGHEST HONOR

Former University of Miami basketball player Will Allen has been recognized as a Theodore Roosevelt Award winner by the NCAA. Allen graduated from the University of Miami with a B.A. in physical education and went on to be drafted No. 60 overall in the fourth round of the 1971 NBA Draft by the Baltimore Bullets. After a short career in the ABA and playing professionally in Belgium, Allen started a career in marketing with Proctor and Gamble. In 1993, he left Proctor and Gamble and purchased Growing Power, a plant nursery on the north side of Milwaukee, Wis. The Rockville, Md., native has since been recognized as a leader in the industry of urban farming and sustainable food production. The "Teddy" award is the highest honor the NCAA bestows upon individuals.

Named after President Theodore Roosevelt, whose concern for the conduct of intercollegiate athletics led to the formation of the NCAA in 1906, this annual award is given to an individual "for whom competitive athletics in college and attention to physical well-being thereafter have been important factors in a distinguished career of national significance and achievement."



BANKUNITED CENTER

Opened in 2003, the BankUnited Center, which seats 7,200 fans for basketball games, is located on the University of Miami's beautiful Coral Gables campus. The venue also hosts concerts, trade shows, lecture series and sporting events, in addition to serving as the home to the Hurricanes' men's and women's basketball teams.

Over the last three seasons, the Hurricanes have established home court dominance, winning 51 games at the "BUC" — including a school-record 14-2 mark in 2007-08 and memorable victories over No. 4/5 Duke, No. 6/7 Wake Forest and No. 20/20 Georgia Tech.

With its grand opening in January of 2003 — a 64-61 overtime win over North Carolina, the BankUnited Center became the University's first on-campus venue with seating to accommodate large events offering an ideal capacity for concerts, conferences, lecture series, banquets and more. It significantly increases the University of Miami's collegiate experience for its students by allowing on-campus events such as commencements, sports, convocations and pep rallies. The community also benefits from the venue's utilization as a showcase for a host of family shows and other special activities.

The BankUnited Center has 25 suites. Each suite is equipped with 12 box seats with three additional bar stools, a lounge area, television and phones, along with a kitchen area with a bar and refrigerator.

The BankUnited Center is managed by Global Spectrum. The Philadelphia-based company is part of one of the world's largest sports and entertainment companies, Comcast-Spectacor, which also owns the Philadelphia 76ers (NBA) and the Philadelphia Flyers (NHL).

THE FIELDHOUSE

The newest addition to Miami athletics opened in March of 2009, with the debut of the Hurricanes' on-campus practice facility. The 29,000-square foot facility is conveniently located immediately adjacent to the BankUnited Center, alongside the Hurricanes 100 Room north of the arena. The new facility houses several full-size practice courts, as well as a multi-purpose room to host a variety of events — including the Miami Heat's 2010 Media Day.

Miami basketball players have access to the secure facility 24 hours a day, allowing the Hurricanes court time at any time all-year round. UM players use the facility for both conditioning and practice sessions, as well as for individual workouts and pick-up games.

The Fieldhouse was also honored for its sustainability components, earning the LEED® Gold designation established by the U.S. Green Building Council and verified by the Green Building Certification Institute (GBCI). The facility achieved the certification specifically for its energy use, lighting, water and material use as well as incorporating a variety of other sustainable strategies. By using less energy and water, LEED certified buildings save money for businesses and taxpayers; reduce greenhouse gas emissions; and contribute to a healthier environment for residents, workers and the larger community.

Jim Larranaga was named the 12th head coach of the University of Miami men's basketball program on April 22, 2011.

Larranaga comes to Miami after serving as the head coach at George Mason for 14 seasons. He guided the program to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2011, 2008, 2006, 2001, 1999) – including an unprecedented run to the 2006 Final Four that captured the nation's attention, defeating Michigan State, North Carolina, Wichita State and Connecticut along the way. Following that run, he was selected the 2006 Clair Bee Coach of the Year.

Larranaga built the Patriots' program into a perennial contender in the highly-regarded Colonial Athletic Association, winning more games than any other coach in program and conference history (273) en route to three conference titles (2008, 2001, 1999).

A two-time CAA Coach of the Year honoree, Larranaga earned the accolade in 2011, leading the Patriots to a 27-7 overall record and 16-2 conference mark en route to the CAA regular-season title and their fifth NCAA Tournament appearance under his leadership. Seeded a program-best eighth in the NCAA Tournament, George Mason rallied from a double-digit deficit to defeat ninth-seeded Villanova, 61-57, before falling to overall No. 1 seed Ohio State in the third round.

Larranaga's teams are known for their offensive efficiency and a frenetic defense dubbed the "Scramble." Last season, his Patriots – who were ranked 24th in the final RPI – finished the season 11th in the nation in three-point field goal percentage (39.5), 18th in scoring margin (10.3), 22nd in turnovers (11.1), 26th in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.28) and 37th in scoring defense (62.5). During its 16-game win streak – which catapulted Mason to No. 25 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll on Feb. 28 – all but four victories came by a double-digit margin. That streak included the 71-51 win at VCU on Feb. 15, with Mason holding the Rams to a season-low offensive output.

He became Mason's all-time leader in men's basketball victories with his 131st win on January 22, 2005, with a 77-58 decision at James Madison. He became the CAA's all-time leader in wins on February 4, 2006, when the Patriots defeated UNC Wilmington. His Mason teams went 182-89 in CAA play.

In 2006, Larranaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the Final Four in 27 years and earned an at-large berth for a CAA team for the first time in 20 years. Along the way, he led Mason to a school record in wins, the program's first-ever national ranking, George Mason's first-ever appearance in the Top 10 and the school's first wins over Top 10 teams.

The Patriots finished the year with a 27-8 record and a No. 8 ranking in the final USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll. Earlier that season, Mason cracked the polls at No. 25, but NCAA tournament wins over Michigan State, No. 10 North Carolina, Wichita State and No. 2 Connecticut vaulted Mason up the poll, and into the national conscience, making Larranaga a household name.

The remarkable run at George Mason began just two years into Larranaga's tenure. After going 9-18 in his first year with the Patriots in 1997-98, Larranaga guided the 1999 Patriots'

squad to a 19-11 overall record and a 13-3 CAA mark. That season, he earned his first Coach of the Year accolades in the CAA and NABC District 4 after making a 10-game improvement and leading the program to its first-ever conference regular season championship, its second CAA Tournament title and first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1989.

The Patriots followed that with another 19-11 overall mark in 1999-2000, tying for first place in the CAA at 12-4 and earning the top seed in the conference tournament. In 2000-01, the Patriots finished 18-12 overall and 11-5 in the CAA, good for a tie for second place, and they won the CAA Tournament title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three years. The Patriots produced another solid campaign with a 19-10 overall record (13-5 in the CAA) and a NIT berth in 2001-02. Mason's 2002-03 roster was hampered by injuries, but managed to pull together a 16-12 record (11-7 in the CAA), and a fourth-place CAA finish.

In 2003-04, Larranaga led the Patriots to a 7-2 non-conference record and to a school-record 23-win season, as Mason finished 23-10 on the year, its first 20-or-more win campaign in 14 years. Gaining an NIT berth (the Patriots fourth postseason appearance in six years), Larranaga led Mason to two consecutive postseason

victories for the first time in school history, and in the process, earned his first postseason.

Under Larranaga, the Patriots won three CAA titles, including the 2008 championship when Mason went 23-11. The Patriots have appeared in the postseason each of the past four seasons for the first time in Mason history, advancing to the NCAA Tournament in 2008, the NIT in 2009, the CollegInsider.com Postseason Tournament in 2010 and back to the NCAA Tournament in 2011.

With 28 years of head coaching experience, the native of Bronx, N.Y., previously served as the head coach at Bowling Green for 11 seasons (1986-1997) and at Division II American International for two seasons (1977-79).

At Bowling Green, he made an immediate impact in his first season. In 1986-87, the Falcons were the nation's most improved team under a first-year head coach that took over a program with a losing record, posting a 15-14 record for an eight-game improvement over the previous season. Larranaga went on to record a 170-144 mark in 11 years at Bowling Green, earning the 1997 Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year honors after leading Bowling Green to a 22-10 record, a conference regular season co-championship and a berth in the National Invitation Tournament. The 22 victories were the most by a Bowling Green team in 47 years and the 13 conference wins were the second-highest total in Falcon history.

Larranaga's 170 victories at Bowling Green ranked second all-time on the Falcons' coaching list and he was only the second coach in the program to record consecutive postseason appearances. Larranaga led his squad to NIT berths in 1990 (18-11) and again in 1991 (17-13), the first time the Falcons enjoyed back-to-back postseason appearances since the early '60s. Bowling Green won better than 61 percent of its games in Larranaga's last four years, recording a 70-44 mark during that stretch. The Falcons finished fourth or better in the MAC in five of Larranaga's 11 seasons and he is among the winningest coaches in MAC history.

Larranaga received his first head coaching position in 1977 when he was named to the post at American International, a Division II program in Springfield, Mass. Taking over a team that had suffered through five consecutive losing seasons prior to his arrival, Larranaga turned AIC into a winning program in his first year and compiled a 28-25 mark in two seasons.

A 1971 graduate of Providence College with a degree in economics, Larranaga was a four-year letterman for the Friars. As the team captain in his senior season, he led Providence to a 20-8 record and an NIT appearance. He graduated as the school's fifth all-time leading scorer with 1,258 points and was selected in the sixth round of the draft by the Detroit Pistons of the National Basketball Association. He was the team's top scorer as a sophomore and junior and was named New England's Division I Sophomore of the Year in 1969. He was inducted into the Providence College Hall of Fame in 1991.

His first coaching opportunity came at Davidson College, where he served as an assistant coach to Terry Holland. Davidson captured three Southern Conference regular-season championships and an NIT berth in his five years there, and he compiled a 47-12 record doubling as the freshman team coach. In 1976, he left Davidson and spent one season as player-coach for the Geronimo Basketball Club in Belgium.

After his two-year stint at American International, Larranaga was reunited with Holland at the University of Virginia in April 1979. An assistant coach under Holland for seven seasons from 1979-86, he helped the Cavaliers reach the NCAA Final Four on two occasions (1981, 1984), finish in the top five of the AP and UPI polls and average more than 24 victories per season. The Cavaliers were 169-62, won three regular-season Atlantic Coast Conference championships and made four NCAA Tournament appearances. Virginia also made a pair of NIT appearances, winning the NIT Championship in 1980. Larranaga was on the staff during the careers of three-time National Player of the Year Ralph Sampson and NBA first-round draft choice Olden Polynice.

Larranaga, 62, and his wife, Liz, have two sons – Jay, who played for his father at Bowling Green and is the head coach of the NBDL's Erie Bayhawks, and Jon, who was a member of his father's George Mason teams from 1999-2003 – and four grandchildren.

Michael Huger

Defensive Coordinator

Michael Huger enters his first season at the University of Miami and his fifth season as an assistant coach for head coach Jim Larranaga assisting in all aspects of the program. He brings six seasons of collegiate coaching experience and nearly a dozen years of professional basketball experience to Coral Gables.

In four seasons at George Mason, Huger helped lead the Patriots to the postseason every year, including NCAA berths in 2008 and 2011. In 2011, the team defeated Villanova to advance to the third round of the NCAA Tournament, earned a regular-season CAA title and posted a school-record tying 27 wins. In 2009, he helped Mason to an NIT bid and its second-straight 20-win season. In 2008, Huger helped the Patriots to their second-highest win total in school history as they beat nationally-ranked Kansas State and won the CAA title for the first time since 2001.

Huger began his coaching career at Longwood University (Va.) under Mike Gillian, a former Mason assistant coach under Larranaga, where he spent two seasons.

Before joining the coaching ranks, Huger played professional basketball in Europe, spending two years in Holland (1994-96) and nine in Belgium (1996-2005). He was selected Dutch League MVP in 1996 after averaging 25.3 points and 5.8 assists, and went on to earn First Team All-Belgium honors in 2000 and 2004 after leading his clubs to Belgium Cup championships in both seasons.

A native of New York City, Huger is a 1994 graduate of Bowling Green State University with a bachelor's degree in education. There he played for Larranaga from 1989-93, helping the Falcons to a pair of NIT appearances. He earned Mid-American Conference honors in his final two seasons, and was a Naismith Award nominee and the runner-up for conference player of the year as a senior. As a prep player, he helped lead Stevenson High School (Bronx) to back-to-back PSAL City Championships in 1988 and 1989.

Huger and his wife, Tonya, have a son, Michael Anthony II.

Eric Konkol

Offensive Coordinator

Eric Konkol enters his first season at the University of Miami and eighth as a member of head coach Jim Larranaga's staff. He assists in all aspects of the program including recruiting, practices, individual player workouts and game preparation.

Konkol previously worked with Larranaga at George Mason from 2002-03 through 2004-05 and 2007-08 through last season, helping to develop 12 All-CAA selections, five CAA All-Rookie honorees and 16 professional players. In the interim, he spent two years coaching at national power Hopkins High School in Minnesota under Ken Novak, Jr. - who was named 2011 ESPN RISE National Boy's Basketball Coach of the Year - and had a short stint on the coaching staff at North Dakota State.

He served as Mason's scouting director from 2002-05 and helped recruit the top non-BCS recruiting class in 2009 according to ESPN.com. Additionally, he monitored the academic progress of the men's basketball student-athletes, graduating 20-of-22 student-athletes who completed their eligibility - with two more students graduating in May 2011. In both 2009 and 2010, the program was recognized by the NCAA with an Academic Progress Rate in the nation's top 10 percent.

Konkol previously worked on Buzz Peterson's staff as a student assistant for NIT champion Tulsa in 2000-01 and as a graduate administrative assistant at Tennessee in 2001-02, earning a master's degree in sport management.

A native of Amherst, Wis., Konkol is a 2000 graduate of the University of Wisconsin at Eau Claire with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology, with an emphasis in exercise management. He played three seasons of basketball for the Division III program - advancing to the national championship game in 2000. He received the team's inspiration award after his junior and senior seasons with the Blugolds, and was an honorary captain as a senior.

He spent his first two years, including one redshirt season, at the University of Wisconsin at Platteville playing for current Wisconsin head coach Bo Ryan. A 1995 graduate of Amherst High School, he was a three-sport athlete (basketball, baseball and cross country) and closed his prep career as the school's all-time leading scorer with 1,871 points.

Konkol and his wife Meagan, have two sons, Ethan and Ryan.

The Assistants

Chris Caputo

Scout Team Coordinator

Chris Caputo enters his first season with the Hurricanes and his 10th season on head coach Jim Larranaga's staff. Entering his seventh season as an assistant coach, his primary responsibilities include recruiting and scouting the opposition.

Caputo played a major role in George Mason's run to the Final Four in 2006, putting together scouting reports to prepare the Patriots as they played nationally-ranked teams and future NBA players in nearly every round.

He has also helped lead the Patriots to the postseason for a Mason-record four-straight seasons, including NCAA berths in 2008 and 2011. In 2011, the team defeated Villanova to advance to the third round of the NCAA Tournament, earned a regular-season CAA title and posted a school-record tying 27 wins. In 2009, he helped Mason to an NIT bid and its second-straight 20-win season. In 2008, Caputo helped the Patriots to their second-highest win total in school history as they beat nationally-ranked Kansas State and won the CAA title for the first time since 2001.

As an assistant at Mason, Hoopscop.com named him one of the Top 25 non-BCS assistant coaches in the nation. In 2010, Caputo attended the Villa 7 Consortium, an educational symposium and networking opportunity for some of the nation's top assistants. In 2011 alone, 19 alumni of Villa 7 have been hired as head coaches.

Prior to becoming an assistant coach, Caputo worked on Larranaga's staff as the video coordinator, coordinated the staff recruiting database and mailing system, as well as serving in other administrative capacities.

A native of Elmhurst, N.Y., Caputo is a 2002 graduate of Westfield (Mass.) State College with a degree in finance and economics. He was a four-year letterwinner as a point guard for the Division III Owls, and served as captain and earned the team's Outstanding Contributor Award as a senior. A 1998 graduate of Archbishop Molloy High School - Larranaga's alma mater, he too played for legendary head coach Jack Curran.

Caputo and his wife Julie married in May.

They are stories of perseverance. Stories about growing up, becoming men and being a part of a family. One-by-one, we hear from them. These are the Miami Hurricanes...

I was raised in Raleigh, NC. I was born and raised there. I was the only child and I had a lot of family to support me. When I was growing up I played basketball and soccer. Soccer was actually my first love. I played soccer until I was 13 or 14. It got way too hot in North Carolina, it's like a dry heat, so I just stuck with an indoor sport.

I started playing basketball when I was five or six. Probably because that's when those Fisher Price goals started coming out and I was dunking and all of your friends were talking about how high you could dunk on your Fisher Price goal.

I secretly wish I was five inches taller. I wish I was 7 feet. I feel like everything in basketball would be so much better if I was 7 feet.

I'm a Miami Hurricane because of my teammates, because of how they treated me so well on my visit. Also because I have a grandmother here and she always wanted me to visit more and it was awkward because I did not know I would be going here. Since I was an only child and really close to my family I thought I would stay in the state of North Carolina. But after taking a visit, I met my grandmother and just seeing her again here, I knew I would have another time here outside of school. She comes to games and tries to be the loudest one in the stands.

When I played basketball as a kid, I pretended to be Kobe Bryant, that was my favorite player. He still is, hands down. There was nobody else I imitated. I always watched Michael Jordan but Kobe was more of my time and he was doing all of the dunks and he was athletic and I stuck with him.

Playing basketball has given me something to do to keep me occupied and it is what I've been doing since I was a little kid. It's one of the best things I know how to do. It's kept me out of a lot of trouble.

Playing basketball has given me the chance to travel to a lot of countries and meet a lot of people. Just have fun in general and get an education. Be in Miami, make a lot of friends.

I was recruited when I was in high school in Kansas by a bunch of different schools. Miami was a good place, I liked the coaches and the school. I liked that it was a small school. It's generally a nice place and they play in the ACC so that's really what drew me closer. I couldn't play basketball for a whole year. I was basically useless to a lot of people, but some people were still kind to me until I got back to playing.

I'll never forget what my father told me when I was going to school in Nigeria and he was dropping me off. He told me "never cheat anyone and never allow myself to be cheated by anyone," so that's something I will never forget.

I secretly wish I played football. I see Calvin Johnson and Jimmy Graham and sometimes I think I could do that. On Sundays, everyone is wearing your jersey and you see old people going crazy. I think I can put on a tight end's jersey or a wide receiver's jersey.

My personal goals are to graduate with a mechanical engineering degree, to play in the NBA for a long time, to raise a family, and maybe be a lawyer some day.

When I was growing up I had a lot of fun with my sister. She was like my first best friend. We were together for a long time. Now she's grown and she's about to get married and it's just weird.

In mechanical engineering you just think about everything that works. Every single thing from the design of your spoons that you eat with, your house, your cars, your bridges and everything. Just anything that works. There's a process that makes it work. There's someone who designs it. There's a calculation.

To be an engineer you have to be perfect. Every little thing is in detail. The end of the bottle cap of a bottle is in detail. So in basketball, every little screen set, every angle of the screen, every turn, the way you stand to get a rebound, everything is in detail. There's a place you have to be for that to work. My dad was basically like a brother to me, also. We did everything together; football, basketball, everything. We had a real great family and they were always there for me. They did everything for me. They are still there, every step of the way.

When I played basketball as a kid, I pretended to be Tracy McGrady. That was always my favorite player. I just liked his style, just everything about him. He always looked so sleepy, like he wasn't going to do anything and then he has the ball and he's going at you, so it kind of throws you off. And a lot of people say I played like him when I was younger because my face never changed. I had no emotion, so that's probably who I looked up to the most.

I'll never forget when I got chased by a dog and I had to jump on top of a car and my knee went through the windshield. My whole body ended up in-

side the car. My knee just broke and shattered the windshield. I had to get nine staples in my right knee. That's probably why the reason I have tendinitis in both my knees too. I'm sure that didn't help.

I am a Hurricane because I wanted to play in the ACC. I grew up watching my dad play at Georgia Tech and all the ACC teams. I just felt like this would be a great place to live. They had a great coaching staff before and they have a great coaching staff now, so it felt like this is where I belong.

Some of my personal goals include just being successful in life whether that be playing basketball or doing other things. I want to own my own restaurant, so just doing that and just being successful and able to take care of my family. I want to have an Italian restaurant. I just always had it in my mind because the way my name is spelled everybody would call me 'Rion' (Ree-on). And I just thought it sounded Italian. So I could have a restaurant called Rion. I just always had that in my head. But it might not work out like that. My favorite Italian meal is just regular pasta. I like chicken Alfredo and pasta with the meat marinara sauce, basically spaghetti. Those are my two favorites.

At the U, I've learned so much from Reggie Johnson. He was one of those people that when I first got here he was always in my head. I got tired of him, he got on my nerves, but when I really think about it, he was always trying to help me and guide me through the little things. Even off the court stuff that I was going through, like problems with school or personal stuff from home I was letting get to me. To get as many basket attempts as possible, I think it should help a lot, getting up and down the floor as fast as we can.
