

DR. JULIO FRENK

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT UNIVERSIDAD NACIONAL AUTÓNOMA DE MÉXICO, 1979

Dr. Julio Frenk, a noted leader in global public health and a renowned scholar and academic, was named the sixth president of the University of Miami in April 2015. He assumed his leadership post on August 16, 2015.

Prior to joining the University of Miami, Dr. Frenk was Dean of the Faculty at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health since January 2009. While at Harvard, he was also the T & G Angelopoulos Professor of Public Health and International Development, a joint appointment with the Harvard Kennedy School of Government.

Dr. Frenk served as the Minister of Health of Mexico from 2000 to 2006. He pursued an ambitious agenda to reform the nation's health system and introduced a program of comprehensive universal health insurance, known as Seguro Popular, which expanded access to health care for tens of millions of uninsured Mexicans.

Dr. Frenk was the founding director-general of the National Institute of Public Health in Mexico, one of the leading institutions of health education and research in the developing world. In 1998 Dr. Frenk joined the World Health Organization (WHO) as executive director in charge of Evidence and Information for Policy, WHO's first-ever unit explicitly charged with developing a scientific foundation for health policy to achieve better outcomes.

He also served as a senior fellow in the global health program of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and as president of the Carso Health Institute in Mexico City. He is the founding chair of the board of the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation at the University of Washington. He also co-chaired the Commission on the Education of Health Professionals for the 21st Century, which published its influential report in the leading journal The Lancet in 2010, triggering a large number of follow-up initiatives throughout the world

Dr. Frenk holds a medical degree from the National Autonomous University of Mexico, as well as a master of public health and a joint doctorate in Medical Care Organization and in Sociology from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. He has been awarded honorary doctorates from several institutions of higher learning. In September of 2008, Dr. Frenk received the Clinton Global Citizen Award for changing "the way practitioners and policy makers across the world think about health."

He is a member of the U.S. Institute of Medicine, American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and National Academy of Medicine of Mexico.

In addition to his scholarly works, which include more than 140 articles in academic journals, as well as many books and book chapters, he has written two best-selling novels for youngsters explaining the functions of the human body.



DR. MARVIN DAWKINS

FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE EDWARD WATERS COLLEGE, 1970

Dr. Marvin Dawkins, a distinguished professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Miami, is in his fifth year as the Faculty Athletics Representative. He was named to the post in April 2012, replacing Clyde McCoy after his 17 years of service in that role.

In his FAR post, Dawkins is responsible for ensuring the academic integrity of students participating in University athletic programs and helping to oversee institutional control of the Department of Athletics. The Faculty Athletics Representative serves as a liaison between the University and the athletic department. This individual is the University's voting delegate to the ACC and represents UM with the NCAA and ACC.

Dawkins received his doctorate from Florida State and completed his postdoctoral research fellowships at Howard University and The Johns Hopkins University. He previously served on the faculties of the University of Maryland, Old Dominion University and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside.

His research focuses on issues of race and social equity in such areas as education, career aspirations and mobility, substance abuse prevention, and sports. He has published widely in these areas, including his most recent article titled "Race and Pathways to Power in the National Football League" (with Jomills H. Braddock and Erica Smith), which appears in American Behavioral Scientist (2012). His research on golf includes book chapters, scholarly articles, and the book African American Golfers During the Jim Crow Era (Praeger 2000), coauthored with Graham C. Kinloch. Dawkins was recently appointed to the United States Golf Association Museum Committee and is currently completing a study on the media treatment of black golfers from the Jim Crow era to the present.



BLAKE JAMES

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
MINNESOTA STATE-MANKATO, 1992

Since taking over as the University of Miami's Director of Athletics in 2013, Blake James has led a transformation at Miami on the field, in student-athlete support, in facilities and in student academic achievement.

In 2015-2016, Miami was the only school in NCAA Division I athletics to have its football team play in a bowl game, men's and women's basketball teams reach the NCAA tournament and baseball team advance to the College World Series. Overall, Miami had 10 sports programs advance to postseason competition to secure its highest finish in the Learfield Directors' Cup standings in twelve years, an indication of broad-based athletic department success

Miami sold out its entire men's basketball season ticket allotment in 2015-2016, marking the first time in Hurricane athletics history that a team has sold out on a season-ticket basis. For fans who chose to watch the Canes on media platforms, the Hurricanes' live streaming video platform took a giant leap, as Miami aired more than 115 live events on ESPN3 – a figure that ranked first among all ACC schools.

In the classroom, three Miami teams were honored nationally for being among the top 10 percent in the Academic Progress Rates (APR) during the 2015-2016 academic year. In addition, eight Hurricane teams scored 990 or better out of a possible 1,000 points – men's cross country (1000), men's diving (1000), men's tennis (991), golf (1000), soccer (991) and women's swimming (996), women's tennis (992) and women's track and field (994).

In the department's continuing efforts to better support student-athletes and coaches, the Miami Hurricane Club set an all-time annual fund record of \$12 million raised for the Student-Athlete Excellence Fund—an increase of 21 percent over the prior year. The Hurricane Club also announced a record 8,100 active members in May 2016, an 80 percent increase in active membership since 2010.

Under James' leadership, Miami has completed several facility enhancements, beginning with the opening of the Schwartz Center for Athletic Excellence, the completion of the student-athlete training table, fueling station, dining hall, new artificial and natural playing surfaces and lights on the Greentree Practice Fields and a center-hung scoreboard inside the Hurricanes' basketball arena. Prior to the 2015 athletics season, James was instrumental in helping Miami strike one of the largest apparel deals in the country with adidas.

Prior to being named AD, James served Miami athletics in the roles of Interim AD and Senior Associate AD for Development and Ticket Operations, where he oversaw the day-to-day operations of development, ticket sales and ticket operations. He also was a member of the Hurricanes' senior staff and provided sport supervision.

James came to UM after spending seven years the University of Maine, where he first served as Senior Associate Athletic Director before serving as Director of Athletics from 2005 to 2010. During his tenure at Maine, athletics experienced tremendous success, including three trips to the Frozen Four for the men's ice hockey program and NCAA playoff berths for football, baseball (two), women's basketball and softball. Additionally, James implemented a comprehensive \$17 million facility improvement plan, which included an indoor practice facility and numerous other facility

upgrades and renovations. Academically, the program flourished, earning the conference academic cup twice and student-athletes maintaining better than a 3.0 GPA.

Prior to his stint at Maine, James worked in athletic development at Providence College, where he established the "Friars Forever" campaign and the Friar Athletic Fund.

James is no stranger to South Florida, beginning his athletic career with the University of Miami, working in ticket sales, corporate sales and athletic development. In 1995, he was hired as Miami's Director of Ticket Sales, serving in that capacity until 1997, when he was named an athletic development officer at the University of Nebraska. He returned to Miami in 1998 as the Director of Major Gifts and Corporate Sales and was promoted to the Director of Athletic Development at Miami in 2000 before moving on to Providence in 2002.

James graduated from Minnesota State University - Mankato with a Bachelor's Degree in Marketing in 1992 and later received his Master's degree in Sports Administration from St. Thomas University in 1994.

He and his wife, Kelly, have two children: daughter, Haley, and son, Ryan.



TONY HERNANDEZ

DEPUTY DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICSMIAMI. 1997

Tony Hernandez, joined the University of Miami Athletic Department in 1998 and is currently the Deputy Director of Athletics In his role, he oversees the following operations and sports:

Financial and Business Operations Human Resources Ticket Operations Equipment Room Video Services adidas Relations Legal/Contractual Matters Men's Basketball Baseball Track and Field

Hernandez joined the University of Miami athletics department in February of 1998 as a graduate assistant in academic services. He was hired full-time in 1999 as a Compliance Coordinator, subsequently being promoted to Director of Compliance in 2002, Assistant AD for Compliance in 2004, Associate AD for Compliance in 2005 and Senior Associate Athletic Director in 2007. In 2005, he also served as the Interim Associate AD for Development and has served as the Interim Associate AD for External Affairs on two separate occasions. During his term as Interim Associate AD for Development, the Hurricane Club exceeded its annual giving budgetary goal by nearly ten percent.

By request of former President Donna E. Shalala, Hernandez served as Miami's Acting Athletic Director for almost two months, following Kirby Hocutt's departure to take the position of Director of Athletics at Texas Tech in February 2011.

In addition to his work at UM, Hernandez has been involved at

the conference and national level. He is currently serving or has previously served on the following committees:

He is also an adjunct professor for Sports Law in the School of Education at Miami and has served as an adjunct faculty member at Florida Atlantic University.

Hernandez earned both a law degree and a bachelor's of business administration in finance from the University of Miami. He is a member of Iron Arrow, the highest honor attainable at UM, and served a term as president. He is married to the former Melissa Schumacher and they have two sons, Anthony Jr. and Austin.



JENNIFER STRAWLEY

DEPUTY DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS SENIOR WOMAN ADMINISTRATOR PENNSYLVANIA, 1998

Jennifer Strawley joined the University of Miami on June 18, 2012 and currently serves as Deputy Director of Athletics and Senior Women's Administrator.

As a member of the department's executive leadership team, Strawley provides strategic direction for the department and assists the Athletic Director with the day-to-day operations. She is the sport administrator for football, women's basketball and women's tennis. She leads the department's strategic planning initiatives, policy development and implementation, coordination of department and coaches meetings and gender equity and inclusion initiatives. Strawley oversees the areas of sports medicine, student-athlete drug testing, academic services, compliance, student-athlete development, and serves as a liaison to various campus groups, as well as to the ACC and the NCAA.

Strawley played a key role in the hiring of head football coach Mark Richt, serving on the selection committee. In addition, she was instrumental in the development of Miami's Celebration of Women's Athletics and spearheaded the Department's "it's on Us Campaign."

Actively engaged in intercollegiate athletics nationally, Strawley has served on various committees within the NCAA and the ACC. Strawley currently serves on the ACC Television Committee, the ACC Women's Basketball foresight committee, the ACC Equity Committee, the ACC Women's Tennis Committee, the ACC Infractions and Sportsmanship Review Committee, the ACC Football Schedulers Group, the NCAA Division I Council Football Recruiting Ad Hoc Working Group and the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Advancement Committee.

Prior to UM, Strawley concluded her second tour with the NCAA as the Director of Academic and Membership Affairs. In this role, Strawley was instrumental in providing leadership in the areas of academic governance and development of academic policy. She was the staff liaison to the NCAA Division I Committee on Academic Performance and the NCAA Division I Academic Cabinet. Strawley served on the senior management team and

was involved in a variety of other internal operations, including coordinating the internal operations for the department's senior management team.

Strawley rejoined the NCAA after serving as the Associate Athletics Director for Intercollegiate Sport Programs and Senior Woman Administrator at Columbia University from 2007-10. While at Columbia, she oversaw numerous varsity sport programs including football and was the athletics program liaison for gender equity and diversity initiatives. Strawley was a member of the department's Executive Management Team.

Prior to her tenure at Columbia, Strawley was the Director of Membership Services and Student-Athlete Reinstatement at the NCAA. In this role, she provided oversight of the student-athlete reinstatement process and was instrumental in the implementation of the student first philosophy. Strawley served as a liaison to numerous NCAA committees and task forces, including the NCAA Divisions I, II and III Student-Athlete Reinstatement Committees, the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee, and the working group appointed to review trends in initial eligibility.

Strawley first joined the NCAA in 1998 as an enforcement services intern. She is a 1998 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania where she earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in history. During her time at Pennsylvania, she was a two-year captain for the Quakers' softball team. Strawley was inducted into the William Tennent High School Athletics Hall of Fame in January of 2014.



TIM WISE

SENIOR ASSOCIATE AD
FACILITIES & EVENT OPERATIONS
SOUTH CAROLINA, 1996

Tim Wise is in his fourth year as the Senior Associate Athletic Director for Facilities and Event Operations at the University of Miami. Wise joined the UM staff in June 2012.

Wise, who has more than 18 years of experience in college athletics as an event manager, facilities director and administrator, was hired by the University of Wisconsin athletics department as Assistant Athletic Director for Events and Facilities in August, 2008. In January 2012, he was named Interim Associate Athletic Director and elevated to the senior management team with additional oversight of the University Ridge Golf Course and \$125 million in capital projects.

Wise also had supervisory oversight of the UW Athletics event management, facilities, food and beverage and guest services units and oversaw an annual budget of approximately \$15 million.

He also served in a lead role in administrative coordination of UW Athletics concerts, summer camps and event parking.

Wise served as the director of facility maintenance at the University of Connecticut from August 2005 to August 2008. He oversaw daily operations of athletic facilities, projects and event operations as the assistant athletics director for facilities and operations at Eastern Michigan University from November 2003 to June 2005.

Wise was hired as the athletics event manager at the University of Denver in August 2000 and promoted to the Director of Athletics Events in August 2001 and served in that role until October 2003. Prior to his time at Denver, Wise was the event services manager at The Ohio State University's Schottenstein Center.

Wise was an event operations manager intern at Michigan State University from August 1998 to May 1999. His first position upon graduation from college was as a conference coordinator at the University of South Carolina from December 1996 to January 1998.

Wise has extensive experience working at NCAA and conference championship events. At Wisconsin he served on the department's Diversity Integration Group and was the representative to the City of Madison and UW Campus Joint Southeast Campus Area Committee. In the past, he served on Connecticut's Environmental Compliance Team as well as the schools Environmental Policy Advisory Council. He also served on the NCAA Woman of the Year Selection Committee and the NCAA Minority Opportunities and Interests Committee, three years as the vice chair. Wise earned the University of Denver Center for Multicultural Excellence Outstanding Staff Award in 2002-03.

He is a member of the Collegiate Event and Facility Management Association and was named to the Board of Directors in September 2011. Wise is currently serving as the President of the association for 2015-16 and was previously 1st Vice President 2014-15, 2nd Vice President 2013-14, and 3rd Vice President 2012-13. Wise also has membership in the Minority Opportunities Athletic Association, the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics and the Stadium Managers Association.

Wise is a 1996 graduate of the University of South Carolina with a bachelor's degree in business administration and earned a master's degree in human performance and sport studies from the University of Tennessee in 1998.



JASON LAYTON

SENIOR ASSOCIATE AD COMMUNICATIONS & SALES SAINT LEO, 1999

Jason Layton joined the University of Miami in December of 2014 as the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Communications and Sales.

In his current position, Layton is responsible for managing the department's ticket sales, marketing, communication, website and social/digital media areas.

Layton's primary focus centers on generating revenue through ticket sales, marketing, corporate sponsorships, promotions and licensing and multi-media rights.

Since his arrival, Miami has already seen exceptional growth in ticket sales and digital streaming with ESPN3.

Under his watch, Miami has seen an increased level of season ticket sales in football and men's basketball, while transitioning to a new ticketing system in Paciolan.

Under Layton's guidance, Miami sold out its entire 2015-16 men's basketball season ticket allotment, marking the first time in Hurricane athletics history that a team has sold out its entire season ticket allotment.

Layton also serves as the primary point of contact with ESPN in establishing the department's new digital network. During the 2015-16 athletics campaign, Miami aired over 115 live events on ESPN3 – a figure that ranked first among all ACC schools.

Layton, a Florida native, arrives in Miami after spending the previous two years at Colorado State University where he served as the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Sales and Marketing.

During his time in Fort Collins, Colorado, Layton's ticket sales plans drove double-digit increases in football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball revenue and tickets sold.

In addition, Layton managed the implementation of the Mountain West Digital Network for CSU online streams, which achieved more than 70,000 views during its first year.

His oversight of CSURams.com saw a complete redesign. Under Layton's redesign, CSURams.com included a fan loyalty rewards program that rewarded fans for social activity, ticketing attendance and sponsorship engagement.

Craig Anderson is his second year as the department's Senior Associate Athletic Director for Compliance in 2016.

In his current capacity, Anderson oversees the Hurricanes' fiveperson compliance office and serves as the departmental liason between the NCAA and all rules educational matters.

Anderson was hired as Associate AD for Compliance at the University of Miami on Feb. 27, 2013. He came to UM after spending three years as the Assistant Athletics Director for Compliance at NC State.

At UM, Anderson is responsible for managing all aspects of the compliance unit's effort, including educating the athletics department and university staff, boosters, coaches and student-athletes about NCAA and ACC regulations. In addition, he is responsible for overseeing the compliance monitoring systems related to recruiting, certification and eligibility. Anderson is also the Sport Supervisor for the women's golf program.

At NC State, he was charged with many roles, including monitoring all amateurism and eligibility issues, serving as the liaison to the academic support program for student-athletes, monitoring all initial eligibility/continuing eligibility processes and conducting NCAA rules education for coaches, staff, boosters and general public.

Before moving to NC State, Anderson served in a nearly threeyear role as Director of Compliance at the University of Virginia from September 2007-July 2010. Jesse Marks was promoted to Senior Associate Athletic Director for Development in August 2016. He was previously promoted to associate AD for development in November 2012 following two years as assistant athletics director for major gifts.

Under the guidance of Director of Athletics Blake James, Marks is responsible for all development operations for the department of athletics, including campaign oversight, major giving, annual fund, donor stewardship, event hospitality and coordination with central advancement efforts.

Since Marks' arrival in 2010, the Hurricane Club has seen significant growth in major giving and annual giving participation. Following the department's restructure in 2010, the Hurricane Club's development results have increased significantly across the board. Major Giving is up more than 70 percent since 2010, including eight gifts over \$1 million and more than 35 gifts in excess of \$250,000 or more. In 2013, UM opened the fully funded \$18-million, 30,000-square foot Schwartz Center for Athletic Excellence featuring new football, academic, and athletic training facilities as well as a Gallery of Champions showcasing the proud championship tradition of UM Athletics. Additionally in 2013, The newly created Football Victory Fund has raised over \$3 million to enhance the football practice facilities including, new artificial and grass fields, new lighting and a training table dining hall for all 400 plus student-athletes.

Annual giving has also seen unprecedented growth through extensive marketing, philanthropic re-branding and digital strategy. Since 2010, Hurricane Club Membership has increased by more than 84 percent to an all-time record of 8,076 active members. The Hurricane Club is consistently recognized nationwide for their use of cutting edge technology and unique campaigns to drive annual support.

Marks has been a part of two major capital campaigns at the University of Miami. The Momentum Campaign (2000-2008) which raised over \$1 billion for the University. Athletics exceeded its goal of \$68 million and raised more than \$85 million dollars. Currently, Marks is leading athletics efforts for university wide \$1.6 billion Momemtum2 Campaign. UM Athletics has raised over \$110 million to date and is on pace to exceed their goal of \$125 million by the end of 2016.

Prior to his return to UM Athletics, Marks served as assistant director of development at Wake Forest University, where he managed relationships for over 150 athletic donors in the southeast, including South Carolina, Georgia, North Carolina and Florida. Prior to Wake Forest, Marks was as assistant tthletics director for development at Florida International University, where he managed all fundraising operations related to the opening of their new football stadium in 2008.

Marks is an active member of the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD) and is an adjunct professor in the School of Education Sports Administration Program teaching Sport Promotions and Sales.

A two-time Miami graduate, Marks earned his bachelor's degree in 2005 and his master's degree in 2008.

The Hurricanes and Mountaineers played one another every season from 1991 to 2003 when both institutions were members of the BIG EAST Conference. •Miami defeated West Virginia 22-20 in its last meeting with the Mountaineers thanks to a game-winning field goal from Jon Peatitie.

 Miami's matchup against West Virginia will mark the final college football game for Gage Batten, Kevin Carroll, Jamal Carter, Sr., Wyatt Chickillo, Adrian Colbert, Stacy Coley, Standish Dobard, Corn Elder, Frank Gabriel, Alex Gall, Danny Isidora, Rayshawn Jenkins, Malcolm Lewis, Austin Pfenninger, Justin Vogel, Michael Welch and Marquez Williams.

He also surpassed 300 yards through the air in two of his final four regular season games.

•Kaaya's 9,686 career-passing yards are already the most in Miami history. His 3,238 passing yards as a sophomore in 2015 are tied for the sixth-most in a single season, while his 3.198 yards in 2014 are the eighth-most. He is the only QB with two individual seasons ranking in the top 10.

- •Kaaya's 11 career 300-yard passing games rank second behind Clemson's Deshaun Watson among active ACC players.

CAN OF CORN

- •Corn Elder finished the regular season with 69.0 tackles (49.0 solo), 4.5 tackles for loss, 3.0 sacks, one interception and 12 pass breakups en route to earning All-ACC honors (first team. coaches: second team ACSMA).
- •His 12 pass breakups are a team best. He also leads the team with 46.0 solo tackles.
- •In the Hurricanes' home opener against FAMU, Elder picked off a pass and tallied a pair of tackles.
- •In Miami's first road game of the year at Appalachian State, Elder tied a then-career high with 7.0 tackles. He also tallied a sack, a tackle for loss, one pass breakup and one quarterback hurry.

- •Under first-year defensive coordinator and Miami native Manny Diaz, the Hurricanes are holding opponents to just 4.84 yards per play a figure that ranks 11th among teams at the FBS level.
- •The Hurricanes rank in the top 25 nationally in four different defensive categories: scoring defense (No. 13/18.9), team sacks (No. 23/2.75), tackles for loss (No. 6/8.3) and total defense (No. 27/355.3).
- •Miami has allowed 26 touchdowns in its last 50 quarters dating back to last season.
- •Miami has held 10 of its 12 opponents under its 2016 scoring average, including Duke in the regular season finale on Nov. 26.
- •Miami has started and finished games strong, outscoring its opponents by a combined 166-88 in the first and fourth quarters of games.
- •The Hurricanes have held three opponents scoreless in the second half this season (FAMU, North Carolina and Virginia).
- •In its ACC opener against Georgia Tech, Miami's defense accounted for 12 points, as freshmen Shaquille Quarterman and Joe Jackson each returned a fumble for a touchdown.
- •Through 12 games in 2016, nine players already have at least 5.0 tackles for loss. In 2015, just four players finished the season (13 games) with at least 5.0 tackles for loss.
- •Against Appalachian State, Miami held the Mountaineers to just 2.6 yards per carry on the ground.
- •Miami dominated FAU in the first half, as it held the Owls to just one yard rushing on 17 attempts. The Hurricanes also did not allow the Owls to convert one third-down conversion as they went 0-for-11. FAU finished the game with just 46 yards.

- •Running back Mark Walton has rushed for over 100 yards in six games this season.

- •Walton's three touchdown performance against NC State marked the fifth time in his career in which he has scored multiple touchdowns
- •Walton closed the year with 106 yards of all-purpose yards and one touchdown reception in the Hurricanes' regular season finale against Duke.
- •On Oct. 12 at Virginia, Walton dashed for 111 yards on the ground.

- Against Pittsburgh, Walton rushed for 125 yards and a touchdown.
- Against North Carolina on Oct. 15, Walton rushed for 82 yards on a career-high 24 carries.
- Walton has more than doubled his 2015 rushing total of 461 yards. He currently leads the team with 1,065 yards on the ground.
- •Walton scored a touchdown on the first play of the game at Appalachian State, as he raced 80 yards for the score. His 80-yard run was the longest of his young career.
- •Walton's 80-yard touchdown run against Appalachian State is tied for the second-longest rush in the ACC this season.
- •On Sept. 10 against FAU, Walton rushed for a career-high 155 yards. He also scored a career-high four touchdowns against the Owls. His 155-yard output against FAU was the fifth highest rushing total in the ACC this season. In two career games against FAU, Walton has totaled seven rushing touchdowns.
- •Walton got off to an impressive start to the 2016 season, as he rushed for a then-career-high 116 yards and had one touchdown against FAMU.

- •Freshman wide receiver Ahmmon Richards currently leads the Hurricanes with 866 yards receiving. His 866 yards are the most ever by a freshman wide receiver at Miami.
- •His 866 receiving yards currently rank ninth all-time in a single season at Miami.
- His 18.83 yards per reception are tops among all FBS freshman nationally. Richards' 18.83 yards per reception are ranked 21st nationally overall.
- •Richards' 866 yards receiving lead all FBS freshman nationally.
- •Richards has been honored as the ACC Rookie of the Week twice this season.

FRESHMAN PHENOMS

- •Miami freshman linebackers Michael Pinckney, Shaquille Quarterman and Zach McCloud have made an immediate impact in their first seasons at The U.
- •The three rookie linebackers have combined for 167.0 tackles, 18.0 tackles for loss and 5.0 sacks. They have combined for over 20 percent of the team's tackles this season.
- •The Miami freshman trio has started at linebacker in the Hurricanes' last 10 games. UM is the only school in the nation that has started three true freshman linebackers.
- •Quarterman and Pinckney are ranked first (79.0) and fifth (57.0) on the team in tackles, while McCloud ranks 10th on the team in tackles (31.0).

THE SPECIALIST

- Punter Justin Vogel has lived up to his preseason all-conference honor as he earned postseason Second Team All-ACC recognition.
 The Tampa, Fla., native has 57 punts for 2,522 yards. His 44.2 yards per punt average ranks second in the ACC and 18th nationally.
- Vogel has 23 punts that have landed inside the 20-yard line and has 16 that have gone over 50 yards.
- Vogel earned Preseason All-ACC honors after a stellar junior season in which he was recognized with All-ACC Third-Team honors by the media and All-ACC honorable mention from the league's coaches.
- •Vogel also has established himself as a leader on and off the field. This season, he was selected as a team captain four times during the regular season. He also was nominated for the Lowe's Senior Class Award for his work in the classroom and in the community.

MARK RICHT

HEAD COACH | FIRST SEASON AT MIAMI (16TH OVERALL) | 153-55 (.736)

Hurricane alumnus Mark Richt was named the 24th head football coach at The University of Miami on Dec. 4, 2015, by Director of Athletics Blake James.

The 2016 season was Richt's first in Coral Gables.

Miami finished with an 8-4 record in his first year, and tied for the second-best record in the ACC Coastal Division at 5-3. The Hurricanes were picked to represent the ACC and play West Virginia in the Russell Athletic Bowl.

Miami had 10 players earn ACSMA All-ACC honors in 2016, while quarterback Brad Kaaya became Miami's all-time passing yards leader under his tutelage. Freshman wide receiver Ahmmon Richards broke the 31-year-old freshman receiving record at Miami originally set by Michael Irvin, while sophomore running back Mark Walton became the 11th 1,000-yard rusher in program history.

At the conclusion of the regular season, Miami was ranked No. 26 nationally in total defense (up from No. 69 a season ago), No. 13 in yards per play (No. 86 in 2015), No. 14 in scoring defense (No. 77 in 2015), No. 6 in tackles for loss (No. 105 in 2015), No. 22 in team sacks (No. 70 in 2015) and No. 17 in defensive touchdowns (not ranked in 2015).

Richt, born in Omaha, Neb., and raised in Boca Raton, Fla., returned to his alma mater after leading the University of Georgia football program for the previous 15 years. He compiled a 145-51 overall record and an 85-40 mark in Southeastern Conference play, won two SEC championships, six SEC East titles and nine bowl games and finished the season in the Associated Press Top-10 rankings seven times.

Richt's .736 winning percentage ranks fifth-best among active FBS head coaches. Richt is one of only seven head coaches in SEC history to record four straight 10-win seasons (2002-05).

During his tenure on the sidelines in Athens, 77 of Richt's players were selected in the NFL Draft over the last 14 years, including eight chosen in the 2002 and 2013 NFL Drafts – the most Georgia players ever selected in a single year.

Off the field, Richt places a strong emphasis on academics and 292 Georgia players earned their degrees during his tenure.

Richt was the 2013 recipient of the Stallings Award given for commitment to humanitarian and community service efforts, and in 2010, he was named to the American Football Coaches Association Board of Trustees.

Before his arrival at Georgia, Richt spent seven seasons as the offensive coordinator at Florida State. In his time in Tallahassee, the Seminoles finished in the nation's top five in scoring offense on five occasions, top 12 in total offense five times and top 12 in passing offense five times.

The 2000 team, which played in the National Championship game against Oklahoma, finished the regular season ranked first nationally in total offense (549.0 ypg), first in passing offense (384.0 ypg), and third in scoring offense (42.4 ppg).

Richt sent six FSU quarterbacks into the NFL between 1987 and 2000. In 2000, Richt coached Chris Weinke to the Heisman Trophy, and in 1991, he coached Casey Weldon to the runner-up for the Heisman. Brad Johnson (now Richt's brotherin-law), was a Pro Bowl selection for Washington in 2000 and led the Tampa Bay Bucs to the Super Bowl title in 2003. Other Richt pro protégés include Danny Kanell (New York Giants), Danny McManus (Kansas City Chiefs) and Peter Tom Willis (Chicago Bears).

Richt played quarterback for the Miami Hurricanes under legendary head coach Howard Schnellenberger.

He spent most of his career at Miami as a backup to Pro Football Hall of Famer and former Buffalo Bills star Jim Kelly. In one of Richt's years at Miami, his teammates included Kelly, Vinny Testaverde and Bernie Kosar and quarterbacks coach Earl Morrall.

Richt is married to the former Katharyn Francis of Tallahassee. The couple has four children – Jonathan, David, Zach, and Anya. Jon, the Miami quarterbacks coach, was married to the former Anna Cearley, in May 2010.

Manny Diaz is in his first season as the Hurricanes' defensive coordinator. In addition to his duties as Miami's defensive coordinator. Diaz coaches the lineback-

Miami's defense enjoyed vast improvements under Diaz' watch and served as one of the top units both in the ACC and nationally in 2016.

At the conclusion of the regular season, Miami was ranked No. 26 nationally in total defense (up from No. 69 a season ago), No. 13 in yards per play (No. 86 in 2015), No. 14 in scoring defense (No. 77 in 2015). No. 6 in tackles for loss (No. 105) in 2015), No. 22 in team sacks (No. 70 in 2015) and No. 17 in defensive touchdowns (not ranked in 2015).

Miami was the only team in the country to start three true freshmen linebackers. and the Hurricanes trio of Zach McCloud, Michael Pinckney and Shaquille Quarterman helped anchor the unit. Three defensive players earned ACSMA All-ACC honors - senior defensive backs Corn Elder (second team) and Ravshawn Jenkins (honorable mention) and Quarterman at linebacker (honorable mention).

Diaz, the son of the former mayor of Miami, Manny Diaz, returned home to South Florida after 18 years of defensive experience. During his 19-year coaching career. Diaz has coached in 16 bowl games and has coached numerous allconference and NFL players at six collegiate institutions.

In 2015, Diaz's defensive unit helped Mississippi State to a 9-4 record and a victory over NC State in the Belk Bowl. His defensive unit held opponents to just 23.2 points per game and ranked in the nation's top 10 in red zone defense and tackles for loss.

Diaz spent one season, 2014, at Louisiana Tech and his impact was felt in a big way. The Bulldogs led the nation in turnovers gained (42) with 16 fumble recoveries and 26 interceptions.

Before his stop at Louisiana Tech, Diaz

coached three seasons at Texas (2011-13). His 2011 defensive unit ranked ninth in total yards per play.

In 2010, during his first stint at Mississippi State, Diaz guided a defense that ranked 22nd in the nation in scoring defense (19.9 ppg), 17th in rushing defense (214.9 ypg) and 17th in tackles for loss (7.0 pg). That was a dramatic turnaround for MSU from the season before his arrival, when the defense finished 71st in scoring defense, 62nd in rushing defense and 89th in tackles for loss. MSU also finished ranked 13th in red-zone defense (.730) and 22nd in turnovers forced (28) nationally in 2010.

Before his first stop at Mississippi State, Diaz spent four seasons as defensive coordinator at Middle Tennessee State. Diaz coached linebackers for two years after mentoring the safeties during his first two years.

In four years under Diaz, the Middle Tennessee defense led its conference in sacks and tackles for loss twice, and finished no lower than third in the league in either category during his tenure. In 2009, the Blue Raiders finished second nationally in tackles for loss, stopping more than eight-and-a-half plays per game behind the line of scrimmage. Diaz's defense also ranked sixth nationally in sacks that season, posting nearly three per game.

Before joining Middle Tennessee, Diaz played a significant role for one of the country's top-ranked defenses by coaching safeties in 2004-05 and handling the linebackers in 2002-03 for NC

Diaz spent the 2000 and 2001 seasons at NCSU as a graduate assistant working primarily with the linebackers. During that time, the Wolfpack went to two bowl games and became the first ACC team to beat Florida State in Tallahas-

Diaz began his coaching career at Florida State in 1998.

THOMAS BROWN

Offensive Coordinator/Running Backs | First Season at Miami (Sixth Overall)

Thomas Brown is in his first season as the Hurricanes' offensive coordinator. In addition to his duties as Miami's offensive coordinator, Brown also coaches the running backs.

Under his watch in 2016, sophomore running back Mark Walton became just the 11th running back in Miami history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season

Brown spent the 2015 campaign on Mark Richt's staff at Georgia where he coached the Bulldog running backs. During Brown's time with the Bulldogs, Georgia rushed for 2,513 yards (194.3 yards per game).

In 2015, he oversaw running back Sony Michel as he rushed for 1,076 yards. Michel became the 13th Bulldog in school history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in a season.

Before arriving at Georgia, Brown coached Heisman Trophy runner-up Melvin Gordon at Wisconsin in 2014. Gordon posted the second-best season ever by a running back with 2,587 rushing yards and 32 to-tal touchdowns. He and sophomore Corey Clement combined to run for 3,536 yards to break the single-season Football Bowl Subdivision record for rushing yards by teammates that had been set the year before by Gordon and James White (3,053 yards).

The Badgers posted the two most prolific rushing performances in the country in 2014 with a school-record 644 rushing yards vs. Bowling Green and 581 vs. Nebraska, and their average of 6.91 yards per rushing attempt ranked as the fourth-best mark in FBS history.

Before joining the Wisconsin staff, Brown served as the running backs coach at Marshall in 2013 and at UT Chattanooga in 2012. He spent the 2011 season as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Georgia.

At Marshall, Brown helped direct Conference USA's second-ranked rushing offense which averaged 205.9 rushing vards per game (ranked 24th nationally). The Herd won the C-USA East Division title with a 7-1 record and defeated Maryland, 31-20, in the Military Bowl. Brown guided Essray Taliaferro to a season that saw him average 5.2 vards per carry and score 10 touchdowns while amassing 1,140 rushing yards. Marshall was one of just seven FBS teams to boast three running backs that rushed for at least 500 yards in 2013 - and was the lone program outside the Power Five conferences to accomplish the feat.

A native of Atlanta, Ga., Brown starred at Tucker High School before enrolling at Georgia and helping the Bulldogs to the 2005 Southeastern Conference championship. He finished his career as the fifth-leading rushing in Georgia history with 2,646 career yards and led the Bulldogs in rushing in 2005 and 2006. For his career, Brown averaged 5.0 yards per carry and scored 25 touchdowns. He was elected by his teammates as the permanent offensive team captain in 2007.

He was selected in the sixth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons and spent the 2009 season with the Cleveland Browns before retiring to pursue coaching opportunities.

Brown earned his bachelor's degree in speech communications from UGA. He and his wife, Jessica, have two children, Orlando and Tyson.

CRAIG KULIGOWSKI

Defensive Line | First Season at Miami (25th Overall)

Craig Kuligowski is in his first season as the Hurricanes' defensive line coach.

Kuligowski arrived in Coral Gables, Fla., after spending the previous 15 years as the defensive line coach at the University of Missouri.

Miami's defensive line enjoyed vast improvements under his guidance and served as one of the top units both in the ACC and nationally in 2016.

At the conclusion of the regular season, Miami was ranked No. 26 nationally in total defense (up from No. 69 a season ago), No. 13 in yards per play (No. 86 in 2015), No. 14 in scoring defense (No. 77 in 2015), No. 6 in tackles for loss (No. 105 in 2015), No. 22 in team sacks (No. 70 in 2015) and No. 17 in defensive touchdowns (not ranked in 2015).

During his 15-year tenure with the Tigers, for whom he was the longest-tenured position coach in the SEC, Kuligowski coached 24 players to all-conference honors. In addition, Kuligowski produced four first round NFL Draft picks since 2009.

In 2015, Kuligowski's defensive line helped the Tigers rank second in the nation in team tackles for loss. The Tigers also ranked ninth in the nation in total defense.

In 2014, Mizzou led the SEC in sacks (a school-record 44), and was the stingiest defense in the league, allowing a conference-low 300.8 yards per game in league games.

The 2013 season saw the emergence of Michael Sam, who became one of the more compelling stories of the year, as he rose from little pre-season fanfare to become one of the top rush ends in the nation. He led the SEC in both sacks (11.5) and tackles for loss (19.0) was named SEC Defensive Player of the Year, and became MU's first defensive First-Team All-American since former great Justin Smith in 2001. Sam was a finalist for the Nagurski, Lombardi and Hendricks awards.

Kony Ealy also turned in an outstanding season, which culminated with him winning First-Team All-SEC acclaim by the Associated Press.

Kuligowski's defensive line was arguably the most disruptive and deepest in the nation in 2013, as it was responsible for 39 of Mizzou's 41 season sacks (which led the SEC and ranked 12th nationally), while notching 73.5 of the team's 107 tackles for loss.

Sheldon Richardson developed into one of the top defensive tackles in the nation in 2012, and claimed First-Team All-SEC honors for his play, which included leading all SEC linemen in tackles (75).

Coach "Kool" debuted a star pupil in 2009: redshirt freshman end Aldon Smith, who turned out to be one of the top freshmen in the entire nation. Smith was named the Big 12 Conference Defensive Freshman/Newcomer of the Year, in unanimous fashion, and he also earned third-team All-American honors, as well as first-team Freshman All-American honors for his outstanding play in 2009.

Smith broke the MU single-season quarterback sacks record in 2009, with 11.5 to surpass the old mark of 11 set in 2000 by former Missouri All-American Justin Smith. Aldon Smith also had 19 tackles for loss in his first year on the field for Mizzou, and he led all of the nation's freshmen in both sacks and tackles for loss a year ago.

In 2007, Kuligowski coached all four of his starters on the Tiger defensive line to at least honorable mention All-Big 12 honors

Kuligowski was credited with building one of the top defensive lines in the MAC during his tenure at Toledo. In 2000, the Rockets were ranked fifth in the country in rushing defense, allowing just 81.5 yards per game and 2.46 yards per carry. They were ranked third in the country in scoring defense, third in total defense and No. 1 in turnover margin.

Kuligowski was a four-year standout at Toledo (1987-90) as an offensive tackle. He was named first team All-MAC two straight years and helped lead the Rockets to the MAC title his senior year.

Kuligowski earned a bachelor of business administration degree from Toledo in 1991. He and his wife Mary have two daughters: Peyton and Madeline, and a son, Max.

RON DUGANS

Passing Game Coordinator/Wide Receivers | First Season at Miami (11th Overall)

Ron Dugans is in his first season as the Hurricanes' wide receivers coach. In addition to his duties as Miami's wide receivers coach, Dugans also serves as the passing game coordinator.

Dugans guided freshman Ahmmon Richards to second-team ACSMA All-ACC honors in his first season, as Richards set the UM freshman all-time receiving mark with 866 receiving yards. Senior Stacy Coley, who became just the eighth Hurricane to ever top 2,000 career yards - including a career-best 743 under Dugans' watch in 2016 - was named to the All-ACC Third Team.

Dugans, a former wide receiver with the Cincinnati Bengals, has 12 years of coaching experience, making previous stops at Florida State, Georgia Southern, Louisville and USF.

The Tallahassee native spent the 2014 and 2015 seasons at USF, where he helped the Bulls to an 8-5 record and an appearance in the 2015 Miami Beach Bowl. Under Dugans' direction in 2015, junior wide receiver Rodney Adams posted a career-high 822 yards and hauled in a school-record nine receiving touchdowns.

In his first season in Tampa, Dugans helped guide wide receiver Andre Davis to a then-school record seven touchdown catches in 2014 despite Davis missing four games with an injury.

Before his two-year stint at USF, Dugans spent three years at Louisville where he served as an assistant on Charlie Strong's staff from 2010-13.

During his final two seasons at U of L, the Cardinals posted a 23-3 record, including an 11-2 mark and

a win in the 2013 Sugar Bowl. He guided wide receiver DeVante Parker to first-team All-American Athletic Conference honors in 2013, as the junior caught 55 passes for 885 yards and 12 touchdowns. Parker, who was also a 2012 first-team All-BIG EAST selection after posting 10 touchdown receptions, logged 28 touchdown catches in his first three seasons.

Prior to his time at Louisville, Dugans coached wide receivers at Georgia Southern (2007-09) for three seasons. Under Dugans' guidance, wide receiver Raja Andrews broke several school records during his senior campaign, en route to finishing 15th nationally in receptions per game and 20th in receiving yards.

Dugans served as a coaching assistant with the NFL's Cincinnati Bengals during the 2007 season. Prior to that, he coached at his alma mater, Florida State. He spent the 2006 season as a graduate assistant coach on offense.

Dugans reunites with Richt after he played for the first year Hurricanes' coach during his time as offensive coordinator at Florida State.

As a player from 1995-99, Dugans played his first two seasons at FSU before taking a medical redshirt during the 1997 campaign. He returned as a starting wide receiver his final two years from 1998-99 and posted 105 receptions for 1,520 vards and seven touchdowns in his career. He caught six passes for 135 vards in the 1999 Fiesta Bowl BCS National Championship Game against Tennessee and tallied five receptions for 99 vards and two touchdowns in the 2000 Sugar Bowl BCS National Championship Game.



Offensive Line | First Season at Miami (25th Overall)

STACY SEAL

Stacy Searels is in his first season as the Hurricanes' offensive line coach.

Under his watch, senior offensive lineman Danny Isidora earned third-team ACSMA All-ACC honors in 2016.

Miami's offensive line played a key role in running back Mark Walton becoming just the 11th 1,000-yard rusher in Miami history in 2016.

Searels, the former offensive line coach at Virginia Tech, Texas, Georgia and LSU, and an All-America offensive lineman as a player at Auburn, reunited with Richt for the second time his career. Searels spent the 2007-10 seasons on Georgia's staff.

The Georgia native arrives in Coral Gables after he spent the past two seasons at Virginia Tech, where his offensive line helped guide the Hokies to a pair of bowl victories.

In 2013, his final season at Texas, Searels' line enabled the Longhorns to finish 36th in the country in rushing offense and 17th in sacks allowed per game. Trey Hopkins was named first-team All-Big 12, while Donald Hawkins secured a spot on the second team.

In 2012, the offensive line, which was without a senior starter, allowed the opposition to post just 4.1 tackles for loss per game, which ranked tied for third in the country.

During his first season at Texas, Searels helped the Longhorns rank 21st nationally and third in the Big 12 with 210.4 rushing yards per game.

Searels joined the Longhorns after coaching the offensive line at Georgia for four seasons. He added the duties of running game coordinator

in 2009. During his time in Athens, the Bulldogs ranked in the top 25 in the nation in fewest sacks allowed three times, including ranking sixth and leading the SEC in 2009 with just 12.

A three-year starter on the offensive line at Auburn, Searels earned first-team All-America honors from both The Associated Press and Football News as a senior in 1987.

Searels blocked for Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson in 1985 and All-American Brent Fullwood at Auburn in 1986 before becoming a fourth-round draft pick by the San Diego Chargers in 1988. He ended his professional career in 1991 with the New York/New Jersey Knights of the World League of American Football.

Searels is married to the former Patricia Hale, and they have two daughters: Taylor and Savannah.

TODD HARTLEY

Special Teams Coordinator/Tight Ends | First Season at Miami (Ninth Overall)

Todd Hartley is in his first year as the Hurricanes' special teams coordinator and tight ends coach.

Under his watch, redshirt sophomore tight end David Njoku earned ACSMA All-ACC Honorable Mention recognition with 654 receiving yards and seven touchdowns in 2016.

Punter Justin Vogel averaged a career-best 44.2 yards per punt, which ranked 18th nationally, while junior Braxton Berrios' average of 12.8 yards per punt return were the sixth-most nationwide.

Vogel earned ACSMA All-ACC second-team honors.

Hartley arrived in Miami after serving as Georgia's director of recruiting in 2015.

Before his return to Georgia, Hartley spent four years at Marshall serving as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator from 2013-14. He began his tenure at Marshall as the team's defensive assistant and safeties coach.

In 2014, he coached punter Tyler Williams to first-team All-Conference USA honors and tight end Eric Frohnapfel to C-USA and honorable mention All-Conference USA honors, making it the fourth straight year he coached at least one all-league student athlete (2013-tight end Gator Hoskins, 2012-safety Dominick LeGrande and 2011-safety Omar Brown).

His punt unit tied for first in the league in average (43.23) and his kickoff return unit ranked second in the league with a 24.61-yard average. Kickoff return man Deandre Reaves totaled 931 return yards, breaking his school record of 924 from 2013. His extra-point/field goal unit set school records in extra points made (83) and kick points (133). He also coached tight

end Ryan Yurachek to Conference USA All-Freshman honors. Prior to the season, his recruiting class was ranked as the best in Conference USA by various recruiting services by a wide margin and among the best within the Group of Five.

In 2013. Hartley mentored Hoskins. a two-time John Mackey Award Watch List honoree who secured a spot on the award's semifinalist list as a senior. A third-team CollegeSportsMadness.com All-American and first-team All-Conference USA selection, the Gainesville, Fla., native finished his career with 28 touchdowns on 99 receptions totaling 1,318 yards. The only player in Herd history to top Hoskins' 28.3 percent touchdown-catches ratio was Randy Moss (31.5 percent on 168 receptions, 53 touchdown catches). His 28 touchdown catches rank third in Herd history (Moss 53, Darius Watts 47). He finished with 15 touchdown catches as a senior (fifth-most at Marshall for a single season), a total that was tied for third nationally and the most among tight ends by seven. That season, his kickoff return unit finished third in Conference USA with a 23.85-vard average.

Georgia had an 11-win season and tallied three bowl victories during Hartley's years working with the Bulldogs, including a 41-10 rout of No. 10 Hawai'i in the 2008 Sugar Bowl. He was instrumental in preparation of the Georgia defense for the 2009 Independence Bowl at a time only one full-time assistant was on staff.

Hartley originally joined the Bulldogs as a student assistant at the end of the 2005 season and worked with the offense and special teams until the spring of 2008.

Hartley graduated from Georgia with a degree in health and physical education in May, 2008.

At the conclusion of the regular season, Miami was ranked No. 26 nationally in total defense (up from No. 69 a season ago), No. 13 in yards per play (No. 86 in 2015), No. 14 in scoring defense (No. 77 in 2015), No. 6 in tackles for loss (No. 105 in 2015), No. 22 in team sacks (No. 70 in 2015) and No. 17 in defensive touchdowns (not ranked in 2015).

Rumph, a member of the Hurricanes' 2001 national championship team, returns to his alma mater after spending the past three seasons as the head coach at American Heritage High School in Plantation, Fla.

During his three seasons as head coach, Rumph guided the Patriots to three straight Florida High School Athletic Association (FH-SAA) state playoff appearances and compiled an overall record of 39-6 in one of Florida's most competitive districts

Rumph wasted little time making his mark on the local high school coaching scene, as his 2013 and 2014 squads claimed 5A FHSAA State Championships, defeating its opponents by a combined score of 104-8 in the final game. American Heritage became just the second school in Broward County history to win back-to-back state football championships.

In 2013 and 2014, Rumph was recognized for his work on the side-

lines as he was selected as a coach for the U.S. Army All-American Bowl in San Antonio.

Before taking over as the head coach at American Heritage, Rumph served as the team's defensive coordinator for two seasons

In addition, Rumph served as the boys and girls track and field head coach. In 2011, his boys and girls track and field teams captured the state championship. Following the year, Rumph was named the 2011 *Miami Herald* Track and Field Coach of the Year.

As a player at the University of Miami, Rumph earned all-conference honors during his junior and senior seasons. As a senior, Rumph finished with 117 tackles and six interceptions as he helped the Hurricanes to the 2001 National Championship.

Banda spent the 2015 season at Mississippi State, where he served as a defensive assistant under current Hurricanes defensive coordinator Manny Diaz.

In 2015, Mississippi State posted a 9-4 record, including a victory over NC State in the Belk Bowl. The Bulldogs' defensive unit held opponents to just 23.2 points per game and ranked in the nation's top 10 in red zone defense.

In addition, MSU led the nation in fewest pass plays of 20+ yards allowed in 2015, surrendering only 24. Despite several key injuries to seniors, the secondary ranked fourth in the Southeastern Conference in passes defended with 63.

Before arriving in Starkville, Banda spent three seasons as a defensive graduate assistant at Texas from 2012-15. He filled a variety of roles, from scripting practices and organizing scouting reports to assisting with the defensive backs. He also worked with both head coach Charlie Strong and former head coach

Mack Brown.

Banda was an instrumental part of the Longhorns defense staff during his time at Texas.

In 2014, Banda's assistance to the defensive staff guided the Longhorns to the nation's 24th-best ranking in total defense. The 2014 Texas squad also ranked No. 1 in scoring defense, No. 2 in total defense, No. 1 pass defense and No. 1 pass defense efficiency.

In 2012, Banda assisted with the game plan that allowed Texas to set an Alamo Bowl record with 10 sacks in the win over No. 13 Oregon State.

Under Banda's assistance in 2012, Texas also featured a defensive unit that allowed just 212.0 passing yards per game, while facing five of the nation's top-10 passing offenses that season.

In addition to his work on defense, Banda also assisted with the Longhorn special teams.

During his tenure at Texas, Banda coached first round NFL Draft pick Kenny Vaccaro.

Banda is a graduate of Incarnate Word in San Antonio. He got his coaching start there after his playing days in 2011.

Jon Richt is in his first season as the Hurricanes' quarterbacks coach.

Under his watch, junior quarterback Brad Kaaya became the all-time leading passer in Miami history with a career-best 3,250 passing yards.

Kaaya passed for 23 touchdowns compared to just seven interceptions, and completed passes with a career high-tying 61.2 percent rate.

Richt joined his father Mark's staff for the second time in his coaching career after he spent the 2015 campaign with the Buffalo Bills as an offensive assistant.

During his lone season in Buffalo, the Bills posted an 8-8 record under first-year head coach Rex Ryan.

He spent the 2014 season serving on Georgia's staff as a quality control assistant.

During the 2014 campaign, Georgia posted a 10-3 overall record and went 6-2 in in SEC play, placing second in the East Division.

The 2014 season was a recordbreaking year for the Bulldogs' offensive unit as Georgia posted 537 points and averaged 41.3 points per game - both of which are school records. Georgia's 41.3 points per game ranked eighth in the NCAA.

Richt was a three-star member of Clemson's 2008 recruiting class before he transferred to Mars Hill College to finish out his collegiate career.
