### **UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT**



#### **DONNA E. SHALALA**

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT
WESTERN COLLEGE FOR WOMEN, 1962

Donna E. Shalala became Professor of Political Science and President of the University of Miami on June 1, 2001. President Shalala has more than 30 years of experience as an accomplished scholar, teacher, and administrator.

Born in Cleveland, Ohio, President Shalala received her A.B. degree in history from Western College for Women. One of the country's first Peace Corps Volunteers, she served in Iran from 1962 to 1964. She earned her Ph.D. degree from The Maxwell School of Citizenship and Public Affairs at Syracuse University. She has held tenured professorships at Columbia University, the City University of New York (CUNY), and the University of Wisconsin - Madison. She served as President of Hunter College of the City University of New York from 1980 to 1987 and as Chancellor of the University of Wisconsin-Madison from 1987 to 1993.

She serves as a distinguished senior fellow in the Economic Studies Program and the Engelberg Center for Health Care Reform at the Brookings Institution.

During her tenure, UM has solidified its position among top U.S. research universities. Momentum: The Campaign for the University of Miami, one of the first billion-dollar capital campaigns completed in the United States, raised \$1.4 billion in private support for the university's endowment, academic and research programs and facilities.

In 1993 President Clinton appointed her U.S. Secretary of Health and Human Services (HHS) where she served for eight years, becoming the longest serving HHS Secretary in U.S. history. At the beginning of her tenure, HHS had a budget of nearly \$600 billion, which included a wide variety of programs including Social Security, Medicare, Medicaid, Child Care and Head Start, Welfare, the Public Health Service, the National Institutes of Health (NIH), the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention (CDC), and the Food and Drug Administration (FDA). At the end of her tenure as HHS Secretary, The Washington Post described her as "one of the most successful government managers of modern times."

She served in the Carter administration from 1977-80 as Assistant Secretary for Policy Development and Research at the U.S. Department of Housing and Urban Development.

In 2007, President George W. Bush handpicked Shalala to co-chair with Senator Bob Dole the Commission on Care for Returning Wounded Warriors, to evaluate how wounded service members transition from active duty to civilian society. In 2009 she was appointed chair of the Committee on the Future of Nursing at the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.

President Shalala has more than four dozen honorary degrees and a host of other honors, including the 1992 National Public Service Award, the 1994 Glamour magazine Woman of the Year Award; in 1992, Business Week named her one of the top five managers in higher education; in 2005, she was named one of "America's Best Leaders" by U.S. News & World Report; in 2008, President Bush presented her with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award; and in 2010 she

received the Nelson Mandela Award for Health and Human Rights, which recognizes individuals for outstanding dedication to improving the health and life chances of disadvantaged populations in South Africa and internationally. In 2011, she was inducted into the National Women's Hall of Fame in Seneca Falls, New York.

She has been elected to the Council on Foreign Relations; National Academy of Education; the National Academy of Public Administration; the American Academy of Arts and Sciences; the American Philosophical Society; the National Academy of Social Insurance; the American Academy of Political and Social Science; and the Institute of Medicine of the National Academy of Sciences.



#### DR. MARVIN DAWKINS

FACULTY ATHLETICS REPRESENTATIVE EDWARD WATERS COLLEGE, 1970

Dr. Marvin Dawkins, a distinguished professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Miami, is in his second year as the Faculty Athletics Representative. He was named to the post in April 2012, replacing Clyde McCoy after his 17 years of service in that role.

In his FAR post, Dawkins is responsible for ensuring the academic integrity of students participating in University athletic programs and helping to oversee institutional control of the Department of Athletics. The Faculty Athletics Representative serves as a liaison between the University and the athletic department. This individual is the University's voting delegate to the ACC and represents UM with the NCAA and ACC.

Dawkins received his doctorate from Florida State and completed his postdoctoral research fellowships at Howard University and The Johns Hopkins University. He previously served on the faculties of the University of Maryland, Old Dominion University and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside.

His research focuses on issues of race and social equity in such areas as education, career aspirations and mobility, substance abuse prevention, and sports. He has published widely in these areas, including his most recent article titled "Race and Pathways to Power in the National Football League" (with Jomills H. Braddock and Erica Smith), which appears in *American Behavioral Scientist* (2012). His research on golf includes book chapters, scholarly articles, and the book *African American Golfers During the Jim Crow Era* (Praeger 2000), coauthored with Graham C. Kinloch. Dawkins was recently appointed to the United States Golf Association Museum Committee and is currently completing a study on the media treatment of black golfers from the Jim Crow era to the present.

#### DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS



**BLAKE JAMES** 

**DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS** MINNESOTA STATE-MANKATO, 1992

Blake James was named the University of Miami's Director of Athletics on Feb. 8, 2013.

Prior to serving as Interim AD role for just over four months (beginning in October 2012), James served as Miami's Senior Associate AD for Development and Ticket Operations. James oversaw the day-to-day operations of development, ticket sales and ticket operations. He was also a member of the Hurricanes' senior staff and provided sport supervision.

Since becoming Athletic Director, Hurricanes' athletics facilities have undergone much-needed upgrades. He oversaw the opening of the Schwartz Center for Athletic Excellence, which houses the DiMare Gallery of Champions, full-service academic area, offices, computer lab and the Dwayne "The Rock" Johnson Football Locker Room. Other upgrades include: a new FieldTurf practice field for football via the Football Victory Fund, a new \$1 million state-of-the-art center-hung scoreboard at BankUnited Center, and a new playing surface at Cobb Stadium for both the soccer and track programs.

Under James' watch, Hurricanes student-athletes have also excelled in the classroom. In the 2014 NCAA APR report, every Miami program registered an APR score of at least 960, with nine teams scoring 990 or better out of a possible 1,000 points. Additionally, Miami's 2013 Graduation Success Rate (GSR) was 92 percent, which ranked 10th overall among FBS programs, and Miami has exceeded the NCAA average GSR in each of the last nine years.

Away from the Coral Gables campus, UM student-athletes have steadily increased their role in the surrounding South Florida community. Every year, Hurricanes student-athletes register thousands of hours of community service, including trips to elementary schools, donor drives, hospital visits, and other various community outreach programs. In June 2014, James and Miami's external staff created the #RENEWED Bus, giving Miami staff and student-athletes a chance to personally thank football season-ticket holders.

James came to UM after spending seven years the University of Maine, where he first served as Senior Associate Athletic Director before serving as Director of Athletics from July 2005 to September 2010. Black Bears Athletics experienced tremendous success under his watch, including three trips to the Frozen Four for the men's ice hockey program and NCAA playoff berths for football, baseball (two), women's basketball and softball.

James is no stranger to South Florida, beginning his athletic career with the University of Miami, working in ticket sales, corporate sales and athletic development. In April 1995, he was hired as Miami's Director of Ticket Sales, serving in that capacity until October 1997, when he was named an athletic development officer at the University of Nebraska. He returned to Miami in 1998 as the Director of Major Gifts and Corporate Sales. He was promoted to the Director of Athletic Development at Miami in March 2000 before moving on to Providence in 2002.

He graduated from Minnesota State University - Mankato with a bachelor's degree in marketing in 1992 and later received his master's degree from St. Thomas University in 1994.

He and his wife, Kelly, have two children: daughter, Haley, and son, Ryan.





### **AL GOLDEN**

Head Coach, Fourth Season Penn State, 1991

Al Golden, the University of Miami's 22nd head football coach, is in his fourth season at the helm of the Hurricanes' program. Under his leadership, the 44-year old Golden laid a foundation and process to return the storied program to prominence. Golden led the Hurricanes to a 9-4 record in 2013 and a berth in the Russell Athletic Bowl in Orlando - Miami's first bowl appearance since 2010.

Led by first-team selections Duke Johnson, Shane McDermott and Denzel Perryman, the Hurricanes placed 12 players on All-ACC teams in 2014, while true freshman quarterback Brad Kaaya hauled in ACC Rookie of the Year honors.

The 2013 season began with a 7-0 start, including a win over No. 12 Florida as the Hurricanes jumped as high as No. 7 in the BCS rankings. Miami was led by nine All-ACC selections, including first-team LB Denzel Perryman and P Pat O'Donnell, who set the school single-season record for punting average. Miami is 11-4 in its last 15 games under Golden after the Hurricanes started 11-11 through the first 22 games.

Prior to Miami's bowl game in Orlando, Golden was the recipient of the 2013 Lombardi Award for Excellence in Coaching at the 44th Rotary Lombardi Award Ceremony.

In his second season at the helm, Golden led the Hurricanes, which were picked to finish fifth in the ACC Coastal Division, to a 7-5 record and a 5-3 league mark, earning a share of the 2012 ACC Coastal Division title. The 2012 season was highlighted by the rise of junior QB Stephen Morris, who threw for a career-best 3,345 passing yards and racked up a school-record 3,415 yards of total offense. Freshman Duke Johnson became Miami's first All-American since 2005 when he earned second-team All-America honors as a kick returner by the Walter Camp Football Foundation and FWAA Freshman All-America honors. Johnson rushed for a UM freshman-record 947 yards and amassed 2,060 all-purpose yards in his rookie season.

The Golden Era. Golden's brand of football—tough, smart and disciplined—was accepted and strides were made in that direction. From 2010 to 2011, the Canes improved 19-plus spots among the nation's FBS schools in turnover margin (+19), fewest penalties per game (+63) and fewest yards penalized per game (+85).

Golden oversaw an offense that was one of the most efficient in the country and produced lauded 2011 seasons for quarterback Jacory Harris, wide receiver Tommy Streeter and running back Lamar Miller. His persuasion on the defense was evident, as the Canes held several toprated offenses to 20-plus points below their season averages. The Miami defense finished the season ranked No. 21 in the nation in scoring defense and tied for ninth in red zone defense.

With a commitment to community service, Golden instituted the Be the Match-Bone Marrow drive at Miami. Members of the football staff and team took an active part in registering members of the UM and South Florida communities for the national organization.

Golden arrived in Coral Gables after spending five seasons (2006-2010) as the head coach at Temple University. Over five seasons at Temple, Golden took the Owls to unprecedented heights. Before his arrival, TU had just two winning seasons over its previous 26 years and had only won 22 percent of its games over the previous 30 years.

In 2010, Golden led the Owls to an 8-4 overall record, 5-3 in Mid-American Conference (MAC) games and saw eight players named to the All-MAC first team. The 2009 season saw the Owls reach unparalleled success. Golden guided the Owls to new heights, finishing the season at 9-4 overall and tying for first place in the MAC East Division with a 7-1 mark. Temple recorded its first winning season since 1990 and made its first bowl appearance in 30 years. The Owls' bowl game was just the third in 111 years of Temple football. The MAC East championship was the Owls' best conference finish since joining the league in 2003. TU won a single-season record nine consecutive games.

The Colts Neck, N.J., native was named the Owls' 24th head football

coach on December 6, 2005, after spending the prior five seasons as defensive coordinator at the University of Virginia.

Named the 2009 MAC Coach of the Year and the Maxwell Club's Tri-State Coach of the Year, Golden also saw an unprecedented 15 Owls earn All-MAC honors, including a school record eight first-team All-MAC honorees. All-American Bernard Pierce was named the MAC Freshman of the Year, while sophomore Adrian Robinson garnered MAC Defensive Player of the Year accolades.

The Owls also received recognition for their community service efforts. In 2009, the Temple team was awarded the Robert P. Levy Community Service Award, presented by the Philadelphia Sports Congress, and the Athletic Department's inaugural T.E.A.M. [Temple's Exceptional Acts for Mankind] Award for community service.

Off the field, Golden has mentored the Owls through the greatest academic turnaround in the NCAA APR Reform Era. In his third season, Golden guided the Owls to a 5-7 mark, the team's most wins most since 1990, and a second-place finish in the MAC East. Facing five opponents that went on to postseason play, the Owls persevered to new heights, despite losing three games on the very last play of the game.

In 2008, Golden saw five Owls earn All-MAC honors, including senior DT Terrance Knighton, Temple's then-only first-team selection. Temple showed significant improvement on special teams, leading the nation in kickoff returns. The Owls out-scored their opponents for the season for the first time since 1990. During his second season in 2007, Golden once again played the nation's most true freshmen (20) and started the nation's most true freshmen (12). He led the Owls to a 4-8 overall record and a 4-4 mark during their inaugural season in the Mid-American Conference.

Along the way, TU won three consecutive games. The fourth win tied Temple's mark for the most conference wins since 1967. Led by All-MAC players DT Andre Neblett and DB Dominique Harris, the Cherry & White defense led the MAC in total defense, red zone defense, and pass defense. The Owls' red zone defense ranked first nationally.

In his first campaign in Owl Country, Golden played 22 true freshmen, the most in the nation, against the third most difficult schedule in the country. Only national champion Florida (10) and Stanford (9) played more bowl participants during the regular season than the Owls, who competed against eight teams that earned postseason berths. Thirty-eight players saw their first major college football action under Golden in 2006, including 27 freshmen.


Golden captured his first victory at the helm when the Owls defeated Bowling Green, 28-14, at Lincoln Financial Field on Oct. 28, 2006. The win was the largest accomplishment for the Owls on the field, but a multitude of goals were achieved off the field during Golden's initial campaign. Temple unveiled the most comprehensive academic support team in the Mid-American Conference and teamed with Adidas as the team's official outfitter. The program was also successful in assembling a regional, nonconference schedule for years to come.

Recruiting has also been a tremendous success under Golden's leadership. His initial signing class in 2006 was rated best in the MAC by CollegeFootballNews.com, while the 2007 and 2008 classes earned top honors in the league from Scout.com.

With a commitment to community service and academics at the core of Golden's program, a multitude of individual honors were bestowed upon the Owls in 2006. Seven student-athletes were named to the 2006 Philadelphia Inquirer Academic All-Area Football team, providing Temple the most honorees of the 10 Delaware Valley institutions that sponsor football. Three players were named to the 2006 Eastern College Athletic Conference Division I-A Football All-Star Team, marking the most for the Owls on the ECAC squad since a trio also earned recognition in 1997

In addition, three football student-athletes were named honorable mention freshman All-Americans by The Sporting News. It signaled the largest number of rookies to receive national recognition in program history.

Golden was named the youngest defensive coordinator in Division I-A by Virginia head coach Al Groh in January 2001, after spending the previous season at his alma mater, serving as linebackers coach and recruiting coordinator under Joe Paterno. From 2001 to 2004, the Cavaliers' defense improved under his tutelage, ranking 108th in total defense in his first year to ranking 18th in total defense in 2004. In the same time period, Virginia's scoring defense went from 74th in the nation (27.6 ppg) to 17th (17.7 ppg) utilizing Golden's 3-4 scheme.



During his first two seasons at Virginia, Golden helped develop twotime All-ACC linebacker Angelo Crowell, who currently plays with the Buffalo Bills, and 2003 Hula Bowl participant Merrill Robertson. Following the 2001 season, Golden was an assistant coach for the Gray team in the 64th Annual Blue-Gray All-Star Football Classic.

ranked recruit to ever attend U.Va. Golden signed the Virginia High

School Player of the Year in both 2002 (Brooks) and 2004 (Olu Hall).

Golden began his coaching career in 1993 as offensive coordinator at Red Bank (N.J.) Catholic High School. He then served as a graduate assistant under George Welsh at Virginia from 1994 to 1996, where he worked primarily with the linebackers and the kickoff and punting teams. He helped develop All- ACC linebackers James Farrior and Jamie Sharper, both of whom were chosen in the 1997 NFL draft. Farrior was a first-round pick (#8) by the New York Jets, while Sharper was a second-round selection (#34) by the Baltimore Ravens. Golden then coached the linebackers at Boston College from 1997 to 1999 under Tom O'Brien. While at BC, Golden coached All-Big East and NFL linebackers Frank Chamberlin (Tennessee Titans) and Erik Storz (Jacksonville Jaguars). The Eagles finished the 1999 regular season with an 8-3 record and a top-25 national ranking, while making their first postseason bowl appearance since 1994.

Golden was a three-year (1989-91) letterwinner and two-year starter at tight end for Penn State, where he received the 1991 Ridge Riley Award, given annually to a player who displays excellence in scholarship, sportsmanship, friendship and leadership. As a junior in 1990, Golden played a key role in Penn State's nationally televised 24-21 upset of No. 1-ranked Notre Dame at South Bend.

His touchdown reception late in the fourth quarter tied the score at 21 as Penn State rallied from a 21-7 deficit. Golden captained the Nittany Lions his senior year and helped lead them to a 42-17 win over Tennessee in the 1992 Fiesta Bowl. Following that victory, Penn State finished with an 11-2 record and ranked third in the nation in the final 1991 AP poll.

After his tenure as a player in State College, Golden spent one season in the NFL with the New England Patriots.

Golden earned his undergraduate degree in pre-law from Penn State in 1991 before receiving his master's in sports psychology from Virginia in December, 1996.

A 2004 inductee of the Jersey Shore Sports Hall of Fame, he is married to the former Kelly Hanna of Lock Haven, Pa. The couple has three children--son A.J. (7), and daughters Addison (6) and Grace (3).





Mark D'Onofrio is in his fourth season as Miami's defensive coordinator. In 2013, he guided a defense that has tallied 29 sacks, more than doubling the Canes' 2012 production (14 sacks) and forced 27 turnovers, including 18 interceptions. Also in 2013, LB Denzel Perryman earned first-team All-ACC status and was a Dick Butkus Award semifinalist

In his first season at Miami, D'Onofrio's defense finished the season ranked ninth in the nation in red zone defense and 21st in scoring defense, holding opponents to an average of 20.08 points per game. The defense, under D'Onofrio's guidance, finished strong and proved stingy, giving up an average of only 13.5 points in the last five games of the season.

Prior to the 2011 season, D'Onofrio saw two of his Temple standouts drafted, now are active on NFL rosters. Defensive end Muhammad Wilkerson was taken in the first round by the New York Jets and free safety Jaiqwaun Jarrett went in the second round to the Philadelphia Eagles. In all, three Owls were drafted during D'Onofrio's tenure and five former players are active in the NFL.

# **OFFENSIVE COORDINATOR / QUARTERBACKS** FLORIDA STATE, 1997

James Coley is in his second season as offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach for the Hurricanes.

In his first season, the Hurricanes averaged 425.8 yards of total offense and 33.8 points. Stephen Morris posted his second consecutive 3,000-yard passing season and Allen Hurns set the school single-season receiving mark (1,162). His offense produced four All-ACC performers, including Hurns, Morris, senior OL Brandon Linder and sophomore RB Duke Johnson.

Coley spent five seasons in Tallahassee on Jimbo Fisher's staff - all five as tight ends coach and the last three as the offensive coordinator. As the recruiting coordinator at Florida State in 2008 and 2009, he was instrumental in the Seminoles landing back-to-back Top 10 signing classes and was also named the ACC's top recruiter in 2010 by ESPN.com.

Prior to Florida State, Coley spent one season in his hometown of Miami as the offensive coordinator and quarterbacks coach at FIU. He completely overhauled the Golden Panthers offense and established new standards for rushing yardage, as the unit doubled its production over the second half of the season.

Jethro Franklin is in his fourth season as the University of Miami's defensive line coach. Prior to arriving in Coral Gables, Franklin spent 20 years coaching defensive lines at the NFL and collegiate levels. The St. Lazaire, France, native has mentored some of the top defensive linemen in the NFL, including former Cane Russell Maryland. Franklin has also coached Packers' standouts Gilbert Brown and Santana Dotson and Pro Bowlers Mario Williams, Vonnie Holliday, Kabeer-Gbaja-Biamila and Maryland.

In 2011, Franklin's line helped the Canes to a No. 9 national ranking in red zone defense and 21st in scoring defense, holding opponents to an average of 20.08 points per game in his first season at Miami. Senior Marcus Robinson and freshman Anthony Chickillo combined for 10 sacks for a loss of 47 yards. Franklin's former standout lineman at Temple, Muhammad Wilkerson, was taken in the first round of the 2011 NFL Draft by the New York Jets.

Prior to joining the Hurricanes' staff, Franklin spent one season at Temple on Al Golden's staff as the line coach.

During his career, Carroll has tutored four NFL talents in Anthony McCoy (Seattle Seahawks), Fred Davis (Washington Redskins), Dominique Byrd (Washington Redskins) and Jordan Cameron (Cleveland Browns).

While at USC, the 33-year old, coached the tight ends. He took on the additional duty of recruiting coordinator beginning in 2007.

Tim "Ice" Harris is in his first season on the Miami Hurricanes coaching staff as running backs coach.

Harris was named Assistant Director of Football Operations on Al Golden's staff on March 3, 2014, where he served as the primary liaison with high school coaches. He also assisted in coordinating community service events for current student-athletes.

Harris has more than 24 years of high school coaching experience and returns to Miami after a second successful stint as the head coach of Booker T. Washington (2003-07, 2011-13), where he compiled a 99-10 record in eight seasons. He was named Florida Dairy Farm Florida Coach of the Year in 2012 and 2013 after guiding Booker T. Washington to back-to-back Class 4A state championships. Booker T. Washington finished No. 1 in the final MaxPreps national football rankings.

A native of Miami, Harris played three years as a defensive back at Carthage College in Kenosha, Wisconsin.

Art Kehoe is in his fourth season as the offensive line coach on Al Golden's staff and his 30th year overall as a Miami Hurricane. Kehoe, an integral part of the U Football legacy, has coached some of the best offensive linemen to ever play the game.

His 2013 offensive line paved the way for four All-ACC selections.

In his first season back at Miami since 2005, Kehoe coached a 2011 line that helped UM to one of its most efficient offensive seasons in memory. The line blocked for the likes of Lamar Miller (1,272 rushing yards) and protected quarterback Jacory Harris (2,486 passing yards) en route to a national ranking of No. 3 in offensive efficiency, according to Footballoutsiders.com.

Kehoe's tenure of 28 years at Miami, a span during which he has either played or coached for six head football coaches, ranks among the longest of any UM athletics figure.

Florida native Larry Scott was named the Miami Hurricanes tight ends coach on Feb. 25,

Scott, a native of Sebring, Fla., had spent the previous eight seasons at USF, beginning in 2005 as the director of high school relations. In 2006, he moved to a graduate assistant role before coaching tight ends in 2007-08 and again in 2010-11. Between tight end coaching stints, he coached the offensive line in 2009. Last season, he coached the running backs and became an offensive assistant in 2013.

During his second stint as the Bulls' TE coach, Scott and his group helped USF to its fifthstraight eight-win season, making it one of only 15 programs nationally and one of just 10 in BCS leagues to accomplish the feat.

Scott's biggest impact on USF came in recruiting within Miami-Dade and Broward counties. USF's 2008 class was considered to be among the best in program history until the Bulls' 2009 class was ranked No. 21 nationally.

Paul Williams, who has 18 seasons of collegiate coaching experience, is in his fourth year as the University of Miami's defensive backs coach. Williams' unit has helped the Canes amassed 18 interceptions on defense - the ninth-most in the nation in 2013.

In his first year at Miami, the Canes were the 21st-rated scoring defense in the nation, holding opponents to an average of 20.08 points per game.

Prior to arriving in Coral Gables, Williams spent five seasons as defensive backs coach at Temple University under Al Golden.

Williams' defensive backs helped lead Temple to a successful 2010 campaign, finishing 8-4 and 5-3 in the Mid-American Conference. Standout defensive back Jaiquawn Jarrett garnered All-MAC first-team honors for the second year in a row, headlining a group of four defensive players earning all-conference accolades. Jarrett was a second-round NFL draft pick by the Philadelphia Eagles.

Hurlie Brown is in his second season as the Miami Hurricanes' running backs coach, ascending to the post on Feb. 10, 2013. Under his watch in 2013, sophomore Duke Johnson rushed for 920 yards, while sophomore Dallas Crawford rushed for 12 touchdowns.

Brown spent the previous two seasons as a member of Golden's staff as the senior football operations coordinator and was responsible for community outreach and recruiting official visits among other administrative duties.

Prior to returning to his alma mater, Brown spent four-plus years at Louisiana-Lafayette, where he served as defensive backs/kickoff team coordinator (2007-10) and secondary coach

The Merritt Island, Fla., native was a standout safety for the Hurricanes from 1988-91. After winning two national titles under Jimmy Johnson and Dennis Erickson, he began his coaching career as a graduate assistant under Erickson for the 1992 season.



# **GAME 1 (LOUISVILLE)**

LOUISVILLE, Ky. (AP) - Brad Kaaya's first touchdown as a college quarterback served as bright spot in the Canes' opener Monday night, a 31-13 loss to Louisville.

Dominique Brown's 15-yard touchdown run in the third quarter and Gerald Christian's 10-yard TD catch late in the fourth followed capped the scoring for the Cardinals.

The victory provided a successful Atlantic Coast Conference debut for the Cardinals and to Bobby Petrino's second coaching stint at the school.

Despite the 18-point margin, Louisville showed little of the offensive efficiency expected in Petrino's return as the Cardinals outgained the Hurricanes 336-244 in a ragged game offensively for both teams. Louisville's new 3-4 defense provided the saving grace with three takeaways, including one that followed a costly fumble by Cardinals quarterback Will Gardner inside his 15.

After Louisville held Miami to a field goal following Gardner's second fumble in the third quarter, Brown's TD provided a 21-13 cushion. Christian's scoring pass from Gardner with 1:43 remaining sealed the win.

Corvin Lamb's 97-yard kickoff return for a TD just before halftime provided the go-ahead score for Louisville, which had to withstand several Miami threats from there for a win that wasn't decided until late.

Gerod Holliman's interception of Hurricanes freshman Brad Kaaya and 61-yard return to Miami's 36 as time expired punctuated Louisville's gutsy defense.

Brown finished with career bests of 33 carries for 143 yards. Gardner completed 20 of 28 passes for 206 yards with two TDs.

The atmosphere was charged from the moment Petrino led the "Cards March" into Papa John's Cardinal Stadium in late afternoon.

Several hours later the Cardinals took the field under the lights in all-black uniforms with matching chrome helmets to thunderous cheers from a record crowd of 55,428, all but a few dressed in black.

Miami featured a newcomer at QB in Kaaya and welcomed back tailback Duke Johnson from a broken ankle. Some Hurricanes players also harbored hard feelings after last year's bowl humiliation.

All that excitement appeared to be a bit much for Louisville at the start as it went three-and-out on the game's first series without gaining a yard. The Cardinals settled down on their next possession to go 93 yards in 12 plays with a nice mix of running and passing that got Louisville to Miami's 2.

Gardner finished things from there with a 2-yard TD pass to wide-open freshman Charles Standberry.

Miami recovered from jitters as well to eventually take a 10-7 lead on Kaaya's 2-yard TD pass to Clive Walford and Matt Goudis' 24-yard field goal. Louisville reclaimed the momentum on the ensuing kickoff as Lamb dashed up the middle almost untouched for a 97-yard touchdown and the 14-10 lead.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) – Duke Johnson had more than 100 close friends and relatives in the stands for his first home game since a broken ankle prematurely ended his sophomore season

They could have left at halftime.

His night was over, and so was any doubt about the outcome. Phillip Dorsett caught two touchdown passes, Johnson became the ninth back in Miami history to eclipse the 2,000-yard career rushing mark and the Hurricanes rolled past Florida A&M 41-7 Saturday night.

"It wasn't perfect," said Miami coach Al Golden, who coached his 100th game overall and evened his record at 50-50. "But I think we got better in a lot of different areas. Some other areas, we've got to continue to make progress in. We played a lot of guys, which was great, and I thought a lot of those guys played really soundly when they came in."

Johnson's mother obtained plenty of tickets for everyone in her group, and was at the stadium five hours before kickoff to lay out a massive tailgate party for what she dubbed the "Return of the Duke."

Her son needed only nine carries to pick up 97 yards.

"I think it meant more to my mom than it did me," Johnson said after his first home game since Oct. 26. "She got together a big crowd, a big fan base, to sit in one section for the game. I think it was more for her than me."

Dorsett had scoring grabs of 4 and 32 yards from Brad Kaaya for the Hurricanes (1-1), who beat the Rattlers for the ninth straight time. Johnson had a 1-yard scoring run, Gus Johnson ran 15 yards for another score and Trayone Gray's first career carry was a 10-yard TD rush late in the fourth quarter.

Kaaya completed 12 of 22 passes for 177 yards in the first home game of his Hurricanes career, with the two touchdowns and two interceptions. Miami's Trayone Gray had a 10-yard touchdown run, on the first carry of his career, with 4:17 left.

"I'm not a big stats guy," Kaaya said. "I'm just a big wins guy. That's all I care about is wins."

Florida A&M (0-2) brought its famed band down from Tallahassee, and the "Marching 100," as expected, put on a scintillating show at halftime, replete with the performers lining up in a "305" formation, a nod to the primary area code in the Miami area.

By then, though, the game was decided.

The Hurricanes got touchdowns on four of their first six possessions, rolling out to a 28-0 lead late in the first half. There were 27 plays in the first quarter, with the line of scrimmage on every one, regardless of who had the ball, being in Florida A&M territory. Miami opened drives on the Rattlers' 49 twice and another on their 13.

# **GAME 3 (ARKANSAS STATE)**

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) -Phillip Dorsett had a quick pregame conversation with Miami coach Al Golden, who gave the senior wide receiver an encouraging prediction.

A prophetic one, too.

Dorsett had 201 receiving yards on only four catches - the first player to do that at college football's highest level since 1997 - and hauled in two touchdown passes for the second straight week, leading Miami past Arkansas State 41-20 on Saturday.

"I told him before the game I thought he was going to have a big one," Golden said. "Obviously, no one could have seen that big. But that's the way he's practicing right now, so good for him."

Good for Miami, too. The Hurricanes hadn't had a pass completion of more than 39 yards in the season's first two games. They needed two plays Saturday to change that.

Dorsett hauled in a 63-yard pass from Brad Kaaya on Miami's second snap, and the Hurricanes were off and running. A true freshman in just his third career game, Kaaya completed 16 of 24 passes for 342 yards and four touchdowns, the other two of those going to Clive Walford and Braxton Berrios as the Hurricanes rolled up 488 yards of offense.

"This is a very big confidence boost for Brad," running back Duke Johnson said. "Brad's first two games were kind of shaky. As a freshman, it's going to come with the territory, especially a freshman coming in and starting with a team like this."

Johnson had 14 carries for 90 yards and a touchdown, and Gus Edwards added another rushing score for Miami (2-1).

Fredi Knighten threw for 217 yards, ran for a touchdown and caught a scoring pass for Arkansas State (1-2). Johnston White had a rushing touchdown with 9:59 remaining for the Red Wolves.

"We played as a group. We just gave up too many big plays," Arkansas State coach Blake Anderson said. "Didn't execute when we needed to. ... We made them make tight throws and catches and they did it. Kaaya threw the ball well and Dorsett caught it. We really executed our coverages."

Dorsett's other catches went for 51, 24 and 63 yards again for another score in the third quarter. He finished with the thirdhighest receiving yard total in Miami history, topped by only Eddie Brown's 220 yards against Boston College on Nov. 23, 1984 - the game where Doug Flutie's pass to Gerard Phelan won it as time expired - and Wesley Carroll's 208 yards at California on Sept. 15, 1990.

"I'm not really a guy that looks at the Jumbotron a lot," Dorsett said. "I'm worried about the game."

Miami had touchdowns on its first three drives, including a 33-yard run from Johnson. The Hurricanes are now 13-0 all-time when Johnson rushes for at least one score.

Edwards rumbled 27 yards to make it 27-7 late in the half, before Knighten caught a 19-yard pass from receiver Tres Houston to get the Red Wolves within 13 at halftime.



# **GAME 4 (NEBRASKA)**

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - Brad Kaaya's 359 passing yards were not enough for the Canes Saturday night, who fell on the road to Nebraska 41-31. Duke Johnson added 93 rushing yards and 84 receiving yards, a new career high.

Ameer Abdullah ran 35 times for Nebraska, accumulating 229 yards.

The Cornhuskers (4-0) will start Big Ten play next week off a performance that drew a Memorial Stadium record crowd of 91,585 that came to see a meeting of programs that combined for eight national titles from 1983 to 2001.

Tommy Armstrong Jr. passed for 113 yards and two touchdowns and ran 13 times for 96 for Nebraska.

After Armstrong was intercepted in the third quarter, giving Miami a chance to tie or take the lead, cornerback Josh Mitchell ran back Johnson's fumble 57 yards for a touchdown to put Nebraska up 31-21.

The Hurricanes came in allowing 2 yards per rushing attempt, but they hadn't faced a back nearly the caliber of Abdullah. He worked in harmony with Armstrong on tough-to-stop zone-read runs and even took snaps out of the wildcat formation a couple times while strengthening his Heisman Trophy candidacy.

Abdullah ran 35 times and also broke 1972 Heisman Trophy winner Johnny Rodgers' school record for all-purpose yardage. His 313 all-purpose yards were the second-most in a game for Nebraska, and it raised his career total to 5,762. Rodgers had 5,586.

Miami and Nebraska played for the first time since the Hurricanes' clinched their fifth, and most recent, national title in the 2002 Rose Bowl.



# **GAME 5 (DUKE)**

**MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) –** Fourth down, 19 yards to go, a rainstorm pouring down and Miami quarterback Brad Kaaya knew he was about to get clobbered from his blind side.

No problem.

He stepped up, Miami's maligned defense did the same just about every time it was asked to, and the Hurricanes put together a much-needed win.

Duke Johnson continued his climb up Miami's career lists with 155 yards and a touchdown, Kaaya added two more scoring passes to his true-freshman resume - including a perfect 28-yard TD toss to Herb Waters on that fourth down conversion - and the Hurricanes beat reigning Atlantic Coast Conference Coastal Division champion Duke 22-10 on Saturday night.

The Hurricanes' defense - shredded by Duke last year, and shredded by Nebraska last week - held the Blue Devils to 264 yards.

"They grew up a lot today," Golden said.

Kaaya keeps growing up more and more every week, it seems. He completed 20 of 34 passess for 223 yards and didn't throw any interceptions for Miami (3-2, 1-1 Atlantic Coast Conference), which won for the 11th time in its last 12 home games. And Johnson became the third Miami player to reach 4,000 all-purpose yards, plus passed Graig Cooper for the No. 5 spot on the Hurricanes' all-time rushing list.

"The win is more important," Johnson said.

Shaquille Powell ran for 58 yards and a touchdown for Duke (4-1, 0-1). The Blue Devils saw their school-record-tying 12-game regular season winning streak snapped, and quarterback Anthony Boone lost for the first time in 15 career starts outside of postseason play.

"Offensively, it was a tough day," Duke coach David Cutcliffe said. "To Miami's credit they won a lot of the battles. I'm proud of our people for continuing to battle. We fought hard on a day that one of the better parts of our team traditionally was struggling, we had a chance to win in the fourth quarter. We had a few unfortunate plays defensively. Otherwise they played about as well as they could against a team with as many weapons as they have."

Cutcliffe called this game the biggest test Duke had faced this season, which was obvious - the Blue Devils had four blowouts to tune up for league play. But what worked last season against Miami fell way short this time around; Duke was held 279 yards below what it managed last season against the Hurricanes, and was being outgained 173-17 after the first quarter.

Duke was 2 for 16 on third downs, plus 0 for 3 on fourth downs. Boone completed 22 of 51 passes for 179 yards, with two interceptions.

"Their defense made a lot of plays," Boone said. "They were physical. They made more plays on defense than we made on offense."

# **GAME 6 (GEORGIA TECH)**

ATLANTA (AP)- Deon Hill ran 8 yards for a decisive touchdown on fourth down, Zach Laskey rushed a career-high 29 times for 133 yards and Georgia Tech stayed unbeaten with a 28-17 victory over Miami on Saturday night.

It marked the first time in six years that the Yellow Jackets beat Miami, and a couple thousand students rushed the Bobby Dodd Stadium field after the final buzzer to celebrate with players and the marching band.

Justin Thomas was held in check statistically but was instrumental in running the spread option offense effectively, helping the Yellow Jackets (5-0, 2-0 Atlantic Conference) earn a nearly 21-minute advantage in time of possession.

Duke Johnson had 100 yards rushing on 14 carries for the Hurricanes (3-3, 1-2 ACC), but freshman quarterback Brad Kaaya couldn't overcome an interception that safety Isaiah Johnson jumped to pick off at the Georgia Tech 10-yard line late in the second quarter.

Thomas, who surprisingly led the nation coming into the game by averaging over 19 yards per completion in coach Paul Johnson's run-first attack, was just 3-of-6 passing for 23 yards entering the fourth.

But following the long timeout before the final quarter, Johnson called for Thomas to hit Tony Zenon on a deep crossing route to convert a long third down. The pass covered 30 yards and set up Hill's TD run on fourth-and-two from the 8.

Kaaya was sacked by linebacker Paul Davis on Miami's next possession, forcing the Hurricanes to punt and give the ball back to clock-consuming Jackets.

Johnson averaged 8.2 yards on 10 carries in the first half, but Georgia Tech's offense did its best to keep the ball out of his hands.

The Jackets had 10-minute advantage in time of possession before eating up nearly the first 7 minutes of the third quarter with a 13-play, 75-yard possession that put Georgia Tech up 21-14 on B.J. Bostic's 2-yard TD run.

Miami caught a break on second down when receiver D'Mauri Jones appeared to lose a fumble at the Jackets' 5, but the call was not overturned, and the Hurricanes cut the lead to four on Michael Badgley's 27-yard field goal.

Miami took a 7-0 lead on the game's opening drive when Braxton Berrios ran a 21-yard corner route past Demond Smith for an uncontested catch in the right side of the end zone.

After Georgia Tech forced a 7-all tie on Thomas' 1-yard run, the Hurricanes went up 14-7 on their third drive when Johnson ran through the left side of the field for a 24-yard touchdown.

The Jackets made it 14-all on the first possession of the second quarter on Zenon's 6-yard run.

# **GAME 7 (CINCINNATI)**

MIAMI GARDENS, FLA. (AP) – It was a banner day for Carter Hucks.

That's what mattered to the Miami Hurricanes.

Duke Johnson became Miami's career leader in all-purpose yards, Brad Kaaya threw three touchdown passes plus ran for another, and the Hurricanes piled up 621 yards on the way to defeating Cincinnati 55-34 on Saturday.

Johnson gave the game ball afterward to Hucks, an 8-year-old who suffers from a rare blood disorder called fanconi anemia and spent most of the week around the Hurricanes. So on a day where a banner flew pregame calling for Miami coach Al Golden's firing, and another was unfurled during the game urging the ouster of defensive coordinator Mark D'Onofrio, the players had plenty of perspective.

"He uplifted us," said Phillip Dorsett, who caught three passes for 143 yards, two of those grabs going for Miami touchdowns. "He helped us attack this game the way we did."

And they did attack, with five touchdown plays of 25 yards or more, one of them an interception return by Tyriq McCord.

Johnson finished with 162 rushing yards on only 10 carries and Joe Yearby added 113 on eight carries for Miami (4-3), giving the Hurricanes two 100-yard runners in the same game for the first time since 2003. Gus Edwards added 85 yards on the ground, including had a 40-yard touchdown run with 9:02 remaining.

"I thought all three phases played well and played hard," Golden said.

Playing with bruised ribs, Gunner Kiel completed 31 of 57 passes for 355 yards and three touchdowns for the Bearcats (2-3), but was also intercepted three times. Carter Jacobs had a 27-yard fumble return for a late score for Cincinnati, which got three touchdowns in the first 11 minutes of the fourth quarter.

"What you saw is what we've been doing the last five weeks," Cincinnati coach Tommy Tuberville said. "Can't tackle anybody, keep giving up big plays. We looked like the Bad News Bears."

Miami got points on nine of its first 13 possessions.

Johnson had a career-long 80-yard run for a score in the first quarter for Miami. He now has 4,427 all-purpose yards, passing Santana Moss' mark of 4,394 and doing so in 14 fewer games.

Kaaya finished 17 of 24 for 286 yards, with a 79-yard scoring pass to Dorsett helping blow the game open in the third quarter. McCord made a juggling grab of an interception - the ball bounced off a receiver, then his own knee before he was able to haul it in, reverse field and find the end zone - to push Miami's lead to 31-10 early in the quarter.

Dorsett's score later in the third was his 16th catch of the year, raising his average per grab to a gaudy 34.3 yards. He also had a 28-yard touchdown catch in the second quarter, helping Miami grab a 24-10 lead at the half.

"I'm never satisfied," Kaaya said. "But it was a good day overall for the offense."

# **GAME 8 (VIRGINIA TECH)**

BLACKSBURG, Va. (AP) - Virginia Tech didn't face Duke Johnson when it played Miami last season.

The Hokies would be happy to never see him again, either. Johnson ran for 249 yards and scored two touchdowns, and Miami raced to a 24-0 halftime lead, then took the ball away on the Hokies' first three possessions after halftime to prevent a comeback in a 30-6 victory Thursday night.

"I thought that was one of the better running backs, maybe the best that we've ever tried to tackle," Hokies coach Frank Beamer said about Johnson, who had 29 times. Beamer later called Johnson the best back he's seen in "forever."

The Hurricanes (5-3, 2-2 Atlantic Coast Conference) outgained Virginia Tech 255-36 in the first half in taking the 24-0 lead, then stymied the Hokies' hopes of coming back by forcing fumbles on three consecutive drives. The first takeaway came after an impressive march to Miami's 1 as Deon Bush stripped Marshawn Williams and made the recovery, too.

Miami's victory came after a 55-34 romp against Cincinnati in its last game, and came as Johnson topped the 100-yard mark for the fourth game in a row. The two might go hand in hand, center Shane McDermott said.

"We executed when we needed to execute, and we have Duke Johnson in the backfield," he said. "When he shines like that, it makes us look very good."

Virginia Tech (4-4, 1-3) lost for the second week in a row and for the fourth time in its last five Thursday night appearances. Its continuing offensive struggles drew boos before halftime and the fumbling sent fans heading for the exits.

The first fumble was especially big because the crowd was energized by Deon Newsome's 58-yard kickoff return to start the half, and a crisp drive that featured Williams' running and a fast-paced attack that followed a 36-yard first half.

The Hokies also almost had their 250-game scoring streak that dated to 1995 come to an end, but backup quarterback Mark Leal hit Ford for a 14-yard touchdown pass on fourth-and-10 with 1:30 left.

Johnson, who missed the Hurricanes' game against Virginia Tech last season with a broken right ankle, got the ball on Miami's first seven plays from scrimmage, and he was just warming up.

He gained 15 yards from a "Wildcat" formation on a drive to Michael Badgley's 28-yard field goal, and had a 29-yard gain on the next drive. He also caught a 15-yard pass on third-and-8 early in the drive to keep it going before Gus Edwards came in to give Johnson a rest and bulled in from 3 yards out, making it 10-0.

An exchange of punts found the Hokies starting at their 1, and after three consecutive incompletions by Michael Brewer, A.J. Hughes' short punt took a big Miami bounce, setting them up at the Hokies' 24.

Johnson ran it in on the next play, and capped the following drive with a 22-yard touchdown reception from Brad Kaaya, making it 24-0. He also had runs of 14 and 25 yards on a drive that ended in a punt.



# **GAME 9 (NORTH CAROLINA)**

**MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) –** - A year ago, North Carolina caught Miami's Duke Johnson.

Not this time.

The way Johnson is playing right now, the Tar Heels had no shot

Johnson finished with 177 rushing yards - including a 90-yard touchdown run that helped Miami blow the game open - and his assault on his school's record books continued as the Hurricanes rolled past the Tar Heels 47-20 on Saturday to keep themselves in the thick of the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coastal Division race.

"I refused to get run down again by North Carolina," said Johnson, whose 90-yard gain tied Miami's all-time record for longest rush.

He wasn't kidding. Last year, on a play where Johnson burst through the right side of the line, got to the sideline and headed for the end zone, the Tar Heels caught Miami's star in his final strides. This year, on an eerily similar-looking play, North Carolina's M.J. Stewart closed the gap and dove for Johnson around the 10-yard line.

"I made sure I got by him," Johnson said.

Brad Kaaya threw for 189 yards and three touchdowns for the Hurricanes (6-3, 3-2). Joe Yearby rushed for 104 yards and Clive Walford had two scoring grabs, becoming the first Miami tight end to do so since Greg Olsen in 2005.

Quarterback Marquise Williams had a pair of touchdown runs and Cayson Collins returned a fumble 39 yards for a score for North Carolina (4-5, 2-3).

"It was very disappointing," North Carolina coach Larry Fedora said. "I don't think we played too well up front, or anywhere."

North Carolina was outgained 494-258, the lowest yardage total for the Tar Heels since Nov. 5, 2011. In their last 36 games, the Heels had averaged 448 yards per outing.

"They did an incredible job. My hat goes off to the Hurricanes," Williams said.

It was over by halftime, with Miami up 30-6 and leading 322-57 in total yards - dominating defensive numbers against a team that had topped the 35-point mark five times in its first eight games this season.

"Obviously, we've settled in," Miami coach Al Golden said. "We've kind of settled in to who we are."

The Hurricanes paid homage to their past, putting Russell Maryland and Jerome Brown in the team's Ring of Honor and honoring Jim Kelly as the headline attraction of their homecoming weekend.

Walford had a pair of 14-yard scoring catches in a 5-minute span of the second quarter, Johnson got loose for his 90-yard score and the lead was 24 points at the break.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) – Dalvin Cook ran for two scores, including the go-ahead touchdown with 3:05 remaining and the second-ranked Seminoles (10-0, 7-0 Atlantic Coast Conference, No. 3 CFP) rallied from 16 points down to beat Miami 30-26 on Saturday night.

Jameis Winston completed 25 of 42 passes for 304 yards for the Seminoles, who clinched the ACC's Atlantic Division title earlier in the day when Clemson lost. They were down 16-0 and 23-7 before outscoring the Hurricanes 23-3 in the final 2 1/2 quarters.

Brad Kaaya threw for 316 yards and two touchdowns for Miami, which got to the Florida State 43 on their final drive but fell short when Jalen Ramsey intercepted a fourth-down pass with 39 seconds left.

Duke Johnson rushed for 130 yards and a touchdown for the Hurricanes (6-4, 3-3), who were eliminated from the ACC's Coastal race. Phillip Dorsett and Clive Walford caught scoring passes for Miami.

They all got what they came to see: another Miami-FSU classic. "That's what this game should be like," Miami coach Al Golden said. "This game should be like this every year."

Down 13 at the half, Florida State got a huge break to get the comeback rolling.

Facing a third down at the Miami 11, Winston dropped back and had his throw deflected by the Hurricanes' Tyriq McCord, whose hand sent the ball flying high into the night.

Karlos Williams caught the carom in stride, waltzed into the end zone and just like that it was a one-possession game, Miami's lead down to 23-17.

The Hurricanes rolled up 320 yards in the first half, then got just about nothing going after halftime, with two punts and a fumble on their first three possessions after returning from the locker room

Meanwhile, Florida State chipped away. Aguyao connected from 37 to get the Seminoles within three, and after Michael Badgley tacked a field goal on for Miami, Aguayo answered again with a 53-yarder.

Cook's go-ahead run came with 3:05 left, the first and only time FSU would lead all night.

Trouble signs were there early for Florida State, which punted twice in the game's first three minutes. Then again, early issues are commonplace for the Seminoles, who have faced second-quarter deficits in seven of their last eight games.

Kaaya found Dorsett with a perfect 27-yard strike that opened the scoring, Johnson got in from a yard out late in the first and Badgley's field goal on the next Hurricane possession pushed the lead to 16-0. It was Miami's biggest lead over Florida State since 2003

**CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. (AP) –** Canaan Severin made a spectacular touchdown catch and Virginia dominated after halftime and kept its bowl hopes alive for one more week, beating Miami 30-7 in its home finale on Saturday night.

Darius Jennings and Khalek Shepherd ran for touchdowns and Ian Frye kicked three field goals for the Cavaliers (5-6, 3-4 Atlantic Coast Conference), who ended a four-game losing streak and play at rival Virginia Tech next Friday night. The Cavaliers will need to snap a 10-game losing streak in the series with the Hokies to make their first bowl since 2011. The Hokies, 6-3 double overtime losers at Wake Forest on Saturday, also need to win to reach the postseason, and will come into the game protecting a 21-year streak of ending seasons in bowl games.

The loss was the second in a row for the Hurricanes (6-5, 3-4), who looked like they had a hard time putting the first one behind them. They led No. 1 Florida State until the final minutes last week and struggled against Virginia's stout defense.

Duke Johnson saw his six-game streak of at least 100 yards rushing end after gaining 88 yards in 15 carries.

Miami also had a somber moment late in the third quarter when wide receiver Herb Waters went down on a kickoff return and didn't get up. He was eventually carted off the field, but was moving his extremities.

The Cavaliers started Senior Night by introducing 34 fourthand fifth-year players, and with designs on improving embattled coach Mike London's chances of returning next season. London took Virginia to an 8-5 record and the Chick-fil-A Bowl in 2011, but they had won only 10 of 34 games the last three years.

Virginia took control late in the third quarter with a 10-play drive. It originally stalled at the 2, but Miami was called for running into the kicker on a field goal try, giving Virginia a first down. Three plays later, Jennings took a jet sweep going right and overran cornerback Artie Burns to score.

Waters was hurt on the ensuing kickoff, and Miami floundered after the lengthy delay. It lost 13 yards on the next three plays, the last a sack of Brad Kaaya by Max Valles that was very nearly a safety.

Shepherd's 17-yard punt return set the Cavaliers up at the 24, and Frye's 22-yard field goal seven plays later made it 23-7. The Cavaliers sealed it when Quin Blanding intercepted Kaaya and Shepherd scored from the 4 to make it 30-7.

Virginia led 13-7 at halftime.



A controversial pass interference penalty allowed Ohio State to tie the game. On 4th-and-goal from the 5, Glenn Sharpe batted away a pass intended for Chris Gamble. Miami began its celebration, but Sharpe was flagged. Krenzel then scored on a one-yard run.
