THE GAME

- ▶ Miami wraps up its three-game homestand Saturday when the Hurricanes host UCF in a nationally-televised game on ESPNU. The Hurricanes will return to Atlantic Coast Conference play Saturday, Oct. 18 at Duke.
- ▶ The Hurricanes are coming off a 41-39 loss to instate rival Florida State. Freshman wide receiver Travis Benjamin accounted for 274 all-purpose yards including third highest kickoff return yardage in school history - six returns for 165 yards.
- ▶ Redshirt freshman quarterback Robert Marve will make his fifth collegiate start and third at Dolphin Stadium. Marve has five touchdown tosses on the season and has completed 57.0 percent (61-of-107) of his passes for 538 yards.
- ▶ The Hurricanes are 34th nationally in overall defense (314.4 yards per game). Miami's return game has been producing field position lately. Freshman Travis Benjamin is 10th nationally in kickoff returns (29.9 yards per return) and 11th nationally in punt return yards (17.7 yds per return). UCF ranks eighth as a team nationally in kickoff returns led by defensive back Joe Burnett who is tied for 13th in the nation. The Knights are 14th nationally in punt returns (18.07 yards per return), also led by Burnett, who ranks 10th nationally.
- ▶ This will be the first ever meeting between UCF and Miami. The Hurricanes are 8-1 all-time against Conference USA teams, which includes wins over USF and Louisville before both moved to the Big Fast

THE OPPONENT

- ▶ UCF defeated SMU, 31-17, last Saturday at home to move to 2-3 overall and 1-1 in Conference USA. Back-up quarterback Michael Greco came off the bench to throw two touchdown passes and redshirt freshman running back Ronnie Weaver rushed for 123 yards and a touchdown.
- ▶ On the season, Greco has thrown for 426 yards and four touchdowns. He's been intercepted three times. Weaver is the team's leading rusher with 328 yards (3.7 yards per carry). UCF's rushing defense is 26th overall nationally led by leading tackler Jason Venson. Venson, the Knights' starting free safety has 29 tackles. The Knights have 36 tackles for loss - six coming from defensive lineman Torrell Troup and another five coming from linebacker Lawrence Young.

DID YOU KNOW?

- ▶ Of the 23 seniors on this year's squad, 13 have already earned degrees, while the remaining 10 are all on course to graduate either in December of 2008 or May of 2009.
- ▶ Last spring, the NCAA released its annual Academic Progress Report (APR) and the Hurricane football team scored a 969, the eighth-highest mark out of the 119 Bowl Sub-division football programs. Miami's score - also the third-highest mark in the 12-team Atlantic Coast Conference - put the team in the 80th-90th percentile nationally based on its performance in the classroom.
- ▶ Running back Graig Cooper (5 TDs) needs just one more touchdown this season to have recorded the most TDs in a single season since Tyrone Moss and Sinorice Moss scored 12 and six touchdowns respectively in 2005.

▶ Randy Shannon is 7-10 overall and is in his second season at Miami. UCF's George O'Leary is 24-31 overall in five seasons at UCF.

HURRICANES EXCELLING IN THE CLASS ROOM

- ▶ Miami's APR score in 2008 was a slight improvement over its mark of 966 in 2007 when the team was ranked 10th nationally in academic success.
- ▶ Of the 23 seniors on this year's squad, 13 have already earned degrees, while the remaining 10 are all on course to graduate either in December of 2008 or May of 2009.
- ▶ The 13 players that have already earned degrees include: Carlos Armour (Sports Administration), Tyrone Byrd (Liberal Arts), Glenn Cook (Marketing and Business Management, Sports Management master's candidate), Romeo Davis (Liberal Arts), Dwayne Hendricks (Business Management), Khalil Jones (Sports Administration), Joe Joseph (Sports Administration), Eric Moncur (Liberal Arts), Anthony Reddick (Liberal Arts), Chris Rutledge (Liberal Arts), Xavier Shannon (Enrollment Management master's candidate), Derron Thomas (Sports Administration) and Chris Zellner (Geography).
- ▶ Last season, Miami had 12 early graduates the second-highest total nationally behind fellow ACC member Boston College and in 2006, Miami had an ACC-high eight players named to the All-ACC Academic Football Team.

ITS ALL ABOUT THE BENJAMINS

- ▶ Freshman receiver/returner Travis Benjamin had his best game of his young career this past weekend against rival FSU, collecting an impressive 274 all-purpose yards against the Seminoles. Benjamin, who had 183 all-purpose yards through Miami's first four games (45.75 ypg), finished with 185 yards on kick returns, 71 yards receiving and 18 yards rushing in an increased role against FSU. Here are some other notes about Benjamin's success this season:
- ▶ His 274 all-purpose yards against FSU was the most by a Hurricane since Edgerrin James had 310 all-purpose yards (299 rushing, 11 receiving) against UCLA in 1998.
- ▶ He scored his first two touchdowns of his career against the Seminoles with an 18-yard rushing TD and a 51-yard receiving TD on a pass from running back Graig Cooper.
- ▶ For the season, Benjamin now leads the team with 457 all-purpose yards, just ahead of Cooper's 448 yards. Benjamin's 91.4 yards per game ranks 10th in the Atlantic Coast Conference through last weekend's games.
- ▶ Benjamin leads the ACC and ranks 10th nationally in kick return average (29.9) while ranking second in league and 11th nationally in punt return average (17.7).
- ▶ He also owns the team's longest kickoff return (57 yards) and reception (51) in addition to owning the highest single-game receiving yards total (71).

UNCOMMON SPENCE

▶ With the injury to linebacker Colin McCarthy, freshman linebacker Sean Spence is likely to take on an increased role the remainder of the season. Spence, who ranks fourth on the team with 21 tackles, has shown big play ability early in his career. His first career sack came against 2007 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow, while his first career touchdown came last weekend on a seven-yard interception return of a pass thrown by FSU's Christian Ponder.

YOUTH IS SERVED

▶ Five of Miami's top six performers in terms of all-purpose yards gained this season are either in their first or second year in the UM program. Freshman Travis Benjamin leads the team with 457 all-purpose yards, while sophomore Graig Cooper and senior Kayne Farquharson - a junior college transfer last year - rank second and third with 448 and 140 yards respectively. Another freshman - Thearon Collier - ranks fourth on the team with 134 all-purpose yards despite missing the FSU game, fellow freshman Aldarius Johnson ranks fifth with 111 yards. Senior Derron Thomas (fourth with 126 yards) is the only UM player with at least two full seasons of Division I playing experience currently ranked in the team's top five in terms of all-purpose yards gained through the season's first five contests.

COUNTING COOPER

▶ Sophomore running back Graig Cooper has a team-high five touchdowns this season (three rushing, one receiving, one punt return). With one more touchdown this season, Cooper will have scored the most touchdowns in a season at UM since 2005 when Tyrone Moss and Sinorice Moss scored 12 and six touchdowns respectively. Last season, Cooper led the team with five touchdowns, while in 2006, then-freshman Javarris James also led the 'Canes with five touchdowns.

MULTIFACETED MATT

▶ Sophomore punter/kicker Matt Bosher is one of just a handful of players nationally that handles all of his team's field goals, punts and kickoffs. Despite the difficutly of taking on so many tasks, Bosher has been one of the best specialists in the ACC the first half of the season. He ranks third in the league in overall scoring (8.6 points per game) - trailing only Sam Swank of Wake Forest among kickers - in addition to ranking third in punting (42.1), third in field goals (1.6 per game) and fourth in field goal percentage (88.9). He is also tied with Clemson's Mark Buchholz for a league-high 19 extra points and against FSU he showed even more versatility in converting a crucial fake punt with a nine-yard run on a 4th-and-4 to keep a UM drive alive late in the contest.

FORECASTING FOURTEEN

- ▶ Thirteen Hurricanes including five true freshmen have already reached the end zone through Miami's first five games. Graig Cooper (5), Kayne Farquharson (2), Travis Benjamin (2), Derron Thomas (1), Leonard Hankerson (1), Jacory Harris (1), Jason Fox (1), Shawnbrey McNeal (1), Javarris James (1), Aldarius Johnson (1), Thearon Collier (1), Sean Spence (1) and Glenn Cook (1) have all reached paydirt at least once this season. A number of players who see regular action will be looking for their first touchdown of the season on Saturday, including junior tight end Dedrick Epps, junior wide receiver Sam Shields, freshman wide receiver Laron Byrd and senior wide receiver Khalil Jones, among others.
- ▶ Each of the last two seasons, UM had only seven players with touchdowns five games in, and in both seasons only 14 players had scored a touchdown by the end of the year. In 2005, only 12 players scored touchdowns (six at the five-game mark), while in 2004, 11 players had a TD at the five-game mark with 16 eventually scoring by the end of the season.

Game Day Press Policies

Only working press will be admitted to the Dolphin Stadium press box. Seats will be issued according to the following criteria:

- 1. State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponent's area, and student newspapers from UM and opponent's schools.
- 2. Other daily newspapers, with preference to those that regularly cover UM.
- **3.** Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered reporting.
- 4. Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which regularly cover UM.
- 5. Scouts. Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status.

Non-Conference Road Game Credentials

LOCKER ROOM LEVERAGE

▶ Through Miami's first five games, the Hurricanes are out-scoring opponents 99-to-55 in the first and third quarters combined. UM's most-effective quarter is the first, where it is out-scoring opponents 49-24, for an average of 9.8-to-4.8 heading into the second quarter. The 'Canes are an even 26 for, 26 against in the second quarter before heading into the locker room at the half. When UM returns to the field for the second half however, the Hurricanes again have an edge over their opponents, out-scoring teams 51-to-31 in the third quarter.

MATURATION OF MARVE

▶ Anytime a team starts a freshman at quarterback, it will likely take some time for everyone on offense to develop a rhythm together, especially when it comes to throwing the football. Through redshirt freshman QB Robert Marve's first four games, the positives far out-weigh the negatives heading into this weekend's game against UCF. Marve, who played in his first collegiate game at No. 5 Florida, is 61-for-107 for 538 yards with five touchdowns and five interceptions this season. After attempting 18 passes at Florida, Marve's role in the offense continues to develop as he attempted 22 passes at Texas A&M, 27 passes two weeks ago against North Carolina, and a career-high 40 passes against Florida State this past weekend.

TURNING POINT

▶ After creating just three turnovers its first four games, the Hurricanes returned to their usual ways last weekend against the FSU, forcing four turnovers (two interceptions, two fumbles) against the Seminoles. FSU's Christian Ponder was picked off twice - once by senior cornerback Bruce Johnson (his first of the season) and once by freshman linebacker Sean Spence (his first career pick). A pair of FSU fumbles were also recovered by senior saftey Ryan Hill (his second recovery this year) and redshirt freshman Adewale Ojomo (his first career). In addition to those turnovers, UM caused more havoc on special teams, forcing two FSU botched punts that resulted in a safety on the first and better field position on the second.

MISSING MCCARTHY

▶ When it was determined that junior linebacker Colin McCarthy will miss the rest of the 2008 season with a shoulder injury, Miami's defense suffered a serious blow. McCarthy, who played in the season's first four games before injuring his shoulder in practice leading up to the Florida State game, leaves a big void in the in the linebacking core, and maybe just as importantly, on special teams. No UM defender has more tackles than McCarthy over the last year-and-a-half, with the Clearwater native collecting 74 last season and 17 this year in UM's first four games. In addition to his play on the defensive side of the football, McCarthy has been a key contributer on special teams, setting several crucial blocks for UM return men on punt and kickoff returns. Freshman linebacker Sean Spence, who started in his place against FSU after thriving as a second-teamer early in the season, will likely remain a starter at outside linebacker the remainder of the season.

MISSING MORE

- ▶ In addition to loss of McCarthy, the UM defense has suffered a number of injury setbacks through the season's first two months. The team has yet to start the same 11 players twice on defense, while a number of expected starters could potentially miss most, if not all of the remainder of the season. Below are some of the main setbacks the UM defense has suffered through the first five games.
- ▶ Senior defensive end Eric Moncur missed the season-opener, was limited in the next three games, and left early against Florida State.
- ▶ Senior safety Randy Phillips was injured early on in the Texas A&M contest and hasn't played since.
- ▶ Senior safety Lovon Ponder missed two games (UF, TAMU) with an injury.
- ▶ Senior linebacker Romeo Davis was inactive for the FSU game.
- ▶ Sophomore defensive end Allen Bailey missed the opener and has slowly worked his way back.
- ▶ Freshman defensive tackle Marcus Forston missed the UNC game.
- ▶ Freshman safety Vaughn Telemaque missed UM's last two games.

GATORS, HEELS AND 'NOLES

▶ The Hurricanes three losses this season have come against teams with a combined record of 12-3. Six points are the difference between Miami's current 2-3 record and a possible 4-1 start for the Hurricanes. After a 26-3 loss at No. 5 Florida, UM dropped a pair of close battles with UNC (28-24) and FSU (41-39) the last two weeks at home. In the latest AP poll, Florida is ranked No. 11, UNC came in at No. 22 and FSU is receiving votes just outside of the Top 25.

STARTING SIX

▶ Whether it be be because injuries or constant competition on both sides of the ball, only six Hurricanes have started all five games this season. Seniors Glenn Cook, Bruce Johnson and Xavier Shannon, juniors Jason Fox and Darryl Sharpton, and sophomore Steven Wesley are the only Hurricanes to have taken the first snap in every contest through the first five games. A total of eight Hurricanes have started four of five games.

ALWAYS ALDARIUS

▶ Freshman Aldarius Johnson is the lone Hurricane to have caught at least one pass in every contest this season. After catching one ball in each of UM's first two games (14-yard reception vs. Charleston Southern; 11-yard reception at No. 5 Florida), Johnson has caught 10 balls the last three games, catching three for 19 yards at Texas A&M, two for 12 yards and a touchdown against North Carolina, and a career-high five for 55 against Florida State last weekend. Junior tight end Dedrick Epps, junior wide receiver Sam Shields and freshman wide reciever Laron Byrd have caught a pass in four of five contests thus far. Johnson currently leads the team with 12 catches, while he ranks third in receiving yards with 111, behind Kayne Farguharson (140 yards) and Thearon Collier (113).

FOX IN THE FLAT

▶ Miami's anchor on the offensive line - left tackle Jason Fox - is one of a number of players on the UM roster that played multiple positions in high school. Fox, who stands 6-foot-7 and weighs 307 pounds, was recruited as an offensive lineman but also spent time as a tight end during his prep playing days. His versatility was on display late in the Florida State game when, after quarterback Robert Marve rolled right, Fox slid back behind Marve on the left side, caught a backwards pass, and ran it in for a five-yard touchdown.

FOURTH DOWN FORTUNE

▶ Miami ranks third nationally in fourth-down efficiency on defense among teams who have defended more than five fourth down attempts. The Hurricanes, who trail only Connecticut (7-for-7) and Michigan State (7-for-8), have stopped their opponents six out of seven times on fourth down. On the flip side, the UM offense is tied for 11th nationally among teams who have attempted at least five fourth-downs, converting on six of eight attempts (75%). Texas and Fresno State are both a perfect 5-for-5 on fourth down while Kansas State (64.3%) and Eastern Michigan (56.3%) lead the nation with nine conversions apiece.

UM OFFENSE IN THE RED ZONE

▶ The Hurricanes are a near-perfect 19-of-21 in the red zone on offense, converting 12 touchdowns and seven field goals this season. The 'Canes rank third in the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 90.5 percent conversion rate. Florida State and Boston College rank in a tie for first in the league with a 90.9 conversion rate, with both teams converting 20-of-22 opportunities.

DON'T BLINK NOW

- ▶ When Miami's offense gets the ball in its hands, you better not get up out of your seat or you might miss something. Eleven of UM's 16 offensive touchdowns this season have come on drives of three minutes or shorter, with seven of those nine TDs coming in under a minute. In fact, UM's longest touchdown drive in terms of used game clock was a 9-play, 43-yard drive that lasted only 4:19 and resulted in a Javarris James' 7-yard touchdown run in the season opener against Charleston Southern.
- ▶ The team's quick-strike ability was on display in College Station three weeks ago, when three offensive TD drives lasted 35 seconds, 27 seconds and eight seconds respectively.
- ▶ This past weekend, UM had two touchdown drives of less than 30 seconds, with Travis Benjamin reaching the endzone on both. His first touchdown was the lone play of a seven second drive that saw him score on a run early in the second half. His second came on another one-play drive that lasted just 21 seconds with running back Graig Cooper hooking up with Benjamin on a 51-yard touchdown pass. ▶ Miami has won 16-of-20 games against teams from the state of Florida since 2000, including a 10-2 record at home. The only four losses against teams from the state of Florida since the turn of the century were season openers against Florida State in 2005 and 2006 and two defeats this season at the hands of then-No. 5 Florida and FSU last weekend. Since 1985, the Hurricanes have won 29 of their last 41 games (.707) against Sunshine State opponents.

MIAMI VERSUS GEORGE O'LEARY

▶ While this is the first time that Miami and UCF have met on the gridiron, today's game will mark the second time UM has gone up against a George O'Leary-coached club. At the conclusion of the 1999 season, Miami faced O'Leary's Georgia Tech Yellow Jackets in the 2000 Gator Bowl on Jan. 1 in Jacksonville, Fla. UM beat Georgia Tech, 28-13, behind a strong defensive performance that held the Joe Hamilton-led Yellow Jackets to a season-low 13 points. Linebacker Nate Webster led UM with 14 tackles en route to being named the MVP of the game. Hamilton was picked off twice, was held without a touchdown pass for the first time in 14 games and freshman running back Clinton Portis had a 73-yard touchdown run for the Hurricanes.

FIRST IMPRESSIONS

- ▶ Today's game against UCF will be the first meeting all-time between the Hurricanes and the Knights, despite the schoolsbeing located about 240 miles apart.
- ▶ UCF will be the 151st team Miami will have played in its 82 seasons of football. The Hurricanes are 92-56-2 (.620) in first-ever meetings with their opponents, including nine straight wins in inaugural meetings with teams.
- ▶ Since 1991, the Hurricanes are 14-1 in their first meetings with schools and have outscored those 13 opponents by an average of 40-11.

LINEBACKERS ASSERTING THEMSELVES EARLY ON

- ▶ The linebacking group of senior Glenn Cook, juniors Darryl Sharpton and Colin McCarthy and freshman Sean Spence make up four of UM's top five tacklers through the season's first five games. The foursome has combined for 91 tackles, or 30% of Miami's 303 total tackles this season.
- ▶ Cook leads the team with 28 total tackles (16 UA, 12 A) while Sharpton and Spence rank third and fourth with 25 and 21 total tackles respectively. Strong safety Anthony Reddick ranks second on the squad with 27 tackles while McCarthy, who missed the FSU game, is fifth with 17 stops. Spence has been a pleasant surprise coming off the bench in UM's first four games before starting against the Seminoles. So far this year he has recorded three-and-a-half tackles for losses (-16 yards), one pass break-up, an interception returned seven yards for a touchdown against FSU and recorded a nine-yard sack of Florida quarterback Tim Tebow. Cook leads the team with five-and-a-half tackles for a loss, three quarterback hurries and is one of four players, along with McCarthy, defensive end Eric Moncur and safety Lovon Ponder to force a fumble this year.

- ▶ The University of Miami has developed a reputation as one of the top rushing teams nationally in recent years and this year appears to be no different. Through the season's first five games, Miami is out-rushing its opponents 630-to-541 for an average of 126-to-108.2 per yards on the ground per game. This advantage is despite the fact that regular starting running back Javarris James has missed the last three-plus contests with a high-ankle sprain.
- ▶ Sophomore Graig Cooper is second on the team with 448 all-purpose yards (322 rush, 45 receiving, 81 punt return) while senior back-up Derron Thomas (91 rush, 35 receiving) ranks fifth with 126 total yards. Cooper, who has two 100-plus yard performances on the ground this year vs. A&M and UNC, leads the team with five total touchdowns (three rush, one rec., one punt return) while UM's next three running backs -- Thomas, junior Javarris James and sophomore Shawnbrey McNeal all have a touchdown apiece.

REVOLVING RECEIVERS

▶ With the losses of wide receivers Darnell Jenkins (619 rec. yards) and Lance Leggett (238), UM returns only 25 percent of its receiving yards from 2007 (499 of 2,034). Sam Shields, Kayne Farquharson, Leonard Hankerson and Khalil Jones are the only four recievers on the roster to have caught a collegiate pass heading into the 2008 season, with Shields (847 career recieving yards) as the only one with more than 100 career vards coming into 2008 (former WR Ryan Hill - 182 career receiving yards - is now playing safety).

- ▶ Joining Shields, Farquharson, Hankerson and Jones is a talented freshman class, including Aldarius Johnson, Travis Benjamin, Laron Byrd, Thearon Collier and Davon Johnson.
- ▶ While only seven UM wide receivers caught a pass in 2007, the Hurricanes have surpassed that mark by three already this year. Johnson leads the team with 12 catches (for 111 yards), while Farquharson (11 catches) and Hankerson (10) rank second and third respectively. Behind the top three, Collier and Hankerson round out the team's top five with nine receptions apiece.

YOUNG'S EARLY INFLUENCE

- ▶ New defensive coordinator Bill Young has the UM defense off to a strong start through the first five games in 2008. Traditionally known for having one of the most athletically talented defenses nationally, Miami appears to be regaining some of its success Hurricanes' fans have become accustomed to the last three decades.
- ▶ Through UM's first five games this season, the Hurricanes rank 29th nationally in rushing defense (108.2 ypg) and 34th in total defense (314.40 ypg). The Hurricanes also rank 17th in tackles for losses (7.6 pg) and 41st nationally in first downs allowed per game (17.2).
- ▶ The 'Canes, after holding Charleston Southern to just 126 total yards of offense in the opener, shut down the fifth-ranked Gators' ground attack in Gainesville, holding 2007 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow and the UF running game to just 89 rushing yards on 27 carries (3.29 ypc). In fact, the Miami defense held a strong Gators offense to just 18.85 yards per drive on UF's first seven drives of the contest.
- ▶ Against A&M, the Aggies gained just 87 yards on 35 carries for an average of 2.5 yards per carry.
- ▶ Versus UNC two weeks ago, the Hurricanes held the Tar Heels to just 35 yards on 33 carries (1.1 ypc). UNC running back Greg Little, who was averaging 60 yards rushing per game coming in, was held to just 38 yards while back-ups Ryan Houston and Shaun Draughn were held to just 18 and 13 respectively.
- ▶ UM's passing defense had a strong game against rival FSU last weekend, collecting two interceptions while holding the Seminoles to just 159 yards through the air.

PLENTY OF FRESHMEN

▶ Take a look at UM's depth chart this week, and you'll see something you aren't accustomed to seeing a lot of at UM -- the abbreviation "Fr." Whether it be on offense, defense or special teams, a number of true freshmen are currently listed on UM's two-deep depth chart this week for the contest against UCF. In addition to names on the depth chart, it's certainly possible four or five more true freshman could see significant playing time at some point this season (16 true freshman were listed on UM's two-deep for the opener against Charleston Southern and 21 played).

COACHES AT THEIR ALMA MATERS

▶ Randy Shannon is one of 18 head coaches at their alma maters. The Hurricanes will face two coaches coaching at their alma maters this season in Virginia Tech's Frank Beamer and Virginia's Al Groh.

▶ Redshirt freshman quarterback Robert Marve will make his fourth career start against the Seminoles while true freshman Jacory Harris will serve as Marve's back-up and likely play. When Harris started UM's opener aginst Charleston Southern on Aug. 28, it marked the first time since the 1983 season that a freshman started the first game of the season. Redshirt freshman Bernie Kosar started the 1983 opener at Florida and finished his first collegiate game 24-of-45 for 223 yards and three interceptions as UF beat UM, 28-3, on Sept. 13, 1983 in Gainesville. Miami would go on to finish 11-1 on the season, winning its first national title.

THE CHRONICLES OF REDDICK

▶ Nearly four full years have passed since Anthony Reddick's Freshman All-American season came to a close in on Dec. 31, 2004. Since then, Reddick -- now a 22-year-old graduate of the University of Miami -- has played in just 12 games and started just five the last three-plus years. Despite a number of injury setbacks over the years. Reddick has persevered and has started at safety in four of UM's first five games this season. Reddick's freshman campain in 2004 saw the Fort Lauderdale native collect 73 tackles, two blocked punts, one forced fumble, one sack and one interception. He collected a career-high 12 tackles twice that season (Louisville, Virginia Tech) and was named UM's Defensive Rookie of the Year (along with Romeo Davis). This year, he ranks second on the team with 27 tackles - 19 of which were unassisted.

TRUE FRESHMEN ON TAP

▶ According to available information, Jacory Harris was the first TRUE freshman to start at quarterback in a season opener for the University of Miami in his collegiate debut versus Charleston Southern. Miami has 33 newcomers on its squad this season with a 2008 recruiting class ranked No. 1 in the country by ESPN.com. Of the 100 total players on the roster, the Hurricanes list 40 freshmen - 31 true freshmen and nine redshirt freshmen. Three true freshmen started for Miami in the season-opener in Harris, wide receiver Aldarius Johnson and linebacker Marcus Robinson. Overall, 21 true freshmen played in the season-opening game: Harris, Robinson, Aldarius Johnson (WR), Thearon Collier (WR), Jordan Futch (LB), Kendal Thompkins (WR), Laron Byrd (WR), Travis Benjamin (WR), Davon Johnson (WR), Andrew Smith (DL), Marcus Forston (DL), Gavin Hardin (DL), Brandon Harris (DB), Vaughn Telemaque (DB), Sean Spence (LB), Jeremy Lewis (DL), Joe Wylie (DB), Arthur Brown (LB), Micanor Regis (DL), John Calhoun (FB) and Cannon Smith (QB).

TWO NEW COACHES ON 2008 STAFF

- ▶ Randy Shannon's 2008 team has two new assistant coaches defensive coordinator Bill Young and wide receivers coach Aubrey Hill.
- ▶ Bill Young, Defensive Coordinator Young is a 39-year coaching veteran, with 21 seasons as a defensive coordinator. He has been a defensive coordinator at Tulsa, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Southern California and most recently at Kansas, where the Jayhawks finished the 2007 season 12-1 with a victory in the Orange Bowl over Virginia Tech with a defense that ranked 12th in the nation. Young also had a one-year stint in the NFL.
- ▶ Under Young's guidance, the 2007 Kansas defense ranked fourth nationally in scoring defense 16.3 points per game) and turnovers gained (35), eighth in run defense (94.8 yards per game) and ninth in pass efficiency defense (105.3). It featured All-American cornerback Aqib Talib. Young was defensive coordinator at Kansas for six seasons under Mark Mangini. In 2006, Kansas finished third in the Big 12 and 28th in the nation in rushing defense (109.0 yards per game), as it held four opponents to under 70 yards of rushing and limited all opponents to a fourth-down conversion rate of less than 25 percent. Young was defensive line coach with the Detroit Lions in 2001. Prior to his stint in the NFL, he worked three seasons as defensive coordinator at Southern California under Paul Hackett. While at USC in 1999, his defense led the nation in total takeaways and topped the conference in rushing defense and turnover margin (third nationally). His USC defense in 1998 was No. 1 in the Pac-10 in total defense, pass efficiency defense (third nationally) and scoring defense. It was also ranked second in the country in forced turnovers.
- ▶ In addition to his three years at USC, his stints as defensive coordinator came at Tulsa in 1983-84, Ohio State from 1988-95 and Oklahoma in 1996-97.
- ▶ During his 27 years in college coaching, Young has helped elevate 31 players to the NFL. Prior to his college coaching career, Young spent six seasons on the prep level at two high schools in Oklahoma. He played outside linebacker and defensive end at Oklahoma State from 1965-67 and led the Cowboys in interceptions in 1965. He was an academic All-Big Eight selection as a senior in 1967 and earned his bachelor's degree in education that year. He then went on to earn his master's degree in secondary education at Central Oklahoma in 1971. He is married to Lawana Young.
- ▶ Aubrey Hill, Wide Receivers Coach Hill played and coached in Steve Spurrier's "Fun 'n Gun" offense at Florida. He was a standout receiver at Florida from 1991-94 before moving into the coaching ranks. He spent the last three years on the Pittsburgh coaching staff, where he tutored first-team All-Big East performers with Greg Lee in 2005 and Derek Kinder in 2006 and a freshman All-America in Oderick Turner in 2006. In 2004 Hill coached at NCAA I-AA Elon (N.C.) University as receivers coach. Prior to that he was the receivers coach at Duke for five seasons and also served in a pair of NFL coaching internships.
- ▶ As a player, Hill helped Florida to a four-year record of 43-10-1 (.806) and three SEC championships. He totaled 86 receptions and 18 touchdowns during his career and caught a touchdown every 4.78 catches, the third best TD ratio in Gators history. He was a team captain as a senior in 1994. Following his playing career, Hill served as a UF graduate assistant from 1996-98. In his first season as an assistant, UF captured the national championship with a 12-1 mark, capped by a 52-20 win over FSU in the Sugar Bowl.
- ▶ During his three years on the Florida staff, the Gators went a combined 32-5 (.865). Hill earned his first full-time appointment at Duke, where he served as receivers coach from 1999-2003. He was instrumental in the development of Scottie Montgomery, who finished his collegiate career ranked second in career receptions (171) and third in yardage (2,379) in Blue Devil annals. He supplemented his collegiate experience with a pair of NFL internships, including stints with the Washington Redskins (summer 2001) and Miami Dolphins (summer 2002). Hill was involved with receivers and special teams in both internships. Hill owns two degrees from Florida, including a bachelor's degree in exercise and sport sciences and a master's degree in leisure/sports management. He and his wife, Shanae, were married on July 4, 2008. He has a 16-year-old daughter, Destini.

ADKINS, HARRIS EARN ACC WEEKLY HONORS (Aug. 25-31)

▶ University of Miami football players Spencer Adkins and Jacory Harris earned Atlantic Coast Conference Weekly honors the week of Aug. 25-31. Harris earned Rookie of the Week honors after starring in his first collegiate game, completing 16-of-26 passes for 190 yards while accounting for two touchdowns — one through the air and one on the ground — in leading Miami to a 52-7 win over Charleston Southern. Harris led the 'Canes to touchdowns on four of their first five possessions. He scored his first collegiate touchdown on a 30-yard run on the seventh play of the game and finished with 212 yards of total offense. Adkins and UNC's E.J. Wilson also earned co-Defensive Lineman of the Week honors. Adkins helped a UM defense that held CSU to 126 total yards and 49 rushing yards. Adkins tallied three solo tackles,two tackles for loss and recorded two sacks from his middle linebacker position.

COOK, MARVE EARN ACC WEEKLY HONORS (Sept. 15-21)

▶ University of Miami football players Glenn Cook and Robert Marve earned Atlantic Coast Conference weekly honors after the perforances in UM's win at Texas A&M on Sept. 20. It is the second time this season the Hurricanes had a Rookie and a Defensive Lineman of the Week. Marve earned Rookie of the Week honors after earning his first career win as UM's starting QB. He made his second career start, he completed 16-of-22 passes for 212 yards and two touchdowns. He threw his first career touchdown with 20 seconds remaining in the first half – a 26 yarder to freshman receiver Thearon Collier - and later had a 16-yarder to Kayne Farquharson in the third quarter. Marve completed 13 of his first 16 passes. For the game, he completed 72.7 percent of his passes. Cook picked up a season-high nine tackles (three solo and six assisted) – one shy of his career-high and returned a fumble for a touchdown. It was his second career fumble return for a TD. He knocked the ball loose, picked it up and ran it back two yards for a touchdown in the third quarter giving the Hurricanes a 41-10 lead. He also had a half tackle for loss. Cook leads the Hurricanes with 18 total tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss.

JAMES ON MAXWELL WATCH LIST

▶ Junior running back Javarris James has been named to the 2008 watch list for the Maxwell Award presented to the outstanding collegiate football player in America since 1937 and is named in honor of Robert W. "Tiny" Maxwell. Semifinalists for the Maxwell and Bednarik Awards will be announced in early November and three finalists for each award will be announced on November 25.

MONCUR ON HENDRICKS WATCH LIST

- ▶ Senior defensive end Eric Moncur is on the preseason watch list for the 2008 Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award. Previous recipients of the Hendricks Award include: Terrell Suggs (Arizona State), David Pollack (Georgia), Elvis Dumervil (Louisville), LaMarr Woodley (Michigan) and Chris Long (Virginia).
- ▶ The Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award is named in honor of college football's first threetime first-team All-American. As a defensive end at the University of Miami, Ted used his agility, height and reach to block passes and kicks, force interceptions and pressure quarterbacks and running backs. He roamed the front line, read plays and blitzed on impulse, completely transforming the way the defensive end position was played. His professional career spanned 15 years and 215 consecutive games. It included four Super Bowl victories, eight Pro Bowl selections and inductions into the College and Pro Football Halls of Fame. It is in the spirit of Ted Hendricks' aggressive style of play, winning attitude and determination that the Defensive End of the Year Award for college football's premier defensive end is presented.

PHILLIPS EXTENDS MIAMI'S UNPRECEDENTED STREAK

▶ The University of Miami extended its school record streak to 14 consecutive years in which a Hurricanes player was chosen in the first round of the NFL draft when junior safety Kenny Phillips was selected by the New York Giants with the 31st pick of the 2008 draft. Miami's streak of 14 straight years with a first-round draft choice is unprecedented in football history. The previous longest streak was nine straight years by the University of Florida (1983-91). The University of Miami's string began in 1995 when Warren Sapp was drafted in the first round. In the last 14 years, UM has had 33 players drafted in the first round of the NFL draft. Since 1982, Miami has had 50 players drafted in the first round of the NFL draft. Prior to 1982, only 11 UM players had ever been selected in the first round.

MIAMI FOOTBALL: A HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

▶ The 2008 season is Miami's 83rd season of competition on the football field. In the previous 82 seasons of play, Miami has posted winning records in 55 seasons. The Hurricanes have played for a national championship 10 times in postseason bowl games, winning five times. Since 1980, Miami has posted at least seven victories a year in 26 of 28 seasons, including 22 seasons of at least nine wins and has won at least 10 games in a season an outstanding 14 times since 1983, earning 11 victories a total of 11 times during that span. Miami has an all-time record of 547-306-19 (.638). Miami has an all-time home record of 368-168-14 (.681), including a final record of 319-142-7 (.689) in games played at the Orange Bowl, the Hurricanes' home field from 1937 to 2007.

RANDY SHANNON VISITS THE MIDDLE EAST

▶ University of Miami Head football coach Randy Shannon was one of five college football coaches to participate in a seven-day Middle East tour May 20-26. The tour was a joint effort of Morale Entertainment and Armed Forces Entertainment. Joining Coach Shannon on the trip were Mark Richt of Georgia, Tommy Tuberville from Auburn, Yale University's Jack Siedlecki and Charlie Weis of Notre Dame. The group gathered at Scott Air Force Base in Illinois before beginning their journey on May 20. The trip took them to Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany, at sea aboard the USS Nassau, Al Udeid Air Base and Camp As Sayliaha in Qatar, the Naval Service Center in Bahrain, a U.S. Air Base at an undisclosed location in Southwest Asia and concluded with a visit with President George Bush at the White House on Memorial Day. The tour was a first-of-its-kind for NCAA football and for Armed Forces Entertainment. The NCAA coaches participated in meet and greets at various bases, as well as coached flag football teams made up of servicemen and women. Additionally, the head coaches hosted three symposiums, where the audience members ask questions. Coach Shannon was accompanied on the tour by UM Senior Associate Athletic Director Tony Hernandez.

COOPER FOURTH AMONG NCAA FRESHMEN IN RUSHING IN 2007

▶ Miami running back Graig Cooper ranked fourth nationally in rushing among true freshmen in 2007. Interestingly, the freshman who led the country, Pittsburgh's LeSean McCoy, was Cooper's teammate in 2006 at Milford Prep Academy. As backfield mates a year ago, Cooper rushed for 1,327 yards on 106 attempts, and McCoy gained 547 yards on 77 carries.

RECAPPING THE SPRING GAME

▶ Freshman linebacker Arthur Brown recorded a team-high eight tackles and added an interception as the defense defeated the offense, 32-29, in the annual University of Miami spring game at the BankUnited Canesfest March 29 at Fort Lauderdale's Lockhart Stadium in front of an estimated crowd of 11,000. Rising sophomore running back Graig Cooper led the offense with eight carries for 91 yards and two touchdowns. Cooper finished with 103 total yards of offense and ran for a 44-yard touchdown run. Running back Javarris James caught four passes for 60 yards and ran once for a 25-yard gain, but it was Miami's defense that came away winners behind its linebackers Brown, Darryl Sharpton and Sean Spence. Sharpton finished with five tackles and recorded three of the defense's six sacks. Spence intercepted two passes on the day. The scoring was set up so that the defense earned two points each for a three-and-out, interception, fumble and one point for a defensive stop before the offense crossed the 50-yard line. The Hurricane offense racked up 19 first downs in four eight-minute quarters and gained 364 yards - 141 rushing and 223 through the air. Redshirt freshman quarterback Robert Marve completed 10-of-22 passes for 93 yards. True freshmsn quarterback Jacory Harris finished the game 9-of-17 for 64 yards while freshman Cannon Smith had 66-yard completion to sophomore Shawnbrey McNeal.

CHARLESTON GAME RECAP

- MIAMI VS. CHARLESTON SOUTHERN NOTES
 ► OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION... Miami's 52 points against Charleston Southern marked the highest offensive production in a season opener since a 63-17 win over Florida A&M on Aug. 31, 2002. It was also the most points scored and the largest margin of victory since a 52-7 rout of Duke on Oct. 8, 2005.
- ▶ CHANGING ZIP CODES... After 71 seasons in the Orange Bowl, UM's season-opener on Aug. 28 marked the debut of the Hurricanes in their new home - Dolphin

- ▶ DAZZLING DEBUT... Jacory Harris' 190 passing yards versus Charleston Southern are the most for a true freshman quarterback in their first start since Ken Dorsev threw for 194 yards in his first start against Rutgers in a 55-0 win on Nov. 20, 1999.
- ▶ STOPPING THE RUN... Miami's defense held Charleston Southern to 49 yards rushing - the least allowed by a Hurricane defense since holding Boston College to just 24 yards rushing in a 17-14 win on Nov. 23, 2006. The 126 yards of total offense by CSU were the fewest by a UM opponent since the 'Canes limited FIU to 114 total yards of offense in a 35-0 win on Oct. 14, 2006.
- ▶ COOPER TAKES IT TO THE HOUSE... Sophomore Graig Cooper's 66-yard punt return for a touchdown marked the first of his career. Cooper is the first Hurricane since Devin Hester against Temple on Oct. 15, 2005 to return a punt for a touchdown.
- ▶ GETTING ON THE BOARD... With the win over CSU, the Hurricanes improved to 194-21 when scoring first.
- ▶ FIRST IMPRESSIONS... Charleston Southern was one of two new opponents Miami is scheduled to face in 2008. - ▶ SPREADING THE WEALTH... Eleven different players made a reception in the 52-7 win over Charleston Southern. It marked the most receivers in a game since 12 Hurricanes made a catch in a 31-28 loss to North Carolina on Oct. 30, 2004.
- ▶ START IT UP... Jacory Harris' 30-yard rushing touchdown on Miami's opening drive marked the first time in exactly five years that the Hurricanes scored a touchdown on their opening drive in their season opener. On August 28, 2003, Ryan Moore gave the Hurricanes the early lead with a 24-yard touchdown pass from Brock Berlin as Miami went on to win, 48-9, at Louisiana Tech.
- ▶ ONE-TWO PUNCH... With Javarris James' 7-yard rushing touchdown on UM's second drive of the game, the 'Canes posted a TD on their first two possessions of the season-opener for the first time since that 2003 season-opening win at Louisiana Tech. James has recorded a rushing touchdown in two-straight home openers for the Hurricanes, posting a career-high two in last season's 31-3 season-opening win over Marshall.
- ▶ ADD A THIRD AND FOURTH... With Graig Cooper's 14-yard rushing touchdown in the second quarter, the Hurricanes scored a touchdown on their first four possessions of the game for the first time since a 34-3 win at Temple on Oct. 15, 2005.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) - - Graig Cooper had a 66-yard punt return for a touchdown and rushed for another score, quarterback Jacory Harris accounted for two touchdowns and Miami moved into its new home with a 52-7 season-opening win Thursday night over Charleston Southern.

Javarris James rushed 12 times for 73 yards and a touchdown for the Hurricanes (1-0), who took full control with a 21point first quarter, their highest-scoring period since Sept. 9, 2006 against Florida A&M. Derron Thomas and Shawnbrey McNeal also had touchdown runs for Miami, which outgained its outmatched opponents from the Football Championship Subdivision 416-126. It won't be so easy next weekend; the Hurricanes visit No. 5 Florida on Sept. 6. Tribble Reese threw for 81 yards, including a 2-yard touchdown pass to Tyrese Harris for Charleston Southern. Harris was 16-for-26 for 190 yards for the Hurricanes, who didn't score more than 37 points in any game last season and eclipsed that with ease Thursday - albeit against an opponent with just two winning seasons in its history.

It was Miami's highest-scoring game since Oct. 8, 2005, a 52-7 win over Duke. So by almost any measure, Miami's first home game in Dolphin Stadium went according to plan. The Hurricanes ended a seven-decade stay at the decrepit, decaying - and now destroyed - Orange Bowl last season, and were lured north to the Miami Dolphins' home field, replete with modern amenities like luxury suites, gargantuan video screens and the potential for up to \$5 million in new revenue for the private school's coffers each year. Other than the orange-and-blue seats and baseball diamond, there was no proof that either the Dolphins or Florida Marlins played at the stadium, which drew 48,119 for the opener - roughly two-thirds its capacity.

The Dolphins' ring of honor for the likes of Don Shula and Dan Marino was covered, Miami's distinctive "U" logo shielded the entrance to the tunnels plus adorned the sidelines, and Hurricanes' flags flew on all sides along the outside of the facility. The game drew 48,119. The debut wasn't totally flawless, at least in the logistical sense. A long-standing Miami pregame tradition - running out of a giant inflatable helmet and onto the field - had to be scrubbed at the last minute when crews couldn't pump enough air to make it work. The Hurricanes ran through a green plastic tunnel instead, with puffs of their trademark white smoke filling the sky. Alas, that was the closest thing Miami had to a major problem all night.

Harris, a true freshman who started only because first-string quarterback Robert Marve was serving a one-game suspension for disciplinary reasons, opened the scoring with a 30-yard run on a fourth-down play 2:37 into the contest, and the points kept coming from there. James scored on a 7-yard run on the next possession, and Harris then hit Leonard Hankerson with a 7-yard TD pass that pushed the lead to 21-0. Cooper scored on a 14-yard run early in the second quarter, then blew past everyone for his first career return touchdown to give Miami a 35-0 lead with 13:24 left in the third. Reese scrambled right and madé a desperate flip to Harris for Charleston Southern's score, which capped a 10-play, 66-yard drive. Thomas answered with a 5-yard run late in the third, restoring Miami's 35-point cushion, and McNeal capped the scoring with a 1-yard plunge with 2:33 remaining.

(AP) - - Tebow was good early and even better late, throwing two touchdown passes and helping the fifth-ranked Gators snap a six-game losing streak against Miami with a 26-3 victory Saturday night at The Swamp. It was Florida's first win since 1985 in the on-again, off-again series. The rebuilding Hurricanes (1-1), three-touchdown underdogs, hung close for three quarters. But Tebow and speedster Percy Harvin took over late and erased three quarters of frustration against Miami's improved defense. Florida's defense was stout all night, holding the Hurricanes to 140 total yards.

"Our defense played outstanding," Gators coach Urban Meyer said. "I thought they played great."

So did Tebow. The Hurricanes pressured the junior with every snap, forcing him to scramble and make early, sometimes off-balance throws. Still, he finished 21-of-35 passing for 256 yards and two TD passes. He also ran 13 times for 55 yards. Harvin, who missed last week's opener while recovering from offseason heel surgery, ran five times for 27 yards.

"We can do much more with him and we will," Meyer said.

Robert Marve, making his first career start for Miami, was 10-of-18 passing for 69 yards and was sacked three times.

"We can build a lot of things off this game," Miami coach Randy Shannon said. "That's the one thing that we're excited about. They see where we can get better, and they also know we were able to play with a top-five team in this country and we had a shot. That's all you want is a shot, a chance on the road, hostile environment and we had that opportunity. But we have to capitalize on it next time.

Florida, whose two scores in the first half came off Miami miscues on special teams, led 9-3 to start the fourth quarter. But Tebow, Harvin & Co. finally found their rhythm, putting together consecutive drives of 86 and 95 yards to put the game away. The Gators, who finished with 345 total yards, took advantage of two favorable calls to score the first of the two late touchdowns. Tebow hooked up with Carl Moore for a 28-yard gain on third-and-9, putting the Gators at the 5-yard line. Moore was initially ruled out of bounds, but officials reviewed the play and said Moore's elbow touched down before his feet landed out of bounds.

"That was the play of the day," said Meyer. "That kind of changed momentum."

Three plays later, on another third down, Miami's Randy Phillips was flagged for pass interference against Harvin. It gave the Gators a first-and-goal at the 2. Harvin took a pitch from Tebow on third down and outran several defenders for the score. Phillips insisted the pass to Harvin was not catchable and should not have been flagged.

"No way," he said. "But the ref made the call, so that's what we've got to live with. Chalk it up, play some more, bounce back."

Florida's next drive was the most impressive of the night, a five-play, 95-yarder that sealed the victory. Tebow found Louis Murphy yes, the guy who spouted off about Florida being better suited than Miami to be referred to as "The U" - in the corner of the end zone for a 19-yard strike. Jonathan Phillips added a 29-yard field goal with 25 seconds to play for the final score.

Florida might not have even scored in the first half had Miami not made two errors on special teams. Matt Bosher shanked a punt on the team's opening drive, a 14-yard kick that gave the Gators great field possession. Tebow made easy work of the short field, directing a 35-yard drive on five plays and giving Florida a 7-0 lead with a 14-yard touchdown pass to Hernandez.

Miami then sucked the energy out of Florida Field - most of the record 90,833 in attendance were clad in orange and blue - with a 16-play drive that took 8:42 off the clock and kept Tebow on the sideline. It ended with a field goal, but gave the Hurricanes plenty of confidence they could play with the Mighty Gators. Nonetheless, the Gators added to their lead with another special teams blunder. Miami left Jeff Demps, one of the fastest players on the field, to rush unblocked at Bosher. Demps blocked the punt, and Murphy nearly recovered for a touchdown, but couldn't hang and the ball trickled out of bounds for a safety and a 9-3 advantage.

"The ball didn't fall our way," Marve said. "We had some plays we left out there on the field. The offense, the numbers might not look great, but we did move the ball. Then we'd get stuck."

MIAMI VS. TEXAS A&M NOTES

- ▶ COOP... Sophomore running back Graig Cooper ran for two touchdowns in the first quarter, which was a career-high. Cooper's 51-yard touchdown run also was a career-long rushing touchdown. It was Miami's longest rushing touchdown since Tyrone Moss had a 50-yard TD run against Virginia Tech on Nov. 4, 2006. Cooper also collected his third career 100-yard rushing game (128 yards on 16 carries) and Miami's first since Javarris James ran for 103 yards on 13 carries against NC State last season (Nov. 3, 2007).
- ▶ MORE COOP... Graig Cooper's 128 yards on the ground set a new personal career-high for single-game rushing yards. His previous career-high of 116 was set against Marshall on Sept. 1, 2007 in his first collegiate game.
- ▶ FOR STARTERS... A few Hurricanes made their first starts of the season: senior Tyrone Byrd (right tackle), senior Chris Rutledge (right guard) and freshman Laron Byrd (wide receiver). It was Tyrone Byrd's and Laron Byrd's first career starts and Rutledge's first career start at guard.
- ▶ BIG PLAYS... Miami had five explosive plays in the first half and eight for the game against Texas A&M. An "explosive play" is a run of 18-plus yards or a pass of 20-plus yards, and that is a key factor in the team's success. Marve's second touchdown pass went to Kayne Farquharson with 6:36 left in the third quarter.
- ▶ ON THE ROAD... Graig Cooper's 19-yard rushing touchdown with 12:56 in the first quarter was the first time Miami scored on its opening possession on the road since a Jon Peattie 38-yard field goal at Georgia Tech on Oct. 28, 2006. UM actually scored first in the game on Glenn Cook's 19-yard fumble return with 14:34 on the clock.
- The 24 first-half points by the Hurricanes were the most since UM put up 30 points at Wake Forest on Nov. 6, 2005.
- The last time Miami scored at least 40 points was in a 47-17 win at Wake Forest on Nov. 6, 2005.
- ▶ PICKING IT OFF... Senior defensive end Eric Moncur picked up Miami's first defensive turnover and his first career interception. Miami had a fumble recovery on a muffed punt against Charleston Southern for the Hurricanes only turnover before today's game.
- ▶ A LITTLE DEJA VU... Senior linebacker Glenn Cook forced a fumble, recovered it and returned it for a two-yard touchdown with 5:43 left in the third quarter. Cook also had a fumble recovery for a touchdown back on Oct. 28, 2006 at Georgia Tech, which also was the last time Miami scored on its opening offensive drive.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Robert Marve threw two touchdown passes and Graig Cooper ran for career-high 128 yards and two scores as Miami picked apart Texas A&M's defense in a 41-23 rout Saturday.

Marve, a redshirt freshman making his second career start, completed 16 of 22 passes for 212 yards. The Hurricanes (2-1) piled up 398 yards on 57 plays - an average of 6.98 yards per offensive snap - and handed A&M its worst nonconference defeat at Kyle Field since a 30-10 loss to Alabama in 1988.

The Hurricanes gained 261 yards in the first half on Saturday. The Hurricanes had 12 first downs on 28 plays in the first half and led 24-10 at the break

The Hurricanes took less than two minutes to score. Marve threw a 29-yard pass to Kayne Farquharson on Miami's first offensive play and three snaps later, Cooper scored on a 19-yard run.

Miami's next possession was more of the same. After Marve threw an 11-yard pass to Sam Shields, Cooper ran untouched for a 51-yard touchdown. Miami gained 121 yards on its first six plays.

Freshman Richie Bean kicked a 38-yard field goal to pull Texas A&M to 14-10 late in the first quarter.

Derron Thomas started Miami's next drive with a 34-yard run. Marve took a hard hit from A&M linebacker Von Miller and left the game after throwing a pass to Farquharson. Freshman Jacory Harris replaced Marve and Matt Bosher kicked a 20-yard field goal for a 17-10 lead.

Miami's Travis Benjamin returned a punt 44 yards to the Aggies' 41 in the final minute of the half. Marve returned and found Thearon Collier wide open in the end zone with 20 seconds remaining.

Early in the third quarter, Marve threw a 36-yard pass to Dedrick Epps as the Aggies continued to blow coverages and miss tackles. The pass set up another short field goal by Bosher that put Miami up 27-10.

Defensive lineman Eric Moncur made a one-handed interception on Johnson's next pass at the Texas A&M 15.

Marve immediately threw a touchdown pass to Farquharson with 6:36 left in the third quarter to make it 34-10.

On the second play of A&M's next possession, Miami linebacker Glenn Cook swatted the ball out of Johnson's hands as he was being sacked, recovered the fumble and trotted into the end zone to make it 41-10.

- ▶ STOPPING THE RUN... The Hurricanes kept the Tar Heels to just 35 yards rushing for a 1.1 yard per carry average. Miami's defense had kept opponents to just 2.4 yards per carry entering today's game, while North Carolina's offense had averaged 6.1 yards per carry entering the
- ▶ PASSING LANE... Kayne Farquharson caught a nineyard touchdown pass from Robert Marve with 11:02 remaining in the opening quarter to help the Hurricanes take the early 7-0 lead. It marked the second-straight game in which Marve and Farquharson have connected for a score.
- ▶ FAST STARTS... With that Farquharson TD today, the Hurricanes have scored on their opening drives in three of four games this season and in two straight.
- ▶ CAREER BEST... With a four-yard touchdown pass in the fourth quarter to Aldarius Johnson - putting the Hurricanes ahead 24-14, Robert Marve threw for a careerhigh three touchdowns in today's game to three different receivers (Farguharson, Cooper, Johnson). It also marked Johnson's first collegiate touchdown. It is also the most touchdown receptions for the Hurricanes since a 35-0 win over Florida International on Oct. 14, 2006, when Kyle Wright had three touchdown passes.
- ▶ SUPER COOPER... Graig Cooper's 11-yard touchdown with 39 seconds remaining in the opening quarter marked his season-high tying fifth touchdown in four games this season. In 11 games last season, he recorded five. With 110 rushing yards today, Cooper notched his secondstraight 100-yard rushing game and the fourth of his career. He ran for 128 yards at Texas A&M last week.
- ▶ IN THE ZONE... Including today's 4-5 effort, the Hurricanes are a near-perfect 14-of-16 in the red zone on offense this season. UM has converted 10 touchdowns and four field goals. Entering today's game, Miami led the ACC with a 90.9 percentage.
- ▶ AT THE HALF... The Hurricanes have outscored their opponents 72-26 during first-half play this season. Entering today's game, opponents are averaging just 130.7 yards of total offense in the opening half. Miami limited North Carolina to 87 yards of total offense in the first half, including just 19 rushing yards.
- ▶ ACC OPENERS... With today's loss, the Hurricanes fall to 2-3 in ACC openers and 3-2 in ACC home openers. The Hurricanes had won three-straight ACC home openers entering today's game. Today's loss also marks the first defeat of the Hurricanes at Dolphin Stadium, moving Miami to 4-1 all-time and 1-1 this season at Dolphin Stadium. It marked Miami's first September loss to an unranked opponent since Sept. 25, 1999, when the Hurricanes fell to an unranked East Carolina, 27-23.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) - Cameron Sexton threw a 14-yard touchdown pass to Brooks Foster with 46 seconds left, Trimane Goddard had two interceptions in the final minutes, and North Carolina rallied from an

Sexton - playing because North Carolina starter T.J. Yates will miss six weeks with a broken left ankle - relieved starter Mike Paulus early and completed 11 of 19 passes for 243 yards, including two fourth-quarter scores. He found Hakeem Nicks with a 74-yard pass with 9 minutes remaining, then coolly found Foster in the right corner of the end zone in the final minute to give North Carolina (3-1, 1-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) its first lead of the day.

Miami had one more chance, getting the ball at its own 31. Robert Marve found Kayne Farquharson for a 29-yard gain that took the Hurricanes to the North Carolina 20 with 15 seconds remaining. Marve nearly hooked up with Farquharson again on the final play of the game, but Goddard's second pick of the quarter sealed the Tar Heels' win. Farquharson had his hands on the ball in the end zone, yet Goddard was the one who wound up with possession.

Marve threw three touchdown passes for Miami (2-2, 0-1), and Graig Cooper rushed for 113 yards plus had a receiving TD for the Hurricanes, who lost to the Tar Heels for the second straight season.

A year ago, Miami almost pulled off a stunning comeback against North Carolina, nearly rallying from a 27-0 halftime deficit. This time, the Tar Heels showed the Hurricanes how to pull one of those off.

Down 24-14 midway through the fourth quarter after Marve connected with Aldarius Johnson on a 4-yard touchdown pass, the Tar Heels went to work. Nicks caught the ball ahead of a diving Bruce Johnson for the first North Carolina touchdown of the final quarter, seeming to stun the Hurricanes a bit, and then Sexton delivered the perfect touch pass at the end.

the perfect touch pass at the end.

It was a stirring turnaround, especially considering how the game started.

The Hurricanes needed only eight plays to go 89 yards - with Cooper rushing three times for 60 of them on the opening drive, capped by Marve finding Farquharson with a 9-yard touchdown pass. A special-teams blunder by the Tar Heels later in the opening quarter gave Miami a two-touchdown edge. North Carolina punter Terrence Brown dropped a snap, fell on the ball at the Tar Heels 11, and the Hurricanes quickly capitalized. Marve lofted the ball to Cooper on a middle screen that resulted in an 11-yard TD for a 14-0 lead. Miami made it look easy in the first 15 minutes, outgaining North Carolina 127-24, limiting the Tar Heels to minus-4 yards rushing and less than two yards per play.

Suddenly, everything that went right in the first quarter suddenly stopped for Miami.

Greg Little's 8-yard run early in the second quarter helped draw North Carolina within 17-7 at halftime, and Ryan Houston scored from 2 yards out midway through the third to draw the Tar Heels within 17-14.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) - Antone Smith rushed for a career-best four touchdowns, including a game-

clinching 20-yarder with 3:57 remaining, and Florida State wasted most of an early 24-point lead before hanging on to beat Miami 41-39 on Saturday.

Smith - who scored three TDs last week - finished with 92 yards on 27 carries for the Seminoles (4-1, 1-1 ACC), who handed Miami its second straight home loss on a stormy afternoon. Christian Ponder ran for 144 yards, becoming the first Florida State guarterback since Charlie Ward in 1992 to run for triple-figures, and Tony Carter made two interceptions for the Seminoles.

yards, becoming the first Florida State guarterback since Charlie Ward in 1992 to run for triple-figures, and Tony Carter made two interceptions for the Seminoles.

Travis Benjamin had an 18-yard touchdown run on an end-around, caught a 51-yard TD pass from running back Graig Cooper, and finished with 274 all-purpose yards for Miami (2-3, 0-2), which has lost 12 of its last 15 conference games. The 'Canes trailed 24-3 at the half and 31-10 in the third quarter, then closed to within 34-32 with 8 minutes remaining. Two botched snaps on FSU punts led to Miami points, Sean Spence ran an interception in for a touchdown and the Hurricanes seemed poised for what would have been an enormous rally. But Smith sealed the win with a third-down run up the middle, giving coach Bobby Bowden just his 14th win in 34 games all-time against Miami. Smith's other scoring runs were for 2, 19 and 5 yards, part of Florida State's 281-yard rushing day as a team. Ponder completed 14 of 31 passes for 159 yards for Florida State, including a 15-yard score to Greg Carr, and looked at ease in his first taste of the Seminoles-Hurricanes rivalry. Miami quarterback Robert Marve, meanwhile, was 17-of-40 for 122 yards and two interceptions. And still, the Hurricanes nearly pulled it off. Left tackle Jason Fox rushed for a 5-yard touchdown with 14 seconds remaining, but the onside kick was controlled by the Seminoles began leaping in celebration - knowing they just dealt their biggest league rival a huge blow.

Florida State scored the game's first 24 points and wound up holding a 440-256 edge in total yards, largely because of Ponder's running ability. He had nine carries for 107 yards by intermission; in the previous 13 meetings between the teams, FSU quarterbacks ran for a combined 111 yards on 99 attempts, It looked like a mismatch. The first of Carter's interceptions set up Smith's opening score, and the Seminoles just kept rolling. When Graham Gano connected on a 53-yard field goal, the Seminoles had a 24-0 lead with 1:07 left in the half.
