Outlook

Four starters return from University of Miami's 1963-64 NIT basketball team which recorded a 20-7 overall campaign—yet sparkling new talent is making the selection of a 1964-65 starting five a difficult, though pleasant task for Coach Bruce Hale.

Only All-America candidate Rick Barry at forward, is without rough competition for his job. Wayne Beckner, Rick's opposite at forward, must fight off the challenge of Mike Wittman, a six foot, six inch sophomore with worlds of potential. If the latter can prove his reputation as an excellent shot and rugged rebounder with the varsity, he and the veteran Beckner will give Miami a one-two punch at this position.

Center holdovers Don Patrican and Chirlie Grob will have the battle of their lives to keep sophomore Eddie Spriggs off the starting five. Spriggs was a brilliant shot and top-notch rebounder with the Miami freshmen last season. He has tremendous speed and will bring real strength and depth to the center position.

John Dampier compiled a 19-point average at guard last year, but faces tough competition from Junior Gee, a diminutive but sensational playmaker. As a freshman, Gee not only demonstrated his ability as a playmaker, but came through as the team's most accurate shooter, averaging 24 points per game.

The other guard spot left open by the loss of Bernie Butts and Larry Kessler seems destined to be grabbed off by either sophomore Rick Jones, a great outside shot who averaged 22 points per game with the 1963-64 Baby Hurricanes, or improving returnee Bob Green.

Coach Bruce Hale has other talent, including reserves from last year and additional sophomore contenders. The rest of the 14-man squad includes: Stewart Marcus, John Bates, Joe Hobbs and Mike Volkman.

This quintet could be one of Miami's best. If it manages to slide by several brutally tough early season assignments on enemy courts, it could compile one of the school's greatest all-time win-loss records.

Miami's first six games will be waged out of town. The Hurricanes will have completed nearly a quarter of their schedule before they meet St. Marys of California at Miami Beach Convention Hall, Dec. 15. The early season away foes include an FIC tilt with Tampa, Duquesne in the Steel Bowl and then, either V.P.I. or Pittsburgh, St. Johns, Niagara, and LaSalle.

HEAD COACH

When Bruce Hale took over the basketball coaching job at Miami in 1954-55, he put together a team which won only two of seven games against out-of-state foes and wound up with an overall seasonal record of 9-11. But even that below par mark was the best UM had posted in three years.

Hale hasn't produced a loser since. Four times in the last five campaigns, his teams have annexed 20 or more games . . . four times they won their way into post season tournaments.

The personable Miami coach has won a universal reputation. He has earned the respect of the opposition, the devoted allegiance of the athletes in his care. He has lifted Miami from the ranks of the unknowns to a national power. Since taking over as coach, his teams have scored 168 victories against only 86 defeats.

Hale is a stronger believer in offense. One year his Hurricanes led the nation in scoring. They generally are in the top ten.

The Miami coach did his college playing for Santa Clara, and only recently was inducted into that school's Hall of Fame. As an Air Force captain in World War II, Hale played on the famed Five By Five team, later coached the Wright Air Field Base to the service championship and then spent 10 years in the pros as a player and coach. Playing with the Chicago Gears in 1945, he made the All-World pro team. The following year, he coached the Chicagoans to the national pro title.

Player Sketches

RICK BARRY, senior letterman, 6 ft. 7, 200 pounds. HS coach, Tom Murtha. Business Administration major. You'll have to look in the record section for the statistical story of Rick's achievements. His sensational scoring and rebounding skills gained him a tryout with the 1964 US Olympic team even though he was only a junior. He gained All-America mention on many '64 teams, was named to the Converse All-America squad and is on most of the pre-season all-star units. It is rare to have an athlete who not only tops everyone in scoring but also dominates both backboards as well—and Barry does just that. While many of his points come from close in and on uncanny follow ups after misses by his teammates, Rick can drop shots in from well out if the traffic becomes too heavy under the basket.

MIKE VOLKMAN, junior, 6 feet, 175 pounds. HS coach, Jim Rauch. Physical Education major. Mike played one year at Evansville college and sat out last season as a transfer. He has good defensive capabilities and his year of college experience makes him a promising addition to the Hurricane squad. His best scoring is from a long one-hander but he can move into position well for the shorter tallies. Volkmann is one of the top free throw men on the squad. He's a two-sport athlete at Miami, being an infielder on the baseball squad.

WAYNE BECKNER, senior, 6 feet 5, 185 pounds. HS coach, Frank DeBricker. Education major. After an effective sophomore year as a reserve, Beckner took over a starting job last season at forward and proved to be a reliable performer. His year of starting experience may make him a top star this season as he has good moves under the boards, shoots equally well from inside or from well out. He scored 23 on Stetson, 20 on Rhode Island for his best games last year. He was over 10 in rebounds eight times, with 14 against Creighton being his top effort. He did not match a 24-rebound performance as a sophomore against Rollins, however.

RICK JONES, sophomore, 6 feet, 160 pounds. HS coach, Ike Tallman. Physical Education major. Rick is rated one of the finest guards to come out of his section of Indiana in a long time. He is the fastest man on the squad, drives in well and can hit from close in as well as far out. Although excelling as a defensive player, Jones possesses skills of no small proportions offensively. As a freshman last year, his 172 field goals and 104 free throws totalling 448 points gave him a 23.5 scoring average. He missed two frosh games. The talented rookie probably will understudy the starting guards, giving Miami tremendous bench power at this position. Jones was No. 1 high school player of Indiana, was selected to play in Kentucky-Indiana All-Star game.

JOHN DAMPIER, senior, 6 ft. 3, 185 pounds. HS coach, John Longfellow. Physical Education major. Dampier, long shot artist, was the streakiest point maker on the club during the 1963-64 campaign. He was over 40 points once, over 30 five times and over 20 on a dozen occasions. He fell off to two points twice. John has shown much greater steadiness in workouts this fall and indications are that the tall guard will have more great games and few or no nights when he is way off the mark. Some new wrinkles in the Miami style of play could help him this year. Dampier transferred to Miami from Junior College. He rated as one of the finest junior collegians in the United States.

JUNIOR GEE, sophomore, 5 ft. 10, 165 pounds. HS coach, Jack Butcher. Physical Education major. Gee came to Miami after a brilliant high school career and he stepped right out as a sensational floor man for the freshmen. His dazzling outside shooting accounted for 226 field goals, 64 free throws and 516 points. He averaged 24.6 points per game. Coach Hale rates Gee as a fine all around sophomore player and expects him to quarterback the 1964-65 varsity. He has excellent qualities of leadership and appears capable of carrying the heavy burden imposed upon him at guard. Gee was an all-state high school player and participated in the Kentucky-Indiana All-Star game.

DON PATRICAN, junior, 6 feet 7, 215 pounds. HS coach, Robert Welch. Business administration major. Don, regular center much of last year in a somewhat up and down season, was the most improved man on the squad during 1964-65 pre-season drills. His scoring and rebounding took an upward turn. Patrican stepped into the double figure column six times in scoring last year, his best night coming against LaSalle (18 points). Playing against a former high school rival in the Rhode Island game, was the spur which sent Patrican to a 22-rebound total in that tilt. He had 19 against Nevada but was in double figures only seven times all year. If Don continues to improve, Miami will be well off at center.

MIKE WITTMAN, sophomore, 6 feet 6, 205 pounds. HS coach, Charles Walsh. Business Administration major. Wittman transferred to Miami from Los Angeles State College. He came highly recommended by Coach Bill Sharman, formerly of the Boston Celtics and a close friend of Coach Bruce Hale. Mike is just right for the UM basketball team and is certain to play a major role this season. He has the size and ability to either take over a starting job or give the other starters plenty of rest without weakening the attack. He is a first rate rebounder. His one-hand jumper shot, makes him a constant threat to the enemy.

CHARLES GROB, junior, 6 feet 8, 245 pounds. HS coach, Ralph Arminio. Business Administration major. Grobe broke away to a slow start last year, but as the season progressed, he came along strong and gave valuable help to the team playing center. He scored only two points in his first five games, but later had 13 point games against both Tampa and the tough Creighton team. He has size and aggressiveness, and helped in tight spots during the 1963-64 seasons. His top rebounding game was 14 against Florida Southern College. He is in excellent condition this year and is being counted on heavily.

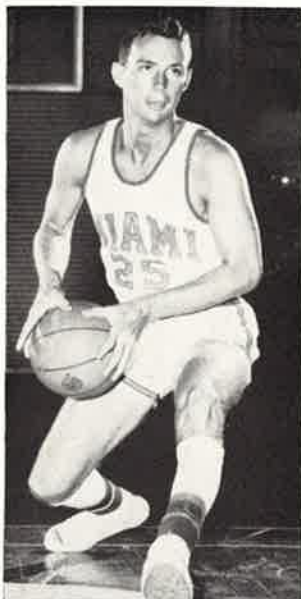
MARCUS

STEWART MARCUS, junior, 6 ft. 4, 210 pounds. HS coach, Charles Fieldson. Business Administration major. This hard working, aggressive athlete, turned in a good sophomore campaign as a reserve forward and center. He was especially good as a rebounder and, though always in action as a replacement, he still found time to snag nine rebounds in one game against Stetson, had seven rebounds in three other tilts and twice he came up with six rebounds. In high school, Marcus was an excellent point maker as well, but in his sophomore year at Miami, he was content to let the others do the shooting for the most part. Stewart is an accurate from 10 or 12 feet out. His top sophomore game was 11 points against Florida Southern.

JOE HOBBS, sophomore, 6 feet, 150 pounds. HS coach, Jim Kees. Pre-Med. major. Joe, lightest man on the squad, is one of the fastest, smoothest ball handlers of Hale's athletes. Leading scorer in Dade county high school circles a couple of campaigns back, the Miamian will round out the back court corps in fine fashion. Joe is carrying his deadly high school shooting eye with him up to the college level. He is a good team man. Joe's lack of weight is somewhat of a handicap, but he overcomes this pretty well by his speed and agility. He sat out last season, but daily workouts gave him a lot of savvy and he knows his way around the court.

JOHN BATES, junior, 6 feet 6, 185 pounds. HS coach, Bill Hecht. Education major. John, one of Dade county's best in high school, has good rebounding potential and possesses more scoring possibilities than he has yet shown. He can play either at center or forward. Bates did an outstanding job in the closing minutes of an overtime game at Nevada though he did not score. His best point-making was against Rollins when he made 11. Four rebounds in the Florida game was high for him in that department. While John does not appear of starting ability as yet, he should strengthen the Miami depth, now that he has one varsity season under his belt.

EDDIE SPRIGGS, sophomore, 6 feet 8 inches, 220 pounds. HS coach, David Fisher. Physical Education major. Spriggs averaged 21.2 points on 201 field goals and 44 free throws and dominated the backboards as a freshman. He's a candidate for starting center for the varsity. Once he garners game experience, he may be hard to keep out of action. Eddie just missed being named the most valuable player in Ohio in his high school senior year. He could eventually become a big gun in University of Miami basketball. He has a good one hand shot and has shown promise as a defensive player.

UM In Steel Bowl

The Hurricanes return to the Steel Bowl Dec. 4-5 for the first time since 1958 when they dropped squeakers to Pittsburgh 69-65 and Clemson 66-61.

Miami will be matched in the first round with Duquesne, the pre-tournament favorite. The Dukes are headed by All-America candidate Willie Somerset, who scored 47 points in one game last year. Three other starters, the alternate center and other veterans, plus sophomore material make the outlook very bright for the Dukes.

Miami's second round foe will be either Pittsburgh, which had a 16-7 record last year, or Virginia Tech. Virginia Tech has three starters back from a 16-7 team. Four of them range from 6 feet 6 to 6 feet 10. Tech might be a real sleeper in basketball circles this year. Pitt is worried over replacing the graduated Brian Generalovich.

Rick Barry's Records

University of Miami's fabled Rick Barry may hold every mark in the Hurricane record book by the time the 1964-65 season is complete.

Already, Miami's All-America candidate has possession of many of them. Rick came out of the 1963-64 season with a new one game mark—52 against Jacksonville.

His 870 points, 314 field goals, 242 free throws and 448 rebounds are all new one season records. No player attempting more than 130 shots has equalled his .549 field goal percentage while Rick's .843 free throw percentage tops all who have had as many as 100 tries in a single season.

With one more year to go, Barry already stands third in all-time UM scoring and rebounds . . . second in free throws and 20 point games . . . and fourth in field goals. Until this year, all UM players—together—in past history had hit for only 18 thirty-point games. Barry last year was over 50 points twice, over 40 points twice, over 30 points on 19 occasions, over 20 points on 24. Illness from a virus cut him down on two games, while Creighton held Barry to 19, when he was healthy.

Every coach who has seen Barry perform, maintains that he is truly an All-American basketball player.
