One of the most recognized collegiate athletic brands in the nation, the orange and green "U" is now used to promote the university's world-renowned academic and health programs and will be incorporated into a full range of uses.

## 'CANES TO FACE VIRGINIA IN ANOTHER COASTAL DIVISION BATTLE

► The 22nd-ranked University of Miami football team will play its third straight Atlantic Coast Conference Coastal Division game when it travels to Charlottesville, Va. to take on Virginia on Saturday, Oct. 30 at 12 p.m. at Scott Stadium. The game will be televised on ESPN.

► The 'Canes are coming off a solid performance in a 33-10 win over North Carolina at Sun Life Stadium. Miami racked up 442 yards offensively (225 rushing; 217 passing) while recording 26 first downs to UNC's 10.

► The 'Canes offense was once again led by the running of senior Damien Berry, who became just the fourth UM player since 1975 to record four straight 100-yard rushing games. Berry carried the ball just 19 times but tallied 109 yards and a touchdown in the win. Behind Berry, Lamar Miller and Mike James each turned in solid outings with 67 and 54 yards rushing respectively.

► Quarterback Jacory Harris threw for 212 yards and tossed touchdown passes to LaRon Byrd, Travis Benjamin and Leonard Hankerson against the Tar Heels. His TD pass to Benjamin in the third quarter moved him into sole possession of second all-time UM for career touchdown passes.

► The 'Canes were led on the defensive side of the ball by senior defensive lineman Allen Bailey, who earned College Football Performance Awards National Defensive Player of the Week honors after recording six tackles and 3.5 tackles for loss against the Tar Heels.

► After holding UNC to just 140 yards through the air and picking off Tar Heel quarterback T.J. Yates twice, the 'Canes defense now leads the country in pass efficiency defense. On the year, UM's defense has allowed just three touchdown passes while recording 14 interceptions - five more than the 'Canes recorded all of last season.

► A big reason for the defensive success is due to the recent play of sophomore safety Vaughn Telemaque, who has recorded a turnover in each of Miami's last four games. After recovering a fumble at Clemson, Telemaque collected an interception against Florida State, two more against Duke the following week before recovering another fumble against UNC.

► Sean Spence continues to rank among the league's best in both tackles and tackles for loss. Heading into this weekend's game against Virginia, Spence has team-highs for tackles (59) and tackles for loss (10.0).

**COVERING THE HURRICANES**

**COACHES SHOW**

UM's coaches show, "Hurricane Game Day with Randy Shannon" airs twice weekly on CSS, at 5:30 p.m. Thursdays and 10 a.m. Saturdays. The show is hosted by Joe Zagacki and Don Bailey Jr. and features Hurricanes players as coach Shannon's guests.

**HURRICANE HOTLINE**

Hurricane Hotline is a weekly two-hour show hosted by Joe Zagacki and Don Bailey, Jr. that airs from 7-9 p.m. Thursday nights during the season from Monty's (2550 South Bayshore Drive Coconut Grove, Florida 33133). Hurricane Hotline features interviews with UM head football coach Randy Shannon, players, coaches and other UM personnel as well as other featured guests. Fans are encouraged to listen on 560 WQAM or view the show in-person at Monty's in Coconut Grove.

**The MIAMI-UVA SERIES**

- ▶ Miami holds a 5-2 advantage in its all-time series with Virginia.
- ▶ The teams only met once before the 'Canes joined the ACC in 2004, with the Hurricanes beating the Cavs, 31-21, in the 1996 Carquest Bowl. Since joining the league, Miami has won four of six meetings, including a 52-17 win last year in Miami.
- ▶ The last time the Hurricanes traveled to Scott Stadium, Jacory Harris led the 'Canes to a 24-17 overtime victory in 2008.

**A 'CANES WIN OVER THE CAVALIERS WOULD...**

- ▶ Give Miami its third straight win over Virginia.
- ▶ Move the Hurricanes' record to 4-1 in ACC play with three regular season conference games remaining.
- ▶ Improve Miami's road record to 3-1 this season.

**The COACHES**

▶ Randy Shannon is in his fourth season as Miami's head coach and owns an overall record of 26-19. Mike London is in his first season at Virginia and is 3-4 as the Cavaliers' head coach.

**Scouting THE CAVALIERS**

- ▶ Virginia enters Saturday's contest with a 3-4 record overall and a mark of 0-3 in ACC play. This past weekend, the Cavaliers stepped out of conference play to beat Eastern Michigan, 48-21, in Charlottesville.
- ▶ The Cavaliers' offense is centered around a passing game that ranks second in the ACC with a 255.1 passing yards per game average. Quarterback Marc Verica is fifth in the league in passing, coming in with 1,489 yards with eight touchdowns and six interceptions.
- ▶ Much like Miami's opponent last week in North Carolina, Virginia uses a two-tailback system with Keith Payne and Perry Jones. Jones has started all seven games and has 399 yards on 71 carries but Payne has more touches despite having not started a game. Payne has team-highs for carries (96), rushing yards (471) and rushing touchdowns (10).
- ▶ Kris Burd is Verica's go-to receiver in the passing game, coming in with 32 catches for 472 yards and four touchdowns. Dontrelle Inman (23 catches, 344 yards) is the team's second option through the air.
- ▶ Defensive end Cam Johnson is the Cavaliers' start in the front seven. Johnson ranks third on the team in tackles (36) while leading UVa in tackles for loss (11), sacks (6) and fumble recoveries (2). Corner Chase Minnifield is the lead man in the secondary, having recorded four of UVa's five interceptions thus far. The team's top tackler is linebacker LaRoy Reynolds (41 total tackles).
- ▶ Raynard Home is the ACC's top kick returner, averaging 26.7 yards per return. Jimmy Howell (43.6) handles the punting duties while Robert Randolph (5-for-8) is UVa's kicker.

**Streak CONTINUES**

- ▶ The University of Miami's impressive streak of former players scoring touchdowns in the NFL continued this weekend as Willis McGahee and Santana scored touchdowns on Sunday.
- ▶ At least one former 'Cane has now scored a touchdown every NFL week since Week 15 of the 2002 season - a span of 129 straight weeks.

**Miami RANKS 2ND IN THE NATION IN SACKS, TACKLES FOR LOSS**

- ▶ As of this week, Miami's defense ranks second in the country in tackles for a loss per game with a 9.29 average. The 'Canes recorded 14 tackles for a loss in their opener against Florida A&M, 11 at No. 2 Ohio State, nine at Pitt, eight at Clemson, six against FSU, nine at Duke and eight this past weekend against UNC.
- ▶ Sean Spence leads the 'Canes with 10 tackles for a loss, while Allen Bailey has 8.5, Olivier Vernon has seven and Micanor Regis has 5.5.
- ▶ The Hurricanes also rank second nationally in sacks after tallying five last weekend against UNC. Allen Bailey has a team-high 5.5 sacks, while Olivier Vernon has four and Andrew Smith and Micanor Regis each have three.












## 'Canes IN THE CLASS ROOM

► Of the 16 seniors on this year's squad, five have already earned degrees, while the remaining 11 are all on course to graduate either in December of 2010 or May of 2011.

► The five players that have already earned degrees include: Matt Boshier (History), Richard Gordon (Liberal Arts), Ryan Hill (Liberal Arts), Pat Hill (Marketing and Management) and Cory Nelms (Liberal Arts).

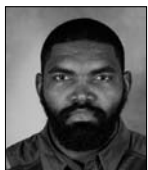
► Overall University of Miami Athletics has an 86% Graduation Success Rate (GSR), the highest GSR ever and up from 82% in 2009. 83% in 2007 was our previous high.

► In May, Miami was recognized as being the only Bowl Championship Subdivision (BCS) team among 26 schools nationally that posted a multi-year APR score in the Top 10 percent in addition to finishing the 2009 season ranked in both the USA Today Coaches poll and Associated Press poll.

► 136 University of Miami student-athletes had a 3.0 GPA or higher following the Spring 2010 semester.

## Shannon LEADS ALL FBS COACHES IN APR

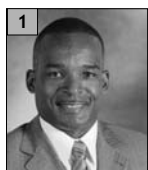
► University of Miami head coach Randy Shannon leads all active Bowl Championship Series conference coaches with a 977 lifetime APR average, according to rankings released in May.

► Shannon's score is the third best nationally among all Football Bowl Subdivision schools, trailing only Troy Calhoun of Air Force and Ken Niumatalolo of Navy.

► The football team's 2008-09 score of 978, sixth best in the nation, will be factored into next year's coaches lifetime ratings, and will continue to boost Shannon's career mark.

► Miami was recognized in May as the only school in the FBS to post a multi-year APR score in the top-10 percent as well as finish the year ranked in both the Coaches and the AP polls.

► Against UNC this past weekend, Miami's defense had another big outing in recording two interceptions and a fumble recovery. Two weeks back at Duke, UM had its best performance in a decade in terms of creating turnovers. The Hurricanes tallied five interceptions and recovered two fumbles, marking the 'Canes created seven turnovers in a since doing so against Washington on Nov. 21, 2001.

**O-line HOLDING ITS GROUND**

► The Hurricanes' offensive line has been one of the league's best this season, ranking third in the ACC in allowing just nine sacks through the season's first seven games.

- UM's O-line has been even more impressive as of late, allowing just two sack in UM's last three games.
- The 'Canes are only allowing 1.28 sacks per game, an improvement of over a sack per contest from last year when Miami allowed 35 sacks in 13 games (2.69 pg).

**More THAN A COINCIDENCE**

► Junior defensive tackle Micanor Regis recorded his third career interception two weeks ago at Duke, returning it 22 yards for a touchdown in Miami's 28-13 win in Durham.

► Regis, who also recorded a sack and a career-high nine tackles at Duke, now has three career interceptions after recording two as a sophomore in 2009.

**Telemaque ON A ROLL**

► After not recording an interception in the first 19 games of his career, sophomore safety Vaughn Telemaque has recorded three in UM's last three games. Against FSU, Telemaque recorded his first career pick in the second half against the Seminoles. He followed that up this two weeks ago against Duke, recording two more in the victory.

► Telemaque has tallied five turnovers in UM's last four games and is one of only five players in the country this year to record at least two fumble recoveries and three interceptions,

Only working press will be admitted to the Sun Life Stadium press box. Seats will be issued according to the following criteria:

1. State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponent's area, and student newspapers from UM and opponent's schools.
2. Other daily newspapers, with preference to those that regularly cover UM.
3. Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered reporting.
4. Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which regularly cover UM.
5. Scouts. Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status.

**Right BETWEEN THE NUMBERS**

- ▶ Miami leads the Atlantic Coast Conference in total defense and pass defense, holding its opposition to an average of 302.7 yards per game overall and 149.1 yards per game through the air.
- ▶ The 'Canes are averaging 29.7 points per game, 399.3 yards per game and 22.3 first downs per game.
- ▶ Damien Berry is averaging 4.9 yards per carry through seven games this season. Berry ranks second in the ACC and 29th nationally with 92.57 rushing yards per game, totaling 648 yards on 131 carries thus far. Lamar Miller is second on the team with 224 yards on 40 carries (5.6 ypc), while Mike James has 219 yards on 38 carries (5.8 ypc).
- ▶ Miami's game against UNC this past weekend was its 901st game all-time (566 wins, 316 losses, 19 ties)
- ▶ Miami is second in the nation in tackles for loss (9.29 pg) and sacks (3.57 pg).
- ▶ Sean Spence leads the 'Canes with 59 tackles, while Ray-Ray Armstrong leads all UM defensive backs with 43 total tackles (23-20) and Allen Bailey leads all linemen with 27 (16-11).
- ▶ Head coach Randy Shannon's 977 lifetime Academic Progress Report average leads all head coaches in Bowl Championship Series conferences and trails only Troy Calhoun of Air Force (983) and Ken Niumatalolo of Navy (978) on the national stage.
- ▶ Orlando Franklin (33 starts) and Colin McCarthy (30 starts) have the most starting experience on the 2010 roster.
- ▶ Miami is averaging 57,458 fans at Sun Life Stadium this season. 53,674 Hurricanes fans saw the 'Canes beat Florida A&M in the season-opener on Sept. 2, a sell-out crowd of 75,115 were in attendance on Oct. 9 against FSU while 43,584 were there to see Miami beat UNC this past weekend.
- ▶ Graig Cooper needs 821 yards to become Miami's all-time leader in all-purpose yardage. Cooper, who has 3,573 yards after picking up 38 yards against UNC this past weekend, is currently fourth in UM history behind Edgerin James (3,590), Ottis Anderson (4,265) and leader Santana Moss (4,394).
- ▶ The 'Canes have 14 interceptions through seven games after collecting just nine in 13 games last season.
- ▶ Thirty-two former 'Canes playing in the NFL last season have earned their degree from the University of Miami.
- ▶ Six Hurricanes are ranked among the Top 150 NFL prospects according to Scouts Inc.'s Todd McShay on ESPN.com. Allen Bailey, Orlando Franklin, Brandon Harris, Graig Cooper, Colin McCarthy and Leonard Hankerson are listed, while Matt Boshier and DeMarcus Van Dyke were also rated but outside of the Top 150.
- ▶ The Hurricanes' seven turnovers created at Duke two weeks ago were the most for Miami's defense since tallying seven against Washington on Nov. 24, 2001. The 'Canes picked off five passes against the Blue Devils, also marking the first time since that Washington game UM has hauled in five INTs in a game.
- ▶ Eleven former Hurricanes were selected to the 2010 NFL Pro Bowl earlier this year, easily the most of any school in the country. Antrel Rolle, Ray Lewis, Ed Reed, Jon Beason, Andre Johnson, Reggie Wayne, Bryant McKinnie, Vince Wilfork, Brandon Meriweather, Jonathan Vilma and Frank Gore all represented the U at the sports' all-star game.
- ▶ Miami has had 11 more first round draft picks than any other school in the country all-time. The 'Canes have had 46 first-rounders, while Ohio State is second with 35 and Florida is third with 32.

**Bailey, HORN EARN ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK HONORS**

- ▶ University of Miami student-athletes Allen Bailey and Tyler Horn have been named Atlantic Coast Conference Players of the Week, as announced Monday by the conference office. Bailey earned defensive lineman honors while Horn is the second Hurricane in as many weeks to be recognized as ACC Offensive Lineman of the Week.
- ▶ Bailey had a career game with six tackles and 3.5 sacks for a total loss in the Hurricanes' 33-10 win over North Carolina on Saturday. Miami entered the evening leading the country in tackles for loss and Bailey helped add to that total as the 'Canes tallied eight as a team against the Tar Heels. Led by Bailey, The 'Canes sacked UNC quarterback T.J. Yates five times, the most by an opposing defense versus the UNC this season.
- ▶ On the year, Bailey leads the team with 5.5 sacks and ranks second with 8.5 tackles for a loss. He also leads all UM defensive linemen with 27 tackles on the year.
- ▶ Horn helped power Miami's offense to 33 points against a North Carolina unit that entered the game ranked second in the ACC in scoring defense. The Hurricanes' center graded out at 97 percent and registered six pancake blocks against the Tar Heels. Miami racked up 442 yards of total offense in the game.
- ▶ Horn's honor is the second straight for UM after Brandon Washington was recognized last week following his performance at Duke.
- ▶ Other ACC honors went out to Clemson's Andre Ellington (Offensive Back), Maryland's Antwine Perez (Defensive Back) and Danny O'Brien (Rookie) and Virginia's Terence Fells-Danzer (Specialist).

**Going FOR FIVE**

- ▶ Damien Berry joined elite company in Miami's win at Duke two weeks ago, becoming just the fifth player since 1975 to rush for 100 yards in three straight games. This past weekend against UNC, he made it four straight with 109 yards on the ground. He is the only ACC player to run for four straight 100-yard games this season.
- ▶ Berry, who leads UM with 648 rushing yards this year, recorded 101 at Clemson, 101 against FSU, 111 at Duke and 109 against UNC in Miami in his last four games.
- ▶ The only four players to accomplish the feat at Miami since 1975 are Willis McGahee, Edgerrin James and Clinton Portis.
- ▶ Only eight players nationally have run for four straight 100-yard games and only four - Berry, Stepfan Taylor from Stanford, Kandall Hunter from Oklahoma State and Bilal Powell from Louisville have a current streak going.

**Notes FROM THE UNC GAME**

- ▶ Junior cornerback Brandon Harris picked off UNC's T.J. Yates in the third quarter – just the second interception thrown by Yates this season and his first in 96 attempts. It marked Harris' first interception of the season.
- ▶ Ramon Buchanan joined in on the action in the fourth quarter – picking off Yates for his first career INT. Miami is the first team to record multiple interceptions of Yates since Nov. 20, 2009, when he threw three interceptions at Boston College.
- ▶ Allen Bailey posted a career-high 3.5 sacks for a loss of 13 yards – more than doubling his total for the season – versus North Carolina as the Hurricanes finished with five sacks and eight tackles for loss.
- ▶ Colin McCarthy led Miami's defense with seven tackles, while Bailey added six.
- ▶ Miami limited North Carolina to just 289 yards of total offense – keeping the Tar Heels to their second-lowest production of the season.
- ▶ With 442 yards of total offense, Miami has surpassed 400 yards of total offense for the third-straight game and for the fourth time this season. The Hurricanes went 5-for-5 in the red zone versus the Tar Heels.
- ▶ Redshirt freshman Lamar Miller rushed for a career-long 27 yards in the third quarter to get UM to the 36-yard line.
- ▶ Freshman Eduardo Clements returned the ball a career-long 29 yards in the second quarter. It was his third 20-plus yard return of the season.
- ▶ Freshman tight end Asante Cleveland grabbed a career-high 25-yard reception in the second half from Jacory Harris. It was the longest catch by a Hurricanes tight end this season.
- ▶ Miami's offensive starters today were: Jacory Harris (QB), LaRon Byrd (WR), Leonard Hankerson (WR), Richard Gordon (TE), Orlando Franklin (LT), Harland Gunn (LG), Tyler Horn (C), Brandon Washington (RG), Seantrel Henderson (RT), Patrick Hill (FB) and Damien Berry (RB)
- ▶ Starting for Miami on defense was: Olivier Vernon (DE), Micanor Regis (LT), Marcus Forston (RT), Allen Bailey (DE), Colin McCarthy (LB), Sean Spence (LB), Brandon Harris (CB), Vaughn Telemaque (FS), JoJo Nicolas (SS), Ryan Hill (CB), Ramon Buchanan (LB).



### Damien BERRY / SENIOR RUNNING BACK

Damien Berry is one of only eight players nationally and seven running backs to record four straight games with 100 yards rushing. The Belle Glade native and three others share the distinction of having the longest active streak among FBS players. Berry will look to extend his streak to five games at Virginia on Saturday, which would tie it for the longest streak in NCAA FBS in 2010.

- ▶ The senior running back is one of only four players at Miami since 1975 - NFL & UM stars Edgerrin James, Clinton Portis and Willis McGahee are the others - to rush for 100 yards in four straight games.
- ▶ Berry is second in the ACC in rushing yards and is in the midst of six straight games with at least 100 all-purpose yards. His lone game without 100 all-purpose yards was a blowout win over FAMU.
- ▶ Berry has 648 yards, 423 in the last four games, and is well on his way to a 1,000-yard season. He would join the short list of just six other Miami greats that have rushed for 1,000 yards in a season.

### Orlando FRANKLIN / SENIOR LEFT TACKLE

Orlando Franklin is the senior leader of the Miami offensive line that leads the ACC with just four sacks allowed in conference play.

- ▶ Franklin has played 490 snaps and allowed just one sack to the opposing defender this season.
- ▶ Over those 490 snaps, Franklin has graded out at 96 percent, collected 43 pancake blocks and nine lumberjack blocks. His single game percentage high was 97 percent against UNC and his single game pancake high was 10 against Clemson.
- ▶ Franklin's grade of 96 percent is all the more impressive when you consider that he played offensive guard, primarily, for the first three years of his career.

### Leonard HANKERSON / SENIOR WIDE RECEIVER

Leonard Hankerson is the ACC's most consistent and productive receiver with eight touchdowns, 38 receptions and 591 yards. He is also the only receiver among the league leaders in scoring at 6.9 points per game.

- ▶ Nationally, Hankerson has the fifth-highest TD total (8) and ranks 10th in points per game (6.9) among receivers. The Fort Lauderdale native's reception-to-touchdown ratio of 1-to-4.75 is also the seventh-best among the NCAA leaders in TD receptions.
- ▶ Hankerson is on the heels of Miami legend Michael Irvin, who set the school TD catches record at 11 in 1986. The other legendary names that he is approaching are Andre Johnson (10 in 2001, 9 in 2002), Reggie Wayne (10 in 2000), Lamar Thomas (10 in 1992) and Eddie Brown (9 in 1984).
- ▶ Hankerson has caught a TD pass in every Miami game this season except two - Ohio State and Florida State, which happen to be the 'Canes only two losses. He had 12 catches and a combined 162 in those two games.

### Brandon HARRIS / JUNIOR CORNERBACK

Brandon Harris is not a popular target for opposing quarterbacks. He has blanketed his opposing wide receivers so well that team have only thrown in his direction 18 times over seven games (2.57 times per game)

- ▶ Harris has locked down his end of the field with such effectiveness that his other secondary mates are capitalizing on mistakes in rapid fashion. In fact, Miami's other defensive backs - Vaughn Telemaque (3), Ryan Hill (3), Ray Ray Armstrong (2) and Demarcus Van Dyke (2) - would rank 20th as a group nationally with their 10 combined interceptions.
- ▶ Harris has one interception on the season and it came against North Carolina's T.J. Yates, who entered the game with the nation's second lowest interception ratio.
- ▶ While teams refuse to pass in his direction, they should also stay away from him in the run game. Miami's defense has been successful on in stopping the opponent on fourth down on 3-of-5 occasions this season. The two biggest stops, which both essentially sealed Hurricane victories... were turned in by Harris, who recorded a solo tackle on Andre Ellington (Clemson) on 4th-and-1 with Miami leading 27-21 in the fourth quarter at Death Valley. Harris also broke up a pass on 4th-and-2 that stymied a North Carolina comeback with the 'Canes leading 19-10 late in the third quarter.

### Sean SPENCE / JUNIOR LINEBACKER

Sean Spence, the emotional and physical leader for the Hurricanes, leads the ACC's top defense with 10 tackles for loss, 59 tackles and two forced fumbles.

- ▶ Spence has recorded a tackle for loss in six of seven games and collected multiple TFL on four occasions.
- ▶ Spence ranks fourth in the ACC in tackles, seventh in tackles for loss and fourth in forced fumbles
- ▶ The Miami Northwestern HS product only needed seven games in 2010 to establish career highs in tackles, tackles for loss and forced fumbles. Both forced fumbles were momentum changing moments in wins over Clemson and UNC.

### Vaughn TELEMAQUE / SOPHOMORE SAFETY

- ▶ There may not be a hotter defender in college football than Miami safety Vaughn Telemaque. Telemaque has recorded five turnovers - two fumble recoveries and three interceptions - in UM's last four games.
- ▶ The sophomore from California is one of only five players nationally with at least two fumble recoveries and three interceptions. Telemaque and Casey Matthews (Oregon) are the only two BCS players with those numbers.
- ▶ Telemaque has a streak of four straight games with a turnover. The only other player in FBS football with an active turnover streak of that nature is Domonic Cook at Buffalo, who has a combined total of five force fumbles and interceptions in the last four games.
- ▶ Telemaque is one of the leaders of a Miami defense that leads the ACC in pass defense, total defense, turnovers gained, pass defense efficiency and ranks second in sacks. Nationally, Miami leads the country in pass efficiency defense and also ranks No. 2 in interceptions, No. 2 in sacks, No. 5 in turnovers gained and No. 6 in pass defense.

### Others TO KEEP AN EYE ON

- ▶ Several other 'Canes are worthy of notice when it comes to All-America recognition. Senior defensive tackle Allen Bailey's break-out game against North Carolina last week him put him back in the mix for both ACC and national awards, while senior punter Matt Boshier has been consistently ranked in the Top 25 in the country in punting average.
- ▶ A few others could join consideration, including Micanor Regis, Ray-Ray Armstrong and Seantrel Henderson, who is a freshman All-America candidate

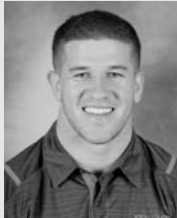

**GSR SCORES SHOW CONTINUED SUCCESS OF MIAMI ATHLETICS**

► In what is becoming an annual upward trend, student-athletes at the University of Miami continue to excel in the classroom at a record pace. The NCAA announced the Graduation Success Rates (GSR) for all member institutions on Wednesday and Miami established a new athletics department-wide record with a GSR of 86 percent.

► Last year, the athletics department-wide GSR was 82 percent and the previous high was set at 83 percent in 2007. The Athletics Department has exceeded the NCAA average for GSR in each of the last six years.

**Hankerson AMONG THE BEST THIS DECADE**

► Senior wide receiver Leonard Hankerson had one of the best seasons in recent memory for a pass catcher at the U in 2009. He is off to another impressive start in 2010, ranking among the nation's elite in receiving.

► His 801 receiving yards last year were the 10th most in school history and the most since Andre Johnson recorded 1,092 yards in 2002.

► Hankerson has now caught a pass in 20 straight games and leads the 'Canes in catches (38), yards (591) and receiving touchdowns (8) through seven games this season. Hankerson had his first multi-TD game of his career in the 'Canes opener against FAMU, before hauling in a career-best and UM record-tying three against Clemson on Oct. 2.

► Against Duke, Hankerson moved into sole possession of sixth place all-time in UM history in career touchdown catches with 16 before adding another this past weekend against UNC.

► With a career-best 147 yards receiving yards at Clemson earlier this year, Hankerson recorded his third career 100-yard receiving game. He nearly reached the 100-yard mark at No. 2 Ohio State earlier in the season, catching seven balls for 90 yards versus the Buckeyes.

**McCARTHY'S SUCCESS CARRYING OVER**

▶ Senior linebacker Colin McCarthy has picked up right where he left off last season, when he averaged 8.1 yards per carry over UM's last seven games. Now in the middle, McCarthy is third on the team with 42 tackles in six games, recording five against FAMU, 11 on the road at No. 2 Ohio State, five at Pitt, six at Clemson, eight against No. 23 FSU and a team-high seven this past weekend against UNC.

▶ McCarthy is the most experienced Hurricane defender, having played in 43 and started 30 games in his career. Heading into the Duke game, he has a team-best 239 career tackles.

**Feat FIRST**

▶ For the first time in school history, the University of Miami recorded a punt return for a touchdown and a kick return for a touchdown in the same game. Two weeks back at Ohio State, Lamar Miller returned a kickoff 88 yards for a touchdown in the first quarter before Travis Benjamin followed Miller's return with a 79- yard punt return for a touchdown with 3:04 left in the first half.

▶ The last time, a Miami player returned a kickoff for a touchdown was Devin Hester at NC State on Oct. 23, 2004. Hester's return went for 100 yards. Benjamin's punt return of 79 yards tied for the 10th longest in school history. It also was his first career punt return for a touchdown and the first for Miami since Thearon Collier's 60-yard punt return last season against Virginia.

▶ The returns also marked the first time in OSU history that an opponent scored on a punt return and a kick return in the same game against the Buckeyes.

► Miami was voted to finish second in the ACC Coastal Division by media members at the 2010 ACC Football Kickoff earlier this fall. After finishing the season 9-4 (5-3 ACC) and advancing to the Champs Sports Bowl in Orlando, the Hurricanes picked up 444 points from members of the working media, while collecting 20 first place votes within the Coastal Division.

► Virginia Tech was predicted on 50 ballots to win its fourth ACC crown. Florida State finished second with 26 votes, followed by Miami (10), Georgia Tech (8), Boston College (2) and North Carolina (2). The Hokies were also tabbed to win the ACC's Coastal Division, earning 532 points and 62 first-place votes.

► Miami followed in second place (444 points, 20 first-place votes); Georgia Tech was third (408); North Carolina fourth (379); fifth was Duke (169); and Virginia (126) rounded out the six-team Coastal Division.

**Miami's SHANNON SIGNS NEW FOUR-YEAR CONTRACT**

▶ University of Miami Director of Athletics Kirby Hocutt announced on May 12 that head football coach Randy Shannon has signed a new four-year contract.

"There's no other place I'd rather be than coaching Hurricanes football. I'm excited about the momentum we continue to build and our strong recruiting classes," said Coach Shannon. "We have dedicated student athletes and experienced and committed coaching staff, a strong athletic program and the University leadership's support -- all important components consistent with long term success."

▶ Shannon, 44, took over the Hurricanes' program in 2007 and has led Miami to two bowl game appearances in three seasons. After going 5-7 in his first season as a head coach, Shannon led the Hurricanes to a 7-6 record in 2008 with an appearance in the Emerald Bowl. In 2009, the Hurricanes had a breakout season winning three games against Top 25 opponents to start the season enroute to a 9-4 campaign and a third place finish in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Miami ended the season with an appearance in the Champs Sports Bowl.

"We are very proud of the positive steps our football program has taken under the leadership of Coach Shannon," said UM Director of Athletics Kirby Hocutt. "With a commitment to excellence in the classroom, in the community, and in competition, we are well on our way, once again, to the top of the college football world."

▶ Shannon has also had a tremendous impact on the football program off the field. The program was among those honored by the National Collegiate Athletic Association (NCAA) for its latest Academic Progress Report score (APR) released yesterday. It was recognized as having posted a multi-year APR score in the top 10 percent. Miami was the only Bowl Championship Subdivision (BCS) team among the 26 schools recognized that finished ranked in the final USA Today Coaches Poll and Associated Press poll after the 2009 season. UM and Duke were the only two Atlantic Coast Conference football programs recognized.

**Spring GAME RECAP**

▶ Travis Benjamin hauled in six catches for 171 yards and a touchdown and quarterbacks Stephen Morris and Spencer Whipple combined for 321 passing yards and three TDs as the Hurricanes defeated Miami, 58-53, in the University of Miami football team's annual spring game Saturday at Traz Powell Stadium in front of an estimated crowd of 10,000.

▶ Team Hurricanes were comprised of the second and third team offenses and the first team, defense while Team Miami was comprised of the first team offense and second and third team defenses. The offenses earned six points for a touchdown, three points for a field goal, one point for an extra point, one point for crossing the 50-yard line and one point for every first down. The defenses earned one point for a three-and-out, two points for an interception, two points for a fumble recovery and six points for a touchdown.

▶ Morris completed 12-of-21 passes for 209 yards, two TDs and one INT. Whipple went 7-of-16 for 112 yards and one touchdown. A.J. Highsmith quarterbacked UM and went 11-of-20 for 131 yards with three TDs and two interceptions.

▶ Kendal Thompkins caught a game-high eight passes for 84 yards and one touchdown for the Hurricanes. Leonard Hankerson had three receptions for 61 yards and two touchdowns.

▶ Linebacker Sean Spence led the Hurricanes with eight tackles. Vaughn Telemaque added six tackles for the Hurricanes. Brandon McGee had seven tackles and two pass breakups for Miami while safety Ray Ray Armstrong intercepted two passes.

**Gino TORRETTA ENSHRINED IN COLLEGE FOOTBALL HOF**

▶ Former University of Miami quarterback Gino Torretta was enshrined into the National Football Foundation (NFF) College Football Hall of Fame in South Bend, Ind. on July 17. Torretta is the sixth Hurricane to be selected for induction, as he joined former student-athletes Bennie Blades, (2006), Don Bosseler (1990) and Ted Hendricks (1987) along with coaches Andy Gustafson (1985) and Jack Harding (1980) in the Hall.

▶ Torretta, along with the 23 other inductees in this year's class, took part in two full days of activities in conjunction with the enshrinement, which was held Saturday night at the Century Center Convention Center.

▶ A key factor in many of Miami's national championship-contending teams, Torretta became one of the most decorated players in college football history, claiming unanimous First Team All-America honors, the Heisman Trophy, Davey O'Brien, Johnny Unitas Golden Arm, Maxwell and Walter Camp awards in 1992.

**Miami-NOTRE DAME FOOTBALL SERIES SET**

▶ The University of Miami and the University of Notre Dame have officially come to an agreement on the dates and sites of a future three-game football series between the schools.

▶ The series will open with a neutral site game at Soldier Field in Chicago on Saturday, Oct. 6, 2012. Game two of the series is scheduled for four years later, with the Hurricanes traveling to South Bend, Ind. to face the Fighting Irish on Saturday, Oct. 8, 2016 at Notre Dame Stadium. The final game of the contract will be played at Sun Life Stadium in Miami Gardens, Fla. on Saturday, Nov. 25, 2017.

▶ The last time the two teams met in Miami, the Hurricanes cruised to a 27-10 win over Notre Dame at the Orange Bowl in 1989. Three of Miami's wins over Notre Dame came during the regular season of the Hurricanes' 1983, 1987 and 1989 national championship years. Notre Dame leads the all-time series between the two schools, 15-7-1.

▶ Miami and Notre Dame recently made national headlines when it was announced the two programs would share the American Football Coaches Association's 2009 Academic Achievement Award, as both schools recorded a 100 percent graduation rate for members of its freshman football student-athlete class of 2002.
