FLORIDA STATE TRAVELS TO PLAY AT MIAMI ON ESPNU

No. 15 Florida State, which has won 10 of its last 12 games, travels to play at Miami on Sunday, February 26, 2012 at 6:00 p.m. at the BankUnited Center in Coral Gables as the Seminoles as Hurricanes renew which began in 1950. The two schools – which are separated by nearly 500 miles – will play for the 68th time and the 15th time as members of the ACC. The Seminoles joined the ACC for the 1991-92 season while the Hurricanes joined the league for the 2004-05 season. Florida State is 11-4 against Miami as members of the ACC with five straight wins in the series since the 2009-10 season. Florida State enters Sunday's game with a 10-3 record in ACC play marking the school record fourth consecutive season it has won at least 10 games in ACC play. The Seminoles have won 19 games so far this season and are looking to win their 20th game for also the school record fourth consecutive season. Following Sunday's game against Miami, the Seminoles will play their second consecutive ACC road game as they travel to play at Virginia on March 1 at 7:00 p.m. before closing out their regular season schedule as they play host to Clemson on Senior Day in Tallahassee on March 4. Each of the Seminoles final three games of the regular season will be televised on one of the ESPN channels – Miami on ESPNU, Virginia on ESPN/ESPN2 and Clemson on ESPN2.

SNAER CONTINUES TO INCREASE HIS LEVEL OF PLAY

All-American and All-ACC candidate Michael Snaer has played well throughout the season and has played especially well during the Seminoles' late season stretch run towards their best ACC finish in school history. Snaer has scored in double figures in nine of the Seminoles' last 12 games and is averaging a team-leading 14.3 points since the Seminoles' defeated Virginia Tech on Jan. 10th in Blacksburg. More than one-third (22 of 60) of his made field goals have come from the 3-point line – he enters Sunday's game against Miami ranked among the ACC's top players for scoring and 3-point field goals made in both overall and conference games.

FLORIDA STATE IN THE ACC STATISTICS

Florida State enters Sunday's game against Miami ranked first in the ACC (in conference games only) in both field goal percentage defense (.392) and 3-point shooting percentage (.372) while ranking second in field goal percentage shooting (.451). The Seminoles are also third in scoring defense in ACC games as they allow an average of 61.9 points per game in third 13 ACC games.

SEMINOLES' HAMILTON PUTS IT ON THE LINE

Florida State head coach Leonard Hamilton will participate in ON THE LINE, a national prostate cancer education and awareness campaign which has teamed up with the Black Coaches & Administrators Association (BCA), the organization that represents and supports African American collegiate basketball and football coaches.

LOOK FOR FLORIDA STATE TO...

...Defeat Miami and sweep the regular season series for the third consecutive season against the Hurricanes. The Seminoles have defeated the Hurricanes twice during the regular season in both 2010 and 2011;

...Defeat Miami and win their seventh consecutive game against Miami. It would mark the Seminoles' longest ever winning streak against the Hurricanes – surpassing a streak of six wins during the 1968 through 1971 seasons;

...Defeat Miami and win their fifth game of the season against a team from the state of Florida. The Seminoles have wins over Jacksonville, UCF, Stetson and Miami (on Feb. 11) so far this season.

FLORIDA STATE'S WINNING PERCENTAGE IN THE LAST SIX SEASONS

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last four years (since the start of the 2006-07 season) in total games played with 130 wins. The Seminoles averaged 21.7 wins per season with records of 22-13 (2006-07), 19-15 (2007-08), 25-10 (2008-09) and 22-10 (2009-10) and 23-11 (2010-11) in the last six seasons.

FLORIDA STATE IN THE ACC

Florida State enters Sunday's game against Miami as the third winningest program in ACC play in the last six years with a 55-37 record in regular season ACC games. The Seminoles and Duke are the only two teams in the ACC who have won at least 10 games and finished in the top four of the ACC standings in each season since the start of the 2008-09 season.

FLORIDA STATE IN THE NATIONAL POLLS

Florida State is ranked No. 15 in this week's Associated Press poll and No. 16 in the ESPN/USA Today poll. It marks the fifth consecutive week the Seminoles have been included in the AP poll and the fourth consecutive week they have been in the ESPN poll. The Seminoles' current five week run during the regular season in the Associated Press poll is their longest since a run of eight straight weeks in the poll during the 1997-98 season (from Dec. 1, 1997 through Jan. 18, 1998). Its current four-consecutive week run in the ESPN/USA Today poll is its longest since a four week run during the 2008-09 season (Feb. 9-March 6). Florida State has been ranked in the nation's top 25 of the AP poll in seven of 14 weeks and in six of 14 weeks in the ESPN poll. Under head coach Leonard Hamilton, the Seminoles have been included in at least one AP and one ESPN poll in each of the last four years.

SEMINOLES CONTINUE BLOCK PARTY AGAINST DUKE

Florida State – ACC All-Defensive team candidate Bernard James specifically – continued to prove itself as one of the top shot blocking teams in the ACC with five blocked shots against Duke. It marked the sixth consecutive time and 19th time in 27 games this season that Florida State has blocked at least five shots in a game. James blocked a season high tying five shots against Duke The Seminoles are ranked second in the ACC in blocked shots with 165 and a 6.1 blocked shots per game average. Florida State has blocked more shots than both Boston College (83) and Virginia (73) combined. James is in a virtual tie for second place in the ACC with 64 blocked shots and a 2.4 blocked shots per game average.

FLORIDA STATE GOES TO THE BOARDS AGAINST DUKE

Florida State was credited with 41 rebounds against Duke on Thursday night in Tallahassee – the second time in its last three games that it has pulled down 41 rebounds. The Seminoles also pulled down 41 rebounds in gaining a rebounding margin of +10 in their 48-47 win over Virginia Tech. Florida State is ranked second in the ACC with a 37.7 rebounds per game margin.

SEMINOLES WITH SEASON LOW TURNOVERS AGAINST DUKE

Florida State committed a season low eight turnovers against Duke (four in each half) and has committed a total of 16 turnovers in its last three halves of basketball. The Seminoles committed four turnovers in both halves against Duke and eight in the second half of the Seminoles win at NC State – far less than their per game average of 16.4 turnovers per game for the first 27 games of the season.

MOST WINS BY A SENIOR CLASS

Florida State's four-year seniors (Deividas Dulkys, Xavier Gibson and Luke Loucks) are the winningest senior class in school history with 89 wins entering Sunday's game against Miami. The Seminoles have won 89 games during the careers of Dulkys, Gibson and Loucks – the trio has matched the number of wins during Florida State's winningest four-year period which came from 2008-11 with 89 wins – but contained no four-year seniors.

LAST GAME VS. MIAMI

Senior Bernard James scored 15 of his career-high-tying 18 points and No. 15/17 FSU earned a 64-59 win over the visiting Miami Hurricanes on Feb. 11, 2012 at the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee. James also added six rebounds and four blocks and several second-half dunks in the victory. The 6-foot-10, 240-pound senior made seven of his eight shots in the second period, contributing to FSU's 52.2-percent shooting clip in that half. Michael Snaer added 12 points and Ian Miller scored 11 for the Seminoles as the team shot 46 percent overall for the day. From Luke Loucks' shot-clock beating lay-up with just over two minutes to play to successful trips to the free-throw line by both Miller and Okaro White with less than 30 seconds on the clock, Florida State won the game that featured five lead changes and nine ties.

Florida State Men's Basketball By The Numbers

.372 Florida State leads the ACC in field goal percentage defense and is bidding to become the first team to lead the ACC in field goal percentage defense in four consecutive seasons.

.435 Ian Miller is shooting .435 from the 3-point line in the last six games (10 of 23) and has made at least one shot from the bonusphere in each of the last six games.

.444 Senior Deividas Dulkys is shooting .444 (four of nine) from the 3-point line in the last three games.

.545 Graduate student Jeff Peterson is shooting .545 from the field in the last three games. He has made two field goals in each of the last three games against Virginia Tech, NC State and Duke.

.850 Sophomore Ian Miller is shooting .850 from the free throw line for his career – he has missed a total of nine free throws in the first two years of his career (51 of 60).

0 Graduate student Luke Loucks is expected to play in his 129th consecutive career game against Duke – he has never missed playing in a game during his Seminole career. He and his classmates (Xavier Gibson and Deividas Dulkys) have played in a class record 89 wins during their careers.

2 The Seminoles and Duke are the only two teams in the ACC to finish in the top four of the ACC standings AND with double digit ACC wins in each of the last four seasons.

2 Florida State's Leonard Hamilton is the second longest tenured head coach in the ACC – he is in his 10th season in Tallahassee – and is ranked behind only Duke's Mike Krzyzewski in terms of longevity in the ACC.

2 ACC All-Defensive team candidate Bernard James is one of only two players in the ACC (also John Henson of North Carolina) who is averaging at least 8.0 rebounds (8.3) and at least 2.0 blocked shots (2.4) and who is ranked in the top five of the league statistics in both blocked shots and steals.

3 Three different Seminoles – Bernard James (Nov. 21), Deividas Dulkys (Jan. 16) and Michael Snaer (Jan. 23) – have earned ACC Player of the week honors this season. It's the most ACC Player of the Week honors in one season in Florida State basketball history.

3 Florida State has three wins in its last five games against top five ranked teams. The Seminoles defeated then No. 5 ranked Notre Dame (March 20, 2011) to advance to the Sweet 16 of the 2011 NCAA Tournament and defeated then No. 3 ranked North Carolina (90-57, Jan. 14, 2012) and Duke (76-73, Jan. 21) during a magical eight day span during the month of January.

5 Sophomore Okaro White is ranked fifth in school history with a .811 career free throw shooting percentage.

SEMINOLES EARN 10 ACC WINS IN FOUR CONSECUTIVE SEASONS

Prior to the beginning of the 2011-12 season, only four ACC programs and seven different coaches in ACC history has guided their teams to at least 10 wins in four or more consecutive seasons. Add Florida State and head coach Leonard Hamilton to that list. Hamilton has guided Florida State to at least 10 wins in each of the last four seasons (10-10-11-10) – one of only two current ACC teams to enjoy at least 10 ACC wins in each of the last four seasons.

SEMINOLES AMONG ACC'S TOP ROAD WARRIORS

Florida State is 4-2 in ACC road games this season and is one of only four league teams four or more conference road wins during 2011-12 conference season. The Seminoles are 8-6 in their last 14 ACC road games in the last two seasons and are looking to have a winning record on the road in league play for the fourth consecutive season. The Seminoles have proven to be one of the ACC's top road teams for the majority of the first 10 seasons of the Leonard Hamilton era. Florida State is the third winningest road team in the ACC in conference games in the last six seasons with 25 wins and is the third best team in the conference in overall road wins. The Seminoles are one of three teams in the ACC with a winning record on the road in ACC play in the last four seasons with a 17-13 record (.567 winning percentage) on the road in ACC play. In the last four seasons Duke (21-10), Florida State (17-13) and North Carolina (19-11) have winning conference records on the road.

FLORIDA STATE RECENTLY IN THE ACC...

...The Seminoles have won 26 of their last 35 ACC games (.743 winning percentage) since defeating Boston College in Tallahassee on Feb. 14, 2010;

...The Seminoles have not lost back-to-back conference games since the 2009-10 season when they dropped consecutive league games at Maryland (Jan. 10, 2010, 77-68) and to NC State (Jan. 12, 2010, 88-81) in Tallahassee;

...The Seminoles have lost consecutive ACC games only once in the last four seasons.

FLORIDA STATE IN ACC PLAY...

...Florida State has held a double digit lead in nine of its 13 ACC games of the season -- +12 vs. Virginia Tech, +33 vs. N. Carolina, +21 vs. Maryland, +25 vs. Wake Forest, +17 vs. Ga. Tech, +13 vs. Virginia, +13 vs. Boston College, +10 vs. Miami and +20 against NC State. Florida State led by as many as +3 (it's winning margin) vs. Duke and as many as +7 in its win over Virginia Tech on Feb. 16;

...Florida State has led by as many as 20 points in four different ACC games this season -- +33 vs. North Carolina, +21 vs. Maryland, +25 vs. Wake Forest and +20 against NC State;

...Florida State has led throughout (never trailed) three different ACC games – at Virginia Tech, against North Carolina and at NC State.

...Florida State has earned double figure wins in five different ACC games – against North Carolina (+33), against Maryland (+14), at Wake Forest (+23), against Georgia Tech (+14) and at NC State (+14). Florida State's 23 point margin of victory over Wake Forest (75-52) is the seventh largest margin of victory in an ACC game and the largest margin of victory on the road in an ACC game in school history. Its 14 point margin of victory at NC State is the sixth largest margin of victory in an ACC road game in school history.

NOTING FLORIDA STATE'S RECORD

Florida State enters Sunday's game against Miami with a 19-8 record and has a 10-2 record since dropping to 9-6 with a loss at Clemson on Jan. 7. The Seminoles were 9-6 from Nov. 11, 2011 through Jan. 7, 2012 and have a 10-2 record from Jan. 10, 2012 through Feb. 23, 2012.

TOUGH TO PREPARE FOR FLORIDA STATE

Under 10th-year head coach Leonard Hamilton, Florida State is one of the toughest teams in the nation to prepare to play against. The Seminoles have had seven different players lead – or tie for the team lead – in scoring in their first 26 games of the 2011-12 season. Junior All-American and All-ACC candidate Michael Snaer has led (or been tied for the team lead) in 12 different games including five different ACC games. Senior Bernard James has led the team in scoring in five different games including the Seminoles' win at Virginia Tech while senior Xavier Gibson led the Seminoles in scoring with 16 points in their win over Duke on Jan. 21.

7 ACC All-Defensive team candidate Bernard James has made seven consecutive free throws entering Sunday's game against Miami. He was a perfect six of six in the Seminoles' win over NC State and was one for one against Duke.

7 Graduate student Luke Loucks has blocked seven shots this season – he blocked a total of six in the first three seasons of his career.

10 ACC All-Defensive team candidate Bernard James has blocked at least one shot in 10 consecutive games – every game since Jan. 17 against Maryland. He has 23 blocked shots and averages 2.3 blocked shots during that span.

11 Junior All-American and All-ACC candidate Michael Snaer has made 11 consecutive free throws entering Sunday's game against Miami. He has not missed a free throw since the second half of Florida State's game against Boston College on Feb. 8.

12 Senior Bernard James is looking to become only the 12th player in school history to lead the Seminoles in rebounding in consecutive years. He led Florida State with 201 rebounds and a 5.9 rebounds per game average as a junior and enters Sunday's game against Miami as the Seminoles' leader with 223 rebounds and an 8.3 rebounds per game average. The last player to lead the Seminoles in rebounding in two consecutive seasons was Adam Waleskowski in 2004 and 2005.

15 Florida State's 15 blocked shots against Virginia Tech on Jan. 10, 2012 is tied for the school record for blocked shots in a single game and is tied for the most in the ACC this season. The Seminoles blocked 15 of the Hokies 59 shots – more than one quarter of their shots (.254) during the game.

18 Florida State has won each of the 18 games it has led at halftime including each of the nine ACC games it has led after the first 20 minutes. The Seminoles recovered from a halftime deficit (32-26) to defeat Duke in Durham, 76-73, on Jan. 21.

19 Florida State is undefeated, 19-0, when it outscores its opponent.

20 Junior All-American and All-ACC candidate Michael Snaer scored in double figures a team leading 20 times in the first 27 games of the season including all three games against North Carolina (17 points) and Duke (14 and 18 points).

40 Senior Xavier Gibson has started 40 of Florida State's last 52 games since the beginning of the 2010-11 season.

50 Senior Bernard James is expected to start his 50th consecutive game against Miami on Sunday. He has started every game for Florida State since Dec. 25, 2010 against Baylor in the Diamond Head Classic.

JAMES BLOCKS FIVE SHOTS AGAINST DUKE

ACC All-Defensive Team candidate Bernard James blocked a season high tying five shots – one off of his overall career high – against Duke on Thursday night in Tallahassee. It marked the second time in his career that he has blocked five shots in an ACC game – he also blocked five shots in the Seminoles' win over Virginia in Feb. 11, 2011. James' 146 blocked shots for his two year career is the third highest blocked shots total for a two year period in school history.

Florida State's 2011-12 Recruiting Class

In continuing an annual tradition that has now reached its 10th consecutive season, Leonard Hamilton and the Florida State men's basketball team have signed a top 25 nationally ranked recruiting class with the addition of four outstanding recruits who will become Seminoles in 2012: Devon Booker (Anchorage, AK./West), Monday Brandon (High Point, N.C./Wesleyan Christian), Robert Gilchrist (London, England/Polk State College) and Aaron Thomas (Cincinnati, Ohio/Brewster Academy).

Florida State's class is ranked as high as No. 17 nationally by Rivals.com and Hamilton is not done yet. With two graduate students and four seniors on the Seminoles' current roster, Hamilton is still looking to add two more players to his already bountiful recruiting class.

"We are very excited about the recruits in our incoming class," said Hamilton.

"Our staff has done another tremendous job of identifying and cultivating four players who we know will have a tremendous impact on our program during their entire careers. We have added everything we were looking for - ball handling skills, shooting ability, size and strong basketball knowledge."

Booker (6-2, 165) was named the 2011 Gatorade Player of the Year in the state of Alaska as he averaged 25.0 points, 8.5 assists, 7.1 rebounds and 3.6 steals per game as a senior at Anchorage West High School. He has graduated from high school and is currently spending a prep season at the Impact Basketball Academy in Las Vegas.

Brandon (6-7, 195) is currently ranked as the 59th best player and the 11th best guard in the nation by Rivals.com. He is a four-star recruit who averaged 19.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 4.0 assists per game as a junior. Considered a natural for Hamilton's system at Florida State, Brandon can play the one, two or three spots on the floor and is comfortable both handling the ball and playing on the wing.

Gilchrist (6-9, 210) is a junior college transfer from Polk State College in Winter Haven, Fla., who will have two years of eligibility remaining when he joins the Florida State program for the 2012-13 season. Ranked as the 16th best junior college player in the nation, he led Polk to the Sun coast Conference championship in 2011 as he earned all-conference first team honors as a freshman. Gilchrist averaged 9.0 points, 6.9 rebounds and 2.7 blocks per game while shooting .481 from the field as a freshman.

Thomas (6-4, 195) is the No. 56 ranked prospect by Rivals.com and was the No. 13 ranked shooting guard and the No. 71 ranked overall player in the nation as a senior at WI throw High School in Cincinnati. He is considered to be one of the top scorers and most athletic players in the class of 2012. Thomas is one of the top players at Brewster who will have at least four players accept Division I scholarships during the 2011 signing period.

WHITE CONTINUES TO SHINE FROM THE FREE THROW LINE

Sophomore Okaro White made five of six free throws in scoring nine points against Duke on Thursday night as he continued her career long trend of shooting well from the free throw line. He has made seven free throws in his last two games and was a perfect 18 of 18 from the line in seven consecutive games from Jan. 4 against Auburn through Jan. 25 against Wake Forest.

With the Seminoles in first half and second half foul trouble Space played a career high eight minutes, scored his third career field goal (in the first half to give the Seminoles a 32-24 lead), pulled down his career high of three rebounds and blocked his first career shot.

PETERSON'S BIGGEST ASSIST OF HIS SEMINOLE CAREER

Graduate student Jeff Peterson helped account for nine of the Seminoles' final 11 points of the game on Feb. 16 in their win over Virginia Tech. He hit his sixth 3-point shot of the season with 1:13 left in the game to bring Florida State to within six at 46-40. He was then credited with his first of two assists on the night on Ian Miller's 3-point shot that brought Florida State to within 47-45 with 45 seconds remaining. Peterson closed the game as he was credited with the game winning assist on Michael Snaer's game-winning buzzer beating basket with 2.6 seconds left in the game. Peterson scored all five of his points in the final 7:39 of the game as he helped Florida State recover from an 11 point deficit (42-31) and outscore the Hokies 17-6 to win the game.

PETERSON IN THE LAST THREE GAMES...

...Jeff Peterson has scored 15 points for a 5.0 points per game average in his last three games. He scored four points in Florida State's win over NC State, five in its win over Virginia Tech and six against Duke. Peterson had scored 10 points in his previous seven games (Jan. 17 against Maryland through Feb. 11 against Miami);

...Jeff Peterson is shooting .545 (six of 11) from the field in the last three games - nearly 12 percentage points higher than he is shooting for the entire season (.429). He has made six field goals in the last three games as compared to six made field goals in his last eight games.;

...Jeff Peterson is averaging 3.7 assists (11 total rebounds) in the last three games as compared to his 1.7 rebounds per game average for the entire season. He totaled four rebounds against both Virginia Tech and Duke and three in the Seminoles' win over NC State;

...Jeff Peterson has played 54 minutes in the last three games including 24 against Duke on Thursday in Tallahassee. He is averaging 18.0 minutes per game as compared to his 16.8 minutes per game average for the season. His 54 minutes in the last three games is more than he played in the previous four games (49).

MILLER AVERAGING IN DOUBLE FIGURES

Sophomore Ian Miller enters Sunday's game against Miami ranked third on the team with a career-high 10.3 points per game average. With nine double figure scoring games in 16 games this season, Miller is looking to become the first player to average in double figure scoring coming off the bench since Monte Cummings averaged 10.1 points as a reserve during the 2000-01 season.

MILLER FROM THE FREE THROW LINE

Sophomore Ian Miller enters Sunday's game against Miami shooting .850 from the free throw line - he has missed only nine free throw attempts in the first 40 games of his career. After missing the first free throw of his career (against UNC Greensboro on Nov. 14, 2010) he made 13 consecutive to close out the season. Miller then made 25 of his first 28 free throws of the 2011-12 season.

Battle-tested 'Nole: FSU forward is an Air Force veteran

Florida State forward Bernard James served three deployments in the Middle East.

Florida State forward Bernard James isn't likely to be rattled by the Cassell Coliseum crowd or a bad call from an official when his team visits Virginia Tech tonight.

He used to guard Iraqi detainees at what was once the largest U.S. military prison in Iraq.

James served in the U.S. Air Force from 2002-08, including three deployments to the Middle East. He spent 2007 as a prison guard at Camp Bucca in southern Iraq.

"Our base was attacked all the time," James said in a phone interview. "We had mortar attacks once every couple weeks. The detainees, they would have riots probably every week."

In 2005, he was a customs agent in Kuwait and Iraq. He was part of convoys between the two countries, transporting vehicles from Iraq to Kuwait for inspection before they were sent to the United States.

"The convoys, they were pretty dangerous," said James, who was promoted from airman to staff sergeant during his time in the Air Force. "There were roadside bombs and things of that nature we had to look out for. That was always on your mind."

James, a 26-year-old senior who never played high school basketball, is in his second season with the Seminoles. He ranks sixth in the ACC in rebounding (8.7 rpg) and fourth in blocked shots (2.4 bpg).

If a pro basketball career doesn't materialize, he might rejoin the Air Force.

"I really enjoyed my time in there," he said. "I'd be happy to go back."

High school dropout

James is not the only veteran in his family.

His stepfather, Darryl Cook, served in both the U.S. Army and the U.S. Air Force. The family moved often because of Cook's assignments.

James, whose last name is his mother's maiden name, attended Windsor Forest High School in Savannah, Ga. He tried out for the basketball team as a ninth-grader but was cut.

"I was just lazy at that point," James said. "Being cut actually kind of sparked me a little bit to work harder - [but] not so much basketball, because I wasn't really that interested in basketball when I tried out."

James dropped out of high school during his sophomore year in 2002, a few days before his 17th birthday.

"I didn't like the social pressure and the social nature of high school," he said. "A lot of high school revolves around your friends and how popular you are and what kind of clothes you wear."

James got his GED. At age 17, with his parents' permission, he enlisted in the Air Force.

"I just wanted to start fresh, start a new life," James said.

James' first deployment was to Qatar in 2003. He was part of his base's security force.

For his third deployment, he was among the Air Force personnel assigned to help guard about 15,000 prisoners at Camp Bucca, which was a U.S. Army base.

Prisoners "were suspected terrorists," he said. "A lot of them were people caught in the wrong place at the wrong time. A firefight may break out in a village and basically whoever they think was shooting back at them, that's who they round up. Those are the ones who go into the detainment facilities and they get their trial."

Another shot at basketball

James grew from 6-foot-5 to 6-10 while in the Air Force.

While stationed in California, he was recruited for his base's intramural basketball team. He opened so many eyes that he was picked for the all-Air Force team that competed in a tournament against teams from the other branches of the military and later played in tournaments for the U.S. Armed Forces all-star team.

FSU coach Leonard Hamilton first noticed James while he was playing for that all-star team in a 2005 tournament in Las Vegas.

James also caught the attention of a few other coaches, but he wanted to play for the Seminoles.

So after his stint in the Air Force ended, he joined the team at Tallahassee (Fla.) Community College in 2008 to improve academically. He played there for two seasons.

Last season, James helped FSU reach the Sweet 16 in the NCAA tournament. James averaged 8.6 points, 5.9 rebounds and 2.4 blocks, and started the final 21 games.

This season, James is averaging 9.7 points, 8.7 rebounds and 2.4 blocks for the Seminoles (9-6, 0-1 ACC).

"He doesn't have a lot of experience from a basketball standpoint, but he's learning," Hamilton said.

"We're a team that needs all the sum of its parts working well in order for us to be successful. I think as we play better as a team, you'll see him flourishing and contributing a lot better."

The 240-pound James credits being physical for his rebounding prowess.

"[It's] making sure that I hit my man before he hits me," he said. "Usually when I hit my man first, I have a pretty good chance of getting my hand on the ball, at least for a tip-out even if I don't pull down the

rebound myself. You get more space so you can actually get down and jump, use your full jumping ability, and you're not just kind of jumping off your tiptoes."

His timing helps him block shots, but James said blocks also involve a "mind game" with opposing players.

"I try to make like I'm not paying attention to them or I don't see them coming," he said.

He also credits his jumping ability and his "freakishly long arms."

Though James has traded in his Air Force uniform for a Florida State uniform, he said he misses the camaraderie of his former life in the military.

"The guys that I worked with pretty much became my family, so I definitely miss those guys and girls a lot," he said.

"You're over there with these guys that you've gotten to know and love. â€ You don't really think about, 'What have I got myself into?' too much. It's more about protecting the people around you - keeping your family safe."

FSU picked up right where it left off late last March with a strong defensive performance in a 79-67 win over Jacksonville. JU didn't score a basket until 14:50 left in the first half and never recovered on the scoreboard despite a late-game rally. FSU -- the nation's leader the last two seasons in defensive field goal percentage -- held Jacksonville to 36.4 percent shooting in the first half but that mark increased to 42.4 percent for the game because of the visitors' 20-10 run after the 'Noles had built their largest lead of the night (22) with 7:49 remaining on the clock. After an ankle injury limited him to just one point in the Seminoles' victorious season-opener last Friday, a healthy James' career evening guided FSU to a 73-50 win over in-state foe UCF at the Donald L. Tucker Center. The 'Noles played as a ranked team for the first time this season as they entered both national polls earlier in the day: No. 24 by in the ESPN/USA Today Poll and No. 25 in the Associated Press poll. TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Leonard Hamilton said before the season ever started that his Florida State men's basketball team "would win games by committee." Three games into the 2011-12 campaign and the head coach's sentiments have proved true. The No. 24 Seminoles defeated visiting Stetson 79-66 at the Donald L. Tucker Center behind double-figure scoring from Deividas Dulkys, Okaro White and Bernard James. It was the third time in as many games this year that FSU got double-digit scoring from at least three players. White's 18 points were just one shy of matching his career best and Dulkys was a perfect 4-for-4 from 3-point range with 16 points. James' second-consecutive double-double output (15 points and 11 rebounds) moved Florida State to 6-0 all-time when the big man records double-digit points and rebounds in the same game. Michael Snaer also added nine points and Xavier Gibson posted six points and seven rebounds. Jon Kreft contributed five points and Jeff Peterson registered a game-best seven assists. The 'Noles built a 33-14 lead in the first half before a 16-0 Hatters run threatened any advantage the home team might take into the locker room. BLACKSBURG, Va. - Florida State received a strong defensive performance and Bernard James put the team on his broad shoulders as the Seminoles earned a 63-59 win at Virginia Tech. By tying his career high with 18 points and setting a new career best with 15 rebounds (nine of which occurred on the offensive glass), James made sure that Florida State picked up its first ACC win of the year and in the process generate some much-needed momentum as college basketball fans across the country prepared to turn their attention to Tallahassee. The Seminoles also achieved a new season high and tied the school record with 15 blocks. Ian Miller and Okaro White made sure to shoulder some of the load, too. Miller continued his impressive offensive play off the bench as the sophomore added 15 points in the win. White finished with just four points but none were more important than the two he scored off a pair of successful free-throw attempts with under six seconds left to play at Cassell Coliseum. White's clutch free throws sealed the win. Florida State looked more like its typically dominant self on that side of the basketball court against Virginia Tech. In addition to halting over a dozen Virginia Tech shots, the 'Noles held their opponents to just 30.5 percent from the field and 16.7 percent from 3-point range. Michael Snaer contributed nine points before fouling out of the ballgame in the final moments for an FSU team that shot 41.2 percent. Luke Loucks added seven points and five assists. Erick Green led the Hokies with 21 points but he wishes his total would have reached 23. Green had an opportunity to tie the game at 61-61 with 10 seconds remaining but Deividus Dulkys' defensive pressure forced him to miss a driving shot attempt before White snagged the rebound and was fouled. Dulkys registered a career-best five

blocks. Miller also set a new career high for blocks with four and James and Xavier Gibson had three blocks each. For the game, the Seminoles won the rebounding battle 36-29.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - The Seminoles upset visiting North Carolina, 90-57, at the Donald L. Tucker Center capping off a day that started before the sun ever rose when fans began lining up outside the arena for a chance to be in the crowd during ESPN's live College Gameday broadcast. North Carolina found itself in that peculiar and unfamiliar position because of Florida State's stifling defense and Deividus Dulkys' couldn't-miss shooting effort. The Lithuanian-born senior had the best game of his career, scoring 32 points on 12-of-14 shooting from the floor -- including an 8-of-10 mark from 3-point range. The Florida State defense didn't hurt either. UNC -- the nation's leader in scoring prior to Saturday's upset -- was held to a season-low scoring total of 57. The Tar Heels also shot a season-worst 37.3 percent from the field and their bench players were outscored by Florida State reserves 24-8. FSU also out-rebounded UNC, 41-33, and forced 21 Carolina turnovers while notching 12 steals. The Seminoles' stout defense set up what was the team's best offensive performance of the season. En route to a season-high 90 points, FSU shot 48.4 percent overall and 44.4 percent from 3-point range. Michael Snaer added 17 points and five rebounds while Okaro White came off the bench with a double-double effort in scoring 12 points and grabbing 10 rebounds. Bernard James had eight points and nine rebounds and Luke Loucks registered six points and six assists. Loucks and Dulkys also added eight of Florida State's 16 total assists. The Seminoles started the game on a 9-2 run and led by as many as 12 in the first half before taking a 36-28 lead into the break.

Game No. 19 -- Florida State 76, Duke 73

DURHAM, N.C. - Michael Snaer's buzzer-beating 3-pointer, led the Florida State men's basketball team to a 76-73 win over No. 4 Duke -- a win that snapped the Blue Devils' 45-game winning streak at Cameron Indoor Stadium. After Duke's Austin Rivers hit a lay-up to tie the game at 73-73 with less than five seconds left on the game clock and with no time-outs to use, Luke Loucks took FSU's inbound pass hastily across mid court where Bernard James' well-placed screen gave him the necessary room to find the game's soon-to-be hero. By beating Duke Florida State capped off what could be considered one of -- if not the -- greatest regular-season weeks in the program's history. Exactly seven days after giving the Tallahassee crowd a reason to rush the court after upsetting then-No. 3 North Carolina, the 'Noles players had a reason to rush the court in Durham following Snaer's big shot. Not only did FSU defeat two top-five teams in a span of one week while also sandwiching a victory over Maryland in between those two games but the Seminoles also moved into a tie for first place in the competitive ACC. It was also Duke's first home loss to an unranked opponent since 2007 when Florida State came into Cameron Indoor and did the same thing. Xavier Gibson's 16 points led Florida State while Bernard James added 12 points and five rebounds. Deividas Dulkys finished with 12 points and Loucks posted eight of his own. The Seminoles held Duke to just 39.7 percent shooting as Rivers scored a game-high 19 points. Andre Dawkins added 14 points and Seth Curry had 12. Ryan Kelly -- one of just three bench players to participate for the Blue Devils -- contributed 10 points.

Game No. 20 -- Florida State 75, Wake Forest 72

WINSTON-SALEM, N.C. - Florida State defeated Wake Forest, 75-72, at the Lawrence Joel Veterans Coliseum for its fifth consecutive win -- a streak that is the team's longest since 1993. The Seminoles have now scored at least 75 points in four consecutive games and have defeated Wake Forest in four consecutive times -- a feat that has not occurred since the 1993-94 season. The ACC's reigning player of the Week, Michael Snaer, led the Seminoles in scoring with 18 points. The junior guard was a perfect 4-for-4 from 3-point range and 6-for-9 overall from the field. Snaer's excellence from long range helped FSU shoot 50 percent from 3-point distance and 50.9 percent in total. One game after shooting 67 percent in the second half against Duke, the 'Noles shot 68 percent in the final period against the Demon Deacons. Just like that buzzer-beating victory over the Blue Devils, Xavier Gibson had another strong game. Gibson scored 10 points while adding three rebounds. Bernard James scored seven points and grabbed nine rebounds and Okaro White came off the bench to add 11 points. Florida State coach Leonard Hamilton said earlier in the week that Demon Deacons center Ty Walker presented a unique challenge because of his ability to alter games defensively. But Walker proved to be a non-factor after he left the game late in the first half with what was announced as a concussion. Walker still managed four blocks in his limited time on the floor but FSU scored 40 points in the paint and won the rebounding

battle 32-25. The Demon Deacons were also held to just 34.9 percent shooting. Demon Deacons star Travis McKie -- the ACC's fourth-leading scorer before Wednesday night with a per-game average of 17.2 points -- was limited to just three points. The Seminoles led 29-23 at the half before Wake Forest cut that advantage to just two points early in the second period. But Florida State answered with a 18-2 run and never trailed by less than double digits the rest of the game.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Michael Snaer's 3-pointer with 2.6 seconds left boosted No. 20 Florida State to a 48-47 victory over Virginia Tech, capping an improbable finish that kept the Seminoles in a first-place tie in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Florida State trailed 45-37 with 1:29 left in the game, but Virginia Tech missed 5 of 6 free throw attempts over the final 1:09 to leave the door open for Snaer's heroics from the right side of the court. Snaer, who had made only three of his 10 previous shots, hit the game-winner from nearly the identical spot he produced similar heroics in Florida State's 76-73 win at Duke on Jan. 21. Ian Miller's 3 from the corner with 44 seconds left got the Seminoles within 47-45. Erick Green led Virginia Tech with 18 points and was nearly fouled as he launched a last-second desperation shot that bounced off the rim as the buzzer sounded. Green scored seven points that keyed a 17-0 Virginia Tech run to start the second half and the Hokies had a 40-25 lead with 14:09 left on Brown's only field goal in the game. Miller led Florida State with 11 points and Snaer had nine to help the Seminoles, who have won nine of 10 and caught North Carolina in the ACC standings. Florida State shot 40 percent from the field. The Hokies shot just 32.7 percent in the game and were beaten 41-31 on the boards.

RALEIGH, N.C. - Ian Miller scored 17 points, Bernard James had 12 and Okaro White and Michael Snaer each finished with 10 to help Florida State improve to 4-0 against North Carolina's four highest-profile programs with a 76-62 win over NC State. Florida State never trailed, shot 49 percent,

led by double figures for the entire second half, held NC State to 29 percent shooting -- its worst of the season, by far -- and forced 17 turnovers. That helped Florida State win its third straight and remain atop the league standings. C.J. Leslie scored 21 points to lead the Wolfpack but the rest of the team combined to shoot 9 of 44 in their second straight loss with both coming to nationally ranked teams in the span of fewer than 48 hours. The Seminoles, who haven't lost in Raleigh since 2006, have their defense largely to thank for their latest win here. They entered allowing teams to shoot just 37 percent -- second-best in the NCAA -- and clamped down on an NC State team that makes nearly 47 percent of its shots. Much of the Wolfpack's offense came from the free throw line, where they were 25 of 31. Florida State outscored NC State 18-9 during an 8½-minute stretch of the second half, with White's tip-in with 10 minutes to play making it a 20-point game for the first time at 57-37. The Wolfpack cut it to 12 three times, the last on Leslie's free throw with 4:25 left. Florida State then re-established its comfortable lead by reeling off seven quick points, with Miller's layup making it 70-51 with 3½ minutes to play. The win was especially sweet for Miller, a native of Charlotte who finished one point shy of a career high.
