SEMINOLES PLAY HOST TO MIAMI IN SECOND GAME OF THREE GAME HOME STAND

Florida State, which has won two of its last three ACC games, plays host to No. 23/23 Miami in the middle game of a three-game home stand on Super Bowl Sunday - February 1, 2015 at 12:30 inside of the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee. It marks the 22nd meeting of the rivals as members of the ACC as Florida State joined the conference for the 1991-92 season and Miami for the 2004-05 season. As member of the ACC, the Seminoles hold a 13-8 record against the Hurricanes including a 6-3 record advantage at home in Tallahassee. Florida State is fresh from an 82-76 double overtime victory over Wake Forest on Wednesday night in Tallahassee and is looking to win consecutive ACC games for the first time this season. Following Sunday's game against Miami, the Seminoles will play host to Clemson on Wednesday at 9:00 p.m. The game between the Seminoles and the Tigers will mark the second meeting of the season between the two teams. Florida State took a 59-55 win over Clemson on January 19 at Clemson.

SEMINOLES NOT STRANGERS TO PLAYING ON SUPER BOWL SUNDAY

Florida State plays host to Miami on Super Bowl Sunday 2015 marking the ninth time the Seminoles have played on the same day as the NFL Championship game. The Seminoles' game on Sunday marks the first time they have played the Hurricanes on Super Bowl Sunday and the second time in five seasons they have played prior to kickoff of the biggest professional football game of the year. Florida State's game against No. 23/23 Miami marks the second time it will face a ranked team on Super Bowl Sunday since a thrilling 68-67 victory over No. 8 ranked Duke in Cameron Indoor Stadium on February 4, 2007.

RATHAN-MAYES NAMED ACC CO-ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

Freshman Xavier Rathan-Mayes, who averaged 26.0 points, 5.0 rebounds, 6.5 assists and 3.0 steals while shooting .512 from the field and .400 from the three point line in two games for the Seminoles last week, was named the ACC Co-Rookie of the Week on January 26 for the first time in his career. He shared the award with Tyus Jones of Duke. It was Rathan-Mayes' 35-point, five rebound, four assists and two steals performance against the Tar Heels that was one for the record books. His 35 points established the Florida State record for points in a game by a freshman, is tied for the fifth highest point total in a game by a freshman in ACC history, is tied for the fourth highest point total by a freshman in a game involving two ACC teams, and he became only the fourth player to score 35 or more against North Carolina in the Smith Center. Rathan-Mayes' 35 points were the most points by an opponent in the Smith Center since J.J. Redick had 35 for Duke on Feb. 7, 2006 and only two other opponents have scored 35 or more points in the Smith Center against UNC: Lionel Simmons of La Salle had 37 on Jan. 9, 1988 and Len Bias of Maryland had 35 on Feb. 20, 1986. Rathan-Mayes is the 14th different Seminole player to earn ACC Rookie of the Week honors and first to earn the honor since the 2012-13 season.

LOOK FOR FLORIDA STATE TO...

...Defeat Miami and run its record to 6-0 against teams from the state of Florida this season. The Seminoles have defeated UCF (December, 96-72), North Florida (December 17, 93-77), USF (December 20, 75-62), Stetson (December 22, 63-59) and Florida (December 30, 65-53);

...Defeat Miami and gain victories over both Miami and Florida in the same year since the 2008-09 season when the Seminoles defeated both the Gators (December 7, 2008, 57-55) and the Hurricanes at home (February 18, 2009, 80-67);

...Defeat Miami and gain its first win of the season over a ranked team. The Seminoles have at least one victory over a ranked team in 23 of the last 24 seasons. The Seminoles have defeated 29 ranked teams under head coach Leonard Hamilton;

...Defeat a ranked Miami team for the first time. The Seminoles have faced a ranked Miami team twice (both last season) in the history of the 73-game series between the two schools.

FLORIDA STATE'S WIN TOTAL IN THE LAST 10 YEARS

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last 10 years (since the start of the 2005-06 season) in total games played with 207 wins. The Seminoles average 21.7 wins per season with records of 20-10 (2005-06), 22-13 (2006-07), 19-15 (2007-08), 25-10 (2008-09), 22-10 (2009-10), 23-11 (2010-11), 25-10 (2011-12), 18-16 (2012-13) and 22-14 (2013-14).

FLORIDA STATE IN ACC PLAY IN THE LAST SEVEN SEASONS

In the last seven seasons (through January 28, 2015), Florida State is 64-44 (.593 winning percentage) and has finished in third place in the league standings three times in regular season ACC play. The Seminoles average 10.1 ACC regular season wins per season and have finished in the top four of the ACC standings four times in the last six seasons. Florida State is third in the ACC in conference wins with 64 and third in winning percentage at .593.

HAMILTON ONLY SEVEN WINS FROM BECOMING FLORIDA STATE'S ALL-TIME LEADER

Leonard Hamilton, Florida State's 13th-year head coach, won his 230th game at Florida State and moved into sole possession of second on the Seminoles' all-time wins list. Hamilton needs just seven wins to become the Seminoles' all-time leader for coaching victories – a standard currently held by J.K. Kennedy who was the second coach in the history of the Seminole basketball program. Hamilton is the fourth coach in school history to win at least 200 games.

HAMILTON ONLY 10 WINS FROM MOVING INTO 10TH IN ACC HISTORY

Head coach Leonard Hamilton won his 230th career game as the Seminoles' head coach as Florida State defeated Wake Forest in double overtime on Wednesday in Tallahassee. Hamilton ranks 11th in ACC history with 230 wins as a head coach in the ACC and needs only 10 wins to move into the ACC's all-time top-10 for career wins. Former Wake Forest head coach and ACC legend Dave Odom is currently ranked 10th in the ACC with 240 career wins.

HAMILTON ALSO MOVING UP THE ACC CAREER LIST FOR VICTORIES

Seminole head coach Leonard Hamilton enters Sunday's game against Miami ranked 14th in ACC history with 101 ACC wins (91 ACC regular season wins and 10 ACC Tournament wins). He became only the 14th coach in ACC history to reach 100 ACC wins with Florida State's victory at Clemson on January 19, 2015. Hamilton is only three ACC wins from moving in to a tie for 12th place all-time in ACC history with the great Everett Case of NC State.

FLORIDA STATE VS. MIAMI – THE LAST GAME

Donnavan Kirk scored 16 points as Miami earned an ACC win with a 77-73 victory against rival Florida State on February 10, 2014 at the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee. The win was just the second on the road for the Hurricanes against the Seminoles in eight attempts. Rion Brown finished with 14 points for Miami while Tonye Jerkiri chipped in 15. Ian Miller scored 13 for Florida State in his first game back from an ankle injury. Devon Bookert scored 17 and Aaron Thomas had 16 in the loss. Miami's five first-half 3-pointers helped extend its lead to 12 points before Miller caught fire. Miller buried a pair of back-to-back 3-pointers and added a pull-up jumper with 37 seconds left to keep the Seminoles within single digits at halftime. The Hurricanes extended its lead to a game-high 13 after a 5-0 start to the second half. Florida State needed stops down the stretch, but the two teams traded baskets for too long before the Seminoles were forced to foul each possession in an attempt to cut the lead. The Hurricanes shot 47.9 percent from the field after entering the game shooting 38.8 percent in ACC play.

He has scored in double figures in six of the first eight ACC games of his career, has totaled at least 20 points three times (21 in a win over Wake Forest on January 28, 22 in a win over Virginia Tech on January 6 and his career high of 35 at the Dean Smith Center against North Carolina in January 24; ...Boris Bojanovsky is the leader in blocked shots in ACC games only with a 2.3 blocked shots per game average eight games against ACC opponents. He has at least one blocked shot in seven of eight ACC games with four blocks coming against Wake Forest on January 28 and at Syracuse on January 11; ...Devon Bookert is ranked eighth with a .404 3-point field goal shooting percentage and sixth with 21 3-point field goals made against ACC opponents. He has made at least two 3-point field goals against seven of the Seminoles' eight ACC opponents with a career-high tying our coming in Florida State's victory over Virginia Tech on January 6 in Tallahassee.

.800 Sophomore Jarquez Smith is shooting .800 from the free throw line (eight of 10) in the last two games. He was 3 of 4 from the line against UNC and was five of six from the line against Wake Forest.

.952 Junior Devon Bookert enters Sunday's game against Miami shooting .952 from the free throw line (20 of 21) in the last nine games. His only missed attempt from the free throw line during that span came in the second half against Clemson.

1 Freshman Phil Cofer scored his first career double double of 21 points and 11 rebounds against Pitt on January 14, 2015.

1 Junior Montay Brandon is the only player who has started each of the first 21 games of the 2014-15 season for the Seminoles. He is also the only Seminole who has started each game in the last two seasons for the Seminoles (57 consecutive starts).

1 Junior Brandon Allen made his first 3-point shot of the season against Wake Forest. 11 Freshman Xavier Rathan-Mayes has played at least 32 minutes in 11 consecutive games (an average of 37.5 minutes played per game).

11 Junior Devon Bookert has made multiple 3-point field goals in 11 of his last 13 games, at least three 3-point field goals in eight of his last 13 games and at least four 3-point field goals in three of the last 13 games.

11 Junior Montay Brandon has scored 266 points and averages a career-high 12.7 points scored per game this season. He needs only 11 points to surpass his single season career high for points scored (276 points) which he scored in 36 games as a sophomore.

22 Junior Brandon Allen has played in 22 minutes in the last four games after playing in 21 minutes in his first eight games of the season. He has played in four consecutive games after playing in eight of the first 17 games of the season.

SEMINOLES HITTING THEIR STRIDE FROM THE FREE THROW LINE

Florida State, which shot .767 from the line in its victory of Wake Forest on Wednesday night, has shot 70 percent or better from the line in each of its last four games. The Seminoles made 23 free throws (including seven of 10 in the two overtime periods) as they outscored the Deacons from the line(23-20) in gaining the win. The Seminoles outscored the Deacons in the two overtime periods (17-11) including 7-4 from the free throw line.

Florida State enters Sunday's game against Miami having utilized six different line-ups in its first 21 games of the season with nine different players having earned at least one starting assignment this season -- but have started the last 12 games with the same starting five -- Phil Cofer, Michael Ojo, Xavier Rathan-Mayes and Montay Brandon. The Seminoles have started each game since December 27 against North Florida with the same line-up.

FLORIDA STATE IN MULTIPLE OVERTIMES

Florida State defeated Wake Forest, 82-72 in double overtime on Wednesday night in Tallahassee. It marked the Seminoles first win in a multiple overtime game since defeating Wichita State, 91-84, in the first round of the NIT at Wichita State. The game was the Seminoles' first multiple overtime game since a triple overtime game against Princeton on December 30, 2011.

COFER AND RATHAN-MAYES AGAINST WAKE FOREST

Freshmen Phil Cofer (19 points) and Xavier Rathan-Mayes (21 points) combined to score 40 of the Seminoles' 82 points (.88 percent) in their 82-76 victory over Wake Forest on Wednesday. Cofer had nine points in the two overtime periods (five in the first overtime period and four in the second overtime period) while Rathan-Mayes totaled five points after regulation time (five points in the second overtime period). The pair combined to shoot .607 from the field (17 of 28) and totaled 12 rebounds in the victory. Cofer was a perfect four of four from the field in the two extra sessions as the Seminoles made five of seven shots (.714 percent) from the field and seven of 10 free throws (.700 percent) in outscoring the Deacons, 17-11, to take the victory.

Florida State Basketball and the Super Bowl

Florida State All-American and 2013 Remington Award Winner Bryan Stork will play as a member of the New England Patriots in the 2015 Super Bowl. He will become the 55th Seminole player to play in the Super Bowl. Should he be a member of the winning team, will become the 28th Seminole to win a Super Bowl title. Former Seminole basketball player Brad Johnson was the starting quarterback on the Tampa Bay Buccaneers Super Bowl winning team in 2003. Johnson (Charles D. Owen High School in Black Mountain, N.C.) was a teammate of ESPN analyst Brad Daugherty on the basketball team at Charles D. Owen High School.

SEMINOLES LED IN SCORING AND REBOUNDING BY FRESHMEN

Florida State was led in the scoring column (by Xavier Rathan-Mayes, 21 points) and in the rebounding column (Phil Cofer, eight rebounds) in its victory over Wake Forest on Wednesday night. It marked the fourth time the Seminoles have been led in scoring a rebounding by freshman in a game this season – also against UMass (22 points by Rathan-Mayes and 12 rebounds by Cofer), at Pitt (Phil Cofer with 21 points and 11 rebounds) and at Clemson (Xavier Rathan-Mayes with 17 points and five rebounds) in addition to their victory over Wake Forest.

RATHAN-MAYES WRITES HIMSELF INTO ACC RECORD BOOK

Freshman Xavier Rathan-Mayes' current four-game scoring streak of 88 points is the most in a four game stretch by a Seminole player since All-American and NBA First Round draft pick Toney Douglas scored 96 points in a five game stretch during senior season as a Seminole. Douglas scored 28 against North Carolina, 28 at Miami, 17 at Maryland and 23 against Clemson during February of his senior season. Douglas averaged 24.0 points scored per game during that stretch. He would stretch the streak to five consecutive games with a 20-point performance against Boston College to bring his scoring averaged in the five games to 23.2 ppg (116 total points)

RATHAN-MAYES IN DOUBLE FIGURE SCORING

Freshman Xavier Rathan-Mayes has scored in double figures in nine of the last 10 games (171 total points) and is averaging 19.0 points scored per game since scoring 14 points against Stetson on December 22. He is two points shy (he scored eight points at Pitt) of scoring in double figures in each of the last 10 games.

Seminole Signee Bacon Named To McDonald's All-American Team

Dwayne Bacon, one of the top high school basketball players in the nation, has been named to the prestigious McDonald's All-American Team. He has signed a National Letter of Intent to play for Head Coach Leonard Hamilton at Florida State beginning in the fall of 2015.

The McDonald's All-American Team is the best-known of the high-school basketball All-American teams. Having the designation of McDonald's All-American instantly brands a player as one of the top high school players in the United States or Canada.

"It is a tremendous honor for Dwayne to be named to the McDonald's All-American team," said Hamilton. "We are elated for him as the honor of being named a McDonald's All-American is a very prestigious one and defines how hard he has worked to become an outstanding player and an even better young man. The additions of Dwayne, Malik Beasley, Terance Mann and Chris Koumadje to the Seminole family raise the level of back to as a team of significance in the greatest basketball conference in the country and in all of college basketball."

Bacon (Lakeland, Fla.) has led Oak Hill to a 32-0 record while averaging 24.2 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.1 assists. He scored 32 points and earned MVP honors against Cape Henry at the High School Winter Classic Basketball Challenge and totaled 33 points as he powered the Warriors past Villa Angela St. Joseph High School. Bacon has scored 30 or more points in three straight games, including 33 in the championship game at the Bass Pro Shops Tournament where he also earned MVP honors and scored 36 points in a win over Word of God. Oak Hill is the No. 2 ranked prep team in the nation.

Beasley (Alpharetta, Ga.) has led St. Francis High School to an 18-3 record while averaging 22.4 points, 7.7 rebounds, 3.4 assists and 2.0 steals per game. He totaled 24 points and eight rebounds against Pinecrest, scored 29 points to go along with six rebounds and five assists against Whitefield and totaled 17 points and seven rebounds in one half of play against Fellowship Christian School.

The selection of Bacon to the McDonald's All-American team marks the fourth elected to the team who have been recruited by Hamilton to play at Florida State. Hamilton also recruited Michael Snaer (2009), Chris Singleton (2008) and Von Wafer (2003) -- three players who enjoyed stellar careers as Seminoles.

Also joining the Seminoles' top-five ranked recruiting class is center Jean Marc Christ Koumadje (7-4, 220) and versatile forward Terance Mann (6-5, 210) who are also enjoying stellar high school seasons.

Mann (Tilton, N.H.) has led Tilton to a 20-1 record while averaging 21 points and 9 rebounds a game. Mann scored his 1,000th career point for during Tilton's recent trip to Manchester, England where he was named the MVP of the Haris Memorial Tournament. He recently totaled 13 points, 12 rebounds and four assists in a 76-58 win over Marianapolis High School on January 24.

Mann was the Seminoles' first signee of their 2015 recruiting class. He pledged his commitment to Hamilton and his staff prior to his official visit during the fall of 2014. Mann is incredibly smart both on and off of the court who's very high basketball IQ and incredible versatility has allowed him to become very skilled at playing four positions on the court.

Koumadje (Chad, Nigeria), who will become the tallest player in school history when he enrolls for the fall 2015 semester, is a member of the nation's No. 1 prep team at Montverde Academy in Montverde, Fla. Koumadje is averaging 7.0 points and 4.0 blocked shots per game as a senior.

BOOKERT SINCE RETURNING FROM INJURY

Junior Devon Bookert has played extremely well in the last 13 games since returning from a foot injury that forced him to miss five consecutive games (November 23 against UMass through December 6 against UCF). In the 13 games since his return to the court against Notre Dame on December 13, Bookert is averaging 12.3 points per game and has made 34 3-point field goals (2.6 3FGM/game).

BOOKERT SEEING DOUBLE

Junior Devon Bookert is the only player in school history who is ranked in the top five of the Seminoles' career free throw shooting percentage record list (second, .822) and career 3-point shooting percentage list (third, .442). He is looking to become the first player in school history to shoot better than 80 percent from the free throw line and better than 40 percent from the 3-point line for his career.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - With the return of sixth-year senior center Kiel Turpin and the debuts of Xavier Rathan-Mayes, Phil Cofer and Dayshawn Watkins providing a glimpse of the future, coach Leonard Hamilton's 13th Florida State men's basketball team made its exhibition debut Monday night at the refurbished Donald L. Tucker Center. Officially, the Seminoles cruised to a 95-73 over perennial NIAA power Embry-Riddle, though the outcome was not nearly as important as Hamilton getting a first in-game glimpse of the newcomers and how they meshed with a core of veterans. Turpin's return, after missing last season following knee surgery, provided the Seminoles with a quick lift offensively in the post. CLEMSON, S.C. -- The Seminoles got 17 points from Xavier Rathan-Mayes and 14 from Devon Bookert to end a three-game losing streak with a 59-55 victory over Clemson. Florida State saw its 12-point, second-half lead slip to 56-55 on Rod Hall's foul shot with 23.3 seconds left. But the Seminoles held on for their third straight win at Littlejohn Coliseum and sixth victory in their past seven meetings with the Tigers. After Hall drew Clemson with a point, Bookert made one of two foul shots and Rathan-Mayes had a breakaway layup for the final margin. Clemson had two chances to tie or pull ahead, first when Hall went to the foul line and missed his first attempt. Then trailing 57-55, Damarcus Harrison missed a 3-pointer with 16 seconds left in the Tigers final opportunity. The Seminoles started quick. Rathan-Mayes and Kiel Turpin, the son of former Kentucky All-American Mel Turpin -- fueled a 13-3 run over an eight-minute stretch of the opening half. The 7-foot Turpin had two inside buckets, Rathan-Mayes a basket and when Devon Bookert hit a 3-pointer, Florida State led 26-14. Clemson picked up a late spark from 6-10 reserve Sidy Djitte, who scored his team's final eight points of the period as the Tigers cut things to 28-22 at the half.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. -- Brice Johnson had 18 points and 14 rebounds to help the 15th-ranked Tar Heels survive a 35-point performance from Florida State freshman Xavier Rathan-Mayes and beat the Seminoles 78-74 at the Dean E. Smith Center. Johnson earned his fourth double-double despite playing just 23 minutes due to first-half foul trouble. Marcus Paige scored 19 points to help the Tar Heels win their fifth straight league game. They led nearly all day, though Rathan-Mayes hit three 3-pointers in the final 36 seconds to keep FSU in it to the horn. Rathan-Mayes' 35 points were a FSU freshman record and were the most by a UNC opponent in the Smith Center in nearly nine years. His last 3 cut the deficit to 75-72 with about 17 seconds left, but FSU got no closer. Rathan-Mayes scored 22 second-half points and finished 14-for-26 from the field. The rest of the Seminoles shot 13-for-35. "I think it all came together for him," Florida State coach Leonard Hamilton said. "And we really needed every one of his points to stay close."

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Xavier Rathan-Mayes scored 21 points, hitting a long jump shot and then two free throws in the final minute of double overtime, and Phil Cofer added 19 points and eight rebounds as Florida State defeated Wake Forest 82-76. Devon Bookert had 15 points for Florida State, making 3 of 4 3-pointers. The Seminoles shot 27 of 58 (46.6 percent) from the floor. Codi Miller-McIntyre scored 25 points and Cornelius Hudson added 18 for Wake Forest, which lost its fourth straight game. The Demon Deacons shot 24 of 70 (34.3 percent) from the floor, including just 8 of 27 from beyond the 3-point arc. Hudson was the exception for Wake Forest, coming off the bench to make a season-high five 3-pointers. Wake Forest pulled out to an early 19-4 lead halfway through the first half as Florida State went 6-plus minutes without a basket. But Florida State gradually chipped away at Wake Forest's lead, tying the game at 43 on a Rathan-Mayes layup with 14:09 left in regulation. Florida State led 65-61 with 1:21 left in regulation, but Miller-McIntyre made a jump shot and then tied the game at 65 with 11 seconds to go to force overtime. After both teams missed chances to win the game in the first overtime, Florida State outscored Wake Forest 10-4 in the final five minutes. Cofer put FSU ahead for good, 77-75, on a slam dunk off an assist by Bookert with 1:25 left. Cofer had nine of his 19 points in overtime and double overtime. The freshman made 9 of 13 shots from the floor.

Arctic blast: 9 Alaska men find their way to Division I college basketball

Alaskans are filling the ranks -- and filling buckets -- at the Division I level of college basketball.

Nine men's basketball players are playing at the highest level of the college game, and several of them have blossomed into legit stars for their teams.

Florida State's Devon Bookert (West) is one of the top guards in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Colgate's Damon Sherman-Newsome (Bartlett) and Houston Baptist's Colter Lasher (Dimond) are their team's leading scorers, and five of the nine lead their teams in 3-point shooting percentage.

Alaskans have had D-I success in the past. Muff Butler was a star at New Orleans in the 1980s, East's Trajan Langdon and Juneau's Carlos Boozer were household names for Duke in the 1990s and Mario Chalmers won a national title at Kansas in 2008. But seldom before have so many from the 49th state been on the Division I scene at once, a phenomenon that can be attributed both to the quality of basketball in Alaska as well as increased awareness of what it takes to make the leap to Division I.

Getting exposure has always been a challenge. In the past, the only Alaskans who got D-I looks were prep superstars like Langdon, Boozer and Chalmers, all of whom were blue-chip prospects coming out of high school.

Getting recruiters to come to Alaska is still a challenge, but Alaskans have become more savvy about developing their games and drawing interest from coaches. Of the nine Alaskans playing D-I ball, only two -- Derrick Wilson of Marquette and Calvin Hoffman of Liberty -- went directly from high school to active Division I rosters, and Wilson didn't make the jump from an Alaska high school. He played one season at East and then spent the rest of his high school days at a Connecticut boarding school with a strong basketball program.

The rest went to junior college (Sherman-Newsome and Oregon's Jalil Abdul-Bassit), took a redshirt year (South Dakota State's Connor Devine) or went to the prestigious Impact Basketball Academy in Las Vegas (Bookert, Lasher, Hartford's Jack Hobbs and Iona's Ryden Hines).

Bookert said Alaskans who want to play high-level college basketball have to be patient.

"I think there's just not much exposure up in Alaska," he said in a phone interview Friday after practicing in advance of a Saturday game against North Carolina State.

Bookert said players from Alaska can also draw interest from college coaches by sending out game tapes or attending basketball camps outside.

It's hard to generalize about Alaska players, but based on this year's statistics it's safe to say coaches who sign Alaskans can count on one thing: shooting ability. Hines, Sherman-Newsome, Lasher, Abdul-Bassit and Bookert lead their teams in 3-point shooting percentage and Devine leads his squad in field goal percentage.

Bookert said he's not sure why Alaskans are typically skilled shooters. But he's got a couple of theories.

"It might be the cold or just something in the water," he said.

Bookert said one of the most important pieces of advice he'd give players hoping to succeed in Division I -- aside from shooting jumpers after practice -- is to spend time in the classroom. He said college coaches look for more than just basketball skill when they recruit players, which means athletes need to focus on their studies throughout high school.

"I would tell them to work hard, of course, and to have good grades," he said. "It means more than you think."

Devon Bookert

Florida State Seminoles
West, 2011
6-3 junior guard

Alaska's Gatorade Player of the Year in 2011 has become a star in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Bookert has started 50 of 82 games in three seasons and ranks 20th in program history in 3-pointers and 88th in career points (647). He's averaging 10.2 points per game, 2.7 assists per game and 4.1 rebounds per game. Despite missing almost a month with a foot injury, Bookert

leads the Seminoles in 3-pointers (24), 3-point shooting percentage (38.7) and minutes per game (33.8). In 2012-13, Bookert set a single-season school record by shooting 52.5 percent from behind the arc (32 of 61); his career 44.4 percent shooting from deep ranks fourth in team history.

Jalil Abdul-Bassit

Oregon Ducks

East, 2011

6-4 senior guard

Abdul-Bassit, who won a state title at West in 2010 before transferring to East, is fourth in scoring for the Ducks with 7.7 points per game, and his 39.3 percentage from long range leads the team. A key reserve, he has started two games and scored a career-best 19 points in Oregon's 81-59 win over Portland State on Nov. 30, 2014.

Connor Devine

South Dakota State Jackrabbits

Wasilla, 2012

6-10 sophomore forward

The 2012 Alaska Gatorade Player of the Year, Devine is averaging 2.7 points per game in his second season at South Dakota State. His 23 blocks rank second on the team and his 63 percent field goal percentage leads the team. On Dec. 18, 2014, he scored a career-high 13 points, pulled down seven rebounds and had three blocks in a win over Idaho State.

Ryden Hines

Iona Gaels

Dimond, 2012

6-10 sophomore forward

Hines helped Dimond to a 4A championship in 2012. Now in his second season at Iona, Hines has started seven straight games, a stretch that's seen the team go 6-1. He's averaging 2.9 points per game, 2.8 rebounds per game and shooting 43.5 percent from 3-point range. In a 74-58 win over Fairfield on Jan. 13, he scored a season-high nine points and grabbed six rebounds.

Jack Hobbs

Hartford Hawks

South, 2013

6-7 freshman forward

Hobbs has cracked the lineup twice in his first season at Hartford, playing a total of 14 minutes and scoring three points. His first collegiate basket was a 3-pointer in Hartford's 69-59 win over Binghamton on Jan. 7.

Calvin Hoffman

Liberty Flames

Anchorage Christian, 2014

6-0 freshman guard

A four-time all-state performer who helped ACS to a Class 3A state championship in 2011, the walk-on has played in seven games as a true freshman. He is averaging 1.7 minutes a game and has amassed seven points, three rebounds and two steals.

Colter Lasher

Houston Baptist Huskies

Dimond, 2012

6-7 sophomore forward

Lasher, one of two Division I players from Dimond's 2012 state title squad, has started 11 games this season and is second on his team in scoring at 11.4 points per game. He leads the Huskies in 3-point percentage (37.8) and is shooting 51.2 percent from the field. He scored a career-best 25 points in Houston Baptist's 68-56 win on Jan. 5 over McNeese State and has been the team's leading scorer in six of 14 games.

Damon Sherman-Newsome

Colgate Raiders

Bartlett, 2011

6-5 senior guard

Sherman-Newsome, who led Bartlett to a state 4A title in 2011, is the leading scorer for the Raiders, who are in first place in the Patriot League for the first time since 1998-99. He's averaging a team-best 15.6 points per game and shooting 41.7 percent from 3-point range. Sherman-Newsome scored a career-high 30 points in a Jan. 7 win over Holy Cross, becoming the seventh player from Alaska to score at least 30 points in a Division I game. He's started all 18 games, scoring in double figures 16 times. If he continues his current pace, he'll finish his career among the top 30 scorers in the program's 115-year history.

Derrick Wilson

Marquette Golden Eagles

East, 2011

6-1 senior guard

Wilson, who played one season at East before spending the next three years at a Connecticut boarding school, has started 12 of 16 games, ranks fifth in scoring at 6.3 points per game and second in assists at 3.2 per contest.
