### GAME STORYLINES

» Purdue concludes its three-game homestand and plays its sixth game in 12 days on Tuesday when it hosts Miami for the third meeting in series history, and the first since 1999.

» The Boilermakers are 4-6 in Big Ten/ACC Challenge play, having won their last two in the event; Purdue provided the Challenge-clinching wins for the Big Ten in each of the last two seasons.

» Purdue is 3-2 in Challenge games at Mackey Arena; the Boilers' last non-conference home loss came to Duke in the Challenge on Dec. 2, 2008 - a span of 22 games.

» The Boilers enter the contest in the midst of a 21-game home winning streak, the second-longest in Mackey Arena history and tied for the seventh-longest home winning streak in the nation.

» The Boilermakers are 90-12 (.882) at Mackey Arena under the direction of head coach Matt Painter, including a 16-0 mark a year ago to mark the program's first undefeated home season in more than 40 years.

» Purdue is 31-7 (.816) under head coach Matt Painter in the month of November, having won 15 of their last 17 November games.

» The Boilermakers are forcing opponents into an average of 15.7 turnovers per game on the year, and own a +10.6 average margin in the points-off-of-turnovers department.

» Through seven games, Purdue is 70-of-176 (.398) from beyond the arc, averaging 10.0 triples per game; the Boilermakers are 22-4 (.846) under Painter when connecting on at least 10 three-point field goals.

» Seniors Robbie Hummel and Ryne Smith have combined to shoot 47-of-95 (.495) from the arc this season; the duo was 9-of-19 (.474) from deep against Coppin State, including a 5-of-9 effort from Hummel.

» Smith is shooting .520 from the arc for the season, and leads the Big Ten with an average of 3.7 treys per game; he needs five triples to break onto the program's career chart.

» Hummel leads Purdue and ranks second in the Big Ten with an average of 19.3 points per game; he has been in double figures in each of the Boilermakers' seven outings, and has reached the 20-point mark on four occasions.

» Senior guard Lewis Jackson is coming off of Purdue's first 10-assist game in nearly seven years with 10 assists and no turnovers against Coppin State on Saturday.

## BOILERMAKERS RIDING LENGTHY HOME WINNING STREAK

Purdue is in the midst of a 21-game winning streak at Mackey Arena, dating to its victory over Indiana on March 3, 2010.

Purdue's current home winning streak is the second-longest in the history of Mackey Arena, and the third-longest in program history.

## THREE-POINT BARRAGE SPURS BOILERS IN EARLY SEASON

Through the first seven games of the 2011-12 season, the Boilermakers are 70-of-176 from three-point range, good for a clip of 39.8 percent. Purdue has made at least 12 triples in four games, and is 22-4 (.846) under head coach Matt Painter when making at least 10 three-point field goals in a game.

Senior Ryne Smith has made 26-of-50 (.520) from deep, and leads the Big Ten with an average of 3.7 treys per game. Classmate Robbie Hummel is 21-of-45 (.467) from the arc on the young season, and ranks third in the conference at 3.0 triples per outing.

The Boilers were 14-of-28 from the arc against Northern Illinois in the season opener. The 14 makes from deep were just two shy of the program's single-game record. Purdue attempted a school-record 34 treys against Coppin State on Nov. 26, falling one shy of Valparaiso's Mackey Arena record.

## BOILERMAKERS OWN ONE OF NATION'S ELITE WIN TOTALS OVER LAST THREE YEARS

Purdue has won 88 games since the beginning of the 2008-09 season, the sixth-best win total in the nation over that stretch. The Boilers' 88 wins in that timeframe are also the second-most in the Big Ten.

## JACKSON FINALLY NOTCHES DOUBLE-DIGIT ASSIST GAME

After recording nine assists in a game on three occasions and narrowly missing on a 10th each time, senior guard Lewis Jackson finally put up a 10-assist game in Purdue's win over Coppin State on Nov. 26.

The performance was the first 10-assist game by a Purdue player since Austin Parkinson had 12 against Penn State on Feb. 4, 2004. More impressively, Jackson compiled his 10 assists against CSU without recording a turnover.

Jackson currently ranks 12th in program history with 341 assists, 59 away from 400 for his career.

## HUMMEL, JACKSON GARNER PRTO ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM HONORS

Seniors Robbie Hummel and Lewis Jackson were rewarded for their efforts in helping lead the Boilers to the championship game of the 5-hour Energy Puerto Rico Tip-Off with all-tournament team honors. The duo made Purdue the only school in the field with two honorees, and was joined by Tony Mitchell (Alabama), Scott Machado (Iona) and Ramone Moore (Temple).

Hummel led the Boilmakers in scoring in San Juan, netting 20.3 points per game and hitting 12-of-13 (.923) attempts from the free-throw line. He hit the game-winning three-pointer with 20 seconds left to defeat Iona in the opening round, and followed up with a 20-point outing against Temple.

Jackson had 17 in the win over Iona before exploding for a career-high 26 in the semifinal win over Temple. He was 8-of-14 from the field and 10-of-11 from the line against the Owls in 32 minutes. He pulled down a career-high nine rebounds against Alabama in the championship contest.

## JACKSON SHINES IN PRTO SEMIFINAL WIN

Senior guard Lewis Jackson had a career day on the offensive end in Purdue's win over Temple in the semifinals of the 5-hour Energy Puerto Rico Tip-Off, finishing with a career-best 26 points.

Jackson shot 8-of-14 from the field against the Owls - marking career highs for both makes and attempts - and connected on a career-high 10 free throws on 11 attempts. The Decatur, Ill., native scored 22 of his 26 points after halftime, including 10 in the final three minutes to seal the win and send the Boilers to the championship game.

The performance marked the first 20-point scoring game of Jackson's career, and also the first time in his collegiate tenure that he had led the Boilers in scoring.

## HUMMEL VYING TO JOIN PROGRAM'S WINNINGEST PLAYERS

Senior forward Robbie Hummel has played in 80 victories in a Purdue uniform, leaving him 11 away from breaking into the program's top-10 for career wins. He is also 20 wins away from becoming just the fourth Boilmaker to play in 100 for his career.

The program record currently stands at 107 wins, and is shared by former Purdue stars Jajuan Johnson and E'Twaun Moore. Keaton Grant and Chris Kramer, both also former teammates of Hummel's, currently rank third (101) and fifth (96), respectively, on the chart.

## HUMMEL ALREADY A MEMBER OF ELITE BOILERMAKER CLUB

Senior forward Robbie Hummel stands alongside Brian Cardinal, Brad Miller and former teammate E'Twaun Moore as the only four players in Purdue history with 1,000 points, 500 rebounds, 200 assists, 100 steals and 50 blocks for their careers.

Hummel currently owns totals of 1,334 points, 645 rebounds, 214 assists, 111 steals and 82 blocks. He is 166 points, 55 boards and 36 assists away from becoming one of only three Boilermakers (along with Cardinal and Miller) to amass 1,500/700/250/100/75 for his career.

## SMITH POISED TO JOIN PROGRAM'S PROLIFIC THREE-POINT SHOOTERS

Senior guard Ryne Smith has made 106 three-point field goals over the course of his tenure in West Lafayette, leaving him five shy of tying Glenn Robinson and Chris Lutz for 14th on the program's career chart. He connected on the 100th three ball of his career in Purdue's win over Western Michigan on Nov. 23.

Smith made 56 triples during his breakout junior season, and 106 of his 126-career field goals (84.1 percent) have come from beyond the arc. He tied program single-game records for three-point makes (8) and attempts (15) in Purdue's win over High Point on Nov. 14.

Senior forward Robbie Hummel has already cemented his name on Purdue's top-10 list for three-point field goals, ranking seventh with 165 for his career. He is 12 treys away from tying former teammate Keaton Grant for sixth in school history.

## HUMMEL A VALUABLE ASSET AT FREE THROW LINE

Since setting foot on campus, Robbie Hummel has been one of Purdue's best and most consistent free throw shooters, and the senior forward is poised to end his career among the most prolific players from the stripe in school history.

Despite a slow start from the stripe, he is shooting .783 (18-of-23) from the free throw line this season. He was 12-of-12 from the line over the course of the semifinals and finals of the 5-hour Energy Puerto Rico Tip-Off.

Hummel shot 90.2 percent from the line as a junior - the second-best single-season effort the program has ever seen - while also establishing a new program record with 36-consecutive makes from the free throw line.

Hummel's career mark of 84.3 percent from the stripe currently ranks sixth in program annals. He needs to make 58 more free throws to tie Keith Edmonson for 15th on the program's career chart (353), and needs to attempt 108 free throws to tie E'Twaun Moore for 15th in school history (457).

Despite missing numerous games to injury in his career, Hummel has averaged 92.3 makes and 109.0 attempts per season from the free throw line.

## JACKSON NOT ONE-DIMENSIONAL AT THE POINT

While Lewis Jackson is well-known for his ability to run Purdue's offense and facilitate for his teammates, the senior guard has also proven himself a threat to score in various ways.

Jackson ranks third on the Boilermakers this season with an average of 10.0 points per game. He averaged a career-best 8.0 points per game as a junior, while shooting a career-high 50.3 percent from the field.

He exploded in the 5-hour Energy Puerto Rico Tip-Off semifinals against Temple, finishing with a career-high 26 points on 8-of-14 shooting from the field and 10-of-11 from the line. Jackson scored 22 of his 26 points against the Owls after halftime.

Despite missing 20 games in his career due to injury, Jackson has compiled 592 points, and needs 36 to match Greg McQuay and Chuckie White for 74th on the program's career scoring chart.

### SMITH EQUALS PROGRAM RECORDS ON CAREER SHOOTING NIGHT

Senior guard Ryne Smith was the difference in Purdue's two-point win over High Point on Nov. 14, connecting on 8-of-15 shots from beyond the arc en route to a game and career-high 20 points.

Smith's eight triples tied both the program and Mackey Arena single-game marks, which he now shares with teammate Robbie Hummel and former coach Cuonzo Martin. The Toledo, Ohio, native's 15 attempts from deep were also a new Mackey Arena record, and tied the program record set by David Teague in 2004.

Smith also has five-career games in which he has made at least five three-point field goals, and tied a program record at Penn State last January with five three-pointers in a game without a miss.

### BOILERS LOOK TO TIE PROGRAM RECORD FOR CONSECUTIVE 20-WIN SEASONS

Heading into the Miami game with six wins on the year, the Boilermakers need 14 more wins to reach the 20-win mark and equal the program record of six-straight 20-win campaigns set under legendary former head coach Gene Keady.

The Boilers' streak, currently at five in a row, ties them with Ohio State and Wisconsin for the most in the Big Ten since 2006-07.

Purdue tied the program record with 29 wins in 2009-10, and won 26 games a year ago to tie for the seventh-best single-season total in program history.

### PURDUE ONE OF FEW WITH 25 WINS IN EACH OF LAST FOUR YEARS

Purdue won 26 games in 2010-11, marking the fourth year in a row that the Boilermakers have reached the 25-win plateau. Purdue is one of only eight Division I schools that can make that claim, along with Butler, BYU, Duke, Gonzaga, Kansas, Pittsburgh and Saint Mary's.

### PURDUE TOUGH TO BEAT WHEN IT SCORES 70 OR MORE

The Boilermakers are 87-11 (.888) under head coach Matt Painter when scoring at least 70 points, including a 5-0 mark this season.

Purdue scored 76 points in its loss to VCU in the third round of the NCAA Tournament, snapping a 40-game winning streak when scoring 70 or more.

### BOILERS NEARLY AUTOMATIC WHEN WINNING REBOUNDING AND TURNOVER BATTLES

Purdue is 60-1 (.984) under head coach Matt Painter in games in which it wins both the rebounding and turnover battles.

The Boilermakers' last loss when finishing ahead in both categories came on March 22, 2008, when they fell to Xavier in the NCAA Tournament round of 32.

### SHARING THE BALL IS A KEY FACET OF BOILERS' CULTURE

With its motion offense and relentless pursuit of transition buckets, Purdue's team identity is largely ingrained with the concept of sharing the ball.

The Boilermakers have piled up 116 assists on 195 field goals in 2011-12, which translates into an assist on 59.5 percent of the team's buckets.

The Painter Era has seen Purdue tally an assist on 58.4 percent of its field goals, with 2010-11's 61.4 percent marking the high for a single campaign. With Painter at the helm, the Boilermakers have not assisted on fewer than 54.7 percent of their makes in a season.

## TURNOVER BATTLE AN INDICATOR OF PURDUE'S SUCCESS

One of the Big Ten and nation's top teams in turnover margin since the beginning of the 2006-07 season, Purdue is 104-25 (.806) in that span when winning the turnover battle, while outscoring its opponents by an average margin of 6.7 points per game off of turnovers.

Purdue is +7.14 in the turnover department this season, and has outscored its opponents by an average of 10.6 points per game off of miscues (74 total points).

The Boilers were +3.65 in the turnover margin department in 2010-11, outscoring their foes by 204 total points (6.0 ppg) off of turnovers. Purdue was 24-4 (.857) on the season when committing fewer turnovers than its opponent. The Boilermakers led the conference and ranked fourth in the nation in turnover margin in 2009-10 with a mark of +4.80.

Since the beginning of the 2006-07 campaign, the Boilermakers have forced an average of 15.7 turnovers per game and limited opponents to an 0.77 assist-to-turnover ratio.

## PURDUE CONSISTENTLY RATES AS ONE OF NATION'S MOST EFFICIENT DEFENSIVE TEAMS

Purdue currently ranks 12th nationally in adjusted defensive efficiency with a mark of 88.9, according to college basketball statistical analyst Ken Pomeroy.

In 2010-11, the Boilermakers ranked 12th in the nation in adjusted defensive efficiency at 89.5.

After finishing 13th and 16th in the category in 2007 and 2008, respectively, the Boilermakers rated fifth in 2009 and third in 2010 - winning a Big Ten regular season and tournament title, and making two Sweet 16 appearances in those seasons.

Purdue is joined by Duke and Kansas as the only three teams in the nation to rank in the top 20 of the kenpom.com adjusted defensive efficiency chart in each of the last five seasons.

## BOILERMAKERS' D FORCING OPPONENTS INTO LONG DROUGHTS

Through seven games this season, the Boilers have forced their opponents into six field-goal droughts of at least four minutes, including five that lasted at least five minutes on the game clock.

Purdue held Western Michigan without a field goal for more than eight minutes in the first half of its win over Western Michigan on Nov. 23, and finished off the game by not allowing the Broncos to score from the field for the final 13:13 of the contest.

Since the beginning of the 2009-10 season, the Boilermakers forced opponents into 115 field-goal droughts of at least four minutes, including 56 dry spells that lasted five minutes or longer.

## BOILERS' ROAD PROWESS AMONG LEAGUE'S ELITE

Purdue's propensity for winning games in the friendly confines of Mackey Arena has been well documented, but the Boilermakers have also won the most true road games among Big Ten teams since 2007-08.

Purdue owns a road-win total of 26 since the beginning of the 2007-08 campaign, two ahead of Michigan State for the conference lead over that stretch.

Since opening his Purdue head coaching career with 17-consecutive road losses, Matt Painter has guided the Boilermakers to a 28-19 (.596) record in their last 47 games on opponents' home floors.

Purdue's current senior class has won in every Big Ten arena, while the current junior class has won in each league venue except the Kohl Center (Wisconsin) and Welsh-Ryan Arena (Northwestern).

## PAINTER MAKING A HABIT OF REACHING 20-WIN MARK

In six of his seven seasons as a collegiate head coach, including each of the last five, Matt Painter has led his teams to at least 20 wins. The former Boilermaker captain is one season away from tying the program record of six-straight 20-win seasons (1983-88) held by his former coach, Gene Keady.

Painter has also guided Purdue to double-digit Big Ten wins in each of the last four seasons, a feat not seen in West Lafayette since Keady piloted the Boilers to five-consecutive seasons with at least 10 league wins from 1994-98.

## PAINTER NOT SHY ABOUT PLAYING ROOKIES

One of Purdue head coach Matt Painter's principal philosophies is that he will play the five players who give the Boilermakers the best chance to win.

In Painter's first six seasons at the Boilermaker helm, 14 players averaged double-figure minutes over the course of their true or redshirt freshman seasons, including eight in the last four years. E'Twaun Moore's average of 31.6 minutes per game in 2007-08 is the rookie high for the Painter Era.

Redshirt freshman Anthony Johnson is currently averaging 17.7 minutes per game this season, while true freshman Jacob Lawson is averaging 14.3 minutes per contest.

## BOILERS REACH FOURTH TOURNEY FINAL IN AS MANY YEARS

With wins over Iona and Temple, respectively, in its first two games of the 5-hour Energy Puerto Rico Tip-Off, Purdue advanced to the finals of its exempt event for the fourth-consecutive season.

The Boilermakers met Oklahoma for the NIT Season Tip-Off title in 2008, defeated Tennessee for the Paradise Jam Crown in 2009, battled Richmond for the top spot at the 2010 Chicago Invitational Challenge and faced Alabama in Sunday's final in San Juan.

## BOILERS SET NEW MACKAY STANDARD ON REDEDICATION NIGHT

The Boilermakers celebrated the rededication of Mackey Arena on Nov. 11 with a 62-point victory over Northern Illinois, setting a Mackey Arena record for margin of victory. The previous high for victory margin at Mackey was 56, established on Dec. 10, 1983.

The 62-point spread was also the Boilermakers' best in the modern era (since 1950), also bettering the 1983 win over Tampa, and the third-highest margin of victory in program history. The performance was Purdue's largest margin of victory since 1901.

The 34 points yielded by the Boilermakers in the season opener were also the fewest they have allowed under head coach Matt Painter.

## BOILERMAKERS PUT CLAMPS ON WESTERN MICHIGAN OFFENSE

In Purdue's win over Western Michigan on Nov. 23, the Boilermakers limited WMU to just eight field goals, the fewest by an opponent in head coach Matt Painter's tenure. The Broncos' eight makes were also the fewest against the Boilermakers in the modern era, one fewer than Pittsburgh's nine field goals on Dec. 15, 1949.

The Boilers were particularly stingy in the second half of that game, holding Western Michigan to 2-of-24 (.083) shooting from the floor after the break.

## HUMMEL EARNS PRESEASON ALL-BIG TEN ACCLAIM

Senior Robbie Hummel was named Preseason All-Big Ten on Oct. 27 by a panel of media from around the league, marking his third-career selection and the fourth year in a row that Purdue has been represented on the squad.

Hummel was also chosen for the preseason team in 2008 and 2009, while 2011 consensus All-American Jajuan Johnson represented the Boilers a year ago.

## HUMMEL NAMED A CANDIDATE FOR LOWE'S SENIOR CLASS AWARD

Senior forward Robbie Hummel has been named one of 30 candidates nationwide for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award, which celebrates achievement in four areas of excellence - community, classroom, character and competition. The list will be trimmed to 10 finalists midway through the season.

Hummel is the third Boilermaker in as many years to be named a candidate for the award, as Chris Kramer and E'Twaun Moore were selected in 2010 and 2011, respectively. Both former Boilermaker stars were honored as finalists and represented Purdue at the Senior CLASS Award festivities at the Final Four.

## HUMMEL NAMED TO PRESEASON WATCH LISTS

Senior Robbie Hummel has been named to preseason watch lists for both the John R. Wooden Award and the Naismith Trophy. The selection was his fourth for the Wooden list and third for the Naismith ledger.

Both awards will be handed out at the 2012 NCAA Final Four in New Orleans.

Jackson and Smith will wear the figurative "C" for the first time in their careers.

### PURDUE ICON BACK FOR 29TH YEAR BEHIND MICROPHONE

Boilermaker legend Larry Clisby is in his 29th season as the voice of Boilermaker basketball. Cliz has worked a total of 1,003 Purdue contests, including 893 as the play-by-play man, and been behind the mic for 600-consecutive Boilermaker games. Cliz celebrated his 1,000th game with the Boilers during the win over Temple on Nov. 18 in the semifinals of the Puerto Rico Tip-Off.

The Old Gold and Black has won 594 games during Cliz's tenure as play-by-play voice for a sparkling .665 winning percentage.

### FANS TO SELECT 'LEGENDS OF MACKEY'

The rich history and tradition of Purdue basketball has produced countless stars, but the question of who ranks as the very best will be answered by Purdue fans this fall and winter as the University conducts an online voting contest to select the "Legends of Mackey."

Voting began at purduesports.com on Nov. 1, and will be tabulated through Dec. 31 in conjunction with the \$99.5 million renovation of Mackey Arena. The men's ballot consists of 41 players who earned All-Big Ten honors in the Old Gold & Black.

The 12 honorees will be announced and featured during the first 12 weeks of 2012.

### CARDINAL JOINS PURDUE ATHLETICS STAFF

NBA world champion and former Boilermaker star Brian Cardinal has joined the Purdue athletics staff as an athletics administration intern.

Cardinal's internship will include roles with the John Purdue Club and Purdue's John R. Wooden Leadership Institute, as well as mentoring student-athletes and non-coaching day-to-day activities in various areas around the department. He will also have a hand in coordinating championship events at Purdue, such as the 2012 NCAA Women's Basketball First and Second Rounds and the 2012 Big Ten Wrestling Championships.

When the current NBA labor situation is resolved, Cardinal will have the option to pursue a playing opportunity in the league.

The Purdue basketball practice court, constructed as part of the Mackey Project, is named after Cardinal and his wife, former Purdue basketball player Danielle (Bird) Cardinal.

With a pair of Sweet 16 appearances, five-consecutive NCAA Tournament berths, Big Ten regular-season and tournament championships and an international gold medal on his résumé, seventh-year head coach Matt Painter is widely regarded as one of the brightest and most-respected coaches in the college game.

In just six years, Painter has returned his alma mater to the ranks of the nation's elite, becoming one of only eight programs in the nation to win at least 25 games in each of the last four seasons. His work has earned him two international coaching appointments, and been roundly acknowledged by both his coaching peers and the media with a trophy case full of awards.

Painter affirmed his long-term commitment to Purdue in March of 2011, agreeing to a new eight-year contract that will keep him in West Lafayette through at least the 2018-19 season.

Entering the 2011-12 season, Painter owns a 163-69 (.703) record in seven years as a head coach, while attaining a 138-64 (.683) mark at Purdue and a 66-38 (.635) record in the Big Ten. In addition to his on-court success, Painter has dedicated himself to developing student-athletes who represent their university with pride on college basketball's biggest stages.

### Purdue Highlights

Painter's tenure as Purdue's head coach has been one of rejuvenation. The last six years have seen five 20-win seasons and NCAA Tournament berths, two Sweet 16 appearances, a regular-season Big Ten title and a Big Ten Tournament crown.

Painter has averaged 23 wins per season during his tenure at the helm of the Purdue program, including at least 25 victories in each of the last four seasons. The last four years have seen the Boilermakers win 107 games, a program record for a four-year stretch.

Painter has also guided the Boilermakers to consecutive Sweet 16 appearances (2009, 2010) and five-straight NCAA Tournament berths, while instilling a recruiting plan that places an emphasis on bringing the top talent from both the Midwest and the state of Indiana to West Lafayette.

Success, however, didn't happen overnight.

As part of a planned transition into the head coaching job, Painter was tabbed in April of 2004 to succeed legendary Purdue head coach Gene Keady. He spent the 2004-05 campaign as associate head coach as the Boilermakers won just seven games and finished 10th in the Big Ten.

Painter officially became the 18th head men's basketball coach in Purdue history on April 1, 2005, and immediately set about laying the groundwork for a dramatic reversal in the program's fortunes.

## HEAD COACH

### SEVENTH SEASON (PURDUE '94)

The 2005-06 campaign saw a two-game improvement, from seven wins to nine, over the previous season despite the fact that star guard David Teague missed the entire season with injury and standout forward Carl Landry played only five games before an injury sidelined him for the remainder of the year.

Perhaps the biggest impact of Painter's initial season at the helm was his tenacious recruiting of the state of Indiana. In the fall of 2006, Painter and his staff signed four in-state products, including future Purdue stars Robbie Hummel, JaJuan Johnson and E'Twaun Moore, in a class that was ranked first in the Big Ten and regarded as one of the nation's five best by various recruiting publications.

Painter rode the momentum of that recruiting haul into the 2006-07 season, which turned out to be a landmark campaign for the program.

Led by Landry and Teague, who both garnered All-Big Ten honors as seniors, the Boilermakers won 22 games en route to their first NCAA Tournament appearance in four years. Purdue won nine conference games in 2006-07, setting a program record for improvement after capturing just three league victories the previous season. The Boilers' 13-game overall turnaround was also a program record, and ranked as the fourth-best in the nation that season.

Painter picked up his first NCAA Tournament win as a head coach along the way, as Purdue defeated Arizona in the first round before dropping a seven-point decision to eventual national champion and top overall seed Florida.

Having to compensate for the loss of his two senior leaders didn't slow Painter down in 2007-08, as the year proved to be another pivotal step in Purdue's resurgence.

Despite counting four true freshmen, two sophomores and a junior college transfer among his top seven scorers, Painter guided the Boilermakers to a 25-9 record, a second-place finish in the Big Ten and a second-consecutive trip to the NCAA Tournament.

With a 15-3 record in the Big Ten, the Boilers finished just one game out of first place and swept league champion Wisconsin to hand the Badgers their only two Big Ten losses of the year. Painter also took a team known as the "Baby Boilers" and directed it to an 11-game winning streak during conference play, as Purdue didn't lose for more than a month during the run.

Purdue ranked as high as 14th in the polls in 2007-08, wrapping up the campaign at No. 20 in both the AP and ESPN/USA Today rankings. The Boilers also showed a knack for knocking off some of the nation's top teams in 2007-08, posting three victories over squads ranked in the top 11 spots of the polls.

The season's efforts also brought individual honors for Painter's players, as Hummel became the first Purdue freshman ever to earn first-team All-Big Ten honors, while Moore was named to the second team and Chris Kramer took home Defensive Player of the Year accolades.



Painter kept the ball rolling in a 2008-09 season that proved to be an historic one for the Boilermakers. Purdue was a constant presence in the national polls, rising as high as ninth to mark its first appearance in the AP top 10 since 1999, while its 27 victories were its most in more than a decade.

The Boilermakers were at their best during the 2009 postseason run, rattling off double-digit victories over Penn State and Illinois to reach the Big Ten Tournament final, where they dispatched Ohio State, 65-61, to earn the first conference tournament crown in program history.

The Big Ten Tournament, however, was just the first act of Purdue's postseason script in 2009, as the Boilers earned the fifth seed in the West Region and headed out to Portland, Ore., for the NCAA Tournament. After defeating Northern Iowa in its first-round game, Purdue earned a 76-74 triumph over Washington in front of a highly-partisan UW crowd at the Rose Garden to capture its first Sweet 16 berth since 2000.

Acclaim was once again forthcoming for Painter's players following the success of the 2008-09 campaign. Johnson, Moore and Hummel were named first, second and third-team All-Big Ten, respectively, while Kramer was an honorable mention all-league pick and Lewis Jackson earned a spot on the Big Ten All-Freshman Team.

Hummel and Johnson were also named to the USBWA All-District V team, making Purdue the only school with multiple honorees, while the latter also earned inclusion on the NABC District 7 first team.

With a core of talented and experienced players back in the fold, expectations were high for the Boilermakers heading into the 2009-10 season, and Painter and Co. didn't disappoint.

Ranked seventh to open the season, Purdue won the Paradise Jam in the U.S. Virgin Islands, defeated Wake Forest in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge and came out on top of a top-10 showdown with West Virginia on New Year's Day en route to matching the best start in program history with a 14-0 run to open the year.

Painter's team faced adversity after a 2-3 start to Big Ten play, but rebounded to win 10-straight league games, and 12 of their last 13, to earn a share of the program's first Big Ten title in 14 years. Along the way, the Boilermakers set a program record with four wins over top-10 teams, tied the 1993-94 squad's program standard of six wins over top-25 teams, vanquished decade-long losing streaks at Indiana, Michigan State and Ohio State, and became the first Purdue team ever to win at Illinois, Indiana, Michigan State and Ohio State in the same season.

With his team once again facing doubters due to a late-season knee injury to Hummel, Painter orchestrated yet another storied postseason run for the Boilermakers.

Fourth-seeded Purdue was a popular pick to be upset by Siena in first-round action in Spokane, Wash., but used a second-half surge to pick up an eight-point win over the Saints. The win marked the 12th-consecutive first-round NCAA Tournament victory for the Boilermakers.

Outsized by Texas A&M in the second-round, the Boilers battled back from a second-half deficit to force an overtime session that would decide a berth to the Sweet 16. Trailing by two with just over a minute left in the extra frame, Moore sank a baseline jumper to tie the score at 61-61. After a defensive stop, Painter called timeout and drew up a play that would see Kramer beat his man off the dribble for the game-winning layup with four seconds on the clock, sending the Boilermakers to their second-consecutive Sweet 16.

The 2010 awards season was also bountiful for Painter's charges, as both Hummel and Moore were named All-Americans – the former earning second-team honors from the coaches' association and both garnering honorable mention recognition from the AP – after earning inclusion on the All-Big Ten first team. Johnson was named second-team All-Big Ten following his junior season, while Kramer captured his second-career Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year award and became the first player in league history to be named to the Big Ten All-Defensive Team in each of his four seasons.

The Boilermakers were widely written off before the 2010-11 season began as they lost Hummel to another knee injury at the beginning of fall practice. Painter, however, was undaunted and led Purdue to another of the finest seasons in program history.

The Boilers finished 26-8 overall, and 14-4 in the Big Ten to finish second in the league. Purdue posted separate winning streaks of seven and 10 games during the campaign, and knocked off a pair of top-10 teams at Mackey Arena in the same week, defeating No. 10 Wisconsin on Feb. 16 and toppling second-ranked Ohio State by 13 points on Feb. 20.

Painter also piloted the Boilermakers to their fifth-straight NCAA Tournament berth, where they defeated Saint Peter's in the second round before falling to eventual Final Four participant VCU in the third round.

The 2010-11 season also saw Painter protégés Johnson and Moore post two of the best individual campaigns that the program had ever seen.

Johnson led the Big Ten in scoring and blocks en route to being named a consensus All-American, Big Ten Player of the Year and Big Ten Defensive Player of the Year, while Moore earned first-team All-Big Ten honors and was named an All-American for the second-straight season after becoming just the fifth Boilermaker in history to break the 2,000-point barrier for his career.

The winningest players in program history at the conclusion of their careers, Johnson and Moore became the first pair of teammates in program history to both score more than 600 points in the same season in 2010-11.

Johnson also earned the Pete Newell Big Man Award from the NABC, given annually to the nation's top interior player as voted by the NABC membership.

Painter has also resurrected Mackey Arena as one of the country's best home-court advantages, piling up an 86-12 (.878) record at home over the last six seasons. In 2010-11, the Boilermakers went 16-0 at home, marking just the second undefeated home slate in the history of Mackey Arena, and the first since the 1968-69 campaign. The 16 home wins also tied the program record set in both 2006-07 and 2007-08, when Purdue went 16-1 on its home floor.

The 2007-08 campaign also included Purdue's first 9-0 home Big Ten record since the 1987-88 season. On Jan. 5, 2010, Painter presided over the 500th win at Mackey Arena.

### The Next Level

With Painter at the helm of the Purdue program, a host of Boilermakers have earned the opportunity to play basketball at the professional level.

The 2011 NBA Draft was a seminal moment in the history of the program, as Johnson and Moore were both selected and, by the end of the night, reunited as members of the Boston Celtics. After being selected 27th overall by New Jersey to become Purdue's first first-round pick since 1994, Johnson was traded to Boston, which later chose Moore with the 55th overall selection.

Carl Landry became the first NBA draft choice of the Painter Era in 2007, when Seattle (now Oklahoma City) called his name with the No. 31 selection and traded his rights to Houston. Landry went on to earn a place on the 2008 NBA All-Rookie Team, and recently completed his fourth season in the league by helping lead the New Orleans Hornets to the Western Conference playoffs.

Former Purdue standouts Chris Kramer and Keaton Grant have also started promising professional careers. Kramer attended training camp with the Milwaukee Bucks in 2010 before averaging 13.5 points and 3.9 rebounds per game for the Fort Wayne Mad Ants of the NBA Development League, while Grant averaged 9.3 points and 4.9 boards per game for the D-League's Sioux Falls Sky Force in 2010-11.

Numerous players who studied under Painter in West Lafayette have also forged professional careers overseas, including recent Boilermakers David Teague, Nemanja Calasan and Marcus Green.

### Commitment to Success Off the Court

Winning championships, however, is only one part of Painter's equation for success. He has also focused himself on developing student-athletes who will represent Purdue with pride.

To that end, Painter has seen a total of 15 players earn a combined 24 Academic All-Big Ten honors during his tenure as head coach. Painter has also mentored an Academic All-American, as Moore earned second-team honors during the 2009-10 season.

A commitment to the community is also part of Painter's focus on student-athlete development, and his players devote themselves to that cause during their time under his watch.

In addition to participation in Special Olympics clinics, Painter's players have also visited local elementary schools and hospitals, and devoted time to the Boys and Girls Club and Big Brothers/Big Sisters. In each of the last three years, the team has also participated in The Challenge, a 5K run/walk that benefits the Purdue Center for Cancer Research.

In 2010 and 2011, respectively, Kramer and Moore were named one of 10 finalists for the Lowe's Senior CLASS Award, given annually to the Division I men's basketball player who exemplifies four areas of excellence: classroom, character, community and competition.

### International Experience

In July of 2009, Painter extended his reach past the collegiate game and into the international arena, serving as an assistant coach with the United States' squad that captured the gold medal at the FIBA U19 World Championship in Auckland, New Zealand. Despite medaling in seven of the last nine U19 Worlds, Team USA hadn't won gold since 1991.

Two of Painter's players also garnered international attention in 2009, as Hummel and Johnson were both invited to the World University Games Trials. Hummel eventually made the squad and helped lead the Americans to a bronze medal.

In the summer of 2010, Johnson was chosen as part of an elite group of college players known as the USA Men's Select Team, whose charge was to help Team USA train for its gold-medal run at the FIBA World Championship.

Painter himself once again ventured into the international spectrum in the summer of 2011, serving as head coach for the U.S. World University Games Team in Shenzhen, China. Despite being knocked from medal contention with a loss in the quarterfinals, Painter led the USA to a 7-1 record that tied for the best in the tournament.
