UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI ESTABLISHED IN 1926


THE UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI, which opened its doors in 1926, is the largest, privately-supported university in the southeast, with an enrollment exceeding 13.000.

Its president is Dr. Henry King Stanford. He came to the presidency of the University of Miami, July 1, 1962.

The 260-acre Main Campus of the University is located in Coral Gables, a residential municipality some

seven miles southwest of the central city whose name it bears.

Possessing none of the brickand-ivy mood traditional to campuses, the University's structures are strikingly modern. In April, 1965 the new \$3.3 million Student Union opened as a center for student activities. Its recreational features include an Olympic-sized swimming pool and bowling alleys. This newest UM building joins a nine-story library and



Within four years, a two-building Science Center will be added to the campus scene to accommodate teaching and laboratory facilities now housed in various buildings. Construction on the first unit of the Center started last fall.

The University maintains separate campuses for marine science and medicine. The Institute of Marine Science on Virginia Key is one of the three largest



oceanographic centers in the U. S. The School of Medicine offers its first two years in a building adjacent to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Coral Gables, the last two clinical years at Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami.

Looking toward its Golden Anniversary in 1975, the University is raising over \$93 million for development. First goals of this program are the \$15 million Science Center and an expanded \$21 million Medical Center adjacent to County-owned Jackson Memorial Hospital.

The University's students—who hail from almost every state and over 50 foreign nations—may study in six undergraduate colleges and schools and four graduate schools.

All freshmen and sophomores are enrolled in the University College to gain a firm grounding in the humanities, social sciences and natural sciences. The student's upperclass years are spent in one of the following colleges and schools: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Music.

The graduate-level scholar studies in the School of Law, School of Medicine, School of Environmental and Planetary Sciences or the Graduate School, which offers the Master's, Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Education degree in many specializations.

The University also serves the community culturally. The drama department presents a full schedule of classical and contemporary theatrical works throughout the year in the Ring Theatre. The Joe and Emily Lowe Art Gallery contains a large permanent collection. One of the famed regional collections of the Samuel H. Kress Foundation is housed in a separate gallery wing on permanent display. It features European masterworks of the 14th through 18th centuries.



ANDY GUSTAFSON

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

ANDY GUSTAFSON heads University of Miami's vast athletic program, directing a program embracing eight varsity sports—football, basketball, tennis, golf, track, baseball, swimming and soccer.

He took over as full time Director of Athletics in December of 1963 after serving in the dual-role of head football coach and athletic director following the

death of Jack Harding.

Gustafson retired from the coaching field with the conclusion of the 1963 season—ending a career of 38 years (he was head coach at Miami 16 years).

Coming to the Hurricanes in the late forties from West Point where he served as Earl "Red" Blaik's chief aide during the Doc Blanchard - Glenn Davis-Arnold Tucker golden era, Gustafson moved to the top rank in his field in America and is listed

among college football's all-time winning coaches. He ranks with the elite few who down through the years have won 100 games or more. His overall coaching record shows 115 victories . . . 78 losses . . . four ties. At Miami, he won 93 games against 65 losses and three ties.

Many of his elevens attained high national ranking . . . four times they won their way into bowl games . . . seven times they were seen on nationwide television in regular season play—and twice more in Bowl games.

The most noteworthy coaching achievement in the embryonic stages of Gustafson's career at Miami was the stunning beating his team gave Purdue in 1950, the week after the Boilermakers had shocked the football world by snapping Notre Dame's sensational win streak at 37 straight.

Andy's college football days came in the heyday of Pittsburgh gridiron fortunes. He fullbacked under Glenn "Pop" Warner in 1923, and the next two seasons under Jock Sutherland. In addition to his brilliance as a fullback, Gus was a field goal kicking star, setting a record at Pitt that has never been equalled—three goals in a single game (against Lafayette 1925). He scored the first touchdown ever in Pitt Stadium (against Washington & Lee 1925).

After leaving Pitt, Andy went to Virginia Tech as head football coach but returned to his alma mater as Sutherland's assistant after four winning years. In 1934, Gustafson left Pitt to join Coach Earl "Red" Blaik at Dartmouth. He followed Blaik to West Point in 1941.

It was from the campus on the Hudson that Andy came to Miami in the fall of 1948 to take the reins as head football coach of the Hurricanes—a post he held until retiring from coaching in 1963.

BRUCE HALE

HEAD COACH

Personable Bruce Hale has turned in 205 victories and suffered only 101 defeats in a University of Miami basketball coaching career which enters its 12th season in 1966-1967.

Never blessed with basketball material large in numbers, Hale has a tremendous skill in getting the most out of what is available. Only once since he took over



at Miami has he failed to at least break even, his lone losing season being in 1954-55 when his team won 9, lost 11. That was his first Miami team.

Here are some of the highlights of Hale's brilliant coaching career at Miami: directed the Hurricanes to four post season tournament (one NCAA, three NIT)... produced two All-Americans (Dick Hickox, Rick Barry)... piloted the Hurricanes to the All-

Time national scoring record two years ago (98.4) . . . his team led the nation in foul shooting in 1964-65 . . . led nation in scoring in 1958-59 . . . finished as runnerup in scoring in 1959-60 and 1962-63.

In 1964-65 for the fourth time in five years, he was able to field a team which won 20 or more games. In those five years, his Miami teams have won 102 times, lost 32.

All that indicates that Hale is not only a successful coach, a past master at improvising, but he is also an offensive-orientated coach. That makes his teams the kind that bring out the crowds. The Hurricane attendance totals have climbed steadily.

When Hale came to Miami, small high school gyms, which housed many UM games in those days, looked empty at Miami games. Miami Beach Auditorium, with a 3600 Auditorium, was spacious. Now the two largest arenas in the Metropolitan area, Miami Beach Convention Hall and Miami Dade Junior college auditorium, have had to turn away crowds at UM games. The Hurricanes will confine their basketball activity to those two courts for most of their home games this year.

Basketball has long been a central factor in Hale's life. He was an All-American player for Santa Clara and this past year was inducted into that school's Hall of Fame.

During World War II, he was commissioned a captain in the Air Force—and was stationed in Miami Beach for part of the period of his armed force service. He played on the famed Five by Five service team—and got some sand in his shoes which made him ready to accept the Miami basketball coaching post when it became available.

In between, he coached the Wright Air Field Base to the service championship, then spent 10 years in professional basketball. He was on the All-World team in 1945 and served as a coach in the National Basketball Association.

RON GODFREY

ASSISTANT COACH

Former University of Miami basketball star Ron Godfrey became full time assistant coach at Miami in 1964-65 after serving several campaigns as a part time assistant.

Godfrey was a brilliant scoring ace at Miami in the late 50s and early 60s. He made honorable mention



All-America in his senior year (1960-61), while the year before, he set a foul shooting record (22 against Oklahoma City) and was hailed by Coach Peck Hickman of the high riding University of Louisville quintet as one of the best forwards in basketball.

Taking over as first string forward in 1958-59, Ron never relinquished the job through three brilliant seasons in which he compiled a 17.5 per game scoring

average and scored 1,384 points. He picked off 767 rebounds.

Godfrey and the fabulous All-America, Rick Barry, are on the All-Time UM basketball team at forwards. The record book is liberally sprinkled with Ron's name.

He is thoroughly grounded in the Hale system of play, not only as a player but also as a coach.

Coach Godfrey did his high school playing at Martins Ferry, Ohio High. While there, he set an all-time single game scoring record of 51 points and in his senior year tallied over 800 points to set an all-time seasonal mark.

THE OUTLOOK

Coach Bruce Hale piloted the Hurricanes to a 15-11 record in 1965-66 with a team which never did find a satisfactory solution to a center problem. The team started the campaign with only two players of proven varsity caliber — and ended with four. All four of them return this year. Two new centers appear to be far superior to the men who held the position last season, while several tested reserves return and new players add depth at guard and forward.

Despite a demanding schedule, Miami's outlook for 1966-67 is far brighter than it was a year ago. Mike Wittman, who matured as a reserve in his sophomore year, became one of Miami's finest forwards in history as a junior and should be even more effective this year with more help from the centers.

Rusty Parker, an untried sophomore at the start, broke the UM field goal scoring record percentage-wise and now, with more experience, should give Miami a tremendous one-two punch up front.


Rick Jones and Junior Gee, back for their third season as guard starters, rate as the best two-man guard team in the land in Coach Hale's book.

Bill Soens, 6-8 is expected to cure the team's 1965-66 woes at center where his scoring and rebounding should more than double the output of all of Miami's 1965-66 centers combined.

John Bates, forward, and Dan Rodgers, guard, give Miami experienced depth in those spots. Mike Kvasnok at center; strong man Tom Masters at forward and newcomers Charles Noti and Tom Green at guard all are better than just occasional fill-in people.

The tough part of the situation gives Miami just one home game before the Hurricane Classic of Dec. 27-28. That game is with the huge and experienced Florida team which twice downed Miami last year. Six other playing dates will find Miami on the road and every game on the road trip slate is a potential trouble spot.

If UM enters the Hurricane Classic with a better than .500 mark, it will stamp this team as one with post season tournament class.




PLAYER SKETCHES

RICK JONES

Senior guard from Muncie, Ind. . . . Business Administration . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 5-11 . . . wgt. 165 . . . letters earned, 2. Jones teams with Junior Gee to give Miami its best pair of guards in history. Coach

Bruce Hale believes the two are equal to any pair of college basketball guards in the land.



Rick came to Miami with a brilliant high school record. Scholastic Magazine named him to its All-America team. He received the Mr. Basketball Award. His Muncie Central team won the state championship in his senior year, with Rick scoring 28 points and being credited with 13 assists. He quarterbacked on the football team, once scoring

three TDs in a single game, including an 80 yard sprint. He lettered three times as a high school baseball pitcher — and has earned the same number as a pitcher for the University of Miami Hurricanes. Jones was 8-3 as a sophomore and last year, on Miami's green nine, he turned in a 5-5 record against some of the nation's best collegiate baseball clubs. In both seasons, he was handicapped in the early going as basketball and baseball overlapped.

Rick was a star on UM's frosh basketball team of 1963-64, scoring 50 points in one game and averaging 23.5 for the season.

Rick failed to earn a starting berth in his sophomore year until the seventh game, but played extensively in reserve roles. Once in the lineup, he stayed. His blazing speed, his competitive spirit — and his all around fine work in scoring, passing and defending contributed much to Miami's brilliant 1964-65 campaign. He had a high sophomore year scoring performance of 24 points against Jacksonville.

As a junior last season, the energetic Jones did a valiant job. He wound up with nine games of 20 points or more, five of them coming in his last eight starts. He had 29 against Virginia.

Rick, always a good free throw man, became an expert last year when his .876 percentage set an all-time one season high at Miami. Part of the season, he was the national leader and at the finish he ranked No. 4 in the nation. A single miss kept him from ranking third. Rick's 710 point scoring total for two campaigns ranks him 20th in the UM all-time standings. Rick's high school coach—Ike Tallman.

JUNIOR GEE

Senior guard from Loogootee, Ind. . . . Physical Education . . . age 22 . . . hgt. 5-10 . . . wgt. 168 . . . letters earned, 2. In two brilliant campaigns, Gee has established himself as one of the best basketball players

ever to come to University of Miami and — with Rick Jones gives Miami the greatest pair of guards it has had at one time.

Gee has been a starter from his first day of practice and if he improves as much this year as he did in 1965-66, he will be pressing for All-America acclaim.

Gee is the playmaker for the Hurricanes and can operate anywhere in the fast break which Miami uses effectively in its high scoring operations. He is a bril-

liant outside shot and can drive in well for the layup shot. He does an excellent job of feeding the big men for the close-in shots.

Junior was a whiz from high school days. His school, with only 200 students was undefeated at home in his four years there. He starred in baseball as well, batting .321, .357 and .417.

As a Miami freshman, he averaged 24.6 points. He picked up 100 points in the AAU tournament, a feat which brought him the 'Most Valuable Player' nod.

Gee started slowly as a sophomore, picking up only five points in a game in which Miami tallied 136 on Tampa. But in his next outing in the Steel Bowl in Pittsburgh, his 18 points upset favored Duquesne and launched Miami toward victory in that event. He didn't break the 20 point barrier until the end of the season. In his last two games, he scored 26 on Rollins and 20 against Florida State.

With Miami's offense being rebuilt last year (after the loss of its forwards and the collapse of its centers), the burden fell heavily on Miami's guards and Gee, in addition to carrying the playmaking burden, found time to kick in with 441 points. That gave him 710 for two seasons, making him the 19th highest pointmaker at Miami. He still has one season to go.

Gee picked up 20 points or more on nine occasions last year, finishing the campaign by being in double figures 13 times in a row. His best nights were on the road. He tallied 30 points against Florida Southern and dazzled mighty Houston with a 28-point performance at Houston. His big night at home was in the season finale when he hit for 27 points against LaSalle.

Although the smallest man on the team Junior's speed and reflexes enabled him to average better than five rebounds a game last year. Twice he had nine, one of those occasions coming against Florida State. Gee's high school coach — Jack Butcher.

RICHARD PARKER

Junior forward from Daytona Beach, Fla... Physical Education . . . nickname, Rusty . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-6 . . . wght. 210 . . . letters earned, 1. Parker played his high school basketball for Mainland High



where he averaged 18 points and 14 rebounds per game. He was on the UM freshman team with Junior Gee and Rick Jones but was not eligible the following year and hence made his varsity debut last season. Rusty was very much in the background in his frosh year but when 1965-66 fall varsity practice came around, Coach Bruce Hale said: "He's in the battle for a starting spot and could make it before the season is over".

Rusty made it from the start and had impressive statistics at the end of the campaign to prove it. However, he was erratic at times and proved on occasion that he was still a sophomore. Twice during the season he failed to score at all, on another time he made only a single point. But to balance that, he collected 22 points in the tingling win over powerful Utah and dazzled everyone with a sensational 32-point performance against mighty Houston in Houston. He finished on a high note with 27 points against LaSalle in the season finale. In that game, he missed just one of 11 field goal tries. Rusty was 20 points or better on five occasions, was in double figures in rebounds 10 times. He picked off 20 rebounds against Florida Southern in Lakeland. Parker is expected to be a much greater factor in team play this season. As the only sophomore starter last year he had a tendency to hang back at times and let the more experienced boys do the job. Now however, he's an experienced vet and could be one of the more potent men on the squad. Actually, Rusty is the best drive-in man on the squad, has the ability to grab the sharp pass and loop the ball through the basket before the opposition reacts. His deadly close-in scoring in 1965-66 gave him a .551 scoring percentage, best ever for any UM player taking at least 150 shots at the hoop.

Parker's shooting skill is not limited to close in skill. He has proven more than once that he is no man to let loose from the corners. Although only 6 feet 6, he was second best rebounder on the team last season. He averaged nine, one under Mike Wittman. Rusty jumps well, is aggressive and is quick with his hands so that once the ball gets close to him, it's his.

Rusty played baseball and football as well as basketball for Mainland High. Hunting and fishing are his hobbies. He hopes to go into physical education and work with retarded children when he graduates. Parker's high school coach—Paul Andrews.

MICHAEL WITTMAN

Senior forward from Nanuet, N. Y. . . . English . . . nickname, Mike . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-6 . . . wgt. 200 . . . letters earned, 2 . . . Mike was the most improved player on the 1965-66 squad and his final scoring



average of 21.8 points was the fourth best ever at University of Miami. That ranked him 48th nationally. Only Dick Hickox in 1960 and Rick Barry in his final two campaigns did better. Wittman also did an excellent job rebounding, leading the team with an even 10 rebounds a game, although he never was the tallest player on the floor. Often he was outranged by two and even three of the opposing team members.

As a sophomore two years ago, Mike put in a solid year of backing up Rick Barry and Wayne Beckner, compiling a promising seven point scoring average and a 5.5 rebounding mark. Twice he scored 18 points in a single game. He grabbed 16 rebounds vs Houston.

Last year as a Junior, Mike quickly earned a starting role at forward and started every game. Miami's center troubles had him working there on occasion. He had only two poor games in his 26 junior year performances. He was held to six by Florida early in the year at Miami — and garnered 22 when he battled Florida in Gainesville. He was stopped at six in Houston. At Santa Clara, Wittman had 17 - and in each of his other games, his total was 18 points or higher. He wound up with 20 or more points on 16 occasions and was over 30 three times, his high being 35 against Ohio U. His rebounding fluctuated more. Against towering Florida at Miami Beach, the New Yorker made only three rebounds but he finished with 17 against Stetson, 15 against Florida State and 17 against LaSalle. He was in double figures 12 times.

Wittman enters his senior basketball campaign at Miami with 734 points to his credit — 18th highest total for any Hurricane player. His 16 games of 20 or more points is fourth best in one season at Miami — and puts him in seventh place in the all-time category for a career. His 392 rebounds in two campaigns has been exceeded by only nine Miami

players in their entire careers.

Mike played his freshman basketball at Los Angeles State college but smog conditions played havoc with an asthma condition and he had to seek a more favorable climate. In high school, he made the Dell and Parade All-America basketball teams. The New Yorker played high school football and baseball as well. He earned four letters each in basketball and baseball, three in football at Nanuet High where his high school coach was Charles Walsh.

Junior center from Philadelphia, Pa. . . . Marketing . . . nickname, Bill . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-8 . . . wgt. 225. Bill comes from a family of athletes. Three uncles played for St. Josephs, two as captains. His father.

all-state in football in high school, was on the Pennsylvania rowing crew. To top it off, his mother captained the women's basketball squad at Mercer.

Bill played a lot of basketball around Philadelphia and sparkled for Penn Charter High school where a 61-point scoring effort on his part is still spoken of with awe. He wound up on the Parade All-America High School team.

Soens made his collegiate start at Villanova and, as a sophomore,

was center on the Wildcat team which went to the finals of the National Invitational Tournament in 1965. He averaged 10 points and 10 rebounds a game that season but broke loose with 23 against New York University to drop that team from the tournament. Bill transferred to Miami and sat out last season. He scored 40 points in an exhibition against the University of Miami Alumni and in the state AAU hit for 38 points in one game and 31 in the next.

Soens played the forward spot most of last year for the Miami Dispatch team but is moving back to his favorite spot at center on the 1966-67 UM squad. Center was a trouble spot for Miami all last year as the Hurricanes could get little scoring from their pivot men. The most reliable UM rebounder was only 6 feet 5 inches tall and so was outranged by most Miami foes. Soens should plug this gap nicely and make it one of the strong spots on the team instead of the weakest. Soens is 6-8 tall and could make it a far different story in the play under the baskets. He has experience to go with his great skills and could eventually become one of the best centers in Hurricane history. Soens' high school coach was Buff Weigand.

JOHN BATES

Senior forward from Miami, Fla... Education ... age 22... hgt. 6-6... wgt. 185... letters earned, 2. John was a letterman in 1963-64, sat out 1964-65 and then came back as a considerably improved player last



year. His first campaign saw him averaging under one point a game. Last winter, he averaged 3.4 points and nearly three rebounds a game.

John is a slender type. He's valuable in short stints and will be called upon to contribute in spot roles this year. He is capable of replacing any of the Miami front men for four or five minutes without weakening the team effort.

In the tingling duel with powerful Ohio University in 1965-66, John contributed 12 big points and 10 rebounds — an effort which was helpful in Miami's 105-100 win. On numerous other occasions, John hustled in to pick off five or six rebounds a game, although he never could get above eight points after his Ohio U sparkler.

John is one of the squad's better defensive men and can neutralize an opposing player who towers several inches above him because of his speed and mobility. He's an excellent jumper.

Back in his high school days, the Miamian was All-City at Miami Jackson and led the Generals both in attacking and on defense. In a game against Miami Military, he scored 44 points and picked off 37 rebounds. He averaged 24 points and 19 rebounds a game in high school, performing as a center.

Bates passed up an appointment to the United States Military Academy to enter the University of Miami and plans eventually to become a lawyer. Swimming, tennis and bowling are his other favorite sports. He won a swimming letter at Miami Jackson High when that team was the most powerful in the state.

John's high school coach in basketball was Speedy Hecht.

Sophomore forward from Lebanon, Indiana . . . Business Administration . . . age 20 . . . hgt. 6-5 . . . wgt. 215 . . . Masters is the invaluable type of player, a team man who can handle himself in almost any

situation. He is one of the strongest players physically on the squad and makes his presence felt under the boards.



In high school, Tom played center and had as many as 25 rebounds in a single game. However, when joining the Hurricane frosh, his 6-5 height left him shy of the needed qualifications for a pivot role and thus he wound up at forward. He did a good job in making the transition, being good for at least 10 re-

bounds per game and averaging 10 points in scoring.

Tom isn't ready to challenge the veterans for a starting berth in his rookie year but he possesses skills which could bring him into the picture in a big way in the future. He can more than hold his own with players several inches taller than himself and could give Miami's starters some vital breathing time.


Masters was an all around high school athlete at Lebanon High. In addition to basketball, he played end in football, ran on the cross country squad and was a shot putter on the track team. He won All-Sectional and All-County honors as well as earning honorable mention on the All-State basketball squad. Tom was among the leading scholar-athletes at Lebanon High and won the school Attitude Award. As a child, Tom was the victim of a near fatal accident impairing sight in one of his eyes, but he has overcome this obstacle. Tom's high school coach was James Rosenstihl.

DANIEL RODGERS

Junior guard from Frankfort, Ky. . . Physical Education . . . nickname, Dan . . . age 20 . . . hgt. 6-5 . . . wgt. 190 . . . letter earned, 1. Rodgers has had a long, hard pull toward basketball glory at University

of Miami but he's making steady progress and will be very much in the picture as an alternate this year.

Dan started playing the game of basketball when he was a fourth grade student. He played center in high school and, after two brilliant years, seemed a sure shot for All-State as a senior. A broken wrist, however, during that final campaign wrecked his chances, but he still was given honorable mention.



Dan saw action in 20 games last season. He proved himself to be an able floor man and strong defensively. He didn't receive many scoring opportunities but showed that he has good potentiality. His best scoring night was seven points against Florida State when he turned in some especially valuable relief duty.

Rodgers is an excellent rebounder and despite his brief floor appearances in 1965-66, he twice had four-rebound games.

Coach Bruce Hale figures that the Kentuckian cager could be the 'sixth man' so necessary to the success of any basketball team. He's capable of filling in on any position since he played center in high school and guard and forward at Miami last season. He has a good outside shot. Swimming is Rodgers' second love in sports. The water facilities in Florida played a large part in Rodgers' decision to come to Miami. He is a qualified swimming instructor. Dan's high school coach was Cliff Barker.

THOMAS EUGENE GREEN

Sophomore guard from Vincennes, Ind. . . . Industrial Engineering . . nickname, Tom . . . age 20 . . . hgt. 6-0 . . . wgt. 160 . . . Tom is the younger brother of Bob Green who earned three letters as a guard for the



Hurricanes. Tom was an excellent high school player, averaging 17 points a game. He was credited with an average of 10 assists per encounter. His qualities of leadership and reputation as a team man earned him the captaincy of his high school team for two successive campaigns. He wound up with All-sectional, All-Regional, All-Conference, All-State and All-America. Tom also won track letters as a distance

runner and lettered on the golf team four years in a row. He scores consistently in the 70s when he can take time off from basketball.

Green is exceedingly fast and is a proficient performer in the fast break. He was a key man with the Baby Hurricanes last year, scoring as many as 21 points in a game. He averaged 14. He was a consistent five or six field goal scorer almost every time out. His 21 point outburst against one team included his season high of 10 field goals.

Tom is going to make a strong bid for the job as first guard replacement for Junior Gee and Rick Jones on the 1966-67 squad and could be ticketed for regular duty before he completes his UM career. His quick hands, good team play and reliable scoring fit in well with the Miami scheme of attack. Green plans to continue his education beyond his bachelor's degree and take advanced work in business to enter the construction field. His father, a former player for Indiana State and later a coach and referee, is in the construction business now. Tom's high school coach was John Dotson.

CHARLES NOTI

Junior guard from Allentown, Pa... Physical Education... age 22... nickname, Chuck... hgt. 6-0... wgt. 205. Noti first decided to try out as a college football player but then changed to basketball. Though

sitting out last season, he was busy on the practice court and will come in for careful scrutiny when 1966-67 practice starts.

Chuck's forte is ball handling



Chuck's forte is ball handling and play-making but he's also an excellent outside shot. For Dieruff High in Allentown, he averaged 22 points per game. That brought him All-Lehigh Valley and All-Pennsylvania honors as well as honorable mention on the high school All-America listings. Noti played one year at

Fork Union Military Academy and boosted his scoring total to 27 points a game and gained All-Virginia honors. His high school football career gave him a spot on Pennsylvania's Big 33 All-Star team and All-State. He repeated the All-State grid acclaim in Virginia in his single year at Fork Union.

All last winter Noti was busy picking up his basketball career and gaining valuable experience as a red shirt. If he can regain his high school form, he could give the Hurricanes the insurance they badly need at

guard behind Rick Jones and Junior Gee.

In high school, Chuck earned nine athletic letters — three each in football, basketball and track. His high school basketball coach was Dick Schmidt.

The Pennsylvanian comes from an athletic family. His brother Joe was a high school All-America and later played at North Carolina State. Noti's high school coach—Dick Schmidt.

MIKE KVASNOK

Junior center from Royalton, Ohio . . . Education . . . age 22 . . . hgt. 6-8 . . . wgt. 210 . . . Mike is a transfer from Cuyahoga Community College He was center on this junior college team for two years



and is counted on to be a strong backup man at center for Bill Soens. Mike has been playing basketball at a fast level for five years. After he graduated as a star center for North Royalton Ohio High School in 1961, he enlisted in the Navy for three years and played basketball on the Navy teams at Point Mugu in Los Angeles and at Treasure Island in San Francisco. He also played in the All-Navy tournament at Youkousca in Japan. His


team was runner up in the championship round.

Mike has played the key exceptionally well throughout his career and has a good hook shot from either side at the key. He also is adept at foul shooting, a factor which finds favor in the eyes of Coach Bruce Hale.

Mike led Cuyahoga in both field goal and free throw percentage of accuracy. He also had a steady 10 to 12 rebounds per game. He should give Miami depth at a position which was woefully lacking in just about every respect last season. He will provide the team with some mobile height.

In some instances, both Kvasnok and Soens can be in the lineup at the same time as Soens proved last year that he could operate effectively as a forward.

Mike did not enter the University of Miami until September and had his first look at the Hurricane style of play when practice opened October 15. However, neither he nor Coach Hale is much worried over his ability to adjust to any changes in Hurricane offensive and defensive plans. Mike has played on so many different teams and has managed to fit in very well in all styles of play. He should find the change over comparatively simple. His high school coach at North Royalton was Paul Rieger.



MIAMI'S ALL-AMERICANS

University of Miami has produced two full-fledged All-America basketball players—Dick Hickox and Rick Barry.

The diminutive Hickox was named to the 1959-60 All-America and Rick Barry to the 1964-65 team. Barry was consensus All-America and was national scoring champion with an average of 37.4 points per game.

The fabulous Barry started his varsity career at UM in 1962-63 and when he had completed his career, he had the highest two single season point years ever put together by a Hurricane player. His 2,298 career scoring total—a UM record—is one of the highest in the history of college basketball.

Rick broke all of the other marks in the UM book except for free throws in a game—which mark he shares with Ron Godfrey, present UM frosh coach. He topped the Miami team in scoring as a junior and a senior. Rick missed four games in his sophomore year or he would undoubtedly have led the team scoring in that campaign also—and would have come close to the top of the all-time scorers in NCAA records.

Six of Barry's game during the 1964-65 season (senior year) were better than 50 point games. In one clash, he hit a high of 59. In a game against the famed Houston team, he tallied 50 points.

Miami's other All-America cage star, Hickox, wound up his UM career in 1961 with 1,529 points, highest ever for a guard at Miami. He led Miami in scoring all three of his varsity years with the Hurricanes.

MIAMI'S IN NCAA RECORD BOOK

The University of Miami basketball players bob up in many of the NCAA statistics for leading performances of 1965-66.

Among the nation's scoring leaders Mike Wittman occupies the No. 48th spot with a 21.8 average. Most of the men who finished ahead of him last year have graduated.

Rick Jones wound up in fourth place in free throw accuracy with an .876 mark.

Though he did not make the first 10, Rusty Parker was well up on the list with his .551 scoring average in field goal attempts. It took .563 to break into the top 10.


As a team, Miami finished 25th in the land in offense with an 87.3 average. Houston and Oklahoma City, which were second and third nationally last year, will play Miami here this year. Western Kentucky, 14th defensively last year, is in the Hurricane Classic and Miami plays St. Johns, 16th defensively, in Jamaica, L. I. Florida, which ranked 12th nationally in defense last season, meets Miami twice.

THINGS ARE DIFFERENT

The University of Miami basketball team, which started the 1965-66 season, was without the services of players who had scored 1,541 of its 2,558 points and 707 of its 1,318 individual rebounds. This year's team starts without the services of players who contributed only 336 of the team's 2,271 points and 108 of the team's 1,141 individual rebounds.

UM RECORD STILL STANDS

The University of Miami free throw percentage of .796 for the 1964-65 season still stands as the highest all-time scoring mark of any team in the NCAA university division.

MIAMI IN NEW TOURNAMENT


University of Miami is one of the four contenders in a brand new basketball tournament the Volunteer Classic, to be staged by University of Tennessee in Knoxville. Miami battles Atlantic Conference power Clemson in the opening game Dec. 16 and on the following night, will play either host Tennessee or Auburn.

Clemson lost only two of nine lettermen from a team which had a 15-10 record last year in the rugged Atlantic Conference. Last season was the first for head coach Bobby Roberts at Clemson and he has every reason to expect an even better team this winter.

Returning Clemson aces are Randy Mahaffee, 6-7 center, and Kenny Gardner, 6-6 and Jim Sutherland, 6-5, at forward. Of the newcomers, two of the best are Randy Mahaffee's brother, Charles, another 6 foot 7 inch forward, and guard Joe Aywood who is expected to give the club the sparkle it needed in the back court.

Tennessee's hopes of winning its own tournament rest with sophomores as only two starters come back from last year's 18-8 team. The returning starters are Ron Windby, 6-4, and Tom Hendrix, an inch taller. They averaged 17.3 and 7.6 respectively in scoring last season. Bill Hann and Bill Justus, flashy guards, and David Bell, 6-7 forward, should give the team lots of help. All are sophomores. Center will belong to seven foot Tom Boerwinkle who averages 3.9 points and nearly 6 rebounds last year as replacement for smooth Red Robbins.

Auburn, which opened the 1965-66 campaign by winning its first seven games and then played .500 ball the rest of the way, is rebuilding.



University of Pennsylvania's defending Ivy league champions; a Western Kentucky team which University of Kentucky Coach Adolph Rupp says "You have to keep in mind when you are talking about potential national champions" and an upcoming Holy Cross five which defeated St. Johns in New York just as the 1965-66 season was closing make up the visitors in the classy field Athletic Director Andy Gustafson and Coach Bruce Hale have scheduled for the Ninth Annual Hurricane Classic.

Holy Cross returns five lettermen, lost only two of the top seven men on the squad. A strong freshman team (averaged better than 90 points per game in winning 19 of 20) provides several possible starters, including a pair of towering cagers in 6-9 Ron Teixeira and 6-7 Ed Sidut. Each average better than 20 points a game as freshmen. Coach John Donohue expects a big winner this year and promises a rough defense to go with a potentially mighty offense.

Western Kentucky, 25-2 last year and a one point loser to mighty Michigan in the NCAA tournament, lost only one starter. Nine lettermen return. John Oldham has a strong scoring team led by the two top point-makers of last year — Clem Haskins, 20.4, and Dwight Smith, 16.1. The defense is really something. The Hilltoppers gave up only 67.5 points a game in outscoring their rivals by 18 points an outing last season.

Pennsylvania won 12 of 14 Ivy league games to grab the title last year and wound up 19-6. It was seventh best in America on defense overall. However, the Philadelphians have a new coach this year, Richard Harter, a Penn graduate. Penn has one returning starter, 6 foot 9 inch Frank Burgess, but also retains forward Tom Malkins, 6 foot 10, and guard Tom Northrup, 6 feet 2. The latter pair saw almost as much action as the starters. Harter's real job is to pick out the best of a promising sophomore crop. The forward battle looms between two 6-5 newcomers, Charles Snell and Jeff Osowski, and 6-10 junior, Tom Mallison. Pete Andrews, 6-0, appears set as a new guard. The height on the Pennsylvania club will be a handicap to the somewhat shorter Hurricanes when the teams get together on the opening night of the Classic.

Cornell made a fight of it for a half against Miami, being behind only 39-37, but Rick Barry's 25 rebounds gave Miami the openings to make it a runaway in the last half.

LSU had a little more defense than Cornell. It led 29-27 at half time and then moved steadily ahead for third place tournament honors.

Mike McCoy, Miami, and Brian Generalovich, Pitt, each made 14 first half points, but Barry's rebounding provided openings for Miami's 43-38 lead. Dave Roman scored 21 second-half points for Pitt, but Barry's rebounding was again the key and the Hurricanes hung on to win.

Miami forged ahead again but made several costly errors, and finally substitute Robert Murray a last minute. errors, and finally substitute Robert Murray, a last minute addition to the Syracuse traveling roster, hit a field goal with three seconds to go and Syracuse was tournament champion, despite Dampier's 35 points.



Though trailing by 11 points during one stage of the clash, Miami fought back brilliantly and knotted the score. In overtime, the Hurricanes had the lead most of the way, and at one time had a chance to pull away on missed free throws. Louisville won in the final second on a shot by Wade Houston. This marked the second time in three years that Miami lost in the Classic finals in the final second of an overtime period.
