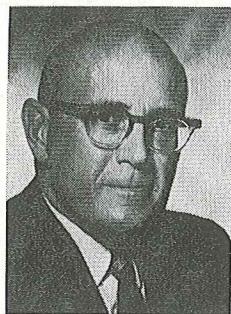
# UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI

ESTABLISHED IN 1926

THE UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI, which opened its doors in 1926, is the largest, privately-supported university in the southeast, with an enrollment exceeding 13,000.

Its president is Dr. Henry King Stanford. He came to the presidency of the University of Miami, July 1, 1962.

The 260-acre Main Campus of the University is located in Coral Gables, a residential municipality some seven miles southwest of the central city whose name it bears.

Possessing none of the brick-and-ivy mood traditional to campuses, the University's structures are strikingly modern. In April, 1965 the new \$3.3 million Student Union opened as a center for student activities. Its recreational features include an Olympic-sized swimming pool and bowling alleys. This newest UM building joins a nine-story library and five-story Computing Center as major additions to the Main Campus in the past three years.

Within five years, a two-building Science Center will be added to the campus scene to accommodate teaching and laboratory facilities now housed in various buildings. Construction on the first unit of the Center started this fall.

The University maintains separate campuses for marine science and medicine. The Institute of Marine Science on Virginia Key is one of the three largest



oceanographic centers in the U. S. The School of Medicine offers its first two years in a building adjacent to the Veterans Administration Hospital in Coral Gables, the last two clinical years at Jackson Memorial Hospital in Miami.

Looking toward its Golden Anniversary in 1975, the University is raising over \$93 million for development. First goals of this program are the \$15 million Science Center and an expanded \$21 million Medical Center adjacent to County-owned Jackson Memorial Hospital.

The University's students—who hail from almost every state and over 50 foreign nations—may study in six undergraduate colleges and schools and four graduate schools.

All freshmen and sophomores are enrolled in the University College to gain a firm grounding in the humanities, social sciences and natural sciences. The student's upperclass years are spent in one of the following colleges and schools: Arts and Sciences, Business Administration, Education, Engineering, Music.

The graduate-level scholar studies in the School of Law, School of Medicine, School of Environmental and Planetary Sciences or the Graduate School, which offers the Master's, Doctor of Philosophy and Doctor of Education degree in many specializations.

The University also serves the community culturally. The drama department presents a full schedule of classical and contemporary theatrical works throughout the year in the Ring Theatre. The Joe and Emily Lowe Art Gallery contains a large permanent collection. One of the famed regional collections of the Samuel H. Kress Foundation is housed in a separate gallery wing on permanent display. It features European masterworks of the 14th through 18th centuries.



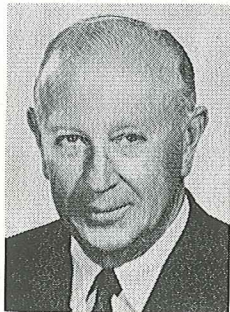


## ANDY GUSTAFSON

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR

ANDY GUSTAFSON heads University of Miami's vast athletic program, directing a program embracing eight varsity sports—football, basketball, tennis, golf, track, baseball, swimming and soccer.

He took over as full time Director of Athletics in December of 1963 after serving in the dual role of head football coach and athletic director following the death of Jack Harding.



Gustafson retired from the coaching field with the conclusion of the 1963 season—ending a career of 38 years (he was head coach at Miami 16 years).

Coming to the Hurricanes in the late forties from West Point where he served as Earl "Red" Blaik's chief aide during the Doc Blanchard - Glenn Davis-Arnold Tucker golden era, Gustafson moved to the top rank in his field in America and is listed among college football's all-time winning coaches. He ranks with the elite few who down through the years have won 100 games or more. His overall coaching record shows 115 victories . . . 78 losses . . . four ties. At Miami, he won 93 games against 65 losses and three ties.

Many of his elevens attained high national ranking . . . four times they won their way into bowl games . . . seven times they were seen on nationwide television in regular season play—and twice more in Bowl games.

The most noteworthy coaching achievement in the embryonic stages of Gustafson's career at Miami was the stunning beating his team gave Purdue in 1950, the week after the Boilermakers had shocked the football world by snapping Notre Dame's sensational win streak at 37 straight.

Andy's college football days came in the heyday of Pittsburgh gridiron fortunes. He fullbacked under Glenn "Pop" Warner in 1923, and the next two seasons under Jock Sutherland. In addition to his brilliance as a fullback, Gus was a field goal kicking star, setting a record at Pitt that has never been equalled—three goals in a single game (against Lafayette 1925). He scored the first touchdown ever in Pitt Stadium (against Washington & Lee 1925).

After leaving Pitt, Andy went to Virginia Tech as head football coach but returned to his alma mater as Sutherland's assistant after four winning years. In 1934, Gustafson left Pitt to join Coach Earl "Red" Blaik at Dartmouth. He followed Blaik to West Point in 1941.

It was from the campus on the Hudson that Andy came to Miami in the fall of 1948 to take the reins as head football coach of the Hurricanes—a post he held until retiring from coaching in 1963.

## BRUCE HALE

HEAD COACH

Personable Bruce Hale has turned in 190 victories and suffered only 90 defeats in a University of Miami basketball coaching career which enters its 11th season in 1965-66.

Never blessed with basketball material large in numbers, Hale has a tremendous skill in getting the most out of what is available. Only once since he took over at Miami has he failed to at least break even, his lone losing season being in 1954-55 when his team won 9, lost 11. That was his first Miami team.



Here are some of the highlights of Hale's brilliant coaching career at Miami: directed the Hurricanes to four post season tournament (one NCAA, three NIT) . . . produced two All-Americans (Dick Hickox, Rick Barry) . . . piloted the Hurricanes to the All-

Time national scoring record last season (98.4) . . . his team led the nation in foul shooting last season . . . led nation in scoring in 1958-59 . . . finished as runnerup in scoring in 1959-60 and 1962-63.

Last year, for the fourth time in five years, he was able to field a team which won 20 or more games. In those five years, his Miami teams have won 102 times, lost 32.

All that indicates that Hale is not only a successful coach, a past master at improvising, but he is also an offensive-orientated coach. That makes his teams the kind that bring out the crowds. The Hurricane attendance totals have climbed steadily.

When Hale came to Miami, small high school gyms, which housed many UM games in those days, looked empty at Miami games. Miami Beach Auditorium, with a 3600 Auditorium, was spacious. Now the two largest arenas in the Metropolitan area, Miami Beach Convention Hall and Miami Dade Junior college auditorium, have had turn away crowds at UM games. The Hurricanes will confine their basketball activity to those two courts for their home games this year.

Basketball has long been a central factor in Hale's life. He was an All-American player for Santa Clara and this past year was inducted into that school's Hall of Fame.

During World War II, he was commissioned a captain in the Air Force—and was stationed in Miami Beach for part of the period of his armed force service. He played on the famed Five by Five service team—and got some sand in his shoes which made him ready to accept the Miami basketball coaching post when it became available.

In between, he coached the Wright Air Field Base to the service championship, then spent 10 years in professional basketball. He was on the All-World team in 1945 and served as a coach in the National Basketball Association.

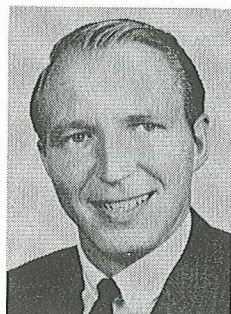


## RON GODFREY

### ASSISTANT COACH

Former University of Miami basketball star Ron Godfrey became full time assistant coach at Miami last season after serving several campaigns as a part time assistant.

Godfrey was a brilliant scoring ace at Miami in the late 50s and early 60s. He made honorable mention



All-America in his senior year (1960-61), while the year before, he set a foul shooting record (22 against Oklahoma City) and was hailed by Coach Peck Hickman of the high riding University of Louisville quintet as one of the best forwards in basketball.

Taking over as first string forward in 1958-59, Ron never relinquished the job through three brilliant seasons in which he compiled a 17.5 per game scoring

average and scored 1,384 points. He picked off 767 rebounds.

Godfrey and the fabulous All-America, Rick Barry, are on the All-Time UM basketball team at forwards. The record book is liberally sprinkled with Ron's name.

He is thoroughly grounded in the Hale system of play, not only as a player but also as a coach.

Coach Godfrey did his high school playing at Martins Ferry, Ohio High. While there, he set an all-time single game scoring record of 51 points and in his senior year tallied over 800 points to set an all-time seasonal mark.

## WHAT'S THE OUTLOOK?

University of Miami lost its two sensational forwards, consensus All-America Rick Barry, who averaged a record 37.4 points record 18.3 rebounds per game, and his running mate, Wayne Beckner, second high on the team with 18.3 scoring and 8.2 on rebounds.

Also gone is John Dampier, a great outside shooter who helped Miami in early season games.

There is no replacement for the fabled Barry in sight, but the loss of Beckner will be compensated for fairly well by the emergence of Mike Wittman as a starter.

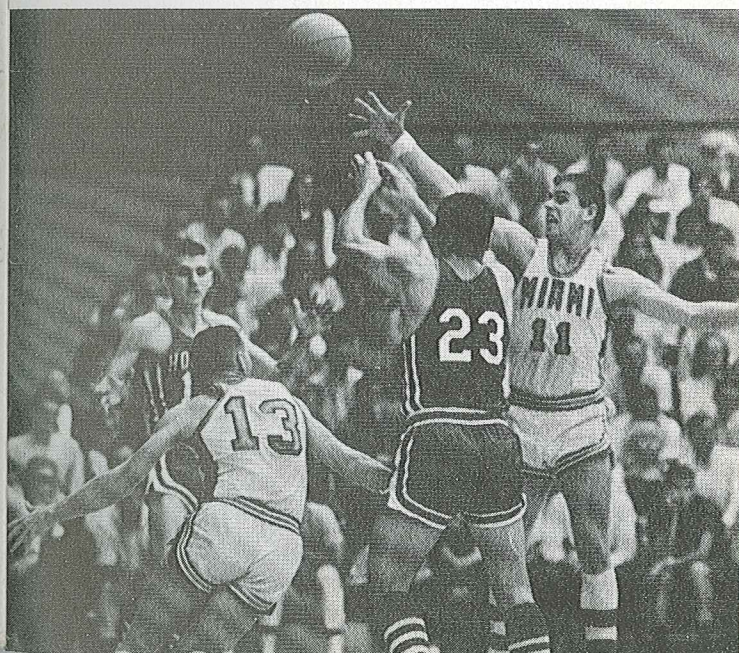
John Bates, who lettered as a sophomore and then was out of action last season, could move in as a contender for the other forward job. He is aggressive, shoots very well and is an excellent rebounder. Standing 6-6, he is tall enough but his great trouble is his slight build. At 185 pounds, he may not be big enough to do the job alone.

Senior letterman Stu Marcus has all the equipment except height.

A sophomore who must be considered in strong contention is 6-6 Rusty Parker from Daytona Beach. If he continues to improve, he could wrest the starting job away from the two lettermen.

The guard positions are Miami's strong spots. Junior Gee and Rick Jones were sensations as sophomores last season and Coach Bruce Hale believes they are likely to be the best pair of guards in the land this year. Both are fast, handle the ball well, can drive in or shoot from the outside. Gee is the field general but Jones is just as talented at the job. They averaged 10.8 and 9.9 points respectively last season on a team in which the play was geared to let Miami's talented forwards shoot. It would be no surprise to see each of them average 20 points a game this year. They can hit from outside as well as from in close.

Gee and Jones are expected to receive good help





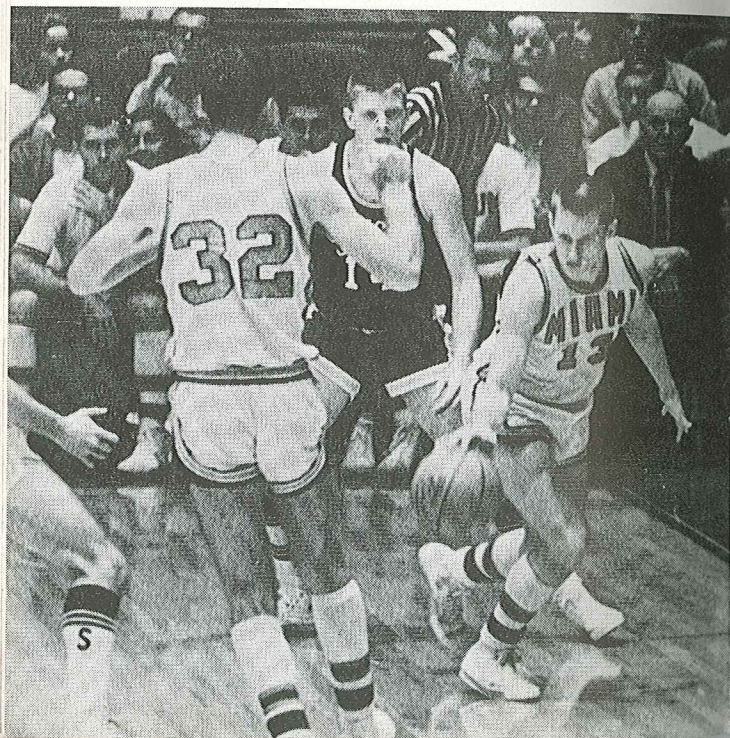
from Bob Green and Mike Volkman, experienced reserve guards last year, and 6-5 sophomore Dan Rodgers, a Kentuckian who rates as an excellent back-court man. Coach Hale has high hopes that Rodgers will give the Hurricanes a strong defensive boost.

What happens at center could well as not be the key to Miami's success. For two years, Don Patrican, 6-7, and Charles Grob, 6-8, have divided the job. Neither has been consistent, though each has occasionally come up with a performance which led Coach Hale to believe that his pivot troubles had been solved. Patrican has shown skill as a rebounder and, occasionally, has scored well. Grob is more aggressive and keeps things loose under the boards, but is not the offensive threat that Patrican is.

However, it is sophomore Eddie Spriggs who could make the big difference this season—not only by his own performance but by spurring the veterans on to greater efforts to stay ahead of him.

Spriggs, 6-8, and weighing 220 pounds, has great potential. He could be a 20-point per game man. He could take up a good portion of the slack left in the rebounding department by the departure of Barry. He was chosen the outstanding high school player in Ohio in his senior year and has shown enough flashes to indicate he has the potential for greatness.

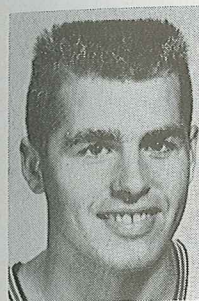
If and when he realizes that potential, the Hurricanes will be on their way to another great basketball season.



## PLAYER SKETCHES

### JUNIOR GEE

Junior guard from Loogootee, Ind. . . . Physical Education . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 5-10 . . . wgt. 168 . . . Gee had a brilliant high school career and has lived up to his reputation since coming to Miami. He was a sensation on the frosh team two years ago with 226 field goals and 64 free throws for 516 points, and a 24.6 point per game average. He stepped right in as a first string guard when varsity practice started last season and no one has come close to dislodging him.



A sensational floor man, Junior can fire in brilliant fashion from outside or scoot in for layups on drive in shots. He's the team quarterback.

Few players have come to a varsity squad with such a buildup as Gee did—and then made good in such brilliant style. Last season, with seniors Rick Barry and Wayne Beckner doing the heavy scoring, Gee and his soph running mate, Rick Jones, spent more of their time feeding the front liners but Junior still managed to finish with a 10.8 scoring average. He is sure to pull this average up considerably this season when he's expected to handle more of the offensive load. Junior has a 20 point per game potential.

In his first varsity game for Miami, the Indiana ace scored only five points in a clash in which his teammates were rolling up 136 points. Next time out, however (the Steel Bowl at Pittsburgh), his 18 points wrecked a favored Duquesne team. That stood as Junior's top scoring effort for nearly two months. Then he helped blunt the threat of a veteran Miami of Ohio team by scoring 19 points. Gee, however, saved his big push until the last two games when he hit for 26 on Rollins and closed out with 20 against FSU.

Junior was one of the most heralded cage players ever to come out of Indiana. Besides basketball, he was a baseball and track ace. High school—Loogootee . . . honors won in high school—All-State, All-county, All-City . . . letters won in high school—basketball 4, track 4, baseball 3 . . . high school coach—Jack Butcher.

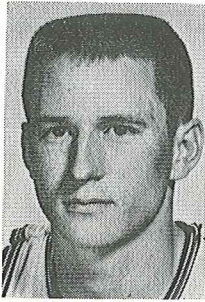

## RICK JONES

Junior guard from Muncie, Ind. . . . Physical Education . . . age 20 . . . hgt. 5-11 . . . wgt. 165 . . . letters earned, 1 . . . Jones opened the 1964-65 season as an understudy to Junior Gee, but moved into a starting job when John Dampier suffered injury and held the assignment the rest of the year. He and Gee team brilliantly at guard, and Coach Bruce Hale rates them the best two-man guard pair in the nation today.



Jones has blazing speed, is an excellent defensive player and can handle the quarterback job if necessary. Last year when

Dampier was felled with an injury in the sixth game, Jones stepped in like a veteran and a new basketball era was launched at Miami. For the rest of the season, the brilliant and dazzling play of Jones and his spectacular running mate, Gee, stole the plaudits of the record breaking crowds.

Rick popped in 13 points against St. Mary's in his first starting assignment and was in double figures most of the rest of the way. He had a high of 24 against Jacksonville, turned in a 20-point performance against Stetson. After Miami's first six games, the elusive Rick had a scoring average of only 2.5 points per game, but steadily pushed that mark upward and settled for a 9.9 mark at the close of the campaign. He is counted on to climb well up into the double figures in scoring this year.

Jones can shoot from outside or drive in for layups equal skill. As a freshman, he averaged 23.5 points a game when he scored 172 field goals and 104 free throws. He was rated the No. 1 high school player in Indiana in his senior year and played in the Kentucky-Indiana All-Star game.

In addition to being a star basketball player, Jones was the leading pitcher on UM's baseball team last season. He is a tremendous competitor, is the fastest man on the cage squad and knows how to use that speed.

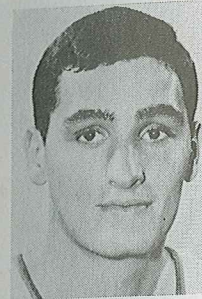

## DONALD PATRICAN

Senior center from Gloucester, Mass. . . . Business Administration . . . nickname, Don . . . age 22 . . . hgt. 6-7 . . . wgt. 215 . . . letters earned, 2 . . . Don has lettered twice, has started most of the games for



Miami at center over the past few years but faces a powerful competitor in the taller, heavier and probably sharper shooting and rebounding Eddie Spriggs this year. Patrican has turned in some brilliant games in the past, both offensively and defensively, has shown himself a capable rebounder, but lack of consistency has been his greatest fault. Both, as a sophomore and as a junior, he fell into slumps which tem-

porarily cost him his starting job. Each time, however, the New England cager managed to bounce back to regain the starting role.

Whether Patrican can shake off the slumps and have a brilliant season from start to finish is one of the key factors in Miami's hopes for 1965-66. Don's big moments as a sophomore included an 18 point performance against LaSalle, and 16 against St. Mary's, Rhode Island and FSU. In the Rhode Island game, he added a sensational 22 rebounds. He had 19 rebounds before fouling out at Nevada.

As a junior, Don had a great opening game with 29 points against Tampa, along with a dozen rebounds. In the next two clashes in the Steel Bowl, he averaged 12 rebounds but managed only five points. He snapped back with 19 against LaSalle—and was over nine only once more all year, hitting for 16 at Florida State. After the first three games, Patrican made double figures in rebounds only once, getting 11 against Florida. However, he seemed at his best when the going was toughest and the 1965-66 schedule offers plenty of opportunities for that skill. In high school, Don was a three-sport star, lettering in track and tennis as well as basketball. He wears a size 15 shoe—and this once forced him to play a game in high school with two right shoes. On a road trip, he had packed his gear wrong. High school—Gloucester . . . letters earned in high school—basketball 4, tennis 1, track 1 . . . honors won in high school—All-State two years, All-County 3 years . . . high school coach—Robert Welch.

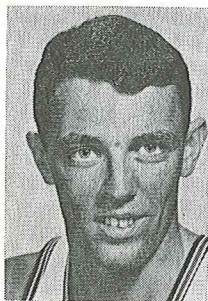

## MICHAEL WITTMAN

Junior forward from Nanuet, N.Y. . . . Business Administration . . . nickname, Mike . . . age 20 . . . hgt. 6-6 . . . wgt. 210 . . . letters earned, 1 . . . Wittman transferred to Miami from Los Angeles State Collage and after laying out a year, operated as a sophomore last season. With seniors Rick Barry and Wayne Beckner piling up sensational scoring and rebounding marks to lead the Hurricanes by wide margins in both departments, there wasn't much playing time left for other forwards. Through the first half of the season, he had only scored as much as 10 points once, had been blanked a couple of times and contributed only two points on four other occasions.



However, in late January, the New Yorker got into a game against Rollins long enough to score 19 points and wound up playing a lot of basketball from then on in.

In the last five games of the season, Mike averaged 14.2 points and made 11.4 rebounds per game—though he rarely saw as much as 15 minutes of action in any contest. He finished with a seven point, 5.5 rebound average for the season. His rebound mark was third high on the team.

Wittman has excellent size and weight for the position he plays. He is aggressive and makes his presence felt under the basket. He has a good jump shot, and picks up quite a few points on tip-ins.

Last season, Mike had his biggest scoring night on the road against Rollins when he finished with 19 points. At home, he had 18 point nights against both Stetson and Rollins. Houston yielded 16 rebounds to him in his best performance in that department. In one three-game stretch, Mike scored 49 points and grabbed 43 rebounds—playing less than half of each tilts. High school—Nanuet . . . high school coach—Charles Walsh . . . letters earned in high school—basketball 3 . . . honors won in high school—All-State, All-County.

## STEWART MARCUS

Senior forward from Miami Beach, Fla. . . . Business Administration . . . age 22 . . . hgt. 6-4 . . . wgt. 215 . . . letters earned, 2 . . . Marcus is given a good chance to gain a starting spot at forward in his final UM campaign after earning two letters as a reserve both at forward and center. He has a lot of natural ability but never has capitalized upon it fully.



Stewart was a sensation in high school, both in scoring and in rebounding but he has done comparatively little shooting as a college player, preferring to feed off to his teammates. However, since those teammates were the high scoring Rick Barry and Wayne Beckner, it may be that Marcus will take on shooting chores of his own this year. He

has an excellent one hand shot from 10 to 20 feet out. Last year, he averaged 50% of his field goal tries, but he only attempted about two field goals a game and wound up with a mere 3.0 scoring average. He averaged an excellent 4.3 in rebounds, though he rarely played as much as 10 minutes in any contest. Marcus had 10 points in each of Miami's games against Tampa . . . had 13 rebounds in the second Tampa game. He was a one man show in the latter stages of the Steel Bowl opening round game against Pittsburgh when he gathered in 10 rebounds.

In his sophomore year, Marcus' best game was against Florida Southern when he collected 11 points. He had a nine rebound game against Stetson and on three other occasions, had seven rebounds. Even if he does not earn a starting job, this looks like the busiest year for him. His fine rebounding skill will give the team more help and he'll be doing even better if he regains his high school scoring touch. High school—Miami Beach High . . . letters earned in high school—basketball 3, track 3 . . . honors won in high school—All-State, All-City, All-Conference . . . high school coach—Charles Fieldson.

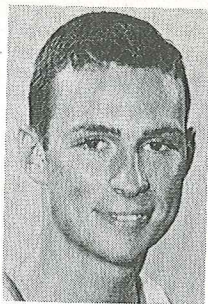

## ROBERT GREEN

Senior guard from Vincennes, Ind. . . . nickname, Bob . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-2 . . . wgt. 180 . . . Letters earned, 2 . . . Green came to Miami on his own, made a place for himself on the freshman squad and has provided solid depth at guard through two seasons of varsity play. With sensational Junior Gee and Rick Jones as starters again, Green seems destined for another year as a reserve.



Bob was below par the first half of 1964-65 and was used only sparingly. However he took part in 11 of the final 13 games on the schedule, coming up with eight-point performances against both Florida Southern and Loyola of the South. In the Florida Southern game, he had only three field goal tries, cashed in on all of them and hit for two free throws for a perfect night.

While not an accomplished rebounder, Green did grab six rebounds against Tampa. Bob had a trio of eight points games in his sophomore year — against St. Marys, Creighton and Florida Southern.

After his sophomore campaign, Green was on the squad which Coach Bruce Hale took to South America and Green turned in some good performances on that journey. He can work the ball into position and feed off exceptionally well but also possesses an excellent outside shot. With the emphasis in Miami's attack falling more heavily on the guards this year due to the graduation of star forwards, Rick Barry and Wayne Beckner, Coach Hale may have to do more substituting than usual to keep his guards moving at top speed. Should this be the case, Green seems assured of lots of action as he will be capitalizing on the experience gained through three seasons of varsity play for the Hurricanes. High school—Lincoln . . . letters earned in high school—basketball 3, football 2, track 2, golf 2 . . . honors won in high school—All-Sectional, second team All-Conference . . . high school coach—John Dotson.

Green comes from a basketball family, his father, Robert Green, formerly serving as a player, coach and referee. His brother is a member of the UM frosh team.

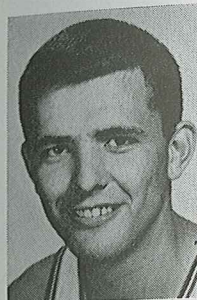

## DANIEL RODGERS

Sophomore guard from Frankfort, Ky. . . . Physical Education . . . nickname, Dan . . . age 20 . . . hgt. 6-5 . . . wgt. 180 . . . Rodgers was a center in high school, but was moved to forward when joining the Hurricanes. He was a brilliant player for Franklin County High in his junior year, seemed to be sure shot for all-state as

a senior in that basketball-minded state, but broke his wrist and was out for the season. Coach Hale heard about the Kentuckian, believed he had the makings of a college player, so Dan became a freshman at Miami two seasons ago. Last year he was red shirted and was shifted to guard, a position he'll seek on the varsity this season.



Rodgers is the tallest guard the Hurricanes have had since

John Dampier operated at that position. He is a good floor man, can shoot and is strong on defense. But with such brilliant starters as Junior Gee and Rick Jones returning, Dan is being counted on as a backup man for the mighty pair.

Playing behind Gee and Jones, does not discourage Rodgers. He had to snap back after his year of part absence from the cage court because of his high school injury, so facing and beating obstacles is a part of a set pattern in his athletic life. His size and determination are in his favor.

In high school, Rodgers was named to the Kentucky Mid-State Conference All-Star team in his sophomore and junior years and to honorable mention All-State as a junior. His best scoring game in high school was 33 points. In rebounds, he averaged 13 per game through his career. Besides basketball, Dan was a top star as a high jumper in track during his high school days. He's a qualified swimming instructor. Rodgers is married and the father of a child. High school coach—Cliff Barker.

Rodgers has been playing basketball since he was in the fourth grade — and except for the span when he was felled by injury in high school, he led his team in scoring.

Though slated to operate at guard for Miami this season, Dan will be available at center if needed there as this was his starring post in high school.



## EDWARD SPRIGGS

Sophomore center from Jackson, Ohio . . . Physical Education . . . nickname, Eddie . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-8 . . . wgt. 220 . . . As a senior at Jackson (Ohio) High, Spriggs was a brilliant all around player and garnered the accolade from scribes as the top high school player in Ohio that season.

In his freshman year at Miami, Spriggs hit for 201 field goals and 44 free throws to give him a 21.2 point average. In virtually every frosh game, he 'owned' both back boards.



Ed was red-shirted last year and this fall he is making a powerful bid for the starting job at center despite the fact that two letterman seniors have two full varsity campaigns of experience on him. Spriggs has the potential to take the job away from both veterans because of his scoring

and rebounding ability. If Spriggs comes through in the manner of which he is capable, the Hurricanes could be on their way to a highly successful season, but if the big boy develops slowly, the Hurricanes may be fighting to stay above the .500 mark in the win and loss column.

Since both forward spots are open for new men this season, Coach Bruce Hale may open the campaign with one of his senior centers as a starter and use Spriggs as a relief man in the early games to give him a chance to garner game experience before tossing him into the thick of torrid competition.

Though he is an excellent recovery man and can pick up the two point tip-ins with regularity, Spriggs can also shoot from outside, handles himself very well for a big man and covers a lot of territory. High school—Jackson High . . . letters earned in high school—basketball 3, football 1 . . . high school coach—Dave Fisher . . . honors won in high school—All-America, most valuable player in Conference two years, most valuable player of his team for four years.

Spriggs scored 1,858 points during his high school career, just 38 points short of the Ohio State mark set by the famous Jerry Lucas. He once hit for 61 points against Logan (Ohio) High. He led his high school team in scoring for three years with averages of 24.8, 31.8, 30.6. Ed averaged 20 rebounds per game throughout his prep career.

## JOHN BATES

Junior forward from Miami, Fla. . . . Education . . . age 21 . . . hgt. 6-6 . . . wgt. 210 . . . letters earned, 1 . . . John lettered as a sophomore but was held out of action last season, so he has two years of varsity eligibility remaining. He matured considerably as a



player during his season out of varsity action and comes back this campaign as an authentic candidate for a starting job at forward.

John's greatest handicap is his frail build and that may force him to divide the forward spot with other prospects. He is one of the better jumpers on the team and is an excellent rebounder.

In pre-season practice, Bates displayed much of the scoring skill which made him one of Dade county's high point men in his senior year as a basketball player for Miami Jackson High School. John's finest performance as a sophomore at UM does not even show on the record books. In an overtime game at Nevada, starting center Don Patrican fouled out and Bates — ordinarily a forward for Miami — was pressed into service at center. His fine defensive play and some excellent feeding off from the pivot carried Miami to victory in that one.

Although he scored 11 points against Rollins, Bates did little shooting as a sophomore. He did a fairly steady rebounding job on his few playing opportunities. Bates rarely played more than a few minutes in any game and his rebounding high was four against Florida in only a couple of minutes of action. Now smoothed out in every way, the former Jackson ace seems set to make a valuable contribution to the Hurricane basketball cause.

John made both the Miami Herald and Miami News All-City teams at Miami Jackson High. His high game at Jackson was 44 points and 37 rebounds against Miami Military Academy. His career totals show 24 points per game and 19 rebounds.

Bates turned down an appointment to the United States Military Academy at West Point to come to the University of Miami. His aim in life is to become a lawyer.

When away from the basketball court, local product Bates spends his time with swimming, tennis and bowling.

While Bates played center in high school, he will play at forward for the Hurricanes. Letters earned in high school—basketball 2, swimming 1 . . . honors won in high school—All-City . . . high school coach—Speedy Heht.

Parker played forward on the frosh team two years ago when Junior Gee, Rick Jones and Eddie Spriggs were 20-point-a-game men, but Rusty remained pretty much in the back-



ground with this trio of brilliant shot-makers around. However, he proved a good student at the game and last season, as a red shirt, picked up valuable experience and displayed real promise for the future. Now, an inch taller and 10 pounds heavier, the Floridian has moved up to the varsity a far smoother and accomplished player than when he first broke in.

"Rusty had a good high school background when he came to us," said Coach Bruce Hale. "He needed experience, but I think he now has gained all he can on the practice floor. His increase in size and weight have helped him a lot and I look for him to develop steadily throughout the year. He is in the battle for a starting spot at forward and could make it before the season is over."

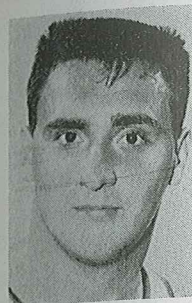
Hale likes the way Parker has picked up in his rebounding. He is gaining confidence in scoring and like most of his teammates, has a one hand jumper which is hard to stop. Rusty has shown more improvement overall than any player now on the squad. He is well indoctrinated in the Miami style of play and is expected to be a big help this season when Miami forwards will be very much on the spot.

Parker was a three-sport athlete in high school, playing end in football and pitching two no-hitters in baseball. He comes from an athletic family, his father once starring in football and basketball at Stetson and later serving nine years as a high school grid coach. Grob is a determined, aggressive basketball player who always manages to earn a few starting calls at center during the course of the season but never has developed quite enough scoring punch to stay in the job.



Starting slowly as a sophomore, Charley scored only two points during the first five games but improved from then on in and wound up the year with a 4.2 scoring average and 87 rebounds. His best scoring and rebounding games since joining the varsity resulted during the 1963-64 season as he tallied 13 points against both Tampa and Creighton and had 14 rebounds against Florida Southern. Grob started off well last fall and had at least an even chance to wrest the first string job away from Don Patrican but an injured arm kept him out of seven of Miami's first 10 battles and allowed him only short action in the next two. As a result, he never did move into top form.

Charlie once seemed on his way when he came up with back to back 11 point performances against Miami of Ohio and Oklahoma City, but he slipped again and not until an eight point showing against FSU in the season finale did he lend much help to the team. With no injury problems, Grob could be a considerable factor in the Hurricane season. 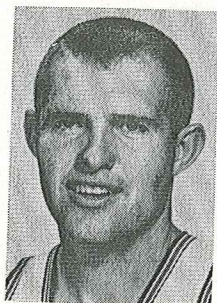

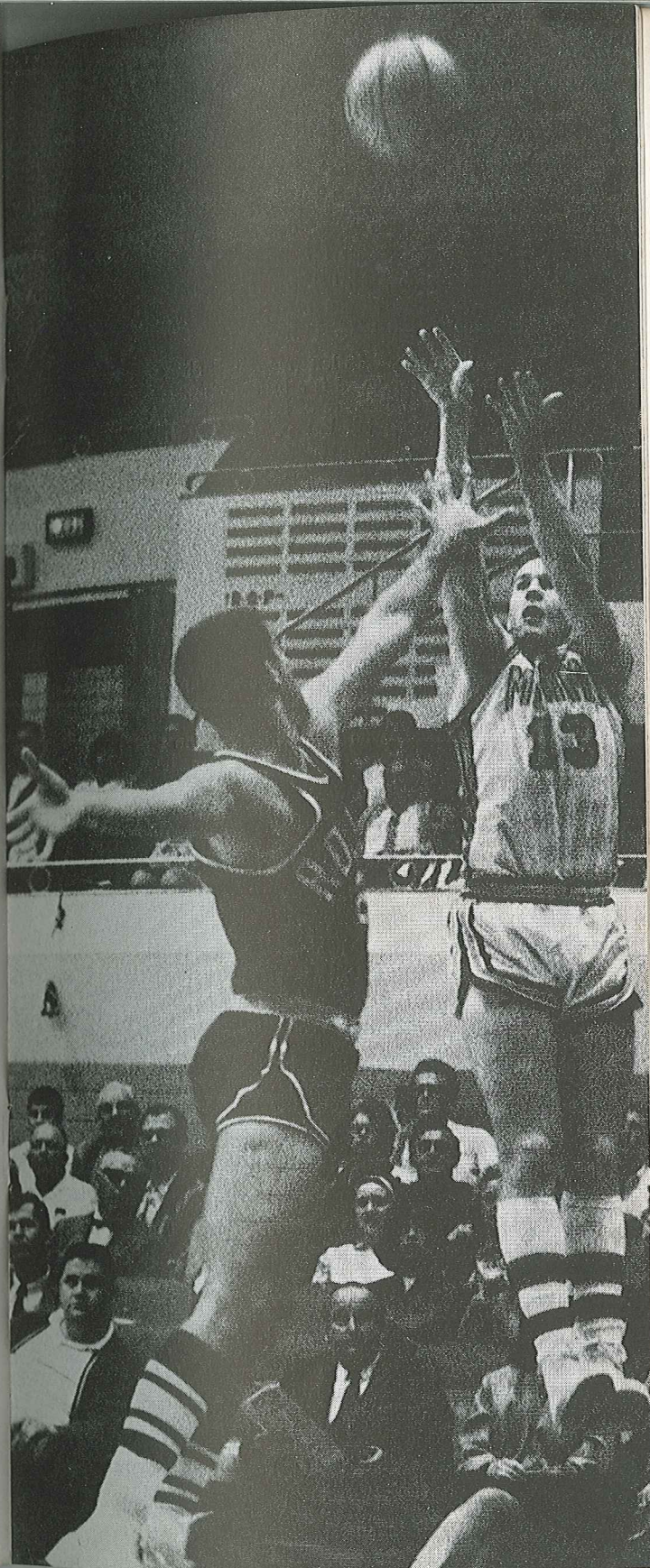

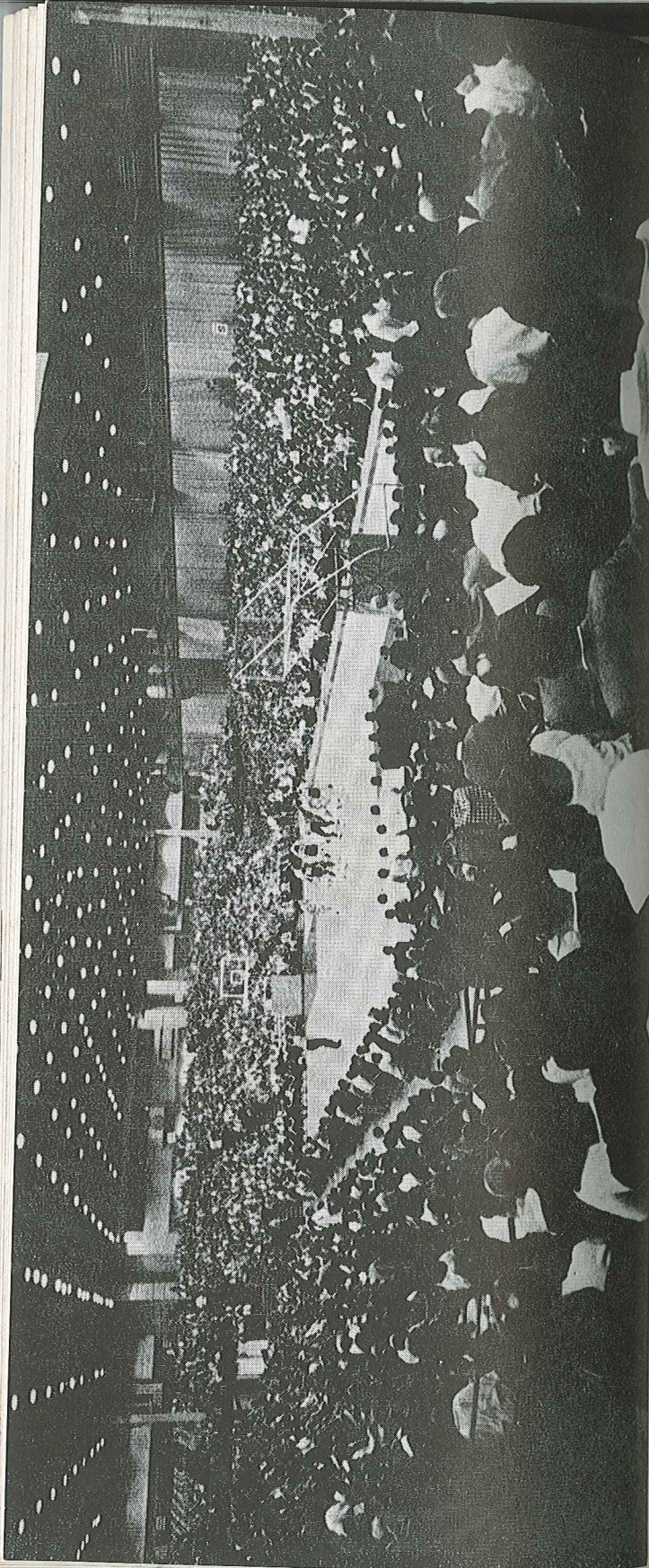

The greatest sophomore prospect in University of Louisville history has brought the largest advance sale of basketball tickets in all history at University of Louisville. Coach Peck Hickman, himself, is quoted as saying, "Westley Unsted is to us what Jerry Lucas was to Ohio State and Oscar Robertson was to Cincinnati"—and that's about the ultimate that can be said for any basketball player. Unsted is 6 feet 8, weighs 240. Regular Joe Liedtke, 6 foot 7 center last year, is playing forward this season. Three lettermen and six sensational sophomores round out what Louisville fans expect to be a sure tournament team at the end of the 1965-66 campaign.

Georgia Tech, which broke even with Louisville in two thrillers last year, has two sophomores rated as probable starters by Coach John Hyder—Phil Wagner, star Kentuckian, and Pete Thorne, a flashy Ohioan. Wes Field, 6 foot 7 junior, is the tallest man on the squad. Tech has only two starters back, but Hyder expects to have a colorful team, with better depth than usual and excellent speed. Lack of experienced height could hurt in some games.

Boston University's Terriers have changed their style of play this year. Coach John Burke has four lettermen back but has lost his big scorer, Randy Cross. The Terriers, however have in 6 foot 7 John Osgood a budding star. He finished so strongly last year that he wound up being named the team's most valuable player. His 33, 32 and 28 point games were high for Boston last season. Osgood and Dave Delaney, 6 feet 8, are the team's big men. The Terriers are looking for some help from the sophomore class. Skip Mortimer, 5 foot 10, is the best of the upcoming sophomores. He is a classy ball handler . . . he did a fine job of shooting for the frosh. Since the Terriers play six games before coming to Miami, Skip should have picked up the one thing he lacks—varsity game experience.

An ailing Rick Barry, for Miami, and injured Rex Trobridge, for Syracuse, left both clubs weakened but the rest of the players put on one of the tournament's most thrilling games. Miami broke ahead 46-42, but ran into late trouble. With Dave Bing sparkling, Syracuse forced the game into overtime. Miami forged ahead again but made several costly errors, and finally substitute Robert Murray, a last minute addition to the Syracuse traveling roster, hit a field goal with three seconds to go and Syracuse was tournament champion, despite Dampier's 35 points.

Barry, with 45 points, set a new tournament record. He had 17 rebounds.

Playing for third place, Yale broke away to an 8-4 lead, then gave up eight successive points and never could get back into contention. Yale lost 73-61 to Tulsa. Rick Park scored 20 for the winners. Bon Fedorko took down 12 rebounds.

Miami and Maryland fought a rip-snorter first half, with the midway point tally being 35-35. The lead alternated frequently. Maryland scored eight points in the first 2:01 of the second half before Miami scored. Miami three times drew even, the last time at 60-60 with eight minutes to go. Then Rick Barry and Wayne Beckner scored eight points while the Terps scored none and the issue was settled.

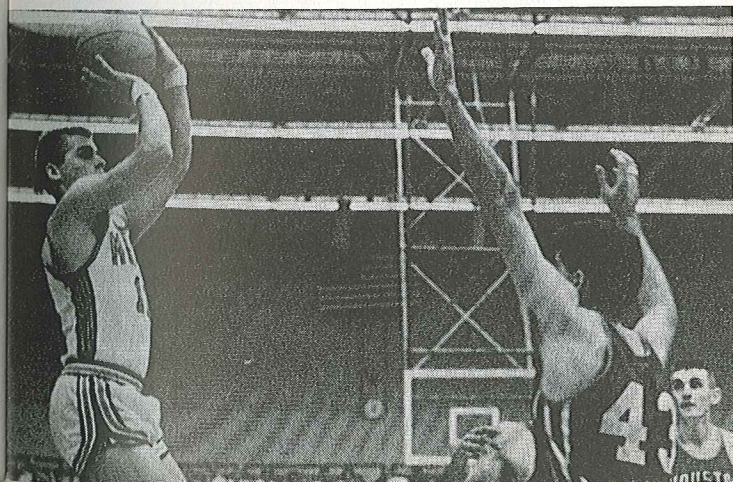

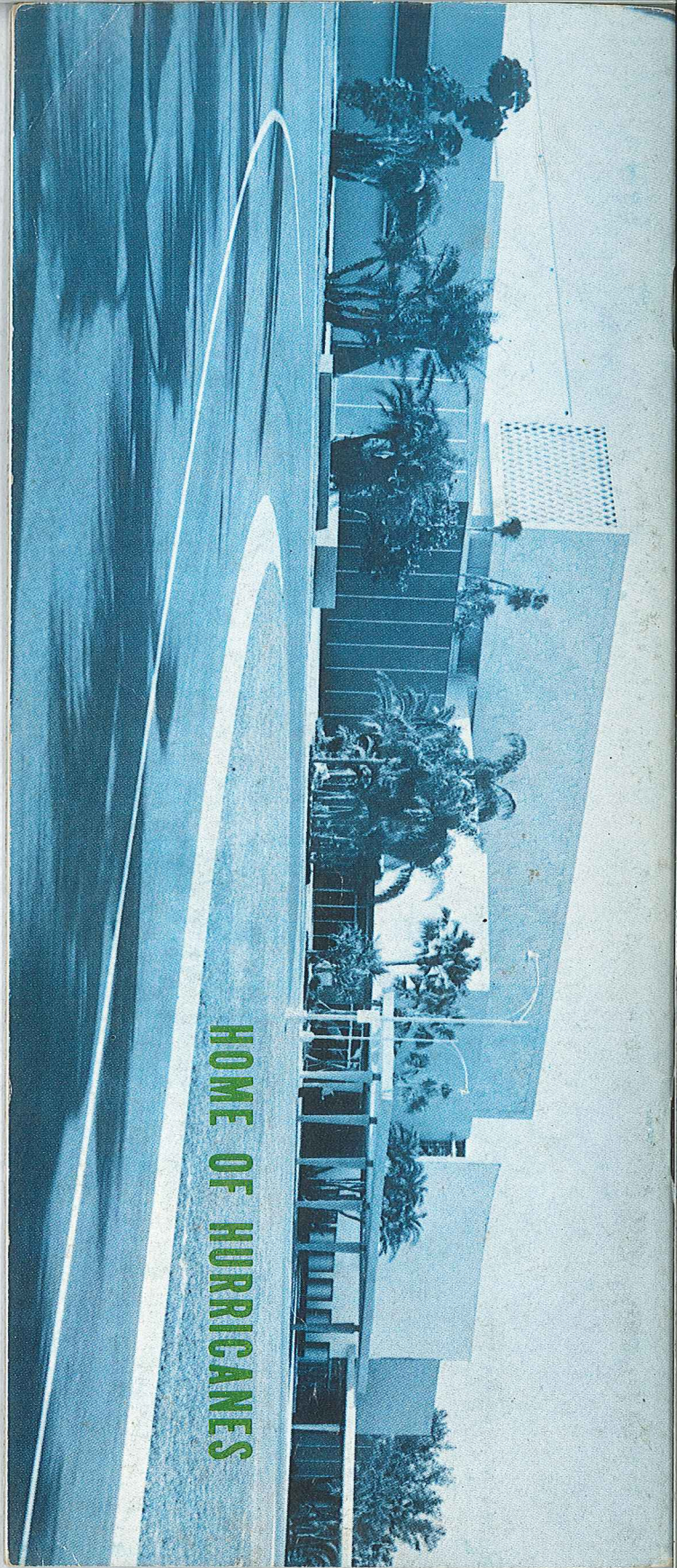
