THE OUTLOOK

BASKETBALL

Graduation took the four leading point makers off the 1957-58 University of Miami basketball team, including the two starting forwards and two starting guards. Scholastic difficulties removed the No. 3 guard and the No. 3 forward. To say the least, the 1958-59 University of Miami basketball team will be woefully inexperienced, compared with its predecessor which won the Florida Intercollegiate Conference title.

Last year's frosh quintet was unbeaten in regular season play and should give this new team good scoring power as well as rebounding strength but it may lack defensive strength and playmaking skill.

Only seniors on the squad are Joe Gardner and Ed Contreras. Joe is an accurate shotmaker, having averaged 41% in both previous seasons, but has seen comparatively little service. Contreras played even more rarely.

The two juniors back are Dick Berghoff, regular center last year, and Norm Nebel. Berghoff had a slow start as a sophomore but toward the end of the season was performing in the style expected of him, though he never did attain his full potential in scoring. If he comes through this year to steady the sophomores, this could be a better Miami season than the experience of the squad would promise.

Miami has seven sophomores but only four of them played on the 1957-58 freshman unit. One of the others, Dave Landis, was a 1956-57 freshman guard of considerable skill. He's returning to action after a year's layoff. Dick Hickox and Bruce Applegate transferred to Miami after spending a year in junior college and also stayed out of action last season. Jerry Davis who played briefly in 1956-57 also returns and may give depth at center.

SWIMMING

University of Miami's 1959 swimming team, facing a greatly expanded schedule, should improve somewhat over 1958, but lacks the all-around depth to trounce the real powerhouses.

Martin Redlich, brilliant distance swimmer in 1956 and 1957 and a capable sprinter last year, and Dick Joseph, a fair distance swimmer, are gone.

Hal Mischner, a great sprinter before he went into the service, is back and may regain his old form. If he doesn't, Sophomore Frank Woods will do the job. If both come through, Miami will be really rough in the sprints.

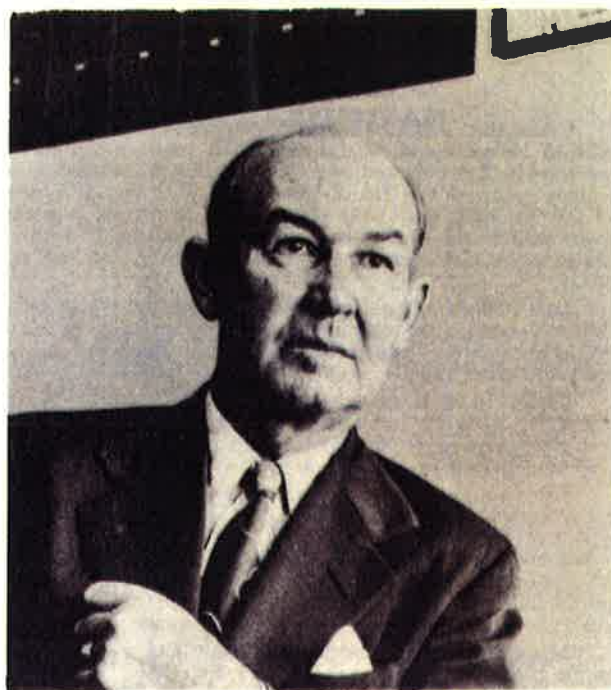
Jack Nelson, who cracked everybody's pool records in the butterfly, will again be unbeatable but the Hurricanes have little backup strength here.

William Lahde broke UM's backstroke record in his first meet last year but was felled by the virus and never regained that form. He should give the team good strength in this event. He may get some real help from the improved Nelson Nichols and William Harding.

Harding was pressed into service as a diver last year, did a fair job and appears to be the lone hope in this event again.

Eduardo Carrera, a fair distance swimmer last year, may be able to challenge the best but has no experienced support.

Newcomer Pete Gross should take up the slack in the breaststroke which at present is a glaring weakness. Dick Kirwick, Larry Frase and Ronald Blackburn round out the squad and give depth for the relay teams where Miami should no longer be a pushover.



Athletic Director, Jack Harding

Jack Harding

was a great all around athlete at University of Pittsburgh and then went on to successful football coaching careers at University of Scranton and University of Miami. He took over the rapidly expanding University of Miami athletic program as full time athletic director in 1948, after having served for a number of years both as head grid coach and as athletic director. Under his guidance, the University of Miami athletic program has expanded to great heights and the Hurricanes have opened athletic relationships with teams from coast to coast. Miami now maintains varsity teams in basketball, football, baseball, track, cross country, tennis, golf and swimming. Harding's wide acquaintanceships have helped Miami schedule-wise and his experience in building has proven to be just what young University of Miami has needed.

THE COACHES

BASKETBALL

BRUCE HALE, head basketball coach at University of Miami, starts his fifth year with the Hurricanes. His UM teams have won 50 games and lost 45. Hale was All America in college at Santa Clara where he was graduated in 1941. He was a captain in the U. S. Army Air Force, playing on the Five by Five team at Miami Beach and later coaching the Wright Air Field Base to the service championship. He played professional basketball for 10 years and was on the All World pro team of 1945. He coached the Chicago America Gears to the pro championship in 1946 and later played and coached the Indianapolis team in professional play.



SWIMMING

LLOYD BENNETT this year fields his ninth swimming team at the University of Miami. He has put together some powerful teams in the past, going undefeated in several campaigns. One of his swimmers, Gaither Rosser, was on the U. S. Olympic team of 1952 — and Junior Jack Nelson was on the 1956 team.



Bennett's 1952 team won 10 of 13 meets while in 1954 and 1955, the Hurricanes went undefeated in dual competition. Florida and Southeastern AAU titles were also won by Miami in those years. He has won nine championships at Miami and every record on the books has been set by men he has coached.

NORMAN NEBEL, 6 feet 4, 185 pounds, 22 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . from Brooklyn, N. Y., Samuel Tilden High . . . High school coach, Charles Krugman. Nebel saw limited action last year but displayed promise of developing into a regular. He has a fine one-hand jump shot and is able to hold his own with much taller men in the rebound department.

Ron led the freshmen to an undefeated season last year with a scoring average of 21 points per game. He was freshman captain. Ron is sorely needed by the varsity which goes into this campaign with no experienced shotmaker. He can hit from anywhere. He made 43 points in one game last year. He gets off the floor well and has good speed.

BRUCE APPLIGATE, 6 feet 3, 195 pounds, 20 years old, sophomore, Physical Education . . . from Ft. Wayne, Ind., Northside High . . . High school coach, Don Bruick. Bruce attended Allen Hancock Junior college in 1956-57 and was regular forward for his one year there. He made the all California junior college tournament team. Did not play at Miami last year to preserve three years of varsity eligibility. Bruce has an excellent pair of



hands and uses a one-hand jumper shot. He's a good rebounder, should see plenty of action this season.

ED CONTRERAS, 6 feet 4, 215 pounds, 21 years old, senior, Business Administration . . . from Tampa, Fla., Plant High . . . High School coach, Gene Bittner. Ed is one of the strongest players on the squad and is expected to reach his collegiate peak this season. He is a rugged type player with a keen shooting eye. Once he breaks into the lineup more often, his scoring average will jump. He's a rugged type player. As first baseman on the Hurricane baseball team, he holds the school record for home runs in one season and for a career. He's a red hot professional baseball prospect.

DICK BERGHOFF, 7 feet, 220 pounds, 22 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . from Ft. Wayne, Ind., Northside High . . . High school coach, Don Bruick. As a freshman two years ago, he set a scoring record of 21.8 points per game average for the season as he tallied 328 points. He fell well below this mark as a sophomore and during the first half of the season, his play was erratic and his scoring light. In the closing weeks, however, as Miami went on a seven-game winning streak, he came along very fast and indicated he is on his way to becoming one of University of Miami's finest basketball players. He topped the team in rebounds, has proven he can score effectively from the center position. He should have what it takes to carry the club until the untried sophomores get a little game experience.

One of the main reasons last year's freshman team was so successful was the fine all-around play of its center, Harry Manushaw. He scores well with either hand on the pivot, shoots a good jumper and is a very strong rebounder, outplaying men several inches taller. If his play continues to improve, he will press anyone for a starting role and will be hard to keep out of the lineup. If he cannot dislodge Berghoff at center, he may move in at forward.
