

2009-10 Season Outlook

38TH SEASON OF WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

Miami is entering its 38th season of women's basketball in 2009-10. The Hurricanes have compiled a 542-428 all-time record since their first season in 1972-73.

HURRICANES ELECT TEAM CAPTAINS

The Hurricanes have voted senior **Charmaine Clark** and sophomores **Shenise Johnson** and **Sylvia Bullock** as their captains for the 2009-10 season.

HURRICANES RETURN SEVEN LETTERWINNERS

With the loss of only two starters, Miami returns 57 percent of its scoring from a year ago. The 12-woman roster features seven returning letterwinners, including three starters - Seniors

Charmaine Clark and Diane Barnes
and sophomore Shenise Johnson. The
roster also features senior Ashley Sours
and sophomore Rikiah Gatlin in the
post, sophomore Riquna Williams on
the wing and sophomore Sylvia Bullock
in the forward position. The Hurricanes
welcome their freshman class of Lee
Anna Osei, Hannah Shaw, Morgan
Stroman, Shanel Williams and Stefanie
Yderstrom as their freshman class this
season.

The group of seven returning players helped Miami to a 13-17 record in 2008-09, which was a four-game improvement from the previous season – tied for the 59th best turnaround in the nation. The Hurricanes will look for continued improvement as their roster now has two McDonald's All-Americans for the first time in program history, with Stroman joining Johnson.

STRONG GUARD PLAY FOR MIAMI

The Hurricanes' backcourt may be one of the best in the ACC. Two letterwinners return, sophomores **Shenise Johnson** and **Riquna Williams**. Johnson was the only member of the 2008-09 team that started all 30 games for Miami and Williams was the team's second-leading scorer, despite missing four games with a leg injury.

Johnson averaged 12.8 points, 7.1 rebounds, 4.1 assists and 2.6 steals, leading Miami in all categories. She was named to the ACC All-Freshman Team and ACC Honorable Mention. She was fourth in the ACC with an .820 free throw percentage and in the top-10 in the ACC in assists, blocks (1.0), steals, defensive rebounds (4.8) and assist/turnover ratio (1.2). Williams, Miami's top player off the bench in 2008-09,was the fifth-best freshman scorer in the conference with an 8.7

points per game average. The Pahokee, Fla. native was also in the top-five among ACC freshman in free throw percentage (.770) and steals (1.69).

DEPTH IN THE FRONTCOURT

Junior Charmaine Clark had her best season in 2008-09, starting 28 games. She recorded 81 assists, surpassing her combined total from her freshman and sophomore seasons. Clark was second on the team with 123 rebounds and is expected to close out her collegiate career with a strong season. Diane Barnes also saw improvement in her second season at Miami after transferring to UM after her freshman year. Barnes is second among returners with a .504 field goal percentage and is a ferocious rebounder, grabbing 45 offensive rebounds in 2008-09. Fellow senior Ashlev Sours made nearly 60 percent of her field goals last year and recorded 24

blocks in 23 games. Sophomore Sylvia **Bullock** started five games and played in 28 in 2008-09. The Anchorage. Alaska native brings tenacious defense and overpowering strength as a forward. Her instinct as a rebounder led to 39 offensive rebounds out of a total of 67 last year.

FRESHMEN WITH A WINNING **PEDIGREE**

The freshman class looks to make an immediate impact as McDonald's All-American Morgan Stroman leads a talented incoming crop. Stroman led her Lower Richland (S.C.) High School team to four consecutive state titles and was named the state Gatorade Player of the Year three straight seasons. Hannah Shaw (Nottingham, England) and **Stefanie Yderstrom** (Ostertalje, Sweden) both have experience playing for their country's national teams. Lee Anna Osei (Toronto, Ontario, Canada) was an All-Canadian point guard and Shanel Williams led her high school team to a Virginia State Championship.

MCDONALD'S ALL-AMERICANS

Freshman Morgan Stroman - a 2009 McDonald's All-American - will be the second current Hurricane to earn the honor. Sophomore **Shenise Johnson** was a 2008 McDonald's All-American. It is the first time in program history that two All-Americans have been on the same team. Stroman will be the third McDonald's All-American in program history, as Tamara James earned the honor in 2002.

FOREIGN INFLUENCE

The Hurricanes' incoming class has three international players: Lee Anna Osei - Canada, Hannah Shaw - United

Kingdom and Stefanie Yderstrom -Sweden. It is the first time that three freshman have been from foreign countries in program history. It is also the most international players on the roster since the 2004-05 season. The 2003-04 Hurricanes featured players from four foreign countries.

NATIONAL TEAM EXPERIENCE

There are three players on the 200roster that have played for their country's national team. Shenise Johnson represented Team USA, while Hannah Shaw and Stefanie Yderstrom played for England and Sweden, respectively.

DIAPER DANDY

As a freshman in 2008-09. Shenise **Johnson** put up some remarkable statistics. Of the 2008 Hoopgurlz Top-100. Johnson was the only student-athlete to be ranked in the Top 10 in points, rebounds, assists, steals and blocks. Among all of the nation's freshmen, Johnson ranked 12th in scoring and 10th in rebounds.

In her sophomore season, Johnson looks to lead the Hurricanes to the postseason for the first time since the 2005-06 campaign. The Henrietta, N.Y. native will contend to be only the third Miami player to be named to an All-ACC team. Tamara James (First Team, 2005, 2006) and **Renee Taylor** (Second Team, 2007) are the previous all-conference selections for Miami since the 'Canes joined the ACC in 2004.

MEIER AND JOHNSON

According to a survey conducted by UC Santa Barbara following the conclusion of the 2008-09 season. Johnson joined UCSB's Lauren Pedersen as the only players nationally to lead their team in points, rebounds, assists and steals. Each player was the first to accomplish the feat since the 1989-90 season when coincidentally, Hurricane head coach **Katie Meier** accomplished the feat as a senior for Duke. Johnson also led the 'Canes in blocks last season - the only player in the country to lead her squad in all five statistical categories.

ON TOP OF THE WORLD

This past summer, Shenise Johnson was chosen to compete with the Team USA U19 World Championship team in Bangkok, Thailand. With an overall record of 8-1, Team USA won the World Championship with an 87-71 victory over Spain. In the tournament, Johnson averaged 9.4 points and was second on the team with 6.9 rebounds per game. She was also one of three players to total double-digits assists with 14. In the Gold Medal game, Johnson recorded a double-double with 11 points and 10 rebounds and also led the team with three assists.

Johnson is the first player in Miami history to play for Team USA.

NINTH SEASON OVERALL FIFTH SEASON AT MIAMI DUKE '90

Katie Meier enters her fifth season as the head coach of the Hurricanes' women's basketball program in 2009-10. A well known and respected figure in women's basketball, Meier has worked tirelessly to put her mark on Miami's program and to build a winning tradition.

Hired on April 19, 2005, then UM Athletics Director Paul Dee announced the appointment of Meier in front of national and local media, fans, alumni and support staff, signifying the beginning of a new era.

Following an unprecedented career as one of the greatest athletes to ever play in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Meier quickly established herself in the coaching ranks. Upon her appointment at UM, following an impressive four-year tenure as the head coach at Charlotte where she helped bring the 49er program into national prominence, Meier made it clear that her goal is to make Miami one of the premier women's basketball programs in the country.

Creating a Winning Program

In her first season, Meier wasted little time in making the first steps towards those goals. After receiving little attention in the ACC preseason polls, the Hurricanes posted an impres-

sive overall record of 17-13. After fighting through a conference that would send nine teams to the postseason, including three to the NCAA Final Four. Miami finished with a sixth-place, 6-8 record in ACC play en route to earning a berth into the second round of the 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournament.

Throughout the season Miami posted wins over ranked teams such as Mississippi (No. 25), Boston College (No. 21) and Virginia Tech (No. 25)—and nearly knocked off then-No. 1 Duke in double-overtime. The Hurricanes also recorded wins over two eventual conference champions in Hartford (America East) and Oakland (Mid-Continent). Under her direction, standout Tamara James produced one of the greatest seasons ever seen by a UM player in 2005-06, including becoming the University's all-time leading scorer before being taken as the No. 8 overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics.

In Meier's second season in 2006-07, the Hurricanes got off to a strong start, winning seven of their first eight games—including a 79-70 win over Indiana to claim the UM Thanksgiving Tournament title. On Dec. 1, Meier picked up her 100th career victory as the Hurricanes defeated Jackson

State, 77-50. However, with only eight healthy players to call upon by the start of the ACC schedule, Miami faced challenge after challenge competing in a league that ranked among the top-three strongest women's basketball conferences nationally and produced two of the NCAA Tournament's four No. 1 seeds in 2006-07.

Regardless, Renee Taylor emerged as the ACC's leading scorer–upholding Miami's streak of producing the league's leading scorer in all three years it had been a member. The All-ACC Second Team selection set school records in singlegame scoring with 42 points at Houston and became the 19th Hurricane to score at least 1,000 points—and just the sixth to do so in her first two seasons. In addition, transfer Maurita Reid emerged as a defensive threat, tying the school record with 10 steals versus Wake Forest and finishing among the ACC's leaders and NCAA's top 10 in steals per game.

The 2007-08 season, Meier's third with the Hurricanes, saw Maurita Reid continue her rise among the ACC elite. The senior was nothing short of impressive shooting beyond the arc and picking opponent's pockets. She hit four or more three-pointers on 10 different occasions and finished the season with 110 steals, good for second in the conference and

fifth in the NCAA. The Queens, N.Y. native led the team in points (15.3 ppg) and rebounding (5.6 rpg) and was also named the ACC All-Defensive Team.

With a No. 21 incoming recruiting class, Meier and the Hurricanes saw significant improvement during the 2008-09 season. The freshman class was highlighted by McDonald's All-American Shenise Johnson - out of Henrietta, N.Y. and Riguna Williams - from nearby Pahokee, Fla.

Johnson lived up to the hype as she was the team leader on the season in points, rebounds, assists and steals. Under Meier's guidance, Johnson was named the ACC Rookie of the Week on three occasions and was named to the ACC All-Freshmen team as well as ACC Honorable Mention. The versatile guard/forward also led the U19 USA team to a gold medal finish in the 2009 World Championships in Bangkok, Thailand.

Miami saw a four-game improvement over its previous year during the 2008-09 season and with a recruiting class that features another McDonald's All-American in Morgan Stroman, as well as two players with elite international experience - Meier's Hurricanes have their sights set on the postseason in 2009-10.

In the past year, Meier and her staff have participated in the Kay Yow Golf Classic and the inaugural 4Kay Run at the Final Four in Tampa, Fla.. The women's basketball team also wore pink during select games for the WBCA's Pink Zone.

BUILDING A TRADITION AT CHARLOTTE

Meier could solely be responsible for bringing the 49er women's basketball program into national prominence. Prior to her appointment as head coach at Charlotte in 2001, the 49ers had only one previous postseason appearance—a WNIT berth in 1990.

During her four-year tenure at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to three postseason berths—one NCAA Tournament appearance (2003) and two WNIT appearances (2004, 2005)—and a combined overall record of 76-45 (.628).

In her inaugural campaign at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to a 16-13 finish to record their first winning season in eight years.

The following season, she guided the 49ers to a 21-9 finish marking the most wins (21) in over a decade at Charlotte. With a 12-2 record in Conference USA play, Meier and the 49ers also earned the school's first-ever C-USA regular-season championship and earned the school's first-ever appearance at the NCAA Tournament.

In 2003-04, Meier and the 49ers concluded the season with a 17-14 record while earning a trip to the 2004 WNIT. Along with marking the first time in school history that the 49ers had made back-to-back postseason appearances, Meier also led Charlotte to their first-ever postseason victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the first round of the WNIT.

In 2004-05, she enjoyed an overall record of 22-9 to tie for the third-most single season wins in Charlotte history and the most wins for the program in a single season since 1990-91. The 49ers also advanced to the postseason for the third-consecutive season and the WNIT for the second-straight year.

Prior to Charlotte, Meier spent seven seasons at Tulane University, serving as an associate head coach from 1999-01 and an assistant coach on the Green Wave staff from 1994-99. As a member of the Tulane coaching staff, Meier helped the Green Wave to an overall record of 164-52 (.759) in seven seasons, including the highest ranking in school history (13th by the Associated Press) in 2000 and a school-record 27 wins the same season.

During her time at Tulane, Meier and the Green Wave also saw an impressive seven-year run at the NCAA Tournament.

Meier began her collegiate coaching career at the University of North Carolina at Asheville where she served as an assistant coach during the 1993-94 season.

ESTABLISHING HER LEGACY AS A PLAYER

Meier's success as a coach is a direct reflection of her playing career as a standout at Duke University. A four-year letterwinner for the Blue Devils under head coach Debbie Leonard from 1986-90, Meier's name is scattered throughout the Duke record books.

She currently ranks among the school's all-time career leaders in scoring average (16.2 points per game), steals (232), free throws made (447) and free throws attempted (624). She is also listed among Duke's leaders in career points (1,761), field goals made (653), field goals attempted (1,283), assists (409) and rebounding average (6.1 rebounds per game).

THIS IS MIAMI WOMEN'S BASKETBALL



Meier wasted no time making her mark at Duke, earning ACC Rookie of the Year and Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America honors 1986. Meier injured her knee in 1988 during her junior season and ultimately missed the entire 1989 campaign while recovering.

Meier returned to Duke for her senior season in 1990 without missing a beat, earning Kodak/WBCA District 2 All-America and All-ACC First Team accolades while being named the Blue Devils' most valuable player.

In 2002, Meier was honored by Duke for her efforts as a player when she was named to the inaugural induction class in the Blue Devils' Hall of Honor. That same year Meier was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary Team. In 2006, she was once again honored by the conference when she was named one of 12 ACC Tournament Legends at the 2006 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament.

Meier's success on the court was only outdone by her accomplishments in the classroom. She was named to the Dean's List from 1986-88. In 1988 she also earned GTE Academic All-America Second Team honors.

After earning a bachelor's degree in English literature with cum laude honors in 1989, Meier went on to earn a Master of Arts in Teaching English from Duke in 1990.

Following her playing career at Duke, Meier moved overseas to play three seasons with BBC Mini-Flat Waregem in Belgium from 1990-93. There, she helped lead her team to three First Division regular season titles and one Belgian Cup Championship.

While in Belgium, Meier also spent time teaching classes of conversational English while coaching teams of 15- to 17-

A native of Wheaton, III., Meier graduated from Wheaton High School in 1985 and in October of 2009 was inducted into her high school hall of fame.



Darrick Gibbs is in his fifth season as an assistant coach with the University of Miami women's basketball team.

Gibbs joined the UM coaching ranks prior to the 2005-06 season, and helped lead UM to a 17-13 record and an appearance at the 2006 WNIT in his first season with the Hurricanes.

Prior to his arrival at UM, Gibbs served as an assistant coach under Katie Meier at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte for two seasons from 2003-05. While at Charlotte, Gibbs helped Meier lead the 49ers to two WNIT appearances, including Charlotte's first postseason victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the 2004 WNIT. The 49ers put together 39-23 record in those two seasons, including a 22-9 mark in 2004-05 to tie for the third-most single-season wins in Charlotte history.





Lonnette Hall enters her fourth season as an assistant coach with the University of Miami women's basketball program.

Having served as an assistant coach on the collegiate level at TCU, Arkansas State, Wisconsin-La Crosse and Cal State Northridge, Hall was promoted from her position as UM's Director of Basketball Operations to assistant coach prior to the 2006-07 season.

As the Director of Basketball Operations at UM, her responsibilities included organizing and coordinating team travel and practices, as well as the production of alumni and team newsletters. She also worked with the UM Marketing and Sports Media Relations offices to help organize various promotional activities.

Hall came to Miami following a one-year stint as the head girl's basketball coach at R.L. Paschal High School in Fort Worth, Texas, in 2004-05. In addition to the day-to-day coaching duties, Hall also managed the program's budget and marketing activities, and oversaw the team's booster club. She also organized HOOP Group, a youth basketball program in the Fort Worth area.

Prior to her stop at R.L. Paschal, Hall spent six years at TCU, serving as an assistant coach with the Lady Frogs from 1999-2003 and as the Director of Basketball Operations during the 2003-04 season.

As an assistant coach with the Lady Frogs, Hall helped guide TCU to three-consecutive NCAA Tournaments while coaching notable players such as Fort Lauderdale native and former All-American Sandora Irvin, who was later selected as the No. 3 overall pick in the 2005 WNBA Draft. Along with coaching, Hall's responsibilities included recruiting, practice and game preparation efforts, in addition to preparing the team's travel arrangements.

While at TCU, Hall also served as an assistant director for the 2004 Conference USA Women's Basketball Tournament and was a member of the TCU Athletic Department's Outreach Committee, Mission Statement Committee and Diversity Subcommittee.

Hall's coaching career began in 1998 at Hueneme High School in Oxnard, Calif., where she served as the head coach of the junior varsity girl's basketball team until 1990.

Following her stay at Hueneme, Hall went on to California State University-Northridge to serve as an assistant coach from 1992-94 before moving on to join the coaching staff at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse from 1994-96. After two seasons at UW-L, Hall spent three seasons at Arkansas State as an assistant coach from 1996-99 prior to her stint at TCU.

A native of Oxnard, Calif., Hall served in the United States Navy from 1986-88. She earned an associate's degree in art from Ventura Junior College in 1991 and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from California State University-Northridge in 1994. Hall added a master's degree in sports administration from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse in 1996.

Carolyn Kieger is in her third season on UM's staff. Kieger, who is in her second stint at Miami, is in her second season as an assistant coach under Katie Meier.

During the 2007-08 season, Kieger held the Director of Operations position at her alma mater, Marquette University. She was responsible for coordinating film exchange, directing summer camp programs and assisted with team travel.

Administration

PRESIDENT DONNA E. SHALALA

Donna E. Shalala became the fifth President of the University of Miami on June 1, 2001. President Shalala is an accomplished scholar, teacher, and administrator whose career has been marked by a variety of leadership positions reflecting her interest in young people. While attending college, she played tennis and still plays a competitive game of doubles. She also enjoys golf, skiing, and other outdoor activities. Recognizing that first-rate facilities are a key part of achieving success on the field, last year Hurricanes football embarked in an exciting new chapter with the move to Land Shark Stadium. This state-of-the-art complex offers both players and fans worldclass amenities that are unparalleled in college sports.

In 1987 President Shalala, a distinguished political scientist, became chancellor of a Big Ten university, the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She led what was then the nation's largest public research university. In 1992 Business Week magazine named her one of the top five managers in higher education, and in 2005 was named one of "America's Best Leaders" by U.S. News & World Report and the Center for Public Leadership at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government. President Shalala's success at Wisconsin was reflected in athletics as well. She hired a new football coach, recruiting Barry Alvarez from Notre Dame. Four years later, Wisconsin won the Big Ten football championship and represented its conference in the Rose Bowl for the



first time in 30 years. President Shalala served on the first Knight Commission, a committee to review college athletics, and has served on the board of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Foundation. In May 2008 she was selected as an Independent Director of the U.S. Soccer Federation.

In 1993, she was named U.S. Secretary for Health and Human Services (HHS) and served for eight years, becoming the nation's longest-serving HHS Secretary. In 2000 she led the official U.S. delegation to the Olympics in Sydney, Australia. At the end of her tenure as HHS Secretary, The Washington Post described her as "one of the most successful government managers of modern times."

In 2007, U.S. President George W. Bush called upon her healthcare expertise to co-chair the Commission on Care for Returning Wounded Warriors, to evaluate how wounded service members transition from active duty to civilian society. In June 2008, President Bush presented her with the Presidential Medal of Freedom, the nation's highest civilian award, at a ceremony in the White

House. The medal recognizes exceptional meritorious service to individuals who have contributed to national security, world peace, or cultural endeavors.

As president of the University of Miami, President Shalala presides over one of the most successful college athletic programs in the country. The Hurricanes football program has consistently ranked in the top of the polls. In 2001 the baseball team won its fourth College World Series and the football team won its fifth national championship. In 2003 the men and women's basketball teams began playing in a new, oncampus facility, the BankUnited Center. Other Hurricanes sports, from tennis to track, have also earned national recognition. This year UM celebrated the opening of the newly renovated Mark Light Stadium at Alex Rodriguez Park and a new basketball training and practice

The Black Coaches Association honored her with its Image of Excellence Award for 2007.

As to her commitment to UM athletics, President Shalala said, "College sports are a vital part of our students' experience while at the University. They also help build community and instill a great sense of pride in our athletes and their accomplishments. The young men and women who play Hurricanes sports are devoted to their game both on a personal and team level, and it shows in their inspired performances time after time. Now it's up to the fans to show their support and cheer them on to many more victories." For a sports fan like President Shalala, there is no better place to call home than the University of

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS KIRBY HOCUTT

Kirby Hocutt is in his second year as the Director of Athletics at the University of Miami. Introduced as UM's Director of Athletics on Feb. 8, 2008, Hocutt began his tenure as the university's 11th Director of Athletics on June 1, 2008.

Hocutt, 37, came to Miami after serving as the athletic director at Ohio University since 2005. Prior to that, he spent six years at the University of Oklahoma serving as associate athletic director for external operations and sports administration.

In his first year in Coral Gables, Hocutt established a master plan for major facilities improvements in addition to initiating the development of a strategic plan for the University of Miami athletic department. He oversaw a number of facility improvements in his initial year, including the construction of a basketball practice facility, as well as upgrades to Alex Rodriguez Park at Mark Light Field, the Neil Schiff Tennis Center and Cobb Stadium. For the first time in nine years, a new Ring of Honor class was inducted under Hocutt's direction, as Edgerrin James, Jim Kelly, Cortez Kennedy, Jim Otto and Gino Torretta were added to the prestigious class of UM football greats.

Two UM head coaches - Paige Yaroshuk-Tews (Women's Tennis) and Nicole Lantagne Welch (Volleyball) earned Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year honors in Hocutt's first year at Miami, while UM student-athletes earned 15 All-America honors during the 2008-09 season. The women's tennis team also became the first women's program



at UM to win an ACC title, claiming the regular season championship after going 25-4 overall and 10-1 in league play.

A former star linebacker at Kansas State, Hocutt has a total of 18 years experience in intercollegiate athletics, including five as a student-athlete.

At Ohio, Hocutt significantly reorganized the athletic department's annual giving program. His leadership led to an increase in fundraising by more than 75 percent - including the securing of the second-largest major gift in school athletics history. He also increased season ticket sales in football by 112 percent and in men's basketball by 50 percent.

In his three years at Ohio, the school won 11 team championships and four head coaches were recognized as conference Coaches of the Year. In 2006, the football team played in its first bowl game in 38 years.

At Oklahoma, Hocutt was the primary administrator for football and the sport supervisor for baseball, men's and women's golf, and men's and women's tennis. His duties included supervision of the athletics development office, athletics ticket office, special events, stadium

suite program, athletics endowment program, letter winners association and the department's facility use and rental pro-


Hocutt led Oklahoma's athletics fundraising to an all-time high in annual giving and capital campaigns. From 1998 to 2005, Oklahoma's annual giving increased from \$3.4 million to more than \$17 million. That 400 percent increase in annual giving was one of the highest percentage increases in intercollegiate athletics history.

Beginning in 1999, Hocutt served in a leadership position in the strategic planning for a \$100 million capital campaign. The \$120 million campaign was unique in that it focused on facility construction or improvements for each of Oklahoma's 20 sports.

Prior to joining the Oklahoma staff, Hocutt served as the assistant director of licensing at the NCAA. In that position, he worked with corporate partners and licensees to create new revenue producing initiatives to support and promote all 81 NCAA championships.

He began his career in sports administration as the assistant director of marketing and promotions at Kansas State University. While at Kansas State, he implemented revenue-producing activities for the athletics department, including corporate partner sponsorships and ticket sales.

Hocutt was a four-year letterman at linebacker at KSU, leading the Big 8 Conference in tackles and earning All-Big 8 Conference team honors as a junior. In 1993, The Sporting News selected him as one of the top 20 underrated players in the nation. Hocutt also served as a team captain his senior season. Two of Hocutt's coaches at Kansas State were



Bob Stoops, head football coach at Oklahoma and Jim Leavitt, the head football coach at USF.

A member of the Orange Bowl Committee, Hocutt was also named to the Miami-Dade Sports Commission Board of Directors on Oct. 1, 2008.

He earned his bachelor's degree from Kansas State University in 1995 and his master's of education degree from the University of Oklahoma in 2001. He and his wife Diane have two sons, 7-year-old Drew and 5-year-old Brooks.

THE RETENTION PROGRAMS

The University of Miami offers unique programs designed to assist student-athletes in their pursuit of a college education. These are a few of the programs offered to assist student-athletes:

- UMX Freshman Experience Course A unique class designed to assist freshman student-athletes with the transition from high school to college.
- 2. Proactive Mentorship Program This program is designed to assist student-athletes with the transition skills necessary to be successful college students. All freshmen are required to participate and meet once a week with a mentor covering issues such as time management, goal-setting, class preparation, test preparation, etc.
- 3. Study Table Program Provides valuable locations and time to accomplish academic goals.

 Structured times, group and individual tutorials, computer labs, and quiet areas are designated for this program.
- 4. F.A.S.T. Program (Freshman Academic Success Training) The main purpose of this program is to ensure a smooth and successful transition from high school to college through academic success training. This will be accomplished through closely monitoring incoming at-risk student-athletes so as to ensure the use of efficient time management and study skills. Assumptions are made that all of our student-athletes come to us with good study habits, academic knowledge, and social judgment. This program will address all these areas and be reinforced throughout the semester.
- Computer Lab Located within the Hecht Athletic Center, student-athletes have access to 30 personal computers with Internet access and conduct research. The lab also has 20 laptop computers that student-athletes can check out and take with them on team trips, or when they want to work on their own
- 6. Tutors Level 1 certified tutors by the College Reading and Learning Association provide individual and group assistance upon request. The tutor program at the University of Miami is one of a small number of athletic programs in the country to be awarded CRLA certification.
- Learning Resource Room Student-athletes with disabilities have access to computer programs that aid in their educational skill development.

Head Athletic Trainer Scott McGonagle and veteran athletic trainers Kevin Blaske, Megan Rogers, Alana Eichman, Ron LeClair, Scott Brooks, Lisa Sahagun, and Wes Brown work hand-in-hand with a full staff of internists, surgeons, dentists, optometrists and counselors to monitor and provide the best in health care to each student-athlete on a year-round basis.

Nationally respected and renowned in the Miami-Dade medical community, UM's certified athletic trainers serve as the gatekeepers for the health care of Miami's student-athletes. They perform injury rehabilitation, evaluate injuries, perform therapy, use ultrasound and manage and care for wounds.

The University of Miami athletic training room is equipped with the latest in diagnostic and rehabilitative equipment. Computerized testing and a wide range of aerobic conditioning equipment are also available to help design individual rehabilitation programs and help reduce the risk of re-injury. The athletic training room also utilizes Biodex machines to further aid athletes in their rehabilitation.

The University has teamed up with the country's finest physicians to assist in the care of UM athletes. The entire medical staff is on 24-hour call should the need arise for urgent treatment.

Miami also offers a comprehensive program intended to aid and educate studentathletes concerning the problems and dangers associated with the usage of drugs and substance abuse. The program consists of drug education, testing, counseling and rehabilitation.

The University of Miami has also created a major field of study for athletic training. All student trainers at UM are required to participate in the major under the guidance of program director Scott McGonagle. Current UM athletic trainers have a wealth of knowledge in the field and have a combined 40 years of experience between them.

The Hurricane training room is easily accessible to all student-athletes and is centrally located in the Hecht Athletic Center.



Strength & Conditioning

The strength & conditioning program for the University of Miami's women's basketball team is under the guidance of assistant strength & conditioning coach Andrew Klich. Klich, who is in his fifth year with the Hurricanes, also oversees the women's track & field and swimming & diving programs for Miami.

He came to UM after serving a year as a graduate assistant strength & conditioning coach at the North Carolina, where he worked with the Tar Heel women's basketball and football teams.

In 2002, he served a year as the assistant nutrition coordinator of the University of Connecticut, and prior to that worked as the performance coach at ASK Fitness from 1996-2002. While working towards his degree in human performance from UConn, Klich worked as a student athletic trainer from 1994-96.

A member of the National Strength & Conditioning Association, Klich is also a certified United States Olympic Weightlifting Coach.

The Hurricane strength & conditioning program operates under the guidance of head strength & conditioning coach Andreu Swasey. Known for his enthusiastic approach to weight training and for developing year-round sport-specific programs for each student-athlete, Swasey along with assistant strength coaches Mac Calloway, Cols Colas, Jimmy Goins, Victor Ishmael and Andrew Klich, assures that Hurricane student-athletes are given the personalized instruction and tools to reach their full physical potential.

The goal of Miami's strength & conditioning program is to minimize injury risk and enhance all physical parameters, including strength, speed, power, flexibility and cardiovascular endurance.

To help achieve this goal, the University added a \$4.9 million weight room. The 12,000-square foot state-of-the-art facility houses 20 custom-designed weight lifting stations, 17 cardiovascular machines, a stretching station, a dumbbell and rehab station and over 44,000 pounds of weights.

Each year when freshmen athletes report, baseline data is collected and a weight-training program is designed. Under the guidance of the strength staff, each student-athlete's progress is closely monitored and documented.

UM athletes also have the use of the track at Cobb Stadium. Known as one of the nation's top training tracks, it allows Hurricane student-athletes the opportunity to work on all facets of speed training.














Compliance

Dear Prospective Student-Athlete:

As a prospective student-athlete, you may have the athletic potential to play college basketball at the Division I level. If so, you probably will be exposed to an enormous amount of recruitment activities from universities throughout the country.

During the recruitment process, coaches will reference various NCAA rules and regulations. The rules are designed for to ease the pressures on prospective student-athletes and to level the playing field so that all universities operate within the same guidelines.

During the recruiting process you may have the following questions:

- When and how often can I visit an institution's campus?
- When, where and how often can a coach telephone me?
- How many times can a coach observe me in practice and/or competition?
- What academic criteria must I meet to be eligible to play Division I college basketball?

The answers to these questions and more can be obtained from the University of Miami Compliance Office or the NCAA by requesting the NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete. The guide may be provided to a prospective student-athlete at any time. The guide addresses issues related to Divisions I, II and III academic eligibility, financial aid, recruitment and more.

To receive a copy of the guide call the NCAA Hotline at 1-800-638-3731 or request it from the University of Miami coach who is recruiting you.

Please remember that since violations of NCAA rules during your recruitment could jeopardize your athletic eligibility, it is important for you and your parents to be informed and to ask questions throughout the recruiting process.

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards:
- Game programs, which may not include posters, and one Student-Athlete Handbook:
- NCAA educational information;
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university;
- One athletic publication (e.g., media guide or recruiting brochure);
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videos produced by the institution and available to all students;
- Schedule and business cards;
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year; and
- Camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.

Who is a Prospective Student-Athlete (Prospect)?

You are a prospect if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you may become a prospect if a university provides you (or your family or friends) any financial aid or other benefit that is not usually provided to prospective student-athletes.

You are no longer a prospect if you have done any of the following:

(1) Officially register and enroll in a minimum full-time program of studies and have attended classes in any four-year collegiate institution's regular academic year (excluding summer); or (2) Participated in a regular squad practice or competition at a four-year collegiate institution that occurs before the

beginning of any term; or (3) Officially register and enrolled and attend classes during the summer prior to initial enrollment and receive institutional athletics aid.

How do I know if I'm being recruited?

A coach is recruiting you if they try to convince you directly, or through your family, to attend their school and participate in intercollegiate athletics. There are several ways to be recruited: (1) a coach may provide you with an official paid visit to view the campus, (2) a coach may arrange an in-person, off-campus meeting with you (or your family), or (3) a coach or staff member may call you (or your family) on more than one occasion for the purpose of recruitment.

Coaches and authorized institutional staff members are the only individuals who may recruit you. Representatives of athletic interests (boosters) may not call, write or make inperson contact with you anywhere for the purpose of recruiting you to a university and participating in athletics.

When can a coach contact me? Off Campus Contact

In the sport of basketball, a coach can arrange a face-to-face meeting with you, off the University's campus, beginning the first day of classes of your senior year.

In all other sports, a coach can arrange a face-to-face meeting with you, off the University's campus, beginning July 1 after your junior year.

Telephone Calls

In all sports other than football and basketball, a coach may call a prospect one time per week after July 1 following the completion of the prospect's junior year in high school.

In the sport of football, a coach may initiate one telephone call to a prospect between April 15th and May 31st of the prospect's junior year. Additional calls are not permitted

prior to September 1st of the beginning of the prospect's senior year in high school.

In the sport of men's basketball, coaches may make one telephone call per month from June 15 of the prospect's sophomore year through July 31 of the junior year. Beginning August 1 of the senior year a coach may make two telephone calls per week. Only one call per week may be made to a two-year or four-year college prospect.

In the sport of women's basketball, coaches may make one telephone call per month during the months of April (on or after the Thursday after the conclusion of the NCAA Division I Final Four) and May of the prospect's junior year in high school, one telephone call between June 1 and June 20 and one telephone call between June 21 and June 30 of the prospect's junior year in high school. Three telephone calls to a prospect are permitted during the month of July, with no more than one call per week.

In the following circumstances unlimited calls to a prospect are permitted: (1) during the five days immediately preceding an official visit to the University of Miami, (2) on the initial date for signing the National Letter of Intent and the two days following the signing date, and (3) on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with a prospect

For all sports, coaches may receive telephone calls placed by a prospect at the prospect's expense at anytime, including before July 1 following the prospect's junior year in high school.

Letters

In sports other than men's basketball, letters and recruiting information may be sent to you starting September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. In men's basketball, recruiting materials may be provided starting June 15 at the conclusion of the prospect's sophomore year.

What is a Contact?

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parent(s) or legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting.

What can a school offer me to attend their University?

You (or your family) may not receive any benefit, inducement or arrangements such as cash, clothing, cars, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or to attend a NCAA school.

A University may offer you a one-year scholarship that covers room and board, tuition and fees, and required course-related books, or any part of these. The institution can recommend that this aid is renewed each year, as is the general practice at the University of Miami but this renewal is not guaranteed. In addition, they can offer you quality academic and medical support, as well as the opportunity to compete for one of the nation's top programs.

What can I do during this process?

Enjoy your high school years and work hard both in the classroom and in your sport. At the beginning of your junior year you should sign up for the NCAA Clearinghouse. Your high school guidance office can provide you with the information to register.







The Hurricanes

It began in controversy. Some reports say the players on the 1927 football team held a team meeting to select Hurricanes, hoping they would sweep away opponents just as the devastating storm did on September 16, 1926. Another version holds that Jack Bell, a columnist for the old Miami News, asked end Porter Norris of the 1926 team what the team should be called. Told that the local dignitaries and University officials wanted to name the team for a local flora or fauna, Norris said the players wouldn't stand for it and suggested "Hurricanes" since the opening game had been postponed by such a storm.

Orange, Green and White

UM's school colors were selected in 1926. The colors of the Florida orange tree represent UM. Orange symbolizes the fruit of the tree, green represents the leaves and white, the blossoms.

The U

In 1973, UM's Athletic Federation, the fund-raising arm of the athletic department at the time, commissioned a local public relations expert to develop a distinctive logo. The University had gone several years with a variety of helmet and uniform changes and the Federation noted that a number of major colleges have the initials UM. Miami designer Bill Bodenhamer suggested the "U" idea, which lent itself to distinctive logos for each sport as well as slogans like "U gotta believe" and "U is great."

Sebastian the Ibis

Folklore maintains that the Ibis, a symbol of knowledge found in the Everglades and Egypt, is the last sign of wildlife to take shelter before a hurricane and the first to reappear after the storm. The local marsh bird was consid-

ered UM's first unofficial mascot when the school vearbook adopted the name "Ibis" in 1926. Its popularity grew among the students during the 1950s. In 1957, San Sebastian Hall, a residence hall on campus, sponsored an Ibis entry in the homecoming celebration. The next year, student John Stormont performed at games in an Ibis costume that was glued, sewn and pinned together and was the forerunner of today's bird. The Ibis has become one of the most recognizable college mascots in the United States.

The "Smoke"

The traditional Hurricane "smoke" entrance in the Orange Bowl began in the 1950s. In an attempt to increase fan interest, UM transportation director Bob Nalette came up with the idea of using fire extinguishers to produce the now-famous smoke that the Hurricanes run through as they enter the field. In his spare time almost 50 years ago. Nalette welded a pipe together that even today billows smoke from the top of the Hurricanes' entrance tunnel. The original setup included flashing lights, two large hurricane flags and a tape of a hurricane being blasted over the loud speaker. The flags and lights are now gone but the smoke and sound track still remain.

Cheerleaders

The University of Miami cheerleaders are the catalyst for school spirit. Along with cheering at both home and away athletic contests, the squads are a strong public relations arm for the University. The University of Miami has two squads: Co-Ed and All Girl. Under the direction of coaches Monica and

Joe Sanchez, both former Miami cheerleaders, the co-ed cheer squad is consistently rated among the nation's top squads. The All-Girl Squad is under the direction of former Miami cheerleader Beverly Hew.

Now in their 23rd year of entertaining fans, the University of Miami Sunsations dance team is a squad of enthusiastic and talented performers. Their reputation for excellence has grown both locally and nationally. The Sunsations, coached by former member Kristine Stephenson, perform at many charitable and community service events in addition to Hurricane football and basketball games.

Band of the Hour

The University of Miami Band of the Hour has been in existence since 1933. The Band of the Hour is the largest and most spirited student organization on the UM campus and draws its membership from the entire student body, representing every state and most majors. Along with activities related to Hurricane football, the Band of the Hour has performed in national television variety shows, three major motion pictures, a national television commercial and the St. Patrick's Day Parade in Dublin, Ireland. The 2009-2010 Band of the Hour is led on the field by student drum majors Stephanie Gust, Jeffrey Lawson, and Brad Newman. The Director of the Band of the Hour is Thomas Keck.



However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 56th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 109 national championships, including 60 in women's competition and 53 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 160 times in men's competition and 91 times in women's action.

If success is best measured in terms of wins and losses, then the ACC is unrivaled in NCAA annals. With North Carolina's victory over Illinois in the 2005 NCAA title game, ACC teams have captured 10 NCAA basketball championships, including six over the last 18 years.

No conference has posted a better NCAA Tournament record than the ACC since the NCAA's inaugural tournament in 1939. With an impressive 85-43 mark over the past 10 years, ACC teams have posted an NCAA Tournament-best mark of 329-164 for a sterling .667 winning percentage against the nation's toughest competition.

In the 24 years of the current 64-team field, the ACC has produced 22 Final Four teams, an average of almost one per year and five more than any other conference.

Since the 1985 NCAA Tournament when the field was expanded to 64 teams, ACC teams have been even more impressive compiling a 233-115 (.670) NCAA record, including 63"Sweet 16" appearances and 22 Final Four berths — all NCAA Tournament bests. Since 1985, 63 of the 120 ACC teams receiving NCAA berths have won at least two NCAA Tournament games.

Following their title run in 2005, North Carolina's Tar Heels lead all ACC schools with four NCAA basketball championships to their credit. Duke has claimed three national titles, NC State two and Maryland one. The Tar Heels have captured NCAA titles in 1957, 1982, 1993 and 2005 while the Blue Devils won their third title in 2001, following back-to-back championships in 1991 and 1992. The Wolfpack walked away with the coveted crown in 1974 and 1983 while the Terps claimed the 2002 national title.

The ACC has 10 or more NCAA Tournament wins in four of the last eight years and 13 times overall and the league has not posted a losing record in NCAA Tournament play since 1987. The conference's 19-year non-losing streak in NCAA Tournament play is tops among all conferences.

Since 1981, the ACC has produced 37 consensus All-Americans - 17 more than any other conference and has accounted for 25 percent of the nation's consensus All-Americans (37-of-146).

Seven of the last 12 and nine of the last 16 consensus National Players of the Year have come from the ACC. Since 1975, the ACC has had 16 consensus national players of the year — 13 more than any other conference. Nine of the ACC's 16 National Players of the Year were unanimous selections.

A year ago the ACC led all conferences with 53 players on NBA rosters. In addition, over the past three years 33 ACC players have made their NBA debuts, including 15 in 2006, eight in 2007 and 10 last year.

This past June the ACC had four players selected in the annual NBA draft. The ACC has had the most, or tied for the most, first round draft picks in four of the past seven years and in 10 of the last 16. Since 1986, the ACC has had 89 first round selections (17 more than any other conference) and has had at least one first round selection in 20 consecutive NBA drafts.

In 2007, the ACC became the first conference in NCAA history to have 10 teams finish the season with 20 or more wins. In addition, 10 ACC teams took part in post-

season play, including an ACC record seven NCAA Tournament teams.

For the first time in league history, the ACC surpassed the 2.4 million mark in attendance in 2006-07. The 12 league schools totaled 2,435,441 over 213 regular season games and six ACC Tournament sessions.

For the third consecutive year, the ACC surpassed the 2.2 million mark in basketball attendance in 2008, with the 12 league teams totaling 2,355,822 over 203 regular-season games and six tournament session.

The stature of ACC basketball is no where more clearly defined than by the league's regional and national television exposure. A record-setting 285 television appearances involving ACC teams, highlight the 2007-08 basketball schedule, including 162 appearances on national television networks.

THE CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2008-09 academic year —12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest — drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when Georgia Tech was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State, and then expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Tech. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting with the 2005-06 academic year.



The University of Miami is one of the largest, most comprehensive private research universities in the southeastern United States, with a well-earned reputation for academic excellence. More than 15.000 undergraduate and graduate students from every state and 110 nations around the world call UM home during the academic semesters. The University has grown from its main location in the city of Coral Gables to the Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine campus located in Downtown Miami, the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science on Virginia Key, the John J. Koubek Center in Little Havana, the James L. Knight Center in downtown Miami, and the South and Richmond campuses in southwest Miami-Dade County. With more than 10,000 full- and part-time faculty and staff, UM is one of the largest private employers in Miami-Dade County.

Enrollment: Total enrollment for the 2008-09 academic year was 15,323 students. Of that number, 10,008 were undergraduate students, 4,901 were graduate students. During the 2007-2008 academic year, the University awarded 2,445 bachelors, 989 master's, 380 J.D.'s, 150 M.D.'s, 116 Ph.D.'s, and 57 other doctorates.

New Freshman Standings: 46% of new freshmen graduated in the top 5 percent of their high school class. Almost two-thirds graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class. Mean SAT was 1282

International Students: The University continues to attract students from South Florida, as well as from other parts of the nation and around the world. It was one of the country's first universities to have an organized international recruitment program. The University of Miami sends representatives worldwide to seek qualified students. Students come from 110 foreign countries, the 50 states, three territories and the District of Columbia.

Honors Program/Honor Societies: Approximately 940 students participate in the Honors Program. UM has 54 academic honor societies, including Phi Beta Kappa.

Research: Research and sponsored program expenditures totaled \$326 million (FY 08). According to the National Science Foundation, UM ranked 66th of all universities in expenditures of federal funds for research and development (FY 07).

Budget: The budget for 2008-09 was \$2.1 billion, with \$1.4 billion projected for the medical campus. At the end of FY 08, the endowment for the University was \$736 million.

Development: In FY 08, contributions reached \$200.5 million in total private cash, gifts, and grants, and in FY 07, UM ranked 34th among all U.S. institutions in this cate gory. In January 2006, UM increased the goal of its Momentum Campaign to \$1.25 billion and raised \$1.4 billion by the close of the campaign in December 2007 to support scholarships, chairs, interdisciplinary centers and research initiatives.

A World-Class Student Body

Enrollment at the University of Miami continues to experience tremendous growth.

The student body also has become more diverse. For fall 2008, Hispanics accounted for 28 percent and African-Americans for 10 percent, while Asian students accounted for 7 percent of all undergraduate students.

For fall 2008, women accounted for approximately 50 percent of the new freshman class, 53 percent of all undergraduates and 49 percent of the graduate and professional students.

Education outside the traditional classroom is an important part of student life at the University of Miami. The University has over 80 programs offered in more than 33 countries on a full academic year, semester, or summer basis as well as UM faculty-led programs during intersession, spring break and summer.

Campuses and Schools

Coral Gables Campus: The Coral Gables campus, with its two colleges and seven schools, is located on a 230-acre tract in suburban Coral Gables.

Medical Campus: The University of Miami Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine campus consists of 68 acres within the 153acre University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Medical Center complex. The medical center includes three University-owned hospitals that make up the University of Miami Health System (UHealth): University of Miami Hospital, Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center and Anne Bates Leach Eye Hospital, home to the top-ranked Bascom Palmer Eye Institute which was ranked the number one

eye hospital in the country for the fifth year in a row in the 2008 annual survey of "America's Best Hospitals" published in U.S. News & World Report; three other programs also ranked among the best. Our primary affiliated hospitals on the medical campus include Jackson Memorial Hospital, Holtz Children's Hospital and the Miami VA Medical Center. Miller School of Medicine faculty conduct more than 1,700 research projects in basic science and clinical care in facilities totaling more than 500,000 square feet of research space. The Biomedical Research Building and a two-story wet lab building are scheduled to be completed in 2009, adding 200,000 square feet of research space. Plans are underway to build the UM Life Science Park on 2 million square feet of space adjacent to the medical cam-

Rosenstiel Campus: The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science is located on an 18-acre waterfront campus on Virginia Key in Biscayne Bay.

South Campus: The south campus, located ten miles southwest of Coral Gables, is on a 136-acre site used for conducting research and development projects.

Richmond Campus: The Richmond campus, established in 2001, is a 76-acre site near south campus. Research facilities for the Rosenstiel School's Center for Southeastern Tropical Advanced Remote Sensing (CSTARS) and Richmond Satellite Operations Center (RSOC) are located on a portion of the new campus.

There also are disciplines such as exercise physiology and Teaching English to Speakers of Other Languages (TESOL). All teacher education courses are approved by the Florida Department of Education. Fall 2008 enrollment: 703.

THE COLLEGE OF ENGINEERING, founded in 1947, is one of the largest schools of its kind in a private institution of higher learning. The college's most distinctive features are the interdisciplinary courses of study, the result of associations with several areas of the University; these include biomedical engineering, which involves a partnership with the Miller School of Medicine, and the audio engineering program with the School of Music. Fall 2008 enrollment: 947.

THE GRADUATE SCHOOL, founded in 1959, offers graduate degrees in all major areas, with over 150 masters and doctoral programs. The list of accomplishments in post-baccalaureate education is extensive. The school has more than 1,400 full-time clinical and basic science faculty members and an additional 1,350 professionals from the community serving as voluntary faculty in various departments. Clinical and research programs include the Miami Institute for Human Genomics, the Interdisciplinary Stem Cell Institute, the Comprehensive AIDS Program, the Miami Transplant Institute, The Miami Project to Cure Paralysis, the Diabetes Research Institute and the Mailman Center for Child Development. Also located in the medical complex is the Louis Calder

Memorial Library, the largest medical resource library in South Florida. Fall 2008 enrollment: 1145.

PHILLIP AND PATRICIA FROST SCHOOL OF MUSIC, founded in 1926, is one of the largest schools of its kind in a private institution and one of the most comprehensive in all of higher learning. The school offers many bachelor's and master's degree programs and is home to the Henry Mancini Institute, offering intensive performing and learning experiences across a broad spectrum of musical genres, including film, world, jazz and pop-inflected musical styles. The school's facilities include the Maurice Gusman Concert Hall, the L. Austin Weeks Center for Recording and Performance, which contains the Victor E. Clarke Recital Hall and the Marta and Austin Weeks Music Library and Technology Center. Fall 2008 enrollment: 614.

THE SCHOOL OF NURSING AND HEALTH STUDIES, founded in 1968, houses the first collegiate nursing program in South Florida. The school has an emphasis on transcultural nursing, which recognizes an individual's unique health benefits and practices. The school is a leader in the development of innovative primary care nursing practice models, which have earned national and international recognition and research. The school's four-story, 53,000-square-foot home, the M. Christine Schwartz Center for Nursing and Health Studies, offers state-of-the art classrooms, research facilities, and the International Academy for Clinical Simulation and Research where high-fidelity patient simulation enables students to improve their clinical and crucial thinking skills prior to interaction with patients. Fall 2008 enrollment: 531.

THE ROSENSTIEL SCHOOL OF MARINE AND ATMOSPHERIC SCIENCE, founded in 1940, it is one of the world's leading institutions for oceanographic research and education today. The school offers interdisciplinary undergraduate and graduate level coursework in marine biology and fisheries, meteorology and physical oceanography, marine affairs and policy, marine and atmospheric chemistry, marine geology and geophysics, and applied marine physics. Fall 2008 enrollment: 333.

From outdoor courts to BIG EAST titles and the challenge of the ACC

Rewind 35 years and you'll find the beginnings of what would blossom into women's basketball at the University of Miami.

From its humble beginnings in 1972-73, with non-scholarship athletes playing on outdoor courts, to more than 500 wins later in 2007-08, with a roster full of recruited talent showcasing their skills in a state-of-the art facility. Hurricanes women's basketball has come a long way.

FROM THE START

In its first two seasons, the Miami women's basketball team competed on outdoor courts and rumor has it that a game was actually rained out. But the players persevered under the program's first head coach, Barry Schimer, and after finishing the inaugural season 2-6, the Hurricanes went on to winning records in each of the next two seasons and finished runner up in the 1975 Florida AIAW State Championship Tournament.

The Hurricanes moved into their first home—the William Lane Campus Sports and Recreation Center—for the 1975-76 season under the program's second head coach Shula Feuer. Just two games into the season. Miami used a 100-20 win over Homestead Air Force Base, to set a school record with the 80-point margin of victory that still stands more than 30 years later.

In 1977-78, Miami's first 1,000-point scorer emerged in Wendy Foote, who averaged a school-record 25.2 points per game as a senior. She would go on to become the first University of Miami basketball player since Rick Barry to sign a professional contract when she signed with the New Orleans Pride of the Women's Professional Basketball League.

ANOTHER STEP FORWARD

As the Hurricanes moved toward their eighth season of competition, Lin Dunn was hired from the University of Mississippi to take over the reigns of the Miami women's basketball program. In her nine seasons at the helm of a burgeoning Hurricanes program, Dunn compiled 149 wins and led the team to a school-record six consecutive winning seasons, two 20-win seasons, one Florida AIAW State Championship and two berths in the AIAW Region III Tournament.

The 1979-80 season, was pivotal in the progression of women's basketball at the university, as the team received its first scholarships (seven) and went on to finish 18-16. Miami gained three additional scholarships for the 1980-81 season and completed one of the most successful campaigns in school history, recording the first 20-win season at 24-18. The Hurricanes went on to win their first Florida AIAW State Championship and advance to the AIAW Region III Tournament.

UM received its full complement of 12 scholarships in 1981-82, and was rewarded with a 19-10 record and a second-straight berth to the AIAW Region III Championships. That season, Sylvia Wilson wrapped up her collegiate career as Miami's leader in points (1,713) and rebounds (1,115), and remains the only Hurricane to grab more than 1.000 career boards.

A NEW HOME. A NEW SCORING LEADER

With the resurrection of Miami men's basketball in 1985-86. both the men's and women's teams moved into the Knight Sports Complex. As the team continued to develop and battle top-20 teams, a player named Maria Rivera-who had set a freshman scoring record with 523 points during the previous season—began to emerge as a serious threat for Hurricane opponents.

Averaging 21.4 points per game as a sophomore, Rivera surpassed the 1,000-point scoring plateau in just her second season and would go on to become the first women's basketball player in Miami history to score more than 2,000 career points. She set a school record that would stand for 18 years with a 41-point performance versus Central Florida, while also breaking Rick Barry's school-record of 2,298 points.

Rivera would close her collegiate career as both Miami's alltime leading scorer with 2,538 points and its all-time steals leader with 382.

A DATE TO THE BIG DANCE

Ferne Labati took over the women's basketball program in 1988 and guided the Hurricanes to a 21-8 record and Miami's first NCAA bid. The Hurricanes traveled to Stillwater. Okla., where they fell to Oklahoma State, 93-69, despite 21-point efforts from eventual All-American Frances Savage and Elaine Harlow.

Labati and the Hurricanes battled to a school-record 25-6 mark in 1989-90, completing the first back-to-back 20-win campaigns in school history, and advanced to their first National Women's Invitational Tournament. That season, Savage averaged 23.6 points per game and set a single-season scoring record with 733 points—and needed just 45 games to become the quickest woman to reach 1.000 points in UM history.

After competing as independents since its inaugural season in 1972, Miami became a member of the New South Women's Athletic Conference in 1990-91, and would go on to post its thirdstraight 20-win season, finishing with a 20-10 overall record, a 9-3 mark in NSWAC play and the conference title.

DREAMING BIG

The Hurricanes became the 10th member of the BIG EAST Conference and began league play in 1991-92—their "Dream Season". Although Miami's season started and ended with a loss, the Hurricanes put together 30-straight wins in between—going undefeated (18-0) in conference play for the first time in BIG EAST history, winning the BIG EAST Tournament and advancing to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament to finish with a top-10 national ranking.

Following an 84-67 regular-season ending win over Villanova, the Hurricanes moved up to No. 7 in the national polls and Savage was named Women's Basketball Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated. The BIG EAST would go on to recognize Savage as BIG EAST Player of the Year, Labati as the league's Coach of the Year and Vicki Plowden and Savage as All-BIG EAST First Team picks. Labati was also heralded as the Kodak/WBCA National Coach of the Year.

The Hurricanes followed up that "Dream Season" with another BIG EAST title in 1992-93 with its school-record fifth-straight 20-win season, as the team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Under Labati's leadership, the Hurricanes would make three more NCAA Tournament appearances and advance to the WNIT twice.

The Hurricanes built a new home, with the opening of the oncampus Convocation Center—now the BankUnited Center—on January 15, 2003. The \$48 million facility boasts three stories, 7,000 seats and 200,000 square feet.

WHEN OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS

After a 13-year run through the BIG EAST, Miami became members of the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004.

Despite a challenging inaugural season in the ACC, Miami advanced to the second round of the ACC Tournament behind the effort of Tamara James—just the second player in NCAA history to lead two conferences in scoring. As a sophomore, James earned All-BIG EAST First Team honors after averaging a league-high 16.6 points per game, and as a junior, she ranked with fifth in the NCAA with an ACC-high 22.3 points per game, earning All-ACC recognition as well as Honorable Mention All-American honors by both the AP and WBCA/Kodak.

In 2005-06, James and the Hurricanes continued to improve under first-year head coach Katie Meier. In her debut, Meier steered the 'Canes to a 17-13 overall record and a 6-8 league mark to place sixth in a conference that would send nine teams to the postseason—including three to the NCAA Final Four. With regular-season wins over several nationally-ranked opponents—and a nearly knocking off then-No. 1 Duke in double overtime—Miami advanced to the postseason for the 12th time in school history, making it as far as the Second Round of the WNIT.

James, who repeated as the ACC's scoring leader as a senior, wrapped up her UM career as the program's all-time leading scorer with 2,406 points and was selected by the Washington Mystics with the eighth overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft.

In 2006-07, a new leader emerged in the diminutive Renee Taylor, who carried on James' tradition of leading the ACC in scoring—as the Hurricanes have produced the ACC's leading scorer in all three seasons they have been a member. Taylors' 42 points versus Houston broke Rivera's 1998 single-game scoring record, and she became the 19th member of Miami's 1,000-points club in her final regular-season game versus NC State, and was the sixth Hurricane to accomplish the feat in her first two years with the squad. She finished her two-year career at Miami with 1,025 points.

The 2007-08 campaign saw Taylor's junior college teammate, Maurita Reid take over as the team's go-to offensive threat. In her senior season, Reid helped continue an impressive streak, as the Hurricanes made it 225 straight games with a three-point field goal. Reid accounted for 43 percent of the three pointers Miami scored on the season, sinking 76 shots from beyond the arc.

Meier and her staff brought in a Top 25 recruiting class for the 2008-09 season, highlighted by McDonald's All-American Shenise Johnson. The Henrietta, N.Y. native played beyond expectations in her freshman campaign, leading the Hurricanes to a 13-17 overall record - a four win improvement from 2007-08. Johnson led her team in virtually every major statistical category on her way to being named to the ACC All-Freshman Team as well as earning All-ACC Honorable Mention. After grabbing three ACC Rookie of the Week awards, Johnson will look to lead the Hurricanes and another top-notch recruiting class into the postseason in 2009-10.

COACHING RECORDS

With the appointment of Katie Meier in 2005, the University of Miami announced just its seventh head women's basketball coach in the program's 34-year history. Meier joined an impressive UM coaching family that includes former legendary coaches Lin Dunn and Ferne Labati.

Labati is UM's all-time leader in career victories, posting an overall record of 303-195 (.608) during her 17-year career from 1988-05. Labati was named the Kodak/WBCA National Coach of the Year following the 1991-92 season in which she guided the Hurricanes to a school-record 30 wins with just two loses and a birth into the "Sweet 16" of the 1992 NCAA Tournament.

1988 KODAK/WBCA HONORABLE **MENTION ALL-AMERICAN**

UM'S ALL-TIME LEADING SCORER

As one of the most electric scorers ever to step on the court and play at the University of Miami, Maria Rivera left her mark at UM as a four-year standout with the Hurricanes. During her playing career from 1984-88, Rivera reached a level never before achieved at Miami and left UM as the school record holder in several categories, including career points with 2,358.

Rivera came to Miami by way of Canovana, Puerto Rico, where, at just the age of 14, she was named the 1978 Player of the Year by the Puerto Rican Olympic Committee before going on to star on the Puerto Rican 1979 and 1983 Pan American Teams.

From day one she showed an unprecedented desire to achieve at UM. Speaking only Spanish, Rivera borrowed \$2,000 dollars from a bank to enroll in an intense fast-paced English program to pass an English equivalency exam required to enroll at Miami, and just three months later she was on campus and playing for the Hurricanes

Rivera averaged 18.7 points—the seventh highest single-season average in school history-and 5.3 assists, leading the Hurricanes in scoring in 13-of-28 games in 1984-85, her first season at UM. That season she showed what lay ahead on several occasion, including a school-record setting performance against Lamar where she hit 10-of-11 shots from the field and a 33point outing against Florida. Following the conclusion of the regular season, she was named to the Women's Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America Team.

The following season she stepped up her game, averaging 21.4 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.3 assists per game. Her 21.4 points per game was the second-highest single-season average in UM history and her 579 points was the third-highest ever at Miami.

Rivera's junior season was highlighted by yet another impressive scoring output, averaging 20.9 points, which ranked third all-time at UM just behind her previous season's mark. That season was full of memorable achievements, including a then-career high 38-point game in UM's opener against Monmouth, but none were more exciting than when she surpassed former Hurricane Sylvia Wilson to become Miami's all-time leading scorer.

Rivera also put together a memorable senior campaign. Needing 29 points to break former men's basketball legend Rick Barry's UM basketball record of 2,298 points. Rivera scored 30 points in the first half of a February 25th contest with Central Florida en route to a then- school-record 41 points to become the University of Miami's all-time leading scorer in both men's and women's basketball

Upon finishing her career with the Hurricanes, Rivera left as the school record-holder in 16 separate categories—including points (2,358), scoring average (21.1 ppg), steals (382) and field goals made (891) and attempted (1,931) to firmly ensure her place as one of the greatest basketball players to ever play at the University of Miami.

Frances Savage is arguably one of the best players to ever don a uniform at the University of Miami. During her four-year career from 1988-91 Savage etched her name throughout the UM record books. She left as the school's second all-time leading scorer with 2,184 points and first all-time with a career 23.2 scoring averagedespite missing all but two games of her senior season.

The 12th child of a household of 13 children, the Fort Lauderdale, Florida native averaged over 30 points per game during her senior season at Sunrise Piper High School and was named the Miami Herald's Broward Player of the Year in 1985 and 1987.

After drawing All-America honors as a high school standout, Savage chose to attend the University of Miami, but was forced to sit out her freshman season in 1987 while fulfilling academic requirements.

Once her opportunity arose in 1988, Savage burst onto the scene at UM, scoring 32 points in her collegiate debut versus Southwest Missouri State-the most points scored by a Miami player in their opening game. She would go on to start and score double figures in all 29 games of the 1988 season, averaging 22.4 points and 9.2 rebounds per game.

As a preseason All-America candidate, Savage's junior season picked up where the 1988 season left off. scoring double figures in all 31 games that season while leading the team in points per game (23.6), rebounds per game (9.5), steals (71), free throw percentage (.786) and field goal percentage (.540).

In 1990, Savage opened her senior season with back-to-back 30-point outings, but was lost for the year with a torn ACL suffered in just the second game of the

Granted a fifth year of eligibility, in 1991, Savage returned to score 31 points in her first start against instate rival, Florida. She tied the then-school record with 41 points in UM's win over Providence during the course of the Hurricanes' 30-game win streak.

Averaging 23.3 points and 10.6 rebounds per game, Savage helped lead the Hurricanes to the BIG EAST Championship title in only their first season in the conference and was named both the BIG EAST and Sports Illustrated Player of the Year, in addition to garnering Kodak All-America honors.

Savage left UM as one of the most decorated athletes in school history, holding nine Hurricane records as well as finishing as the school's second all-time leading scorer, and has since been inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame and the University of Miami's "Iron Arrow" Society—the highest honor bestowed on an individual by the university.

Postseason Results

The Hurricanes have made a total of 10 postseason appearances in school history, earning six NCAA Tournament and four WNIT berths in the program's 35year history. Miami has an overall record of 5-11 (.313) in postseason tournaments, posting a 2-6 (.250) mark in the NCAA Tournament and a 3-5 (.375) record in the WNIT.

UM's longest run at the NCAA Tournament came during the 1991-92 season when after drawing No. 2 seed in the East Regional behind a 29-1 record and a BIG EAST Championship Title, the Hurricanes advanced to the "Sweet 16" before falling to Vanderbilt, 77-67, in Charlottesville, Va.

UM's last NCAA Tournament appearance came following the 2003-04 regular season and the last WNIT berth came in 2005-06.
