**UM, CLEMSON TO MEET IN SUPER BOWL DAY CLASH**

The University of Miami women's basketball team will face Clemson in a Super Bowl appetizer at the BankUnited Center on Sunday. Tip-off is set for 2 p.m. and the game will be televised on CSS.

The Canes will be looking to even the all-time series against the Tigers, who hold a slight 5-4 advantage. A win would also extend Miami's home win-streak to 37 games.

**SHENISE DAZZLES IN SCORING 2,000 POINTS**

Miami's versatile senior guard Shenise Johnson became the fourth player in program history to reach the 2,000-point plateau. Needing 15 points to reach the milestone heading into UM's Jan. 15 contest at Florida State, Johnson started the game on fire, hitting seven of her first 10 shots. Her final bucket of the half, a layup coming off of a Seminole turnover, proved to be her 15th point of the game. Johnson would finish the contest with a game-best 24 points, leading the Canes to victory - the first win in nearly 25 years at Florida State.

Johnson currently has 2,079 points and needs just 105 to pass Frances Savage (1988-92) for third place on the school all-time scoring list.

**RIQUANA ISN'T TOO FAR BEHIND**

The Canes are gifted with two offensively gifted guards. Riquna Williams is just six points shy of the 2,000-point milestone herself. If she is to reach the mark, Miami would be the only team in the nation with two 2,000-point scorers.

**MIAMI DUO HONORED ON WOODEN LIST**

Miami Hurricanes Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams have been named to the Women's Midseason Nominee List for the 2011 John R. Wooden Award, as announced by the Los Angeles Athletic Club. The Wooden Award is considered the most prestigious individual honor in college basketball. The Midseason List names the Top 20 candidates for the award.

**PROTECTING THE BANKUNITED CENTER**

With Miami's season-opening win over Texas-Pan American, the Canes won their 25th-consecutive home contest - setting a new program record.

Miami has extended that record to 36 games after its 64-39 victory over Virginia Tech on Jan. 26. The streak is currently the third-longest active streak in the nation. Connecticut (96) and Stanford (73) are the two teams with longer active win streaks. Coincidentally, Stanford's Tara VanDerveer, Connecticut's Geno Auriemma and Miami's Katie Meier shared last season's AP National Coach of the Year Award.

The streak began with the team's final regular season home game of the 2009-10 season and continued with a perfect 20-0 home record last season.

The previous record of 24 straight wins at home was set from the 1990-91 through the 1992-93 seasons.

**ON THE VERGE OF GREATNESS**

With just 67 more rebounds, senior Shenise Johnson will become just the third player in NCAA Division I women's basketball history to score 2,000 points, pull down 1,000 rebounds and dish out 500 assists in a career.

After a nationwide survey, it was found that Stanford's Nicole Powell (2000-04) and Old Dominion's Nancy Lieberman (1976-1980) are the only other women to accomplish the feat.

**UM GREAT TAMARA JAMES NAMED AN ACC LEGEND**

The Atlantic Coast Conference announced its eighth annual class of ACC Women's Basketball Legends and Miami great Tamara James will be among the honorees. The Legends Class of 2012 will be honored at the 2012 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, which will be held March 1-4 at the Greensboro Coliseum.

The all-time leading scorer in women's basketball for the Miami Hurricanes, Tamara James set a scoring record for men and women in her four-year career at Miami with 2,406 points. James was named first-team All-ACC in 2005 and 2006 and first-team All-Big East in 2004. She led the ACC in scoring both of years in the conference, averaging 22.3 in 2005 and 21.5 in 2006.

**A PROGRAM FIRST**

For the first time in the history of the program, the Hurricanes defeated a Top 5 team. Maryland visited the BankUnited Center on Jan. 12 with a perfect 16-0 record and a No. 5 national ranking.

Miami, behind 34 points from Riquna Williams, defeated the Terrapins 75-63. At the time, Maryland was the highest scoring team in the nation and were also ranked No. 1 nationally in rebound differential. The Canes held the Terps to 21 points below their season average and outrebounded them 48-40.

**A PAIR OF CAREER GAMES**

In Miami's own Holiday Tournament championship game, juniors Morgan Stroman and Stefanie Yderstrom reached career highs in scoring 23 and 20 points respectively. For their efforts, each was named to the Miami Holiday All-Tournament Team.

For the first time since Jan. 29, 1987, the Hurricanes defeated Florida State in Tallahassee. Miami had lost its last nine meetings in the state capital prior to its Jan. 15 win. Miami raced to a 19-point lead early in the second half. However, the Seminoles rallied late to tie the game at 57. Stefanie Yderstrom nailed a corner three with 17 seconds left that proved to be the game-winner.

#### ARE YOU SERIOUS?!

Miami senior Shenise Johnson is having a remarkable start to the 2011-12 season. The Preseason AP All-American and ACC Player of the Year leads the conference in several categories and ranks among the best in others. Johnson is the only player in the conference to rank among the Top 10 in scoring, rebounding and assists. In fact, in all the BCS automatically qualifying conferences, only Colorado's Chucky Jeffery shares that distinction with Johnson (Pac 12).

#### SHOWTIME

Miami senior guard Riquna Williams has saved her best performances for the biggest games. Against No. 11 Rutgers, the 5-6 Pahokee, Fla. native poured in a career-high 36 points in the double-overtime victory. Then, against an undefeated and fifth-ranked Maryland team, Williams matched a career-best with eight three-pointers, leading her team to a 75-63 win.

#### APPLYING THE HEAT

At 14.0 steals per game, the Hurricanes rank No. 3 in the nation. Shenise Johnson, with 3.8 thefts per contest, is No. 1 in the conference and ranks third nationally. Riquna Williams isn't too far off, having a hand in on 2.1 steals per game. In all, Miami forces 24.2 turnovers per game and scores 26.6 points per game off of them, 12.9 points per game more than its opponents.

#### MORE HARDWARE FOR THE TROPHY CASE

With back-to-back double-doubles in the Miami Holiday Tournament, Shenise Johnson led the Hurricanes to wins over Holy Cross and VCU. For her performance in the two-day event, the senior guard was named the Tournament's Most Outstanding Player. Earlier in the season, Johnson was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Great Alaska Shootout.

#### SWEDISH THREE-BALLS

Junior Stefanie Yderstrom leads the ACC with 50 three-pointers this season. The Ostertalje, Sweden native now has 150 career three-point field goals - tied for third in program history. However, Riquna Williams is far and away the school's most prolific three-point shooter, sinking 249 for her career - 97 more than Desma Thomas' (1992-97) second-place total of 152.

### DOUBLE-FIGURE STREAK SNAPPED

Shenise Johnson was held to six points against Maryland on Jan. 12, ending her nation-long streak of 87 straight games of scoring in double-figures. In the two games after the streak was snapped, Johnson led the Canes with 24 and 20 points respectively in wins at Florida State and Virginia.

### "EPIC" PERFORMANCE

After rolling her ankle in Miami's win at Michigan State on Dec. 1, it wasn't a guarantee that Riquana Williams would play against No. 11 Rutgers on Dec. 5. Not only did Williams play, she scored a career-best 36 points. Williams only had five points at halftime, but poured in 31 in the second half and two overtime sessions in helping the Canes erase a 16-point second-half deficit and defeat the Scarlet Knights, 92-81.

### MORE THAN ANY OTHER

After wins over Rutgers (12/5) - 36 points - and Ole Miss (12/10) - 17 points - Riquana Williams was voted the ACC Player of the Week for the seventh time in her career. No other active player has earned the award more than Williams. Second place on that list with six awards is Shenise Johnson.

### THE BIG TEN/ACC CHALLENGE

The women's 2011 Big Ten/ACC Challenge ended in a 6-6 draw in its fifth year. The ACC won each of the previous four challenges.

Miami earned its first victory in the challenge in three attempts with its 76-60 victory at Michigan State. The Canes fell to Michigan in 2007 and then Indiana in 2008.

### BIG-TIME TEAM ON THE SMALL SCREEN

The Nov. 17 meeting with Tennessee was the first of 12 games that will be televised this season - a program record. Miami's next televised contest will be at home against Clemson on Feb 5. CSS will provide coverage beginning at 2 p.m.

### BLOCK PARTY

In Miami's 64-39 win over Wake Forest on Jan. 26. Guards Shenise Johnson and Stefanie Yderstrom set career-highs with four and three blocks respectively. Yderstrom came into the game with zero blocks on the season.

### ON THE DOUBLE

Shenise Johnson has recorded six double-doubles for the Hurricanes this season. Her sixth came in the Canes' 64-39 victory against Wake Forest, as she finished the game with 10 points and 12 rebounds. The senior now has 33 career double-doubles - the most among any current ACC player.

## HIGH PRAISE FOR THE CANES

After Miami defeated Michigan State in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge, Spartan head coach Suzy Merchant said, "I'm not surprised. We knew what they were going to do. We practiced against six and seven guys on our scout team. But from 1 to 5, that's the fastest, most athletic team we've faced in my career. We've played Duke, and it's not even close."

ULM's Mona Martin had even more praise to hand out, saying, "Last year we played Texas A&M, and they end up winning the thing [NCAA title], and I think this UM team could be a big contender for the national championship if they stay healthy," Martin said. "They have so much depth, play so hard. They're going to be way up there this year. I've watched a lot of film, lot of ballgames, and they run the floor better than any team I've watched from point guard to post. Their transition offense is unbelievable. I can't say we've ever played a team that runs the floor that well, and I've been in this business 36 years. There is a lot of desire and fight in those kids."

## MORE TO COME

National Player of the Year candidate Shenise Johnson ranks in the Top 10 of many categories for UM career records including points (4th), assists (5th), rebounds (2nd), and steals (2nd). Johnson is the only player in Miami history to be ranked in the Top 10 of all four of those categories.

## JOHNSON TABBED ACC PRESEASON POY

Shenise Johnson returns as the 2011-12 ACC Preseason Player of the Year. The senior was named the 2010-11 ACC Player of the Year, the first Hurricane player to win the award, and voted to last year's All-ACC First Team and All-ACC Defensive team.

## CANES OPEN SEASON RANKED SEVENTH

The Hurricanes, who finished the 2010-2011 season ranked tenth in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll, moved up three spots in anticipation of their 2011-12 season. The No. 7 ranking in the Coaches' Poll is the highest rank in program history to begin a season.

The Hurricanes were also ranked No. 7 in the pre-season Associated Press Poll.

Miami is currently ranked 10th in the AP Poll and 8th in the Coaches Poll.

## MIAMI DUO NAMED PRESEASON ALL-ACC

The Preseason All-ACC Team is highlighted by the Miami senior guard tandem of Johnson and Williams. The two led the Canes to a 20-0 home record last season at the BankUnited Center.

Johnson, the first Associate Press Preseason All-American in team history, earned 2010-11 ACC Player of the Year honors and her second straight selection to the All-ACC First Team. Williams, who led the conference and finished 11th in the nation in scoring, is also coming off a selection to the All-ACC First Team.

## CANE NAMED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN

University of Miami senior guard Shenise Johnson was one of five players named to the Associated Press Preseason All-America Team.

Johnson, who earned 25 of 40 potential votes, was joined on the preseason team by Baylor's Brittney Griner (40 votes), Notre Dame's Skylar Diggins (37), Stanford's Nnemkadi Ogwumike (37) and Tennessee's Shekinna Stricklen (21).

## 2010-11 Season Recap

### MIAMI FINISHES MEMORABLE SEASON

The 2010-11 University of Miami women's basketball team finished one of the best seasons in program history with an 88-83 loss to 21st-ranked and sixth seeded Oklahoma in the second round of the NCAA Tournament at John Paul Jones Arena in Charlottesville, Va.

The Hurricanes finished 28-5, recording the most wins since the 1991-92 team tallied 30 victories.

### STRONG NON-CONFERENCE RECORD

Miami took care of business in the non-conference portion of the schedule, going 15-2 outside the ACC. Their signature win was the 81-72 victory over No. 20/12 Georgetown on Dec. 7 to establish the Canes as a national contender.

### 20-20

Miami won 20 games for the 10th time in program history. Following the 22-14 record in 2009-10, it was the first time the team had consecutive 20-win seasons since the 1988-89 season through the 1991-92.

### DANCING

Miami earned a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament in the Dayton Region. It was the first time since 2004 that the program advanced to the "Big Dance."

The Canes won their first round match up 80-62 over No. 14 Gardner-Webb at John Paul Jones Arena in Charlottesville, Va. behind 18 points from junior Shenise Johnson to setup a second-round game against No. 6 Oklahoma. It was the first win in the NCAA Tournament for the Hurricanes since 1993.

### WILLIAMS ALSO HONORED

Riquna Williams also picked up a number of accolades throughout the season, including being named to the All-ACC First Team. The guard was named ACC Player of the Week on four occasions throughout the year, and was a finalist for the WBCA/State Farm All-America team.

### KATIE MEIER EARNS MAJOR AWARDS

Head coach Katie Meier picked up several high-profile postseason awards for her success on the year. Meier was tabbed by the Associated Press as its Coach of the Year, sharing the award with Connecticut's Geno Auriemma and Stanford's Tara VanDerveer.

In addition, she took home the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year Award and RUSSELL ATHLETIC/WBCA Region 2 Division I Coach of the Year honors, an award voted on by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

Meier also won the Babe Didrickson Zaharias award and gained entrance to UM's prestigious Iron Arrow Society – known as the highest honor attained at the university.

### JOHNSON RECOGNIZED FOR SEASON

Shenise Johnson had one of the best seasons of any player in the country, earning a litany of awards for her efforts. Prior to the ACC Tournament, the junior was named ACC Player of the Year, the first Hurricane player to win the award, and voted to the All-ACC First Team and All-ACC Defensive team. In addition, the league honored her with Player of the Week on Jan. 3.

Johnson also earned spots on the Associated Press Third Team All-America, Full Court Press Second Team All-America, USBWA All-America and WBCA/State Farm All-America teams. She was also a finalist for the Wooden Award given to the top player in women's basketball.

## ACC TOURNAMENT

Miami earned the No. 2 seed in the 2011 ACC Tournament at the Greensboro Coliseum in Greensboro, N.C., receiving a first-round bye. The Canes drew NC State in the quarterfinals, defeating the Wolfpack 93-85 with four players scoring at least 15 points. In the semifinals, North Carolina jumped out to a big lead and never looked back, routing Miami 83-57 to end the tournament for the Canes.

## 100 HURRICANE VICTORIES

Head coach Katie Meier won her 100th game at the helm of the Hurricanes with the team's March 20th victory over Gardner-Webb in the first round of the NCAA Tournament. The sixth-year head coach is just the third coach in the program's 40-year history to reach the milestone.

## UP AND DOWN THE COURT

Katie Meier's fast-paced offense averaged 79.9 points per game – fourth highest in the country. The Canes beat up on a number of opponents, with a +17.2 scoring margin – 12th-best in NCAA Division I out of 333 teams.

## SCORING TITLE

Riquna Williams led the ACC in scoring last season, averaging 21.7 points per game. Williams also totaled the most overall points in the league with 717 on the year. Shenise Johnson finished the season right behind her in scoring, finishing second in the conference at 19.6 points per game.

## HISTORIC WINNING STREAK

Miami won 17 straight games overall from Nov. 17-Jan. 24 – the second longest streak in program history and at one point the longest active streak in the country. The Hurricanes have only reached a winning streak of at least 10 games five times previously and it was the first such streak for the 'Canes since the 1992-93 season, in which they won 10 consecutive games. The longest winning streak in team history occurred during the 1991-92 season, when Miami won 30 straight games.

## GIMME THAT

The Canes finished second in the nation with 13.7 steals per game. Morgan Stroman averaged the fifth-most steals per game, 3.7, with Shenise Johnson ranking tenth in the country at 3.2 per contest. Stroman, Johnson and Riquna Williams (2.8/game) were the top three stealers in the ACC. Miami grabbed a season-high 21 steals on three occasions – against Clemson, Lipscomb and Kennesaw State.

Bolstered by their steals, the Hurricanes also finished fourth in the nation in turnover margin (+7.97).

## NOT CLOSE

The Hurricane didn't play too many close games in 2010-11. Here is a breakdown of certain situations from last season.

- 20-0 at home
- 24-0 when leading at the half
- 27-2 when scoring at least 60 points
- 14-0 when allowing fewer than 60 points
- 28-0 when leading with 3:00 left in the second half
- 17-0 when out-rebounding opponents



### Head Coach Katie Meier

Katie Meier enters her seventh season as the head coach of the Hurricanes' women's basketball program in 2011-12. A well known and respected figure in women's basketball, Meier has worked tirelessly to put her mark on Miami's program and to build a winning tradition. All of her hard work was rewarded after the 2010-11 season as she was named the Associated Press National Coach of the Year - sharing the award with Connecticut's Geno Auriemma and Stanford's Tara VanDerveer.

Meier led the Hurricanes into the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2004 and its win over Gardner-Webb in the first round was the first tournament win for the 'Canes since 1993. Miami entered the 2010-11 season with high internal expectations, but were picked eighth in the Preseason ACC Poll and were coming off a season in which it was the No. 12 seed in the ACC Tournament.

However, the Hurricanes exceeded all of the outside expectations and at one point, won 17 straight games. They were a perfect 20-0 inside the BankUnited Center and finished 12-2 in ACC play - earning their first regular season conference title since joining the league in 2004. As a reward, Meier was named the

ACC Coach of the Year and later would be selected as the WBCA/RUSSELL ATHLETIC Region 2 Coach of the Year, as voted on by her peers.

Hired on April 19, 2005, then UM Athletics Director Paul Dee announced the appointment of Meier in front of national and local media, fans, alumni and support staff, signifying the beginning of a new era.

Following an unprecedented career as one of the greatest athletes to ever play in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Meier quickly established herself in the coaching ranks. Upon her appointment at UM, following an impressive four-year tenure as the head coach at Charlotte where she helped bring the 49er program into national prominence, Meier made it clear that her goal is to make Miami one of the premier women's basketball programs in the country.

In her first season, Meier wasted little time in making the first steps towards those goals. After receiving little attention in the ACC preseason polls, the Hurricanes posted an impressive overall record of 17-13. After fighting through a conference that would send nine teams to the postseason, including three to the NCAA Final Four. Miami finished with a sixth-place, 6-8 record in ACC play en route to earning a berth into the second round of the 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournament.

Throughout the season Miami posted wins over ranked teams such as Mississippi (No. 25), Boston College (No. 21) and Virginia Tech (No. 25)--and nearly knocked off then-No. 1 Duke in double-overtime. The Hurricanes also recorded wins over two eventual conference champions in Hartford (America East) and Oakland (Mid-Continent). Under her direction, standout Tamara James produced one of the greatest seasons ever seen by a UM player in 2005-06, including becoming the University's all-time leading scorer before being taken as the No. 8 overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics.

In Meier's second season in 2006-07, the Hurricanes got off to a strong start, winning seven of their first eight games--including a 79-70 win over Indiana to claim the UM Thanksgiving Tournament title. On Dec. 1, Meier picked up her 100th career victory as the Hurricanes defeated Jackson State, 77-50. However, with only eight healthy players to call upon by the start of the ACC schedule, Miami faced challenge after challenge competing in a league that ranked among the top-three strongest women's basketball conferences nationally and produced two of the NCAA Tournament's four No. 1 seeds in 2006-07.

Regardless, Renee Taylor emerged as the ACC's leading scorer--upholding Miami's streak of producing the league's leading scorer in all three years it had been a member. The All-ACC Second Team selection set school records in single-game scoring with 42 points at Houston and became the 19th Hurricane to score at least 1,000 points--and just the sixth to do so in her first two seasons. In addition, transfer Maurita Reid emerged as a defensive threat, tying the school record with 10 steals versus Wake Forest and finishing among the ACC's leaders and NCAA's top 10 in steals per game.

The 2007-08 season, Meier's third with the Hurricanes, saw Maurita Reid continue her rise among the ACC elite. The senior was nothing short of impressive shooting beyond the arc and picking opponent's pockets. She hit four or more three-pointers on 10 different occasions and finished the season with 110 steals, good for second in the conference and fifth in the NCAA. The Queens, N.Y. native led the team in points (15.3 ppg) and rebounding (5.6 rpg) and was also named the ACC All-Defensive Team.

With a No. 21 incoming recruiting class, Meier and the Hurricanes saw significant improvement during the 2008-09 season. The freshman class was highlighted by McDonald's All-American Shenise Johnson - out of Henrietta, N.Y. and Riquna Williams - from nearby Pahokee, Fla.

Johnson lived up to the hype as she was the team leader on the season in points, rebounds, assists and steals. Under Meier's guidance, Johnson was named the ACC Rookie of the Week on three occasions and was named to the ACC All-Freshmen team as well as ACC Honorable Mention. The versatile guard/forward also led the U19 USA team to a gold medal finish in the 2009 World Championships in Bangkok, Thailand.

The 2009-10 season was one of the most successful in program history. Under Meier's vision, the Hurricanes advanced to the WNIT Championship game. Miami posted a 22-14 overall record - the first 20-win campaign since the 2002-03 season and just the eighth all-time.

In her sophomore season, Johnson was joined by a healthy Riquna Williams and the duo racked up accolades throughout the season. Johnson was named First Team All-ACC, while Williams garnered second-team honors. The tandem led Miami to a 5-1 WNIT record - the deepest postseason run in team history - with both earning all-tournament honors along the way.

Following the 2009-10 campaign, University of Miami Director of Athletics Kirby Hocutt announced that Meier signed a contract extension through 2015.

"We are excited about the tremendous progress our women's basketball team achieved this past season," said Hocutt. "Coach Meier continues to assemble a special group of talented young women at the University of Miami and we look forward to the future success of our program."

## Miami Hurricanes use grit to prevail over Wake Forest

The 10th-ranked University of Miami women's basketball team won its 36th home game in a row Thursday night at BankUnited Center, and though the 64-39 win over Wake Forest wasn't as thrilling or pleasing to the eye as some of the Hurricanes' other victories during the streak, coach Katie Meier took great pride in her team's grit and defense.

The Canes held the Demon Deacons to 25 percent shooting (15 of 60), outrebounded them 50-40, and no Wake Forest player scored in double digits.

"It was an ugly win for us, and that's a compliment to Wake Forest and what they do," Meier said. "It was really kind of disjointed and gritty and grimy and scrummy, and that's how you have to play them."

Wake Forest coach Mike Petersen said simply, "Miami's a lot better than us." He went on to praise UM's athleticism and coaching.

"They have really good players, Katie's a really good coach, and they play really hard," Petersen said. "Basketball's not a hard game. It's not rocket science. It's five people running around in short pants. You're on the road against the eighth-ranked [in the ESPN poll] team in the country, you shoot 25 percent, guess what? You're not gonna win."

Hurricanes senior guard Riquna "Bay-Bay" Williams did not start for the second game in a row. She has been dealing with an ill family member and has been distracted. Krystal Saunders started in her place, scored the first basket and scored again four minutes later to give UM an early 8-7 lead.

Then Williams came off the bench at 14:52 and showed almost immediately why she is one of the most feared players in the ACC. She grabbed a defensive rebound, raced up the court and hit the Canes' first three-pointer of the night. Two minutes later, she dribbled through traffic and scored on a driving layup to put UM ahead 13-9. By halftime, she led the Canes with nine points, and she finished tied with Stefanie Yderstrom with a team-high 14 points.

Yderstrom was coming off a career-best, 22-point night against Virginia Tech, and she was a key player again Thursday. She made three from beyond the arc, had six rebounds, four assists and an uncharacteristically high three blocks. UM improved to 18-3 overall and 7-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference. Wake Forest fell to 12-8 and 2-5 in the ACC.

UM All-America candidate Shenise Johnson was held to five first-half points, but she gave the Demon Deacons fits inside with 10 rebounds and three blocks before halftime. She wound up with 10 points, 12 rebounds, seven assists, four blocks and two steals.

“My shot wasn’t falling. I was like 0 for 4 at the start, so I said, ‘OK, let me do something else, distribute the ball and rebound,’” Johnson said. “It was grimy out there, felt like an ACC tourney game, with them riding us with their bodies straight up. We’re not used to that. They messed up our timing on offense.”

Meier noticed Johnson’s effort.

“Seemed like she had 10 rebounds by the first media [timeout],” Meier said. “I kind of yelled at the team, ‘Does anyone else but Mo want to rebound? At halftime she had 10, and no one else had more than three.’”

Two busloads of children from the Miami-Dade Police Athletic League injected the 1,648 fans with energy, and for the 36th time in a row, they went home happy.

Wake Forest center Sandra Garcia, a Miami native who went to Plantation American Heritage, had two points and six rebounds. Secily Ray led the Demon Deacons with nine points.

## Role players step up to carry Miami Hurricanes over Virginia Tech

It came as little surprise that the 10th-ranked University of Miami women's basketball team was well on its way to a 79-48 victory over Virginia Tech within the first 10 minutes Monday night. The more significant news was that two Hurricane starters — guard Riquna “Bay Bay” Williams and forward Morgan Stroman — were on the bench.

Miami had gone 52 consecutive games with the same starting lineup, so the absences were glaring.

Williams is dealing with a family issue, missed practice time and has been distracted. She finally entered the game with 10:57 to go in the first half, but wound up playing only 10 minutes. She went 0 for 2 with four points from the free-

throw line and had no assists or steals.

It was her lowest output of the season, coming off her second-worst game, a 2-of-11 night for six points at Virginia. Williams averages 16.2 points per game and scored 36 against then-No. 11 Rutgers and 34 against then-No. 5 Maryland.

Stroman, a junior guard, was in street clothes with a cast on her left leg. She tore her Achilles tendon in the final minutes of the Hurricanes' win at Virginia last week, will undergo surgery Tuesday and miss the rest of the season.

She was one of three Hurricanes averaging double figures with 12.9 points per game and was second on the team with 6.5 rebounds per game.

“We had a tough week, with losing Morgan and Riquna had some family issues that kept her away from practice and we're making adjustments,” coach Katie Meier said. “I couldn't be more proud of how much composure we played with. It was like, OK, just change two starters and click. That's such credit to these two upper classmen [pointing to guards Stefanie Yderstrom and Shenise Johnson].”



Yderstrom led the Canes with a career-high 22 points in 19 minutes on 7-of-10 shooting. She was left alone outside and took advantage with four three-pointers.

“I’m just happy with how we won, as a team,” Yderstrom said.

Johnson kicked in 18 points on 7-of-12 shooting and had six steals and four assists.

“You’ve got the most versatile player in the country here in Shenise, and then you have this unbelievable Steady Eddie in Stef, and we can solve a lot of problems together,” Meier said. “They changed their roles, accepted it, and said, ‘OK, what’s next?’ That’s really special.”

The Hurricanes (17-3, 6-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) also got a big boost — literally — from 6-6 center Shawnice Wilson, starting her first game of the season. She had 12 points and five rebounds. Wilson will be counted on more in the absence of Stroman, one of UM’s most active players in the paint.

UM’s defense was relentless, forcing 22 turnovers and limiting the Hokies to 27 percent shooting and 11 percent from beyond the arc.

“It was strange, and we definitely miss Stro, but she’s not gone, she’s still there in our ear,” Johnson said of Stroman. “With Bay, we miss the energy, the electric threes, the amazing shots. I missed her as a friend. She’s been alongside me the last four years, but we got the W, and she’ll be back.”

Meier added: “Everyone just has to give a little more each, one more tip, one more rebound and we can handle it.”

Monet Tellier led the Hokies (6-14, 2-5) with 18 points and Aerial Wilson added 15.

The Hurricanes are back home Thursday night against Wake Forest.

## No. 13 Miami women survives Florida St rally

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) — It came down to the final seconds before 13th-ranked Miami finally ended a 25-year jinx in Tallahassee.

The Hurricanes watched a 19-point lead disappear before escaping with a 60-57 win Sunday at Florida State on Stefanie Yderstrom's 3-pointer from deep in the corner with 17 seconds remaining.

"A lot of demons ... were still on our back a little, bit but she exorcised the demons with that big shot," said Miami coach [Katie Meier](#), who was a freshman at Duke when the Hurricanes last won here on Jan. 29, 1987. "They make it very, very hard to get a bucket. That shot by Stefanie was big."

Miami (15-3, 4-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) led 41-22 a minute into the second half, but Florida State fought back to tie the game at 57 when [Cierra Bravard](#) made the second of two tries at the free throw line with 37 seconds left.

Shenise Johnson led Miami with 24 points and became just the fourth player in Miami history to reach 2,000 career points. Morgan Stroman and Riquna Williams added 11 points for the Hurricanes. Yderstrom finished with 9, all on treys.

Yderstrom and Williams — the ACC's top two 3-point shooters — each made three 3-point shots for Miami, which hit 8 of 22 of its long distance tries compared to Florida State's 1 of 5 from behind the arc. The two Hurricanes guards have each made 38 field goals from long range this season.

Sophomore forward [Natasha Howard](#) led Florida State (10-9, 2-3) with 22 points and a career-high 17 rebounds, getting 14 points and 10 rebounds in the second half to spark the Seminoles' late rally.

"Seventeen rebounds hasn't been had against a top-25 team here in years," Florida State coach [Sue Semrau](#) said.

In fact, it was just the third time since 1993 that it had happened.

"We didn't give up at all," the 6-foot-3 Howard said. "That's the best thing that ever happened. We didn't give up at the end."

Miami was able to hold on for the win despite shooting 36.5 percent compared to Florida State's 43.1 percent, and the Seminoles won the rebound battle 39-32 led by Howard's dominating presence.

Chasity Clayton added 12 points and Bravard 10 for Florida State, which was hurt by 22 turnovers.

Johnson scored 15 points in the first half and keyed a 23-6 run that propelled the Hurricanes into the locker room with a 35-20 lead.

"Shenise did a great job of setting the tone very early for us," said Meier said, adding, "Two thousand points ... that's an amazing accomplishment."

Semrau, however, was frustrated with her team's start.

"I hope that after this, we play more grown up in the first half," she said..

A pair of Howard layups sparked an early 8-0 Florida State burst that gave the Seminoles a quick-lived 10-7 lead, but disappeared quickly in the wake of the Hurricanes' 23-6 run capped by a Johnson layup for a 30-16 lead with 4:44 left in the half.

The Seminoles' women weren't able to pull off a second home-floor upset in as many days. Florida State's unranked men's team clobbered No. 3 North Carolina 90-57 just 24 hours earlier.

Semrau's team visits Boston College on Thursday, while Miami is at Virginia that night.

## University of Miami duo projected in WNBA 1st round

ESPN college basketball analyst Debbie Antonelli predicted earlier this week that the Miami Hurricanes will have two first-round picks in April's WNBA Draft.

In the 15 previous drafts, the Canes have had just three players selected, including only one first-rounder — Tamara James as the eighth pick in 2006. The other draftees were Octavia Blue (No. 15 in 1998) and Tombi Bell (No. 39 in 2001).

Antonelli expects 5-11 senior guard Shenise Johnson to go in the top five to seven picks and said 5-7 senior guard Riquna Williams won't last past No. 10.

"Durability and versatility are the two things that define [Johnson's] game," Antonelli said. "She can stuff the right side of a stat sheet. She's exciting and emotional — in a good way — and when the Canes need a play, they put it in her hands."

Antonelli said Johnson can defend the three perimeter positions and would be a great fit for a team looking for a multi-dimensional guard.

Antonelli also raves about Williams and her explosiveness, which she displayed last year when she jumped over a James Madison player.

"The Indiana Fever have the 11th pick in the draft," said Antonelli, the Fever's TV analyst for the past decade, "and I don't think Riquna will be there when it's our turn."

Antonelli said Williams has great separation skills.

"She can get her shot off on anybody," she said. "She can beat you with a change of pace, she has range, she's quick with the ball and she can handle."

Besides Johnson and Williams, the only other guard regarded as a consensus top-10 pick is

Tiffany Hayes of Connecticut.

Antonelli said there is very little to nit-pick about UM's duo. She mentioned Johnson's "decision-making at a high rate of speed can be better."

As for Williams, the analyst said she'd like to see her move to the next play quicker instead of letting mistakes bother her and slow her down.

"They're both ready for the next level," Antonelli said. "I'd like to see the Miami team as a whole show its character by beating ranked teams on the road, but Johnson and Williams have the complete skill set."

## FIU

The Panthers have actually had more WNBA draft picks than Miami with five. But FIU has not had a player selected since 2002 and has yet to send a first-rounder to the league.

FIU's highest overall selection was Gergana Branzova, who was taken 24th in 1998. Also selected were Albena Branzova (29th, 1998), Andrea Nagy (25th, 1999), Dalma Ivanyi (39th, 1999) and Gergana Slavtcheva (30th, 2002).

It will be interesting to see if 5-7 point guard Jerica Coley gets drafted in a couple of years. If so, the St. Petersburg native would be FIU's first American-born draftee.

## Miami Dade College

Kesheria McNeil, a 5-8 point guard from Raleigh, N.C., scored 42 points in one game and 33 in another. She earned Florida Junior College Player of the Week honors.

**CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP)-** Celebrating yet another 3-pointer, Riquna Williams hopped along the sideline, faced the stands and waved to coax more cheers from a crowd eager to witness a milestone win for the Miami Hurricanes.

"I've never done that before," the senior guard said.

It was a night of firsts. Williams scored 34 points and No. 13-ranked Miami defeated a top-five team for the first time ever, rallying past No. 5 Maryland 75-63 Thursday.

Williams tied a career high by sinking eight 3-pointers, the last coming with two minutes left to put Miami ahead by 11 points.

"The difference was we had no answer for Riquna," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "She was unstoppable. She was definitely in a zone."

The Hurricanes (14-3 overall, 3-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) won despite missing 21 consecutive shots in the first half, when they went 10 minutes without a basket to squander an early 12-point lead.

Miami extended its home winning streak to 34 games.

"There's something magical that happens at home - we just have these moments," coach Katie Meier said. "The crowd is in a frenzy, and we're an emotional team. The crowd totally helped."

Maryland (16-1, 3-1) was held 21 points below its scoring average of 84.4 points per game, best in the nation.

Miami outscored the Terrapins by 33 points from 3-point range and won even though Shenise Johnson shot 2 for 15 and had just six points, 10 below her average. That ended her streak of scoring in double figures in 87 consecutive games.

Johnson didn't seem to mind.

"We won. Period," the senior said. "I feel like I'm in some way responsible. This is a great win for our program, and I'm happy to be a part of it."

Williams shot 12 for 24, including 8 for 14 from 3-point range. Stefanie Yderstrom went 4-for-7 beyond the arc and scored 12 points. Morgan Stroman added 10 points and eight rebounds for the Hurricanes, who enjoyed an eight-rebound edge despite Maryland's height advantage.

Alyssa Thomas had 18 points for the Terrapins but committed eight turnovers. Laurin Mincy was held to six points, nearly nine below her average.

The Terrapins went 2 for 11 from 3-point range, while Miami shot 13 for 28. The loss was the first for Maryland since it was beaten in the second round of the NCAA tournament last year.

"We remember how it felt last time," Thomas said. "I know we're going to come back strong."

Miami trailed by seven points early in the second half but regained the lead when a 3-pointer by Williams made it 47-46. She sank back-to-back 3-pointers during a 10-0 run that put the Hurricanes up 64-56 with less than four minutes left.

That prompted her celebration along the sideline as she encouraged the fans' cheers.

"I wanted to let them know, 'You guys are helping us,'" she said. "It was a great emotional feeling, like, 'We want to win, and we're going to go get it.'"

Williams scored 15 points in the first 8 1/2 minutes to help the Hurricanes take a 22-10 lead. They then went cold, and a 15-1 run by the Terrapins put them ahead.

Meier described the Hurricanes' offense in the first half as "horrible."

"I said, 'If our offense is the problem, we're fine,'" she said. "We knew we would click at a certain point."

### **HOME COURT DEFENSE**

The 27 points scored by Maryland in the first half against the Canes were the fewest by the Terrapins of any first period this season.

### **TWICE AS NICE**

## Miami Hurricanes need active Morgan Stroman against Maryland

If the goose is loose, the 13th-ranked University of Miami women's basketball team tends to win, says coach Katie Meier.

The goose, for those who aren't privy to the Hurricanes' inside jokes, is junior forward Morgan Stroman, who also goes by "Stro". When she is loose, energetic and crashing the boards for rebounds, the rest of the Hurricanes follow suit. She had 18 points and 10 rebounds — seven of them offensive — in a road win at Georgia Tech last week, a "Herculean effort," in Meier's words.

Energy and rebounding will be critical Thursday night at home against fifth-ranked Maryland (16-0), one of four unbeaten teams.

The Terrapins average 84.4 points per game, which is tied with Notre Dame for best in the NCAA. The Hurricanes rank fourth in that category at 82.4 ppg and lead the nation with 16.1 steals per game, so expect a lot of fast

breaks. Maryland will have a height advantage with only one starter under six feet. The Hurricanes start 5-6 Riquna Williams, 5-8 Stefanie Yderstrom, and 5-11 Shenise Johnson.

"They've got a ton of size, so it's going to come down to how do they guard our guards, and can we keep them from pounding us inside," Meier said. "We will need Stro to be loosey-goosey and get our team energized. Whenever I feel we're not playing with enough spark, I look right at Stro and she makes it her business to get everyone going."

Stroman relishes the role. She has been a team leader for as long as she can remember. She made varsity as a seventh-grader in Hopkins, S.C., and by the time she graduated from Lower Richland High, she had won four state titles and been named South Carolina Player of the Year and a McDonald's All-American. Her mother, Debbie, was her high school coach, and Stroman credits her mom for instilling her with passion for the game.

## Defensive Miami Hurricanes execute their gameplan, take out Wolfpack

Create turnovers on defense, and get Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams to score a whole bunch of points.

That was the formula the University of Miami used on its way to its first Atlantic Coast Conference title. Coach Katie Meier — with a few new parts in her arsenal — isn't tinkering with that. She's just trying to develop other ways for the Hurricanes to win games and become more diverse come March.

And Thursday night, she saw progress as 12th-ranked UM relied on some old-fashioned, half-court offensive execution to hold off N.C. State 78-68 in their ACC home opener at BankUnited Center.

Senior Riquna "Bay Bay" Williams, battling flu-like symptoms, led the way for the Canes (12-3, 1-1 ACC) with 22 points and a pair of clutch, back-to-back three-pointers that provided some cushion after the Wolfpack (10-5, 0-2) trimmed a 20-point deficit to as little as three and then had it 66-61 with 4:38 remaining in the game.

But it was the way her team passed the ball and set itself up for good shots — with center Pepper Wilson getting involved — that made Meier happy.

### Sharp Execution

"It wasn't just, 'Hey, we're athletic and we exploded.' Those were well really well-executed possessions of offense," Meier said of her team's late 13-0 run that made it 78-61 with 1:45 to play. "That's probably the first time this year that we went to our [set] offense to rely on getting us the win and came through."

Wilson finished with a season-high 11 rebounds and played with a lot more fire than she did in Chapel Hill, N.C., when she was pulled after just one minute of action by Meier for not showing enough fight for an inbounds pass that was stolen away from her. Wilson also scored seven points and blocked a season-high three shots in Thursday's win.

"I played with a lot more confidence," Wilson said. "When I project confidence and my team sees it we can play confident. I realized with UNC that if I would have played that way I could have made an impact. That hit me hard. I know it's important for me to grow up and mature as a person mentally."

N.C. State (10-5, 0-2) led 23-21 before UM closed the first half on 23-2 run.

### 'Phenomenal' play

"Thank goodness we played a phenomenal last five and a half of minutes of that first half, which was spirited, ferocious, inspirational basketball. We needed it," Meier said. "We've had quite a history with N.C. State the last couple times we played them so we were not surprised with their comeback. It's the third game in a row we've gotten a lead on them, and then they [fought] back and really cut the lead."

Meier said she was happy with Williams' shot selection Thursday.

Williams, who was 6 of 19 at North Carolina, finished 9 of 17 Thursday. Meier also praised the lift sophomore Krystal Saunders provided off the bench: six points, three rebounds and two steals in 18 minutes.

### Mixing it up

"They only gave her credit for one offensive rebound, but I think she generated five fouls scrumming in there for us in huge moments when we were really on the ropes, and then hit a very composed little runner that was huge — a pressure-release jumper," Meier said. "We've got a lot to work on — and that's OK. We're going to get exposed a lot each game we play and we're going to learn from that.

"We're just going to keep putting together this season because we want to be exposed now and be good in late February and March. So, we were lucky to get some lessons and a win."

## Hurricanes cruise past VCU, await much bigger tests

Perhaps it's a credit to the recent progress the Miami Hurricanes have made in women's basketball that Thursday night's 91-61 win over unranked Virginia Commonwealth cannot be seen as overly satisfying.

The 12th-ranked Canes (11-2) never trailed as forward Morgan Stroman led the way with 23 points in just 24 minutes.

Coupled with their win over Holy Cross on Wednesday, the Canes won their annual holiday tournament.

But tougher tests await the Canes, starting with Monday's trip to Chapel Hill to play No. 24 North Carolina in an ACC opener.

"It's bunker-down mentality," coach Katie Meier said of the Canes' plans for the next few days, interrupted to some extent by the New Year's holiday.

Stroman, who made 9 of her 12 shots from the field and 5 of 7 from the line, was not the Canes' only star against VCU (8-4).

Canes guard Shenise Johnson was named the tournament's MVP. She had 12 points, 13 rebounds, six assists and six steals against VCU.

For the two games, she had 29 points, 23 rebounds, 13 assists and eight steals, and has now scored in double figures in 84 consecutive games, the longest active run in the nation.

Stroman, with 35 points in two games, and point guard Stefanie Yderstrom, who had 20 of her 37 tournament points against VCU, were the other Canes on the all-tournament team.

As a team, the Canes had 23 steals and outscored VCU in the paint, 50-22.

"I appreciate the term 'easy bucket,'" Meier said, "but there is a lot of work that goes into those plays."

The Canes also extended their school-record home win streak to 32 games. Only Connecticut (91) and Stanford (68) have longer streaks, and Miami is just ahead of Duke (30) and Baylor (29).

The Canes appear to have the talent to make a deep run in the NCAA Tournament.

But to do that, they will have to beat ranked teams away from the BankUnited Center.

So far this season, that has been a problem for the Canes, who are 1-2 against ranked teams, with both losses (Tennessee and Georgetown) coming on the road and by a combined total of 41 points. Miami's one win over a ranked team (Rutgers) came in overtime.

"We thank the people who taught us those lessons," Meier said, referring to the losses. "When someone beats us at anything, if it's our fault, we're going to fix it."

The Canes will get a chance to make those corrections Monday at UNC.

"It's just another opportunity," Johnson said, "to show who we are."

## Miami women rout Holy Cross 84-49

### Hurricanes bounce back from 25-point loss after watching inspiring video montage

CORAL GABLES — When the 12th-ranked Miami women's basketball team gathered the day after Christmas for the first time since its jarring 25-point loss at Georgetown five days earlier, coach Katie Meier showed her players a 25-minute video montage. advertisement

It included a clip of former Hurricanes linebacker Ray Lewis. Meier also spliced in images from the team's game against Georgetown she felt showed lack of toughness, as well as clips of her team grinding away in the weight room and training on the track.

"It was stone quiet" while players watched, Meier said.

And on Wednesday night, the players who looked like "zombies" against Georgetown returned to being their old passionate selves.

The Hurricanes, who dropped five spots in the Associated Press poll, routed Holy Cross 89-49 Wednesday at BankUnited Center in the UM Holiday Tournament.

"It definitely instilled a little more passion inside of us," Johnson said of watching Meier's video montage.

"Nobody giggled. Nobody smiled. Nobody smirked. It really hurt us to see us putting in all that work and then go out on the court and not show who we are. The Ray Lewis film ... all we kept saying in practice and before the game was, 'Effort, effort.' We were quoting some of the lines."

Miami (10-2) will play Virginia Commonwealth (8-3) in the final Thursday at 7 p.m. VCU beat Morgan State 73-52 in the first semifinal Wednesday.

"Obviously my team answered the call," Meier said. "We didn't have a great time away from each other after that horrible performance up in D.C."

"We're fixers. You'll notice the record here lately — we don't lose two in a row. But we usually can fix it right away. And to have to sit on that for seven days and not be able to fix that right away was frustrating for us."

The Hurricanes put themselves firmly back together against Holy Cross. Riquna Williams led four scorers in double figures — all of whom played no more than 22 minutes — with 18 points.

Fellow guards Stefanie Yderstrom and Johnson had 17 points and forward Morgan Stroman had 12 points, including the team's first six. Johnson also posted 10 rebounds and seven assists, with just one turnover.



Williams scored 15 of her points in the first half, draining a 3-pointer in the final minute that gave the 'Canes a 47-22 lead heading into halftime. That basket topped the Hurricanes' point total from their previous game — the stunning 71-46 loss at then-No. 17 Georgetown on Dec. 21.

The Hurricanes took a while to shake off the Crusaders (6-6) on Wednesday.

They led just 18-16 before Johnson's layup with 10:52 left in the first half. Johnson then made another layup and a free throw for a three-point play to ignite a 22-3 run that included eight points from guard Yderstrom and seven apiece from Johnson and Williams.

The Hurricanes ambushed the Crusaders to start the second half. A 20-6 run coming out of the locker room boosted their lead to 67-28 with 13:58 left, and the lead eventually ballooned to as many as 44 points, 79-35, on Yderstrom's 3-pointer with 8:42 left.

"I feel like we're back," Yderstrom said. "That's the good thing about basketball. When you fall down like we did, you can rise up and be better. I think we showed that tonight."

## Miami Hurricanes women bounce back from blowout

It was 18 degrees in Worcester, Mass., on Wednesday night, and most residents of that city would be delighted to be traveling in relatively-balmy South Florida. But the Holy Cross women's basketball team was here to play the 12th-ranked University of Miami, and freezing temperatures might have been more pleasant than what they encountered.

The Hurricanes were coming off a 25-point loss at Georgetown last week and a fuming coach Katie Meier welcomed the team back from Christmas break on Monday with a grueling practice and a 25-minute motivational video that included clips of Ray Lewis' "Effort" speech to the UM football team and footage of the UM women playing "like zombies," in Meier's words, against the Hoyas.

"They answered the call," Meier said.

Miami shook off the Crusaders early and cruised to an 89-49 victory in the evening game of the UM Women's Basketball Holiday Tournament. The Canes led by 25 late in the first half, went on a 43-10 run, and were never threatened. It was their 31st consecutive win at the BankUnited Center.

Meier said the film room was "stone quiet" during the video.

"After that horrible performance up in D.C., to have to sit on that for seven days and not be able to fix it right away was frustrating," Meier said. "My message was don't say a word. We did a little montage, spliced in Ray Lewis, some of our lack of effort at Georgetown, and clips of when we did bust our tails in the weight room and track. At the end, I said, 'Message heard?' They said, 'Yeah.'

“It’s not the end of the world that we lost that game, but we’re a passionate, emotional team and to see the zombies walking around out there, that had to change. ... All of a sudden one day this unbelievably fun, passionate, energized, wonderful group of young ladies had no passion for the game.”

The Hurricanes (10-2) will play Virginia Commonwealth (8-3) in Thursday’s 7 p.m. championship game. VCU beat Morgan State 73-52 in Wednesday’s early game. The Canes will have to key in on Rams senior forward Courtney Hurt, who scored 32 against Morgan State, and senior guard Andrea Barbour, who scored 23.

Morgan State (2-8) plays Holy Cross (6-6) in the 5 p.m. consolation game.

The Crusaders kept things close early, held UM scoring leader Shenise “Moe” Johnson scoreless for the first nine minutes, and they trailed by just two, 18-16. But then Johnson came to life, scored seven points in a Canes’ 13-0 run, and in the blink of an eye UM led 31-16.

Riquna “Bay Bay” Williams played only 20 minutes and led UM with 18 points on 7-of-12 shooting. Fifteen of those points came before halftime. Stefanie Yderstrom tied a career high with five three pointers and finished with 17 points. Johnson nearly got a triple-double with 17 points, 10 rebounds, seven assists (and just one turnover) in 22 minutes. Morgan Stroman kicked in 12 points and seven rebounds in 15 minutes.

“The video definitely had an impact on us,” Johnson said. “It really hurt us to see those clips. [Wednesday] we showed that passion and were high-fiving again.”

## University of Miami basketball player Pepper Wilson feels at home

University of Miami women's basketball player Shawnice "Pepper" Wilson did not plan on playing basketball when she was younger. Now 6 feet 6 inches tall, she is taking the Hurricanes to the next level as one of the new players of the season.

"I actually wanted to be a cheerleader, and that didn't work out," said Wilson, 21. "I looked like I was supposed to be a part of the sport I was cheering for."

Wilson remembers trying out for her middle-school basketball team in seventh grade and only scoring 11 points the whole season. But by the next year, she scored about 25 points the first game. By high school, Wilson — who attended Westinghouse High School in Pittsburgh — scored 1,540 points and ranked 23 out of the top 50 seniors in the 2008 High School Slam Magazine, a basketball publication.

She was recruited in high school by the University of Miami, but chose the University of Pittsburgh since it was close to home.

Wilson originally played center for the Pitt and averaged 6.9 points and 5.3 rebounds.

Then, after her sophomore year, she transferred to Miami. "When Pitt wasn't it for me, and I didn't see myself succeeding to the best of my ability, I was like, Miami."

Katie Meier, her coach at UM, as well as players and fans, say her decision brought Miami an advantage the team never had before.

"She stabilizes us offensively," said Meier. "She's a real nice anchor for us."

Miami guard Shenise Johnson agrees.

"We don't have to dribble drive all the time," Johnson said. "We can slow it down. We can play a

little bit of half court and throw it to her and still be efficient.”

Wilson’s decision to come to Miami meant a year off the courts because of NCAA rules concerning student athletes transferring schools. Though frustrating, she said it was worth the wait. “I was able to cater to my knee and rehab it more,” said Wilson. “I was able to become healthier. I lost a lot of weight coming into this program. I think it was the best thing, having the year off.”

Wilson also said she got a chance to get a feel for the team and how Meier coaches.

“I feel she’s real about what she says and she has so much passion,” Wilson said. “I feel that I can learn from her because one day I would like to become a coach.”

Throughout her basketball career, Wilson has kept her nickname and jersey number.

After Wilson was born, her grandmother started calling her “Pepper.”

Wilson was never told the reason for her nickname because she was only 4 when her grandmother died. But she continues to use the nickname in honor of her grandmother.

“In remembrance of her, I kind of carried the name on, so when they say, ‘would you rather be called Shawnice?’ I’ll be like, ‘Call me Pepper.’” Wilson’s number 40 is another constant in her life. She has a tattoo on the top of her left shoulder with the number, which doesn’t have a story behind like her nickname but has a special meaning for her. “I just started my career with it, and I’m going to end with it,” said Wilson, who is enjoying her life in Miami. “I love the fact that I can go to the beach in November,” she said. And her Miami fans love her back.

“With Pepper, they’ve never had a player like that,” said Hope Kaiser, a fan. “It changes the game.”

Wilson, who is majoring in criminology with a psychology minor has two years left at the UM. During her time at the school she wants to take her team to a national championship.

“I just hope to become the best player and lead my team to a national championship,” Wilson said. “That’s the ultimate goal. I feel if you’re not in it to get something out of in the future, you’re wasting your time.”

## Big run sparks UM women's demolition of Louisiana-Monroe

Sebastian the Ibis was in the holiday spirit Friday night, dressed in a Santa Claus suit. Jingle Bell Rock played over the loudspeakers at the BankUnited Center.

But the seventh-ranked University of Miami women's basketball team was not in a giving mood. The Hurricanes trounced Louisiana-Monroe 103-39 in a game that was lopsided from start to finish.

The Hurricanes opened with a 22-0 run and closed with a 16-0 run to win their 30th consecutive home game (third-longest streak in the nation). They improved to 9-1 and left Warhawks coach Mona Martin shaking her head and gushing about her opponent.

"Last year we played Texas A&M, and they end up winning the thing [NCAA title], and I think this UM team could be a big contender for the national championship if they stay healthy," Martin said. "They have so much depth, play so hard. They're going to be way up there this year. I've watched a lot of film, lot of ballgames, and they run the floor better than any team I've watched from point guard to post. Their transition offense is unbelievable. I can't say we've ever played a team that runs the floor that well, and I've been in this business 36 years. There is a lot of desire and fight in those kids."

How dominant were the Canes?

UM led 22-0 in the first 4:20 before the Warhawks scored their first basket. Jennifer Capers' jumper at 9:17 gave the Canes their first 30-point lead, 33-2. By halftime, they led 55-19. They took a 40-point lead, 64-24, on a Shenise Johnson put-back with 16:10 left in the game and a 50-point lead, 79-28, six minutes later on a Riquna Williams layup. Krystal Saunders made it a 60-point gap with the 100th UM point in the closing minutes.

The Hurricanes made 12 of their first 16 shots (75 percent) while the Warhawks missed 12 of their first 13. The South Dade High band played the Na-Na-Na-Na-Goodbye song when UM went up 7-0.

Johnson had scored 10 points at the three-minute mark, extending her nation-leading streak to 81 games in double digits. By the middle of the first half, she was resting on the bench while UM coach Katie Meier got a look at her reserves.

The bench, nicknamed "The Second Wave" and "The Reinforcers," wound up playing more combined minutes than the starters. Meier pulled her starters for good with 6:10 to go. Johnson

and Williams finished with 16 points apiece, and Morgan Stroman added 14. Krystal Saunders kicked in a career-high 16 off the bench, and Michelle Woods 13.

The Hurricanes head to Washington, D.C., to face Georgetown on Wednesday and are back home Dec. 28-29 for their Holiday Tournament, which includes Holy Cross, Virginia Commonwealth and Morgan State.

## Women's basketball locals: Former CSN star Michelle Woods making most of time at Miami

Michelle Woods doesn't get many minutes in University of Miami women's basketball games.

When she does play, though, she makes the most of her time.

The true freshman out of Community School plays behind All-American Shenise Johnson and Riquana Williams, senior guards who were invited to the USA Basketball Women's World University Games Team Trials in May.

Woods usually is the first player off the bench, Miami coach Katie Meier said. Through 10 games (9-1), she has averaged nearly 11 minutes, 3.7 points and 1.6 rebounds.

In 10 minutes during the season opener, she had a season-high seven points and added three steals. She had seven points in 12 minutes against South Florida. She had a season-high six steals along with five points and three assists in 18 minutes against Prairie View A&M.

"It's very hard for freshmen to catch on," Meier said. "She really, really gets it. She is so well-coached."

The two-time Class 2A player of the year came into the program with an advantage because her father, Mitch Woods, coached her during high school. Mitch Woods, who played basketball for Rollins College, has been to all the home games and some of the away ones, she said.

The experience of being part of a program that won two state titles has allowed her "to mentally have the capacity to comprehend multiple offensive systems," Meier said.

Woods reported to Miami in June and started working out and playing pickup with teammates.

"It helped," she said. "I'm just adapting to the quickness and playing against all-around good players everywhere."

Woods hasn't been intimidated by the caliber of players she faces. And because she plays smart, Meier is confident she will make the right choices.



"She takes very good shots. She doesn't make mistakes," the coach said. "She makes great entry passes into the post."

Woods brings energy and aggressiveness to the court, qualities that help keep her in the game. She is fifth on the team in steals.

"I always like to play hard because that's what she's looking for," she said. "I just play good defense."

## Miami Hurricanes' 'Pepper Project' makes major progress in win over Ole Miss

Mississippi coach Renee Ladner was finished with her news conference and walking out the door. But the last question posed to her — about University of Miami center Pepper Wilson — had lingered.

"I'll take her," Ladner said. "Six-six? Oh yeah."

UM coach Katie Meier wasn't offering, however, especially after Wilson scored a season-high 15 points in the Hurricanes' 76-48 victory over visiting Ole Miss on Saturday night.

The Canes, ranked ninth in the nation, improved to 8-1. Ole Miss, which entered on a five-game winning streak, fell to 6-2.

Miami, which has won 29 consecutive home games, will return to the BankUnited Center on Friday for a game against Louisiana-Monroe.

Against Ole Miss, Miami led by as many as 14 points in the first half. The Rebels cut the deficit to 35-33 with 13:42 left in the game, but Miami regained its composure and cruised from there.

The Canes were led by guard Riquana Williams, who had a game-high 17 points. But because Williams came in averaging 17.6 points, her

performance was hardly a revelation.

Wilson's effort, meanwhile, was something Meier has been eagerly anticipating, which was made clear soon after the coach walked into her portion of the news conference flanked by Wilson and Williams.

"Pepper gets the big-time media," a delighted Meier joked. "That's what I'm talking about!"

Wilson, a junior who sat out last season after transferring from Pittsburgh, is accustomed to being a starter if not a star.

But with the Canes an established power and returning all five starters, she has made the adjustment to coming off the bench and to Miami's faster style of offense.

"Before coming in Miami, I was used to setting up half-court," Wilson said. "There's a lot of stuff I'm learning, even things I thought I knew.

"I'm trying to be not so robotic in the post. I never knew how important my hips were to my footwork. I'm glad to have coaches who tell me I'm good but that I can be much better."

Wilson said she realizes that not starting is "nothing personal — I'm not mad."

Meier said Wilson is not the only one adjusting. She called it "The Pepper Project," which is, in essence, Miami's guards learning how to get the ball to Wilson after not having played with a true post presence the past several years.

Two other Miami players scored in double figures Saturday — starters Morgan Stroman (14) and Shenise Johnson (11). The Canes held Ole Miss to 35.1 percent shooting, forced 23 turnovers and were plus-eight on the boards.

The Rebels' stars — 5-4 sophomore point guard Valencia McFarland and 6-4 senior center Nikki Byrd — were shut down. The Canes pressed and denied McFarland the ball, holding her to six points, nine below her average.

Byrd, who came in sixth in the nation in rebounds (11.7) and second on the team in scoring (14.6), was held to 10 points and five boards in 18 minutes. The Canes went right at her and got her out of the game with two fouls in the first three minutes of action.

Meier also made sure to praise her bench — including Wilson — for providing "energy" and allowing her starters to come in fresh to finish off a fatigued Rebels team.

"We could think of a thousand reasons why we didn't play very well," Ladner said. "But the truth is Miami is a better team."

## Miami Hurricanes' Williams a cerebral star playing at warp speed

The average spectator who never has spent time with University of Miami guard Riquana "Bay-Bay" Williams might assume it is pure athleticism that commands her to dribble 100 mph, juke defenders like former NFL star Barry Sanders and then drive for an acrobatic layup or step back for a perfect three-pointer.

No way the electrifying 5-6 senior can possibly make decisions at that speed, right? Those 36 points she chalked up in the double-overtime victory over Rutgers the other night, the steals on the run, the emphatic block ... pure instinct, right? Think again.

"Bay-Bay is one of the most misjudged athletes I have ever coached," said UM coach Katie Meier, whose ninth-ranked team hosts Ole Miss at 7 p.m. Saturday. "She plays so fueled, with so much passion and speed that she sometimes forces shots, and it may seem she's not thinking, but she is. Bay has amazing basketball IQ and

doesn't get enough credit for that. She'll come into timeouts with suggestions. She has a strong drive to not only outplay but outsmart her opponents."

In fact, Meier said, Williams has to think more than most because she has so many options at her disposal. Her quick thinking is a big reason UM is 7-1 and on a 28-game home win streak.

"Imagine being blessed with the ability to be successful in 10 different ways, like an artist who could do realism, impressionism, cubism ... and you have one second to decide which way you're going to go," Meier said. "That is Bay-Bay. She's sometimes 10 feet from the basket and in the blink of an eye has to dig through her huge bag of tricks and decide if she's going to drive to the basket, shoot a three, change direction, hesitate, hook shot, post up, pass. She can do it all.

"She's over-talented, and sometimes that can retard player development because there are too

many options in front of her. When I was in college, I had one move and one countermove and that was about it. It's harder to have choices."

Since she arrived at UM from the McClure Projects in Pahokee, Williams has reshaped her body and refined her game. She slimmed down from 186 pounds to 150 and shed her "Microwave" nickname.

"They called me that because I'd be super hot for five to 10 minutes, and then the bell would go off and, it's a wrap. I'm done," Williams said.

Last season, she averaged 31.4 minutes per game.

Williams credits guards coach Carolyn Kieger for "nagging and motivating" her to be more than a scorer. Kieger is Marquette's all-time assists leader and has pushed Williams to shoot less and pass more. This season, Kieger is tutoring Williams in the fine art of altering speed.

"Coach Kieger is taking my game to the next level," Williams said. "Start fast, slow down. Start slow, speed up. If the opponent steps up, I hesitate and blow past them."

Last season, Williams led the ACC and ranked 11th in the nation in scoring with 21.7 points per game. She has loftier goals this season after researching the stats of recent All-American players. Most of them didn't lead their conferences in scoring, but were good rebounders, assist leaders and shot 50 percent or better.

She is averaging 17.6 points, 3.5 assists and 2.5 steals, and is determined to be more well-rounded, like her backcourt partner, Shenise Johnson, who is averaging 18.9 points, 8.3 rebounds, 6.0 assists and 4.9 steals.

"Bay is so much fun to coach," Meier said. "She is wise, insightful, funny, an old soul. I have learned so much from her and so has everyone on this team."

## Stroman scores 20 to lead No. 9 Miami women in 76-60 win over Michigan State

EAST LANSING, Mich. — Morgan Stroman missed a free throw for No. 9 Miami and no one minded.

She hit everything else and scored 20 points on a near-perfect night to lead the No. 9 Hurricanes past Michigan State 76-60 Thursday in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge.

“Morgan is so underrated,” Miami coach Katie Meier said. “Our junior class has some perfect student-athletes. And she can stay in the shadows, then say, ‘I’m a McDonald’s All-American, too.’”

Stroman had 13 points at the break, hitting all four of her shots from the field and all five at the line for the much quicker Hurricanes (6-1). She finished 7-for-7 and 6-for-7, respectively.

“Coach has been telling me we need more energy,” Stroman said. “When I’m hyped, everyone else is hyped, too.”

Shenise Johnson added 13 points and Stefanie Yderstrom had 11 in Miami’s second-closest game this season.

Porsche Poole had 17 points for the foul-plagued Spartans (5-3), who played without starters Lykendra Johnson and Taylor Alton for most of the first half. Michigan State trailed 38-26 at halftime.

“I get frustrated talking to Lykendra about that at this stage of her career,” Michigan State coach Suzy Merchant said of the Big Ten’s leading rebounder. “She has to learn not to let her frustrations carry over. But those are our two seniors. They need to play at a higher level.”

Courtney Schiffauer and Jasmine Hines each had nine points for Michigan State, while Becca Mills grabbed nine rebounds, all in the first 20 minutes.

Miami forced the Spartans into 19 turnovers and had 11 steals. That was more than enough when Michigan State shot just 3 for 16 on 3s.

“We absolutely had to turn them over,” Meier said. “That had 36 points in the paint, so what’s our choice?”

The Hurricanes shot 45 percent from the field, 30 percent on 3s (6 for 20) and 75 percent (12 for 16) on free throws. They had 15 assists and just 10 turnovers while running at every opportunity.

“To only have 10 turnovers the way we play was big,” Meier said. “We average 95 possessions a game, so that means we’re keeping 85 of them.”

The Spartans shot 42 percent from the field and 78 percent (7 for 9) at the line, and had a 37-34 edge in rebounds.

Miami point guard Riquana Williams went down with a left knee injury and was helped off the court with 1:16 left before halftime. She returned briefly in the second half and finished with nine points.

The Hurricanes built a 36-20 edge with pressure defense, drives to the basket and a steady procession to the foul line. The Spartans had 13 turnovers in the first 20 minutes, when they were outscored 11-3 at the line.

With Johnson and Alton back in the lineup, Michigan State pulled to 46-36 on an off-balance jumper by Poole and made it an eight-point game on a layup by Alton.

Miami kept the Spartans at bay with five of their six 3-pointers in the second half, two from deep in the right corner and one from up top by Yderstrom.

“I absolutely love this team,” Meier said of a group that lost to Tennessee by 16, then beat Prairie View A&M by 81. “And we had a great experience playing up in Anchorage. If not for that, I think we would’ve lost this game. That was a great lesson for us.”

But Michigan State rallied again behind Schiffauer’s aggression and Hines’ strength inside. Annalise Pickrel’s jumper with 6:14 to go pulled the Spartans to 59-52 with 6:14 left.

“We cut it to seven but just didn’t make a couple of plays when we needed to,” Merchant said. “I liked our fight in the second half and the way we competed. We just couldn’t get over the hump.”

Stroman finally missed a free throw but made her second attempt, then converted a layup on a pass from Shenise Johnson to make it a 10-point game. On the Hurricanes’ next possession, Yderstrom connected again from 21 feet to make it 65-52.

## Williams leads No. 9 Miami to Alaska title

Both the Miami and South Florida women's teams had to fly nearly 5,000 miles to meet on the basketball court.

No. 9 Miami won the all-Florida final in the Great Alaska Shootout on Thursday night, downing its in-state rivals 92-72 while light snow fell outside the arena.

"It's kind of ironic," said Miami coach Katie Meier, who didn't know the other teams in the tournament when the school signed the contract.

"I don't think either AD is happy," she joked.

"This is what being an NCAA student-athlete is all about," South Florida coach Jose Fernandez said. "It's about going to play a couple of games and experiencing a beautiful part of the country."

Meier said there's never any guarantees in the Great Alaska Shootout, and noted the host team, Division II Alaska Anchorage, gave the Hurricanes a tough game in the opening round.

But Meier's Hurricanes (4-1) used two strong second-half performances to win both of their games in the Shootout.

In the final against South Florida (4-3), Miami led 44-32 at the break, but blew the game wide open to start the second half.

The Hurricanes went on a 24-7 run during the first 9 minutes to put away the Bulls.

"The biggest growth has been our team's performance in the second half," Meier said.

Meier attributes it to the Hurricanes' strong bench.

"We're not exhausted at halftime," she said.

Riquna Williams scored 17 points to lead Miami, and was voted the player of the game.

Shenise Johnson added 11 points and nine rebounds for the Hurricanes (4-1). She was selected the tournament MVP.

Sylvia Bullock, a Miami forward playing in her hometown of Anchorage, scored 10 points.

"We definitely came out here for reasons, one of those was to bring Sylvia home," Meier said. "We have five opportunities to win championships this year, there's four to go."

Jasmine Wynne led South Florida (4-3) with 21 points. Kaneisha Saunders added 11 points for the Bulls, and Akila McDonald and Andrell Smith had 10 apiece.

South Florida was down 75-46 with 8:30 left, but a scrappy performance by the Bulls made the final score a little more respectable, Fernandez said.

"If a game is out of reach, you need to win a game within a game, and I think we did that," he said. "I was disappointed we gave up as many points as we did. We didn't play defense particularly well here in Alaska."

Central Michigan beat Alaska Anchorage 90-84 in overtime in the third-place game.

## UM women's basketball to get big test against Vols

They are ranked No. 7 in the Associated Press poll, mentioned on the cover of *Sports Illustrated* this week and breezed past their first two opponents by 52 and 46 points.

Tuesday night in Knoxville, Tenn., the University of Miami women's basketball team — and a national TV audience — will find out just how good these Hurricanes really are as they take on third-ranked Tennessee in the State Farm Tipoff Classic.

"This is a huge event for women's basketball, a very big deal," said UM coach Katie Meier, the co-National Coach of the Year last season. "And with Tennessee as the opponent, it's an even bigger deal. We are in the ACC, have been in NCAA tournament, have played in big games. But to start the season with this celebration of these two programs on national television is really special."

It is particularly meaningful for Meier because it is her first time coaching against legend Pat Summitt, a longtime mentor who helped Meier land her first head coaching job.

Summitt is in her 38th year at Tennessee and announced in August that she is battling early onset Alzheimer's disease. Her team, determined to win her a ninth national title, has adopted the motto: "Time for 9."

The game figures to be played at a breakneck pace.

"Tie your shoes tight," Meier said. "My God, there is a ton of speed on the court when these two teams match up. You know about their defense and rebounding, but they can really score in open

court.”

The Vols have four starters back from last season's 34-3 team, including Southeastern Conference preseason Player of the Year Shekinna Stricklen, a 6-2 guard/forward.

Freshman Ariel Massengale won three consecutive state titles at Bolingbrook (Ill.) High and is the point guard Tennessee has been waiting for. In fact, she started the season opener against Pepperdine, becoming just the 14th player in Summitt's tenure to start her first collegiate game.

Summitt said the Hurricanes remind her of her team.

“They're a lot like us,” she said. “This Miami team is very athletic. They have very good team speed and quickness. And they returned everyone back from last year, so I have a lot of respect for them.”

Although Tennessee beat Pepperdine by 32 points in the opener, Summitt and her staff were not satisfied with their defensive effort.

“I think our defense just has to get so much better, especially when a team like Miami comes into town,” associate head coach Holly Warlick said. “You talk about quick, they're quick on quick, and those are the things that we need to get better on — one-on-one defense and taking care of the basketball.”

Said Summitt: “We've got to start out stronger ... put the pedal to the metal and keep it there. We've got a big challenge ahead of us playing Miami on Tuesday night. They looked very polished in their opening game.

“I can tell you, we are going to learn a lot about us in that game. We have to go into the game with great preparation and focus.”

The Hurricanes rely on the backcourt senior duo of Shenise “Moe” Johnson and Riquna “Bay-Bay” Williams, both of whom are on the Wade Trophy watch list. They combined for 41.3 points per game last season. Junior forward Morgan Stroman and guard Stefanie Yderstrom have elevated their games, and Sylvia Bullock will share time with 6-6 Pitt transfer Shawnice “Pepper” Wilson in the paint.

This is the deepest UM team Meier has had since she took the job seven years ago, and she is eager to see how her team matches up against one of the nation's best.

“We're seeking information from this game, information about our team,” she said. “We will find out in November if we're ready for a game like that, and that's when you want to find that out. You don't want to find out in March that you're not prepared for a game of that caliber. This is the time to find out, when you still have time to fix things.”

## No. 7 UM women fall short vs. No. 3 Tennessee

### Miami disappointed in first big test of season, 92-76 loss to No. 3 Tennessee

In the past, Miami coach Katie Meier would have been thrilled for her Hurricanes to play Tennessee to a tie after the first half. Now she's just disappointed.

The seventh-ranked Hurricanes tied the game at 42 points just before halftime only to see the No. 3 Lady Volunteers launch a flurry of scoring to open the first half. Tennessee held off Miami's comeback effort midway through the second half to win 92-76 on Tuesday night in the State Farm Tip-Off Classic.

"We didn't schedule the game to say, 'Oh gosh, what a great opportunity,'" Meier said. "We schedule the game to come in here and play big-time basketball and figure out where we are, and we've got a ways to go."

It was the first big test of the season for two veteran teams, and the matchup lived up to its billing in the first-ever meeting for the programs. It was also a shot for Miami to prove it belongs among the top teams in the nation a year after winning a share of the Atlantic Coast Conference title and reaching the second round of the NCAA tournament.

Though the game pitted preseason all-Americans Shekinna Stricklen and Shenise Johnson against one another, the spotlight was stolen by Spani, and Meighan Simmons, who together hit 7 of 13 from 3-point range.

The game was tied 42-all at halftime before the Lady Vols (2-0) unleashed an 18-4 run to open the second half. Glory Johnson, who struggled in the first half against Miami's inside defense, hit a layup that made it 60-46 with 16:19 to go.

The Lady Vols got sloppy, committing three turnovers that helped the Hurricanes to charge back with nine unanswered points to cut the margin to seven, and with 7:31 to go, Shenise Johnson hit a jumper to cut the Lady Vols' lead to 73-68.

Miami (1-1) would get no closer. Two possessions later, Spani took an inbound pass with 10 seconds on the shot clock and launched a 3-point attempt that hit nothing but net as the buzzer sounded.

"I thought that was the turning point of the game, as we were struggling kind of to get back in it," Meier said.

A couple of minutes later, Spani rebounded a missed 3-pointer by Shenise Johnson and launched the ball across the court to Simmons, who charged to the basket for a fastbreak layup to make it 84-68. The basket capped an 11-0 run that began with Spani's trey and sent the orange-clad crowd into a frenzy.

Simmons scored 18 points off the bench, Glory Johnson finished with 16 points and nine rebounds, Stricklen added 15 and Ariel Massengale had 11 points and nine assists.

"I thought across the board, everybody contributed in certain ways," Tennessee coach Pat Summitt said. "It's just a matter of who's coming in. At any given moment, we've got enough people that somebody's going to step up."

The Tennessee coaches expected a strong rebounding effort by the Lady Vols, so they instead asked the players to focus on not turning the ball over. By halftime, Tennessee had just six turnovers but had 13 fewer rebounds than Miami.

By the end of the game, the Lady Vols had put enough of an effort on the boards to trail the Hurricanes 45-38 in rebounding, and it was Miami which was struggling to hang onto the ball. The Hurricanes turned the ball over 21 times, leading to 23 points for the Lady Vols -- 10 more points than Miami got off giveaways.

Riquna Williams, who led the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring a season ago, scored 24 points for Miami. Shenise Johnson added 17 and Morgan Stroman scored 11.

The stingy defensive play by both teams forced the ball to the hands of the outside shooters during the first half, leading four lead changes and two ties.

Miami took an early edge after scoring eight unanswered points. Williams and Stefanie Yderstorm each had a 3 while Stroman hit a pair of free throws to take an 8-2 lead, their largest margin of the first half.

A few minutes later, Tennessee went on an 8-0 run of its own, capped by a 3-pointer by Simmons off a dish by Massengale. The basket gave the Lady Vols an 18-16 lead -- their first since the opening basket. They slowly built their margin to 38-31 on a jumper in the paint by Alicia Manning with 4:52 in the first half, but Miami scored the final five points of the half to tie it at the break.

"Our confidence was high," Shenise Johnson said. "(The score) was zero-zero."

The teams launched a flurry of long shots during their streaks, and the Lady Vols hit 7 of 13 and Miami 6 of 14 from behind the arc in the first half. Tennessee finished 11 of 22 from long range, while Miami missed all nine of

its second-half 3-point shots.

The Lady Vols have now won 38 straight games at home on the court named for Summitt, dating back to a 62-54 loss to Duke on Feb. 16, 2009. They travel to Virginia on Sunday before hosting No. 1 Baylor at The Summitt on Nov. 27.

## Miami Hurricanes-Tennessee battle about to get personal

When Katie Meier shakes the hand of Tennessee legend Pat Summitt in Knoxville on Tuesday, she will be thinking about far more than the nationally-televised State Farm Tipoff Classic between the seventh-ranked Hurricanes and third-ranked Vols.

Meier will be thinking back to 2001, when Summitt helped her get her first head coaching job at Charlotte. Meier was a Tulane assistant at the time, and knew Summitt and her staff through recruiting and coaches' gatherings. It turned out that Summitt had been the graduate school roommate of Charlotte athletic director Judy Rose, so when Rose leaned on Summitt for a recommendation for the 49ers' opening, Summitt made a strong push for Meier.

Meier also will extend her hand with compassion, as Summitt faces her public battle with early onset Alzheimer's. The 59-year-old Tennessee coach, in her 38th year at the school, revealed in August that she had been diagnosed with the disease and has vowed to continue coaching and use her platform to raise awareness.

"It's personal," Meier said of coaching against Summitt for the first time. "Pat's done a lot for my career. She had a very large hand in me getting my first head coaching job. She obviously saw something in me. I sat with her the first summer after I got the Charlotte job, and she asked: 'How

does it look?' And I said, 'I feel good about it. I think I can do a good job.' She said, 'You better, 'cause I put my name on you.' I'll never forget that. Those steely eyes were there. She meant it. She was serious. And you're not going to let her down. I've felt that connection with her ever since."

Meier said she remembers the day in August when Summitt disclosed her medical condition.



“We were in a staff meeting, and I remember getting a text,” Meier said. “We got very quiet. Very solemn. We were concerned with how she’s feeling. It took watching her statement to deal with it, to see she’s a fighter, she’s prepared for this, under control, doing what she needs to do.

“You think about lifting her up, and it’s like, OK, she lifts you up. She’s going to get everyone through it. The coaching community is very struck by it, and really concerned, and nobody could have handled it as perfectly as she has.”

### Staying sharp

In order to keep her cognitive skills sharp, Summitt does 12 brain teasers on her iPad every morning over breakfast. Then, she heads to the office. Although she has given up some of the peripheral parts of her job, she remains fully engaged with the team and practices.

“That’s what I want to talk about — basketball, not dementia,” Summitt said. “I don’t want a pity party, because it is what it is.”

LSU coach Nikki Caldwell, a former Vols player and assistant, said her perception of Summitt hasn’t changed with the news.

“I see her as ‘Coach,’ ” Caldwell said. “I don’t see her any different than that. I see her as somebody who is still hungry as a teacher for the game, someone who still loves the game, someone who is still passionate about preparing her team for greatness. You’re going to literally have to put Coach in a wheelchair and get her out of there. ... Only she’ll know when it’s time.”

Summitt reiterated on a conference call Thursday what she has been saying since August. Her mind is on basketball as much as it can be.

“Things haven’t changed,” Summitt said. “I love being in practice. I love our team. I love motivating every day. This senior group has pulled together. I’m excited about the season.”

### Vols a favorite

The Vols will be the sentimental favorite this season, as they try to win a ninth national title for their coach. Meier said although she hopes to beat Summitt on Tuesday, she will root for Tennessee the rest of the season.

Asked what Summitt has meant to the sport, Meier paused and said: “I could spend two hours on that. It’s one thing to be the best at your profession. And she is obviously, obviously the best. When Pat wins, women’s basketball is happy. You know she’s special because when Tennessee wins, you’re happy for them. Even though it’s a sickening amount of time that they win, you say, ‘That’s good for women’s basketball.’”

Summitt’s generosity is what stands out, Meier said.

“Pat and her staff have been so helpful to so many of us,” she said. “They’re cheering for you, supporting you. If you ask, ‘Can I come to a practice and see how you work?’ they let you. They’re all about women’s basketball, especially coach Summitt. I am lucky enough to have had exposure to them and how they operate. I hope everyone in our profession appreciates what that program means to our sport.”

Call it a 2-for-1 game. The University of Miami women's basketball team, ranked No. 7 in the nation, pretty much scored two points for every point its opponent, Texas-Pan American, scored en route to a season-opening 83-37 victory Friday at the BankUnited Center on UM's campus.

Cause for celebration? Not really.

A sloppy first half by UM had coach Katie Meier ranting and raving at her players at halftime.

Then, during the scolding, Meier yelled at them, "You're playing as bad as my haircut. I was yelling with everything coming out of my mouth and then that comes out," Meier said. The players' reaction was pure silence.

Finally, Meier told them, "You can laugh — that was funny."

The tension was broken and Miami came back to play a much smoother, efficient second half.

Friday was one of those early season games where your opponent is little-known, outmanned and usually has a hyphen in its name.

Texas-Pan American, even though being scrappy, fit the bill on all accounts. Make no doubt about it, though, there's no hyphen in the name of Miami's next opponent, and instead of being little-known, the next opponent is one of the best-known programs in women's college basketball history — Tennessee. The 6 p.m. game on Tuesday in Knoxville will be nationally televised on ESPN2.

Meier was asked if UM could beat Tennessee if the Canes played like they did Friday.

Meier quickly answered: "No."

Against Pan American's Broncs, Miami had four players in double figures, led by Shenise Johnson with 20 points. Riquna Williams added 16, and

Meier said the easy victory over Texas-Pan Am served a valuable purpose.

“It’s just fantastic to have struggled in this sort of game and then have Tennessee looming. I will have their attention in practice.”

Meier also called the early season showdown with Tennessee “perfect.”

“When you coach in this profession, you want an opportunity to be tested,” she said. “To be challenged. I want to be exposed. I’m fine with it. What are we missing here at Miami? We can go into that game and figure out what we have to work on for the rest of the season.”

## Miami Hurricanes women get tuneup in exhibition rout over Barry

If Monday night's exhibition is any indication, opponents of the seventh-ranked University of Miami women's basketball team better put in some extra wind sprints. Hurricanes coach Katie Meier emptied her bench early, and UM still ran away (literally) with a 96-44 win over Barry University.

The Hurricanes played fast and furious from the start and raced to a 35-4 lead in the first 11 minutes on 73 percent shooting, while the Buccaneers missed 15 of their first 17 shots — largely because of UM's relentless defense. It was clear early on that it would be a long night for the Division II Bucs.

UM led 51-15 at halftime, and 12 of the 13 women on the roster had scored by that point. The Canes shot 67.9 percent from the field in the first half and an eye-popping 75 percent from three-point range (6 of 9). The Buccaneers shot 15.6 percent from the field.

"It was our first time out, we were working a bunch of players, and you don't often see those great offensive percentages in that situation," Meier said. "It's a real testament to how focused this team is and how much they care about each other. They're raising the bar."

Asked what the game revealed about the Hurricanes, senior guard Riquana Williams smiled and said: "It's gonna be a fun season."

Williams and Shenise Johnson, the other half of the Hurricanes' dynamic backcourt duo, combined for 41.3 points per game last season. Monday night, they played 21 minutes apiece and combined for 26 points, 12 assists.

Pepper Wilson, a 6-6 junior transfer from Pitt, made her much-anticipated debut. She finished with 10 points and nine rebounds.

Barry coach Bill Sullivan, who spent 15 years as the Coral Gables High boys' coach, admitted he had reservations about bringing his team to play the reigning Atlantic Coast Conference champs.

"I was debating whether it was a wise choice," he said. "We were intimidated and shell-shocked the first half. Their height, athleticism and experience made it a difficult matchup. But it was good for us. I just hope Coach Meier got something out of the game. I don't know how much we helped them, but I look forward to following them this year. I'm a big Miami fan."

Yvonne Houston, a senior guard from Miami Krop High, scored 12 for Barry. Shanna Suttington led the Bucs with 16.

Bring on the national rankings. Bring on the preseason awards. Bring on Tennessee and the ESPN cameras.

This is exactly what University of Miami women's basketball coach Katie Meier and her seventh-ranked Hurricanes have been craving, and they feel perfectly comfortable sitting among the nation's elite programs.

Every player is back from last season's 28-5 team, including dynamic senior duo Riquna "Bay-Bay" Williams and Shenise "Moe" Johnson, a preseason All-American and ACC Conference Player of the Year. They combined for 41.3 points per game last season.

As if that weren't enough to excite Meier, 6-6 Pitt transfer Shawnice "Pepper" Wilson, a junior, will provide the one piece that was missing last year — a big, reliable player in the paint.

"We gave up a double-double to a post player off the bench against Oklahoma, Joanna McFarland, in the NCAA second round and that's why we lost," Meier said.

"That would not have happened if Pepper was in the game. She is in all senses of the word an anchor. She has sat out far too long and is very serious and very driven, and on a tremendous mission to prove she came to the right place."

In addition to Johnson, Williams and Wilson, the Hurricanes will rely on veterans Morgan Stroman, Stefanie Yderstrom and Krystal Saunders, who have been playing “out of their minds” in practice, Meier said. Rangy freshman Suriya McGuire also has impressed, and the coach expects her to be a fan favorite.

### Talented roster

Meier, a 2010-11 AP Coach of the Year, said the national exposure and high expectations haven’t changed her approach, except that she has raised the recruiting bar and will have more game-day decisions because she has top talent from the top to bottom of her roster.

“Do I make the right rotations, keep people in their rhythm, does the hot shooter stay in or do I make a mistake and oversub,” Meier said. “Those are the things I’ve got to deal with. Depth creates another set of issues.”

But she relishes the challenge, and so do her players. She said that “extra carrot” of being a Top 10 team motivates them.

“They’re aware of it, and it’s just a responsibility that comes with it,” she said. “We don’t want to show up on any court and lay an egg. Not that we did before, but every time we put a uniform on now, AP is going to be there. I don’t think that’s a negative. We are ready for it.”

“Last year was the hunger year, chip on shoulder and proving yourself, but we’re still hungry because we upped the schedule. We can’t rest because we’ve added another level of challenge.”

The Hurricanes play an exhibition Monday night against Barry University and open the regular season 1 p.m. Friday in a Veteran’s Day matchup against Texas-Pan American. Meier is hoping for a big crowd because school is out and it’s a holiday.

### Big game

Then, on Nov. 15, they travel to Tennessee to face the No. 2 Lady Vols in a nationally-televised game sure to get a lot of attention. Legendary coach Pat Summitt is battling early-onset dementia, and determined to continue winning games. Summitt helped Meier land her first head-coaching job at Charlotte, so the game will have personal meaning for her.

### Major turnaround

There were times, in her first few years at UM, when Meier wondered whether she would ever reach this point. But the Hurricanes went from worst-to-first in the ACC last year, and Meier was rewarded with a five-year contract extension through 2016.

“I don’t think it’s any shock to say, you gotta have some grit to you to do well at Miami,” Meier said.

“You have to have a really strong sense of self, an absolutely clear vision. And you have to be very bold. When you do all that is required of you and you start feeling momentum turn in your favor, you have complete ownership and that’s how I feel right now.”

# Miami picked to win 1st ACC women's hoops title

Times are changing in Atlantic Coast Conference women's basketball; it's out with the old and in with the new.

The favorite to win the ACC championship is Miami, the best preseason projection for the Hurricanes since they joined the league in 2004. The preseason all-league team announced Tuesday includes players from Miami, Maryland and Florida State - but not bluebloods Duke or North Carolina.

"It just shows that this is a great conference, that the sport is always evolving," said Miami guard Shenise Johnson, the league's preseason player of the year.

"It's about time," she added. "You need new faces, new teams, different colleges. You don't want the same people winning all the time, so it's actually good that we have different people around."

The Hurricanes received 30 of a possible 40 first-place votes by the league's panel of school representatives and media members. Two-time reigning ACC tournament champion Duke was picked to finish second and received the other 10 first-place votes.

It's the first time since 1995 - and only the fourth time since the league began preseason balloting in 1991 - that a school other than Duke, North Carolina or Maryland was the preseason pick to win the league. And it represents a remarkable turnaround for a Miami senior class that finished tied for 10th in the ACC when they were both freshmen and sophomores.

"They deserve that spot," North Carolina State coach Kellie Harper said. "As far as preseason polls are concerned, that's probably as accurate as you can get it."

It's certainly hard to argue with the Hurricanes' resume.

Reigning national coach of the year Katie Meier returns all five starters - and, for that matter, the entire team - after Miami went 28-5 last season and shared the ACC regular-season title with Duke before suffering a pair of surprising postseason losses. The Hurricanes were knocked out in the semifinals of the ACC tournament by North Carolina before Oklahoma eliminated them in the second round of the NCAA tournament.

"It's been a climb. It's been really arduous and it's been difficult," Meier said. "It's been stressful and scrappy, and everything that you think it has been. It has not been easy. It's not easy now, either. That same mentality, that same effort, that same scrappiness - if I see any of that missing, we're going to have a problem, but so far, I don't see any of that missing."

Maryland was picked to finish third, followed by Florida State, Georgia Tech, North Carolina, N.C. State, Virginia, Boston College, Wake Forest, Clemson and Virginia Tech.

Johnson, the reigning ACC player of the year after averaging 19.6 points last season, could become the 12th three-time all-ACC first-team selection and first since 2008. She was joined on the preseason all-conference team by teammate Riquana Williams. They were joined by Maryland's Lynetta Kizer and Alyssa Thomas, and Florida State's Cierra Bravard.

"I think it kind of shows that anything is possible. I think where we are ... that's OK," Bravard said. "It just shows how tough and how competitive it's going to be this year."

The preseason projections aren't only about who's returning - but who's not around anymore at the league's traditional powers.

Duke lost do-it-all-guard Jasmine Thomas, who led the Blue Devils to four straight ACC championship games and victories in the last two. The Tar Heels must replace three mainstays over the past four years - Jessica Breland, Cetera DeGraffenreid and Italee Lucas - with a handful of first-year players.

North Carolina also will be without two key players until at least mid-December - shot-blocking center Waltiea Rolle is pregnant and is due Nov. 3, and guard Tierra Ruffin-Pratt had shoulder surgery in July. Coach Sylvia Hatchell said it's possible that either or both could be redshirted.

"We have a lot of uncertainties, I guess you could say," coach Sylvia Hatchell said, adding that "those young kids have just got to have some time. But it's going to be fun, because ... we're going to be better than people think we're going to be, especially as we move along, get people back out there and get experience under our belts."

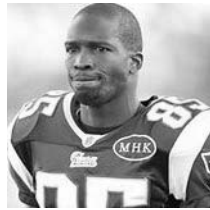

## UM women's victory comes at painful expense

The seventh-ranked University of Miami's women's basketball team won a game Sunday, but it was not without some pain — particularly for star guard Riquana Williams.

With 14:53 left in the second half of UM's 68-47 victory over Clemson at the BankUnited Center, Williams collided with teammate Michelle Woods and both went to the court hard and remained down sprawled on their backs.

Woods got up relatively quickly but Williams remained prone for almost three minutes while being attended to by a doctor.

When Williams finally was helped to her feet she made her way ever-so-slowly and unsteadily off the court with support from others, and then immediately went into the locker room for more treatment and observation of a head and neck injury.

"We had three doctors in the training room just now, so we'll know more," Canes coach Katie Meier said. "But they're concerned, so we'll see. We're just waiting to hear. They are taking some precautionary looks at her — that's anytime it's a

head and neck."

Until the injury, it should have been a night for Williams who has averaged 15.6 points this season — to celebrate. With 11:11 left in the first half, Williams hit a three-pointer to become only the fifth player in UM history to score 2,000 or more points. She finished Sunday's game with 15 points before exiting with the injury.

UM said Williams was walking around following the game, but would not say whether she would be taken to a hospital for further observation and possible tests.

UM (20-3, 9-1 in the Atlantic Coast Conference) had a comfortable margin throughout against

Clemson (6-15, 2-8) and was led by Shenise Johnson, who had 19 points and 15 rebounds before 1,620 fans.

"I think one of my favorite things about Shenise Johnson is she had 19 and 15 and she mentions she missed a couple of layups," Meier said. "It's so fun coaching her with how competitive she is and how she challenges herself.

"The one consistent thing about us, and will continue to be, is Shenise Johnson."

Johnson was asked how she, as a 5-11 guard, can manage to pull down a team-leading 15 rebounds.

"I enjoy rebounding," she said with a laugh, holding her arms up and flexing. "I try to watch the flight of the ball and look at where it's going before I go running to get it. I want the ball, and whoever wants it will get it."

Miami did not play at its best, but Meier summed up, "A 21-point victory against an ACC team — I'll take it."

Next up for Miami, which has won 37 home games in a row, is a key conference game against North Carolina at 7 p.m. Wednesday in the BankUnited Center.

The No. 23 Tar Heels (17-5, 7-2), who beat the Canes 65-63 earlier in the season, have won five in a row.

"We'll be prepared no matter what," Johnson promised.
