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Bruce Hale

HEAD COACH

Bruce Hale launches his eighth year as head basketball coach at the University of Miami with every expectation of giving Miami fans another exciting team, capable of playing with the nation's best.

Basketball has become a major sport at Miami . . . the Hurricanes are competing against major cage powers as the result of the impetus the personable UM coach has given the game.

Hale is a believer in a powerful offense. His 1958-59 team led the nation in scoring . . . his Hurricanes finished runnerup to Ohio State two years ago . . . they wound up among the top 10 scoring teams in America last season.

In seven seasons, Hale's teams have won 111 games while losing 62. Only his first campaign was a losing one. In 1960, his team went to the NCAA tournament; last year it went to the NIT in New York. His Hurricanes captured undisputed possession of the Florida Intercollegiate crown four times, and tied for the title once.

Hale played his college basketball for Santa Clara where he was graduated in 1941. Later, he played on the famed Five-By-Five team at Miami Beach as an Air Force captain during World War II and also coached the Wright Air Field Base to the service championship. In the next 10 years, he played professional basketball, being on the All-World team in 1945. He coached the Chicago American Gears to the pro championship in 1946 and later coached the Indianapolis professional team.

Outlook

DICK HICKOX, All-American guard; Ron Godfrey and Bruce Applegate, forwards, and Harry Manushaw, center, have graduated after being three-year starters. They carried Miami to 61 wins against 18 losses as Miami twice wound up in national tournaments.

Julie Cohen, a brilliant playmaker and good scorer from the guard spot is the lone starting returnee. However, three juniors saw a lot of action last year and Coach Bruce Hale believes one of his new men, Lou Alix, is a natural. Cohen is rated a player of All-America calibre.

Alix, 6 feet 9, is a rugged performer under the boards. He is one of the most aggressive players in UM history and can hold up his end of the scoring. He's slated for a forward job.

Mike McCoy, 7 foot 1 junior, is slated to start at center and has all the equipment needed to score and to rule the backboards. Big Mike wasn't aggressive enough as a sophomore but seems to have found the spark to make him an outstanding player this year.

Lee Woods, 6 feet 7, rounds out Miami's towering front line. He lettered last season, being capable at rebounds and scoring. He should be able to step up his performance considerably this year, now that he has a campaign of experience under his belt.

Although he was in the shadow of Dick Hickox last winter, Kenny Allen, a six footer, shows flashes of fine basketball. A leg injury kept him out of half the campaign but he has the inside track for the open guard spot on the 1961-62 aggregation.

Returning after a year's absence is Jack Spisak, 6 foot 4 forward. Spisak averaged 4.3 points a game and had a .547 field goal shooting mark as a sophomore but was sidelined all last season because of a broken arm. He could conceivably earn a starting role if it becomes necessary to do some juggling in the front line. He looms as the No. 1 forward relief.

Charles Holiber, 6 foot 4 sophomore, and Larry Heffer, 6 foot 4 senior, give depth at forward. Each is aggressive and each has shown scoring ability.

Sophomore Greg Meyer, 6 feet 10, could be a top notch player once he gains polish. He could develop rapidly and if that did take place, the Hurricanes would have plenty of depth and size up front.

One senior and two juniors fill out the guard ranks. The Stavreti brothers, Carl and Chris, and Bruce Shapiro are lettermen. Carl Stavreti, the highest scoring man of the three, is giving Allen a hard fight for the open guard spot. His brother Chris has a little more experience but Carl is a shade better in scoring. Shapiro, 5 feet 7, just doesn't have the size to see much service.

While Coach Hale plans to stick to his basic fast-breaking attack, this team will be able to have more power close in on offense and certainly, with its great height, looms strong defensively.

Varsity Player Sketches

Forwards

LEE WOODS, 6 feet 7, 200 pounds, 24 years old, junior, Arts and Science . . . Played for Coach Merle Crawford at Kansas City, Mo., and then entered the U.S. Navy for three years. Participated in every game last year and his .544 shooting percentage from the field indicated that he can be counted on heavily on the offense. Woods did not shoot often last season, preferring to feed to the senior veterans but he could come into his own during the 1961-62 campaign. He is extremely capable under the boards. An excellent team man, Lee should be a real balance wheel up front. His 14.9 point scoring average as a freshman regular is closer to a measure of his ability than his 4.2 as a sophomore reserve. His best efforts last year were 11 point performances against Army in the "Hurricane Classic" and Florida at Gainesville. He grabbed 15 rebounds in a road game against Rollins.

LOU ALIX, 6 feet 9, 210 pounds, 21 years old, sophomore, Physical Education . . . Starred at David Prouty in Spencer, Mass., playing for Coach Bernard Prusacyck. Alix is big, rugged and able. He has tremendous potentiality and is well on his way to utilizing it. He is a one time All-America high school star who can do just about anything needed on the basketball court. Although Lou is capable of playing center in fine style, he will be a forward for UM. Alix is a first rate point-maker and a devastating performer under the boards where his size and aggressiveness count. He moves well and can get into the air. Lou has that flaming desire to excel, which marks the great athlete.

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JACK SPISAK, 6 feet 4, 190 pounds, 21 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . Jack played for Miami Edison when Red Bogart was coaching there. After lettering as a sophomore reserve at UM in 1959-60, Spisak was counted on heavily to see lots of action at forward last season but had to sit out the entire campaign due to a broken arm sustained prior to the opening game. Jack was an effective close-in jump shot and has one of the best shooting eyes on the squad. He is an excellent rebounder as he jumps well and has good co-ordination. As a sophomore, his best efforts were 12 points against Jacksonville and eight rebounds against Florida Southern.

LARRY HEFFER, 6 feet 4, 205 pounds, 20 years old, senior in Education . . . His high school playing was for Coach Bill Bushnell at John Marshall in Rochester, N. Y. Larry came to Miami as a rather awkward lad who averaged 8.9 points a game for the 1958-59 freshman team. He wasn't quite able to make the varsity squad, but after two years in intramural competition he has developed into a reliable all-around performer and so, as a senior, rejoins the Hurricane varsity squad. Larry is a much improved point-maker, performs well under the boards and Coach Bruce Hale believes he will be valuable as a depth man.

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CHARLES HOLIBER, 6 feet 4, 215 pounds, 18 years old, sophomore in Business Administration . . . Holiber did his high school playing at Samuel Tilden in Brooklyn, N. Y., under Coach Jerry Gold. He's a rugged athlete who does a good job

of getting the ball in those under-the-goal melees and isn't pushed around by anyone, no matter what the size. He's a good competitor, a capable shooter and a cager who should develop into a good all-around player. Charlie needs more experience, however, and this season should find him picking up spot assignments for the most part.

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Centers

MIKE MCCOY, 7 feet 1, 230 pounds, 21 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . His high school coach at South Side in Ft. Wayne, Indiana, was Don Reichert. One of the tallest collegiate basketball players in the country today, Mike served his apprenticeship as a sophomore last season, starting a number of games. He turned in fine performances in several games, but displayed sophomore erraticness in some others. Coach Hale looks to Mike as a much improved player this year. With some newly acquired aggressiveness, he's expected to come into his own. He has real potential in scoring and of course his size gives him a great advantage in snaring rebounds. McCoy was third high on the team in rebounds last season, though playing part time. He actually outscored Harry Manushaw, first string center. Mike had games of 21 points against Rollins and 19 in a clutch performance against Florida State in Tallahassee. His two best rebounding performances were in two FSU games—13 at Tallahassee and 14 at Miami.

GREG MEYER, 6 feet 10, 215 pounds, 20 years old, sophomore, Engineering . . . At Governor Academy, Peoria, Illinois, Meyer was coached by Dave Williams. Greg is still in the process of acquiring co-ordination and hasn't yet been able to put all of his talents to good use. He has the size and the desire and could develop into an excellent basketball player. Meyer came along steadily in his freshman season at Miami and earned a berth on the 1961-62 varsity squad by his late-season frosh performance. He has improved sharply since moving up to the big team and may be a lot of help in the upcoming campaign.

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Guards

JULIE COHEN, 6 feet, 180 pounds, 22 years old, senior, Physical Education . . . Al Bedain coached him at Erasmus High, Brooklyn, N. Y., where he made high school All-America. Julie was the most improved player on the squad last winter and appears headed for a great year — he could make All-America. No less than brilliant as a ball handler, he has speed, dribbling and faking ability, plus shooting skill. With a year of experience behind him, Cohen made complete use of these skills last season and became the team's quarterback. He scored 22 points against Miami of Ohio to give the Hurricanes a hard-earned win, he equalled his sophomore year single game high in scoring, he hit 20 or more points in four other games, and picked off 11 rebounds against Morehead to equal his sophomore year high against Brigham Young. Julie is the man around whom Coach Bruce Hale is building his 1961-62 Miami cage aggregation. Last summer, Julie played in Jerusalem in the U.S. Maccabiah games.

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KEN ALLEN, 6 feet, 175 pounds, 21 years old, junior, Business

Administration . . . Played for Red Bogart at Miami Edison. Ken was high scorer for the frosh in 1958-59 with a 7.5 average and showed last year that his jump shot has lost none of its sting. However, he was sidelined more than half the 1960-61 season with a leg injury and was able to do little more than prove that he's an excellent prospect. Ken has lots of basketball sense, possesses speed and is an inspirational type player. Coach Hale rates Allen one of the finest cagers to come out of Florida high school play. He made All-City and All-State tournament teams during his high school play.

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CHRIS STAVRETI, 6 feet, 175 pounds, 22 years old, senior, Physical Education . . . Played for Don Reichert at South Side in Ft. Wayne, Indiana. Stavreti won two varsity letters at Miami and gives the team reliable depth at guard. Chris is fast, handles the ball well and if he regains his sophomore year accuracy, will see a lot of action. He was an All-City performer back in high school. Chris' high scoring game for the Hurricanes dates back to his sophomore year when he tallied 17 points against Florida Southern college. That was also a higher point total than he ever had recorded in high school or as a yearling. His forte is ball handling and feeding to teammates.

The Opposition

Jacksonville University, Jacksonville, Fla.

Dec. 2 at Miami Beach Auditorium; Jan. 10 at Jacksonville. Coach, Richard Kendall. One year record—on 12, lost 11. 1961 record—on 12, lost 11. Scored 1972 points, opp. 1881. 1961 vs. Miami—Miami won 93-84 and 96-80. All-Time series—Miami leads 7 to 1 in games and 693-660 in points.

The Dolphins lost three starters but in Roger Strickland, 6'5", Jacksonville has its first authentic All-America threat. Hoby Williams, 6'8", and Stave Gay, 6'7", freshmen, provide height.

Morehead State College, Morehead, Ky.

Dec. 4 at Morehead, Ky. Coach, Bob Laughlin. Eight year record—won 116, lost 83. 1961 record—won 19, lost 12. Scored 2482 points, opp. 2433. 1961 vs. Miami—Miami won, 85-70. All-Time series—Miami leads 3 to 1 in games and 327 to 313 in points.

The Ohio Valley Conference champions retain 11 of last year's top 13 men. Included are four starters, headed by high scoring Granville Williams who averaged 22.7 last year, Ed Noe, 6'8½", and Norman Pokley, 6'9".

University of Louisville, Louisville, Ky.

Dec. 6 at Louisville, Ky. Coach, Bernard Hickman. Seventeen year record — won 345, lost 126. 1961 record—won 21, lost 8. Scored 2232 points, opp. 1920. 1961 vs. Miami—Miami won 71-69. All-Time series—Louisville leads 3-1 in games and 315 to 265 in points.

Bud Olsen, 6'8", center, is only returning starter. He's an All-America threat. Jodie Frazier who started many games at guard is also back. Ron Hawley, 6'4", and Ron Rooks, 6'1", are outstanding sophomores.

Murray State College, Murray, Ky.

Dec. 8 at Murray, Ky. Coach, Hal Luther. Seven year record—won 80, lost 76. 1961 record—won 13, lost 10. Scored 1818 points, opp. 1697. Did not play Miami in 1961. All-Time series—each has won once.

Miami leads in points, 157-149. Ron Green, 6'3" guard, is lone returnee. Three squad veterans, topped by 6'7" Len Mahoney, and four sophs, led by 6'7" Stan Walker may have to give way to four talented transfers.

Florida Southern College, Lakeland, Fla.

Dec. 14 at Miami Beach Convention Hall; Feb. 3 at Lakeland. Coach, Tom Green. Eleven year record—won 142, lost 111. 1961 record—won 8, lost 16. Scored 1740 points, opp. 1865. 1961 vs. Miami—Miami won 87-54 and 92-80. All-Time series—Miami leads 43-7 in games and 3066-2533 in points.

Three veterans, plus 6'6" Jerry Eaton and 6'8" Len Wozniak, who divide the center spot, return. Ricky Duncan, junior college All-America transfer, may give the club the back court man it needs. Team much improved.

University of Florida, Gainesville, Fla.

Dec. 16 at Miami Beach Convention Hall; Jan. 11 at Gainesville. Coach, Norman Sloan. Nine year record—won 142, lost 79. 1961 record—won 15, lost 11. Scored 1830 points, opp. 1846. 1961 vs. Miami—lost 93-74 and won 81-73. All-Time series—Florida leads 28 to 15 in games and 2792 to 2471 in points.

Lou Merchant, unanimous all SEC guard, heads four returning lettermen. The squad has added two junior college aces—Tom Barbee and Jim Jarrett but could stand more height. Cliff Luyk, 6'7" center, is the big man.

University of Minnesota, Minneapolis, Minn.

Dec. 28-29, Hurricane Classic at Miami Beach Auditorium. Coach, John Kundla. Two year record—won 22, lost 26. 1961 record—won 10, lost 13. Scored 1455 points, opp. 1506. Has never met Miami in basketball. The Gophers, fifth in the Big Ten last year, will be bolstered by the addition of Ray Cronk, brilliant 6'7" forward from 1959, who was ineligible last year. Tom McGrann, 6'7" center and Norm Grow, 6'5" forward, return.

Miami University, Oxford, Ohio

Dec. 28-29, Hurricane Classic at Miami Beach Auditorium. Coach, Richard Shrider. Four year record—won 52, lost 48. 1961 record—on 12, lost 12. Scored 1843 points, opp. 1785. 1961 vs. Miami Hurricanes—Hurricanes won 102-100. All-Time series—Miami (O.) leads in wins 3-2 and in points, 400-389.

Two regulars and two lettermen reserves return. Sophomore Trip Bosart, 6'6", and Bob Moon, half inch shorter, may be starters. They and 6'6" Dave Mack are tallest on squad.

Temple University, Philadelphia, Pa.

Dec. 28-29, Hurricane Classic at Miami Beach Auditorium. Coach, Larry Litwack. Nine year record—won 159, lost 84. 1961 record—won 20, lost 8. Scored 2047 points, opp. 1781. Has never played Miami. Although entire 1960-61 squad is back, several sophomores are bidding for starting berths on this team which went to the NIT semi-finals. Bruce Drysdale, 21.3, is top scorer.

University of Rhode Island, Kingston, R. I.

Jan. 3 at Miami Beach Auditorium. Coach, Ernest A. Calverley. Four year record—won 42, lost 52. 1961 record—won 18, lost 9. Scored 2084 points, opp. 1906. Rhode Island never has met Miami in basketball. Only one starter is lost from team which won Yankee conference flag for first time in 10 years last season. Sophomores Daniel Nilson, 6'8", and Bruce Bumpus, 6'6", may supply height.

Oklahoma City University, Oklahoma City, Okla.

Jan. 6 at Miami Beach Auditorium. Coach, A. E. Lemons. Six year record—won 98, lost 60. 1961 record—won 14, lost 12. Scored 2000 points, opp. 1905. Did not play Miami in 1961. All-Time series—Miami leads 1-0 in games, 83-66 in points. Two starters are back with two 1961 reserves and sophomore sensation, Bud Kopfer, 6'5½", rounding out a team expected to be somewhat stronger than the 1961 outfit. Bill Johnson, 6'9", is big man.

Florida State University, Tallahassee, Fla.

Jan. 13 at Tallahassee; Feb. 24 at Miami Beach Convention Hall. Coach, J. K. Kennedy. Thirteen year record—won 162, lost 155. 1961 record—won 14, lost 10. Jerry Greenspan, leading scorer and rebounder until he was hurt in mid-season, leads good all-around squad.

LaSalle College, Philadelphia, Pa.

Jan. 25 at Miami Beach Auditorium. Coach, Don Moore. Thirteen year record—won 238, lost 90. 1961 record—won 15, lost 7. Scored 1648 points, opp. 1522. 1961 vs. UM—LaSalle won 88-74. 1961 vs. UM—LaSalle won 88-74. All-Time series—LaSalle leads 2-1 in games and 258-235 in points. The Explorers lost two starters, retain four lettermen. Sophomores bring height lacking last season, with 6'5" Frank Corace rated best of newcomers. Bob McAteer, guard, and 6'4" Bill Rafferty, top veterans.

University of Tampa, Tampa, Fla.

Jan. 30 at Tampa; Feb. 17 at Miami Beach Auditorium. Coach, Bob Lavoy. Three year record—won 27, lost 57. 1961 record—won 11, lost 17. Coach Lavoy retains his top men, so Tampa should be a real toughie this year. Several frosh will help out considerably as the Spartans seek to continue on from a late 1961 rush.

Rollins lost heavily through graduation which took All-League Dick Bishop. Whatever help is coming for the Tars must come from newly enrolled freshmen. The club has suffered from lack of height.

Stetson University, DeLand, Fla.

Scored 2104 points, opp. 1845. 1961 vs. Miami—Stetson won 76-68, lost 91-84. All-Time series—Miami leads 27-26 in games and 3197 to 3096 in points. The Hatters, always tough for Miami, retains six lettermen. They may find the tall man they need in 6'7" Lamar Deaver or 6'6" Johnny Poole. Joel Hancock and Dalton Epting are tops among veterans.

University of Houston, Houston, Texas

University of Tulsa, Tulsa, Okla.

The Oklahoma Hurricanes lost two starters but two sophomores, Neil Tebbenkamp and Ray Heath, need only experience to make them top notch performers—and they'll have experience by the time they come to Miami.

THREE RUGGED TRIPS

Three rugged road trips are on the 1961-62 schedule. In December, Miami plays at Morehead, Louisville and Murray State in Kentucky during a five-night period, while in mid-January, Jacksonville, Florida and Florida State will be played on a four-day road trip. The last journey, at the end of January and start of February, sends Miami against Tampa, Rollins, Stetson and Florida Southern during a five-day period.

HURRICANE BASKETBALL CLASSIC

Miami University of Oxford, Ohio, winner of the first Hurricane Basketball Classic in overtime against host University of Miami Hurricanes in 1958, returns for another try at the title in the fourth annual Hurricane Classic, December 28 and 29. Making their first appearances in the tournament will be University of Minnesota and Temple University.

Temple probably will go into this year's tournament the favorite as the Owls, who had a 20-8 record last year and went into the second round of the NIT, have their entire 1960-61 squad available.

Miami of Ohio lost four lettermen, retains four and has good sophomore strength, but may have trouble against tall teams as none of the Redskins go above 6 feet 6.

Minnesota's Gophers tied for third in the Big Ten in 1960 and fourth last year. Three starters are back along with good reserves and some top sophomore prospects. The Gophers are a bit taller than the Redskins but again may have trouble against really tall foes.

This year's tournament will be in the Miami Beach Auditorium. First round games December 28 will be at 7:45 p.m. and 9:30 p.m. with the finals, plus the clash for third place slated the following night.

The Hurricane Classic all-star team last year included Sager of Army and Foley of Holy Cross at forward, Fisher of Tennessee at center, and Hickox of Miami and Shea of Holy Cross at guards. Hickox was the tournament's most valuable player two years in a row. He missed the honor as a sophomore by one vote.

The all-star team two campaigns ago had Godfrey of Miami as one forward with Miller and Earnest of Brigham Young tied for the other spot. Thobe of Xavier was center with Miami's Hickox garnering one guard spot and Castelle and Irvin of Xavier tied for the other. Hickox was unanimous choice as most valuable.

Miami holds the record for most points in one game, 110 vs Brigham Young, and the most field goals, 41, and free throws, 28, in the same game. The Hurricane two-game scoring total of 197 is the highest for the tournament.

Hickox set the one-game scoring record of 34 points against Brigham Young and his 60 for the tournament is another high. His 12 field goals in one game and 27 in two are tournament marks. Godfrey holds the one-game free throw mark with eight, while Cohen's 14 is a tournament record for two games. Manushaw has made most rebounds for the tournament, 30, but Godfrey's 22 is high for a single game.

Miami has captured the Hurricanes Classic two years in a row. Last year, the Hurricanes won by comfortable margins over Army and Holy Cross, while Tennessee trounced Army for third place. Two years ago, Coach Hale's UM quintet soundly trounced Brigham Young and Xavier to cop the title, with Brigham Young salvaging third place over Florida. In the 1958 tournament, Miami of Ohio whipped the Hurricanes in the title game, as New York University trimmed Tulane for third place.

FEW CLOSE GAMES

Only five Hurricane basketball games were decided by five points or less last year. The Hurricanes suffered their first loss early in the season to Santa Clara by one point, lost their NIT game to St. Louis by two to end their season. Miami turned back Louisville and Florida State by two point margins, and finished four points ahead of Loyola of New Orleans.

By hitting on .459 per cent of their field goal attempts, they finished ninth in the United States in this phase of the statistics.

Miami's high scoring last season was remarkable in that the team played two of the nation's top ranking defensive teams—Santa Clara, which finished first in defense nationally, and San Francisco, which ranked third.

Santa Clara held its rivals to an average of 48.7 points a game but Miami tallied 65, while San Francisco, which limited its opponents to an average of 51.4 per game, yielded 68 to the Hurricanes.

TWO HOME COURTS

University of Miami's basketball team plays its home games at Miami Beach Auditorium with about a 3,600 seating capacity and also in the Miami Beach Convention Hall where 6,800 can be handled.
