After leading Miami to the 2013 NCAA Sweet 16 and winning the school's first ACC regular season and tournament championships, **Jim Larrañaga** was honored as the AP, Naismith, USBWA Henry Iba, Adolph Rupp Cup and ACC Coach of the Year. The Bronx, N.Y., native helped Miami to a No. 2 national ranking by both the AP and USA TODAY, and a No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament.



THE GAME

No. 15 Miami hosts Savannah State on Dec. 8 at 7 p.m. in the BankUnited Center, in the fourth of five-straight home games for the Hurricanes.

THE SERIES

Miami is 4-0 in the all-time series against Savannah State, which dates back to the 1988-89 season. The Canes are 3-0 against the Tigers at home and 1-0 on the road. Miami won the last matchup with Savannah State, defeating the Tigers, 68-51, on Dec. 19, 2013 in Georgia.

LARRAÑAGA BY THE NUMBERS

5 - Coach Jim Larrañaga is one of five ACC coaches with a Final Four appearance to his credit. In 2006, Larrañaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the NCAA Final Four in 27 years.

7 - Larrañaga is no stranger to the ACC. In his seven seasons as an assistant coach at Virginia, the Cavaliers participated in the NCAA Final Four in 1981 and 1984, won three ACC Championships and finished in the Top 5 of the AP rankings.

14 - Larrañaga has made 14 postseason appearances in the past 24 years, including six NCAA tournaments.

31 - Larrañaga is in his 31st year as a head coach and has successfully transitioned three institutions into successful programs: Miami, Bowling Green and George Mason.

500 - Coach L is one of five ACC coaches with 500 or more wins.

LARRAÑAGA - WHY MIAMI?

Along with returning to the best basketball conference in the country, Coach L had a few personal reasons for accepting the head coaching job at Miami. Coach's grandfather was from Cuba, where he produced the Larrañaga [lare-en-YAH-ga] cigar. Coach's father was raised in Key West before moving to The Bronx, N.Y., getting married and raising six children. Coach L was raised in The Bronx, but vacationed to Florida as a boy. He also has owned a house in Sarasota - which he bought from Dick Vitale's daughter - and three of his siblings have retired to Florida.

**DID YOU KNOW .....**

Coach L became the first Miami coach to win 20+ games in his first two seasons at UM and only the fourth of 12 UM coaches to post two 20-win seasons.

Former Cane Rick Barry was named one of the Greatest Players in NBA History.

Miami native and former Cane James Jones won the 2010-2011 NBA All-Star Weekend 3-Point Contest and the NBA Championship in the 2011-2012 season.

Six-time NBA All Star Amar'e Stoudemire enrolled at UM last year and is taking classes to earn his bachelor's degree.

UM is in its 11th season in the ACC.

Coach L led the George Mason Patriots to the Final Four with big wins over some of basketball's elite teams such as Michigan State, UNC, and UConn. He was the first coach to take a mid-major to a Final Four in 27 years when his team advanced in 2006.

In 14 years at George Mason, Larrañaga led the Patriots to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2011, 2008, 2006, 2001, 1999), including the 2006 Final Four.

Miami basketball received APR (academic progress rate) Public Recognition Awards for being among the top 10 percent in APR in their sport. Miami ranks in the top 10 percent NCAA men's basketball with a 990 APR.

The Miami Department of Athletics recorded a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 92 percent. Miami's department-wide GSR is tied for third among ACC schools and 10th overall among FBS programs. UM has exceeded the NCAA average GSR in each of the last 10 years.

According to latest US News & World Report rankings, the University of Miami is tied as the top academic institution in the state of Florida and ranks 48th nationally.

The Canes have averaged 20+ wins in each of the last eight seasons.

The Hurricanes have made at least one trey in 876 of 882 games since the NCAA adopted the 3-point shot in 1986.

Miami has held 735 of its last 736 opponents to less than 100 points. UNC was the last team to score 100+, defeating UM 105-64 on Jan. 31, 2007.

**REED RETURNS TO THE LINEUP**

Sophomore guard Davon Reed returned to the court on Dec. 6 against Green Bay after sitting out the first eight games rehabbing a knee injury. Reed tallied one steal in eight minutes against the Phoenix, bringing needed energy to the game.

**BURNETT BREAKS OUT IN BACK-TO-BACK GAMES**

Redshirt freshman Deandre Burnett broke out for 40 points off the bench over two games this week for the Hurricanes, after missing the past four contests due to an injury. He hit six shots from long range and shot 46.9 percent from the field, and added 5.5 rebounds and 1.5 steals, in 26.5 minutes per game. Against No. 24/25 Illinois, Burnett notched 19 points and 8 rebounds in 24 minutes, hitting 7-16 from the field and knocking down a trio of 3-pointers. Against Green Bay, Burnett scored 21 of Miami's 55 points, adding three rebounds, two steals and a block in 29 minutes. He hit 50 percent (8-16) of his shots, again draining three shots from distance.

Burnett has now led the team in scoring in two of his three appearances.

With his 21 points against the Phoenix, Burnett is the first freshman to score more than 20 points in a game since Durand Scott had 21 against Duke on March 13, 2010.

**THOMAS STRONG IN THE PAINT VS. GREEN BAY**

Senior forward Joe Thomas grabbed a career-high 13 rebounds against Green Bay on Dec. 6. His previous season-best was five against Howard, and career-best was when he played at Niagara, an 11-rebound performance vs. Rider on Jan. 2, 2014.

**UM SHOOTING NEARLY 50 PERCENT**

Miami is shooting 46.9 percent from the field and 41.1 percent from three while holding opponents to 39.2 percent and 28.5 percent, respectively.

The Canes have shot better than 50 percent from the field in four of their last six games, and have shot better than 43.9 percent in every game except vs. Illinois (37.9%) and Green Bay (32.8%).

Through nine games, Miami has shot 50 percent or better from the field in seven halves and 50 percent or better from three in six halves.

**LECOMTE ON FIRE**

Sophomore guard Manu Lecomte is hitting 53.6 percent (37-69) from the field, 48.8 percent (20-41) from long range and 85.7 percent (12-14) at the line in his sophomore season with the Canes. After averaging 7.7 points per game as a rookie, Lecomte has improved to 11.8 ppg this year, scoring in double digits in seven of nine games. Last year Lecomte scored in double digits 11 times in 33 games played.

**WHAT A DIFFERENCE A YEAR MAKES**

Miami's only two returners - Manu Lecomte and Tonye Jekiri - have drastically improved their stats from a season ago. The chart below shows 2014-15 overall stats and 2013-14 overall stats.

**RODRIGUEZ ON ROBERTSON & COUSY AWARD WATCH LISTS**

Junior PG Angel Rodriguez is one of 36 players listed on the watch list for the 2015 Bob Cousy Collegiate Point Guard of the Year Award and was one of 24 players named to the early-season watch list for the 2014-15 Oscar Robertson Trophy for national player of the year, the U.S. Basketball Writers Association announced Nov. 24.

**SINCE THE ARRIVAL OF COACH LARRAÑAGA IN 2011-12 ...**

- Miami has posted the fourth-most wins (31) of all ACC schools in league play, trailing only Duke (40), UNC (39) and Virginia (36).
  - Miami has the most wins (6) combined of any ACC school against the two winningest ACC programs - UNC and Duke - in the past three seasons. The next highest is four wins: Virginia is 4-5 against both teams, and Duke is 4-2 against UNC.
  - Miami is the only school with a winning record (6-4) over Duke and North Carolina combined in the past three seasons. Duke is 4-2 against North Carolina.
  - Miami is one of three schools with five or more wins in the ACC Tournament.
  - Miami is one of four ACC schools with a winning record in the NCAA tournament.
  - Miami has the third-most ACC road wins (14) in league play, behind Duke (17) and UNC (17).
  - Miami has posted the most overall road wins (21) of all ACC teams the past three seasons. UNC is second with 20 while Duke and Virginia each have 17.
  - Miami's seeds in the ACC Tournament have been No. 1, No. 6 and No. 10.
  - Miami is one of eight ACC teams to make an NCAA tournament appearance.
  - Miami is one of five ACC teams to make an NIT appearance.
  - One ACC Coach of the Year, one ACC Player of the Year, ACC Defensive Player of the Year, one ACC Tournament MVP, four ACC All-Tournament, one first-team All-ACC, one second-team All-ACC, three third-team All-ACC, two honorable mention All-ACC, one ACC All-Rookie Team and three ACC All-Defensive Team selections.
  - Miami has the most lopsided win over Duke (27 points) and second-most lopsided wins over Boston College (27 points), North Carolina (26 points) and Florida State (24 points) of any ACC team.
  - Miami has won seven ACC games by 20 or more points: Boston College (27, 22, 22 and 21), Duke (27), North Carolina (26) and Florida State (24).
  - All 13 seniors earned academic degrees from UM: Garrus Adams, Rion Brown, Julian Gamble, Malcolm Grant, Justin Heller, Reggie Johnson, DeQuan Jones, Kenny Kadji, Donnavan Kirk, Trey McKinney Jones, Ryan Quigtar, Durand Scott, Erik Swoope.

**FRESHMEN PLAYING WITH CONFIDENCE**

Miami's four scholarship freshmen are playing with confidence as Deandre Burnett is the team's third-leading scorer (12.2 ppg) while coming off the bench. With Omar Sherman (6.4), James Palmer (5.7) and Ja'Quan Newton (3.6) add depth to the Canes' offensive attack. Palmer leads the freshmen with his 45.5 percent shooting, followed by Sherman (45.1%), Newton (40.9%) and Burnett (40.7%).

**MIAMI RANKED NO. 15 IN BOTH POLLS**

Miami is ranked No. 15 in both polls, as of Dec. 1. It is the highest ranking in December in the history of Canes basketball (chart on page 2). When Miami is ranked in the Top 25 under Coach L, the Canes are 19-5.

Miami made its season debut in the Top 20 of both major college basketball polls Nov. 24. Miami checked in at No. 17 in the Associated Press top 25, and earned a No. 20 ranking in the USA TODAY Coaches Poll.

The Hurricanes were last ranked in the final polls of the 2012-13 season, holding the No. 5 spot in the final AP poll and No. 10 in USA Today Coaches Poll. The last time Miami was ranked in the month of November was in 2008-09 when the Canes opened the year No. 17/16, then were No. 22/21 in polls released on Nov. 24, 2008.

**RECAPPING MIAMI VS. GREEN BAY**

No. 15 Miami lost to Green Bay in the third of five-straight home games for the Hurricanes ... Miami trailed at halftime (25-23) for just the second time of the season. The other game was a 12-point deficit at No. 7 Florida, a game that the Hurricanes won 69-67 ... Miami shot a season low 32.8 percent (20-61) for the game. The Canes' previous low was 37.9 percent against Illinois ... With 21 bench points, the Hurricanes have recorded 19+ points off the bench in eight of nine games this season, led by 34 against South Alabama ... Miami sophomore Davon Reed checked into the game in the second half, clocking his first minutes of the season after sustaining a knee injury in September. Reed added needed energy to the court ended the night with a steal in eight minutes ... R-Freshman Deandre Burnett set his career high in points for the second-straight night, after 19 against Illinois and knocking down 21 against Green Bay ... Senior forward Joe Thomas grabbed 13 rebounds, a career high. His previous season-best was five against Howard. Thomas' career-best was at Niagara, when he had 11 vs. Rider on Jan. 2, 2014.

**CANES OPEN 8-0 FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2009**

Miami opened the season 8-0 for the first time of Coach Larrañaga's UM career. The Canes opened 4-1 in 2011-12 and 2012-13, and 3-2 in 2013-14. The last time UM opened 8-0 was in 2009-10, when Miami opened 8-0. In 2007-08, Miami started the year 12-0.

**MCCLELLAN TABBED ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK**

Junior guard Sheldon McClellan was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Week, the league announced Dec. 1.

McClellan hit 73.9 percent (17-of-23) from the field, 75 percent (6-of-8) from 3-point range and 100 percent (8-of-8) from the foul line in two Miami wins this week. The Houston native averaged 24.0 points, 6.5 rebounds, 2.5 assists and 1.0 steals in 31.5 minutes per game. On the 10th day of an 11-day road trip, McClellan notched a double-double with 31 points and 11 rebounds while shooting 11-of-17 (64.7 percent) from the field and 5-of-7 (.714) from beyond the arc in Miami's 77-74 win at Charlotte. In an 87-75 win over South Alabama, McClellan scored 17 points on a perfect 6-of-6 performance from the field.

**BENCH POINTS KEY FOR THE HURRICANES**

The Hurricanes have recorded 19+ points off the bench in eight of nine games this season, led by 34 against South Alabama. Against Howard, Florida and Akron, the subs scored 25 points. Deandre Burnett leads the way with 61 bench points, in just five games played.

**CANE STRONG: UMBB IN THE WEIGHT ROOM**

Under strength Coach Steve Felde (fell-dee), five Canes bench at least 300 pounds and eight bench press more than 250 pounds. Joe Thomas leads the way at 375, followed by Deandre Burnett (315), who is up 85 pounds since arriving at UM. Also in the 300-club are Angel Rodriguez (300/+60), Manu Lecomte (300/+85) and Mike Fernandez (300/+95).

**JEKIRI CONTROLLING THE BOARDS**

Junior forward Tonye Jekiri is controlling the boards for Miami, averaging 9.8 through nine games. Jekiri tied his career high of 13 against Drexel, then set his new mark of 16 the next night, against Akron. Jekiri has secured 8+ rebounds in eight of nine games this season. Jekiri also has 21 blocks and 19 assists for the Canes.

**RODRIGUEZ NAMED ACC PLAYER OF THE WEEK**

Angel Rodriguez was named Atlantic Coast Conference Player of the Week, the league announced Nov. 24.

Rodriguez opened his week by scoring 22 points in the final nine minutes at No. 8/7 Florida, draining five second-half three-pointers to help Miami

earn an impressive win. Rodriguez also demonstrated his defensive prowess by drawing a charge with three seconds remaining in the game against the Gators.

For the week, Rodriguez averaged 16.8 points, 5.3 assists, 3.8 rebounds, 3.0 steals and 1.3 blocks per game. He hit 45.8 percent from the field, including 45.5 percent from three, and 76.5 percent from the line. The junior scored 13 plus points in all four games this week, and despite standing 5-foot-11, blocked five shots over four games. He drained a three-pointer in every game, including five against UF.

**RODRIGUEZ MVP; JEKIRI ALL-TOURNAMENT**

Angel Rodriguez was named the Gildan Charleston Classic Most Valuable Player and Tonye Jekiri was named to the All-Tournament Team. In three games, Rodriguez averaged 14.3 points, 6.0 assists, 4.3 rebounds, 3.0 steals and 1.7 blocks in 30.0 minutes. Jekiri nearly averaged a double-double with 12.0 rebounds and 9.0 points, along with 2.7 blocks and 1.7 assists per game.

**RODRIGUEZ FLIRTS WITH TRIPLE-DOUBLE**

Junior guard Angel Rodriguez flirted with a triple-double against Akron, posting 15 points, nine assists and eight rebounds. His stat line also included two blocked shots and a steal, while shooting 66.7 percent from the field.

**ANTHONY LAWRENCE, JR. SIGNS NLI WITH CANES**

Anthony Lawrence, Jr. has signed a National Letter of Intent to play basketball for the University of Miami.

Nicknamed "Amp," Lawrence is a 6-7, 200-pound guard/forward from Saint Petersburg, Fla., who led his Lakewood Senior High School team to the Class 5A state championship game as a junior. Lawrence scored 18 points in the championship game and totaled 25 rebounds in two state tournament games.

Lawrence averaged 20 points and 13 rebounds as a junior at Lakewood, and in his sophomore campaign, averaged 21 points, eight rebounds and four steals. Listed as a four-star recruit by ESPN, the long wing can finish on the break or knock down the three. He brings a complete game to the Hurricanes with the ability to handle the ball, pass,

shoot, rebound and play defense with great intensity.

Lawrence, who played AAU ball for Each 1 Teach 1 Elite, chose Miami over offers from USC, Clemson and Texas, among others. Anthony's father, Anthony Lawrence Sr. was a two-year letterman at Miami from 1991-93. After college, he played overseas in Portugal, Mexico and the Dominican Republic. His brother, Patrick, also played at Miami from 1991-94.

**CANES IN SPAIN**

In August, the University of Miami embarked on a 10-day educational and competitive tour to Spain. The Canes were 4-0 against teams from Barcelona, Valencia and Madrid. In four games in Spain, Miami outscored its opponent 89.8 to 65.8 ppg and pulled down nearly twice as many rebounds, 51.8 to 27.0 per night. The Canes hit 51.8 percent from the field, 27.8 percent from three and 62.4 percent at the line. UM also averaged 17.8 assists and 13.3 steals per night.

Individually, four Canes averaged double digits, led by Sheldon McClellan (20.0), followed by Dre Burnett (14.3), Ja'Quan Newton (13.5) and James Palmer (11.5). Spaniard Ivan Cruz Uceda averaged 11.0 rebounds per game while Tonye Jekiri averaged 8.5 rpg. Senior Angel Rodriguez did not play any games in Spain due to injury.

**NEW SCOREBOARD HUNG IN BANKUNITED CENTER**

Miami Hurricanes home basketball games will be more exciting this year as a new state-of-the-art center-hung scoreboard – made possible by a \$1 million Momentum2 campaign gift from FMSbonds, Inc. – will be unveiled for the 2014-15 season.

The gift was made possible by FMSbonds, Inc. President James A. Klotz and Chairman Paul Feinsilver. Klotz is a long-time University of Miami Athletics donor and is a member of the Athletics Visiting Committee.

The center-hung scoreboard is 24 feet wide by 17 feet tall (including ring). The main screen is 10' 8.8" in height and the ring is 2' 5". The main screen has 2,848 columns of resolution.

**US NEWS AND WORLD REPORT**

According to latest US News & World Report rankings, the University of Miami is tied for the top academic institution in the state of Florida and ranks 48th nationally.

**SEASONS OF CHANGE**

Miami faces back-to-back seasons with roster turnover after losing six players from the 2012-13 ACC Championship season – five to graduation, one to NBA – then six seniors (5 scholarship) after the 2013-14 campaign.

**LARRAÑAGA CONTRACT EXTENDED THROUGH 2022**

The University of Miami extended Coach Jim Larrañaga's contract through May 31, 2022, Director of Athletics Blake James announced in September 2014. Larrañaga first signed a five-year contract in April 2011, then was granted a three-year extension in 2012.

**LECOMTE NAMED TO U20 ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM**

Manu Lecomte was named to U20 Men Division B 2014 All-Tournament Team after leading Belgium to the championship game of the FIBA U20 European Championships, held in Sarajevo, Bosnia & Herzegovina.

The Canes sophomore averaged 20.0 points, 5.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 1.1 steals in 30.4 minutes per game in the tournament. In his eight games, he averaged 47.1 percent from the field, including 53.8 percent from 2-point range, and was 79.5 percent at the line. He ranked second in the tournament in points per game, fourth in field goals made and free throw percentage and seventh in free throws made. He posted a 34-point night against Belarus, also recording four assists, three steals and three rebounds in the 21-point win. Against Cyprus, Lecomte hit 11-of-13 from the line. He drained four shots from long distance in two outings and had six or more rebounds in four games.

Lecomte has been part of Belgium's national team program for most of the past decade. He was a member of the U16 team for two years, the U18 team for two years and is in his second year with the U20 squad. With the appearance in the title game, the Belgian team will move from Division B to the top league, Division A.

**MIAMI BASKETBALL – THE EARLY YEARS**

The University of Miami basketball program was dormant for 14 years from 1971-1985. In 1983 Director of Athletics Sam Jankovich announced the resurrection of men's basketball at Miami, with the reinstatement vote by the UM Board of Trustees on Oct. 12, 1983. Head coach Bill Foster was hired March 21, 1984, adding assistants Clint Bryant,

Seth Greenberg and Cesar Odio by July 1. Tim Harvey was the staff's first recruit, a 6-10, 240-pound center from Plainfield, N.J., who transferred from Georgia Tech. On Oct. 15, 1984 the first men's basketball practice in 12 years was held on the patio in the center of campus, viewed by more than 200 students. Miami defeated The Citadel, 85-77, on Nov. 22, 1985, in the first game of the new era of UM basketball.

**DIVERSITY AT UM EXTENDS TO COURT**

Five Miami players speak English as a second language: Ivan Cruz Uceda - Spanish (Spain); Mike Fernandez - Spanish (Cuba); Tonye Jekiri - African; Manu Lecomte - French; Angel Rodriguez - Spanish (Puerto Rico). UM is the academic home of nearly 1,700 foreign students of all socioeconomic backgrounds, from more than 110 countries as diverse as Peru, Pakistan, and Poland. Miami's diversity also is evident in its full-time faculty, which is nearly 36 percent minority, making UM one of the most diverse major private research universities.

**LARRAÑAGA MEMBER OF UM FACULTY**

Coach Jim Larrañaga is an Adjunct Assistant Professor of Kinesiology and Sport Sciences at the University of Miami. Due to his head coaching responsibilities, Larrañaga is a guest lecturer at several different classes in the School of Education and Human Development throughout the semester.

**COACH L TIES TO THE ACC**

Coach Jim Larrañaga was an assistant coach at Virginia from 1979-1986, under the leadership of Terry Holland. In those seven seasons, Larrañaga helped the Cavaliers to five NCAA appearances: Final Four twice, Elite Eight once, Sweet 16 once and Round of 64 once, as well as two NIT appearances, including the Championship and Quarterfinal round.

**APPROACHING WIN NO. 550**

Coach Jim Larrañaga is six wins away from 550 career victories and three wins away from 300 conference victories. He started the 2014-15 season with a 536-370 overall and 297-185 conference record in 30 years as a head coach.

**CORAL GABLES AND MIAMI FACTS**

The Florida city of Coral Gables, situated just a few miles southwest of Miami, is part of Miami-Dade County. Incorporated in 1925, Coral Gables was created as a fully-planned community by George Merrick, who envisioned an upscale Miami suburb with large elements of Mediterranean-style architecture to highlight the region's Spanish influence. In 1925, roughly simultaneous to the founding of Coral Gables, the city was selected as the home to the University of Miami, which was constructed that year on 240 acres of land just west of U.S. Route 1, approximately two miles south of downtown Coral Gables.

The average temperature in Coral Gables is 75 degrees.

Coral Gables averages 300 days of sunshine per year.

The Venetian Pool, located in Coral Gables, is acclaimed as "the world's most beautiful public swimming pool."

The Biltmore Golf Course in Coral Gables, has been played by Tiger Woods, and by amateur golf lovers Bill Clinton and Will Smith.

Miami has 84 miles of beaches.

**2014-15 QUICK HITS**

- UM opened the season with nine scholarship players available. This is the second-straight season the Canes open the campaign with eight or more new players and only nine available scholarship players.
- Miami has 10 new players on the roster for 2014-15: Eight scholarship newcomers, one D-I transfer who must sit out and one walk-on.
- UM opened the 2014-15 campaign with just two players from the 2013-14 season, in sophomore Manu Lecomte and junior Tonye Jekiri. Sophomore Davon Reed was out through Dec. 5 with a lower extremity injury.
- Seven players didn't wear a Miami uniform last season.
- Miami's 14-man roster includes players from five countries - Belgium, Nigeria, Puerto Rico, Spain, U.S. - six states - Florida, Texas, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New Hampshire - and Washington, D.C.
- There are no seniors playing for the Canes: One graduate student, five juniors, three sophomores and five freshmen.
- Three D-I transfers are eligible to play in 2014-15: Sheldon McClellan (Texas), Angel Rodriguez (Kansas State) and Joe Thomas (Niagara).
- The Canes lost six players – including three starters and the team's top two scorers – from the 2013-14 season, five to graduation and one transferred.
- Miami lost five of its top seven players from 2013-14. To open the 2013-14 season, Miami had lost its top six players from the 2012-13 campaign.
- Without Reed, the Canes returned 11.9 points, 7.6 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 1.3 steals and 0.9 blocks per game from the 2013-14 season. A year ago, Miami opened the 2013-14 season returning 9.3 points, 5.1 rebounds, 1.1 assists, 0.8 steals and 0.5 blocks per game.
- For the second-straight season, Miami returns the fewest points per game (18.4) and rebounds per game (9.2) of all ACC schools.
- The Canes held opponents to just 59.5 points per game in 2013-14, which was ranked No. 11 of 345 teams in Division I. Miami also averaged 61.5 ppg, which was ranked No. 337.
- The Canes lost 10 games by five points or less, or in overtime, during the 2013-14 season, on their way to a 17-16 overall record.

Jim Larrañaga was named the 12th head coach of the University of Miami men's basketball program on April 22, 2011.

After leading UM to the 2013 NCAA Sweet 16, and winning the school's first ACC regular season and tournament championships, Larrañaga was honored as the AP, Naismith, USBWA Henry Iba and ACC Coach of the Year. The Bronx native helped Miami to a No. 2 national ranking by both the AP and USA TODAY, and a No. 2 seed in the NCAA tournament. He is the 10th coach in the last 10 years to lead two top-10 programs, as Miami was No. 2 on Feb. 18, 2013, and George Mason was No. 8 in the final Top 25 poll in 2006.

Larrañaga directed the Canes to a 27-point win over No. 1 Duke and three other 20+ point wins over ACC opponents that season, including North Carolina (+26), Florida State (+24) and Boston College (+22). UM's 29 overall and 15 ACC wins in 2012-13 were program-bests, as was the 14-game winning streak and 13-0 start in conference play. Other program firsts include defeating all three teams in the North Carolina Triangle in the same season, beating a trio of teams in the Top 20 since joining the ACC and hosting five home sellouts at the BankUnited Center.

Individually, Coach L saw Shane Larkin earn the ACC Player of the Year and Lute Olson National Player of the Year awards, as well as All-American status and finalist nods for the Bob Cousy, John Wooden and James Naismith player of the year honors before declaring early for the 2013 NBA Draft. Larkin was also the ACC Tournament MVP, on the All-ACC Defensive team and a defensive All-American. Durand Scott was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year, three players - Larkin, Scott and Kenny Kadji - were listed on all-conference teams and four were on the ACC All-Tournament Team - Larkin, Scott, Julian Gamble and Trey McKinney Jones. All six seniors on the Sweet 16 team earned academic degrees from the University of Miami and one player was listed on the All-ACC Academic Team.

Larrañaga came to Miami after serving as the head coach at George Mason for 14 seasons. He guided that program to five NCAA Tournament appearances (1999, 2001, 2006, 2008, 2011) - including an unprecedented run to the 2006 Final Four that captured the nation's attention, defeating Michigan State, North Carolina, Wichita State and UConn along the way. Following that run, he was selected the 2006 Clair Bee Coach of the Year. Larrañaga built the GMU Patriots' program into a perennial contender in the highly-regarded Colonial Athletic Association, winning more games (273) than any other coach in program and conference history en

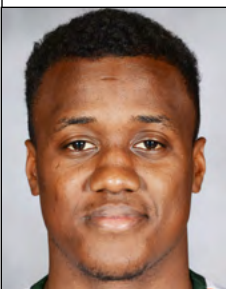

route to three conference titles (1999, 2001, 2008). A two-time CAA Coach of the Year honoree, Larrañaga earned the accolade in 2011, leading the Patriots to a 27-7 overall record and 16-2 conference mark en route to the CAA regular-season title and their fifth NCAA Tournament appearance under his leadership. Seeded a program-best eighth in the NCAA Tournament, George Mason rallied from a double-digit deficit to defeat ninth-seeded Villanova, 61-57, before falling to overall No. 1 seed Ohio State in the third round. In 2006, Larrañaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the Final Four in 27 years and earned an at-large berth for a CAA team for the first time in 20 years. Along the way, he led Mason to a school record in wins, the school's first national ranking, George Mason's first appearance in the Top 10 and the school's first wins over Top 10 teams.

With 29 years of head coaching experience, the native of The Bronx, N.Y., previously served as the head coach at Bowling Green for 11 seasons (1986-1997) and at Division II American International for two seasons (1977-79). His first coaching opportunity came at Davidson College, where he served as an assistant coach to Terry Holland. Davidson captured three Southern Conference regular-season championships and an NIT berth in his five years there, and he compiled a 47-12 record doubling as the freshman team coach. In 1976, he left Davidson and spent one season as player-coach for the Geronemo Basketball Club in Belgium. A 1971 graduate of Providence College with a degree in economics, Larrañaga was a four-year letterman for the Friars. As the team captain in his senior season, he led Providence to a 20-8 record and an NIT appearance. He graduated as the school's fifth all-time leading scorer with 1,258 points and was selected in the sixth round of the draft by the Detroit Pistons of the National Basketball Association. He was the team's top scorer as a sophomore and junior and was named New England's Division I Sophomore of the Year in 1969. He was inducted into the Providence College Hall of Fame in 1991.

Larrañaga, 65, and his wife, Liz, have two sons - Jay, who played for his father at Bowling Green and is an assistant coach with the Boston Celtics, and Jon, who was a member of his father's George Mason teams from 1999-2003 - and four grandchildren.
