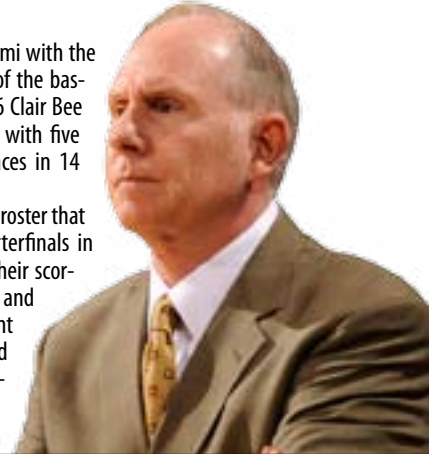

A new era began at the University of Miami with the hiring of Jim Larranaga as the head coach of the basketball program on April 22, 2011. The 2006 Clair Bee Coach of the Year, Larranaga comes to UM with five NCAA Tournament and three NIT appearances in 14 years at George Mason.

Miami returns 11 players from its 12-man roster that went 21-15 and advanced to the NIT quarterfinals in 2011. The Hurricanes return 80 percent of their scoring, including 90 percent of their free throws and 67 percent of their three-pointers, 89 percent of their assists, 69 percent of their blocked shots, 85 percent of their steals and 79 percent of their rebounding.

THE RETURNERS

Three statistical leaders return for the Hurricanes, led by **Malcolm Grant** and **Durand Scott**. **Reggie Johnson** will return to the court for ACC play after injuring his knee in the offseason.

Last season **Grant** recorded an ACC-high 2.6 three-pointers per game at a league-best 42.3 percent (19th in the nation), while converting an ACC-best 85.3 percent from the charity stripe.

As a sophomore, **Scott** averaged 13.6 points (12th in the ACC), 4.2 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game, shooting 44.5 percent from the field, 39.1 percent from beyond the arc and 83.7 percent (third in the ACC) from the charity stripe.

Johnson, who earned 2011 All-ACC Honorable Mention accolades, tested the NBA waters but returned to UM after averaging 11.9 points (20th in ACC), a team-high 9.6 rebounds (fourth in ACC) and a team-best 1.3 blocks per game as a sophomore.

THE NEWCOMERS

Four playmakers have been added to the 2011-12 roster, a pair of junior transfers and a duo of freshmen guards.

Kenny Kadji played in 42 games at the University of Florida before transferring to UM last fall. **Trey McKinney Jones** transferred from UMKC where he averaged 10.9 points and shooting a team-best 47.6 percent in his sophomore season. **Bishop Daniels** is a sharpshooter with tremendous jumping ability who came to Miami from Raleigh's Word of God Christian Academy and **Shane Larkin** led Orlando's Dr. Phillips High to a 27-6 record his senior season by averaging 18.8 points, 6.3 assists and 3.5 steals per game.

THE COACH

Miami: Head coach Jim Larranaga is entering his 28th season as a head coach and first at Miami. He has posted a 470-344 overall record and is currently No. 17 on the list of winningest active Division I head coaches with a 443-308 record in DI games. Coach L was the head coach of DII American International two years.

Jim Larranaga was named the 12th head coach of the University of Miami men's basketball program on April 22, 2011.

Larranaga comes to Miami after serving as the head coach at George Mason for 14 seasons. He guided the program to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2011, 2008, 2006, 2001, 1999) – including an unprecedented run to the 2006 Final Four that captured the nation's attention, defeating Michigan State, North Carolina, Wichita State and Connecticut along the way. Following that run, he was selected the 2006 Clair Bee Coach of the Year.

Larranaga built the Patriots' program into a perennial contender in the highly-regarded Colonial Athletic Association, winning more games than any other coach in program and conference history (273) en route to three conference titles (2008, 2001, 1999).

A two-time CAA Coach of the Year honoree, Larranaga earned the accolade in 2011, leading the Patriots to a 27-7 overall record and 16-2 conference mark en route to the CAA regular-season title and their fifth NCAA Tournament appearance under his leadership. Seeded a program-best eighth in the NCAA Tournament, George Mason rallied from a double-digit deficit to defeat ninth-seeded Villanova, 61-57, before falling to overall No. 1 seed Ohio State in the third round.

Larranaga's teams are known for their offensive efficiency and a frenetic defense dubbed the "Scramble." Last season, his Patriots – who were ranked 24th in the final RPI – finished the season 11th in the nation in three-point field goal percentage (39.5), 18th in scoring margin (10.3), 22nd in turnovers (11.1), 26th in assist-to-turnover ratio (1.28) and 37th in scoring defense (62.5). During its 16-game win streak – which catapulted Mason to No. 25 in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll on Feb. 28 – all but four victories came by a double-digit margin. That streak included the 71-51 win at VCU on Feb. 15, with Mason holding the Rams to a season-low offensive output.

He became Mason's all-time leader in men's basketball victories with his 131st win on January 22, 2005, with a 77-58 decision at James Madison. He became the CAA's all-time leader in wins on February 4, 2006, when the Patriots defeated UNC Wilmington. His Mason teams went 182-89 in CAA play.

In 2006, Larranaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the Final Four in 27 years and earned an at-large berth for a CAA team for the first time in 20 years. Along the way, he led Mason to a school record in wins, the school's first-ever national ranking, George Mason's first-ever appearance in the Top 10 and the school's first wins over Top 10 teams.

The Patriots finished the year with a 27-8 record and a No. 8 ranking in the final USA Today/ESPN Coaches Poll. Earlier that season, Mason cracked the polls at No. 25, but NCAA tournament wins over Michigan State, No. 10 North Carolina, Wichita State and No. 2 Connecticut vaulted Mason up the poll, into the national conscience and made Larranaga a household name.

The remarkable run at George Mason began just two years into Larranaga's tenure. After going 9-18 in his first year with the Patriots in 1997-98, Larranaga guided the 1999 Patriots'

squad to a 19-11 overall record and a 13-3 CAA mark. That season, he earned his first Coach of the Year accolades in the CAA and NABC District 4 after making a 10-game improvement and leading the program to its first-ever conference regular season championship, its second CAA Tournament title and first NCAA Tournament appearance since 1989.

The Patriots followed that with another 19-11 overall mark in 1999-2000, tying for first place in the CAA at 12-4 and earning the top seed in the conference tournament. In 2000-01, the Patriots finished 18-12 overall and 11-5 in the CAA, good for a tie for second place, and they won the CAA Tournament title and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second time in three years. The Patriots produced another solid campaign with a 19-10 overall record (13-5 in the CAA) and a NIT berth in 2001-02. Mason's 2002-03 roster was hampered by injuries, but managed to pull together a 16-12 record (11-7 in the CAA), and a fourth-place CAA finish.

In 2003-04, Larranaga led the Patriots to a 7-2 non-conference record and to a school-record 23-win season, as Mason finished 23-10 on the year, its first 20-or-more win campaign in 14 years. Gaining an NIT berth (the Patriots fourth postseason appearance in six years), Larranaga led Mason to two consecutive postseason

victories for the first time in school history, and in the process, earned his first postseason.

Under Larranaga, the Patriots won three CAA titles, including the 2008 championship when Mason went 23-11. The Patriots have appeared in the postseason each of the past four seasons for the first time in Mason history, advancing to the NCAA Tournament in 2008, the NIT in 2009, the CollegInsider.com Postseason Tournament in 2010 and back to the NCAA Tournament in 2011.

With 28 years of head coaching experience, the native of Bronx, N.Y., previously served as the head coach at Bowling Green for 11 seasons (1986-1997) and at Division II American International for two seasons (1977-79).

At Bowling Green, he made an immediate impact in his first season. In 1986-87, the Falcons were the nation's most improved team under a first-year head coach that took over a program with a losing record, posting a 15-14 record for an eight-game improvement over the previous season. Larranaga went on to record a 170-144 mark in 11 years at Bowling Green, earning the 1997 Mid-American Conference Coach of the Year honors after leading Bowling Green to a 22-10 record, a conference regular season co-championship and a berth in the National Invitation Tournament. The 22 victories were the most by a Bowling Green team in 47 years and the 13 conference wins were the second-highest total in Falcon history.

Larranaga's 170 victories at Bowling Green ranked second all-time on the Falcons' coaching list and he was only the second coach to record consecutive postseason appearances. Larranaga led his squad to NIT berths in 1990 (18-11) and again in 1991 (17-13), the first time the Falcons enjoyed back-to-back postseason appearances since the early '60s. Bowling Green won better than 61 percent of its games in Larranaga's last four years, recording a 70-44 mark during that stretch. The Falcons finished fourth or better in the MAC in five of Larranaga's 11 seasons and he is among the winningest coaches in MAC history.

Larranaga received his first head coaching position in 1977 when he was named to the post at American International, a Division II program in Springfield, Mass. Taking over a team that had suffered through five consecutive losing seasons prior to his arrival, Larranaga turned AIC into a winning program in his first year and compiled a 28-25 mark in two seasons.

A 1971 graduate of Providence College with a degree in economics, Larranaga was a four-year letterman for the Friars. As the team captain in his senior season, he led Providence to a 20-8 record and an NIT appearance. He graduated as the school's fifth all-time leading scorer with 1,258 points and was selected in the sixth round of the draft by the Detroit Pistons of the National Basketball Association. He was the team's top scorer as a sophomore and junior and was named New England's Division I Sophomore of the Year in 1969. He was inducted into the Providence College Hall of Fame in 1991.

His first coaching opportunity came at Davidson College, where he served as an assistant coach to Terry Holland. Davidson captured three Southern Conference regular-season championships and an NIT berth in his five years there, and he compiled a 47-12 record doubling as the freshman team coach. In 1976, he left Davidson and spent one season as player-coach for the Geronimo Basketball Club in Belgium.

After his two-year stint at American International, Larranaga was reunited with Holland at the University of Virginia in April 1979. An assistant coach under Holland for seven seasons from 1979-86, he helped the Cavaliers reach the NCAA Final Four on two occasions (1981, 1984), finish in the top five of the AP and UPI polls and average more than 24 victories per season. The Cavaliers were 169-62, won three regular-season Atlantic Coast Conference championships and made four NCAA Tournament appearances. Virginia also made a pair of NIT appearances, winning the NIT Championship in 1980. Larranaga was on the staff during the careers of three-time National Player of the Year Ralph Sampson and NBA first-round draft choice Olden Polynice.

Larranaga, 62, and his wife, Liz, have two sons – Jay, who played for his father at Bowling Green and is the head coach of the NBDL's Erie Bayhawks, and Jon, who was a member of his father's George Mason teams from 1999-2003 – and four grandchildren.

Among Miami's 11 returners is leading scorer and All-ACC Third Team pick Malcolm Grant (14.8 ppg, 3.2 apg, 1.8 rpg). Of the 15 All-ACC picks in 2011, just five will return to the collegiate ranks in 2012, with Grant the only one not suiting up for the Tar Heels. Last season Grant hit an ACC-high 2.6 three pointers per game, at a league-high 42.3 percent (19th in the nation), while converting an ACC-best 85.3 percent from the charity stripe.

In his second season with Miami, Grant was among just two players to lead the ACC in as many as three different statistical categories — leading the league in three-point field goal percentage, three-point field goals made and free throw percentage. At the time this honor was received, Grant's three point percentage ranked 14th among all Division I players, while his free throw percentage was 30th. Starting all 36 games last season, the 6-1 Brooklyn, N.Y., native has posted a team-high 29 double-figure scoring efforts, with eight games of 20-plus points, including a career-high 26 points in a win over West Virginia. In that game, he hit 13-of-14 free throw attempts and went 3-of-6 from long range.

Grant hit two three-pointers in the NIT game against Alabama to extend his three-point streak to an ACC-long 23-straight games, the fifth-longest streak in Miami history. With 155 career threes in just two seasons as Hurricane, Grant is in 10th place all-time in program history in triples made, while his 94 three-pointers last season were tied for second-best in Miami history. His 222 attempts in a season were the third most tries from deep in a season for a Hurricane. Grant, who led the ACC in three-point field goal percentage, three-pointers per game and free throw percentage, hit a three in 33-of-36 games last season.

Grant and Durand Scott are the first teammates to notch consecutive 100-assists seasons since Thomas Hocker and Kevin Presto achieved the feat in both 1987-88 and 1988-89. In 2009-10, Grant and Scott became the first UM duo since 1992-93 to collect 100 assists in the same season and the fourth pair of teammates to do so in UM history.

Miami also returns second-leading scorer Durand Scott, who had a breakout rookie season in 2010 followed by a solid 2011 campaign, showing major improvement in his shooting percentage from the charity stripe (.670 to .837) and from beyond the arc (.276 to .391) between his first two seasons.

As a sophomore, Scott was ranked among the ACC's leaders in scoring (12th), free throw percentage (3rd, 76th in the nation) and minutes played (6th). He carries a seven-game double-figure scoring streak into next season.

Scott registered 100 assists for the second-straight season, becoming the first Cane to do so since John Salmons in 2001-02. The New York native's 225 career assists rank 15th in program history.

In his second campaign with Miami, he averaged 13.6 points (12th in the ACC), 4.2 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game, shooting 44.5 percent from the field, 39.1 percent from beyond the arc and 83.7 percent (third in the ACC) from the charity stripe. Over three NIT games, his scoring leapt to a team-high 19.3 points per game, converting 50 percent from the field and 89 percent from the line, to go with 3.3 assists and 3.3 rebounds an outing.

He scored 10-plus points 29 times as a sophomore, with six performances of at least 20 points — including back-to-back 20-point games to open his second campaign as a Cane and a season-high 27 points in the win over Ole Miss.

Scott played in all 36 games, with 35 starts, the second most in program history, and his 1,182 minutes on the hardwood rank second-most in program history, just 14 minutes shy of the school record.

Big man Reggie Johnson, who earned 2011 All-ACC Honorable Mention accolades, tested the NBA waters after averaging 11.9 points (20th in ACC), a team-high 9.6 rebounds (fourth in ACC) and a team-best 1.3 blocks per game as a sophomore, shooting 59.1 percent from the field, the third-highest single-season percentage in UM history.

Sophomore Reggie Johnson's 347 rebounds last season were the most since 1964-65, when Rick Barry pulled down a school-record 475 rebounds 46 years ago. Overall, it is the sixth highest total for a single season in UM history. His career-high 20 rebounds in the NIT-opening win over FAU was the most for a Hurricane since the return of Miami basketball in 1985-86 and for an ACC player last season.

"Big Reg" earned honorable mention accolades after emerging as one of the league's best big men with 13 double-doubles last season, fourth in the ACC and second most at UM since the return of the program in 1985-86. Hailing from ACC country, the 6-10, 300-pound Winston-Salem, N.C., native ranked third in the conference and 27th in the nation with 9.6 rebounds per game, while his 3.5 offensive boards per game was second in the league and his 6.1 defensive rebounds per game ranked fourth.

Johnson, who appeared in all 36 games last season with 34 starts, was among the league's most improved players in both scoring and rebounding, and had a pair of 20-point, 10-rebound games last season, including a 20-point, 14-rebound effort at NC State. He scored in double-figures 23 times last season, including a career-high 25 points on 8-of-10 shooting from the field and 9-of-12 shooting from the line in his homecoming at Wake Forest, while he grabbed a career-high 20 rebounds to go with 14 points in an NIT win over FAU. Johnson recorded 10-plus boards 15 times and led the team in rebounding in 32 games last season.

After losing more than 25 pounds in the offseason, he is expected to be back on the court in January after tearing the meniscus in his right knee during a pickup game in June of 2011.

The Assistants

Entering the 2011-12 campaign, assistant coaches Michael Huger, Eric Konkol and Chris Caputo have aided Coach Larranaga for a combined 23 seasons.

Michael Huger

Michael Huger enters his first season at the University of Miami and his fifth season as an assistant coach for head coach Jim Larranaga assisting in all aspects of the program. He brings six seasons of collegiate coaching experience and nearly a dozen years of professional basketball experience to Coral Gables.

In four seasons at George Mason, Huger helped lead the Patriots to the postseason every year, including NCAA berths in 2008 and 2011. In 2011, the team defeated Villanova to advance to the third round of the NCAA Tournament, earned a regular-season CAA title and posted a school-record tying 27 wins. In 2009, he helped Mason to an NIT bid and its second-straight 20-win season. In 2008, Huger helped the Patriots to their second-highest win total in school history as they beat nationally-ranked Kansas State and won the CAA title for the first time since 2001.

Huger began his coaching career at Longwood University (Va.) under Mike Gillian, a former Mason assistant coach under Larranaga, where he spent two seasons.

Before joining the coaching ranks, Huger played professional basketball in Europe, spending two years in Holland (1994-96) and nine in Belgium (1996-2005). He was selected Dutch League MVP in 1996 after averaging 25.3 points and 5.8 assists, and went on to earn First Team All-Belgium honors in 2000 and 2004 after leading his clubs to Belgium Cup championships in both seasons.

A native of New York City, Huger is a 1994 graduate of Bowling Green State University with a bachelor's degree in education. There he played for Larranaga from 1989-93, helping the Falcons to a pair of NIT appearances. He earned Mid-American Conference honors in his final two seasons, and was a Naismith Award nominee and the runner-up for conference player of the year as a senior. As a prep player, he helped lead Stevenson High School (Bronx) to back-to-back PSAL City Championships in 1988 and 1989.

Huger and his wife, Tonya, are expecting a child in the fall.

Eric Konkol

Eric Konkol enters his first season at the University of Miami and eighth as a member of head coach Jim Larranaga's staff. He assists in all aspects of the program including recruiting, practices, individual player workouts and game preparation.

Konkol previously worked with Larranaga at George Mason from 2002-03 through 2004-05 and 2007-08 through last season, helping to develop 12 All-CAA selections, five CAA All-Rookie honorees and 16 professional players. In the interim, he spent two years coaching at national power Hopkins High School in Minnesota under Ken Novak, Jr. - who was named 2011 ESPN RISE National Boy's Basketball Coach of the Year - and had a short stint on the coaching staff at North Dakota State.

He served as Mason's scouting director from 2002-05 and helped recruit the top non-BCS recruiting class in 2009 according to ESPN.com. Additionally, he monitored the academic progress of the men's basketball student-athletes, graduating 20-of-22 student-athletes who completed their eligibility - with two more students graduating in May 2011. In both 2009 and 2010, the program was recognized by the NCAA with an Academic Progress Rate in the nation's top 10 percent.

Konkol previously worked on Buzz Peterson's staff as a student assistant for NIT champion Tulsa in 2000-01 and as a graduate administrative assistant at Tennessee in 2001-02, earning a master's degree in sport management.

A native of Amherst, Wis., Konkol is a 2000 graduate of the University of Wisconsin at Eau Claire with a bachelor's degree in kinesiology, with an emphasis in exercise management. He played three seasons of basketball for the Division III program - advancing to the national championship game in 2000. He received the team's inspiration award after his junior and senior seasons with the Blugolds, and was an honorary captain as a senior.

He spent his first two years, including one redshirt season, at the University of Wisconsin at Platteville playing for current Wisconsin head coach Bo Ryan. A 1995 graduate of Amherst High School, he was a three-sport athlete (basketball, baseball and cross country) and closed his prep career as the school's all-time leading scorer with 1,871 points.

Konkol and his wife Meagan, have two sons, Ethan and Ryan.

Chris Caputo

Chris Caputo enters his first season with the Hurricanes and his 10th season on head coach Jim Larranaga's staff. Entering his seventh season as an assistant coach, his primary responsibilities include recruiting and scouting the opposition.

Caputo played a major role in George Mason's run to the Final Four in 2006, putting together scouting reports to prepare the Patriots as they played nationally-ranked teams and future NBA players in nearly every round.

He has also helped lead the Patriots to the postseason for a Mason-record four-straight seasons, including NCAA berths in 2008 and 2011. In 2011, the team defeated Villanova to advance to the third round of the NCAA Tournament, earned a regular-season CAA title and posted a school-record tying 27 wins. In 2009, he helped Mason to an NIT bid and its second-straight 20-win season. In 2008, Caputo helped the Patriots to their second-highest win total in school history as they beat nationally-ranked Kansas State and won the CAA title for the first time since 2001.

As an assistant at Mason, Hoopscoop.com named him one of the Top 25 non-BCS assistant coaches in the nation. In 2010, Caputo attended the Villa 7 Consortium, an educational symposium and networking opportunity for some of the nation's top assistants. In 2011 alone, 19 alum of Villa 7 have been hired as head coaches.

Prior to becoming an assistant coach, Caputo worked on Larranaga's staff as the video coordinator, coordinated the staff recruiting database and mailing system, as well as serving in other administrative capacities.

A native of Elmhurst, N.Y., Caputo is a 2002 graduate of Westfield (Mass.) State College with a degree in finance and economics. He was a four-year letterwinner as a point guard for the Division III Owls, and served as captain and earned the team's Outstanding Contributor Award as a senior. A 1998 graduate of Archbishop Molloy High School - Larranaga's alma mater, he too played for legendary head coach Jack Curran.

Caputo and his wife Julie married in May.

The 2011-12 Team

The Hurricanes welcome head coach Jim Larranaga and his staff to guide Miami into its eighth season in the ACC. In 14 years at George Mason, Larranaga led the Patriots to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2011, 2008, 2006, 2001, 1999) – including the 2006 Final Four.

Miami returns 11 players from its 12-man roster that went 21-15 and advanced to the NIT quarterfinals in 2011. The Hurricanes have played games in the postseason in 12 of the past 17 years, five of which were in the NCAA Tournament.

The Hurricanes return 80 percent of their scoring, including 90 percent of their free throws, 67 percent of their three-pointers, 89 percent of their assists, 69 percent of their blocked shots, 85 percent of their steals and 79 percent of their rebounding.

Trio of Starters Return

Among Miami's 11 returners is leading scorer and All-ACC Third Team pick **Malcolm Grant** (14.8 ppg, 3.2 apg, 1.8 rpg), who posted an ACC-high 2.6 three-pointers per game at a league-high 42.3 percent (19th in the nation), while converting an ACC-best 85.3 percent from the charity stripe.

Big man **Reggie Johnson** earned 2011 All-ACC Honorable Mention accolades, averaged 11.9 points (20th in ACC), a team-high 9.6 rebounds (fourth in ACC) and a team-best 1.3 blocks per game as a sophomore, shooting 59.1 percent from the field – the third-highest single-season percentage in UM history. He is expected to be back on the court in January after tearing the meniscus in his right knee during a pickup game in June.

Miami also returns second-leading scorer **Durand Scott**, who averaged 13.6 points (12th in the ACC), 4.2 rebounds and 3.1 assists per game, shooting 44.5 percent from the field, 39.1 percent from beyond the arc and 83.7 percent (third in the ACC) from the charity stripe.

Other Returners

Junior **Garrius Adams** (7.3 ppg, 3.7 rpg) and sophomore **Rion Brown** (4.4 ppg, 2.0 rpg) will add experienced depth to the guard position for the Canes and senior **DeQuan Jones** (4.5 ppg, 2.5 rpg) brings three years of experience at both the guard and forward position.

Senior forward **Julian Gamble** (4.0 ppg, 3.4 rpg) will sit out the entire season with a knee injury, so sophomore forward **Raphael Akpejori** (6-10, 230lbs) will fill in a big body in the paint in the absence of the two returning big men (Johnson and Gamble).

The Newcomers

Four playmakers join the team for the 2011-12 season in **Kenny Kadji** (Florida), **Trey McKinney Jones** (UMKC), **Bishop Daniels** (Word of God) and **Shane Larkin** (Dr. Phillips). Kadji and McKinney Jones each attended UM last season, but had to sit out due to NCAA transfer rules.

Shane Larkin, a 5-11, 160-pound point guard from Orlando, rounds out the Hurricane newcomers. Larkin led Dr. Phillips High to a 27-6 record his senior season by averaging 18.8 points, 6.3 assists and 3.5 steals per game.

Kenny Kadji, a 6-10, 248-pound forward/center, played in 42 games at the University of Florida before transferring to UM in the summer of 2011. Coming out of high school he was the fifth-ranked center in the class of 2008 by both Rivals.com and Scout.com.

Trey McKinney Jones, a 6-5, 205-pound transfer from UMKC, played in 61 games for the Roos, averaging 10.9 points and shooting a

team-best 47.6 percent in his sophomore season. He also dished out 60 assists, the second-most on the team, in his second year.

Bishop Daniels, a 6-2, 175-pound point guard, is a sharpshooter with tremendous jumping ability who came to Miami from Raleigh's Word of God Christian Academy. Daniels was rated the No. 4 dunker in the 2011 class by Rivals.

Take Three for the Team

The Hurricanes have made a three-point basket in 311-straight games and have made at least one trey in 768 of 771 games since the NCAA adopted the three-point shot in 1986. The only three times Miami failed to hit a three-pointer was against Indiana on Dec. 15, 2001 (0-13), versus St. John's on Mar. 5, 2000 (0-13) and against Howard on Dec. 6, 1991 (0-15). The Hurricanes are 2-1 all-time when failing to hit a trey.

22-Straight Non-Conference Wins

The Hurricanes have won 22 consecutive non-conference games at the BankUnited Center and have defeated 37 of their last 40 non-conference opponents at home. Miami's last non-conference home loss came at the hands of Ohio State, 73-68, in the ACC/Big Ten Challenge on Dec. 2, 2008.

Home Sweet Home

The Hurricanes were 13-4 at the BankUnited Center in 2010-11. Over the last four seasons, UM has compiled a 51-14 (.785) record at home, including nine wins over ranked opponents. The Hurricanes have now notched double digit home wins at the BankUnited in four-straight seasons and seven times in eight full seasons calling the arena home. UM has won 22 consecutive non-conference games at home.

100 Assists for Grant and Scott

Malcolm Grant and Durand Scott were the first teammates to notch consecutive 100-assist seasons since Thomas Hocker and Kevin Presto achieved the feat in both 1987-88 and 1988-89. In 2009, Grant and Scott became the first UM duo since 1992-93 to collect 100 assists in the same season and the fourth pair of teammates to do so in UM history.

In 2010-11 Grant totaled 115 handouts while Scott notched 112 assists. The previous season, Grant totaled 117 while Scott added 113.

Update the Record Books

The 2010-11 Hurricanes set a school record playing in their 35th game of the season. Malcolm Grant also etched his name atop the books by making his 35th start of the season, the most in one campaign in program history.

And not to be outdone, sixth-year player Adrian Thomas appeared in his school-record 131st game as a Hurricane.

Miami is a Top Academic Institution

Already the top academic institution in the state of Florida and a world-renowned research institution, the University of Miami and its Department of Athletics are building upon its reputation for developing world-class students. In the 2012 edition of the U.S. News & World Report's annual issue, the University of Miami has risen to number 38 - up from 47 last year, a nine-point rise. UM remains the highest ranked school in the state of Florida.

Canes Post Second-Best Team GPA

In the spring of 2011, the men's basketball team posted its second-best spring team GPA in the history of the program. Senior Julian Gamble earned a 4.0 GPA for the fall 2010 semester while Eric Swoope, Adrian Thomas, Justin Heller and Ryan Quigtar registered a 3.0 or better to be named to the 55th Annual ACC Honor Roll.

Swoope and Thomas were also listed on the 2011 All-ACC Academic Men's Basketball Team.

2010-11 Review

The Hurricanes closed the 2010-11 season with a 21-15 overall record, having won nine of their last 15 games, and advancing to the quarterfinals of the National Invitation Tournament for the second time in program history.

The 2011 Canes finished at No. 69 in the final NCAA RPI with a strength of schedule ranked No. 41 by RealTimeRPI.com and No. 43 by CollegeRPI.com.

Last season, Miami registered wins over NCAA Tournament teams West Virginia and Akron, as well as NIT teams Boston College (twice), McNeese State, Florida Atlantic and Missouri State.

HURRICANE HOOPS FACILITIES

BankUnited Center

Opened in 2003, the BankUnited Center, which seats 7,200 fans for basketball games, is located on the University of Miami's beautiful Coral Gables campus. The venue also hosts concerts, trade shows, lecture series and sporting events, in addition to serving as the home to the Hurricanes' men's and women's basketball teams.

Over the last three seasons, the Hurricanes have established home court dominance, winning 51 games at the "BUC" — including a school-record 14-2 mark in 2007-08 and memorable victories over No. 4/5 Duke, No. 6/7 Wake Forest and No. 20/20 Georgia Tech.

With its grand opening in January of 2003 — a 64-61 overtime win over North Carolina, the BankUnited Center became the University's first on-campus venue with seating to accommodate large events offering an ideal capacity for concerts, conferences, lecture series, banquets and more. It significantly increases the University of Miami's collegiate experience for its students by allowing on-campus events such as commencements, sports, convocations and pep rallies. The community also benefits from the venue's utilization as a showcase for a host of family shows and other special activities.

The BankUnited Center has 25 suites. Each suite is equipped with 12 box seats with three additional bar stools, a lounge area, television and phones, along with a kitchen area with a bar and refrigerator.

The BankUnited Center is managed by Global Spectrum. The Philadelphia-based company is part of one of the world's largest sports and entertainment companies, Comcast-Spectacor, which also owns the Philadelphia 76ers (NBA) and the Philadelphia Flyers (NHL).

The Fieldhouse

The newest addition to Miami athletics opened in March of 2009, with the debut of the Hurricanes' on-campus practice facility. The 29,000-square foot facility is conveniently located immediately adjacent to the BankUnited Center, alongside the Hurricanes 100 Room north of the arena. The new facility houses several full-size practice courts, as well as a multi-purpose room to host a variety of events — including the Miami Heat's 2010 Media Day.

Miami basketball players have access to the secure facility 24 hours a day, allowing the Hurricanes court time at any time all-year round. UM players use the facility for both conditioning and practice sessions, as well as for individual workouts and pick-up games.

The Fieldhouse was also honored for its sustainability components, earning the LEED® Gold designation established by the U.S. Green Building Council and verified by the Green Building Certification Institute (GBCI).

The facility achieved the certification specifically for its energy use, lighting, water and material use as well as incorporating a variety of other sustainable strategies. By using less energy and water, LEED certified buildings save money for businesses and taxpayers; reduce greenhouse gas emissions; and contribute to a healthier environment for residents, workers and the larger community.

Only One Key Loss in Forward Adrian Thomas

Miami lost only one player from the 2010-11 roster, a three-point specialist in Adrian Thomas. He appeared in a school-record 132 games over six years as a Hurricane. Thomas played in all 36 games last year, making 11 starts, including nine straight to close his collegiate career. He averaged 9.1 ppg, 3.7 rpg and 2.6 three-pointers per game - second-best in the ACC behind teammate Malcolm Grant. He also ranked eighth in the ACC, shooting 38.9 percent from long range. Thomas hit a three in 20-straight (1/8-3/21) games for the second-longest active streak in the ACC, and he made a three-pointer in 28 of his last 30 games, and in 78 of his last 87 games. Of his 105 field goals made in 2010-11, 93 were from beyond the arc (.886).

Cardiac Canes

In 2011, the "Cardiac Canes" had an ACC-record eight-straight games decided by four points or less. The Hurricanes saw this trend reemerge in the ACC Tournament, where both of their games were decided in the final moments — the 10-point comeback with 42.5 seconds to go to ultimately defeat Virginia in overtime and the buzzer-beating layup by North Carolina to knock UM out in the ACC quarterfinals.

Long Distance Firepower

Behind the long-distance firepower of the ACC's top-two most prolific three-point shooters in Adrian Thomas and Malcolm Grant, the Hurricanes knocked down a school record 283 three-pointers last season, besting the previous high of 251 set in 2008-09. The duo — both ranking among Miami's top four in single-season three-pointers — accounted for 187 (66 percent) of those treys.

The Hurricanes attempted a program-high 750 three-point field goals last season, surpassing the previous high of 684 set in 2001-02.

Converting 37.7 percent from beyond the arc as a team, the 2011 Hurricanes' conversion rate was second-best in UM history, just behind a program-best 38.5 percent in 2007-08.

Comeback Win Propels Miami in ACC Tournament

The ninth-seeded Miami men's basketball team used an amazing comeback in its ACC Tournament opening round game — overcoming a 10-point deficit with under 40 seconds to go, to force overtime and knock eighth-seeded Virginia out of the ACC Tournament with the 69-62 decision. It is believed to be the biggest comeback in under a minute to play in ACC Tournament history, as the 'Canes erased a 53-43 deficit beginning with a Durand Scott three-pointer with 34 seconds to play in regulation.
