SEMINOLES CLOSE OUT THREE-GAME ROAD SWING AT MIAMI

Florida State, which is included in the national top-25 for the ninth consecutive week and 10th week this season, travels to play at Miami on Wednesday, February 1, 2017 at 8:00 p.m. The Seminoles have been ranked among the nation's top 25 teams since coming in at No. 25 in the sixth week of the season (December 12) and have been in the top 10 each of the last three weeks. Florida State was ranked No. 6 last week – tying the second highest national ranking in school history. The Seminoles meet Miami on Wednesday night for the first of two regular season games between the Seminoles and the Hurricanes with the second meeting coming on Senior Day in Tallahassee on March 4 at the Donald L. Tucker Center. Florida State enters Wednesday's game against Miami with 18 wins – matching the number of wins it earned during the regular season in 2015-16 and more wins than it earned (17) during the 2014-15 season. Following Florida State's game against Miami, the Seminoles return home for two consecutive games against Clemson (February 5, 12:30 p.m.) and NC State (February 8, 7:00 p.m.).

SEMINOLES IN NATIONAL RANKINGS FOR NINTH WEEK

Florida State enters this week of games against Miami (February 1) and Clemson (February 5) ranked No. 15 in the Associated Press poll and No. 16 in the USA Today Coaches poll. It marks the eighth consecutive week and ninth week overall that the Seminoles are nationally ranked. The Seminoles' string of eight consecutive weeks in the polls is their longest since an eight week stay in the poll from January 25-March 15 during the 1992-93 season. Florida State was ranked in the AP poll for each of the 18 weeks (including the preseason poll) of the 1988-89 season. The Seminoles are ranked 16th in the USA Today Coaches Poll – the eighth consecutive week they have been included in the coaches poll. Florida State spent 17 consecutive weeks in the coaches poll during the 1992-93 season.

BACON LOOKS TO PUSH DOUBLE FIGURE STREAK TO 32 GAMES

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon scored 19 points against Syracuse and enters Wednesday's game against Miami having scored in double figures in 31 consecutive games. He has scored at least 10 points in each of Florida State's games since scoring 10 against Georgia Tech on Feb. 17, 2016. Bacon's streak is the 14th longest in school history and is the longest double figure scoring streak by a Seminole since Toney Douglas earned a streak of 33 consecutive games scored in double figures in the final two games of the 2006-07 season and the first 31 games of the 2007-08 season. The school record for consecutive games scored in double figures is 72 by Dave Fedor during the 1960, 1961 and 1962 seasons. He scored in double figures in every game during his three-year Seminole career.

BACON NAMED TO WOODEN AWARD MIDSEASON TOP 25

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon is one of five ACC players who has been named to the John R. Wooden Award Midseason Top 25 list. The sophomore is averaging a career-high 17.1 points per game and has scored in double figures in an ACC best 30 consecutive games. Bacon is also on the Robertson Award Watch List, Naismith Award Watch List, the Julius Erving Award Watch List (as the nation's top small forward), was named to the NIT Season Tip-Off All-Tournament Team, was named the Most Valuable Player at the Orange Bowl Classic, was named the Lute Olson National Player of the Week (Jan. 2) and was named the ACC Player of the Week (Jan. 2). Bacon was a preseason All-ACC Second-Team selection by the media in attendance at the ACC Operation Basketball in October. He earned Freshmen All-American honors and was named to the All-ACC Freshman Team as he became just the second freshman in school history to lead the Seminoles in scoring during the 2015-16 season.

BACON NAMED TO MIDSEASON OSCAR ROBERTSON MIDSEASON WATCH LIST

All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon, who enters Wednesday's game against Miami averaging a career-high 17.1 points scored per game, has been named to the midseason watch list for the Oscar Robertson Trophy. The trophy is presented by the USBWA and is presented to the National Player of the Year at the conclusion of the season. Bacon is joined by Joel Berry II of North Carolina and Luke Kennard of Duke as the three players from the ACC on the 19-player list.

LOOK FOR FLORIDA STATE TO...

...Defeat Miami and gain a win in Coral Gables over the Hurricanes for the first time since January 15, 2014 when the Seminoles took a 63-53 win;

...Defeat Miami and gain its seventh ACC victory of the season for the 11th consecutive season. The Seminoles have won at least seven ACC games in each year since the 2005-06 season and have won at least seven ACC games in 11 of Leonard Hamilton's 14 seasons at Florida State;

...Defeat Miami and win its 19th game of the season. The Seminoles have won at least 19 games in 10 of Leonard Hamilton's 14 seasons at Florida State.

FLORIDA STATE'S WIN TOTAL IN THE LAST 11 YEARS

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last 11 years (since the start of the 2005-06 season) in total games played as a member of the ACC with 251 wins. The Seminoles average 21.2 wins per season with records of 20-10 (2005-06), 22-13 (2006-07), 19-15 (2007-08), 25-10 (2008-09), 22-10 (2009-10), 23-11 (2010-11), 25-10 (2011-12), 18-16 (2012-13), 22-14 (2013-14), 17-16 (2014-15), 20-14 (2015-16) and 18-4 (2016-17).

TIM PICKETT NAMED FLORIDA STATE'S ACC TOURNAMENT LEGEND

Tim Pickett, who was an All-ACC First Team selection as a Seminole as a senior in 2004, will represent Florida State as its legend at the 2017 ACC Tournament in Brooklyn. Pickett is remembered as one of the most exciting players in Florida State men's basketball history and the preeminent building block in head coach Leonard Hamilton's mission of making the Seminoles an elite college basketball program. Pickett joined All-American Bob Sura (1994) as only the second Florida State player to earn All-ACC first-team honors when he was selected in 2004. Pickett was a second-team All-ACC selection in 2003 and was a two-time All-ACC Defensive Team selection. He averaged 16.7 points per game over his two years as a Seminole and was a second-round pick in the 2004 NBA Draft by the New Orleans Hornets.

SEMINOLES' ISAAC LEADS ACC FRESHMEN, FOURTH NATIONALLY IN REBOUNDS

Freshman sensation Jonathan Isaac, has earned in double figure rebounds in four of the last five games, enters Wednesday's game against Miami as the ACC's freshmen leader in rebounds and ranked fourth nationally among all freshman in rebounds. Isaac is averaging 8.1 rebounds per game and has pulled down in double figures in rebounds in six of his first 22 games as a collegian including four of his first nine career ACC games. Isaac is ranked eighth overall in the ACC in rebounding and is tied for third in ACC games only with a 9.2 rebounds per game average.

ISAAC NAMED TO MIDSEASON WAYMAN TISDALE AWARD WATCH LIST

Freshman sensation Jonathan Isaac, who with his 8.1 rebounds per game average is the leading rebounder among freshmen in the ACC, has been named to the Wayman Tisdale Award midseason watch list. The trophy is presented each year to the national freshman Player of the Year. Isaac is joined on the list by Dennis Smith, Jr. of NC State and Jayson Tatum of Duke – giving the ACC three players on the list. Isaac enters Wednesday's game against Miami looking to earn his fifth double in the last six games.

FLORIDA STATE'S STREAKS...

...Florida State has won 14 of its last 17 games since defeating Illinois on November 25, 2016 in the final round of the NIT Season Tip-Off;
 ...Florida State won a school-record 12 consecutive games from November 25 (72-61 against Illinois) through January 10 (88-72 over against Duke);
 ...Florida State defeated four consecutive AP nationally ranked teams (No. 21/21 Florida, No. 11/11 Virginia, No. 21/23 Virginia Tech and No. 7/7 Duke – the first time in school history the Seminoles had defeated four consecutive ranked teams (on the schedule as they were played and not in consecutive games);
 ...Florida State has played 11 consecutive games as a nationally ranked team. The Seminoles are 8-3 in those games with four wins over top-15 ranked teams so far this season.

FLORIDA STATE'S FIELD GOAL PERCENTAGE DEFENSE

Florida State enters Wednesday's game against Miami as one of only five teams in the ACC holding its opponents under 40 percent shooting from the field. The Seminoles' .399 field goal percentage defense mark (head coach Leonard Hamilton's favorite statistic) includes holding eight different opponents to 40 percent or below shooting from the field including No. 6/7 Louisville (.385 shooting from the field in Florida State's 73-68 win over the Cardinals (January 18). The Seminoles also held George Washington to a .226 shooting mark from the field in its victory over the Colonials in Washington, D.C. (December 4). Florida State has held eight of its first nine ACC opponents below its season-long shooting percentage – the ninth team (Notre Dame) shot .466 against Florida State and is shooting .466 for the season.

SEMINOLES FROM THE 3-POINT LINE IN RECENT GAMES

Florida State made nine 3-point field goals against Syracuse (including eight in the second half against the Orange) and have now made its ACC season-high of nine 3-point field goals in three different games -- in its victory over Wake Forest and against North Carolina and Syracuse. The Seminoles enter Wednesday's game against Miami averaging 7.0 made 3-point field goals per game in its first 22 games of the season.

SEMINOLES AMONG MOST ACTIVE DEFENSIVE TEAMS IN THE ACC

Florida State, one of the most active teams defensively in the ACC, enters Wednesday's game against Miami ranked fourth in the ACC steals (7.6 spg), fourth in the ACC in blocked shots (5.5 bpg) and ranked fifth in the ACC in field goal percentage defense. The Seminoles are the ONLY team in the ACC ranked in the top five of the most important defensive statistics maintained by the ACC. The Seminoles are allowing 71.6 points per game – nearly three points fewer per game than they allowed during the 2015-16 season.

FLORIDA STATE VS. MIAMI – THE LAST MEETING

Sheldon McClellan scored 20 points and No. 12 Miami fought off a second-half rally from Florida State to win 67-65 on February 14, 2016 at the Donald L. Tucker Center in Tallahassee. The Hurricanes led by four with less than a minute remaining when Dwayne Bacon's 3-pointer brought the Seminoles to 66-65. After Davon Reed missed a 3, Florida State had a chance to go ahead but Devon Bookert was short on a 3-pointer from the corner. Ja'Quan Newton hit one of two free throws for Miami, leaving Florida State one last chance, but Malik Beasley missed a 30-footer that would have won it. Reed had 14 points and Angel Rodriguez scored 11 for the Hurricanes, who secured their fourth 20-win season in Jim Larranaga's five years as coach. Bookert led Florida State with 14 points, and Xavier Rathan-Mayes had 12. Miami jumped out to an 11-2 lead and was up by seven before Florida State scored eight straight points – consecutive 3-pointers by Benji Bell and Terance Mann's jumper – to take a 15-14 advantage with 10:13 remaining. After the score was tied at 17, the Hurricanes regained control with a 17-5 run and built their largest lead of the half (34-22) with 1:49 remaining.

Florida State Men's Basketball By The Number

.400 Freshman sensation Jonathan Isaac is shooting .400 from the 3-point line (six of 15) in the last five games.

.462 Junior Xavier Rathan-Mayes is shooting .462 from the 3-point line in the last three games (six of 13). He made his season-high of four 3-point field goals in the Seminoles' game against Syracuse on Saturday.

.893 Freshman sensation Jonathan Isaac is shooting .893 from the free throw line in the last five games. He was a perfect seven of seven from the line in Florida State's victories over Notre Dame (January 18) and Louisville (January 21).

.923 Graduate student Michael Ojo is shooting .923 from the free throw line (12 of 13) in ACC play (the last nine games). His only missed free throw in ACC play came against Louisville when he scored his ACC career high of 10 points – including six of seven from the free throw line.

1.4 Senior Jarquez Smith has blocked 13 shots in his last nine games and is averaging 1.4 blocked shots per game since ACC play began against Wake Forest on December 28. He has blocked at least one shot in 12 consecutive ACC games dating back to February 25, 2016 at Duke.

2 Junior Xavier Rathan-Mayes is ranked second in ACC games only with his 2.8:1 assists:turnover ratio. He is averaging 4.3 assists against only 1.6 turnovers in the first half (nine games) of ACC play.

4 Graduate student Michael Ojo has scored in double figures four times this season (13 against Winthrop, 12 against Minnesota, 10 against Nicholls State and 10 against Louisville). He scored in double figures zero times in the first three seasons and 96 games of his career.

7 Freshman Trent Forrest enters Wednesday's game against Miami having made seven consecutive free throws since the second half of Florida State's game against North Carolina.

13 All-American candidate Dwayne Bacon has made 13 3-point shots in his last six games and is shooting .371 (13 of 35) from distance since January 10 against Duke. He was one-of-two from the bonusphere in the Seminoles' victory over the Blue Devils.

17 Florida State pulled down a season-high 17 offensive rebounds against Syracuse. The Seminoles have 31 offensive rebounds in their last two games.

18 Florida State is undefeated, 18-0 when it outscores its opponent.

29 Sophomore PJ Savoy, who has played in 15 games and averages 9.7 minutes played per game, is ranked second among his Seminole teammates with 29 3-point field goals. He averages 1.9 made 3-point field goals per game.

BACON CONTINUES HIS MARCH TOWARDS 1,000 CAREER POINTS

All-American Dwayne Bacon enters Wednesday's game with 913 career points and needs only 87 points to become the 46th player in school history to score 1,000 or more career points. Bacon set Florida State's record for points by a freshman (536 in 2015-16) and is looking to become only the second sophomore in school history to reach the 1,000-point mark. All-American and NBA First Round draft choice Bob Sura (1,055 points) is the only Seminole to reach the coveted scoring mark as a sophomore. Sura reached the mark in 62 games, Bacon will play his 57th career game against the Hurricanes. Mitchell Wiggins, a junior college transfer into Florida State, holds the Seminoles record for fastest player in the fewest games to reach 1,000 career points. He reached the mark in 43 games during the 1982 and 1983 seasons.

In one of the greatest scoring exhibitions in college basketball history, Florida State guard Xavier Rathan-Mayes scored 30 points in a span of 4:38 on February 25, 2015 in the second half of Miami's 81-77 victory over the Seminoles. At one point during the run, Rathan-Mayes did not miss a single shot -- 6-for-6 on 3-pointers, two layups and four made free throws -- for 26 points in a 3:35 span. He finished the game with 35 points. "One of the greatest shooting performances I have ever seen," Miami's Jim Larranaga said after the game.

RATHAN-MAYES STARTING TO HEAT UP FROM DISTANCE

Junior Xavier Rathan-Mayes enters Wednesday's game against Miami tied for 15th place in Florida State history with 115 career 3-point field goals made. He is shooting a career-best .359 from the 3-point line and is averaging 1.3 made 3-point field goals per game. Rathan-Mayes is just the 16th player in school history to make at least 115 career 3-point field goals. He is also ranked 11th in school history with his 386 career 3-point field goals attempted.

Why I Wear My Number

Phil Cofer – “I was very close to the members of my recruiting class at Tennessee. When we left Tennessee because of the coaching change, we all decided that we would all wear No. 0 wherever we decided to go to school. Larry Austin wore No. 0 at Xavier (before transferring to Vanderbilt) and CJ Turman wore No. 0 when he played at Florida Atlantic. Jordan Cornish was supposed to get No. 0 at UNLV (before transferring to Cal.) but another player already had the number.”

Jonathan Isaac – “There is no specific reason I wear No. 1. I wore No. 11 when I played for USA Basketball as a senior in high school, I wore No. 1 when I played AAU ball with Each 1 Teach 1, I wore No. 42 when I played in the NIKE Hoop Summit and I wore No. 1 as a senior at IMG Academy.”

CJ Walker – “I wear No. 2 at Florida State because my favorite player, Kyrie Irving, wears No. 2. I have been a fan of his for a long time; he has certainly influenced my game and how I play my game. I am looking forward to meeting him sometime during my career.

Trent Forrest – “I wear No. 3 to honor two of my teammates who have recently passed away. Two of my former AAU teammates (Rod Scott) wore No. 3 and another (Herman Williams) wore No. 13. So with the No. 3 in common in both of their numbers I decided to change to that number at Florida State when it became available. Rod passed away after he was involved in a car crash in 2016 and Herman collapsed while playing in a pick-up game at his church just before his freshman year began at University of Louisiana Monroe.”

Dwayne Bacon – “I wear the No. 4 because that’s my favorite basketball number. There is no significance – it’s just the number I am most comfortable wearing.”

PJ Savoy – “I wear No. 5 at Florida State because it represents the number of people in my family – my mom, my dad, my two sisters and me. My father wore No. 5 when he played overseas in Belgium in 1998 and 1999.”

Braian Angola-Rodas – “I wear No. 11 because that’s the number my dad wore when he played basketball. He loved wearing that number when we played against each other. He passed away in 2014; I have made him a promise that I will always wear No. 11 in his honor.”

Terance Mann – “I wear No. 14 because that’s the number my mom wore when she played at Georgetown. It’s also the date of my grandmother’s birthday – December 14.”

Xavier Rathan-Mayes – “I wear No. 22 because that’s the number my father, Tharon, wore when he played at Florida State. I have always wanted to follow in his footsteps; I always wanted to break the records he set wearing the same number he wore as a Seminole.”

ISAAC WITH FOUR DOUBLE DOUBLES IN LAST FIVE GAMES

Freshman sensation Jonathan Isaac has earned double doubles in four of Florida State’s last five games and is averaging a near double of 14.5 points and 9.5 rebounds since January 14 against North Carolina. He enters Wednesday night’s game against Miami with six double doubles in his first 19 career games – tied for the fifth highest double total in the ACC this season and by far the most by any ACC freshmen this season. SMITH MOVES INTO FLORIDA STATE’S ALL-TIME TOP 10 FOR BLOCKED SHOTS

Senior Jarquez Smith blocked three shots in two games last week against Georgia Tech and Syracuse and moved into sole possession of 10th place on the Seminoles’ all-time blocked shot list with 116 career blocked shots. He became just the 10th player in school history with at least 115 career blocked shots as a Seminole with two rejections against Georgia Tech. Smith needs only three blocked shots to move into ninth all-time and needs only seven to move into eighth place in Seminole shot-blocking history.

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Florida State accomplished something on Sunday that hasn't happened in Leonard Hamilton's 29 seasons and 879 games as a college coach -- hit triple digits in consecutive games. The Seminoles rolled to a 100-71 victory over Detroit Mercy as they were 40 of 70 from the field and had five players in double figures. It is the first time since December of 1996 -- against Jacksonville and Tennessee State -- that FSU has scored 100 or more in back-to-back games. Leonard Hamilton Might have His Best Team – But Don't Tell Him Just Yet

It wasn't as if Florida State Coach Leonard Hamilton didn't warn his players.

After his team had beaten Louisville eight days ago to finish a remarkable six-game run in which the Seminoles went 5-1 against ranked teams, he warned his players not to get carried away with all the oohing and aahing they were receiving nationally.

"'Noles now a number one seed!" screamed the bracketologists, who change their predictions on an almost hourly basis.

"FSU looks like a Final Four team," was another Internet headline — as if early April somehow came in late January.

"I told them that what they did against those teams was impressive, but they better not let down with three straight road games coming up," Hamilton said on Tuesday afternoon, just before he and his team flew to Atlanta to play Georgia Tech the next night. "They let up on the road in this league and they'll pay for it. I hope they understand that."

Apparently, they didn't. At least not on Wednesday when Georgia Tech — the only team to beat North Carolina in ACC play so far this winter — hammered the Seminoles, 78-56, having led by 26 at halftime.

"They outplayed us, they out prepared us," Hamilton said afterward. "Their players played better and they probably outcoached us. They were connected mentally and emotionally a lot better than we were.

"Inevitably, it seems to happen to every team every year. I hope it's the only one we're going to have."

Then, on Saturday, the sixth-ranked Seminoles fell again, 82-72, at Syracuse.

The truth in Hamilton's last comment can be found in the fact that no college basketball team has gone undefeated since 1976. The night before his sixth-ranked team got burned in Atlanta, top-ranked Villanova, second-ranked Kansas and fourth-ranked Kentucky all lost on the road.

Still, there is plenty of reason to believe the losses won't start a prolonged slump for the Seminoles, who are 1804 overall and 6-3 in the ACC. Hamilton has been at Florida State for 15 years. His 2011 team reached the Sweet 16 before losing by one to VCU's Final Four team. His 2012 team won the ACC tournament. He believes this could be his best team.

"Potentially," he said. "We'll have to see how much we improve between now and March. I keep telling them if we want to get where we want to go in March, we have to improve every day in January and in February. It's a good group. Most of the time, they listen."

The Seminoles are talented and fascinating all at once. They have two seven-footers who are role players: 7-1 senior Michael Ojo and 7-4 sophomore Christ Koumadje combine to play about 24 minutes a game, averaging about nine points and five rebounds between them. But each is an intimidating defense presence on the floor and helps give Hamilton the ability to play big, small or both.

There isn't a senior among the team's three stars: junior forward Xavier Rathan-Mayes; sophomore guard Dwayne Bacon; and freshman center Jonathan Isaac.

At 6-7, Bacon can get his shot almost anytime he wants — he hit the winning three-pointer at Virginia to culminate a 29-point afternoon — but also passes the ball well. Isaac is a possible one-and-done, averaging more than 13 points and almost eight rebounds a game. Rathan-Mayes is the glue guy: he doesn't score that much (10.1 points per game) but averages nearly five assists. All could come back next year. Or all could be gone.

"I don't worry about that," Hamilton said. "Now is certainly not the time to do that anyway. But I think we've recruited well and we're in a place now if we lose some kids early, we'll continue to be good. It's a different time. You have to be prepared for that."

Hamilton is 68 and has seen many different times and many different places in his coaching career. He was with Joe. B. Hall at Kentucky when it won the 1978 national title and reached two other Final Fours. His first head coaching shot came at Oklahoma State, where he went from eight wins in season one to 17 in season four. He then took over a Miami program that was about to go into the Big East and promptly went 1-17 in conference play in 1991, the Hurricanes' first season.

Nine years later, Miami tied for first in the regular season and reached the Sweet 16.

And then came Michael Jordan.

Jordan had taken over the Washington Wizards' front office during the 1999-2000 season and was looking for a new coach after a 29-53 disaster. He landed on Hamilton. One year later, after going 19-63, Jordan went looking for a new coach again.

"I've never regretted it," Hamilton insisted about his lost season in Washington. "We faced some challenges, but I thought the team was well-coached. When Michael told me he wanted to come back and play and bring back a coach he'd played for before [Doug Collins], I respected that."

The following season, for the first time in 30 years, Hamilton wasn't coaching. "I could have had a job," he said. "I had college teams contacting me during the season in Washington. But I decided to wait — I'd never had a vacation. By January, when I was constantly watching two games at once in two different rooms, my wife said to me, 'You need to go back to work.'"

So he did, at Florida State. Fifteen years later, only Mike Krzyzewski has been coaching in the ACC longer. What's more, Hamilton says he isn't going anywhere anytime soon.

"I don't play golf, I don't fish and I don't like to travel very much," he said, laughing. "I feel great and, even with all the changes, I still love doing this. I wake up every morning excited about practice, excited about the games."

"I love the relationships I have with the players — the ones here now — and the ones who I've coached in the past. The best thing to me isn't winning, it's being invited to weddings or christenings or the phone calls from guys who are about to get married or have a baby. To me, that's winning."

Sometime soon, Hamilton will win his 500th game as a college coach. He's at 496 and hopes he'll keep adding to that number for years to come. He's the only person to win coach-of-the-year honors in both the Big East and the ACC. He's been to the Sweet 16. He'd like to go farther than that this spring.

"We've got a chance," he said. "But right now, I don't even want to think about that. If I think about that, if the kids think about that, then we won't be good enough in March. I know we need to get better on defense and be more consistent on offense. Believe me, I can find plenty of things to work on every day in practice. We've got a long way to go. I need to make sure they understand that."

Saturday's loss at Syracuse proved again why Hamilton was concerned about this three-game road swing. There is clearly much more to learn. Selection Sunday is six weeks away.

Hard Work Paying Off For Florida State's Michael Ojo

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. -- Florida State center Michael Ojo looks like an intimidating person right until you get to his smile.

It's a smile that never leaves the 7-foot-1, 304-pound center's face, but he does have good reason for it to be there. Ojo, a redshirt senior, has come a long way from his freshman year.

He's from Lagos, Nigeria, a town that had just one basketball goal, and he didn't start playing organized basketball until his late teens. He was more project than player at the time he stepped on campus.

"Basketball is a game of muscle memory and it takes a lot of repetitions to gain confidence so it grows instinctive for you," FSU assistant head coach Stan Jones said.

"When you grow up in a village where they had one goal, and you couldn't dunk on it. If you broke the goal then nobody could shoot on it. Michael didn't get those repetitions like most kids in America do in the little leagues in second, third, and fourth grade doing all the drills and working on the mechanics.

"So it's taken some time. All of a sudden you see him with the production he has now and realize that he's just starting to catch up."

The biggest adjustment for Ojo didn't come on the basketball court, but in the classroom.

"Being able to socialize with people was the biggest challenge," Ojo said.

"How to relate to people on campus and my teachers in classrooms. Because when I first got here my accent was really deep and they were talking too fast.

"My professors did a good job of adjusting in class just for me to get used to the language and everything like that."

On the basketball court, Ojo had many challenges ahead of him.

Most notably was that he had to learn how to play the game as a big man. He had to learn how to dunk, and it's something that he's still working on five years later.

"I'm still practicing how to dunk," Ojo said.

"I still miss some of my dunks. The rim we had back home was a little shaky. It wasn't that good. If you break the rim you have to fix it, and I didn't have the money to fix it.

"So I would have to go up and just drop the ball in. You're not allowed to dunk the basketball. It took me a little while, maybe my whole freshman year, to get used to going up hard and shaking the rim hard.

"Now I don't want to break the rim, but the rim is going to end up breaking. It took me a little while to get used to it because I started playing basketball late."

He averaged less than a point (0.7) and one rebound per game as a freshman, and averaged just over two points and two rebounds per game as both a sophomore and as a junior.

He missed most of his redshirt junior year with a torn meniscus in his left knee, but that also gave him the opportunity to learn about the game.

"One of the things we did last year, and it's really opened the game up for him, was having him shadow coach Christ Koumadje as a freshman," Jones said.

"It's like the game slowed down to him, and gave him some reference points on how coaches view things."

This season, Ojo is averaging 5.3 points and 3.9 rebounds per game, and is coming off a 10 point, six rebound game against No. 14 Louisville. He's turned into a much better player, and has made an impact for the Seminoles in some big games this year.

One of the big reasons for his success this season is his improvement at the free throw line.

Ojo has made 38 of his 45 free throw attempts this season, and has the second highest free throw percentage on the team (0.771) behind freshman Jonathan Isaac (0.824).

His first three years he made just 41 of his 102 attempts (0.401).

"You have to get everything aligned," Jones said.

"You have to get your grip. You have to know your alignment. You have to know your pace. You have to know your finish point and follow throw. You have to go through those things.

"That was the initial part when he was a freshman was getting those fundamental, structural things in place. Then it just becomes a thing of volume reps to get the muscle memory."

It wasn't just the structural issues that plagued Ojo early, but it was also the mental aspect of being in front of so many people.

"The next thing is you have to eventually be in that situation," Jones said.

"When you're playing in front of 20,000 in Carolina or 12,000 in our arena and the game's on the line with Dick Vitale on the sideline, everyone thinks it's so easy to just make a shot. You have to get out there and manage your emotions.

"There was a time in Michael's career where his mistakes were more from anxiety than what he was doing."

It's something that bothered him from the beginning, and it gave him something to prove.

"It's been a learning curve in a couple areas for him," Jones said.

"He didn't want to be labeled as the big guy who couldn't shoot free throws. That's something that he wanted to prove throughout his career. That he wasn't a typical guy they could play hack-a-Shaq on."

So coach Jones and Ojo went to work. He's spent a lot of time in the gym over the last five years working on the issue.

"Maybe a million shots," Ojo said.

"I've shot a pretty good amount of free throws over the course of my career. From my freshman year to yesterday. I was in the gym yesterday shooting free throws. There's always room for improvement unless you're 100 percent.

“Even when I got injured last year I would come by the gym and shoot free throws because I couldn’t practice with them. I’ve shot a good number now. I take so much pride in it because it’s something that I struggled with early in my career.

"Now it’s satisfying that I’m shooting a much better percentage than before. It’s not where I need it to be, but that’s why I still practice and keep shooting. It’s much better than before.”

Ojo has been a big part of the Seminoles success this season. FSU is eighth in the country with an 18-2 record and is 6-1 in the ACC with a 6-1 record against ranked teams.
