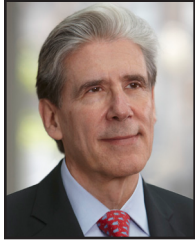

**DR. JULIO FRENK**

UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

UNIVERSIDAD NACIONAL AUTÓNOMA DE MÉXICO, 1979

Dr. Julio Frenk, a noted leader in global public health and a renowned scholar and academic, was named the sixth president of the University of Miami in April 2015. He assumed his leadership post on August 16, 2015.

Prior to joining the University of Miami, Dr. Frenk was Dean of the Faculty at the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health since January 2009. While at Harvard, he was also the T & G Angelopoulos Professor of Public Health and International Development, a joint appointment with the Harvard Kennedy School of Government.

Dr. Frenk served as the Minister of Health of Mexico from 2000 to 2006. He pursued an ambitious agenda to reform the nation's health system and introduced a program of comprehensive universal health insurance, known as Seguro Popular, which expanded access to health care for tens of millions of uninsured Mexicans.

Dr. Frenk was the founding director-general of the National Institute of Public Health in Mexico, one of the leading institutions of health education and research in the developing world. In 1998 Dr. Frenk joined the World Health Organization (WHO) as executive director in charge of Evidence and Information for Policy, WHO's first-ever unit explicitly charged with developing a scientific foundation for health policy to achieve better outcomes.

He also served as a senior fellow in the global health program of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation and as president of the Carso Health Institute in Mexico City. He is the founding chair of the board of the Institute for Health Metrics and Evaluation at the University of Washington. He also co-chaired the Commission on the Education of Health Professionals for the 21st Century, which published its influential report in the leading journal *The Lancet* in 2010, triggering a large number of follow-up initiatives throughout the world.

Dr. Frenk holds a medical degree from the National Autonomous University of Mexico, as well as a master of public health and a joint doctorate in Medical Care Organization and in Sociology from the University of Michigan, Ann Arbor. He has been awarded honorary doctorates from several institutions of higher learning. In September of 2008, Dr. Frenk received the Clinton Global Citizen Award for changing "the way practitioners and policy makers across the world think about health."

He is a member of the U.S. Institute of Medicine, American Academy of Arts and Sciences, and National Academy of Medicine of Mexico.

In addition to his scholarly works, which include more than 140 articles in academic journals, as well as many books and book chapters, he has written two best-selling novels for youngsters explaining the functions of the human body.

**DR. MARVIN DAWKINS**

FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE

EDWARD WATERS COLLEGE, 1970

Dr. Marvin Dawkins, a distinguished professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Miami, is in his fifth year as the Faculty Athletics Representative. He was named to the post in April 2012, replacing Clyde McCoy after his 17 years of service in that role.

In his FAR post, Dawkins is responsible for ensuring the academic integrity of students participating in University athletic programs and helping to oversee institutional control of the Department of Athletics. The Faculty Athletics Representative serves as a liaison between the University and the athletic department. This individual is the University's voting delegate to the ACC and represents UM with the NCAA and ACC.

Dawkins received his doctorate from Florida State and completed his postdoctoral research fellowships at Howard University and The Johns Hopkins University. He previously served on the faculties of the University of Maryland, Old Dominion University and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside.

His research focuses on issues of race and social equity in such areas as education, career aspirations and mobility, substance abuse prevention, and sports. He has published widely in these areas, including his most recent article titled "Race and Pathways to Power in the National Football League" (with Jomills H. Braddock and Erica Smith), which appears in *American Behavioral Scientist* (2012). His research on golf includes book chapters, scholarly articles, and the book *African American Golfers During the Jim Crow Era* (Praeger 2000), coauthored with Graham C. Kinloch. Dawkins was recently appointed to the United States Golf Association Museum Committee and is currently completing a study on the media treatment of black golfers from the Jim Crow era to the present.

ATHLETICS ADMINISTRATION

**BLAKE JAMES**

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
MINNESOTA STATE-MANKATO, 1992

Since taking over as the University of Miami's Director of Athletics in 2013, Blake James has led a transformation at Miami on the field, in student-athlete support, in facilities and in student academic achievement.

In 2015-2016, Miami was the only school in NCAA Division I athletics to have its football team play in a bowl game, men's and women's basketball teams reach the NCAA tournament and baseball team advance to the College World Series. Overall, Miami had 10 sports programs advance to postseason competition to secure its highest finish in the Learfield Directors' Cup standings in 12 years, an indication of broad-based athletic department success.

Miami sold out its entire men's basketball season ticket allotment in 2015-2016, marking the first time in Hurricane athletics history that a team has sold out on a season-ticket basis. For fans who chose to watch the Canes on media platforms, the Hurricanes' live streaming video platform took a giant leap, as Miami aired more than 115 live events on ESPN3 – a figure that ranked first among all ACC schools.

In the classroom, three Miami teams were honored nationally for being among the top 10 percent in the Academic Progress Rates (APR) during the 2015-2016 academic year. In addition, eight Hurricane teams scored 990 or better out of a possible 1,000 points - men's cross country (1000), men's diving (1000), men's tennis (991), golf (1000), soccer (991) and women's swimming (996), women's tennis (992) and women's track and field (994).

In the department's continuing efforts to better support student-athletes and coaches, the Miami Hurricane Club set an all-time annual fund record of \$12 million raised for the Student-Athlete Excellence Fund—an increase of 21 percent over the prior year. The Hurricane Club also announced a record 8,100 active members in May 2016, an 80 percent increase in active membership since 2010.

Under James' leadership, Miami has completed several facility enhancements, beginning with the opening of the Schwartz Center for Athletic Excellence, the completion of the student-athlete training table, fueling station, dining hall, new artificial and natural playing surfaces and lights on the Greentree Practice Fields and a center-hung scoreboard inside the Hurricanes' basketball arena. Prior to the 2015 athletics season, James was instrumental in helping Miami strike one of the largest apparel deals in the country with adidas.

Prior to being named AD, James served Miami athletics in the roles of Interim AD and Senior Associate AD for Development and Ticket Operations, where he oversaw the day-to-day operations of development, ticket sales and ticket operations. He also was a member of the Hurricanes' senior staff and provided sport supervision.

James came to UM after spending seven years the University of Maine, where he first served as Senior Associate Athletic Director before serving as Director of Athletics from 2005 to 2010. During his tenure at Maine, athletics experienced tremendous success, including three trips to the Frozen Four for the men's ice hockey program and NCAA playoff berths for football, baseball (two), women's basketball and softball. Additionally, James implemented a comprehensive \$17 million facility improvement plan, which included an indoor practice facility and numerous other facility

upgrades and renovations. Academically, the program flourished, earning the conference academic cup twice and student-athletes maintaining better than a 3.0 GPA.

Prior to his stint at Maine, James worked in athletic development at Providence College, where he established the "Friars Forever" campaign and the Friar Athletic Fund.

James is no stranger to South Florida, beginning his athletic career with the University of Miami, working in ticket sales, corporate sales and athletic development. In 1995, he was hired as Miami's Director of Ticket Sales, serving in that capacity until 1997, when he was named an athletic development officer at the University of Nebraska. He returned to Miami in 1998 as the Director of Major Gifts and Corporate Sales and was promoted to the Director of Athletic Development at Miami in 2000 before moving on to Providence in 2002.

James graduated from Minnesota State University - Mankato with a Bachelor's Degree in Marketing in 1992 and later received his Master's degree in Sports Administration from St. Thomas University in 1994.

He and his wife, Kelly, have two children: daughter, Haley, and son, Ryan.

**JENNIFER STRAWLEY**

DEPUTY DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
CHIEF OPERATING OFFICER
SENIOR WOMAN ADMINISTRATOR
PENNSYLVANIA, 1998

Jennifer Strawley joined the University of Miami on June 18, 2012 and currently serves as Deputy Director of Athletics and Chief Operating Officer. She also serves as the departments Senior Woman Administrator.

Serving as the second-in-command, Strawley provides strategic direction for the department and assists the Director of Athletics with the day-to-day operations. She is the sport administrator for football, women's basketball and women's tennis. Strawley leads the department's strategic planning initiatives, policy development and implementation, coordination of department and coaches meetings and gender equity and inclusion initiatives. She oversees the areas of human resources, sports medicine, academic services, equipment / Adidas, video services and student-athlete development, as well as serves as a liaison to various campus groups, the ACC and the NCAA.

Strawley played a key role in the hiring of head football coach Mark Richt, serving on the selection committee. In addition, she was instrumental in the development of Miami's annual Celebration of Women's Athletics recognizing the achievements of Miami's female student-athletes while raising money to support women's athletics.

Actively engaged in intercollegiate athletics nationally, Strawley has served on various committees within the NCAA and the ACC. She currently serves on the ACC Television Committee, the ACC Women's Basketball foresight committee, the ACC Equity Committee, the ACC Infractions and Sportsmanship Review Committee, the ACC Football Schedulers Group, and the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee. She also serves on the board of directors for Women's Leaders in College Sports and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

Prior to UM, Strawley concluded her second tour with the NCAA as the Director of Academic and Membership Affairs. In this role, Strawley was instrumental in providing leadership in the areas of academic governance and development of academic policy. Strawley was a member of the department's Executive Management Team.

Prior to her tenure at Columbia, Strawley was the Director of Membership Services and Student-Athlete Reinstatement at the NCAA. In this role, she provided oversight of the student-athlete reinstatement process and was instrumental in the implementation of the student first philosophy. Strawley served as a liaison to numerous NCAA committees and task forces, including the NCAA Divisions I, II and III Student-Athlete Reinstatement Committees, the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee, and the working group appointed to review trends in initial eligibility.

Strawley first joined the NCAA in 1998 as an enforcement services intern. She is a 1998 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania where she earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in history. During her time at Pennsylvania, she was a two-year captain for the Quakers' softball team. Strawley was inducted into the William Tennent High School Athletics Hall of Fame in January of 2014.

Jason Layton serves as the University of Miami Deputy Director of Athletics and Chief Financial Officer, a position he took over in August 2017. He initially joined Miami in December 2014 as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Communications and Sales.

In his current position, Layton is responsible for managing the department's business office, marketing, digital strategies, communications, ticket sales, ticket operations, client experience, video production and broadcast departments.

Additionally, Layton has oversight of all departmental licensing matters, Hurricane Sports Properties, serves as the department ACC Network liaison and is the sport administrator for men's basketball.

Since his arrival, Miami has seen exceptional growth in ticket sales and video production services in both content and broadcast with ESPN and the newly formed ACC Network.

Under his watch, Miami has seen an increased level of season ticket sales in football and men's basketball. Under Layton's guidance, Miami saw an unprecedented growth in football attendance during the 2016 season, as the Hurricanes totaled 42,000 season ticket holders and averaged 58,572 fans per game – the 27th-highest total in the nation and leader among all Power Five schools in percentage increase on a year-to-year basis (23 percent).

In addition, Miami sold out its entire 2015-16 and 2016-17 men's basketball season ticket allotment, marking the first time in Hurricane Athletics history that a team has sold out its entire season ticket allotment in back-to-back seasons.

Layton also serves as the primary contact for ESPN with the recent launch of the ACC Network, first in digital format in August 2016 and building to the linear network in fall of 2019. Since 2015, Miami has produced over 200 live events on ESPN3/ACC Network Extra – a figure that ranks near the top of all ACC schools.

Layton, a Florida native, arrived in Miami after spending the 2013 and 2014 seasons at Colorado State University where he served as the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Sales and Marketing. During his time in Fort Collins, Colo., Layton's ticket sales plans drove double-digit increases in football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball revenue and tickets sold.

Before his arrival at Colorado State, Layton spent 13 years with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In his 13 years with the club, he handled a variety of responsibilities from sales, marketing, ticketing and luxury suite operations to advertising, accounting, finance and purchasing. Layton began his career with the Buccaneers as a customer service representative in 1999 before elevating to the role of Senior Director of Business Administration in 2011. Layton received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Saint Leo University in Saint Leo, Fla.

Annual giving has also seen unprecedented growth through extensive marketing, philanthropic re-branding and digital strategy. Since 2010, annual Hurricane Club Membership has increased by more than 100 percent to an all-time record of 11,500 active members and over \$14 million raised for student-athlete excellence. The Hurricane Club is consistently recognized nationwide for their use

of cutting edge technology and unique campaigns to drive annual support.

Marks has been a part of two major capital campaigns at the University of Miami: The Momentum Campaign, (2000-2008) which raised over \$1 billion for the University, and Momentum2. Under Marks' leadership, athletics exceeded its goal of \$68 million and raised more than \$85 million dollars towards the Momentum campaign and raised over \$118 million towards the university wide \$1.6 billion Momentum2 Campaign.

Prior to his return to UM Athletics, Marks served as assistant director of development at Wake Forest University, where he managed relationships for over 150 athletic donors in the southeast, including South Carolina, Georgia, North Carolina and Florida. Prior to Wake Forest, Marks was as assistant athletics director for development at Florida International University, where he managed all fundraising operations related to the opening of their new football stadium in 2008.

Marks is an active member of the National Association of Athletic Development Directors (NAADD) and is an adjunct professor in the School of Education Sports Administration Program teaching Sport Promotions and Sales.

A two-time Miami graduate, Marks earned his bachelor's degree in 2005 and his master's degree in 2008.

HEAD COACH PAIGE YAROSHUK-TEWS

21ST SEASON (17TH AS HC) | UCLA, 1996

Hometown: Miami, Fla. | Head Coach: Miami, 2005-present

An outstanding recruiter with unrivaled knowledge of the game and passion for teaching, the 2016-17 season marked the 16th illustrious year for Paige Yaroshuk-Tews as the head coach of the University of Miami women's tennis team.

The program's all-time winningest coach, Yaroshuk-Tews has turned the Hurricanes into a force nationally, leading Miami to the NCAA's Elite Eight in eight of the last 14 seasons, tied for the fourth-most quarterfinal appearances in the nation during that span. The Hurricanes have also made the Sweet 16 in 11 of the past 12 years, one of four programs to do so.

In her 15 years at Miami, Yaroshuk-Tews boasts an overall record of 319-103 (.756) and an ACC career record of 124-29 (.810). As a result of her unparalleled achievements, Yaroshuk-Tews was inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame in 2012.

Yaroshuk-Tews' desire to make Miami a national title contender on a yearly basis has helped the program consistently flourish with all-conference and All-American talent. The Hurricanes have not only made the NCAA Team Championship in each of her 16 years as head coach, but have also won at least one NCAA match every season. UM qualified for the ITA National Team Indoor Championships 12 straight years, from 2005-16, and was ranked in the top 10 at some point during the season in each of those campaigns. Yaroshuk-Tews annually brings in some of the top prep talent, reloading year in and year out for a program consistently ranked among the nation's best.

Since taking the head coaching position for the women's tennis program at Miami in 2001, Yaroshuk-Tews has led the Hurricanes on an unprecedented run in Coral Gables, Fla. In total, she has directed Miami to 12 Sweet 16 berths, eight Elite Eight trips and an appearance in the 2006 NCAA final, the program's first since 1985.

Miami hosted the first and second rounds of the NCAA Team Championship 12 straight years under Yaroshuk-Tews, each season from 2005-2016. The Hurricanes have turned in 15 straight ITA top-25 finishes, including 13 in the top 15. In eight of the last 12 seasons, Miami has ended the year in the top 10. Fifteen different Hurricanes have garnered a total of 30 ITA All-American honors under Yaroshuk-Tews, the former a program record for a coach. In 13 of her 16 seasons, at least one Hurricane has been named an All-American, and in nine of them multiple players received the honor. Under Yaroshuk-Tews' watch, 17 Hurricanes have combined for 32 All-ACC distinctions and 22 Miami players have totaled 39 Academic All-ACC recognitions.

Despite dealing with significant injuries throughout the 2017 campaign, Yaroshuk-Tews oversaw the team's 22nd consecutive NCAA Team Championship berth and 21st winning season in a row. The Hurricanes finished 13-12, concluded the campaign ranked No. 25 nationally and reached the second round of NCAA play. Miami had two First Team All-ACC honorees for the second straight year, as Sinead Lohan and Estela Perez-Somarrriba both garnered that distinction and All-ACC Academic Team accolades. Perez-Somarrriba, an ITA All-American, became the first Hurricane freshman to reach the NCAA Singles Championship Final Four, giving Miami a semifinalist for the third season in a row.

Yaroshuk-Tews guided Miami to a 21-6 record in 2016, the team's 11th 20-win season in a 13-year span. The Hurricanes went 12-2 in the ACC for the third year in a row, finishing in second place, and reached the ACC Championship final for the sixth time in 12 seasons in the ACC. Miami advanced to the Sweet 16 for the 11th year in a row and ended the campaign ranked No. 10 in the nation, its 13th straight top-15 finish and eighth top-10 finish in the last 11 years. Sinead Lohan, Stephanie Wagner and Wendy Zhang combined for a total of four ITA All-American distinctions. Wagner, the ITA Southeast Region Senior Player of the Year, broke the program's career wins record, finishing with 134. The All-American trio combined for six ACC Player of the Week honors, with Wagner winning four, the most by anyone since 2012, to conclude her career with eight. Lohan went 40-6 in singles, tied for the third-most wins in a season by a Miami player, and became the seventh different Hurricane to reach the NCAA Singles Championship Final Four, including the sixth under Yaroshuk-Tews.

The Hurricanes went 18-7 in 2015 and finished second in the ACC at 12-2. Miami reached the Sweet 16 for the 10th year in a row and earned a 12th consecutive top-15 finish. The team also finished in the top four of the ACC for the 11th straight year, each one since it joined the conference. On an individual level, Yaroshuk-Tews guided both Sinead Lohan and Stephanie Wagner to ITA All-American honors. Both of them reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Singles Championship, marking the third time ever—all under the direction of Yaroshuk-Tews—two Hurricanes did so the same year. Wagner was also named the ITA National Player to Watch. UM set a program record with five nationally-ranked singles players in the year-end rankings and tied the top mark set the previous season with six different players ranked in either singles or doubles.

In 2014, Miami posted its sixth consecutive 20-win season and 10th in the last 11 years, finishing at 21-6, with a 12-2 mark in the ACC to tie for first place. The Hurricanes hosted the NCAA Team Championship first and second rounds for the 10th consecutive year and reached the NCAA round of 16 for the ninth straight time. Additionally, UM made the ITA National Team Indoor Championships for the 10th season in a row. Miami ended the year at No. 12 in the nation and two Hurricanes, Monique Albuquerque and Clementina Riobueno, earned ITA All-American recognition. Six different Hurricanes ended the season ranked in either singles or doubles, a new program record.

The 2013 season saw Miami win its first ACC Championship title, as the Hurricanes knocked off a trio of top-30 teams in Cary, N.C., including second-ranked North Carolina in the semifinals. Miami went on to finish 23-6, marking the most wins for the program since 2009 and the third-most during Yaroshuk-Tews' tenure. The season also marked the fifth consecutive trip to the Elite Eight for the Hurricanes, then the longest streak in the country. UM concluded the year ranked eighth, its fifth straight top-10 finish, and Yaroshuk-Tews was named the ITA Southeast Region Coach of the Year, while her assistant coach, Alex Santos, was chosen as the ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year.

During the 2012 season, the Hurricanes advanced to their fourth consecutive NCAA Team Championship Elite Eight, before falling to eventual national champion Florida. Miami played host to North Florida and Utah in the first two rounds of the tournament, winning both matches, 4-0. In the Sweet 16, the Hurricanes exacted revenge on ACC foe North Carolina, winning 4-2 to erase the memory of a 4-3 loss to the Tar Heels in the regular season. Miami wound up ninth in the final national rankings, and Anna Bartenstein was named an ITA All-American, making it nine straight seasons Yaroshuk-Tews coached a player who received the honor.

In 2011, Yaroshuk-Tews led Miami on another deep run in the NCAA Team Championship, winning at home in the first two rounds before taking down Michigan in the round of 16 in Stanford, Calif. The Hurricanes finished the season ranked seventh nationally. Also in 2011, senior Bianca Eichkorn became the program's all-time winningest singles player (133 victories) en route to numerous All-America and all-conference honors. Among them, Eichkorn became the fourth UM player in the last seven seasons to be named ACC Player of the Year under Yaroshuk-Tews, who surpassed 200 career wins with Miami's NCAA-opening 4-0 victory May 13 against FIU. Anna Bartenstein was also named an ITA All-American in 2011, making it four straight years the Hurricanes had at least two players garner the accolade.

In 2010, Yaroshuk-Tews led the Hurricanes to the NCAA quarterfinals, a No. 10 final ranking and a 20-6 record, UM's sixth 20-win season in the last seven years. Miami also posted a 10-1 mark in ACC play to finish in second place. For the second straight year—the first time that happened since 1985-86—three Hurricanes earned ITA All-America honors, this time Bianca Eichkorn, Gabriela Mejia and Laura Vallverdu, who also won the Honda Sports Award. Vallverdu was an All-American in singles and doubles, giving Miami four All-America honors for the first time since 1988. Additionally, Vallverdu set the program record for singles wins (131) and became the fourth four-year All-American in program history and the first under Yaroshuk-Tews. Eichkorn and Vallverdu both reached the NCAA Singles Championship quarterfinals, the second straight year two Hurricanes did so after it had not previously happened in program history. Vallverdu made the semifinals, to become the program's first two-time semifinalist.

During the 2009 season, Yaroshuk-Tews claimed the ACC Coach of the Year award after leading UM to a 26-5 mark, its second-best record ever during the NCAA era (1982-present). The Hurricanes went 16-0 at home, captured the ACC regular season title at 10-1 and registered 12 consecutive victories leading into the ACC Championship final. Yaroshuk-Tews saw her team advance to the NCAA quarterfinals and concluded the season seventh in the country, its second best finish of the last 32 years. For the first time since 1988, three UM players were named ITA All-Americans, in Bianca Eichkorn, Julia Cohen and Laura Vallverdu. All three reached the NCAA Singles Championship round of 16, a first in school history. Cohen and Eichkorn became the first Hurricane duo to make the semifinals the same year, and Vallverdu finished as the second finalist in program history. In total, four Hurricanes played in the NCAA Singles Championship, marking the first time that happened, and four Miami duos were listed in the final ITA doubles rankings for the first time ever.

In 2008, Miami finished with a 17-6 overall mark, snapping a string of four consecutive 20-win seasons. The Hurricanes faced 18 ranked opponents and went 12-6 against them. UM hosted the first two rounds of the NCAA Team Championship for the fourth straight year and reached a third consecutive Sweet 16. The Hurricanes' 6-1 win over No. 45 NC State April 12 gave Yaroshuk-Tews her 132nd



victory to pass legendary Miami coach Ivan Duvenhage (1982-88) for the program record. Miami ended the season at No. 14 in the nation and Laura Vallverdu was named an ITA All-American.

During the 2007 season, Yaroshuk-Tews led the Hurricanes to a 22-7 mark, the team's fourth straight 20-win season and to the NCAA quarterfinals for the second straight season. Miami went 17-1 at home, with the lone loss against eventual NCAA champion Georgia Tech. The Hurricanes finished the season ranked ninth in the nation, their second straight top-10 finish. Audra Cohen and Laura Vallverdu were both named ITA All-Americans, making it three straight years UM had multiple honorees for the first time since 1986-88. Cohen went 42-2 in singles, became the first player in program history win the national title in the NCAA Singles Championship and was also the first to win the Honda Sports Award. She also won her second consecutive ITA National Player of the Year Award and ACC Player of the Year award, making it three straight years a Hurricane earned both accolades. It marked just the second time ever a school had three straight ITA National Player of the Year winners on the women's side, and Cohen was fifth woman to win the award in back-to-back years. Cohen ended the season at No. 1 in the nation for the second year in a row, marking the third straight time a UM player finished first, and she was selected to the ITA All-Star Team as well. Three Hurricanes made the NCAA Singles Championship for the third time ever, and first since 1985. Yaroshuk-Tews reached 100 wins with a 6-1 win over eighth-ranked Baylor Feb. 3, becoming the third coach in program history to get to triple digits. Her assistant coach, David Anderton, garnered the ITA National Assistant Coach of the Year award for his work with the team.

The 2006 campaign was a special one for the Miami program, as the Hurricanes advanced to the final of the NCAA Team Championship for the first time since 1985 and the second time ever. UM upset second-ranked Notre Dame in the quarterfinals and third-ranked USC in the semifinals. The impressive run came to an end in the championship match against two-time defending champion and top-seeded Stanford. The Hurricanes finished the season at 24-7 and shared the ACC regular season title for the second straight year. Yaroshuk-Tews' squad came up with big wins against some of the nation's best teams, going 5-3 against top-10 teams, including a 4-2 mark against opponents ranked in the top three. The Hurricanes finished the season ranked fourth in the country, their first top-five finish since 1987 and the fourth-best record in program history during the NCAA era (1982-present).

The same year, Melissa Applebaum and Audra Cohen were both named ITA All-Americans, making it back-to-back years the Hurricanes had a pair of honorees for the first time since the 1987-88 season. Cohen went 34-2 in singles and finished the season ranked No. 1 in the nation, the second straight year a Hurricane took the top spot. She was named the ITA National Player of the Year and ACC Player of the Year, making it back-to-back years a Hurricane won both awards, and she was nominated for the Honda Sports Award. Cohen and Applebaum ended the year ranked second nationally in doubles and made the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship. Both of them were named to the ITA All-Star Team. Additionally, four Hurricanes made the year-end ITA rankings for the first time in 30 years.

The team flourished in 2005 under Yaroshuk-Tews, earning a 21-5 overall record, marking its second consecutive 20-win season. Miami went 9-1 in Atlantic Coast Conference play in its inaugural season in the league to tie for first place and also reached the ACC Championship final. The Hurricanes made the USTA/ITA National Team Indoor Championships and upset fourth-ranked UCLA, 4-3. UM earned an automatic bid to host the first two rounds of the NCAA Team Championship and fell to California in the second round to snap a 27-match home winning streak. The Hurricanes finished at No. 13 in the nation and both Audrey Bañada and Megan Bradley were named ITA All-Americans, the first time Miami had multiple players earn the honor since 1992. The pair also reached the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship, the first Miami duo to do so since 1992. Bradley set a program record for singles wins with 44, finishing at 44-2 and winning 39 straight matches along the way. She won the ITA National Indoor Intercollegiate Championships title, finished the season ranked first in the nation, made the ITA All-Star Team, and won ACC/UM Female Scholar-Athlete of the Year and ITA National Senior Player of the Year. Additionally, Bradley was the first Hurricane to win ITA National Player of the Year and the first to receive the ACC Player of the Year award. Her ITA national awards were the first by a Hurricane since 1991.

In 2004, Yaroshuk-Tews led her team to yet another successful season and earned her second BIG EAST Coach of the Year award. The Hurricanes finished with a 20-4 overall record and were ranked 15th in the final poll, the team's highest ranking since 1991. Miami made the BIG EAST Championship final for the 13th straight year—every one it participated in as a conference member—and won its eighth title. Half the titles and seven of the finals appearances came with Yaroshuk-Tews on the coaching staff. The Hurricanes were part of one of the biggest upsets in collegiate tennis history in 2004. They beat previously undefeated and top-ranked Florida, 4-3, in the second round of the NCAA Team Championship in Gainesville, Fla. Miami had not defeated the Gators since the 1986 season. The Hurricanes advanced to the Sweet 16 for the first time since 1999 and defeated No. 11 Tulane, 4-1, to reach the Elite Eight for the first time since the 1986. Megan Bradley was named an ITA All-American, the first Hurricane to garner the honor since 1999, which was also the last time Miami won 20-plus matches. After the season, Yaroshuk-Tews was tabbed to coach the prestigious USA Tennis Collegiate Team.

During the 2003 season, Yaroshuk-Tews led her team to a 17-7 record and an eighth consecutive trip to the NCAA Team Championship. Her squad advanced to the second round of the tournament and finished the season ranked 23rd in the country, marking the program's first top-25 finish since 1999. The Hurricanes had two players—Melissa Applebaum and Megan Bradley—in the NCAA Singles Championship for the first time since 1992, and placed a pair—Applebaum and Bradley—in the NCAA Doubles Championship for the first time since 1997, both ending the longest droughts in program history.

In 2002, her first season as head coach, Yaroshuk-Tews guided the Hurricanes to their seventh BIG EAST Championship title and she was named BIG EAST Coach of the Year. The team finished with a 14-7 record and reached the second round of the NCAA Team Championship for the first time in three years. Half of Miami's wins came against ranked opponents that season and the Hurricanes had a player, Mari Toro, finish the season nationally ranked for the first time since 1999.

Yaroshuk-Tews spent the 1998 and 1999 seasons as the assistant coach at Miami before being promoted to associate head coach for the 2000 and 2001 seasons. During that stretch, the Hurricanes won the BIG EAST Championship in both 1998 and 2000. In Yaroshuk-Tews' opening year on staff, UM had its first All-American—Lioudmila Skavronskaia—in three years, quickly ending the program's first two-year drought without one since its first two years of existence (1973-74).

Prior to joining the Miami staff, Yaroshuk-Tews worked at the United States Tennis Association (USTA) Player Development Headquarters in Key Biscayne, Fla., as a traveling coach with the top U.S. junior players. Before her USTA appointment, Yaroshuk-Tews played professionally in satellite and challenger events. A Miami native and Killian High School graduate, Yaroshuk-Tews stood out among Florida juniors. In the Girl's 18 Division, she held the No. 1 ranking in Florida and the No. 8 spot nationally.

Yaroshuk-Tews went on to star at UCLA, where she was a four-year letter winner and two-time ITA All-American. The Bruins made the NCAA Team Championship and finished in the top 15 all four of her seasons on the team, including a trio of top-10 finishes. She made an immediate impact as a freshman in 1993, playing No. 5 singles and No. 2 doubles for UCLA, who finished No. 13 in the nation. Her junior year, in 1995, Yaroshuk-Tews played No. 3 singles and No. 3 doubles for the Bruins, who concluded the year sixth in the country after reaching the Elite Eight. Individually, Yaroshuk-Tews made the NCAA Singles Championship and finished ranked No. 78 nationally.

As a senior in 1996, Yaroshuk-Tews played No. 2 singles and No. 1 doubles for the Bruins, who made the Final Four and ended the season ranked fourth. Yaroshuk-Tews won the PAC-10 Indoor and Outdoor Doubles Championships with partner Keri Phebus and achieved ITA All-America and All-PAC-10 honors in both singles and doubles. The Bruins' top tandem was ranked as high as No. 1 in the nation during the 1996 season and finished No. 3, while Yaroshuk-Tews achieved a singles ranking as high as No. 13 and closed at No. 21. She made the round of 16 of the NCAA Singles Championship and the quarterfinals of the NCAA Doubles Championship. In addition, Yaroshuk-Tews was honored with UCLA's "Champs Award," given to the school's most inspirational female athlete, and was named the team's Most Valuable Player. She was also appointed to the Rolex/ITA Collegiate All-Star Team.

Yaroshuk-Tews graduated from UCLA in 1996 with a bachelor's degree in sociology, while earning PAC-10 academic honors. She began UM's graduate studies program in elementary education during the spring of 1999.

Yaroshuk-Tews is the daughter of Ernie and Carol Yaroshuk. Her father was a member of the University of Miami baseball team from 1961-63, and was inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame in 1992. He holds the third highest batting average (.448) in the program's single season history. Yaroshuk-Tews and her father form the only father-daughter duo in the UMShoF.

On Jan. 10, 2004, Yaroshuk-Tews was married to Scott Tews. The couple lives in Palmetto Bay, Fla., with their daughter, Emma, and son, Landon.

LAURA VALLVERDU

ASSOCIATE HEAD COACH

Sixth Season | Miami, 2010

After completing her second year as an assistant coach for the University of Miami women's tennis program in 2014-15, Laura Vallverdu was promoted to associate head coach.

Before earning the title as a full-time assistant, Vallverdu was the team's volunteer assistant coach for one year and prior to that was a graduate manager for a season. She is now in her seventh year on staff at Miami, including her third as the associate head coach.

Vallverdu was a four-year (2006-10) letter winner at Miami under head coach Paige Yaroshuk-Tews and spent one season as an assistant coach at Barry University after graduating. There, Vallverdu helped guide the Buccaneers to a 27-1 record and their first national championship, and she was named the ITA Division II South Region Assistant Coach of the Year.

A native of Valencia, Venezuela, Vallverdu is third all-time at Miami in singles wins with 131 total, which was the record when she concluded her career in 2010. Vallverdu reached the finals of the NCAA Singles Championship as a junior in 2009 and advanced to the semifinals the next year, making her the only two-time semifinalist in program history.

As a senior in 2010, Vallverdu led the Hurricanes in singles wins with 35, finishing at 35-13, including a 21-12 mark against nationally ranked opponents. She completed the season ranked fourth in singles, her second-consecutive top-10 finish and fourth-straight top-20 finish, as well as seventh in doubles.

Vallverdu was the first player in University of Miami history to win at least 30 singles matches in each of her four years. She was a five-time All-American (four singles, one doubles), the fourth four-year All-American in school history and a four-time All-ACC selection, a first in the program's history.

In 2010, Vallverdu won the Honda Sports Award in tennis, designating her as the nation's top collegiate female athlete in the sport. The honor was based on the results of national balloting among 1,000 NCAA member schools as part of the Collegiate Women Sports Awards program. She was also one of four nominees for the award in 2009, when she helped Miami earn the top seed at the ACC Championship for the first time.

Over Vallverdu's 10 years associated with the Miami women's tennis program as a player or coach, the Hurricanes are 202-66 (.754) overall and 97-24 (.802) in ACC matches. In nine of those 10 seasons, Miami has reached the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Team Championship and finished ranked in the top 15 in the nation. Six times, the Hurricanes have made the Elite Eight and they have finished in the top 10 on six occasions.

In 2013, Vallverdu helped lead Miami to its first ACC Championship title. The Hurricanes then won a share of the ACC regular season title the following season, Vallverdu's first after being promoted to assistant coach. She has also mentored seven Hurricanes to a total of nine ITA All-America honors in her first six years on Miami's staff, as well as guided eight players to 13 total All-ACC accolades.

During those six seasons, Vallverdu has helped the Hurricanes tally a 117-42 (.736) record. Miami has surpassed 20 wins in four of those campaigns and earned a quartet of top-10 finishes. In each of the last three years, a Miami player reached the semifinals of the NCAA Singles Championship, the first Hurricanes do so since Vallverdu herself in 2010.

Vallverdu graduated from Miami in 2010 with a bachelor's degree in psychology with a minor in business, and then earned her master's degree in sport administration from Miami in 2012.



MACI EPSTEIN

STUDENT ASSISTANT COACH

First Season | Virginia, 2016

Maci Epstein joined the University of Miami women's tennis staff in advance of the 2017-18 season and serves as the program's student assistant coach.

Epstein played for the Hurricanes in 2016-17 after joining Miami as a graduate transfer from the University of Virginia. She tallied 17 singles wins, including four en route to a semifinal berth at the 2016 ITA Southeast Regional Championships, and earned a career-best No. 69 mark in the national rankings.

At Virginia, Epstein helped the program to its first two ACC Championship titles and first NCAA Elite Eight berth. The Cavaliers made the NCAA Sweet 16 and finished top-15 all three of her seasons in Charlottesville, Va. Epstein peaked at fifth in the country in doubles in 2012-13, then the highest mark in Virginia history, and she was a VaSID All-State Second Team pick in singles in 2014-15. She concluded her collegiate career with superb records of 89-55 in singles and 93-54 in doubles.

A native of Winter Park, Fla., Epstein graduated from Virginia in 2016 with a degree in media studies and sociology. She is currently pursuing a master's degree at Miami in communication studies.



IRELIAM “COOKIE” GUADALUPE

ATHLETIC TRAINER

First Season | Florida Southern, 2006

Ireliam “Cookie” Guadalupe joined the University of Miami in October 2017 as an associate athletic trainer. She works primarily with the Miami women’s tennis team.

Prior to joining the Hurricanes, Guadalupe spent five-plus years as the director of sports medicine at Ave Maria University. Here many responsibilities there included overseeing all athletic training operations, supervising staff, developing emergency action plans and managing the budget.

While at the NAIA institution in Ave Maria, Fla., Guadalupe also served as an adjunct professor for a year. She was an adjunct professor at Florida Gulf Coast University from 2014-17.

Guadalupe spent two years at Wellstar Health Systems in Marietta, Ga., as the head athletic trainer for the Atlanta Beat women’s professional soccer team. She preceded that with 19 months as an athletic trainer at IMG Academy in Bradenton, Fla.

A certified athletic trainer for over a decade, Guadalupe is a member of multiple professional organizations and carries several certifications. She has worked numerous U.S. Women’s Soccer youth camps, a CONCACAF Olympic Qualifier, two national cheerleading competitions and the movie “42.”

Guadalupe, who is currently pursuing her doctorate in education at FGCU, has given a variety of presentations at national conferences and conducted multiple research studies.

A native of Fort Myers, Fla., Guadalupe graduated from Florida Southern College in 2006 with a degree in athletic training. She received her master’s in sports medicine with a concentration in athletic training from Georgia State University in 2008 after serving as a graduate assistant athletic trainer for nearly two years at nearby Kennesaw State University.



BRIAN GABRIEL

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING COACH

First Season (fifth at UM) | Incarnate Word, 1996

Brian Gabriel finished his fourth year as an assistant strength and conditioning coach with the Hurricanes in 2016-17. He has had direct oversight of the Miami baseball program since 2014 and began working with the women’s tennis team in 2017.

Gabriel arrived in Miami after serving for six years as the head strength and conditioning coach at Coastal Carolina University. From 2006-09, Gabriel was the director of strength and conditioning for the Chanticleers’ Olympic sports teams. In December 2009, he was promoted to director of speed, strength and conditioning for all sports, including the Chanticleers baseball and football teams.

Gabriel’s strength and conditioning programs helped impact a Chanticleers baseball program that captured six consecutive Big South Conference Championships, six NCAA Regional appearances, three NCAA Regional host spots, and two NCAA Super Regional appearances.

Certified by the National Strength & Conditioning Association, Gabriel arrived at CCU in 2006 from Columbia University, where he served as an assistant strength coach and director of football strength and performance for four years. Prior to his time at Columbia, Gabriel had spent one year at Trinity (Texas) University as head strength and conditioning coordinator, as well as one year in the same position with the Detroit Dogs of the American Basketball Association - who won the ABA’s World Championship that year.

A 1996 graduate of the University of Incarnate Word with a bachelor’s degree in psychology, Gabriel earned his master’s degree in biobehavioral science-physical education from Columbia in 2006.

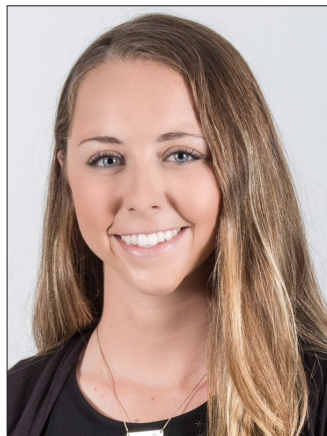
Gabriel and his wife, Guadalupe, have a son named Zion.

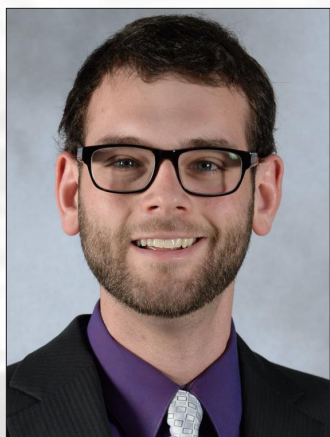

2017 Honors

Estela Perez-Somarriba earned ITA All-America recognition in singles, becoming the eighth freshman to do so in program history, including the seventh in singles. Overall, it was the ninth ITA All-America honor for a Miami freshman, as Ronni Reis garnered the distinction in both singles and doubles in 1984-85. She became the 28th Hurricane to be an ITA All-American, including the 15th under head coach Paige Yaroshuk-Tews, and it marked the 64th total honor by a Miami player, including the 33rd under Yaroshuk-Tews. The Madrid native was one of 11 freshmen in the nation to pick up the accolade and one of only seven to do so in singles.

Both Perez-Somarriba and Sinead Lohan were tabbed as First Team All-ACC picks. Miami was one of four schools with multiple players on the top team and this was the fourth year in a row the Hurricanes had at least two All-ACC honorees. Lohan became the sixth Hurricane to garner at least three All-ACC distinctions, as she was a first-team choice in 2017 and a second-team selection in 2016. Perez-Somarriba was the 17th different Miami player to earn All-ACC honors in the team's 13 years as a member of the conference.

The same two Hurricanes, Perez-Somarriba and Lohan, were also named to the All-ACC Academic Team. It marked the 11th straight year multiple Miami players made the list. Lohan became the 12th multiple-time honoree in program history and Perez-Somarriba the 17th with at least one such recognition.

In addition, Lohan picked up one ACC Player of the Week award, garnering the accolade on April 18. She was also a HERO Sports Hero of the Week nominee on April 20. Perez-Somarriba, Maci Epstein, Silvia Fuentes and Ana Madcur all garnered ITA Scholar-Athlete honors and Miami was named an ITA Academic Team for the third year in a row.

2017 Final Rankings Notes

- The Hurricanes ended the season ranked No. 25 in the country, their 15th consecutive top-25 finish.
- Miami concluded the campaign as the fourth-highest-ranked team in the ACC, behind only fifth-ranked North Carolina, ninth-ranked Georgia Tech and No. 12 Duke.
- Miami was one of just seven schools in the nation with two singles players in the final top 30, along with Florida, Georgia, Michigan, North Carolina, Pepperdine and Vanderbilt.
- Sinead Lohan (No. 21) missed ITA All-America honors by one spot, but became the fourth player in Miami history with three top-25 finishes, joining Ronni Reis (1985-88), Lise Gregory (1985-87) and current associate head coach Laura Vallverdu (2007-10). She also became the fifth Hurricane with three top-30 finishes, as Stephanie Wagner (2014-16) did so, too.
- Estela Perez-Somarriba (No. 26) ended the season with her highest mark of the year and was the sixth-highest-ranked freshman in the nation, including second-highest among ACC freshmen. The mark also is the sixth-best by a freshman in program history.
- For the 13th time in 14 years, Miami had at least one player in the final top 30. Also, for the seventh time in the past 11—including the third in a row—two Hurricanes finished top-30.

2017 NCAA Singles Championship

Estela Perez-Somarriba and Sinead Lohan both competed in the 2017 NCAA Singles Championship. For Lohan, it was her third straight berth, making her the ninth Hurricane to appear in the event at least three times. This was the 15th season in a row and the 32nd time in the 36-year history of the tournament Miami was represented in the field. Additionally, it was the 18th time, including the ninth under Paige Yaroshuk-Tews, multiple Hurricanes participated.

Perez-Somarriba advanced all the way to the Final Four, becoming the eighth Hurricane to reach the semifinals and marking the ninth such appearance in program history. She became the first Miami freshman to make the Final Four and, then at No. 40, was the lowest-ranked semifinalist since No. 43 Stacey Tan of Stanford in 2011. The Madrid native topped four top-65 players, including three in the top 50 and two in the top 30, to get to the Final Four, where she dropped a three-set decision to sixth-ranked Belinda Woolcock of Florida, 1-6, 7-5, 3-6.

Lohan, who reached the Final Four in 2016 and the Elite Eight in 2015, dropped her opening round matchup, 6-3, 3-6, 3-6, against No. 24 Brienne Minor of Michigan, the eventual national champion. It was a rematch of the first round in 2016, when Lohan topped then-No. 19 Minor, 6-3, 6-4, in Tulsa, Okla.

- In each one of Paige Yaroshuk-Tews' 16 years as the Miami head coach, the Hurricanes have won at least one match in the NCAA Team Championship
 - Miami has won multiple NCAA matches, advancing to the Sweet 16, in 12 of those 16 seasons, including winning at least three matches to reach the Elite Eight in eight of them

Consecutive Seasons with a Player in the Final ITA Rankings: 16

- In all 16 Paige Yaroshuk-Tews' seasons as Miami's head coach, the Hurricanes have had at least one player in the final ITA singles and/or doubles rankings
 - Miami has had multiple players in the year-end rankings 15 straight seasons, including nine of the past 10 with at least four and six in two of the last four
- Since the start of the NCAA era (1982-present), at least one Hurricane has been in the final rankings all but two times (2000, 2001)

Consecutive Seasons at .500 or Better: 21

- The Hurricanes have finished no worse than .500 each of the last 21 seasons, a streak that began in 1997
 - Miami has been over .500 in 20 of those 21 years and at least seven matches over .500 in 18 of them
- In the program's 45 years, Miami has finished under .500 just twice and has been over .500 42 times, including 38 times with a record of at least five matches over .500

Consecutive NCAA Team Championship Appearances: 22

- Miami has made the NCAA Team Championship each of the past 22 seasons
- In 2017, Miami won, 4-0, over USF in the first round and fell to top-ranked Florida, the eventual national champion, 4-1, on the road in the second round

Since the NCAA Singles Championship began in 1982, 27 Hurricanes have combined for a total of 58 berths in the field, posting an overall record of 84-57 (.596). At least one Hurricane has participated 32 of 36 years (all but 1996 and 2000-02), with multiple players doing so 18 times, including three competing on five occasions (1984-87 and 2007) and four once (2009).

Miami has made the NCAA finals twice, falling to USC, 6-3, in Oklahoma City in 1985 and dropping a 4-1 decision against Stanford on the Cardinal's home court in Stanford, Calif., in 2006. Additionally, the Hurricanes made the Final Four in 1986 and defeated Trinity (Texas), 5-4, in Austin, Texas, in the third-place match.
