## ACC TITLE ON THE LINE WHEN MIAMI VISITS DUKE

Dramatic endings over the weekend have set up what could prove to be an even more dramatic match up on Friday night. No. 5 Miami will head to Durham, N.C. at 7 p.m. to face the No. 7 Duke Blue Devils at Cameron Indoor Stadium.

Each team currently sports a 13-1 conference record heading into the contest in which the winnner will most likely take the ACC Regular Season crown and earn a No. 1 seed in the ACC Tournament.

The Canes have had no success to date against the Blue Devils, having yet to win in eight all-time meetings. However, the injury bug has hit Duke hard this season, as it is left with eight scholarship players. One of those players is freshman center Elizabehth Williams. The frosh as been named the ACC Rookie of the Week on eight occasions this season. Sophomore point guard Chelsea Gray is also a playmaker, averaging a leagueleading 6.0 assists per game and scoring 11.5 points per contest.

## STEPPING UP

When Miami's junior forward Morgan Stroman went down with a season-ending Achilles injury, a huge void was left for the Canes. Not one member of the team can completely fill that void, but none has done more than Stefanie Yderstrom to help Miami since.

Before the Stroman injury, Yderstrom averaged 9.1 points per game and scored in double figures in nine of 19 games. In the eight games since, the Swede has scored in double digits six times, twice setting her career high with 22 points vs. Virginia Tech and 26 at No. 8 Maryland. Over that span, the 5-8 guard has averaged 13.9 points and has connected on 18 threepointers.

## UM DUO HONORED ON WOODEN AND USBWA LISTS

Miami Hurricanes Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams have been named to the Women's Midseason Nominee List for the 2011 John R. Wooden Award and the USBWA National Player of the Year Award. The Midseason Lists names the Top 20 candidates for each award.

## CANES REACH HIGHEST RANKING IN HISTORY

The Hurricanes, who finished the 2010-2011 season ranked tenth in the final ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll, moved up three spots in anticipation of their 2011-12 season. The No. 7 ranking in the Coaches' Poll is the highest rank in program history to begin a season.

The Hurricanes were also ranked No. 7 in the preseason Associated Press Poll.

Miami is currently ranked 5th in both the AP and Coaches Polls - the highest ranking in school history.

## PROTECTING THE BANKUNITED CENTER

With Miami's season-opening win over Texas-Pan American, the Canes won their 25th-consecutive home contest - setting a new program record.

Miami has extended that record to 39 games after its 67-60 victory over Rival Florida State on Feb. 19. The streak is currently the second-longest active streak in the nation, behind only Stanford (76). The streak began with the team's final regular season home game of the 200910 season and continued with a perfect 20-0 home record last season.

The previous record of 24 straight wins at home was set from the 1990-91 through the 1992-93 seasons.

## ON THE VERGE OF GREATNESS

With just 20 more rebounds, senior Shenise Johnson will become just the third player in NCAA Division I women's basketball history to score 2,000 points, pull down 1,000 rebounds and dish out 500 assists in a career.

After a nationwide survey, it was found that Stanford's Nicole Powell (2000-04) and Old Dominion's Nancy Lieberman (1976-1980) are the only other women to accomplish the feat. With just nine more steals, Johnson will join Lieberman as the only two women to also collect 400 or more career steals.

## PEPPER EMERGES

6-6 junior transfer Pepper Wilson arrived in Miami's 73-61 win over NC State - the program's first-ever win at the Wolfpack's home arena. The powerful center scored a season-high 17 points, while ripping down a seasonbest 17 rebounds - the first double-double in a Miami uniform.

## SHENISE DAZZLES IN SCORING 2,000 POINTS

Miami's versatile senior guard Shenise Johnson became the fourth player in program history to reach the 2,000-point plateau. Needing 15 points to reach the milestone heading into UM's Jan. 15 contest at Florida State, Johnson started the game on fire, hitting seven of her first 10 shots. Her final bucket of the half, a layup coming off of a Seminole turnover, proved to be her 15th point of the game. Johnson would finish the contest with a game-best 24 points, leading the Canes to victory - the first win in nearly 25 years at Florida State.

Johnson currently has 2,167 points and needs just 27 to pass Frances Savage (1988-92) for third place on the school all-time scoring list.

## UM GREAT JAMES NAMED AN ACC LEGEND

The Atlantic Coast Conference announced its eighth annual class of ACC Women's Basketball Legends and Miami great Tamara James will be among the honorees. The Legends Class of 2012 will be honored at the 2012 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament, which will be held March 1-4 at the Greensboro Coliseum.

The all-time leading scorer in women's basketball for the Miami Hurricanes, Tamara James set a scoring record for men and women in her four-year career at Miami with 2,406 points. James was named first-team AllACC in 2005 and 2006 and first-team All-Big East in 2004. She led the ACC in scoring both of years in the conference, averaging 22.3 in 2005 and 21.5 in 2006.

MORE HARDWARE FOR THE TROPHY CASE
With back-to-back double-doubles in the
Miami Holiday Tournament, Shenise Johnson led the Hurricanes to wins over Holy Cross and VCU. For her performance in the two-day event, the senior guard was named the Tournament's Most Outstanding Player. Earlier in the season, Johnson was named the Most Outstanding Player of the Great Alaska Shootout.

## A QUARTER CENTURY OF FUTILITY... OVER

For the first time since Jan. 29, 1987, the Hurricanes defeated Florida State in Tallahassee. Miami had lost its last nine meetings in the state capital prior to its Jan. 15 win. Miami raced to a 19-point lead early in the seond half. However, the Seminoles rallied late to tie the game at 57. Stefanie Yderstrom nailed a corner three with 17 seconds left that proved to be the game-winner.

## SWEDISH THREE-BALLS

Junior Stefanie Yderstrom leads the ACC with 58 three-pointers this season. The Ostertalje, Sweden native now has 158 career three-point field goals - second in program history. However, Riquna Williams is far and away the school's most prolific three-point shooter, sinking 262 for her career.

## "EPIC" PERFORMANCE

After rolling her ankle in Miami's win at Michigan State on Dec. 1, it wasn't a guarantee that Riquna Williams would play against No. 11 Rutgers on Dec. 5. Not only did Williams play, she scored a career-best 36 points. Williams only had five points at halftime, but poured in 31 in the second half and two overtime sessions in helping the Canes erase a 16-point second-half deficit and defeat the Scarlet Knights, 92-81.

## MORE THAN ANY OTHER

After wins over Rutgers (12/5) - 36 points - and Ole Miss (12/10) - 17 points - Riquna Williams was voted the ACC Player of the Week for the seventh time in her career. No other active player has earned the award more than Williams. Second place on that list with six awards is Shenise Johnson.

## CANES BACKCOURT NAMED TO WATCHLISTS

The University of Miami's Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams have been named to the Women's Preseason Nominee List for the 2011 John R. Wooden Award. The duo has also been selected to the "Wade Watch" list for the State Farm Wade Trophy Division I Player of the Year, as well as the Naismith Player of the Year List.

## MORE TO COME

National Player of the Year candidate Shenise Johnson ranks in the Top 10 of many categories for UM career records including points (4th), assists (5th), rebounds (2nd), and steals (1st). Johnson is the only player in Miami history to be ranked in the Top 10 of all four of those categories.

## THE ACC KNOWS

Johnson, the ACC Preseason Player of the Year and a preseason All-American, scored a game-high 18 points in a 72-55 victory over Alaska Anchorage in the Great Alaska Shootout's first round, earning Player of the Game honors. In the tournament final against USF, Johnson nearly recorded a triple-double with 11 points, nine rebounds and nine assists. For her performance in the two games, Johnson was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player.

The Henrietta, N.Y., native amassed game-highs in points (22), rebounds (6), assists (8) and steals (7) against Longwood in a 92-43 victory to wrap up the week.

## HIGH PRAISE FOR THE CANES

After Miami defeated Michigan State in the Big Ten/ ACC Challenge, Spartan head coach Suzy Merchant said, "I'm not surprised. We knew what they were going to do. We practiced against six and seven guys on our scout team. But from 1 to 5 , that's the fastest, most athletic team we've faced in my career. We've played Duke, and it's not even close."

ULM's Mona Martin had even more praise to hand out, saying, "Last year we played Texas A\&M, and they end up winning the thing [NCAA title], and I think this UM team could be a big contender for the national championship if they stay healthy," Martin said. "They have so much depth, play so hard. They're going to be way up there this year. I've watched a lot of film, lot of ballgames, and they run the floor better than any team l've watched from point guard to post. Their transition offense is unbelievable. I can't say we've ever played a team that runs the floor that well, and l've been in this business 36 years. There is a lot of desire and fight in those kids."

## JOHNSON TABBED ACC PRESEASON POY

Shenise Johnson returns as the 2011-12 ACC Preseason Player of the Year. The senior was named the 2010-11 ACC Player of the Year, the first Hurricane player to win the award, and voted to last year's All-ACC First Team and All-ACC Defensive team.

## MIAMI DUO NAMED PRESEASON ALL-ACC

The Preseason All-ACC Team is highlighted by the Miami senior guard tandem of Johnson and Williams. The two led the Canes to a 20-0 home record last season at the BankUnited Center.

Johnson, the first Associate Press Preseason AllAmerican in team history, earned 2010-11 ACC Player of the Year honors and her second straight selection to the All-ACC First Team. Williams, who led the conference and finished 11th in the nation in scoring, is also coming off a selection to the All-ACC First Team.

## CANE NAMED PRESEASON ALL-AMERICAN

University of Miami senior guard Shenise Johnson was one of five players named to the Associated Press Preseason All-America Team.

Johnson, who earned 25 of 40 potential votes, was joined on the preseason team by Baylor's Brittney Griner (40 votes), Notre Dame's Skylar Diggins (37), Stanford's Nnemkadi Ogwumike (37) and Tennessee's Shekinna Stricklen (21).

## 2010-11 Season Recap

## MIAMI FINISHES MEMORABLE SEASON

The 2010-11 University of Miami women's basketball team finished one of the best seasons in program history with an $88-83$ loss to 21 st-ranked and sixth seeded Oklahoma in the second round of the NCAA Tournament at John Paul Jones Arena in Charlottesville, Va.

The Hurricanes finished $28-5$, recording the most wins since the 1991-92 team tallied 30 victories.

## STRONG NON-CONFERENCE RECORD

Miami took care of business in the non-conference portion of the schedule, going 15-2 outside the ACC. Their signature win was the 81-72 victory over No. 20/12 Georgetown on Dec. 7 to establish the Canes as a national contender.

## 20-20

Miami won 20 games for the 10th time in program history. Following the 22-14 record in 2009-10, it was the first time the team had consecutive 20 -win seasons since the 1988-89 season through the 1991-92.

## DANCING

Miami earned a No. 3 seed in the NCAA Tournament in the Dayton Region. It was the first time since 2004 that the program advanced to the "Big Dance."

The Canes won their first round match up 80-62 over No. 14 Gardner-Webb at John Paul Jones Arena in Charlottesville, Va. behind 18 points from junior Shenise Johnson to setup a second-round game against No. 6 Oklahoma. It was the first win in the NCAA Tournament for the Hurricanes since 1993.

## WILLIAMS ALSO HONORED

Riquna Williams also picked up a number of accolades throughout the season, including being named to the All-ACC First Team. The guard was named ACC Player of the Week on four occasions throughout the year, and was a finalist for the WBCA/State Farm All-America team.

## KATIE MEIER EARNS MAJOR AWARDS

Head coach Katie Meier picked up several high-profile postseason awards for her success on the year. Meier was tabbed by the Associated Press as its Coach of the Year, sharing the award with Connecticut's Geno Auriemma and Stanford's Tara VanDerveer.

In addition, she took home the Atlantic Coast Conference Coach of the Year Award and RUSSELL ATHLETIC/ WBCA Region 2 Division I Coach of the Year honors, an award voted on by the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

Meier also won the Babe Didrickson Zaharias award and gained entrance to UM's prestigious Iron Arrow Society - known as the highest honor attained at the university.

## JOHNSON RECOGNIZED FOR SEASON

Shenise Johnson had one of the best seasons of any player in the country, earning a litany of awards for her efforts. Prior to the ACC Tournament, the junior was named ACC Player of the Year, the first Hurricane player to win the award, and voted to the All-ACC First Team and All-ACC Defensive team. In addition, the league honored her with Player of the Week on Jan. 3.

Johnson also earned spots on the Associated Press Third Team All-America, Full Court Press Second Team All-America, USBWA All-America and WBCA/State Farm All-America teams. She was also a finalist for the Wooden Award given to the top player in women's basketball.

## ACC TOURNAMENT

Miami earned the No. 2 seed in the 2011 ACC Tournament at the Greensboro Coliseum in Greensboro, N.C., receiving a first-round bye. The Canes drew NC State in the quarterfinals, defeating the Wolfpack 93-85 with four players scoring at least 15 points. In the semifinals, North Carolina jumped out to a big lead and never looked back, routing Miami 83-57 to end the tournament for the Canes.

## GIMME THAT

The Canes finished second in the nation with 13.7 steals per game. Morgan Stroman averaged the fifthmost steals per game, 3.7, with Shenise Johnson ranking tenth in the country at 3.2 per contest. Stroman, Johnson and Riquna Williams (2.8/game) were the top three stealers in the ACC. Miami grabbed a season-high 21 steals on three occasions - against Clemson, Lipscomb and Kennesaw State.

Bolstered by their steals, the Hurricanes also finished fourth in the nation in turnover margin (+7.97).

## SCORING TITLE

Riquna Williams led the ACC in scoring last season, averaging 21.7 points per game. Williams also totaled the most overall points in the league with 717 on the year. Shenise Johnson finished the season right behind her in scoring, finishing second in the conference at 19.6 points per game.


Head Coach Katie Meier
Katie Meier enters her seventh season as the head coach of the Hurricanes' women's basketball program in 2011-12. A well known and respected figure in women's basketball, Meier has worked tirelessly to put her mark on Miami's program and to build a winning tradition. All of her hard work was rewarded after the 2010-11 season as she was named the Associated Press National Coach of the Year - sharing the award with Connecticut's Geno Auriemma and Stanford's Tara VanDerveer.

Meier led the Hurricanes into the NCAA Tournament for the first time since 2004 and its win over Gardner-Webb in the first round was the first tournament win for the 'Canes since 1993. Miami entered the 2010-11 season with high internal expectations, but were picked eighth in the Preseason ACC Poll and were coming off a season in which it was the No. 12 seed in the ACC Tournament.

However, the Hurricanes exceeded all of the outside expectations and at one point, won 17 straight games. They were a perfect 20-0 inside the BankUnited Center and finished 12-2 in ACC play - earning their first regular season conference title since joining the league in 2004. As a reward, Meier was named the ACC Coach of the Year and later would be selected as the WBCA/RUSSELL ATHLETIC Region 2 Coach of the Year, as voted on by her peers.

Hired on April 19, 2005, then UM Athletics Director Paul Dee announced the appointment of Meier in front of national and local media, fans, alumni and support staff, signifying the beginning of a new era.

Following an unprecedented career as one of the greatest athletes to ever play in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Meier quickly established herself in the coaching ranks. Upon her appointment at UM, following an impressive four-year tenure as the head coach at Charlotte where she helped bring the 49er program into national prominence, Meier made it clear that her goal is to make Miami one of the premier women's basketball programs in the country.

In her first season, Meier wasted little time in making the first steps towards those goals. After receiving little attention in the ACC preseason polls, the Hurricanes posted an impressive overall record of 17-13. After fighting through a conference that would send nine teams to the postseason, including three to the NCAA Final Four. Miami finished with a sixth-place, 6-8 record in ACC play en route to earning a berth into the second round of the 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournament.

Throughout the season Miami posted wins over ranked teams such as Mississippi (No. 25), Boston College (No. 21) and Virginia Tech (No. 25)--and nearly knocked off then-No. 1 Duke in double-overtime. The Hurricanes also recorded wins over two eventual conference champions in Hartford (America East) and Oakland (Mid-Continent). Under her direction, standout Tamara James produced one of the greatest seasons ever seen by a UM player in 2005-06, including becoming the University's all-time leading scorer before being taken as the No. 8 overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics.

In Meier's second season in 2006-07, the Hurricanes got off to a strong start, winning seven of their first eight games--including a 79-70 win over Indiana to claim the UM Thanksgiving Tournament title. On Dec. 1, Meier picked up her 100th career victory as the Hurricanes defeated Jackson State, 77-50. However, with only eight healthy players to call upon by the start of the ACC schedule, Miami faced challenge after challenge competing in a league that ranked among the top-three strongest women's basketball conferences nationally and produced two of the NCAA Tournament's four No. 1 seeds in 2006-07.

Regardless, Renee Taylor emerged as the ACC's leading scorer--upholding Miami's streak of producing the league's leading scorer in all three years it had been a member. The All-ACC Second Team selection set school records in singlegame scoring with 42 points at Houston and became the 19th Hurricane to score at least 1,000 points-and just the sixth to do so in her first two seasons. In addition, transfer Maurita Reid emerged as a defensive threat, tying the school record with 10 steals versus Wake Forest and finishing among the ACC's leaders and NCAA's top 10 in steals per game.

The 2007-08 season, Meier's third with the Hurricanes, saw Maurita Reid continue her rise among the ACC elite. The senior was nothing short of impressive shooting beyond the arc and picking opponent's pockets. She hit four or more three-pointers on 10 different occasions and finished the season with 110 steals, good for second in the conference and fifth in the NCAA. The Queens, N.Y. native led the team in points ( 15.3 ppg ) and rebounding ( 5.6 rpg ) and was also named the ACC All-Defensive Team.

With a No. 21 incoming recruiting class, Meier and the Hurricanes saw significant improvement during the 2008-09 season. The freshman class was highlighted by McDonald's All-American Shenise Johnson - out of Henrietta, N.Y. and Riquna Williams - from nearby Pahokee, Fla.

Johnson lived up to the hype as she was the team leader on the season in points, rebounds, assists and steals. Under Meier's guidance, Johnson was named the ACC Rookie of the Week on three occasions and was named to the ACC All-Freshmen team as well as ACC Honorable Mention. The versatile guard/forward also led the U19 USA team to a gold medal finish in the 2009 World Championships in Bangkok, Thailand.

The 2009-10 season was one of the most successful in program history. Under Meier's vision, the Hurricanes advanced to the WNIT Championship game. Miami posted a 22-14 overall record - the first 20-win campaign since the 2002-03 season and just the eighth all-time.

In her sophomore season, Johnson was joined by a healthy Riquna Williams and the duo racked up accolades throughout the season. Johnson was named First Team All-ACC, while Williams garnered second-team honors. The tandem led Miami to a 5-1 WNIT record - the deepest postseason run in team history - with both earning all-tournament honors along the way.

Following the 2009-10 campaign, University of Miami Director of Athletics Kirby Hocutt announced that Meier signed a contract extension through 2015.
"We are excited about the tremendous progress our women's basketball team achieved this past season," said Hocutt. "Coach Meier continues to assemble a special group of talented young women at the University of Miami and we look forward to the future success of our program."

## MIAMI 83, TEXAS-PAN AMERICAN - NOV. 11, 2011

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Miami was leading by 20 points, and coach Katie Meier was steaming mad at halftime anyway
"You are playing," she said, "as bad as my haircut."
OK, so Meier's locks were a bit out of place Friday. Maybe it was worth a bad hair day to see national player of the year candidate Shenise Johnson come within an assist of a triple-double, have nine different players score and the seventh-ranked Hurricanes open their season with an 83-37 win over Texas-Pan American.

Johnson finished with 20 points, 13 rebounds and nine assists, Riquna Williams scored 16 points and the Hurricanes (1-0) forced 35 turnovers on the way to winning their 25th straight game at home, a program record.
"Not quite sure exactly why we were so awkward to start the game," said Meier, who won the AP's national coach of the year award last season. "I don't know a better word. It just felt very awkward. There was no flow, there was no rhythm, there was no energy and that was really disappointing. ... I'm sure it had to do a lot with Texas-Pan Am.

Say this for Texas-Pan American: The Broncs weren't intimidated early. Miami's lead was only 24-13 with less than 4 minutes left in the first half before the Hurricanes hit five straight shots, the last two by Stefanie Yderstrom

The Hurricanes were shooting 23 percent late in the half then shot 54 percent the rest of the way
"We found out what you have to do and how hard to you have to play to play against a team like this," Broncs coach Denny Downing said. "I think we learned from their passion, because obviously they're very passionate about what they're doing."

LaQuita Garner scored 14 for the Broncs (0-1). Texas-Pan American played some of the Big 12's toughest teams last season - Baylor, Texas, Oklahoma and Oklahoma State - and lost them all by an average of 50.8 points.

This one didn't seem as though it would turn into one of those blowouts, not the way the Broncs hung around for much of the first half.

Yderstrom and Morgan Stroman scored 12 each for the Hurricanes, who visit No. 3 Tennessee on Tuesday.
"We had it in mind," Yderstrom acknowledged afterward, when asked about the looming trip to Knoxville. "You can't overlook any competition. I think they gave us a good game, especially in the first half. We needed it."

Johnson was nearly perfect on the day. She shot 6 for 9 from the field, made all eight of her foul shots and controlled pace for the Hurricanes.
"The opponent is our opponent," Johnson said. "But if Miami does what Miami is supposed to do, we'll win. I don't think we were looking ahead. I think we were just worried about Miami."

And while it was the beginning of a season with Final Four hopes, Miami's start was more than a little rusty.

Miami was 6 for 26 from the field in the first 16 minutes, an uncharacteristic clip for a team that shot 43 percent last season. Here's a great example of how cold the Hurricanes were in the opener: There was one possession where four players all missed shots and Miami came away empty, a series that had Meier pivoting around and taking a somewhat purposeful walk a few steps down the sideline.

Eventually, the defending Atlantic Coast Conference regular-season co-champions got going, making their final five shots of the opening half. Yderstrom hit a 3-pointer with 1:22 left to push the lead to 33-13, and she converted a nifty reverse layup about a minute later to keep the margin at 20 points going into halftime.

So while Miami couldn't have liked the offensive numbers in the first 20 minutes, the defense made up for at least some of the trouble at the other end. In the first half, Texas-Pan American had 21 shot attempts - and 20 turnovers, unable to handle Miami's pressure.

In the second half, the offensive surge just kept going. The Hurricanes made seven of their first 13 shots after intermission, capped by a three-point play by Pepper Wilson with 13:14 left that gave Miami a 54-28 lead.
"Our bench did a fantastic job of changing our rhythm," Meier said. "And that's fun."

KNOXVILLE, Tenn. (AP) - Pat Summitt has fielded plenty of questions about her health lately. Certainly nothing has changed about her ability to grill her players at halftime when she's disappointed in their performance.

The third-ranked Lady Vols came into halftime tied at 42 with seventh-ranked Miami after being manhandled on the boards. Summitt got onto them hard during her halftime speech, and they responded with a 92-76 victory on Tuesday night in the State Farm Tip-Off Classic.
"If you ever doubt if Pat Summitt is still coaching, look at how our team responds coming out in the second half," associate head coach Holly Warlick said. "She got on them pretty hard. We all did as a staff about our rebounding effort, our hustle plays that weren't there. We challenged them for 20 minutes, and I think they responded."

It was the first big test of the season for two veteran teams, and the matchup lived up to its billing in the first-ever meeting for the programs.

Though the game pitted preseason All-Americans Shekinna Stricklen and Shenise Johnson against one another, the spotlight was stolen by Taber Spani and Meighan Simmons, who together hit 7 of 13 from 3 -point range.

The Lady Vols (2-0) came out after intermission and unleashed an 18-4 run to take control. Glory Johnson, who struggled in the first half against Miami's inside defense, hit a layup that made it $60-46$ with 16:19 to go.

The Lady Vols got sloppy, committing three turnovers that helped the Hurricanes charge back with nine unanswered points to cut the margin to seven, and with 7:31 to go, Shenise Johnson hit a jumper to cut the Lady Vols' lead to 73-68.

Miami (1-1) would get no closer. Two possessions later, Spani took an inbound pass with 10 seconds on the shot clock and launched a 3-pointer that hit nothing but net as the buzzer sounded.
"I thought that was the turning point of the game, as we were struggling kind of to get back in it," Miami coach Katie Meier said.

A couple of minutes later, Spani rebounded a missed 3-point attempt by Shenise Johnson and launched the ball across the court to Simmons, who charged to the basket for a layup to make it 84-68. The basket capped an 11-0 run that began with Spani's trey and sent the orange-clad crowd into a frenzy.
"I think it's more mental than anything else," said Spani, who played 39 minutes. "Obviously all of us have shot millions of shots throughout our careers, so it's just a mindset going in and knowing that you can knock down shots."

Simmons scored 18 points, Glory Johnson finished with 16 and nine rebounds, Stricklen added 15 points and Ariel Massengale had 11 points and nine assists.
"I thought across the board, everybody contributed in certain ways," Summitt said. "It's just a matter of who's coming in. At any given moment, we've got enough people that somebody's going to step up."

The Tennessee coaches expected a strong rebounding effort by the Lady Vols, so they instead asked the players to focus on not turning the ball over. By halftime, Tennessee had just six turnovers but had 13 fewer rebounds than Miami.

By the end of the game, the Lady Vols had put enough an effort on the boards to trail the Hurricanes $45-38$ in rebounding, and it was Miami that was struggling to hang onto the ball. The Hurricanes turned the ball over 21 times, leading to 23 points for the Lady Vols - 10 more than Miami got off giveaways.

Riquna Williams, who led the Atlantic Coast Conference in scoring a season ago, sank 24 points for Miami. Shenise Johnson added 17 and Morgan Stroman scored 11.

The stingy defensive play by both teams forced the ball to the hands of the outside shooters during the first half, leading four lead changes and two ties.

Miami took an early edge after scoring eight unanswered points. Williams and Stefanie Yderstorm each had a 3, while Stroman hit a pair of free throws to take an 8-2 lead, their largest margin of the first half.

A few minutes later, Tennessee went on an 8-0 run of its own, capped by a 3-pointer by Simmons off a dish by Massengale. The basket gave the Lady Vols an 18-16 lead - their first since the opening basket. They slowly built their margin to $38-31$ on a jumper in the paint by Alicia Manning with $4: 52$ in the first half, but Miami scored the final five points of the half to tie it at the break.

Our confidence was high," Shenise Johnson said. "(The score) was zero-zero."
The teams launched a flurry of long shots during their streaks, and the Lady Vols hit 7 of 13 and Miami 6 of 14 from behind the arc in the first half. Tennessee finished 11 of 22 from long range, while Miami missed all nine of its second-half attempts.

The Lady Vols have now won 38 straight games at home on the court named for Summitt, dating to a 62-54 loss to Duke on Feb. 16, 2009. They travel to Virginia on Sunday before hosting No. 1 Baylor at The Summitt on Nov. 27.

EAST LANSING, Mich. (AP) - Morgan Stroman scored 20 points in a near-perfect shooting night to lead No. 9 Miami past Michigan State 76-60 Thursday night in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge.

Stroman had 13 points at the break, hitting all four of her shots from the field and all five at the line for the much quicker Hurricanes (6-1). She finished 7 for 7 and 6 for 7 , respectively. Shenise Johnson added 13 points and Stefanie Yderstrom had 11 in Miami's second-closest game this season.

Porsche Poole had 17 points for the foul-plagued Spartans (5-3), who played without starters Lykendra Johnson and Taylor Alton for most of the first half. Michigan State trailed 38-26 at halftime. Courtney Schiffauer and Jasmine Hines each had nine points for Michigan State, while Becca Mills grabbed nine rebounds, all in the first 20 minutes.

Miami forced the Spartans into 19 turnovers and had 11 steals. That was more than enough when Michigan State shot just 3 for 16 on 3s.

The Hurricanes shot 45 percent from the field, 30 percent on 3 s ( 6 for 20 ) and 75 percent ( 12 for 16) on free throws. They had 15 assists and just 10 turnovers while running at every opportunity. The Spartans shot 42 percent from the field and 78 percent (7for 9 ) at the line, and had a 37-34 edge in rebounds.

Miami point guard Riquna Williams went down with a left knee injury and was helped off the court with 1:16 left before halftime. She returned briefly in the second half and finished with nine points.

The Hurricanes built a 36-20 edge with pressure defense, drives to the basket and a steady proces sion to the foul line. The Spartans had 13 turnovers in the first 20 minutes, when they were outscored $11-3$ at the line.

With Johnson and Alton back in the lineup, Michigan State pulled to 46-36 on an off-balance jumper by Poole and made it an eight-point game on a layup by Alton.

Miami kept the Spartans at bay with five of their six $3 s$ in the second half, two from deep in the right corner and one from up top by Yderstrom.

But Michigan State rallied again behind Schiffauer's aggression and Hines' strength inside. Annalise Pickrel's jumper with 6:14 to go pulled the Spartans to 59-52 with 6:14 left.

Stroman finally missed a free throw but made her second attempt, then converted a layup on a pass from Shenise Johnson to make it a 10-point game. On the Hurricanes' next possession, Yderstrom connected again from 21 feet to make it 65-52.

MIAMI 92, RUTGERS 81, 20T - DEC. 5, 2011
CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Riquna Williams said her stomach was still burning nearly an hour after the final whistle. Shenise Johnson limped with every step. Miami coach Katie Meier said she was looking for some oxygen.

A comeback for the ages left No. 9 Miami drained - but still perfect at home.
Williams scored a career-high 36 points, Johnson added 25 points and 12 rebounds and the Hurricanes knocked No. 11 Rutgers from the ranks of the unbeaten with a 92-81 double-overtime win Monday night, Miami's 28th straight in its own building. The Hurricanes trailed by 16 points with 17 minutes left in the second half, then started a most improbable rally against one of the nation's top defensive clubs.
"You've got to be really cocky and have some really confident kids to think that you're coming back from that one," Meier said. "You really do. Especially when you look over on the other bench and it's Rutgers, one of the best defensive teams in the history of women's basketball."

A clash of styles - Miami's offense vs. Rutgers' defense - was all Scarlet Knights for the first 25 minutes. Rutgers (8-1) was up 40-24 early in the second half, and Meier acknowledged afterward that she thought the Hurricanes were in real trouble.

Miami outscored Rutgers 68-41 the rest of the way.
"I don't think we played scared at all," Rutgers coach C. Vivian Stringer said. "I don't think we played very smart."

The Scarlet Knights got a layup from Erica Wheeler with 1.5 seconds left in regulation to force overtime and another game-tying shot from Betnijah Laney just before the buzzer and sending it to send it to a second OT.

But Williams took over for Miami in the second OT, hitting a pair of 3-pointers to get the Hurricanes going, and they survived. It was the first time Rutgers allowed 90 points since Jan. 2, 2003, and given the way the first 25 minutes of the game went, no one would have figured that was happening Monday night.

Of course, the next 25 minutes were the ones that told the story.
"Awesome game," Johnson said. "My heart rate is still pumping. Credit goes to Rutgers. It was just a fun, fun game."

April Sykes scored 19 points and grabbed 10 rebounds for Rutgers, Erica Wheeler scored 13 and Khadijah Rushdan added 10

Miami trailed for all but 2:35 of regulation, and still had plenty of chances to win before the overtimes. Johnson went 2 for 4 from the foul line in the final 38 seconds of regulation, so the Hurricanes' lead was never larger than two - giving Rutgers life.

The Scarlet Knights took advantage. Taking possession with 10.7 seconds left in regulation, Rutgers got the ball down low to Oliver. She missed a layup, but Wheeler was there for the putback with 1.5 seconds to play in regulation, tying the game at 63 .
"We made a couple mistakes down the stretch," Wheeler said. "But it's a learning experience. We definitely are getting better from this situation."

Stefanie Yderstrom's 3-pointer gave the Hurricanes the lead with 1:47 left in the first overtime. She appeared to cramp up on the next possession, so Williams simply waited for her chance, connecting from beyond the arc to push the Miami lead to 71-67. And once again, Rutgers rallied - Sykes' 3 with a halfminute to play got the Scarlet Knights to 73-72, and when Laney knotted it, the Rutgers bench leaped for joy.

It was the Scarlet Knights' final celebration of the night.
"They've got to grow up - yesterday," Stringer said, unhappy that the chance was wasted.
Rutgers came into the game having allowed only 70 points once - in the season opener - and on a six-game streak of not allowing any more than 52 points. Opponents were shooting 31 percent and committing more than 20 turnovers a game against the Scarlet Knights through eight games, so the Hurricanes knew exactly what to expect.

So predictably, Rutgers' man-to-man gave Miami fits.
But the Hurricanes did little to help their own cause, missing at least nine shots near the rim in a 9-minute span of the first half alone, falling behind 31-22 going into the locker room - after the Scarlet Knights held them to 27 percent shooting. And when Rutgers started the second half on a 9-2 run, capped by a jumper from Sykes, the lead was 40-24 with 17:23 left.

With that, Meier called timeout, and something clicked, just in time.

The win was Miami's 29th straight at home, while the loss snapped a five-game winning streak for Mississippi.
"We were flat coming out in the second half," Miami coach Katie Meier said. "Our second wave, our reinforcements, didn't score but went in with some energy and wore the other team down.

When our starters came back in, we were fresh against a fatigued Ole Miss team and we were able to blow the game open with some special performances.

Byrd scored 10 points to lead the Rebels (6-2).
"This is the real world of college basketball," Ladner said. "Miami has an outstanding team and an outstanding coach. Playing in this type of environment can really help us."

Miami ran off 11 unanswered points and took an 11-3 lead in the first 6:03.
Byrd, the Rebels' leading scorer, sat out 14 minutes of the first half with foul trouble and played only 18 minutes.
"Had that not happened, we would have been in a dogfight the entire game," Meier said. "But it was partially our scouting. We wanted to go at her and get her in foul trouble."

Shenise Johnson's 3-pointer with 8:32 remaining in the first half gave the Hurricanes their first double-digit lead at 18-6.
"They put a lot of pressure and take the offense away from you," Ladner said. "Their game plan is to pick you up full court and beat you the last 10 minutes."


## MIAMI 103, ULM 39 - DEC. 16, 2011

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Louisiana Monroe absorbed an early blow and never recovered against Miami. Riquna Williams, Shenise Johnson and Krystal Saunders each scored 16 points, and the No. 7 Hurricanes opened with a 22-0 run to rout the Warhawks 103-39 on Friday night.
"I had a lot of babies out there - seven freshmen - I played them all, what the heck," Louisiana Monroe coach Mona Martin said. "We only have three seniors. It's been a very tough season so far." The 16 points was a career best for Saunders, who went 6 of 8 from the field, including 2 of 3 from 3-point range. Through the Hurricanes' first nine games, the sophomore was shooting 27 percent from the field and was just 1 of 19 from beyond the arc.
"My teammates always have had confidence in me," Saunders said. "They told me to keep shooting." Morgan Stroman added 14 points and Michelle Woods had 13 for the Hurricanes in their 30th straight home win.
"It's fun this year; it's not just (Williams and Johnson)," Miami coach Katie Meier said. "We have a balanced team. The upperclassmen did a fantastic job of taking care of the game early. They made sure that we shared minutes like we did."

Johnson scored eight points, including two 3-pointers, during an opening 22-0 run by Miami (9-1), which was never threatened.

The Warhawks broke the scoring drought on Larrie Williams' jumper 4:53 into the game, but Miami scored the next 11 points and took a 33-2 lead on Jessica Capers' jumper with 9:26 to go in the half. Williams scored 11 points to lead Louisiana Monroe (1-10).
"They are very impressive, they run the ball so well," Martin said. "I've been in this business for 36
years and they run the floor better than any team I've ever seen."
The Hurricanes shot 12 of 16 from the field in the first 9 minutes, while the Warhawks converted only one of 13 shots. Miami used mostly reserves over the second 10 minutes of the first half and built a 55-19 lead at halftime.
"There are a lot of people in our second wave that would be starters somewhere else," Meier said. "It's very hard to break into a starting lineup that brought back every starter.
"I've been very blessed that l've had the same starting lineup for 43 games in a row."
Johnson's put-back 3:51 into the second half put the Hurricanes up by 40-64-24 - and Riquna Williams' layup with 10:34 remaining increased the lead to 79-28.

The Hurricanes also outscored the Warhawks 25-6 in fast break points and forced 30 turnovers. "They've got so much depth and they play hard," Louisiana Monroe coach Mona Martin said. "They run the ball so well from point guard to post."

Miami, which surpassed 90 points for the fifth time this season and topped 100 for the second time, outscored Louisiana Monroe 17-0 in the final 7:18.
"Last year we played Texas A\&M and they were ranked 12th at the time," Martin said. "They wound up winning the thing and I thought (Miami) could be a good contender for the national championship if they stay healthy."

## GEORGETOWN 71, MIAMI 46 - DEC. 21, 2011

WASHINGTON, D.C. (AP) - Seventh-ranked Miami and its high-powered offense finally met its match. No. 17 Georgetown held the nation's highest-scoring team to nearly half its average and 21 percent shooting in a 71-46 rout Wednesday night.
"(Georgetown) smacked us in the face and we ran and called our moms and asked for help instead of turning to each other," said coach Katie Meier.

Sugar Rodgers scored 24 points - including a trio of 3-pointers - to lead the Hoyas (10-2), who stifled the Hurricanes (9-2) from the start. Miami had averaged 87 points per game, and its worst offensive outing had been a 92-76 loss at Tennessee on Nov. 15.
"Credit to Georgetown," Shenise Johnson said. "They did a great job of dismantling us."
The Hoyas led 34-21 at halftime while holding Miami to just one field goal in the last six minutes while going on an 11-5 run, and maintained a double-digit lead the rest of the way.
"I think we rattled them a little bit, showed them that we were serious this year, and we got em," Alexa Roche said.

With just over seven minutes remaining, Suriya McGuire hit a 3-pointer to bring Miami within 15. But the Hoyas answered with a 12-0 run, highlighted by Tia Magee's three-point play, to take a 66-39 lead, their largest of the game.

Johnson led Miami with 10 points - her fewest of the season - on 1-for-13 shooting. Georgetown also limited the Hurricanes' second-leading scorer, Riquna Williams, to a season-low six points.
"Every time I got the ball there were two defenders running at me - when I did get the ball," Johnson said. "A lot times I had to just go get the rebound and try to go back up with it."

Magee scored 13, Rubylee Wright added 10, and Sydney Wilson grabbed 12 rebounds for Georgetown, which snapped a seven-game losing streak to Miami since 2000.
"They handed us a huge lesson," Meier said. "I'm regretful that it happened but l'll be more regretful if we don't take it and learn from it."

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) - Sylvia Hatchell spent all Monday night telling her North Carolina players to keep believing they could win despite yet another key injury, a bevy of turnovers and the struggle to find any rhythm offensively.

At least her Tar Heels proved they'll still listen to their coach on a rough night
Chay Shegog hit the go-ahead free throws with 1:11 left, helping No. 25 North Carolina rally past No. 12 Miami 65-63 in the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both teams.

Shegog finished with 20 points to lead the Tar Heels (11-2, 1-0 ACC), who won despite finishing with a season-high 31 turnovers. North Carolina trailed by eight with about $51 / 2$ minutes left before fighting back to take its first lead on Shegog's free throws. Freshman Brittany Rountree added 14 points for the Tar Heels, including two free throws with 16.7 seconds left to push UNC's lead to four.

The Tar Heels held on from there, surviving a missed layup by Miami's Riquna Williams that would've tied it with 2 seconds left as well as Morgan Stroman's hurried heave that fell way short as the horn sounded.
"About the only thing I can say is they never gave up and they played with a lot of heart," Hatchell said. "It wasn't pretty and we had a lot of turnovers, but they kept fighting and playing hard."

It was a victory that's sure to give the Tar Heels some confidence, not to mention show Hatchell tha she's got a bunch of fighters despite a rough start.

Williams knocked down 3-pointers on the first two possessions for the Hurricanes (11-3, 0-1) while the Tar Heels missed a pair of layups on their first two trips down the floor. An irate Hatchell had seen enough by that point, calling a timeout 68 seconds in to have an animated discussion with her players in the huddle.
"I said, ‘Look, y'all are playing like you're afraid of them,"' Hatchell said. "'We're in a battle out here, you know? You've got to be aggressive."'

But things got worse. First North Carolina fell behind by 11 points. Then senior guard She'la White rolled her left ankle while driving to the basket in the latest blow to a roster already depleted by injuries. White tried to return later in the half, but her departure looked crippling when freshmen Rountree and Shannon Smith were left as the only true ballhandlers against Miami's pressure - not to mention when Rountree picked up her fourth foul less than a minute into the second half.

At times, the Tar Heels were struggling to get the ball across midcourt against Miami's fullcourt trap Smith had nine turnovers and repeatedly heard frustrated streams both from the UNC sideline or her own teammates
Yet the Tar Heels played enough defense to hold Miami to 35-percent shooting, including 6-for-26 from 3 -point range. They also took a 41-34 rebounding advantage and finished with a 16-7 edge in secondchance points, including when the 5 -foot- 7 Smith somehow managed to grab her own miss and score to tie the game at 60 with 1:53 left

Meanwhile, the Hurricanes were going in the wrong direction
"We just didn't have that fight that we normally have," said Stroman, who had 13 points. "It's like, I guess, we're depending on everyone to make the big shots at the end of the game and at that time, we just need to step up and ... play with our chest out and play with confidence. And we weren't playing like that."

Miami led 58-50 on Stefanie Yderstrom's third 3-pointer with 5:19 left, but the Hurricanes missed eight of their last 10 shots. The teams were tied on the boards with about $71 / 2$ minutes left before the Tar Heels pushed ahead there late.

Williams finished with 16 points, including a driving layup while drawing a blocking foul from Smith for a three-point play that brought Miami to within 64-63 with 11.1 seconds left. Yderstrom added 15 points, though preseason ACC player of the year Shenise Johnson had 11 on 4-for-13 shooting.

That defense helped negate all the turnovers that led to 25 points for Miami - though the Tar Heels didn't have a turnover in the final $41 / 2$ minutes.

"The difference was we had no answer for Riquna," Maryland coach Brenda Frese said. "She was unstoppable. She was definitely in a zone."

The Hurricanes (14-3 overall, 3-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) won despite missing 21 consecutive shots in the first half, when they went 10 minutes without a basket to squander an early 12 -point lead. Miami extended its home winning streak to 34 games.
"There's something magical that happens at home - we just have these moments," coach Katie Meier said. "The crowd is in a frenzy, and we're an emotional team. The crowd totally helped."

Maryland (16-1, 3-1) was held 21 points below its scoring average of 84.4 points per game, best in the nation.

Miami outscored the Terrapins by 33 points from 3-point range and won even though Shenise Johnson shot 2 for 15 and had just six points, 10 below her average. That ended her streak of scoring in double figures in 87 consecutive games.

Johnson didn't seem to mind.
"We won. Period," the senior said. "I feel like I'm in some way responsible. This is a great win for our program, and I'm happy to be a part of it."

Williams shot 12 for 24 , including 8 for 14 from 3-point range. Stefanie Yderstrom went 4 -for-7 beyond the arc and scored 12 points. Morgan Stroman added 10 points and eight rebounds for the Hurricanes, who enjoyed an eight-rebound edge despite Maryland's height advantage.

Alyssa Thomas had 18 points for the Terrapins but committed eight turnovers. Laurin Mincy was held to six points, nearly nine below her average.

The Terrapins went 2 for 11 from 3-point range, while Miami shot 13 for 28 . The loss was the first for Maryland since it was beaten in the second round of the NCAA tournament last year.
"We remember how it felt last time," Thomas said. "I know we're going to come back strong."
Miami trailed by seven points early in the second half but regained the lead when a 3-pointer by Williams made it 47-46. She sank back-to-back 3-pointers during a 10-0 run that put the Hurricanes up 64-56 with less than four minutes left.

That prompted her celebration along the sideline as she encouraged the fans' cheers.
"I wanted to let them know, 'You guys are helping us,"' she said. "It was a great emotional feeling, like, 'We want to win, and we're going to go get it."'

Williams scored 15 points in the first $81 / 2$ minutes to help the Hurricanes take a 22-10 lead. They then went cold, and a 15-1 run by the Terrapins put them ahead.

Meier described the Hurricanes' offense in the first half as "horrible."
"I said, 'If our offense is the problem, we're fine,"' she said. "We knew we would click at a certain point."

MIAMI 60, FLORIDA STATE 57 - JAN. 15, 2012
TALLAHASSEE, Fla. (AP) - It came down to the final seconds before 13th-ranked Miami finally ended a 25-year jinx in Tallahassee.

The Hurricanes watched a 19-point lead disappear before escaping with a 60-57 win Sunday at
Florida State on Stefanie Yderstrom's 3-pointer from deep in the corner with 17 seconds remaining. "A lot of demons ... were still on our back a little, bit but she exorcised the demons with that big shot," said Miami coach Katie Meier, who was a freshman at Duke when the Hurricanes last won here on Jan. 29, 1987. "They make it very, very hard to get a bucket. That shot by Stefanie was big."

Miami (15-3, 4-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) led 41-22 a minute into the second half, but Florida State fought back to tie the game at 57 when Cierra Bravard made the second of two tries at the free throw line with 37 seconds left.

Shenise Johnson led Miami with 24 points and became just the fourth player in Miami history to reach 2,000 career points. Morgan Stroman and Riquna Williams added 11 points for the Hurricanes. Yderstrom finished with 9, all on treys.

Yderstrom and Williams - the ACC's top two 3-point shooters - each made three 3-point shots for Miami, which hit 8 of 22 of its long distance tries compared to Florida State's 1 of 5 from behind the arc. The two Hurricanes guards have each made 38 field goals from long range this season.

Sophomore forward Natasha Howard led Florida State (10-9, 2-3) with 22 points and a career-high 17 rebounds, getting 14 points and 10 rebounds in the second half to spark the Seminoles' late rally. "Seventeen rebounds hasn't been had against a top- 25 team here in years," Florida State coach Sue Semrau said.

In fact, it was just the third time since 1993 that it had happened.
"We didn't give up at all," the 6-foot-3 Howard said. "That's the best thing that ever happened. We didn't give up at the end."

Miami was able to hold on for the win despite shooting 36.5 percent compared to Florida State's 43.1 percent, and the Seminoles won the rebound battle 39-32 led by Howard's dominating presence. Chasity Clayton added 12 points and Bravard 10 for Florida State, which was hurt by 22 turnovers. Johnson scored 15 points in the first half and keyed a 23-6 run that propelled the Hurricanes into the locker room with a 35-20 lead.

Shenise did a great job of setting the tone very early for us," said Meier said, adding, "Two thousand points ... that's an amazing accomplishment.

Semrau, however, was frustrated with her team's start.
" hope that after this, we play more grown up in the first half," she said..
A pair of Howard layups sparked an early 8-0 Florida State burst that gave the Seminoles a quick lived 10-7 lead, but disappeared quickly in the wake of the Hurricanes' 23-6 run capped by a Johnson layup for a 30-16 lead with 4:44 left in the half.

The Seminoles' women weren't able to pull off a second home-floor upset in as many days. Florida
State's unranked men's team clobbered No. 3 North Carolina $90-57$ just 24 hours earlier.
Semrau's team visits Boston College on Thursday, while Miami is at Virginia that night.

CHARLOTTESVILLE, Va. - Miami coach Kate Meier typically does not flash a smile after her team turns the ball over 27 times in a contest. Life in the ACC, the coach noted, is merely about surviving and stealing as many victories as possible.

For that reason the cheers that billowed out of the visitor's locker room were fitting for the 11th-ranked Hurricanes after they outlasted Virginia, 56-53, on Thursday night in front of a crowd of 3,161 at John Paul Jones Arena.
understand that we return every starter from last year, but the margin for error in this league is so small. That's just how it goes," Meier said. "You come out with any road victory and we are going to celebrate it. That's a heck of a win and a big time RPI win for us.
"We knew we were in for a fight."
Miami (16-3, 5-1 ACC) sealed the win as guard Shenise Johnson nailed two free throws with 18.2 seconds remaining.
Virginia $(14-6,2-4)$ had a chance to force overtime in the final six seconds, but three attempts at a game-tying 3-pointer did not come to fruition.

Lexie Gerson had a 3-pointer blocked out of bounds by Johnson with 5.4 seconds left, Ariana Moorer missed a 3-pointer wildly a second later and forward Jazmin Pitts could not muscle a desperation 3-pointer from the corner all the way to the basket as the final horn sounded.
"We just ran a play, kind of like an elevator play to kind of run [Gerson] through a double screen and close that off and । don't know, 'lll have to go back and look at it, but I don't know if we got the defense off enough to give her time," Virginia coach Joanne Boyle said. "But I thought she had a good look early, but she hesitated.
"You have to be able to come off that elevator screen and just catch and shoot. I thought there was a little bit of a hesitation."

Pits did not hesitate on her final 3-pointer but admited that she was trying to make sure she beat the final buzzer and rushed her attempt.
"It just came out and I knew there was like 1 or 2 seconds left so I just kind of had to shoot it," said Pitts, who played 23 minutes as a host of Virginia starters battled foul trouble.

As Boyle noted, the contest would not have had the late drama had the Cavaliers executed better at the free-throw line.
Virginia missed eight of its 10 free-throw attempts in the second half, including three in the final 3:12.
"We just don't have a lot of margin for error," Boyle said.
Despite shooting just 45.8 percent ( 11 for 24 ) from the charity stripe in the game, the Cavaliers still led $53-51$ after Moorer drove to the basket and connected on a runner off the glass.

Trailing by two and with 12 seconds on the shot clock, Meier called a timeout with 1:12 remaining to set up a play for Johnson.
"I usually have [timeouts]," Meier said. "When I had four left with 4 minutes I thought, 'We won't turn it over. I can prevent that.'"

The decision by Meier worked brilliantly as Johnson drove to the basket, hit a lay up and drew the fifth foul of the game on Virginia forward Telia McCall.

Johnson hit the free throw, pushing the Hurricanes in front, 54-53.
Virginia gave the ball back to the Hurricanes, however, as Moorer was called for traveling near the free-throw line with 47.4 seconds left.

Boyle promptly called a timeout prior to Miami's possession. The decision was made not to foul Miami, but a wild 3-pointer from Johnson was collected under the basket by reserve center Shawnice Wilson and Meier signaled for another timeout with 22 seconds left.

Meier said it was by design that Wilson was positioned for the potential missed free throw.
Successful on the second attempt to get the inbounds in, Virginia fouled Johnson as she attempted to dribble away from pressure with 18.2 seconds left.

Johnson nailed both free throws, pushing the score to the final margin.
"I thought we were in major trouble because what they do is what we struggle with," Meier said. "Virginia was playing people tough and played tough at Duke and up at Maryland.

Moorer paced the Cavaliers with 18 points and three assists, but missed six free throws while playing all 40 minutes. Miami was led by a 20 -point effort from Johnson, who also added 13 of the team's 45 rebounds.
Virginia, which led $33-29$ at halftime, forced the 27 turnovers by Miami, but managed just 20 points off the miscues.
The Cavaliers return to action Saturday at 7 p.m. at home against Boston College.

## MIAMI 79, VIRGINIA TECH 48 - JAN. 23, 2012

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - The Miami Hurricanes were forced to use a new lineup, and ended up with the same old result.

Stefanie Yderstrom scored a career-high 22 points to lead the No. 10 Hurricanes, who didn't miss a beat in a 79-48 win over Virginia Tech on Monday night despite injury and personal issues altering the lineup Miami had started the previous 52 games.

Miami lost starting forward Morgan Stroman for the season with a torn Achilles tendon in the Hur ricanes' 56-53 win at Virginia last Thursday. Riquana Williams, the team's second-leading scorer, also missed extensive practice before the game against Virginia Tech because of a family issue, according to Miami coach Katie Meier.

Williams came off the bench against the Hokies and played 10 minutes.
"We had a tough week with losing Morgan and Riquana had some family issues that kept her away from practice," Meier said. "We're making adjustments.

The Hurricanes (17-1, 6-1 ACC) had little difficulty doing so against the Hokies. Miami was never threatened after opening the game on a 15-1 run in the first 4:10. Shenise Johnson led Miami's early scoring surge with nine points.

Later in the first half, Miami scored 11 unanswered points during a 3:15 span and increased the lead to 38-11. Maria Brown's basket with 4:51 remaining ended the spurt.
"It was strange not having her there," Johnson said of Stroman, who averaged 12 points a game. "She brings energy. But we had a lot of people step up tonight."

The Hokies (6-14, 2-5) were held without a field goal for an $8: 15$ stretch until Aerial Wilson scored consecutive layups within an 18 second-span that reduced Miami's lead to $40-18$ with 59 seconds remaining.
"I couldn't be more proud of how much composure we played with," Meier said. "I thought it was one of our best team games of the year."

Yderstrom shot 7 of 10 from the field, including 4 of 6 on 3-pointers. Johnson finished with 18 points and Shawnice Wilson, who replaced Stroman, scored 12 points for Miami
"I'm just happy that we won and how we won as a team," Yderstrom said. "I had some open shots and I made them."

Miami won its 35th consecutive home game, hours after returning to the top 10 national rankings for the first time since the week of Dec. 19.

Monet Tellier scored 18 points to lead the Hokies, who lost their fifth straight and third consecutive game against a Top 25 team after previous losses against then-No. 5 Duke and then-No. 25 North Carolina last week.
"I know they were a little discombobulated with the injury and with whatever went on with Williams, but I was very impressed with them," Virginia Tech coach Dennis Wolff said. "Conversely, I was very disappointed in our guys, particularly with how we started the game."

Wilson's put-back basket with 27 seconds left gave Miami a 42-18 lead at halftime.
Jessica Capers' basket with 14:11 remaining in the second half gave the Hurricanes their first 30-point lead at 55-25.

Stefanie Yderstrom and Riquna Williams scored 14 points each to help the 10th-ranked Hurricanes overcome 37-percent shooting in a 64-39 win over Wake Forest on Thursday night.

Shenise Johnson added 10 points and 12 rebounds as Miami (18-3, 7-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) got its seventh straigth win overall and 36 th straight at home
"This wasn't a momentum win at all," Miami coach Katie Meier said. "I'm complimenting Wake Forest when I say it was an ugly win. That's a compliment to their staff and how well they prepare for you. "It was kind of disjointed, gritty, grimy and scrummy. We had to play it."
Miami led by 13 at halftime and stretched the advantage to $37-20$ on consecutive baskets by Shenise Johnson and Sylvia Bullock in the first 1:17 of the second half.

Sandra Garcia's jumper with 7:01 remaining got Wake Forest to 52-39. Johnson and Yderstrom followed with consecutive 3-pointers and extended the Hurricanes' lead to 58-39.
"I try to let the shot come to me and not rush it," said Yderstrom, who hit three 3-pointers. Williams' layup with 1:59 remaining gave Miami its first 20-point lead at 60-39, and the Hurricanes finished the game on a 12-0 run, holding the Deamon Deacons scoreless after Garcia's basket. Secily Ray scored nine points to lead Wake Forest (12-8, 2-5), which shot just 25 percent ( 15 for 60 ). "You've got to score to beat Miami," Wake Forest coach Mike Petersen said. "You can't expect to come down here and play in the 50 s . We were trying to get to 70 s to get it done. We didn't make enough shots and didn't execute well."

The Demon Deacons stayed close until Miami used a 9-0 run to take a 33-18 lead on Williams' jumper inside the lane with $1: 18$ to go in the first half.

Miami held Wake Forest without a field goal for a 6:03 span until Brooke Thomas' jumper 18 seconds later ended the drought and pulled the Hurricanes within 13 at halftime.
"It was grimy out there; It felt like an ACC game," Johnson said. "I think they messed up our timing a little bit and did a great job of being physical."

Both teams struggled offensively during the first 10 minutes of the first half. The Hurricanes shot 6 for 20 from the field and the Demon Deacons were 4 for 15.

Millesa Calicott's 3-pointer with 7:57 remaining reduced the Hurricanes' lead to 24-18 before Miami went on its late first half run.
"They were matching us point for point and had more energy than us to start the game," Meier said. "But after they got through that our defense just took over."

Johnson missed her first four shots but finished the first half with 10 rebounds and four assists. "They weren't frustrating me," Johnson said. "My shot wasn't falling so I said, `let me do something else.' I started to distribute the ball and get my team shots. They did a very good job of knocking them down."

Miami (19-3, 8-1 Atlantic Coast Conference) never trailed and pulled to a double digit lead on Williams' basket in the lane 5:44 into the game. The advantage never dropped into single digits the rest of the way.
"It starts on the defensive end," said Williams, who was unsure how many points she needs for 2,000.
"It would be great to achieve something so big," she said after learning how many she's away.
Her coach was smiling next to her.
"We know," joked Meier.
On very likely soon having another member of her exclusive club, Johnson said: "I think it's just going to be a result of our hard work."

Stefanie Yderstrom added 15 points for Miami, which hasn't lost since dropping its conference opener at North Carolina on Jan. 2

Tessah Holt paced Boston College (5-16, 0-8) with 12 points. The Eagles have lost eight straight.
"They trigger their offense from their defense, from transition baskets," BC coach Sylvia Crawley said. "We talked about, 'Even if we have to eat the ball don't turn it over."

The Eagles shot just 36 percent in the game ( 18 of 50 ) and many times had trouble getting off decent shots. They had 20 turnovers that led to 29 points.

Williams also grabbed eight rebounds. Johnson, who had a team-leading nine boards, became the fourth to reach the 2,000-point mark earlier this season.

Miami missed its first two shots from the floor before its superior tandem of Johnson and Williams combined with its pressure defense to take charge.

Johnson missed the first shot of the game - a short jumper in the lane - but hit six of her next eight during the first half. She scored eight of her team's initial 16 points as the Hurricanes pulled to a 13 -point lead on her 3-pointer.

After Johnson's offensive surge, Williams dominated, scoring 11 straight Miami points and 13 of 16 as the Hurricanes pushed their lead to 27-11 midway into the half.

Johnson's two free throws gave the Hurricanes a 41-16 edge, their largest lead in the opening half.
Miami, which forced 15 turnovers in the opening 20 minutes, led 48-27 at intermission.
The Hurricanes pushed their lead over 30 points (61-29) on Williams' basket early into the second half. They came out after intermission and scored 13 of the initial 15 points, making sure the Eagles wouldn't give them any threat.

## MIAMI 68, CLEMSON 47 - FEB. 5, 2012

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Miami's 37th consecutive home win perhaps came at a big expense. Shenise Johnson scored 19 points to lead the No. 7 Hurricanes to a 68-47 victory over Clemson Sunday afternoon. But the Hurricanes could be missing guard and second leading scorer Riquna Williams for Wednesday's game against No. 23 North Carolina.

Williams, who averages 15.6 points, left the game with 14:53 in the second half after she hit her head as she collided with teammate Michelle Woods while chasing a loose ball. Williams stayed on the floor for three minutes then walked gingerly toward the locker room and didn't return.

Meier isn't sure about Williams' status on Wednesday.
Johnson picked up the void for Williams, who scored 15 points before her injury - including the 2,000th of her career. Johnson scored 12 points in the second half and finished with 15 rebounds.
"Coach told us in the locker room that we need to be tougher (in the second half)," Johnson said. "I had to change my whole mindset and shots started going in."

The Hurricanes (20-3, 9-1 ACC) broke the game open with a 17-1 run midway through the first half. Williams hit two 3-pointers and Johnson and Shawnice Wilson scored five points each during the Miami surge.

Williams' second 3-pointer with 11:09 remaining gave her 2,000 points in her Hurricanes' career. Johnson's 3-pointer with 6:24 remaining ended the spurt and increased the Miami lead to 26-8. The Hurricanes held Clemson without a basket for a 9:29 stretch.

We had really nice ball movement," Meier said. "We played a decent game but there were some individual things that you've got to finish."

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - Shenise Johnson and Riquna Williams helped Miami avenge its lone ACC loss Johnson scored 19 points and Williams added 17 to lead No. 6 Miami to a 61-37 win over No. 22 North Carolina. The Tar Heels beat the Hurricanes 65-63 in Chapel Hill on Jan. 2.

Maryland missed six layups and seven free throws in the second half. "Late-game free throws, layups, turnovers, those are costly to put a team away in your building," Frese said.

Yderstrom started the Hurricanes' rally hitting consecutive jumpers. Williams' hit a 3-pointer to get Miami within 50-49.

The teams traded baskets, but Miami couldn't pull ahead. A layup by Hawkins and a free throw by Alyssa Thomas gave Maryland a 66-60 lead with 6:05 left before the Hurricanes' late rally.

It was an entertaining back-and-forth first half with neither team able to build more than a six-point lead. Thomas kept the Terrapins in the game early, scoring eight of the team's first 10 points before Kizer took over. The 6 -foot-4 senior's strong three-point play tied the game at 13 . She scored four points over the final 1:42 of the half to help Maryland take a $38-33$ lead. Kizer finished the half with 14 points and nine rebounds.

Miami won the first meeting between the teams on Jan. 12, handing Maryland its first loss of the season. In that game Kizer had just four points and four rebounds in 16 minutes.
"We felt we gave everything pretty much, it definitely hurts," Kizer said. "This is one we will keep in our back pocket and come out stronger.

Meier was dressed in a pink top and wore pink sneakers in support of the Play4Kay foundation that honors former N.C. State coach Kay Yow, who died of cancer three years ago. The Miami players wore pink sneakers while the Terrapins were dressed in pink uniforms.

CORAL GABLES, Fla. (AP) - The Miami Hurricanes were clinging to a one-point lead with $3: 43$ left in Sunday's game when the public-address announcer reported a defeat for Duke, which tightened the race atop the Atlantic Coast Conference standings.

Miami coach Katie Meier pretended not to hear.
"I was kind of wondering why the crowd was cheering so loud," Meier said with a smile. "I didn't see a dog-catching Frisbee out there.

Maybe it was a coincidence, but the No. 6-ranked Hurricanes didn't allow a point the rest of way and beat Florida State, 67-60.

The Hurricanes (24-3, 13-1) pulled into a tie for the league lead with No. 5 Duke, which lost at
Maryland. Miami plays at Duke on Friday.
"If we want what we want, we were going to have to win at Duke whether they won or lost today,"
Meier said. The Blue Devils' defeat makes it likely Miami will move into the top five for the first time ever.
The Hurricanes earned their 39th consecutive home victory by taking advantage of 24 Florida State turnovers. Miami scored 21 points off turnovers to four for the Seminoles.
"That has to happen for us to win," said Shenise Johnson, who had 23 points and 10 rebounds. "We have to create turnovers and push the tempo. Seventy-five feet of the court has to be ours, because from 15 feet in - we're a lot smaller than everybody else. So we want to try to speed the game up. That's what we do. That's Miami basketball."

The Seminoles (13-15, 5-9) have lost four games in a row for the first time since 2003-04.
Florida State outshot Miami and outrebounded it, but turnovers more than compensated for the disparity. The smaller, quicker Hurricanes used their full-court press repeatedly to create offensive chances, and they outscored Florida State 13-0 on fast breaks.

The Hurricanes also outscored the Seminoles by 15 points from 3-point range, where Florida State went 0 for 5 .
"We had a lot of costly turnovers, and that was the difference," Seminoles coach Sue Semrau said. "They did a great job of keeping us busy on the perimeter."

Riquna Williams scored 24 points for the Hurricanes, combining with Johnson to give them a potent one-two punch, as usual.
"We were both aggressive," Johnson said. "We were looking for each other. We did a great job of knowing where each other was.

The Hurricanes swept the season series and earned their 13th consecutive victory. Meier collected her 200th win.
"It feels old," she said with a smile.
FSU's Natasha Howard had her 11th double-double of the season with 19 points and 13 rebounds, but she committed six turnovers. Cierra Bravard had 12 points and Chelsea Davis 11 for the Seminoles, who never led in the second half.

Alexa Deluzio's basket capped an 8-0 run that allowed Florida State to briefly tie it at 57 with 5:20 left, but that was their final basket. Miami regained the lead for good with 4:10 to go on a follow shot by Williams, and the Hurricanes sealed the win by sinking five of six free throws in the final 35 seconds.
"If you have a season like we're having, you're going to win in a lot of different ways," Meier said. Miami raced to an 8-2 lead then fell behind 19-16. Williams and Johnson sank 3-pointers in the final 70 seconds of the first half to give the Hurricanes a $36-31$ halftime advantage.

Williams converted a three-point play and sank a 3-pointer on consecutive possessions to make it 50-39 - Miami's biggest lead.
