Coach Jim Larrañaga ranks in the top 60 on the list of winningest coaches all time, and top 15 amongst active coaches vs. major schools. After leading Miami to the 2013 NCAA Sweet 16 and winning the school's first ACC regular season and tournament championships, Larrañaga was honored as the AP, Naismith, USBWA Henry Iba, Adolph Rupp Cup and ACC Coach of the Year.

Head coach Jim Larrañaga has a 574-385 overall record in his 32nd season as a head coach. He is 104-51 in his fifth season at the University of Miami, with a 43-30 mark in ACC play.

LARRAÑAGA BY THE NUMBERS

5 - Coach Jim Larrañaga is one of five ACC coaches with a Final Four appearance to his credit. In 2006, Larrañaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the NCAA Final Four in 27 years.

6 - In 31 years of coaching, Jim Larrañaga has a winning record in the NCAA Tournament, a 7-5 mark in six appearances.

7 - Larrañaga is no stranger to the ACC. In his seven seasons as an assistant coach at Virginia, the Cavaliers participated in the NCAA Final Four in 1981 and 1984, won three ACC Championships and finished in the Top 5 of the rankings.

10 - The 2015-16 marks the 10th anniversary of Larrañaga's Cinderella run to the 2006 NCAA Final Four with George Mason. Both associate head coach Chris Caputo and director of operations James Johnson were on that GMU staff.

15 - Larrañaga has made 15 postseason appearances in the past 26 years, including six NCAA tournaments.

32 - Larrañaga is in his 32nd year as a head coach and has successfully transitioned three institutions into successful programs: Miami, Bowling Green and George Mason.

500 - Coach L is one of five ACC coaches with 500 or more wins.

LARRAÑAGA - WHY MIAMI?

Along with returning to the best basketball conference in the country, Coach L had a few personal reasons for accepting the head coaching job at Miami. Coach's grandfather was from Cuba, where he produced the Larrañaga [lare-en-YAH-ga] cigar. Coach's father was raised in Key West before moving to The Bronx, N.Y., getting married and raising six children. Coach L was raised in The Bronx, but vacationed to Florida as a boy. He also has owned a house in Sarasota - which he bought from Dick Vitale's daughter - and three of his siblings have retired to Florida.

LAST TIME OUT - #13/11 VIRGINIA 66, #8/9 MIAMI 58

In an intense ACC early-season heavyweight battle, 13th-ranked Virginia remained perfect at home and handed No. 8 Miami its first conference loss of the season and snapped the Hurricanes' seven-game win streak with a 66-58 on Tuesday night. UM (13-2, 2-1) got within three points with under two minutes to play, but Virginia (13-3, 2-2) made crucial free throws down the stretch and closed the contest strong, highlighted by a London Perrantes runner with 1:05 left. Miami guard Angel Rodriguez led the Hurricanes with 17 points, 11 of those coming in the second half. Fellow senior and Canes' leading scorer Sheldon McClellan added 13 points, while Davon Reed finished with 11. Miami trailed by four at halftime, but used a 7-0 spurt to begin the second half as McClellan came away with a steal and an easy flush on the other end. The teams then went blow-for-blow as the lead changed hands 11 times over the following six minutes until the Cavs took the lead for good. Virginia's Darius Thompson caught an alley-oop from Malcolm Brogdon to ignite the crowd with just over four minutes to go before a Miami travel gave the ball back. But the Canes scored a pair of quick buckets — one by Tonye Jekiri, one by Rodriguez — to make it a 59-56 ballgame with 2:20 remaining. Jekiri then came up with a steal, which set up a good look from downtown for Ivan Cruz Uceda, but the 6-foot-10 senior misfired and Perrantes, who came in averaging 21 points a game against Miami in his career as Larrañaga pointed out, delivered the final dagger moments later. Virginia was 15 for 17 from the line in the second half alone. Miami shot 10-17 at the foul line for the night, but the most important miss came on the front end of a Rodriguez one-and-one with 48 seconds left, trailing by five. After a rather slow start for both sides, the Cavaliers grabbed an early six-point edge midway through the opening half before the Hurricanes went on a 7-0 run to take their first lead at 14-13, capped by a tough Angel Rodriguez triple from the corner that temporarily quieted the crowd. Virginia got a lift from both Anthony Gill and Mike Tobey, who combined for 19 points and 12 rebounds in the first half as the Cavaliers led 27-23 at the break. UVA outscored Miami 18-8 in the paint and 9-2 in second-chance opportunities in the first half. UM sophomore guard Ja'Quan Newton provided an offensive spark off the bench with six first-half points, but was held scoreless for the duration. Starting forward Kamari Murphy picked up a pair of fouls and sat all but six minutes of the opening half. Murphy picked up his third a few minutes into the second half and played 17 minutes on the evening. Jekiri led Miami with six rebounds, as UM lost the overall battle of the boards, 35-27. UVA was led by Brogdon's 20 points, 14 of which came after the break, while Gill wound up with 15 points and eight rebounds. Perrantes scored all 13 of his points in the second half.

TALE OF TWO HALVES

In three ACC games, Miami has scored 24.0 ppg in the first half and 40.7 ppg in the second stanza. In those three games, the Canes are hitting just 34.7 percent from the field in the first half, then 47.6 percent in the second. At the line, Miami is 53.8 percent in the first 20 minutes and 80.5 percent in the second period. The Canes trail their opponents -1.3 ppg in the first period, and outscore their opponents +7.3 ppg in the second half.

After just 5.3 ppg on 25.0 percent shooting in the first half, Sheldon McClellan averages 13.3 ppg in the second, hitting 66.7 percent. Ja'Quan Newton also picks up his game, from 3.3 ppg in the first to 7.7 ppg in the second. Rodriguez ups his points from 2.7 to 6.0 ppg.

LAST YEAR AGAINST CLEMSON

Sheldon McClellan dropped 19 points on Clemson last season, hitting 6-8 shots from the field including 3-5 from long range. He was also 4-4 from the line. Ivan Cruz Uceda added 10 points, also hitting a trio of 3-pointers. Tonye Jekiri posted 17 rebounds and blocked five Tiger shots. Angel Rodriguez dished out five assists, tallied two steals and scored nine points.

CANES HAVE STINGY 3-POINT DEFENSE

In eight-straight games, Miami has held all of its opponents to less than 32.0 percent shooting in each game from long range, holding them to a combined 23.0 percent mark in that timeframe. In the first seven games, Miami averaged 41.4 percent 3-point defense. Opponents shot better than 32 percent from three in six of the first seven games. The Canes held in-state opponents Florida and Florida State to 8.3 percent and 10.5 percent from long range, respectively.

MCCLELLAN ONE OF TOP SHOOTING GUARDS IN THE NATION, TOP IN ACC

Senior guard Sheldon McClellan has posted the eighth-best shooting percentage (53.1%) in the country among guards, and has the top shooting percentage among guards in the ACC, according to stats on NCAA.org on Jan. 14. McClellan is currently on three national player of the year early-season watch lists: Naismith Trophy Men's College Player of the Year, Oscar Robertson Trophy for Men's National Player of the Year and Jerry West Shooting Guard of the Year Award.

MIAMI WINNING BY DOUBLE DIGITS

In 12 of Miami's 13 victories, the Canes have outscored their opponents by double digits. Nebraska is the only exception, as Miami won by only five points in overtime against the Huskers. UM is outscoring opponents by 16.1 points per outing, and averaging 81.1 points per contest.

TAKING CARE OF BUSINESS AT THE LINE

Miami is outscoring its opponents by 16.3 points per game this season, and averaging 18.7 made free throws per game. Through 15 games, the Canes are connecting on 76.1 percent of shots at the line, and have hit at least 19 free throws in each game but four, with 12 vs. Florida State, 11 vs. Princeton, 10 at Virginia and seven made FTs against Northeastern.

The Canes are No. 51 in the country in free throws made, and No. 28 in fewest fouls.

NEWTON'S SOPHOMORE SURGE

Miami sophomore Ja'Quan Newton has immensely improved his stats from last year, and has scored in double digits a team-high 12 times this season.

MIAMI HOLDS THE LEAD

In Miami's 13 victories, the Canes have led for all but 43 minutes and 22 seconds combined. The Canes trailed 19:49 to Syracuse, 12:00 vs. Princeton, 4:59 vs. UTRGV and 3:59 at Nebraska, added to 1:21 vs. Louisiana, 0:39 vs. Charleston, 0:22 vs. Mississippi State and 0:13 vs. Florida. Miami hasn't trailed in five games - against Utah, Butler, Charlotte, La Salle and Florida State.

In Miami's 13 wins, the Canes have only trailed after the first half against Syracuse, Nebraska and Princeton. The Cornhuskers held a lead with 3:39 left in overtime, the Orange led by one with 7:07 left in regulation and the Tigers led with 6:02 left in regulation.

THE BUC IS SOLD OUT

In just his fifth season in Coral Gables, Jim Larrañaga and Miami have SOLD OUT the season ticket allotment for all home games this year at the BankUnited Center. This is the first time in Miami athletics history a team has sold out their season. Due to the season ticket sales, seats will not be available on a single-game basis. In Coach Larrañaga's fifth season at The U, fans have bought 5,500 season tickets, more than doubling the total number of season tickets sold in his first season in Coral Gables. When Coach L began his reign in Miami, fans bought 2,251 season tickets for the 2011-12 campaign. After a record-breaking season on the court in 2012-13, season tickets peaked at 3,674 for 2013-14.

BODY CHANGES FOR CRUZ UCEDA AND JEKIRI

Seniors Ivan Cruz Uceda and Tonye Jekiri have spent the summer in the weight room. Cruz Uceda has dropped 20 pounds from 237 to 217, and his body fat has slimmed down from 24 percent to nine percent in just a year in Miami. Jekiri has added 20 pounds to his 7-foot frame, now weighing 250 pounds.

LOOKING BACK:

FEB. 8, 2015 - MIAMI 56, CLEMSON 45

Sheldon McClellan scored 19 points and the Miami Hurricanes sank 10 3-pointers to snap a three-game losing streak by beating Clemson 56-45 Sunday. Clemson had won four in a row. The Hurricanes trailed early in the second half before scoring 13 consecutive points, and led the rest of the way. Junior Tonye Jekiri tied a career high with 16 rebounds with five blocked shots for Miami (15-8, 5-5 Atlantic Coast Conference). Ivan Cruz Uceda had 10 points off the bench. Donte Grantham and Jordan Roper scored 10 points apiece for Clemson (14-9, 6-5). The Tigers missed their final 12 shots and finished at 33 percent, including 5 for 20 from 3-point range. Their offensive frustrations culminated trailing by seven points in the final three minutes, when they missed five shots before committing a turnover - all during a single possession. Clemson lost despite holding an opponent below 40 percent shooting for the fifth game in a row, the team's longest such streak since at least 1964. Miami guard Angel Rodriguez had his first two baskets of the game, a steal and an assist during the Hurricanes' run that turned a 28-27 deficit into a 40-28 lead. He fed McClellan for an alley-oop dunk that made it 44-30. Clemson cut the deficit to 46-43 before Manu Lecomte made 3-pointers on consecutive possessions - his only baskets of the game. McClellan shot 6 of 8 from the floor, including 3 of 5 from 3-point range. The Hurricanes went 6 1/2 minutes without a field goal in the first half, but Cruz Uceda made three consecutive 3-pointers to put them ahead 18-15. Clemson led 25-24 at the half.

LARRAÑAGA WINS 100TH AT MIAMI

The Canes' victory over Charleston marked win No. 100 for Head Coach Jim Larrañaga at the University of Miami. Needing only 150 games, Coach Larrañaga is the fastest to accomplish the feat in program history. Bruce Hale was previously the Miami coach who won 100 games the quickest, earning 100 victories in just 159 games. Hart Morris took 163 games, Frank Haith 174 and Leonard Hamilton took 230 games.

MIAMI'S STARTERS SHOW EXPERIENCE

In six-straight games, Miami has started two redshirt seniors, one true senior, a redshirt junior and a true junior. Those players have now combined for 314 career starts and 502 games played. Sheldon McClellan has started 75 games playing in 120, Tonye Jekiri has 67 starts in 118 games, Angel Rodriguez is at 83/111, Davon Reed 45/77 and Kamari Murphy 44/77.

Those five players have been on a Division I team a combined 21 seasons, as McClellan and Rodriguez are both in their fifth year on the court, Jekiri and Murphy are each in their fourth season, and Reed is a true junior. The average age of that starting five is 21.8 years old: Rodriguez - 23; McClellan - 23; Murphy - 22; Jekiri - 21; Reed - 20.

MCCLELLAN ON THREE NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR WATCH LISTS

Senior shooting guard Sheldon McClellan is turning heads across the country, earning nods on a trio of watch lists for national player of the year awards. He is one of 50 players on the Naismith Trophy Men's College Player of the Year early season watch list, one of 33 players on the watch list for the Oscar Robertson Trophy for Men's National Player of the Year and is among the 20 players named to the watch list for the 2016 Jerry West Shooting Guard of the Year Award.

THREE CANES ALL-TOURNEY IN PUERTO RICO

Sheldon McClellan, Angel Rodriguez and Tonye Jekiri were named to the Puerto Rico Tip-Off All Tournament Team. This is the first time three players from the same team were on the tournament squad.

HOMECOMING FOR RODRIGUEZ, EARNS MVP

Senior guard Angel Rodriguez was named the Puerto Rico Tip-Off Most Valuable Player. He averaged 13.7 points and 4.0 assists, including 19 points in the championship game. The native of Cupey, P.R., just 20 minutes from San Juan, was greeted by friends and family at each game.

MIAMI WINS PUERTO RICO TIP-OFF

Miami defeated Mississippi State 105-79, then downed No. 16 Utah 90-66 and dropped No. 22/20 Butler 85-75 to win the 2015 Puerto Rico Tip-Off. The Canes outscored their opponents by 20.0 points per game, and out rebounded opponents by 8.7 rebounds per game. Miami also won the event in 2007-08.

FOUR PLAYERS BOAST NCAA TOURNAMENT EXPERIENCE

Senior Tonye Jekiri returns from Miami's 2012-13 ACC Championship and NCAA Sweet 16 team. Sheldon McClellan (Texas), Kamari Murphy (Oklahoma State) and Angel Rodriguez (Kansas State) also have played in the NCAA Tournament, each with their previous schools.

MIAMI LANDS HUELL, BROWN AND MILLER

The Miami men's basketball team landed a pair of top-30 players in Dewan Huell and Bruce Brown, and top 100 player Rodney Miller.

With the addition of these three players, Miami would have six top 100 players next season: Huell (25), Brown (44), Ja'Quan Newton (52), Miller (90), James Palmer (98).

Huell, at 6-10 and 218 pounds, is a five-star, top-25 power forward from Miami Norland High School. Nationally, he is ranked the No. 21 player by ESPN, No. 23 by Rivals and No. 25 by Scout. ESPN and Scout rank him fifth at his position, and Scout says he's the top player in the state of Florida, while ESPN and Rivals have him second in the state. A fluid player who finishes around the rim, Huell runs the floor and can beat his man off the dribble. He can hit the open 15-footer, as well as play with his back to the basket, scoring with a jump hook. Huell has the ability to elevate quickly, giving him the ability to block shots and grab offensive rebounds.

Brown, from Wakefield, Mass., is a four-star shooting guard at Vermont Academy in Saxton's River, Vt. At 6-4 and 205 pounds, Brown is ranked No. 30 by ESPN, No. 44 per Scout and No. 49 by Rivals. A combo guard with a 6-9 wingspan, Brown is one of the best defenders in the country and plays with tremendous energy. He is physical, has the ability to score off the dribble and can play multiple backcourt positions.

Miller is a 6-foot-11-inch, 245-pound center playing prep ball at Oak Hill Academy in Virginia. A native of Laurelton, N.Y., Miller is a

consensus four-star recruit, ranked No. 90 overall by Scout.com and No. 114 by Rivals.com. As a center, he is ranked No. 17 by Scout.com and No. 15 by ESPN. Miller, with a 7-foot-1-inch wingspan, has the ability to alter shots defensively, is a blue-collar rebounder and has good offensive touch around the rim.

CANES SIGN TOP 10 RECRUITING CLASS

The 2016 recruiting class of Dewan Huell, Bruce Brown and Rodney Miller is being named a top-10 recruiting class in the country, with 247Sports ranking the class No. 7, Scout at No. 8, ESPN at No. 9 and Rivals at No. 10.

The 2016 class rankings top Miami's best mark from 2005, when the Canes signed four four-star recruits – Jimmy Graham, Brian Asbury, Adrian Thomas and Denis Clemente – in a class that was ranked No. 12 in the nation by Scout.

In 2009, Miami's signing class was nationally ranked No. 19 by Scout and No. 24 by ESPN. That Hurricanes' heralded 2009 class was comprised of ESPNU 100 picks Durand Scott, Garrus Adams and Donnavan Kirk, in addition to May signee Antoine Allen.

Since 2002, Miami has signed 16 Scout.com top 100 players, including three five-star, top-25 players in DeQuan Jones (22, 2008), Huell (25) and Durand Scott (25, 2009). Since Larrañaga's arrival, his staff has signed five top-100 players in Huell (25), Brown (44), Ja'Quan Newton (52, 2014), Rodney Miller (90) and James Palmer (98, 2014).

Huell is the most lauded signee for Miami since Scott in 2009, Jones in 2008, No. 32 Guillermo Diaz in 2003 and McDonald's All-American Darius Rice in 2000.

MIAMI PREDICTED TO FINISH FIFTH IN ACC

Miami was predicted to finish fifth out of 15 teams in the Atlantic Coast Conference this season, as announced by the league during Operation ACC Basketball in Charlotte, N.C., Oct. 28. North Carolina was predicted to win the league, followed by Virginia, Duke and Notre Dame.

In 2012-13, the Canes were picked to finish fifth, then won the league's regular season and tournament championship. In all four of Larrañaga's seasons at Miami, the Canes have finished the season better than predicted at ACC media day.

- Under Coach L, Miami has posted three of the Canes' top five finishes in ACC play, including the 2013 championship, tied for fourth in 2012 and tied for sixth in 2015. In 2008, Miami tied for fifth in league play, and in 2005, tied for sixth.
- In four seasons under Coach L, Miami has tallied six wins in the ACC Tournament. In the previous seven seasons, Miami went 6-7.
- In two NIT appearances under Coach L, Miami is 5-2 for a .714 winning percentage. In Miami's other 10 NIT appearances combined, the Canes went 6-10 for a .375 winning percentage.

DID YOU KNOW ...

Coach L became the first Miami coach to win 20+ games in his first two seasons at UM and only the third of 12 UM coaches to post three 20-win seasons.

Former Cane Rick Barry was named one of the Greatest Players in NBA History.

Miami native and former Cane James Jones won the 2010-2011 NBA All-Star Weekend 3-Point Contest and the NBA Championship in the 2011-2012 and 2012-13 seasons.

Six-time NBA All Star Amar'e Stoudemire enrolled at UM in 2013 and took classes to earn his bachelor's degree.

UM is in its 12th season in the ACC.

Coach L led the George Mason Patriots to the 2006 Final Four with big wins over some of basketball's elite teams such as Michigan State, UNC and UConn. He was the first coach to take a mid-major to a Final Four in 27 years (Penn '79) when his team advanced in 2006.

In 14 years at George Mason, Larrañaga led the Patriots to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2011, 2008, 2006, 2001, 1999), including the 2006 Final Four.

Miami basketball received APR (Academic Progress Rate) Public Recognition Awards for being among the top 10 percent in APR in its sport. Miami ranks in the top 10 percent NCAA men's basketball with a 990 APR.

The Miami Department of Athletics recorded a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 89 percent. Miami's department-wide GSR is 16th overall among FBS programs. UM has exceeded the NCAA average GSR in each of the last 10 years.

The Canes have averaged 20.0 wins over the last 11 seasons.

The Hurricanes have made at least one trey in 918 of 924 games since the NCAA adopted the 3-point shot in 1986. The last time Miami was held without a 3-pointer was Feb. 26, 2014 at Virginia.

Miami has held 777 of its last 778 opponents to less than 100 points. North Carolina was the last team to score 100+, defeating UM 105-64 on Jan. 31, 2007.

MIAMI BASKETBALL – THE EARLY YEARS

The University of Miami basketball program was dormant for 14 years from 1971-1985. In 1983 Director of Athletics Sam Jankovich announced the resurrection of men's basketball at Miami, with the reinstatement vote by the UM Board of Trustees on Oct. 12, 1983. Head coach Bill Foster was hired March 21, 1984, adding assistants Clint Bryant, Seth Greenberg and Cesar Odio by July 1. Tim Harvey was the staff's first recruit, a 6-10, 240-pound center from Plainfield, N.J., who transferred from Georgia Tech. On Oct. 15, 1984 the first men's basketball practice in 12 years was held on the patio in the center of campus, viewed by more than 200 students. Miami defeated The Citadel, 85-77, on Nov. 22, 1985, in the first game of the new era of UM basketball.

COACHING COORDINATORS FOR MIAMI

Miami's assistant coaching staff is set up in a coordinator system, with Jamal Brunt as the offensive coordinator, Chris Caputo manning the defense and Adam Fisher handling the scout for every opponent. James Johnson is the Dean of Discipline.

IT'S ALL ABOUT LOCATION

Miami's complete 13-man roster includes players from: Three countries - Nigeria (2), Spain, U.S.; One U.S. commonwealth - Puerto Rico; Eight states - Connecticut, Florida, Nevada, New Hampshire, New Jersey, New York, Pennsylvania, Texas; and Washington, D.C.

COACHING CHANGES FOR THE HURRICANES

After having the same assistant coaching staff his first four years in Miami, Larrañaga has two new assistant coaches in 2015-16 in Jamal Brunt and Adam Fisher, following the departure of Eric Konkol (Louisiana Tech) and Michael Huger (Bowling Green). Konkol had been an assistant with Coach L 11 seasons and Huger was an assistant coach for eight years and player for four seasons.

Due to the lack of turnover, Coach L has only had nine assistant coaches in the last 14 seasons. Five of his assistants left for a D-I head coaching job, and two others who have worked their way into head coaching jobs. In those 14 seasons, only twice two assistants left at the same time, 1996 (Stan Heath and Steve Merfeld) and 1989 (Jeff Snyder and Ricky Stokes).

Chris Caputo, in his 14th season on Larrañaga's staff and fifth in Coral Gables, was promoted to associate head coach in the summer of 2015.

COACH L REUNITED WITH JAMES JOHNSON

Larrañaga completed his 2015-16 staff with the addition of James Johnson as the team's director of basketball operations. Johnson, who was on Larrañaga's staff for two seasons at George Mason University, including the historic NCAA Final Four run in 2006, came to Miami after seven seasons on staff at fellow ACC school Virginia Tech, where he was the head coach for two seasons after five years as an assistant coach.

LARRAÑAGA CONTRACT EXTENDED THROUGH 2022

The University of Miami extended Coach Jim Larrañaga's contract through May 31, 2022, Director of Athletics Blake James announced in September 2014. Larrañaga first signed a five-year contract in April 2011, then was granted a three-year extension in 2012.

PROCANES REPORT

Former Hurricanes James Jones and Shane Larkin have taken their talents onto NBA rosters this season, as Jones is in Cleveland with the Cavaliers and Larkin joins a new team, the Brooklyn Nets, after playing across town with the Knicks last season. Miami has 17 former players in professional basketball at this time. A complete list is on page five of the notes.

The Florida city of Coral Gables, situated just a few miles southwest of Miami, is part of Miami-Dade County. Incorporated in 1925, Coral Gables was created as a fully-planned community by George Merrick, who envisioned an upscale Miami suburb with large elements of Mediterranean-style architecture to highlight the region's Spanish influence. In 1925, roughly simultaneous to the founding of Coral Gables, the city was selected as the home to the University of Miami, which was constructed that year on 240 acres of land just west of U.S. Route 1, approximately two miles south of downtown Coral Gables.

LAST SEASON MIAMI ...

- Played in the National Invitation Tournament Championship game.
- Played a game in April for the first time in school history.
- Was the only team to defeat eventual national champion Duke on their come court.
- Defeated Duke and Syracuse on the road in the same season, the second time this has ever happened, and the first time since UNC did so during the 1983-84 season.
- Defeated three ranked teams: at No. 8/7 Florida, vs. No. 24/25 Illinois and at No. 4 Duke.
- Defeated a pair of top-7 teams in the same season, both on the road: No. 6/7 Florida and No. 4 Duke.
- Won two true road games against ranked opponents - No. 6/7 Florida and No. 4 Duke - for the first time since 1998-99.
- Defeated Coach Krzyzewski, Boeheim & Donovan, all on the road.
- Ended Duke's 41-game home winning streak, the then-longest active streak in Division I.

- Snapped Florida's streak of 33 consecutive home wins, which was the longest streak in school history.

MIAMI SETS SCHOOL RECORD FOR GAMES PLAYED, SECOND-MOST WINS

Miami played a school-record 38 games last season, topping the 36 games played in 2012-13. The Canes' 25 wins were second all-time in school history, behind the 29-7 mark in 2012-13.

CANES POST 20+-WIN SEASON

With a victory at Virginia Tech on March 7, 2015, Miami posted its third 20-win season in four years since the arrival of Jim Larrañaga. Since 2011-12, Coach L has tallied seasons of 20-13, 29-7, 17-16 and 25-13, for an average of 22.8 wins per season. Since joining the ACC in 2004-05, Miami posted three 20-win seasons before Larrañaga, 23-11 in 2008, 20-13 in 2010 and 21-15 in 2011.

MIAMI'S ROAD WINS RANK TOP 11 NATIONALLY

Miami was one of 38 teams in the country, and one of 11 teams from a Top 8 conference, to win 10+ games away from its home arena last regular season. Gonzaga led the way with 14 road and neutral site victories.

The Canes have posted 10+ wins away from home in two of Coach L's four seasons at Miami. In 2012-13, Miami won 15 on the road, including five neutral-site games. Last year, Miami was 10-5 away from the BankUnited Center, with a 3-1 neutral-site record, in the regular season.

CANES IN NATIONAL STATS, VIA NCAA.COM

Miami was 13th in the country in turnovers per game (10.1), committing less than 15 turnovers in 35 of 38 outings.

The Canes knocked down 292 shots from 3-point range, good enough for 20th in the nation. UM hit at least seven shots from long range in 23 games, and tied a school record of 15 made in a game, going 15-of-25 at Virginia Tech on March 7.

UM shot 74.6 percent from the free throw line, which was the 22nd-best mark in the country. Miami drained at least 70 percent of its free throws in 28 games last year. The Canes' 544 free throws made were No. 39 in the NCAA.

Miami averaged just 15.6 fouls per game, a mark that was 22nd-best in the nation, grabbed 1317 total rebounds (29th) and posted a 1.27 assist-to-turnover ratio (44th).

CANES FINISH SIXTH IN ACC AFTER BEING PICKED 10TH

Miami finished sixth in the 2014-15 ACC rankings after being projected to finish 10th by the media at Operation Basketball in October. In each of Coach L's four seasons at Miami, the Canes have exceeded preseason expectations. In his first season, Miami was picked fifth and finished tied for fourth. In just his second season, UM won the ACC after being projected to finish fifth. A year ago, the Canes were selected 12th, but ended 10th.

The Canes and Notre Dame both made a jump of four spots: Miami from 10th to sixth and Notre Dame from seventh to third. Wake Forest and Virginia Tech were the only schools who were slotted in the correct spots. In order of preseason projections, here are the final mis-projections of each team: Duke -1, North Carolina -3, Louisville -1, Virginia +3, Syracuse -3, Pittsburgh -4, Notre Dame +4, Florida State -3, NC State +2, Miami +4, Clemson +2, Wake Forest +0, Georgia Tech -1, Boston College +1, Virginia Tech +0.

LARRAÑAGA POSTS FOURTH 25-WIN SEASON

With a 25-13 mark last season at Miami, Coach Jim Larrañaga has posted four 25-win seasons as a head coach. His first was a 27-8 mark at George Mason in 2005-06, when he led the team to the NCAA Final Four and in 2010-11 he was 27-7 with a 1-1 mark in the NCAA Tournament. At Miami, Coach L led the Canes to a 29-7 mark in 2012-13, winning the ACC regular season and tournament, then taking UM to the NCAA Sweet 16.

CARDIAC CANES - YEAR TWO

Miami played 16 games last season that were decided by five points-or-less. The Canes had five losses by a total of 22 points in the month of February. Three of those games were decided by a total of five points. Miami and Georgia Tech each had 13 games decided by four points or less last season. Miami and Notre Dame led the ACC with nine wins in close games. In 2013-14, Miami led the ACC having played 13 games decided by five points-or-less or in OT.

MIAMI VS. RANKED OPPONENTS

Miami was 3-6 against ranked teams in 2014-15, including 1-1 against top-5 teams and 2-2 against top-10 teams. Of the six losses, one was a double-overtime defeat against Virginia, and the Canes came up 6.1 ppg short in the other five outings. The Canes were 1-3 at home, 2-2 on the road and 0-1 at neutral sites vs. Top 25 opponents. See a complete list vs. ranked opponents since the arrival of Coach L on page 10.

LARRAÑAGA RETURNS HOME, NY COACHES IN NIT

Coach Jim Larrañaga returned to his roots for the NIT, playing in his home state of New York. Larrañaga grew up in the Parkchester neighborhood of The Bronx, playing high school basketball for Jack Curran at Archbishop Molloy High School in Queens.

Since 2000, only four coaches originally from the state of New York have led their team to the championship game of the NIT. In 2015, coach Jim Larrañaga is from The Bronx. In 2014, Larry Brown (Brooklyn) was the runner up with SMU. John Beilein (Burt) won the event in 2007 with West Virginia. In 2000, Matt Doherty (East Meadow) was runner up with Notre Dame.

COACH L IN MADISON SQUARE GARDEN

In Larrañaga's 31 years of coaching, he had never been the head coach of a team playing a game in Madison Square Garden, until March 31 against Temple. He played in the World's Most Famous Arena multiple times while playing college ball for Providence, and was an assistant coach for Virginia when the Cavaliers won the NIT in 1980. Larrañaga's final collegiate game as a Friar was played against UNC in 1971, an 86-79 loss for PC in the NIT Elite 8.

MARCH WAS HURRICANE SEASON

Miami was 7-1 in the month of March last season, and Jim Larrañaga is 19-8 in the month of March while coaching at Miami.

BALANCED ATTACK IN THE POSTSEASON

In five NIT games Miami presented a balanced attack with ...

* Six players averaging more than 7.6 points per game: McClellan (13.2 ppg), Reed (10.8), Jekiri (8.0), Lecomte (8.0), Newton (7.8), Burnett (7.6).

* Nine guys knocking down a 3-pointer: Burnett (7), Cruz Uceda (6), McClellan (6), Reed (4), Lecomte (3), Newton (2), Sherman (1), Jekiri (1), Palmer (1).

* Five players grabbing 3.8 or more rebounds per game: Jekiri (7.5), Reed (7.0), McClellan (5.0), Cruz Uceda (4.8) and Newton (3.8).

SECOND-HALF SCORING FUELS CANES

In five NIT games, Miami scored 40.4 points per game in the second stanza after just 25.6 per game in the first half. For the season, Miami averaged 30.0 points in the first and 37.0 in the second period. Miami scored 35+ in the second period in all five NIT games, led by 45 at Richmond after scoring just 18 in the first half against the Spiders.
