THE GAME

- ▶ Miami begins a stretch of three consecutive home games Saturday when the Hurricanes host North Carolina in a nationally-televised game on ESPN2. The Hurricanes will play four of their next five games at Dolphin Stadium.
- ▶ The Hurricanes are coming off of one of their best offensive games on the road in three years when Miami defeated Texas A&M, 41-23, at Kyle Field last Saturday. Miami's 41 road points were the most since a 47-17 win at Wake Forest on Nov. 6, 2005.
- ▶ Redshirt freshman quarterback Robert Marve will make his third collegiate start against the Tar Heels. Marve tossed his first two career touchdowns against the Aggies - his first a 26-yarder to true freshman Thearon Collier and his second to senior Kayne Farquharson from 15 yards out. Marve completed 16-of-22 passes for 212 yards.
- ▶ The Hurricanes and the Tar Heels both enter the contest 2-1. In three games, Miami has allowed just 225 rushing yards (75 per game and 2.4 per carry). North Carolina's offense has been explosive with 1,069 yards (356.3 yards per game and 6.1 yards per play).
- ▶ Defensively, the Hurricanes are ranked 26th nationally in overall defense and 17th in rushing defense through the first three games. Miami is yielding just 18.7 points per game and 277.7 yards per game. Against Texas A&M, linebacker Glenn Cook led the team with nine tackles, one for a loss and a fumble recovery for a touchdown. Cook leads the team with 18 tackles.

THE OPPONENT

- ▶ North Carolina dropped its first game of the season last Saturday as Virginia Tech rallied to defeat the Tar Heels, 20-17, in an ACC Coastal Division matchup. UNC outgained the Hokies 307-268, but the Tar Heels committed 14 penalties and had three turnovers in the loss.
- ▶ Quarterback T.J. Yates has completed 40-of-66 passes for 623 yards, six touchdowns and one interception. Yates completed 11-of-18 passes for 181 yards and one TD against the Hokies. Receiver Brandon Tate has been dynamic for the Tar Heels with 11 catches for 297 yards and three TDs. He leads the nation and ACC in all-purpose yards with 797 (141 rushing, 297 receiving, 141 punt returns)

DID YOU KNOW?

- ▶ Of the 23 seniors on this year's squad, 13 have already earned degrees, while the remaining 10 are all on course to graduate either in December of 2008 or May of 2009.
- ▶ Last spring, the NCAA released its annual Academic Progress Report (APR) and the Hurricane football team scored a 969, the eighth-highest mark out of the 119 Bowl Sub-division football programs. Miami's score - also the third-highest mark in the 12-team Atlantic Coast Conference - put the team in the 80th-90th percentile nationally based on its performance in the classroom.
- ▶ Miami's 41 road points were the most points scored by the Hurricanes since UM won at Wake Forest back in Nov. 2005.

and 218 on kickoff returns while accounting for five total touchdowns. Running back Greg Little has 179 yards on 50 carries and two scores.

► Defensively, the Tar Heels are led by linebacker Mark Paschal with 28 tackles, 2.5 sacks and one interception. Fellow linebacker Quan Sturdivant is second with 27 tackles and an interception. The Tar Heels have intercepted seven passes and forced eight turnovers.

THE SERIES

► North Carolina holds a slight 6-5 edge in the all-time series between the two schools. Since Miami joined the ACC in 2004, UM and UNC have split four match-ups with the 'Canes winning back-to-back years in 2005 and 2006 and UNC winning in 2004 and 2007. The series between the two programs dates back to 1946.

THE COACHES

► Randy Shannon is 7-8 and is in his second season at Miami. North Carolina's Butch Davis is 6-9 in his second season with the Tar Heels.

HURRICANES EXCELLING IN THE CLASS ROOM

► Miami's APR score in 2008 was a slight improvement over its mark of 966 in 2007 when the team was ranked 10th nationally in academic success.

► Of the 23 seniors on this year's squad, 13 have already earned degrees, while the remaining 10 are all on course to graduate either in December of 2008 or May of 2009.

► The 13 players that have already earned degrees include: Carlos Armour (Sports Administration), Tyrone Byrd (Liberal Arts), Glenn Cook (Marketing and Business Management, Sports Management master's candidate), Romeo Davis (Liberal Arts), Dwayne Hendricks (Business Management), Khalil Jones (Sports Administration), Joe Joseph (Sports Administration), Eric Moncur (Liberal Arts), Anthony Reddick (Liberal Arts), Chris Rutledge (Liberal Arts), Xavier Shannon (Enrollment Management master's candidate), Derron Thomas (Sports Administration) and Chris Zellner (Geography).

► Last season, Miami had 12 early graduates - the second-highest total nationally behind fellow ACC member Boston College and in 2006, Miami had an ACC-high eight players named to the All-ACC Academic Football Team.

STRONG START FOR UM's RUNNING BACKS

► The University of Miami has developed a reputation as one of the top rushing teams nationally in recent years and this year appears to be no different. Through the season's first three games, Miami is out-rushing its opponents 444-to-225 on the ground while its top two performers in terms of all-purpose yards gained are running backs.

► Sophomore Graig Cooper leads the team with 262 all-purpose yards (181 - rush, 81 - punt return) and senior Derron Thomas (87 - rush, 34 receiving) ranks second with 121 total yards. Cooper, coming off a career-high 128 yards rushing at Texas A&M, leads the team with four total touchdowns (three rushing, one punt return) while UM's next three running backs -- Thomas, junior Javarris James and sophomore Shawnbrey McNeal all have a touchdown apiece.

LINEBACKERS ASSERTING THEMSELVES EARLY ON

► The linebacking group of senior Glenn Cook, juniors Darryl Sharpton and Colin McCarthy and freshman Sean Spence make up four of UM's top five tacklers through the season's first three games. The foursome has combined for 59 tackles, or 32% of Miami's 182 total tackles this season.

► Cook leads the team with 18 total tackles (9 - UA, 9 - A) while Sharpton and McCarthy rank second and third with 16 and 15 total tackles respectively. Safety Anthony Reddick ranks fourth on the squad with 14 while Spence has 10, including seven solo stops. Spence has been a pleasant surprise coming off the bench in his first three collegiate contests, recording two-and-a-half tackles for losses (-15 yards), one pass break-up and a nine-yard sack of Florida quarterback Tim Tebow. Cook had a team-high nine tackles and a fumble return for a touchdown in College Station while McCarthy leads the team with two forced fumbles, including the one that led to Cook's touchdown.

REVOLVING RECEIVERS

► With the losses of wide receivers Darnell Jenkins (619 rec. yards) and Lance Leggett (238), UM returns only 25 percent of its receiving yards from 2007 (499 of 2,034). Sam Shields, Kayne Farquharson, Leonard Hankerson and Khalil Jones are the only four receivers on the roster to have caught a collegiate pass heading into the 2008 season, with Shields (847 career receiving yards) as the only one with more than 100 career yards (former wide receiver Ryan Hill -- 182 career receiving yards -- is now playing safety).

► Joining Shields, Farquharson, Hankerson and Jones is a talented freshman class, including Aldarius Johnson, Travis Benjamin, Laron Byrd, Thearon Collier, Davon Johnson and Kendal Thompkins.

► While only seven UM wide receivers caught a pass in 2007, the Hurricanes have surpassed that mark by two already this year. Hankerson, Farquharson, Byrd, Collier, Johnson, Shields and Benjamin all have at least three catches, Thompkins has two while Jones has one catch.

Game Day Press Policies

Only working press will be admitted to the Dolphin Stadium press box. Seats will be issued according to the following criteria:

1. State newspapers by circulation, wire services, national publications, newspapers from opponent's area, and student newspapers from UM and opponent's schools.
2. Other daily newspapers, with preference to those that regularly cover UM.
3. Radio and television personnel not broadcasting, but considered reporting.
4. Non-daily newspapers, with preference to those which regularly cover UM.
5. Scouts. Freelance and/or non-daily writers may be asked to produce copies of actual publications in which their work has appeared. In some cases, these materials will be required as verification of the writers' status.

Conference Road Game Credentials

Writers covering UM on a regular basis should make all requests for conference road credentials directly with the home team.

Non-Conference Road Game Credentials

Writers covering UM on a regular basis may make requests for non-conference road credentials with the UM Sports Information Office. Credential requests are faxed to the opponent school by Monday two weeks prior to the contest.

YOUNG'S IMMEDIATE INFLUENCE

► New defensive coordinator Bill Young has the UM defense off to a strong start through the first three games in 2008. Traditionally known for having one of the most athletically talented defenses nationally, Miami appears to have regained some of its success Hurricanes' fans have become accustomed to the last three decades.

► Through UM's first three games this season, the Hurricanes rank 17th nationally in both first downs allowed per game (14.33) and rushing yards allowed per game (75.0). The Hurricanes also rank 26th in total defense (277.67 ypg) and 14th in tackles for losses (8.0 pg).

► The 'Canes, after holding Charleston Southern to just 126 total yards of offense in the opener, shut down the fifth-ranked Gators' ground attack in Gainesville, holding 2007 Heisman Trophy winner Tim Tebow and the UF running game to just 89 rushing yards on 27 carries (3.29 ypc). In fact, the Miami defense held a strong Gators offense to just 18.85 yards per drive on UF's first seven drives of the contest.

► Against A&M last weekend, the Aggies gained just 87 yards on 35 carries for an average of 2.5 yards per carry.

TWO-DEEP WITH FRESHMEN

► Take a look at UM's depth chart this week, and you'll see something you aren't accustomed to seeing a lot of at UM -- the abbreviation "Fr." Whether it be on offense, defense or special teams, 13 true freshmen are currently listed on UM's two-deep depth chart this week for the contest against North Carolina. In addition to names on the depth chart, it's certainly possible four or five more true freshman could see significant playing time at some point this season (16 true freshman were listed on UM's two-deep for the opener against Charleston Southern). ► The Hurricanes are a near-perfect 10-of-11 in the red zone on offense. UM has converted seven touchdowns, three field goals and if it weren't for a late interception against A&M, the Hurricanes would be one of just nine teams nationally (and five teams in BCS leagues) to have converted 100 percent of their red zone chances. The 'Canes lead the Atlantic Coast Conference with a 90.9 percentage.

DON'T BLINK NOW

► When Miami's offense gets the ball in its hands, you better not get up out of your seat or you might miss something. Eight of UM's 10 offensive touchdowns this season have come on drives of three minutes or shorter, with four of those eight TDs coming in under 36 seconds. The team's quick-strike ability was on display in College Station last weekend, when three offensive TD drives lasted 35 seconds, 27 seconds and eight seconds respectively. MIAMI VS. THE STATE OF NORTH CAROLINA

► The University of Miami is 32-17-1 all-time versus teams from the state of North Carolina. Since UM joined the Atlantic Coast Conference in 2004, the Hurricanes are 8-3 against teams from the Tar Heel State. Prior to two late season losses to N.C. teams last season, the Hurricanes had seven straight wins against the state from late 2004 to early last year.

► Prior to Miami joining the ACC, the 'Canes rarely faced teams from North Carolina, playing just four games against N.C. teams from the time Dennis Erickson took over the program in 1989 to the team's last year in the BIG EAST in 2003. Over that 15-year span, UM faced East Carolina three times and NC State once.

 - Graig Cooper was UM's leading rushing, collecting 77 yards on 13 carries
 - Teraz McCray had two sacks and three-and-a-half tackles for losses
 - Kenny Phillips led the team with nine total tackles

IT'S BEEN A WHILE

► When UM hosts UNC on Saturday, it will be 30 days since UM's last home game – the 'Canes season-opener against Charleston Southern on Aug. 28. The last time the Hurricanes had that much time in between home games was during the team's national championship season in 2002 when, after an Oct. 12 home game versus Florida State, the team had a bye week followed by three straight away games at West Virginia (10/26), at Rutgers (11/2) and at Tennessee (11/9). The 'Canes finally hosted a game again that season on Nov. 21 against Pitt – 40 days after the FSU contest the previous month.

BUTCH IS BACK

► Today's game marks the first time that current UNC head coach Butch Davis will coach a collegiate game in South Florida since the former UM head coach left for the NFL following the Hurricanes' 2000 season. Davis, who coached the Hurricanes for six seasons (1995-2000), compiled a record of 52-20 in Coral Gables, including an 11-1 mark and a Sugar Bowl victory over Florida in his final season at UM. After coaching the Cleveland Browns for four seasons, Davis returned to the collegiate ranks last year to take over the Tar Heel program.

FIRST HALF BELONGS TO THE UM DEFENSE

► Through the season's first three games, the UM defense is already making it difficult on opponents to not only put points on the board, but to also move the football in the first half of ball games. The Hurricanes have only allowed 19 first half points this season (6.3 per contest) while opponents are averaging just 130.7 yards of total offense. Against Charleston Southern, UM held the Buccaneers to just 43 yards of offense in the first half, taking a 28-0 lead into halftime. A week later against No. 5 Florida, the 'Canes held the Gators to 123 yards of first-half offense. UF's only two scores in the first half came on a short field (14-yard TD pass after UF opened the drive on Miami's 35-yard-line) and a blocked punt that resulted in a safety just before halftime. Despite Texas A&M collecting 226 first-half yards, the UM defense buckled down after an early Aggie touchdown, holding A&M to just three more points the rest of the half.

HURRICANES AT DOLPHIN STADIUM

► Miami is a perfect 4-0 in games played in Dolphin Stadium. In addition to UM's season-opening 52-7 win over Charleston Southern on Aug. 28, the Hurricanes defeated Virginia, 31-21, in the Carquest Bowl in 1996; NC State, 46-23, in 1998 in the Micron PC Bowl and Florida State, 16-14, in the 2003 Orange Bowl.

SEPTEMBER SUCCESS

► Since the turn of the century, the Hurricanes are 23-6 in the month September, including last weekend's 41-23 win over Texas A&M in College Station. Miami has faced five ACC opponents in the month of September since joining the league back in 2004, holding a record of 3-2 over that time. UM has victories over Florida State (2004), Clemson (2005) and Duke (2007) and losses to Florida State in 2005 and 2006. The 'Canes and the Heels have only met once in the month of September and that was way back in 1960, when UM beat UNC, 29-12, on Sept. 30 in Miami. The Hurricanes last loss to an unranked team in the month of September came on Sept. 25, 1999 when No. 9 UM lost to an unranked East Carolina team, 27-23, in Raleigh, N.C.

TRUE FRESHMEN ON TAP

► According to available information, Jacory Harris was the first TRUE freshman to start at quarterback in a season opener for the University of Miami in his collegiate debut versus Charleston Southern. Miami has 33 newcomers on its squad this season with a 2008 recruiting class ranked No. 1 in the country by ESPN.com. Of the 100 total players on the roster, the Hurricanes list 40 freshmen - 31 true freshmen and nine redshirt freshmen. Three true freshmen started for Miami in the season-opener in Harris, wide receiver Aldarius Johnson and linebacker Marcus Robinson. Overall, 21 true freshmen played in the season-opening game: Harris, Robinson, Aldarius Johnson (WR), Thearon Collier (WR), Jordan Futch (LB), Kendal Thompkins (WR), Laron Byrd (WR), Travis Benjamin (WR), Davon Johnson (WR), Andrew Smith (DL), Marcus Forston (DL), Gavin Hardin (DL), Brandon Harris (DB), Vaughn Telemaque (DB), Sean Spence (LB), Jeremy Lewis (DL), Joe Wylie (DB), Arthur Brown (LB), Micanor Regis (DL), John Calhoun (FB) and Cannon Smith (QB).

THE CHRONICLES OF REDDICK

► Nearly four full years have passed since Anthony Reddick's Freshman All-American season came to a close in on Dec. 31, 2004. Since then, Reddick -- now a 22-year-old graduate of the University of Miami - has played in just 10 games and started just four the last three-plus years. Despite a number of injury setbacks over the years, Reddick has persevered and has started at safety in UM's first three games this season. Reddick's freshman campaign in 2004 saw the Fort Lauderdale native collect 73 tackles, two blocked punts, one forced fumble, one sack and one interception. He collected a career-high 12 tackles twice that season (Louisville, Virginia Tech) and was named UM's Defensive Rookie of the Year (along with Romeo Davis). This year, he ranks fourth on the team with 14 tackles - nine of which were unassisted.

COOK, MARVE EARN ACC WEEKLY HONORS

► University of Miami football players Glenn Cook and Robert Marve have earned Atlantic Coast Conference weekly honors announced by the league office Monday. It is the second time this season the Hurricanes had a Rookie and a Defensive Lineman of the Week.

► Marve earned Rookie of the Week honors in leading the Hurricanes to a convincing, 41-23 win over Texas A&M. He made his second career start and completed 16-of-22 passes for 212 yards and two touchdowns. He threw his first career touchdown with 20 seconds remaining in the first half – a 26 yarder to freshman receiver Thearon Collier and later had a 16-yarder to Kayne Farquharson in the third quarter. Marve completed 13 of his first 16 passes. For the game, he completed 72.7 percent of his passes.

► Cook picked up a season-high nine tackles (three solo and six assisted) – one shy of his career-high and returned a fumble for a touchdown. It was his second career fumble return for a TD. He knocked the ball loose, picked it up and ran it back two yards for a touchdown in the third quarter giving the Hurricanes a 41-10 lead. He also had a half tackle for loss. Cook leads the Hurricanes with 18 total tackles and 2.5 tackles for loss.

TWO NEW COACHES ON 2008 STAFF

▶ Randy Shannon's 2008 team has two new assistant coaches – defensive coordinator Bill Young and wide receivers coach Aubrey Hill.

▶ **Bill Young, Defensive Coordinator** – Young is a 39-year coaching veteran, with 21 seasons as a defensive coordinator. He has been a defensive coordinator at Tulsa, Ohio State, Oklahoma, Southern California and most recently at Kansas, where the Jayhawks finished the 2007 season 12-1 with a victory in the Orange Bowl over Virginia Tech with a defense that ranked 12th in the nation. Young also had a one-year stint in the NFL.

▶ Under Young's guidance, the 2007 Kansas defense ranked fourth nationally in scoring defense (16.3 points per game) and turnovers gained (35), eighth in run defense (94.8 yards per game) and ninth in pass efficiency defense (105.3). It featured All-American cornerback Aqib Talib. Young was defensive coordinator at Kansas for six seasons under Mark Mangini. In 2006, Kansas finished third in the Big 12 and 28th in the nation in rushing defense (109.0 yards per game), as it held four opponents to under 70 yards of rushing and limited all opponents to a fourth-down conversion rate of less than 25 percent. Young was defensive line coach with the Detroit Lions in 2001. Prior to his stint in the NFL, he worked three seasons as defensive coordinator at Southern California under Paul Hackett. While at USC in 1999, his defense led the nation in total takeaways and topped the conference in rushing defense and turnover margin (third nationally). His USC defense in 1998 was No. 1 in the Pac-10 in total defense, pass efficiency defense (third nationally) and scoring defense. It was also ranked second in the country in forced turnovers.

▶ In addition to his three years at USC, his stints as defensive coordinator came at Tulsa in 1983-84, Ohio State from 1988-95 and Oklahoma in 1996-97.

▶ During his 27 years in college coaching, Young has helped elevate 31 players to the NFL. Prior to his college coaching career, Young spent six seasons on the prep level at two high schools in Oklahoma. He played outside linebacker and defensive end at Oklahoma State from 1965-67 and led the Cowboys in interceptions in 1965. He was an academic All-Big Eight selection as a senior in 1967 and earned his bachelor's degree in education that year. He then went on to earn his master's degree in secondary education at Central Oklahoma in 1971. He is married to Lawana Young.

▶ **Aubrey Hill, Wide Receivers Coach** – Hill played and coached in Steve Spurrier's "Fun 'n Gun" offense at Florida. He was a standout receiver at Florida from 1991-94 before moving into the coaching ranks. He spent the last three years on the Pittsburgh coaching staff, where he tutored first-team All-Big East performers with Greg Lee in 2005 and Derek Kinder in 2006 and a freshman All-America in Oderick Turner in 2006. In 2004 Hill coached at NCAA I-AA Elon (N.C.) University as receivers coach. Prior to that he was the receivers coach at Duke for five seasons and also served in a pair of NFL coaching internships.

▶ As a player, Hill helped Florida to a four-year record of 43-10-1 (.806) and three SEC championships. He totaled 86 receptions and 18 touchdowns during his career and caught a touchdown every 4.78 catches, the third best TD ratio in Gators history. He was a team captain as a senior in 1994. Following his playing career, Hill served as a Florida graduate assistant from 1996-98. In his first season as an assistant, Florida captured the national championship with a 12-1 mark, capped by a 52-20 victory over Florida State in the Sugar Bowl.

▶ During his three years on the Florida staff, the Gators went a combined 32-5 (.865). Hill earned his first full-time appointment at Duke, where he served as receivers coach from 1999-2003. He was instrumental in the development of Scottie Montgomery, who finished his collegiate career ranked second in career receptions (171) and third in yardage (2,379) in Blue Devil annals. He supplemented his collegiate experience with a pair of NFL internships, including stints with the Washington Redskins (summer 2001) and Miami Dolphins (summer 2002). Hill was involved with receivers and special teams in both internships. Hill owns two degrees from Florida, including a bachelor's degree in exercise and sport sciences and a master's degree in leisure/sports management. He and his wife, Shanae, were married on July 4, 2008. He has a 16-year-old daughter, Destini.

RANDY SHANNON VISITS THE MIDDLE EAST

► University of Miami Head football coach Randy Shannon was one of five college football coaches to participate in a seven-day Middle East tour May 20-26. The tour was a joint effort of Morale Entertainment and Armed Forces Entertainment. Joining Coach Shannon on the trip were Mark Richt of Georgia, Tommy Tuberville from Auburn, Yale University's Jack Siedlecki and Charlie Weis of Notre Dame. The group gathered at Scott Air Force Base in Illinois before beginning their journey on May 20. The trip took them to Landstuhl Regional Medical Center in Germany, at sea aboard the USS Nassau, Al Udeid Air Base and Camp As Sayliaha in Qatar, the Naval Service Center in Bahrain, a U.S. Air Base at an undisclosed location in Southwest Asia and concluded with a visit with President George Bush at the White House on Memorial Day. The tour was a first-of-its-kind for NCAA football and for Armed Forces Entertainment. The NCAA coaches participated in meet and greets at various bases, as well as coached flag football teams made up of servicemen and women. Additionally, the head coaches hosted three symposiums, where the audience members ask questions. Coach Shannon was accompanied on the tour by UM Senior Associate Athletic Director Tony Hernandez.

MIAMI FOOTBALL: A HISTORICAL PERSPECTIVE

The 2007 season was Miami's 82nd season of competition on the football field. In those 82 seasons of play, Miami has posted winning records in 55 seasons. The Hurricanes have played for a national championship 10 times in post-season bowl games, winning five times. Since 1980, Miami has posted at least seven victories a year in 26 of 28 seasons, including 22 seasons of at least nine wins and has won at least 10 games per season an outstanding 14 times since 1983, earning 11 victories a total of 11 times over that span. Miami has an all-time record of 545-304-19 for a winning percentage of .639. Miami has an all-time home record of 367-167-14 (.682), including a record of 319-142-7 (.689) in games played at the Orange Bowl, the Hurricanes' home field from 1937 to 2007. In 2007, Miami played its fourth season in the Atlantic Coast Conference, finishing 2-6 and in fifth place in the Coastal Division.

COOPER FOURTH AMONG NCAA FRESHMEN IN RUSHING IN 2007

► Miami running back Graig Cooper ranked fourth nationally in rushing among true freshmen in 2007. Interestingly, the freshman who led the country, Pittsburgh's LeSean McCoy, was Cooper's teammate in 2006 at Millford Prep Academy. As backfield mates a year ago, Cooper rushed for 1,327 yards on 106 attempts, and McCoy gained 547 yards on 77 carries.

PHILLIPS EXTENDS MIAMI'S UNPRECEDENTED STREAK

▶ The University of Miami extended its school record streak to 14 consecutive years in which a Hurricanes player was chosen in the first round of the NFL draft when junior safety Kenny Phillips was selected by the New York Giants with the 31st pick of the 2008 draft. Miami's streak of 14 straight years with a first-round draft choice is unprecedented in football history. The previous longest streak was nine straight years by the University of Florida (1983-91). The University of Miami's string began in 1995 when Warren Sapp was drafted in the first round. In the last 14 years, UM has had 33 players drafted in the first round of the NFL draft. Since 1982, Miami has had 50 players drafted in the first round of the NFL draft. Prior to 1982, only 11 UM players had ever been selected in the first round.

JAMES ON MAXWELL WATCH LIST

▶ Junior running back Javarris James has been named to the 2008 watch list for the Maxwell Award presented to the outstanding collegiate football player in America since 1937 and is named in honor of Robert W. "Tiny" Maxwell. Semifinalists for the Maxwell and Bednarik Awards will be announced in early November and three finalists for each award will be announced November 25th.

MONCUR ON HENDRICKS WATCH LIST

▶ Senior defensive end Eric Moncur is on the preseason watch list for the 2008 Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award. Previous recipients of the Hendricks Award include: Terrell Suggs (Arizona State), David Pollack (Georgia), Elvis Dumervil (Louisville), LaMarr Woodley (Michigan) and Chris Long (Virginia).

▶ The Ted Hendricks Defensive End of the Year Award is named in honor of college football's first three-time first-team All-American. As a defensive end at the University of Miami, Ted used his agility, height and reach to block passes and kicks, force interceptions and pressure quarterbacks and running backs. He roamed the front line, read plays and blitzed on impulse, completely transforming the way the defensive end position was played. His professional career spanned 15 years and 215 consecutive games. It included four Super Bowl victories, eight Pro Bowl selections and inductions into the College and Pro Football Halls of Fame. It is in the spirit of Ted Hendricks' aggressive style of play, winning attitude and determination that the Defensive End of the Year Award for college football's premier defensive end is presented.

ADKINS, HARRIS EARN ACC WEEKLY HONORS

▶ University of Miami football players Spencer Adkins and Jacory Harris earned Atlantic Coast Conference Weekly honors the week of Aug. 25-31. Harris earned Rookie of the Week honors. Harris started his first collegiate game and completed 16-of-26 passes for 190 yards while accounting for two touchdowns – one through the air and one on the ground -- in leading Miami to a 52-7 win over Charleston Southern. The true freshman from Miami led the Hurricanes to touchdowns on four of their first five possessions. He scored his first collegiate touchdown on a 30-yard run on the seventh play of the game and finished with 212 yards of total offense. Adkins and North Carolina's E.J. Wilson also earned co-Defensive Lineman of the Week honors. Adkins helped a Miami defense that held Charleston Southern to 126 total yards and 49 rushing yards. Adkins tallied three solo tackles – two tackles for loss and recorded two sacks from his middle linebacker position.

RECAPPING THE SPRING GAME

▶ Freshman linebacker Arthur Brown recorded a team-high eight tackles and added an interception as the defense defeated the offense, 32-29, in the annual University of Miami spring game at the BankUnited Canesfest March 29 at Fort Lauderdale's Lockhart Stadium in front of an estimated crowd of 11,000. Rising sophomore running back Graig Cooper led the offense with eight carries for 91 yards and two touchdowns. Cooper finished with 103 total yards of offense and ran for a 44-yard touchdown run. Running back Javarris James caught four passes for 60 yards and ran once for a 25-yard gain, but it was Miami's defense that came away winners behind its linebackers Brown, Darryl Sharpton and Sean Spence. Sharpton finished with five tackles and recorded three of the defense's six sacks. Spence intercepted two passes on the day. The scoring was set up so that the defense earned two points each for a three-and-out, interception, fumble and one point for a defensive stop before the offense crossed the 50-yard line. The Hurricane offense racked up 19 first downs in four eight-minute quarters and gained 364 yards - 141 rushing and 223 through the air. Redshirt freshman quarterback Robert Marve completed 10-of-22 passes for 93 yards. True freshman quarterback Jacory Harris finished 9-of-17 for 64 yards while true freshman quarterback Cannon Smith was 1-of-5 with a 66-yard completion to sophomore running back Shawnbrey McNeal.

CHAPEL HILL, N.C. (AP) - Brandon Tate scored on a long end-around in a spurt of 27 points to start the game and Connor Barth kicked four field goals to help North Carolina hold off Miami 33-27, giving Davis his first ACC win against a program he once built into a national champion.

Anthony Elzy ran for 95 yards and a score for the Tar Heels (2-4, 1-2 Atlantic Coast Conference), who turned in a dominating performance to take a 27-0 lead at halftime then hung on as the Hurricanes (4-2, 1-1) twice rallied to within a touchdown in the second half.

Davis had played down his first game against the Hurricanes earlier in the week and said after the game that beating Miami didn't make the victory anymore special. The Tar Heels had struggled to do that this season, from a 34-31 loss on a final-play field goal at East Carolina to a 22-20 loss to Virginia and last week's 17-10 loss at Virginia Tech. This time, they put together big plays when they needed them in the second half: a punt-forcing sack from Hilee Taylor to end a Miami drive near midfield late in the third quarter; a 49-yard catch-and-run from Tate on the ensuing possession; and two fourth-quarter field goals from Barth that kept Miami in catch-up mode.

Davis took over at Miami in 1995. He gradually brought the Hurricanes back to the prominence they had enjoyed under Jimmy Johnson, going 51-20 over six seasons, while winning three Big East Conference titles and four bowl games. His last team went 11-1 and finished ranked No. 2 nationally in 2000 after winning the Sugar Bowl. Then, after Davis left to coach the NFL's Cleveland Browns, his former players went unbeaten in 2001 and won a national title under Larry Coker.

Davis' new team got off to a fast start against Miami and Shannon, who was a player and an assistant under Davis. But Miami did everything it could to get back in the game, with Darnell Jenkins scoring on a 97-yard touchdown catch that made it 27-20 late in the third quarter and Javarris James scoring on a short run to set up an onside kick with about a minute left.

The Tar Heels ultimately hung on by holding off several Miami spurts, including Jenkins' long TD catch from Wright that was the second-longest in Miami history and the longest allowed by North Carolina in its history.

But Barth kicked 20- and 35-yard field goals, setting a school record with 19 consecutive made kicks, that pushed the lead to 33-20 with 10:55 left. North Carolina finished with a season-high 183 yards rushing, with quarterback T.J. Yates adding a touchdown on a keeper in the second quarter. Yates threw for 218 yards.

CHARLESTON GAME RECAP

MIAMI VS. CHARLESTON SOUTHERN NOTES

► **OFFENSIVE PRODUCTION...** Miami's 52 points against Charleston Southern marked the highest offensive production in a season opener since a 63-17 win over Florida A&M on Aug. 31, 2002. It was also the most points scored and the largest margin of victory since a 52-7 rout of Duke on Oct. 8, 2005.

► **CHANGING ZIP CODES...** After 71 seasons in the Orange Bowl, UM's season-opener on Aug. 28 marked the debut of the Hurricanes in their new home - Dolphin Stadium.

► **RUSH HOUR...** Five different players scored five rushing touchdowns for Miami - the most since the Hurricanes had five rushing TDs in a 51-10 win over Florida A&M on Sept. 9, 2006. Jacory Harris, Javarris James, Graig Cooper, Derron Thomas and Shawnbrey McNeal all ran the ball in for a touchdown. Thomas' 5-yard touchdown run in the third quarter marked the second of the senior's career.

► **DAZZLING DEBUT...** Jacory Harris' 190 passing yards versus Charleston Southern are the most for a true freshman quarterback in their first start since Ken Dorsey threw for 194 yards in his first start against Rutgers in a 55-0 win on Nov. 20, 1999.

► **STOPPING THE RUN...** Miami's defense held Charleston Southern to 49 yards rushing - the least allowed by a Hurricane defense since holding Boston College to just 24 yards rushing in a 17-14 win on Nov. 23, 2006. The 126 yards of total offense by CSU were the fewest by a UM opponent since the 'Canes limited FIU to 114 total yards of offense in a 35-0 win on Oct. 14, 2006.

► **COOPER TAKES IT TO THE HOUSE...** Sophomore Graig Cooper's 66-yard punt return for a touchdown marked the first of his career. Cooper is the first Hurricane since Devin Hester against Temple on Oct. 15, 2005 to return a punt for a touchdown.

► **GETTING ON THE BOARD...** With the win over CSU, the Hurricanes improved to 194-21 when scoring first.

► **FIRST IMPRESSIONS...** Charleston Southern was one of two new opponents Miami is scheduled to face in 2008. With the CSU win, the Hurricanes improved to 92-56-2 (.620) in first-ever meetings, including nine straight wins in inaugural games. Since 1991, the Hurricanes are 14-1 in first meetings. UM will play UCF for first time on Oct. 11.

► **SPREADING THE WEALTH...** Eleven different players made a reception in the 52-7 win over Charleston Southern. It marked the most receivers in a game since 12 Hurricanes made a catch in a 31-28 loss to North Carolina on Oct. 30, 2004.

► **START IT UP...** Jacory Harris' 30-yard rushing touchdown on Miami's opening drive marked the first time in exactly five years that the Hurricanes scored a touchdown on their opening drive in their season opener. On August 28, 2003, Ryan Moore gave the Hurricanes the early lead with a 24-yard touchdown pass from Brock Berlin as Miami went on to win, 48-9, at Louisiana Tech.

► **ONE-TWO PUNCH...** With Javarris James' 7-yard rushing touchdown on UM's second drive of the game, the 'Canes posted a TD on their first two possessions of the season-opener for the first time since that 2003 season-opening win at Louisiana Tech. James has recorded a rushing touchdown in two-straight home openers for the Hurricanes, posting a career-high two in last season's 31-3 season-opening win over Marshall.

► **ADD A THIRD AND FOURTH...** With Graig Cooper's 14-yard rushing touchdown in the second quarter, the Hurricanes scored a touchdown on their first four possessions of the game for the first time since a 34-3 win at Temple on Oct. 15, 2005.

MIAMI GARDENS, Fla. (AP) - Graig Cooper had a 66-yard punt return for a touchdown and rushed for another score, quarterback Jacory Harris accounted for two touchdowns and Miami moved into its new home with a 52-7 season-opening win Thursday night over Charleston Southern.

Javarris James rushed 12 times for 73 yards and a touchdown for the Hurricanes (1-0), who took full control with a 21-point first quarter, their highest-scoring period since Sept. 9, 2006 against Florida A&M. Derron Thomas and Shawnbrey McNeal also had touchdown runs for Miami, which outgained its outmatched opponents from the Football Championship Subdivision 416-126. It won't be so easy next weekend; the Hurricanes visit No. 5 Florida on Sept. 6. Tribble Reese threw for 81 yards, including a 2-yard touchdown pass to Tyrese Harris for Charleston Southern. Harris was 16-for-26 for 190 yards for the Hurricanes, who didn't score more than 37 points in any game last season and eclipsed that with ease Thursday - albeit against an opponent with just two winning seasons in its history.

It was Miami's highest-scoring game since Oct. 8, 2005, a 52-7 win over Duke. So by almost any measure, Miami's first home game in Dolphin Stadium went according to plan. The Hurricanes ended a seven-decade stay at the decrepit, decaying - and now destroyed - Orange Bowl last season, and were lured north to the Miami Dolphins' home field, replete with modern amenities like luxury suites, gargantuan video screens and the potential for up to \$5 million in new revenue for the private school's coffers each year. Other than the orange-and-blue seats and baseball diamond, there was no proof that either the Dolphins or Florida Marlins played at the stadium, which drew 48,119 for the opener - roughly two-thirds its capacity.

The Dolphins' ring of honor for the likes of Don Shula and Dan Marino was covered, Miami's distinctive "U" logo shielded the entrance to the tunnels plus adorned the sidelines, and Hurricanes' flags flew on all sides along the outside of the facility. The game drew 48,119. The debut wasn't totally flawless, at least in the logistical sense. A long-standing Miami pregame tradition - running out of a giant inflatable helmet and onto the field - had to be scrubbed at the last minute when crews couldn't pump enough air to make it work. The Hurricanes ran through a green plastic tunnel instead, with puffs of their trademark white smoke filling the sky. Alas, that was the closest thing Miami had to a major problem all night.

Harris, a true freshman who started only because first-string quarterback Robert Marve was serving a one-game suspension for disciplinary reasons, opened the scoring with a 30-yard run on a fourth-down play 2:37 into the contest, and the points kept coming from there. James scored on a 7-yard run on the next possession, and Harris then hit Leonard Hankerson with a 7-yard TD pass that pushed the lead to 21-0. Cooper scored on a 14-yard run early in the second quarter, then blew past everyone for his first career return touchdown to give Miami a 35-0 lead with 13:24 left in the third. Reese scrambled right and made a desperate flip to Harris for Charleston Southern's score, which capped a 10-play, 66-yard drive. Thomas answered with a 5-yard run late in the third, restoring Miami's 35-point cushion, and McNeal capped the scoring with a 1-yard plunge with 2:33 remaining.

MIAMI VS. FLORIDA NOTES

► **UM POINT TOTAL...** Miami's three points were the fewest points in the series since Florida won, 18-0, in 1960.

► **MARVE'S DEBUT...** Redshirt freshman quarterback Robert Marve made his first career start tonight. Oddly enough, it was the second straight week that a freshman started at quarterback for the Hurricanes, which according to available records, is the first that Miami has ever started freshman quarterbacks in back-to-back games.

► **FRESHMEN ON THE FIELD...** For the second straight game, true freshmen were spotted all over the field the Hurricanes. Freshman defensive tackle Marcus Forston made his first career start. Ten true freshmen played against the Gators: Forston (DT), Brandon Harris (DB), Aldarius Johnson (WR), Vaughn Telemaque (DB), Jacory Harris (QB), Thearon Collier (WR), Sean Spence (LB), Kendal Thompkins (WR), Laron Byrd (WR) and Travis Benjamin (WR). Another three redshirt freshmen played Saturday night: Robert Marve, Adewale Ojomo (DE) and Chris Ivory (LS).

► **MONCUR AND BAILEY RETURN...** With 7:46 remaining in the first quarter, senior defensive end Eric Moncur and sophomore Allen Bailey made their first appearances of the season.

► **GETTING GOING...** Redshirt freshman quarterback Robert Marve completed his first career pass with 5:09 left in the first quarter. Marve's three-yard completion to Leonard Hankerson gave the Hurricanes a first down.

► **BOSHER BOOTS CAREER LONG FG...** Sophomore kicker Matt Boshier connected on a career-long 50-yard field goal with 12:51 left in the second quarter. It was Boshier's second career field goal. He kicked his first career field goal - a 22-yarder - in UM's win against Charleston Southern last week.

► **WIDE RECEIVER NOTES...** Senior wide receiver Kayne Farquharson caught a career-high three passes on the night. Fellow wide receiver Leonard Hankerson also tied a career-high with three receptions (set last week vs. Charleston Southern).

► **PASSING GAME...** Miami's 79 passing yards were the lowest since the Hurricanes passed for 56 yards against Georgia Tech, Oct. 13, 2007.

GAINESVILLE, Fla. (AP) - - Tebow was good early and even better late, throwing two touchdown passes and helping the fifth-ranked Gators snap a six-game losing streak against Miami with a 26-3 victory Saturday night at The Swamp. It was Florida's first win since 1985 in the on-again, off-again series. The rebuilding Hurricanes (1-1), three-touchdown underdogs, hung close for three quarters. But Tebow and speedster Percy Harvin took over late and erased three quarters of frustration against Miami's improved defense. Florida's defense was stout all night, holding the Hurricanes to 140 total yards.

"Our defense played outstanding," Gators coach Urban Meyer said. "I thought they played great."
So did Tebow. The Hurricanes pressured the junior with every snap, forcing him to scramble and make early, sometimes off-balance throws. Still, he finished 21-of-35 passing for 256 yards and two TD passes. He also ran 13 times for 55 yards. Harvin, who missed last week's opener while recovering from offseason heel surgery, ran five times for 27 yards.

"We can do much more with him and we will," Meyer said.
Robert Marve, making his first career start for Miami, was 10-of-18 passing for 69 yards and was sacked three times.
"We can build a lot of things off this game," Miami coach Randy Shannon said. "That's the one thing that we're excited about. They see where we can get better, and they also know we were able to play with a top-five team in this country and we had a shot. That's all you want is a shot, a chance on the road, hostile environment and we had that opportunity. But we have to capitalize on it next time."

Florida, whose two scores in the first half came off Miami miscues on special teams, led 9-3 to start the fourth quarter. But Tebow, Harvin & Co. finally found their rhythm, putting together consecutive drives of 86 and 95 yards to put the game away. The Gators, who finished with 345 total yards, took advantage of two favorable calls to score the first of the two late touchdowns. Tebow hooked up with Carl Moore for a 28-yard gain on third-and-9, putting the Gators at the 5-yard line. Moore was initially ruled out of bounds, but officials reviewed the play and said Moore's elbow touched down before his feet landed out of bounds.

"That was the play of the day," said Meyer. "That kind of changed momentum."
Three plays later, on another third down, Miami's Randy Phillips was flagged for pass interference against Harvin. It gave the Gators a first-and-goal at the 2. Harvin took a pitch from Tebow on third down and outran several defenders for the score. Phillips insisted the pass to Harvin was not catchable and should not have been flagged.

"No way," he said. "But the ref made the call, so that's what we've got to live with. Chalk it up, play some more, bounce back."
Florida's next drive was the most impressive of the night, a five-play, 95-yarder that sealed the victory. Tebow found Louis Murphy - yes, the guy who spouted off about Florida being better suited than Miami to be referred to as "The U" - in the corner of the end zone for a 19-yard strike. Jonathan Phillips added a 29-yard field goal with 25 seconds to play for the final score.

Florida might not have even scored in the first half had Miami not made two errors on special teams. Matt Boshier shanked a punt on the team's opening drive, a 14-yard kick that gave the Gators great field possession. Tebow made easy work of the short field, directing a 35-yard drive on five plays and giving Florida a 7-0 lead with a 14-yard touchdown pass to Hernandez.

Miami then sucked the energy out of Florida Field - most of the record 90,833 in attendance were clad in orange and blue - with a 16-play drive that took 8:42 off the clock and kept Tebow on the sideline. It ended with a field goal, but gave the Hurricanes plenty of confidence they could play with the Mighty Gators. Nonetheless, the Gators added to their lead with another special teams blunder. Miami left Jeff Demps, one of the fastest players on the field, to rush unblocked at Boshier. Demps blocked the punt, and Murphy nearly recovered for a touchdown, but couldn't hang and the ball trickled out of bounds for a safety and a 9-3 advantage.

"The ball didn't fall our way," Marve said. "We had some plays we left out there on the field. The offense, the numbers might not look great, but we did move the ball. Then we'd get stuck."

TEXAS A&M GAME RECAP

MIAMI VS. TEXAS A&M NOTES

► **COOP...** Sophomore running back Graig Cooper ran for two touchdowns in the first quarter, which was a career-high. Cooper's 51-yard touchdown run also was a career-long rushing touchdown. It was Miami's longest rushing touchdown since Tyrone Moss had a 50-yard TD run against Virginia Tech on Nov. 4, 2006. Cooper also collected his third career 100-yard rushing game (128 yards on 16 carries) and Miami's first since Javarris James ran for 103 yards on 13 carries against NC State last season (Nov. 3, 2007).

► **MORE COOP...** Graig Cooper's 128 yards on the ground set a new personal career-high for single-game rushing yards. His previous career-high of 116 was set against Marshall on Sept. 1, 2007 in his first collegiate game.

► **FOR STARTERS...** A few Hurricanes made their first starts of the season: senior Tyrone Byrd (right tackle), senior Chris Rutledge (right guard) and freshman Laron Byrd (wide receiver). It was Tyrone Byrd's and Laron Byrd's first career starts and Rutledge's first career start at guard.

► **BIG PLAYS...** Miami had five explosive plays in the first half and eight for the game against Texas A&M. An "explosive play" is a run of 18-plus yards or a pass of 20-plus yards, and that is a key factor in the team's success. In 2007, Miami only had four or more explosive plays in a game four times – the high of five coming against Duke and FIU. Here were the 'Canes' big plays:

- Kayne Farquharson – 29-yard completion (1st quarter)
- Graig Cooper – 19-yard rushing TD (1st quarter)
- Graig Cooper – 51-yard rushing TD (1st quarter)
- Kayne Farquharson – 21 yard completion (2nd quarter)
- Derron Thomas – 34-yard run (2nd quarter)
- Thearon Collier – 26-yard touchdown recept. (2nd quarter)
- Dedrick Epps – 36 yard reception (3rd quarter)
- Thearon Collier – 25-yard reception (3rd quarter)

► **FIRST TIME SCORERS...** Redshirt freshman QB Robert Marve threw his first career touchdown with 27 seconds to go in the second quarter to freshman Thearon Collier. It was also Collier's first career touchdown reception. He almost had a second one, but he had a 66-yard touchdown reception in the second quarter called back due to a penalty. Marve's second touchdown pass went to Kayne Farquharson with 6:36 left in the third quarter.

► **ON THE ROAD...** Graig Cooper's 19-yard rushing touchdown with 12:56 in the first quarter was the first time Miami scored on its opening possession on the road since a Jon Peattie 38-yard field goal at Georgia Tech on Oct. 28, 2006. UM actually scored first in the game on Glenn Cook's 19-yard fumble return with 14:34 on the clock.

- The 24 first-half points by the Hurricanes were the most since UM put up 30 points at Wake Forest on Nov. 6, 2005.
- The last time Miami scored at least 40 points was in a 47-17 win at Wake Forest on Nov. 6, 2005.

► **PICKING IT OFF...** Senior defensive end Eric Moncur picked up Miami's first defensive turnover and his first career interception. Miami had a fumble recovery on a muffed punt against Charleston Southern for the Hurricanes only turnover before today's game.

► **A LITTLE DEJA VU...** Senior linebacker Glenn Cook forced a fumble, recovered it and returned it for a two-yard touchdown with 5:43 left in the third quarter. Cook also had a fumble recovery for a touchdown back on Oct. 28, 2006 at Georgia Tech, which also was the last time Miami scored on its opening offensive drive.

► **COOK COMES UP BIG...** Senior linebacker Glenn Cook recorded nine total tackles (three solo, six assists), which is the highest tackle total of any Miami defender this season. Cook's nine total tackles fell just one short of his career-high of 10 set against Duke on Oct. 21, 2006.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) - Robert Marve threw two touchdown passes and Graig Cooper ran for career-high 128 yards and two scores as Miami picked apart Texas A&M's defense in a 41-23 rout Saturday.

Marve, a redshirt freshman making his second career start, completed 16 of 22 passes for 212 yards. The Hurricanes (2-1) piled up 398 yards on 57 plays - an average of 6.98 yards per offensive snap - and handed A&M its worst nonconference defeat at Kyle Field since a 30-10 loss to Alabama in 1988.

The Hurricanes gained 261 yards in the first half on Saturday. The Hurricanes had 12 first downs on 28 plays in the first half and led 24-10 at the break.

The Hurricanes took less than two minutes to score. Marve threw a 29-yard pass to Kayne Farquharson on Miami's first offensive play and three snaps later, Cooper scored on a 19-yard run.

Miami's next possession was more of the same. After Marve threw an 11-yard pass to Sam Shields, Cooper ran untouched for a 51-yard touchdown. Miami gained 121 yards on its first six plays.

Freshman Richie Bean kicked a 38-yard field goal to pull Texas A&M to 14-10 late in the first quarter.

Derron Thomas started Miami's next drive with a 34-yard run. Marve took a hard hit from A&M linebacker Von Miller and left the game after throwing a pass to Farquharson. Freshman Jacory Harris replaced Marve and Matt Boshier kicked a 20-yard field goal for a 17-10 lead.

Miami's Travis Benjamin returned a punt 44 yards to the Aggies' 41 in the final minute of the half. Marve returned and found Thearon Collier wide open in the end zone with 20 seconds remaining.

Early in the third quarter, Marve threw a 36-yard pass to Dedrick Epps as the Aggies continued to blow coverages and miss tackles. The pass set up another short field goal by Boshier that put Miami up 27-10.

Defensive lineman Eric Moncur made a one-handed interception on Johnson's next pass at the Texas A&M 15.

Marve immediately threw a touchdown pass to Farquharson with 6:36 left in the third quarter to make it 34-10.

On the second play of A&M's next possession, Miami linebacker Glenn Cook swatted the ball out of Johnson's hands as he was being sacked, recovered the fumble and trotted into the end zone to make it 41-10.
