



BASKETBALL COACH

Bruce Hale

Bruce Hale's colorful basketball teams are awakening the greatest basketball interest ever at University of Miami and turnaway crowds are beginning to be common at Miami home games.

His 1959-60 team reached new heights as it won 23 games while losing four and gained a bid to the NCAA tournament. The team won the state championship and its third successive undisputed Florida Intercollegiate conference championship.

In six seasons, Hale's teams have scored 91 victories, met 55 defeats. He made his U-M coaching debut in 1954-55 and that year had his only losing team with a 9-11 record. In his first three years, he had 36 wins and 36 losses to his credit but then his work began to reap dividends and his last three campaigns have resulted in 55 wins against 19 losses. His 1958-59 UM team led the nation in scoring, while last year Hale's Hurricanes finished second in the United States, only 5-10ths of a point behind National Champs, Ohio State. His 1959-60 team was the greatest in 35 years of University of Miami basketball.

Hale was All-America for Santa Clara where he was graduated in 1941. A captain in the Air Force, he played on the famous Five by Five team in Miami Beach and later coached the Wright Air Field Base to the service championship. For 10 years, he played professional basketball and was on the All-World pro team in 1945. He coached the Chicago American Gears to the pro championship in 1946 and later coached the Indianapolis professional team.

The Outlook

IN WINNING 23 games and losing only four to earn a bid in the NCAA tournament, the 1959-60 University of Miami basketball team was the best in the history of the school.

Coach Bruce Hale is expected to have an even greater team this year, although the schedule, which features a trip to California and Utah, is much stiffer.

All five starters, including All-America Dick Hickox, are back from last year's winning team—they return along with three reserves. To make the picture even more glowing, Miami has five talented sophomores which gives the team size, depth and, perhaps some men who could grab starting assignments. The new men have height not seen before in Miami. One of them is a seven foot, one inch giant, Mike McCoy.

Last year's team lacked a good sixth man, needed more depth and height. Coach Hale garners all three ingredients for his 1960-61 club.

Returnees Ron Godfrey and Bruce Applegate at forward; Harry Manushaw at center and All-America Hickox and Julie Cohen at guard were the big guns in an attack which averaged 89.9 points a game last year. Essentially the same team, without Cohen, led the nation in scoring in 1958-59 with 87.6 points a game. Ohio State of the Big Ten just edged Miami for the honor last year.

The starting five last year had to carry virtually all the burden. Reserves were too inexperienced or too small to help. Jack Spisak, Chris Stavreti and Bruce Shapiro; now juniors, are better equipped to aid this year, but the big boost will come from the sophomores.

McCoy and the six foot, nine inch Lou Alix are taller than any of last year's varsity while Lee Woods, six foot, seven inches, matches Harry Manushaw, tallest of the veterans. The two new guards, Ken Allen and Carl Stavreti, are six footers.


With such a wealth of material, the Hurricanes can keep the pressure on all the way. Last year, most of the athletes had to pace themselves as there was little opportunity for rest in the key games.

Injuries, a bugaboo last year when replacements were just not available, will not be so costly this year. When Ron Godfrey was hurt and way below par in the NCAA tournament game, the Hurricanes were sunk. This year, at least one capable performer stands behind every starter—and is trying to shoulder his way to the starting team.

The Varsity Players

Forwards

RON GODFREY, 6 feet 4, 175 pounds, 22 years old, senior, Physical Education . . . Played for Martins Ferry, Ohio, under Coach Elmer Freese. Has lettered twice. A key performer the past two seasons, Ron does everything well. He was All Hurricane Classic and All-Florida Intercollegiate Conference forward last year. Godfrey broke the one-season record for free throws at UM with 159 and his 22 free throws against Oklahoma City is another

mark. He starts this year ninth in the UM all-time career scoring tables. He's ninth in field goals, fourth in free throws, and sixth in rebounds. Ron is tied for second for the greatest number of 20-point-games. His highest point total, 32, was against Murray State, and his most rebounds, 22, came against Xavier. The latter is a Hurricane Classic one-game rebound record. His loss by an injury prior to the NCAA tournament last year, hurt the Hurricanes chances against Western Kentucky.

BRUCE APPLGATE, 6 feet 3, 195 pounds, 22 years old, senior, Physical Education . . . Played for North Side, Ft. Wayne, Ind., under Coach Don Burick. Bruce was invaluable as a sixth man in 1958-59 but moved to the starting five last season and again proved a mighty balance wheel. He was elected honorary captain at the close of the campaign. Bruce has a fine one-handed jump shot from any spot on the floor and is an excellent man on the fast break. Re-

bounds effectively. Last year, he had 20-point-games both against Rollins and Florida Southern. His best rebounding job, 12, goes back to the 1958-59 finale against Florida State.

LEE WOODS, 6 feet 7, 200 pounds, 23 years old, sophomore, Arts and Science . . . Played at Leavenworth, Kansas, under Coach Merle Crawford. Spent three years in the U.S. Navy. Lee is good under the boards, an excellent team man and a capable shot. He has lots of poise and determination. As a freshman, he caged 75 field goals and 44 free throws in 13 games for 194 points and a 14.9 average.

LOU ALIX, 6 feet 9, 220 pounds, 20 years old, sophomore, Physical Education . . . Played at David Prouty High, Spencer, Mass., under Coach Bernard Prusacyck. Lou possesses the most all around potential of any of the newcomers. He is an excellent shot, a fine rebounder and has that fire and spirit of an athlete who never wants to lose. As a freshman, Lou played 12 games, hitting for 93 field goals and 39 free throws for 225 points, an average of 18.8 per game. He can play center or forward. Alix came to U-M as an All-America high school star and rates as one of the best prospects to ever enter the U-M camp.

JACK SPISAK, 6 feet 3, 180 pounds, 21 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . Played at Miami Edison High under Coach Red Bogart. Broke in as a reserve last year and won his letter. Jack has a good jump shot from in close. He is a good rebounder and gives good help as a reserve forward. His best scoring total, 12 points, came against Jacksonville last season. He picked up eight rebounds against Florida Southern.

Centers

HARRY MANUSHAW, 6 feet 7, 225 pounds, 22 years old, senior, Business Administration . . . Played at Horace Mann High, Gary, Ind., under Coach Keither Crown. Lettered twice. He broke the UM rebounding record as a sophomore even though he did not become a regular for the first several weeks of the season. He did not equal his sophomore year's statistics last season mainly because the Hurricanes had no adequate replacement for him

and he tried to pace himself. He was on the second All-Florida Intercollegiate Conference team at center. Harry is second in UM's rebound career totals. His 29 points against Loyola and 27 rebounds against Florida State in his sophomore year are his two top games.

MIKE McCOY, 7 feet 1, 225 pounds, 20 years old, sophomore, Physical Education . . . Played at South Side High, Ft. Wayne, Ind., under Coach Don Reichert. McCoy is one of the tallest basketball players in the country. He is the tallest ever to play for the University of Miami. While listed as a center, he also could see action as a forward during the 1960-61 season. Transferred to Miami after one semester at Northwestern. Mike should be one of the standout college players in the U.S. before he graduates. He has unusual coordination for a big man, can shoot from the outside. He has tremendous ability under the boards because of his height. He'll be needed a lot this year. Mike had a fabulous high school record, making All-City, All-State and All-America. He has the potential of being a future college All-America as well.

Guards

DICK HICKOX, All-America, 5 feet 6, 165 pounds, 22 years old, senior, Physical Education . . . Played for Coach Don Burick at North Side High, Ft. Wayne, Ind. Miami's great two-year veteran is pictured on the cover of this year's NCAA Basketball Guide as one of the greatest little men in basketball today and one of the finest players in the land no matter what the size may be. Dick was on the Associated Press All-America team last year and twice in a row has been on the United Press Little Man All-America team. He

was the unanimous choice at guard on the Florida Intercollegiate Conference team, its leading scorer and most valuable player. He was selected on the first All-Hurricane Classic team last season and was the most valuable player. Last year, Hickox broke the one year scoring, field goal and points averaged records at Miami and also shattered the one-year and all-time marks for number of 20-point-games. He starts this year in third place in career scoring at Miami, is sixth in total field goals, third in free throws, and, of all things, is 15th in rebounds! He's deadly accurate from any place on the floor including the free throw line—can drive in for layups and hit the big one in a clutch. Dick's 40-foot field goal as the buzzer sounded beat Iona in Madison Square Garden last season, while a field goal nearly as long broke a tie at the buzzer in the Florida State tilt. He's a great ball stealer, a sharp passer and a whiz on the fast break. His 34 points against Brigham Young last year — a Hurricane Classic record—is his biggest single game output. He grabbed 10 rebounds against Florida State in 1958-59 and had nine in the Brigham Young game in 1959-60.

JULIE COHEN, 6 feet, 175 pounds, 21 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . Played at Erasmus Hall High, Brooklyn, New York, under Coach Al Bedain. Was a high school All-America and spent a year at New York University before entering Miami. An excellent ball handler possessing terrific speed and a good shot, Julie was a regular as a sophomore. He should really come into his own this year. Julie could bolster his effectiveness from the free throw line. He hit for 22 points against Florida last year and grabbed 11 rebounds against Brigham Young. Cohen contributed greatly to Miami's greatest team in history last year.

BRUCE SHAPIRO, 5 feet 7, 155 pounds, 23 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . Played at Ben Franklin High, Rochester, New York, under Coach Mauro Panaggio. He got into 21 games last year as a reserve and lettered. Playing behind Miami's All-American Dick Hickox, Shapiro will again see reserve duty with the Hurricanes this year. His outstanding game last year came against Tampa as he scored 14 point. Bruce made the All-City team in

high school.



CARL STAVRETI, 6 feet, 170 pounds, 20 years old, sophomore, Physical Education . . . Played at South Side High, Ft. Wayne, Ind., under Coach Don Reichert. Attended Northwestern University one year but did not compete in varsity sports. Carl is capable of substituting for either Dick Hickox or Julie Cohen and doing a capable job. He is a consistent point-maker, has a good two handed set shot and can fire those long ones. He was All-City and All-State in

high school.

KEN ALLEN, 6 feet, 175 pounds, 20 years old, sophomore, Business Administration . . . Played at Miami Edison High under Coach Red Bogart. Ken topped the 1958-59 frosh with 297 points and a 17.5 average. He has a fine one-handed jump shot, has lots of basketball sense, is a good team leader and really should go places. He made the All-City team and also made the All-State Tournament team in high school. Ken rates as one of the best cagers ever produced in the State of Florida.

CHRIS STAVRETI, 6 feet, 175 pounds, 21 years old, junior, Physical Education . . . Did his high school playing at South Side High, Ft. Wayne, Ind., under Coach Don Reichert. Was a freshman at Central Michigan before coming to Miami. Chris showed last year he had lots of speed, was a good ball handler and accurate from both the field and the free throw line. He is in for another year as a reserve, but he is a dependable one. Chris scored 17 points against Florida Southern last year—his highest output in either high school or college. He was an All-City performer in his prep days.

Game Captains Appointed

University of Miami's basketball captains are appointed for each game. The honorary captain is then elected by the squad after the season closes. Bruce Applegate was given the honor by the 1960 squad.

Two Home Courts

Both the Miami Beach Auditorium and the Miami Beach Convention Hall will be used as home courts by the University of Miami basketball team this season.

Actually the same floor is shifted back and forth between the two adjacent buildings.

The Auditorium, which has been Miami's home court since it was built, can crowd some 4,000 spectators indoors while the Convention Hall can handle 6,800 fans.

UM High Nationally

Dick Hickox of the Hurricanes was 25th in the national major college scoring ranks with his 22.1 points per game average.

The Hurricanes as a team had the second highest scoring average in the nation, finishing with an 89.9 average against 90.4 for champion Ohio State.

The Hurricanes were eighth nationally in free throw accuracy with a .739 percentage. Miami's 897 tries and 663 successes were the largest by any team.

The final press polls ranked UM ninth in the nation.

The tournament was inaugurated in December, 1958, when Miami of Ohio defeated the Hurricanes in overtime for the title. New York U. took third place over Tulane.

Last year Miami routed Xavier, 110-93, for the title with Brigham Young defeating Florida for third place.

On the tournament All-Star team of 1958 were Ramsey, New York U, and Thomas, Miami (Ohio) forwards; Wingard, Miami (Ohio) and Klinker, Tulane, tied at center; Hamilton, Miami (Ohio) and Hickox, U of Miami, guards. Hamilton was named most valuable player.

Last year's all star team had Godfrey of Miami as one forward with Miller and Earnest of Brigham Young tied for the other spot. Thobe of Xavier was center; Hickox, Miami, was one guard and Castelle and Irvin, Xavier, tied for the other spot. Hickox was unanimous choice as most valuable.

Miami holds the record for most points in one game—110 vs. Brigham Young and the most field goals—41, and free throws—28—in the same game. The Hurricane two-game scoring total of 197 is the highest for the tournament.

Hickox of U-M set the one game scoring record of 34 points against Brigham Young and his 60 for the tournament is another high. His 12 field goals in one game and 27 in two are tournament marks. Godfrey holds the one-game free throw mark with eight while Cohen's 14 is a tournament record for two games. Manushaw has made most rebounds for the tournament—30, but Godfrey's 22 is high for one game.



Two overtime battles went to Miami. Twice Dick Hickox fired winning field goals which went through the hoop as the buzzer was sounding.

First Trip To Coast

University of Miami's 1960-61 basketball team will be the first Hurricane cage team to travel to the Pacific Coast.

The Hurricanes will play Santa Clara at San Jose, California, Dec. 8 and then will meet San Francisco in San Francisco two days later. On the swing home, the club will stop off in Provo, Utah to meet Brigham Young, one of the teams in the 1959 Hurricane Classic.

Coach Bruce Hale has an extra incentive to have his team do well on this trip since it opens in San Jose against his alma mater, Santa Clara.


