JACK HARDING

Jack Harding was a great all around athlete at University of Pittsburgh and then went on to successful football coaching careers at University of Scranton and University of Miami. He took over the rapidly expanding University of Miami athletic program as full time athletic director in 1948, after having served for a number of years both as head grid coach and as athletic director. Under his guidance, the University of Miami athletic program has expanded to great heights and the Hurricanes have opened athletic relationships with teams from coast to coast. Miami now maintains varsity teams in basketball, football, baseball, track, cross country, tennis, golf and swimming. Harding's wide acquaintanceships have helped Miami schedulewise and his experience in building has proven to be just what young University of Miami has needed.

BRUCE HALE

Head Coach

Bruce Hale, starting his third year as head basketball coach at University of Miami, has compiled a two-year record of 23 wins against 23 defeats and has set Miami's sights toward the upper brackets in basketball. Bruce was an All-America at Santa Clara where he graduated in 1941 after playing on three successive Pacific Coast independent championship teams. Hale graduated with a B.S. degree. He spent five years in the U.S. Army Air Force, being discharged as a captain. Bruce played on the Five by Five team in Miami Beach and later coached the Wright Air Field Base team to the service championship. Bruce played professional basketball for 10 years, being named on the All World pro team of 1945 with the Dayton Bombers. In 1946, he coached the Chicago American Gears



to the world championship in the National league. He later played with and coached Indianapolis in the N.B.A. before retiring from active play. He came to Miami in the fall of 1954.

TONY FERRARA

Assistant Coach

Tony Ferrara, varsity assistant and freshman coach, has held that post in each of Bruce Hale's head coaching seasons. Ferrara played both basketball and baseball for the University of Miami in his undergraduate days and was in the school's top 10 point makers in basketball at the time of his graduation. He ranks as one of the heaviest hitting third basemen in U. of Miami history. Tony is no stranger to the coaching game, having served as an assistant in basketball at an earlier period. Miami's freshmen have enjoyed two winning seasons under his guidance.

THE OUTLOOK

RETAINING four of its 1955-56 starters, University of Miami's 1956-57 basketball team faces three major problems this season before it can be expected to do as well as it did a year ago.

1. A replacement must be found for Dick Miani who broke Miami's one-season scoring records for number of field goals, free throws and total points. Sophomore replacements look good enough to take up the loss of Miani on defense and on the floor, but no one is in sight to take up the slack in scoring.

2. More height is needed at center where the Hurricanes fared badly in several key games after the mid-season loss of Carl Paulus, 6 feet 10 inches tall. Pete Turonis, sophomore, 6 feet 7, is a little taller than Stan Kojkowski or Bob Steiner but the U-M may still suffer in most games from lack of height.

3. Only experienced reserve returning is Bob Steiner, alternate center, which means there is no depth of experience at forward or guard.

Coach Hale did an outstanding job bringing his sophomores along in the 1955-56 campaign and it appears, numerically at least, he has even more sophomore talent available this year. Last year he had to shove his sophomores into action as starters from the beginning of the season. This year, most of them can be broken in more gradually. However, the schedule has been stiffened considerably. Loyola of the South, Bradley and Xavier, beaten by Miami last year, are off the schedule—but Kentucky, Akron, Louisville, Toledo, Dayton, and the Texas Aggies have been added.

Miami should have a somewhat tighter defense this year than last but the passing Miani, who averaged just under 20 points per game, may mean that the offense will slow down a bit, too.

ORANGE BOWL TOURNAMENT

University of Miami is the host team in the Orange Bowl basketball tournament. The tournament, inaugurated in 1955, has been established as one of the top early season basketball classics. West Virginia won the first tournament, defeating Miami in the finals, 83-78. Columbia took third place over Tulane, 64-61. Yale defeated Santa Clara, 86-67, to top the losers' bracket while Florida State edged New York U, 85-83, in the battle for seventh place.

Accepting invitations to play in the 1956 tournament in addition to Miami are Stanford, Seton Hall, Connecticut, Western Kentucky, LaSalle, Valparaiso and Pittsburgh. The tournament opens December 27 and the finals will be staged December 30.

VARSITY PLAYER SKETCHES

FORWARDS

ED MORRIS, junior in Engineering, 6 feet 4, 180 pounds, Elwood, Indiana. Morris became a regular at the start of the 1955-56 campaign and, in picking up 419 points and 322 re-

bounds in 26 games, he scored more points than any other Hurricane ever tallied as a sophomore—and he collected more rebounds than any other Hurricane no matter what his year. His .472 percentage on field goal attempts set another Miami record. In addition to being a strong rebounder, he has a good one-hand shot from the side of the floor. He is outstanding as a team man. MARTY BURDETTE, junior in Business Administration, 6 feet 3, 195 pounds, Gas City, Indiana. Marty is one of the most aggressive players on the squad. His rugged play won



several games for U-M last year. He wasn't a regular at the start but was well ahead of all rivals for his position at the finish of his sophomore season. He has a good one-handed shot from any spot. Marty is strong on rebounds and plays well on defense. He's very dependable and goes all out in every game. His high school coach—John Frenberger.

ED CONTRERAS, sophomore in Business Administration, 6 feet 4, 215 pounds, Plant high of Tampa. Ed is a rugged type player, strong off the boards and capable of scoring with either hand. Has not played up to his capabilities as yet but could be a threat to the varsity veterans. In 14 freshman games, he picked up 44 field goals and 31 free throws for 119 points, an average of 8.5 per game. High school coach—Gene Biittner, now at University of Tampa.

JOE GARDNER, sophomore in Business Administration, 6 feet 2, 165 pounds, hails from Chattanooga, Tennessee. Joe has a good two-hand set shot and a nice one-hand jump shot from any position. Very aggressive and liking to play the game, Joe is the type from whom much can be expected. J. R. Osteen coached him at City High.

CENTERS

STANLEY KOJKOWSKI, junior in Business Administration, 6 feet 6, 185 pounds, from Lawrence Harbor, New Jersey. Took over the first string job after towering Carl Paulus



dropped from school in mid-season last year and did a courageous job from then on in. One of the best one-handed shots on the team, Stan has an excellent hook. His high school coach—John Wortley at Sayreville.

BOB STEINER, junior in Pre-Medical, 6 feet 6, 200 pounds, from Coral Gables. Played a lot of basketball as a reserve last year but has the ability to grab off a starting spot. He

JERRY DAVIS, sophomore in Business Administration, 6 feet 6, 215 pounds, Bronx, New York. Could be the strongest rebounder on the team. Jerry covers both boards well. Has a good one-hand shot from around the pivot area. Fine as a team player on defense. Coach at DeWitt Clinton—Nate April.

GUARDS

GENE STAGE, junior in Education, 6 feet, 170 pounds, Elwood, Indiana. A regular from the start of his sophomore season, Gene is a good steady all-around back court player.



He possesses a fine jump shot and is equally effective with a two-hand set from outside. Gene scores consistently and does a good job defensively on all opponents. He should rate All-America mention this year if he continues to improve. His high school coach—John Ward.

GEORGE TALBOT, junior in Education, 6 feet 1, 175 pounds, Delray Beach. He is a good ball handler with an excellent one-hand shot. Has fine ability at faking and driving past defender. Good all around floor man. Came to Miami after being in armed service. Coach at Seacrest—M. E. Frump.

MARK THISTLETHWAITE, sophomore in Education, 6 feet, 170 pounds, from Sheridan, Indiana. Mark is sound in fundamentals and had an excellent freshman season. He has a good two-hand set shot from the outside and excels with a one-hand jump shot off the foul circle. Mark should play a lot of basketball. His freshman year included 17 games in which he made 88 field goals and 28 free throws for 204 points, an average of 12 points per game. Larry Hobbs was his high school coach.

GAIL BALDWIN, sophomore, is 6 feet 3, weighs 155 pounds. He hails from Morgantown, West Virginia. Gail, a guard, showed good defensive ability as a freshman and could develop into a valuable reserve during the upcoming campaign.
