• Boston College and Georgia Tech will kick off the 60th annual Atlantic Coast Conference Basketball Tournament on Thursday at noon inside the Greensboro Coliseum.

• The game will be aired on ESPNU, the ACC Network and WEEI Radio (850 AM).

• These two teams met last Saturday in the regular season finale with Boston College winning, 74-72.

• BC has won its last three games and four of its last six overall. The Eagles and Duke are the only teams in the conference to enter the tournament on three-game win streaks.

• Georgia Tech has lost two of its last three outings.

• This will be the first time that the two sides will meet in the ACC Tournament.

HEAD COACH STEVE DONAHUE

**THIRD SEASON
45-51 AT BOSTON COLLEGE
191-189 OVERALL**

Steve Donahue is in his third season as the head basketball coach at Boston College. He assumed the position on April 7, 2010 after serving 10 years as the head coach at Cornell.

In his first season at the Heights, Donahue guided the Eagles to a 21-13 record, including a 9-7 mark in Atlantic Coast Conference action. BC earned a berth in the National Invitation Tournament and advanced to the second round.

Donahue established an up-tempo style of play that season and allowed the Eagles to lead the ACC in field goals made, and rank second in three-point field goal percentage and assist-turnover ratio, and third in assists.

The 2011-12 Eagles were an entirely new team as Donahue lost 10 lettermen and all five of his starters from the previous year. He brought in 11 newcomers and regularly started four freshmen. BC went 9-22, but beat No. 15 Florida State at home, 64-60, on February 8, 2012.

Donahue led Cornell to three consecutive Ivy League titles (2008-2010) and a trip to the 2010 NCAA Sweet 16.

In his 10 seasons leading the Big Red, Donahue totaled a 146-138 record. Cornell achieved the best Ivy record over the last five years (55-15) and Donahue was recognized for his work by being named a court coach by USA Basketball for the Under-18 national team trials in Washington, D.C., in July of 2008. Donahue coached and/or recruited seven of the school's top 13 all-time leading scorers, two Ivy League Player of the Year selections, two Ivy League Rookie of the Year players, eight NABC All-District selections, six Academic All-District picks and two Academic All-Americans.

Under his guidance, the Big Red recorded a perfect 14-0 Ivy League mark in 2007-08, joining Penn and Princeton as the only league schools to achieve that record. Cornell reached new heights in 2009-10, winning the program's third straight Ivy League title en route to an Ivy League-record 29 wins, the program's first NCAA win, and a trip to the Sweet 16. Cornell climbed as high as No. 22 nationally in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll, the program's first national ranking in 59 years, and set an Ivy League record for three-pointers in a season (326). The team also set single-season school records in points (2,545), field goals (913), assists (543) and blocked shots (127). The Big Red won the MSG Holiday Festival with a victory over St. John's, Cornell's first win over a Big East school since 1969, and captured a season-opening win at Alabama, the team's first win over a school from the Southeastern Conference since 1972. Cornell went 11-1 at home and won 18 games away from home, the most among any Division I school. The most attention was given to Cornell's effort in a 71-66 loss at No. 1 Kansas, a game the Big Red led with less than one minute to play. The Big Red then shocked the college basketball world as a No. 12 seed, knocking out both fifth-seeded Temple and fourth-seeded Wisconsin by double figures.

For his efforts, Donahue was named the Clair Bee Coach of the Year, the NABC District 4 Coach of the Year, the midseason Hugh Durham

Coach of the Year by collegeinsider.com as the top mid-major coach in the country, and was a finalist for both the Hugh Durham Award and the Jim Phelan Award for national coach of the year. Cornell earned its second consecutive Ivy League title in 2008-09, becoming the first team other than Penn or Princeton to win consecutive outright championships in conference history. The Big Red went 21-10 and won the Ancient Eight by three games with its 11-3 mark. It was the first time Cornell had posted consecutive 20-win seasons.

The 2007-08 district Coach of the Year according to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), the United States Basketball Writers' Association (USBWA) and CollegeInsider.com (Hugh Durham National Mid-Major Coach of the Year finalist), Donahue directed the 2007-08 Big Red to a 22-6 record and the program's first Ivy title in 20 years.

Off the court, Donahue expects his players to succeed in the classroom and contribute in their community. Cornell players made frequent appearances in local schools, speaking to students on the importance of a good education.

Renowned as a top recruiter and for his offensive mind while an assistant at the University of Pennsylvania, Donahue learned the trade from some of the nation's top coaches. Donahue served as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator under Fran Dunphy at Penn for 10 years. During his tenure as a Quaker assistant, he was heavily involved in the recruitment of five of Penn's top 20 all-time scorers. He was also instrumental in the Quakers winning six Ivy League titles in his last eight years there, advancing to the NCAA Tournament five times and earning national recognition with a top 25 ranking.

Prior to joining Dunphy's staff at Penn, Donahue coached for two seasons under Hall of Fame coach Herb Magee at Philadelphia University. During his two seasons there, the Rams won 20 games each season and also competed in the 1989 NCAA Division II tournament.

Donahue served as an assistant for current Lafayette head coach Fran O'Hanlon at Monsignor Bonner HS, helping to guide Bonner to the 1987-88 Philadelphia Catholic League championship. He began his coaching career at Springfield (Pa.) HS under Skip Werley, his former college coach. He served as head coach of the junior varsity and assistant coach for the varsity team for three seasons.

He played both baseball and basketball at Ursinus College, earning four letters in both sports. He served as basketball team captain as a senior. In his freshman season, Donahue helped the basketball squad finish 23-8 and advance to the NCAA Division III tournament's semifinal round. The following year, Ursinus advanced to the tournament's quarterfinal round. He graduated in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in economics and business administration.

Donahue and his wife, Pamela, have four children, Taylor (16), Matthew (15), Katie (10) and Jack (9).

THE SERIES WITH GEORGIA TECH

- Georgia Tech owns a 9-7 record against Boston College in 16 meetings.
- BC has a slight 6-5 edge in meetings since BC joined the ACC in 2005-06.
- The squads split a pair of games last year with each team winning on its home court. Both games were decided by four points.
- BC won this year's game in the regular season finale on Saturday, 74-72.
- The last three meetings have been decided by an average of 3.3 points.
- The Yellow Jackets have defeated BC twice in the second round of the NCAA Tournament in 2005 and 1996. The two sides have yet to play in the ACC Tournament.

BC BEATS GEORGIA TECH ON SATURDAY

- Freshman **Joe Rahon** scored 15 points, including eight in the last four minutes, to lead Boston College past Georgia Tech, 74-72, in front of 5,247 fans in Conte Forum on Saturday afternoon.
- In BC's regular season finale, Rahon shot 5 of 7 from the floor and handed out a game-high seven assists. Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** netted 14 points on 6 of 9 shooting, sophomore **Ryan Anderson** scored 13, and classmate **Eddie Odio** posted a career-high 11 points.
- Trailing 64-59 with 4:19 left, the Eagles went on a 12-0 run to stake a 71-64 lead with 28 seconds on the clock. Rahon scored eight points during the run while Hanlan scored on two layups - the first after an Odio block started a transition play and the second after he came up with a steal off of full-court pressure.
- The Yellow Jackets hit two 3-pointers in the last 25 seconds, but the Eagles made enough free throws to seal the win.
- Holding a 41-38 lead in the opening minutes of the second half, the Yellow Jackets used an 11-4 spurt to take a 52-42 lead - their largest - with 14:23 to play. The Eagles then used a 14-4 run to tie the game, 56-56, with 6:54 remaining. Odio scored the run's first eight points while Hanlan scored four.
- After the Yellow Jackets opened an early 8-2 lead, the Eagles scored 10 straight points to take a 12-8 edge just over five minutes into the game. Georgia Tech then tallied five quick points to regain the lead, but a put-back dunk from Anderson helped put BC back up 19-15 with 10:53 to play in the half.
- With under a minute remaining in the first, the Yellow Jackets held a 36-29 lead behind a 13-5 run before the Eagles trimmed the margin to 36-32 at the break.
- Marcus Georges-Hunt led Georgia Tech with a game-high 16 points while Chris Bolden scored 12 and Daniel Miller had 10.

Huckaby starred for the Eagles from 1990-94, finishing his 126-game career with 1,316 points. He currently ranks 18th on BC's career scoring list.

Former Eagle **Danya Abrams** will serve as an analyst for select games. He ranks seventh on the BC career scoring chart (2,053) and third in rebounds (1,029).

COMEBACK CREW

- Boston College and Duke are the two hottest teams entering the ACC Tournament. Both won their last three regular season games.
- The Eagles have done it a little differently than Duke, which has won by an average of 15.7 points in the last three games. BC has come from behind in every game and won by an average of 3.3 points.
- The most impressive comeback was against Virginia. The Eagles trailed, 43-32, with 10:24 left in the game.
- BC closed the game on a 12-3 run, and freshman **Joe Rahon** hit a 3-pointer with 8.2 seconds left to seal the win.
- Clemson held a 43-38 lead before BC went on a 17-3 run to take a 55-46 lead with 5:13 to go. Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** scored 21 of his 24 points in the second half, and scored 18 of the team's final 29 points in the last 11:21.
- Georgia Tech built a 52-42 lead at the 14:23 mark of the second half on Saturday. A 14-4 BC run tied the game with 6:54 to go, and Rahon led the final charge by scoring eight points in the last four minutes.
- BC trailed at the half in all three of those wins.

HANLAN NAMED ACC FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR

- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** has earned the ACC Rookie of the Year award, announced Tuesday by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association (ACSMA).
- Hanlan earned 43 of the 77 votes cast by ACSMA members. Duke's Rasheed Sulaimon finished second with 15 votes and NC State's T.J. Warren had 12.
- Hanlan is the first conference rookie of the year winner for Boston College since Troy Bell won Big East Rookie of the Year honors in 1999-2000. Hanlan is the fifth winner from BC to earn a conference rookie of the year award.
- "It is a great honor for him and well deserved, mostly because he is someone who is putting a great amount of work in to improve both on and off the basketball court," head coach Steve Donahue said. "It is also a credit to his teammates for trusting him with the ball quite a bit. Their unselfishness has made him better as well."
- The Aylmer, Quebec product was the only unanimous selection for the All-Freshman Team. He also received honorable mention recognition on All-ACC voting.
- Hanlan is the only freshman to rank in the top six in points (14.6), rebounds (4.2) and assists (2.3) among the rookie class. He ranks sixth in the ACC in conference scoring (15.7) and is eighth overall (14.6). Hanlan leads all freshmen with 26 double-digit scoring games.
- Hanlan also leads ACC freshmen and ranks sixth overall in free throw attempts per game (5.1). He ranks 10th in the league in free throw percentage (.750) and field goal percentage (.463) during league action. Hanlan was named ACC Rookie of the Week a conference-best four times.
- He has scored in double figures in all but two conference games this season. He has recorded 10 games of 15 or more points and four games of 20 or more points since league play started in January.

ANDERSON, HANLAN EARN ALL-ACC HONORS

- Sophomore **Ryan Anderson** earned All-ACC Third Team honors and freshman **Olivier Hanlan** was the only unanimous choice on the All-ACC Freshman Team, announced Monday by the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association.
- Anderson ranks fourth in the ACC in rebounding (8.1) and sixth in scoring (15.1). He has eight double-doubles this year which ranks sixth in the conference. His nine 20-point games rank third in the league and his nine 10-rebound games rank fifth. He is also second in the ACC with three "20 and 10" games.
- Hanlan was the only freshman named on all 77 ballots for the All-Freshman Team. He also received honorable mention recognition on All-ACC voting. Hanlan is the only freshman to rank in the top six in points (14.6), rebounds (4.2) and assists (2.3) among the rookie class. He ranks sixth in the ACC in conference scoring (15.7) and is eighth overall (14.6). Hanlan leads all freshmen with 26 double-digit scoring games.
- BC is the only team in the ACC which had a unanimous choice on the All-Freshman Team in each of the last two seasons. Anderson accomplished the same feat last year.

HANLAN EARNS FINAL ROOKIE OF WEEK AWARD

- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** captured Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week honors, announced Monday by the conference office.
- It marked the sixth time that a BC player earned the honor, which led the conference. Hanlan won the award a league-best four times while classmate **Joe Rahon** earned it twice.
- The freshman duo accounted for half of the rookie of the week honors since ACC play began in January.
- Hanlan averaged 19.0 points, 5.0 rebounds and 2.5 assists in a pair of wins last week for Boston College. Hanlan took over in the second half at Clemson, scoring 21 of his 24 points in the final 20 minutes. He went 12-for-14 from the line while adding five rebounds and three assists. He scored 18 of BC's 29 points in the final 11:21.
- He then recorded 14 points, five boards, two assists and two steals in a win against Georgia Tech. He was 6-for-9 from the field.

RAHON NAMED TO ALL-ACC ACADEMIC TEAM

- Freshman **Joe Rahon** was named to the 2012-13 All-ACC Academic Team, announced March 7 by Commissioner John Swofford.
- To be eligible for consideration, a student-athlete must have earned a 3.00 grade point average for the previous semester and maintained a 3.00 cumulative average during his academic career.
- Rahon has been named ACC Rookie of the Week twice this season and is the only freshman in the conference to have two games of 26 or more points. He currently ranks eighth in the ACC in assists (3.5) and 10th in assist/turnover ratio (1.7). Both of those numbers rank second among the freshman class.

HANLAN LEADS BC PAST CLEMSON

- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** scored 24 points, including 21 in the second half, to lead Boston College past Clemson, 68-61, in Littlejohn Coliseum on Tuesday night.
- Hanlan eclipsed the 20-point plateau for the fifth time this season shooting 12 of 14 from the free throw line. Sophomore **Ryan Anderson** recorded his eighth double-double of the year with 18 points and 11 rebounds to help lead the Eagles to their first-ever win in Clemson.
- Freshman **Joe Rahon** posted 10 points and seven rebounds, and sophomore **Eddie Odio** registered eight points and seven boards.
- Neither team held a lead larger than one possession in the second half until Clemson gained a 43-38 advantage with just under 12 minutes to play. Hanlan answered with five straight points to knot the score at 43-43 before the Tigers hit a 3-pointer to regain a 46-43 lead with 9:50 to play.
- The Eagles then went on a 12-0 run to claim a 55-46 edge with 5:13 left. During the stretch, Hanlan, Anderson, and Rahon each scored four points. With BC holding a 59-50 lead with 2:18 to play, the Tigers used a 7-1 spurt to cut BC's lead to 60-57 with 1:25 remaining, but Hanlan scored seven points in the last minute to help seal the win.
- After the two teams traded 7-0 runs to open the game, the Tigers used a 9-3 spurt to take a 16-10 lead just under seven minutes into the contest. The Eagles then scored six straight points including four from Anderson to tie it, 16-16, with just under 10 minutes to play in the half.
- Clemson scored seven straight points to claim a 23-16 edge, but the Eagles responded with a 9-2 run to once again tie the game, 25-25, with 2:37 to play in the opening period. Rahon capped the stretch with a 3-pointer. The teams traded baskets down the stretch as Clemson carried a 29-27 lead into the break.

HANLAN TAKES CONTROL

- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** scored 21 of his 24 points in the second half to lead BC past Clemson.
- Hanlan was 1-for-2 from the field in the first 20 minutes and the bucket was a 3-pointer. He also had two assists.
- After halftime, he was 4-for-8 from the field and 12-for-14 from the foul line with four rebounds and an assist.
- The spark was a 3-pointer that Hanlan hit at the 11:21 mark. He scored 18 of BC's 29 points in the final 11:21.
- Hanlan was also 11-for-12 from the foul line in the last 11:21.

DICK KELLEY EARNS USBWA AWARD FOR COURAGE

- Boston College Assistant Athletics Director - Media Relations **Dick Kelley** and Oakland University's women's basketball coach Beckie Francis have been selected as male and female recipients, respectively, of the U.S. Basketball Writers Association's Most Courageous Award.
- The award is presented annually by the USBWA to honor male and female athletes, coaches, officials or administrators in college athletics who have demonstrated extraordinary courage while facing adversity in life.
- "I am overwhelmed and very grateful for this amazing honor," Kelley wrote to the USBWA. "I have never sought recognition but rather did what I did because I loved my job and everyone I had the privilege of working with."
- Kelley graduated from BC in 1987 and has worked for the athletics department since 1991.

BC COMES BACK TO BEAT VIRGINIA

- Freshman **Joe Rahon** scored 15 points, including the game-winning 3-pointer with 8.2 seconds left, to lead Boston College past Virginia, 53-52, in front of 5,062 fans in Conte Forum on March 3.
- Virginia's Joe Harris made one of two free throws to push UVA's lead to 52-50 with 29 seconds remaining. BC used a timeout and on the ensuing possession, Rahon caught a pass from sophomore **Patrick Heckmann** on the left wing and knocked down the game-winner as the Eagles closed the game on a 12-3 run. Heckmann forced UVA's Jontel Evans out of bounds on Virginia's last possession.
- Rahon shot 3 of 5 from beyond the arc. Heckmann scored nine points on a trio of 3-pointers and freshman **Olivier Hanlan** scored 13 points. Sophomore **Ryan Anderson** totaled eight points and nine rebounds while classmate **Eddie Odio** scored eight points.
- The Eagles held a 28-27 edge early in the second half before the Cavaliers scored 10 straight points to initiate a 16-4 run and stake a 43-32 lead with 10:24 to play. BC answered with seven straight points to pull within 43-39 with 8:41 left. Virginia was able to push its lead to 49-41 with 4:27 to play before the Eagles went on their game-closing 12-3 run.
- Virginia opened the game with an 11-3 lead just over seven minutes into the contest. Trailing 15-7, the Eagles scored 10 unanswered points to start a 15-2 run and take a 22-17 edge with just under four minutes left in the half. Anderson scored the run's first four points before Heckmann, Hanlan, and Rahon each knocked down 3-pointers.
- The Cavaliers then scored eight straight points to gain a 25-22 advantage with 1:32 remaining in the period. Hanlan hit a jumper with just over a minute left to bring BC within one point, 25-24, at the half.
- Akil Mitchell led Virginia with 16 points on 8 of 11 shooting and Harris scored 14 points.

"THIS GAME IS FOR DICK KELLEY"

- You couldn't have scripted it any better.
- BC was down 43-32 with 10:24 to play against Virginia, which boasts the fourth-best scoring defense in the country.
- A dramatic comeback ended with a 12-3 run, capped by a 3-pointer from freshman **Joe Rahon** with 8.2 seconds left to give BC a 53-52 lead.
- On the ensuing UVA possession, sophomore **Patrick Heckmann** forced Jontel Evans into a turnover which sealed the win.
- The team dedicated the game to Assistant Athletics Director for Media Relations, **Dick Kelley**, who was honored before the game with the U.S. Basketball Writers Association's Most Courageous Award given annually to an athlete, coach, official, or administrator who has demonstrated extraordinary courage while facing adversity in life.
- Rahon hit the game-winning 3-pointer right in front of where Kelley sits on press row.
- Following the win and the playing of the Alma Mater, the entire team rushed to the other side of the court to celebrate with Kelley.
- Rahon: "We didn't have to go out there and win for him, but we were going to come out and play as hard as we possibly could for him today. And getting able to be with him when he got his award at the beginning of the game meant the world to us and we hope it meant the world to him, too."
- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan**: "He's at every workout, practice just sitting there in his chair and watching us and talking to us after. And we just love Dick. Everybody loves him on the team and everybody appreciates him."
- Head Coach **Steve Donahue**: "This game is for Dick Kelley and the stuff he's done. What we're doing is kind of fun and games. I think all these guys are close to Dick. If we're going to go down, we're going to go down fighting in his honor, for sure."
- Donahue: "It's hard not to get emotional about him, because when I first got here, he was in my office all the time. As we went forward, his encouragement to me about what I'm doing and how I'm doing it and how great it is. And then, just spreading that throughout our team, his love of BC and his love of our program. When you come new and you have someone that loves the place that much and wants to help you, and there's no ulterior motive. Wins and losses, they don't matter. Just a very unique guy, and what he's going through, for all of us, is an incredibly tough thing to watch, but it's also just amazing how he's handled it. It's just very inspirational."

HANLAN IS TOP ACC FRESHMAN SCORER

- Hanlan has been one of the best freshmen in the ACC all season long, and he has only gotten better in conference play.
- The Aylmer, Quebec product ranks sixth in the league in scoring (15.7) since conference play began. The next freshman ranks 25th.
- He is also 10th in field goal percentage (.463) and free throw percentage (.750).
- For the season, Hanlan leads all freshmen and is eighth overall in scoring (14.6). No other freshman ranks in the top 20.
- He has 26 double-digit scoring games which leads ACC freshmen.
- Hanlan is the only freshman guard in the conference with a double-double. He had 17 points and 12 rebounds vs. Providence.
- He is the only player in the conference to be named ACC Rookie of the Week four times.

AND AMONG OTHER LEADERS

- Hanlan is the only ACC freshman that ranks in the top six in points, rebounds and assists among the rookie class.
- Hanlan is fifth in the league in assists (2.3) and sixth in rebounding (4.2).
- Only four other freshman appear on two of the lists. Teammate Joe Rahon is one of them as he is sixth in points (10.0) and second in assists (3.7).

ACC CANADIANS

- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** is the only active player in the ACC to hail from Canada.
- He is already third on the career scoring chart for Canadians in the conference.
- The Aylmer, Quebec (about 10 miles west of Ottawa) product is the 10th player in ACC history from The True North.

- Hanlan and Rahon accounted for four of the first five rookie of the week awards during conference action.
- Hanlan has won the award four times which leads the league. Rahon, NC State's T.J. Warren, Georgia Tech's Marcus Georges-Hunt and Duke's Rasheed Sulaimon have each been honored twice.
- Hanlan also won the award on December 24.

ANDERSON'S NUMBERS

- Sophomore **Ryan Anderson** has been forced to play underneath the basket in a four-guard offense due to the injury to classmate **Dennis Clifford**.
- Anderson has still produced team highs in scoring (15.1) and rebounding (8.1) this year.
- He ranks fourth in the ACC in rebounding and sixth in scoring. He is also sixth in the conference with eight double-doubles.
- The Lakewood, Calif., product has eight 20-point games this year which ranks third in the conference. His nine games of double digit rebounds ranks fifth.
- Anderson is one of three players to have two games this season with 17 or more rebounds. Duke's Mason Plumlee and NC State's Richard Howell are the other two. Anderson had an ACC-best (tied with Howell) 19 boards against New Hampshire and recorded 17 against FIU.
- Anderson also ranks second in the league in "20 and 10" games with three.

JACKSON FINDS STROKE

- Sophomore **Lonnie Jackson** averaged 7.7 points per game through the first 12 outings, then found his stroke from December 31 to January 16. He averaged a team-best 16.8 points in a span of five games during that period.
- In particular, he regained his stroke from beyond the arc. Jackson shot at a .576 (19-for-33) clip in those five outings. Prior to the Dartmouth game, he had shot .310 (22-for-71) from 3-point land.
- Jackson had 22 points in the win at Virginia Tech and was 5-for-8 from beyond the arc. He followed that up with a season-high 23 points at Wake Forest, going 4-for-6 from long distance.
- It was the first time in his career that he had consecutive 20-point games.
- The Valencia, Calif., product ranks fourth in the ACC in 3-point percentage (.432) during conference play and ranks seventh in 3-pointers made (2.1).

ODIO STEPS UP

- Sophomore **Eddie Odio** stepped up his play over a seven-game span from January 29 to February 19.
- He was productive all around the floor as he averaged 6.7 points, 5.0 rebounds, 2.1 blocks and 1.4 steals in those seven games.
- He led the team in blocks (15) and steals (10) during that span.
- Odio had a career game against Maryland on February 19. He set career highs in minutes (31), rebounds (11) and blocks (6).
- The six blocks were the second most in the conference this year.
- He was 4-for-4 from the field and connected on a triple to score a career-high nine points at Florida State. He also had four rebounds and two assists in that game.
- Odio had two spectacular dunks (his only two FG attempts) against #4/4 Duke on February 10 to go along with five rebounds and three steals.
- The Miami, Fla., product had six rebounds and four blocks against North Carolina on January 29.
- Odio was all over the place in the first half against Clemson on February 2 as he had seven points, five rebounds and three steals in the first 20 minutes.
- He played an important part in BC's comeback win against Virginia. In part of the 12-3 game-ending run, he put down a dunk to cut the BC deficit to 51-48 with 1:38 left to play. On the ensuing possession, he blocked a Joe Harris jumper, leading to a fastbreak layup to cut it to one.
- Odio scored a career-high 11 points off the bench on Saturday vs. Georgia Tech. He also had another huge block, this one on Marcus Georges-Hunt, that led to a fastbreak layup to push the BC lead to 68-64 with 54 seconds left.

AND DUNKS A LOT

- Odio has quickly become a fan favorite at Conte Forum not only because of the above numbers, but because his dunks are quick and explosive.
- He has 18 jams this year, but has 15 in the last 12 games alone.
- He had two apiece in the games against North Carolina, Clemson, #4/4 Duke, Maryland and Virginia.
- Odio's two slams against the Blue Devils landed him on SportsCenter's weekend top 10. He finished a dunk while being fouled by Mason Plumlee, then electrified the crowd with an acrobatic dunk on an inbounds play.

1-POINT LOSSES TO ACC 1-2

- Boston College nearly knocked off the top two teams in the league at Conte Forum but came up one point short both times.
- An unranked Miami team came to Chestnut Hill on January 16 and the Hurricanes escaped with a 60-59 win.
- The Eagles had a chance to tie the game at the end of regulation as freshman **Olivier Hanlan** went to the free throw line for three shots with half a second remaining. He connected on the first two before hitting the front rim on the final attempt.
- Miami is currently 13-1 in the league and reached #2/2 in the national polls, the highest in program history.
- BC came up a bucket short against #4/4 Duke on February 10, losing 62-61. It was the Blue Devils' lowest scoring output this year.
- On the game's final possession, Hanlan drove into the lane from left to right. His jump shot from just inside the right elbow missed the rim and the Eagles could not corral the rebound for a final shot.
- The Eagles were leading Duke, 61-56, with two minutes remaining.
- BC's four ACC home losses have come by an average of 4.7 points.

A FIRST FOR THIS GROUP

- Boston College was 0-20 last year when it trailed with one minute to play.
- It was 0-11 this season until it beat Wake Forest on February 13, 66-63. Now it is 2-14.
- BC scored the game's final 10 points in the last two minutes to overcome a 63-56 deficit. It trailed 63-60 with a minute remaining.
- The situation nearly mirrored the one against #4/4 Duke in the previous game. The Eagles were down a point with the last possession in both games.
- In both instances, head coach **Steve Donahue** called a timeout with 18 seconds left.
- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** drove the ball into the lane and got an open jumper against Duke, but the shot missed to the left and the scramble for the rebound drained the rest of the clock.
- Freshman **Joe Rahon** controlled the point against Wake Forest. He drove down the lane and drew a foul for two shots, which he hit, to take the win.

ROAD WINS

- Boston College was winless on the road all of last season, finishing 0-9 in true road games. It has three road wins in 11 games this year.
- The Eagles snapped the winless streak away from home with a 73-61 win at Penn State on November 28. It was their first regular season win on the road since March 1, 2011 at Virginia Tech - a span of 10 games.
- This core group of Eagles also won their first ACC road game at Virginia Tech on January 9. It was the first conference win on the road since March 1, 2011 - also in Blacksburg.
- BC defeated Clemson on March 5 at Littlejohn Coliseum, 68-61. Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** scored 21 of his 24 points in the second half to lead the Eagles.

CLOSE CALLS

- Boston College has played 19 games decided by 10 points or fewer and is 10-9 in those contests.
- The Eagles are also 6-6 in games decided by 1-4 points.
- BC's first four ACC losses were all decided by five points or less.
- BC has played more games decided by five points or overtime than any other team in the conference. It is 6-8 in 14 games.
- Three other teams have played in 10 such games.

STILL LEARNING

- One word to describe Boston College is young.
- It becomes obvious how young the Eagles are when you look at the numbers: 95 percent of the scoring comes from either freshmen or sophomores.
- In addition, 94 percent of the rebounds and 97 percent of the assists this season have come from underclassmen.
- Freshmen and sophomores have played 5,808 of the 6,225 minutes this year - 93 percent. The underclassmen have also accounted for all but three starts so far this year.

NEW OFFENSE

- The Boston College offense was noticeably faster than last year after it started with 84 points in the season-opening win against FIU.
- The Eagles' high point total last year was 83 against Sacred Heart and that is the only time the team reached 80 points.
- Boston College only eclipsed 70 points four times last season, but has done it in 14 of the 31 games this year. Nine of those games have been victories.
- BC averaged 59.3 points per game last season and is averaging 66.9 this year.
- The offense scored 86 points in the win against Virginia Tech on January 9, including 54 in the second half. It was the most points for BC in a game since January 8, 2011.
- The Eagles matched a season low with 50 points in a loss at #8/11 Miami on February 5. They won the other game earlier in the season against Auburn, 50-49.
- Boston College is 9-5 when it scores 70 or more points.

TWO BIG GAMES

- Sophomore **Ryan Anderson** is Boston College's leading scorer (15.1) and rebounder (8.1).
- He is the only Eagle that has recorded multiple double-doubles over the last two years. He had seven last year and has eight this season.
- His last four double-doubles have come in ACC road games.
- His first two this year were monster performances. He had a career-high 29 points to go along with 17 rebounds (a career high to that point) in the season-opener against FIU.
- He also had a 23-point, 19-rebound effort against New Hampshire on December 16.
- The Lakewood, Calif., product has eight 20-point performances this year. His most recent one came at Duke on February 24 when he scored 23.
- His most recent double-double came at Clemson when he recorded 18 points and 11 rebounds.
- He ranks fourth in the ACC in rebounding and sixth in scoring.

NEARLY A RECORD

- Anderson's 19 rebounds against New Hampshire on December 16 nearly tied a Conte Forum record.
- Danya Abrams holds the BC single-game record in Conte Forum with 20 rebounds, which he had against Providence on January 22, 1994.
- Anderson tied Ryan Sidney's performance against St. Bonaventure on December 4, 2002 for the second most in a game in Conte.
- Anderson's 17-rebound game against FIU is also the third most in a game since Conte opened in 1988.

THE HOT HAND

- Freshman **Joe Rahon** scored 26 points against Clemson on February 2 to lead BC to a 75-68 win.
- It was the second-most points scored by a freshman in the ACC this season.
- The San Diego, Calif., product went 9-for-12 from the floor and 6-for-7 from beyond the arc.
- It was his second game this year with six 3-pointers. He is the only player in the ACC with two such games.
- He also hit six treys against Dartmouth and earned ACC Rookie of the Week honors after scoring 24 points.

FREE POINTS

- Boston College went 30-for-39 from the foul line in the season opener against FIU. Sophomore **Ryan Anderson** led the way with an 11-for-14 performance.
- It was the most free throws hit in a game since the Eagles made 31 at Maryland on December 9, 2007.
- That number nearly topped the most free throws BC attempted last year - 31 in the season opener against New Hampshire.
- BC scored 15 more points than FIU at the stripe which was better than any difference last year. The best in 2011-12 was a 10-point edge against Stony Brook.
- Boston College had another great night from the line at Penn State November 28, going 27-for-36. Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** paced the way with a 15-for-19 performance from the stripe.
- That was the most free throws made by a BC player since Jared Dudley sank 16 against Virginia on January 13, 2007.
- It is also the most attempts by a player in the ACC this year and the third-most free throws made.
- BC shot 92.9 percent (13-for-14) from the foul line in its win against Dartmouth on December 31. It was the first time that the Eagles shot over 90 percent from the line since November 23, 2004 vs. New Hampshire.
- Boston College went 21-for-22 from the line against Maryland on February 19. That was the second-best free-throw percentage in Conte Forum history for BC and the best since 1996.
- The Eagles' record with 20+ attempts is a 28-for-29 (.966) effort against Providence on February 1, 1996.
- BC ranks fourth in the ACC in free throw percentage (.713).

THE "O" AND JOE STORY

- Freshmen guards **Olivier Hanlan** and **Joe Rahon** have made an immediate impact for the Eagles.
- Hanlan earned first-team All-NEPSAC AAA team honors as a senior at New Hampton School in New Hampton, N.H. He averaged 17 points, seven assists and six rebounds, and led his 15th-ranked team to a 26-9 record.
- "O" also has international experience for Canada. He played on the Canadian U19 team that competed in Latvia for the 2011 FIBA World Championships. He was also part of the U17 team that finished third in the 2010 FIBA World Championships in Germany.
- Rahon led his high school, Torrey Pines, to three CIF Championship games and one CIF title. He was a three-year varsity starter and completed his high-school career with 1,475 points.
- The San Diego, Calif., product earned all-state honors from Cal-Hi Sports all three seasons. Rahon was also named first team All-CIF and first team All-North County as a junior and senior.
- He was the point guard for one of the top AAU teams in the country, Dream Vision, and teamed with the nation's top 2012 recruit, Shabazz Muhammad.

RAHON IN THE ACC

- Rahon ranks eighth in the ACC in assists (3.6) and assist/turnover ratio (1.8) while playing a team-high 35.5 minutes a game which ranks third in the conference. He ranks second among conference freshmen in the first two categories.
- He is third on the team with 10.1 points per game which ranks sixth among ACC freshmen.
- Rahon is one of five rookies in the ACC to rank in the top six in two categories (of points, rebounds, assists) among his classmates. He ranks sixth in points and second assists.

DOWN THE STRETCH

- Hanlan and Rahon were crucial down the stretch in securing the 73-61 win at Penn State.
- The two freshmen directly accounted for all of BC's last 13 points after the Nittany Lions pulled within three, 60-57, with 3:08 left on the clock. BC was up 59-39 just 2:14 earlier.
- Hanlan was the highlight as he scored eight points, going 6-for-7 from the foul line in the final 2:45, and assisted on an **Andrew Van Nest** dunk.
- Rahon converted on three of four attempts from the charity stripe.

RAHON EARNS ROOKIE OF THE WEEK HONORS FOR SECOND TIME

- Freshman **Joe Rahon** earned Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week honors for the second time on February 4.
- Rahon scored a season-high 26 points to lead Boston College past Clemson. It was the most points scored by a freshman in the ACC this season. Rahon was 9-for-12 from the floor and 6-for-7 from beyond the arc. He also had four rebounds and four assists in the game.
- It was the second time this year that Rahon connected on six 3-pointers.

HANLAN NAMED ACC ROOKIE OF THE WEEK FOR THIRD TIME

- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week for the second consecutive week, announced January 21.
- It marked BC's fourth ACC Rookie of the Week accolade, which leads the conference. Hanlan has earned the award three times and classmate **Joe Rahon** has also been recognized.
- Hanlan continued his impressive play in ACC action as he recorded 17 points, four rebounds and four assists in Boston College's game against Miami. Hanlan went 6-for-10 from the field and reached the 17-point mark for the third-straight game.

HANLAN NAMED ACC ROOKIE OF THE WEEK FOR SECOND TIME

- Freshman **Olivier Hanlan** was voted the Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week on January 14 after averaging 17.5 points, 6.5 rebounds, 4.0 assists and 3.5 steals in his first two ACC road games.
- It marked the second time that Hanlan was voted ACC Rookie of the Week (December 24). Freshman **Joe Rahon** earned the honor on January 7.
- Hanlan had a monster game at Virginia Tech as he recorded 17 points, eight rebounds, five steals and four assists in the 86-75 win. He then added 18 points, five rebounds and four assists at Wake Forest and was a perfect 7-for-7 from the foul line.

RAHON VOTED ACC ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

- Freshman **Joe Rahon** was named the Atlantic Coast Conference Rookie of the Week on January 7 after averaging 21.0 points, 3.5 rebounds and 3.5 assists in games against Dartmouth and NC State.
- Rahon scored 24 points in a 79-58 win against Dartmouth and was nearly perfect from the field. He was 7-for-8 from the floor, 6-for-6 from beyond the arc and 4-for-4 from the foul line.
- It was the third-most points scored by a freshman in a game in the ACC this year. He also had five assists.
- He followed that up with an 18-point performance in his ACC debut against #23/25 NC State.

HANLAN VOTED ACC CO-ROOKIE OF THE WEEK

- Freshman guard **Olivier Hanlan** was voted ACC Co-Rookie of the Week on December 24. He shared the honor with Florida State's Aaron Thomas.
- The Aylmer, Quebec product notched his first collegiate double-double with 17 points and 12 rebounds in a 71-68 win against Providence. Nine of his rebounds came on the defensive end, and he also had two assists and two steals in 40 minutes of action.

ANDERSON TRENDS

- Sophomore **Ryan Anderson** lit up the stat sheet and Twitter vs. #16/17 Baylor.
- At halftime, he had 19 points and went 8-for-12 from the field. He also hit a half court shot at the buzzer to give BC a 43-41 lead at the break. During halftime, Anderson was the #1 trend on Twitter in Boston.

Fran Fraschilla @franfraschilla

Wow. BC's Ryan Anderson has improved. Looks like an All-ACC player and only a sophomore. Seems like he's more athletic than a year ago.

- Anderson finished the day with 25 points and six rebounds in an 84-74 loss to the Bears.

ANDERSON RETURNS AS LEADING PERFORMER

- Sophomore forward **Ryan Anderson** has built on his impressive rookie campaign - he and Duke's Austin Rivers were the only unanimous choices to the ACC All-Freshman Team, getting a vote on all 61 ballots.
- Anderson led all conference freshmen and was seventh overall in rebounding (7.4). He was also second among freshmen in scoring (11.2) and 20th overall.
- He had seven double-doubles last year.
- The Lakewood, Calif., product was just the 11th player in ACC history to lead his team in scoring and rebounding as a freshman.
- In the last eight games of the season, Anderson averaged 16.3 points and 9.0 rebounds per outing. He also shot .539 (48-for-89) from the field.
- He concluded the year with a 22-point, 12-rebound performance against NC State in the ACC Championship.
- Anderson ranks fourth in the ACC in rebounding (8.1) and sixth in scoring (15.1).

CLIFFORD TAKES ON NEW ROLE

- Sophomore center **Dennis Clifford** earned one of the highest honors prior to the season from his teammates - he was voted the only captain for the 2012-13 season.
- He was second on the team last year in rebounding (4.7) and third in scoring (9.1). His .529 shooting percentage was tops on the squad.
- Had he qualified, Clifford would have ranked third in the ACC in shooting percentage. He was 110-for-208 from the field on the year.
- He scored 12 points in the season-opening win against FIU on 6-for-8 shooting. He also recorded five rebounds and three blocks in 18 minutes of action.
- Clifford is averaging 3.1 points and 3.3 rebounds per game. He missed three games with a sprained right ankle he suffered at Penn State but returned to action against Providence. He has averaged 10.4 minutes in the last 14 games battling a sore knee, but has started six of the last nine.

LONNIE FOR THREE

- Sophomore guard **Lonnie Jackson** has appeared in all 31 games with 19 starts this year.
- Jackson averaged 8.3 points per game last season which was tied for fourth on the team. He hit a team-best 57 3-pointers and was the most accurate free throw shooter, going 52-for-66 (.788).
- The Valencia, Calif., product scored a career-high 26 points on December 18 to lead BC to a 75-55 win against Bryant.
- He went 8-for-13 from the field and 7-for-11 from 3-point land in that game. Those seven 3-pointers were the second most by a player in the ACC last season. It was also the second best 3-point percentage (.636) among those with 10 or more attempts.
- Jackson was the first BC player to hit seven 3-pointers in a game since Tyrese Rice did it against North Carolina on March 1, 2008.
- He is fourth on the team in points per game at 9.1 while averaging 2.8 rebounds and 1.9 assists per game.

HECKMANN'S OFFSEASON

- Sophomore guard **Patrick Heckmann** went back home over the summer to train and play in the German national program.
- He played in his first international game against Iran in the Istanbul Cup for coach Svetislav Pešić.
- He did all of this after playing in 22 games for BC last year. He missed seven games after being diagnosed with Mononucleosis in January.
- Heckmann is capable of putting up huge numbers like he did against UC Riverside on November 25 last year. He erupted for 32 points, going 9-for-13 from the floor and 4-for-5 from beyond the arc. He was also a perfect 10-for-10 from the foul line.
- It was tied for the second most points in 76 Classic history and was tied for the eighth-most all-time by a freshman in the ACC.
- It was also the most points by an ACC freshman and the fourth-most points scored in the league all season.
- Heckmann is fifth on the team in scoring with 7.7 points per game.

THE THREE

- Boston College ranked third in the ACC in 3-point field goals made last season with 225, a 7.3 per game average. It also attempted the third-most in the conference with 664.
- Sophomore guard **Lonnie Jackson** led the team in 3-pointers with 57 while sophomore forward **Ryan Anderson** hit 23, the next most for a returner.
- Matt Humphrey was second on the team with 55 triples while Jordan Daniels hit 37.
- The Eagles rank third in the ACC in 3-pointers made (6.9) but are eighth in 3-point field goal percentage (.344).

IN THE WEIGHT ROOM

- Strength & Conditioning Coach **Nick Asermelly** put the Eagles to work in the weight room during the offseason and the payoff is clear. Here is a chart of some of the improvements made by BC in the offseason.

YOUNG & EXPERIENCED

- The story of Boston College is its youth - with freshmen and sophomores accounting for all but three starts this year.
- The three sophomores (**Ryan Anderson**, **Dennis Clifford** and **Lonnie Jackson**) played in all 31 games last year and each had at least 24 starts.
- The Eagles ranked first in the ACC in freshmen scoring, rebounding and minutes played.
- Freshmen accounted for 1,350 points last year (43.5 per game), 632 rebounds (20.4) and 4,303 minutes (68.6) which led all ACC teams.
- Duke freshmen were second in the conference in scoring with 706 points (20.8 per game), Maryland was second in rebounding with 412 (12.8) and Virginia Tech trailed BC with 2,406 minutes (36.1).

GERRY WARD NAMED ACC LEGEND

- Former men's basketball standout Gerry Ward has been named Boston College's representative in the 2013 ACC Men's Basketball Legends Class.
- Ward started at forward for three seasons and averaged in double figures each year. He averaged a then-school record 20.0 points per game as a senior in 1963. His total of 1,112 career points still ranks 33rd on the Boston College all-time list and was the school's third-best career total when he finished his career. Ward shot .525 from the field, which was also a school record at the time.
- Ward was equally as productive on the glass. His career rebounding average of 13.3 per contest is the second-best in school history and his 947 career rebounds rank sixth. His three single-season rebound averages rank among the top eight single seasons in BC history.
- After averaging 20.0 points and 12.4 rebounds as a senior, he was named a third-team All-America and an Academic All-America first-team honoree. After graduation, he was drafted in the first round of the 1963 NBA Draft as the fifth overall selection by the St. Louis Hawks.
- Ward played four seasons in the NBA as a guard for the Hawks, Boston Celtics, Philadelphia 76ers and Chicago Bulls, averaging 3.2 points, 1.7 rebounds and 1.4 assists per game. He was a member of the 1965 World Champion Boston Celtics.
- Ward is a member of the Boston College Varsity Hall of Fame and his jersey was retired by Boston College in 2007.
- The complete 2013 legends class includes: Gene Corrigan (ACC), Terrell McIntyre (Clemson), Trajan Langdon (Duke), Tharon Mayes (Florida State), Mark Price (Georgia Tech), Gary Williams (Maryland), Mike Wittman (Miami), Mike O'Koren (North Carolina), Dereck Whittenburg (NC State), Travis Watson (Virginia), Ace Custis (Virginia Tech) and Carl Tacy (Wake Forest).

BC SPENDS A WEEK IN SPAIN

- Head Coach **Steve Donahue** and the Eagles spent a week in Spain in late August to prepare for the upcoming season.
- BC played four games in three different cities. It started in Madrid and BC lost to Eurocolegio Casvi in its first game overseas, 86-77.
- The Eagles then defeated Real Cano Madrid, 60-56, in the capital city.
- The team traveled by bus north up the coast to Valencia where it faced Valencia of Spain's top league. The Eagles lost, 93-66.
- The tour of the country wrapped up in Barcelona with a 76-65 loss to Regal Barcelona's second team.
- "That trip was beneficial and eye-opening because we have a real understanding of where we are at, at the earliest point you can possibly have," Donahue said after the trip. "Typically, coaches try to get a feel of where they're at, but I am pretty sure what our strengths and weaknesses are."
- Sophomore forward **Ryan Anderson**: "This was definitely a great experience for basketball, but the memories that all of us shared will never be forgotten by any of us. I know that 30 years from now we will be able to look back and say that we had a great trip. This trip really brought all of us much closer. We were all good friends and liked each other before, but spending this time together has really made us a family. I've said it before, but I wouldn't have wanted to go on this trip with anyone else. We made memories for a lifetime."

GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE THIRD IN NATION

- Boston College, along with Northwestern University, tied for third in the nation for overall Graduation Success Rate (GSR) in all sports among FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision) schools, according to data released by the NCAA in October.
- The 97 percent that both schools registered was topped only by Notre Dame (99) and Duke (98).
- Seventeen BC sports teams received a perfect GSR score of 100. Those teams included men's and women's fencing, men's and women's golf, men's and women's skiing, men's and women's swimming, women's basketball, women's rowing, women's field hockey, women's ice hockey, women's softball, women's soccer, women's tennis, women's track and women's volleyball.
- The NCAA developed the Graduation Success Rate as part of its academic reform initiative to more accurately assess the academic success of student-athletes. The rate holds institutions accountable for transfer students unlike the federal graduation rate. The GSR also accounts for midyear enrollees and is calculated for every sport.

EAGLES IN THE NBA

- There are currently two former Eagles playing professionally in the NBA.
- Jared Dudley was the 22nd overall pick of the 2007 draft, taken by the Charlotte Bobcats. He was traded to the Phoenix Suns late in 2008.
- Reggie Jackson was drafted 24th overall by the Oklahoma City Thunder in 2011 and the organization exercised its third-year option.
- Other former Eagles playing professionally around the world include Louis Hinnant (Germany), Sean Marshall (Turkey), Corey Raji (France), Tyrese Rice (Germany), Craig Smith (Israel) and Joe Trapani (Germany).
