After leading Miami to the 2013 NCAA Sweet 16 and winning the school's first ACC regular season and tournament championships, **Jim Larrañaga** was honored as the AP, Naismith, USBWA Henry Iba, Adolph Rupp Cup and ACC Coach of the Year. The Bronx, N.Y., native helped Miami to a No. 2 national ranking by both the AP and USA TODAY, and a No. 2 seed in the NCAA Tournament.



THE GAME

Miami will face Charlotte for the second-straight game when the Canes travel to North Carolina for the 9 p.m. Nov. 25 matchup at Halton Arena. UM defeated the 49ers just 46 hours prior, on Sunday night in the championship game of the Charleston Classic.

THE SERIES

Miami leads the all-time series 5-4 against Charlotte, which dates back to the 1997-98 season. The Canes are 3-1 against the 49ers at home, 1-3 on the road and 1-0 at neutral sites. Under Coach L, UM is 3-0 in the series against Charlotte. Miami won the last matchup against Charlotte, defeating the 49ers, 77-58, on Nov. 23, 2014 at the Charleston Classic. Coach L is 4-0 all-time against Charlotte.

THE COACH

LARRAÑAGA BY THE NUMBERS

5 - Coach Jim Larrañaga is one of five ACC coaches with a Final Four appearance to his credit. In 2006, Larrañaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the NCAA Final Four in 27 years.

7 - Larrañaga is no stranger to the ACC. In his seven seasons as an assistant coach at Virginia, the Cavaliers participated in the NCAA Final Four in 1981 and 1984, won three ACC Championships and finished in the Top 5 of the AP rankings.

14 - Larrañaga has made 14 postseason appearances in the past 24 years, including six NCAA tournaments.

31 - Larrañaga is in his 31st year as a head coach and has successfully transitioned three institutions into successful programs: Miami, Bowling Green and George Mason.

500 - Coach L is one of five ACC coaches with 500 or more wins.

LARRAÑAGA - WHY MIAMI?

Along with returning to the best basketball conference in the country, Coach L had a few personal reasons for accepting the head coaching job at Miami. Coach's grandfather was from Cuba, where he produced the Larrañaga [lare-en-YAH-ga] cigar. Coach's father was raised in Key West before moving to The Bronx, N.Y., getting married and raising six children. Coach L was raised in The Bronx, but vacationed to Florida as a boy. He also has owned a house in Sarasota - which he bought from Dick Vitale's daughter - and three of his siblings have retired to Florida.

**DID YOU KNOW .....**

Coach L became the first Miami coach to win 20+ games in his first two seasons at UM and only the fourth of 12 UM coaches to post two 20-win seasons.

Former Cane Rick Barry was named one of the Greatest Players in NBA History.

Miami native and former Cane James Jones won the 2010-2011 NBA All-Star Weekend 3-Point Contest and the NBA Championship in the 2011-2012 season.

Six-time NBA All Star Amar'e Stoudemire enrolled at UM last year and is taking classes to earn his bachelor's degree.

UM is in its 11th season in the ACC.

Coach L led the George Mason Patriots to the Final Four with big wins over some of basketball's elite teams such as Michigan State, UNC, and UConn. He was the first coach to take a mid-major to a Final Four in 27 years when his team advanced in 2006.

In 14 years at George Mason, Larrañaga led the Patriots to five NCAA Tournament appearances (2011, 2008, 2006, 2001, 1999), including the 2006 Final Four.

Miami basketball received APR (academic progress rate) Public Recognition Awards for being among the top 10 percent in APR in their sport. Miami ranks in the top 10 percent NCAA men's basketball with a 990 APR.

The Miami Department of Athletics recorded a Graduation Success Rate (GSR) of 92 percent. Miami's department-wide GSR is tied for third among ACC schools and 10th overall among FBS programs. UM has exceeded the NCAA average GSR in each of the last 10 years.

According to latest US News & World Report rankings, the University of Miami is tied as the top academic institution in the state of Florida and ranks 48th nationally.

The Canes have averaged 20+ wins in each of the last eight seasons.

The Hurricanes have made at least one trey in 872 of 878 games since the NCAA adopted the 3-point shot in 1986.

Miami has held 731 of its last 732 opponents to less than 100 points. UNC was the last team to score 100+, defeating UM 105-64 on Jan. 31, 2007.

**CANES WIN BACK-TO-BACK CHARLESTON CLASSIC CHAMPIONSHIPS**

Miami won its second Gildan Charleston Classic in as many tries when the Canes defeated Charlotte, 77-58, on Sunday. In 2009, UM defeated Tulane (74-54), UNC Wilmington (67-60) and South Carolina (85-70) to win the event. Against Charlotte, the Canes won Coach Jim Larrañaga's first bracketed exempt tournament championship since moving to Coral Gables. Miami was 2-1 in the 2013 Wooden Legacy and 1-2 in the 2012 Diamond Head Classic. UM didn't play in an exempt tournament in 2011-12.

**RODRIGUEZ MVP; JEKIRI ALL-TOURNAMENT**

Angel Rodriguez was named the Gildan Charleston Classic Most Valuable Player and Tonye Jekiri was named to the All-Tournament Team. In three games, Rodriguez averaged 14.3 points, 6.0 assists, 4.3 rebounds, 3.0 steals and 1.7 blocks in 30.0 minutes. Jekiri nearly averaged a double-double with 12.0 rebounds and 9.0 points, along with 2.7 blocks and 1.7 assists per game.

**ROAD WARRIORS**

On Nov. 16, Miami started an 11-day roadtrip that will see the Canes play five games in nine days in three states. After an in-state matchup with Florida, Miami played three games in the Charleston (S.C.) Classic, now is wrapping up the road swing with a Nov. 25 matchup against Charlotte.

**CANES SHOOTING 10 PERCENT BETTER IN SECOND HALF**

Through five games, the Canes have outscored their opponents 208-136 in the second half. Miami has averaged nearly 10 more points per game and is shooting more than 10 percent better from the field, from three and at the free throw line in the second half of the game than the first stanza. Junior Angel Rodriguez' stats are significantly better in the second half, as well.

**UM SHOOTING NEARLY 50 PERCENT**

UM hit 59.3 percent (32-54) of its shots against Akron, including 47.1 percent (8-17) from distance. The previous night, the Canes knocked down 11-21 (52.4%) from three.

Miami is shooting 49.5 percent from the field and 42.6 percent from three while holding opponents to 37.3 percent and 33.0 percent, respectively.

Miami has hit 43 shots from long range, with six players knocking down a three, led by 13 from Angel Rodriguez and 12 from Manu Lecomte.

**CANES RECEIVING VOTE IN USA TODAY POLL**

Miami is still receiving a vote in the USA TODAY Sports Top 25 men's basketball coaches' poll. Miami defeated then-No. 7 Florida on Nov. 17, and will face off against five other teams in the top 25, including five in the top 10: Duke (No. 3), North Carolina (No. 6), Florida (No. 7), Louisville (No. 8) and Virginia (No. 9).

In addition to a ranked Syracuse team (No. 24), Miami has three other opponents receiving votes on its 2014-15 schedule: Pittsburgh, Notre Dame and Illinois.

**SHARING THE BALL**

Through five games, the Hurricanes have averaged 16.0 assists per game on 27.6 made field goals per outing. Miami's high was 19 assists against Akron. Angel Rodriguez leads the way with 5.2 per outing.

**CANES OPEN 5-0 FOR FIRST TIME SINCE 2009**

Miami improved to 5-0 to open the season for the first time of Coach Larrañaga's UM career. The Canes opened 4-1 in 2011-12 and 2012-13, and 3-2 in 2013-14. The last time UM opened 5-0 was in 2009-10, when Miami opened 8-0.

**BENCH POINTS KEY FOR THE HURRICANES**

The Hurricanes now have recorded 20+ points off the bench in all five games this season. Against Howard, Florida and Akron, the bench players scored 25 points, 22 against Charleston and vs. Drexel, 21. James Palmer leads the way with 42 bench points, followed by Omar Sherman (33), Ja'Quan Newton (27), Deandre Burnett (11) and Mike Fernandez (2).

**SINCE THE ARRIVAL OF COACH LARRAÑAGA IN 2011-12 ...**

- Miami has posted the fourth-most wins (31) of all ACC schools in league play, trailing only Duke (40), UNC (39) and Virginia (36).

- Miami has the most wins (6) combined of any ACC school against the two winningest ACC programs - UNC and Duke - in the past three seasons. The next highest is four wins: Virginia is 4-5 against both teams, and Duke is 4-2 against UNC.

- Miami is the only school with a winning record (6-4) over Duke and North Carolina combined in the past three seasons. Duke is 4-2 against North Carolina.

- Miami is one of three schools with five or more wins in the ACC Tournament.

- Miami is one of four ACC schools with a winning record in the NCAA tournament.

- Miami has the third-most ACC road wins (14) in league play, behind Duke (17) and UNC (17).

- Miami has posted the most overall road wins (21) of all ACC teams the past three seasons. UNC is second with 20 while Duke and Virginia each have 17.

- Miami's seeds in the ACC Tournament have been No. 1, No. 6 and No. 10.

- Miami is one of eight ACC teams to make an NCAA tournament appearance.

- Miami is one of five ACC teams to make an NIT appearance.

- One ACC Coach of the Year, one ACC Player of the Year, ACC Defensive Player of the Year, one ACC Tournament MVP, four ACC All-Tournament, one first-team All-ACC, one second-team All-ACC, three third-team All-ACC, two honorable mention All-ACC, one ACC All-Rookie Team and three ACC All-Defensive Team selections.

- Miami has the most lopsided win over Duke (27 points) and second-most lopsided wins over Boston College (27 points), North Carolina (26 points) and Florida State (24 points) of any ACC team.

- Miami has won seven ACC games by 20 or more points: Boston College (27, 22, 22 and 21), Duke (27), North Carolina (26) and Florida State (24).

- All 13 seniors earned academic degrees from UM: Garrius Adams, Rion Brown, Julian Gamble, Malcolm Grant, Justin Heller, Reggie Johnson, DeQuan Jones, Kenny Kadji, Donnavan Kirk, Trey McKinney Jones, Ryan Quiglar, Durand Scott, Erik Swoope.

**IN THE THREE YEARS PRIOR TO THE ARRIVAL OF COACH L (2008-11) ...**

- Miami posted the eighth-most ACC wins (17) in the league, ahead of NC State (16), Virginia (16) and Georgia Tech (14).

- Miami recorded 60 overall wins, seventh-most in the ACC.

- Miami's seeds in the ACC Tournament were No. 9 (twice) and No. 12.

- Miami was one of four ACC teams to not play in the NCAA tournament.

- Miami was one of five ACC teams to play in the NIT.

- Miami had one first-team All-ACC, one third-team All-ACC, one honorable mention All-ACC, one ACC All-Rookie Team and one ACC Tournament Team selection.

**2014-15 QUICK HITS**

- UM has nine scholarship players available. This is the second-straight season the Canes open the campaign with eight or more new players and only nine available scholarship players.
- Miami has 10 new players on the roster for 2014-15. Eight scholarship newcomers, one D-I transfer who must sit out and one walk-on.
- UM opens the 2014-15 campaign with just two players from the 2013-14 season, in sophomore Manu Lecomte and junior Tonye Jekiri.
- Davon Reed is out until at least January with a lower extremity injury.
- Seven of Miami's nine available scholarship players didn't wear a Miami uniform last season.
- Miami's 14-man roster includes players from five countries - Belgium, Nigeria, Puerto Rico, Spain, U.S. - six states - Florida, Texas, New York, Pennsylvania, New Jersey, New Hampshire - and Washington, D.C.
- There are no seniors playing for the Canes. Miami has one graduate student, five juniors, three sophomores and five freshmen.
- Three DI transfers are eligible to play in 2014-15: Sheldon McClellan (Texas), Angel Rodriguez (Kansas State) and Joe Thomas (Niagara).
- The Canes lost six players - including three starters and the team's top two scorers - from the 2013-14 season, five to graduation and one transferred.
- Miami lost five of its top seven players from 2013-14. To open the 2013-14 season, Miami had lost its top six players from the 2012-13 campaign.
- The Canes return 11.9 points, 7.6 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 1.3 steals and 0.9 blocks per game from the 2013-14 season. A year ago, Miami opened the 2013-14 season returning 9.3 points, 5.1 rebounds, 1.1 assists, 0.8 steals and 0.5 blocks per game.
- For the second-straight season, Miami returns the fewest points per game (18.4) and rebounds per game (9.2) of all ACC schools.
- The Canes held opponents to just 59.5 points per game in 2013-14, which was ranked No. 11 of 345 teams in Division I. Miami also averaged 61.5 ppg, which was ranked No. 337.
- The Canes lost 10 games by five points or less or in overtime during the 2013-14 season, on their way to a 17-16 overall record.
- Sophomore Manu Lecomte is the only returning guard from the 2013-14 season, bringing experience in the form of 7.7 points and 2.3 assists per game as a rookie last year. When he is cleared from injury, Davon Reed will bring his matured, stronger, sophomore body to the court, and look to improve on his 6.6 points, 1.2 assists and 1.7 rebounds per game.
- UM's backcourt could be labeled as one of the best in the ACC, despite the lack of experience in a Miami jersey. An All-Big 12 performer in 2012-13, transfer Angel Rodriguez leads the charge for the Canes after averaging 11.4 points and 5.2 assists at Kansas State. Classmate Sheldon McClellan put up 13.5 points and 3.9 rebounds per night for the University of Texas in 2012-13, adding experienced firepower for Miami. Rookie Ja'Quan Newton was a high-volume prep scorer, recording 1,972 career points at Neumann-Goretti High in Philadelphia and redshirt freshman Deandre Burnett averaged 37 ppg in his final season at Carol City High in Miami. Fellow freshman James Palmer averaged 15.7 ppg for a strong St. John's College HS team.

**PALMER DOUBLES UP FROM DISTANCE**

Freshman guard James Palmer has knocked down 10 shots from long range, hitting two in each game for the Hurricanes. He is 10-17 (58.8%) from three.

**RODRIGUEZ ON COUSY WATCH LIST**

Junior PG Angel Rodriguez is one of 36 players listed on the watch list for the 2015 Bob Cousy Collegiate Point Guard of the Year Award.

**JEKIRI CONTROLLING THE BOARDS**

Junior forward Tonye Jekiri is controlling the boards for Miami, averaging 11.0 through five games. Jekiri tied his career high of 13 against Drexel, then set his new mark of 16 the next night, against Akron. The last time a Cane grabbed more than 15 rebounds was in 2011, when Reggie Johnson grabbed 20 against Florida Atlantic.

Jekiri has secured 8+ rebounds in all five games this season. Jekiri also has 12 blocks and seven assists for the Canes.

**RODRIGUEZ FLIRTS WITH TRIPLE-DOUBLE**

Junior guard Angel Rodriguez flirted with a triple-double against Akron, posting 15 points, nine assists and eight rebounds. His stat line also included two blocked shots and a steal, while shooting 66.7 percent from the field.

Rodriguez has scored in double figures in all four games this season for the Hurricanes, with 16, 24, 15 and 15. He scored 10 straight points for the Canes between the 17:01 and 15:13 marks to open the second half against Drexel, pushing the Canes' lead to 11. For the season, he's hit 52.2 percent (12-23) from distance.

Rodriguez is not just a scorer for the Canes, more importantly, he is a bulldog of a defender. In four games at Miami, he has had 11 steals, 21 assists and 16 rebounds. The 5-11 guard also has five blocked shots on the season and took a charge with three seconds remaining against Florida to win the game. He also disrupts passes and shots with his active hands and physical play.

**RODRIGUEZ PLAYS D, DRAINS 24 IN WIN OVER GATORS**

Junior PG Angel Rodriguez scored 22 his 24 points in the final nine minutes against No. 8/7 Florida, draining five 3-pointers in the last seven minutes to help Miami to the win. Rodriguez also showed his strong defense by drawing a charge with three seconds remaining in the game. In 36 minutes, Rodriguez totaled three assists, three steals and two rebounds with his 7-14 shooting, hitting five from distance, and 5-7 mark at the free throw line.

**ANTHONY LAWRENCE, JR. SIGNS NLI WITH CANES**

Anthony Lawrence, Jr. has signed a National Letter of Intent to play basketball for the University of Miami.

Nicknamed "Amp," Lawrence is a 6-7, 200-pound guard/forward from Saint Petersburg, Fla., who led his Lakewood Senior High School team to the Class 5A state championship game as a junior. Lawrence scored 18 points in the championship game and totaled 25 rebounds in two state tournament games.

Lawrence averaged 20 points and 13 rebounds as a junior at Lakewood, and in his sophomore campaign, averaged 21 points, eight rebounds and four steals. Listed as a four-star recruit by ESPN, the long wing can finish on the break or knock down the three. He brings a complete game to the Hurricanes with the ability to handle the ball, pass, shoot, rebound and play defense with great intensity.

Lawrence, who played AAU ball for Each 1 Teach 1 Elite, chose Miami over offers from USC, Clemson and Texas, among others. Anthony's father, Anthony Lawrence Sr. was a two-year letterman at Miami from 1991-93. After college, he played overseas in Portugal, Mexico and the Dominican Republic. His brother, Patrick, also played at Miami from 1991-94.

**CANE STRONG: UMBB IN THE WEIGHT ROOM**

Under strength Coach Steve Felde (fell-dee), five Canes bench at least 300 pounds and eight bench press more than 250 pounds. Joe Thomas leads the way at 375, followed by Deandre Burnett (315), who is up 85 pounds since arriving at UM. Also in the 300-club are Angel Rodriguez (300/+60), Manu Lecomte (300/+85) and Mike Fernandez (300/+95).

**CANES IN SPAIN**

- In August, the University of Miami embarked on a 10-day educational and competitive tour to Spain. The Canes were 4-0 against teams from Barcelona, Valencia and Madrid.
- In four games in Spain, Miami outscored its opponent 89.8 to 65.8 ppg and pulled down nearly twice as many rebounds, 51.8 to 27.0 per night. The Canes hit 51.8 percent from the field, 27.8 percent from three and 62.4 percent at the line. UM also averaged 17.8 assists and 13.3 steals per night.

- Individually, four Canes averaged double digits, led by Sheldon McClellan (20.0), followed by Dre Burnett (14.3), Ja'Quan Newton (13.5) and James Palmer (11.5). Spaniard Ivan Cruz Uceda averaged 11.0 rebounds per game while Tonye Jekiri averaged 8.5 rpg. Senior Angel Rodriguez did not play any games in Spain due to injury.

**SEASONS OF CHANGE**

Miami faces back-to-back seasons with roster turnover after losing six players from the 2012-13 ACC Championship season - five to graduation, one to NBA - then six seniors (5 scholarship) after the 2013-14 campaign.

**LARRAÑAGA CONTRACT EXTENDED THROUGH 2022**

The University of Miami extended Coach Jim Larrañaga's contract through May 31, 2022, Director of Athletics Blake James announced in September 2014. Larrañaga first signed a five-year contract in April 2011, then was granted a three-year extension in 2012.

**COACHING COORDINATORS FOR MIAMI**

Miami's assistant coaching staff is set up in a coordinator system, with Eric Konkol as the offensive coordinator, Michael Huger manning the defense and Chris Caputo handling the scout for every opponent.

**LECOMTE NAMED TO U20 ALL-TOURNAMENT TEAM**

Manu Lecomte was named to U20 Men Division B 2014 All-Tournament Team after leading Belgium to the championship game of the FIBA U20 European Championships, Division B, held in Sarajevo, Bosnia & Herzegovina.

The Canes sophomore averaged 20.0 points, 5.0 rebounds, 3.0 assists, 1.1 steals in 30.4 minutes per game in the tournament. In his eight games, he averaged 47.1 percent from the field, including 53.8 percent from 2-point range, and was 79.5 percent at the line. He ranked second in the tournament in points per game, fourth in field goals made and free throw percentage and seventh in free throws made. He posted a 34-point night against Belarus, also recording four assists, three steals and three rebounds in the 21-point win. Against Cyprus, Lecomte hit 11-of-13 from the line. He drained four shots from long distance in two outings and had six or more rebounds in four games.

Lecomte has been part of Belgium's national team program for most of the past decade. He was a member of the U16 team for two years, the U18 team for two years and is in his second year with the U20 squad. With the appearance in the title game, the Belgian team will move from Division B to the top league, Division A.

**POSTGAME NOTES: MIAMI VS. CHARLOTTE**

Miami has now won its second Charleston Classic and improves to 6-0 all-time in the Charleston Classic after winning the tournament in three games in 2009-10 ... Miami is now 5-4 in the all-time series against Charlotte ... Miami is 6-3 in exempt bracketed tournaments under the leadership of Coach L ... Five Canes scored in double figures: Sheldon McClellan (19), Manu Lecomte (15), James Palmer, Angel Rodriguez (13), and Tonye Jekiri (11) ... The Canes had 17 assists on 30 field goals ... Miami forced 19 turnovers and scored 27 points off turnovers ... Starters: Angel Rodriguez, Manu Lecomte, Sheldon McClellan, Joe Thomas and Tonye Jekiri ... Angel Rodriguez was named the Gildan Charleston Classic Most Valuable Player and Tonye Jekiri was named to the All-Tournament Team ... Sheldon McClellan scored a game high (tie) 19 points for the Canes on 9-15 shooting. His 19 points ties his career-high as a Cane, which he last recorded against Howard (11/14/14) ... Sheldon McClellan recorded a game high and season-high eight rebounds ... Angel Rodriguez has now scored in double figures in all five games this season for the Hurricanes, with 16, 24, 15, 15, and 13 ... With five assists against Charlotte, Angel Rodriguez has 3+ assists in all five games for the Canes ... Angel Rodriguez had five steals topping his previous collegiate career-high. His previous career-high was four, which he last recorded against Howard (11/4/14) ... Freshman James Palmer had a career-high 12 points ... Angel Rodriguez, Manu Lecomte, and James Palmer have all a hit a three-point field goal in all five games this season ... Tonye Jekiri has recorded a block in all five games this season.

**POSTGAME NOTES: MIAMI DOWNS NO. 8/7 FLORIDA**

The Canes snapped Florida's 33 game home winning streak and 25-game home non-conference winning streak at the Stephen C. O'Connell Center. The 33-game streak was the third-longest in the country, behind 34 from both Duke and Stephen F. Austin ... Miami's last road win over a Top 10 team was Feb. 5, 2012 at No. 7/5 Duke (78-74, OT) ... Miami's last road win over a ranked team was Feb. 2, 2013 at No. 19

NC State (79-78) ... Miami is 48-135 overall against ranked teams with a 14-63 mark on the road ... Against ranked teams since the arrival of Coach Larrañaga in 2011, Miami is 6-14 overall, 3-6 on the road and 2-1 in regular season non-conference matchups ... Miami is now 23-45 in the series against Florida, which dates back to the 1927-28 season. The Hurricanes are 7-29 on the road against the Gators. Since the rebirth of UM basketball in 1985, Miami is 3-9 against UF, and under Coach L, Miami is now 1-0 ... Miami is now 2-2 in the last four matchups with the Gators. The Canes' last win over the Gators was Dec. 4, 2004, a 72-65 victory in Gainesville ... Head coach Jim Larrañaga has a 538-370 overall record in his 31st season as a head coach. He is 68-36 in his third season at the University of Miami ... Starters: Angel Rodriguez, Manu Lecomte, Sheldon McClellan, Joe Thomas and Tonye Jekiri ... Angel Rodriguez scored 24 points his first 20-point game as a Cane, also topping his previous collegiate career-high. His previous career-high was 22 points against Baylor (2/16/13) when he played for Kansas State ... Rodriguez knocked down five 3-pointers in the game, all five in the last 6:21 in the game. He also knocked down three-straight FTs after being fouled on a 3-point attempt ... Rodriguez also notched three assists, three steals and two rebounds in 36 minutes ... Tonye Jekiri tied the game with a free throw and then took a 56-55 lead at the 3:48 mark, which was Miami's first lead of the game. Miami was down by 14 at the 8:29 mark ... Tonye Jekiri grabbed eight rebounds and blocked three shots to lead the Canes on the boards ... Freshman James Palmer had his first double-figure scoring game of his collegiate career with 10 points ... Omar Sherman scored his first points of his collegiate career on a 3-point play at the 10:10 mark in the first half ... Omar Sherman made a 3-point shot, then blocked a Gator shot, which led to a Tonye Jekiri shot, in which he got fouled, then tied and gave Miami the lead with 3:48 left in the game ... Eight different Canes scored in the first half ... Miami was 9-of-11 (81.8 percent) from the free throw line in the last five minutes of the game ... Miami shot 65.2 percent from the field and 70 percent from the 3-point line in the second half ... Miami's game against Florida was the first of an 11-day roadtrip where the Canes play five games in nine days in three states.

**NEW SCOREBOARD HUNG IN BANKUNITED CENTER**

Miami Hurricanes home basketball games will be more exciting this year as a new state-of-the-art center-hung scoreboard – made possible by a \$1 million Momentum2 campaign gift from FMSbonds, Inc. – will be unveiled for the 2014-15 season.

The gift was made possible by FMSbonds, Inc. President James A. Klotz and Chairman Paul Feinsilver. Klotz is a long-time University of Miami Athletics donor and is a member of the Athletics Visiting Committee.

The center-hung scoreboard is 24 feet wide by 17 feet tall (including ring). The main screen is 10' 8.8" in height and the ring is 2' 5". The main screen has 2,848 columns of resolution.

**MIAMI BASKETBALL – THE EARLY YEARS**

The University of Miami basketball program was dormant for 14 years from 1971-1985. In 1983 Director of Athletics Sam Jankovich announced the resurrection of men's basketball at Miami, with the reinstatement vote by the UM Board of Trustees on Oct. 12, 1983. Head coach Bill Foster was hired March 21, 1984, adding assistants Clint Bryant,

Seth Greenberg and Cesar Odio by July 1. Tim Harvey was the staff's first recruit, a 6-10, 240-pound center from Plainfield, N.J., who transferred from Georgia Tech. On Oct. 15, 1984 the first men's basketball practice in 12 years was held on the patio in the center of campus, viewed by more than 200 students. Miami defeated The Citadel, 85-77, on Nov. 22, 1985, in the first game of the brand new era of Hurricane basketball.

**DIVERSITY AT UM EXTENDS TO COURT**

Five Miami players speak English as a second language: Ivan Cruz Uceda - Spanish (Spain); Mike Fernandez - Spanish (Cuba); Tonye Jekiri - African; Manu Lecomte - French; Angel Rodriguez - Spanish (Puerto Rico). UM is the academic home of nearly 1,700 foreign students of all socioeconomic backgrounds, from more than 110 countries as diverse as Peru, Pakistan, and Poland. Miami's diversity also is evident in its full-time faculty, which is nearly 36 percent minority, making UM one of the most diverse major private research universities.

**LARRAÑAGA MEMBER OF UM FACULTY**

Coach Jim Larrañaga is an Adjunct Assistant Professor of Kinesiology and Sport Sciences at the University of Miami. Due to his head coaching responsibilities, Larrañaga is a guest lecturer at several different classes in the School of Education and Human Development throughout the semester.

**COACH L TIES TO THE ACC**

Coach Jim Larrañaga was an assistant coach at Virginia from 1979-1986, under the leadership of Terry Holland. In those seven seasons, Larrañaga helped the Cavaliers to five NCAA appearances: Final Four twice, Elite Eight once, Sweet 16 once and Round of 64 once, as well as two NIT appearances, including the Championship and Quarterfinal round.

Jim Larrañaga was named the 12th head coach of the University of Miami men's basketball program on April 22, 2011.

After leading UM to the 2013 NCAA Sweet 16, and winning the school's first ACC regular season and tournament championships, Larrañaga was honored as the AP, Naismith, USBWA Henry Iba and ACC Coach of the Year. The Bronx native helped Miami to a No. 2 national ranking by both the AP and USA TODAY, and a No. 2 seed in the NCAA tournament. He is the 10th coach in the last 10 years to lead two top-10 programs, as Miami was No. 2 on Feb. 18, 2013, and George Mason was No. 8 in the final Top 25 poll in 2006.

Larrañaga directed the Canes to a 27-point win over No. 1 Duke and three other 20+ point wins over ACC opponents that season, including North Carolina (+26), Florida State (+24) and Boston College (+22). UM's 29 overall and 15 ACC wins in 2012-13 were program-bests, as was the 14-game winning streak and 13-0 start in conference play. Other program firsts include defeating all three teams in the North Carolina Triangle in the same season, beating a trio of teams in the Top 20 since joining the ACC and hosting five home sellouts at the BankUnited Center.

Individually, Coach L saw Shane Larkin earn the ACC Player of the Year and Lute Olson National Player of the Year awards, as well as All-American status and finalist nods for the Bob Cousy, John Wooden and James Naismith player of the year honors before declaring early for the 2013 NBA Draft. Larkin was also the ACC Tournament MVP, on the All-ACC Defensive team and a defensive All-American. Durand Scott was the ACC Defensive Player of the Year, three players - Larkin, Scott and Kenny Kadji - were listed on all-conference teams and four were on the ACC All-Tournament Team - Larkin, Scott, Julian Gamble and Trey McKinney Jones. All six seniors on the Sweet 16 team earned academic degrees from the University of Miami and one player was listed on the All-ACC Academic Team.

Larrañaga came to Miami after serving as the head coach at George Mason for 14 seasons. He guided that program to five NCAA Tournament appearances (1999, 2001, 2006, 2008, 2011) - including an unprecedented run to the 2006 Final Four that captured the nation's attention, defeating Michigan State, North Carolina, Wichita State and UConn along the way. Following that run, he was selected the 2006 Clair Bee Coach of the Year. Larrañaga built the GMU Patriots' program into a perennial contender in the highly-regarded Colonial Athletic Association, winning more games (273) than any other coach in program and conference history en

route to three conference titles (1999, 2001, 2008). A two-time CAA Coach of the Year honoree, Larrañaga earned the accolade in 2011, leading the Patriots to a 27-7 overall record and 16-2 conference mark en route to the CAA regular-season title and their fifth NCAA Tournament appearance under his leadership. Seeded a program-best eighth in the NCAA Tournament, George Mason rallied from a double-digit deficit to defeat ninth-seeded Villanova, 61-57, before falling to overall No. 1 seed Ohio State in the third round. In 2006, Larrañaga became the first coach at a mid-major school to take his team to the Final Four in 27 years and earned an at-large berth for a CAA team for the first time in 20 years. Along the way, he led Mason to a school record in wins, the school's first national ranking, George Mason's first appearance in the Top 10 and the school's first wins over Top 10 teams.

With 29 years of head coaching experience, the native of The Bronx, N.Y., previously served as the head coach at Bowling Green for 11 seasons (1986-1997) and at Division II American International for two seasons (1977-79). His first coaching opportunity came at Davidson College, where he served as an assistant coach to Terry Holland. Davidson captured three Southern Conference regular-season championships and an NIT berth in his five years there, and he compiled a 47-12 record doubling as the freshman team coach. In 1976, he left Davidson and spent one season as player-coach for the Geronemo Basketball Club in Belgium. A 1971 graduate of Providence College with a degree in economics, Larrañaga was a four-year letterman for the Friars. As the team captain in his senior season, he led Providence to a 20-8 record and an NIT appearance. He graduated as the school's fifth all-time leading scorer with 1,258 points and was selected in the sixth round of the draft by the Detroit Pistons of the National Basketball Association. He was the team's top scorer as a sophomore and junior and was named New England's Division I Sophomore of the Year in 1969. He was inducted into the Providence College Hall of Fame in 1991.

Larrañaga, 65, and his wife, Liz, have two sons - Jay, who played for his father at Bowling Green and is an assistant coach with the Boston Celtics, and Jon, who was a member of his father's George Mason teams from 1999-2003 - and four grandchildren.
