FEBRUARY 13 AT GEORGIA TECH

- Marcus Georges-Hunt hit a 3-pointer with 0.7 seconds left to push Georgia Tech past Boston College, 74-71, on February 13 at McCamish Pavilion.
- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** scored a game-high 21 points.
- Junior **Ryan Anderson** recorded 13 points, four assists and a career-high four steals. Sophomore **Joe Rahon** scored 11 points and dished out four assists.
- Hanlan sparked the first run of the game with Boston College trailing, 16-13. He scored eight of the nine unanswered Eagle points to put them ahead, 22-16.
- BC held the lead the rest of the half, but Georgia Tech was able to cut the deficit to one at the break, 35-34.
- Boston College controlled much of the second half and led 69-64 with 3:18 left after a Rahon layup.
- Georgia Tech scored the next six points to take a 70-69 lead with 22 seconds left.
- Hanlan hit a baseline jumper with three seconds left to give the lead back to BC, but Georges-Hunt sealed the win with a 3-pointer with 0.7 seconds left.

JANUARY 21 VS. GEORGIA TECH

- Boston College cut a 19-point first-half deficit to 57-56 with 4:44 left in the game, but Georgia Tech pulled away after that for a 68-60 victory on January 21 in Conte Forum.
- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** scored a team-high 19 points, going 8-for-10 from the floor. Junior **Lonnie Jackson** scored 14 points.
- Georgia Tech opened the game on a 16-3 run over the first 4:47. The Yellow Jackets hit their first seven shots of the game. Trae Golden had seven of those points.
- The Yellow Jackets then extended their lead to 34-15 at the 6:31 mark thanks to a 12-2 run.
- Boston College scored nine unanswered points over three minutes to cut the deficit to 34-24. Jackson sparked the run with a trey.
- Georgia Tech extended its lead to 42-27 at halftime.
- The Eagles scored 10 unanswered points early in the second half to cut the deficit to 50-42. That turned into a 19-5 run that trimmed it to 55-51 with 9:34 left.
- BC knocked the deficit down to 57-56, but Georgia Tech scored the next five points to make it 62-56 with 1:35 left.

A GAME FOR THE AGES

- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** went off for an ACC freshman record 41 points in Boston College's 84-64 win over Georgia Tech in last season's ACC Tournament opener.
- It was the most points scored in a tournament game since 1970 and the third-most all-time. It was the most points ever scored in a first round game.
- Hanlan also recorded five rebounds, three assists and two steals. He went 14-for-18 from the field and 8-for-10 from beyond the arc.
- He finished the day by hitting his last 12 shots.
- His eight 3-pointers tied the ACC Tournament freshman record set by Mark Price and was one short of the overall record.
- It was the most points scored by a BC player since Tyrese Rice had 46 versus North Carolina on March 1, 2008.

BC SCHEDULE RANKED 2ND TOUGHEST BY KENPOM

- Boston College established one of the toughest non-conference schedules in the country this season.
- BC's opponents in November are a combined 125-91 this year. UMass, Toledo and Connecticut each have at least 23 victories while Providence has 20.
- The Eagles' opposition in the month of December is a combined 106-78 with VCU reaching 24 wins. BC also faced 26-4 Harvard, the Ivy League champions, on January 1.
- All of the Eagles opponents are a combined 506-324 - a .610 winning percentage.
- According to the 2014 Pomeroy College Basketball Ratings, Boston College has the second toughest schedule in the country. BC's opponents have the top-ranked defense in the nation while their offenses are ranked sixth.
- BC has played nine teams currently ranked in the top 50 of ESPN's daily RPI, including six in the top 20.

OFFENSIVE EFFICIENCY

- According to the 2014 Pomeroy College Basketball Ratings, Boston College features the 27th-most efficient offense in the country and fifth best in the ACC behind #7/6 Duke, #11/11 Syracuse, Pittsburgh and #6/8 Virginia.
- KenPom defines its adjusted offensive efficiency as an estimate of the offensive efficiency (points scored per 100 possessions) a team would have against the average D-I defense.

NOTING THE HOME WIN AGAINST VIRGINIA TECH

- The 24-point margin of victory was the second-largest for BC in ACC play since the Eagles began league play in 2005. The Eagles defeated Georgia Tech, 112-73, in 2008.
- Boston College hit 14 3-pointers in the game which tied a Conte Forum record. BC also hit 14 against Hartford on January 31, 2007. The Eagles hit 14 as a team last year in the ACC Tournament against Georgia Tech.
- BC matched a season-high with 19 assists and its seven turnovers were the second-fewest this year. The +12 assist number was the best all season.
- The Eagles' eight steals were a season high and seven blocks matched a season high.
- Boston College had a 24-1 advantage in points off turnovers in the game.
- The Eagles started the game 8-for-12 from the floor.
- BC was 7-for-12 from beyond the arc in the first 20 minutes.

EAGLES RANK 35TH IN FREE THROW PERCENTAGE

- As of March 7, Boston College ranked 35th in the country in free throw percentage at 73.8 percent.
- BC hit more free throws through 10 games than it had attempts in the first 10 games of last season.
- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** ranks sixth in the ACC in free throw percentage at .819 (181-for-221).
- Junior **Ryan Anderson** is 151-for-206 (.733).
- Hanlan (7.1) and Anderson (6.6) are second and third in the ACC in free throw attempts per game, respectively.
- Last season, Boston College shot 71 percent from the stripe.

HANLAN REACHES 1,000

- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** scored his 1,000th point against Pittsburgh on February 26.
- He became just the third player in Boston College history to reach 1,000 points in his sophomore season, joining Troy Bell (1999-2001) and Craig Smith (2002-04) on that list. Bell and Smith are first and second at BC in career scoring, respectively.
- In addition, Hanlan is the 29th player in ACC history to reach the 1,000-point plateau during his sophomore season. He is the first Eagle on that chart.
- Hanlan is the 41st player in Boston College history to score 1,000 points.

ASSIST/TURNOVER RATIO

- Boston College has taken care of the ball the last 13 games, committing just 118 turnovers - a 9.1 per game average. It had a season-low four against Georgia Tech which was a Conte Forum record.
- BC averaged 12.9 turnovers per game in the first 18 games of the season.
- The Eagles committed single-digit turnovers in seven consecutive games from January 21 to February 16. It was the first time that happened since BC joined the ACC for the 2005-06 season.
- BC has 146 assists in the last 13 games and matched a season high with 19 (on 24 baskets) against Virginia Tech.
- The Eagles had a 24-1 points off turnovers margin against the Hokies.
- BC committed 12 first half turnovers at #1/1 Syracuse that led to 17 points. After halftime, the Eagles turned the ball over just five times for four Orange points.
- BC has committed less than 11 turnovers in eight of the last 13 games.
- Boston College ranks seventh in the ACC during league play in assist/turnover ratio (1.20).

HANLAN AFTER HALFTIME

- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** has averaged 11.7 points after the first half this season.
- 139 of his 362 second-half/overtime points (38 percent) have come at the foul line where he is shooting 139-for-170 (.818) after halftime - 77 percent of his free throw attempts occur in the second half or overtime.
- In the first half at Providence, he had four points. He finished with a team-high 23.
- In the first half vs. Massachusetts, he had two points. He finished with 19.
- The Aylmer, Quebec native scored 13 points in the second half against Toledo and finished with 18.
- Hanlan took control of the game against Florida Atlantic, scoring 27 of his 38 points in the second half. He was 7-for-14 from the floor and 10-for-12 from the foul line.
- He scored 21 of his 26 points in the second half against Maryland and went 15-for-16 from the foul line. Those 15 free throws are the most in the ACC in a game this year.
- He tallied 20 of his 28 points at Auburn in the second half.
- Hanlan scored 22 points in the second half against Clemson. He finished with 27.
- He was perfect from the field against Georgia Tech, going 4-for-4 from the floor and 2-for-2 from the foul line for 10 points.
- Hanlan scored all 14 of his points at #20/21 Virginia in the second half.
- At #1/1 Syracuse, Hanlan scored 16 points in the second half and overtime. He was 1-for-5 from the floor in the first half but 5-for-9 in the second and overtime.
- Hanlan has led the Eagles in scoring in the second half in 20 of the 31 games this year.
- Hanlan ranks third in the ACC in scoring (18.6) and seventh in field goal percentage (.450).

ANDERSON REACHES 1,000

- Junior **Ryan Anderson** became the 40th player in Boston College history to reach the 1,000-point plateau when he scored 14 points against Maryland.
- Anderson scored his 1,000th point on a baseline jumper that tied the score at 70-70.
- He has 1,267 points (13.6 per game) in his career which currently ranks 24th in BC history.

ANDERSON'S NUMBERS

- Junior **Ryan Anderson** is averaging 14.3 points and 7.1 rebounds per game this season.
- He had 21 points and six rebounds at Providence and then recorded 22 points, seven rebounds, three assists and three blocks against Massachusetts.
- It was the second-straight season he started out with consecutive 20-point games. He has reached the 20-point plateau five times in his career. He had three such games last season.
- The Lakewood, CA product had game highs of 28 points and 11 rebounds against Sacred Heart.
- Anderson is the ACC active leader in career double-doubles with 19. Senior Travis McKie of Wake Forest has 17.
- His 17th double-double came against Philadelphia on December 15 when he had 10 points and 13 rebounds.
- His 18th came at North Carolina with 11 points and 12 rebounds and then his 19th came vs. Notre Dame when he had 11 and 11.
- Anderson recorded 18 points, eight rebounds and a career-high five blocks against Virginia Tech and then had 21 points and six rebounds at Notre Dame.
- He had game highs with 20 points and seven rebounds at #20/21 Virginia.
- He scored 24 points - 15 in the second half - to lead BC to a win at Wake Forest. He was 14-for-16 from the foul line.
- Anderson ranks ninth in the ACC in rebounding and 11th in scoring.

RAHON FILLING UP STAT SHEET

- Sophomore **Joe Rahon** has been putting up numbers in a few different categories in the last 17 games.
- He is averaging 8.6 points, 3.3 rebounds, 3.6 assists and 1.0 steal per game since January 4.
- The San Diego, CA product leads the team in assists (61) and has just 26 turnovers in that span - a 2.35 assist/turnover ratio.
- Rahon matched a season high with seven rebounds against Clemson and had three steals.
- He scored 13 points at North Carolina while dishing out six assists. He had just one turnover in the game.
- Against Virginia Tech, he recorded 20 points, six assists and five rebounds. He was 5-for-8 from beyond the arc.
- He recorded 13 points, four rebounds and three steals at Notre Dame. At home against the Irish, he had 13 points, four rebounds, four assists and two steals.
- Rahon has had at least four assists in nine of the last 17 games.
- During conference play, Rahon ranks eighth in the ACC in assist/turnover ratio (2.32).

JACKSON FINDS STROKE

- Junior **Lonnie Jackson** was Boston College's most productive player in a four-game span from January 11-21, averaging 15.8 points per game.
- He was 22-for-42 (.524) from the floor and 19-for-34 (.559) from 3-point land.
- Prior to the first Virginia Tech game, Jackson averaged 4.4 points per game. He was 17-for-55 (.309) from the field and 14-for-45 (.311) from long range.
- The Valencia, CA, product scored a game-high 17 points and had six rebounds in the win at Virginia Tech.
- Fourteen of his points came in the first half when he went 5-for-7 from the floor and 4-for-5 from beyond the arc.
- Jackson was quiet in the second half, but was called upon when BC had the ball with 30 seconds left and down, 59-58. He hit a 3-pointer to put BC ahead for good.
- Then against #2/2 Syracuse, Jackson hit a season-high six 3-pointers for a team-best 18 points.
- He continued his hot shooting at North Carolina, going 5-for-7 from the floor and 4-for-6 from beyond the arc for 14 points. He also scored 14 points against Georgia Tech and 15 at Notre Dame.
- In conference action, Jackson is second in the ACC in 3-point percentage (.426) and eighth in 3-pointers made (2.22).

ODIO'S IMPROVEMENT

- Like classmate **Lonnie Jackson**, junior **Eddie Odio** has also found a rhythm from beyond the arc.
- He is 13-for-23 (.565) from 3-point land in the last 19 games and 32-for-55 (.582) from the floor.
- The Miami, FL set a new career high with 12 points at North Carolina, going 3-for-4 from long range.
- Odio also went 3-for-4 from three at Harvard on New Year's Day. He matched his previous career high there with 11 points.
- Before the calendar turned to 2014, Odio was shooting 4-for-15 (.267) from long range and averaging 3.6 points.
- In 2014, he is a stellar 12-for-21 (.571) from three and averaging 4.6 points.

OWENS HAS BEST GAME

- Freshman **Garland Owens** had the best game of his young career on December 12 against Maryland.
- He recorded season highs with 16 points, six field goals and four 3-pointers.
- Owens was 6-for-8 from the floor and 4-for-5 from beyond the arc. He also had three boards.
- The Gaithersburg, MD product sparked a pair of runs off the bench against the Terrapins.
- The Eagles went on a 16-6 run to cut the deficit to 27-25 in the first half. Owens had half of those points with a dunk and a pair of 3-pointers.
- Owens then scored six of the eight BC unanswered points in the second half that gave BC its first lead at 57-56.
- Owens averages 3.7 points and 1.8 rebounds per game in 15.3 minutes.

CLIFFORD TO APPLY FOR REDSHIRT

- Junior **Dennis Clifford** has battled a knee injury the last two seasons.
- During his freshman season, Clifford played in all 31 games and made 25 starts. He averaged 26.9 minutes, 9.1 points and 4.7 rebounds.
- Last year, the Bridgewater, MA product was limited on the court. He only missed three games, but he averaged just 14.6 minutes per game. He averaged 2.8 points and 3.2 rebounds.
- Clifford missed the first 14 games this year but made his season debut against Clemson. He played 12 minutes, and had three rebounds and a block.
- He was a huge factor in the win at Virginia Tech, playing 21 minutes and recording six points and six rebounds.
- The Hokies were 10-for-33 (.303) from the floor when he was in the game. They were 10-for-24 (.417) when he was on the bunch.
- Virginia Tech was also 4-for-15 (.267) on layups, tips, or dunks when Clifford was on the floor.
- Clifford will forego the rest of the season to apply for a redshirt.

CAUDILL HAS CAREER GAMES

- Junior **KC Caudill** recorded 11 points, five rebounds and two assists in 21 minutes of play at USC.
- Caudill is from Brea, CA, which is about 25 miles from Los Angeles and the home of the Trojans.
- In front of friends and family, he set or tied career highs in points, rebounds, assists, field goals (3), free throws made and attempted (5-for-8), and minutes.
- Entering the game, Caudill had not scored more than four points since January 19, 2012 at NC State - his freshman year.
- Caudill played a career-high 23 minutes at Wake Forest on March 1. He had five points and a career-high five rebounds.
- He has averaged 19.7 minutes in the last three games. His career average is 8.1 minutes per game.

THE NEW GUYS

- All four healthy newcomers have spent time on the court this year (freshman **Darryl Hicks** is out for the season recovering from a torn ACL).
- Junior **Alex Dragicevich**, a transfer from Notre Dame, has started 13 times. He is averaging 3.9 points and 1.4 rebounds per game. He had eight points off the bench against Virginia Tech.
- Freshman **Garland Owens** has appeared in 29 games and has four starts. He is averaging 15.3 minutes a contest and scored 16 points against Maryland.
- Freshman **Will Magarity** has played in 29 games, averaging 10.5 minutes. He had a vital offensive rebound and putback with 1:30 left against Florida Atlantic to extend BC's lead to 75-71.
- Freshman **Sam Donahue** made his collegiate debut at Providence and has appeared in 12 contests.

HANLAN NAMED ACC CO-PLAYER OF WEEK

- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** was named Atlantic Coast Conference Co-Player of the Week on November 18.
- Hanlan shared the honor with Duke's Jabari Parker, who was also named Rookie of the Week.
- Hanlan averaged 28.0 points, 4.0 rebounds and 4.0 assists as Boston College went 1-1 last week. He was 15-for-26 from the field (.577), 6-for-14 from 3-point land (.429) and 20-for-23 from the foul line (.870).
- He scored 18 points and dished out a career-high six assists against Toledo.
- He then scored a regular season career-high 38 points (27 after halftime) to lead BC to its first win of the year over Florida Atlantic. He was 11-for-19 from the field and 12-for-14 from the foul line.
- It was the third-most points scored in the ACC this season.

CANADA, EH?

- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** is one of three active players in the ACC to hail from Canada (Florida State's Xavier Rathan-Mayes, Syracuse's Tyler Ennis).
- He is already the career scoring leader for Canadians in the conference with 1,084 points. He topped Duke's Greg Newton who scored 812 points from 1994-97.
- The Aylmer, Quebec (about 10 miles west of Ottawa) product is the 10th player in ACC history from The True North.
- Hanlan also ranked sixth among Canadians nationally in scoring last year. Gonzaga's Kelly Olynyk led the way with 17.6 points per game.

JOE GOES OFF

- Sophomore **Joe Rahon** averaged 10.6 points in the first five games of the season, then he went off for 22 points against Washington in the 2K Classic finale.
- He was particularly good in the first half, scoring 16 points while going 6-for-8 from the floor. He was 4-for-5 from beyond the arc as well.
- Rahon also had four rebounds and three assists.
- The San Diego, Calif., product had a pair of games last year when he hit six 3-pointers.
- Rahon then scored 19 points against Sacred Heart on November 26, including nine in the overtime period. He outscored the Pioneers by himself in overtime, 9-6.
- In those two games, Rahon averaged 20.5 points while going 13-for-20 from the floor (.650), 6-for-11 from 3 (.545) and 9-for-10 (.900) from the foul line.

RAHON NAMED TO ALL-ACC ACADEMIC TEAM

- Sophomore **Joe Rahon** was named to the 2014 All-ACC Academic Men's Basketball Team.
- To be eligible for consideration, a student-athlete must have earned a 3.00 grade point average for the previous semester and maintained a 3.00 cumulative average during his academic career.
- It is the second All-ACC academic honor for Rahon in as many seasons.

JACK MAGEE NAMED ACC LEGEND

- Former men's basketball star **Jack Magee** was named Boston College's representative in the 2014 ACC Men's Basketball Legends Class, announced January 29 by Commissioner John Swofford.
- Magee was the leading scorer on the first Boston College team to reach the NCAA Tournament in 1957-58, averaging 15.5 points per game in leading the Eagles to a 16-6 record in his first of two seasons at BC. He and fellow BC Hall of Famer George Giersch were the heroes of the 1958 game against Holy Cross, when the Eagles defeated the Crusaders, 73-68.
- Magee then led the Eagles to a 17-9 record as a senior, again leading the team in scoring with 13.1 points per game. He earned honorable mention NABC All-District honors in 1958.
- After two years in the Army, Magee returned to BC as an assistant coach to Bob Cousy (1964-66) before becoming head coach at Georgetown, where he posted a six-year record of 68-79 (.463). He led the Hoyas to an 18-7 record in 1969-70.
- He was inducted into the Boston College Varsity Club Athletic Hall of Fame in 1986. Originally a native of The Bronx, N.Y., he currently lives in Fairfax, Va.
- The complete 2014 legends class includes: Wayne "Tree" Rollins (Clemson), Gene Banks (Duke), Al Thornton (Florida State), Travis Best (Georgia Tech), John Lucas (Maryland), Steve Edwards (Miami), Eric Montross (North Carolina), Julius Hodge (NC State), Pat Garrity (Notre Dame), Don Hennon (Pittsburgh), Dave Bing (Syracuse), Terry Holland (Virginia), Bobby Stevens (Virginia Tech), Sam Ivy (Wake Forest).

2012-13 ALL-ACC PERFORMERS

- Junior **Ryan Anderson** earned All-ACC Third Team honors and sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** was the only unanimous choice on the All-ACC Freshman Team last season and was the ACC Freshman of the Year.
- Anderson ranked fourth in the ACC in rebounding (8.0) and eighth in scoring (14.9). He had eight double-doubles last year which ranked sixth in the conference. His nine 20-point games ranked third in the league and his nine 10-rebound games ranked fifth. He was also second in the ACC with three "20 and 10" games.
- Hanlan was the only freshman named on all 77 ballots for the All-Freshman Team. He also received honorable mention recognition on All-ACC voting. Hanlan was the only freshman to rank in the top six in points (15.4), rebounds (4.2) and assists (2.3) among the rookie class. He ranked sixth in the ACC in conference scoring (15.7) and was eighth overall (14.6).
- BC is the only team in the ACC that had a unanimous choice on the All-Freshman Team in each of the last two seasons. Anderson accomplished the same feat in 2011-12.

TWO WOUNDED WARRIORS JOIN EAGLES FOR 2K CLASSIC

- Master Sergeant **William Ramos** and Sergeant **Ryan Casavant** served as honorary captains for Boston College during its four games in the 2K Sports Classic benefiting Wounded Warrior Project. They traveled with the team down to New York City for the two games at Madison Square Garden.
- Ramos served in the Marine Corps for many years and is currently in the Massachusetts Army National Guard as well as an officer at a state prison. Ramos has been deployed during the Gulf War (1990-91) and in Iraq (2004-05). Ramos held various positions throughout his military career including Senior Drill Instructor, Military Ordnance and Military Police Operations. He currently commands the 26th Maneuver Enhancement Brigade (Homeland Response Force) and volunteered to assist at the Boston Marathon as he typically does for many local events. After the tragic events of that morning, he was reactivated for duty throughout the week.
- Casavant served for several years as a Sergeant in the United States Marine Corps and did two combat tours in Afghanistan (2004) and Iraq (2005). Casavant recently finished his undergrad in psychology and sociology and is currently in grad school for Vocational Rehab counseling focusing on veterans. His goal is to continue to serve his country by providing service to those returning home with PTSD. Casavant is active in WWP programs and has attended several BC football games.

THE FRESHMAN OF THE YEAR

- Sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** earned the ACC Freshman of the Year award from both the Atlantic Coast Sports Media Association (ACSMA) and the ACC coaches last season.
- Hanlan earned 43 of the 77 votes cast by ACSMA members. Duke's Rasheed Sulaimon finished second with 15 votes and NC State's T.J. Warren had 12. He received 10 of a possible 11 votes from the coaches.
- Hanlan was the first conference rookie of the year winner for Boston College since Troy Bell won Big East Rookie of the Year honors in 1999-2000. Hanlan was the fifth winner from BC to earn a conference rookie of the year award.
- "It is a great honor for him and well deserved, mostly because he is someone who is putting a great amount of work in to improve both on and off the basketball court," head coach **Steve Donahue** said. "It is also a credit to his teammates for trusting him with the ball quite a bit. Their unselfishness has made him better as well."

SUMMER CAMPS

- There were only three schools in the country to have a player at both the Big Man Skills Academy and the Point Guard Skills Academy this past summer: BC, California and Oregon.
- Junior **Ryan Anderson** participated in the Nike Big Man Skills Academy while sophomore **Olivier Hanlan** took part in the Nike Point Guard Skills Academy.
- In addition, Hanlan was invited to the camps run by Chris Paul and LeBron James.

RAHON'S FIRST YEAR

- **Olivier Hanlan** received a lot of the accolades, but **Joe Rahon** was just as important to the team's success down the stretch.
- Rahon ranked seventh in the ACC in assists (3.7) and eighth in assist/turnover ratio (1.8) while playing a team-high 35.6 minutes a game which ranked third in the conference. He ranked second among conference freshmen in the first two categories.
- He was third on the team with 10.1 points per game which ranked sixth among ACC freshmen.
- Rahon was one of five rookies in the ACC to rank in the top six in two categories (of points, rebounds, assists) among his classmates. He ranked fifth in points and second in assists.

THE ENERGY OF ODIO

- Junior **Eddie Odio** averaged 4.3 points and 3.4 rebounds last season, but his defensive presence and ability to spark the team was his biggest impact.
- Tim Brando nicknamed him "The Human Pogo" for his quick and electric jumping ability.
- Odio, who averaged 19.1 minutes a game last year, put down 20 dunks - 17 in the last 14 games alone.
- In addition, his dunks are huge and ignite the arena. His two slams against Duke landed him on SportsCenter's weekend top 10.
- The Miami, Fla., product can stand in the paint with anyone. He had games of four and six blocks. Those six stuffs against Maryland were the second-most in a game in the ACC last year.

JACKSON'S RANGE

- Junior **Lonnie Jackson** was fourth on team last year with 8.7 points per game, but could take over at any point.
- He averaged a team-high 16.8 points from December 31 to January 16 - a span of five games.
- Jackson scored 22 points at Virginia Tech and then followed that up with a season-high 23 at Wake Forest.
- The Valencia, Calif., product led the team in 3-pointers (65) and free throw percentage (.831). He ranked sixth in the ACC in 3-pointers (2.0).
- During conference games, Jackson ranked fourth in the ACC in 3-point percentage (.432) and seventh in 3-pointers made (2.1).
- He missed the first three games of the season with a hamstring injury. He made his season-debut against Florida Atlantic, playing 16 minutes and handing out a game-high four assists.

HECKMANN'S CONTRIBUTIONS

- Junior **Patrick Heckmann** made 23 starts for the Eagles last year and averaged 8.0 points, 2.5 rebounds and 1.5 assists per game.
- He averaged 6.6 points, 2.3 rebounds and 1.3 assists in league games, and reached double-digit scoring 12 times.
- The Mainz, Germany product spent the summer training with the German national team.

RUBIN LEADS USA TO GOLD IN 19TH MACCABIAH

- Senior **Danny Rubin** scored 25 points to lead the United States past Argentina, 87-76, in the gold medal match of the 19th Maccabiah Games in Jerusalem on July 29, 2013.
- The United States team went 4-1 in pool play with its only loss coming in the opener against Argentina. Rubin broke out when he scored a game-high 22 points against Russia in the fourth game of Group A. He then scored 21 in the finale versus Guinea-Bissau.
- The Americans drew Israel in the semifinals and came away with a 77-73 victory. Rubin scored 11 points in that game. A rematch against Argentina decided the gold medal, and the United States avenged its only loss with an 87-76 triumph. Rubin led the U.S. with 25 points.
- The Chevy Chase, Md., product averaged 15.3 points per game during the tournament.

EAGLES PICKED EIGHTH IN ACC PRESEASON POLL

- Boston College was voted eighth in the Atlantic Coast Conference preseason poll. The Eagles received 457 votes.
- Duke (805 points) was selected to win the regular season conference title and earned 50 first-place votes. Syracuse (753) came in second with three first-place votes and North Carolina (668) rounded out the top three and earned the final first-place vote.
- Virginia (612), Notre Dame (608), Pittsburgh (477) and Maryland (473) were voted fourth, fifth, sixth, and seventh, respectively, before the Eagles.
- The rest of the preseason ballot in order was: Florida State (334), NC State (332), Georgia Tech (311), Miami (224), Wake Forest (220), Clemson (141) and Virginia Tech (65).

ANDERSON NOMINATED FOR GOOD WORKS TEAM

- Junior **Ryan Anderson** has been named a nominee for the 2014 Allstate NABC Good Works Team, announced December 3 by the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC) and Allstate Insurance Company.
- The award recognizes a select group of college basketball student-athletes who have made significant contributions to the greater good of their communities through volunteerism and civic service.
- In its second year, the Allstate NABC and WBCA Good Works Teams honor players at all levels of college basketball who represent the sport's finest in the areas of leadership and charitable achievements amongst their peers. The student-athletes nominated for this prestigious award embody the true spirit of teamwork and giving back.
- The 2014 nominees uphold impressive service resumes detailing unique and inspiring stories of servitude. From volunteering with sick and underprivileged children to lobbying state legislature for new laws that could help save lives, this exceptional group of young men and women demonstrate the positive impact student-athletes can have on and off the court.
- From the 118 NABC nominees and 84 WBCA nominees, special voting panels will select two 10-member teams comprised of five student-athletes from the NCAA Division I level and five student-athletes from NCAA Divisions II, III and the NAIA. The final roster of 20 award recipients will be unveiled in February.

ANDERSON, RAHON AND RUBIN ARE 2013-14 CAPTAINS

- Senior **Danny Rubin**, junior **Ryan Anderson** and sophomore **Joe Rahon** will serve as the captains of the 2013-14 men's basketball team.
- Rubin is the most tenured player on the team. He has appeared in 75 games and made 24 starts. He is the only senior on this year's squad.
- Anderson was an All-ACC Third Team performer last season after averaging 14.9 points and 8.0 rebounds a game. He ranked fourth in the conference in rebounding and free throw attempts, eighth in scoring, and ninth in field goal percentage. The Lakewood, Calif., resident also ranked sixth in the ACC with eight double-doubles. He led the Eagles in rebounding and was second in scoring.
- Rahon was one of two players to start all 33 games last year. He averaged 10.1 points, 3.2 rebounds and 3.7 assists per game. He led the Eagles in minutes (35.6) and assists, was second in steals (33), third in points and fourth in rebounds. Rahon ranked third in the ACC in minutes, seventh in assists and eighth in assist/turnover ratio (1.8). The San Diego, Calif., product ranked second among all ACC freshmen in assists and fifth in points.
- It marks the second time in program history that two players from California will serve as captains. Jared Dudley (San Diego) and Sean Marshall (Rialto) were the captains of the 2006-07 team.

EAGLES IN THE NBA

- There are currently two former Eagles playing professionally in the NBA.
- Jared Dudley was the 22nd overall pick of the 2007 draft, taken by the Charlotte Bobcats. He played for the Phoenix Suns from 2008-13 before he was traded to the LA Clippers prior to the 2013-14 season.
- Reggie Jackson was drafted 24th overall by the Oklahoma City Thunder in 2011.
- Other former Eagles playing professionally around the world include Troy Bell (Italy), Louis Hinnant (Hungary), Sean Marshall (Turkey), Corey Raji (Luxembourg), Tyrese Rice (Israel), Craig Smith (Israel), Joe Trapani (Belgium) and Andrew Van Nest (Austria).

DONAHUE RECOGNIZED BY AMERICAN CANCER SOCIETY

- Head Coach **Steve Donahue** was presented with the 2013 American Cancer Society Sandra C. Labaree New England Volunteer Values Award during the first half of Boston College's football season opener against Villanova.
- The American Cancer Society annually recognizes 45 Society volunteers from New England whose actions and service in the fight against cancer most exemplify the organization's values.
- "I think it's my responsibility with the position I'm in to try and do as much as I can for Coaches vs. Cancer and the American Cancer Society because I think I can make an impact," Donahue said. "If that helps others get involved - which I think it has a tendency to do - then I really feel a deep responsibility to do that. I worked for Fran Dunphy at Penn. I saw how much he was involved, the impact he had and the impact we can make as head coaches against this deadly disease. It's just the right thing to do."
- Donahue has spearheaded the annual Boston College Coaches vs. Cancer 5K Classic and the Coaches vs. Cancer Tip-Off Breakfast. The 5K has raised more than \$16,000 to date with the third annual race being held on September 14.

EAGLE GRADUATION SUCCESS RATE FIFTH IN THE NATION

- Boston College ranks fifth in the nation for overall Graduation Success Rate (GSR) in all sports among FBS (Football Bowl Subdivision) schools, according to data released by the NCAA on October 24. BC's GSR score of 96 was topped only by Notre Dame (99), Duke (98), Stanford (97) and Northwestern (97).
- Only nine other schools received an overall GSR of over 90: Wake Forest (94), Rice (94), Miami, Fla. (92), Vanderbilt (91), Air Force (90), Army (90), Illinois (90), Navy (90), Virginia Tech (90).
- In addition, the football team's score of 94 was best in the Atlantic Coast Conference and tied for third in the nation. Only eight FBS institutions received a football GSR of 90 or better. Those schools are Northwestern (97), Rice (96), Boston College (94), Notre Dame (94), Stanford (93), Air Force (93), Duke (92) and Boise State (91).
- Fourteen BC sports teams received a perfect GSR score of 100. Those teams included men's fencing, men's golf, men's skiing, men's swimming, women's basketball, women's rowing, women's field hockey, women's ice hockey, softball, women's skiing, women's soccer, women's swimming, women's tennis and women's volleyball.
- The NCAA developed the Graduation Success Rate as part of its academic reform initiative to more accurately assess the academic success of student-athletes. The rate holds institutions accountable for transfer students unlike the federal graduation rate. The GSR also accounts for midyear enrollees and is calculated for every sport.

DICK KELLEY, 1965-2014

How many times have we heard the expression “he died doing what he loved”?

For Dick Kelley, who loved working for Boston College - especially with its basketball team - this was not possible. Amyotrophic lateral sclerosis (ALS) robbed him of that ability some time ago. But what happened Thursday evening in a room on the 22nd floor of Massachusetts General Hospital had to come very close. The two people Dick loved most - his parents, Ann and Ed - sat by his hospital bed and relayed play-by-play of the Boston College-Georgia Tech basketball game. Shortly thereafter, Dick closed his eyes one final time and passed peacefully. Boston College basketball; Ann; Ed; heaven.

Though many people have loved Boston College equally, none loved the Jesuit institution more than Dick Kelley. After graduating from BC and working for two years in the BU Sports Information office, Dick returned to 321 Conte Forum and never left. In his 22 years as the primary contact for BC men’s basketball, he touched the lives of hundreds of coaches, co-workers, student-athletes, media members and colleagues. He also contributed mightily to other programs such as men’s ice hockey, soccer and football.

He preached his mantra of “positive and humble” to the likes of Craig Smith, Jared Dudley, Pete Mitchell, Matt Ryan, Mike Mottau, Chris Kreider and hundreds of others, no doubt helping them perfect their grammar and interview skills along the way. The skills he inherited from his teacher parents were evident in his tough love approach with Eagle student-athletes. He once famously told Matt Ryan “You’re a Boston College graduate, why don’t you sound like it once in a while?”.

Dick was well known as a mentor to dozens of sports information student assistants and interns through the years. His no-nonsense, tough love approach fooled few, as his heart of gold inevitably won them over. Many of his protégés have gone on to highly successful careers in college athletics, professional football, network television, journalism and other fields. Dick received many accolades on a professional level and last February was given the US Basketball Writers Association’s Most Courageous Award prior to the BC-Virginia basketball game before the longest standing ovation in the history of Conte Forum. Following the game, which BC won on a last-second shot, the entire team mobbed him on press row, a testament to the program’s affection for a man who devoted so much of his life to his work.

In addition to his parents, Dick is survived by brother Ted and his wife Carrie, brother Patrick, nephews Michael and Ryan and nieces Emma and Meghan.

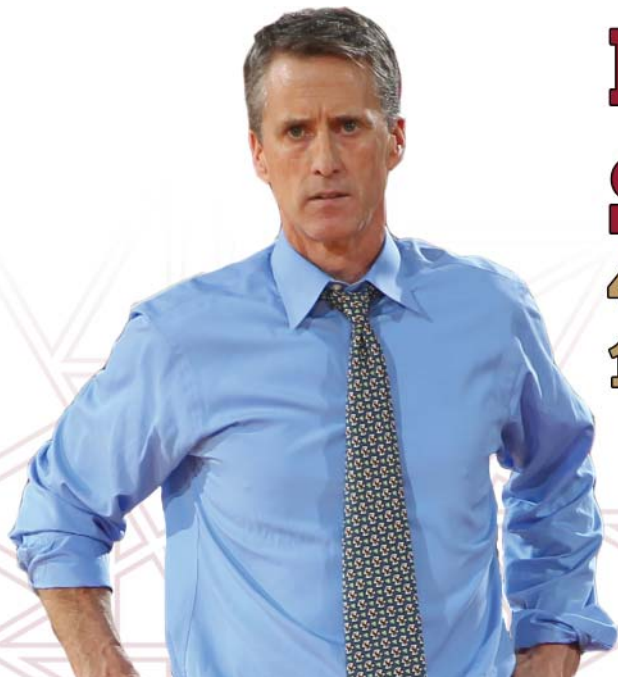

HEAD COACH

STEVE DONAHUE

4th Season at Boston College

14th Season Overall

Steve Donahue is in his fourth season as the head basketball coach at Boston College. He assumed the position on April 7, 2010 after serving 10 years as the head coach at Cornell.

In his first season at the Heights, Donahue guided the Eagles to a 21-13 record, including a 9-7 mark in Atlantic Coast Conference action. BC earned a berth in the National Invitation Tournament and advanced to the second round.

Donahue established an up-tempo style of play that season and allowed the Eagles to lead the ACC in field goals made, and rank second in three-point field goal percentage and assist-turnover ratio, and third in assists.

The 2011-12 Eagles were an entirely new team as Donahue lost 10 lettermen and all five of his starters from the previous year. He brought in 11 newcomers and regularly started four freshmen. BC went 9-22, but beat No. 15 Florida State at home, 64-60, on February 8, 2012.

Last season, BC showed marked improvement and finished the season at 16-17, winning four of its last five games. Olivier Hanlan, who averaged 15.4 points per game, earned ACC Freshman of the Year honors from both the media and coaches, and Ryan Anderson garnered All-ACC Third Team accolades. The Eagles return all but one player from last year's squad and will be the most experienced team in the ACC in 2013-14.

Prior to taking the Boston College job, Donahue led Cornell to three consecutive Ivy League titles (2008-2010) and a trip to the 2010 NCAA Sweet 16.

In his 10 seasons leading the Big Red, Donahue totaled a 146-138 record. Cornell achieved the best Ivy record over the last five years (55-15) and Donahue was recognized for his work by being named a court coach by USA Basketball for the Under-18 national team trials in Washington, D.C., in July of 2008. Donahue coached and/or recruited seven of the school's top 13 all-time leading scorers, two Ivy League Player of the Year selections, two Ivy League Rookie of the Year players, eight NABC All-District selections, six Academic All-District picks and two Academic All-Americans.

Under his guidance, the Big Red recorded a perfect 14-0 Ivy League mark in 2007-08, joining Penn and Princeton as the only league schools to achieve that record. Cornell reached new heights in 2009-10, winning the program's third straight Ivy League title en route to an Ivy League-record 29 wins, the program's first NCAA win, and a trip to the Sweet 16. Cornell climbed as high as No. 22 nationally in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches' Poll, the program's first national ranking in 59 years, and set an Ivy League record for three-pointers in a season (326). The team also set single-season school records in points (2,545), field goals (913), assists (543) and blocked shots (127). The Big Red won the MSG Holiday Festival with a victory over St. John's, Cornell's first win over a Big East school since 1969, and captured a season-opening win at Alabama, the team's first win over a school from the Southeastern Conference since 1972. Cornell went 11-1 at home and won 18 games away from home, the most among any Division I school. The most attention was given to Cornell's effort in a 71-66 loss at No. 1 Kansas, a game the Big Red led with less than one minute to play. The Big Red then shocked the college basketball world as a No. 12 seed, knocking out both fifth-seeded Temple and fourth-seeded Wisconsin by double figures.

For his efforts, Donahue was named the Clair Bee Coach of the Year, the NABC District 4 Coach of the Year, the midseason Hugh Durham Coach of the Year by collegeinsider.com as the top mid-major coach in the country, and was a finalist for both the Hugh Durham Award and the Jim Phelan Award for national coach of the year. Cornell earned its second consecutive Ivy League title in 2008-09, becoming the first team other than Penn or Princeton to win consecutive outright championships in conference history. The Big Red went 21-10 and won the Ancient Eight by three games with its 11-3 mark. It was the first time Cornell had posted consecutive 20-win seasons.

The 2007-08 district Coach of the Year according to the National Association of Basketball Coaches (NABC), the United States Basketball Writers' Association (USBWA) and CollegeInsider.com (Hugh Durham National Mid-Major Coach of the Year finalist), Donahue directed the 2007-08 Big Red to a 22-6 record and the program's first Ivy title in 20 years.

Off the court, Donahue expects his players to succeed in the classroom and contribute in their community. Cornell players made frequent appearances in local schools, speaking to students on the importance of a good education.

Renowned as a top recruiter and for his offensive mind while an assistant at the University of Pennsylvania, Donahue learned the trade from some of the nation's top coaches. Donahue served as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator under Fran Dunphy at Penn for 10 years. During his tenure as a Quaker assistant, he was heavily involved in the recruitment of five of Penn's top 20 all-time scorers. He was also instrumental in the Quakers winning six Ivy League titles in his last eight years there, advancing to the NCAA Tournament five times and earning national recognition with a top 25 ranking.

Prior to joining Dunphy's staff at Penn, Donahue coached for two seasons under Hall of Fame coach Herb Magee at Philadelphia University. During his two seasons there, the Rams won 20 games each season and also competed in the 1989 NCAA Division II tournament.

Donahue served as an assistant for current Lafayette head coach Fran O'Hanlon at Monsignor Bonner HS, helping to guide Bonner to the 1987-88 Philadelphia Catholic League championship. He began his coaching career at Springfield (Pa.) HS under Skip Werley, his former college coach. He served as head coach of the junior varsity and assistant coach for the varsity team for three seasons.

He played both baseball and basketball at Ursinus College, earning four letters in both sports. He served as basketball team captain as a senior. In his freshman season, Donahue helped the basketball squad finish 23-8 and advance to the NCAA Division III tournament's semifinal round. The following year, Ursinus advanced to the tournament's quarterfinal round. He graduated in 1984 with a bachelor's degree in economics and business administration.

Donahue and his wife, Pamela, have four children, Taylor (17), Matthew (16), Katie (11) and Jack (10).
