DR. JULIO FRENK
UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT
 UNIVERSIDAD NACIONAL
 AUTÓNOMA DE MÉXICO, 1979

A fourth-generation physician whose paternal grandparents fled Germany in the early 1930s to build a new life in Mexico, Julio Frenk catalyzed his deep gratitude for the kindness of strangers into a lifelong mission to improve the health, education, and well-being of people around the world.

Dr. Frenk became the sixth president of the University of Miami in August of 2015. He also holds academic appointments as Professor of Public Health Sciences at the Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine and as Professor of Health Sector Management and Policy at the School of Business Administration.

Prior to joining the University of Miami, he was the dean of the Harvard T.H. Chan School of Public Health and the T & G Angelopoulos Professor of Public Health and International Development, a joint appointment with the Harvard Kennedy School of Government.

Julio Frenk served as the Minister of Health of Mexico from 2000 to 2006. There he pursued an ambitious agenda to reform the nation's health system and introduced a program of comprehensive universal coverage, known as Seguro Popular, which expanded access to health care for more than 55 million previously uninsured Mexicans.

He was the founding director-general of the National Institute of Public Health in Mexico, one of the leading institutions of its kind in the developing world. He also served as executive director in charge of Evidence and Information for Policy at the World Health Organization and as senior fellow in the global health program of the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation, among other leadership positions.

Dr. Frenk holds a medical degree from the National University of Mexico, as well as a master of public health and a joint Ph.D. in Medical Care Organization and in Sociology from the University of Michigan. He has received honorary degrees from seven universities.

His scholarly production, which includes over 160 articles in academic journals, as well as many books and book chapters, has been cited more than 15,000 times. In addition, he has written three best-selling novels for youngsters explaining the functions of the human body.

He is a member of the American Academy of Arts and Sciences, the U.S. National Academy of Medicine, and the National Academy of Medicine of Mexico. He serves on the boards of the United Nations Foundation and the Robert Wood Johnson Foundation. He has received numerous recognitions, including the Clinton Global Citizen Award for changing the way practitioners and policy makers across the world think about health, the Bouchet Medal for Outstanding Leadership presented by Yale University for promoting diversity in graduate education, and the Welch-Rose Award for Distinguished Service from the Association of Schools and Programs of Public Health.



DR. MARVIN DAWKINS
FACULTY REPRESENTATIVE
 EDWARD WATERS, 1970

Dr. Marvin Dawkins, a distinguished professor in the Department of Sociology at the University of Miami, is in his seventh year as the Faculty Athletics Representative. He was named to the post in April 2012, replacing Clyde McCoy after his 17 years of service in that role.

In his FAR post, Dawkins is responsible for ensuring the academic integrity of students participating in University athletic programs and helping to oversee institutional control of the Department of Athletics. The Faculty Athletics Representative serves as a liaison between the University and the athletic department. This individual is the University's voting delegate to the ACC and represents UM with the NCAA and ACC.

Dawkins received his doctorate from Florida State and completed his postdoctoral research fellowships at Howard University and The Johns Hopkins University. He previously served on the faculties of the University of Maryland, Old Dominion University and the University of Wisconsin-Parkside.

His research focuses on issues of race and social equity in such areas as education, career aspirations and mobility, substance abuse prevention, and sports. He has published widely in these areas, including his most recent article titled "Race and Pathways to Power in the National Football League" (with Jomillis H. Braddock and Erica Smith), which appears in *American Behavioral Scientist* (2012).

His research on golf includes book chapters, scholarly articles, and the book *African American Golfers During the Jim Crow Era* (Praeger 2000), coauthored with Graham C. Kinloch. Dawkins was recently appointed to the United States Golf Association Museum Committee and is currently completing a study on the media treatment of black golfers from the Jim Crow era to the present.



BLAKE JAMES
DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS
 MINNESOTA STATE -
 MANKATO, 1992

Since taking over as the University of Miami's Director of Athletics in 2013, Blake James has transformed The U, spearheading improvement in all aspects of the department, including postseason appearances, student-athlete support, facility upgrades, ticket sales and academic achievement.

In the most recent academic year, Miami continued to achieve excellence both on and off the field. UM's football team won 10 games for the first time since 2003, played in the ACC Championship Game for the first time and earned an invitation to the Capital One Orange Bowl. Head coach Mark Richt, who James hired in 2016, was named ACC Coach of the Year and Walter Camp National Coach of the Year.

That momentum has carried well into the off-season as the Hurricanes are poised to sell out football season tickets for the first time at Hard Rock Stadium in 2018. Miami is also slated to open the new, state-of-the-art Carol Soffer Football Indoor Practice Facility this fall.

In 2017-18, Miami was one of only three schools in the nation to have its football team play in a New Year's Six bowl game and advance both its men's and women's basketball teams to the NCAA Tournament. Overall, 14 of UM's 18 teams advanced to postseason play. Hurricane student-athletes earned two ACC Player of the Year honors, 64 All-ACC selections, nine individual ACC titles and 18 All-America accolades.

Miami's recent success continues to garner both James and UM national recognition. In 2017, James was selected as one of four Division I recipients of the 2016-17 Under Armour Athletic Director of the Year award, an honor given by the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA). James is currently serving a two-year term as Chair of the NCAA Division I Council, the group responsible for the day-to-day decision-making for all of Division I Athletics.

James has always placed a strong emphasis on academics and community outreach during his five-plus years as Miami's Director of Athletics. In the most recent Graduation Success Rate figures released by the NCAA, Miami student-athletes posted a GSR mark of 91 percent. Twelve Hurricane teams posted perfect 2016-17 scores on the NCAA's latest Academic Progress Report (APR). Miami's cumulative GPA for the 2018 spring semester was 3.09 – the ninth consecutive cumulative GPA of 3.0 or higher. Miami's football program received the 2016 AFCA Academic Achievement Award. In 2018, Hurricane student-athletes ranked first among all Division I schools in the NCAA Team Works Helper Helper Community Service Competition, participating in more than 200 events and logging more than 3,382 hours of community service.

During James' tenure, Miami has completed several facility enhancements, including the opening of the Schwartz Center for Athletic Excellence; the completion of the student-athlete training table, fueling station and dining hall; new artificial and natural playing surfaces and lights on the Greentree Practice Fields and a center-hung scoreboard inside the Watson Center.

James has led multiple, multi-million dollar capital renovation projects, including renovations of the Hecht Center and the men's and women's basketball offices. Over the past year, Miami Athletics has secured over \$34 million in gifts to fund the Carol Soffer Football Indoor Practice Facility, including the largest donation in department history – a \$14 million gift from the Soffer Family, which served as the lead gift for the facility.

Under James' leadership, the Hurricane Club continues to

support UM's student-athletes and coaches in record numbers. The Hurricane Club completed a record-setting year in 2016-17, raising an all-time record \$49 million. Its current membership of more than 11,500 represents an over 100-percent jump from its membership of 5,140 in 2010.

Ticket sales are also at an all-time high. In 2017, the Hurricanes averaged 58,682 fans last year at Hard Rock, which ranked second in the nation at stadiums with seating capacities below 70,000. In 2016, Miami ranked first among Power 5 programs in attendance percentage increase (23 percent) over 2015 attendance. The Hurricanes have also sold out their men's basketball season tickets for three consecutive seasons for the first time ever.

In addition, Miami has built its broadcast, communications and marketing departments into one of the nation's leaders in digital media and video production. Miami continually ranks at the top of the conference in number of live ACC Network Extra broadcasts each year. James was also instrumental in helping Miami strike one of the largest apparel deals in the country with adidas.

Prior to being named AD, James served Miami Athletics in the roles of Interim AD and Senior Associate AD for Development and Ticket Operations, where he oversaw the day-to-day operations of development, ticket sales and ticket operations. He also was a member of the Hurricanes' senior staff and provided sport supervision.

James returned to UM after spending seven years at the University of Maine, where he first served as Senior Associate Athletic Director before serving as Director of Athletics from 2005 to 2010. During his tenure at Maine, athletics experienced tremendous success, including three trips to the Frozen Four for the men's ice hockey program and NCAA playoff berths for football, baseball (two), women's basketball and softball. James implemented a comprehensive \$17 million facility improvement plan at Maine, which included an indoor practice facility and numerous other facility upgrades and renovations. Academically, the program flourished, earning the conference academic cup twice and student-athletes maintaining a 3.0 GPA or above.

Prior to his stint at Maine, James worked in athletic development at Providence College, where he established the "Friars Forever" campaign and the Friar Athletic Fund.

James is no stranger to South Florida, beginning his athletic career with UM, working in ticket sales, corporate sales and athletic development. In 1995, he was hired as Miami's Director of Ticket Sales, serving in that capacity until 1997, when he was named an athletic development officer at the University of Nebraska. He returned to Miami in 1998 as the Director of Major Gifts and Corporate Sales and was promoted to the Director of Athletic Development at Miami in 2000 before moving on to Providence in 2002.

James graduated from Minnesota State University - Mankato with a Bachelor's degree in Marketing in 1992 and later received his Master's degree in Sports Administration from St. Thomas University in 1994. He and his wife, Kelly, have two children: daughter, Haley, and son, Ryan.



JENNIFER STRAWLEY
DEPUTY AD / CHIEF
OPERATING OFFICER
PENNSYLVANIA, 1998

Jennifer Strawley joined the University of Miami on June 18, 2012 and currently serves as Deputy Director of Athletics and Chief Operating Officer. She also serves as the departments Senior Woman Administrator.

Serving as the second-in-command, Strawley provides strategic direction for the department and assists the Director of Athletics with the day-to-day operations. She is the sport administrator for football, women's basketball and women's tennis. Strawley leads the department's strategic planning initiatives, policy development and implementation, coordination of department and coaches meetings and gender equity and inclusion initiatives. She oversees the areas of human resources, sports medicine, academic services, equipment / Adidas, video services and student-athlete development, as well as serves as a liaison to various campus groups, the ACC and the NCAA.

Strawley played a key role in the hiring of head football coach Mark Richt, serving on the selection committee. In addition, she was instrumental in the development of Miami's annual Celebration of Women's Athletics recognizing the achievements of Miami's female student-athletes while raising money to support women's athletics.

Actively engaged in intercollegiate athletics nationally, Strawley has served on various committees within the NCAA and the ACC. She currently serves on the ACC Television Committee, the ACC Women's Basketball foresight committee, the ACC Equity Committee, the ACC Infractions and Sportsmanship Review Committee, the ACC Football Schedulers Group, and the NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Oversight Committee. She also serves on the board of directors for Women's Leaders in College Sports and the Women's Basketball Coaches Association.

Prior to UM, Strawley concluded her second tour with the NCAA as the Director of Academic and Membership Affairs. In this role, Strawley was instrumental in providing leadership in the areas of academic governance and development of academic policy. Strawley served on the senior management team and was involved in a variety of other internal operations.

Strawley rejoined the NCAA after serving as the Associate Athletics Director for Intercollegiate Sport Programs and Senior Woman Administrator at Columbia University from 2007-10. While at Columbia, she oversaw numerous varsity sport programs including football and was the athletics program liaison for gender equity and diversity initiatives. Strawley was a member of the department's Executive Management Team.

Prior to her tenure at Columbia, Strawley was the Director of Membership Services and Student-Athlete Reinstatement at the NCAA. In this role, she provided oversight of the student-athlete reinstatement process and was instrumental in the implementation of the student first philosophy. Strawley served as a liaison to numerous NCAA committees and task forces, including the NCAA Divisions I, II and III Student-Athlete Reinstatement Committees and the NCAA Olympic Sports Liaison Committee.

Strawley first joined the NCAA in 1998 as an enforcement services intern. She is a 1998 graduate of the University of Pennsylvania where she earned her Bachelor of Arts degree in history. During her time at Pennsylvania, she was a two-year captain for the Quakers' softball team. Strawley was inducted into the William Tennent High School Hall of Fame in of 2014.



JASON LAYTON
DEPUTY AD / CHIEF
FINANCIAL OFFICER
SAINT LEO, 1999

Jason Layton serves as the University of Miami Deputy Director of Athletics and Chief Financial Officer, a position he took over in August 2017. He initially joined Miami in December 2014 as the Senior Associate Athletics Director for Communications and Sales.

In his current position, Layton is responsible for managing the department's business office, marketing, digital strategies, communications, ticket sales, ticket operations, client experience, video production and broadcast departments.

Additionally, Layton has oversight of all departmental licensing matters, Hurricane Sports Properties, serves as the department ACC Network liaison and is the sport administrator for men's basketball.

Since his arrival, Miami has seen exceptional growth in ticket sales and video production services in both content and broadcast with ESPN and the newly formed ACC Network.

Under his watch, Miami has seen an increased level of season ticket sales in football and men's basketball. Under Layton's guidance, Miami saw an unprecedented growth in football attendance during the 2016 season, as the Hurricanes totaled 42,000 season ticket holders and averaged 58,572 fans per game – the 27th-highest total in the nation and leader among all Power Five schools in percentage increase on a year-to-year basis (23 percent).

In addition, Miami sold out its entire 2015-16 and 2016-17 men's basketball season ticket allotment, marking the first time in Hurricane Athletics history that a team has sold out its entire season ticket allotment in back-to-back seasons.

Layton also serves as the primary contact for ESPN with the recent launch of the ACC Network, first in digital format in August 2016 and building to the linear network in fall of 2019. Since 2015, Miami has produced over 200 live events on ESPN3/ACC Network Extra – a figure that ranks near the top of all ACC schools.

Layton, a Florida native, arrived in Miami after spending the 2013 and 2014 seasons at Colorado State University where he served as the department's Senior Associate Athletics Director for Sales and Marketing. During his time in Fort Collins, Colo., Layton's ticket sales plans drove double-digit increases in football, volleyball, men's basketball and women's basketball revenue and tickets sold.

Before his arrival at Colorado State, Layton spent 13 years with the Tampa Bay Buccaneers. In his 13 years with the club, he handled a variety of responsibilities from sales, marketing, ticketing and luxury suite operations to advertising, accounting, finance and purchasing. Layton began his career with the Buccaneers as a customer service representative in 1999 before elevating to the role of Senior Director of Business Administration in 2011. Layton received his bachelor's and master's degrees from Saint Leo University in Saint Leo, Fla.



DAVID WYMAN
SENIOR ASSOCIATE AD
ACADEMIC SERVICES
 FLORIDA A&M, 1994

"When you do the right things, the right things happen."

David Wyman has empowered over 2,000 student-athletes with his signature creed. Now in his 23rd year, Wyman has advised and mentored a diverse population of student-athletes to become skilled professionals in many different careers.

Wyman is the Senior Associate Athletic Director for Academic Services at the University of Miami, a position he was promoted to in August 2017. Wyman is also the sport administrator for Miami's volleyball program.

He began his own career as an intern, and was quickly promoted to the full-time staff after working just two months in the academic services division. Wyman became the assistant director two years later, supervising the tutorial program and advising both the football and men's basketball teams. He was then promoted to associate director, taking on the responsibility of coordinating the NCAA eligibility certification for all 400 student-athletes.

Since 2004, Wyman has managed the Division of Athletic Academic Services, currently leading a staff of eight full-time professionals. Under his leadership, the department and sport programs have gained national recognition and honors for continued growth in both academic progress rates (APR) and graduation success.

A 2016 inductee to the Iron Arrow Society, Wyman has helped guide the football team to a pair AFCA Academic Achievement Awards for graduating 100 percent of student-athletes in the freshman classes of 2002 and 2009.

MARK RICHT

HEAD COACH | THIRD SEASON AT MIAMI (18TH OVERALL) | 171-63 (.731)

In three seasons as head coach, Mark Richt has made an indelible impact on his alma mater's football program -- both on and off the field.

Since returning home in December 2015, Richt has posted a 26-12 record - among the best starts in Miami history - and a stretch that included a 15-game winning streak, UM's longest since 2002.

Miami's standout defense was ranked No. 2 in total defense nationally in 2018, and ranked No. 1 in several categories, including tackles for loss, third down conversion defense and passing yards allowed. Defensive tackle Gerald Willis earned All-America honors from several outlets, while 11 Hurricanes earned all-conference honors - including linebacker Shaq Quarterman, who was named to the 2018 All-ACC First Team.

The Hurricanes won 10 games in 2017, climbing as high as second in the College Football Playoff rankings. Miami captured the Atlantic Coast Conference's Coastal Division for the first time in its history and earned an invitation to the Capital One Orange Bowl for the first time in 13 years. Richt won 2017 ACC Coach of the Year honors and was also named the 2017 Walter Camp Coach of the Year.

Off the field, Richt has energized the program, from supporting the fundraising efforts for the Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility to launching The U Network, which assists former Hurricanes in networking and career placement after their playing careers have concluded. Miami was one of three schools, along with Stanford and Northwestern, to earn the 2016 American Football Coaches Association (AFCA) Academic Achievement Award. In addition, the Hurricanes ranked first among all FBS programs in 2016 in the NCAA Team Works Helper Helper Community Service Competition, and helped Miami finish first among Division I schools overall in 2018.

Richt was named the University of Miami's 24th head football coach on Dec. 4, 2015. His hiring provided immediate dividends as the Hurricanes posted a 9-4 record in his first season in Coral Gables. Miami then defeated West Virginia, 31-14, in the Russell Athletic Bowl for the program's first bowl victory in 10 years. The Hurricanes were ranked No. 20 in the final Associated Press poll and No. 23 in the final Amway Coaches Poll -

the program's first season-ending rankings since 2009.

Miami had 10 players earned ACSMA All-ACC honors in 2016, while quarterback Brad Kaaya became Miami's all-time passing yards leader. Freshman wide receiver Ahmmon Richards broke the 31-year-old freshman receiving record at Miami originally set by Michael Irvin, while sophomore running back Mark Walton became the 11th 1,000-yard rusher in program history.

Six Hurricanes were selected in the 2018 NFL Draft. Nine Hurricanes were selected in the 2017 NFL Draft, the most for Miami since 2006, including first-round pick David Njoku to the Cleveland Browns. Richt has had 99 of his players drafted as a head coach, including 14 first-round picks.

Richt, born in Omaha, Neb., and raised in Boca Raton, Fla., returned to his alma mater after leading the University of Georgia football program for the previous 15 years. He compiled a 145-51 overall record and an 85-40 mark in Southeastern Conference play. Georgia won two SEC championships, six SEC East titles and nine bowl games under Richt, and finished the season in the Associated Press Top-10 rankings seven times.

Richt's 164 career wins rank fourth among active FBS head coaches and his .744 winning percentage ranks as the seventh best among current FBS coaches with at least five years of experience. Richt is one of only seven head coaches in SEC history to record four straight 10-win seasons (2002-05).

Richt coached some of the greatest quarterbacks in Georgia history, including David Greene, a four-year starter who left Athens as the then-winningest quarterback in NCAA history with 42 career wins. Aaron Murray, also a four-year starter, is the SEC's all-time leader in passing yards (13,166) and touchdown passes (121). Matthew Stafford threw for 3,459 yards and 25 touchdowns (then a school record) as a junior for the Bulldogs.

Overall, four of Georgia's quarterbacks under Richt were drafted - Greene (Seattle), Murray (Kansas City), D.J. Shockley (Atlanta), and Stafford, who was the top overall pick in the draft in 2009 by the Detroit Lions.

During his tenure in Athens, 85 of Richt's players were selected in the NFL Draft, including eight chosen in the 2002 and 2013 NFL Drafts – the most Georgia players ever selected in a single year. Richt also placed a strong emphasis on academics as 292 Georgia players earned their degrees during his tenure.

In 2016, Richt was named the first-ever honorary head coach of the Allstate AFCA Good Works Team for his commitment to giving back to others. In 2013, Richt received the Stallings Award given for commitment to humanitarian and community service efforts, and in 2010, he was named to the AFCA Board of Trustees.

Before his arrival at Georgia, Richt spent 11 seasons at Florida State, the last seven as the offensive coordinator. In his time in Tallahassee, the Seminoles finished in the nation's top five in scoring offense on five occasions, top 12 in total offense five times and top 12 in passing offense five times. FSU won two national championships (1993, 1999) and played for the national championship in 2000. The 2000 team finished the regular season ranked first nationally in total offense (549.0 ypg), first in passing offense (384.0 ypg), and third in scoring offense (42.4 ypg).

Richt launched his coaching career at Florida State, first as a graduate assistant from 1985-86 and then as a volunteer assistant from 1987-88. He spent the 1989 season as the offensive coordinator at East

Carolina before returning to FSU as the quarterbacks coach.

Richt coached two quarterbacks to the Heisman Trophy – Charlie Ward in 1993 and Chris Weinke in 2000. Quarterback Casey Weldon finished runner-up for the Heisman in 1991 under his tutelage. He also sent six FSU quarterbacks into the NFL between 1987 and 2000. Brad Johnson (now Richt's brother-in-law) was a Pro Bowl selection for Washington in 2000 and led the Tampa Bay Buccaneers to a Super Bowl triumph in 2003. Other Richt pro protégés included Danny Kanell (New York Giants), Danny McManus (Kansas City Chiefs), Peter Tom Willis (Chicago Bears), Weinke (Carolina Panthers) and Weldon (Tampa Bay Buccaneers).

Richt played quarterback for the Hurricanes under legendary head coach Howard Schnellenberger. He spent most of his career at Miami as a backup to Pro Football Hall of Famer and former Buffalo Bills star Jim Kelly. In one of Richt's years at Miami, his teammates included Kelly, Testaverde and Bernie Kosar, as well as quarterbacks coach Earl Morrall.

Richt is married to the former Katharyn Francis of Tallahassee. The couple has four children – Jonathan, David, Zach, and Anya. Jon, the Miami quarterbacks coach, was married to the former Anna Cearley in May 2010. They have two daughters, Jady and Zoe.

Manny Diaz is in his third and final season as the Hurricanes' defensive coordinator; Diaz accepted the head coaching position at Temple University on Thurs., Dec. 13.

In addition to his duties as Miami's defensive coordinator, Diaz coaches the linebackers.

Continuing the impressive trends from Diaz's first two years running the operation, Miami delivered another stellar season on defense in 2018. The Hurricanes ranked No. 2 in total defense and ranked No. 1 in several categories, including tackles for loss, third down conversion percentage and passing yards allowed. Defensive tackle Gerald Willis earned All-American honors from several outlets while linebacker Shaq Quarterman was named to the All-ACC First Team - one of eight all-conference picks.

The Hurricanes ranked among the nation's leaders in several defensive categories in 2017, including first nationally in team sacks, third nationally in tackles for loss and ninth nationally in opponent yards per play. Five Hurricanes on the defensive side of the ball earned 2017 All-ACC honors while another three picked up Honorable Mention recognition. Thanks in large part to his dominating unit, Miami also ranked No. 5 nationally in turnover margin, No. 8 nationally in fumbles recovered and No. 15 nationally in passes intercepted.

Miami's defense enjoyed vast improvements under Diaz' watch and served as one of the top units both in the ACC and nationally in his first season in 2016. At the conclusion of the 2016 season, Miami was ranked No. 20 in total defense (up from No. 69 the previous season), No. 9 in yards per play (No. 86 in 2015), No. 12 in scoring defense (No. 77 in 2015), No. 5 in tackles for loss (No. 105 in 2015), No. 22 in team sacks (No. 70 in 2015) and tied for No. 8 in defensive touchdowns allowed (No. 61 in 2015).

Miami was the only team in the country to start three true freshmen linebackers, and the Hurricanes' trio of Zach McCloud, Michael Pinckney and Shaquille Quarterman helped anchor the unit. Three defensive players earned ACSMA All-ACC honors - senior defensive backs Corn Elder (second team) and Rayshawn Jenkins

(honorable mention) and Quarterman at linebacker (honorable mention).

Diaz, the son of the former mayor of Miami, Manny Diaz, returned home to South Florida after 18 years of defensive experience. During his 19-year coaching career, Diaz has coached in 16 bowl games, amassing a 13-3 record in bowls, and has coached numerous all-conference and NFL players at six collegiate institutions.

In 2015, Diaz's defensive unit helped Mississippi State to a 9-4 record and a victory over NC State in the Belk Bowl. His defensive unit held opponents to just 23.2 points per game and ranked in the nation's top 10 in red zone defense and tackles for loss.

Before a 2014 stop at Louisiana Tech, Diaz coached three seasons at Texas (2011-13). His 2011 defensive unit ranked ninth in total yards per play.

In 2010, during his first stint at Mississippi State, Diaz guided a defense that ranked 22nd in the nation in scoring defense (19.9 ppg), 17th in rushing defense (214.9 ypg) and 17th in tackles for loss (7.0 pg). MSU also finished ranked 13th in red-zone defense (.730) and 22nd in turnovers forced (.28) nationally in 2010.

Before his first stop at Mississippi State, Diaz spent four seasons as defensive coordinator at Middle Tennessee State. Diaz coached linebackers for two years after mentoring the safeties during his first two years.

In four years under Diaz, MTSU's defense led its conference in sacks and tackles for loss twice, and finished no lower than third in the league in either category during his tenure. In 2009, the Blue Raiders finished second nationally in tackles for loss.

Before joining Middle Tennessee, Diaz played a significant role for one of the country's top-ranked defenses by coaching safeties in 2004-05 and handling the linebackers in 2002-03 for NC State.

Diaz spent the 2000 and 2001 seasons at NCSU as a graduate assistant.

Diaz began his coaching career at Florida State in 1998. In his two years as a graduate assistant, he was on the same coaching staff as Miami head coach Mark Richt and was part of the Seminoles' national title-winning coaching staff in 1999.

Diaz and his wife Stephanie have three sons: Colin, Gavin and Manny.



THOMAS BROWN

Offensive Coordinator/Running Backs | Third Season at Miami (8th Overall)

Thomas Brown is in his third season as the Hurricanes' offensive coordinator. In addition to his duties as Miami's offensive coordinator, Brown also coaches the running backs.

Running back Travis Homer continued his ascent as one of the nation's top running backs in 2018, passing Miami legend Frank Gore in career rushing yards (1,979) and earning All-ACC second-team honors for the second straight year. True freshman tight end Brevin Jordan enjoyed a dominant rookie season and was also selected to the All-ACC Second Team.

Miami's offense enjoyed a strong 2017 under his guidance, with Homer earning second-team All-ACC recognition despite taking over as starting running back five games into the season due to a season-ending injury to running back Mark Walton.

Under his watch in 2016, sophomore running back Mark Walton became just the 11th running back in Miami history to rush for 1,000 yards in a season. Walton rushed for 1,117 yards and 14 touchdowns, averaging 5.3 yards per carry.

Brown spent the 2015 campaign on Mark Richt's staff at Georgia where he coached the Bulldog running backs. During Brown's time with the Bulldogs, Georgia rushed for 2,513 yards (194.3 yards per game).

In 2015, he oversaw running back Sony Michel as he rushed for 1,076 yards. Michel became the 13th Bulldog in school history to rush for at least 1,000 yards in a season.

Before arriving at Georgia, Brown coached Heisman Trophy runner-up Melvin Gordon at Wisconsin in 2014. Gordon posted the second-best season ever by a running back with 2,587 rushing yards and 32 total touchdowns. He and sophomore Corey Clement combined to run for 3,536 yards to break the single-season Football Bowl Subdivision record for rushing yards by teammates that had been set the year before by Gordon and James White (3,053 yards).

The Badgers posted the two most prolific rushing performances in the country in 2014 with a school-record 644 rushing yards vs. Bowling Green and 581 vs. Nebraska, and their average of 6.91 yards per rushing attempt ranked as the fourth-best mark in FBS history.

Before joining the Wisconsin staff, Brown served as the running backs coach at Marshall in 2013 and at UT Chattanooga in 2012. He spent the 2011 season as an assistant strength and conditioning coach at Georgia.

At Marshall, Brown helped direct Conference USA's second-ranked rushing offense which averaged 205.9 rushing yards per game (ranked 24th nationally). The Herd won the C-USA East Division title with a 7-1 record and defeated Maryland, 31-20, in the Military Bowl. Brown guided Essray Taliaferro to a season that saw him average 5.2 yards per carry and score 10 touchdowns while amassing 1,140 rushing yards. Marshall was one of just seven FBS teams to boast three running backs that rushed for at least 500 yards in 2013 - and was the lone program outside the Power Five conferences to accomplish the feat.

A native of Atlanta, Ga., Brown starred at Tucker High School before enrolling at Georgia and helping the Bulldogs to the 2005 Southeastern Conference championship. He finished his career as the fifth-leading rusher in Georgia history with 2,646 career yards and led the Bulldogs in rushing in 2005 and 2006. For his career, Brown averaged 5.0 yards per carry and scored 25 touchdowns. He was elected by his teammates as the permanent offensive team captain in 2007.

He was selected in the sixth round of the 2008 NFL Draft by the Atlanta Falcons and spent the 2009 season with the Cleveland Browns before retiring to pursue coaching opportunities.

Brown earned his bachelor's degree in speech communications from UGA. He and his wife, Jessica, have three children: Orlando, Tyson and Judah.

Ron Dugans is in his third season as the Hurricanes' wide receivers coach. In addition to his duties as Miami's wide receivers coach, Dugans also serves as the team's co-offensive coordinator.

Under his watch, wide receiver Lawrence Cager enjoyed a career year in 2018, leading Miami and ranking among the ACC's leaders in touchdowns. Cager set career marks for catches and receiving yards. Three Hurricanes on the offensive side of the ball earned All-ACC recognition at the end of the season, including second-team selections Travis Homer and Brevin Jordan.

Miami's offense enjoyed a prolific 2017, including a breakout season from senior wide receiver Braxton Berrios, who earned All-ACC recognition. Berrios posted career-high totals in catches (52), yards (634) and touchdowns (nine), leading Miami in each category on his way to becoming a Campbell Trophy finalist and the Jim Tatum Award recipient from the ACC.

Dugans guided Ahmmon Richards to freshman All-America honors and second-team ACSMA All-ACC honors his first season, as Richards set the UM freshman all-time receiving mark with 934 yards. Senior Stacy Coley, who became just the eighth Hurricane to ever top 2,000 career yards - including a career-best 754 under Dugans' watch in 2016 - was named to the All-ACC Third Team.

Dugans spent the 2016 and 2017 seasons as Miami's wide receivers coach / passing game coordinator.

Dugans, a former wide receiver with the Cincinnati Bengals, has made previous stops at Florida State, Georgia Southern, Louisville and USF.

The Tallahassee native spent the 2014 and 2015 seasons at USF, where he helped the Bulls to an 8-5 record and an appearance in the 2015 Miami Beach Bowl. Under Dugans' direction in 2015, junior wide receiver Rodney Adams posted a career-high 822 yards and hauled in a school-record nine receiving touchdowns.

In his first season in Tampa, Dugans helped guide wide receiver Andre

Davis to a then-school record seven touchdown catches in 2014 despite Davis missing four games with an injury.

Before his two-year stint at USF, Dugans spent three years at Louisville where he served as an assistant on Charlie Strong's staff from 2010-13.

During his final two seasons at U of L, the Cardinals posted a 23-3 record, including an 11-2 mark and a win in the 2013 Sugar Bowl. He guided wide receiver DeVante Parker to first-team All-American Athletic Conference honors in 2013, as the junior caught 55 passes for 885 yards and 12 touchdowns. Parker, who was also a 2012 first-team All-BIG EAST selection after posting 10 touchdown receptions, logged 28 touchdown catches in his first three seasons.

Prior to his time at Louisville, Dugans coached wide receivers at Georgia Southern (2007-09) for three seasons. Under Dugans' guidance, wide receiver Raja Andrews broke several school records during his senior campaign, en route to finishing 15th nationally in receptions per game and 20th in receiving yards.

Dugans served as a coaching assistant with the NFL's Cincinnati Bengals during the 2007 season. Prior to that, he coached at his alma mater, Florida State. He spent the 2006 season as a graduate assistant coach on offense.

Dugans reunites with Richt after he played for the Hurricanes' coach during his time as offensive coordinator at Florida State.

As a player from 1995-99, Dugans played his first two seasons at FSU before taking a medical redshirt during the 1997 campaign. He returned as a starting wide receiver his final two years from 1998-99 and posted 105 receptions for 1,520 yards and seven touchdowns in his career. He caught six passes for 135 yards in the 1999 Fiesta Bowl BCS National Championship Game against Tennessee and tallied five receptions for 99 yards and two touchdowns in the 2000 Sugar Bowl BCS National Championship Game.

Todd Hartley is in his third year as the Hurricanes' special teams coordinator and tight ends coach.

Hartley guided senior tight end Christopher Herndon IV to a breakout year in 2017 that culminated in All-ACC second-team recognition, while senior kicker Michael Badgley was named to the All-ACC First Team. Badgley became Miami's all-time leader in career field goals made and points scored in his final year.

Under his watch, redshirt sophomore tight end David Njoku earned ACSMA All-ACC Honorable Mention recognition with 698 receiving yards and eight touchdowns in 2016.

Punter Justin Vogel averaged a career-best 43.8 yards per punt, which ranked 21st nationally, while Braxton Berrios' average of 11.3 yards per punt return were the 11th-most nationwide. Vogel earned ACSMA All-ACC second-team honors.

Hartley arrived in Miami after serving as Georgia's director of recruiting in 2015.

Before his return to Georgia, Hartley spent four years at Marshall serving as the tight ends coach and recruiting coordinator from 2013-14. He began his tenure at Marshall as the team's defensive assistant and safeties coach.

In 2014, he coached punter Tyler Williams to first-team All-Conference USA honors and tight end Eric Frohnapfel to C-USA and honorable mention All-Conference USA honors, making it the fourth straight year he coached at least one all-league student-athlete (2013-tight end Gator Hoskins, 2012-safety Dominick LeGrande and 2011-safety Omar Brown).

His punt unit tied for first in the league in average (43.23) and his kickoff return unit ranked second in the league with a 24.61-yard average. Kickoff return man Deandre Reaves totaled 931 return yards, breaking his school record of 924 from 2013. His extra-point/field goal unit set school records in extra points made

(83) and kick points (133). He also coached tight end Ryan Yurachek to Conference USA All-Freshman honors. Prior to the season, his recruiting class was ranked as the best in Conference USA by various recruiting services by a wide margin and among the best within the Group of Five.

In 2013, Hartley mentored Hoskins, a two-time John Mackey Award Watch List honoree who secured a spot on the award's semifinalist list as a senior. A third-team CollegeSportsMadness.com All-American and first-team All-Conference USA selection, the Gainesville, Fla., native finished his career with 28 touchdowns on 99 receptions totaling 1,318 yards. The only player in Herd history to top Hoskins' 28.3 percent touchdown-catches ratio was Randy Moss (31.5 percent on 168 receptions, 53 touchdown catches). His 28 touchdown catches rank third in Herd history (Moss 53, Darius Watts 47). He finished with 15 touchdown catches as a senior (fifth-most at Marshall for a single season), a total that was tied for third nationally and the most among tight ends by seven. That season, his kickoff return unit finished third in Conference USA with a 23.85-yard average.

Georgia had an 11-win season and tallied three bowl victories during Hartley's years working with the Bulldogs, including a 41-10 rout of No. 10 Hawaii in the 2008 Sugar Bowl. He was instrumental in preparation of the Georgia defense for the 2009 Independence Bowl at a time only one full-time assistant was on staff.

Hartley originally joined the Bulldogs as a student assistant at the end of the 2005 season and worked with the offense and special teams until the spring of 2008.

Hartley graduated from Georgia with a degree in health and physical education in May, 2008. Hartley and his wife, Jessica, have four children: Tucker, Tenley, Teagan and Tatum.

After Miami's defense delivered another standout season in 2018, Patke was elevated to the position of co-defensive coordinator on Fri., Dec. 14.

In his former role, Patke worked directly with Miami defensive coordinator Manny Diaz and assisted with the Hurricane linebackers.

In addition, Patke broke down film and provided scouting reports to the defensive staff.

Patke arrived in Coral Gables after he spent the 2015 season at Mississippi State where he also worked with Diaz on the defensive side of the ball, serving as a graduate assistant.

During his lone season in Starkville, Patke helped guide the Bulldogs to a 9-4 record and a victory in the 2015 Belk Bowl in Charlotte, N.C. In addition, the Bulldogs' set the school record for tackles for loss and ranked 10th nationally during the 2015 campaign.

Before joining the coaching staff at Mississippi State, Patke also worked with Diaz at Louisiana Tech during the 2014 campaign and helped guide the Bulldogs to a 9-5 record. Louisiana Tech also captured the 2014 Heart of Dallas Bowl, defeating Illinois 35-18.

Louisiana Tech defensive unit ranked No. 1 in the country in turnovers gained and interceptions. The Bulldogs also ranked second nationally in tackles for loss.

Patke began his coaching career in 2011 at University of The Incarnate Word, working with current Miami safety coach Ephraim Banda. He spent two years at UIW and earned his master's degree in business administration with an emphasis on sports management.

Patke received his undergraduate degree in business administration from Stephen F. Austin State University in 2008. He also played linebacker at SFA for four years (2004-08) and was a three-year starter.

The Hurricanes ranked No. 2 in total defense and ranked No. 1 in several categories, including tackles for loss, third down conversion percentage and passing yards allowed.

Patke joined the Miami football coaching staff before the start of spring practice in 2016 and served as the team's quality control analyst for Hurricanes' defensive unit for the 2016 and 2017 seasons.

In Patke's second season as a quality control analyst in 2017, the Hurricanes ranked among the nation's leaders in several defensive categories, including first nationally in team sacks, third nationally in tackles for loss and ninth nationally in opponent yards per play. Thanks in large part to its dominating defense, Miami also ranked No. 5 nationally in turnover margin, No. 8 nationally in fumbles recovered and No. 15 nationally in passes intercepted.

Miami's defense enjoyed served as one of the top units both in the ACC and nationally in Patke's first season at Miami in 2016.

Jon Richt is in his third season as the Hurricanes' quarterbacks coach.

Richt oversaw the development of both redshirt freshman N'Kosi Perry and veteran signal caller Malik Rosier at the quarterback position for Miami in 2018.

Richt guided Rosier to an impressive first season as the Hurricanes' quarterback in 2017, with the redshirt junior finishing with 26 touchdown passes across 13 starts.

Rosier's 26 touchdown passes were tied with Vincent Testaverde (1986) and Brad Kaaya (2014) for the fourth-most in a single season in Hurricanes history, and just three behind Steve Walsh's program record of 29 set in 1988.

Rosier, who added five rushing scores and totaled 468 rushing yards, bested Vinny Testaverde's Miami record of "touchdowns responsible for" (30) with 31; Testaverde's mark was set during his Heisman Trophy season of 1986.

Under his watch, former Hurricane quarterback Brad Kaaya became the all-time leading passer in Miami history in 2016.

Kaaya also finished the 2016 season by posting single-season career bests in passing yards (3,532), touchdowns (27) and completions (261) under Richt's guidance.

In addition, Kaaya posted a single-season career-best completion rate of 62.0 percent rate during the 2016 season.

Richt joined his father Mark's staff for the second time in his coaching career after he spent the 2015

campaign with the Buffalo Bills as an offensive assistant.

During his lone season in Buffalo, the Bills posted an 8-8 record under first-year head coach Rex Ryan.

He spent the 2014 season serving on Georgia's staff as a quality control assistant.

During the 2014 campaign, Georgia posted a 10-3 overall record and went 6-2 in in SEC play, placing second in the East Division.

The 2014 season was a record-breaking year for the Bulldogs' offensive unit as Georgia posted 537 points and averaged 41.3 points per game - both of which are school records. Georgia's 41.3 points per game ranked eighth in the NCAA.

In 2013 and 2014, Rumph was recognized for his work on the sidelines as he was selected as a coach for the U.S. Army All-American Bowl in San Antonio. Before taking over as the head coach at American Heritage, Rumph served as the team's defensive coordinator for two seasons.

In addition, Rumph served as the boys and girls track and field head coach. In 2011, his boys and girls track and field teams captured the state championship. Following the year, Rumph was named the 2011 Miami Herald Track and Field Coach of the Year. As a player at the University of Miami, Rumph earned all-conference honors during his junior and senior seasons. As a senior, Rumph finished with 117 tackles and six interceptions as he helped the Hurricanes to the 2001 National Championship.

Rumph was selected in the first round of the 2002 NFL Draft with the 27th overall selection by the San Francisco 49ers. He played four seasons in San Francisco before concluding his career in 2006 with the Washington Redskins.

Behind his offensive line, Miami's backfield rushed for 1,966 yards and averaged 5.8 yards per carry - including a near 1,000-yard season from junior running back Travis Homer (966). Senior Tyree St. Louis earned All-ACC Honorable Mention recognition after making the successful transition from right to left tackle.

Four of Searels' offensive linemen were recognized with All-ACC honors in 2017, including senior left tackle Kc McDermott, who was named to the All-ACC Third Team.

Donaldson, one of the top-rated players signed by Miami, was an instant starter at The U and earned Freshman All-America recognition from ESPN and the Football Writers Association of America (FWAA).

Under his watch, senior offensive lineman Danny Isidora earned third-team ACSMA All-ACC honors in 2016.

During his first season at Texas, Searels helped the Longhorns rank

21st nationally and third in the Big 12 with 210.4 rushing yards per game.

Searels joined the Longhorns after coaching the offensive line at Georgia for four seasons. He added the duties of running game coordinator in 2009. During his time in Athens, the Bulldogs ranked in the top 25 in the nation in fewest sacks allowed three times, including ranking sixth and leading the SEC in 2009 with just 12.

From 2003-06, Searels coached the offensive line at LSU, where he helped the Tigers win 44 games over four seasons and capture the 2003 BCS National Championship. Guard Stephen Peterman was drafted in the third round of the 2004 NFL Draft by the Cowboys, while tackle Andrew Whitworth was a second-round pick of the Bengals in 2006.

Prior to his stint in Baton Rouge, Searels coached the offensive line at Cincinnati for three seasons (2000-02) and at Appalachian State for seven seasons (1994-2000). He started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Auburn, his alma mater, in 1992.

A three-year starter on the offensive line at Auburn, Searels earned first-team All-America honors from both The Associated Press and Football News as a senior in 1987.

Searels blocked for Heisman Trophy winner Bo Jackson in 1985 and All-American Brent Fullwood at Auburn in 1986 before becoming a fourth-round draft pick by the San Diego Chargers in 1988. He ended his professional career in 1991 with the New York/New Jersey Knights of the World League of American Football.

Gerald Willis put together one of the most dominant seasons by a defensive tackle nationwide, leading the position at the FBS level and ranking first overall in the ACC with 18.0 tackles for loss. Willis was named an All-American by several outlets, while defensive end Joe Jackson earned All-ACC Honorable Mention honors. Willis was a second-team All-ACC selection.

Simpson joined the Hurricanes in March of 2018 after spending the 2017 season with the Atlanta Falcons. Simpson was the defensive line/assistant head coach at Georgia State in 2016.

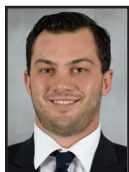

The Winona, Miss., native earned his degree in sport studies in 2015.



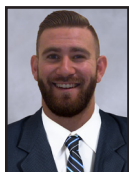

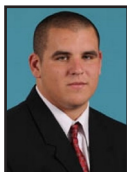

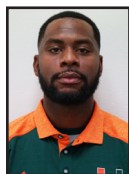

Jorge Baez begins his fifth season with the Miami Hurricanes' football program and his third under head coach Mark Richt, serving as the director of player development for the offensive side of the ball.

In 2015, Baez held the role of director of on-campus recruiting with the Hurricanes' football program.

Baez spent the 2014 season with Miami as the program's assistant director of player personnel. In this capacity, Baez assisted with recruiting and gameday operations.

The Miami native also spent the 2003-05 seasons under head coach Larry Coker. During these three seasons with the Hurricanes, Baez gained valuable experience as he assisted in a

variety of capacities and helped Miami make three straight bowl appearances, including the 2003 FedEx Orange Bowl, while the Hurricanes posted a record of 31-7 during that stint.

Prior to joining the Hurricanes staff in 2014, Baez spent the 2013 season as Gulliver Prep's offensive coordinator.

Before arriving at Gulliver Prep, Baez spent two seasons at Southern University in Baton Rouge, La.

During his two-year stint at Southern University, Baez served as the program's passing game co-coordinator and wide receivers coach.

In his first season as the program's wide receiver's coach, Baez made an immediate impact on the performance of the Southern receiving corps as the passing offense ranked No. 28 nationally and No. 1 in the SWAC, averaging 248.0 yards per game.

In his two seasons at Southern, Baez tutored three All-SWAC wide receivers (Mike Berry – 2011, LaQuinton Evans – 2011 and Lee Doss – 2012). In addition, Baez recruited and coached All-American wide receiver and Miami native Willie Quinn.

Before his arrival at Southern, Baez served as the offensive coordinator and recruiting coordinator at Lambuth University in Jackson, Tenn.

Prior to Baez' stop at Lambuth, the energetic coach held stints guiding prospects to successful collegiate and professional careers.

In 2009, Baez mentored a pair of record-setting receivers at Ole Miss in Shay Hodge and Dexter McCluster. Hodge and McCluster would eventually go on to earn first-team All-SEC honors. Hodge became the first player in Ole Miss history to top 1,000 yards receiving (1,135) and led the SEC in both yards and catches (70), while ranking third in the conference with eight TD receptions. He finished as the Ole Miss all-time leader in receiving yards.

A dual-purpose threat, McCluster became the first SEC player ever with 1,000 yards rushing and 500 yards receiving in the same season. He ended his career No. 2 on the Ole Miss all-time all-purpose yardage list.

In 2008, Baez helped Houston Nutt's Rebels reverse their fortunes, as the team posted a 9-4 record, won the Cotton Bowl and earned a No. 14 final national ranking.

In his second season with the Rebels, Baez mentored a Rebel receiving corps that produced current Miami Dolphins wide receiver Mike Wallace. Wallace entered the NFL after he was selected by the Pittsburgh Steelers in the third round.

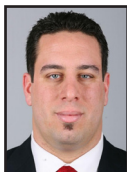

Joel Rodriguez, a former lineman at the University of Miami, is in his fourth year as a member of the Hurricanes staff in 2018 where he serves as the team's director of player development for the defensive side of the ball.

Rodriguez returned to Coral Gables following an impressive three-year tenure at Fordham University, where he primarily worked with the offensive line and served as the run game coordinator. Under his watchful eye, the Fordham offense enjoyed a record-setting year with four of the five starting linemen earning All-Patriot League honors in 2014. The line blocked for freshman running back Chase Edmonds, who won the 2014 Jerry Rice Award as the top NCAA FCS freshman as well as the 2014 Patriot League Rookie of the Year award.

In 2014, the Rams led the Patriot League in passing offense, total offense and scoring offense, while on the national level the Rams ranked fourth in passing offense (326.1 yards/game) in the NCAA FCS and ranked among the top ten in scoring offense (40.6 points/game – fifth), team passing efficiency (156.23 – third), total offense (494.1 yards/game – seventh) and first downs (331 – ninth).

In 2013, the Fordham running game was a key to the Rams' success as the team set school records for scoring (526 points), passing offense (5,052 yards) and total offense (7,214), with linemen Mason Halter and Tom Fisher leading the way as each earned First Team All-Patriot accolades at season's end with Halter also receiving All-America honors. The Rams also led the NCAA FCS in total offense, averaging 376.4 yards/game.

In 2012, Rodriguez coached an offensive line that helped the Fordham offense average 435.7 yards/game, second-best in the Patriot League and 18th-best in the NCAA FCS, while the Rams scored 31.2 ppg, second in the league and 32nd in the NCAA FCS.

Rodriguez arrived at Fordham after serving as the offensive line coach at Bryant University for four years, helping the Bulldogs make the transition from NCAA Div. II to NCAA FCS. In 2011, Rodriguez guided an offensive line that helped running back Jordan Brown lead the NCAA FCS in rushing, averaging 165.0 yards/game. In 2010, the Bulldogs allowed just 14 sacks in eight conference games, ranking in the top half of the league in that category.

In his first year at Bryant, the Bulldogs enjoyed a tremendously successful inaugural season competing at the Division I level, posting a 7-4 record overall, thanks in part to a strong running game. Prior to his four years at Bryant, Rodriguez was a graduate assistant coach at Mississippi in the spring of 2007.

A 2005 graduate of the University of Miami, Rodriguez was a standout offensive lineman with the Hurricanes from 2001-04, garnering Verizon Academic All-District honors during his career and being named to three BIG EAST All-Academic teams and one ACC All-Academic squad.

After serving as a backup during his first two years, Rodriguez was the starting center and anchor on the offensive line as a junior and senior. Rodriguez played in 11 games as a junior with 10 starts before suffering a season-ending injury against Rutgers. He was named offensive MVP by the Miami coaching staff after an outstanding game in the team's win over in-state rival Florida in 2003.

Rodriguez signed a free-agent contract with the NFL's Tennessee Titans following graduation and was a member of the practice squad in 2005 before being allocated to the NFL Europe Berlin Thunder in 2006.

Rodriguez is a graduate of Monsignor Pace High School where he was named the top-ranked center and fifth-best offensive lineman by Florida Prep Football.

Anderson was the head student equipment manager during his undergraduate career at Florida State. He graduated with his B.S. in sports management from Florida State in 2012.



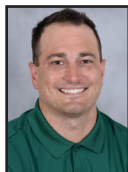
DANIEL BOGENSCHUTZ

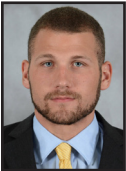

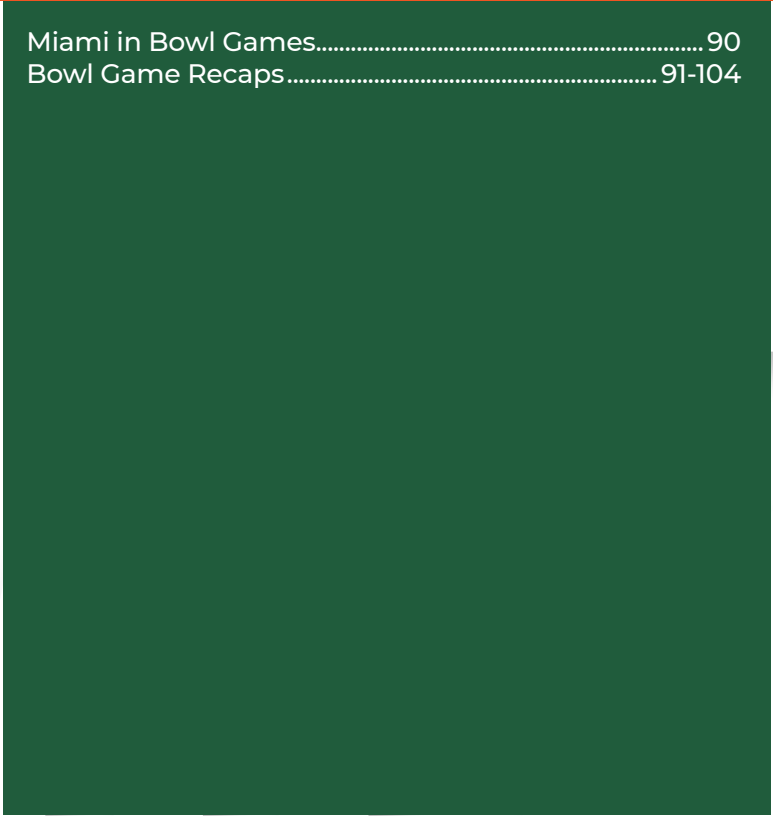

Miami's 34-game winning streak came to an end as Ohio State defeated the Hurricanes 31-24 in double overtime to win the Fiesta Bowl and the BCS National Championship. Maurice Clarett scored his second touchdown on a five-yard run in the second overtime. Craig Krenzel had a pair of touchdown runs for the Buckeyes (14-0), who ended Miami's winning streak -- the sixth-longest in college football history -- in a game of high drama that was prolonged by a controversial pass interference call. It was the first-ever overtime in a BCS title game, despite Miami turning the ball over five times and losing **Willis McGahee** to a knee injury in the fourth quarter. On the final play of regulation, **Todd Sievers** kicked a 40-yard field goal to tie it at 17-17. **Kellen Winslow Jr.** caught a seven-yard TD pass from **Ken Dorsey** in the first overtime. On 4th-and-goal from the 5, **Glenn Sharpe** batted away a pass intended for Chris Gamble. Miami began its celebration, but Sharpe was flagged for pass interference. Krenzel then scored on a one-yard run and Miami was stopped in the second overtime.
