FLORIDA STATE BACK ON THE ROAD TO PLAY AT MIAMI WEDNESDAY NIGHT

Florida State, which has won six of its last seven games since December 8, travels to Miami in its fourth of 18 consecutive ACC games on Wednesday, January 15, 2014 at 9:00 p.m. The Seminoles won two games last week with a dominant defensive performance against Clemson in which they allowed a school record low for an ACC game 41 points and a dominant offensive performance against Maryland in which they made a school record high for an ACC game 16 3-point shots. The Seminoles defeated the Tigers, 56-41 and topped Maryland, 85-61 to up their ACC record to 2-1. Florida State's game at Miami marks the first of two games during the regular season against the Hurricanes; the Seminoles will play host to Miami in Tallahassee on February 10. Following Wednesday's game against Miami, the Seminoles will travel to play at Virginia on Saturday at 12 Noon before playing host to Notre Dame on Tuesday, January 21 at 8:00 p.m. Florida State's game against Notre Dame marks the first appearance in Tallahassee for Notre Dame and the Seminoles' first game against the Fighting Irish since they became members of the ACC in 2013.

FLORIDA STATE'S DEFENSE IN TWO WINS LAST WEEK

Florida State's defense limited Clemson and Maryland to 51.0 points per game, a .317 field goal shooting percentage and a .216 3-point field goal shooting percentage in two ACC wins last week. The Seminoles' defense limited both Clemson and Maryland below 34 percent shooting from the field and under 27 percent from the 3-point line. Florida State's defense held both teams to a total of 102 points - an average of 51 points per game. The Seminoles allowed the Tigers to score 41 points - the fewest points allowed in Florida State history in an ACC game and held the Tigers to 16 first half points - also the fewest points allowed in a half of an ACC game since joining the league for the 1991-92 season. The Seminoles +15 margin of victory ranks tied for sixth in school history for margin of victory in an ACC game on the road. Florida State's victory over Maryland saw the Seminoles' defense limit the Terps to a .333 field goal shooting percentage and a .167 3-point field goal shooting percentage. Maryland made a season low 17 field goals (it entered the game averaging more than 26 made field goals per game) and made less than half of their season average of 3-point field goals made per game. The Terps average more than seven made shots from long range and were held to three by the Seminoles' defense.

SEMINOLES AMONG NATION'S TOP DEFENSIVE TEAMS

Florida State, which limited Clemson to 30 percent shooting from the field, blocked five shots and earned 10 steals, is ranked seventh nationally in field goal percentage defense (.363) and tied for eighth nationally in blocked shots per game (6.7 bpg). The Seminoles and Green Bay are the only two teams in the nation ranked in the top 10 nationally in the field goal percentage and blocked shots categories.

FLORIDA STATE'S DEFENSIVE RANKINGS UNDER LEONARD HAMILTON

Florida State, the third winningest team in the ACC in the last nine seasons and the 2012 ACC Champions, have built a tradition of suffocating defense under head coach Leonard Hamilton. In four consecutive seasons in which the Seminoles played in the NCAA Tournament (2009-12), the Seminoles did not rank lower than ninth nationally in field goal percentage defense, not lower than 11th nationally in blocked shots and not lower than 67th in steals.

FLORIDA STATE'S WIN TOTAL IN THE LAST NINE YEARS

Florida State is the third winningest program in the ACC in the last nine years (since the start of the 2005-06 season) in total games played with 185 wins. The Seminoles average 21.8 wins per season with records of 20-10 (2005-06), 22-13 (2006-07), 19-15 (2007-08), 25-10 (2008-09), 22-10 (2009-10), 23-11 (2010-11), 25-10 (2011-12), 18-16 (2012-13) and 11-4 (2013-14).

FLORIDA STATE IN ACC PLAY IN THE LAST FIVE SEASONS

In the last five seasons, Florida State is 52-30 (.634 winning percentage) and has finished in third place in the league standings three times in regular season ACC play. The Seminoles average 10.4 ACC regular season wins per season and have finished in the top four of the ACC standings four times in the last five seasons. Florida State is third in the ACC in conference wins with 52, third in winning percentage at .634 and tied for second (with North Carolina) with four top-four league standing finishes in the last five seasons.

FLORIDA STATE ESTABLISHES SCHOOL RECORD FOR 3-POINT SHOTS MADE IN AN ACC GAME

Led by Ian Miller's career-best six 3-point field goals made, the Seminoles made a school record for ACC games 16 3-point shots in its 85-61 win over Maryland on Sunday. The Seminoles were 10 of 15 (.667 percent) from long range in the first half and six of nine in the second half (.667 percent). Miller made a career-high six 3-point shots – he was one of six different players who made at least one 3-point shot during the game. The Seminoles' 16 3-point shots made against Maryland ranks as the third highest single game total in school history and are the most made in a game by an ACC team this season.

NOTING FLORIDA STATE'S THREE POINTS SHOTS MADE AGAINST MARYLAND

Florida State entered its game against Maryland ranked 14th in the ACC with 58 3-point field goals made and a 4.2 3-point field goals made per game average. Then it made a near-school record 16 3-point field goals in its 85-61 win over the Terps. The Seminoles enter Wednesday's game against Miami ranked 13th in the ACC with 74 3-point field goals made and a 4.9 3-point field goals made per game average.

SEMINOLES FINISH MARYLAND GAME WITH POSITIVE ASSIST:TURNOVER RATIO

Florida State totaled 17 assists in its win over Maryland and earned a positive assist:turnover ratio of 1.2:1 in its win over the Terps. The Seminoles' 17 assists ranks as their second highest total of the season – they had 22 in their win over Jacksonville State. Their positive assist to turnover ratio was their third of the season with more assists than turnovers coming against both Michigan (November 22) and Jacksonville State (December 8).

FLORIDA STATE'S BENCH

Florida State's bench outscored Maryland's entire team, 24-22, in the first half of the Seminoles' 85-61 win over the Terps on Sunday in Tallahassee. The Seminoles' bench totaled 44 points in the game with four of the six players who came in as reserves scoring at least three points.

BUILDING UP ITS BLOCKED SHOTS TOTAL

Florida State enters Wednesday's game at Miami as the ACC leaders in blocked shots (6.7 bpg) and have earned at least five blocked shots in 12 of its first 15 games of the season. The Seminoles are the only team in the ACC with 100 blocked shots this season.

FLORIDA STATE VS. MIAMI – THE LAST GAME

Florida State gave the No. 3/4 Hurricanes a scare at the Donald L. Tucker Center, erasing a double-digit deficit midway through the second half before ultimately falling, 74-68, in hard-fought fashion on February 13, 2013. Miami got a combined 24 points from low-post players Reggie Johnson and Julian Gamble. Shane Larkin finished with 22 points. Okaro White led the way for Florida State as they shot 46.2 percent compared to Miami's 63.8 percent clip from the field. White finished with 15 points and a team-high eight rebounds. Devon Bookert had perhaps the best start-to-finish game of his first season as the freshman point guard started and played 28 minutes, finishing with 12 points and just one turnover. Michael Snaer, Ian Miller and Kiel Turpin each scored nine points and Terry Whisnant came off the bench to add eight of his own.

FLORIDA STATE DEFENSIVELY

Florida State is the only team in the ACC with at least 100 steals (113 / 7.5 spg) and at least 100 blocked shots (100 / 6.7 bpg). The Seminoles are ranked first in the ACC in blocked shots and third in the ACC in steals and are joined by only North Carolina as the two teams who are ranked in the top five of both categories. The Tar Heels are ranked second in steals (130 / 8.1 spg) and are tied for fourth in blocked shots (85 / 5.3 bpg).

FLORIDA STATE LOOKING TO LEAD THE ACC IN BLOCKED SHOTS FOR FIFTH STRAIGHT YEAR

Florida State enters Wednesday's game against Miami as the ACC leaders in blocked shots as it looks to lead the ACC in blocked shots for the school record fifth consecutive season. The ACC record for consecutive seasons leading the ACC in blocked shots is five by Maryland from 2000 through 2004. Only Florida State (four consecutive years, 2010-13) and Maryland (five consecutive years, 2000-04) have led the ACC in blocked shots in at least four consecutive seasons.

FLORIDA STATE'S FIELD GOAL PERCENTAGE DEFENSE

Florida State enters Wednesday's game against Miami ranked fifth in the nation and second in the ACC in field goal percentage defense (head coach Leonard Hamilton's favorite statistic). The Seminoles have held nine consecutive opponents under .390 shooting from the field and 12 of their first 15 opponents of the season under 40 percent from the field. Only Northeastern (.469 in a Florida State win), Michigan (.431 in a Wolverine win) and Jacksonville (.411 in a Florida State win) have shot better than 40 percent from the field against Florida State (and none since Northeastern on Nov. 24) this season. The Seminoles have held 14 of their 15 opponents under their season average field goal percentage with the lone exception being Northeastern in the Seminoles' 62-60 win over the Huskies in the third place game of the 2013 Puerto Rico Tip-Off.

Seminoles' Brandon Plays Through Pain By Patrick Nohe

It was late on the evening of February 19th. Montay Brandon had his head ducked low in a visiting locker at NC State. Florida State had just lost 84-66 and Brandon was checking his phone to get his mind off going scoreless that night and the fact his team had now lost six of its last ten.

Then he saw the tweet. Josh Level was dead.

Brandon couldn't believe it. The two had kept up with one another all season -- but they hadn't spoken in two weeks. Now Montay was less than an hour and a half from where he'd grown up in Greensboro, NC -- where he'd know Josh since he was nine years old -- yet he couldn't have been further away.

"We had to come right back," said Brandon, who boarded a plane that night and headed back to Florida State with his teammates. "It was [a difficult flight], it really was."

Level died of Myocarditis, a viral infection -- not unlike a cold -- that attacks the heart.

The 17 year-old was playing a high school game for New Gardens Friends School on the road in Winston-Salem when he collapsed during a timeout. He was taken to a hospital, but could not be resuscitated and was pronounced dead.

Montay was left grief-stricken, unable to even attend the funeral.

"I stayed here in Tallahassee, I talked to his parents and told them I'd have them in my prayers and everything," recalled Brandon. "I don't know if I'd have been able to handle it, it would have been pretty tough."

Josh had been two years younger than Montay, but -- whether or not Montay had ever told him -- Level's work ethic had been an inspiration to Brandon.

"Josh is somebody that worked really hard, he was one of the players that wasn't as good at first and he developed his game really hard," remembered Brandon.

"Me and him would be in the gym together like every day during the summers, so he became sort of like my little brother."

That continued into Brandon's freshman year. The two maintained regular correspondence, Josh following Montay at Florida State while Montay tried to keep up with Josh's high school games.

"He was a hard worker, tireless worker, played hard, competed in everything," said Brandon. "I mean he just wanted the same opportunity to play college ball."

He never got that opportunity.

But this season -- and for the rest of his career - - Brandon plans to honor him by wearing his number, 32.

It will be a constant reminder of Level's drive and determination.

"While I'm out there and I have that jersey on I won't take anything for granted," said Brandon. "I'll play hard the whole time, no plays off, just to represent him in that way and just show like -- his thing was hard work, you could do anything through hard work -- so I want to do that too as well."

TALLAHASSEE, Fla. - Justin Anderson scored 16 points and Akil Mitchell added 11 points along with 13 rebounds to lead Virginia to a 62-50 win at Florida State in the Atlantic Coast Conference opener for both schools. Virginia jumped to an early 6-0 lead and never trailed. The Cavaliers led by as many as 15 in the opening half and 22 in the second half. Capitalizing on a 20-2 scoring advantage off Florida State first half turnovers, Virginia built an early 28-13 lead on its way to a 30-17 cushion at the midway break despite losing the services of scoring leader Joe Harris early in the game. Anderson and freshman London Perrantes took up the scoring slack for the Cavaliers with 10 points apiece in the opening half. Perrantes finished with 14 points and teammate Malcolm Brogdon added 11. Harris played less than three minutes without taking a shot before being injured during a scramble for a loose ball. Florida State went the opening five minutes without a score until Okaro White's 3-point shot from the side. White was Florida State's lone double-digit scorer with 15 points.

FSU men look like different team since loss to UVA

hindsight, maybe it was just the type of start to the ACC season that the Florida State men's basketball team needed.

After going 9-3 in the non-conference slate, with Top 25 wins over VCU and UMass, the Seminoles began conference play with a sluggish, sloppy 62-50 loss at home to Virginia.

All Leonard Hamilton's team has done since then is win two straight by double-figures, beating Clemson on the road by 15 and then blitzing Maryland on Sunday night by 24.

"As a coach you don't ever want to lose a game," Hamilton said. "But sometimes you can learn a lot from a loss. And it motivates you to focus. And I'm hoping that's what happened with the Virginia game. It helped us grow up a little bit."

Against the Cavaliers, the Florida State defense played typical Florida State defense — holding the visitors to just 32.8 percent shooting from the floor. But the FSU offense struggled mightily, committing 13 turnovers in the first half and scoring just 17 points. The Seminoles wound up shooting just 31 percent for the game.

The teaching point from the FSU coaching staff after that loss was simple: Move the ball. And take better shots.

That message was received loud and clear.

Florida State has shot a combined 48.6 percent from the floor in the last two wins.

"Before the Clemson game, the (prior) three or four games we had all been taking hard shots," said senior guard Ian Miller, who leads the Seminoles at 13.9 points per game. "We had been making one-on-one moves and they were working to an extent. But when we played a good team with a good defense like Virginia, you're likely to lose.

"So we know to move the ball and get each other wide-open shots like we do in practice."

At Clemson, Florida State hit just 1 of 11 shots from 3-point range but made 57 percent from inside the arc — an exceptionally high percentage against the defensive-minded Tigers.

And against Maryland on Sunday night, FSU's shooters hit a remarkable 16 of 24 from beyond the arc in an 85-61 win.

In both of those victories, the ball movement was crisp. It didn't "stick" in one spot nearly as much as it did in the disappointing loss to the Cavaliers.

"Against Virginia we didn't buy in," said sophomore guard Aaron Thomas, who is second on the team with 12.5 points per game. "There was a lot of one-on-one. You can't go one-on-one against Virginia. We weren't able to get the ball moving. The ball was sticking a lot.

"And that game really woke us up."

With the back-to-back victories, the Seminoles are now 11-4 overall and 2-1 in the ACC. It's still very early, obviously, but they are currently in fourth place in the conference standings behind Syracuse, Pittsburgh and Virginia.

Florida State plays at Miami (9-6, 1-2) on Wednesday night. And Hamilton hopes to continue see the Seminoles of the past two games.

"We realized we were not getting the best opportunities for us because we were not being patient," he said. "We have tried to challenge our guys to push the ball and play more in transition. And all year long we've had a problem once we got in the half-court to not gear down and execute.

"I think we've grown up the last couple of games. Hopefully we can continue to improve."

Henry column: FSU's Hamilton not coaching by the book

Seminole coach settling in on player rotations

Leonard Hamilton is not coaching by the book this season.

For instance, the veteran Florida State men's basketball coach isn't following standard instructional material that suggests a team's starting five should be its five best players.

Or that a coach needs a complicated or intricate system to win games.

As the Seminoles' non-conference schedule gives way to Atlantic Coast Conference play, starting Saturday at home against Virginia, Hamilton's interesting approach on how he uses his personnel is paying dividends.

He enjoys nothing better than working out ways for his team to beat yours.

"Our starters come in after the game starts," Hamilton said following Monday's 67-59 home win over Charleston Southern.

"We don't have a traditional starting five."

Traditions, records and eggs are meant to be broken.

When the basketball is tossed up for the opening tip-off, Hamilton's best offensive player in senior guard Ian Miller and best defender in sophomore guard Aaron Thomas are next to him on the bench.

That's by X-and-O design.

Only Duke and North Carolina have won more ACC games than FSU over the past eight seasons, so it's not like Hamilton is playing a shell game.

There's no guessing here.

Hamilton's strategic decision to rotate Miller and Thomas into games after the opening few minutes gives the Seminoles a nice boost. And sets up further substitutions.

In Monday's victory, the duo combined for 34 points. Miller scored 11 of his 15 points in the first half; Thomas 14 of his game-high 19 points in the second half.

Still, there's plenty more valuable pieces to Hamilton's cool puzzle.

Unlike last season, when the Seminoles missed the NCAA Tournament, this year's team (9-3) has handled adjustments and player rotations.

FSU's versatility has also given it advantages on the perimeter and the block. The lineup can go big or small. Mix in the unique combo of 7-foot-3 Boris Bojanovsky and 7-foot-1 Michael Ojo at center, and whola.

The plan has led to an improved defense, mindset and confidence.

"They are a very difficult team to guard; their size is astounding," Charleston Southern coach Barclay Radebaugh marveled.

"I've never seen size like that on a college team. I thought our guys played with tremendous toughness against a monster of a team."

It remains to be seen if the Seminoles produce fear by their appearance or actions in the ACC, but they have the talent to bounce back from last year's season that still saw the program win 18 games.

Take Monday, for example.

The victory was an important learning experience, not a keepsake for Shutterfly.

The Buccaneers tried to widen the floor and launched treys with NASA ferocity, 29 total.

FSU, on a modest four-game win streak, didn't play particularly well either.

Senior forward Okaro White, one of the team's top players, was 1 of 5 from the floor and finished with two points. Miller was 2 of 7 from beyond the arc. Point guard Devon Bookert, despite finishing with a career-high nine assists and a team-high seven boards, missed all five of his three-point attempts.

Then there were the turnovers.

Even Hamilton smiled and said you can't coach against or make some of these up.

Three consecutive turnovers over a 60-second span late in the game helped the Bucs slice a double-digit deficit into nearly a slice of humble pie for the Seminoles.

"If you can win when your players are not at their very best, that's significant," Hamilton said.

While certainly a sign of progress – FSU, thanks to its strength of schedule, has placed itself in solid position for a return trip to the NCAA Tournament for these resume-building wins – the ACC might not be as forgiving.

That's why Hamilton said his team had to quickly turn its attention to the visiting Cavaliers (9-4).

While UVa, always noted for its suffocating defense, suffered a 35-point defeat (87-52) at Tennessee on Monday, Hamilton believes that's an aberration. He said the Cavs are much improved from last season.

And we all know what happened when FSU visited Charlottesville, Va., a year ago.

"All I have to do is look at last year's film up there, where they gave us our hat and showed us where the door was," Hamilton said of the 56-36 loss.

The door may have hit FSU on the its rump on the way out, but this is a different FSU team.

It's better. It's tougher. It's versatile.

Hamilton might not be coaching by the book in all instances, but his adjustments have put the Seminoles in position to win.
