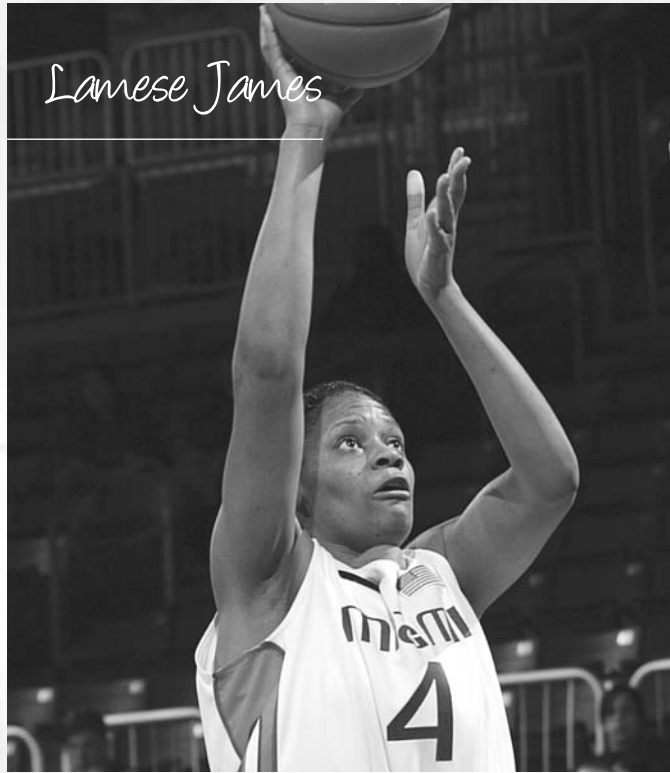

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

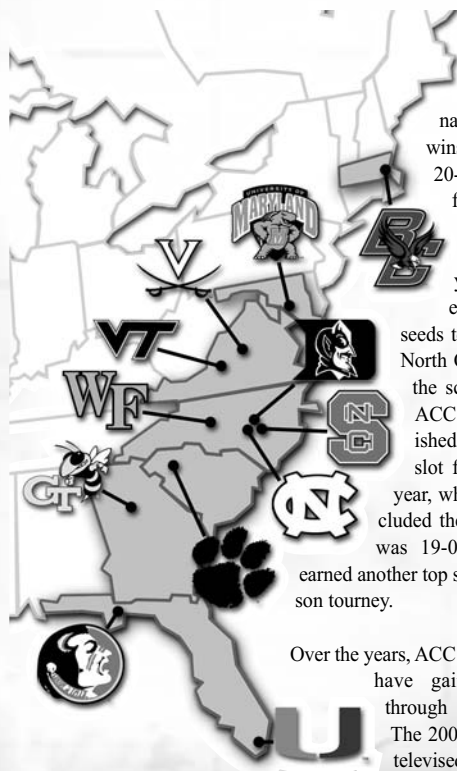
Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 56th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 109 national championships, including 57 in women's competition and 52 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 145 times in men's competition and 92 times in women's action.

Since 1977, when the league adopted women's basketball and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights. The 2005-06 season marked the first time in NCAA history that a conference sent three teams to the same Final Four. The title game pitted an automatic ACC winner as second-seeded Maryland faced No. 1 seed Duke. The Terrapins claimed their first national title in school history and the league's second with a thrilling 78-75 overtime game at the TD Banknorth Garden in Boston, Mass., on April 4, 2006.

Following the 2006-07 season, Duke became the first ACC team and only the 14th in NCAA history to finish a regular season undefeated (29-0), while the 34 wins for North Carolina marked the most in program history.

The 2007-08 season was no different in the continuation towards excellence as eight ACC teams earned postseason bids, including six NCAA Tournament berths. It also marked the sixth consecutive year the league has sent at least six to the Big Dance. Joining North Carolina and Maryland as representatives of the ACC in the NCAA Tournament were Duke, Florida State, Georgia Tech, and Virginia. Boston College and NC State represented the league in the Women's NIT, marking the first-ever



appearance for the Eagles and the Wolfpack's first since 1976. NC State advanced to the semifinals, giving the squad 21 wins for the season, their third 20-plus win tally in the past four years.

For the third consecutive year, a pair of ACC teams earned two of the No. 1 seeds to the NCAA Tournament. North Carolina, which picked up the school's fourth consecutive ACC Tournament crown, finished 30-2 and earned a No. 1 slot for the fourth consecutive year, while Maryland, which concluded the season 30-3 overall and was 19-0 in College Park, Md., earned another top seed in the NCAA postseason tourney.

Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their television exposure. The 2007-08 schedule featured 57 televised games and included 96

television appearances. In addition, the ACC broadcasted nine games on ESPN2 and seven on Fox Sports Net and affiliates. Twenty-seven match-ups were featured on the league's regional sports network, which includes Comcast SportsNet, Fox Sports Net South, SunSports and New England's Sports Network (NESN). To conclude the 2007-08 season, the ACC finished 64-54 (.542) in front of a national televised audience, including a 23-12 mark against non-conference foes.

The league's women's basketball programs continue to rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 144 appearances and won 194 games in the last 31 years, including 32 wins by a number one seed. In addition to sending three teams to the same Final Four for the first time in history, the league has boasted such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 20 consecutive years and at least one to the Final Four in 11 of the last 20 years. The conference has also made 14 trips to the Final Four in the last 27 years with three teams finishing second and North Carolina and Maryland capturing National Championships in 1994 and 2006, respectively.

Since 1989, the ACC has placed 14 players on the All-Final Four team, while Maryland's Laura Harper joined the ranks of Virginia's Dawn Staley and North Carolina's Charlotte Smith, who was dubbed the NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player in 2006. In all, 65 ACC players have been named to the NCAA Tournament All-Region teams with 10 Most Outstanding Player recognitions.

Eight players have garnered National Player of the Year accolades while competing under the ACC banner. Staley was a back-to-back selection in 1991 and 1992, while Smith received the ESPY award in 1995. Duke's Alana Beard was recognized with National Player of the Year honors in both 2003 and 2004, and UNC's Ivory Latta earned ESPN.com National Player of the Year in 2006. In 2007, Duke guard Lindsey Harding was named the Naismith Trophy Women's College Player of the Year presented by AT&T.

Five league coaches have combined to earn 13 national Coach of the Year honors. Duke's Gail Goestenkors, North Carolina's Sylvia Hatchell, Virginia's Debbie Ryan, Maryland's Chris Weller and NC State's Kay Yow have all garnered national recognition.

Seven ACC representatives, including coaches and student-athletes, have participated in the Olympics. NC State's Yow, assisted by Hatchell of UNC, headed up the 1988 gold medal-winning Olympic team. Maryland's Vicky Bullett was a member of both the 1988 and 1992 Olympic teams. Staley, a three-time Olympian, struck gold in Athens as a member of the 2004 title squad. Duke's Goestenkors served as an assistant coach on the gold medal-winning team in Athens.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association (WNBA) in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the league. Sixty-nine former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while five former players have worked the sidelines as coaches. Four ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2008 WNBA Draft as the foursome was selected in the first 14 picks of the round. In all, eight league players were selected in the 2008 WNBA Draft, while the league tabbed a league-record of nine selectees in 2006 and 2007.

In addition, ACC women's basketball players have earned first-team Academic All-America honors 10 times, including Virginia's Val Ackerman in 1981, the former President of the WNBA. In 1997, NC State's Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a flawless 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. Thirteen players have earned ACC postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

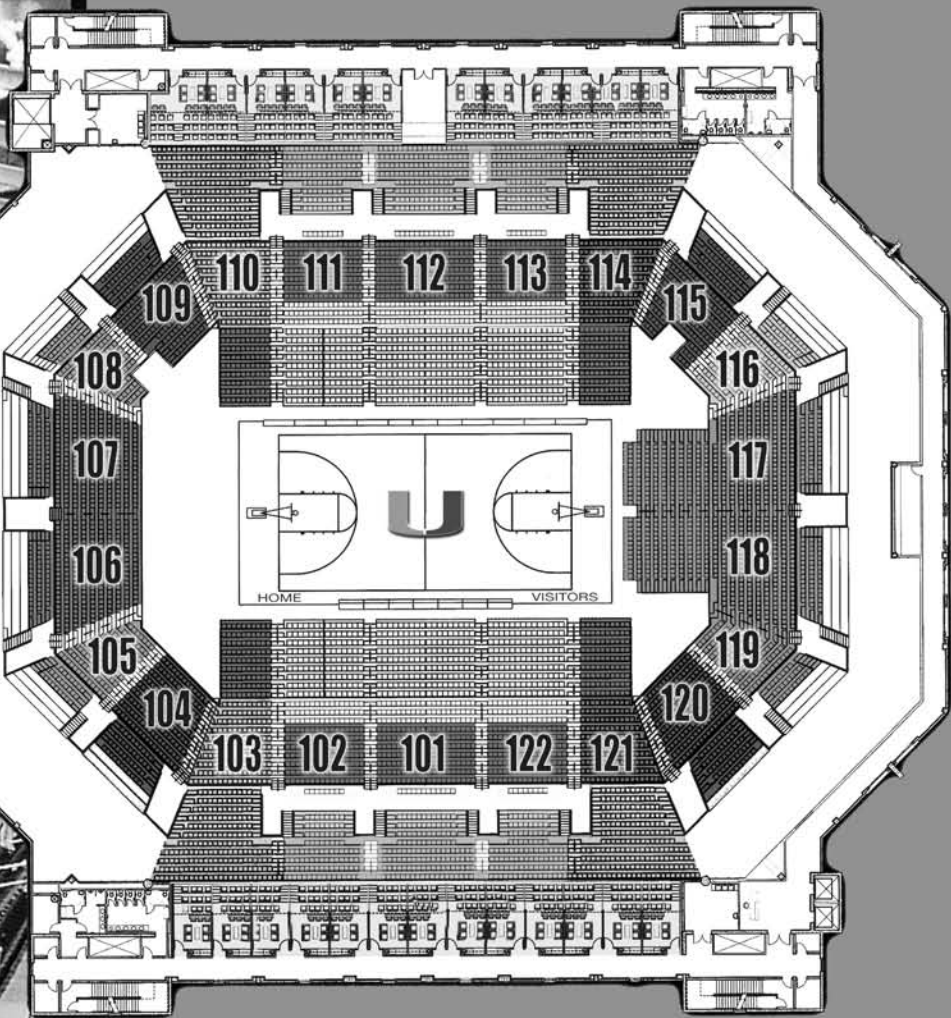
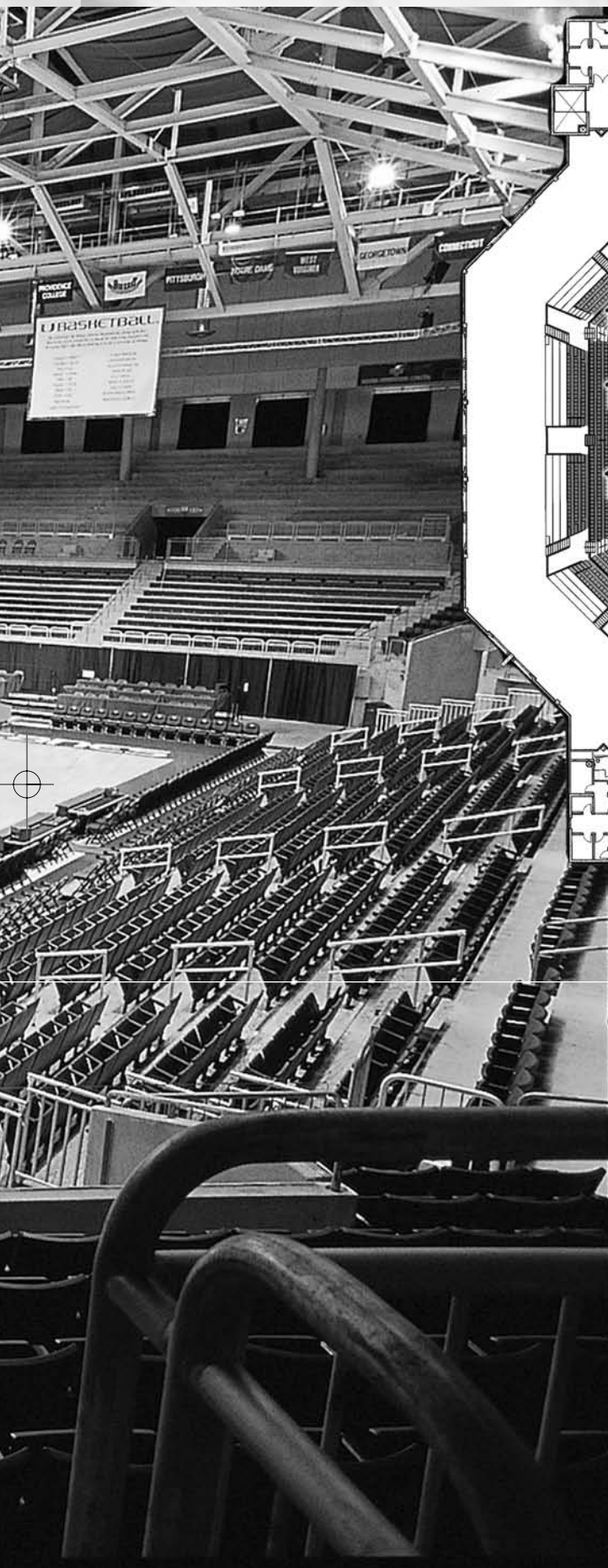

Preseason Q&A with Coach Meier

Q: What will the impact of a nationally-ranked recruiting class have on the team this year?

A: "We've had some real success recruiting in every class that we've had here. I think that you're seeing the fruits of that in some of the success of our current players. I think that recruiting is always the lifeline of a program and it's nice to be recognized. I think in the end, any coach will tell you that if they're satisfied and pleased and excited about the kids they've signed, whether they're ranked or not, knows that this is a good class, then that means the most. I think that you'll see that, up and down in the classes of the kids that are currently playing for us, plus the kids that we've brought in"

Q: After a difficult season on paper in 2007-08, what positives will carry over from that team?

A: "It was kind of one of those seasons of 'almosts'. I think we lost by an average of 3.6 points per game. The difference between what we scored and what our opponent scored—I've never seen anything like that. Going from the year before, where that margin was large, we were trying to be competitive. I don't think anyone in the ACC will tell you that Miami was not competitive last year. We were very competitive. But it takes special plays, or special players, or special moments to win and that's where I think our kids recognize that it's right there, and it's right within our reach. It's just a matter of conversion or a few defensive stops here and there. It was a difficult season in the record, but I think coming into this year, this process is a series of steps and I think we did take a very large step last year."

Q: Do you expect last year's strong defense to carry over to this season?

A: "Defense and rebounding, those were the two huge steps we made last year without question. To really be a force, to be the team that was hard to score against, we'll retain those qualities. Now this program has established itself with a style of play that we're going to play. Maybe we don't have as much girth, in terms of size, but we've got length, and quickness, and real leaping ability, and those things excite me about this team as well."

Q: If you ask any freshman or newcomer over the past couple years, they will tell you they chose Miami because it feels like a family. How do you foster that type of environment with your program?

A: "It certainly starts with President Shalala, who touches every person on this campus. She has a direct personal involvement with everybody. All the freshman go to her house on the first day of school, and she shakes hands with every single new comer, and meets them, and greets every one of their parents. It's just an amazing thing and it does trickle down, so it starts there. But if you talk specifically about the athletic department, the "U" can be such an intimidating thought. When you're not here you think it's this huge university that's just won all these national championships and a big time athletic department. We do have all that, but the secret to the "U" is that it is a family, and it's a small family, and it's a tight-knit family. We hold each other accountable and I think there's a real authenticity to this place and the athletic department, and I certainly try to carry that over to my team. You know you can't be a family unless you dare to be honest and you dare to be truthful and you really do go straight at people. In recruiting I think we're very honest and we will tell you, 'If you want to be in a class of 300 students and put an iPod on and whether or not you attend does not matter, then please do not come to Miami because that's not Miami.' I think when you can be that raw and that honest, then you do have a certain love and trust there that makes you a family."

Q: "Play it forward" has been adopted as the team motto this season, what does that mean to you and your program?

A: "Well I think the key word is play. I think that our style of play is very attractive and that does help us in recruiting and it helps our players' confidence levels, it helps practice intensity. We are a very forward thinking team, when we play we have the mantra of the next play. We do play aggressively therefore there will be mistakes, but we need to forgive them and move on, and I think that's a big part of it. There have been some tough times in this program that are still fresh, they're not far, far removed and we are taking what we can from them, but we're definitely putting them beneath us. It's not above us, it's not some ceiling we can't break through. It's definitely something that we have used as a foundation and we've taken it out of our past and put it underneath us. We're just stepping right on it, and we're just going to stomp on it and use it as the next step and just keep building upwards. So, I don't think there's any doubt that this group has accepted that and really we're excited. We don't want to be in pause mode and we certainly don't want to be in rewind. So, we have a really simple thing, we just say, 'hey, press play, next play, press play' and let's get over this and move forward. We do



play on the balls of our feet, that is our style. Our mentality, we're a forward thinking, future thinking team. I think it all kind of lies along there."

Q: Last season, Maurita Reid was named to the All-ACC Defensive Team, she also led the team in scoring and rebounding, is there a person or a group of players that can fill that void?

A: "Maurita was just an incredible talent and fortunately she was able to handle the unfortunate responsibilities of having to do so much for this team. I don't believe that we have anybody that needs to do that for us. Now, whether or not they do, that's great. But in terms of balance and more than one or two threats on the floor, offensively I think we have a group of very active players, very productive players, players that will bring statistics. We didn't have that as much, but there are players that have grown and really improved over the summer and then I think we've added some players that will bring some substance and productivity to the line up. I don't expect someone to have to lead us in all categories this year."

Q: What are you looking forward to the most this season?

A: "I want to compete! I'm such a competitive person and I trust this team, I love this team, I think I really know this team. We love each other for our strengths and we love each other for our weaknesses. I don't think there's any question, we are very authentic. I just want to see them represent this university and get out there and show that attitude, intensity, and confidence that 'hey, we're coming after you.' That's what I love most about this team, when I'm in workouts with them, they're getting after it. It's not coming from me and that's my favorite thing about this season, is there's an intensity out there that doesn't have to come from me. It's coming from within the team, within our leadership, and within even some of the new kids. That's what I'm most excited about."

Damisha Moore: "Damisha is a truly gifted human being. She is a special person that I just enjoy being around. I think she makes me better, and I think she makes everyone she meets better. She's challenging, she's driven and all that carries over to the basketball court. Could there have been a more improved player? I'm not sure there was. She had to sit back and take it all in at first but as the season progressed, as soon as she understood it and had that comprehension, she was full speed ahead. I think she's going to be a real big factor in not only what we're doing, but more so how we're doing it."

Riquna Williams (Bay Bay): "You talk about this highly rated recruiting class and people didn't even count Bay Bay. Unless you were in the state of Florida, you missed this kid. If we had a highly rated recruiting class and her ranking wasn't even in there, I think people are going to be very shocked. She is an incredible talent, she is a special player. She will change the game in every second she is on the court. I think that she is threatening on offense, she's threatening on defense. She is definitely one of those playing on the balls of her feet forward-thinking, aggressive mentality players and she does some amazing athletic things that as a coach, your jaw drops. I think she's going to be a big story on our team and a big impact in the ACC."

Lamese James: "Lamese is very close to my heart. We've been through this journey together and Lamese's story at Miami is another kind of side story that I'm just really excited about. Just to see Lamese write her final chapter. We talk about how you write your own story and you paint your own picture and Lamese has a big fat sharpie pen right now and she's writing it. To me, she's an inspiration and I know she's an inspiration to the team as well. Nothing could make me happier than to see Lamese have the season she deserves because she has worked very hard. She is showing her leadership skills. She is a crafty scorer and a really efficient, productive player, certainly on the rebounding end as well. It's a real need for us, we need Lamese to have a great season, but I think she will really inspire this team."

LaToya Drake: "Drake showed incredible flashes last year where there's a lot in her. I think we can push and pull and try to get it out of her, but I think what happened this summer is that she saw and went after it herself. I think she was as self-committed as any player on our team this summer. She really spent time in the gym, stayed here, worked hard, worked on the weaknesses of her game. I have a lot of respect for players who do that versus players just working on what they're good at. She actually got in the gym and worked on things she really needed to improve on. She's driven right now and focused. Her defensive ability really carried us last year but I think she's added offensive this year. She's going to be somebody that teams really need to pay attention to."

Charmaine Clark: "In coaching you kind of know when a player has turned the corner. Charmaine has changed, there's a difference. She is hungry, she's playing hungry, she's playing with an incredible amount of will and determination, like 'I will not be denied' success. She doesn't say it out loud, it's not something she proclaimed, I can just see it. I think the team sees it as well. So, when you take a player that has been very productive and a very important part of our program, and you see that change occur, it makes me very confident that she will have a special season for us."

Briyana Blair: "Bri has come off a leg injury the last workout of the spring actually, really kind of a freak accident. She spent most of the offseason rehabbing and it's amazing because she's playing very fresh. She has fresh legs, she has a fresh energy, and she's an energy player. She's a high energy player for us, a very bright young lady and a high basketball IQ. She really adds a special dimension to our team and we can be a very flexible, versatile team with Bri in the lineup. Her contributions are sometimes not noticed on the stat sheet but they're noticed in the energy level. When she comes in or is on the court, we play tougher, our shoulders are back and our confidence goes up. That's a real compliment to her."

Ashley Sours: "Ashley comes in highly touted. No question, people have high expectations of her and we like expectations here in this program and we place them right up there. Our goal sheet is truly a linen sheet, it's large and we put it up right in our locker room, we put it out there. Ashley comes in with a lot of hype and a lot of expectation and a lot of success. I think one of the keys is she played for such a winning program with Lynn Larson at Central Arizona. One of the best coaches in women's basketball, I don't care what level. She's just a straight up great coach and Ashley comes from that program with a ton of success. That oozes from her, she's a confident young lady, and she's an adult and brings a lot of maturity to this team. She still has that silly

side, which I love, but a real maturity in terms of 'let's get down to business, let's get this done, I know how to win.' She speaks the truth. In that sense I think she's really going to be a force in the locker room and huddles. On the basketball side of it all, it's nice to have a player that I look up to. I'll enjoy that a lot. She's significantly taller than me and we needed that, we needed some size, we needed somebody on the offense end that I thought could finish. Our guards draw a lot of attention and I think Ashley is going to do a great job of hitting simple shots and being somebody that draws attention in the post and give us some scoring down low."

Captain LaToya Cunningham: "In my mind, I work extra at night, I'll put in an extra hour a day for LaToya. She means that much to me, she's earned that. She inspires her team to work harder and she inspires the staff to work harder. I think everybody in the league, at this point, understands how special she is. What she's done for this program, she's the heart and soul, she's been through a lot here. Her engine never stops. She's a fighter and she has a lot of pride and she's so proud of Miami. Great things are going to happen for her just because of the amount of time and effort that she puts in. Beyond that, she does a lot for us on the court. She's a tempo point guard, I think she really pushes tempo, she communicates and give a lot of confidence to her team. She'll knock down the open shot and then she'll take on anyone defensively and try to shut them down. I love having LaToya on this team and I know her teammates feel the same way. I think she's going to be a big reason why this season is going to be successful."

Vitalija Vasciunaite: "We do a per minute productivity analysis on our team and when you really look at how productive V is per minutes played, she's a very productive offensive player. She's somebody that could win a game for you, she can hit an open shot. She's got a real mental toughness to her and real accuracy on her shots, whether it's a three or just inside the three. She brings a certain savviness and a kind of European vision and passing ability that gives us some real versatility on the offensive end."

Epiphany Woodson: "Pip is going to have a really special season for us. She's another one of those kids who put in a lot of time this summer, really committed to it. She's getting to the point where she's taking ownership in this program and really understanding what it takes to be a leader and to be one of the reasons why Miami is successful. She's really taking on that responsibility and being accountable for the team's success. That's a big moment in a young player's career, when they understand that and really take it on and accept it and not only accept it but ask for it and want it. I think there's no question that Pip has taken that on and is really pushing this team. She's done a really great job with the young players as they come in to really try to take them under her wing and help them adapt and get them comfortable and confident. Beyond that, I think she's a really exciting player. She's really improved her defense an incredible amount, really spent most of the summer working on her foot work, her speed, her agility. Offensively, she's playing with a ton of confidence right now. She can score from a lot of different spots on the floor. I think she uses her strength very well as a point guard. She can really control her game. I think she's the reason we won a couple really key games last year and I think I'll be saying that again this year."

Diane Barnes: "She's 100% work. One of the best work ethics on the team, not only this team, but any team I've ever coached. She'll spend every minute of the day she can in the gym, if she's not in class. She

has a really strong desire to improve and be a dominant player in the ACC. Defensively, she'll get after you. I feel very comfortable putting her on any player on the other team. She can guard one through five and she'll do it with passion and intensity and a certain determination that makes a strong statement for us. I think the attitude of the team and the aggressiveness and how hungry we play, we look to D for that and she brings it, there's never been a day she doesn't bring it. She's going to bring intensity every day, with that, comes defense, comes rebounding, comes steals and comes, what we call, hustle-play baskets. She's just one of those over the top players, where if you need some emotion, need some energy, or you need something special to happen, D's usually the one that can bring that for us. She's going to be a big part of what we're doing."

Sylvia Bullock: "Big Syl. She has already made an incredible impact on this team. She's a very vocal player, a very intense player. Along the lines of what we do like, a very athletic, long, versatile, speedy, leaping forward for us. She'll be special on our defenses. Offensively, she's so active she'll be difficult to guard because she's a very active, emotional player. She certainly has a ton of confidence and is going to be a nice impact player for us and I'm expecting that this year."

Shenise Johnson (Moe Moe): "Moe Moe came with incredible stats, scoring 36 points in the state championship game and some 2,000 points in her high school career. But, that's not what makes her special and we knew that in recruiting her. She's special because she's a very versatile player. Her passing is phenomenal. Her rebounding from the guard position is very special. Her anticipation in terms of steals is incredible. She's a multi-dimensional player, she can score from anywhere on the court, but most of the time her scoring comes from the fact that she is a very smart basketball player. She's a very complete basketball player. She's savvy enough to look around and see what's need from her and then bring it. If we need scoring from her there's no doubt in my mind, that if we're having a tough offensive night, that Moe Moe will amp up her scoring. There's no doubt in my mind that if we're getting killed on the boards then she will bring us the rebounding we need and she can do it in amazing numbers. I do think she's going to have a huge impact on our team and our program, but I think she'll do it all within a realm of 'let's help Miami win.'"

Rikiah Gatlin: "Kia will add some strength in the post for us. We definitely needed some size down there. She has great hands, large hands and surprisingly athletic in terms of her balance and movement. From the moment we met her and recruited her, we asked her just to work really hard and from that moment, and this summer and fall, she's one of the hardest workers on the team. She just never stops, and she never quits, and just keeps getting after it. It's kind of that mentality that we needed in the post. We need kind of that 'I'm not going to talk the talk, but I will certainly walk the walk.' She's been doing it. There's a certain authenticity to her. Everyone, coaches and players, have a ton of faith in her and I really think that with time will bring some special qualities to the team."

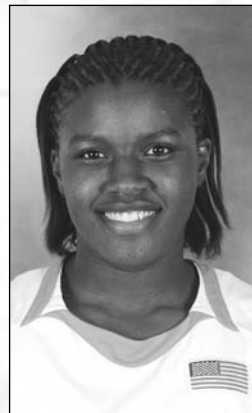

Eighth Season Overall | Fourth Season at Miami | Duke '90



University of Miami head coach Katie Meier enters her fourth year at the helm of the Hurricanes' women's basketball program. A well known and respected figure in women's basketball, Meier has worked tirelessly to put her mark on Miami's program and to build a winning tradition.

Hired on April 19, 2005, UM Athletics Director Paul Dee announced the appointment of Meier in front of national and local media, fans, alumni and support staff, signifying the beginning of a new era.

Following an unprecedented career as one of the greatest athletes to ever play in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Meier quickly established herself in the coaching ranks. Upon her appointment at UM, following an impressive four-year tenure as the head coach at Charlotte where she helped bring the 49er program into national prominence, Meier made it clear that her goal is to make Miami one of the premier women's basketball programs in the country.

In her first season, Meier wasted little time in making the first steps towards those goals. After receiving little attention in the ACC preseason polls, the Hurricanes posted an impressive overall record of 17-13 and, fighting through a conference that would send nine teams to the postseason, including three to the NCAA Final Four, finished with sixth-place, 6-8 record in ACC play en route to earning a berth into the second round of the 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournament.

Throughout the season Miami posted wins over ranked teams such as Mississippi (No. 25), Boston College (No. 21) and Virginia Tech (No. 25)—and nearly knocked off then-No. 1 Duke in double-overtime. The Hurricanes also recorded wins over two eventual conference champions in Hartford (America East) and Oakland (Mid-Continent).

Under her direction, standout Tamara James produced one of the greatest seasons ever seen by a UM player in 2005-06, including becoming the University's all-time

leading scorer before being taken as the No. 8 overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics.

In Meier's second season in 2006-07, the Hurricanes got off to a strong start, winning seven of their first eight games—including a 79-70 win over Indiana to claim the UM Thanksgiving Tournament title. On Dec. 1, Meier picked up her 100th career victory as the Hurricanes defeated Jackson State, 77-50. However, with only eight healthy players to call upon by the start of the ACC schedule, Miami faced challenge after challenge competing in a league that ranked among the top-three strongest women's basketball conferences nationally and produced two of the NCAA Tournament's four No. 1 seeds in 2006-07.

Regardless, Renee Taylor emerged as the ACC's leading scorer—upholding Miami's streak of producing the league's leading scorer in all three years it has been a member. The All-ACC Second Team selection set school records in single-game scoring with 42 points at Houston and became the 19th Hurricane to score at least 1,000 points—and just the sixth to do so in her first two seasons. In addition, transfer Maurita Reid emerged as a defensive threat, tying the school record with 10 steals versus Wake Forest and finishing among the ACC's leaders and NCAA's top 10 in steals per game.

The 2007-08 season, Meier's third with the Hurricanes, saw Maurita Reid continue her rise among the ACC elite. The senior was nothing short of impressive shooting beyond the arc and picking opponents pockets. She hit four or more three-pointers on 10 different occasions and finished the season with 110 steals, good for second in the conference and fifth in the NCAA. The Queens, N.Y. native led the team in points (15.3 ppg) and rebounding (5.6 rpg) and was also named the ACC All-Defensive Team.

However, Reid wasn't the only contributor for the Hurricanes. A strong freshmen class, led by guard Epiphany Woodson, helped build a foundation for Miami's immediate future. Woodson ended the season as the team's third leading scorer (6.4 ppg) and shared starts with the veteran LaToya Cunningham at the point.

The 2008-09 season is shaping up to be one of Meier's best in South Florida as she and her staff recruited a strong incoming class, ranked as high as No. 21 in some basketball publications. The young talent added with the existing leadership will be something to look out for in the rugged ACC.

BUILDING A TRADITION AT CHARLOTTE

Meier could solely be responsible for bringing the 49er women's basketball program into national prominence. Prior to her appointment as head coach at Charlotte in 2001, the 49ers had only one previous postseason appearance—a WNIT berth in 1990.

During her four-year tenure at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to three postseason berths—one NCAA Tournament appearance (2003) and two WNIT appearances (2004, 2005)—and a combined overall record of 76-45 (.628).

In her inaugural campaign at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to a 16-13 finish to record their first winning season in eight years.

The following season, she guided the 49ers to a 21-9 finish marking the most wins (21) in over a decade at Charlotte. With a 12-2 record in Conference USA play, Meier and the 49ers also earned the school's first-ever C-USA regular-season championship and earned the school's first-ever appearance at the NCAA Tournament. In 2003-04, Meier and the 49ers concluded the season with a 17-14 record while earning a trip to the 2004 WNIT. Along with marking the first time in school history that the 49ers had made back-to-back postseason appearances, Meier also led Charlotte to their first-ever postseason victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the first round of the WNIT.

In 2004-05, she enjoyed an overall record of 22-9 to tie for the third-most single season wins in Charlotte history and the most wins for the program in a single season since 1990-91. The 49ers also advanced to the postseason for the third-consecutive season and the WNIT for the second-straight year.

Prior to Charlotte, Meier spent seven seasons at Tulane University, serving as an associate head coach from 1999-01 and an assistant coach on the Green Wave staff from 1994-99. As a member of the Tulane coaching staff, Meier helped the Green Wave to an overall record of 164-52 (.759) in seven seasons, including the highest-ranking in school history (13th by the Associated Press) in 2000 and a school-record 27 wins the same season.

During her time at Tulane, Meier and the Green Wave also saw an impressive seven-year run at the NCAA Tournament.

Meier began her collegiate coaching career at the University of North Carolina at Asheville where she served as an assistant coach during the 1993-94 season.

ESTABLISHING HER LEGACY AS A PLAYER

Meier's success as a coach is a direct reflection on her playing career as a standout at Duke University. A four-year letterwinner for the Blue Devils under head coach Debbie Leonard from 1986-90, Meier's name is scattered throughout the Duke record books.

She currently ranks among the school's all-time career leaders in scoring average (16.2 points per game), steals (232), free throws made (447) and free throws attempted (624). She is also listed among Duke's leaders in career points (1,761), field goals made (653), field goals attempted (1,283), assists (409) and rebounding average (6.1 rebounds per game).

Meier wasted no time making her mark at Duke, earning ACC Rookie of the Year and Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America honors 1986. Meier injured her knee in 1988 during her junior season and ultimately missed the entire 1989 campaign while recovering.

The women's basketball team also wore pink during select games for the WBCA's Think Pink program, last season. This season, the Hurricanes have planned to don pink accessories during the WBCA's Pink Zone campaign.

Meier returned to Duke for her senior season in 1990 without missing a beat, earning Kodak/WBCA District 2 All-America and All-ACC First Team accolades while being named the Blue Devils' most valuable player.

In 2002, Meier was honored by Duke for her efforts as a player when she was named to the inaugural induction class in the Blue Devils' Hall of Honor. That same year Meier was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary Team. In 2006, she was once again honored by the conference when she was named one of 12 ACC Tournament Legends at the 2006 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament.

Meier's success on the court was only outdone by her accomplishments in the classroom. She was named to the Dean's List from 1986-88. In 1988 she also earned GTE Academic All-America Second Team honors.

After earning a bachelor's degree in English literature with cum laude honors in 1989, Meier went on to earn a Master of Arts in Teaching English from Duke in 1990.

Following her playing career at Duke, Meier moved overseas to play three seasons with BBC Mini-Flat Waregem in Belgium from 1990-93. There, she helped lead her team to three First Division regular season titles and one Belgian Cup Championship.

While in Belgium, Meier also spent time teaching classes of conversational English while coaching teams of 15- to 17-year-olds.

A native of Wheaton, Ill., Meier graduated from Wheaton High School in 1985.

Gibbs joined the UM coaching ranks prior to the 2005-06 season, and helped lead UM to a 17-13 record and an appearance at the 2006 WNIT in his first season with the Hurricanes.

Prior to his arrival at UM, Gibbs served as an assistant coach under Katie Meier at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte for two seasons from 2003-05. While at Charlotte, Gibbs helped Meier lead the 49ers to two WNIT appearances, including Charlotte's first post-season victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the 2004 WNIT. The 49ers

put together 39-23 record in those two seasons, including a 22-9 mark in 2004-05 to tie for the third-most single-season wins in Charlotte history.

As one of the 49ers' main recruiting contacts, Gibbs played a major role in putting together their 33rd-ranked 2004 recruiting class during his first season at Charlotte.

Gibbs joined the Charlotte coaching staff in 2003 following a two-year stay at the College of Charleston where he served as an assistant coach from 2001-03. His responsibilities with the Cougars included recruiting, organizing practice schedules, scouting opponents and coordinating team travel.

Prior to his stint at the College of Charleston, Gibbs spent three seasons at Wofford College. As an undergraduate, he served as a student assistant with the Terriers from 1998-00, and remained with the team as an assistant during the 2000-01 season.

Originally from Pawleys Island, S.C., Gibbs received a bachelor's degree in psychology from Wofford in 2000.

Having served as an assistant coach on the collegiate level at TCU, Arkansas State, Wisconsin-La Crosse and Cal State Northridge, Hall was promoted from her position as UM's Director of Basketball Operations to assistant coach prior to the 2006-07 season.

As the Director of Basketball Operations at UM, her responsibilities included organizing and coordinating team travel and practices, as well as the production of alumni and team newsletters. She also worked with the UM Marketing and Sports Media Relations offices to help

organize various promotional activities.

As an assistant coach with the Lady Frogs, Hall helped guide TCU to three-consecutive NCAA Tournaments while coaching notable players such as Fort Lauderdale native and former All-American Sandora Irvin, who was later selected as the No. 3 overall pick in the 2005 WNBA Draft. Along with coaching, Hall's responsibilities included recruiting, practice and game preparation efforts, in addition to preparing the team's travel arrangements.

While at TCU, Hall also served as an assistant director for the 2004 Conference USA Women's Basketball Tournament and was a member of the TCU Athletic Department's Outreach Committee, Mission Statement Committee and Diversity Subcommittee.

Hall's coaching career began in 1998 at Hueneme High School in Oxnard, Calif., where she served as the head coach of the junior varsity girl's basketball team until 1990.

Following her stay at Hueneme, Hall went on to California State University-Northridge to serve as an assistant coach from 1992-94 before moving on to join the coaching staff at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse from 1994-96. After two seasons at UW-L, Hall spent three seasons at Arkansas State as an assistant coach from 1996-99 prior to her stint at TCU.

A native of Oxnard, Calif., Hall served in the United States Navy from 1986-88. She earned an associate's degree in art from Ventura Junior College in 1991 and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from California State University-Northridge in 1994. Hall added a master's degree in sports administration from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse in 1996.

Kieger graduated from Marquette University with a Bachelor's degree in Broadcasting and Electrical Communications in 2006. In 2007, she received the McCahill Award given to a MU graduated senior student-athlete who demonstrated the highest performance in scholarship, leadership and athletics.

As a junior, she became the 13th 49er in school history to score 1,000 career points, scoring in double-figures in 22 of 31 games that season. She was named to Conference USA's All-Freshmen Team in 2002-03.

A native of Coppell, Texas, Brown was a Street and Smith honorable mention All-American and rated 31st among power forwards in the nation according to the All-Star Girls Report. The Coppell High School graduate set a school record with 2,036 career points, while grabbing 1,245 rebounds.

Hurricane Force

From outdoor courts to Big East titles and the challenge of the ACC

Rewind 35 years and you'll find the beginnings of what would blossom into women's basketball at the University of Miami.

From its humble beginnings in 1972-73, with non-scholarship athletes playing on outdoor courts, to more than 500 wins later in 2007-08, with a roster full of recruited talent showcasing their skills in a state-of-the-art facility, Hurricanes women's basketball has come a long way.

FROM THE START

In its first two seasons, the Miami women's basketball team competed on outdoor courts and rumor has it that a game was actually rained out. But the players persevered under the program's first head coach, Barry Schimer, and after finishing the inaugural season 2-6, the Hurricanes went on to winning records in each of the next two seasons and finished runner up in the 1975 Florida AIAW State Championship Tournament.

The Hurricanes moved into their first home—the William Lane Campus Sports and Recreation Center—for the 1975-76 season under the program's second head coach Shula Feuer. Just two games into the season, Miami used a 100-20 win over Homestead Air Force Base, to set a school record with the 80-point margin of victory that still stands more than 30 years later.

In 1977-78, Miami's first 1,000-point scorer emerged in Wendy Foote, who averaged a school-record 25.2 points per game as a senior. She would go on to become the first University of Miami basketball player since Rick Barry to sign a professional contract when she signed with the New Orleans Pride of the Women's Professional Basketball League.

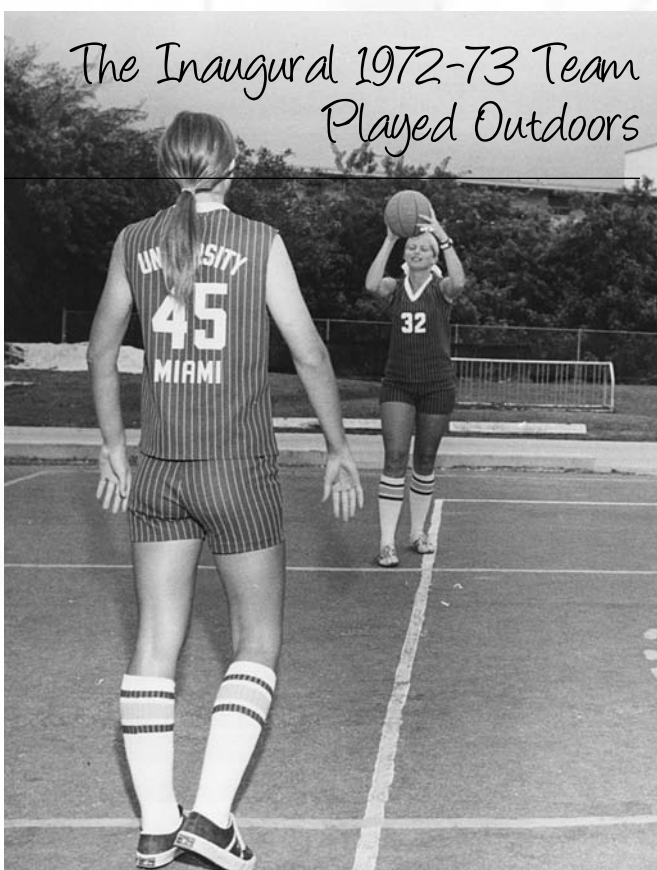
ANOTHER STEP FORWARD

As the Hurricanes moved toward their eighth season of competition, Lin Dunn was hired from the University of Mississippi to take over the reigns of the UM women's basketball program. In her nine seasons at the helm of a burgeoning Hurricanes program, Dunn compiled 149 wins and led the team to a school-record six consecutive winning seasons, two 20-win seasons, one Florida AIAW State Championship and two berths in the AIAW Region III Tournament.



The 1979-80 season, was pivotal in the progression of women's basketball at the university, as the team received its first scholarships (seven) and went on to finish 18-16. Miami gained three additional scholarships for the 1980-81 season and completed one of the most successful campaigns in school history, recording the first 20-win season at 24-18. The Hurricanes went on to win their first Florida AIAW State Championship and advance to the AIAW Region III Tournament.

UM received its full complement of 12 scholarships in 1981-82, and was rewarded with a 19-10 record and a second-straight berth to the AIAW Region III Championships. That season, Sylvia Wilson wrapped up her collegiate career as Miami's leader in points (1,713) and rebounds (1,115), and remains the only Hurricane to grab more than 1,000 career boards.



A NEW HOME, A NEW SCORING LEADER

With the resurrection of Miami men's basketball in 1985-86, both the men's and women's teams moved into the Knight Sports Complex. As the team continued to develop and battle top-20 teams, a player named Maria Rivera—who had set a freshman scoring record with 523 points during the previous season—began to emerge as a serious threat for Hurricane opponents.

Averaging 21.4 points per game as a sophomore, Rivera surpassed the 1,000-point scoring plateau in just her second season and would go on to become the first women's basketball player in Miami history to score more than 2,000 career points. She set a school record that would stand for 18 years with a 41-point performance versus Central Florida, while also breaking Rick Barry's school-record of 2,298 points.

Rivera would close her collegiate career as both Miami's all-time leading scorer with 2,538 points and its all-time steals leader with 382.

A date to the big dance

Ferne Labati took over the women's basketball program in 1988 and guided the Hurricanes to a 21-8 record and Miami's first NCAA bid. The Hurricanes traveled to Stillwater, Okla., where they fell to Oklahoma State, 93-69, despite 21-point efforts from eventual All-American Frances Savage and Elaine Harlow.

Labati and the Hurricanes battled to a school-record 25-6 mark in 1989-90, completing the first back-to-back 20-win campaigns in school history, and advanced to their first National Women's Invitational Tournament. That season, Savage averaged 23.6 points per game and set a single-season scoring record with 733 points—and needed just 45 games to become the quickest woman to reach 1,000 points in UM history.

Program History

After competing as independents since its inaugural season in 1972, Miami became a member of the New South Women's Athletic Conference in 1990-91, and would go on to post its third-straight 20-win season, finishing with a 20-10 overall record, a 9-3 mark in NSWAC play and the conference title.

DREAMING BIG

The Hurricanes became the 10th member of the BIG EAST Conference and began league play in 1991-92—their "Dream Season". Although Miami's season started and ended with a loss, the Hurricanes put together 30-straight wins in between—going undefeated (18-0) in conference play for the first time in BIG EAST history, winning the BIG EAST Tournament and advancing to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament to finish with a top-10 national ranking.

Following an 84-67 regular-season ending win over Villanova, the Hurricanes moved up to No. 7 in the national polls and Savage was named Women's Basketball Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated. The BIG EAST would go on to recognize Savage as BIG EAST Player of the Year, Labati as the league's Coach of the Year and Vicki Plowden and Savage as All-BIG EAST First Team picks. Labati was also heralded as the Kodak/WBCA National Coach of the Year.

The Hurricanes followed up that "Dream Season" with another BIG EAST title in 1992-93 with its school-record fifth-straight 20-win season, as the team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Under Labati's leadership, the Hurricanes would make three more NCAA Tournament appearances and advance to the WNIT twice.

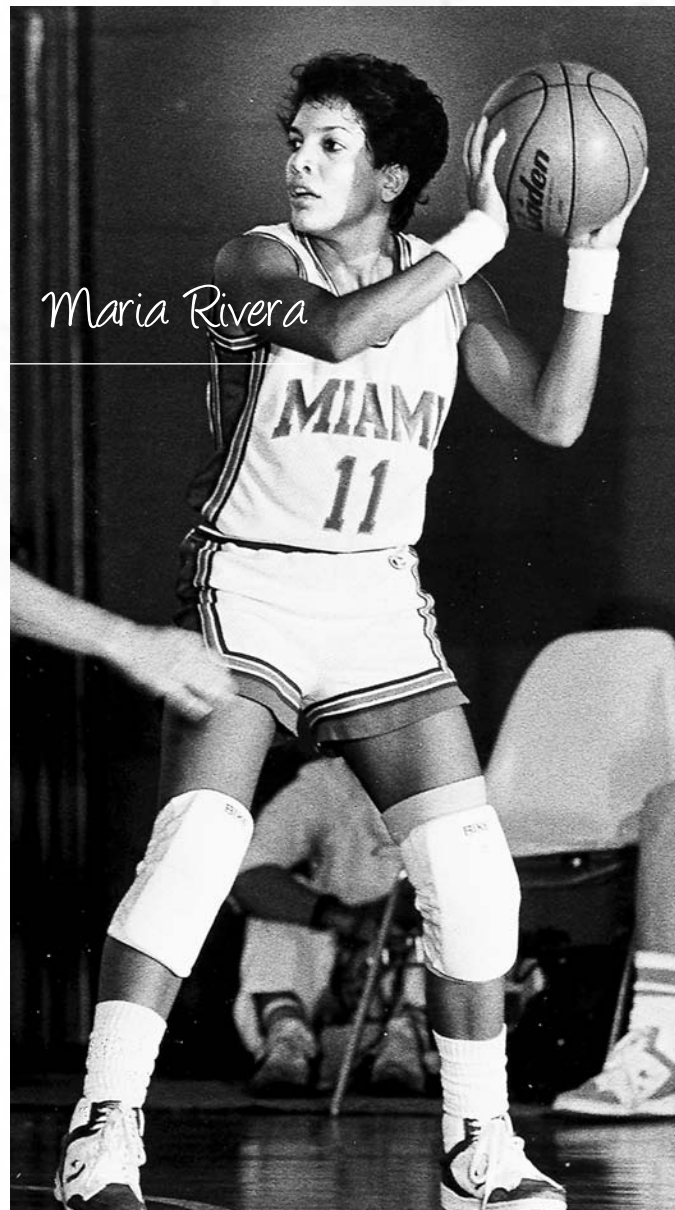
The Hurricanes built a new home, with the opening of the on-campus Convocation Center—now the BankUnited Center—on January 15, 2003. The \$48 million facility boasts three stories, 7,000 seats and 200,000 square feet.

WHEN OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS

After a 13-year run through the BIG EAST, Miami became members of the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004.

Despite a challenging inaugural season in the ACC, Miami advanced to the second round of the ACC Tournament behind the effort of Tamara James—just the second player in NCAA history to lead two conferences in scoring. As a sophomore, James earned All-BIG EAST First Team honors after averaging a league-high 16.6 points per game, and as a junior, she ranked with fifth in the NCAA with an ACC-high 22.3 points per game, earning All-ACC recognition as well as Honorable Mention All-American honors by both the AP and WBCA/Kodak.

In 2005-06, James and the Hurricanes continued to improve under first-year head coach Katie Meier. In her debut, Meier steered the 'Canes to a 17-13 overall record and a 6-8 league mark to place sixth in a conference that would send nine teams to

the postseason—including three to the NCAA Final Four. With regular-season wins over several nationally-ranked opponents—and a nearly knocking off then-No. 1 Duke in double overtime—Miami advanced to the postseason for the 12th time in school history, making it as far as the Second Round of the WNIT.

James, who repeated as the ACC's scoring leader as a senior, wrapped up her UM career as the program's all-time leading scorer with 2,406 points and was selected by the Washington Mystics with the eighth overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft.

In 2006-07, a new leader emerged in the diminutive Renee Taylor, who carried on James' tradition of leading the ACC in scoring—as the Hurricanes have produced the ACC's leading scorer in all three seasons they have been a member. Taylors' 42 points versus Houston broke Rivera's 1998 single-game scoring record, and she became the 19th member of Miami's 1,000-points club in her final regular-season game versus NC State, and was the sixth Hurricane to accomplish the feat in her first two years with the squad. She finished her two-year career at Miami with 1,025 points.

The 2007-08 campaign saw Taylor's junior college teammate, Maurita Reid take over as the team's go-to offensive threat. In her senior season, Reid helped continue an impressive streak, as the Hurricanes made it 225 straight games with a three-point field goal. Reid accounted for 43 percent of the three pointers Miami scored on the season, sinking 76 shots from beyond the arc.

Meier leads the Hurricanes into their fifth season of ACC play and bring in a top-25 recruiting class with them in 2008-09



COACHING RECORDS

With the appointment of Katie Meier in 2005, the University of Miami announced just its seventh head women's basketball coach in the program's 34-year history. Meier joined an impressive UM coaching family that includes former legendary coaches Lin Dunn and Ferne Labati.

Labati is UM's all-time leader in career victories, posting an overall record of 303-195 (.608) during her 17-year career from 1988-05. Labati was named the Kodak/WBCA National Coach of the Year following the 1991-92 season in which she guided the Hurricanes to a school-record 30 wins with just two losses and a birth into the "Sweet 16" of the 1992 NCAA Tournament.

As one of the most electric scorers ever to step on the court and play at the University of Miami, Maria Rivera left her mark at UM as a four-year standout with the Hurricanes. During her playing career from 1984-88, Rivera reached a level never before achieved at Miami and left UM as the school record holder in several categories, including career points with 2,358.

Rivera came to Miami by way of Canovana, Puerto Rico, where, at just the age of 14, she was named the 1978 Player of the Year by the Puerto Rican Olympic Committee before going on to star on the Puerto Rican 1979 and 1983 Pan American Teams.

From day one she showed an unprecedented desire to achieve at UM. Speaking only Spanish, Rivera borrowed \$2,000 dollars from a bank to enroll in an intense fast-paced English program to pass an English equivalency exam required to enroll at Miami, and just three months later she was on campus and playing for the Hurricanes.



Rivera averaged 18.7 points—the seventh highest single-season average in school history—and 5.3 assists, leading the Hurricanes in scoring in 13-of-28 games in 1984-85, her first season at UM. That season she showed what lay ahead on several occasions, including a school-record setting performance against Lamar where she hit 10-of-11 shots from the field and a 33-point outing against Florida. Following the conclusion of the regular season, she was named to the Women's Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America Team.

The following season she stepped up her game, averaging 21.4 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.3 assists per game. Her 21.4 points per game was the second-highest single-season average in UM history and her 579 points was the third-highest ever at Miami.

Rivera's junior season was highlighted by yet another impressive scoring output, averaging 20.9 points, which ranked third all-time at UM just behind her previous season's mark. That season was full of memorable achievements, including a then-career high 38-point game in UM's opener against Monmouth, but none were more exciting than when she surpassed former Hurricane Sylvia Wilson to become Miami's all-time leading scorer.

Rivera also put together a memorable senior campaign. Needing 29 points to break former men's basketball legend Rick Barry's UM basketball record of 2,298 points, Rivera scored 30 points in the first half of a February 25th contest with Central Florida en route to a then-school-record 41 points to become the University of Miami's all-time leading scorer in both men's and women's basketball.

Upon finishing her career with the Hurricanes, Rivera left as the school record-holder in 16 separate categories—including points (2,358), scoring average (21.1 ppg), steals (382) and field goals made (891) and attempted (1,931) to firmly ensure her place as one of the greatest basketball players to ever play at the University of Miami.

Frances Savage is arguably one of the best players to ever don a uniform at the University of Miami. During her four-year career from 1988-91 Savage etched her name throughout the UM record books. She left as the school's second all-time leading

scorer with 2,184 points and first all-time with a career 23.2 scoring average—despite missing all but two games of her senior season.

The 12th child of a household of 13 children, the Fort Lauderdale, Florida native averaged over 30 points per game during her senior season at Sunrise Piper High School and was named the Miami Herald's Broward Player of the Year in 1985 and 1987.

After drawing All-America honors as a high school standout, Savage chose to attend the University of Miami, but was forced to sit out her freshman season in 1987 while fulfilling academic requirements.

Once her opportunity arose in 1988, Savage burst onto the scene at UM, scoring 32 points in her collegiate debut versus Southwest Missouri State—the most points scored by a Miami player in their opening game. She would go on to start and score double figures in all 29 games of the 1988 season, averaging 22.4 points and 9.2 rebounds per game.



As a preseason All-America candidate, Savage's junior season picked up where the 1988 season left off, scoring double figures in all 31 games that season while leading the team in points per game (23.6), rebounds per game (9.5), steals (71), free throw percentage (.786) and field goal percentage (.540).

In 1990, Savage opened her senior season with back-to-back 30-point outings, but was lost for the year with a torn ACL suffered in just the second game of the season.

Granted a fifth year of eligibility, in 1991, Savage returned to score 31 points in her first start against in-state rival, Florida. She tied the then-school record with 41 points in UM's win over Providence during the course of the Hurricanes' 30-game win streak.

Averaging 23.3 points and 10.6 rebounds per game, Savage helped lead the Hurricanes to the BIG EAST Championship title in only their first season in the conference and was named both the BIG EAST and Sports Illustrated Player of the Year, in addition to garnering Kodak All-America honors.

Savage left UM as one of the most decorated athletes in school history, holding nine Hurricane records as well as finishing as the school's second all-time leading scorer, and has since been inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame and the University of Miami's "Iron Arrow" Society—the highest honor bestowed on an individual by the university.

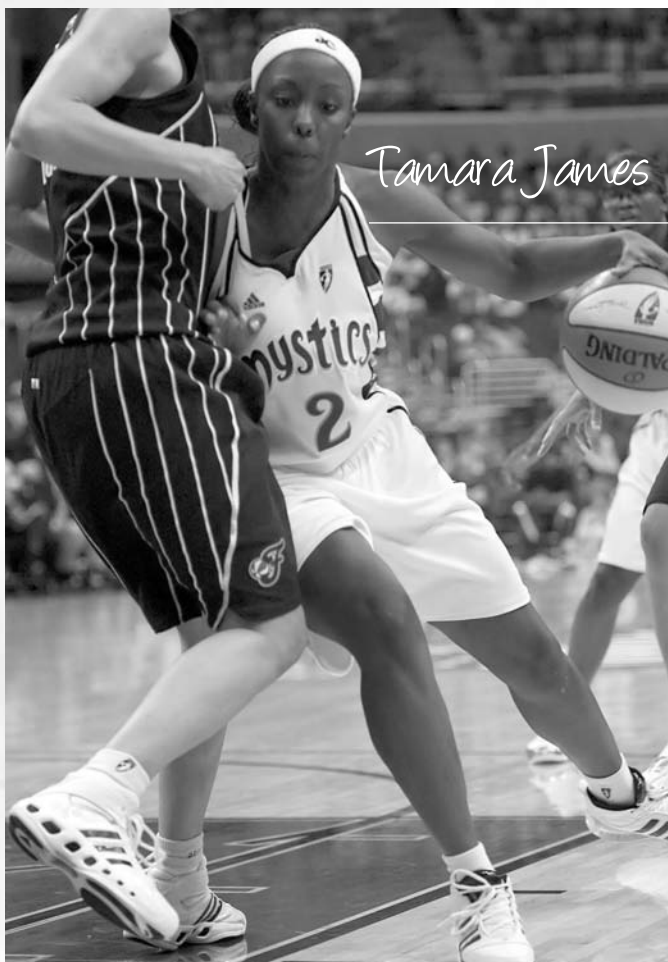

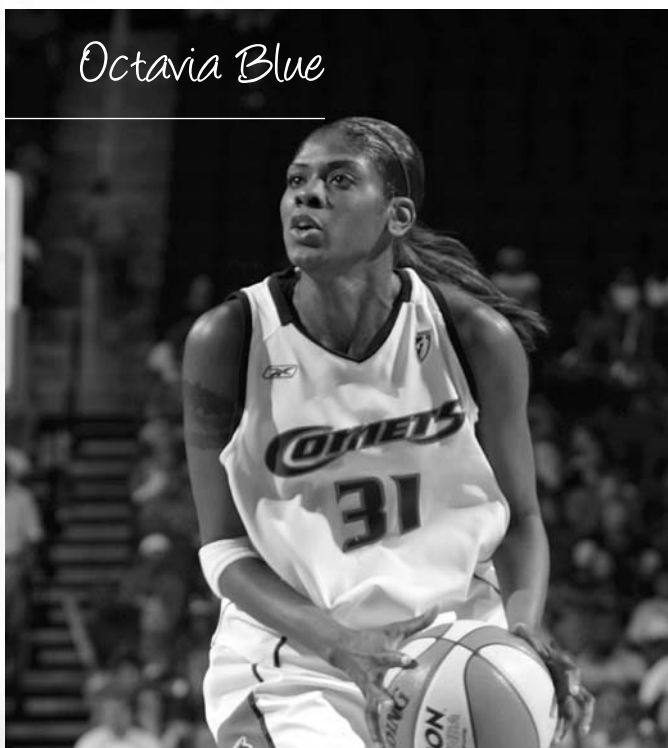

Postseason Results

The Hurricanes have made a total of 10 postseason appearances in school history, earning six NCAA Tournament and four WNIT berths in the program's 35-year history. Miami has an overall record of 5-11 (.313) in postseason tournaments, posting a 2-6 (.250) mark in the NCAA Tournament and a 3-5 (.375) record in the WNIT.

UM's longest run at the NCAA Tournament came during the 1991-92 season when after drawing No. 2 seed in the East Regional behind a 29-1 record and a BIG EAST Championship Title, the Hurricanes advanced to the "Sweet 16" before falling to Vanderbilt, 77-67, in Charlottesville, Va.

UM's last NCAA Tournament appearance came following the 2003-04 regular season and the last WNIT berth came in 2005-06.
