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A LETTER FROM THE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Whether it's succeeding on the field of play, excelling in the classroom or reaching out to serve our South Florida community, we continue to Build Champions at The U.

The Hurricanes just wrapped up another remarkable school year in 2018-19. Our accomplishments are a tribute to the hard work and dedication of our student-athletes, coaches and staff, as well as the continued support we receive from donors, alumni and fans to make it all possible.

Thirteen of our 18 programs advanced to NCAA postseason play. Our women's indoor track and field team won the ACC title for the third time in four seasons. Two Hurricanes captured individual NCAA championships – Michelle Athlerley in the women's indoor pentathlon and Estela Perez-Somarriba in women's tennis. In addition, two UM divers – David Dinsmore and Briadam Herrera – placed second at the NCAA Championships.

Overall, Hurricane student-athletes earned four ACC Player of the Year honors, 68 All-ACC selections, 11 individual ACC titles and 35 All-America accolades. Randy Ableman was named ACC Men's and Women's Diving Coach of the Year and Amy Deem was named ACC Indoor Track & Field Women's Coach of the Year.

In the most recent Graduation Success Rate figures released by the NCAA, Miami student-athletes posted a GSR mark of 90 percent. Nine programs were recognized for perfect single-year scores of 1,000 in the 2017-18 Academic Progress Report (APR). In addition, six of those programs – men's and women's cross country, golf, men's and women's tennis and volleyball – earned perfect multi-year scores of 1,000 for the four-year period from 2014-15 to 2017-18. Our student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom, and our dedicated coaches and academic staff members work tirelessly to help them achieve these results.

Our mission to give back to the community that so strongly supports us continues to grow. For the second consecutive year, Hurricane student-athletes ranked in the Top 10 among all Division I schools in the NCAA Team Works Helper Helper Community Service Competition, participating in 146 events and logging more than 3,600 hours of community service.

On the development front, the Hurricane Club continues to support our program in record numbers. The Hurricane Club raised more than \$16 million in 2018-19 and now boasts a record 12,500 members, an increase of 140 percent since 2010. Philanthropic annual fund gifts increased to \$5.9 million in 2018-19 and the Hurricane Club secured 10 seven-figure leadership gifts. Your donations give our student-athletes and coaches the absolute best chance to compete and succeed, including academic support, student-athlete development, nutrition, technology and state-of-the-art facilities.



In August 2018, the new, state-of-the-art Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility opened for use. The \$40-plus million facility encompasses not just indoor practice fields for football, but also new football coaches offices, new football reception and recruiting areas, weight room renovations and new coaches offices for golf, rowing, soccer and volleyball.

The renovations also include our new studio for the ACC Network, which launches this August and will provide a tremendous platform to help promote and showcase Miami Athletics to a wide audience. It's truly an exciting time to be involved with The U!

Thank you to everyone who has invested in our athletic department over the past year. Your generosity has helped our student-athletes succeed in the classroom, in competition -- and in life. We are looking forward to the start of another memorable season this fall. We hope to see you cheering on the Canes all year long!

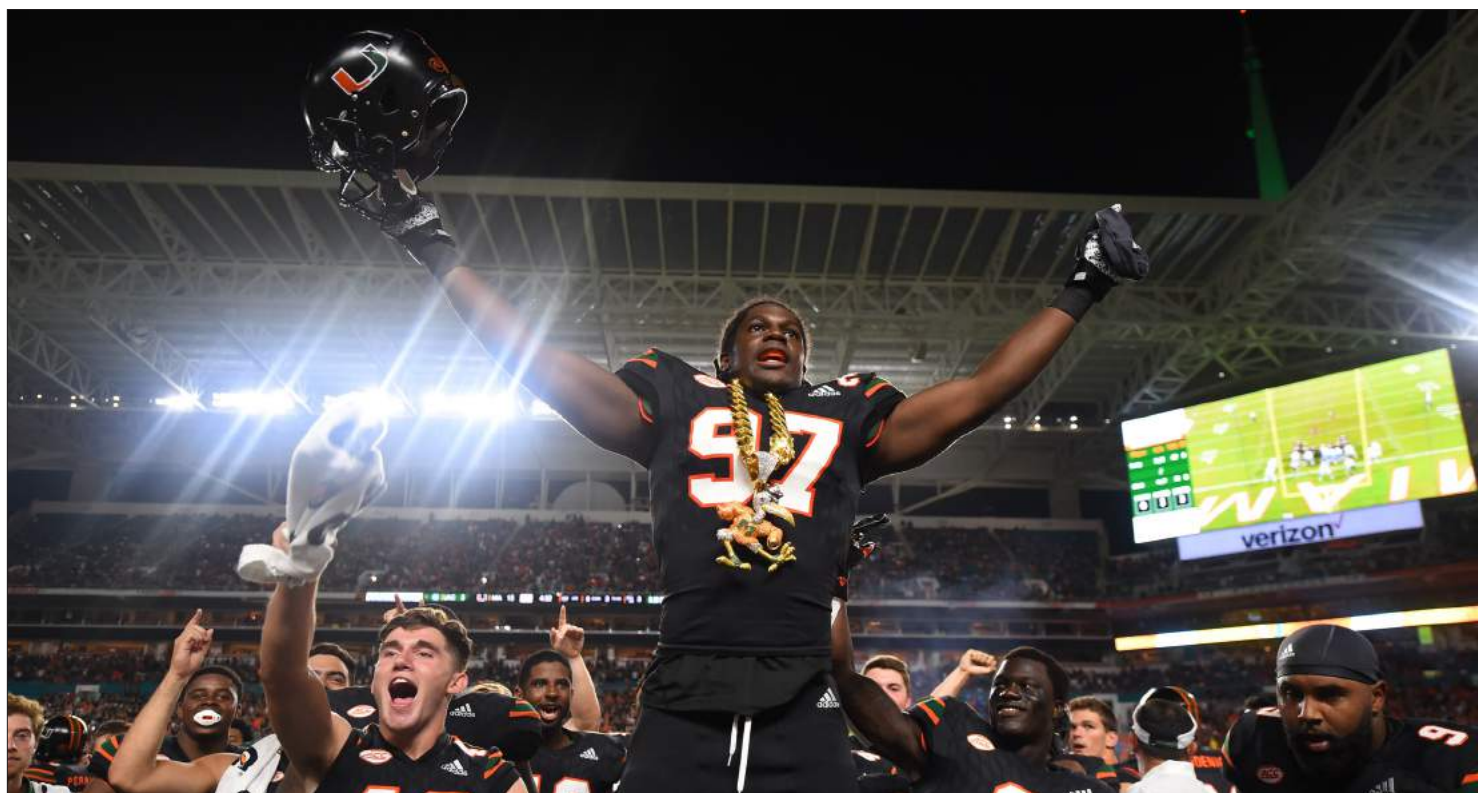

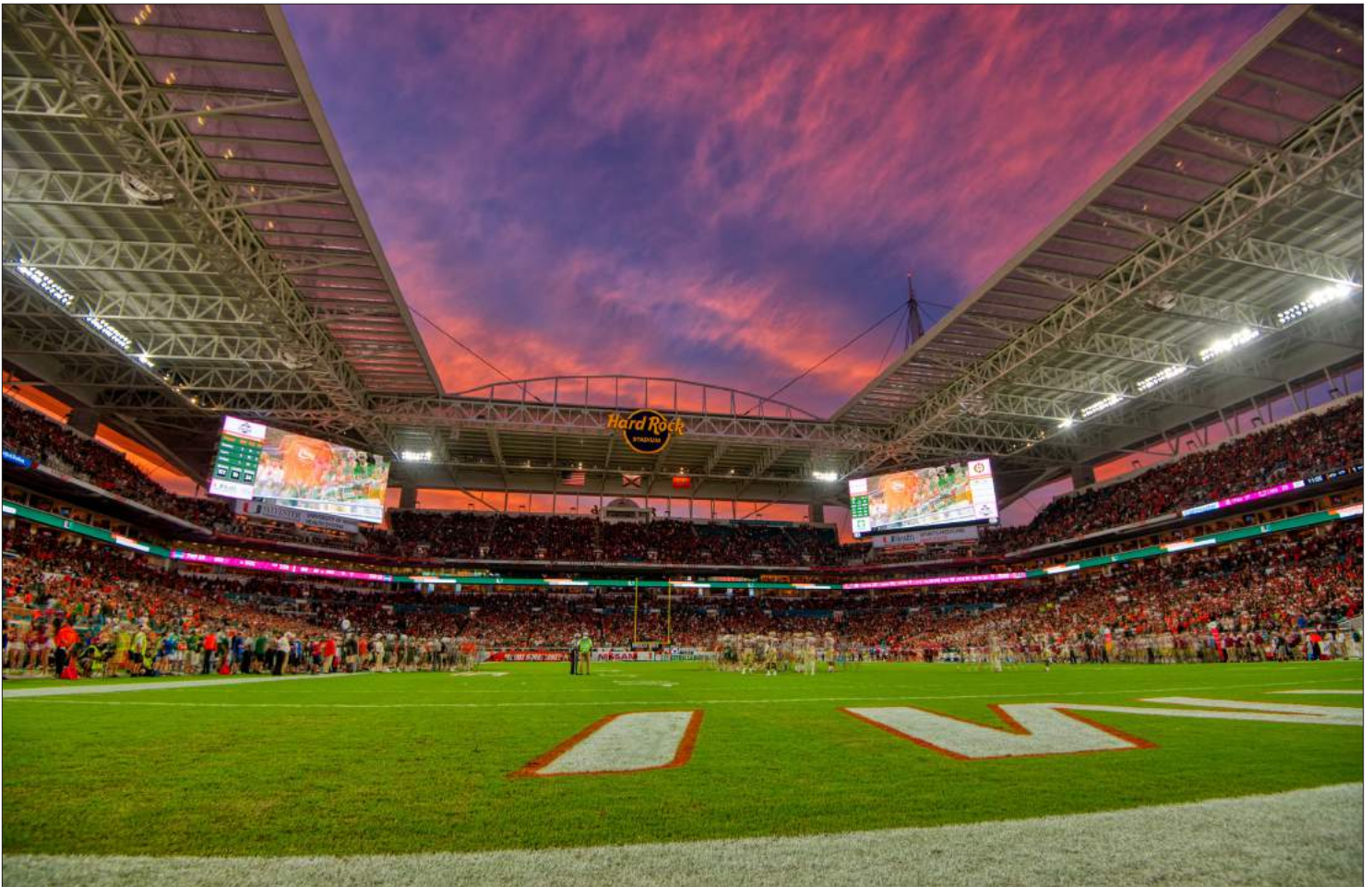
OUR MISSION

BASEBALL

- Miami had an impressive first season under head coach Gino DiMare's tutelage, finishing 41-20 and returning to the NCAA postseason for the first time since 2016. The Canes earned the 46th postseason berth in program history and reached the Starkville Regional final before falling to No. 6 Mississippi State.
- The Hurricanes went 18-12 in ACC play, winning seven conference series and turning in their best conference record since 2016.
- Del Castillo was named a Freshman All-American by Baseball America, D1 Baseball and Perfect Game and was joined by freshman Slade Cecconi on Collegiate Baseball Newspaper's Freshman All-America Team.
- Alex Toral led a powerful Hurricane lineup that clubbed 85 home runs on the season, the most since Miami hit 106 in 2010. The first baseman smashed a team-high 24 home runs on the season to move into a tie with Yonder Alonso for the second-most home runs by a Hurricane in a single season.
- Twelve different Hurricanes hit at least one home run in 2019, sparking an explosion of power from the Miami bats that matched the 2018 season home run total of 23 after just 15 games in 2019. The Canes' 85 homers were more than the combined team home run total of 58 from the previous two seasons (35 in 2017 and 23 in 2018).
- Three-time honoree Evan McKendry led eight Hurricanes that were selected to the 2019 All-ACC Academic Team, tying for the second-most in the conference with Virginia.
- After the season, five Hurricanes were selected in the MLB First-Year Player Draft, with Amditis, McKendry and pitchers Gregory Veliz and Mark Mixon all signing contracts to begin their professional careers.

MEN'S BASKETBALL

- Miami posted a 14-18 record, including a 5-13 mark in ACC play.
- Chris Lykes led the team in scoring and ranked ninth in the ACC in overall scoring (16.2) and eighth in league play (15.9).
- Lykes was the second-leading scorer nationally among players under 6-feet tall in the six power conferences (Markus Howard, Marquette, 25.0 ppg).
- Miami was the only program among the nation's power conferences to have five players each average at least 10.5 ppg.
- UM defeated Wake Forest, 79-71, in first round of the ACC Tournament, marking the seventh time in head coach Jim Larrañaga's eight years the Canes picked up at least one win in the tournament.
- Because of injuries and a suspension, UM played with a rotation of just seven scholarship student-athletes for most of the season.
- Anthony Lawrence II reached the 1,000-point mark in his career on March 5 on Senior Night against Pittsburgh. Lawrence finished with 1,043 points (34th in school history) and 141 career steals (ninth in school history) and played in 130 career games (tied for fifth in program history).
- With 14 wins, Larrañaga finished the season with 645 career victories, 11th most nationally among active head coaches.

WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

- Made the postseason for the 10th year in a row, played in the NCAA Tournament for the eighth time in nine years, hosted NCAA action for the second time in three years, won 20-plus games for the ninth time in 10 seasons and tallied 10-plus ACC victories for the seventh time in nine seasons.
- Tied for the fourth-most wins in a season in program history by finishing 25-9 and logged six top-25 triumphs, including two over top-five foes and one over a top-three opponent for the first time in program history.
- Head coach Katie Meier eclipsed 350 wins in her 18-year head coaching tenure, en route to Werner Ladder Naismith Coach of the Year top-15 candidacy, and the redshirt senior Khaila Prather became the first Miami basketball player, male or female, to be part of five NCAA Tournament rosters.
- Beatrice Mompremier earned multiple All-America honorable mentions to go along with three ACC Player of the Week distinctions, First Team All-ACC recognition, Lisa Leslie Center of the Year finalist plaudits, midseason watch list selection for multiple national player of the year awards and a program single-season record-setting 12.2 rebounds per game.
- Emese Hof was a WBCA All-America Honorable Mention who received a First Team All-ACC accolades, ACC Most Improved Player distinction, All-ACC Defensive Team honors, an ESPNW National Player of the Week recognition, All-ACC Academic Team selection and set the program records for single-season (58.6) and career (54.9) field goal percentage, before signing with the WNBA's Phoenix Mercury.

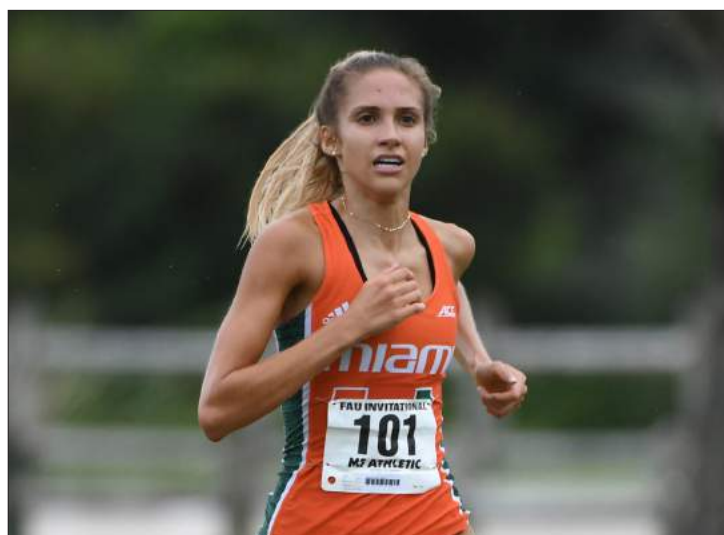

CROSS COUNTRY

- Six runners (one man, five women) represented Miami at the NCAA South Regional.
- Both the men's and women's team finished 15th at the ACC Championships
- Dylan Sykes was Miami's top finisher six times, while Matthew Wiefels was close behind with three second-place finishes.
- Men's team finished first at the UCF Invitational.
- Anne den Otter and Olivia Raymond were the lone Canes to compete in all six meets for the women's team.
- Riley Howard had early success – earning the top finishes for the Canes three times -- before injury. Howard posted the 10th fastest 5K at the Mountain Dew Invitational with her time of 18:32.37.
- The women's top team finish was second place at the FAU Invitational.



FOOTBALL

- The Miami Hurricanes compiled a 7-5 record during regular season (4-4 in ACC play) to earn their first-ever berth to the New Era Pinstripe Bowl, where they fell to Wisconsin. Miami finished the season 7-6 overall.
- With a 4-4 record in ACC play in 2018, the Hurricanes compiled a 16-8 ACC record over their three seasons under head coach Mark Richt, matching the best three-season output in history (16-8, 2004-06).
- Richt retired as head coach on December 30, 2018 and Manny Diaz – who served as defensive coordinator for all three seasons of Richt's tenure – was introduced as the 25th head coach in program history on Jan. 2, 2019.
- Under Diaz's direction in 2018, the Hurricanes' defense ranked No. 2 in total defense and No. 1 in several categories, including tackles for loss, third down conversion percentage and passing yards allowed.
- Defensive tackle Gerald Willis III earned All-America honors from several outlets, including second-team recognition from USA TODAY and Sports Illustrated. Willis III started every regular season game and led the ACC with 18.0 tackles for loss, more than any other defensive tackle in FBS.
- 11 players earned All-ACC honors in 2018, including linebacker Shaq Quarterman, who was selected to the All-ACC First Team.
- A new 'turnover chain' was unveiled for 2018, one that featured a charm in the model of Sebastian the Ibis. Turnover chain 2.0 was comprised of more than 4,000 stones, weighed roughly three kilograms and featured an 8.5-inch charm. Bandy was the first player to wear the new chain when he recovered a fumble against Savannah State.
- For the second straight season, Miami topped rivals Florida State (28-27) and Virginia Tech (38-14). The Hurricanes knocked off 2018 ACC Coastal Division champion Pittsburgh, 24-3, in their regular season finale at Hard Rock Stadium.
- Miami's trip to the New Era Pinstripe Bowl marked the 42nd bowl game in program history and sixth straight bowl-eligible season.
- Led by safety Sheldrick Redwine in the fourth round, the Hurricanes had five players selected in the 2019 NFL Draft: Redwine (Cleveland), Michael Jackson, Sr., (fifth round, Dallas), Joe Jackson (fifth round, Dallas), Jaquan Johnson (sixth round, Buffalo) and Travis Homer (sixth round, Seattle).

GOLF

- Miami reached an NCAA Regional for the seventh straight season, competing in the Cle Elum Regional, where the Hurricanes earned a 15th-place finish.
- The Hurricanes set five school records at the Schooner Fall Classic and Illini Invitational. In Norman, Miami set the program marks for lowest three-day total (833), two-day total (542) and one-day totals (267 and 275) on a par-71 course. At the Medinah Country Club golf course, the Canes scored the lowest par-72, 54-hole total (846) in program history.
- Freshman Anna Backman earned ACC Golfer of the Month for February after capturing the UCF Challenge individual title with an 11-under par performance.
- Miami was ranked No. 31 nationally in the final Golfweek team rankings and No. 21 in the final WGCA poll.
- UM took eighth place at the ACC Championships, with Claudia De Antonio (tied for 23rd) and Kristyna Frydlova (tied for 26th) earning top-30 finishes.
- Kristyna Frydlova and Renate Grimstad were named to the Academic All-ACC Team, as well as to the WGCA All-American Scholars list along with Claudia De Antonio.

ROWING

- Miami's Second Varsity Four earned a bronze medal at the ACC Rowing Championships, winning a medal for the Canes for the first time since the conference expanded to nine teams.
- The Varsity Four placed sixth in Grand Final at ACC Rowing Championships, while the Varsity Eight and Second Varsity Eight each finished second in their respective Petite Finals.
- The Hurricanes finished tied for seventh with 30 points at ACC Rowing Championships and junior Tessa White-Parsons was named Second Team All-ACC.
- Senior Jackie Lippincott, graduate student Autumn Kramer and freshman Meredith Costello were among 61 All-ACC Academic rowing honorees.

SOCCER

- Head coach Sarah Barnes' first season at the helm was capped with a top-10 victory over the eventual ACC and national champion Florida State, the programs 12th top-10 win and first since Sept. 22, 2016.
- Phallon Tullis-Joyce garnered All-ACC Academic Team accolades for the third straight year and also earned Second Team All-ACC recognition. She signed a professional contract with Stade de Reims, which competes in the French Ligue 2, in January.
- Tullis-Joyce notched a career-high 85 saves, ninth on the Hurricanes' single-season list, and led the ACC with 4.72 saves per game. In 10 conference matches she registered 56 saves, including a program record 17 saves at third-ranked North Carolina.
- Tullis-Joyce capped her career ranked among the top-three all-time in program history in numerous categories; third with 24 wins, tied for second with 14 shutouts, third with 259 saves and second with 5,584 minutes in net.
- Jamie Brunworth, an ACC postgraduate scholarship recipient, finished her career with five goals and nine assists, while hitting the target 43.8-percent of the time in 64 career matches.

SWIMMING

- Two new program records were set at ACC Swimming & Diving Championships (200 freestyle relay & 200 IM)
- Manon Viguier, Zorry Mason, Carmen San Nicolas & Sydney Knapp – 200 freestyle relay – 1:31.10
- Zorry Mason – 200 IM – 1:58.79
- Including the two school records, there were 16 performances that cracked Miami's top-10 all-time list, including six by freshman Zorry Mason and three by freshman Maria Artigas Fernandez
- In addition to her school record in the 200 IM, Mason posted the eighth-best time ever in the 100-yard freestyle (50.14), the ninth-best 100-yard backstroke (55.90), the second-best 100-yard breaststroke (1:01.26), the third-best 200-yard breaststroke (2:13.53) and the fifth-best 100-yard butterfly (53.92).
- Mason's time of 1:58.79 in the 200 IM at the 2019 ACC Championships was tied for the top finish in the 'B' final of the event, scoring points for the Hurricanes. She also added points with a fifth-place finish in the 'C' final of the 100-yard breaststroke (1:01.77).
- Another impressive freshman, Artigas posted the 10th-fastest 100-yard backstroke (55.97), the seventh-fastest 200 IM (2:01.73) and the third-fastest 400 IM (4:20.79).
- Junior Claire McGinnis cracked the top 10 in both the 1000-yard freestyle (10:11.73, eight-best) and the 1,650-yard freestyle (16:52.35, ninth).
- Graduating senior Roxanne Yu, who was tapped into Omicron Delta Kappa honor society, recorded the ninth-fastest 200-yard butterfly (2:02.34) and the sixth-fastest 100-yard backstroke (55.30) in her final season.
- The Hurricanes picked up six dual meet wins over the course of the year, including a home and home sweep of FGCU – who had they had not topped in seven previous contests entering 2018-19.
- The team was named a CSCAA Scholar All-America honoree with the top team GPA in the state of Florida, the fourth-best GPA of any school in the ACC and the 12th-best GPA of any 'Power 5' institution.



DIVING

- The Hurricanes swept the Atlantic Coast Conference diving awards, with Randy Ableman winning ACC Men's Diving Coach of the Year & ACC Women's Diving Coach of the Year, redshirt senior Briadam Herrera winning ACC Men's Diver of the Year and redshirt sophomore Alicia Blagg winning ACC Women's Diver of the Year.
- Miami swept the podium at the ACC Championships, with Blagg taking top honors in both the 1-meter and 3-meter, Herrera taking gold medals in both 1-meter and 3-meter, and redshirt junior David Dinsmore (gold) and sophomore Zach Cooper (silver) taking the top two spots in men's platform.
- Herrera upped his career ACC gold medal count to six, while Dinsmore successfully defended his platform title once again. The 2019 gold medal marked Dinsmore's third straight on the tower.
- Blagg earned Honorable Mention All-America recognition in the 1-meter at the 2019 NCAA Women's Swimming & Diving Championships and finished third nationally, for the first NCAA All-America honor of her career, in the 3-meter. It was Blagg's first trip to the NCAA Championships.
- Herrera picked up the sixth and seventh All-America honors of his career at the NCAA Men's Swimming & Diving Championships. Herrera was sixth nationally in the 1-meter and ended as the national runner-up in the 3-meter.
- Dinsmore and Cooper both earned All-America recognition in the platform, with Dinsmore finishing as the national runner-up in his signature event for the third All-America honor of his career. Cooper took fourth place in a career-best finish to earn the second All-America honor of his career.

MEN'S TENNIS

- Miami finished the season with 17 victories, the most by the Hurricanes since reaching the mark in 2008.
- The Hurricanes returned to the NCAA Team Championship for the second straight season, the first time UM has earned back-to-back tournament bids since a four year stretch from 2006-2009.
- During the regular season, Miami finished 7-5 against conference foes and earned the fifth seed at the ACC Championship. The Canes went on to top Clemson in the ACC Championship opener to advance to the quarterfinals. Overall, the seven ACC wins, fifth-seed and tournament advancement were the best marks since 2011.
- UM defeated No. 11 Notre Dame 4-3 on March 15, the program's first victory over a top-15 opponent since April 16, 2010, when Miami defeated No. 14 Duke, 4-3.
- Adria Soriano Barrera, who was ranked as high as No. 13 in singles on Feb. 6, completed his sophomore campaign at No. 40 in the nation and became only the second UM student-athlete to reach the NCAA Singles Championship over the past decade. Fellow classmate Bojan Jankulovski capped the season ranked No. 94 in singles.
- UM excelled at the Neil Schiff Tennis Center, winning 11 out of 12 home contests for its best home winning percentage (.917) since 2000. Dating back to the final match of the 2018 spring season, the Hurricanes extended their home winning streak to 12. It marked the program's longest in 18 years, since Miami had a 20-match winning streak from Feb. 1, 2000 through Feb. 24, 2001. In addition, the Hurricanes' 11-0 mark to open the 2019 campaign was the program's best home start since the 2000 season, when the Canes closed out the year a perfect 15-0.
- The Hurricanes locked up five weekly honors during the spring season. Franco Aubone and Francisco Bastias (March 19) and Tastuki Shimamoto and Soriano Barrera (March 12) earned ACC Doubles Team of the Week. Bastias (Feb. 26), Jankulovski (March 12) and Soriano Barrera (Jan. 22) secured ACC Player of the Week. It marked the first time three difference Canes were announced as individual weekly winners in a season, since Miami joined the ACC prior to the 2004-05 campaign.

WOMEN'S TENNIS

- Miami reached the NCAA Team Championship for the 24th straight season and made the second round of the 18th time in a row, advanced to the ACC Championship semifinals for the 11th time in 15 years and logged a 17th consecutive ITA top-25 finish, including a 15th top-20 spot in the last 16 years, by placing No. 20.
- Estela Perez-Somarriba won the second NCAA Singles Championship title in program history, repeated as ACC Player of the Year, finished with the most singles wins (43-5 record) in the country and second-most ever by a Hurricane, capped the year ranked second nationally and reached the top spot in the rankings in May.
- Daevenia Achong ended the year ranked No. 123 in singles, as well as placed No. 25—and peaked at No. 13—in doubles alongside Daniella Roldan after the pair became the first Hurricanes to compete in the NCAA Doubles Championship since 2015.
- The Hurricanes defeated nine ranked teams, including five in the top 25 and two in the top 15, while reaching at least 18 total victories (19-8) for the 14th time in their last 16 campaigns, as head coach Paige Yaroshuk-Tews eclipsed 350 wins in her 18-year career.
- Miami players combined for three ACC Player of the Week honors (Achong twice, Perez-Somarriba once) and five ACC Freshman of the Week accolades (Achong four times, Lucia Marzal once).

MEN'S TRACK & FIELD

- Kevin Arreaga and Raheem Chambers competed at the NCAA Outdoor Championships, while five men and the 4x100 relay qualified for the NCAA East Preliminary in six total events.
- Miami's men's team scored 48 points at the ACC Outdoor Championships, tallying their second-best team score since joining the ACC prior to the 2005 championships.
- The Hurricanes earned three individual and two relay ACC medals and had eight All-ACC honors in 2019.
- Kevin Arreaga earned back-to-back silver medal in the hammer throw at ACC Outdoors, while Raheem Chambers claimed the silver medal in the 100m and McKinly Brown earned bronze in the 400m hurdles.
- The 4x100 relay made up of Raheem Chambers, Tyrees Moulton, Hasani Knight and Isaiah Taylor posted Miami's third-fastest time to finish third at ACC Outdoor Championships.

WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD

- The Miami women won the 2019 ACC Indoor Team Championship, giving the Canes their fourth ACC title in the last four seasons. Miami's women won the ACC Indoor Championship in 2016 and 2017, while winning the ACC Outdoor Championship in 2018 on their home track.
- Director of track and field/cross country Amy Deem was named the 2019 ACC Indoor Track and Field Women's Coach of the Year and USTFCCA South Region Women's Coach of the Year.
- Michelle Atherley won the NCAA Indoor Pentathlon Championship to become Miami's 17th track and field national champion and holds the Canes' program record with her score of 4,547 points.
- Miami had four individuals and the 4x400 relay qualify for the NCAA Indoor Championship and seven individuals and two relay teams for the NCAA Outdoor Championships.
- Michelle Atherley was tabbed the ACC Indoor Field MVP and was named the ACC Scholar Athlete of the Year. Atherley won the ACC Indoor Pentathlon with an ACC Championship record performance and also placed third in the women's high jump.

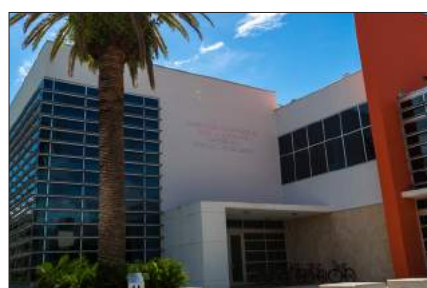

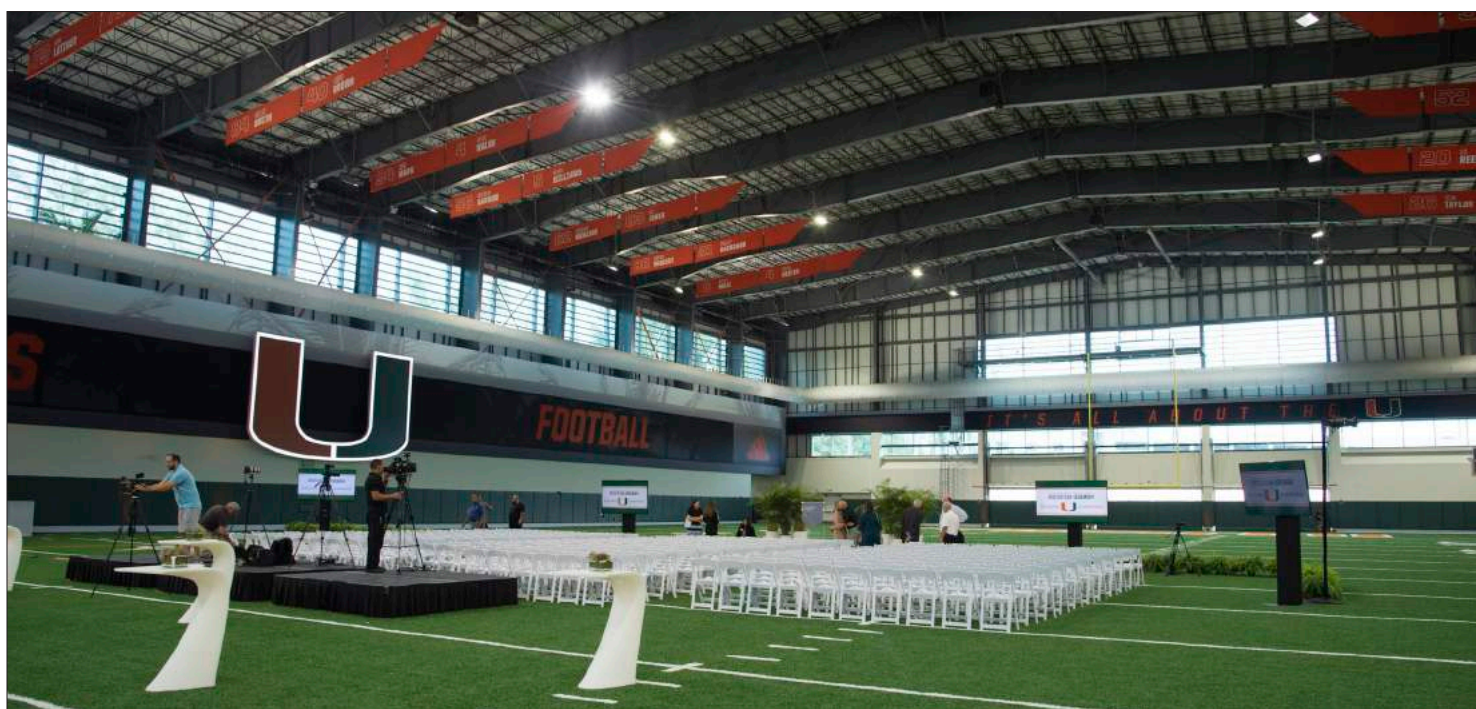

SOFFER INDOOR PRACTICE FACILITY OPENS



The University of Miami held its dedication ceremony for the Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility on Oct. 11, 2018.

More than 400 guests attended the dedication ceremony, which was held on the practice facility field and included remarks from lead donor Carol Soffer, director of athletics Blake James, former head coach Mark Richt and other university officials.

“It’s a dream come true,” Soffer said. “I’ve been waiting for this for two years now. I never imagined it to be as beautiful as it is. Thanks to Coach Richt, because he really was responsible for making this building sing. It’s incredible.”

The Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility features 75,000 square feet of high performance artificial field turf, two turf fields and approximately 90,000 square feet of floor area, which includes new football coaches’ offices, recruiting suites, team film rooms and indoor turf practice fields.

Richt and his wife Katharyn personally donated \$1 million in support of the facility, which was strategically designed in conjunction with the Hecht Athletic Center to synchronize the two buildings. The football operations offices have a more efficient layout, minimizing steps between the weight room, locker room, coaches’ offices, film rooms and indoor and outdoor practice fields.

“It’s phenomenal. This exceeded anything I dreamed it could be,” Richt said. “I knew what it was going to look like all along, or at least had a vision of what it was going to look like, but the pictures don’t do it justice.”

In addition to the Soffer Family’s \$14 million lead gift, University of Miami football alumni combined to raise \$2.2 million in support of the project.

“Family is one of our core values, and you see it play out with our program all the time,” James said after the ceremony. “Whether it’s guys who leave here throwing up the ‘U’ or guys stepping up to make this project a reality, I think they all recognize the important need that this was for our program. It was great to see so many of them do their part.”

The Hurricanes football student-athletes have already begun reaping the benefits of the Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility, which had a construction time of just 14 months.

“It’s amazing. Especially from my point of view, being here [as a freshman], it was just turf right here,” football student-athlete Demetrius Jackson said. “Every time we come in here, they’re adding something. It’s amazing and a blessing for it to be finally done.”

Nine University of Miami Athletics programs were recognized for perfect single-year scores of 1,000 in the 2017-18 Academic Progress Report (APR), released Wednesday by the NCAA.

The Miami programs earning perfect scores for the 2017-18 school year were women's basketball, men's cross country, men's diving, golf, women's soccer, men's tennis, women's tennis, men's track and field and volleyball.

"It is a remarkable achievement for nine of our teams to post perfect APR scores for 2017-18," UM Director of Athletics Blake James said. "Our student-athletes continue to excel in the classroom, and our

women's tennis (1,000), men's track and field (981), women's track and field (986) and volleyball (1,000) teams each topped their respective sports' multi-year national averages.

The report comes a week after the Hurricanes' men's and women's cross country, golf, men's and women's tennis and volleyball teams each earned Public Recognition Awards from the NCAA. The Public Recognition Awards each year are bestowed upon teams finishing in the top 10 percent of their respective sports based on the most recent multi-year Academic Progress Rate.

The APR, created to be a more real-time measurement of academic success than graduation rates, is a team-based metric through which scholarship student-athletes each term earn one point for remaining eligible and one point for staying in school or graduating. This report is based on NCAA Division I APR data submitted by the institution for the 2014-15, 2015-16, 2016-17 and 2017-18 academic years.

In the fall of 2011, the Division I Board of Directors approved tougher academic standards, including setting a new standard that teams must meet to participate in postseason competition. The goal of the NCAA's academic performance program is improvement, not punishment.

Not only does the program ensure accountability for student-athletes, teams and institutions, but also it provides fairness by considering individual circumstances per team and school. To compete in the 2019-20 postseason, teams must achieve a 930 four-year APR. NCAA members chose the 930 standard because that score predicts, on average, a 50 percent graduation rate for teams at that APR level. Additionally, teams must earn at least a 930 four-year APR to avoid penalties.

dedicated coaches and academic staff members work tirelessly to help them achieve these results."

Six UM programs – men's and women's cross country, golf, men's and women's tennis and volleyball – earned perfect multi-year scores of 1,000 for the four-year period for school years from 2014-15 to 2017-18.

ACC NETWORK



The University of Miami's broadcast video department produced a record number of digital broadcasts for ESPN during the 2018-19 school year. UM's video services department produced 91 digital broadcasts for ESPN last season for use on ACC Network Extra and other platforms.

In the past three years, Miami has generated over 320 live ESPN events through its in-house broadcast crew.

UM completed multi-million dollar renovations of its broadcast facilities in preparation for the launch of the ACC Network in the fall of 2019. The renovations allow for the broadcast of linear events on various ESPN networks while simultaneously producing video board and digital events in our secondary control room.

All home soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball and baseball games were broadcast either digitally via ACC Network Extra or on a linear network (ESPN, ESPN 2, ESPNU, FSN or Raycom).

Among the digital broadcasts from the 2018-19 school year:

- Eight women's soccer matches
- 11 volleyball matches
- Five men's basketball games
- 16 women's basketball games
- 34 baseball games
- Six men's tennis matches
- Six women's tennis matches
- Two track & field meets

Additionally, UM's new linear control room was used to broadcast five events across ESPN's linear networks, which provided a great opportunity to prepare for the launch of the ACC Network this fall:

- Four men's basketball games (1 ESPNU, 3 ESPN2)
- One women's basketball game (ESPN2)

In addition to the ESPN productions, Miami also managed in-house video board shows for all on-campus events:

- 17 men's basketball video board shows
- 22 women's basketball video board shows
- 34 baseball video board shows

UM's crew also produced 24 episodes of The Coach Mark Richt Show and Hurricane GameDay for air on FOX Sports Florida, My33 and UM's social media platforms.
