2005-06 OUTLOOK

Two years after moving into a new home facility in the Convocation Center and one season removed from their inaugural season in the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference, the University of Miami women's basketball team will once again usher in a season of "new" in 2005-06 as first-year head coach Katie Meier embarks on her introductory season at the helm of the UM program.

Meier, who was named Miami's seventh head coach in the program's 33-year history in April of this year, takes over a Hurricane team that has the potential to surpass all expectations behind the play of a solid corps of experienced players, including National Player of the Year and All-America candidate senior Tamara James. UM will also benefit from the return of fifth-year senior Melissa Knight who returns this season after sitting out the entire 2004-05 campaign rehabbing from an ACL injury.

With Miami's returning players paired with an extremely talented group of underclassmen, the Hurricanes could make the newest chapter in the school record books an impressive one as they embark on their second season in the ACC, which is arguably the best women's basketball conference in the nation.

FIRST-YEAR HEAD COACH KATIE MEIER

In April of 2005, the University of Miami women's basketball program took the next step in establishing its self as one of the nation's elite with the announcement of Katie

Meier as the newest head coach. Meier came to UM by way of Charlotte, where she spent four seasons at the helm of the lady 49ers.

As only the fifth head coach in Charlotte history, Meier could solely be responsible for bringing the 49er women's basketball program into national prominence. Prior to her appointment as head coach at Charlotte in 2001, the 49ers had only one previous postseason appearance - a WNIT birth in 1990. During her four-year tenure at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to three postseason births - one NCAA Tournament appearance (2003) and two WNIT appearances (2004, 2005) - and a combined overall record of 76-45 (.628).

Prior to Charlotte, Meier spent seven seasons at Tulane University, serving as an associate head coach from 1999-01 and an assistant coach on the Green Wave staff from 1994-99. As a member of the Tulane coaching staff, Meier helped the Green Wave to an overall record of 164-52 (.759) in seven seasons, including the highest ranking in school history (13th by the Associated Press) in 2000 and a school-record 27 wins the same season. During her time at Tulane, Meier and the Green Wave also saw an impressive seven-year run at the NCAA Tournament.

Meier's success as a coach is a direct reflection on her playing career as a stand-out at Duke University. A four-year letterwinner for the Blue Devils from 1986-90, Meier's name is scattered throughout the Duke record books.

She currently ranks third all-time in scoring average

(16.2 points per game), steals (232), free throws made (447) and free throws attempted (624). She also ranks fourth all-time in points (1,761), and fifth all-time in field goals made (653), field goals attempted (1,283) and assists (409) and ninth all-time at Duke in rebounding average (6.1 rebounds per game).

Meier wasted no time making her mark at Duke, earning ACC Rookie of the Year and Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America honors 1986. Meier injured her knee during her in 1988 during her junior season and ultimately missed the entire 1989 campaign while recovering.

Meier returned to Duke for her senior season in 1990 without missing a beat, earning Kodak/WBCA District 2 All-America and All-ACC First Team accolades while being named the Blue Devils' most valuable player.

In 2002 Meier was honored by Duke for her efforts as a player when she was named to the inaugural induction class in the Blue Devils' Hall of Honor. That same year Meier was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary Team.

Meier's success on the court was only outdone by her accomplishments in the classroom. She was named to the Dean's List from 1986-88. In 1988 she also earned GTE Academic All-America Second Team honors.

Meier brings to Miami an impressive background in the Atlantic Coast Conference along with the desire and the knowledge to succeed and has all the potential to raise the bar at UM.

THE HURRICANE BACKCOURT

Meier's biggest void to fill in the UM starting lineup will be the one left by the graduation of three-year starting point guard Yalonda McCormick, who averaged 12.6 points per game while playing in an average of 36 minutes per game last season.

Sophomore Marianne Curtis returns as the only true point guard to see actual playing time in a Miami uniform. Last season she averaged just over seven minutes per game in 24 games, but made tremendous strides in the off-season to prepare herself for a bigger role.

Curtis will compete with junior college transfer Renee Taylor for the starting nod as the UM point guard. Taylor, a 5-2 spark from Harlem, N.Y., led the NJCAA in scoring last season, posting 30.1 points per game for Monroe Community College and has the athletic ability and speed to compete with the ACC's best.

Sophomore Albrej Grimsley returns for her second season as one of three returning starters from last season. Grimsley finished the season ranked third on the team with 6.0 points per game and should look to increase her production with more experience.

Senior guard Katie Hayek, who has served primarily as a role player for the past three seasons, enters her final campaign more than ready to vastly increase her minutes after ending last season with glimpses of what she could do as a full-time starter.

The Hurricane backcourt will also look to the play of sophomore guard Selena Eskinazi-Budge and freshman LaToya Cunningham, who hails from Vallejo, Calif.

DOWN LOW

Up front, the Hurricane lineup will feature one of the nation's top talents in senior forward Tamara James. James, a 2005 All-ACC and All-America Honorable Mention selection, enters the season ranked third all-time at UM in career scoring average (20.0 ppg). She sits at fourth place all-time with 1,761 points and is on pace to challenge Maria Rivera's mark of 2,358 for tops all-time at Miami.

James led the Hurricanes and the ACC in scoring last season with 22.3 points per game and topped the UM roster with 6.9 rebounds per game.

UM welcomes the return of Melissa Knight, who average 9.3 points and 4.4 rebounds per game as a starter two seasons ago, after missing the entire 2004-05 season with an ACL injury.

Tatjana Marincic heads into her senior season following a 2004-05 season that saw her average 4.5 points per game and looks to steadily increase her production, a trend that proven to be true in each of her previous three seasons at Miami.

Sophomore Lamese James, who saw playing time in 17 of 29 games last season, joins Marincic and Knight in the forward-guard position.

On the block, 6-1 junior Imani Dhahabu returns following her first season as a full-time starter in which she averaged 5.6 points and 5.0 rebounds per game.

Joining Dhahabu is fellow classmate Amy Audibert, who averaged 11.8 minutes and 2.6 points per game, and 6-3 freshman prep standout Brittany Denson.

THE SCHEDULE

Highlighted by a slate that includes 14 postseason participants from a year ago, including 12 NCAA Tournament teams.

First-year head coach Katie Meier and the Hurricanes will play host to 17 home games at the Convocation Center this season while hosting a pair of holiday tournaments - the UM Thanksgiving Tournament (Nov. 25-26) and the Hurricane Holiday Classic (Dec. 28-29) - in Miami's second season in the tradition-rich ACC.

Opponents scheduled to come to Coral Gables this season include Hartford (Dec. 10), Ole Miss (Dec. 28-29), North Carolina (Jan. 9), Boston College (Jan. 19), Virginia (Jan. 22), Virginia Tech (Jan. 29), Florida State (Feb. 9) and Duke (Feb. 19) - all teams that earned births in the 2005 NCAA Tournament.

The Hurricanes will have four televised games on the ACC's Regional Sports Network, consisting of FOX Sports South, SUN Sports and Comcast Sports Southeast, four times next season in games against UNC (Jan. 9), Georgia (Jan. 15), FSU (Feb. 17) and Georgia Tech (Feb. 26). Comcast Sports Southeast will also carry the Jan. 5 game at Georgia Tech and the Jan. 12 game at Clemson.

"This schedule will offer us the chance to play some of the nation's top programs," said Meier. "The caliber of teams in our non-conference schedule should prepare us for play in the ACC, which, from top to bottom, is arguably the best conference in the country."

"We also extremely thrilled about the opportunity to play at least 17 games on our home floor. Anytime you have the chance to play in front of your fans you have to be excited because home court advantage is such a major asset to any program, especially when you are in a league as tough as the ACC."

UM opens the season Nov. 18 with Samford before hosting the UM Thanksgiving Tournament, featuring an opening-round match-up with Bradley (Nov. 25) and return the following day for the championship or consolation game with Duquesne or Oakland, who play the previous day.

The Hurricanes then play five games over the next 10 days with games against at home against George Mason (Nov. 30), Fairleigh Dickinson (Dec. 2), Siena (Dec. 3), Florida International (Dec. 6) capped off by a Dec. 10 competition against 2005 NCAA Tournament qualifier Hartford.

Miami's first road game of the season comes Dec. 16 and takes them over 2,300 miles away when they travel to Missoula, Mont. to face 2005 Big Sky Champion and NCAA Tournament qualifier Montana.

The Hurricanes head to Orlando Dec. 20 to square-off with in-state foe, UCF, who won the 2005 Atlantic Sun regular season championship, before hosting the Hurricane Holiday Classic (Dec. 28-29) featuring 2005 NCAA Tournament participants, Ole Miss, 2005 WNIT participants, Maine along with North Carolina A&T.

UM opens conference play in Atlanta against Georgia Tech (Jan. 5) and return home to face defending ACC Champions, North Carolina (Jan. 9) at the Convocation Center.

Following an ACC match-up at Clemson (Jan. 15), the Hurricanes break from league play to take part in the Russell Athletic Shootout in Duluth, Ga. where they play a Georgia

(Jan. 15) team that comes off a Sweet 16 appearance in the NCAA Tournament a year ago.

Miami comes home Jan. 19 to welcome Boston College, who like UM a year ago, make their inaugural debut in the ACC after departing from the BIG EAST.

Following the contest with the Eagles, the Hurricanes host Virginia (Jan. 22), travel to NC State (Jan. 26), return home for Virginia Tech (Jan. 29) and take to the road for Maryland (Feb. 1) and Wake Forest (Feb. 5).

The Hurricanes battle in-state and ACC rival Florida State twice in a three-game stretch, hosting the Seminoles Feb. 9 and traveling to Tallahassee Feb. 17 with a Feb. 12 trip to Boston College in between.

Meier, who was an All-ACC standout from 1986-90 with the Blue Devils and is member of the Duke Hall of Honor, will welcome her alma mater to the Convocation Center Feb. 19 before wrapping up the regular season Feb. 26 at home against Georgia Tech.

Season ticket packages for the 2005-06 season start at just \$75 dollars and include admission to all 17 home games. Fans can also purchase the Family Plan and receive admission to all home games for two adults and three children for just \$100 dollars.

KATIE HAYEK

5-9 / SENIOR / GUARD / LANCASTER, PA. (LANCASTER CATHOLIC)

AT MIAMI

A role player who has been one of UM's first options off the bench for most of her career...Hayek could make a huge impact this season with the potential to step into the starting lineup in her senior campaign...Always a dangerous threat from behind the arc, she poses a major threat to opponents as one of the Hurricane's purest shooters.

2004-05 (JUNIOR)

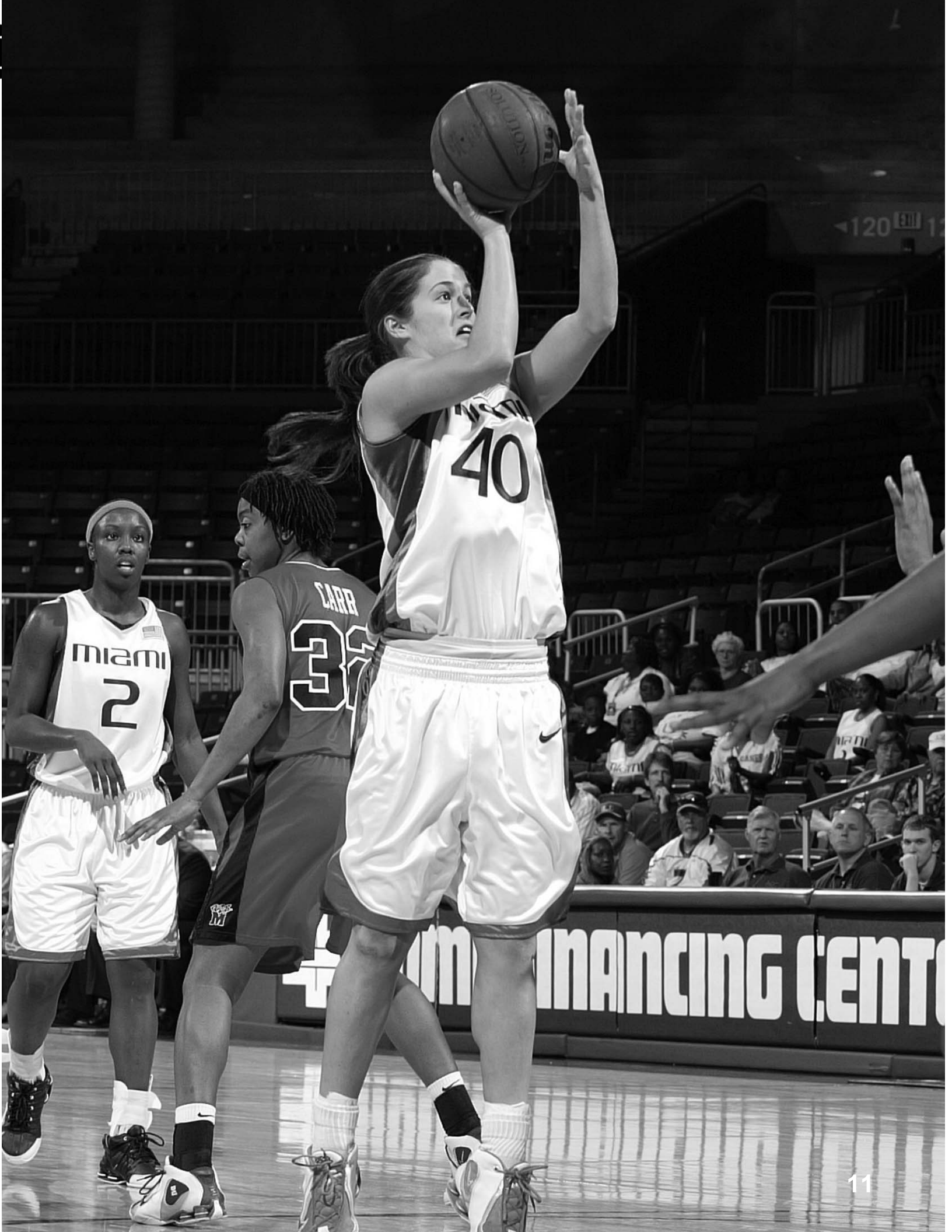

I acted when I was younger, but got out of it with playing basketball. I've really learned a lot through classes and independent studies with professors, so hopefully that will help me in the long run.

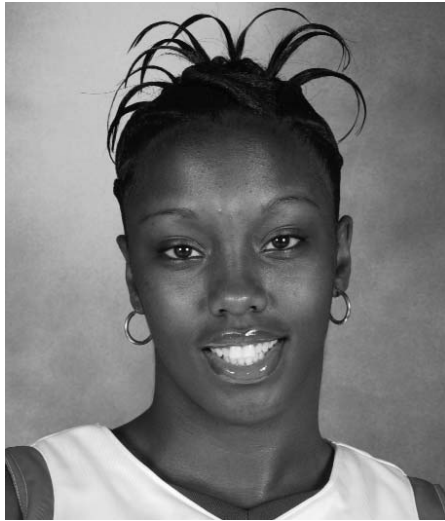

AT MIAMI

From day one, James has made her mark as one of the nation's top players while etching her name throughout the UM record books...One of the country's most prolific due to her ability to score in the low post as well as the range to hit the deep three...The National Player of the Year candidate enters the season ranked third all-time at UM in career scoring average (20.0 ppg)...Sits at fourth place all-time with 1,761 points and is on pace to challenge Mania Rivera's mark of 2,358 for tops all-time at UM...Ranks ninth all-time in career rebounding average (6.5 rpg), sixth in field goals made (650), eighth in field goal attempts (1,305), ninth in field goal percentage (.498), fourth in three pointers made (97), fourth in three point attempts (280), fifth in three point percent (.346), fifth in free throws made (364), sixth in free throw attempts (476) and third in free throw percent (.765).

2004-05 (JUNIOR)

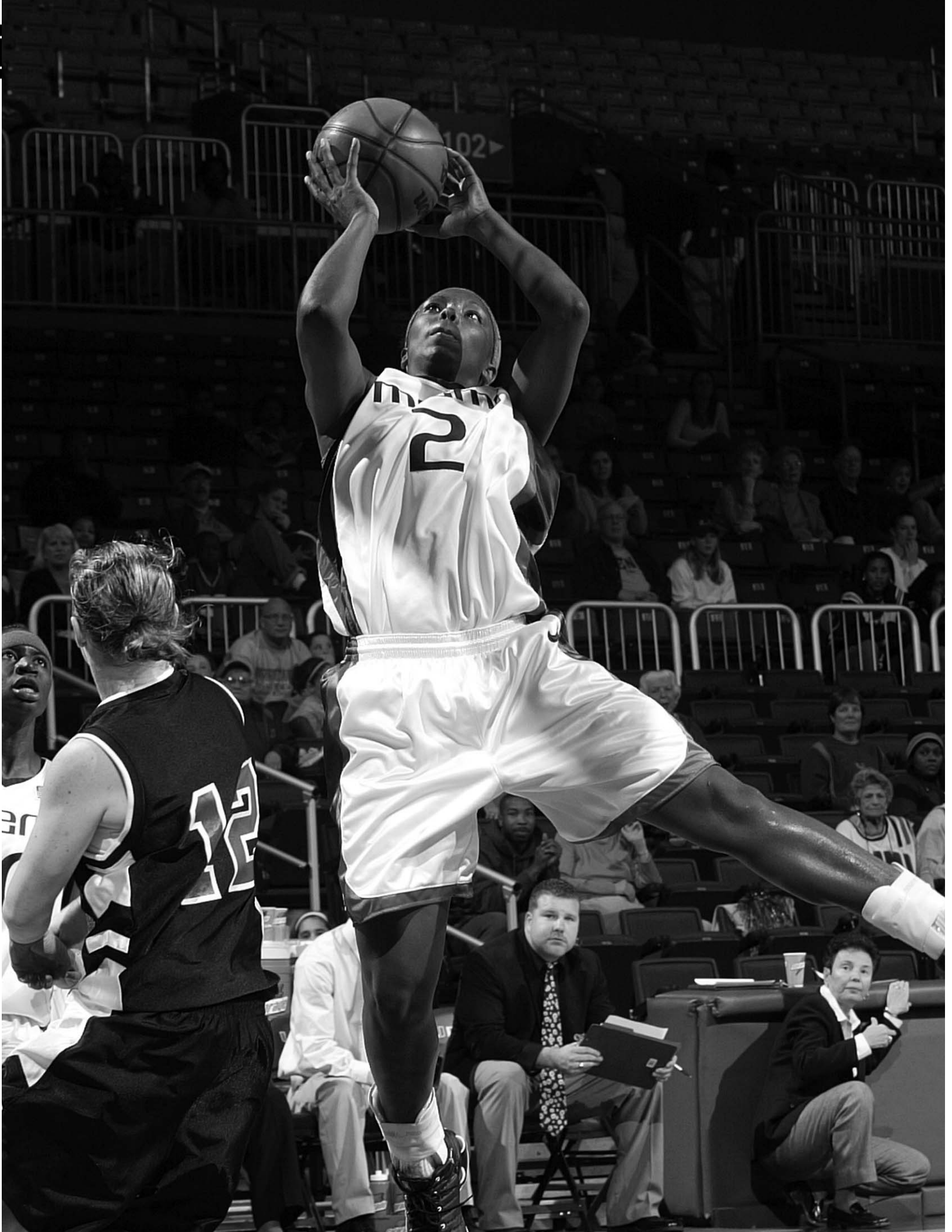
IN THE OFF-SEASON YOU HAD SURGERY ON BOTH ANKLES, WHEN DO YOU THINK YOU'LL BE READY?

COMING BACK OFF AN ACL INJURY WHAT IS THIS SEASON GOING TO BE LIKE? YOU HAVE A LITTLE BIT OF A DIFFERENT MENTALITY. YOU GRADUATED AND ARE WORKING TO GET A SECOND DEGREE, BUT ALSO COMING BACK FOR YOUR FIFTH SEASON AT UM.

"It's actually hard in the classroom to come back and focus and study because I already have my degree. On the court, I think I'm more determined and more willing to give it my all because I can give more attention to basketball and I've already seen a year go to waste just from my injury. I just want to go out with a bang."

SITTING OUT LAST YEAR, YOU GOT TO SEE THE GAME FROM A COACH'S PERSPECTIVE. DO YOU THINK THAT HELPED YOU IN TERMS OF KNOWING WHAT'S GOING ON WITH THE GAME AND LEARNING THE THINGS YOU CAN DO AND ALSO HOW TO HELP TEAMMATES?

"Just watching games has made me see everybody and what they bring to the floor, and what they can bring to the basketball program. Just knowing everybody's weaknesses and strengths can help me create better opportunities. I think I had a better sense when I got out there on the court and also seeing just from a coach's standpoint like mistakes that other people make game by game. Hopefully, I've learned from sitting on the bench and watching our team make mistakes and we can go into the season not making the same mistakes that people have made in the past."

AFTER REHABBING, WHAT DID YOU DO IN THE SUMMER TO GET PREPARED FOR THIS SEASON?

"More or less, I worked on getting my confidence back because it's hard coming back after an injury especially when you get that injury doing basketball oriented stuff - I was going up for a lay up. It's hard just to get my confidence going back up with the same leg and not having the fear of tearing it again. Basically just getting my confidence back was a main thing after the surgery."

LAST YEAR YOU SAT OUT, SO THIS WILL BE YOUR FIRST YEAR PLAYING AGAINST SOME OF THESE ACC TEAMS. ARE YOU EXCITED ABOUT GETTING TO PLAY AGAINST NEW PLAYERS, BECAUSE FOR YOU, IT'S A WHOLE NEW BALLGAME?

"Everyone in the ACC is more athletic and that's good because I love running up and down the court. Playing against ACC teams, and having the opportunity to play in two leagues for two different coaches is exciting because not many people can say they have done that."

SPEAKING OF COACHES, DO YOU THINK YOU WILL ENJOY COACH MEIER'S STYLE - WHICH AS YOU MENTIONED IS A LITTLE BIT MORE UPTEMPO?

"I think her style fits our program right now because we're very small. Everyone seems to be 5-8 to 6-1 at the most and I think, because we're small, we have to run more and it gives us an advantage where we have a disadvantage."

YOU GRADUATED LAST MAY AND YOU'RE GOING BACK TO GET A SECOND DEGREE. WHAT ARE YOUR PLANS AFTER SCHOOL?

"I have some connections with the NBA, so hopefully working in marketing or management department in a NBA related field. And I'm actually working on a business plan to start a company."

WHAT KIND OF COMPANY?

"It's a franchise of sorts."

THIS WILL BE YOUR FIFTH YEAR, DO YOU THINK YOU'VE ACCOMPLISHED A LOT OF THE GOALS THAT YOU SET FOR YOURSELF ON AND OFF THE COURT?

"Definitely off the court, I got my degree and I wanted to do that. On the court I have a couple more things I want to accomplish and hopefully by the end of this season I can do that and go out on a good note and succeed in some of my goals."

WHERE DO YOU SEE THIS TEAM GOING THIS YEAR?

"Since I've been at UM, since I've played anyway, we've gone to the postseason. It's my senior year and I don't want to change that. And I don't want to go the NIT. We are going to the NCAA Tournament and we're making it past the first round. You can quote me on that."

"I am planning to graduate this May. I am looking into graduate school. But for right now, I am planning on going into my field of international marketing when the opportunity comes along."

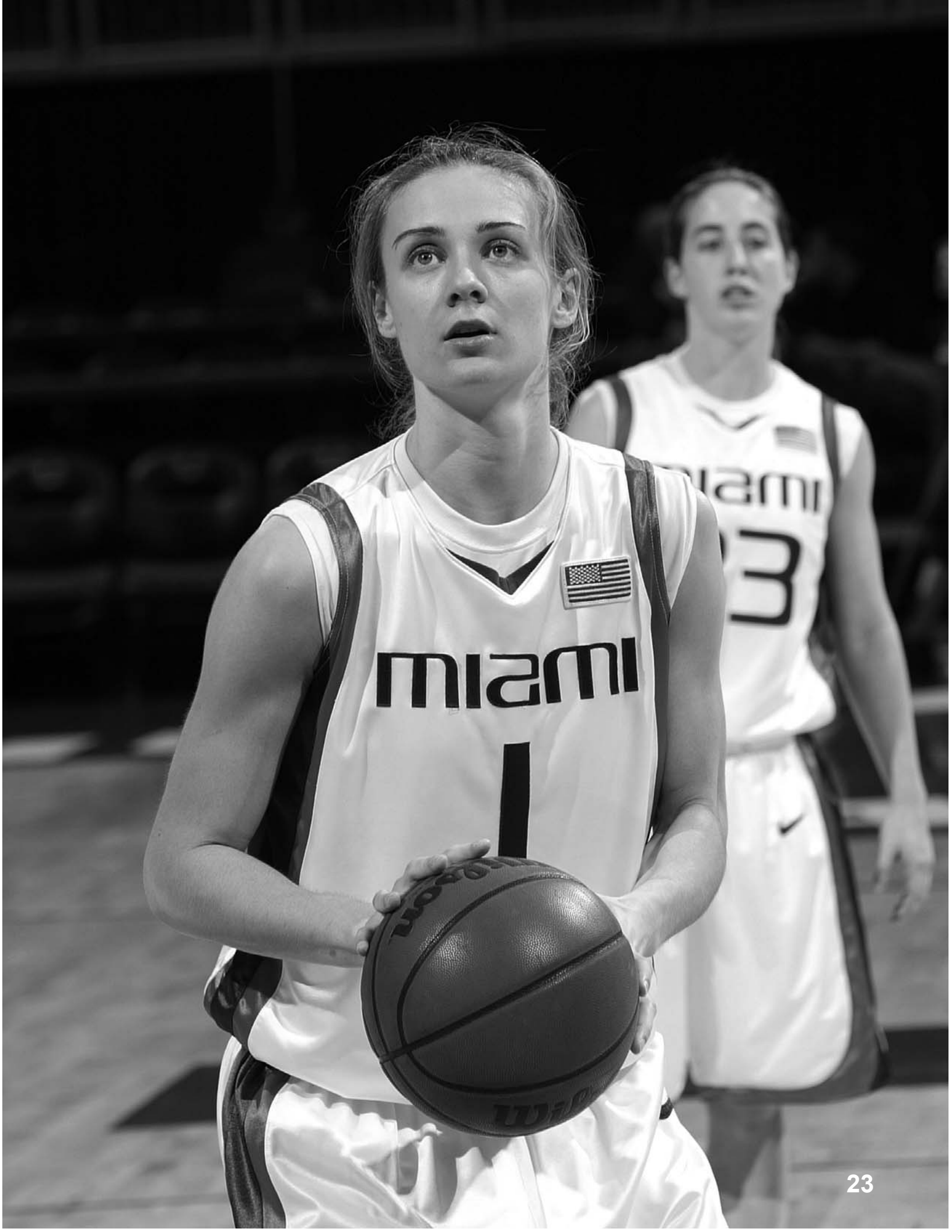

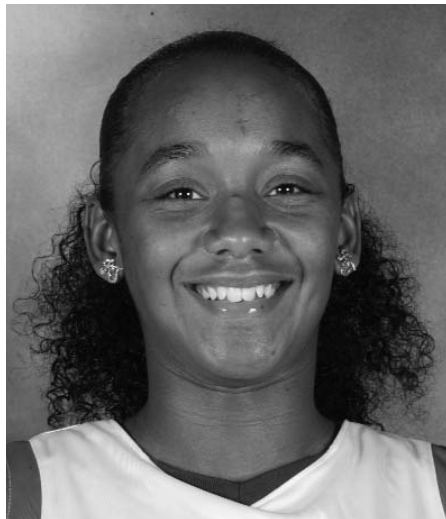

DUKE (1989)**

In 2005 the University of Miami women's basketball program will usher in their second season in the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference under the direction of newly-appointed head coach Katie Meier.

Meier, who came to UM by way of Charlotte where she spent the last four seasons, becomes just the seventh women's basketball coach in Miami's 33-year history.

As only the fifth head coach in Charlotte history, Meier could solely be responsible for bringing the 49er women's basketball program into national prominence.

Prior to her appointment as head coach at Charlotte in 2001, the 49ers had only one previous postseason appearance - a WNIT birth in 1990.

During her four-year tenure at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to three postseason births - one NCAA Tournament appearance (2003) and two WNIT appearances (2004, 2005) - and a combined overall record of 76-45 (.628).

In her inaugural campaign at Charlotte, Meier wielded the 49ers to a 16-13 finish to record their first winning season in eight years.

The following season, she guided the 49ers to a 21-9 finish, marking the most wins (21) in over a decade at Charlotte. With a 12-2 record in Conference USA play, Meier and the 49ers also earned the school's first-ever C-USA regular-season championship and earned the school's first-ever appearance at the NCAA Tournament.

In 2003-04 Meier and the 49ers concluded the season with a 17-14 record while earning a trip to the 2004 WNIT. Along with marking the first time in school history that the 49ers made back-to-back postseason appearances, Meier also led Charlotte to their first-ever postseason victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the first round of WNIT.

Last season, Meier enjoyed an overall record of 22-9 to tie for the third-most single season wins in Charlotte history and the most wins for the program in a single season since 1990-91. The 49ers also advanced to the postseason

for the third-consecutive season and the WNIT for the second-straight year.

Prior to Charlotte, Meier spent seven seasons at Tulane University, serving as an associate head coach from 1999-01 and an assistant coach on the Green Wave staff from 1994-99. As a member of the Tulane coaching staff, Meier helped the Green Wave to an overall record of 164-52 (.759) in seven seasons, including the highest ranking in school history (13th by the Associated Press) in 2000 and a school-record 27 wins the same season.

During her time at Tulane, Meier and the Green Wave also saw an impressive seven-year run at the NCAA Tournament.

Meier began her collegiate coaching career at the University of North Carolina at Asheville where she served as an assistant coach during the 1993-94 season.

Meier's success as a coach is a direct reflection on her playing career as a stand-out at Duke University. A four-year letterwinner for the Blue Devils from 1986-90, Meier's name is scattered throughout the Duke record books.

She currently ranks third all-time in scoring average (16.2 points per game), steals (232), free throws made (447) and free throws attempted (624). She also ranks fourth all-time in points (1,761), and fifth all-time in field goals made (653), field goals attempted (1,283) and assists (409), and ninth all-time at Duke in rebounding average (6.1 rebounds per game).

Meier wasted no time making her mark at Duke, earning ACC Rookie of the Year and Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America honors 1986. Meier injured her knee during her in 1988 during her junior season and ultimately missed the entire 1989 campaign while recovering.

Meier returned to Duke for her senior season in 1990 without missing a beat, earning Kodak/WBCA District 2 All-America and All-ACC First Team accolades while being named the Blue Devils' most valuable player.

In 2002 Meier was honored by Duke for her efforts as a player when she was named to the inaugural induction class in the Blue Devils' Hall of Honor. That same year Meier was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary Team as one of the top 50 players to ever play in the ACC.

Meier's success on the court was only outdone by her accomplishments in the classroom. She was named to the Dean's List from 1986-88. In 1988 she also earned GTE Academic All-America Second Team honors.

While in Belgium Meier also spent time teaching classes of conversational English while coaching teams of 15- to 17-year-olds.

ACCEPTING THE JOB AT MIAMI

"This is amazing for me and my family. This is the start of something special and I feel that very deeply. From the minute I left the meeting with the search committee, I knew that this was a perfect fit, the perfect job.

I was looking for a special place, a special place that has special people. Once I found it, I got a little aggressive because I knew this was the job I wanted. I have been sprinting for it for about a week now and I feel I'm still sprinting.

I want to make this the best university in the nation. I feel that I have accepted the best job in America."

HER VISION OF THE PROGRAM

"If you look at women's basketball, looking at the successful programs, there are difference-makers. There is always somebody, besides the coaches, besides the players; there is somebody who dreams about a successful basketball program. The difference-makers are normally the senior women's administrators, we have a fantastic senior women's administrator, Connie Nickel, your athletic director, and if you are fortunate you have a president who cares about the program as well and I have all three of those here.

The players and I have talked about style of play a little bit. I think you will enjoy our style. I have a goal of generating over 90 possessions a game, very up-tempo. I told them that we need to lead the conference in steals, lead the conference in assists and most importantly, we need to lead the conference in charges taken because we are going to play our tails off. We might get out-shot and we might get out-rebounded, but we absolutely will not get out-played, out-hustled or out-worked.

I'll put the pressure on myself. I like pressure; I'm not scared of pressure. We are not going to back down. I told the players 'we are going to blow the ceiling off this place,' and I truly believe that. We are ready for this and I think we are going to do something very special here.

We want to be the envy of every program in the nation. I want them to envy our fan support. I want our opponents to envy the potential we have in recruiting - to envy the types of recruits we are able to draw because all of the resources we have in place. When people start becoming jealous of us, we have made the big time and that's what we are working for.

With the resources that we have, with the institution that we have to sell and the special people we have in place here, I truly believe this can be a national championship job. That is pressure, but I am ready." (These statements were taken from a press conference held to announce the hiring of Katie Meier as the head women's basketball coach at UM on April 19, 2005.)

Tombi Bell enters her first season as an assistant coach with head coach Katie Meier and the University of Miami women's basketball team in 2005.

Bell comes to Miami following a two-year stint at Murray State where she served as an assistant coach under Joi Felton from 2003-05.

She served as an assistant coach for the 2005 U.S. Virgin Island Junior National team where she helped lead the team to a silver medal in Trinidad.

Her knowledge and passion in the coaching ranks can be attributed to her accomplishments as a player, both on the collegiate and professional levels.

Bell was a four-year letterwinner at the University of Florida from 1997-01, where she finished her career ranked third all-time in career assists (431), sixth in three throws made (274) and seventh in career steals (191) in Gator history.

During her senior season in 2000-01, she posted 19 double-figure scoring games and was named to the All-SEC Second Team by league coaches and was an All-SEC Honorable Mention selection as voted on by media members.

That same season she was named to the SEC Scholar Athlete Honor Roll and was selected by teammates to receive the Leadership Award and the Fightin' Gator Hustle Award - given to the UF player who took the most charges and recorded the most defensive deflections and rebounds.

Bell was also one of 15 college seniors selected to participate in the 2001 WBCA All-Star Challenge in St. Louis, Mo.

Following her senior season Bell was selected as the 39th overall pick by the Minnesota Lynx in the 2001 WNBA Draft and in 2002, she played on the U.S. Virgin Islands National Team, leading the team to a bronze medal in the Caricom Basketball Tournament.

Bell graduated from Florida with bachelor's degree in exercise and sports sciences with a specialization in sport management in 2002.

Born in the U.S. Virgin Islands, Bell was raised in Miami, Fla. and has been around basketball and college athletics her entire life. Her brother Raja plays for the NBA's Phoenix Suns and played for Florida International University in Miami. Her father, Roger, is the Associate Athletic Director for Academic Services at UM and her mother is an Exception Student Education Program Specialist at Arcola Lake Elementary in Miami-Dade County.

Derrick Gibbs begins his first season as an assistant coach with the University of Miami women's basketball team under head coach Katie Meier in 2005.

Gibbs comes to UM from the University of North Carolina at Charlotte where he served as an assistant coach under Meier for two seasons from 2003-05. While at Charlotte, Gibbs helped Meier lead the 49ers to two WNIT appearances - along with Charlotte's first postseason victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the 2004 WNIT - and an overall record of 39-23, including a 22-9 mark in 2004-05 to tie for the third-most single-season wins in Charlotte history.

As one of the 49ers' main recruiting contacts, Gibbs played a major role in UNCC's 33rd nationally-ranked 2004 recruiting class during his first season at Charlotte.

Gibbs joined the UNCC coaching staff in 2003 following a two-year stay at the College of Charleston where he served as an assistant coach from 2001-03. His responsibilities with the Cougars included recruiting, organizing practice schedules and the scouting of opponents. He also coordinated team travel.

Prior to coaching at the College of Charleston, Gibbs spent three seasons at Wofford College from 1998-01. While in undergraduate school, he served as a student-assistant with the Terriers from 1998-00 and remained with the team as an assistant during the 2000-01 season.

Originally from Pawleys Island, S.C., Gibbs received a bachelor's degree in psychology from Wofford in 2000.



ANGIE HEMBREE

GEORGIA STATE (1983)**

Recognized as one of the top former high school coaches in the nation, Angie Hembree will enter her first season in the collegiate ranks as an assistant coach with the University of Miami women's basketball program in 2005.

Hembree comes to UM following a 21-year career as one of the most successful high school coaches in the country, serving 14 seasons as a head coach.

Prior to joining head coach Katie Meier's staff this season, Hembree spent past seven seasons as the head coach at Collins Hill High School in Suwannee, Ga. where she led the Lady Eagles to three state championships and three regional championships. While at Collins Hill, Hembree amassed an overall record of 181-33, highlighted by a two-year span from 2003-05 during which time her teams posted an overall mark of 63-2.

In addition to winning the Georgia State Championship in 2005 her Collins High team finished the 2004-05 season ranked fifth nationally and first in the southeast region by USA Today and Hembree was named the Atlanta Tip-Off Club, Georgia High School Athletic Association and Gwinnett County Coach of the Year.

As one of the most established authorities on high school basketball, Hembree was selected to serve as a member of the Women's Basketball Coaches Association's (WBCA) High School All-American Nomination Committee following the 2004-05 season. Hembree coaching tenure began in 1984 at Feldwood High School (now Bannaker High School) in College Park, Ga. where she spent five seasons while serving as the head coach during the 1987-88 season. While at Feldwood, Hembree also served as the head girls track coach, helping FHS to a state championship in 1987.

She then went on to become the head coach at Milton High School in Alpharetta, Ga. from 1988-94 before moving on to South Forsyth High School in Cumming, Ga. from 1994-96 where she also served as an assistant softball coach on South Forsyth's 1994 state championship team. Prior to being named the head coach at Collins Hill in 1998, Hembree spent two seasons as an assistant coach at Medowcreek High School from 1996-98.

A native of Atlanta, Ga., Hembree earned her bachelor's degree in education from Georgia State in 1983. At Georgia State, she was a member of GSU 1982 AIAW Tournament team and a four-year letterwinner in softball. She received a masters in education from North Georgia College and State University in 1996 and in 2003 earned a specialist degree in leadership from Lincoln Memorial University.

and team and player schedules, as well as the production of alumni and team newsletters. She also works with the UM Marketing and Sports Media Relations offices to help organize various promotional activities.

Hall comes to Miami following a one-year stint as the Head Girl's Basketball Coach at R.L. Paschal High School in Fort Worth, Texas during the 2004-05 season. In addition to day-to-day coaching duties at R.L. Paschal, Hall also managed the program budget and marketing activities in addition to overseeing the team's booster club. Hall also organized HOOP Group, a youth basketball program in the Fort Worth area.

Prior to her stop at R.L. Paschal, Hall spent six years at TCU, serving as an assistant coach with the Lady Frogs from 1999-03 and as the Director of Basketball Operations during the 2003-04 season. As an assistant coach with the Lady Frogs, Hall helped with TCU's recruiting, practice and game preparation efforts in addition to preparing the team's travel arrangements.

As TCU's Director of Basketball Operations, Hall's responsibilities included handling the team budget, preparing travel arrangements and assisting in game operations. Hall also oversaw the program's managers, equipment, booster club, community outreach program, compliance needs, and camp administration.

While at TCU, Hall also served as an assistant director for the 2004 Conference USA Women's Basketball Tournament and was a member of the TCU Athletic Department's Outreach Committee, Mission Statement Committee and Diversity Subcommittee.

Hall's coaching career began in 1998 at Hueneme High School, where she served as the Head Junior Varsity Girl's Basketball Coach until 1990. Following her stay at Hueneme, Hall went on to California State University-Northridge to serve as an assistant coach from 1992-94 before moving on to join the coaching staff at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse from 1994-96. After two seasons at UW-L, Hall spent three seasons at Arkansas State as an assistant coach from 1996-99 prior to going on to TCU.

Hall served in the United States Navy from 1986-88. She earned an associate's degree in art from Ventura Junior College in 1991 and three years later received a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from California State University-Northridge in 1994. Hall went on to earn a masters degree in sports administration from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse in 1996.

Laz Fernandez enters his second season with the University of Miami Women's Basketball Team. As the Hurricanes' Video Coordinator, Fernandez is responsible for handling all of UM's video needs as well as various administrative duties.

Prior to coming to Miami, Fernandez spent two seasons at nearby Barry University in Miami Shores, Fla. where he served on the men's coaching staff. At Barry, Fernandez assisted with all administrative duties of head coach Cesar Odio's program including recruiting, coaching, and the development of post players.

With Odio, Fernandez helped lead the Buccaneers to an overall record of 32-24 while finishing first in the country in scoring defense in 2002-03 with opponents averaging just 53.9 points a game against the Buccaneers. In 2003-04, Barry finished third in the country in scoring defense.

Fernandez spent three seasons at Taylor University in Indiana under head coach Paul Patterson prior to coaching at Barry. There he served as the Head Student Manager for three seasons. During his tenure at Taylor, the Trojans amassed an overall record of 61-36 while capturing the Mid-Central Conference regular season championship in 2002 en route to a No. 8 national ranking.

Fernandez is also very active in summer basketball camps. He has been the Camp Director for Play Hard Basketball Camp (2002-04), Sergio Rouco's Worldwide Basketball Camp (2004), and a camp counselor at the UM Basketball Camp (2000-04) and Go-All Pro Basketball Camp (2000-04).

A native of Miami, Fernandez is a graduate of Miami Christian High School. He received a bachelor's in Sport Management from Taylor in 2002 and earned a masters in Sport Management from Barry in 2004.



PRESIDENT DONNA E. SHALALA



DR. DONNA E. SHALALA
UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT

Donna E. Shalala became the fifth President of the University of Miami on June 1, 2001. President Shalala is an accomplished scholar, teacher, and administrator whose career has been marked by a variety of leadership positions reflecting her interest in young people. She also is a big sports fan!

Shalala was influenced by her mother, Edna, a former nationally ranked tennis player, while growing up in Cleveland, Ohio. While attending college, she played tennis and still plays a competitive game of doubles. She also enjoys golf, skiing and other outdoor activities. "Sports gave me discipline," she said. "During the course of a year, I try to attend all of our sports, and I wish I could watch more of the games."

At a typical Hurricanes football game, Shalala spends the first quarter in the stands talking with students, and then she sits in her outdoor seats for a quarter. The rest of the time is spent in the boxes on what she calls business. "I'm talking to donors, I'm trying to raise money," she said. "I look forward to the day where I can sit down and watch an entire game from beginning to end. I can usually do that only at a bowl game." In 1987 President Shalala, a distinguished political scientist, became the first woman chancellor of a Big Ten university, the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She led what was then the nation's largest public research university. In 1992 Business Week magazine named her one of the top five managers in higher education.

President Shalala's success at Wisconsin was reflected in athletics as well. She hired a new football coach, recruiting Barry Alvarez from Notre Dame. Four years later, Wisconsin won the Big Ten football championship and represented its conference in the Rose Bowl for the first time in 30 years. President Shalala served on the first Knight Commission, a committee to review college athletics, and has served on the board of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Foundation.

In 1993, Shalala was named U.S. Secretary for Health and Human Services (HHS) and served for eight years, becoming the nation's longest-serving HHS Secretary.

In 1999 she spearheaded the United Way campaign for federal employees that raised a record \$44 million for local and national charities. In 2000 she led the official U.S. delegation to the Olympics in Sydney, Australia. At the end of her tenure as HHS Secretary, The Washington Post described her as "one of the most successful government managers of modern times."

As President of the University of Miami, President Shalala presides over one of the most successful college athletic programs in the country. The Hurricanes football program consistently ranks in the top of the polls. In 2001 the baseball team won its fourth College World Series and the football team won its fifth national championship. In 2003 the men and women's basketball teams began play in a new, on-campus facility, the Convocation Center. Other Hurricane sports-from golf to tennis-have also earned national recognition.

As to the future of UM athletics, Shalala said, "We have to make sure that we have first-class facilities and coaches. We need substantial fan support for all of our sports to be able to maintain them at the highest competitive levels. All of our sports deserve strong support. We have to

make sure we have enough opportunities for young women and men. Compliance will always demand our attention. We have people of great integrity. I believe our biggest challenge is not getting complacent about our programs, and investing in women's sports at the same level as men's sports."

For a sports fan like President Shalala, there is no better place to call home than the University of Miami

DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS

Paul Dee has served as Director of Athletics since 1993. Prior to his appointment, Dee had served the University as its Vice President and General Counsel beginning in 1981.

During his tenure as Director of Athletics, Dee has focused the efforts of the Athletic Department on four major points of emphasis: 1) the success of its programs; 2) the development of its student-athletes, both athletically and academically; 3) the quality of its staff; and 4) the improvement of facilities. The department has achieved success in each of these areas.

PROGRAM SUCCESS

During Dee's tenure as Director of Athletics, the University of Miami has won three team national championships (baseball in 1999 and 2001, football in 2001).

Prior to joining the Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004, Miami was a dominant program in the Big East Conference, winning 34 league titles between 1993 and 2004. Included in those league championships were eight football titles, eight women's tennis titles, seven men's tennis titles, six Big East women's outdoor track and field championships, two women's indoor track, and one title in men's basketball, women's basketball and men's swimming and diving.

In their inaugural year in the Atlantic Coast Conference, UM teams won conference championships in women's indoor and outdoor track, and the women's tennis and volleyball teams finished in second place. The football team finished in third place, and the men's basketball program had a resurgence under new head coach Frank Haith.

Under Dee's supervision, the University of Miami athletic department has added full scholarship programs in women's soccer, women's volleyball and women's rowing, and the university will begin playing women's lacrosse in 2007.

STUDENT-ATHLETE SUCCESS

University of Miami student-athletes have continued to achieve academically. UM student-athletes have shown consistent improvement in grade-point average and graduation rates over the last decade.

Perhaps the most successful scholar-athlete of the last decade at UM was football offensive tackle Joaquin Gonzalez, who earned the 2001 HealthSouth Draddy Award (the "Academic Heisman"), in addition to earning first-team All-America honors on the field in 2000 and 2001.

QUALITY OF STAFF

Miami coaches have been widely recognized by their peers as some of the nation's best. The current UM coaching staff has earned a combined 18 National Coach of the Year honors, including nine by diving coach Randy Ableman, four by baseball coach Jim Morris, three by football coach Larry Coker, and two by women's golf coach Lela Cannon.

IMPROVEMENT AND EXPANSION OF FACILITIES

Since 1993, the University of Miami athletic program has seen an almost complete makeover of its athletic facilities. During that period, Dee has overseen the following facility projects:

- o Construction of a new football field at Greentree Fields
- o Construction of Cobb Stadium (track and soccer)
- o Renovation of football locker and equipment rooms
- o Renovation of the athletic training room
- o Renovation of the athletic department offices
- o Construction of the academic study hall facility
- o Construction of the weight training facility
- o Construction of the football meeting rooms
- o Construction of locker rooms for track, soccer and volleyball
- o Construction of the Convocation Center for basketball
- o The start of construction in 2005 of Alex Rodriguez Park for baseball

A COMMITMENT TO A WELL-ROUNDED PROGRAM

Dee believes intensified fundraising efforts and developing stronger interest in women's sports are vital to ensuring the future success of the Hurricanes' program. National Influence

During his 12 years as Director of Athletics, Dee has been active in professional activities. Dee has served on several NCAA committees, including the Committee on Certification and the Management Council. He is currently a member of the Committee on Infractions.

Before joining the University of Miami, Dee was with the Miami law firm of Mershon, Sawyer, Johnston, Dunwoody & Cole and was a law clerk for Chief U.S. District Judge Charles Fulton in Miami. He received his bachelor of arts degree from the University of Florida in 1970 and his master's of education and juris doctor degrees with honors from the University of Miami in 1973 and 1977, respectively.

Dee has a son, Terrance, who practices law in Miami.

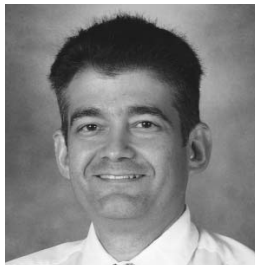
DR. CLYDE B. MCCOY

U ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS

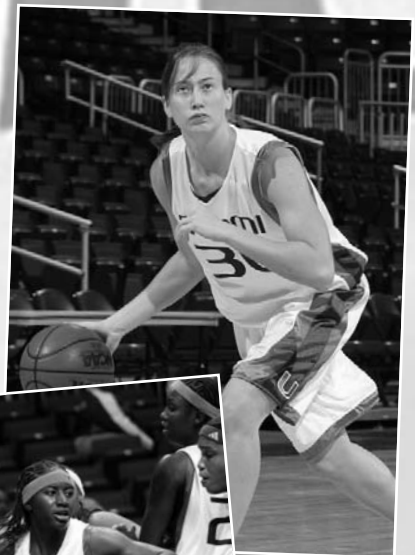
The University of Miami has boasted 26 All-Conference selections in the school's 33-year history, including 2005 First Team All-ACC selection Tamara James.

The University of Miami women's basketball team will have no fewer than six televised games this season.

Current University of Miami players Amy Audibert, Marianne Curtis, Selena Eskinazi-Budge and Tatjana Marincic were named to the 2004-05 ACC Academic Honor Roll.

U THE CONVOCATION CENTER

The University of Miami women's basketball team plays in the Convocation Center, a \$48 million dollar, 7,000 seat, on-campus arena which opened in 2003.



UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI

The University of Miami is the largest, most comprehensive private research university in the southeastern United States with a well-earned reputation for academic excellence. More than 15,000 undergraduate and graduate students from every state and more than 114 nations around the world call UM home during the academic semesters. The University has grown from its main location in the City of Coral Gables to the Medical campus located in Downtown Miami, the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science on Virginia Key, the John J. Koubek Center in Little Havana, the James L. Knight Center in Downtown Miami, and the South and Richmond campuses in southwest Miami-Dade county. With more than 9,800 full- and part-time faculty and staff, UM is one of the largest private employers in Miami-Dade County.

Enrollment: Total enrollment for the 2004-2005 academic year was 15,250 students. Of that number, 9,741 were undergraduate students, 3,235 were graduate students, and 1,911 were professional students. During the 2003-2004 academic year, the University awarded 2,155 bachelors, 1,183 master's, 381 J.D.'s, 142 M.D.'s, 119 Ph.D.'s, and 40 other doctorates.

New Freshman Standings: Two in five new freshmen graduated in the top five percent of their high school class. Almost two-thirds graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class.

International Students: The University continues to attract able students from South Florida, as well as from other parts of the nation and around the world. It was one of the country's first universities to have an organized international recruitment program. The University of Miami sends representatives worldwide to seek qualified students. These students represent 113 foreign countries, the 50 states, three territories, and the District of Columbia.

Honors Program/Honor Societies: Approximately 1,200 students participate in the Honors Program. UM has 51 academic honor societies, including Phi Beta Kappa.

Research: Research and sponsored program expenditures totaled \$263.1 million (FY 04). According to the National Science Foundation, UM ranked sixth of all universities in expenditures of federal funds for research and development (FY 02).

Budget: The budget for 2004-05 was \$1.4 billion, with \$803 million projected for the medical campus. At the end of the FY 04 the endowment was \$475.0 million.

Development: In FY 04, contributions reached \$125.7 million in private cash, gifts and grants. In FY 03, the University ranked 49th among national research institutions in this category. In October 2003, Momentum: the Campaign for the University of Miami was announced to increase the University's endowment and raise needed funds to support its research, teaching, and service missions.

A WORLD-CLASS STUDENT BODY

Enrollment at the University of Miami continues to experience tremendous growth. Applications for the freshman class during 2003-2004 reached 18,490 — the highest freshman class application figure in the University's history.

The student body also has become more diverse. Hispanics accounted for 28 percent and African-Americans for 11 percent, while Asian students accounted for seven percent.

Women accounted for approximately 57 percent of the new freshman class that year, about 58 percent of all undergraduates, and 50 percent of the graduate and professional students.

Education outside the traditional classroom is an important part of student life at University of Miami. The University has 60 programs offered in 25 countries on a full academic year, semester, or summer basis.

CAMPUSES AND SCHOOLS

Coral Gables Campus: The Coral Gables campus, with its two colleges and seven schools, is located on a 230-acre tract in suburban Coral Gables.

Medical Campus: The University of Miami Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine campus consists of 35 acres within the 80-acre University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Medical Center complex. Other facilities at the medical center, in addition to Jackson Memorial Hospital, include the Miami Veterans Affairs Medical Center and two University-owned hospitals — the University of Miami Hospital and Clinics and Anne Bates Leach Eye Hospital, along with the Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center and Bascom Palmer Eye Institute. Dedication of the Lois Pope LIFE Center in fall 2000 and the Batchelor Children's Research Institute in spring 2001 in the Schonger Research Quadrangle marked major contributions to the research facilities at the medical campus. School of Medicine faculty currently conduct more than 1,300 research projects aimed at advances in basic science and clinical care in facilities totaling more than two million square feet of owned and leased space.

COMPLIANCE

Dear Prospective Student-Athlete:

As a prospective student-athlete, you may have the athletic potential to play college football at the Division I-A level. If so, you probably will be exposed to an enormous amount of recruitment activities from universities across the country.

Throughout the recruitment process, coaches will reference various NCAA rules and regulations. The rules are designed for various reasons. The most important of which are to ease the pressures on prospective student-athletes and to level the playing field so that all universities operate within the same guidelines.

During the recruiting process you may have the following questions:

- When and how often can I visit an institutions campus?
- When, where and how often can a coach telephone me?
- How many times can a coach observe me in practice and/or competition?
- What academic criteria must I meet to be eligible to play Division I-A college football?

The answers to these questions and more can be obtained from the University of Miami Compliance Office or the NCAA by requesting the NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete. The guide may be provided to a prospective student-athlete at any time. The guide addresses issues related to Divisions I, II and III academic eligibility, financial aid, recruitment and more.

To receive a copy of the guide call the NCAA Hotline at 1-800-638-3731 or request it from the University of Miami coach who is recruiting you.

Please remember that since violations of NCAA rules during your recruitment could jeopardize your athletic eligibility, it is important for you and your parents to be informed and to ask questions throughout the recruiting process.

A DIVISION I INSTITUTION MAY PROVIDE A RECRUIT WITH THE FOLLOWING PRINTED MATERIALS:

- General correspondence, including letters, U.S. Postal Service postcards and institutional note cards;
- Game programs, which may not include posters, and one Student-Athlete Handbook;
- NCAA educational information;
- Pre-enrollment information subsequent to signing a National Letter of Intent with the university;
- One athletic publication (e.g., media guide or recruiting brochure);
- Official academic, admissions and student services publications published or videos produced by the institution and available to all students;
- Schedule and business cards;
- Questionnaires which may be provided prior to your junior year; and
- Camp brochures which may be provided prior to your junior year.



IMPORTANT INFORMATION FROM THE UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI COMPLIANCE OFFICE

FREQUENTLY ASKED QUESTIONS

Who is a Prospective Student-Athlete (Prospect)?

You are a prospect if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you may become a prospect if a university provides you (or your family or friends) any financial aid or other benefit that is not usually provided to prospective student-athletes.

How do I know if I'm being recruited?

A coach is recruiting you if they try to convince you directly, or through your family, to attend their school and participate in intercollegiate athletics. There are several ways to be recruited: (1) a coach may provide you with an official paid visit to view the campus, (2) a coach may arrange an in-person, off-campus meeting with you (or your family), or (3) a coach or staff member may call you (or your family) on more than one occasion for the purpose of recruitment.

Coaches and authorized institutional staff members are the only individuals who may recruit you. Representatives of athletic interests (boosters) may not call, write or make in-person contact with you anywhere for the purpose of recruiting you to a university and participating in athletics.

When can a coach contact me?

Off Campus Contact

In the sport of basketball, a coach can arrange a face-to-face meeting, off the University's campus, with you beginning the first day of classes of your senior year.

In the sport of football, a coach can arrange a face-to-face meeting, off the University's campus, with you beginning July 1 after your junior year. In all other sports, a coach can arrange one face-to-face meeting, off the University's campus, with you on your high school campus during the month of April of your junior year. Then beginning July 1 after your junior year.

Telephone Calls

- In all sports other than football and basketball, a coach may call a prospect once during the month of March of the prospect's junior year in high school and then on or after July 1 following the completion of the prospect's junior year in high school. Only one phone call may be made per week to a prospect or the prospect's family.
- In the sport of football, a coach may initiate one telephone call to a prospect during the month of May of the prospect's junior year. Additional telephone calls to a prospect may not be made before September 1 of the beginning of the prospect's senior year in high school, limited to one call per week.
- In the sport of men's basketball, coaches may make one telephone call per month after June 15 of the prospect's sophomore year through July 31 of the junior year. Beginning August 1 of the senior year a coach may make two telephone calls per week. Only one call per week to a two-year college prospect.
- In the sport of women's basketball, one telephone call during the months of April and May of the prospect's junior year in high school, one telephone call between June 1 and June 20 and then one telephone call may be made to a prospect on or after June 21 of the prospect's junior year in high school. In addition, only three telephone calls to a prospect may be made during the month of July, with no more than one call per week.
- In the following circumstances unlimited calls to a prospect are permitted: (1) during the five days immediately preceding an official visit to the University of Miami, (2) on the initial date for signing the National Letter of Intent and the two days following the signing date, and (3) on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with a prospect.
- For all sports, coaches may receive telephone calls placed by a prospect at the prospect's expense at anytime, including before July 1 following the prospect's junior year in high school.

Letters

Letters and recruiting information may be sent to you starting September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school.

What is a Contact?

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parent(s) or legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting.

What can a school offer me to attend their University?

You (or your family) may not receive any benefit, inducement or arrangements such as cash, clothing, cars, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or to attend a NCAA school.

A University may offer you a one-year scholarship that covers room and board, tuition and fees, and required course-related books, or any part of these. The institution can recommend that this aid is renewed each year, as is the general practice at the University of Miami but this renew-

al is not guaranteed. In addition, they can offer you quality academic and medical support, as well as the opportunity to compete for one of the nation's top programs.

What can I do during this process?

Enjoy your high school years and work hard both in the classroom and in your sport. At the beginning of your junior year you should sign up for the NCAA Clearinghouse. Your high school guidance office can provide you with the information to register.

ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SERVICES

THE RETENTION PROGRAMS

The University of Miami offers unique programs designed to assist student-athletes in their pursuit of a college education. These are a few of the programs offered to assist student-athletes:

1. UMX Freshman Experience Course - A unique class designed to assist freshman student-athletes with the transition from high school to college.

2. Proactive Mentorship Program - This program is designed to assist student-athletes with the transition skills necessary to be successful college students. All freshmen are required to participate and meet once a week with a mentor covering issues such as time management, goal-setting, class preparation, test preparation, etc.

3. Study Table Program - Provides valuable locations and time to accomplish academic goals. Structured times, group and individual tutorials, computer labs, and quiet areas are designated for this program.

4. F.A.S.T. Program (Freshman Academic Success Training) - The main purpose of this program is to ensure a smooth and successful transition from high school to college through academic success training. This will be accomplished through closely monitoring incoming at-risk student-athletes so as to ensure the use of efficient time management and study skills. Assumptions are made that all of our student-athletes come to us with good study habits, academic knowledge, and social judgment. This program will address all these areas and be reinforced throughout the semester.

5. Computer Lab - Located within the Hecht Athletic Center, student-athletes have access to 30 personal computers with Internet access and conduct research. The lab also has 20 laptop computers that student-athletes can check out and take with them on team trips, or when they want to work on their own.

6. Tutors - Level 1 certified tutors by the College Reading and Learning Association provide individual and group assistance upon request. The tutor program at the University of Miami is one of a small number of athletic programs in the country to be awarded CRLA certification.

7. Learning Resource Room - Student-athletes with disabilities have access to computer programs that aid in their educational skill development.

ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SERVICES

The Athletic Academic Services Staff of the University of Miami Athletic Department is committed to providing the academic support services necessary to facilitate the graduation of student athletes and the nurturing of skills to promote the development of responsible, well-rounded individuals. This mission is fulfilled through our commitment to promote athletics, academics, personal development and career development.



Roger Bell (M.S.), Associate Athletic Director for Academic Services

A 14-year veteran at UM, Roger is in his first year as the Associate Athletic Director for Academic Services. He oversees the Academic Services and also serves as the academic advisor for women's swimming/diving and men's diving, and Life Skills Programs. Bell graduated from Morehouse College in 1972 with a Bachelor of Arts degree in Education and completed a masters of Science degree in Educational Leadership at the University of Miami. Bell and his wife, Denise, have two children, Raja and Tombi.



David Wyman (M.S.), Director of Academic Services

An 11-year veteran of the office of Athletic Academic Services, David enters his first year as the Director of Academic Services. As the director, he provides oversight of Athletic Academic Services and is the academic liaison to campus. THE COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS

THE COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS

The School of Architecture, founded in 1983, offers a wide range of professionally accredited undergraduate and graduate degrees with specialization in suburb and town design and computing in design. The school's faculty and students, headed by Dean Elizabeth Plater-Zyberk, have earned numerous honors and accolades for excellence in design. Fall 2004 enrollment: 357.

The College of Arts and Sciences, founded in 1926, encompasses most of the disciplines within the realm of the liberal arts. The college comprises 20 academic departments, with approximately 40 distinct majors available to undergraduates. The college employs approximately 400 full-time faculty. Fall 2004 enrollment: 4,739.

The School of Business Administration, founded in 1929, is accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. The nine departments of the school offer 26 undergraduate and graduate-level degree programs. It also is one of the first schools in the nation to offer a graduate-level management program in the Spanish language for Latin American business executives. Fall 2004 enrollment: 2,795.

The School of Communication, founded in 1985, is one of the University's nationally and internationally acclaimed schools. Major programs of study include advertising, broadcasting, communication studies, journalism, motion pictures, public relations, and visual communication. Its 80,000 sq. ft. facility houses a broad range of student facilities and activities, including computer labs, a studio, and a cable television station and a nationally recognized debate team. Students also work on the student-run campus newspaper and yearbook. Undergraduate and graduate enrollment for fall 2005: 1400.

The School of Education, founded in 1929, houses the Departments of Teaching and Learning, Educational and Psychological Studies, and Exercise and Sport Sciences. Undergraduate majors and minors are available in elementary, secondary, special, and music education. There also are disciplines such as exercise physiology and teaching English to speakers of other languages (TESOL). All teacher education courses are approved by the State of Florida and are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. Fall 2004 enrollment: 808.

The College of Engineering, founded in 1947, is one of the largest schools of its kind in a private institution of higher learning. The college's most distinctive features are the interdisciplinary courses of study, the result of associations with several areas of the University; these include biomedical engineering, which involves a partnership with the School of Medicine, and ocean engineering, which has a partnership with the Rosenstiel School. Fall 2004 enrollment: 1,018.

The Graduate School, founded in 1959, offers graduate degrees in all major areas, with 60 doctoral, 125 master's and eight specialist programs. The list of accomplishments in post-baccalaureate education is extensive. The Rosenstiel School is considered among the world's top institutes for marine and atmospheric research and graduate training.

The School of Law, founded in 1928, offers graduate programs in comparative law, inter-American law, international law, ocean and coastal law, taxation, estate planning, and real estate property development. The law library is considered a leading legal research library with state-of-the-art research tools and journals. Fall 2004 enrollment: 1,311.

The Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine, founded in 1952, already has established a research enterprise that the National Institutes of Health ranks in the top 30 percent of the nation's 125 medical schools with regard to research funding awarded. The medical school's 1,000-plus full-time faculty members and an additional 500 research personnel conduct clinical and basic science research crossing all disciplines, from epidemiology and pediatrics to AIDS, psychiatry, and the neurosciences. Together with its partner, Jackson Memorial Hospital, the school comprises the second-busiest medical center in the nation. Fall 2004 enrollment: 931.

Phillip and Patricia Frost School of Music, founded in 1926, is one of the largest schools of its kind in a private institution and one of the most comprehensive in all of higher learning. The school offers many bachelor's and master's degree programs. The school's facilities include the Maurice Gusman Concert Hall and the L. Austin Weeks Center for Recording and Performance, which contains the Victor E. Clarke Recital Hall, and the new Marta and Austin Weeks Music Library and Technology Center, among others. Fall 2004 enrollment: 748.

The School of Nursing and Health Studies, founded in 1968, houses one of the first collegiate nursing programs in South Florida. The school has an emphasis on transcultural nursing, which recognizes an individual's unique health benefits and practices. The school is a leader in the development of innovative primary care nursing practice models, which have earned national and international recognition and research. Fall 2004 enrollment: 209.

The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science, founded in 1969, has grown from humble beginnings into one of the nation's leading institutions for oceanographic research and education today. The school offers curricula in applied marine physics, marine affairs, marine and atmospheric chemistry, marine biology and fisheries, marine geology and geophysics, and meteorology and physical oceanography. Fall 2004 enrollment: 209.

THE CONVOCATION CENTER

Through the assistance of generous commitments from Ryder System, Inc. and the Dauer Family, the University of Miami finally has its own on-campus multipurpose Convocation Center.

The Convocation Center, which opened on January 4, 2003, serves as the centerpiece of the campus and unites all aspects of the University of Miami and South Florida communities. The 7,000-seat center hosts gatherings ranging from academics to campus and community events.

"The on-campus Convocation Center will not only enhance Hurricane Basketball but it benefits the entire communit," says Paul Dee, Director of Athletics. "We are extremely grateful to the corporate leaders and individual donors who have made the Convocation Center a reality."

The cost of the facility is \$48 million. As a private institution, no state or local tax funds were involved in the construction of this facility.

HURRICANE WARNINGS

THE HURRICANES

It began in controversy. Some reports say the players on the 1927 football team held a team meeting to select Hurricanes, hoping they would sweep away opponents just as the devastating storm did on September 16, 1926. Another version holds that Miami News columnist Jack Bell asked end Porter Norris of the 1926 team what the team should be called. Told that the local dignitaries and University officials wanted to name the team for a local flora or fauna, Norris said the players wouldn't stand for it and suggested "Hurricanes" since the opening game had been postponed by such a storm. From time to time, opposition has arisen to the name that would "reinforce Miami's negative reputation as a weather-beaten community living constantly under the threat of destruction." But as one UM official rationalized in the 1960s, "Does anyone think Chicago is overrun by bears just because the town has a football team by that name?"

ORANGE, GREEN AND WHITE

UM's school colors were selected in 1926. The colors of the Florida orange tree represent UM. Orange symbolizes the fruit of the tree, green represents the leaves and white, the blossoms.

THE U

In 1973, UM's Athletic Federation, the fund-raising arm of the athletic department at the time, commissioned a local public relations expert to develop a distinctive logo. The University had gone several years with a variety of helmet and uniform changes and the Federation noted that a number of major colleges have the initials UM. Miami designer Bill Bodenhamer suggested the "U" idea, which lent itself to distinctive logos for each sport as well as slogans like "U gotta believe" and "U is great."

SEBASTIAN THE IBIS

Folklore maintains that the Ibis, a symbol of knowledge found in the Everglades and Egypt, is the last sign of wildlife to take shelter before a hurricane and the first to reappear after the storm. The local marsh bird was considered UM's first unofficial mascot when the school yearbook adopted the name "Ibis" in 1926. Its popularity grew among the students during the 1950s. In 1957, San Sebastian Hall, a residence hall on campus, sponsored an Ibis entry in the homecoming celebration. The next year, student John Stormont performed at games in an Ibis costume that was glued, sewn and pinned together and was the forerunner of today's bird. Through the years, the Ibis has become one of the most recognizable college mascots in the United States.

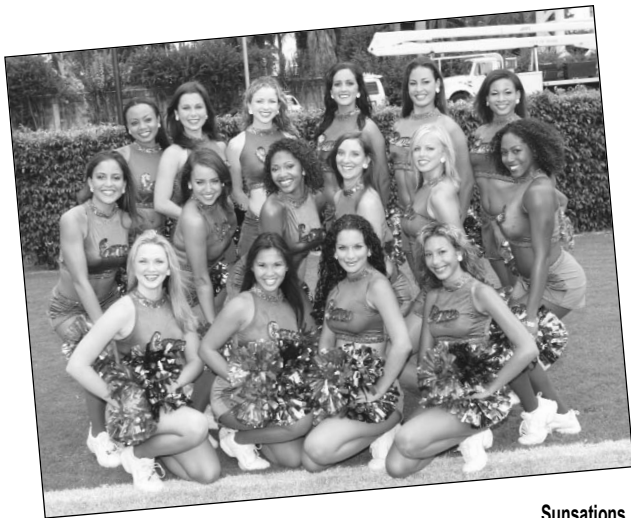
SUNSATIONS

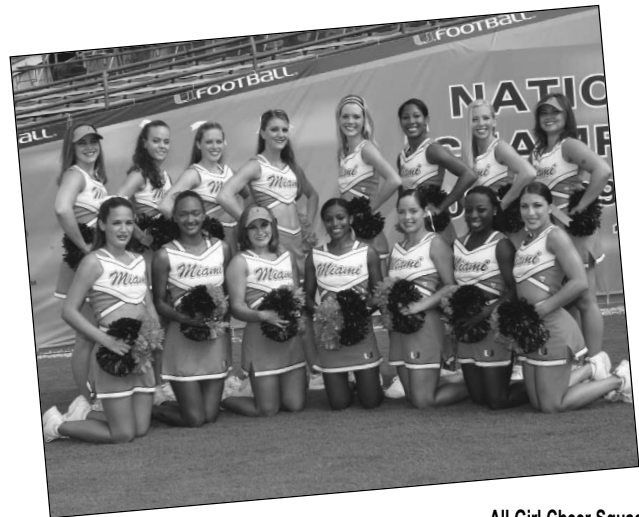

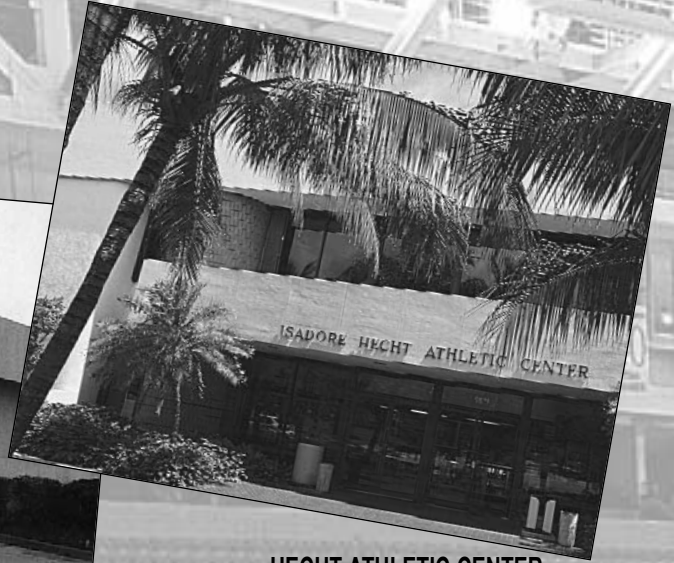

RONALD SHANE

WATERSPORTS CENTER

The Ronald W. Shane Watersports Center, home of the University of Miami rowing team and has 4,200 square feet of storage space for shells. It is located on Indian Creek, a three mile sheltered body of water that is wide enough for six boats in the heart of Miami Beach.



HECHT ATHLETIC CENTER

The Hecht Athletic Center houses the athletic program administrative offices, locker rooms, meeting rooms, and a strength and conditioning center.



NEIL SCHIFF TENNIS CENTER

The home of Miami tennis is one of the top five facilities in the country. With 16 courts and seating for 1,000 spectators, the facility hosts many of the nation's top amateur events, including the International Junior Orange Bowl Tournament, ITCA Women's Rolex Qualifier and BIG EAST Tennis Championships.



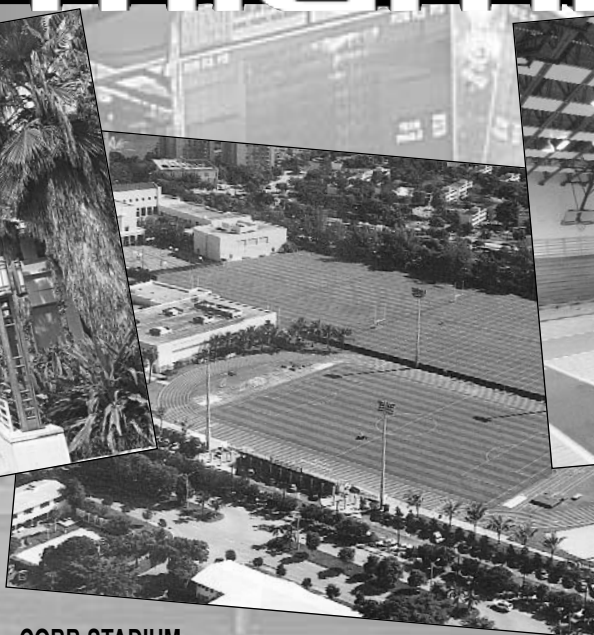
NORMAN WHITTEN STUDENT UNION POOL

WELLNESS CENTER

The Wellness Center provides students a variety of activities and services, including a fitness room, aerobic classes, indoor track, gymnasium with basketball, volleyball and badminton courts; racquetball and squash courts; indoor pool, spa and sauna.



COBB STADIUM

Located adjacent to the Hecht Athletic Center. The first class stadium is available to host soccer and track and field events for school and youth groups and provides seating for 500 people.



KNIGHT SPORTS COMPLEX

Home of the University of Miami women's volleyball team. The building houses practice courts and locker rooms for volleyball, as well as men's and women's basketball.



GREENTREE PRACTICE FIELDS

The practice home of the 1983, '87, '89, '91 and '01 national football champions. The field includes three full-length prescription athletic turf fields and lights for evening practices.

CONVOCAION CENTER

On Jan. 4, 2003, the University of Miami began competition in the Convocation Center, the home of Miami men's and women's basketball and the University's first large-capacity venue for other educational, cultural, and community events. The \$48 million facility was totally funded through private donations.



ORANGE BOWL

Dedicated on December 10, 1937 the Orange Bowl serves as the home of the University of Miami football team. The facility has a seating capacity of 72,319 and has played host to five Super Bowls and numerous collegiate bowl games. Since 1970, when the collegiate national champion was first selected after the completion of the bowl games, the Orange Bowl Classic has hosted 11 games that decided the national title. Until the 1996 season when the OBC moved to Pro Player Stadium, Orange Bowl Stadium had hosted eight of the previous 11 national championship games, including University of Miami titles in 1983, 1987 and 1991.

"Welcome to Miami...bienvenidos a Miami." With 84 miles of Atlantic coastline, yearlong sunshine, and a boasted average daily temperature of 75 degrees, it is no wonder in his hit single, rapper Will Smith dubbed Miami "the city where the heat is on."

THE HEAT ON THE COURT

Thanks to South Florida's year-round, sports-friendly climate, Miami has a lot to offer in outdoor recreational activities. From some of the PGA's finest golf courses to almost 700 parks, there is something for everyone. With countless opportunities for kayaking, scuba-diving, fishing, beach volleyball, and rollerblading, there is no excuse for going without a tan.

South Florida truly has the perfect weather for sports, and is one of only eight metropolitan areas in the United States that can boast of a professional franchise in each of the four major sports. The Major League's Florida Marlins had everybody "doing the fish" when they won the World Series in 1997 and 2003. The NFL's Miami Dolphins have thrilled fans for decades at the Pro Player Stadium, which hosted both the 1995 and 1999 Super Bowls. Despite the warm weather, South Florida's own hockey team, the Florida Panthers, keep up on the ice. And for basketball fans, the NBA's Miami Heat keep things heated up at the American Airlines Arena.

MIAMI IS CALIENTE

Truly a melting pot, Miami is home to a variety of cultures, creating a totally unique, vibrant cultural mosaic. With representatives of every Hispanic nation in the world, Spanish serves as a second language to most of Miami's residents. The spirit of the Caribbean is alive in Little Haiti, where many Haitian artists, musicians and entrepreneurs get their start in Miami. The proud focal point of this neighborhood is the Caribbean Market, an open-air replica of Port-au-Prince's Iron Market, where Creole is the dominant language, and there are elements of Afro-Caribbean religions such as voodoo.

Dubbed as the Latin-American Hollywood by the New York Times, such blockbusters as *Big Trouble*, written by Miami Herald columnist Dave Barry, and starring Tim Allen and Rene Russo; *Any Given Sunday*, *There's Something About Mary*, *The Birdcage*, and *Wild Things* were all filmed in Miami.

Miami is a Hollywood favorite off-screen as well as on-screen, with dozens of celebrities calling Miami home, and even more who consider it a favorite weekend getaway. Gloria and Emilio Estefan's Star Island estate and Gianni Versace's Ocean Drive mansion-turned-museum are just a couple of examples of Miami's celebrity appeal. It is not uncommon to spot Sean "Puffy" Combs or members of N'Sync dancing at a South Beach club or former president Bill Clinton playing golf at the Biltmore Hotel.

MIAMI HOT SPOTS

For shopping, for dancing, or for just plain people watching, Miami offers several places to see and be seen.

With over 800 buildings designed in the 30s and 40s, South Beach serves as the largest collection of Art Deco architecture in the world. Celebrity-owned restaurants like Cameron Diaz's Bambu, night clubs such as Level, which is based on the format of New York's Studio 54, and a medley of huge anchor stores and small unique boutiques create the flavor of Miami's most famous hot spot.

Coconut Grove, just a ten-minute drive from the University of Miami, is another student favorite. Built mainly by West Indian craftsmen brought in from the Bahamas, it still holds onto the Caribbean appeal its name suggests. Attracting writers, artists, and non-conformists, this hub of the bohemian arts contributed to Miami's cultural renaissance. Fast-forward a century, and the Grove is still one of Miami's hottest nightspots, with more than 75 cafes, restaurants, and clubs that line the streets.

THE WARMTH OF CORAL GABLES, THE "CITY BEAUTIFUL"

The University of Miami campus is located in Coral Gables, dubbed "the City Beautiful." Founded by George Merrick almost a century ago, the Gables is one of Miami's most beautiful areas. The palm-lined streets are all named after European villages, each one bordered by Old Spanish style homes. Downtown Coral Gables is bustling with the many offices of multi-national corporations. The city's central boulevard, Miracle Mile, has a wide array of designer boutiques and art galleries. One Gables favorite is the Venetian Pool, a beautiful swimming lagoon carved out of coral, which features cascading waterfalls and underwater caves.

THE TRADITION

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 53rd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 94 national championships, including 49 in women's competition and 45 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 119 times in men's competition and 61 times in women's action.

Since the inception of women's basketball in the ACC in 1977, a tradition of excellence has been established.

Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their television exposure. The 2005-06 schedule features 40 televised games, including 11 national telecasts (six games on Fox Sports Net and affiliates and five on espn2). In addition, 29 match-ups will be featured on the league's regional sports network which includes Comcast SportsNet, Fox Sports Net South and Sun Sports. In all, the ACC will make 75 television appearances this season.

The league's women's basketball programs rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 103 appearances and won 137 games in the last 28 years, 11 of them as a number one seed. The league boasts such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 17 consecutive years. The conference has also made ten trips to the Final Four in the last 24 years with two teams finishing second and North Carolina capturing the National Championship in 1994.

Since 1989, the ACC has placed nine players on the All-Final Four team, including Staley and Smith, who were dubbed Most Outstanding Players. In all, 50 ACC players have been named to NCAA Tournament All-Region teams, with eight Most Outstanding Player recognitions.

Three players have garnered national player of the year accolades while competing under the ACC banner. Virginia's Dawn Staley was a back-to-back selection in 1991 and 1992, while North Carolina's Charlotte Smith received the ESPY award in 1995. Duke's Alana Beard was recognized with national player of the year honors in both 2003 and 2004.

Five league coaches have combined to earn 11 national coach of the year awards. Duke's Gail Goestenkors, North Carolina's Sylvia Hatchell, Virginia's Debbie Ryan, Maryland's Chris Weller and NC State's Kay Yow have all garnered national recognition.

Seven ACC representatives, including coaches and student-athletes, have participated in the Olympics. NC State's Kay Yow, assisted by Sylvia Hatchell of North Carolina, headed up the 1988 gold medal-winning Olympic team. Maryland's Vicky Bullett was a member of both the 1988 and 1992 Olympic teams. Three-time Olympian and Virginia graduate, Dawn Staley struck gold in Athens as a

member of the 2004 Olympic squad. Duke's Gail Goestenkors served as an assistant coach on the gold-medal winning team in Athens.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the league. Forty-three former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while five former players have worked the sidelines as coaches.

The ACC also stands at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics in terms of the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. Since 1983, 381 women's basketball players have received ACC Academic Honor Roll recognition. The 2003-04 academic year included 39 selections. In addition, ACC women's basketball players have earned first-team Academic All-America honors six times, including Virginia's Val Ackerman in 1981, the former President of the WNBA. In 1997, NC State's Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. Thirteen players have earned ACC postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

A HISTORY

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting July 1, 2005.

2004-05 IN REVIEW

The 2004-05 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and seven individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 51 national team titles over the last 15 years.

The ACC's 2004-05 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, North Carolina in men's basketball and Duke in women's golf. In addition, a total of 181 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year.

CHAMPIONSHIPS

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2005-06 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women.

The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

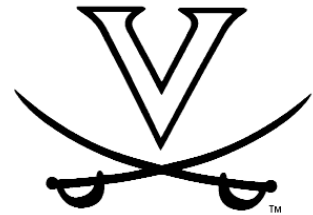

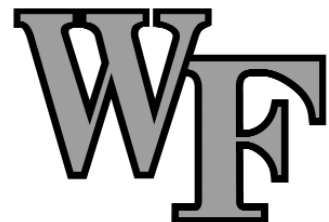

RETURNING FIRST-TEAM ALL-ACC

TAMARA JAMES - MIAMI

Miami's Tamara James led the ACC in scoring with 22.3 points per game in her first season in the league, becoming the first player in Hurricane history to earn All-ACC honors. James started all 29 contests for Miami, averaging 36.8 minutes per game. She led the team in rebounding with 6.9 per contest, and collected 75 steals on the year.

MONIQUE CURRIE - DUKE

Duke's Monique Currie became the sixth straight Blue Devil to earn ACC Player of the Year accolades in 2005. The only unanimous selection to the All-ACC First Team, Currie averaged 17.5 points and 7.1 rebounds per game. Currie also had 123 assists and a team-high 77 steals en route to being named All-ACC for the third time in her career.

IVORY LATTA - NORTH CAROLINA

North Carolina's Ivory Latta earned All-ACC status for the second time in her career, leading the Tar Heels with 17.4 points per game in 2005. The ACC Tournament MVP, Latta led the league with an 86.3 free throw percentage, including a 91.2 percent mark in league play. Latta also dished out 147 assists on the season.

SHAY DORON - MARYLAND

Maryland's Shay Doron earned All-ACC accolades for the second season in a row after earning a spot on the third team as a freshman in 2004. Doron was third in the ACC in scoring with 17.6 points per game in 2005, and shared the team lead with 63 steals. Doron started all 32 games for the Terrapins, averaging 32.6 minutes per contest.

RETURNING SECOND-TEAM ALL-ACC

CRYSTAL LANGHORNE - MARYLAND

In addition to earning a spot on the All-ACC Second Team, Maryland's Crystal Langhorne was tabbed the ACC's Freshman of the Year. Langhorne was the only player in the league to average a double-double in 2005, as she was sixth in the conference in scoring with 17.2 points per game and led the league in rebounding with 10.6 per game.

ERLANA LARKINS - NORTH CAROLINA

North Carolina's Erlana Larkins earned All-ACC honors in her first collegiate season, and was one of just two unanimous selections to the All-Freshmen Team. Larkins led the league in field goal percentage with a .609 mark, converting 181 of her 297 attempts, and was second in scoring for the Tar Heels with 14.6 points per game.

LIZ STRUNK - WAKE FOREST

Wake Forest's Liz Strunk earned All-ACC honors for the second time in her career after scoring 15.1 points per game for the Demon Deacons in 2005. Strunk started all 32 games for Wake Forest, and was fourth in the league in free throw percentage with an .829 mark. Strunk was third on the team with 5.9 rebounds per game.

TIFFANY STANSBURY - NC STATE

NC State's Tiffany Stansbury earned All-ACC status for the first time in her career in 2005, leading the Wolfpack in both scoring and rebounding with 11.6 points and 7.0 boards per contest. Stansbury was third in the league in blocked shots with 1.76 per game and was second in offensive rebounds with 3.62 per contest.

A LOOK BACK AT 2004-05

The University of Miami women's basketball team headed into the 2004-05 season, its' first in the Atlantic Coast Conference, on the heels of one of its most successful seasons in program history. The previous year's team had posted a 22-7 record en route to a NCAA Tournament bid, thanks to a school-record 12-game win streak to open the season.

Bringing back just two starters from that team following the loss of Melissa Knight with a season-ending knee injury, the 2004-05 Hurricanes fought through the adversity of playing in arguably the nation's toughest conference to close out the year with an overall record of 12-16 and a 10th-place 4-10 mark in ACC play.

Despite the disappointing outcome to the season, the 2004-05 season had numerous highlights led by the play of junior forward Tamara James. James, who either led or sat at second in the NCAA in scoring for most of the season, would finish the season as the ACC's leading scorer with a 22.3 point scoring average which also ranked fifth nationally. Her production on the court led her to All-ACC First Team accolades as well as both AP and Kodak/WBCA Honorable Mention All-America honors.

The 2004-05 season also saw senior guard Yalonda McCormick become just the 18th player in UM history to reach the 1,000 career point mark.

Miami opened the season in impressive fashion, downing Gardner Webb and TCU to win the 2004 Miami Jam.

James was named the tournament's most valuable player after averaging 18 points in the two games highlighted by a 17-point game against TCU in the championship game.

Following the Miami Jam, the Hurricanes went through a tough stretch, losing five of the next six games including a 109-49 loss to 12th-ranked Texas Tech in the second-worst loss in school history.

Following the Texas Tech loss, UM returned home to down UCF, 69-50 before evening their record at 5-5 with a, 55-49 win over perennial NCAA Tournament participant Montana. Against Montana, James led all scorers with 21 points, followed by sophomore center Amy Audibert and senior point guard Yalonda McCormick, who each turned in 10 points. In addition to Audibert, another underclassman in freshman guard Albrely Grimsley stepped up to lead Miami in rebounds with eight.

The Hurricanes followed up their impressive showing against Montana with a pair of victories against Fairfield and Loyola Marymount at the UM Holiday Classic to close out the calendar year. Miami beat Fairfield handily behind James' career-high 39 points - the seventh highest single game outing in UM history - before clinching the tournament crown with a 78-67 win over Loyola Marymount.

James was once again named the tournament MVP with another strong performance, posting 26 points against

LMU, while Grimsley notched a career high of her own with 18 points.

Following a 93-83 win over Coppin State to ring in the New Year, Miami received a rude welcome of sorts in league play as it lost its first five ACC games.

The Hurricanes finally got on the winning track in their new league with a 62-57 win over intrastate rival Florida State at the Convocation Center. The Seminoles were ranked 21st nationally and were boasting an 18-3 record before Miami announced its arrival on the ACC scene with authority.

James contributed 18 points, while McCormick led all scorers with 23 points. The Hurricanes, who overcame an 11-point Seminole lead, forced 19 turnovers out of their intrastate rival.

After an 83-69 win on the road at Clemson, the Hurricanes posted one of their most impressive outings of the season as they nearly knocked off third-ranked Duke in a 72-63 loss. The Hurricanes and Blue Devils exchanged leads often in the first half, before Duke took control of the half before intermission.

Miami bounced back and got within six points but the third-ranked Devils were just too much to handle on this night. Three Hurricanes- James, McCormick and junior guard-forward Tatjana Marincic - all finished with double figures.

After the tough loss to Duke, the Hurricanes defeated fellow-ACC newcomer Virginia Tech, 78-67, at the

Convocation Center before traveling to Charlottesville where they upended Virginia, 66-60.

The Cavaliers came into the game with a 16-8 record, but Miami was able to notch the road win behind 12 points by James in the final four minutes of regulation. James, who entered the game as the nation's second leading scorer, led all players with 31 points, marking the fifth time overall and the second-consecutive in which the junior guard topped the 30-point plateau.

While the Hurricanes had been playing better basketball since their schedule entered the heart of ACC play, they could not stop No. 21 North Carolina State from getting legendary head coach, Kay Yow, her 900th win. James (23 points) and McCormick (20 points) once again led the Hurricanes in the 71-68 loss to one of the conference's best teams.

Following the loss to the Wolfpack, Miami once again came up short as it was unable to overtake No. 20 Maryland in their next home tilt. Maryland, led by Crystal Langhorne's 29 points, sneaked by UM 70-65. James posted 27 points in defeat.

The next two games on the road at Duke and Virginia Tech were equally as difficult for UM, who lost the two by a total of 79 points

Concluding the regular season with a 4-10 record in ACC play, the Hurricanes drew the 10th seed in their inaugural trip to the ACC Tournament where they drew a match-up with ninth-seeded Georgia Tech.

Miami defeated Georgia Tech, 60-58, in dramatic fashion as James caught a full-court pass from McCormick in the paint and turned to score over two Tech defenders as time expired.

The Hurricanes made their first tournament game memorable as they were able to capitalize on Ferne Labati's scripted play to get the ball inside to their leading scorer, who then took care of the rest.

Four Hurricanes were in double figures, including Katie Hayek, who along with James' 15 points led the team. The other Hurricanes in double figures, Marincic and McCormick, both scored 11 points to help UM to the win at the Greensboro Coliseum.

Unfortunately for Miami, the season ended in the quarterfinals of the conference tournament as top-seeded North Carolina, who trailed the Hurricanes for the majority of the game before a late surge helped them advance to the semifinals before eventually going on to claim the ACC Championship Title, knocked off the Hurricanes, 64-57.

Senior Yalonda McCormick and junior Tamara James scored 17 points apiece to lead the University of Miami women's basketball team past TCU, 68-57, Sunday afternoon in the Championship Game of the 2004 Miami Jam held at the Convocation Center.

James, who fell short of a double-double with nine rebounds, was named the tournament's MVP, averaging a tournament-best 18 points in two games over the weekend, while McCormick was selected to the Miami Jam All-Tournament team.

Miami and TCU traded baskets through the first two minutes of the game until UM put together a 8-0 run capped off by a three by freshman Albreys Grimsley to take a 12-5 lead at the 14:30 mark.

A James' basket brought the Hurricane lead to 10 with less than nine minutes to play before senior Fallon Phanord scored three of her career-high seven points to extend the lead to 13 with 8:13 left in the half.

Head coach Ferne Labati earned her 300th career win at the University of Miami behind a career-best 17-point outing by junior Katie Hayek and a 12-point, 13-rebound double-double by sophomore Imani Dhahabu as the Hurricanes downed Clemson, 83-69, Monday night at Littlejohn Coliseum.

With the win over the Lady Tigers (7-12, 1-6 ACC) Labati, who is UM's (10-10, 2-5 ACC) all-time leader in wins with an overall record of 300-198, and the Hurricanes earned their first true road victory of the season, breaking a seven-game skid.

With 22 seconds left to play, James picked Maryland's Kalika France and following a miss by Yalonda McCormick, the Hurricanes' Imani Dhahabu pulled down one of her nine rebounds on the night and drew a foul, setting up an opportunity to tie the game with 11 seconds left.

Dhahabu couldn't capitalize and the Terps went on to take the 70-65 victory.

Dhahabu fell one rebound shy of a double-double, scoring a career-best 18 points while McCormick scored 13 points and dished out six assists.

Mistie Williams had 23 points and eight rebounds for second-ranked Duke, which scored the first 10 points in a 95-61 victory Wednesday night over Miami.

Jessica Foley and Monique Currie added 18 points apiece for the Blue Devils (26-2, 12-1 Atlantic Coast Conference).

Duke is one win away from earning the top seed in next week's ACC tournament for the fourth straight year and sixth time in seven seasons. The Blue Devils close the regular season at home Sunday against No. 8 North Carolina, hoping to avenge their only conference loss.

Tamara James scored 26 points to lead Miami (12-14, 4-9), which couldn't stop the Duke offense and struggled for good shots throughout the game. The Blue Devils made 57 percent of their shots and led by as many as 42 points.

Miami had lost consecutive close games against ranked teams, falling to North Carolina State and Maryland by a combined eight points. But the trip to Cameron Indoor Stadium quickly turned into a rout, with the Blue Devils knocking down outside shots and dominating inside.

Duke never stopped attacking, even as the game grew more one-sided. Little went right for the Hurricanes, with coach Ferne Labati earning a technical foul with her team down by 57-28 with 16:04 left.

The 6-foot-3 Williams was virtually unstoppable inside, scoring 14 points on 7-for-9 shooting in the first half. Chante Black, a 6-5 freshman, added six rebounds, helping Duke take a 20-9 edge on the glass en route to a 46-26 halftime lead.

Duke also went 5-for-8 from 3-point range in the half, with Foley and Wanisha Smith hitting two 3s apiece.

Duke did all that despite Currie - who averages 17 points and seven rebounds - going to the bench with her third foul with 8:17 left before the break.

The University of Miami women's basketball team was overpowered by a Virginia Tech team that shot 54.1 percent from the field with all five starters scoring double figures as the Hokies (17-10, 6-8 ACC) downed UM (12-15, 4-10 ACC), 90-45, at Cassell Coliseum in the Hurricanes regular season finale.

Led by Kerri Gardin's game-high 16 points, the Hokies overtook the Hurricanes in nearly every statistical category including rebounding (47-to-27), points in the paint (40-to-24) and three-point percentage (50.0-to-21.1.)

Virginia Tech opened the game on an 8-0 run and led by 22 at 26-4 ten minutes into the game. The Hokies maintained a 20-plus margin lead for the remainder of the half, heading into the intermission with a 47-20 lead.

The second half wouldn't fair any better for the Hurricanes, as Virginia Tech went on to cruise to the 90-45 victory.

Junior Katie Hayek led the Hurricanes with 13 points followed by classmate Tamara James who surpassed former UM great Octavia Blue to move into fourth-place all-time in scoring at UM with 12 points against the Hokies.

The Hurricanes will prepare for the 2005 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament beginning March 4 running through the championship game March 7. Pairings for the tournament will be announced Monday.

Junior Tamara James caught a full-court pass from teammate, senior Yalonda McCormick in the paint and turned to score over two Yellow Jacket defenders as time expired to lift the ninth-seed Hurricanes past eighth-seeded Georgia Tech, 60-58, Friday afternoon in the opening first-round game of the 2005 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament at the Greensboro Coliseum.

Trailing by two at 58-56, the Yellow Jackets (13-14) capitalized on a missed free throw UM's (13-15) McCormick when, in transition off the McCormick miss, Jill Ingram found a wide-open Janie Mitchell who was able to tie the game at 58 with just under two seconds remaining.

UM head coach Ferne Labati called a time out following the Mitchell basket to set up the Hurricanes' chance at the game-winner.

Coming out of the timeout, McCormick inbounded the ball with 1.6 seconds showing, lofting it into the paint to James who fought off two Georgia Tech defenders to grab the pass. James brought the ball down and threw up a shot while spinning to the basket with four-tenths of a second remaining and watched as the shot bounded on the rim and fell through as time expired to give the Hurricanes the win, making their inaugural game in the ACC Tournament a memorable one.

James finished as the Hurricanes' leading scorer with 15 points and led UM with seven rebounds and five steals. Junior Katie Hayek scored 15 in the first start of her career for the Hurricanes and McCormick and junior Tatjana Marincic added 11 each in the UM win.

The Hurricanes - who out-shot the Yellow Jackets 46.9-to-35.5 percent - fell behind early in the game, trailing the Yellow Jackets 8-1 in the game's early minutes. UM found a rhythm and tied the score at 10-all before putting together a 13-0 run to take a 23-12 lead with 5:22 remaining in the half.

Miami kept Georgia Tech at bay for the remainder of the half, taking a 36-24 lead into the half behind James and Hayek who scored 10 and 13, respectively.

Georgia Tech's Mitchell led all scorers with 21 points and pulled in seven rebounds for Georgia Tech.

Ivory Latta scored 19 points and hit the go-ahead 3-pointer Saturday to help fourth-ranked North Carolina avoid an upset with a 64-57 win over Miami in the Atlantic Coast Conference tournament quarterfinals.

Nikita Bell added 13 points and eight rebounds for the top-seeded Tar Heels (25-3), who trailed most of the way before making a late run to reach Sunday's semifinals.

Tamara James had 13 points and 14 rebounds for the ninth-seeded Hurricanes (13-16), who led by as many as 10 points in the first half and held a three-point edge with 2½ minutes to play.

The Tar Heels - the top seed for the first time in eight years - have high hopes of winning their first tournament title since 1998. But they very nearly saw those dreams end abruptly against a team they beat by 31 points in the regular season.

They shot just 29 percent and went 18-for-28 at the line, struggling to overcome a determined effort by the Hurricanes.

North Carolina trailed 55-52 late before going on a 9-0 run, led by Latta and Bell.

First Latta hit two free throws to cut the deficit to one point, then hit a 3-pointer off a feed from Bell for a 57-55 lead with 2:08 left.

Bell then came up with two big plays. With North Carolina struggling much of the day against Miami's zone defense, Bell flashed to the top of the key to catch the ball, then made a spinning move to the basket for a 59-55 lead with 1:33 left.

After a Miami timeout, Bell stole a pass near midcourt for a break-away attempt. She missed the layup, but Camille Little got the rebound and picked up the fifth foul on James with 1:19 left.

Little closed the run with two free throws, giving the Tar Heels a 61-55 edge.

Miami advanced to the quarterfinals with a 60-58 win over Georgia Tech, when James caught a halfcourt heave and banked in a shot at the buzzer. Despite playing that tough game only 24 hours earlier, the Hurricanes showed so signs of fatigue early and jumped to the lead.

The Tar Heels missed their first 10 shots, going without a field goal for the game's first seven minutes. James and Miami took advantage, taking a 16-6 lead on a 3-pointer from Katie Hayek midway through the half.

THE HISTORY

IT ALL STARTED IN 1972-73

Miami's basketball heritage began with the 1972-73 season and consisted of a team with no scholarship athletes and no indoor facilities with which to play. It is rumored that during the early years one game was actually rained out.

Miami's first women's basketball game took place January 9, 1973 as the Hurricanes, and first-year head coach Barry Schimer, lost 37-21 to Miami-Dade North. Miami would bounce back and record its first victory three days later, a 36-26 win over Broward Central on January 12, 1973. Miami would finish its inaugural season with a 2-6 record.

BUILDING A FOUNDATION

It wouldn't take long for Miami to record its first winning season as the Hurricanes won their first four games, all on the road, and finished 6-3 in 1973-74. The 1974-75 season brought much of the same as Schimer led the Hurricanes to an 8-6 record, their second consecutive winning season.

That season would be one of firsts for Miami who won its first two games ever at the Florida AIAW State Championships defeating Florida A&M, 59-38, and Florida Tech, 53-32. The Hurricanes also faced Florida and Florida State for the first time losing to the Gators, 67-32, and to the Seminoles, 59-45. The 1974-75 season would also be one of endings as Schimer stepped down as coach with a career record of 16-15.

Miami moved indoors to the William Lane Campus Sports and Recreation Center in 1975-76 as Shula Feuer took over as head coach. The William A. Lane Center was made possible by a voluntary increase in the Student Activity Fee and a grant of \$1.2 million dollars from the Dunspaugh-Dalton Foundation. The structure was named in the memory of William A. Lane, Sr., a long-time Miami attorney, the first president of the Foundation and staunch supporter of UM.

After losing their 1975-76 season-opener, Miami exploded for 100 points in a 100-20 win over Homestead Airforce Base the next time out. The 80 point margin of victory is still a standing UM record. Miami finished at 7-13 that season and after a 9-11 record the next year Feuer stepped down as head coach of the Hurricanes.

The 1977-78 team went 8-8 under the guidance of 26-year old coach Yvette McKinney. Miami was led by Wendy Foote, Miami's first 1,000-point scorer, who averaged a school-record 25.2 points per game as a senior. She ended her UM career as the school-record holder for career field goals (490), free throws (194) and points (1,174).

In the summer of 1979, Foote became the first University of Miami basketball player since Rick Barry to sign a professional contract when she signed to play with New Orleans Pride of the Women's Professional Basketball League.

DUNN PUTS UM IN POSITION

In 1978, the university made a move that would forever change women's basketball at Miami. That year, UM hired Lin Dunn as UM's fourth-ever head coach. Dunn, who left the University of Mississippi to come to Coral Gables, was also named an Assistant Director of Athletics upon her arrival. Dunn would coach the Hurricanes for nine seasons racking up 149 wins and leading Miami to a school-record six consecutive winning seasons, two 20-win seasons, one Florida AIAW State Championship and two berths in the AIAW Region III Tournament.

Following a 10-13 season in 1978-79, Dunn upgraded the Hurricanes schedule, taking on national powers Oral Roberts, Kansas and Alabama. The 1979-80 season also marked the first time that women's basketball was given scholarships (seven) as Dunn finished her second season with an 18-16 record.

Miami gained three additional scholarships for the 1980-81 season, raising the number of scholarship athletes to ten. Led by Sylvia Wilson, Dottie Richardson and Robin Harmony, the Hurricanes went on to one of the most successful campaigns in school history, recording the first 20-win season in school history going 24-18.

The Hurricanes also went on to win the school's first Florida AIAW State Championship and earned a trip to the AIAW Region III Tournament.

The start of the 1981-82 season marked another first for the basketball program as it had a full complement of 12

scholarships. With the added scholarships, the Hurricanes continued their tremendous success under Dunn recording a 19-10 record and earning its second-consecutive berth to the AIAW Region III Championships, despite losing to Florida State, 84-80, in the semifinals of the Florida AIAW State Championships.

Similar to the year before, UM's season ended in the first round with a 81-66 loss to national power Delta State. Wilson scored 22 points and grabbed 14 rebounds in her final game, finishing her career as Miami's then-all-time leader in points (1,713) and rebounds (1,115). Wilson still remains the only UM women's basketball player ever to surpass 1,000 rebounds for her career.

MIAMI FORCED TO REBOUND FROM TOUGH SEASON

The 1982-83 season would prove to be a wild ride for the Hurricanes who finished 14-13, which included five straight losses to end the season.

Miami returned to winning form in 1983-84 posting a 19-12 record. The season was full of milestones as Harmony became the third UM women's basketball player to score 1,000 career points while Dunn won her 100th game at Miami, 63-58, over Rutgers on February 4, 1984.

Dunn recorded her second 20-win season in 1984-85 as Miami finished 21-7. Following a slow start, Miami would string together 12 straight wins which included victories over Florida State, Michigan State, Purdue, St. Joseph's and Missouri. Miami would go on to lose four of its next seven games before ending the season winning its final five games.

Disappointingly the Hurricanes were passed over for postseason, despite winning 21 games, by both the NCAA and NWIT.

That season Cordella Fulmore became the fourth women's basketball player to score 1,000 career points and Maria Rivera set a freshman scoring record with 523 points.

RIVERA MAKES HER MARK, DUNN LEAVES A LEGACY

The 1985-86 season saw the resurrection of men's basketball at Miami and the completion of the Knight Sports Complex on the Coral Gables campus. Dedicated on November 12, 1985, the new building was made possible through a gift from the James L. Knight Charitable Trust. The facility was built to house the offices for the men's basketball staff, while also serving as a home court for Hurricane women's basketball games.

Despite the advantage of having new home court, Dunn's school-record string of six consecutive winning seasons came to an end in 1985-86 as young and inexperienced Hurricane squad struggled through one of the most difficult schedules in Miami history en route to a dismal 9-18 season.

The following season, Dunn put together another grueling schedule that consisted of eight teams that finished in the previous season's Top-20. The Hurricanes dropped 10 games to likes of national powers Illinois, Mississippi,

Louisiana State, Old Dominion, Florida, Louisiana Tech, Auburn, Kentucky, Iowa (twice) and top-ranked Texas.

Despite the difficult season, All-America candidate Rivera continued to shine by averaging 21.4 points per game and surpassing the 1,000-point plateau in only her second season when she scored 30 points in a 82-59 win over South Florida on February 15, 1986.

In 1987-88 Miami struggled for the second-straight season, losing six of its first eight games to finish the season at 15-15. The lone bright spot was once again, Rivera

who dominated by averaging 20.9 points per game. On March 7, 1987, Rivera scored 26 points in a 76-72 win over Tulane and became UM's all-time leading scorer (1,716 points), surpassing former teammate Cordelia Fulmore (1,713 points).

Two days later on March 9, 1987, Dunn would coach in her final game at Miami as the Hurricanes defeated Florida Atlantic, 59-43. Dunn left Miami to take over the head coaching duties at Purdue, finishing her tenure with a 149-119 record.

Frances Savage led Miami to the NCAA "Sweet 16" in 1992 and was named the Sports Illustrated National Player of the Year.

With Dunn's departure, assistant coach Ken Patrick took over as interim head coach for the 1987-88 season. Under Patrick's guidance, the Hurricanes went 14-13, once again taking on some of the best teams in the nation. Miami opened the season on a roll winning five of its first six games but stumbled in its next five games to national powers Virginia, Auburn, Illinois, Notre Dame and Old Dominion. Miami then regrouped taking seven of its last nine games including an upset 75-69 win at perennial power North Carolina.

The 1987-88 season was highlighted by Rivera, who on January 27, 1988, became the first women's basketball player in Miami history to surpass 2,000 career points. One month later she would set the UM standard for points in a game when she poured in 41 points in a 103-87 victory over Central Florida while breaking Rick Barry's school-record of 2,298 points. Rivera would leave UM as its all-time leading scorer (2,358 points) as well as the school's all-time leader in steals (382).

THE LABATI ERA BEGINS

Ferne Labati was appointed the University of Miami's head women's basketball coach on March 30, 1988 and immediately made an impact on the UM program.

In her first season as head coach, Labati led the Hurricanes to a 21-8 record to mark only the third 20-win season in UM history as well as their first appearance at the NCAA Tournament.

Labati opened her UM career on November 25, 1988 with a 90-71 win over S.W. Missouri State. The game was also the first for Frances Savage, a proposition 48 casualty in 1987-88, who scored a game-high 32 points and pulled down nine rebounds in the win. Savage would go on to score a total of 649 points that season, the most by any women's basketball player in their first season.

The team's success in 1988-89 brought them an NCAA bid for the first time in school history. Miami traveled to Stillwater, Okla. to take on Oklahoma State. The Hurricanes would get 21 points apiece from Savage and Elaine Harlow, but it wouldn't be enough to overcome a 34-point effort from OSU's Clinette Jordan as the Cowboys defeated Miami, 93-69.

The Hurricanes returned the next season and finished 25-6, setting a school record for wins in a season. The 20-win season was the second consecutive for Miami under Labati and marked the first time in the school history that a women's basketball team recorded back-to-back 20-win campaigns.

Led by Savage, who averaged 23.6 points per game and set a new standard for points in a season with 733 during the year. On January 13, 1990, Miami defeated Stetson, 88-69, as Savage scored a season-high 37 points and become the seventh women's basketball player in Miami history to score 1,000 career points. She accomplished the feat in only 45 games to become the quickest woman to 1,000 points in UM history.

Despite the outstanding season Miami was not granted a bid to the NCAA Championships. Instead, the Hurricanes were offered a bid to the National Women's Invitational Tournament in Amarillo, Texas. On March 22, 1990, Miami won its first postseason game ever with an 85-83 win over Illinois State.

The next day against Kentucky, Savage poured in 24 points and grabbed 12 rebounds but it wasn't enough to overcome the Wildcats balanced attack in a 80-68 Kentucky victory.

Miami's season ended on March 24, 1990 with a 82-80 heartbreak loss to UNC-Charlotte.

After playing as independents since 1972, Labati and the Hurricanes would play as members of the New South Women's Athletic Conference in 1990-91. The Hurricanes posted their third consecutive 20-win season finishing with a 20-10 record including a 9-3 record in NSWAC play. The Hurricanes would also go on to win the conference tournament that season.

HURRICANES HIT THE BIG EAST IN "DREAM SEASON"

Miami officially accepted a bid to become the 10th member of the BIG EAST Conference, beginning with the 1991-92 season, on October 10, 1990. Also called the "Dream Season" in Hurricane lore, UM's first season in the BIG EAST turned out to be the greatest in school history. The season started and ended with a loss, but in between the Hurricanes put together 30-straight wins, won the BIG EAST regular season title, going undefeated (18-0) in conference play, won the BIG EAST Tournament Championship, advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament and finished with a top-10 national ranking.



In their first season in the BIG EAST, the 1991-92 season saw the Hurricanes put together a school-record 30-2 overall record enroute to their first BIG EAST Regular Season and Championship Tournament Titles.

THE HISTORY

UM's season-opening 71-69 overtime loss to FSU on November 23, 1991 would mark the Hurricanes last loss prior to the start of the 30-game win streak that would span 124 total days.

The first of the 30 wins occurs against state-rival Florida, with a 95-75 win in the home opener at the Knight Sports Complex on December 1, 1991. The game was dedicated to an ailing Walt Kichefski, former UM football coach and renowned "Gator-Hater". "Coach K" was to be the honorary coach for the game but was too ill to attend and the season would be dedicated to "Coach K" following his passing later in the season.

During the course of the season the Hurricanes overcame a second-half deficit to defeat former UM coach Lin Dunn and her Purdue Boilermakers, 65-63, on December 19, 1991 to mark the first win ever for the UM program over a top-10 team.

Four days later, Miami entered the Associated Press poll tied for 25th with Long Beach State and SW Missouri State in their first appearance in the AP poll since January, 1985. The Hurricanes would later debut in the USA Today poll in early January. The month of February saw UM break into the nation's Top 10 on February 3, 1992 at No. 9 in both polls.

Five seniors - Merren Armour, Vicki Bowers, Sherri Eyer, Jeannie Hebert and Frances Savage - took their final bow on March 1, 1992 after a smoke-filled entrance in front of a record crowd of 1,617 at the Knight Sports Complex as the Hurricanes closed out the regular season undefeated in the BIG EAST, the first undefeated season in BIG EAST history, with an 84-67 win against Villanova.

UM moved to No. 7 in the national polls the very next day, while Savage was named one of five finalists for the women's College Player of the Year. That same week Savage would earn BIG EAST Player of the Year, while Labati was named Coach of the Year. Savage and Plowden are also named to the All-BIG EAST First Team.

Sixth-ranked Miami earned the second-seed and a first-round bye in the East Regional when the NCAA announces the pairings for the 48-team women's tournament on March 15, 1992.

Two days later Sports Illustrated announced Frances Savage as its 1992 Women's Basketball Player of the Year.

Following a first-round bye at the NCAA Tournament, Hebert and Savage both score over 20 points as UM defeated North Carolina 86-72 and advance to the Sweet Sixteen in Charlottesville, Va. on March 21, 1992. The second-round game was a reported sell-out in the first three hours of ticket sales.

The "Dream Season" would come to an end as third-seeded Vanderbilt handed UM a 77-67 loss.

Although the team suffered a defeat to end the season, the 30-2 year would end on a high note as Savage was named to the prestigious Kodak All-America team in addition to being named the SI Player of the Year.

UM WINS BACK-TO-BACK TITLES

Even with the graduation of Savage and career assist leader Hebert, the Hurricanes continued their winning ways in 1992-93 finishing 24-7 en route to their second-consecutive BIG EAST regular season and tournament titles. The 20-win season was Miami's fifth consecutive under Labati and set a school record for consecutive 20-win seasons.

The Hurricanes' opening game of 1992-93 was one for the record books as Miami won its 300th game in the program's history with a 94-37 thrashing of Florida Atlantic on

December 6, 1992. Three days later on December 9, Plowden became the ninth women's basketball player in UM history to score 1,000 career points as Miami rolled to a 80-63 win over Appalachian State.

Miami ended the regular season with a 77-65 win over Pittsburgh to clinch a share of its second consecutive regular season title with Georgetown. The BIG EAST Tournament was all Miami as the Hurricanes swept to the championship beating all three of their opponents by an average of over 20 points per game.

The tournament championship guaranteed the Hurricanes a return trip to the NCAA Tournament and Miami hosted St. Peter's on March 17, 1993 in the opening round of the East Regional. Della Wilson led Miami with 21 points as the Hurricanes advanced to the second-round with a 61-44 win. Miami's season would end three days later in Bowling Green, Ky. to Western Kentucky.

The summer of 1993 was a joyous one for Labati, who was awarded on June 21, 1993, the first multi-year contract given to a coach of a women's sport in UM history.

Following two injury-plagued seasons that saw UM go 10-17 and 11-16 in 1993-94 and 1994-95, respectively, as well as the effects of Hurricane Andrew on the South Florida area, the Hurricanes bounced back to earn a share of the 1995-96 BIG EAST title.

The 1995-96 season saw the addition of Notre Dame, Rutgers and West Virginia as full-time conference members which began the start of divisional play. The BIG EAST was separated into two divisions, the BE 6 and BE 7.

UM began the 1995-96 season healthy for the first time in three seasons and difference showed as Miami opened the season winning five of its first seven games. The Hurricanes slumped following the holiday break but caught fire at the end of the year winning seven of its last 11 regular season games, including a 67-60 win over Seton Hall in

the season finale, en route to a share of the BIG EAST 7 Division title and a 15-14 record. Also highlighting the season was Labati's 150th win at UM. The milestone victory for Labati moved her into first-place on UM's career-wins list ahead of the legendary Lin Dunn.

Miami embarked on the 1996-97 season with high expectations as four starters returned from a team that won seven of its final 11 regular-season games the year before on its way to a share of the BIG EAST 7 division title. Even before the season began, the Hurricanes would go from one of the most experienced teams in the BIG EAST to one of the youngest as starters Jordan and Cassandra Wimes were lost prior to the season's first game.

On top of the early setbacks, Miami would have to play one of the toughest schedules in team history. The 1996-97 season saw seven UM opponents finish among the final USA Today/CNN Top-25 coaches poll, including Old Dominion (2nd), Notre Dame (4th), Connecticut (5th), Florida (6th) and Alabama (8th).

Miami struggled early but rallied to win seven of its final 10 games, advance to the semifinals of the BIG EAST tournament and finish with a respectable 15-14 overall record.

Several positives were taken from that season as numerous Hurricanes reached milestones that season including Desma Thomas who broke the school record for career three-point baskets against Oral Roberts on December 19, 1997. Thomas would later become the 10th women's basketball player in UM history to eclipse 1,000

career points. A week later, Octavia Blue would join her on that list as UM's 11th 1,000-point scorer. The season's biggest milestone was reached on February 2, 1997 when Miami defeated Villanova 70-56 giving Ferne Labati her 300th career victory.

The 1996-97 season saw the emergence of two more players as Gina Graziani led the BIG EAST in assists, while Kym Hope would earn the conference's Most Improved Player award.

Graziani shattered both the Miami (198) and BIG EAST (143) freshman records for assists in a season. She would become the first freshman in BIG EAST history to lead the league in assists as well as finish the season ranked sixth nationally.

The women's basketball program received another honor when on April 10, 1997, Associate Head Coach Robin Harmony became the first former women's basketball player in UM history to be inducted into the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame.

BLUE, HOPE AND GRAZIANI LEAD UM BACK TO NCAA'S

The 1997-98 season returned four starters in All-BIG EAST Preseason First Team selections Octavia Blue and Kym Hope, plus the return of Cassandra Wimes and BIG EAST assists leader Gina Graziani. That season the Hurricanes finished with a 19-10 overall record and an impressive 13-5 mark in BIG EAST competition, both five-year highs. In addition, UM was one of three teams in the

13-team conference to receive a first round bye at the 1998 BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament before going on to return to post-season play at the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament.

In perhaps the Hurricanes biggest win of the season, Blue made the first of two free throw attempts with no time left on the clock to lift UM to a 77-76 over Notre Dame, a participant in the 1997 Final Four, on February 3, 1998. Blue grabbed a rebound as time was expiring and was fouled as she went back up for the put-back.

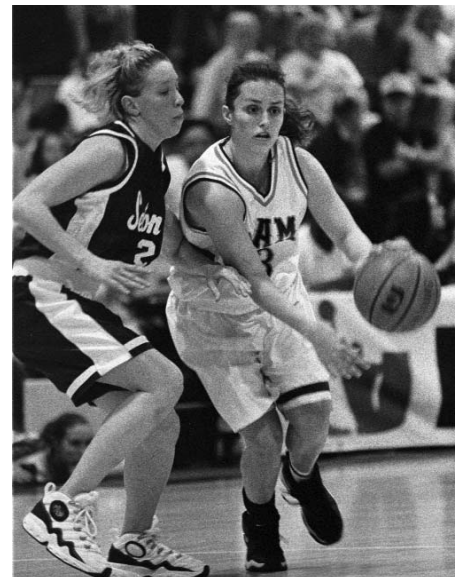
Blue became the first UM player to ever be drafted in the WNBA's annual draft as she was selected in the second round, 15th overall, by the Los Angeles Sparks, while earning BIG EAST First Team honors along with Hope. Hope led the league in rebounding and double-doubles and Blue placed second in scoring followed by Hope, while Graziani once again led the league in assists.

Graziani would finish fifth in the nation in assists as she became just the second player ever at UM to record over 200 assists in one season with 210.

After a four-year absence, the Hurricanes returned to NCAA post-season play for the first time since the 1992-93 season. The 11th-seeded Hurricanes played sixth-seeded and 14th-ranked Clemson in the Midwest Regional at Ruston, La. on March 14, 1998. The Tigers, who were ahead by just two points after the first half, pulled away in the second for a 60-49 win over Miami.

The 1998-99 season returned two starters in All-BIG EAST Preseason First Team selection Kym Hope, BIG EAST assists leader Gina Graziani. The Hurricanes finished the 1998-99 season with an overall mark of 15-14 and a conference record of 9-9. UM finished the conference race in a tie for sixth place, advancing to the BIG EAST tournament quarterfinals. UM was then awarded an invitation to play Rice in the Women's NIT.

Seniors, Hope, Jordan, Barnhart and Wimes spent their final season donning the Hurricane uniform and left their mark in the record books. Hope, Jordan and Wimes became the

12th, 13th and 14th players, respectively to surpass the 1,000 point plateau. Hope was named to the All-BIG EAST first team while classmate Jordan earned third-team honors. Graziani ranked third in the conference with 153 assists in 24 appearances.

The 1999 BIG EAST tournament was slated to begin on February 27 and matched up No.7 seed Miami with No. 10 seed West Virginia. Hope's double-double of 29 points and 14 rebounds led the Hurricanes along with the similar feat by Graziani who finished with 10 points and 11 assists. Wimes hit for 20 points and with that effort surpassed 1,000 career points. The quarterfinal round pitted then No. 7 Rutgers vs. the Miami Hurricanes. Rutgers defense, rated No. 2 nationally, proved too much for the Hurricanes as the Scarlet Knights ran away with a 79-53 win. The 'Canes were led by Hope and Graziani who scored 11 points apiece.

A trip to Houston, Texas was in the cards for the Hurricanes as well as a match-up with Rice in the first round of the Women's National Invitational Tournament. The Owls defeated UM 65-58, despite a 22-point effort from Hope and 19 points from Wimes. The game marked UM's sixth post-season appearance and second straight after receiving the at-large bid in 1997-98.

THE REBUILDING BEGINS

The 1999-2000 season marked a rebuilding period for the Hurricanes and head coach Feme Labati. Miami suffered the loss of four starters from the 1998-99 NCAA tournament team, returning lone starter Gina Graziani for her senior campaign.

The young Hurricane team finished with an overall

mark of 14-15 and a conference record of 9-7. UM finished the conference race in a tie for sixth place. Miami was the sixth seed in the BIG EAST tournament by virtue of a tie with Pittsburgh and the result of their head-to-head competition. In the first round UM defeated Seton Hall before falling to Notre Dame in the quarterfinals.

Graziani left her mark in the UM and BIG EAST record books. She led the team in assists every season in her four-year career and left the UM ranks first on UM's individual career list with 743 assists in her career.

The 2000 BIG EAST tournament began on March 4 and matched up sixth-seeded Miami with No. 10 seed Seton Hall. Dalia Clarke's double-double with 14 points and 11 rebounds led the Hurricanes to a 69-42 win over Seton Hall. The Pirates shot just 17 percent in the first half and 24 percent for the game. Miami's 27-point winning margin was the second largest in conference history for a first-round game. The quarterfinal round pitted the No. 2 seed Notre Dame versus Miami. The Fighting Irish had handed UM losses in both previous meetings by a margin of 15 or more points in the regular season. Notre Dame proved too much for the Hurricanes winning again by a 15-point margin, with a 67-52 final score to end the season.

The rebuilding process would continue with the 2000-01 season was one of ups and downs for Miami as the young UM team finished with an overall mark of 13-15 and a BIG EAST record of 6-10, but finished with a positive note for the following season. Highlighting the play and showing a glimpse of the future was freshman forward Chanivia Broussard who was named to the All-BIG EAST Rookie Team.

MIAMI RESUMES POSTSEASON PLAY, MOVES INTO THE "CONVO"

After two consecutive losing seasons, the Hurricanes rebounded in the 2001-02 season, going 19-12, which included wins over 17th-ranked Texas, 21st-ranked Boston College and 24th-ranked Virginia Tech to make their first appearance in the Women's National Invitational Tournament since the 1998-99 season.

Miami finished fifth in the BIG EAST with a record of 10-6. Meghan Saake became the first player ever to earn BIG EAST Defensive Player of the Year honors Chanivia Broussard was named to the BIG EAST Second Team. Following a second-round loss to Villanova in the 2002 BIG EAST Tournament, Miami earned a birth into the 2002 WNIT, setting up a first round game against Georgia Tech in Atlanta, Ga. The Hurricanes knocked off the Yellow Jackets, 73-64, to move on to Houston, Texas for a match-up with Houston. Miami couldn't get past the Cougars, falling 83-76 to close out the season.

Building on the momentum carried over from the previous year, the 2002-03 season marked one of great success and excitement for the Hurricanes. Miami finished the season 18-13 and made its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since the 1997-98 season. Miami received an at-large bid into the NCAA's marking the first time in league history the BIG EAST sent seven teams to the 'Big Dance'.

The Hurricanes also moved into a new home playing in the Convocation Center - a \$48 million dollar, three-story, 7,000 seat, 200,000 square foot facility - on January 15, 2003.

During the 2002-03 season, Tamara James became the first freshman in history to lead the BIG EAST conference in scoring.

With 16 wins in the regular season which included a win on the road against 16th-ranked Notre Dame, the Hurricanes advanced to the 2003 BIG EAST Tournament where they upset second-seeded and 18th-ranked Rutgers in the quarterfinals before falling to eventual BIG EAST Tournament Champion, Villanova in the semifinals.

Following the BIG EAST Tournament, received an at-large bid to the 2003 NCAA Tournament, marking just the fifth tournament appearance in school history and their first since the 1997-98 season. Seeded 11th, UM headed to Albuquerque, N.M. to take on sixth-seeded New Mexico. Playing in front of a contingent of 16,151 fans - the largest first-round crowd to attend the Women's NCAA Tournament - the Hurricanes fell in overtime, 91-85, to the Lobos to cap of the season.

Head coach Ferne Labati won her 400th career victory with a win over St. John's on Feb. 8, 2003. Labati became the 39th Division I head coach to reach the 400-win mark.

Freshman Tamara James stormed onto the BIG EAST scene, becoming the first freshman ever to lead the league in scoring with 21.0 points per game and earned All-BIG EAST second team, freshman team and tournament team honors. She was the highest scoring freshman in the nation, ranked 10th nationally, earned Associated Press, WBCA/Kodak All-America Honorable Mention honors and was named to the Freshman All-America team by Full Court Press. James earned BIG EAST Rookie of the week five times - the five times marked the most times a Miami player has earned the weekly honor.

Miami led the nation in steals averaging 14.8 steals per game led by Saake, who ranked third in the nation averaging 4.0 steals per game.

MIAMI SAYS FAREWELL TO THE BIG EAST

The 2003-04 season would mark a milestone in the UM women's basketball program as, with the announcement that Miami would join the Atlantic Coast Conference beginning with the 2004-05 season, the Hurricanes would be playing in their final season in the BIG EAST.

With that as the backdrop of the year, head coach Ferne Labati led the 2003-04 Hurricanes to one of the most successful seasons in UM history and was named the 2004 Russell Athletic/WBCA Region I Coach of the Year.

The Hurricanes opened the season with a school-record 12-game win streak before going to finish with an overall record of 22-7 on their way to their second consecutive appearance at the NCAA Tournament. The total number of wins marked only the eighth time in school history and the first time since the 1992-93 season a UM team had won 20 or more games.

In their BIG EAST farewell tour, the Hurricanes finished fourth in the conference with an 11-5 record. They earned a first round bye in the BIG EAST Tournament for the first time since the 1997-98 season before falling in the quarterfinals to eventual BIG EAST Tournament Champion, Boston College.

Miami earned an at-large bid to the 2004 NCAA Tournament and drew the West Regional fifth-seed. The Hurricanes were knocked out in the first round, losing to future ACC-rival and 12th-seeded Maryland, 86-85.

Sophomore Tamara James continued to make her mark in the Miami record book in 2003-04, becoming the 17th player and the fourth sophomore in UM history to reach 1,000 career points with a 26 point outing against Syracuse on February 18. James also became the first player since the 1998-99 season to earn All-BIG EAST First Team honors after averaging 16.6 points and 4.6 rebounds per game.

Senior Chanivia Broussard, who averaged 15.2 points and 6.2 rebounds per game, earned All-BIG EAST Third Team accolades while junior Yolanda McCormick was named to the All-BIG EAST honorable mention team.

MIAMI JOINS THE TRADITION-RICH ACC

After a 13-year run as members of the BIG EAST, the University of Miami officially became members of the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004. Joining UM's move would be fellow BIG EAST departee, Virginia Tech, which would expand the already dominant conference into a new 11-team league.

UM's 2004-05 inaugural season in the ACC would prove to be a difficult one as the Hurricanes posted their first losing season in four years with an overall mark of 13-16. Miami put together a ninth-place 4-10 finish in what would be considered the strongest conference in the country as eight-of-11 ACC teams qualified for postseason play.

Drawing the ninth seed in their conference tournament debut at 2005 ACC Tournament, the Hurricanes made their first appearance at the annual event a dramatic one as Tamara James fought off two Georgia Tech defenders as time expired to get off a game-winning shot to lead UM past the Yellow Jackets, 6-58, in the opening round.

Miami returned the next day to take on top-seeded, and eventual tournament champions, North Carolina, but fell to UNC, 64-57 after leading for the majority of the game.

James once again headlined UM's season, leading the ACC in scoring with 22.3 points per game to become just the second player in NCAA history to lead two major conferences in scoring. James' scoring average would rank fifth nationally as she drew All-ACC honors in addition to being named an AP and WBCA/Kodak Honorable Mention All-American.

While Miami set foot in a new conference in 2004-05, that season also saw the end of the Labati era, who's UM career ended after 17 seasons at the helm of the Hurricane women's basketball program following the season. Labati left as the winningest coach in UM history, posting an overall record of 303-195 while at Miami.

THE NEXT CHAPTER...

Two seasons after moving into a new arena and one year after moving into a new conference, the University of Miami women's basketball program will once again usher in a season of "firsts" in 2005-06 season as the Hurricanes enter the season under the direction of first-year head coach Katie Meier, who was named UM's seventh head coach on April 19, 2005.

With the inclusion of the league's 12 member, Boston College, Meier, along with the likes of three returning starters including National Player of the Year candidate Tamara James, will lead the Hurricanes into the newly-reformed 12-member ACC as UM prepares for the next chapter in the school history books.

UM SPORTS HALL OF FAME

The University of Miami Athletics Hall of Fame was officially created on April 13, 1966. Several judges of the Circuit Court of Dade County, all of whom were UM Alumni, spearheaded the Hall's creation as a method of recognizing "those who have contributed most to Hurricane athletics over the years." Currently, there are five former women's basketball players or coaches - Robin Harmony, Jeannie Hebert, Ferne Labati, Maria Rivera and Frances Savage - in the UM Sports Hall of Fame.

MARIA RIVERA 11

As one of the most electric scorers ever to step on the court and play at the University of Miami, Maria Rivera left her mark at UM as a four-year standout with the Hurricanes. During her playing career from 1984-88, Rivera reached a level never before achieved at Miami and left UM the school record holder in several categories, including career points with 2,358.

Rivera can to Miami by way of Canovana, Puerto Rico, where, at just the age of 14, she was named the 1978 Player of the Year by the Puerto Rican Olympic Committee before going on to star on the Puerto Rican 1979 and 1983 Pan American Teams.

From day one she showed an unprecedented desire to achieve at UM. Speaking only Spanish, Rivera borrowed \$2,000 dollars from a bank to enroll in an intense fast-paced English program to pass an English equivalency exam required to enroll at Miami and just three months later she was on campus and playing for the Hurricanes.

Rivera averaged 18.7 points - the seventh highest single-season average in school history - and 5.3 assists, leading the Hurricanes in scoring in 13-of-28 games in 1984-85, her first season at UM. That season she showed what lay ahead on several occasion, including a school-record setting performance against Lamar where she hit 10-of-11 shots from the field and a 33-point outing against Florida. Following the conclusion of the regular season, she was named to the Women's Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America Team.

The following season she stepped up her game, averaging 21.4 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.3 assists per game. Her 21.4 points per game was the second-highest single-season average in UM history and her 579 points was the third-highest ever at Miami.

Rivera's junior season was highlighted by yet another impressive scoring out-put, averaging 20.9 points, which ranked third all-time at UM just behind her previous season's mark. That season was full of memorable achievements, including a then-career high 38 point game in UM's opener against Monmouth, but none where more exciting than when she surpassed former Hurricane Sylvia Wilson to become Miami's all-time leading scorer.

In her senior campaign Rivera posted what could have been the most memorable one of her career. Needing 29 points to break former men's basketball legend Rick Barry's UM basketball record of 2,298 points, Rivera scored 30 points in the first half of a February 25th contest with Central Florida en route to a school-record 41 points to become the University of Miami's all-time leading scorer in both men's and women's basketball.

Upon finishing her career with the Hurricanes, Rivera left as the school record-holder in 16 separate categories including points(2,358), scoring average (21.1 ppg), steals (382) and field goals made (891) and attempted (1,931) to firmly ensure her place as one of the greatest basketball players to ever play at the University of Miami.

FRANCES SAVAGE 24

Frances Savage is arguably one of the best players to ever don a uniform at the University of Miami. During her four-year career from 1988-91 Savage etched her name throughout the UM record books. She left as the school's second all-time leading scorer with 2,184 points and first all-time with a career 23.2 scoring average - all despite missing all but two games of her senior season.

The 12th child of a household of 13 children, the Fort Lauderdale, Florida native averaged over 30 points per game during her senior season at Sunrise Piper High School and was named the Miami Herald's Broward Player of the Year in 1985 and 1987.

After drawing All-America honors as a high school standout, Savage chose to attend the University of Miami, but was forced to sit out her freshman season in 1987 while fulfilling academic requirements.

Once her opportunity arose in 1988, Savage burst onto the scene at UM, scoring 32 points in her collegiate

debut versus Southwest Missouri State - the most points scored by a Miami player in their opening game. She would go on to start and score double figures in all 29 games of the 1988 season, averaging 22.4 points and 9.2 rebounds per game.

As a preseason All-America candidate, Savage's junior season picked up where the 1988 season left off, scoring double figures in all 31 games that season while leading the team in points per game (23.6), rebounds per game (9.5), steals (71), free throw percentage (.786) and field goal percentage (.540).

In 1990, Savage opened her senior season with back-to-back 30-point outings, but was lost for the year with a torn ACL suffered in just the second game of the season.

Granted a fifth year of eligibility, in 1991, Savage returned to score 31 points in her first start against in-state rival, Florida. She tied the school record with 41 points in UM's win over Providence during the course of the Hurricanes' 30-game win streak.

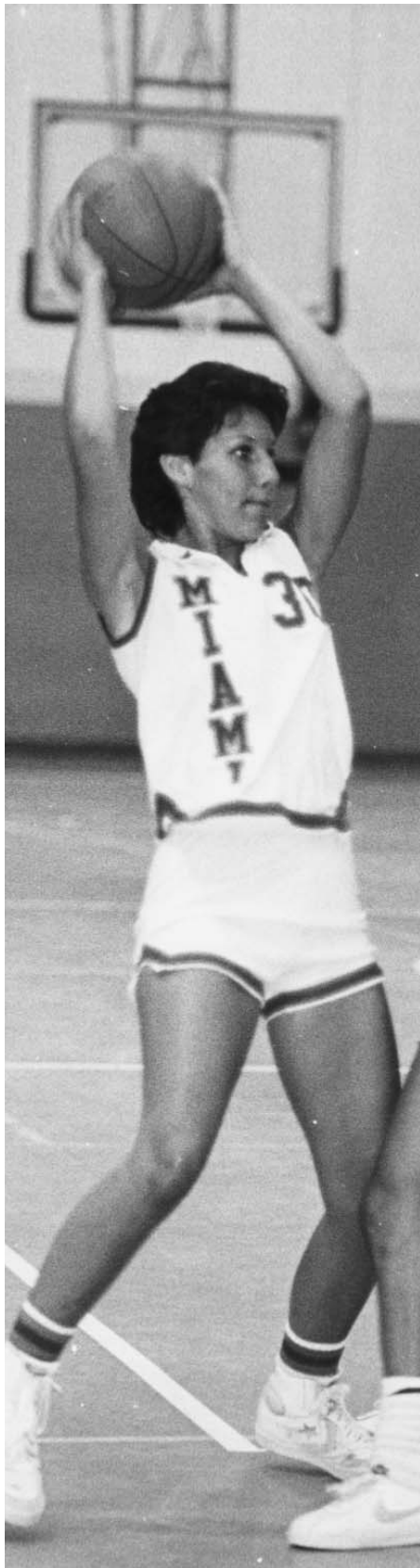
Averaging 23.3 points and 10.6 rebounds per game, Savage helped lead the Hurricanes to the BIG EAST Championship title in only their first season in the conference and was named both the BIG EAST and Sports Illustrated Player of the Year, in addition to garnering Kodak All-America honors.

Savage left UM as one of the most decorated athlete's in school history, holding nine Hurricane records as well as finishing as the school's second leading scorer all-time and has since been inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame - one of only four players in school history - as well as the University of Miami's "Iron Arrow" Society - the highest honor bestowed on an individual by the university.

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ALL-TIME POSTSEASON RESULTS

The Hurricanes have made a total of nine postseason appearances in school history, earning six NCAA Tournament and three WNIT births in the program's 33-year history. Miami has an overall record of 4-10 (.286) in postseason tournaments, posting a 2-6 (.250) mark at the NCAA Tournament and a 2-4 (.333) record at the WNIT. UM's longest run at the NCAA Tournament came during the 1991-92 season when, after drawing No. 2 seed in the East Regional behind a 29-1 record and a BIG EAST Championship Title, the Hurricanes advanced to "Sweet 16" before falling to Vanderbilt, 77-67, in Charlottesville, Va. UM's last NCAA Tournament appearance came following the 2003-04 regular season and the last WNIT birth came in 2001-02.

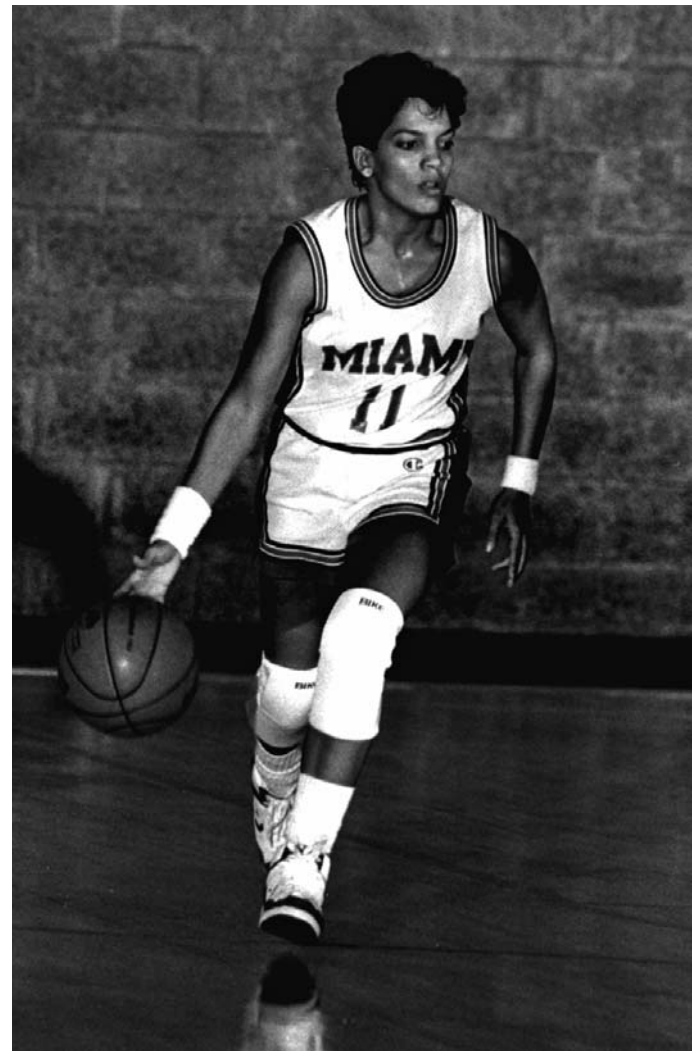

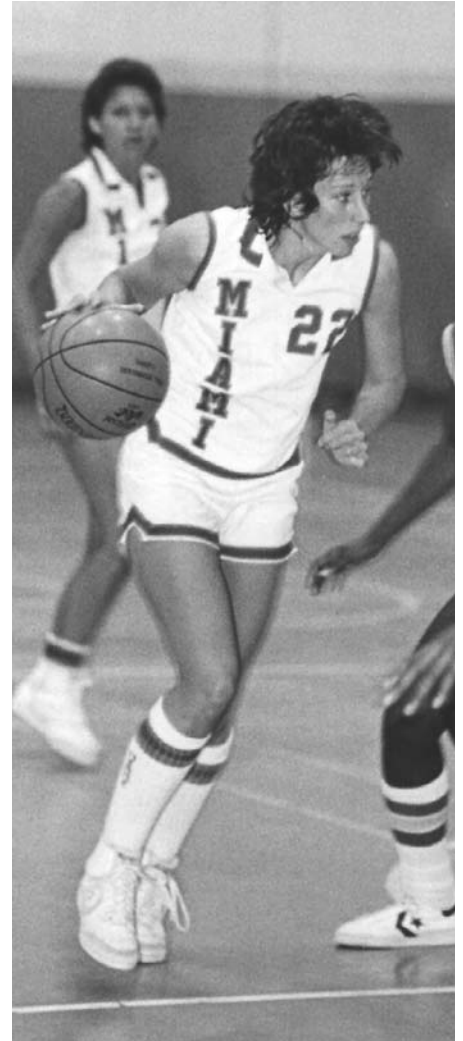

COACHING AWARDS AND RECORDS

With the appointment of Katie Meier in 2005, The University of Miami announced just their seventh head women's basketball coach in the program's 33-year history. Meier joins an impressive UM coaching family that includes legendary coaches Lin Dunn and Ferne Labati. Labati is UM's all-time leader in career victories, posting an overall record of 303-195 (.608) during her 17-year career from 1988-05. Labati was named the Kodak/WBCA National Coach of the Year following the 1991-92 season in which she guided the Hurricanes to a school-record 30 wins with just two losses and a birth into the "Sweet 16" of the 1992 NCAA Tournament.

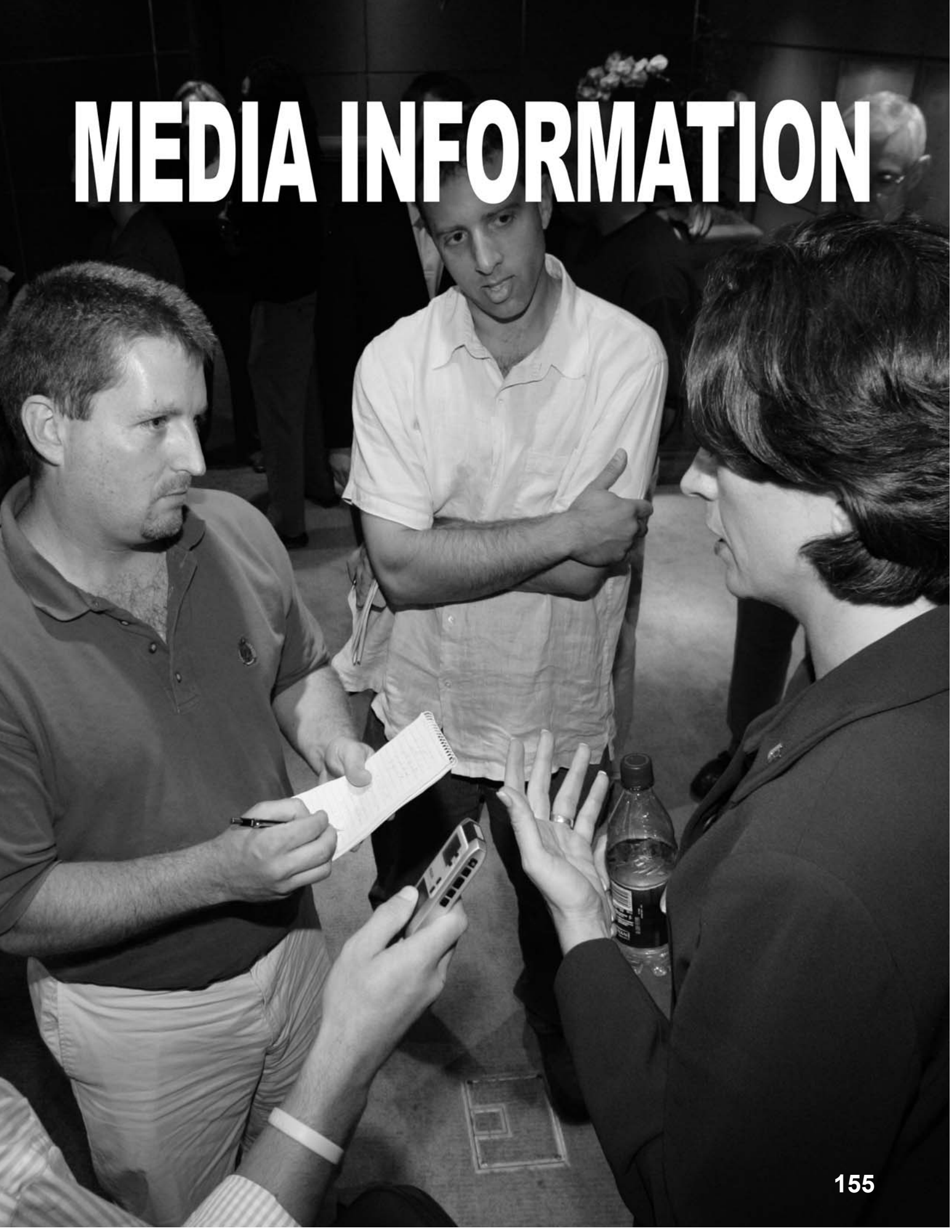
