



A LETTER FROM THE ATHLETICS DIRECTOR

Whether it's succeeding on the field of play, excelling in the classroom, reaching out to serve our community or standing up for equality, we continue to Build Champions at The U.

The Hurricanes just wrapped up another remarkable – and in many ways unprecedented -- school year in 2019-20. Our accomplishments are a tribute to the hard work and dedication of our student-athletes, coaches and staff, as well as the continued support we receive from donors, alumni and fans to make it all possible.

Obviously, our spring sports seasons were cut short on March 12 due to the COVID-19 pandemic. While it proved to be a challenging stretch for our athletic department, I was continually inspired by the commitment and dedication of our student-athletes, coaches and staff, who worked together to ensure that we stayed connected to each other and to our loyal Canes supporters around the world.

I was also heartened by the way our U Family came together to support Black Lives Matter. Our student-athletes have used their platform to generate awareness, spark discussion and enact meaningful change that we can all be proud of as we continue to work together.

This past year marked another year of outstanding performances by Hurricanes student-athletes both on and off the field. Defensive end Gregory Rousseau had a phenomenal season, earning ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year honors. Beatrice Mompremier earned honorable mention All-America honors and was selected in the second round of the WBNA Draft. David Dinsmore captured the ACC platform diving title and Randy Ableman was named ACC Men's Diving Coach of the Year for the fourth time in six years. Debbie Ajagbe won the ACC Indoor shot put and weight throw titles and was named ACC Indoor Track Scholar-Athlete of the Year. Our baseball team, ranked seventh in the country when the season was shuttered, had three players – pitchers Slade Cecconi and Chris McMahon and shortstop Freddy Zamora – selected in the first two rounds of the Major League Baseball Draft.

The NCAA awarded track and field standout Brittny Ellis a \$10,000 NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship for both her academic and athletic achievements. Estela Perez-Somarriba, the defending NCAA women's singles champion, continued to rack up honors, earning the ITA Southeast Region's Arthur Ashe Leadership & Sportsmanship Award as well as its Senior Player of the Year accolade. Renate Grimstad won the 2020 Dinah Shore Trophy, cementing her status as one of the top collegiate female golfers who has made an impact both on the golf course through her leadership and on society through charitable endeavors.

Despite the pivot to online classes in the spring our student-athletes posted remarkable academic numbers. We placed a school-record 237 student-athletes on the ACC Honor Roll. Every team posted at least a 3.0 grade point average in the spring semester.

Our football team's spring semester and cumulative GPAs set a team record. Nine of our programs were recognized for perfect single-year scores of 1,000 in the latest NCAA Academic Progress Report. And five programs -- men's and women's cross country, golf, and men's and women's tennis teams -- earned Public Recognition Awards for teams finishing in the top 10 percent of their respective sports based on the most recent multi-year APR. Our student-athletes



continue to excel in the classroom, and our dedicated coaches and academic staff members work tirelessly to help them achieve these results.

Our mission to give back to the community that so strongly supports us continues to grow. UM student-athletes placed fourth nationally in the NCAA Team Works Helper Helper Community Service Competition, our third consecutive Top 10 finish. Our rowing, soccer and men's track & field/cross country teams each finished second in their respective competitions, while our football team finished third.

On the fundraising front, despite a challenging climate, our Hurricane Club donors continue to step up in support of our student-athletes. Through your generosity, the Hurricane Club raised close to \$11 million in 2019-2020, including \$1.5 million in commitments to support our endowed scholarship fund, 10 new Golden Canes Society Members and three seven-figure gifts -- one being the largest gift in UM baseball history from a former student-athlete. In addition, we received major-gift commitments to our baseball program from MLB standouts Ryan Braun, Yonder Alonso, and Manny Machado. We are also excited to announce the opening of our new state-of-the art Jimmy and Kim Klotz. Baseball Player Development Center.

This past February we held our Sixth Annual Celebration of Women's Athletics in the Carol Soffer Indoor Practice Facility, raising a record \$650,000 with a record attendance of more than 550. Your financial support helps provide our student-athletes with the opportunity to achieve their academic and athletic goals at the highest levels in a world-class environment.

Thank you to everyone who has invested in our athletic department over the past year. Your generosity has helped our student-athletes meet the present challenges with renewed determination and continue to succeed in the classroom, in competition -- and in life.





BASEBALL

- Miami proved to be one of the top teams in the country during a shortened 2020 season. The Canes went 12-4 and finished the season ranked as high as No. 5 by Baseball America and in the top 15 of all six major polls.
- The Hurricanes began the 2020 season as a consensus top-10 team, ranked as high as No. 3 by D1 Baseball and climbed to No. 1 in that poll after an opening weekend sweep of Rutgers. Miami entered the 2020 season with multiple top-5 preseason rankings for the first time since 2007.

- A preseason pick to win the ACC Coastal, Miami went 3-0 in conference play before the COVID-19 pandemic ended the season prematurely. The Hurricanes swept Coastal foe Pittsburgh and were the only undefeated team in the ACC Coastal division.
- The 2020 Hurricanes featured a pair of All-Americans, as standout right-handed pitchers Brian Van Belle and Chris McMahon were both selected to Collegiate Baseball's All-America Second Team.
- After the season, three Hurricanes were selected in the MLB First-Year
 Player Draft. Sophomore right-hander Slade Cecconi was taken with the
 33rd overall pick by the Arizona Diamondbacks, becoming the 29th Hurricane to be selected in the first round of an MLB Draft. McMahon, a junior
 right-hander, went in the second round to the Colorado Rockies and junior
 shortstop Freddy Zamora was taken in the second round by the Milwaukee
 Brewers.
- With three players drafted, Miami tied with Mississippi State and Texas A&M with the most selections among the top 60 picks in the 2020 MLB Draft. Van Belle and fellow right-hander Tyler Keysor signed free agent contracts following the shortened five-round MLB Draft, joining the Red Sox and Reds organizations, respectively.



MEN'S BASKETBALL

- Despite playing the entire season with nine or fewer available scholarship players—including as few as six in one game—and, per ESPN, boasting a top-20 strength of schedule, the Hurricanes finished 15-16 (7-13 ACC) and earned a bye through the first round of the ACC Tournament.
- Head coach Jim Larrañaga earned the 650th win of his illustrious career on Dec.
 when Miami earned an 81-79 victory at Illinois, an eventual top-25 team, in the Big Ten/ACC Challenge, making him the 39th coach all-time with Division I experience to reach that milestone.
- Miami went 3-1 in overtime games, including a 102-95 road triumph on Feb. 19 at Virginia Tech in the first triple-overtime affair in program history, as Isaiah Wong finished with 27 points and 12 rebounds, Keith Stone tied Miami's single-game ACC rebounding record with 18 and the Hurricanes eclipsed 100 points in an ACC game for the first time

- DJ Vasiljevic concluded his career with the second-most made 3-pointers in program history (272) and joined Chris Lykes, who finished No. 10 in the ACC in scoring (15.4) and posted 20-plus points six times in 2019-20, in surpassing 1,000 career points during the 2019-20 campaign.
- Miami guards Harlond Beverly and Isaiah Wong combined for four 20-point games, the highest combined total by Hurricane true freshmen since 2000-01, with Wong's 27 at Virginia Tech ranking as the ninth-most by a Miami true freshman since the program rebirth.



WOMEN'S BASKETBALL

 The Canes finished with a 15-15 overall record and a 7-11 mark in ACC play. Miami was eligible for its 11th straight postseason appearance, but the postseason did not occur due to COVID-19.

- The Canes won 12 games at home for the sixth straight season.
- · As a team, Miami finished second in the ACC in steals per game (8.70)
- · Beatrice Mompremier became the sixth Cane to be drafted into the WNBA after getting selected 20th overall by the Los Angeles Sparks
- Mompremier was ultimately waived by the Sparks but signed with the Connecticut Sun ahead of the 2020 season.
- Mompremier was one of three players in program history to earn All-America accolades from both the WBCA and the AP in back-to-back season's (Tamara James. Shenise Johnson).
- Mykea Gray was named to the ACC All-Defensive Team, marking the first time the Canes had a player on the team in back-to-back years since 2010-11.
- Gray led the ACC in both total steals (64) and steals per game (2.21), and joined the 1,000-point club, becoming the 28th Cane to do so.
- Kelsey Marshall etched her name into the program record book this season, moving in to third in program history for career 3-pointers made (192).



CROSS COUNTRY

- In its first season under the direction of coach Cody Halsey, the cross country team featured seven individuals (six men, one woman) at the NCAA South Regionals.
- For the second year in a row, both teams finished 15th at the ACC Cross Country Championships.
- · Major personal records were set by multiple athletes, including a 90-second personal mark by Emma Langlois and three-minute personal mark by Dylan Sykes.
- · The men's team was represented by four freshmen, one of whom (Andrew Madden) competed in every race.
- Madden and Sykes were the men's top. finishers in all five races, while Langlois finished in the top spot in the final three races. Sophomore Ryley Howard began the season with two top Miami finishes.
- The team recorded seven individual season-best times at FSU Invite.
- The men finished sixth at the Virginia Tech Alumni Invitational for their top finish of the year, while the women finished fourth at the same race.
- The team was recognized for being in the Top 10 percent academically of all NCAA Division I cross country programs.

- for third place in the ACC Coastal Division with Pittsburgh and North Carolina.
- The Hurricanes earned bowl eligibility and accepted a bid to the 2019 Walk-On's Independence Bowl in Shreveport, La., where they fell to Louisiana Tech, 14-0, to end the year with a 6-7 overall record.
- Miami topped rival Florida State for the third straight year, marking its longest winning streak over the Seminoles since a stretch of winning six straight from 2000-2004.
- QB Jarren Williams set the Miami record with six touchdown passes in a 52-27 win over Louisville on Nov. 9, where the Hurriscanes tied a school record for points in an ACC game and earned bowl eligibility for the seventh straight year.
- •Gregory Rousseau was named ACC Defensive Rookie of the Year after tying school's second-best single-season sack total (15.5). Rousseau led the ACC in both sacks and tackles for loss.
- •Shaq Quarterman became the only Hurricane to ever start all 52 games of his collegiate career without missing a single start, moving into ninth place with 356 career total tackles.
- •Eight Miami Hurricanes earned invites to the NFL Combine and four were selected in the NFL Draft: Shaq Quarterman (fourth round, Jacksonville), DeeJay Dallas (fourth round, Seattle), K.J. Osborn (fifth round, Minnesota) and Jonathan Garvin (seventh round, Green Bay).



GOLF

- The Miami Hurricanes rose to as high as No. 26 in the golfstat.com rank-
- ings and closed out the year ranked No. 33, 20 spots higher than the first released rankings of the season.
- The team featured a pair of top-100 ranked individuals: No. 29 Renate
 Grimstad and No. 93 Kristyna Frydlova.
- Through seven tournaments and 20 rounds, Miami ranked second in the ACC, only trailing top-ranked Wake Forest with a 1.75 relative to par scoring average. The Hurricanes led the defending national champions/fifth-ranked Duke (+2.06) and No. 22 Florida State (+5.14).
- Individually, Grimstad led the entire conference with a 71.00 scoring average, a -0.85 relative to par average and
- matched the conference high with one tournament win. The senior's scoring

average also shattered the program mark in the category.

- Grimstad secured ACC Golfer of the Month for February after she earned her first collegiate victory with a dominating seven-stroke triumph at the UCF Challenge.
- Anna Backman secured her second career individual title at the Allstate Intercollegiate Sugar Bowl.
- Grimstad's Second Team All-American status tied the program's highest individual mark since 1993, while she also earned the program's first ever Dinah Shore Trophy Award, cementing her status as one of the top collegiate female players who has made an impact on the golf course through her leadership and also on society through charitable endeavors.

ROWING

- The Canes posted a strong showing at the Head of the Indian Creek in October 2019.
- At the Head of Indian Creek, the 'A' and 'B' V8+ boats claimed first and second, respectively, while the 'A' and 'C' V4+ boats took home silver and bronze, respectively.
- The Canes' novice boat placed fourth in the novice race at the Rivanna Romp
- Miami completed successful training camp ahead of spring 2020 season.
 Unfortunately, the spring season was cancelled due to COVID-19.
- Rowing placed 51 members on the ACC Honor Roll; the full list is on page 21-22 of this report.



SOCCER

- The Miami Hurricanes earned a top-15 victory over No. 15 Clemson, 3-2, in their second season under Sarah Barnes.
- Miami averaged 1.50 goals per match in 2019, the Hurricanes' highest since 2016.
- Miami's shot percentage also improved in 2019, with the Hurricanes scoring at a 16.8% rate, the second highest mark in

program history. Only trailing an 18.8% shot percentage over the course of the 1999 season.

- In addition, the Canes hit the target on 51.0% of their shots in 2019, the highest mark since 2003.
- Tia Dupont earned All-ACC Academic Honors.
- Kristina Fisher signed a professional contract with Spain's Sporting Club de Huelva in January.



SWIMMING

- The swimming & diving team accumulated four dual meet wins over the course of the season, capturing wins over Illinois (Nov. 1-2), Boston College (Jan. 4), FGCU (Jan. 18) and FAU (Jan. 25). The Hurricanes finished 4-4 in dual meets.
- With a young group of swimmers, the Hurricanes will return their top six point scorers from the season into 2020-2021, headlined by sophomore Zorry Mason (449 total points). Other top scorers include No. 2 Carmen San Nicolas, No. 3 Sydney Knapp, No. 4 Alaina Skellett, No. 5 Isabel Traba and No. 6 Andrea Todorovic.
- Junior Carmen San Nicolas became the ninth-fastest performer all-time in the 200-yard freestyle, while junior Sydney Knapp became the sixth-fastest performer all-time in the 100-yard freestyle & the ninth-fastest performer in the 200-yard freestyle
- Sophomore Zorry Mason became the fifth-fastest performer all-time in the 50-yard freestyle and the second-fastest performer in school history in the 200-yard breaststroke.
- Freshman Isabel Traba became the fifth-fastest performer all-time in the 200-yard butterfly, while fellow freshman Andrea Todorovic became the third-fastest performer all-time in the 400-yard IM.
- Junior Alaina Skellett broke her own school record in the 200-yard backstroke at the ACC Championships, where the Hurricanes finished 11th at with 298 points.



DIVING

• The Miami Hurricanes had five divers qualify for NCAA Swimming & Diving Championships at NCAA Zone 'B' qualifying in Athens, Ga.: freshman Mia Vallée (3-meter springboard, women), freshman Max Flory (1-meter springboard, 3-meter springboard, platform), freshman Brodie Scapens (1-meter springboard, platform), junior Zach

Cooper (platform) and senior David Dinsmore (platform).

- Miami became first team in ACC history to finish with the top-four finishes in the men's platform at the ACC Swimming & Diving Championships (Dinsmore - gold, Cooper - silver, Flory - bronze)
- The Hurricanes also became first team since 2000 to sweep a podium in a single diving event at ACC Championships
- Miami was able to repeat the feat at NCAA Zone B qualifying, where the Hurricanes captured the top-four finishes.
- Randy Ableman was voted as ACC Men's Diving Coach of the Year for the fourth time in the past six seasons.
- The Hurricanes had top-three finishes in both springboard events (Mia Vallée, Jessie Creed, Millie Haffety in 3-meter

- Miami earned eight shut out victories, including two to open conference play.
- The Hurricanes closed out the year with a top-25 victory over in-state rival Florida State, 4-0.
- Francisco Bastias (Feb. 25) and
 Adria Soriano Barrera (March 10) both
 claimed ACC Player of the Week accolades to close out the season, while
 Bastias and Soriano Barrera (Feb. 25) teamed up to win Doubles Team of the Week honors.
- Overall, the Hurricanes closed out the year ranked No. 21, and sat in first in the ACC, ahead of second-ranked UNC (2-0 ACC).
- Individually, Soriano Barrera ranked No. 39 in the singles rankings, while Franco Aubone and Benjamin Hannestad ranked No. 23 in doubles and Bastias and Soriano Barrera ranked No. 56.
- In the fall, Aubone and Hannestad teamed up to go 13-3 as a tandem, and closed out 2019 ranked ninth in the nation. The top-10 doubles ranking was the highest mark since All-Americans Carl Sundberg and Daniel Vallverdu opened the 2008-09 campaign as the top-ranked tandem in the nation's preseason poll (Sep. 4, 2008).
- Hannestad and Aubone had a stellar fall campaign, claiming the ITA Southeast Regional doubles title, before reaching the semifinals of the prestigious ITA National Fall Championships.



WOMEN'S TENNIS

· In a campaign cut short after just two months due to the COVID-19

pandemic, the Hurricanes notched their 20th consecutive winning season, as they finished 6-4, with all four setbacks against top-20 foes.

- Estela Perez-Somarriba became the fifth four-time ITA All-American in program history and set the Miami career singles wins record on Jan.
- 26, en route to capping the season with a career total of 141.
- On Feb. 15, Perez-Somarriba played Coco Gauff, a WTA top-55 player, in front of over 5,500 fans in an exhibition match at the Delray Beach Open that served as the first women's match in the tournament's history.

- One of three freshmen to enroll in January in advance of the spring season, Florencia Urrutia went 9-2 in singles play and 8-4 in doubles action, finishing second on the team in combined victories between the two categories.
- The Hurricanes peaked at No. 18 in the team rankings, while Perez-Somarriba ascended to the top spot in singles, sophomore Daevenia Achong reached No. 72, freshman Selma Cadar ascended to No. 69 and two Miami doubles pairs, both featuring aforementioned players, earned national rankings.

MEN'S TRACK & FIELD

- Kevin Arreaga and Raheem Chambers both qualified for the NCAA Indoor Track and Field Championships; Arreaga in the men's weight throw and Chambers in the 60m dash. Due to COVID-19, neither were able to compete.
- Arreaga finished the season ranked No. 14, while Chambers finished with the third-fastest time in the NCAA at 6.57 seconds.
 Arreaga's mark of 21.82m tops Miami's All-Time list.
- When finishing second at the Vandy Invitational, Chambers' time ranked as the then-No.2 time in the world and as Miami's fastest time in program history.
- Chambers also claimed the silver medal at the ACC Indoor Championships.
- Arreaga finished with a bronze medal, despite competing with a back injury.
- Freshman Justin Forde finished ninth at the ACC Championships and broke into Miami's Top 5 early in the season in the triple jump with a mark of 15.71m, which ranks as No. 2 All-Time.
- Davonte Fuller broke into Miami's Top 5 in the indoor 400m with a time of 47.49.
- The men's 4x4 team of McKinly Brown, Tyrees Moulton, Davonte Fuller and Edward Wintergalen run the second-fastest time in program history in their first relay of the season.
- Jeffrey Williams broke into two Top 5 lists in his opening season with the Canes, coming in at No. 5 in both the shot put and the weight throw.
- Russell Robinson finished in Miami's Top 5 list in the long jump at No. 5 at 7.43m.



WOMEN'S TRACK & FIELD

- The Miami women finished second at the ACC Indoor Championships and ranked No. 29 in the NCAA.
- Debbie Ajagbe and Tiara McMinn qualified for the NCAA Indoor Championships, prior to COVID-19.
- Ajagbe finished the season ranked No. 5 in the women's weight throw and No. 15 in the shot put; McMinn finished the season ranked No. 3 in the women's 60m hurldes.
- Ajagbe had a historic performance at the 2020 ACC Indoor Championships, winning shot put & weight throw to earn her ACC Indoor Field MVP honors.
- Ajagbe was also tabbed ACC Field Performer of the Year and ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year. This was the second year in a row Miami has swept ACC Field MVP, ACC Field Performer of the Year and ACC Scholar-Athlete of the Year.
- Jacious Sears scored 14 points at ACCs with her second-place 60m time and thirdplace 200m time.
- Brittny Ellis earned Miami's first-ever NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship Award
- Alfreda Steele and Sears run a 7.25 second 60m daash time, which ranks as No. 3 in Miami history. Sears also cracked Top 5 in the women's 200m in program history.
- Emma Langlois broke into Miami's Top 5 in both the 3000m and the 5000m.
- Kayla Johnson claimed the fastest time in program history in the 600m at 1:27.64.
- In her first meet as a Cane, Taylor Wright now holds the third-best mark in Miami history in the high jump (1.80m).
- Debbie Ajagbe claims weight throw program record at 22.55m, which also ranks as a ACC Championships record.



The Miami programs earning perfect scores for the 2018-19 school year were men's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's diving, golf, rowing, men's and women's tennis, and women's track and field.

"It is once again a remarkable achievement for nine of our teams to post perfect APR scores for the 2018-19 academic year," Director of Athletics Blake James said. "I am exceedingly proud of our student-athletes and their desire to excel in the classroom, as well as our coaches and academic staff members who work tirelessly to help them achieve these results."

UM's football program posted its highest single-year APR in program history (987) for 2018-19. In addition, the Hurricanes' men's basketball (968), women's basketball (995), men's cross country (1,000), women's cross country (1,000), football (973), golf (1,000), rowing (994), soccer (997), men's tennis (1,000), women's tennis (1,000), men's track and field (991), women's track and field (992)

and volleyball (995) teams each topped their respective sports' multi-year national averages.

The report came a week after the Hurricanes' men's and women's cross country, golf, and men's and women's tennis teams each earned Public Recognition Awards from the NCAA. The Public Recognition Awards each year are bestowed upon teams finishing in the top 10 percent of their respective sports based on the most recent multi-year Academic Progress. Rate.

The APR, created to be a more real-time measurement of academic success than graduation rates, is a team-based metric through which scholarship student-athletes each term earn one point for remaining eligible and one point for staying in school or graduating. This report is based on NCAA Division I APR data submitted by the institution for the 2015-16, 2016-17, 2017-18 and 2018-19 academic years.

In the fall of 2011, the Division I Board of Directors approved tougher academic standards, including setting a new standard that teams must meet to participate in postseason competition. The goal of the NCAA's academic performance program is improvement, not punishment.

To compete in the 2019-20 postseason, teams had to achieve a fouryear APR of 930. NCAA members chose the 930 standard because that score predicts, on average, a 50 percent graduation rate for teams at that APR level. Additionally, teams must earn a four-year APR of at least 930 to avoid penalties. APRs for each team, lists of teams receiving public recognition and those receiving sanctions are available online through the NCAA's searchable database.

ACC NETWORK



The University of Miami's broadcast video department was on pace for a record number of digital broadcasts for ESPN during the 2019-20 school year before the COVID-19 pandemic. UM's video services department produced 56 digital broadcasts for ESPN last season for use on ACC Network Extra and other platforms.

In the past four years, Miami has generated over 392 live ESPN events through its in-house broadcast crew.

UM completed multi-million dollar renovations ot its broadcast facilities in preparation for the launch of the ACC Network in the fall of 2019. The renovations allow for the broadcast of linear events on various ESPN networks while simultaneously producing video board and digital events in our secondary control room.

All home soccer, volleyball, men's and women's basketball and baseball games were broadcast either digitally via ACC Network Extra or on a linear network (ESPN, ESPN 2, ESPNU, FSN or Raycom).

Among the digital broadcasts from the 2019-20 school year:

- · Six women's soccer matches
- Nine volleyball matches
- Two men's basketball games
- 10 women's basketball games
- 12 baseball games
- · One men's tennis match
- Two women's tennis matches


Additionally, UM's new linear control room was used to broadcast 16 events across ESPN's linear networks, which provided a great opportunity to prepare for the launch of the ACC Network this fall:

- Nine men's basketball games (ACC Network)
- Four women's basketball games (ACC Network)
- One women's soccer match (ACC Network)
- One women's volleyball match (ACC Network)
- One baseball game (ACC Network)

In addition to the ESPN productions, Miami also managed in-house video board shows for all on-campus events:

- 15 men's basketball video board shows
- 19 women's basketball video board shows
- 14 baseball video board shows

JIMMY & KIM KLOTZ PLAYER DEVELOPMENT CENTER A GAME CHANGER FOR CANES BASEBALL PROGRAM



The University of Miami boasts one of the best baseball programs in the country, with four national championships, 25 trips to the College World Series and 46 NCAA tournament appearances.

The Jimmy and Kim Klotz Player Development Center ensures that the Hurricanes will have a world-class facility to master their craft on a daily basis.

"The Jimmy and Kim Klotz Player Development Center is a critical addition to our athletic department and for our baseball

program," Miami director of athletics Blake James said. "We offer our sincere gratitude to Jimmy and Kim for their generosity and to all of those who helped make this project a reality. Our storied baseball program will take a big step forward with this facility and, most importantly, our incredible student-athletes will benefit for years to come."

The Jimmy and Kim Klotz Player Development Center, an approximately 6,800-square foot facility which sits down Mark Light Field's right field line, features batting cages, three pitcher's mounds and a multi-purpose area, along with the latest state-of-the-art technology. Miami's new facility features a camera system that allows for video analysis and data tracking.

The Jimmy and Kim Klotz Player Development Center is just the first step in the University of Miami's Baseball Facility Enhancement Campaign.

"Knowing that we do have phases, this is part one and we have other phases that are in the works," DiMare said. "We're going to stay very aggressive trying to do those things because we want to be one of the top programs in the country and, in order to do that, you've got to have top facilities. The Light is a great place and we're keeping the historical tradition from the stadium that we have here but we've got to add some things with that to stay up with the times."




