

Season Outlook

Entering her 17th season at the helm of University of Miami women's basketball program, head coach Ferne Labati welcomes back eight returnees, including three starters, from a 2003-04 team that posted one of the most successful season's in school history. Last season the Hurricanes finished with an overall record of 22-7 while making their sixth NCAA Tournament appearance.

The experience developed from last year's team should prove to be a major asset as Labati, who needs just 10

wins to reach 300 on her career at UM, leads this year's edition of the Hurricanes into the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference.

Among those nine returning players are three of the Hurricanes' top scorers from 2003-04, including leading scorer, junior Tamara James.

Along with James, among starters returning for Miami this season will be a pair of seniors in Melissa Knight and Yalonda McCormick. Knight and McCormick both will be relied upon to replace a void filled by the departure of Chanivia Broussard and Shaquana Wilkins, who combined for 26.6 points per game and 14.8 rebounds per game last season.

Juniors Tatjana Marincic and Katie Hayek should make an even larger impact on this year's team after productive seasons last year along with the rising sophomore class of Amy Audibert, Imani Dhahabu and Sandra Jansson.

The Hurricanes will also look for production from a strong recruiting class that brought in five newcomers who could all see significant playing time this season.

From the Perimeter

Heading the UM backcourt in 2004-05 will be senior point guard Yalonda McCormick. McCormick's resume includes 60 consecutive starts at point dating back to her sophomore campaign in 2001-02 in which she started all 31 games for Miami and was the only player to start all 29 games for the Hurricanes a year ago.


Last season McCormick led the Hurricanes with 5.4 assists per game and 3.2 steals per game and finished the season third on the team in scoring, averaging 12.2 points per game on her way to being named an All-BIG EAST Honorable Mention selection.

Fellow classmate Melissa Knight joins McCormick in the backcourt for

her senior season. Knight started in 28of-29 games for the Hurricanes in 2003-04, averaging 9.3 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.5 assists per game.

Junior Tatjana Marincic will also vie for time on the UM perimeter following her sophomore season in which she saw more time than any Hurricane nonstarter, averaging 3.0 points and 2.0 rebounds in 25 games.

After seeing action in 18 games as a defensive role player, senior Fallon Phanord should also make a contribution to this year's team after averaging 0.8 rebounds and 0.6 points in 6.2 minutes per game last season.





Following her sophomore season in which she missed the first seven games after hyper extending her knee, Katie Hayek returns for her junior season after averaging 1.0 points per game in 14 games in 2003-04.

Also adding depth to the UM backcourt will be sophomore Sandra Jansson.

In the Paint

Junior forward Tamara James, a 2004 All-BIG EAST First Team selection, returns as Miami's only starter in the paint from a year ago. The All-American candidate led the Hurricanes in scoring in 2003-04, averaging 16.6 points per contest on her way to becoming the 17th player and fourth sophomore in school history to reach 1,000 points on her career.

Not only an inside threat, averaging 4.6 rebounds per game last year, James also adds to the Hurricanes perimeter after leading UM in three-point percentage (.379) last season, connecting on 39-of-103 from behind the line.

Sophomore Imani Dhahabu will be relied upon to replace the departure of Miami's top two rebounders from last season – Shaquana Wilkins and

Chanivia Broussard. Dhahabu played in more games than any other freshman last season, averaging 3.0 points and 2.2 rebounds per game in 21 appearances.

Miami also brings back sophomore Amy Audibert, who posted 1.0 points and 0.5 rebounds per game in just 5.3 minutes per game last season.

Newcomers

The Hurricanes will welcome five newcomers in 2004-05 in Marianne Curtis, Albrey Grimsley, Lamese James, JoJuana Jones and Selena Eskinazi-Budge.

Curtis, a 5-8 guard out of Palmetto High School, adds to the Hurricanes' outside threat. The Miami native was a two-time All-Dade selection, averaging 21.4 points last season at Palmetto.

Grimsley, a 5-9 guard out of St. Lucie West Centennial High School, was a

Class 4A all-state selection as a sophomore and junior, Grimsley averaged 13.1 points and 4.8 assists last season. She is the No. 31-ranked guard in the nation by the All-Star Girls Report.

James, a 6-1 guard/forward out of South Broward High School, was the

Florida 5-A Player of the Year her senior season. As a senior at South Broward, she averaged a double-double with 16.7 points and 10.2 rebounds per game and was named to the All-Broward Class 6A-4A Girls' Basketball Team. James spent one year at The Patterson School prior to coming to Miami.

Jones, a 6-1 forward out of Menchville High School, should bolster the Hurricanes interior in 2004-05 after averaging almost 14 points and 12 rebounds for the Monarchs last season. She was the No. 26-ranked forward in the nation by the All-Star Girls Report.

Eskinazi-Budge comes to Miami by way of Beachwood, Ohio. As a four-year starter at Beachwood High School, Eskinazi-Budge set the school record for career points and averaged over 23 points a game during her senior season.

The Schedule

The University of Miami's 2004-05 schedule will feature 16 home games, including two tournaments hosted at the Convocation Center, and four televised games in the Hurricanes' inaugural season in the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Miami's 2004-05 slate will include eight teams that advanced to the NCAA Tournament in 2003-04, including defending ACC Champions Duke.

The Hurricanes will also play games in seven different states in 2004-05 as part of a 12-game road tilt.

UM host two exhibition games November 3 and 13, before opening up the season with Gardner Webb November 19 in the opening round of the Miami Jam. The Hurricanes return November 21, playing in either the

championship or consolation game against UCLA or TCU.

Following a November 23 contest with Hartford in West Hartford, Conn., Miami heads to Brooklyn, N.Y. November 26-27 to take part in the LIU Turkey Classic featuring Oregon, Maryland-Eastern Shore and host Long Island.

The Hurricanes take on George Mason November 30 in Fairfax, Va. and open the month of December with cross-town rival Florida International (Dec. 4) at Golden Panther Arena.

Two days later, UM faces a Texas Tech (Dec. 6) team, who finished the 2003-04 season ranked 17th in the ESPN/USA Today Coaches Poll, in Lubbock, Texas.

UM returns to Coral Gables for a home date with Central Florida December 13 and Montana December

20 before taking on Fairfield December 28 in the opening round of the UM Holiday Classic and Loyola or Hofstra the following day to close out the month of December.

The 2004-05 non-conference schedule concludes with a January 2 game with Coppin State.

Miami opens the ACC conference schedule traveling to Tallahassee, Fla. to take on intra-state rival Florida State before games with Wake Forest (Jan. 13), at North Carolina (Jan. 17), at NC State (Jan. 20) and Georgia Tech (Jan. 23).

UM wraps up the season with games against Florida State (Jan. 27), at Clemson (Jan. 30), Duke (Feb. 3), Virginia Tech (Feb. 6), at Virginia (Feb. 10), NC State (Feb. 14), Maryland (Feb. 17), at Duke (Feb. 24) and at Virginia Tech (Feb. 27).

The 2005 ACC Women's Basketball Championships will take place March 4-7 in Greensboro, N.C.

onna E. Shalala became the fifth President of the University of Miami on June 1, 2001. President Shalala is an accomplished scholar, teacher, and administrator whose career has been marked by a variety of leadership positions reflecting her interest in young people. She also is a big sports fan!

Shalala was influenced by her mother, Edna, a former nationally ranked tennis player, while growing up in Cleveland, Ohio. While attending college, she played tennis and still plays a competitive game of doubles. She also enjoys golf, skiing and other outdoor activities.

In 1987 President Shalala, a distinguished political scientist, became the first woman chancellor of a Big Ten university, the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She led what was then the nation's largest public research university, raising more than \$400 million for the endowment, and spearheaded a \$225 million state-private partnership program to renovate and add to the university's research facilities. In 1992 Business Week magazine named her one of the top five managers in higher education.

President Shalala's success at Wisconsin was reflected in athletics as well. She hired a new football coach, recruiting Barry Alvarez from Notre Dame. Four years later, Wisconsin won the Big Ten football championship and represented its conference in the Rose Bowl for the first time in 30 years. President Shalala served on the first Knight Commission, a committee to review college athletics, and has served on the board of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Foundation.

In 1993 Shalala was named U.S. Secretary for Health and Human Services (HHS) and served for eight years, becoming the nation's longestserving HHS Secretary. She was an active member of the Washington, D.C., community, participating in events to benefit the arts including serving as a member of the Kennedy Center Board of Trustees.

In 1999 she spearheaded the United Way campaign for federal employees that raised a record \$44 million for local and national charities. In 2000 she led the official U.S. delegation to the Olympics in Sydney, Australia. At the end of her tenure as HHS Secretary, The Washington Post described her as "one of the most successful government managers of modern times."

As president of the University of Miami, President Shalala presides over one of the most successful college athletic programs in the country. The Hurricanes football program consistently ranks in the top of the polls. In 2001 the baseball team won its fourth College World Series and the football team won its fifth national championship. And, in 2003 the men and women's basketball team began play in a new, on-campus facility, the Convocation Center. Other Hurricane sports—from golf to tennis—have also earned national recognition.

For a sports fan like President Shalala, there is no better place to call home than the University of Miami.



Director of Athletics



Paul Dee Director of Athletics

Paul Dee has served as Director of Athletics since June of 1993. Prior to his appointment, Dee had served the University as its Vice President and General Counsel beginning in 1981.

During his tenure as Director of Athletics, Dee has focused the efforts of the Athletic

Department on four major points of emphasis: 1) the success of its programs; 2) the development of its student-athletes, both athletically and academically; 3) the quality of its staff; 4) improvement of facilities. The department has achieved success in each of these areas.

Program Success

The University of Miami has won three team national championships (Baseball in 1999 and 2001; Football in 2001) during Dee's tenure as Director of Athletics.

Prior to joining the Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004, Miami was a dominant program in the Big East Conference winning 34 league titles between 1993 and 2004. Included in those league championships were: eight football titles, eight women's tennis titles, seven men's tennis titles, six Big East women's outdoor track and field championships, two women's indoor track and one title in men's basketball, women's basketball and men's swimming and diving.

Under Dee's supervision, the University of Miami Athletic Department has added full scholarship programs in women's soccer, women's volleyball and women's rowing.

Student-Athlete Success

University of Miami student-athletes have continued to achieve academically. UM student-athletes have shown consistent improvement in grade-point average and graduation rates over the last decade.

Perhaps the most successful scholar-athlete of the last decade at UM was football offensive tackle Joaquin Gonzalez, who earned the 2001 HealthSouth Draddy Award (the "Academic Heisman") in addition to earning first-team All-America honors on the field in 2000 and 2001.

Quality of Staff

Miami coaches have been widely recognized by their peers as some of the nation's best. The current UM coaching staff has earned a combined 20 National Coach of the Year honors, including nine by diving coach Randy Ableman, four by baseball coach Jim Morris, three by football coach Larry Coker, two by women's golf coach Lela Cannon, and one by women's basketball coach Ferne Labati.

Improvement and Expansion of Facilities

Since 1993, the University of Miami athletic program has seen an almost complete makeover of its athletic facilities. During that period, Dee has overseen the following facility projects:

- Construction of new football field at Greentree Field
- · Construction of Cobb Stadium (track and soccer)
- · Renovation of football locker and equipment rooms
- · Renovation of the athletic training room
- Renovation of athletic department offices
- · Construction of the academic study hall facility
- Construction of the weight training facility
- · Construction of the football meeting rooms
- · Construction of locker rooms for track, soccer and volleyball
- Construction of Convocation Center for basketball and, looking ahead constuction of Alex Rodriguez Park

A Commitment To A Well-Rounded Program

National Influence

During his eleven years as Director of Athletics, Dee has been active in professional activities.

Dee has served on several NCAA Committees, including the Committee on Certification, the Management Council and currently is a member of the Committee on Infractions. In the BIG EAST, Dee has served on the Executive Television Committee and, for two years, was Chair of the BIG EAST Football Conference. Dee will assume new assignments as we enter the ACC.

Before Miami

Before joining the University, Dee was with the Miami law firm of Mershon, Sawyer, Johnston, Dunwoody & Cole and was a law clerk for Chief U.S. District Judge Charles Fulton in Miami. He received his bachelor of arts degree from the University of Florida in 1970 and his master's of education and juris doctor degrees with honors from the University of Miami in 1973 and 1977, respectively.

Dee has a son, Terrance, who practices law in Miami.



The University of Miami women's basketball program has become one of the most consistent programs in the country over the last 16 years. UM's success can be attributed to a woman who has

guided the Hurricanes since 1988.

Labati is full of optimism and enthusiasm and that is why the Hurricanes have become a program with a reputation of winning and of pride throughout the Southeast Region.

As the Hurricanes make their historical debut in the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference, Labati enters this season with great excitement as she returns three starters from last year's club that finished 22-7 overall and advanced to the NCAA Tournament for the second consecutive season.

With her appointment as head women's basketball coach on March 30, 1988, Labati was charged with turning around a program that had three previous seasons of mediocrity.

Highlighting her 16 seasons are nine berths in postseason play, six in the NCAA tournament and three in the Women's NIT. The Hurricanes won back-to-back BIG EAST regular season and tournament titles in 1992 and 1993, while finishing as high as No. 6 nationally. Her 1996 squad earned a share of the BIG EAST 7 division title. Labati herself was named WBCA/Converse Coach of the Year and BIG EAST Coach of the Year in 1992, while top player Frances Savage was Sports Illustrated's national player of the year.

Labati's record at Miami stands at 290-179 (.618) while her overall record in 26 previous seasons as a head coach is 404-294 (.586).

Labati won her 400th career victory with a win over St. John's on Feb. 8, 2003. Labati became the 39th Division I head coach to reach the 400-win mark.

On February 12, 2000 with a win over Providence, Labati reached the 350 career-win plateau. On January 25, 1996, Labati passed former UM head coach Lin Dunn as the all-time leader in coaching wins as the Hurricanes defeated West Virginia, 77-58. With the victory, her 150th as a Hurricane, Labati became only the second men's or women's basketball coach to reach the 150-win plateau at UM along with men's former coach Bruce Hale. On February 2, 1997 Labati became the 59th women's basketball coach in NCAA history to win 300 career games with a 70-56 win over Villanova.

With a 73-64 postseason win over Georgia Tech on March 2, 2002 Labati won her 250th game at Miami, giving her the most victories by a UM head coach. In 2004-05, Labati will look to reach yet another career milestone, needing just 10 wins to reach 300 on her career at Miami.

A Proven Winner

In 1988-89, Labati's first year with the program, she inherited a 14-13 team and coached them to a 21-8 record as an independent. The team went on that season to earn the first NCAA Tournament berth in the history of Hurricanes women's basketball.

In 1989-90, Miami went 25-6, the most successful season in Miami history to that point, which included a berth in the National Women's

Invitation Tournament in Amarillo, TX. Labati has since bettered that record with her 1991-92 team's 30-2 mark.

Miami went 20-10 in 1990-91 and won its first league title when the Hurricanes went 9-3 during their one-year stay in the New South Women's Athletic Conference. The Hurricanes went on to win the NSWAC tournament championship that season as well.

As a new member in the BIG EAST Conference in 1991-92, the Hurricanes would go onto to do what no ever conference team had ever accomplished, a "Dream Season" of sorts.

Labati's 1991-92 season will always be remembered as the "Dream Season" for Miami women's basketball. She captured both the WBCA/Converse Division I National Coach of the Year and BIG EAST coach of the Year honors as the Hurricanes compiled a 30-2 record, went undefeated (18-0) in league play, won the BIG EAST regular season and tournament titles and advanced to the Sweet Sixteen of the 1992 NCAA Tournament before falling to eventual Final Four participant, Vanderbilt. The loss to the Commodores snapped UM's amazing 30-game win streak which set a school record and was the longest in the nation at the time.

The 1992-93 season brought more of the same as the Hurricanes went 24-7, Labati's fifth 20-win season in her first five seasons at UM. Miami went 15-3 in the BIG EAST earning a share of its second consecutive regular season title and dominated the league's postseason tournament. The Hurricanes went on to win their second consecutive BIG EAST Tournament championship, defeating their opponents by an average of 21 points per game, and earned its third berth to the NCAA Tournament.

After putting up with season ending injuries, hurricanes and tropical storm destruction for four straight seasons, Labati guided her somewhat veteran and youthful team back into the NCAA tournament in 1997-98 and finished among the top three teams in the league. The 1998-99 season marked the sixth season that UM competed in the postseason. With a 15-13 record and an appearance in the BIG EAST tournament quarter-finals, the Hurricanes were chosen to play in the Women's NIT.

The next two seasons marked a time of rebuilding in the Labati era. Miami posted a 14-15 record in 1999-00 and a 13-15 record during the 2000-01 season

In 2001-02 the Hurricanes went 19-12 overall and 10-6 in the BIG EAST. The 2001-02 season marked the seventh season that UM competed in the postseason. Miami was invited to participate in the WNIT. Miami advanced to the second round.

The 2002-03 season marked one of great success and excitement for the Hurricanes. Miami finished the season 18-13 and made its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since the 1997-98 season. Miami received an at-large bid into the NCAA's marking the first time in league history the BIG EAST sent seven teams to the 'Big Dance'.

In 2002-03, the Hurricanes also moved into a new home playing in the Convocation Center beginning January 15, 2003.

Last season, Labati's Hurricanes followed up

the success of the previous season with a 12-0 start - the best in school history - on their way to a 22-7 finish and the second consecutive berth in the NCAA Tournament.

Rewards of Success

With the continued growth and achievement for the program come more honors. In February 1993, Labati was inducted into the both the South Jersey Hall of Fame and the Collingswood (NJ) High School Hall of Fame. Just recently, Labati was inducted into the Eastern (NJ) High School Hall of Fame.

The success of Labati's teams on the court and in the classroom did not go unnoticed by the University's administration. On June 21, 1993, Miami Athletic Director Paul Dee awarded Labati with a multi-year contract, the first ever given to a

coach of a women's sport in Miami history.

"This new contract is in recognition of Ferne's tremendous accomplishments as the coach and leader of our women's basketball program," Dee said in the 1993 announcement. "The success achieved by her teams, both on and off the court, contributed greatly to the university's decision."

Recently, Dee extended Coach Labati's contract for five additional seasons.

And though she has gotten the rewards and accolades that come with winning, Labati understands that... "the road to success is always under construction."

In the spring of 1998, Labati was 'tapped' into the University's most prestigious honor society, the 'Iron Arrow' and on April 20, 2004 Labati was inducted into the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame.

Graduation Success

Though the success on the court is impressive, what she has accomplished off the court might serve as her legacy at the University of Miami. In her 16 previous seasons, 45 of 46 student-athletes that have completed their eligibility at Miami have graduated.

Solid Administrator

Having taken both Trenton State College and Fairleigh Dickinson University from sub-.500 seasons to postseason playoff berths before she arrived in Coral Gables, Labati has proven time and time again that she possesses the tools of a fine administrator, coach and recruiter.

Prior to Miami, Labati served as head coach of FDU for four years (1984-88). Three of the four Lady Knight squads recorded 16 or more wins and advanced to postseason play.

Labati first coached at Trenton State (1979-84), leading Trenton State College to the Division III Eastern Regional Champion-ships in 1982 and 1984. She was tabbed the 1983-84 Coach of the Year by the Philadelphia-area sportswriters after a 20-8 campaign. In 1981, The New Jersey Sportswriters named her Coach of the Year after taking Trenton State from a 5-21 record in 1979-80 to a 19-11 record in 1980-81.

Labati is the past president of the New Jersey Basketball Coaches Association (1986) and formally served as a voting member of the USA Today Top 25 Coaches' Poll.

Her coaching career began at Eastern High School in New Jersey, where she coached for five years. Labati then went on to Deptford (NJ) High School prior to joining the college ranks as an assistant at then-national power Immaculata (PA) College for two seasons (1976-78).

Labati attained her Bachelor's degree in Health Administration at East Stroudsburg University in Pennsylvania.



With her apparent cool, calm and collective demeanor on the bench, Harmony is a valued teacher of the game - both on and off the court. "Robin is not only tremendous with the X's and O's of basketball - she is a great teacher," added Labati. "She's an excellent floor and game coach who has the ability to relate to our players and help them improve from year to year."

Harmony first came to Coral Gables as a student-athlete, playing basketball for former Seattle Storm WNBA coach Lin Dunn from 1980-84. The Hershey, Pa. native was an impact performer all four-years playing at guard and forward. Harmony is still considered to be one of the greatest players to ever wear the orange and green, racking up 1,308 points, 760 rebounds, 314 steals and 445 assists in 125 games.

She was inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame on April 14, 1997 for her outstanding athletic achievement at Miami.

Her collegiate career still ranks among the program's all-time best, as she is listed among the top 10 in games played, games started, field goals made, field goals attempted, assists, steals and points. Harmony is the only player in UM men's or women's basketball history to record 1,000 points, 750 rebounds, 400 assists and 300 steals during her career.

One of the longer standing records in the history of Miami women's basketball is most assists in a single game which was established by Harmony during her junior season when she had 14 against cross-town rival Florida International on December 4, 1982.

In her four years as a player, Miami went 76-50, including a 24-15 record her freshman year during 1980-81. The 24 overall wins set a UM single season record which stood until 1989-90 when Miami went 25-6 with Harmony as an assistant coach. The current record is 30 wins from UM's 30-2 "Sweet Sixteen" season in 1991-92 with Harmony as the associate head coach.

In 1984, Harmony received her B.S. in Education and Recreation and then traveled abroad to England as a player/coach for the Avon Cosmetics Basketball Club. Avon would go on to win the league championship with Harmony as the Most Valuable Player.

The Labati/Harmony relationship first began at Fairleigh Dickinson University where Labati was serving as the head coach during the mid-80Õs. After spending two seasons as an assistant coach under Dunn at Miami, Harmony left for New Jersey and a position on the Labati's Fairleigh Dickinson staff in 1987.

After helping Labati lead the FDU Lady Knights to a 16-13 record and postseason play during the 1987 season, an odd twist of fate soon occurred. Following a mediocre 14-13 season under former UM interim head coach Ken Patrick, Labati was hired as the Hurricanes sixth-ever head coach in March of 1988. Labati then turned around and brought back to UM the former standout player/coach as her top assistant.

As a coach, Harmony keeps everyone on an even keel, and Labati understands her value to the Hurricanes' program.

"I have been extremely lucky to have Robin on my staff," added Labati. "To be successful you need to have talented people around you and she has been instrumental in the success of this program. She is a fun person to have around and great for our program. It's like having another head coach on staff."

Harmony got her first taste of head coaching three seasons ago under less than cheerful circumstances, taking over the first seat on the bench on December 18, 1993, when coach Labati was in New Jersey with her family following the death of her father.

Harmony made her debut a successful one, beating Valparaiso, 77-59 at the Knight Sports Complex. She also coached the team to a 68-47 win over St. John's on January 8, 2000 to currently freeze her career record at a perfect 2-0.

For her efforts over the years, Harmony was presented with the team's Unsung Hero Award in 1992, given annually by the women's basketball program to someone who exemplifies the award's name.

Harmony graduated from Hershey (PA) High School in 1980, where she was a three-year starter and MVP averaging 19 points, 14 rebounds and eight assists her senior season.

University of Miami



he University of Miami is the largest, most comprehensive private research university in the southeastern United States with a well-earned reputation for academic excellence. Nearly 15,000 undergraduate and graduate students from every state and more than 114 nations around the world call UM home during the academic semesters. The University has grown from its main location in the City of Coral Gables to the Medical campus located in Downtown Miami, the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science on Virginia Key, the John J. Koubek Center in Little Havana, the James L. Knight Center in Downtown Miami, and the South and Richmond campuses in southwest Miami-Dade county. With more than 9,400 full- and part-time faculty and staff, UM is the largest private employer in Miami-Dade County.


Enrollment: Total enrollment for the 2003-2004 academic year was 15,248 students. Of that number, 9,636 were undergraduate students, 3,340 were graduate students, and 1,905 were professional students. During the 2002-2003 academic year, the University awarded 2,053 bachelor's, 1,138 master's, 363 J.D.'s, 133 M.D.'s, 116 Ph.D.'s, and 11 other doctorates (2002-03).



New Freshman Standings: Over one in three new freshmen graduated in the top 5% of their high school class. Almost two-thirds graduated in the top 10% of their high school class.

International Students: The University continues to attract able students from South Florida, as well as from other parts of the nation and around the world. It was one of the country's first universities to have an organized international recruitment program. The University of Miami sends representatives worldwide to seek qualified students. These students represent 113 foreign countries, the 50 states, three territories, and the District of Columbia.

Honors Program/Honor Societies: Approximately 1,600 students participate in the Honors Program. UM has 50 academic honor societies, including Phi Beta Kappa.



Research: Research and sponsored program expenditures totaled \$243.8 million (FY 03). According to the National Science Foundation, UM ranked 52nd of all universities in expenditures of federal funds for research and development (FY

Budget: The budget for 2003-04 is \$1.3 billion, with \$759 million projected for the medical campus. At the end of the FY 03 the endowment was \$414.0 million.

Development: In FY 03, contributions reached \$92.8 million in private cash, gifts and grants. In FY 02, the University ranked 54th among national research institutions in this category. In October 2003, Momentum: the Campaign for the University of Miami was announced to increase the University's endowment and raise needed funds to support its research, teaching, and service missions.



A World-Class Student Body

Enrollment at the University of Miami continues to experience tremendous growth. Applications for the freshman class during 2002-2003 reached 15,903 — the highest freshman class application figure in the University's history.

The student body also has become more diverse. White, non-Hispanic students accounted for 62 percent of the incoming freshman class in 2002-2003, Hispanics accounted for 22 percent, and African-Americans for 9 percent, while Asian students accounted for 7 percent.

Women accounted for approximately 59 percent of the new freshman class that year, about 57 percent of all undergraduates, and 52 percent of the graduate and professional students.

Education outside the traditional classroom is an important part of student life at University of Miami. The University has 60 programs offered in 25 countries on a full academic year, semester, or summer hasis







Campuses and Schools

Coral Gables Campus: The Coral Gables campus, with its two colleges and seven schools, is located on a 260-acre tract in suburban Coral Gables.

Medical Campus: The University of Miami School of Medicine campus consists of 35 acres within the 80-acre University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Medical Center complex. Other facilities at the medical center, in addition to Jackson Memorial Hospital, include the Miami Veterans Affairs Medical Center and two University-owned hospitals-the University of Miami Hospital and Clinics and Anne Bates Leach Eye Hospital, along with the Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center and Bascom Palmer Eye Institute. Dedication of the Lois Pope LIFE Center in fall 2000 and the Batchelor Children's Research Institute in spring 2001 in the Schoninger Research Quadrangle marked major contributions to the research facilities at the medical campus. School of Medicine faculty currently conduct more than 1,200



research projects aimed at advances in basic science and clinical care in facilities totaling more than two million square feet of owned and leased space.



Rosenstiel Campus: The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science is located on a 16-acre waterfront campus on Virginia Key in Biscayne Bay.

South Campus: The south campus, located ten miles southwest of Coral Gables, is on a 136-acre site used for conducting research and development projects.



Richmond Campus: The Richmond campus, established in 2001, is a 78-acre site near south campus. Research facilities for the Rosenstiel School's Center for Southeastern Tropical Advanced Remote Sensing (CSTARS) and Richmond Satellite Operations Center (RSOC) are located on a portion of the new campus.

Dr. Clyde B. McCoy **Faculty Athletic** Representative

Clyde B. McCoy, Ph.D. has served the University of Miami in various capacities for more than a quarter of a century. One of his current roles at UM is faculty athletic representative.

In this role, Dr. McCoy is responsible for ensuring academic integrity, facilitating institutional control of intercollegiate athletics and

enhancing the student-athlete experience, as well as representing the University to the NCAA. As the faculty representative, Dr. McCoy has established drug education, testing and treatment programs that serve as a model for colleges and universities throughout the United States.

Dr. McCoy has also served on several BIG EAST, ACC and NCAA committees; including chairing the ACC Academic Consortium, as well as successfully chairing the University of Miami NCAA Athletic Committee for Certification.

During his tenure at the University he has established a successful career and international reputation in research, teaching and administration. He presently serves as professor and chairperson of the School of Medicine's Department of Epidemiology and Public Health, and as Director of the University of Miami Comprehensive Drug Research Center and Health Services Research Center. His work in the early detection of breast cancer and in drug and HIV prevention have become national models.

He has been responsible for more than 50 research projects covering a broad span of epidemiology, substance abuse, cancer, HIV-AIDS, community studies, health planning, and health services and his extensive list of publications has been co-authored with more than 200 colleagues.

He has been honored as a Distinguished Alumni at the University of Cincinnati, and Most Outstanding Faculty Athletic Representative by the American Football Foundation and is proud to be a member of UM's Iron Arrow and Phi Beta Delta, Honor Society for International Scholars.



Wayne Roberts Senior Associate Athletic Director and CFO

Wayne joined the Athletic Department as Chief Financial Officer in 1996 after serving the University of Miami in several capacities starting as Director of Cost Studies and rising to Associate Controller and University Controller before joining the Athletic Department. He was promoted to Senior Associate Athletic Director in September, 2003. Mr. Roberts joined the

and women's tennis, and men's and women's track and cross-country.



Ross Bjork Associate Director of Athletics for External Operations

Ross Bjork begins his second year as the Associate Director of Athletics for External Operations at the University of Miami. Bjork oversees Athletic Development, Marketing and Promotions, Internet Communications, Ticket Sales, and Hurricane Sports Properties. Since his arrival at Miami, the U Excellence Capital

Campaign has been activated and annual giving to the Hurricane Club has increased to over \$4.5M and membership in the Club has surpassed 5,800 active members. Bjork has also assisted in negotiating an extension to Miami's Nike and Gatorade contracts for the Hurricanes.

Bjork came to Miami from the University of Missouri where he spent over six years as a member of the athletic development staff. In May 2001 Bjork was named Assistant Athletic Director for Development and oversaw all aspects of Missouri's athletic development office, including the Tiger Scholarship Fund, special events, premium parking and seating for football and basketball, and the Champions for Life Capital Campaign.

Bjork first arrived at Mizzou in April 1997 and served as an athletic development officer until 1999. He became the Director of the Tiger Scholarship Fund in 1999, before being named Assistant Athletic Director for Development.

Upon his arrival at Mizzou, annual donations to the TSF escalated from \$1.6 million in 1996 to \$5.4 million in 2002, while TSF membership increased from 2,400 to 4,600 annual members. Total giving also increased from \$2.1 million in 1996 to \$14.6 million in 2003. In addition, Bjork directed the sales campaign of the private football suites project in 2000, and implemented the new priority seating program for Missouri basketball. He also oversaw the generation of \$102 million for the Champions for Life Capital Campaign that further enhanced Mizzou's endowment program and upgraded the Sports Park. Upon his departure, over \$87.5 million had been secured.

Prior to joining the Missouri athletic staff, Bjork served as an assistant coordinator for the Hilltopper Athletic Foundation at Western Kentucky University and served as a graduate assistant at Western Illinois University in the Department of Campus Recreation.

A native of Dodge City, Kan., Bjork was a two-year starter at fullback at Emporia State University earning honorable mention All-MIAA honors as a senior. He received his Bachelor's Degree in Recreation Administration from Emporia State in 1995, and a Master's Degree in Athletic Administration from Western Illinois in December 1996. Ross' wife Sonya works for the University of Miami Alumni Association and they reside in South Miami.



Penni Key Associate Athletic Director for Internal Services

Penni Key enters her seventh year of service for the University of Miami Athletic Department. Key provides oversight of compliance, academic and sports medicine departments as well as being the primary liaison to the student-athlete drug testing committee. She

also has overseen the NCAA Certification process as the department completes second-cycle accreditation with the NCAA.

Key is a seasoned athletic administrator entering her 12th year in collegiate athletics. The majority of Key's experience resides in the area of NCAA compliance. Under her guidance, Miami's compliance office has implemented one of the most comprehensive compliance programs in the nation.

Key came to Miami in September of 1998 from Central Michigan University where she was the Director of Compliance. The majority of the previous two years, Key served as the first compliance administrator at Fresno State University. Athletic Academic Services

The Athletic Academic Services Staff of the University of Miami Athletic Department is committed to providing the academic support services necessary to facilitate the graduation of student athletes and the nurturing of skills to promote the development of responsible, well-rounded individuals. This mission is fulfilled through our commitment to promote athletics, academics, personal development and career development.

The Retention Programs

The University of Miami offers unique programs designed to assist student-athletes in their pursuit of a college education. These are a few of the programs offered to assist student-athletes:

- 1. FEX Freshman Experience Course A unique class designed to assist freshman student-athletes with the transition from high school to college.
- 2. Proactive Mentorship Program This program is designed to assist student-athletes with the transition skills necessary to be successful college students. All freshmen are required to participate and meet once a week with a mentor covering issues such as time management, goal-setting, class preparation, test preparation, etc.
- 3. Study Table Program Provides valuable locations and time to accomplish academic goals. Structured times, group and individual tutorials, computer labs, and quiet areas are designated for this program.
- 4. F.A.S.T. Program (Freshman Academic Success Training) The main purpose of this program is to ensure a smooth and successful transition from high school to college through academic success training. This will be accomplished through closely monitoring incoming at-risk student-athletes so as to ensure the use of efficient time management and study skills. Assumptions are made that all of our student-athletes come to us with good study habits, academic knowledge, and social judgment. This program will address all these areas and be reinforced throughout the semester.
- 5. Computer Lab Located within the Hecht Athletic Center, student-athletes have access to 30 personal computers with Internet access and conduct research. The lab also has 7 lab top computers that student-athletes can check out and take with them on team trips, or when they want to work on their own
- 6. Tutors Level 1 certified tutors by the College Reading and Learning Association provide individual and group assistance upon request. The tutor program at the University of Miami is one on a small number of athletic programs in the country to be awarded CRLA certification.
- 7. Learning Resource Room Student-athletes with disabilities have access to computer programs that aid in their educational skill development.


Ethnic Minority Postgraduate Scholarship, Carole obtained her Master's degree in Education from Auburn University.

The Colleges and Schools

The School of Architecture, founded in 1983, offers a wide range of professionally accredited undergraduate and graduate degrees with specialization in suburb and town design and computing in design. The school's faculty and students, headed by Dean Elizabeth Plater-Zyberk, have earned numerous honors and accolades for excellence in design. Fall 2003 enrollment: 383.

The College of Arts and Sciences, founded in 1926, encompasses most of the disciplines within the realm of the liberal arts. The college comprises 20 academic departments, with approximately 40 distinct majors available to undergraduates. The college employs approximately 400 full-time faculty. Fall 2003 enrollment: 4.612.

The School of Business Administration, founded in 1929, is accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. The nine departments of the school offer 26 undergraduate and graduate-level degree programs. It also is one of the first schools in the nation to offer a graduate-level management program in the Spanish language for Latin American business executives. Fall 2003 enrollment: 2,888.

The School of Communication, founded in 1985, is one of the fastest-growing schools at the University. Major programs of study include public relations, motion pictures, and broadcast journalism, as well as photography, advertising, and visual communication. It also houses a broad range of student facilities and activities such as a cable television station and a student-run FM radio station, an award-winning twice weekly newspaper, and a nationally recognized debate team. Fall 2003 enrollment: 1,361.

The School of Education, founded in 1929, houses the Departments of Teaching and Learning, Educational and Psychological Studies, and Exercise and Sport Sciences. Undergraduate majors and minors are available in elementary, secondary, special, and music education. There also are disciplines such as exercise physiology and teaching English to speakers of other languages (TESOL). All teacher education courses are approved by the State of Florida and are accredited by the National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education. Fall 2003 enrollment: 799.

The College of Engineering, founded in 1947, is one of the largest schools of its kind in a private institution of higher learning. The college's most distinctive features are the interdisciplinary courses of study, the result of associations with several areas of the University; these include biomedical engineering, which involves a partnership with the School of Medicine, and ocean engineering, which has a partnership with the Rosenstiel School. Fall 2003 enrollment: 1,107.

The Graduate School, founded in 1959, offers graduate degrees in all major areas, with 60 doctoral, 125 master's, and eight specialist programs. The list of accomplishments in post-baccalaureate education is extensive. The Rosenstiel School is considered among the world's top institutes for marine and atmospheric research and graduate training.

The School of Law, founded in 1928, offers graduate programs in comparative law, inter-American law, international law, ocean and coastal law, taxation, estate planning, and real estate property development. The law library is considered a leading legal research library with state-of-the-art research tools and journals. Fall 2003 enrollment: 1,303.

The School of Medicine, founded in 1952, already has established a research enterprise that the National Institutes of Health ranks in the top 30 percent of the nation's 125 medical schools with regard to research funding awarded. The medical school's 1,000-plus full-time faculty members and an additional 500 research personnel conduct clinical and basic science research crossing all disciplines, from epidemiology and pediatrics to AIDS, psychiatry, and the neurosciences. Together with its partner, Jackson Memorial Hospital, the school comprises the second-busiest medical center in the nation. Fall 2003 enrollment: 911.

Phillip and Patricia Frost School of Music, founded in 1926, is one of the largest schools of its kind in a private institution and one of the most comprehensive in all of higher learning. The school offers many bachelor's and master's degree programs. The school's facilities include the Maurice Gusman Concert Hall and the L. Austin Weeks Center for Recording and Performance, which contains the Victor E. Clarke Recital Hall, among others. Fall 2003 enrollment: 721.

The School of Nursing, founded in 1968, houses one of the first collegiate nursing programs in South Florida. The school has an emphasis on transcultural nursing, which recognizes an individual's unique health benefits and practices. The school is a leader in the development of innovative primary care nursing practice models, which have earned national and international recognition and research. Fall 2003 enrollment: 355.

The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science, founded in 1969, has grown from humble beginnings into one of the nation's leading institutions for oceanographic research and education today. The school offers curricula in applied marine physics, marine affairs, marine and atmospheric chemistry, marine biology and fisheries, marine geology and geophysics, and meteorology and physical oceanography. Fall 2003 enrollment: 213

Important Information From the University of Miami Compliance Office

Dear Prospective Student-Athlete:

As a prospective student-athlete, you may have the athletic potential to play college basketball at the Division I level. If so, you probably will be exposed to an enormous amount of recruitment activities from universities across the country.

Throughout the recruitment process, coaches will reference various NCAA rules and regulations. The rules are designed for various reasons. The most important of which are to ease the pressures on prospective student-athletes and to level the playing field so that all universities operate within the same guidelines.

During the recruiting process you may have the following questions:

- · When and how often can I visit an institutions campus?
- When, where and how often can a coach telephone me?
- How many times can a coach observe me in practice and/or competition?
- What academic criteria must I meet to be eligible to play Division I college basketball?

The answers to these questions and more can be obtained from the University of Miami Compliance Office or the NCAA by requesting the NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete. The guide may be provided to a prospective student-athlete at any time. The guide addresses issues related to Divisions I, II and III academic eligibility, financial aid, recruitment and more.

To receive a copy of the guide call the NCAA Hotline at 1-800-638-3731 or request it from the University of Miami coach who is recruiting you.

Please remember that since violations of NCAA rules during your recruitment could jeopardize your athletic eligibility, it is important for you and your parents to be informed and to ask questions throughout the recruiting process.

Frequently Asked Ouestions

Who is a Prospective Student-Athlete (Prospect)?

You are a prospect if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you may become a prospect if a university provides you (or your family or friends) any financial aid or other benefit that is not usually provided to prospective student-athletes.

How do I know if I'm being recruited?

A coach is recruiting you if they try to convince you directly, or through your family, to attend their school and participate in intercollegiate athletics. There are several ways to be recruited: (1) a coach may provide you with an official paid visit to view the campus, (2) a coach may arrange an in-person, off-campus meeting with you (or your family), or (3) a coach or staff member may call you (or your family) on more than one occasion for the purpose of recruitment.

Coaches and authorized institutional staff members are the only individuals who may recruit you. Representatives of athletic interests (boosters) may not call, write or make inperson contact with you anywhere for the purpose of recruiting you to a university and participating in athletics.

When can a coach contact me? Off Campus Contact

A coach can arrange a face-to-face meeting, off the University's campus, with you beginning July 1st following the completion of your junior year in high school.

Telephone Calls

 In all sports other than football and basketball, a coach may call a prospect once during the month of March of the prospect's junior year in high school and then on or

- after July 1 following the completion of the prospect's junior year in high school. Only one phone call may be made per week to a prospect or the prospect's family.
- In the sport of football, a coach may initiate one telephone call to a prospect during the month of May of the prospect's junior year. Additional telephone calls to a prospect may not be made before September 1 of the beginning of the prospect's senior year in high school, limited to one call per week.
- In the sport of men's basketball, coaches may make one telephone call to a prospect during the month of March during the prospect's junior year. A coach may then call a prospect on or after June 21 of the prospect's junior year, followed by three additional phone calls in the month of July, with no more than one call per week.
- In the sport of women's basketball, one telephone call during the month of March of the prospect's junior year in high school and then one telephone call may be made to a prospect on or after June 21 of the prospect's junior year in high school. In addition, only three telephone calls to a prospect may be made during the month of July, with no more than one call per week.
- In the following circumstances unlimited calls to a prospect are permitted: (1) during the five days immediately preceding an official visit to the University of Miami, (2) on the initial date for signing the National Letter of Intent and the two days following the signing date, and (3) on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with a prospect
- For all sports, coaches may receive telephone calls placed by a prospect at the prospect's expense at anytime, including before July 1 following the prospect's junior year in high school.

Letters

Letters and recruiting information may be sent to you starting September 1st at the beginning of your junior year in high school.

What is a Contact?

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parent(s) or legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an exchange of a greeting. NOTE: At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting.

What can a school offer me to attend their University?

You (or your family) may not receive any benefit, inducement or arrangements such as cash, clothing, cars, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or to attend a NCAA school.

A University may offer you a one-year scholarship that covers room and board, tuition and fees, and required course-related books, or any part of these. The institution can recommend that this aid is renewed each year, as is the general practice at the University of Miami but this renewal is not guaranteed. In addition, they can offer you quality academic and medical support, as well as the opportunity to compete for one of the nation's top programs.

What can I do during this process?

Enjoy your high school years and work hard both in the classroom and in your sport. At the beginning of your junior year you should sign up for the NCAA Clearinghouse. Your high school guidance office can provide you with the information to register.



The top priority of the University of Miami athletic department is a commitment to its student-athletes both on and off the court. This commitment is constantly reinforced with the medical attention that is available to Hurricane studentathletes.

UM's newly renovated and expanded training room, located in the Hecht Athletic Center, contains the most modern equipment available.

Computerized testing and a wide range of aerobic conditioning equipment is available to help design individual rehabilitation programs and help reduce the risk of re-injury. The training room also contains a state-of-the-art Biodex machine to aid athletes in their rehabilitation.

The University has assembled one of the finest medical staffs in the country. The women's basketball team physician and orthopedic surgeon Dr. Keith Hechtman works with the UM training staff throughout the season. Dr. Hechtman also works with the Hurricane baseball team.

Miami's top-notch training staff, is headed by Scott McGonagle, McGonagle, a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association, joined the UM family in September of 1995 following a 13 year stint as the head trainer at the University of Tulsa. He has also served on the training staffs at the 1993 and 1994 U.S. Olympic Festivals as well as the U.S. Olympic Training Center in 1991.

Assistant trainer Kysha Harriell works and travels with the women's basketball team. She monitors the medical progress of Hurricane basketball players and works closely with team physicians in designing rehabilitation programs for the athletes.

Harriell came to Miami from Pittsburgh where she was a student assistant trainer from 1993-96. While at Pittsburgh, Harriell worked with several sports including football, gymnastics, women's basketball, and track and field.

Harriell was also an intern at Carlow College where she worked directly with volleyball, women's basketball and cross country.

Harriell, is a certified member of the National Athletic Trainers Association and also serves on the NATA Ethnic Diversity Advisory Council. She currently teaches Sports Medicine classes at Miami and is pursuing a Doctorate in Education.

Harriell earned a bachelor of science degree in movement science and athletic training from Pittsburgh in 1996 and a master's degree in Sports Administration/Sports Medicine from Miami in 1997.

Dr. Hechtman, regarded as one of the finest physicians in the southeast, works with Dr. John Uribe, a specialist in orthopedics and another member of UM's medical team, in serving as team physicians for both Florida International University and St. Thomas University.

Hurricane athletes enjoy the luxury of having one of the nation's finest sports medicine facilities located right on campus. Doctors' Hospital features a full service health-care center specializing in sports medicine. The clinic provides preventative care, physicals, injury evaluations, special testing and referral to specialists. Doctors' Hospital possesses some of the most high-tech equipment in the nation and is available to treat Hurricane athletes.

With all this medical expertise and equipment available to them, Hurricane athletes are among the best cared for in the nation.

Miami also offers a comprehensive program intended to aid and educate student-athletes concerning the problems and dangers associated with the usage of drugs and substance abuse. The program consists of drug education, testing, counseling and rehabilitation.

In order to join the training staff at the University, athletic trainers must undergo rigorous hours of work and pass a certification exam. Each trainer at Miami must have worked at least 1,500 hours as a student-trainer under the supervision of a certified athletic trainer, graduated from a medical curriculum, and passed the national exam.

The Hurricane training room is easily accessible to all student-athletes and is centrally located in the Hecht Athletic Center.

Strength & Conditioning

At the University of Miami winners are made on and off the court. Just as important as the final numbers that read on the scoreboard, are the results achieved in the Hurricanes' weight room. It is this firm belief that has made Miami one of the nation's up and coming programs.

The Hurricane Strength and Conditioning program operates under the guidance of head strength coach Andreu Swasey.

Head Strength and Conditioning Coach Andreu Swasey is noted for his enthusiastic approach to weight training and for developing year-round sports specific programs for each student-athlete. Together with assistant strength coaches Lisa Ciaravella, Mark Dziadek, Victor Ishmael, Jimmy Goins and Dave Richardson, Hurricane student athletes are given the personalized instruction and tools to reach their full physical potential.

The goal of the Hurricane Strength and Conditioning program is to minimize risk and enhance all physical parameters, including strength, speed, power, flexibility and cardiovascular endurance.

The results of the strength program are obvious as the Hurricanes enter the 2002-03 season stronger and healthier than ever before. Conditioning will be crucial as the Hurricanes face

some of the nations best athletes in the always grueling BIG EAST Conference.

The 5,500 square foot Hurricane weight room is adjacent to the Hurricanes' practice facility and is located within the Hecht Athletic Center. Totally refurbished in 1995 with a complete line of weights and muscle-specific machines, the Hurricane weight room is complete with a rubberized floor surface, stereo sound system, cooled water fountains and full-length mirrored walls.

Entering the 2002-03 season, UM studentathletes will have the use of the newly-constructed state-of-the-art track on the Cobb Stadium for Soccer, Track & Field on which to work on all facets of speed training.

Committed to the health and development of her players, Ferne Labati is one of the most progressive basketball coaches in the country with regards to strength and conditioning. It his her belief that strength and conditioning is every bit as important as scrimmaging and watching film. Along with Ciaravella, Labati will evaluate the strength and conditioning program by how the Hurricanes are doing in March because just as basketball skills must improve as the ACC and NCAA Tournament come around, so must the conditioning of their players.

The University recently completed the construction of a new \$4.9 million weightroom. The 12,000 square foot state-of-art facility housed 20 custom designed weight lifting stations, 17 cardio-vascular machines, a stretching area, a dumbbell and rehab area, nearly 44,000 of weight.

Hurricane Warnings

The U



In 1973, UM's Athletic Federation, the fund raising arm of the athletic department at the time, commissioned a local public relations expert to develop a distinctive logo. The University had gone several years with a variety of helmet and uniform changes and the Federation noted that a number of major colleges have the initials UM. Miami designer Bill Bodenhamer suggested the "U" idea, which lent itself to distinctive logos for each sport as well as slogans like "U gotta believe" and "U is great."

Sebastian the Ibis



Folklore maintains that the Ibis, a symbol of knowledge found in the Everglades and Egypt, is the last sign of wildlife to take shelter before a hurricane and the first to reappear after the storm. The local marsh bird was considered UM's first unofficial mascot when the school yearbook adopted the name "Ibis" in 1926. Its popularity grew among the students during the 50's. In 1957 San Sebastian Hall, a residence hall on campus, sponsored an Ibis entry in the homecoming celebration. The next year, student John Stormont performed at games in an Ibis costume that was glued, sewn and pinned together and was the forerunner of today's bird. Through the years, the lbis has become one of the most recognizable college mascots in the United States.

The Hurricanes

It began in controversy. Some reports say the 1927 football team held a team meeting to select Hurricanes, hoping they would sweep away opponents just as the devastating storm did on September 16, 1926. Another version holds that Miami News columnist Jack Bell asked end Porter Norris of the 1926 team what the team should be called. Told that the local dignitaries and University officials wanted to name the team for a local flora or fauna, Norris said the players wouldn't stand for it and suggested "Hurricanes" since the opening game had been postponed by such a storm. From time to time, opposition has arisen to the name that would "reinforce Miami's negative reputation as a weather-beaten community living constantly under the threat of destruction." But as one UM official rationalized in the 60's, "Does anyone think Chicago is overrun by bears just because the town has a football team by that name?"

Orange, Green & White

UM's school colors were selected in 1926. The colors of the Florida orange tree represent UM. Orange symbolizes the fruit of the tree, green represents the leaves and white, the blossoms.

Iron Arrow

Started in 1926, the purpose of the society was to honor those students who had contributed significantly to the "glory, fame & growth" of UM. The name "Iron Arrow" was a combination of parts of two ideas — Arrow from Bow and Arrow (straight path) and Iron from Iron Age.

Despite the warm weather, South Florida's own hockey team, the Florida Panthers, can keep up on the ice. And for basketball fans, the NBA's Miami Heat keep things heated up at the AmericanAirlines Arena.

Miami is Caliente

Truly a melting pot, Miami plays home to a variety of cultures, creating a totally unique, vibrant cultural mosaic. With representatives of every Hispanic nation in the world, Spanish serves as a second language to most of Miami's residents. Little Havana is the heart of Miami's Cuban community, where churro vendors line the streets, the aroma of high-octane café Cubano fills the air, and the spirit of friendly competition

fills Domino Park.

The spirit of the Caribbean is alive in Little Haiti, where many Haitian artists, musicians and entrepreneurs get their start in Miami. The proud focal point of this neighborhood is the Caribbean Market, an open-air replica of Port-au-Prince's Iron Market, where Creole is the dominant language, and there are elements of Afro-Caribbean religions such as voodoo.

Sizzling the silver screen

With tropical weather, a high quality labor pool, low production costs, and direct links to Latin America, Miami has become one of the most important entertainment centers in the world. Dubbed as the Latin-American Hollywood by the New York Times, such blockbusters as Big Trouble, written by Miami Herald columnist Dave Barry, and starring Tim Allen and Rene Russo, Any Given Sunday, There's Something About Mary, The Birdcage, and Wild Things were all filmed in Miami.

Miami is a Hollywood favorite off-screen as well as on-screen, with dozens of celebrities calling Miami home, and even more who consider it a favorite weekend getaway. Gloria and Emilio Estefan's Star Island estate and Gianni Versace's Ocean Drive mansion-turned-museum are just a couple of examples of Miami's celebrity appeal.

Miami Hot Spots

For shopping, for dancing, or for just plain people watching, Miami offers several places to see and be seen.

With over 800 buildings designed in the 30s and 40s, South Beach serves as the largest collection of Art Deco architecture in the world. It also sets the scene for a nightlife that just won't quit. Celebrity-owned restaurants like Cameron Diaz's Bambu, night clubs such as Level, which is based on the format of New York's Studio 54, and a medley of huge anchor stores and small unique boutiques create the flavor of Miami's most famous hot spot.

Coconut Grove, just a ten-minute drive from the University of Miami, is another student favorite. Built mainly by West Indian craftsmen brought in from the Bahamas, it still holds onto the Caribbean appeal its name suggests. Attracting writers, artists, and non-conformists, this hub of the bohemian arts contributed to Miami's cultural renaissance. Fast-forward a century, and the Grove is still one of Miami's hottest nightspots, with more than 75 cafes, restaurants, and clubs that line the streets.

The warmth of Coral Gables, the "City Beautiful"

The University of Miami campus is located in Coral Gables, dubbed "the City Beautiful." Founded by George Merrick almost a century ago, the Gables is one of Miami's most beautiful areas. The palm-lined streets are all named after European villages, each one bordered by Old Spanish style homes. Downtown Coral Gables is bustling with the many offices of multi-national corporations. The city's central boulevard, Miracle



Mile, has a wide array of designer boutiques and art galleries. One Gables favorite is the Venetian Pool, a beautiful swimming lagoon carved out of coral, which features cascading waterfalls and underwater caves.



Athletic Facilities



Mark Light Field

In 1971, former Miami Coach Ron Fraser had a dream of building a state-of-the-art college baseball field and Hurricane supporter George Light came forward with the funding. However, Light never got to see the Hurricanes reach the College World Series. He died shortly after his donation as the Hurricanes finished second in their first CWS. The field, dedicated in 1977, is named for Light's son, Mark, who died of muscular dystrophy. Light's widow, Ethel, was known as "The First Lady of Mark Light Field." She was seldom missing from her seat right behind home plate. She passed away in 1994.

In 1994, the field was refurbished with natural grass and several additional renovations were made in the fall of 1996. The locker room, training room and umpire's room were updated. A new hitting cage and sound system were also added. "The Light" has been the home of the 1982, 1985, 1999 and 2001 NCAA College World Series Champions. One of the nation's most complete facilities, MLS has a seating capacity of 5,000.



Norman Whitten Student Union Pool

As Director of Intramural Sports, Norman Whitten had close ties with the University of Miami. His dedication to UM sports lead to the contribution of the Student Union Pool. In 1966. the area was converted into part of the Student Union. The Norman Whitten Student Union Pool has been the home to 34 National Title Winners and 28 Olympians, including three-time National Champion and five-time World Champion diver Greg Louganis.



Greentree Practice Fields

Because of a generous donation by Myron Greentree, the practice fields for Hurricane athletes was opened in the 1970's. The practice home of the 1983. '87,'89,'91 and '01 national football champions under went a \$2 million renovation during the 1998 off-season. The renovation included three full-length prescription athletic turf fields and lights for evening practices.



Ronald W. Shane **Watersports Center**

The Ronald W. Shane Watersports Center, home of the University of Miami rowing team, is dedicated "to promote and develop amateur watersports competition for adults, youth, students, and underprivileged individuals in South Florida." The charter of the Watersports Center is grounded in the beliefs of its founder, Dr. Ron Shane, that giving back to the community and providing resources to anyone willing to participate is the most important aspect of the organization. The Watersports Center is a not-for-profit foundation, all of whose programs are open to the community.

The Watersports Center was dedicated in October of 1993 and has 4.200 square feet if storage space for shells. It is located on Indian Creek, a three mile sheltered body of water that is wide enough for six boats in the heart of Miami Beach. Beginning in 2002, a second level will be added to the center, with more space for meeting rooms, ergs, weight room and an internet café.



Knight Sports Complex

With the dedication and support of James L. Knight, the Knight Sports Complex was completed in 1985. Knight was an avid supporter of the University of Miami and made several other contributions such as the school of architecture. The building houses practice courts and locker rooms for men's and women's basketball and volleyball. One of the nation's most complete basketball practice facilities, the KSC was refurbished with a new permanent playing surface in the spring of 1994.



University of Miami **Wellness Center**

In January of 1996, the University of Miami Wellness Center was opened for use by the student body, faculty, staff and alumni. Located next to the Hecht-Stanford residential colleges, the Wellness Center provides students a variety of activities and services, including a fitness room, aerobic classes, indoor track, gymnasium with basketball, volleyball and badminton courts; racquetball and squash courts; indoor pool, spa and sauna.



Cobb Stadium

Located adjacent to the Hecht Athletic Center and providing seating for 500 people, the is named after Ambassador and Mrs. Charles E. Cobb. The Cobb family donated the gift for the reconstruction and expansion of the University track and the construction of the new soccer field. Because of this contribution, Cobb Stadium was opened in the spring of 1999.

Ambassador Cobb was captain of the Stanford University track team and a member of the 1960 United States Olympic team as a high hurdler. He has been a member of the University of Miami Board of Trustees and its Executive Committee for over 20 years and is a former Chairman of the Board of Trustees.



Hecht Athletic Center


With a generous donation from Isadore Hecht, the University of Miami was able to renovate and make additions to the athletic administrative offices in 1979. Hecht believed that to attract the highest quality of student-athlete, the University needed to have the best facilities. The Hecht Athletic Center houses all the administrative offices within the University if Miami athletic program. In 2001, the facility completed an \$8 million expansion that features the addition of new locker rooms, meeting rooms and an improved strength and conditioning center.



Neil Schiff Tennis Center

A 1948 graduate of the University of Miami, Neil Schiff spent the majority of his life in dedicated service to his alma mater. At the time of his passing in 1985. Schiff was vice-chairman of UM's board of Trustees. His passing was felt deeply by the tennis community and the young men and women who prospered through his love and support of Hurricane tennis.

Dedicated in 1987, the home of Miami tennis is one of the top five facilities in the country. With 16 courts and seating for 1,000 spectators, the facility hosts many of the nation's top amateur events, including the International Junior Orange Bowl Tournament, ITCA Women's Rolex Qualifier and BIG EAST Tennis Championships.



Orange Bowl

Dedicated on December 10. 1937 the Orange Bowl serves as the home of the University of Miami football team. The facility has a seating capacity of 72,319 and has played host to five Super Bowls and numerous collegiate bowl games. Since 1970, when the collegiate national champion was first selected after the completion of the bowl games, the Orange Bowl Classic has hosted 11 games that decided the national title. Until the 1996 season when the OBC moved to Pro Player Stadium, Orange Bowl Stadium had hosted eight of the previous 11 national champigames, including University of Miami titles in 1983, 1987 and 1991.





The ACC at 52nd Years

The Tradition

Consistency. It's the mark of true excellence in any endeavor.

However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 52nd year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation. And that is not mere conjecture, the numbers support it.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 91 national champion-ships, including 47 in women's competition and 44 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 116 times in men's competition and 57 times in women's action.

Since the inception of women's basketball in the Atlantic Coast Conference in 1977, a tradition of excellence has certainly been established. Celebrating its 50th Anniversary in 2003, the ACC reflected on 50 years of tremendous success, including a rich 26-year history of ACC Women's Basketball.

The league's women's basketball programs rank among the best in the country in terms of the NCAA Tournament, having made 96 appearances and won 128 games in the last 27 years, 10 of them as a number one seed. The league boasts such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 16 consecutive years. The conference has also made ten trips to the Final Four in the last 23 years with two teams finishing second and North Carolina capturing the National Championship in 1994

Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their NCAA Tournament success and television exposure. The 2004-05 schedule will feature a league-record 43 televised games, including 11 national telecasts including six games on ESPN/ESPN2 and five on Fox Sports Net. In addition, 28 conference match-ups and two non-conference games will be featured this year on the league's regional sports network which includes Comcast Sports Net, FSN South and the Sunshine Network. In all the ACC will total a record 79 television appearances.

The 11 league programs account for five national player of the year honors including Virginia's Dawn Staley's back-to-back selections in 1991 and 1992 and most recently, Blue Devil Alana Beard's back-to-back selections in 2003 and 2004. The conference has collected 120 All-America selections in the past 27 years, producing 49 first-teamers. In the last 15 years, the ACC has placed nine players on the All-Final Four team, including two dubbed Most Outstanding Player and 47 players on All-Region teams, with eight Most Outstanding Player recognitions.

Five coaches have garnered national coach of the year awards nine times. Coaches distinctions include Duke's Gail Goestenkors (1999,2000,2001,2003), North Carolina's Sylvia Hatchell (1994), Maryland's Chris Weller (1992), Virginia's Debbie Ryan (1991) and NC State's Kay Yow (1990, 2000).

Seven representatives, including coaches and athletes from the ACC have participated in the Olympics. NC State's Kay Yow, assisted by Sylvia Hatchell of North Carolina, headed up the 1988 gold medal-winning Olympic team. Maryland's Vicky Bullett was a member of both the 1988 and 1992 Olympic teams and Virginia's Dawn Staley was a member of the 1996, 2000 and 2004 gold-medal winning Olympic squad in Atlanta, Sydney and Athens. Duke's Gail Goestenkors was an assistant coach on the 2004 gold-medal winning Athens team.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the WNBA. Thirty-nine former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while four former players have worked the sidelines as coaches.

The ACC also stands at the forefront of intercollegiate athletics in terms of the academic accomplishments of its student-athletes. Since 1983, 400 women's basketball players have received ACC Academic Honor Roll recognition. The 2003-04 academic year included 30 selections. In addition, ACC basketball players have earned first-team Academic All-America honors six times, including Virginia's Val Ackerman in 1981, the current President of the WNBA. In 1997 NC State's Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. Twelve players have earned ACC Postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.

2003-04 in Review

The 2003-04 academic year concluded with the league pocketing three more national team titles and six individual NCAA crowns. In all, the ACC has won 48 national team titles over the last 14 years. The ACC's 2003-04 national champions were Wake Forest in field hockey, North Carolina in women's soccer and Virginia in women's lacrosse. Overall, 66 ACC teams took part in post-season play compiling a 101-66-4 (.596) record.

A total of 169 student-athletes from the ACC earned first, second or third-team All-America honors this past year. In addition, the ACC produced nine national Players of the Year, two national Rookies of the Year and three national Coaches of the Year recipients.

The ACC placed at least one team in the top 10 nationally in 17 sports. In all, 31 ACC teams finished their season with a top 10 ranking.

The Championships

The conference will conduct championship competition in 25 sports during the 2004-05 academic year - 12 for men and 13 for women. The first ACC championship was held in swimming on February 25, 1954. The conference did not conduct championships in cross country, wrestling or tennis during the first year.

The 12 sports for men include football, cross country, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, wrestling, baseball, tennis, golf and lacrosse. Fencing, which was started in 1971, was discontinued in 1981.

Women's sports were initiated in 1977 with the first championship meet being held in tennis at Wake Forest University.

Championships for women are currently conducted in cross country, volleyball, field hockey, soccer, basketball, swimming, indoor and outdoor track, tennis, golf, lacrosse, softball and rowing.

A History

The Atlantic Coast Conference was founded on May 8, 1953, at the Sedgefield Inn near Greensboro, N.C., with seven charter members - Clemson, Duke, Maryland, North Carolina, North Carolina State, South Carolina and Wake Forest - drawing up the conference by-laws.

The withdrawal of seven schools from the Southern Conference came early on the morning of May 8, 1953, during the Southern Conference's annual spring meeting. On June 14, 1953, the seven members met in Raleigh, N.C., where a set of bylaws was adopted and the name became officially the Atlantic Coast Conference.

Suggestions from fans for the name of the new conference appeared in the region's newspapers prior to the meeting in Raleigh. Some of the names suggested were: Dixie, Mid South, Mid Atlantic, East Coast, Seaboard, Colonial, Tobacco, Blue-Gray, Piedmont, Southern Seven and the Shoreline.

Duke's Eddie Cameron recommended that the name of the conference be the Atlantic Coast Conference, and the motion was passed unanimously. The meeting concluded with each member institution assessed \$200.00 to pay for conference expenses.

On December 4, 1953, conference officials met again at Sedgefield and officially admitted the University of Virginia as the league's eighth member. The first, and only, withdrawal of a school from the ACC came on June 30, 1971, when the University of South Carolina tendered its resignation.

The ACC operated with seven members until April 3, 1978, when the Georgia Institute of Technology was admitted. The Atlanta school had withdrawn from the Southeastern Conference in January of 1964.

The ACC expanded to nine members on July 1, 1991, with the addition of Florida State University.

The conference expanded to 11 members on July 1, 2004, with the addition of the University of Miami and Virginia Polytechnic Institute and State University. On October 17, 2003, Boston College accepted an invitation to become the league's 12th member starting with the 2005-06 academic year.



ACC Commissioner



John Swofford ACC Commissioner

Now in his eighth year as commissioner, John Swofford has made a dramatic impact on the Atlantic Coast Conference and college athletics and is regarded as one of the top administrators in the NCAA.

Swofford assumed his role as the fourth full-time commissioner in the 51-year history of the Atlantic Coast Conference in July of 1997. He follows James H. (Jim) Weaver, the league's first Commissioner from 1954-1970, Robert (Bob) James, who served from 1971-1987

and Eugene F. (Gene) Corrigan, who held the position from 1987 to 1997.

In addition to overseeing one of the nation's largest athletic conferences, Swofford has been pivotal in positioning the Atlantic Coast Conference for the future. In 2003, on behalf of the nine league institutions and the ACC Council of Presidents, he introduced Miami, Virginia Tech and Boston College as the newest members of the ACC.

With expansion, Swofford's leadership and negotiating skills helped bring the conference extended and enhanced television contracts in both football and basketball.

In May of 2004, the league extended its relationship with ABC, ESPN and Jefferson-Pilot by re-negotiating its football television agreement. Highlights include the rights to the inaugural ACC Football Championship Game and significant increases in the number of televised games through 2010.

In May of 2000, Swofford negotiated one of the nation's most lucrative basketball television contracts with Raycom/Jefferson-Pilot Sports through the 2010-11 season. After the addition of the three new conference members, under Swofford's guidance, Raycom/Jefferson-Pilot increased their financial commitment to the ACC basketball package in May of 2004. During his tenure, the ACC has become the only conference to have television packages with two national cable networks - ESPN and Fox Sports Net. The results of these packages increased the television audience of ACC basketball by over 25 percent.

In order to reach the expanding audience of ACC fans, Swofford negotiated an agreement with XM Satellite Radio, to broadcast the league's football, men's and women's basketball games.

The North Wilkesboro, N.C., native was a prime mover in the creation of the ACC-Big Ten Basketball Challenge, a three-day series matching two of the nation's premiere college basketball conferences.

Highly respected by his peers, Swofford was a force in the development and growth of the Bowl Championship Series (BCS) to determine an annual national champion in Division I football. In addition to being involved with the BCS since its inception, he served as Coordinator of the BCS for the 2000 and 2001 college football seasons and is currently the chair of the Board of Directors of NCAA Football.

Since becoming Commissioner in 1997, Swofford has been responsible for securing a league-high six bowl opportunities for the ACC. In 2002, the conference set an NCAA record when seven of its nine teams (78%) participated in bowl play. This past year, the ACC won the Bowl Challenge Cup, awarded by ESPN, for having the best winning percentage in bowl play.

In January of 2001, the Triangle Chapter of the College Football Hall of Fame named Swofford the recipient of its "Outstanding American Award." In the fall of 2002, he was named to the North Carolina High School Athletic Association's Hall of Fame and in December of 2003 he was inducted into the Chick-fil-A Peach Bowl Hall of Fame. The Sporting News named Swofford the fifth most influential person in sports in the United States for 2003.

During Swofford's first seven years as Commissioner, ACC teams have won 22 national titles while participating in 35 national championship games. In addition, 578 ACC teams have participated in various NCAA championships during his seven years - an average of 82 NCAA teams per year.

A long-time advocate of the importance of academics and student-athlete welfare, Swofford stimulated the formation of the league's first-ever ACC Student-Athlete Advisory Committee. This group of current ACC athletes gives the conference direct feedback on their experiences participating at the highest level of college athletics.

One of the league's first marketing initiatives in men's basketball under Swofford was to negotiate a new rotation for the Tournament through the year 2010. Wanting to capitalize on the popularity of the Tournament and the dynamic cities within the ACC footprint, the league awarded future tournaments to Atlanta, Ga., Washington D.C. and Tampa, Fla., in addition to the traditional stops in Greensboro and Charlotte. The 2001 ACC Tournament in Atlanta set NCAA attendance records for single session (40,083), per session average (36,505) and total attendance (182,525).

Swofford placed an added emphasis on the development of women's basketball in the ACC with the hiring of an Associate Commissioner for Women's Basketball to oversee all aspects of the sport on both a conference and national level.

In addition to his influence and presence in the ACC, Swofford has been a prominent leader in intercollegiate athletics, serving as President of the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics (NACDA) in 1993-94. In 2002, Swofford was appointed as a member of the NCAA Football Oversight Committee. In addition, he has served as a member of the prestigious NCAA Executive Committee. He was named chairman of the NCAA Football Television Committee in 1984 and was also chairman of the NCAA Communications and NCAA Special Events/Post-season Bowl Committees. Swofford is a past chairman of the NCAA Division I Championship Committee and was appointed to the NCAA Special Committee to Study a Division I-A Football Championship.

During his 21 years as an athletics director and assistant athletics director in the league, Swofford chaired numerous ACC committees, including five terms as chair of the ACC Television Committee.

The Director of Athletics at the University of North Carolina from 1980 to 1997, Swofford was instrumental in building North Carolina's athletics department into one of the country's most respected programs. During his tenure, Tar Heel athletic teams claimed 123 ACC championships and 24 national collegiate titles, including 18 by the school's women's programs. During the 1993-94 year, the Tar Heels captured the inaugural Sears Directors' Cup, emblematic of the collegiate all-sports champion. North Carolina finished in the Top Six of the Sears Cup standings in each year of Swofford's tenure that the award was given. Four of Swofford's coaching hires at UNC went on to win national championships at the school.

Under his leadership, North Carolina enjoyed a tremendous growth in its athletic facilities, including the construction of the Smith Center, a complex which includes a 21,572-seat basketball arena and the Koury Natatorium and the Frank H. Kenan Football Center. He initiated the idea and provided the impetus for the founding of North Carolina's trademark licensing program which yields \$2 million annually in sales.

The University chose to recognize his many accomplishments by establishing the John D. Swofford women's athletics scholarship and naming an auditorium in the school's football complex in his honor.

Swofford was a two-time all-state football player and three-sport MVP at Wilkes Central High School. He is a 1971 graduate of North Carolina and a recipient of the prestigious Morehead Scholarship. In 1973, Swofford received a MEd. degree with a major in Athletics Administration from Ohio University, which is often referred to as the Harvard of sports management programs.

Athletically, Swofford followed in the footsteps of his older brother Jim, and played his collegiate football in the ACC. Whereas Jim played tackle for Duke from 1957 to 1959, John played quarterback and defensive back for North Carolina from 1969 to 1971. The 1970 team went to the Peach Bowl while the 1971 squad captured the school's first-ever outright ACC title and played in the Gator Bowl. Swofford was named to the ACC Academic Honor Roll and Who's Who in College Athletics.

Swofford began his administrative career when past ACC Commissioner and then University of Virginia Athletics Director Gene Corrigan hired him as the school's athletic ticket manager and assistant to the director of athletic facilities and finance in the fall of 1973.

He returned to Chapel Hill in May 1976 as assistant athletics director and business manager, handling all of the athletic department's business affairs. Swofford dropped the business manager title in January 1979, and was named assistant executive vice-president of the Educational Foundation.

Swofford became the school's athletic director on May 1, 1980. At the age of 31, he was the youngest major college Athletics Director in the nation at the time.

John and his wife Nora reside in Greensboro, N.C. Together they have three children, Autumn, 26, and Chad Swofford, 24, and Nora's daughter, Amie Williams, 22.







2003-2004 Season in Review

The 2003-04 season will go down as one of the most successful in Miami history. Behind a school-best 12-game win streak to open the season, the Hurricanes finished the year with an overall record of 22-7 on their way to their second consecutive appearance at the NCAA Tournament. The total number of wins marked only the eighth time in school history a UM team has won 20 or more games.

In their BIG EAST farewell tour, the Hurricanes finished fourth in the conference with an 11-5 record. They earned a first round bye in the BIG EAST Tournament for the first time since the 1997-98 season before falling in the quarterfinals to eventual BIG EAST Tournament Champion, Boston College.

The Season

The Hurricanes opened the season with back-to-back wins in Morehead, Kentucky at the Morehead State Tournament, downing host school Morehead State (93-54) and Eastern Kentucky (90-81) before returning to the state of Florida to upend South Florida (62-55).

Miami then headed west to take part in the Saint Mary's Thanksgiving Classic in Moraga, California. With wins over Weber State (82-60) and Bradley (70-52), UM extended the win streak to five games, matching the school record for consecutive wins to open the season that was last recorded during the 1989-90 campaign.

The Hurricanes returned to Coral Gables for the home opener against cross-town rival Florida International December 2 and recorded their school-record sixth consecutive win in a 78-58 decision over the Golden Panthers.

The first true test of the season would come ten days later when in-state rival Florida, who had won eight straight over the Hurricanes, made a trip to the Convocation Center. Miami would hold off the Gators, winning 80-75 behind a pair of free throws by Tamara James down the stretch.

UM extended the win streak to nine games following the Florida win with decisive victories over Dartmouth (74-53) and Richmond (80-73) in Coral Gables.

With a win over Toledo (68-57) in the opening game of the Gatorade Holiday Classic, Miami advanced to the championship game for a match-up with No. 24 Vanderbilt as UM hit the 10-win plateau on the season.

The nationally-ranked Commodores wouldn't pose a threat as the Hurricanes cruised to a 79-57 victory behind a career-best 28 points from Yalonda McCormick.

The win over Vanderbilt would lift the Hurricanes into the national spotlight as the Hurricanes broke into the top 25 polls for the first time since the 1992-93 season, debuting at the 24th spot in the AP poll and 25th in the USA Today/ESPN poll.

Riding an 11 game win streak, the 24th-ranked Hurricanes opened BIG EAST play with a 79-60 win over St. John's in Alumni Hall.

The win-streak would come to a close in a 58-55 loss at Villanova with the Wildcats holding UM to just 36 percent from the field.

Miami rebounded from the loss to Villanova with a win over No. 20 Boston College (70-66) as McCormick once again came through, hitting 14 of her 23 points against the Eagles in the final six minutes.

The Hurricanes escaped a two overtime nail biter at home against Georgetown (57-55), but at a price when James, UM's leading scorer, left in the second overtime with a strained neck after hitting her head on the floor.

The 21st-ranked Hurricanes, playing without the injured James, then went on to topple Pittsburgh (77-68) on the play of Shaquana Wilkins who posted her fifth double-double of the season with 20 points and a career-high 15 rebounds before handling Providence (86-67).

Miami, ranked 17th in the country with an overall record of 16·1, welcomed BIG EAST rival Notre Dame to the Convocation Center for a January 28 match-up. The Irish would outscore UM 33-22 in the second half of a 59-50 decision to hand the Hurricanes their second loss of the

Miami would then drop the next two games, falling to Rutgers (76-69) and to fourth-ranked UConn (83-65).

The Hurricanes ended the three-game skid with a win over St. John's (85-74) before moving on to win games over Virginia Tech (65-56), Syracuse (85-65) and Seton Hall (81-43) to improve to 20-4 overall with a 9-4 record in conference play.

Then for the second time in the season, Notre Dame snapped the Hurricanes win streak, forcing a season-high 37 turnovers by Miami in the 93-58 loss.

UM closed out the season with wins over West Virginia (82-74) and Providence (81-62) to wrap up the regular season with an overall record of 22-5 while finishing fourth in the BIG EAST with an 11-5 record in conference play.

Seeded fourth in the BIG EAST Tournament, Miami drew a first-round bye for the first time since the 1997-98 season. The Hurricanes would fall to Boston College (65-53), who would eventually go on to down UConn to claim the BIG EAST Championship title.

Following the BIG EAST Tournament, the Hurricanes made their second consecutive and ninth overall appearance at the NCAA Tournament after receiving an at-large bid to the 2004 'Big Dance.' The Hurricanes joined seven other schools from the BIG EAST in the tournament field, marking only the second time in NCAA history that one conference has sent eight teams to the tournament.

Miami drew a No. 5 seed in the West Regional of the NCAA Tournament for a match-up with No. 12 seeded Maryland in the first round.

Leading the Terrapins 32-23 with less than six minutes remaining in the first half, the Hurricanes' suffered a setback when Chanivia Broussard left the game after injuring her knee in a pileup under the basket as Maryland took a 38-37 leading heading into the half.

Broussard would return in the second half and lead the Hurricanes with 22 points and 11 rebounds but Miami fell short as Maryland held on to the 86-85 win to put an end to the Hurricanes' accomplished season.

CORAL GABLES, Fla.—The University of Miami women's basketball team is off to its best start in school history, with a 78-58 win over cross-town rival Florida International University Tuesday night, the Hurricanes improve to 6-0 overall.

Miami started the 1979-80 and 1989-90 seasons on five-game winning streaks, the best start prior to the win over FIU.

The Hurricanes snapped a three-game losing streak to FIU (1-4) to earn its 30th all-time victory over the Golden Panthers. UM leads the all-time series 30-19.

Miami opened the game on a 20-4 run and maintained the double-digit lead the entire first half. UM owned a 42-27 lead at halftime shooting 56.3 percent from the field, compared to 39.3 percent for the Golden Panthers.

FIU came out and forced seven Miami turnovers in the first eight minutes of the second half sparking an 18-5 run, cutting UM's lead to two (47-45) with 12 minutes remaining in the game.

The Hurricanes built the lead back as the Golden Panthers only managed to score eight points over the next 10 minutes of play. UM took advantage and went on a 25-8 run to taking a 19-point (72-53) lead with two minutes left in the game.

Miami shot over 50 (52.5) percent in the game for the third time this season and forced a season-high 27 opponent turnovers. FIU shot 40.4 percent for the game.

CORAL GABLES, Fla.—Junior Yalonda McCormick (Miami, Fla.) scored a career-high 28 points to lead the Miami women's basketball team to a 79-57 victory over No. 24 Vanderbilt claiming its fourth straight Gatorade Holiday Classic championship title Monday night in Coral Gables, Fla.

The Hurricanes improve to 11-0, while Vanderbilt drops to 10-1 on the season.

Miami off to its best start in school history extends its win streak to 11, the longest streak since the 1991-92 season. The Hurricanes won 30 in a row and advanced to the NCAA Sweet Sixteen during that season.

Shaquana Wilkins recorded her fourth double-double of the season with 16 points and 10 rebounds.

Tamara James (Dania, Fla.) averaged 14.0 points in the tournament and was named to the all-tournament team for the second year in a row.

The Hurricanes opened the game on a 6-0 run and never lost the lead. UM led 38-29 at halftime.

The Commodores cut Miami's lead to five (40-35) with 17:47 remaining in the game. McCormick hit a jumper to spark a 10-2 run giving Miami a double-digit lead (50-37) with 14 minutes left in the game.

Miami would not lose the double-digit lead owning its largest lead of 28 points (79-51) with just less than four minutes to play.

Vanderbilt ended the game on a 6-0 run but was unable to overcome the deficit as Miami evened the all-time series one-all with the Commodores.

STORRS, Conn. (AP) - Despite a season-high 33 turnovers, No. 4 Connecticut defeated No. 22 Miami 83-65 on Sunday in its first game since beating top-ranked Tennessee on Thursday.

"They were keyed up to play well," Auriemma said. "We ran some great stuff on offense. It wasn't anything I didn't expect. What I didn't expect was we either cross halfcourt and score or cross halfcourt and throw it away."

Miami's quickness and UConn's errant passes resulted in 21 steals for the Hurricanes, who still were unable to stop Diana Taurasi and Ashley Battle.

Chanivia Broussard led Miami with 20 points. Tamara James scored 19 and had seven steals. The Hurricanes have lost three straight.

The Huskies dominated inside, outrebounding Miami 46-30 and outscoring the Hurricanes 42-26 in the paint. When their offense was clicking, the Huskies scored on crisp backdoor cuts and finished strong off fastbreaks.

"I think we were in a little bit of a hurry to hurry up and get it done," Auriemma said. "It was good for us to see that's not us. We can't play quicker than a quick team. That's not our style."

UConn was up by 25 early in the second half. Battle had six points in a 9-0 second half run, capped by Willnett Crocket's layup that gave UConn its largest lead at 58-33.

But the Hurricanes continued to press late in the game and took advantage of UConn turnovers, cutting the lead to 14 against the UConn reserves with under three minutes to play. The starters returned and the Huskies regained control.

"In the beginning of the game we were patient and did a lot of good things," Miami coach Ferne Labati said. "We ended up taking quick shots and bad shots. (UConn) controlled the boards from the get-go. That was a major factor."

Miami scored 20 points off UConn turnovers while the Huskies converted Miami's 23 miscues into 24 points.

The 33 turnovers were the most for UConn since the 1994-95 season.

It All Started in 1972-73

Miami's basketball heritage began with the 1972-73 season and consisted of a team with no scholarship athletes and no indoor facilities with which to play. It is rumored that during the early years one game was actually rained out.

Miami's first women's basketball game took place January 9, 1973 as the Hurricanes, and first-year head coach Barry Schimer, lost 37-21 to Miami-Dade North. Miami would bounce back and record its first victory three days later, a 36-26 win over Broward Central on January 12, 1973. Miami would finish its inaugural season with a 2-6 record.

It wouldn't take long for Miami to record its first winning season as the Hurricanes won their first four games, all on the road, and finished 6-3 in 1973-74. The 1974-75 season brought much of the same as Schimer led the Hurricanes to an 8-6 record, their second consecutive winning season.

That season would be one of firsts for Miami who won its first two games ever at the Florida AlAW State Championships defeating Florida A&M, 59-38, and Florida Tech, 53-32. The Hurricanes also faced Florida and Florida State for the first time losing to the Gators, 67-32, and to the Seminoles, 59-45. The 1974-75 season would also be one of endings as Schimer stepped down as coach with a career record of 16-15.

Miami moved indoors to the William Lane Campus Sports and Recreation Center in 1975-76 as Shula Feuer took over as head coach. The William A. Lane Center was made possible by a voluntary increase in the Student Activity Fee and a grant of \$1.2 million dollars from the Dunspaugh-Dalton Foundation. The structure was named in the memory of William A. Lane, Sr., a long-time Miami attorney, the first president of the Foundation and staunch supporter of UM.

The Hurricanes lost their opening game of the 1975-76 season falling to Marymack (M0) 63-53. In their next game however Miami exploded for 100 points in a 100-20 win over Homestead Airforce Base. The 80 point margin of victory is still a standing UM record. Miami finished at 7-13 that season and after a 9-11 record the next year Feuer stepped down as head coach of the Hurricanes.

The 1977-78 team went 8-8 under the guidance of 26 year old coach Yvette McKinney. Miami was led by Wendy Foote, Miami's first 1,000-point scorer, who averaged a school-record 25.2 points per game as a senior. She ended her UM career as the school-record holder for career field goals (490), free throws (194) and points (1,174).

In the summer of 1979, Foote became the first University of Miami basketball player since Rick Barry to sign a professional contract when she signed to play with New Orleans Pride of the Women's Professional Basketball League.

Lin Dunn Raises UM to the Next Level

In 1978, the University made a move that would forever change women's basketball at Miami. That year, UM hired Lin Dunn as UM's fourth-ever head coach. Dunn, who left the University of Mississippi to come to Coral Gables, was also named an Assistant Director of Athletics upon her arrival. Dunn would coach the Hurricanes for nine seasons racking up 149 wins and leading Miami to a school-record six consecutive winning seasons, two 20-win seasons, one Florida AlAW State Championship and two berths in the AlAW Region III Tournament.

Following a 10-13 season in 1978-79, Dunn upgraded the Hurricanes schedule taking on national powers Oral Roberts, Kansas and Alabama. The 1979-80 season also marked the first time that women's basketball was given scholarships (seven). Dunn finished her second season with an 18-16 record and clearly had the Hurricane program heading in the right direction.

Miami gained three additional scholarships for the 1980-81 season, raising the number of scholarship athletes to 10, and the Hurricanes went on to one of the most successful season's in school history. Miami recorded the first 20-win season in school history going 24-18, setting a new school-record for victories in a season.

The Hurricanes, led by Sylvia Wilson, Dottie Richardson and Robin Harmony, went on to win the school's first Florida AIAW State Championship and earn a trip to the AIAW Region III Tournament.

Miami entered the State Championships seeded fourth and easily dispatched fifth-seeded South Florida, 69-47, in the opening round. Miami's semifinal opponent was top-seed Florida State, whom UM had never beaten in 11 previous tries. The Hurricanes went on to beat the Seminoles, 79-70, and advance to the finals where they would take on Florida for the championship.

In the finals, Wilson poured in 18 points and Harmony added 16 as the Hurricanes went on to win the State Championship defeating the Gators, 65-59.


Following the State Championships, Miami would travel to Hattiesburg, MS to play Southern Mississippi in their first appearance at the AIAW Region III Tournament. Despite 21 points from Harmony, the Hurricanes fell, 80-75, to USM ending Miami's record breaking season.

The start of the 1981-82 season marked another first for the basketball program as it had a full complement of 12 scholarships. With the added scholarships, the Hurricanes continued their tremendous success under Dunn recording a 19-10 record and earning its second-consecutive berth to the AIAW Region III Championships.

Despite losing to Florida State, 84-80, in the semifinals of the Florida AIAW State Championships, the Hurricanes are invited to the AIAW Region III

Tournament for the second-consecutive season. Once again UM's season ends in the first round with a 81-66 loss to national power Delta State. Wilson scored 22 points and grabbed 14 rebounds in her final game, finishing her career as Miami's then-all-time leader in points (1,713) and rebounds (1,115). Wilson still remains the only UM women's basketball player ever to surpass both 1,000 points and 1.000 rebounds for her career.

Dedicated in September 1982, the \$139 million dollar James L. Knight Center/Miami Convention Center became the second home of Miami basketball playing host to the Women's Court Classic.

The 1982-83 season was a wild ride for the Hurricanes who finished 14-13, which included five straight losses to end the season and despite outstanding performances by Harmony and Donna Mapp.

On December 2, 1982, Harmony recorded a school-record 14 assists in a 89-73 loss to Florida International. The record still stands going into the 1998-99 season. Mapp also set a school-record during the 1982-83 season pulling down 24 rebounds as Miami defeated Stetson, 83-61, on February 5, 1983. Mapp's record would be broken the following season.

Miami returned to its winning form in 1983-84 recording a 19-12 record. The season was full of milestones as Harmony became the third UM women's basketball player to score 1,000 career points with a 13-point effort against Florida on December 11, 1983 and Dunn won her 100th game at Miami, 63-58, over Rutgers on February 4, 1984.

The season began with a 76-56 win over Florida Memorial. The game was a coming out of sorts for junior college transfer Cordelia Fulmore who scored a team-high 26 points and grabbed 10 rebounds to lead Miami to the victory in her first game as a Hurricane.

Later in the season, Fulmore recorded 23 points and a school-record 25 rebounds as Miami lost 88-79 to Georgia State at the Alaska Northern Lights Invitational in Anchorage, AK. It was the second 20-point, 20-rebound game of the season for Fulmore who remains the only UM women's basketball player to record 20 points and 20 rebounds in a single game twice.

Dunn recorded her second 20-win season in 1984-85 as Miami finished 21-7. Following a slow start, Miami would string together 12 straight wins which included victories over Florida State, Michigan State, Purdue, St. Joseph's and Missouri. Miami would go on to lose four of its next seven games before ending the season winning its final five games.

Fulmore became the fourth women's basketball player to score 1,000 career points on February 9, 1985 when she scored 25 points to lead Miami to a 75-62 victory over Texas A&M.

Miami concluded the season with its fifth consecutive victory, a 81-73 win over Florida International. Maria Rivera scored a team-high 22 points to lead the Hurricanes and set a freshman scoring record with 523 points.

Disappointingly the Hurricanes were passed over for postseason, despite winning 21 games, by both the NCAA and NWIT.

The 1985-86 season saw the resurrection of men's basketball at Miami and the completion of the Knight Sports Complex on the Coral Gables campus. Dedicated on November 12, 1985, the new building was made possible through a gift from the James L. Knight Charitable Trust. The facility was built to house the offices for the men's basketball staff, while also serving as a home court for most of the Hurricane women's basketball games.

Dunn's school-record string of six consecutive winning seasons came to an end in 1985-86 as young and inexperienced Hurricane squad struggled through one of the most difficult schedules in Miami history en route to a dismal 9-18 sea-

The following season, Dunn put together another grueling schedule in 1985-86 that consisted of eight teams that finished in the previous season's Top-20.

The Hurricanes dropped 10 games to likes of national powers Illinois, Mississippi, Louisiana State, Old Dominion, Florida, Louisiana Tech, Auburn, Kentucky, Iowa (twice) and #1-ranked Texas.

Despite the difficult season, All-America candidate Rivera continued to shine by averaging 21.4 points per game and surpassed the 1,000-point plateau in only her second season when she scored 30 points in a 82-59 win over South Florida on February 15, 1986.

For the second-consecutive season Miami struggled, losing six of its first eight games and finished the season at 15-15. Once again, Rivera dominated by averaging 20.9 points per game.

On March 7, 1987, Rivera scored 26 points in a 76-72 win over Tulane and became UM's all-time leading scorer (1,716 points), surpassing former teammate Cordelia Fulmore (1,713 points).

Two days later on March 9, 1987, Dunn would coach in her final game at Miami as the Hurricanes defeated Florida Atlantic, 59-43. Dunn left Miami to take over the head coaching duties at Purdue, finishing her tenure with a 149-119

At a Crossroads

With Dunn's departure, assistant coach Ken Patrick took over as interim head coach.

The Hurricanes went 14-13 that season, once again taking on some of the best teams in the nation. Miami opened the season on a roll winning five of its first six games. The Hurricanes then stumbled losing its next five games to national powers Virginia, Auburn, Illinois, Notre Dame and Old Dominion. Miami then regrouped taking seven of its last nine games including an upset 75-69 win at perennial power North Carolina.

The season was highlighted by Rivera, who on January 27, 1988, became the first women's basketball player in Miami history to surpass 2,000 career points. One month later she would set the UM standard for points in a game when she poured in 41 points in a 103-87 victory over Central Florida. In that contest she broke Rick Barry's school-record of 2,298 points.

Rivera ended her stellar career at UM with a team-high 20 points as the Hurricanes defeated South Florida, 76-60. She would leave UM as its all-time leading scorer (2,358 points) as well as the school's all-time leader in steals (382).

The Labati Era Begins

Ferne Labati was appointed the University of Miami's head women's basketball coach on March 30, 1988.

In previous 10 seasons at Miami Labati has done that and then some, guiding the Hurricanes to five 20-win seasons, one 30-win season, four NCAA Tournament berths, one National Women's Invitational Tournament, two BIG EAST regular season titles, one BIG EAST division title and two BIG EAST tournament championships.

In June of 1988 the \$52 million dollar, 15,862 seat, Miami Arena opened its doors and has played host to a total of eight UM women's basketball games. Miami defeated Florida, 75-67, in its inaugural game in the Arena and has gone on to post a perfect 8-0 record at that venue.

In her first season as head coach, Labati led the Hurricanes to a 21-8 record in 1988-89, only the third 20-win season in UM history, and its first trip to the NCAA Tournament.

Labati opened her UM career on November 25, 1988 with a 90-71 win over S.W. Missouri State. The game was also the first for Frances Savage, a proposition 48 casualty in 1987-88, who scored a game-high 32 points and pulled down nine rebounds in the win. Savage would go on to score a total of 649 points that season, the most by any women's basketball player in their first season.

The team's success in 1988-89 brought them an NCAA bid for the first time in school history. Miami traveled to Stillwater, OK to take on Oklahoma State. The Hurricanes would get 21 points apiece from Savage and Elaine Harlow, but it wouldn't be enough to overcome a 34-point effort from OSU's Clinette Jordan as the Cowboys defeated Miami, 93-69.

The Hurricanes returned the next season and finished 25-6, setting a school record for wins in a season. The 20-win season was the second consecutive for Miami under Labati and marked the first time in the school history that a women's basketball team recorded back-to-back 20-win campaigns.

Miami was led by Savage, who set some records of her own in 1989-90. Savage averaged 23.6 points per game and set a new standard for points in a season with 733. On January 13, 1990, Miami defeated Stetson, 88-69, as Savage scored a season-high 37 points and become the seventh women's basketball player in Miami history to score 1,000 career points. She accomplished the feet in only 45 games becoming the quickest women to 1,000 points in UM history.

Despite the outstanding season Miami was not granted a bid to the NCAA Championships. Instead, the Hurricanes were offered a bid to the National Women's Invitational Tournament in Amarillo, TX.

On March 22, 1990, Miami won its first postseason game ever with an 85-83 win over Illinois State. Harlow led Miami with 27 points while Savage added 26 points and 11 rebounds.

The next day against Kentucky, Savage poured in 24 points and grabbed 12 rebounds but it wasn't enough to overcome the Wildcats balanced attack in a 80-68 Kentucky victory. Miami's season ended on March 24, 1990 with a 82-80 heartbreak loss to UNC-Charlotte.

Prior to joining the BIG EAST, Miami played for one year in the New South Women's Athletic Conference in 1990-91. The Hurricanes played that season without the services of its All-American Frances Savage who went down with a torn lateral meniscus in her left knee during the second game of the season.

The Hurricanes went on to record their third consecutive 20-win season finishing with a 20-10 record including a 9-3 record in NSWAC play. The Hurricanes would also go on to win the conference tournament that season.

Usher in the BIG EAST and the "Dream Season"

Miami officially accepted a bid to become the 10th member of the BIG EAST Conference, beginning with the 1991-92 season, on October 10, 1990.

Also called the "Dream Season", UM's first season in the BIG EAST turned out to be the greatest in school history. The season started and ended with a loss, but in between the Hurricanes put together 30-straight wins, won the BIG EAST regular season title, going undefeated (18-0) in conference play, won The BIG EAST tournament championship, advanced to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament and finished with a top-10 national ranking.

UM's season-opening 71-69 overtime loss to FSU on November 23, 1991 would mark the Hurricanes last loss prior to the start of the 30-game win streak, 124 total days.

The first of the 30 wins occurs against state-rival Florida, with a 95-75 win in the home opener at the Knight Sports Complex on December 1, 1991. Savage scores 31 points in her first start of the season. The game was dedicated to an ailing Walt Kichefski, former UM football coach and renowned "Gator-Hater". "Coach K" was to be the honorary coach for this game but was too ill to attend.

The season would be dedicated to "Coach K" following his passing later in the season

In such a tremendous season, a major event took place in Coral Gables as current UM head coach Ferne Labati overcame a second-half deficit to defeat former UM coach Lin Dunn and her Purdue Boilermakers, 65-63, on December 19, 1991. It was also the first win ever for the UM program over a top-10 ranked team.

Four days later, Miami enters the Associated Press poll tied for 25th with Long Beach State and SW Missouri State. It is UM's first appearance in the AP poll since January, 1985. The Hurricanes would later debut in the USA Today poll in early January.

The 'Canes also started conference play on a high-note with a 78-59 defeat of Boston College on January 3, 1992, the first of 21 BIG EAST wins for UM that season

After learning of its move to a school-record No. 19 in the national polls, Miami wins at Providence, 87-83 and sets a school-record with its 13th straight victory.

February would bring even more success for the Hurricanes as they broke into the nation's Top 10 on February 3, 1992 at No. 9 in both polls.

The inaugural BIG EAST season reached a pinnacle on February 21, 1992 as UM clinches the BIG EAST title with a 75-59 win over Connecticut in front of 6.039

On February 23, 1992, Savage would score her 2,000th-point in a 79-66 victory over Syracuse in just her 87th career game.

Five seniors - Merren Armour, Vicki Bowers, Sherri Eyer, Jeannie Hebert and Frances Savage - take a final bow on March 1, 1992 after a smoke-filled entrance in front of a record crowd of 1,617 at the Knight Sports Complex as the Hurricanes closed out the regular season undefeated in the BIG EAST, the first undefeated season in BIG EAST history, with an 84-67 win against Villanova.

UM moves up to No. 7 in the national polls the very next day, while Savage is named one of five finalists for the women's College Player of the Year. That same week Savage would earn BIG EAST Player of the Year, while Labati was named Coach of the Year. Savage and Plowden are also named to the All-BIG EAST First Team.

On March 9, 1992, UM defeats Connecticut, 56-47, in front of 5,047 at Gampel Pavilion to win the BIG EAST title. Savage was named Tournament MVP while Plowden and Hebert were selected to the All-Tournament team.

Sixth-ranked Miami earns the second-seed and a first-round bye in the East Regional when the NCAA announces the pairings for the 48-team women's tournament on March 15, 1992.

Two days later Sports Illustrated announces Frances Savage as its Women's Basketball Player of the Year.

Hebert and Savage both score over 20 points as UM defeated North Carolina 86-72 and advance to the Sweet Sixteen in Charlottesville, VA on March 21, 1992. The second-round game was a reported sell-out in the first three hours of ticket sales.

The "Dream Season" would come to an end as third-seeded Vanderbilt hands UM a 77-67 loss.

Although the team suffered a defeat to end the season, the 30-2 year would end on a high note as Savage was named to the prestigious Kodak All-America

Miami Wins Back-to-Back Titles

Even with the graduation of Savage and career assist leader Hebert, the Hurricanes continued their winning ways in 1992-93 finishing 24-7 and taking their second-consecutive BIG EAST regular season and tournament titles. The 20-win season was Miami's fifth consecutive under Labati and set a school record for consecutive 20-win seasons.

The Hurricanes' opening game of 1992-93 was one for the record books as Miami won its 300th game in the program's history with a 94-37 thrashing of Florida Atlantic on December 6, 1992. Three days later on December 9, Plowden became the ninth women's basketball player in UM history to score 1,000 career points as Miami rolled to a 80-63 win over Appalachian State.

Miami ended the regular season with a 77-65 win over Pittsburgh to clinch a share of its second consecutive regular season title with Georgetown. The BIG EAST Tournament was all Miami as the Hurricanes swept to the championship beating all three of their opponents by an average of over 20 points per game.

In the tournament final against Providence, Miami received a team-high 24 points from freshman point guard Holly Rilinger, and 19 points and 17 rebounds from Plowden as the Hurricanes knocked off the Lady Friars, 77-56, in Providence. Plowden was named the Tournament's Most Outstanding Performer while Rilinger and Carla Harris were named to the All-Tournament team.

The tournament championship guaranteed the Hurricanes a return trip to the NCAA Tournament and Miami hosted St. Peter's on March 17, 1993 in the opening round of the East Regional. Della Wilson led Miami with 21 points as the Hurricanes advanced to the second-round with a 61-44 win.

Miami's season would end three days later in Bowling Green, KY as Western Kentucky caught fire in the second-half hitting 62% of their shots to pull away and knock off the Hurricanes, 78-63.

The summer of 1993 was a joyous one for Labati, who was awarded on June 21, 1993, the first multi-year contract given to a coach of a women's sport in UM history.

"This new contract is in recognition of Ferne's tremendous accomplishments as the coach and leader of our women's basketball program for the last five years," Athletic Director Paul Dee said in the announcement. "The success achieved by her teams both on and off the court contributed greatly to the university's decision."

Injuries, Natural Disasters the Hurricanes are Back on **Track**

Following two injury plagued seasons and one Hurricane Andrew, the Hurricanes earn a share of the 1995-96 BIG EAST title. The trophy means more as UM had recorded 10-17 and 11-16 overall records from 1993-1995.

The 1995-96 season saw the addition of Notre Dame, Rutgers and West Virginia as full-time conference members which began the start of divisional play. The BIG EAST was separated into two divisions, the

BE 6 and BE 7.

UM began the 1995-96 season healthy for the first time in three seasons and difference showed as Miami opened the season winning five of its first seven games. The Hurricanes slumped following the holiday break but caught fire at the end of the year winning seven of its last 11 regular season games, including a 67-60 win over Seton Hall in the season finale, en route to a share of the BIG EAST 7 Division title.

The season was highlighted by Ferne Labati's 150th win at UM. The victory came on January 25, 1996 as Jennifer Jordan, 26 points, led four Hurricanes in double figures in a 77-58 win over West Virginia. The 150th victory for Labati moved her into first-place on UM's career-wins list ahead of the legendary Lin

Miami embarked on the 1996-97 season with high expectations as four

starters returned from a team that won seven of its final 11 regular-season games the year before on its way to a share of the BIG EAST 7 division title.

Even before the season began, the Hurricanes would go from one of the most experienced teams in the BIG EAST to one of the youngest as starters Jordan and Cassaundra Wimes were lost prior to the season's first game.

On top of the early setbacks, Miami would have to play one of the toughest schedules in team history. The 1996-97 season saw seven UM opponents finish among the final USA Today/CNN Top-25 coaches poll, including #2 Old Dominion, #4 Notre Dame, #5 Connecticut, #6 Florida and #8 Alabama.

Miami struggled early but rallied to win seven of its final 10 games, advance to the semifinals of the BIG EAST tournament and finish with a respectable 15-14 overall record.

Several Hurricanes reached milestones that season as Desma Thomas broke the school record for career three-point baskets against Oral Roberts on December 19, 1997. Thomas would later become the 10th women's basketball player in UM history to eclipse 1,000 career points. A week later, Octavia Blue would join her on that list as UM's 11th 1,000-point scorer.

The season's biggest milestone was reached on February 2, 1997 when Miami defeated Villanova 70-56 giving Ferne Labati her 300th career victory.

The 1996-97 season saw the emergence of two more players as Gina Graziani led the BIG EAST in assists, while Kym Hope would earn the conference's Most Improved Player award.

Graziani shattered both the Miami (198) and BIG EAST (143) freshman records for assists in a season. She would become the first freshman in BIG EAST history to lead the league in assists as well as finish the season ranked sixth

nationally in this category.

Miami's defense was the key to the Hurricanes' back-to-back winning

Hope stepped in for the redshirted Jordan at center and quickly became the team's most consistent performer. She averaged 12.8 points as well as a teambest 8.1 rebounds per contest on the way to the BIG EAST Most Improved Player honor.

The women's basketball program received another honor when on April 10. 1997, Associate Head Coach Robin Harmony became the first women's basketball player in UM history to be inducted into the University of Miami Sports Hall of

UM Returns to NCAA's

The 1997-98 season returned four starters in All-BIG EAST Preseason First Team selections Octavia Blue and Kym

Hope, plus the return of Cassaundra Wimes and BIG EAST assists leader Gina Graziani. The depth was especially balanced as Shannon Drury, Beth Barnhart and MeChelle Murray all recorded starts throughout the season.

The 1997-98 season saw the Hurricanes finish with a 19-10 overall record and an impressive 13-5 mark in BIG EAST competition, both five-year highs. In addition, UM returned to post-season play at the 1998 NCAA Division I Women's Basketball Tournament and were one of three teams in the 13-team conference to receive a first round bye at the 1998 BIG EAST Women's Basketball Tournament.

On the local scene, the Hurricanes performance at the Knight Sports Complex became one of the more exciting events that the athletic program had to offer as Miami posted a five-year high 12-1 home record, including a 10-game win streak going into the 1998-99 season.

Blue was selected in the second round, 15th overall, by the Los Angeles Sparks, while earning BIG EAST First Team honors along with Hope. Hope led the league in rebounding and double-doubles. Blue placed second in scoring followed by Hope, while Graziani once again led the league in assists.

Graziani would finish No. 5 in the nation as she became just the second player ever at UM to record over 200 assists in one season with 210.

The first half of the season began auspiciously as the 'Canes marched out to a 9-7 record by midseason.

Miami's amazing turnaround began on January 17, 1998 as UM defeated St. John's 72-60 at the Knight Sports Complex for its fifth straight home win. That win would ignite a second half surge by Labati's squad as they went 9-2 heading into the BIG EAST Tournament.

In perhaps the Hurricanes biggest win of the season, Blue made the first of two free throw attempts with no time left on the clock to lift UM to a 77-76 over Notre Dame, a participant in the 1997 Final Four, on February 3, 1998. Blue

grabbed a rebound as time was expiring and was fouled as she went back up for the put-back.

February was also highlighted by the team's impressive 6-1 record and a 90-69 road win over West Virginia to end the regular season at 18-8.

After finishing with a 13-5 BIG EAST record, the team's best conference mark since the 1992-93 season, the Hurricanes were seeded No. 3 in the post-season

The host-school, Rutgers, finished with a 14-4 conference mark to earn the Big East 7 division title and No. 2 behind top-seeded Connecticut. After receiving a first-round bye that goes along with finishing among the top three in the conference, Miami faced Georgetown in the quarterfinals.

Graziani paced the 'Canes with a team-high 19, while Blue added 18 in UM's 81-66 win over Georgetown. Hope notched her 14th double-double of the season with 14 points and 11 rebounds against the Hoyas.

Against Rutgers in the semifinals, Hope led all scoring and rebounding with 23 points and 12 boards for her league-high 15th double-double of the season. Despite Hope's efforts and 15 points by Blue, the Hurricanes fell to the home team 81-62. Following the tournament Hope was named to the BIG EAST All-Tournament team.

After a four-year absence, the Hurricanes returned to NCAA post-season play for the first time since the 1992-93 season. The 11th seeded Hurricanes played 6th seeded and 14th ranked Clemson in the Midwest Regional at Ruston, LA on March 14, 1998.

The Tigers, who were ahead by just two points after the first half, pulled away in the second for a 60-49 win over Miami. Drury had one of her best outings of the season, as she led the 'Canes with 13 points, including three 3-pointers. The Hurricanes were just one of 20 schools whose men's and women's teams were invited to NCAA post-season tournament play.

Postseason Play Continues

The 1998-99 season returned two starters in All-BIG EAST Preseason First Team selection Kym Hope, BIG EAST assists leader Gina Graziani. Add that to the return of seniors Jennifer Jordan. Beth Barnhart and Cassuandra Wimes and the season was filled with expectation. The Hurricanes finished the 1998-99 season with an overall mark of 15-14 and a conference record of 9-9. UM finished the conference race in a tie for sixth place, advancing to the BIG EAST tournament quarterfinals. UM was then awarded an invitation to play Rice in the Women's NIT.

On the homefront, women's hoops continued to draw a loyal crowd, posting a 10-4 record at the Knights Sports Complex.

Seniors, Hope, Jordan, Barnhart and Wimes spent their final season donning

the Hurricane uniform and left their mark in the record books. Hope, Jordan and Wimes became the 12th, 13th and 14th players, respectively to surpass the 1,000 point plateau. Hope was named to the All-BIG FAST first team while classmate Jordan earned third-team honors. Graziani ranked third in the conference with 153 assists in 24 appearances.

The first contest of the 1998-99 season was at then No. 25 Florida International. A two-point Hurricane win (67-65) was sealed with two Hope foul shots with 56 seconds remaining on the game clock. The win was not only the first of the season, but also marked UM's second consecutive win at FIU's Golden Panther Arena and snapped FIU's 16-game home winning streak. UM continued on the road and suffered losses at Tulane and

Florida before rebounding vs. Coppin State at home. The 'Canes pulled out a 97-68 romp by six double-digit scorers; Hope (21), Jordan (20), Shannon Drury (14), Wimes (11), freshman Kathryn Fowler (11) and Graziani (10). Graziani managed the double-double with 12 assists.

The win over Coppin State began a six-game homestand as well as a six-game winning streak. UM racked up wins over previously unbeaten Boston College as well as Syracuse, Hampton, Florida Atlantic and Oklahoma. Unfortunately, the Hurricanes fell victim to BIG EAST foe St. John's, 76-74, in overtime. A win over Pittsburgh (75-60) was sandwiched with a loss to then No. 13 Rutgers (68-54) only three days later. The 'Canes returned home and fell victim to Western Kentucky (75-61). It seemed bad luck was following UM as it then fell to Pittsburgh, 63-61, after defeating the Panthers just five days earlier. The Hurricanes responded with two wins. The first came over Providence (85-63) with Jordan recording a career-high 31 points while the second came vs. then No. 21 Boston College (66-53). Jordan and Hope led the scoring assault with 26 and 24 points apiece. Jordan was honored as BIG EAST Player of the Week for her performance against both teams.

The celebration didn't last long as the women then lost five of six league contests in the next three weeks. The only bright spot was a 98-73 win over West Virginia. Hope managed a double-double of 33 points and 10 rebounds. The win marked head coach Ferne Labati's 200th win at the University of Miami and the 98 points scored by the Hurricanes also marked a program-high for points in BIG EAST action. UM went .500 for the remainder of the season winning three of six games. The three wins were consecutive and came over Georgetown (81-62), Seton Hall (66-52) and St. John's (83-51). The wins over the Hoyas and SJU avenged earlier losses in the season to both teams.

The BIG EAST tournament was slated to begin on February 27 and matched up No.7 seed Miami with No. 10 seed West Virginia. Hope's double-double of 29 points and 14 rebounds led the Hurricanes along with the similar feat by Graziani who finished with 10 points and 11 assists. Wimes hit for 20 points and with that effort surpassed 1.000 career points.

The quarterfinal round pitted then No. 7 Rutgers vs. the Miami Hurricanes.Rutgers defense, rated No. 2 nationally, proved too much for the Hurricanes as the Scarlet Knights ran away with a 79-53 win. The 'Canes were led by Hope and Graziani who scored 11 points apiece.

A trip to Houston, Texas was in the cards for the Hurricanes as well as a match-up with Rice in the first round of the Women's National Invitational Tournament. UM held a 1-0 advantage against the Owls winning the only prior contest between the two schools. That win came during the 1982-83 season. The Owls were able to even the score, defeating UM 65-58, despite a 22-point effort from Hope and 19 points from Wimes. The game marked UM's sixth postseason appearance and second straight after receiving the at-large bid in 1997-98.

The Rebuilding Begins

The 1999-2000 season marked a rebuilding period for the Hurricanes and head coach Ferne Labati. Miami suffered the loss of four starters from the 1998-99 NCAA tournament team, returning lone starter Gina Graziani for her senior cam-

The young Hurricane team finished with an overall mark of 14-15 and a conference record of 9-7. UM finished the conference race in a tie for sixth place. Miami was the No. six seed in the BIG EAST tournament by virtue of a tie with Pittsburgh and the result of their head-to-head competition. In the first round UM defeated Seton Hall before falling to Notre Dame in the quarterfinals.

On the homefront, women's hoops continued to draw a loyal crowd, posting a 9-7 record at Knight Sports Complex, UM was 4-6 on the road.

Graziani left her mark in the UM and BIG EAST record books. She led the team in assists the entire her entire four-year career. She now ranks first on UM's individual career list with 743 assists in her career. She is also the all-time BIG EAST assist leader with 474 assists. Sheila lames also made a move into the UM record books with 57 three-pointer in her career.

Miami opened the 1999-2000 season with a five-game homestand. The Hurricanes won three out of the five games with wins over Furman, Eastern Kentucky and Florida International. The two losses came at the hands of Florida and NCAA tournament team Tulane.

UM was .500 for the next nine games, beginning with a win on the road over Florida Atlantic, then a loss to North Carolina State. Things continued on the winloss path, the Hurricanes tallied wins over Brown, Temple, St. John's and Seton Hall, while suffering losses to Southern Methodist, Rutgers, and West Kentucky.

Miami's young talent was tested, as the Hurricanes fell into a five-game losing skid beginning with a two-point BIG EAST home loss to Georgetown. Losses to

Connecticut and Boston College followed.

The losing streak was snapped in Hurricanes style with a 20-point blowout on the road over West Virginia. UM suffered a loss to Connecticut on the road, before winning games against Providence and West Virginia. The two game win-streak was snapped by back-to-back losses to Georgetown and Notre

Miami finished up the season with conference wins over Syracuse and Pittsburgh.

The BIG EAST tournament was slated to begin on March 4


and matched up No. 6 seed Miami with No. 10 seed Seton Hall. Dalia Clarke's double-double with 14 points and 11 rebounds led the Hurricanes to a 69-42 win over Seton Hall. The Pirates shot just 17 percent in the first half and 24 percent for the game. Miami's 27-point winning margin was the second largest in conference history for a first-round game. UM led 31-19 at halftime in the victory.

The quarterfinal round pitted the No. 2 seed Notre Dame versus Miami. The Fighting Irish had handed UM losses in both previous meetings by a margin of 15 or more points in the regular season. Notre Dame proved too much for the Hurricanes winning again by a 15-point margin, with a 67-52 final score. The Fighting Irish donned a seven-point lead at halftime, but opened up the second half with a 7-2 run in the winning effort. Dalia Clarke led the Hurricanes with 16 points and nine boards. Clarke averaged 15 points and 10 rebounds in tournament action for LIM

The Rebuilding Continues

The 2000-01 season marked a rebuilding period for the Hurricanes and head coach Ferne Labati. The season was one of ups and downs for Miami, but finished with on a positive note for the following season.

The young Hurricane team finished with an overall mark of 13-15 and a conference record of 6-10. UM finished the conference race in a tie for eighth place.

On the homefront, women's hoops continued to draw a loyal crowd, posting an 11-6 record at Knight Sports Complex. UM was 2-8 on the road.

Miami opened the 2000-01 season in explosive fashion as five players scored in double digits en route to an 87-50 victory over Florida Atlantic in the season opener in Knight Sports Complex.

UM shot 44.2 percent from the field in the first half to build a 45-20 halftime lead and cruised from there.

Freshman Chanivia Broussard scored a game-high 18 points to lead the Miami to a 71-51 win over visiting St. Bonaventure putting the Hurricanes back on the winning path.

Miami opened BIG EAST play with defending National Champion Connecticut on Dec. 5. The Huskies overwhelmed Miami with their full-court pressure defense and fast-break offense in a 77-53 win.

UM lost back-to-back games as they fell at FIU 78-48 to the Golden Panthers. Once again Broussard would put Miami back on the winning path as she scored 14 points to lead the team to a 73-51 victory over visiting South Florida.

Sophomore Alicia Hartlaub scored 17 points en route to a 74-59 victory over visiting Kentucky.

The win marked the first win in school history over UK, and the first win over a Southeastern Conference school since the 1991-92 season.

The team took an unexpected fall to Fairfield University (67-55) at home. Miami fell to 4-4 overall at this point in the season but things would quickly change as the team earned a spot in the title game of the Gatorade Holiday Classic with a 70-61 victory over New Hampshire.

Dalia Clarke was named Most Valuable Player of the Gatorade Holiday Classic after leading Miami to a 64-51victory over Western Michigan to claim the championship title.

Miami had not won the tournament since the 1997-98 season.

James scored a career-high 28 points leading the Hurricanes to an 83-48 victory over visiting Radford.

Miami (7-4) extended its win streak to three in a row, the longest of the season. Its back to BIG EAST play for Miami as they fell on road at Virginia Tech 64-51. UM is now 7-5 overall and winless in conference play at 0-2.

Miami earns its first BIG EAST win at Boston College 65-59. Dalia Clarke scored a career-high of 24 points and 13 rebounds in the win. Clarke would lead Miami to its next conference win, a 67-51 victory over St. John's.

She scored 20 points and tallied 11 rebounds.

The Hurricanes were on the right track at 9-5 overall and 2-2 in conference.

Up next for UM was Providence at home, Miami led PC 7-1 all-time in Knight Sports Complex.

The Friars came out strong and upset the Hurricanes 77-60.

The loss would be the start of a five game losing spiral, falling in overtime to Western Kentucky (82-75) and at UConn for the second time this season (81-45).

UM then fell by two points in the final seconds of the game to nationally ranked Rutgers 39-37.

They would round out the losing streak in another disappointing loss to Pittsburgh in the final minute of the contest (84-74) after leading the entire game.

Now 9-10 overall and 2-6 in the BIG EAST, the Hurricanes rely on the talent of Clarke as she scored 16 points and grabbed 13 rebounds to lift Miami past Georgetown 52-46.

James earned her first double-double of the season with 17 points and a career-high 10 assists to lead the team to an 84-68 victory over visiting West Virginia.

James committed her second double-double of the season, scoring 18 points and grabbing a career-high 11 rebounds in 40 minutes of action as Miami fell to Seton Hall 69-61.

After the minor setback at Seton Hall the Hurricanes put themselves right back into it with back-to-back wins over St. John's (80-43) and Pittsburgh (96-69).

Miami closed out the regular season with three losses, falling 81-43 at No. 2-ranked Notre Dame, before losing back-to-back one point games.

UM fell at Syracuse 62-61 and to Villanova at home 60-59.

The 10th seeded Hurricanes faced the 7th seeded Boston College Eagles in the first round of the BIG EAST tournament in Storrs, Conn.

Miami fell 62-49 to BC to end its season.

Broussard who was named to the BIG EAST All-Rookie team led Miami with 20 points and nine rebounds.

The 2001-02 Season

Miami opened the season on a three-game winning steak; posting wins over Iona (71-52), Northwestern (86-69) and IUPUI (72-58).

The Hurricanes lost their next two games on the road, falling to South Florida (76-68) and Kentucky (60-57).

UM opened BIG EAST play with a win over West Virginia (69-53). The Hurricanes played No. 17 Texas in the Fab Four Orange Bowl Classic.Miami beat Texas (57-55) and tallied

its first win over a ranked opponent since its win over No. 21 Boston College during the 1998-99 season.

Miami continued on the winning path posting wins over Florida Atlantic (92-77), Lehigh (76-49) and Yale (75-46). Miami won the Gatorade Holiday Classic for the second season in a row beating Yale in the Championship game.

The Hurricanes had their five-game winning streak snapped by visiting Minnesota (80-65). Miami resumed BIG EAST play hosting defending national champion, Notre Dame. The Hurricanes fell to the Fighting Irish by four points, 69-65.

Miami went on to beat Rutgers (65-55) on the road for the first time since 1996.97

The Hurricanes lost the next two games, falling to West Virginia (57-52) and No. 1 Connecticut (96-50) on the road.

UM won its next four conference games, posting wins over Syracuse (75-71-OT), Seton Hall (56-54), St. John's (68-51) and Rutgers (65-55).

The Hurricanes hosted No. 24 Virginia Tech in its second matchup of the season. Miami went on to defeat its second ranked opponent, knocking off the Hokies (55-53).

UM went back on the road and fell to Providence (69-64). Miami returned home and closed out the regular season with a win over No. 18 Boston College (60-57).

With a fifth place finish in the BIG EAST Miami faced Georgetown in the first round of the tournament. Miami beat the Hovas 69-52. before facing the No. 4 seed Villanova.

The Hurricanes lost to the Wildcats 68-49.

Miami was invited to participate in the Women's National Invitational Tournament. Miami beat Georgia Tech 73-64 in the first

The Hurricanes closed out the season with an 83-76 loss to second-round opponent Houston.

Miami returns to the NCAA Tournament in 2002-03

The 2002-03 season marked one of great success and excitement for the Hurricanes. Miami finished the season 18-13 and made its first appearance in the NCAA Tournament since the 1997-98 season. Miami received an at-large bid into the NCAA's marking the first time in league history the BIG EAST sent seven teams to the 'Big Dance'.

The Hurricanes also moved into a new home playing in the Convocation Center on January 15, 2003. The \$48 million, three-story, 200,000 square foot facility seats 7,000. It features a state of the art locker room, lounge area, training room and

Miami finished seventh in the BIG EAST with a record of 8-8. UM advanced to the semifinals of the BIG EAST Tournament for the first time since the 1996-97 season. UM fell to No. 14 Villanova (65-59) who went on to beat No. 1 Connecticut in the BIG EAST finals.

Head coach Ferne Labati won her 400th career victory with a win over St. John's on Feb. 8, 2003. Labati became the 39th Division I head coach to reach the 400-win mark.

Freshman Tamara James stormed onto the BIG EAST scene, becoming the first freshman ever to lead the league in scoring with 21.0 points per game. She earned All-BIG EAST second team, freshman team and tournament team honors.

She was the highest scoring freshman in the nation, ranked 10th nationally. She earned Associated Press, WBCA/Kodak All-America Honorable Mention honors and was named to the Freshman All-America team by Full Court Press.

James earned BIG EAST Rookie of the week five times-the five times marked the most times a Miami player has earned the weekly honor.

Miami led the nation in steals averaging 14.8 steals per game. Meghan Saake ranked third in the nation averaging 4.0 steals per game.

Miami also ranked 15th in the nation in assists (18.0), 19th in blocked shots (5.0) and 24th in scoring offense (74.9).

The Hurricanes recorded top wins on the road over No. 16 Notre Dame (80-70) and No. 18 Rutgers (77-74).

Miami says farewell to the BIG EAST

In her 16th season at the helm of the University of Miami women's basketball program, head coach Ferne Labati led the 2003-04 Hurricanes to one of the most successful seasons in UM history and was named the 2004 Russell Athletic/WBCA Region I Coach of the Year.

The Hurricanes opened the season with a school-record 12-game win streak before going to finish with an overall record of 22-7 on their way to their second consecutive appearance at the NCAA Tournament. The total number of wins marked only the eighth time in school history and the first time since the 1992-93 season a UM team had won 20 or more games.

In their BIG EAST farewell tour, the Hurricanes finished fourth in the conference with an 11-5 record. They earned a first round bye in the BIG EAST Tournament for the first time since the 1997-98 season before falling in the guarterfinals to eventual BIG EAST Tournament Champion, Boston College.

Miami earned an at-large bid to the 2004 NCAA Tournament and drew the West Regional No. 5 seed. The Hurricanes were knocked out in the first round, losing to 12th-seeded Maryland, 86-85.

Sophomore Tamara James continued to make her mark in the Miami record book in 2003-04, becoming the 17th player and the fourth sophomore in UM history to reach 1,000 career points with a 26 point outing against Syracuse on February 18.

James also became the first player since the 1998-99 season to earn All-BIG EAST First Team honors after averaging 16.6 points and 4.6 rebounds per game.

Senior Chanivia Broussard, who averaged 15.2 points and 6.2 rebounds per game, earned All-BIG EAST Third Team accolades while junior Yolanda McCormick was named to the All-BIG EAST honorable mention team.



Miami Sports Hall of Fame

Women's Basketball in the **UM Sports Hall of Fame**



Head Coach Ferne Labati (1988-present)

In recognition of the success she has brought to the University of Miami women's basketball program both on and off the court, Head Coach Ferne Labati was inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame on April 20, 2004. Labati is UM's all-time leader in career wins with 290 entering the 2004-05 season. In 16 sea-

sons at Miami, Labati has guided the Hurricanes to nine postseason appearances and in 1992 she was named the WBCA/Converse Division I National Coach of the Year.



#22 Robin Harmony (1980-1984)

On April 10, 1997, Associate Head Women's Basketball Coach Robin Harmony was inducted into the University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame. Harmony, the first UM women's basketball player to be inducted into the Hall of Fame, was a standout performer for the Hurricanes from 1980-84, recording 1,308

points, 760 rebounds, 314 steals and 445 assists during her career. Harmony is the only player in Miami men's or women's basketball history to record over 1,000 career points, 700 career rebounds, 400 career assists and 300 career steals.



#11 Maria Rivera (1984-1988)

Maria Rivera still holds Hurricane records in six categories: career points (2,358), career field goals made (891), career field goals attempted (1,931), career free throws made (508), career free throws attempted (651) and career steals (382). She was named an honorable mention All-American her senior season. Rivera is tied for first on the UM sin-

gle game scoring list with 41 points against UCF in 1988. She s the second ever women's basketball player inducted into the UM Athletics Hall of Fame



#24 Frances Savage (1988-1992)

Frances Savage overcame a serious knee injury to become Miami's second all-time leading scorer (2,184 points). The 5-9 forward from Fort Lauderdale led the 1991-92 team to 30 straight wins, a BIG EAST title and the NCAA Sweet Sixteen while garnering, among many awards, Kodak/WBCA First-Team All-

America honors as well as being name Sports Illustrated Player of the Year.



#42 Jeannie Hebert-Truax (1988-1992)

Jeannie Hebert was arguably one of the best basketball players ever to play at Miami by the time her four-year career. Hebert started in all 119 games she appeared in college. The career total is the second-most starts all-time by a Hurricane, behind the 120 by Loretta Harvey, and the fourth-most games played. For her career, Hebert ranks second in assists (694), third all-time in

scoring (1,766 points), third in free throws made (437), third in free throws attempted (583), fourth in steals (237), fourth in free throw percentage (.750), fifth in field goals made (652), fifth in field goals attempted (1,492) and eighth in scoring average (14.8


