# ATLANTIC COAST CONFERENCE

Consistency. It is the mark of true excellence in any endeavor. However, in today's intercollegiate athletics, competition has become so balanced and so competitive that it is virtually impossible to maintain a high level of consistency.

Yet the Atlantic Coast Conference has defied the odds. Now in its 55th year of competition, the ACC has long enjoyed the reputation as one of the strongest and most competitive intercollegiate conferences in the nation.

Since the league's inception in 1953, ACC schools have captured 105 national championships, including 56 in women's competition and 49 in men's. In addition, NCAA individual titles have gone to ACC student-athletes 139 times in men's competition and 86 times in women's action.

Since 1977, when the league adopted women's basketball and a tradition of excellence was established, the ACC has continued to soar to new heights. The 2005-06 season marked the first time in NCAA history that a conference sent three teams to the same Final Four. The title game pitted an automatic ACC winner as second-seeded Maryland faced No. 1 seed Duke. The Terrapins claimed their first national title in school history and the league's second with a thrilling 78-75 overtime game in Boston, Mass., on April 4, 2006.

Following the 2006-07 season, Duke became the first ACC team and only the 14th in NCAA history to finish a regular season undefeated (29-0), while the 34 wins for North Carolina marked the most in program history.

Eight ACC teams earned postseason bids in 2007, including six NCAA Tournament berths. It also marked the fifth consecutive year the league has sent at least six teams to the Big Dance. With 67 percent of its membership competing in postseason play, the ACC boasted the highest league participation in the nation.



number one seed. In addition to sending three teams to the same Final Four for the first time in history, the league boasts such national accomplishments as sending at least one team to the "Sweet 16" for 19 consecutive years and at least one to the Final Four in 11 of the last 19 years.

The conference has also made 14 trips to the Final Four in the last 26 years with three teams finishing second and North Carolina and Maryland capturing National Championships in 1994 and 2006, respectively.

Since 1989, the ACC has placed 14 players on the All-Final Four team, while Maryland's Laura Harper joined the ranks of Virginia's Dawn Staley and North Carolina's Charlotte Smith, earning recognition as the NCAA Tournament Most Outstanding Player in 2006. In all, 61 ACC players have been named to the NCAA Tournament all-region teams with 10 Most Outstanding Player recognitions.

Five players have garnered National Player of the Year accolades while competing under the ACC banner. Staley was a back-to-back selection in 1991 and 1992, while Smith received the ESPY award in 1995. Duke's Alana Beard was recognized with National Player of the Year honors in both 2003 and 2004, and UNC's Ivory Latta earned ESPN.com National Player of the Year in 2006. In 2007, Duke guard Lindsey Harding was named the Naismith Trophy Women's College Player of the Year presented by AT&T.

Five league coaches have combined to earn 13 national Coach of the Year honors. Duke's Gail Goestenkors, North Carolina's Sylvia Hatchell, Virginia's Debbie Ryan, Maryland's Chris Weller and NC State's Kay Yow have all garnered national recognition.

Seven ACC representatives, including coaches and student-athletes, have participated in the Olympics. NC State's Yow, assisted by Hatchell of UNC, headed up the 1988 gold medal-winning Olympic team. Maryland's Vicky Bullett was a member of both the 1988 and 1992 Olympic teams. Staley, a three-time Olympian, struck gold in Athens as a member of the 2004 title squad. Duke's Goestenkors served as an assistant coach on the gold medal-winning team in Athens.

This summer Maryland's duo of Crystal Langhorne and Harper and Duke's Abby Waner led the USA Under-21 Women's Basketball to a gold medal at the FIBA U21 World Championship in Russia. The squad, spearheaded by first-year Duke head coach JoAnne P. McCallie, defeated Australia, 96-73. In addition, two ACC student-athletes were represented on the 2007 USA Women's Basketball Pan American team, while last year's ACC Rookie of the Year Monica Wright (UVa.) and a pair of league signees competed on the 12-member 2007 USA Basketball U19 World Championship team.

Since the inaugural season of the Women's National Basketball Association in 1997, the ACC has been a recognizable presence in the league. Sixty-one former ACC stars have played on the hardwood in the WNBA, while five former players have worked the sidelines as coaches. Three ACC players were selected in the first round of the 2007 WNBA Draft as the trio was selected in the first 11 picks of the round. In all, nine league players were selected in the 2007 WNBA Draft, matching the league's draftee total of 2006.

In addition, ACC women's basketball players have earned First Team Academic All-America honors 10 times, including Virginia's Val Ackerman in 1981, the former President of the WNBA. In 1997, NC State's Jennifer Howard was tabbed GTE CoSIDA Academic Player of the Year after posting a flawless 4.0 grade point average throughout her career. Thirteen players have earned ACC postgraduate scholarships, while three others were named NCAA Postgraduate Scholars.



Over the years, ACC women's basketball teams have gained global recognition through their television exposure. The 2006-07 schedule featured 54 televised games, the most in ACC women's basketball history, and included 97 television appearances by ACC teams. In addition, the ACC broadcasted nine games on ESPN2 and five on Fox Sports Net and affiliates. Thirty matchups were featured on the league's regional sports network, which includes Comcast SportsNet, Fox Spots Net South, SunSports and New England's Sports Network (NESN).

The league's women's basketball programs continue to rank among the best in the country, having made 138 NCAA Tournament appearances and winning 184 games in the last 30 years, 26 of them as a

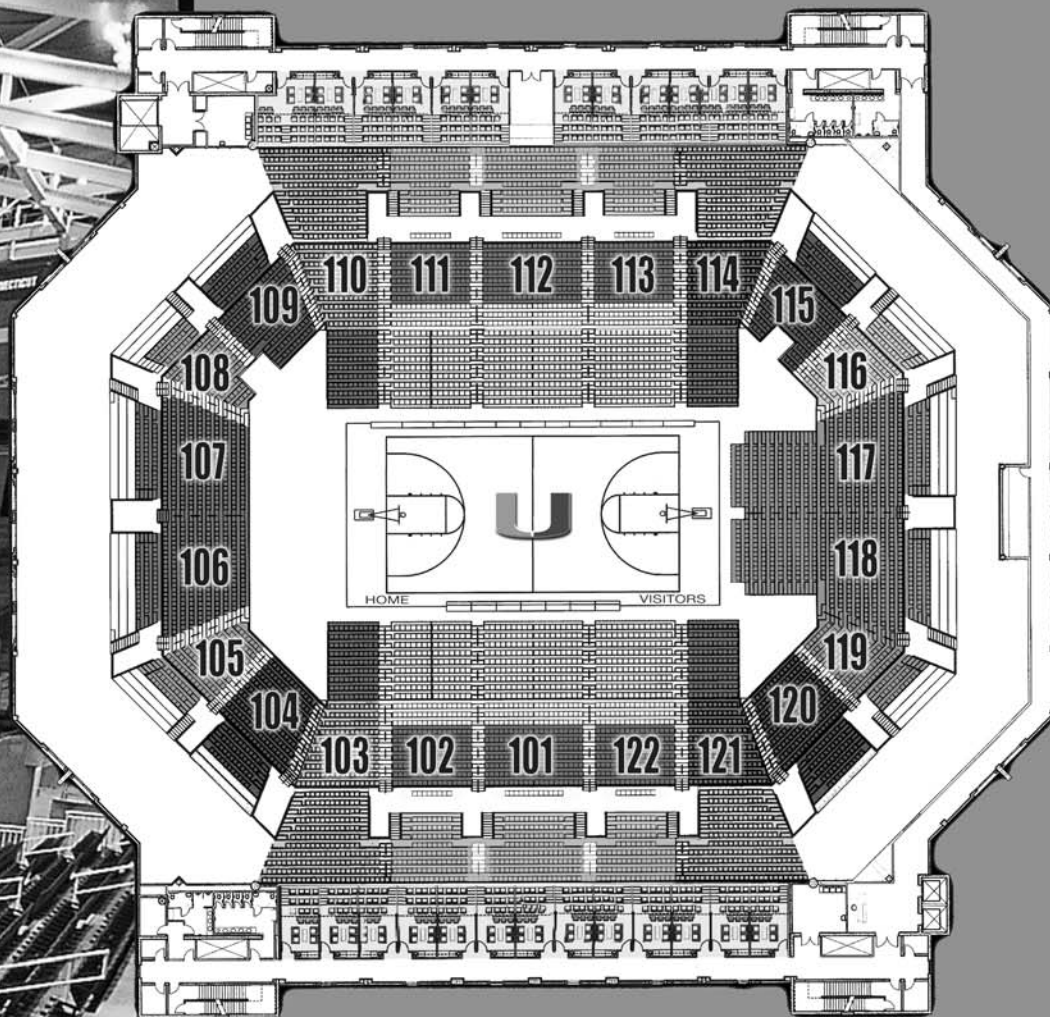
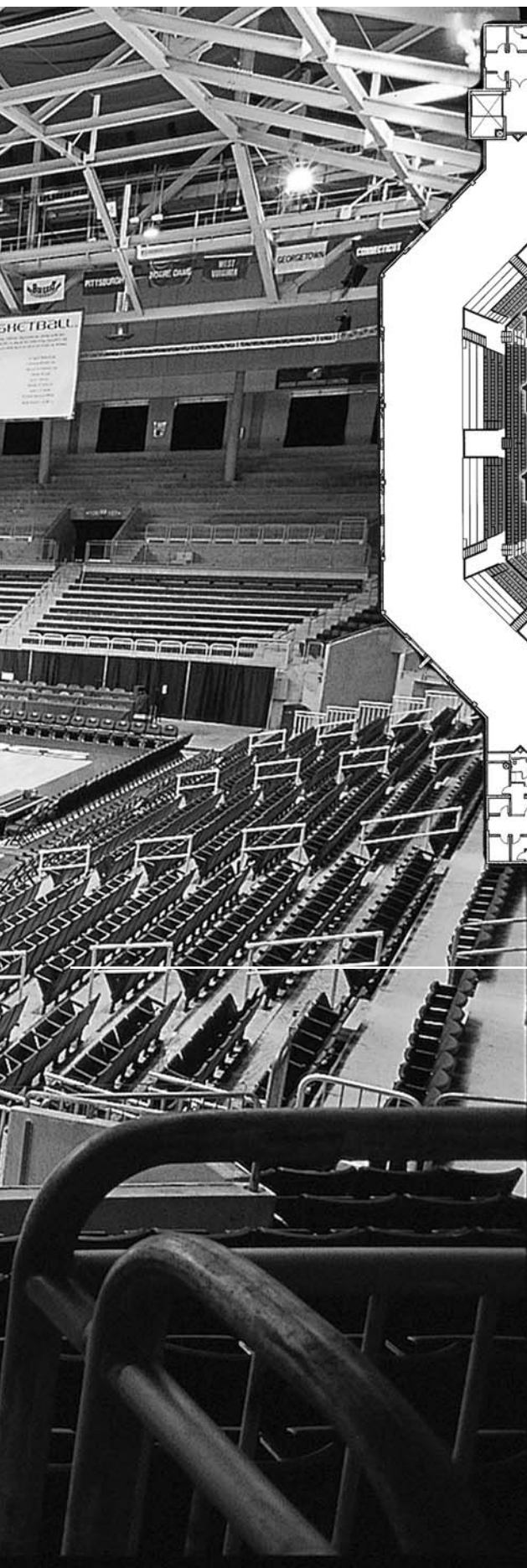

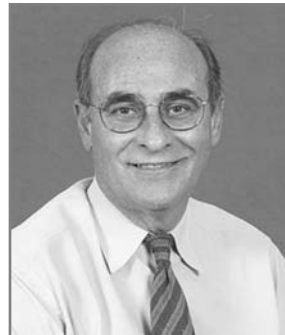

### PRESS RELEASES

## MEDIA OUTLETS



### TELEVISION COVERAGE

As a member of the Atlantic Coast Conference, the University of Miami is featured in one of the largest women's basketball television packages in the country in the ACC's Regional Sports Network (RSN), consisting of FOX Sports South (FSN), Fox Sports Net Florida, Comcast Sports Net (CSN) and New England Sports Network (NESN).

This season, the Hurricanes are scheduled to appear on RSN at least twice, with home contests versus Virginia (Jan. 21) and Virginia Tech (Feb. 11) slated for broadcast.

### THE KATIE MEIER SHOW

Beginning in January, head coach Katie Meier will be featured on "The Katie Meier Show", a weekly half-hour show airing on Fox Sports. The show will include highlights from the previous week, a preview of upcoming games and player and coach interviews and features.

## PRESEASON Q&A WITH COACH MEIER

**Q: One of the more obvious changes from last season to 2007-08 is simply the increase in the size of Miami's women's basketball squad. From finishing with eight healthy players to heading into this season with 14—what are some of the changes you expect as a result of that?**

A: "I'm really excited to have the depth and the athleticism that our style of play requires. We should be able to play that up-tempo style for 40 minutes without having to make concessions or adjustments because of a lack of depth. I'm excited for it—but the most fun thing is the players look around and they're very excited. They're excited because they know that now we can play some of these defenses that we could only play for two or three minutes last season for a full 40 minutes. We can really push the tempo like we've done and not be exhausted at the end of a game and have the poise. You know you lose your poise a little bit when you're exhausted, and now I think that they can play fresh."

**Q: Clearly last year didn't go as planned in terms of wins and losses. What do you think your staff and the returning players took away from last season? What did they learn that could be beneficial heading into this season?**

A: "I'm very proud of last year's team and I know that people are going to question me for saying that. But I thought that we had a very gritty team... players that never felt sorry for themselves. You didn't hear or get a lot of excuses, and that's a huge lesson. The core of that team returns and they have had the pain of losing. They didn't just let it go—it's still there. It drives them. But they also had the pride in the fact that they understand that no matter what—you compete to win every game and I felt like I saw that. To be in the nation's top conference and to have built-in excuses but not take them, I'm very proud. I'm proud of that unit. I'm proud of that group. I'm proud of what was accomplished even though it doesn't show up in the win column. I think a lot was accomplished for this program and for the future."

**Q: For anyone who has had the opportunity to spend any time with this team, it becomes apparent how close the staff and players are to each other—really encompassing a "U Family" atmosphere. Is this something you create or help foster?**

A: "I think it's very purposeful. It's not fake, it's just very purposeful. I think it's important to us as a staff so that when we're recruiting, one of the first things you'll hear out of our mouths is that we're really selective in the people that we invite to be part of our family. And I think that it starts there. There is a culture of winning, but the winning takes care of itself if you've taken care of the respect and the drive that we talk about. We work on the discipline, the respect, the intensity, the visionary, the enthusiasm... and then take the time to have team building—take the time to understand that cohesion is key to what we're doing. I think that everyone on this team has a very open heart. I think we'll accept each others' weaknesses and we'll cover for each other. We have a theme this year that 'we are us' and we take it very seriously. We feel very strong about who we are and we're very proud of the group that we've assembled, and I think that goes a long way."

**Q: Renee Taylor was the ACC's leading scorer in 2006-07 and someone that drew a lot of attention from opponents on the court. Who—or what group of players—do you envision filling that void?**

A: "Well, we don't have another Renee Taylor on this team. However, I think that our defensive rebounding will be good, and that will take a lot of the burden off of the offense. We were definitely lacking in that last year and we have made up for that with some of the people we have back and some that we recruited. Renee had a lot of pressure on her to score because we were giving up a lot of points. I don't think that we will be in that situation as much this year. I think that Maurita Reid gives us another opportunity to have this terrific scorer that people are going to have to give a lot of attention to. But I also think that we are going to have a lot of weapons around her. Renee had a lot of attention, and a lot of defensive schemes were set around her, and I think with our system and our personalities it's going to be little harder to do this season."

**Q: Are there any specific areas that you and your staff addressed when recruiting the incoming class?**



A: "People ask what position our players play and sometimes we can't answer that because we look for basketball players. We look for very versatile players—those that can guard and play three or four positions. That is our style. We have an open court. I think a lot of people have raised their eyebrows to see what we are trying to do down here with our transition. We don't lock into a robotic style of play and we don't put our players in a box and say 'this is all you are allowed to do.' I think that that has drawn a lot of attention from our recruits. Now it's a matter of cleaning it up. We get these basketball players, players that can make plays—not run plays—but make them."

**Q: Is there anyone you think will surprise opponents this season?**

A: "I think that teams are going to be surprised with the return of Lamese James and Eboni Sadler. I think that people did not understand how significant the loss of those two players was. I am really looking for some big things out of Albrey Grimsely and Maurita Reid. They have a lot of experience. Additionally, the development of Carla Williams in the offseason has been pretty impressive. I think she is really ready to go."

**Q: Are there any specific team objectives or goals in 2007-08?**

A: "We have addressed the needs of our depth and athleticism. I think that rebounding is huge for us and you will see that. We are very aggressive with the ball. This is a team that in the early workouts is quick with the ball. I think some of our full court defenses and traps are going to be pretty effective because we can cover a lot of distance and go get the ball. One of the objectives that we had to address is our rebounding and I think that we have taken care of that."

**Q: What are you most excited about heading into this season?**

A: "I love these kids. I am really excited to see this sincere love and respect for each other that we have in this group. I love how accepting and challenging they are, and how committed they are to the University of Miami. This is a special group and I have really enjoyed it a lot."

### This and that...

**LaToya Cunningham:** "Toya has been a team captain since she has been a sophomore and has tremendous leadership skills. She played a lot of point guard and two-guard for us and I expect the same from her this year. She is great with tempo and is one of the best on-ball defenders that I have coached. She really represents this program in terms of being the front woman for us. You put LaToya in front for us and you say what does she represent? You know about her effort, defense and good character because she carries all that."

**Epiphany Woodson:** "Pip lives up to her hype. She was one of the top point guards in the country coming in and I've been surprised with her savvy. She plays a very mature

game. I knew she could make great passes and I knew she was great in full court, but I have been very impressed by her calm demeanor and her awareness on the court. I think that she is going to be a significant player for us. She has been fun to work with. She gets it as a freshman."

**Maurita Reid:** "Maurita can't help but be special. It is a transition for her without Renee [Taylor] this year, but people don't understand that she did that in junior college and won a championship her second year at Monroe [Community College]. Maurita stands on her own as one of the most threatening players in the conference. She can get 10 steals in one game and then get 26 points and 12 rebounds. I've never seen somebody lead a team in points, steals, assists and rebounding as often as Maurita did. I think that she is going to have a lot of pressure on her this year. I also know that she has a lot of faith and confidence in her teammates this year. That makes Maurita more settled and more of an explosive player."

**Albrey Grimsley:** "Albrey has the most ACC experience on the team—and she is a name that I am sure the conference coaches are wondering 'when is she going to leave?' because she has been a significant player since her freshman season. She is a great setup player, and I think she is going to have to give us more scoring this year. She is an unselfish player who wants to win games for us on the defensive end. I know that Albrey is excited because she knows her teammates have the same mentality. She has really taken the new players under her wing and explained that we are not going to win any games if we don't play defense. She doesn't say a lot—but what she says is very poignant. She is going to have a special senior year."

**Damisha Moore:** "Damisha might surprise some people because she was a very highly sought-after player, but she tore her ACL in the spring of her junior year and didn't play as a senior in high school. She's still shaking off some of the cobwebs of not playing for a year, but every time I'm in the gym with her, she's way better than the last time. The improvement from one session to the next session has been incredible, and I know she hasn't peaked yet. She can score. She can rebound. She has a solid character and is really emerging as a leader as a freshman."

**Vitalija Vasconiute:** "V is a real basketball player. She brings a lot of experience in a different style, and isn't just a shooter. Her instincts for basketball,

her spacing, her knowledge of other people on the court and her vision makes her a player that can really give you what you need. She is always very threatening with the ball and a very fundamental player."

**Briyana Blair:** "We knew Briyana would be a great flyer in our system and runs the court very well. She's a great athlete and just as fast as you could find. She is a great defender that will give us some length in the perimeter, which we have lacked. She has very quick hands and quick feet, and really digs in and buys into an up-tempo defense. She can also be aggressive to the rim and will work her way in."

**Eboni Sadler:** "Eboni was just coming into her own last year—getting comfortable with the system and understanding the level of commitment to conditioning and the intensity of college basketball when she had that unfortunate injury. I don't think I'm more proud of anybody on the team as I am of Eboni and Lamese [James] for coming back. Both of them coming back and not knowing whether it would be worth the effort—and just having that blind faith and the commitment to being the best they can... really wanting to taste success and really help. They didn't like what happened last year and they want to come back and be a part of the reason it won't happen again. Eboni finally understands just how good of a player she is, and I think she's even surprised herself. I'm really excited about the level she is playing at right now. And Eboni did this herself. She made the decision to commit to this, and I think we are going to be thrilled with her."

**Lamese James:** "After a season off the court, Lamese came back and passed the fitness test on her first try. She has come back fit and I think that has set the tone for the whole season. Lamese is a starter and people don't necessarily realize that it was a huge loss for us not having her last season. To lose her and that experience was huge. She's a very creative scorer—somehow the ball just goes in. She's not limited to a certain area on the court - she can hurt you from a lot of different places."

**Charmaine Clark:** "She's an example of somebody that has really flourished in our system. Charmaine took advantage of the opportunity last year to get so much playing time as a freshman, and I really saw her keep improving. She's a great one-on-one player and is tough to guard. She is really the most improved defensive player on the team because at the beginning of last season she really didn't understand what was

required of her defensively, but by the end of the season we were putting her on players who were All-Americans and first team all-conference, and she was holding her own. She has gotten a lot tougher and more physical on the defensive end and is a really nice rebounder for us."

**LaToya Drake:** "Drake is a great athlete and a reliable young lady that has really been an impressive addition to the team. She is still learning and lot of this is new to her, but she's really rising up and absorbing as much as she can. She is really eager, and you get the feeling she is going to come through for you. She's real quick to the ball, grabs everything off the rim and I think we needed an inside presence. I think she's definitely going to be disruptive on the defensive end and very threatening on the offensive end. When all else fails, she is going to get the rebound for you."

**Diane Barnes:** "Barnes is another player that absolutely chose Miami because of our style. It's a good fit for her skill set. She's very active, high-energy... doesn't shy away from work. She's probably one of the hardest workers on the team and is always in the gym, and she is always trying to be better. She's a very aggressive player and one of the most athletic players I've ever coached—and that's really saying something. She will bring a lot of excitement to the court and I think she will definitely catch a lot of attention."

**Carla Williams:** "Carla has really committed to herself, to this program, to academics... to everything. What a great offseason she had. She did a tremendous job in the classroom, a tremendous job in the weight room, a tremendous job in the track... I think she is taking it very, very seriously and has really shown great leadership... understanding that she is a senior, understanding that people need her to help them. I think that has made her a more mature player and very reliable. Carla showed flashes of brilliance last year—and that's great, but we need her to be more consistent. If she keeps up with the pace she is at, she is really going to be a force in the ACC."

**Kathryn Hester:** "Kat brings a dimension of physicality. We're definitely going to need her to give us that presence in the paint, holding her position and clearing some lanes for us. She can score on the block well and hit the three."

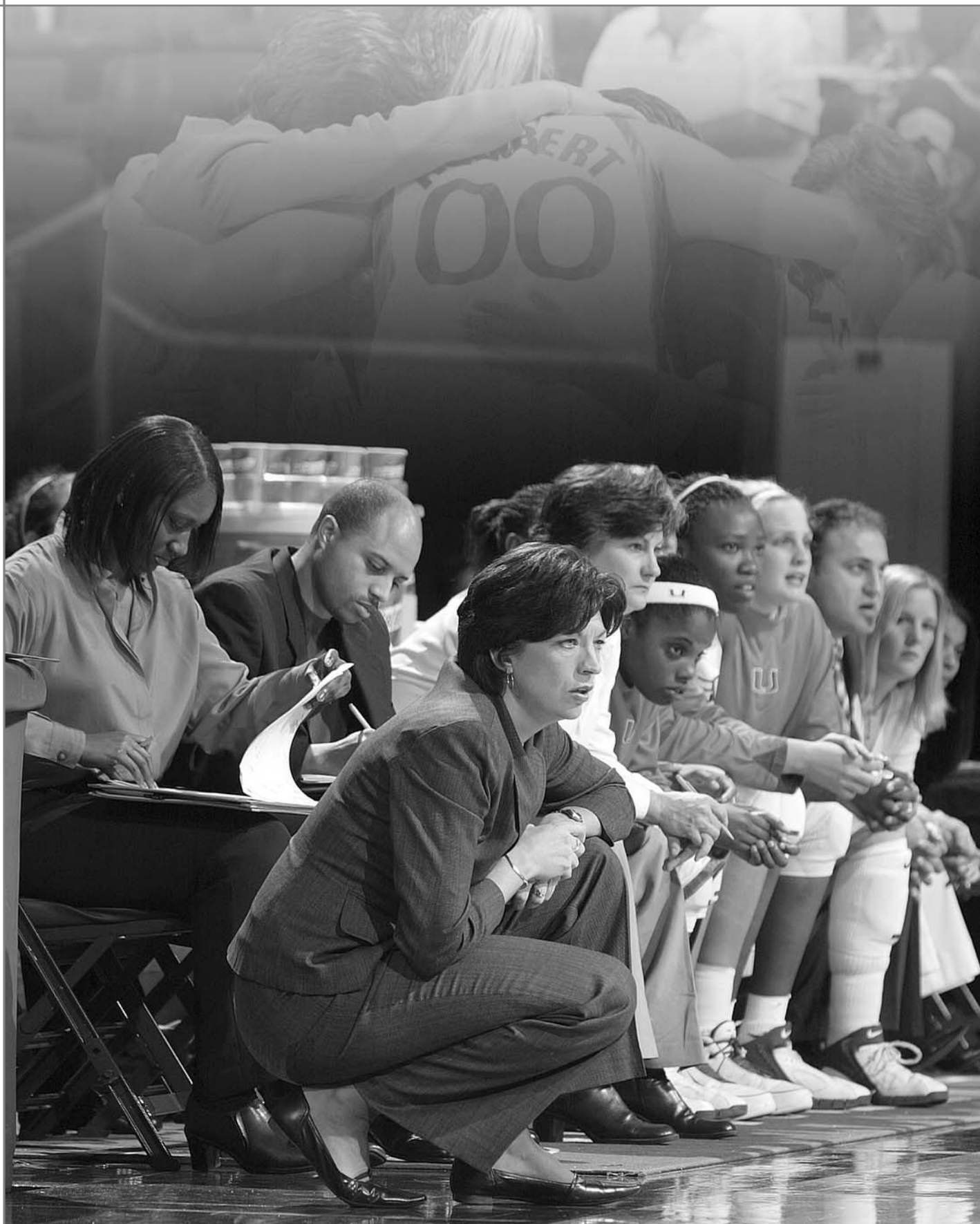

## HEAD COACH KATIE MEIER

SEVENTH SEASON OVERALL | THIRD SEASON AT MIAMI | DUKE '90



University of Miami head coach Katie Meier enters her third year at the helm of the Hurricanes' women's basketball program. A well known and respected figure in women's basketball, Meier has worked tirelessly to put her mark on Miami's program and to build a winning tradition.

Hired on April 19, 2005, UM Athletics Director Paul Dee announced the appointment of Meier in front of national and local media, fans, alumni and support staff, signifying the beginning of a new era.

Following an unprecedented career as one of the greatest athletes to ever play in the Atlantic Coast Conference, Meier quickly established herself in the coaching ranks and, upon her appointment at UM following an impressive four-year tenure as the head coach at Charlotte where she helped bring the 49er program into national prominence, made it clear that her goal is to make Miami one of the premier women's basketball programs in the country.

"With the resources that we have, with the institution that we have to sell and the special people we have in place here, I truly believe this can be a national championship job," said Meier of her vision. "That is pressure, but I am ready."

In her first season, Meier wasted little time in making the first steps towards those goals. After receiving little attention in the ACC preseason polls, the Hurricanes posted an impressive overall record of 17-13 and, fighting through a conference that would send nine teams to the postseason, including three to the NCAA Final Four, finished with sixth-place, 6-8 record in ACC play en route to earning a berth into the second round of the 2006 Women's National Invitation Tournament.

Throughout the season Miami posted wins over ranked teams such as Mississippi (No. 25), Boston College (No. 21) and Virginia Tech (No. 25)—and nearly knocked off then-No. 1 Duke in double-overtime. The Hurricanes also recorded wins over two eventual conference champions in Hartford (America East) and Oakland (Mid-Continent).

Under her direction, standout Tamara James produced one of the greatest seasons ever seen by a UM player in 2005-06, including becoming the University's all-time leading scorer before being taken as the No. 8 overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics.

In Meier's second season in 2006-07, the Hurricanes got off to a strong start, winning seven of their first eight games—including a 79-70 win over Indiana to claim the UM Thanksgiving Tournament title. On Dec. 1, Meier picked up her 100th career victory as the Hurricanes defeated Jackson State, 77-50. However, with only eight healthy players to call upon by the start of the ACC schedule, Miami faced challenge after challenge competing in a league that ranked among the top-three strongest women's basketball conferences nationally and produced two of the NCAA Tournament's four No. 1 seeds in 2006-07.

Regardless, Renee Taylor emerged as the ACC's leading scorer—upholding Miami's streak of producing the league's leading scorer in all three years it has been a member. The All-ACC Second Team selection set school records in single-game scoring with 42 points at Houston and became the 19th Hurricane to score at least 1,000 points—and just the sixth to do so in her first two seasons. In addition, transfer Maurita Reid emerged as a defensive threat, tying the school record with 10 steals versus Wake Forest and finishing among the ACC's leaders and NCAA's top 10 in steals per game.

**BUILDING A TRADITION AT CHARLOTTE**

Meier could solely be responsible for bringing the 49er women's basketball program into national prominence. Prior to her appointment as head coach at Charlotte in 2001, the 49ers had only one previous postseason appearance—a WNIT berth in 1990.

During her four-year tenure at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to three postseason berths—one NCAA Tournament appearance (2003) and two WNIT

appearances (2004, 2005)—and a combined overall record of 76-45 (.628). In her inaugural campaign at Charlotte, Meier led the 49ers to a 16-13 finish to record their first winning season in eight years.

The following season, she guided the 49ers to a 21-9 finish marking the most wins (21) in over a decade at Charlotte. With a 12-2 record in Conference USA play, Meier and the 49ers also earned the school's first-ever C-USA regular-season championship and earned the school's first-ever appearance at the NCAA Tournament.

In 2003-04, Meier and the 49ers concluded the season with a 17-14 record while earning a trip to the 2004 WNIT. Along with marking the first time in school history that the 49ers had made back-to-back postseason appearances, Meier also led Charlotte to their first-ever postseason victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the first round of the WNIT.

In 2004-05, she enjoyed an overall record of 22-9 to tie for the third-most single season wins in Charlotte history and the most wins for the program in

a single season since 1990-91. The 49ers also advanced to the postseason for the third-consecutive season and the WNIT for the second-straight year.

Prior to Charlotte, Meier spent seven seasons at Tulane University, serving as an associate head coach from 1999-01 and an assistant coach on the Green Wave staff from 1994-99. As a member of the Tulane coaching staff, Meier helped the Green Wave to an overall record of 164-52 (.759) in seven seasons, including the highest ranking in school history (13th by the Associated Press) in 2000 and a school-record 27 wins the same season.

During her time at Tulane, Meier and the Green Wave also saw an impressive seven-year run at the NCAA Tournament.

Meier began her collegiate coaching career at the University of North Carolina at Asheville where she served as an assistant coach during the 1993-94 season.

**ESTABLISHING HER LEGACY AS A PLAYER**

Meier's success as a coach is a direct reflection on her playing career as a standout at Duke University. A four-year letterwinner for the Blue Devils under head coach Debbie Leonard from 1986-90, Meier's name is scattered throughout the Duke record books.

She currently ranks among the school's all-time career leaders in scoring average (16.2 points per game), steals (232), free throws made (447) and free throws attempted (624). She is also listed among Duke's leaders in career points (1,761), field goals made (653), field goals attempted (1,283), assists (409) and rebounding average (6.1 rebounds per game).

Meier wasted no time making her mark at Duke, earning ACC Rookie of the Year and Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America honors 1986. Meier injured her knee in 1988 during her junior season and ultimately missed the entire 1989 campaign while recovering.

Meier returned to Duke for her senior season in 1990 without missing a beat, earning Kodak/WBCA District 2 All-America and All-ACC First Team accolades while being named the Blue Devils' most valuable player.

In 2002, Meier was honored by Duke for her efforts as a player when she was named to the inaugural induction class in the Blue Devils' Hall of Honor. That same year Meier was named to the Atlantic Coast Conference's 50th Anniversary Team. In 2006, she was once again honored by the conference when she was named one of 12 ACC Tournament Legends at the 2006 ACC Women's Basketball Tournament.

Meier's success on the court was only outdone by her accomplishments in the classroom. She was named to the Dean's List from 1986-88. In 1988 she also earned GTE Academic All-America Second Team honors.

After earning a bachelor's degree in English literature with cum laude honors in 1989, Meier went on to earn a Master of Arts in Teaching English from Duke in 1990.

Following her playing career at Duke, Meier moved overseas to play three seasons with BBC Mini-Flat Waregem in Belgium from 1990-93. There, she helped lead her team to three First Division regular season titles and one Belgian Cup Championship.

While in Belgium, Meier also spent time teaching classes of conversational English while coaching teams of 15- to 17-year-olds.

A native of Wheaton, Ill., Meier graduated from Wheaton High School in 1985.

Darrick Gibbs is in his third season as an assistant coach with the University of Miami women's basketball team.

Gibbs joined the UM coaching ranks prior to the 2005-06 season, and helped lead UM to a 17-13 record and an appearance at the 2006 WNIT in his first season with the Hurricanes.

Prior to his arrival at UM, Gibbs served as an assistant coach under Katie Meier at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte for two seasons from 2003-05. While at Charlotte, Gibbs helped Meier lead the 49ers to two WNIT appearances, including Charlotte's

first postseason victory with a 78-71 win over Clemson in the 2004 WNIT. The 49ers put together their 39-23 record in those two seasons, including a 22-9 mark in 2004-05 to tie for the third-most single-season wins in Charlotte history.

As one of the 49ers' main recruiting contacts, Gibbs played a major role in putting together their 33rd-ranked 2004 recruiting class during his first season at Charlotte.

Gibbs joined the Charlotte coaching staff in 2003 following a two-year stay at the College of Charleston where he served as an assistant coach from 2001-03. His responsibilities with the Cougars included recruiting, organizing practice schedules, scouting opponents and coordinating team travel.

Prior to his stint at the College of Charleston, Gibbs spent three seasons at Wofford College. As an undergraduate, he served as a student assistant with the Terriers from 1998-00, and remained with the team as an assistant during the 2000-01 season.

Originally from Pawleys Island, S.C., Gibbs received a bachelor's degree in psychology from Wofford in 2000.





## ASSISTANT COACH LONNETTE HALL

Lonnette Hall enters her second season as an assistant coach with the University of Miami women's basketball program.

Having served as an assistant coach on the collegiate level at TCU, Arkansas State, Wisconsin-La Crosse and Cal State Northridge, Hall was promoted from her position as UM's Director of Basketball Operations to assistant coach prior to the 2006-07 season.

As the Director of Basketball Operations at UM, her responsibilities included organizing and coordinating team travel and practices, as well as the production of alumni and

team newsletters. She also worked with the UM Marketing and Sports Media Relations offices to help organize various promotional activities.

Hall came to Miami following a one-year stint as the head girl's basketball coach at R.L. Paschal High School in Fort Worth, Texas, in 2004-05. In addition to the day-to-day coaching duties, Hall also managed the program's budget and marketing activities, and oversaw the team's booster club. She also organized HOOP Group, a youth basketball program in the Fort Worth area.

Prior to her stop at R.L. Paschal, Hall spent six years at TCU, serving as an assistant coach with the Lady Frogs from 1999-2003 and as the Director of Basketball Operations during the 2003-04 season.

As an assistant coach with the Lady Frogs, Hall helped guide TCU to three-consecutive NCAA Tournaments while coaching notable players such as Fort Lauderdale native and former All-American Sandora Irvin, who was later selected as the No. 3 overall pick in the 2005 WNBA Draft. Along with coaching, Hall's responsibilities included recruiting, practice and game preparation efforts, in addition to preparing the team's travel arrangements.

While at TCU, Hall also served as an assistant director for the 2004 Conference USA Women's Basketball Tournament and was a member of the TCU Athletic Department's Outreach Committee, Mission Statement Committee and Diversity Subcommittee.



Hall's coaching career began in 1998 at Hueneme High School in Oxnard, Calif., where she served as the head coach of the junior varsity girl's basketball team until 1990.

Following her stay at Hueneme, Hall went on to California State University-Northridge to serve as an assistant coach from 1992-94 before moving on to join the coaching staff at the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse from 1994-96. After two seasons at UW-L, Hall spent three seasons at Arkansas State as an assistant coach from 1996-99 prior to her stint at TCU.

A native of Oxnard, Calif., Hall served in the United States Navy from 1986-88. She earned an associate's degree in art from Ventura Junior College in 1991 and went on to earn a bachelor's degree in kinesiology from California State University-Northridge in 1994. Hall added a master's degree in sports administration from the University of Wisconsin-La Crosse in 1996.

Lynn Bria enters her first season as an assistant coach on the University of Miami women's basketball staff.

Bria brings 17 years of coaching experience to Coral Gables, including 13 years as a head coach. She most recently served as an assistant coach and recruiting coordinator at West Virginia University during the 2006-07 season—helping guide the Mountaineers to the second round of the NCAA Tournament and a 21-11 overall record.

Bria spent the previous seven years (1999-2006) at the helm of the Ohio University

women's basketball program. At Ohio, she helped mold seven All-MAC selections, including 2005 MAC Sixth Man of the Year Simone Redd and 2006 MAC Freshman of the Year Rachel Frederick. Bria guided the Bobcats to the MAC Tournament quarterfinals four times, and wrapped up her stint there as the second-winningest coach in program history.

Prior to her tenure at Ohio, Bria was the head women's basketball coach at the University of Central Florida for three years from 1996-1999. She led the Golden Knights to their second-ever NCAA Tournament appearance after winning the Atlantic Sun regular-season and tournament titles in 1998-99, compiling a 20-10 overall record and a 13-3 mark in league play.

Bria arrived at UCF following three years as head coach at Texas Woman's University, two years as an assistant coach at Marshall and one year as an assistant coach at Radford.

A native of Charleston, West Virginia, Bria was a two-sport star before graduating from the University of Charleston (W. Va.) in 1990. As a senior, she earned First Team All-West Virginia Intercollegiate Athletic Conference honors in basketball, following back-to-back seasons as an honorable mention selection. Bria and the Golden Eagles advanced to the NAIA National Tournament twice in basketball and once in tennis, where she earned all-conference accolades as a senior. Bria was inducted into the University of Charleston's Athletic Hall of Fame in 2003.

"I'm so thrilled to add such a quality coach and person to our program," said Miami head coach Katie Meier. "Lynn Bria is one of the most loved and respected coaches in the business, and brings us so much experience and knowledge. Her enthusiasm for coaching and teaching is unmatched."

Sander has twice been recognized by the University's athletic department for her hard work, and was named the department's Employee of the Month in September 2007.

Prior to her current position, Sander served a two-year stint as the Rowing Coordinator with Miami's women's rowing program.

A 2004 graduate of the University of Miami with a bachelor's degree in both history and marine affairs, Sander was four-time letterwinner with the rowing team and served as co-captain as a senior. She helped the team to program-best runner-up finish at the 2004 BIG EAST Championships, in addition to winning gold medals with the Junior Varsity 8 at the Head of the Chattahoochee and the Florida Intercollegiate Rowing Association (FIRA) Regatta.

A native of Syracuse, N.Y., Sander is in the process of completing her master's degree in education and sports administration at UM.

### **CHRIS BAILEY**

Chris Bailey is in his second season as the Video Coordinator for the University of Miami women's basketball program.

Bailey's many responsibilities include coordinating the film exchange program with opponents, helping the coaching staff analyze film in game preparation and producing promotional and end-of-year banquet highlight videos.

A 2005 graduate of Eastern Michigan University with a bachelor's degree in psychology, Bailey has been involved with basketball since he began coaching the Livingston Sting girls' basketball team in 2000. During five seasons as coach of that AAU team, Bailey also worked several camps, including Rick Pitino's Cardinal Camp in 2001, Jay Smith's Central Michigan boy's camp in 2001 and the Eastern Michigan women's basketball camps from 2001-04, while serving as Eastern Michigan's student assistant.

Upon his graduation from EMU, he moved on to Louisville, where he worked as a graduate assistant with the women's basketball program and also as the assistant director of its camp.



### **PAM BROWN**

Coordinator of Women's Basketball Operations

Pam Brown enters her first season as the Coordinator of Women's Basketball Operations for the University of Miami. Brown assists Director of Women's Basketball Operations Rachel Sander, as well as the coaching staff, with day-to-day office management duties.

Brown comes to Miami after playing one year of professional basketball in Holland. Prior to that, she played collegiate basketball at Charlotte—including three seasons (2002-05) under head coach Katie Meier. Brown was part of

Charlotte's most successful Class of 2006, winning 81 games, claiming two league titles and making four postseason appearances—including a trip to the 2003 NCAA Tournament—in her four years with the 49ers.

A First Team All-Atlantic 10 pick as a senior in 2005-06, Brown averaged 12.9 points and 5.7 rebounds per game in her final collegiate season, shooting 77.8 percent from the line and 49.5 percent from the field. As a junior, she became the 13th 49er in school history to score 1,000 career points, scoring in double-figures in 22 of 31 games that season. She was named to Conference USA's All-Freshmen Team in 2002-03.

A native of Coppell, Texas, Brown was a Street and Smith honorable mention All-American and rated 31st among power forwards in the nation according to the All-Star Girls Report. The Coppell High School graduate set a school record with 2,036 career points, while grabbing 1,245 rebounds.

### **AMY AUDIBERT**

Graduate Assistant

Amy Audibert enters her first season as a graduate assistant for the Hurricanes' women's basketball program.

A 2007 graduate of the University of Miami, Audibert was a four-year letterwinner with the women's basketball team from 2003-07 and epitomizes the heart and spirit of the U.

She competed in both the BIG EAST and ACC conferences and helped the Hurricanes to both NCAA and WNIT appearances. As a junior, she registered the steal and assist that led to Tamara James' record-breaking basket to become UM's all-time leading scorer. As a senior, the 6-4 center surprised opponents with her accurate three-point shot, converting a team-best 40 percent of her attempts from long range. She played in 80 games over her career and started 21 games as a senior.

A native of Niagara Falls, Ontario, Audibert is working on her master's degree in sports administration at UM.

**THE UNIVERSITY OF MIAMI** is one of the largest, most comprehensive private research universities in the southeastern United States, with a well-earned reputation for academic excellence. More than 15,000 undergraduate and graduate students from every state and 105 nations around the world call UM home during the academic semesters. The University has grown from its main location in the city of Coral Gables to the Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine campus located in Downtown Miami, the Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science on Virginia Key, the John J. Koubek Center in Little Havana, the James L. Knight Center in downtown Miami, and the South and Richmond campuses in southwest Miami-Dade County. With more than 10,000 full- and part-time faculty and staff, UM is one of the largest private employers in Miami-Dade County.

**Enrollment:** Total enrollment for the 2006-2007 academic year was 15,670 students. Of that number, 10,190 were undergraduate students, 3,175 were graduate students, and 1,986 were professional students. During the 2004-2005 academic year, the University awarded 2,392 bachelors, 1,014 master's, 401 J.D.'s, 128 M.D.'s, 108 Ph.D.'s, and 48 other doctorates.

**New Freshman Standings:** Over 40% of new freshmen graduated in the top 5 percent of their high school class. Almost two-thirds graduated in the top 10 percent of their high school class.

**International Students:** The University continues to attract able students from South Florida, as well as from other parts of the nation and around the world. It was one of the country's first universities to have an organized international recruitment program. The University of Miami sends representatives worldwide to seek qualified students. Students come from 105 foreign countries, the 50 states, three territories and the District of Columbia.

**Honors Program/Honor Societies:** Approximately 898 students participate in the Honors Program. UM has 49 academic honor societies, including Phi Beta Kappa.

**Research:** Research and sponsored program expenditures totaled \$267 million (FY 06). According to the National Science Foundation, UM ranked 62nd of all universities in expenditures of federal funds for research and development (FY 04).

**Budget:** The budget for 2006-07 was \$1.6 billion, with \$953 million projected for the medical campus. At the end of FY 06, the endowment for the University was \$620 million.

**Development:** In FY 06, contributions reached \$161.6 million in total private cash, gifts, and grants, a 19 percent increase from last year. In January 2006, Momentum: The Campaign for the University of Miami surpassed its \$1 billion goal 18 months ahead of schedule, and the institution set its sights on a new challenge: raising an additional \$250 million by the end of 2007. As of March 2006, the Momentum campaign had raised \$1.23 billion for scholarships, chairs, interdisciplinary centers and research initiatives.

## A WORLD-CLASS STUDENT BODY

Enrollment at the University of Miami continues to experience tremendous growth. Applications for the freshman class during 2006-2007 reached 19,031.

The student body also has become more diverse. For fall 2006, Hispanics accounted for 26 percent and African-Americans for 9 percent, while Asian students accounted for 8 percent.

For fall 2006, women accounted for approximately 51 percent of the new freshman class, 55 percent of all undergraduates, and 49 percent of the graduate and professional students.

Education outside the traditional classroom is an important part of student life at the University of Miami. The University has 77 programs offered in 33 countries on a full academic year, semester or summer basis as well as UM faculty-led programs during intersession, spring break and summer.

## CAMPUSES AND SCHOOLS

**Coral Gables Campus:** The Coral Gables campus, with its two colleges and nine schools, is located on a 230-acre tract in suburban Coral Gables.





**Medical Campus:** The University of Miami Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine campus consists of 45 acres within the 100-acre University of Miami/Jackson Memorial Medical Center complex. Other facilities at the medical center, in addition to Jackson Memorial Hospital, include the Miami Veterans Affairs Medical Center and two University-owned hospitals—the University of Miami Sylvester Comprehensive Cancer Center and Anne Bates Leach Eye Hospital, home to the top-ranked Bascom Palmer Eye Institute. Bascom Palmer was ranked the number one eye hospital in the country for the third time in a row in the 2006 annual survey of "America's Best Hospitals" published in U.S. News & World Report; five other programs at UM/Jackson also ranked among the best. Miller School of Medicine faculty conduct more than 1,300 research projects aimed at advances in basic science and clinical care in facilities totaling more than two million square feet of space, including the newly opened Clinical Research Building.

**Rosenstiel Campus:** The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science is located on an 18-acre waterfront campus on Virginia Key in Biscayne Bay.

**South Campus:** The south campus, located ten miles southwest of Coral Gables, is on a 136-acre site used for conducting research and development projects.

**Richmond Campus:** The Richmond campus, established in 2001, is a 76-acre site near south campus. Research facilities for the Rosenstiel School's Center for Southeastern Tropical Advanced Remote Sensing (CSTARS) and Richmond Satellite Operations Center (RSOC) are located on a portion of the new campus.

## THE COLLEGES AND SCHOOLS

**The School of Architecture** offers a wide range of professionally accredited undergraduate and graduate degrees with specialization in suburb and town design and computing in design. The school's new 8,600-square-foot Jorge M. Perez Architecture Center, features a state-of-the-art lecture hall that seats 145, an exhibition gallery and a multimedia classroom.

**The College of Arts and Sciences** encompasses most of the disciplines within the realm of the liberal arts. The college comprises 20 academic departments, with approximately 40 distinct majors available to undergraduates.

**The School of Business Administration** is accredited by the Association to Advance Collegiate Schools of Business. The nine departments of the school offer 26 undergraduate and graduate-level degree programs.

**The School of Communication** is one of the University's nationally and internationally acclaimed schools. Major programs of study include advertising, broadcasting, communication studies, journalism, motion pictures, public relations and visual communication. Its state-of-the-art facilities include recently upgraded computer labs, fully equipped digital television studios, a cable television station, a film sound stage, editing suites, computer labs and a nationally recognized debate team.

**The School of Education** houses the Departments of Teaching and Learning, Educational and Psychological Studies and Exercise and Sport Sciences. Undergraduate majors and minors are available in elementary, secondary, special and music education.

**The College of Engineering** features interdisciplinary courses of study, the result of associations with several areas of the University; including biomedical engineering, which involves a partnership with the Miller School of Medicine, and ocean engineering, which has a partnership with the Rosenstiel School.

**The Graduate School** offers graduate degrees in all major areas, with 60 doctoral, 125 master's and eight specialist programs. The Rosenstiel School is considered among the world's top institutes for marine and atmospheric research and graduate training.

**The School of Law** offers graduate programs in comparative law, inter-American law, international law, ocean and coastal law, taxation, estate planning and real estate property development. The law library is considered a leading legal research library with state-of-the-art research tools and journals.

**The Leonard M. Miller School of Medicine** already has established a research enterprise that the National Institutes of Health ranks in the top 30 percent of the nation's 125 medical schools with regard to research funding awarded. The medical school's 1,000-plus full-time faculty members and an additional 700-plus research personnel conduct clinical and basic science research crossing all disciplines, from epidemiology and pediatrics to AIDS, psychiatry, and the neurosciences.

**Phillip and Patricia Frost School of Music** is one of the largest schools of its kind in a private institution and one of the most comprehensive in all of higher learning. The school offers many bachelor's and master's degree programs.

**The School of Nursing and Health Studies** houses one of

the first collegiate nursing programs in South Florida. The school has an emphasis on transcultural nursing, which recognizes an individual's unique health benefits and practices. The school is a leader in the development of innovative primary care nursing practice models, which have earned national and international recognition and research.

**The Rosenstiel School of Marine and Atmospheric Science** has grown from humble beginnings into one of the nation's leading institutions for oceanographic research and education today. The school offers curricula in applied marine physics, marine affairs, marine and atmospheric chemistry, marine biology and fisheries, marine geology and geophysics, and meteorology and physical oceanography.





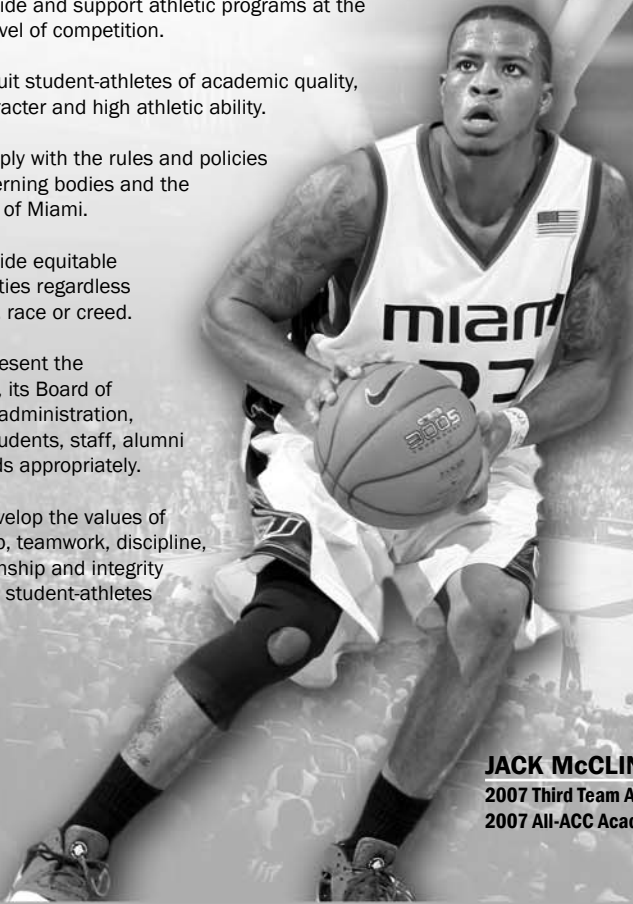

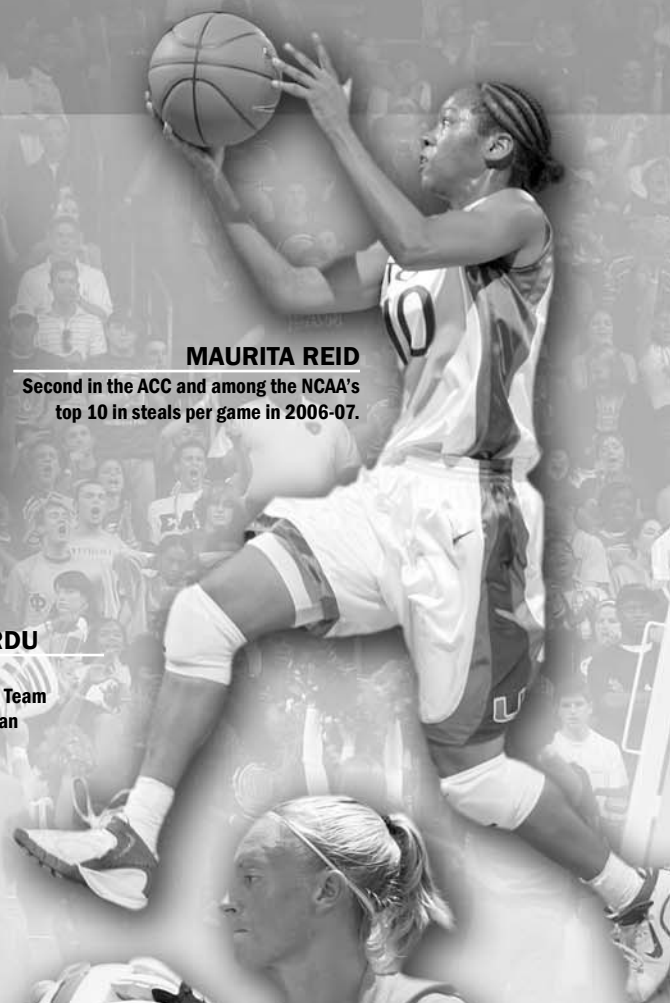

### **BANKUNITED CENTER**

Home to Hurricanes basketball, Miami opened competition at the "BUC" with an overtime win by the men's team over nationally-ranked North Carolina on Jan. 4, 2003. The University's first large-capacity venue for athletic, educational, cultural and community events, the \$48 million facility was totally funded through private donations.

### **COBB STADIUM**

Through a major gift from Ambassador and Mrs. Charles E. Cobb and the Cobb family, Cobb

Stadium for Soccer and Track & Field opening in the spring of 1999. The project included the reconstruction and expansion of the University track and the construction of a new soccer field to accommodate the University's newly-formed soccer program. The facility includes seating for 500.

### **GREENTREE PRACTICE FIELDS**

The practice home of the five-time national championship Miami football program, Greentree underwent a \$2 million renovation during the 1998 offseason and includes three

full-length prescription athletic turf fields and lights to allow evening practices.

### **HECHT ATHLETIC CENTER**

Dedicated in 1979, the Hecht Athletic Center is home base for the University of Miami's Athletic Department, housing all of the administrative offices and many of the coaching offices for the Hurricanes.

### **KNIGHT SPORTS COMPLEX**

Home to the UM women's volleyball team, the Knight Sports Complex

was completed in 1985 and houses practice courts, locker rooms and coaching offices. The facility was refurbished with a new permanent playing surface in the spring of 1994 and previously served as the home court of Miami women's basketball.

### **MARK LIGHT FIELD AT ALEX RODRIGUEZ PARK**

Completed in 1977—and refurbished with natural grass for the first time in 1994, "The Light" has been the home of four-time College NCAA World Series Champions Hurricanes baseball. Currently

undergoing renovations, the facility has a seating capacity of 5,000 and features an assortment of concessions for the enjoyment of fans.

**NEIL SCHIFF TENNIS CENTER**

Dedicated in 1987, the home of Miami tennis is one of the top-five facilities in the country. With 16 courts and seating for 1,000 spectators, the facility hosts many of the nation's top amateur events, including the International Junior Orange Bowl Tournament, ITCA Women's Rolex Qualifier and rounds of the NCAA Tournament.

**NORMAN WHITTEN STUDENT UNION POOL**

Located in the heart of UM's campus, the Whitten Student Union Pool has been home to 35 National Title winners and 28 Olympians, including three-time National Champion and five-time World Champion diver Greg Louganis.

**ORANGE BOWL**

Dedicated on Dec. 10, 1937, the Orange Bowl has served as the home of Miami football for seven decades. With a seating capacity of 72,319, the facility has played host

to five Super Bowls and numerous collegiate bowl games. Since 1970, when the national champion was first selected following the completion of the bowl season, the Orange Bowl Classic has hosted 11 games that decided the national title. Until the 1996 season, when the OBC moved to Dolphin Stadium, the Orange Bowl had hosted eight of the previous 11 national title games, including the University of Miami's championship wins in 1983, 1987 and 1991. Beginning in 2008, Miami's football program will call Dolphin Stadium its new home.

**WELLNESS CENTER**

This state-of-the-art recreation and fitness facility opened in January 1996. Located next to the Hecht and Stanford Residential Colleges, the Wellness Center provides students a variety of activities and services, including a fitness room with nautilus and free weights; aerobics, yoga and spinning classes; an elevated indoor track; gymnasium with basketball, volleyball and badminton courts; racquetball and squash courts; as well as an indoor pool, spa and sauna.



## U TRADITION: HURRICANES 101



### **THE NAME: THE HURRICANES**

It began in controversy. Some reports say the players on the 1927 football team held a team meeting to select Hurricanes, hoping they would sweep away opponents just as the devastating storm did on Sept. 16, 1926. Another version holds that Jack Bell, a columnist for the old Miami News, asked end Porter Norris of the 1926 team what the team should be called. Told that the local dignitaries and University officials wanted to name the team for a local flora or fauna, Norris said the players wouldn't stand for it and suggested "Hurricanes" since the opening game had been postponed by such a storm. From time to time, opposition has arisen to the name that would "reinforce Miami's negative reputation as a weather-beaten community living constantly under the threat of destruction." But as one UM official rationalized in the 1960s, "Does anyone think Chicago is overrun by bears just because the town has a football team by that name?"

### **THE COLORS: ORANGE, GREEN & WHITE**

UM's school colors were selected in 1926 and are representative of the Florida orange tree—with orange symbolizing the fruit of the tree, green representing the leaves and white signifying the blossoms.

### **THE U**

In 1973, UM's Athletic Federation, the fundraising arm of the athletic department at the time, commissioned a local public relations expert to develop a distinctive logo. The University had gone several years with a variety of helmet and uniform changes, and the Federation noted that a number of major colleges have the initials UM. Miami designer Bill Bodenhamer suggested the "U" idea, which lent itself to distinctive logos for each sport as well as slogans like "U gotta believe" and "U is great". In recent years, the well-known U logo—and such outspoken proponents as former Miami standout and NFL Hall of Famer Michael Irvin, has inspired fans to begin referring to the University of Miami as "the U" and showing their support by making a U symbol with their hands.

### **THE MASCOT: SEBASTIAN THE IBIS**

Folklore maintains that the ibis, a symbol of knowledge found in the Everglades and Egypt, is the last sign of wildlife to take shelter before a hurricane and the first to reappear after the storm. The local marsh bird was considered UM's first unofficial mascot when the school yearbook adopted the name "Ibis" in 1926. Its popularity grew among the students during the 1950s. In 1957, San Sebastian Hall, a residence hall on campus, sponsored an ibis entry in the homecoming celebration. The next year, student John Stormont performed at games in an Ibis costume that was glued, sewn and pinned together and served as the beginnings of today's bird. Through the years, the Ibis has become one of the most recognizable college mascots in the United States.

### **IRON ARROW**

Members of the prestigious Iron Arrow Honor Society can be seen around campus wearing their brightly colored Seminole Indian jackets and beating the ritual drum on "the Rock" in front of the University Center (UC). Admission to the elite Tribe, a mystery to the uninitiated, is the highest honor attained at the University of Miami. Induction into Iron Arrow is known as tapping, a ritual that involves a procession and marking the tappees foreheads with orange, white and green stripes. Founded by Bowman Foster Ashe in 1926 only a month after the University opened, the society honors individuals who best exemplify the five qualities of Iron Arrow: love of alma mater, character, leadership, scholarship and humility.

## U BASKETBALL: ONLY THE BEST



### **GRADUATION SUCCESS**

The University of Miami boasts a 100 percent Graduation Success Rate (GSR) for women's basketball according to the latest statistical information released by the NCAA. The report is published annually and this particular data took into account the percentage of athletes who originally enrolled between 1990 and 1999 and earned a degree within six years of enrollment.

### **PLAYING IN THE NATION'S TOP CONFERENCE**

As members of the Atlantic Coast Conference (ACC), student-athletes at Miami have the opportunity to play against the nation's top programs. In 2006-07, eight ACC teams earned postseason bids, including six NCAA Tournament berths. It marked the fifth-straight year the league has sent at least six teams to the Big Dance.

### **MAKING THE POSTSEASON**

The University of Miami women's basketball program has advanced to the postseason in four of the last six seasons, including a 2006 appearance in the Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT).

### **ALL-CONFERENCE HONORS**

The Hurricanes have produced 28 all-conference selections in the school's 34-year history, including WNBA First Round selection Tamara James, who held the distinction of being one of only three players to earn First Team All-ACC accolades from 2004-05 through 2005-06. In 2006-07, Renee Taylor—the ACC's leading scorer—was named to the Second Team All-ACC.

### **ALL-AMERICANS**

Since 1991, the University of Miami has produced 13 First, Second, Third or Honorable Mention All-Americans.

### **NATIONAL PLAYER OF THE YEAR**

Always in the national spotlight, former University of Miami standout Frances Savage was named the 1992 Sports Illustrated National Player of the Year.

### **PREPARING FOR THE WNBA**

The University of Miami has proven to be a building ground for players looking to excel beyond the college ranks and into the world of professional basketball. In the 10-year history of the WNBA, four former Hurricanes have donned league uniforms, including Tamara James, who was selected as the eighth pick in the First Round of the 2006 WNBA Draft by the Washington Mystics, and Octavia Blue, who was selected by the Los Angeles Sparks in the Second Round as the 15th overall pick in the 1998 Draft.

### **MEDIA EXPOSURE**

Miami's women's basketball program is covered by several of the nation's top media outlets. Miami is located in the nation's 17th-largest television market, the 12th-largest radio market and the 12th-largest newspaper market. The Hurricanes will play no fewer than two games on television as part of an ACC-package that features a total of 90 television appearances in 2007-08. In addition to having games broadcast on ESPN and ESPN2, the ACC will broadcast many games on the league's regional sports networks—which include Comcast SportsNet, Fox Sports Net South, Fox Sports Net Florida and New England Sports Network, reaching approximately 24 million households.

### **THE NATION'S BEST FACILITIES**

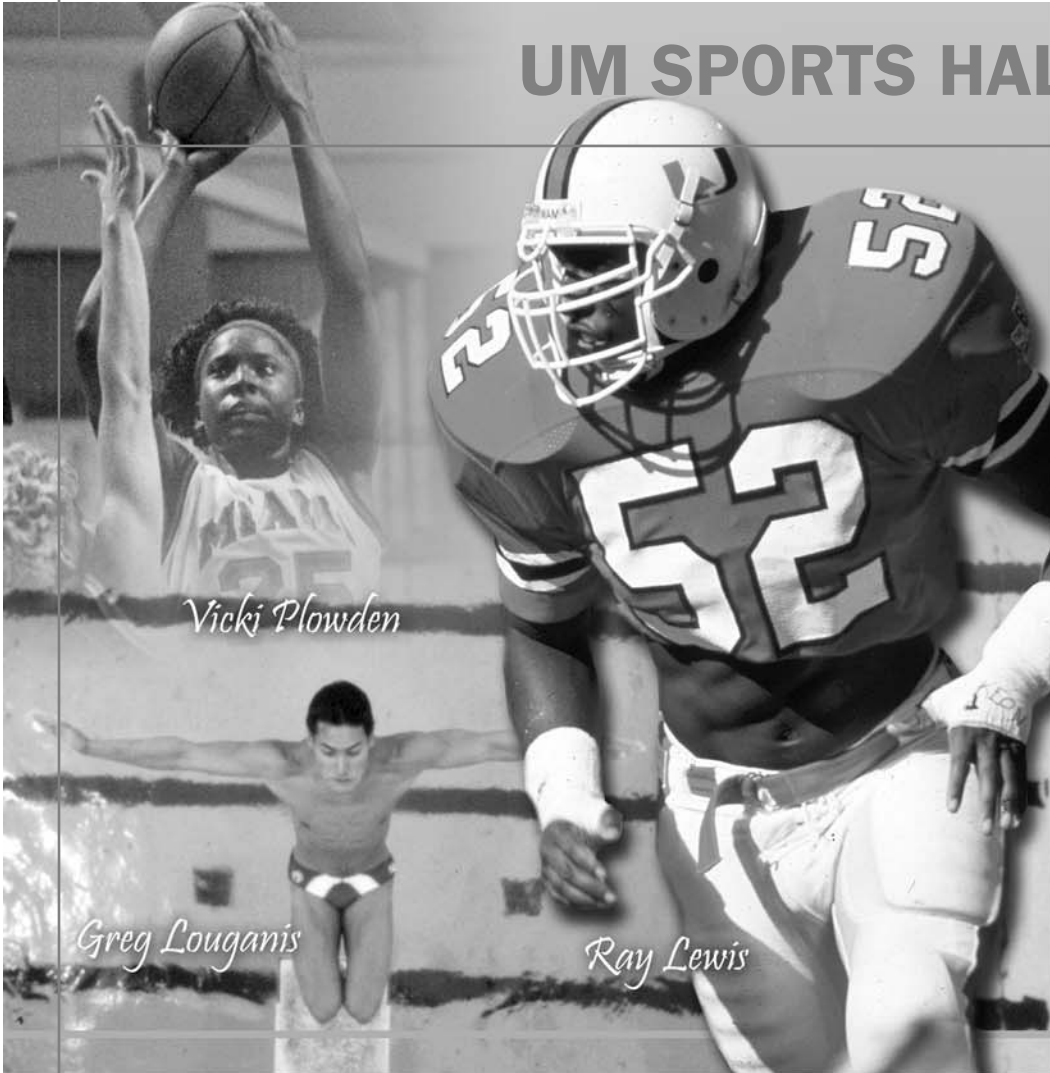
Miami plays all home games in the four-year old BankUnited Center, a \$48 million, 7,000 seat, on-campus arena that features administrative offices for men's and women's basketball, carpeted locker rooms, a weight room, player lounge areas, banquet facilities, private suites and convention space.

### **COACHED BY THE BEST**

The University of Miami women's basketball program operates under the direction of third-year head coach Katie Meier. In her six-year career as a head coach, Meier's teams have advanced to the NCAA Tournament once and Women's National Invitation Tournament (WNIT) three times, including UM's 2006 berth.

The University of Miami Sports Hall of Fame was officially created on April 13, 1966. Several judges of the Circuit Court of Dade County, all of whom were UM alumni, spearheaded the Hall's creation as a method of recognizing "those who have contributed most to Hurricane athletics over the years."

The 2007 inductees were: Randy Ableman (Diving Coach), J.D. Arteaga (Baseball), Albert Bentley (Football), Maurice Crum (Football), Danny Graves (Baseball), Mike McCoy (Basketball), Vicki Plowden (Basketball) and Rachel Violet (Tennis). Including the 2007 class, there have been 336 inductees into the Hall, which is housed on the UM campus adjacent to the Hecht Athletic Center.

Ray Lewis, who played football for the Hurricanes and went on to win a Super Bowl with the Baltimore Ravens, said about his 2006 induction, "This honor for me, right now today is the happiest day of my life. Words can't adequately explain. This is it. I've been to the top of a lot of things, even the Super Bowl, but this is legendary."

### THE HEAT ON THE COURT

Thanks to South Florida's year-round, sports-friendly climate, Miami has a lot to offer in outdoor recreational activities. From some of the PGA's finest golf courses to almost 700 parks, there is something for everyone. With countless opportunities for kayaking, scuba-diving, fishing, beach volleyball and rollerblading, there is no excuse for going without a tan.

South Florida truly has the perfect weather for sports and is one of only eight metropolitan areas in the United States that can boast of a professional franchise in each of the four major sports. The Major League's Florida Marlins had everybody "doing the fish" when they won the World Series in 1997 and 2003. The NFL's Miami Dolphins have thrilled fans for decades at Dolphin Stadium, which hosted the Super Bowl in 1995, 1999 and 2007. Despite the warm weather, South Florida's own hockey team, the Florida Panthers, keep up on the ice. And for basketball fans, the 2006 NBA Champion Miami Heat keep things hot at the American Airlines Arena.

### MIAMI IS CALIENTE

Truly a melting pot, Miami is home to a variety of cultures, creating a totally unique, vibrant cultural mosaic. With representatives of every Hispanic nation in the world, Spanish serves as a second language to most of Miami's residents. Little Havana is the heart of Miami's Cuban community, where churro vendors line the streets, the aroma of high-octane cafe Cubano fills the air and the spirit of friendly competition fills Domino Park.

The spirit of the Caribbean is alive in Little Haiti, where many Haitian artists, musicians and entrepreneurs get their start in Miami. The proud focal point of this neighborhood is the Caribbean Market, an open-air replica of Port-au-Prince's Iron Market, where Creole is the dominant language.

### SIZZLING THE SILVER SCREEN

With tropical weather, a high-quality labor pool, low production costs and direct links to Latin America, Miami has become one of the most important entertainment centers in the world. Dubbed as the Latin-American Hollywood by the *New York Times*, such blockbusters as *Big Trouble*—written by *Miami Herald* columnist Dave Barry, *Any Given Sunday*, *There's Something About Mary*, *The Birdcage* and *Wild Things* were all filmed in Miami.

A Hollywood favorite off-screen as well, Miami is home to dozens of celebrities and even more consider it a favorite weekend getaway. Glorinda and Emilio Estefan's Star Island estate and Gianni Versace's Ocean Drive mansion-turned-museum are just a couple examples of Miami's celebrity appeal. It is not uncommon to spot Sean "Diddy" Combs or Jamie Foxx dancing at a South Beach club or former president Bill Clinton playing golf at the Biltmore Hotel.

## MIAMI HOT SPOTS

For shopping, dancing or just plain people watching, Miami offers several places to see and be seen.

With over 800 buildings designed in the '30s and '40s, South Beach serves as the largest collection of Art Deco architecture in the world. Celebrity-owned restaurants, like Cameron Diaz's Bambu, night clubs such as Level—based on the format of New York's Studio 54, and a medley of huge anchor stores and unique boutiques create the flavor of Miami's most famous hot spot.

Coconut Grove, just a 10-minute drive from the University of Miami, is another student favorite. Built mainly by West Indian craftsmen brought in from the Bahamas, it still holds onto the Caribbean appeal its name suggests. Attracting writers, artists and non-conformists, this hub of the bohemian arts contributed to Miami's cultural renaissance. Fast-forward a century and the Grove is still one of Miami's hottest nightspots, with more than 75 cafes, restaurants and clubs that line the streets.

## THE WARMTH OF CORAL GABLES, THE "CITY BEAUTIFUL"

The University of Miami campus is located in Coral Gables, dubbed the "City Beautiful". Founded by George Merrick almost a century ago, the Gables is one of Miami's most beautiful areas. The palm-lined streets are all named after European villages, each one bordered by Old Spanish style homes.

Downtown Coral Gables is bustling with the many offices of multi-national corporations, while the city's central boulevard—Miracle Mile—is home to a wide array of designer boutiques and art galleries. One Gables favorite is the Venetian Pool, a beautiful swimming lagoon carved out of coral, which features cascading waterfalls and underwater caves.

## UNIVERSITY PRESIDENT DONNA E. SHALALA

Donna E. Shalala became the fifth President of the University of Miami on June 1, 2001. President Shalala is an accomplished scholar, teacher and administrator whose career has been marked by a variety of leadership positions reflecting her interest in young people. She is also a big sports fan!

While attending college, she played tennis and still plays a competitive game of doubles. She also enjoys golf, skiing and other outdoor activities.

At a typical Hurricanes football game, Shalala spends the first quarter in the stands talking with students, and then she sits in her outdoor seats for a quarter. The rest of the time is spent in the boxes on what she calls business. "I'm talking to donors, I'm trying to raise money," she said. "I look forward to the day where I can sit down and watch an entire game from beginning to end. I can usually do that only at a bowl game."

In 1987 President Shalala, a distinguished political scientist, became the first woman chancellor of a Big Ten university, the University of Wisconsin-Madison. She led what was then the nation's largest public research

university. In 1992 Business Week magazine named her one of the top five managers in higher education, and in 2005 was named one of "America's Best Leaders" by U.S. News & World Report and the Center for Public Leadership at Harvard University's Kennedy School of Government.

President Shalala's success at Wisconsin was reflected in athletics as well. She hired a new football coach, recruiting Barry Alvarez from Notre Dame. Four years later, Wisconsin won the Big Ten football championship and represented its conference in the Rose Bowl for the first time in 30 years. President Shalala served on the first Knight Commission, a committee to review college athletics, and has served on the board of the National Collegiate Athletic Association Foundation.

In 1993, Shalala was named U.S. Secretary for Health and Human

Services (HHS) and served for eight years, becoming the nation's longest-serving HHS Secretary. In 2000 she led the official U.S. delegation to the Olympics in Sydney, Australia. At the end of her tenure as HHS Secretary, The Washington Post described her as "one of the most successful government managers of modern times."

In early 2007, U.S. President George W. Bush called upon her healthcare expertise to co-chair a commission on care for America's returning wounded warriors.

As president of the University of Miami, President Shalala presides over one of the most successful college athletic programs in the country. The Hurricanes football program has consistently ranked in the top of the polls. In 2001 the baseball team won its fourth College World Series and the football team won its fifth national championship. In 2003 the men and women's basketball teams began playing in a new, on-campus facility, the BankUnited

Center. Other Hurricanes sports, from tennis to track, have also earned national recognition.

The Black Coaches Association honored her with its Image of Excellence Award for 2007.

As to the future of UM athletics, Shalala said, "We have to make sure that we have first-class facilities and coaches. We need substantial fan support for all of our sports to be able to maintain them at the highest competitive levels. All of our sports deserve strong support. We have to make sure we have enough opportunities for young women and men. Compliance will always demand our attention. We have people of great integrity. I believe our biggest challenge is not getting complacent about our programs, and investing in women's sports at the same level as men's sports."

For a sports fan like President Shalala, there is no better place to call home than the University of Miami.

Members of the women's basketball team and staff were honored to meet Chief Justice John Roberts when he came to speak at UM by invitation of President Shalala in November 2006.



# DIRECTOR OF ATHLETICS PAUL DEE

Paul Dee has served as Director of Athletics since 1993 and has announced his intention to retire on June 1, 2008. After 15 years in his position, he will tie for the longest tenure of any UM Athletic Director with Jack Harding, who was the first to hold that position. In his final year, Dee still has many plans to keep the University of Miami athletic department among the finest in intercollegiate sports.

Prior being named Athletic Director, Dee had served the University as its Vice President and General Counsel beginning in 1981.

During his tenure as Director of Athletics, Dee has focused the efforts of the athletic department on four major points of emphasis: 1) the success of its programs; 2) the development of its student-athletes, both athletically and academically; 3) the quality of its staff; and 4) the improvement of facilities. The department has achieved success in each of these areas.

and 2004. Included in those league championships were eight football titles, eight women's tennis titles, seven men's tennis titles, six Big East women's outdoor track and field championships, two women's indoor track, and one title in men's basketball, women's basketball and men's swimming and diving.

Under Dee's supervision, the University of Miami athletic department has added full scholarship programs in women's soccer, women's volleyball and women's rowing.

### STUDENT-ATHLETE SUCCESS

University of Miami student-athletes have continued to achieve academically. UM student-athletes have shown consistent improvement in grade-point average and graduation rates over the last decade. In fall semester 2006, UM student-athletes recorded a collective 2.90 grade point average, the best GPA performance for a semester in school history. In 2007, every sports team surpassed the minimum

Coach of the Year honors, including nine by diving coach Randy Ableman, four by baseball coach Jim Morris, and one by women's golf coach Lela Cannon.

### IMPROVEMENT AND EXPANSION OF FACILITIES

Since 1993, the University of Miami athletic program has seen an almost complete makeover of its athletic facilities. During that period, Dee has overseen the following facility projects:

- Construction of the BankUnited Center
- The three-year renovation of baseball's Alex Rodriguez Park at Mark Light Field
- Construction of a new football fields at Greentree Practice Fields
- Construction of Cobb Stadium
- Renovation of football locker and equipment rooms
- Renovation of the athletic training room
- Renovation of athletic department offices

### PROGRAM SUCCESS

During Dee's tenure as Director of Athletics, the University of Miami has won three team national championships (baseball in 1999 and 2001, football in 2001).

In its first three years in the Atlantic Coast Conference, UM teams won four conference championships in women's indoor and outdoor track, and the women's tennis team finished No. 2 in the country in 2006. The football team has been to bowl games all three seasons. The men's basketball program has played in the postseason twice.

Prior to joining the Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004, Miami was a dominant program in the Big East Conference, winning 34 league titles between 1993

standard needed in the NCAA's Academic Progress Report. In the three years the APR has been compiled, Miami has never been subject to any penalties for not meeting the NCAA mandated minimum requirements.

Perhaps the most successful scholar-athlete of the last decade at UM was football offensive tackle Joaquin Gonzalez, who earned the 2001 HealthSouth Draddy Award (the "Academic Heisman"), in addition to earning first-team All-America honors on the field in 2000 and 2001.

### QUALITY OF STAFF

Miami coaches have been widely recognized by their peers as some of the nation's best. The current UM coaching staff has earned a combined 15 National

Dee believes intensified fundraising efforts and developing stronger interest in women's sports are vital to ensuring the

future success of the Hurricanes' program.

### NATIONAL INFLUENCE

During his 14 years as Director of Athletics, Dee has been active in professional activities. Dee has served on several NCAA committees, including the Committee on Certification and the Management Council. He is currently a member of the Committee on Infractions, and serves as its Vice Chairman.

### BEFORE MIAMI

Before joining the University of Miami, Dee was with the Miami law firm of Mershon, Sawyer, Johnston, Dunwoody & Cole and was a law clerk for Chief U.S. District Judge Charles Fulton in Miami. He received his bachelor of arts degree from the University of Florida in 1970 and his master's of education and juris doctor degrees with honors from the University of Miami in 1973 and 1977, respectively. Dee has a son, Terrance, who practices law in Miami.

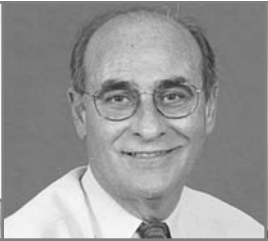

### OFFICE OF ATHLETIC COMPLIANCE

David Reed, Stephen Clacherty, Jamie Israel and Debbie Foley form one of the nation's most comprehensive compliance departments. They work closely with the Hurricanes athletic department to ensure full compliance with institutional, Atlantic Coast Conference and NCAA rules and regulations.

Dear Prospective Student-Athlete:

As a prospective student-athlete, you may have the athletic potential to play college basketball at the Division I level. If so, you probably will be exposed to an enormous amount of recruitment activities from universities across the country.

Throughout the recruitment process, coaches will reference various NCAA rules and regulations. The rules are designed for various reasons. The most important of which are to ease the pressures on prospective student-athletes and to level the playing field so that all universities operate within the same guidelines.

#### During the recruiting process you may have the following questions:

- When and how often can I visit an institution's campus?
- When, where and how often can a coach telephone me?
- How many times can a coach observe me in practice and/or competition?
- What academic criteria must I meet to be eligible to play Division I basketball?

The answers to these questions and more can be obtained from the University of Miami Compliance Office or the NCAA by requesting the NCAA Guide for the College-Bound Student-Athlete. The guide may be provided to a prospective student-athlete at any time. The guide addresses issues related to Divisions I, II and III academic eligibility, financial aid, recruitment and more.

To receive a copy of the guide call the NCAA Hotline at 1-800-638-3731 or request it from the University of Miami coach who is recruiting you.

Please remember that since violations of NCAA rules during your recruitment could jeopardize your athletic eligibility, it is important for you and your parents to be informed and to ask questions throughout the recruiting process.

## Who is a Prospective Student-Athlete (Prospect)?

You are a prospect if you have started classes for the ninth grade. Before the ninth grade, you may become a prospect if a university provides you (or your family or friends) any financial aid or other benefit that is not usually provided to prospective student-athletes.

## You are no longer a prospect if you have done any of the following:

(1) Officially register and enroll in a minimum full-time program of studies and have attended classes in any four-year collegiate institution's regular academic year (excluding summer); or (2) Participated in a regular squad practice or competition at a four-year collegiate institution that occurs before the beginning of any term; or (3) Officially register, enroll and attend classes during the summer prior to initial enrollment and receive institutional athletics aid.

## How do I know if I'm being recruited?

A coach is recruiting you if they try to convince you directly, or through your family, to attend their school and participate in intercollegiate athletics. There are several ways to be recruited: (1) a coach may provide you with an official paid visit to view the campus, (2) a coach may arrange an in-person, off-campus meeting with you (or your family), or (3) a coach or staff member may call you (or your family) on more than one occasion for the purpose of recruitment.

Coaches and authorized institutional staff members are the only individuals who may recruit you. Representatives of athletic interests (boosters) may not call, write or make in-person contact with you anywhere for the purpose of recruiting you to a university and participating in athletics.

## When can a coach contact me?

**Off Campus Contact** In the sport of basketball, a coach can arrange a face-to-face meeting with you, off the University's campus, beginning the first day of classes of your senior year. In all other sports, a coach can arrange a face-to-face meeting with you, off the University's campus, beginning July 1 after your junior year.

## Telephone Calls

■ In the sport of women's basketball, coaches may make one telephone call per month during the months of April (on or after the Thursday after the conclusion of the NCAA Division I Final Four) and May of the prospect's junior year in high school, one telephone call between June 1 and June 20 and one telephone call between June 21 and June 30 of the prospect's junior year in high school. Three telephone calls to a prospect are permitted during the month of July, with no more than one call per week.

■ In the following circumstances unlimited calls to a prospect are permitted: (1) during the five days immediately preceding an official visit to the University of Miami, (2) on the initial date for signing the National Letter of Intent and the two days following the signing date, and (3) on the day of a coach's off-campus contact with a prospect

■ For all sports, coaches may receive telephone calls placed by a prospect at the prospect's expense at anytime, including before July 1 following the prospect's junior year in high school.

## Letters

In sports other than men's basketball, letters and recruiting information may be sent to you starting September 1 at the beginning of your junior year in high school. In men's basketball, recruiting materials may be provided starting June 15 at the conclusion of the prospect's sophomore year.

## What is a Contact?

A contact is any face-to-face encounter between a prospect or the prospect's parent(s) or legal guardian and an institutional staff member or athletic representative during which any dialogue occurs in excess of an



exchange of a greeting. **NOTE:** At the Division I level, athletic representatives (boosters) may not contact you for the purpose of recruiting.

## What can a school offer me to attend their University?

You (or your family) may not receive any benefit, inducement or arrangements such as cash, clothing, cars, gifts or loans to encourage you to sign a National Letter of Intent or to attend a NCAA school.

A University may offer you a one-year scholarship that covers room and board, tuition and fees and required course-related books, or any part of these. The institution can recommend that this aid is renewed each year, as is the general practice at the University of Miami, but this renewal is not guaranteed. In addition, they can offer you quality academic and medical support, as well as the opportunity to compete for one of the nation's top programs.

## What can I do during this process?

Enjoy your high school years and work hard both in the classroom and in your sport. At the beginning of your junior year you should sign up for the NCAA Clearinghouse. Your high school guidance office can provide you with the information to register.

## ATHLETIC ACADEMIC SERVICES

The Athletic Academic Services Staff of the University of Miami Athletic Department is committed to providing the academic support services necessary to facilitate the graduation of student athletes and the nurturing of skills to promote the development of responsible, well-rounded individuals. This mission is fulfilled through our commitment to promote athletics, academics, personal development and career development.

### THE RETENTION PROGRAMS

The University of Miami offers unique programs designed to assist student-athletes in their pursuit of a college education. These are a few of the programs offered to assist student-athletes:

#### UMX FRESHMAN EXPERIENCE COURSE

A unique class designed to assist freshman student-athletes with the transition from high school to college.

#### PROACTIVE MENTORSHIP PROGRAM

This program is designed to assist student-athletes with the transition skills necessary to be successful college students. All freshmen are required to participate and meet once a week with a mentor covering issues such as time management, goal-setting, class preparation, test preparation, etc.

#### STUDY TABLE PROGRAM

Provides valuable locations and time to accomplish academic goals. Structured times, group and individual tutorials, computer labs and quiet areas are designated for this program.

#### F.A.S.T. PROGRAM (FRESHMAN ACADEMIC SUCCESS TRAINING)

The main purpose of this program is to ensure a smooth and successful transition from high school to college through academic success training. This will be accomplished through closely monitoring incoming at-risk student-athletes so as to ensure the use of efficient time management and study skills. Assumptions are made that all of our student-athletes come to us with good study habits, academic knowledge and social judgment. This program will address all these areas and be reinforced throughout the semester.

#### COMPUTER LAB

Located within the Hecht Athletic Center, student-athletes have access to 30 personal computers with Internet access and conduct research. The lab also has 20 laptop computers that student-athletes can check out and take with them on team trips, or when they want to work on their own.

#### TUTORS

Level 1 certified tutors by the College Reading and Learning Association provide individual and group assistance upon request. The tutor program at the University of Miami is one of a small number of athletic programs in the country to be awarded CRLA certification.

#### LEARNING RESOURCE ROOM

Student-athletes with disabilities have access to computer programs that aid in their educational skill development.

#### ROGER BELL (M.S.)

Assistant Athletic Director for Academic Services

A 15-year veteran at UM, Bell oversees the Academic Services and also serves as the academic advisor for women's swimming/diving and men's diving, and Life Skills Programs. Bell graduated from Morehouse College in 1972 with a bachelor's degree in education and completed a master's degree in educational leadership at Miami. 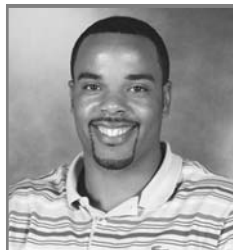
**SPENCER WELBORN (M.S.Ed)**

Angie Lawrence is in her third year as an assistant athletic trainer at the University of Miami. She is primarily responsible for the athletic training and rehabilitation of the women's basketball and rowing teams, however she assists with the care of all UM student-athletes as necessary.

Lawrence came to UM in the summer of 2005, following an eight-year stint at the University of North Carolina at Charlotte. At Charlotte she handled the athletic training needs for the women's basketball program in addition to serving as a clinical instructor for student athletic trainers.

Prior to her position at Charlotte, Lawrence served as a student athletic trainer at Appalachian State, earning a bachelor's degree in health promotion in 1997. Following her graduation, she served as a graduate assistant at Charlotte and went on to earn a master's in health promotion and kinesiology in 1999.

Hurricane student-athletes receive the very best in state-of-the-art professional medical care. Head Athletic Trainer Scott McGonagle and veteran athletic trainers Kevin Blaske, Kelly Donahue, Angie Lawrence, Ron LeClair, Megan Rogers, Logan Merritt, Lisa Sahagun, Wes Brown and Joseph Ochoa work hand-in-hand with a full staff of internists, surgeons, dentists, optometrists and counselors to monitor and provide the best in health care to each student-athlete on a year-round basis.

Nationally respected and renowned in the Miami-Dade medical community, UM's certified athletic trainers serve as the gatekeepers for the health care of Miami's student-athletes. They perform injury rehabilitation, evaluate injuries, perform therapy, use ultrasound and manage and care for wounds.

The University of Miami athletic training room is equipped with the latest in diagnostic and rehabilitative equipment. Computerized testing and a wide range of aerobic conditioning equipment are also available to help design individual rehabilitation programs and help reduce the risk of re-injury. The athletic training room also utilizes Biodex machines to further aid athletes in their rehabilitation.

The University has teamed up with the country's finest physicians to assist in the care of UM athletes. The entire medical staff is on 24-hour call should the need arise for urgent treatment.

Miami also offers a comprehensive program intended to aid and educate student-athletes concerning the problems and dangers associated with the usage of drugs and substance abuse. The program consists of drug education, testing, counseling and rehabilitation.

The University of Miami has also created a major field of study for athletic training. All student trainers at UM are required to participate in the major under the guidance of program director Scott McGonagle. Current UM athletic trainers have a wealth of knowledge in the field and have a combined 40 years of experience between them.

The Hurricane training room is easily accessible to all student-athletes and is centrally located in the Hecht Athletic Center.

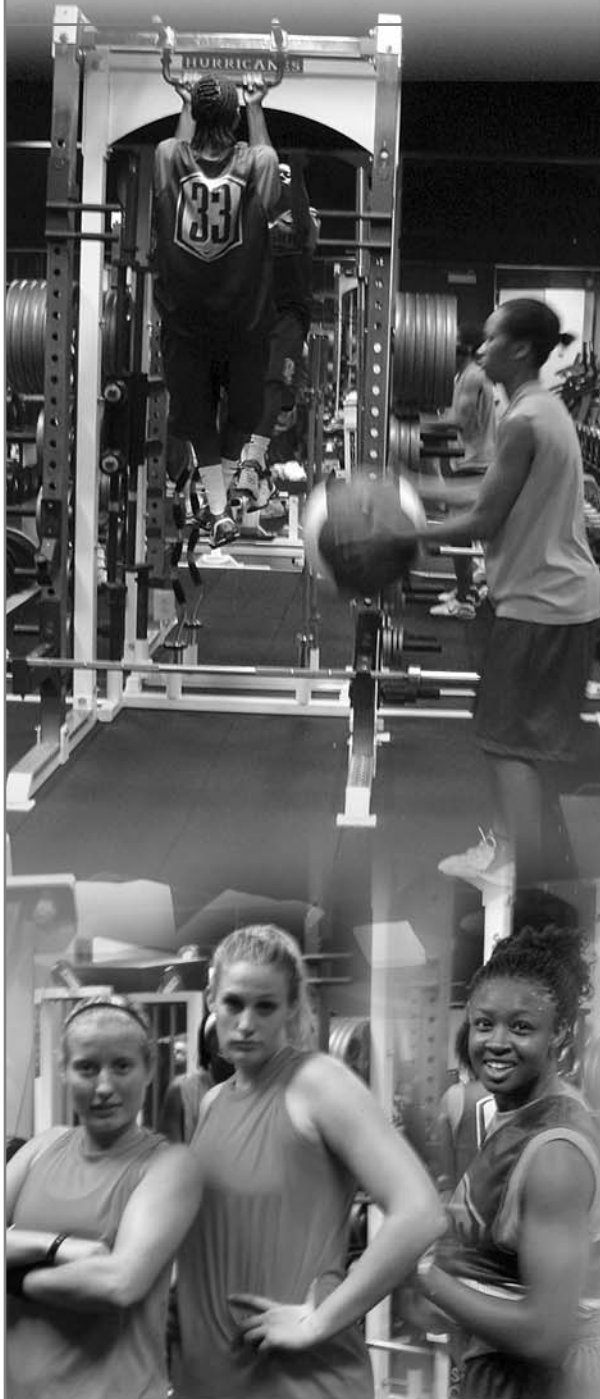

## STRENGTH & CONDITIONING



### HURRICANE STRENGTH & CONDITIONING PROGRAM

The Hurricane strength & conditioning program operates under the guidance of head strength & conditioning coach Andreu Swasey. Known for his enthusiastic approach to weight training and for developing year-round sport-specific programs for each student-athlete, Swasey along with assistant strength coaches Mac Calloway, Cols Colas, Jimmy Goins, Victor Ishmael and Andrew Klich, assures that Hurricane student-athletes are given the personalized instruction and tools to reach their full physical potential.

The goal of Miami's strength & conditioning program is to minimize injury risk and enhance all physical parameters, including strength, speed, power, flexibility and cardiovascular endurance.

To help achieve this goal, the University added a \$4.9 million weight room. The 12,000-square foot state-of-the-art facility houses 20 custom-designed weight lifting stations, 17 cardiovascular machines, a stretching station, a dumbbell and rehab station and over 44,000 pounds of weights.

Each year when freshmen athletes report, baseline data is collected and a weight-training program is designed. Under the guidance of the strength staff, each student-athlete's progress is closely monitored and documented.

UM athletes also have the use of the track at Cobb Stadium. Known as one of the nation's top training tracks, it allows Hurricane student-athletes the opportunity to work on all facets of speed training.



### ANDREW KLICH

Assistant Strength & Conditioning Coach

The strength & conditioning program for the University of Miami's women's basketball team is under the guidance of assistant strength & conditioning coach Andrew Klich. Klich, who is in his third year with the Hurricanes, also oversees the track & field and swimming & diving programs for Miami.

He came to UM after serving a year as a graduate assistant strength & conditioning coach at the North Carolina, where he worked with the Tar Heel women's basketball and football teams. Prior to working at UNC, Klich spent a year as the strength & conditioning coach for Knapp Wrestling Camps and Clinics.

In 2002, he served a year as the assistant nutrition coordinator of the University of Connecticut, and prior to that worked as the performance coach at ASK Fitness from 1996-2002. While working towards his degree in human performance from UConn, Klich worked as a student athletic trainer from 1994-96.

A member of the National Strength & Conditioning Association, Klich is also a certified United States Olympic Weightlifting Coach.

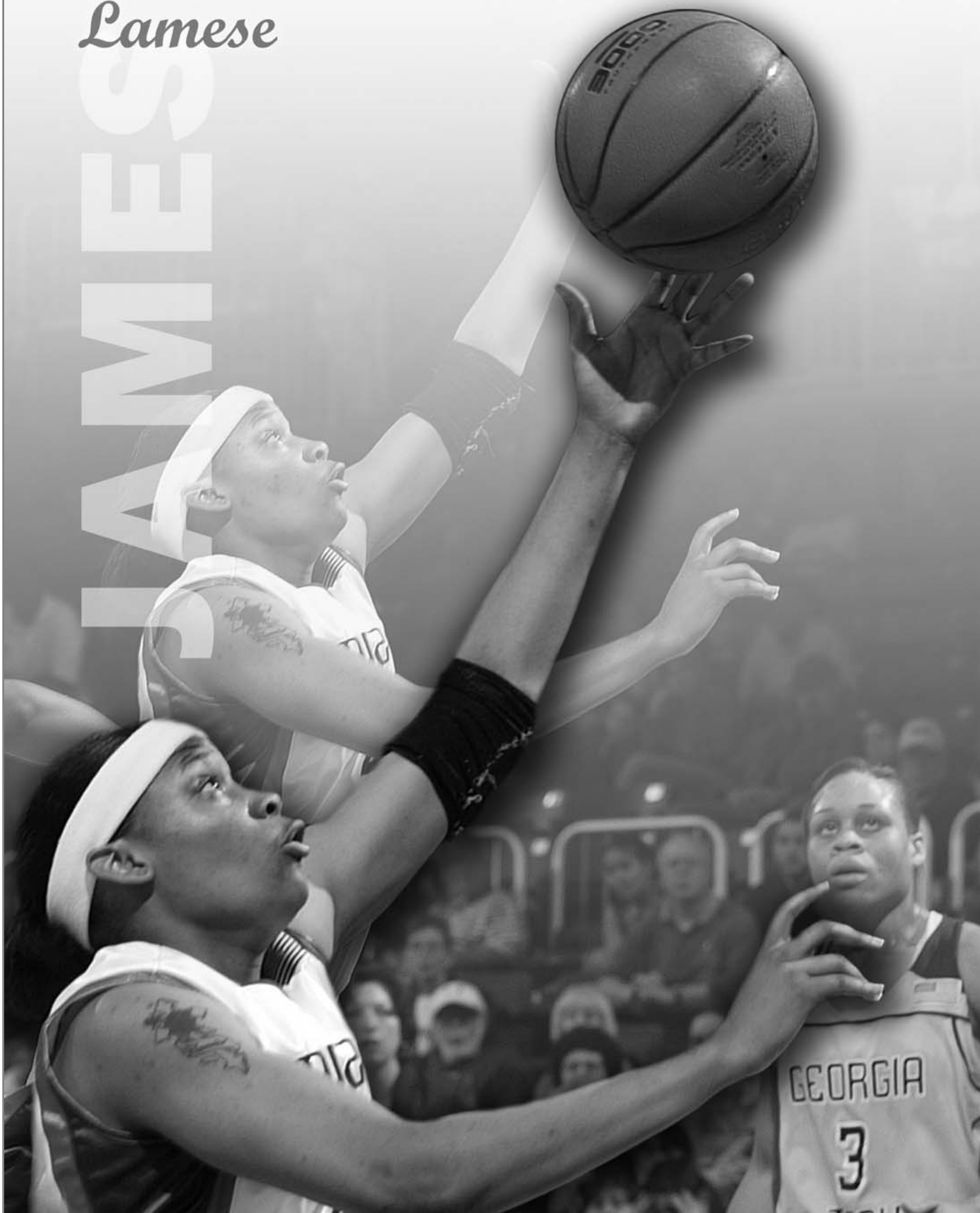

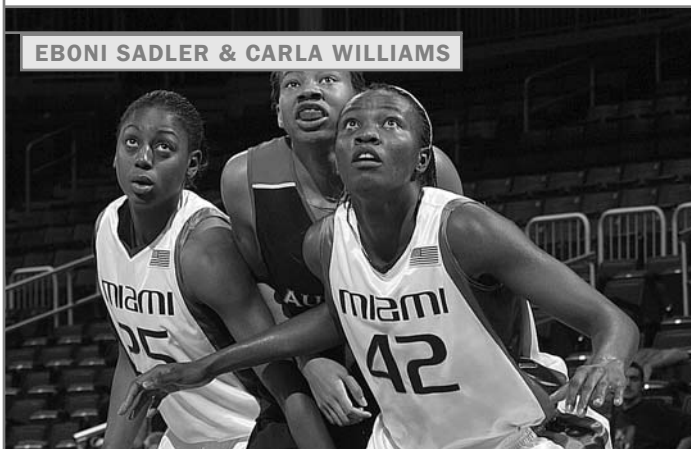

## GAME 21: VIRGINIA TECH 78, MIAMI 71

**1/25/07—Blacksburg, Va...** Maurita Reid finished with a career-high 28 points and Renee Taylor added 17 points, but it wasn't enough as Miami fell to Virginia Tech, 78-71. The Hokies shot 47.5 percent from the field and 80.8 percent from the line. Although the 'Canes managed to hit 53.8 percent of their three-point attempts (7-13) in the second half—including four of Reid's career-high five treys, they struggled in the first half and shot just 36.1 percent from the field and 68.8 percent from the line. UM opened the second half trailing, 37-25, when Taylor hit a three-pointer. Reid followed it with another to bring Miami within six. Another pair of back-to-back threes from Taylor and Reid knotted the game at 45-all with 13:35 remaining. The Hokies answered with six straight and would lead by as many as nine points. A 12-2 Miami run—including consecutive three-point plays from Taylor and Reid—brought the Hurricanes within a basket, down 68-66, and Reid's fifth trey kept Miami within three, 74-71, with 1:07 to go. But a layup from Brittany Cook, followed by a pair of Hokie free throws, sealed the win for Virginia Tech.

Renee Taylor got Miami's offense going early, scoring the first six points for the Hurricanes, but a 12-4 Florida State run pushed the Seminoles on top, 25-17, with 7:10 to go in the opening period. The Hurricanes responded with a seven-point outburst from Maurita Reid and Miami would outscore its visitors, 15-5, over the remainder of half to take the 32-30 lead into the break. The teams traded baskets and the lead after intermission, but a 10-0 FSU run late in the half broke open the game for the 'Noles as they took the 66-56 lead with 3:52 to go. Miami tried to hammer away at the FSU advantage, including three-pointers from Albrey Grimsley and Cunningham in the last two minutes, but it wasn't enough as the Seminoles sealed the game from the line.

**1/28/07—Coral Gables, Fla...** Five Clemson players scored in double figures as Miami fell, 79-69. Carrie Whitehurst led Clemson with 15 points on a career-high five three-pointers, as the Tigers edged the 'Canes in field goal percentage (44.6 percent to 39.6 percent) and rebounding (44-33), while grabbing 15 steals—the second most for any Miami opponent this season. Renee Taylor and Maurita Reid combined to hit six three-pointers in the opening six minutes, as UM charged out to a 23-14 lead. Clemson answered with a trey of its own, and Miami would not hit another three for the remainder of the game. Reid ran into early foul trouble and UM's second-leading scorer had to sit for much of the period. For Clemson, Whitehurst was called in and would go on to hit four-straight threes, as the Tigers closed the half on a 12-2 run to take the 46-44 lead into halftime. Despite hitting 48.5 percent from the field in the opening stanza, the Hurricanes struggled to find their shot in the second half, connecting on just five field goals (25 percent). Clemson took advantage, putting together several scoring drives and led by as many as 15 points. Miami hit 15 of 18 free throws in the half, but it wasn't enough.

A pair of three-pointers from Virginia's Brenna McGuire sparked an 8-0 run as the Cavaliers took the 16-14 edge. But 11 first-half points on 5-of-7 shooting from Miami's Albrey Grimsley, including a three-pointer with 1:05 remaining in the opening half, gave the Hurricanes the 26-25 lead. However, the Cavs scored for the 27-26 advantage at the break. Virginia came out strong in the second half, outscoring Miami 15-3 to take the commanding 44-31 lead with 15:29 left to play. The Cavs extended their lead to 19 points, up 60-41, and the 'Canes wouldn't get closer than nine points the rest of the way.

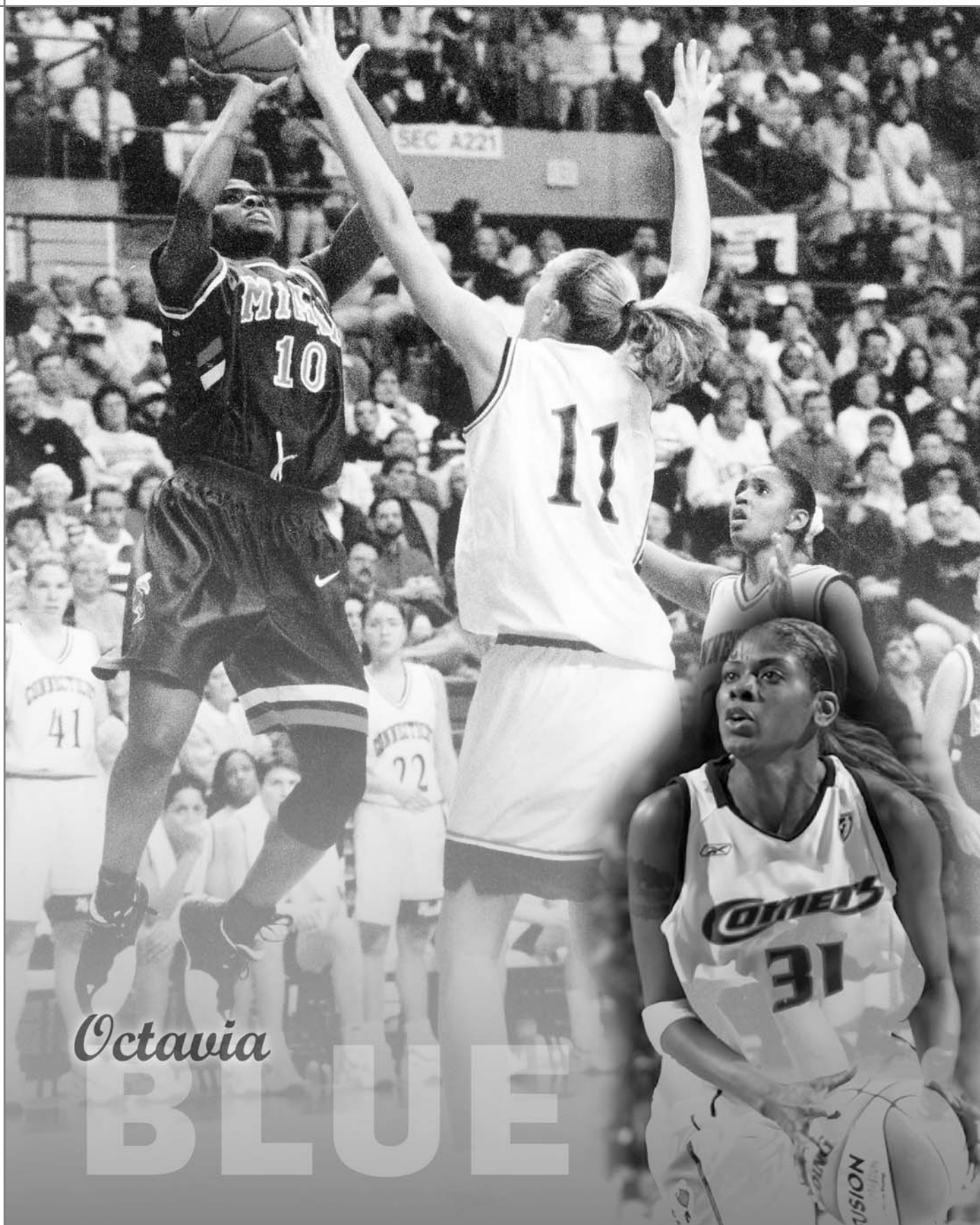

## HURRICANE FORCE

*From outdoor courts to Big East titles and the challenge of the ACC*

Rewind 35 years and you'll find the beginnings of what would blossom into women's basketball at the University of Miami.

From its humble beginnings in 1972-73, with non-scholarship athletes playing on outdoor courts, to more than 500 wins later in 2007-08, with a roster full of recruited talent showcasing their skills in a state-of-the-art facility, Hurricanes women's basketball has come a long way.

### FROM THE START

In its first two seasons, the Miami women's basketball team competed on outdoor courts and rumor has it that a game was actually rained out. But the players persevered under the program's first head coach, Barry Schimer, and after finishing the inaugural season 2-6, the Hurricanes went on to winning records in each of the next two seasons and finished runner up in the 1975 Florida AIAW State Championship Tournament.

The Hurricanes moved into their first home—the William Lane Campus Sports and Recreation Center—for the 1975-76 season under the program's second head coach Shula Feuer. Just two games into the season, Miami used a 100-20 win over Homestead Air Force Base, to set a school record with the 80-point margin of victory that still stands more than 30 years later.

In 1977-78, Miami's first 1,000-point scorer emerged in Wendy Foote, who averaged a school-record 25.2 points per game as a senior. She would go on to become the first University of Miami basketball player since Rick Barry to sign a professional contract when she signed with the New Orleans Pride of the Women's Professional Basketball League.

### ANOTHER STEP FORWARD

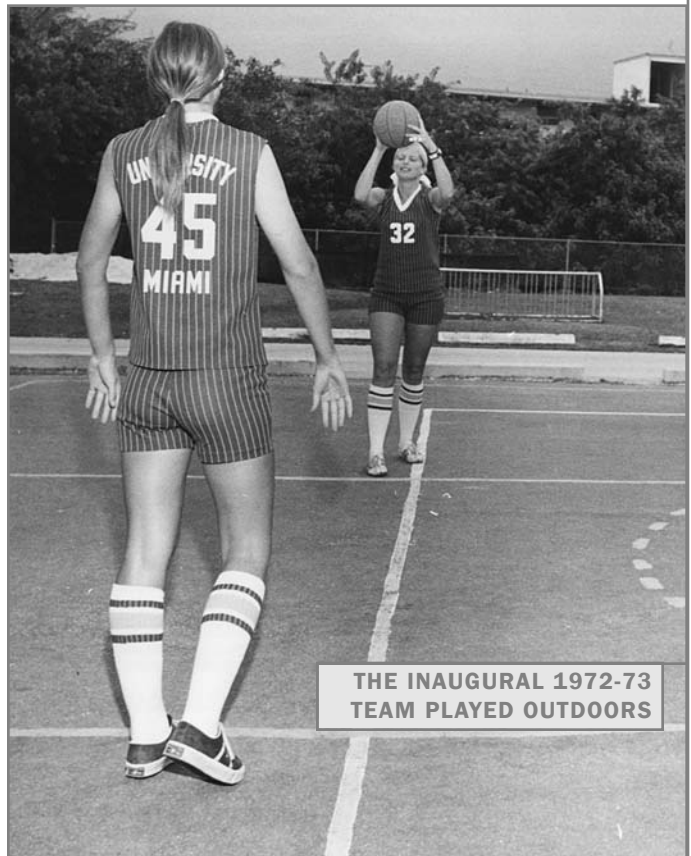
As the Hurricanes moved toward their eighth season of competition, Lin Dunn was hired from the University of Mississippi to take over the reigns of the UM women's basketball program. In her nine seasons at the helm of a burgeoning Hurricanes program, Dunn compiled 149 wins and led the team to a school-record six consecutive winning seasons, two 20-win seasons, one Florida AIAW State Championship and two berths in the AIAW Region III Tournament.

The 1979-80 season, was pivotal in the progression of women's basketball at the university, as the team received its first scholarships (seven) and went on to finish 18-16. Miami gained three additional scholarships for the 1980-81 season and completed one of the most successful campaigns in school history, recording the first 20-win season at 24-18. The Hurricanes went on to win their first Florida AIAW State Championship and advance to the AIAW Region III Tournament.

UM received its full complement of 12 scholarships in 1981-82, and was rewarded with a 19-10 record and a second-straight berth to the AIAW Region III Championships. That season, Sylvia Wilson wrapped up her collegiate career as Miami's leader in points (1,713) and rebounds (1,115), and remains the only Hurricane to grab more than 1,000 career boards.

### A NEW HOME, A NEW SCORING LEADER

With the resurrection of Miami men's basketball in 1985-86, both the men's and women's teams moved into the Knight Sports Complex. As the team continued to develop and battle top-20 teams, a player named Maria Rivera—who had set a freshman scoring record with 523 points during the previous season—began to emerge as a serious threat for Hurricane opponents.

Averaging 21.4 points per game as a sophomore, Rivera surpassed the 1,000-point scoring plateau in just her second season and would go on to become the first women's basketball player in Miami history to score more than 2,000 career points. She set a school record that would stand for 18 years with a 41-point performance versus Central Florida, while also breaking Rick Barry's school-record of 2,298 points.

Rivera would close her collegiate career as both Miami's all-time leading scorer with 2,538 points and its all-time steals leader with 382.

### A DATE TO THE BIG DANCE

Ferne Labati took over the women's basketball program in 1988 and guided the Hurricanes to a 21-8 record and Miami's first NCAA bid. The Hurricanes traveled to Stillwater, Okla., where they fell to Oklahoma State, 93-69, despite 21-point efforts from eventual All-American Frances Savage and Elaine Harlow.

Labati and the Hurricanes battled to a school-record 25-6 mark in 1989-90, completing the first back-to-back 20-win campaigns in school history, and advanced to their first National Women's Invitational Tournament. That season, Savage averaged 23.6 points per game and set a single-season scoring record with 733 points—and needed just 45 games to become the quickest woman to reach 1,000 points in UM history.

After competing as independents since its inaugural season in 1972, Miami became a member of the New South Women's Athletic Conference in 1990-91, and would go on to post its third-straight 20-win season, finishing with a 20-10 overall record, a 9-3 mark in NSWAC play and the conference title.

### DREAMING BIG

The Hurricanes became the 10th member of the BIG EAST Conference and began league play in 1991-92—their "Dream Season". Although Miami's season started and ended with a loss, the Hurricanes put together 30-straight wins in between—going undefeated (18-0) in conference play for the first time in BIG EAST history, winning the BIG EAST Tournament and advancing to the Sweet 16 of the NCAA Tournament to finish with a top-10 national ranking.

Following an 84-67 regular-season ending win over Villanova, the Hurricanes moved up to No. 7 in the national polls and Savage was named Women's Basketball Player of the Year by Sports Illustrated. The BIG EAST would go on to recognize Savage as BIG EAST Player of the Year, Labati as the league's Coach of the Year and Vicki Plowden and Savage as All-BIG EAST First Team picks. Labati was also heralded as the Kodak/WBCA National Coach of the Year.

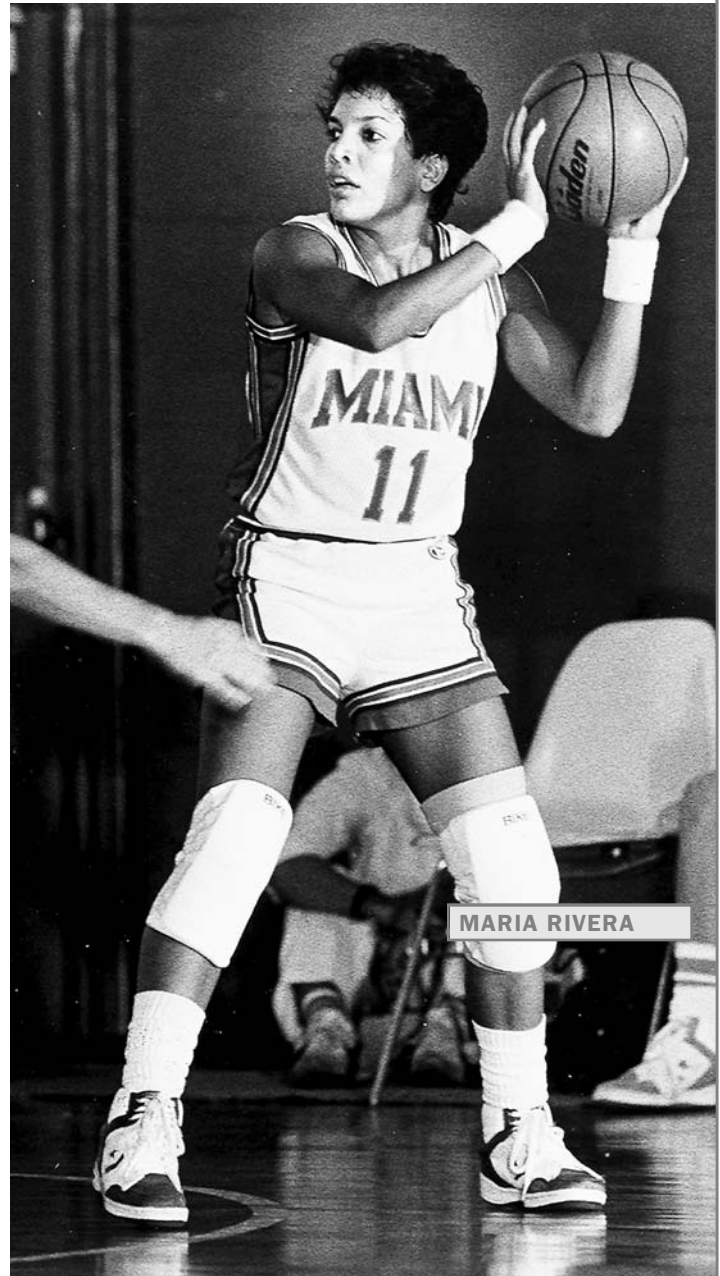
The Hurricanes followed up that "Dream Season" with another BIG EAST title in 1992-93 with its school-record fifth-straight 20-win season, as the team advanced to the second round of the NCAA Tournament. Under Labati's leadership, the Hurricanes would make three more NCAA Tournament appearances and advance to the WNIT twice.

The Hurricanes built a new home, with the opening of the on-campus Convocation Center—now the BankUnited Center—on January 15, 2003. The \$48 million facility boasts three stories, 7,000 seats and 200,000 square feet.

### WHEN OPPORTUNITY KNOCKS

After a 13-year run through the BIG EAST, Miami became members of the tradition-rich Atlantic Coast Conference on July 1, 2004.

Despite a challenging inaugural season in the ACC, Miami advanced to the second round of the ACC Tournament behind the effort of Tamara James—just the second player in NCAA history to lead two conferences in scoring. As a sophomore, James earned All-BIG EAST First Team honors after averaging a league-high 16.6 points per game, and as a junior, she ranked with fifth in the NCAA with an ACC-high 22.3 points per game, earning All-ACC recognition as well as Honorable Mention All-American honors by both the AP and WBCA/Kodak.

In 2005-06, James and the Hurricanes continued to improve under first-year head coach Katie Meier. In her debut, Meier steered the 'Canes to a 17-13 overall record and a 6-8 league mark to place sixth in a conference that would send nine teams to the postseason—including three to the NCAA Final Four. With regular-season wins over several nationally-ranked opponents—and a nearly knocking off then-No. 1 Duke in double overtime—Miami advanced to the postseason for the 12th time in school history, making it as far as the Second Round of the WNIT.

James, who repeated as the ACC's scoring leader as a senior, wrapped up her UM career as the program's all-time leading scorer with 2,406 points and was selected by the Washington Mystics with the eighth overall pick in the 2006 WNBA Draft.

In 2006-07, a new leader emerged in the diminutive Renee Taylor, who carried on James' tradition of leading the ACC in scoring—as the Hurricanes have produced the ACC's leading scorer in all three seasons they have been a member. Taylors' 42 points versus Houston broke Rivera's 1998 single-game scoring record, and she became the 19th member of Miami's 1,000-points club in her final regular-season game versus NC State, and was the sixth Hurricane to accomplish the feat in her first two years with the squad. She finished her two-year career at Miami with 1,025 points.

Meier and the Hurricanes continue to grow as they embark on their fourth season of ACC competition in 2007-08.

### COACHING RECORDS

With the appointment of Katie Meier in 2005, the University of Miami announced just its seventh head women's basketball coach in the program's 34-year history. Meier joined an impressive UM coaching family that includes former legendary coaches Lin Dunn and Ferne Labati.

Labati is UM's all-time leader in career victories, posting an overall record of 303-195 (.608) during her 17-year career from 1988-05. Labati was named the Kodak/WBCA National Coach of the Year following the 1991-92 season in which she guided the Hurricanes to a school-record 30 wins with just two losses and a birth into the "Sweet 16" of the 1992 NCAA Tournament.

As one of the most electric scorers ever to step on the court and play at the University of Miami, Maria Rivera left her mark at UM as a four-year standout with the Hurricanes. During her playing career from 1984-88, Rivera reached a level never before achieved at Miami and left UM as the school record holder in several categories, including career points with 2,358.

Rivera came to Miami by way of Canovana, Puerto Rico, where, at just the age of 14, she was named the 1978 Player of the Year by the Puerto Rican Olympic Committee before going on to star on the Puerto Rican 1979 and 1983 Pan American Teams.



From day one she showed an unprecedented desire to achieve at UM. Speaking only Spanish, Rivera borrowed \$2,000 dollars from a bank to enroll in an intense fast-paced English program to pass an English equivalency exam required to enroll at Miami, and just three months later she was on campus and playing for the Hurricanes.

Rivera averaged 18.7 points—the seventh highest single-season average in school history—and 5.3 assists, leading the Hurricanes in scoring in 13-of-28 games in 1984-85, her first season at UM. That season she showed what lay ahead on several occasions, including a school-record setting performance against Lamar where she hit 10-of-11 shots from the field and a 33-point outing against Florida. Following the conclusion of the regular season, she was named to the Women's Basketball Yearbook Freshman All-America Team.

The following season she stepped up her game, averaging 21.4 points, 4.4 rebounds and 3.3 assists per game. Her 21.4 points per game was the second-highest single-season average in UM history and her 579 points was the third-highest ever at Miami.

Rivera's junior season was highlighted by yet another impressive scoring output, averaging 20.9 points, which ranked third all-time at UM just behind her previous season's mark. That season was full of memorable achievements, including a then-career high 38-point game in UM's opener against Monmouth, but none were more exciting than when she surpassed former Hurricane Sylvia Wilson to become Miami's all-time leading scorer.

Rivera also put together a memorable senior campaign. Needing 29 points to break former men's basketball legend Rick Barry's UM basketball record of 2,298 points, Rivera scored 30 points in the first half of a February 25th contest with Central Florida en route to a then-school-record 41 points to become the University of Miami's all-time leading scorer in both men's and women's basketball.

Upon finishing her career with the Hurricanes, Rivera left as the school record-holder in 16 separate categories—including points (2,358), scoring average (21.1 ppg), steals (382) and field goals made (891) and attempted (1,931) to firmly ensure her place as one of the greatest basketball players to ever play at the University of Miami.

Frances Savage is arguably one of the best players to ever don a uniform at the University of Miami. During her four-year career from 1988-91 Savage etched her name throughout the UM record books. She left as the school's second all-time leading scorer with 2,184 points and first all-time with a career 23.2 scoring average—despite missing all but two games of her senior season.

The 12th child of a household of 13 children, the Fort Lauderdale, Florida native averaged over 30 points per game during her senior season at Sunrise Piper High School and was named the Miami Herald's Broward Player of the Year in 1985 and 1987.

After drawing All-America honors as a high school standout, Savage chose to attend the University of Miami, but was forced to sit out her freshman season in 1987 while fulfilling academic requirements.

Once her opportunity arose in 1988, Savage burst onto the scene at UM, scoring 32 points in her collegiate debut versus Southwest Missouri State—the most points scored by a Miami player in their opening game. She would go on to start and score double figures in all 29 games of the 1988 season, averaging 22.4 points and 9.2 rebounds per game.



As a preseason All-America candidate, Savage's junior season picked up where the 1988 season left off, scoring double figures in all 31 games that season while leading the team in points per game (23.6), rebounds per game (9.5), steals (7.1), free throw percentage (.786) and field goal percentage (.540).

In 1990, Savage opened her senior season with back-to-back 30-point outings, but was lost for the year with a torn ACL suffered in just the second game of the season.

Granted a fifth year of eligibility, in 1991, Savage returned to score 31 points in her first start against in-state rival, Florida. She tied the then-school record with 41 points in UM's win over Providence during the course of the Hurricanes' 30-game win streak.

Averaging 23.3 points and 10.6 rebounds per game, Savage helped lead the Hurricanes to the BIG EAST Championship title in only their first season in the conference and was named both the BIG EAST and Sports Illustrated Player of the Year, in addition to garnering Kodak All-America honors.

Savage left UM as one of the most decorated athletes in school history, holding nine Hurricane records as well as finishing as the school's second all-time leading scorer, and has since been inducted into the UM Sports Hall of Fame and the University of Miami's "Iron Arrow" Society—the highest honor bestowed on an individual by the university.



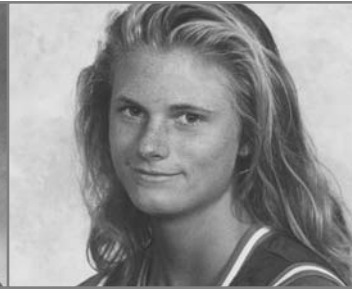

## POSTSEASON RESULTS

The Hurricanes have made a total of 10 postseason appearances in school history, earning six NCAA Tournament and four WNIT berths in the program's 35-year history. Miami has an overall record of 5-11 (.313) in postseason tournaments, posting a 2-6 (.250) mark in the NCAA Tournament and a 3-5 (.375) record in the WNIT.

UM's longest run at the NCAA Tournament came during the 1991-92 season when after drawing No. 2 seed in the East Regional behind a 29-1 record and a BIG EAST Championship Title, the Hurricanes advanced to the "Sweet 16" before falling to Vanderbilt, 77-67, in Charlottesville, Va.

UM's last NCAA Tournament appearance came following the 2003-04 regular season and the last WNIT berth came in 2005-06.
