NCAA GAINESVILLE REGIONAL STORYLINES & NEWS

- The Miami Hurricanes open their 82nd season in program history and third under the direction of J.D. Arteaga.
- Miami is coming off their first NCAA Super Regional Appearance since 2016, taking down Southern Miss. in the regional final.
- The Hurricanes are coming off two victories in the ACC Baseball Tournament, falling to champion Georgia Tech in the semifinal round, 9-3
- The Hurricanes rank third in NCAA Division I baseball history with 51 all-time NCAA Tournament appearances.
- For the sixth time in program history, Miami will travel to Gainesville for NCAA Regional play, previously winning the regional in 1989 and 2002 before being eliminated in 2009, 2011 and 2021.
- It'll be the first time since 1994 where the Hurricanes will face the Troy Trojans, where Miami bested Troy 12-4 in the first round of the Coral Gables regional.
- Daniel Cuvet has been listed unavailable for the regional as the two-time All-American has been dealing with a stress fracture in his back
- 135-55 (.710) is the Miami program record for the Hurricanes in regional play, with is 14-10 in NCAA tournament games in Gainesville.
- Rob Evans earned his 10th win of the season after allowing just two runs across seven innings with six strikeouts against Stanford in the quarterfinal round of the ACC Tournament.
- With the win, Evans became the first Miami starting pitcher since Brian Van Belle in 2019 to reach 10 wins in a season.
- Five Hurricanes have made this year's All-ACC squad. Alex Sosa, Derek Williams, Rob Evans and Daniel Cuvet all made the second team, while catcher/designated hitter Alonzo Alvarez earned a spot on the All-ACC Freshman squad.
- Head coach JD Arteaga captured his 100th career win with a win Boston College last week in the ACC Tournament semifinal round, he becomes only the fourth head coach in the program's history to eclipse 100 career wins, joining Ron Fraser, Jim Morris and Gino DiMare.
- The Canes welcome 23 newcomers to the squad. 12 freshmen, 10 transfers and 1 JUCO transfer will don the orange and green.

THE HURRICANES' SKIPPER

UM Sports Hall of Fame Class of '07
No. 33 retired in '03

Winningest pitcher in program history (43)
Third season as head coach, 24th season on staff



J.D. Arteaga became the 10th head baseball coach in University of Miami history prior to the 2024 season. In his second season at the helm, Arteaga guided Miami to an NCAA Super Regional appearance, marking the program's first trip to the round since the 2016 squad under Jim Morris.

Arteaga previously served as associate head coach in charge of pitching before elevating to the program's top role. Overall, the 2026 season will mark Arteaga's 24th year as a member of the Hurricanes baseball staff.

One of the nation's most respected pitching minds, Arteaga played a key role in the development of right-hander Andrew Walters, who established himself as one of the most dominant closers in college baseball. Walters earned unanimous All-America honors and was a finalist for the prestigious NCBWA Stopper of the Year Award following the 2022 season, anchoring a Miami pitching staff that produced four selections in the 2022 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft.

That draft class was led by left-hander Carson Palmquist, a third-round pick of the Colorado Rockies, followed by right-hander Alex McFarlane, who was selected in the fourth round by the Philadelphia Phillies.

Arteaga developed another All-American in 2021, as Palmquist was a consensus All-America pick and earned first-team honors by the NCBWA and Perfect Game. The lefty headlined Miami's four All-ACC selections with a first-team nod while also earning a place on the ACC All-Freshman Team.

Palmquist and right-hander Alejandro Rosario each were named Freshman All-Americans, while right-hander Jake Smith was selected in the sixth round of the MLB Draft by the Los Angeles Angels and right-hander Daniel Federman signed a free agent contract with the Baltimore Orioles.

The 2020 Hurricanes featured a pair of All-Americans, as standout right-handed pitchers Brian Van Belle and Chris McMahon were both selected to Collegiate Baseball's All-America Second Team.

After the season, sophomore right-hander Slade Cecconi was taken by the Arizona Diamondbacks with the 33rd overall pick in the 2020 MLB Draft, becoming the 29th Hurricane to be selected in the first round of an MLB Draft.

McMahon, a junior right-hander, went in the second round of the MLB Draft to the Colorado Rockies. Van Belle and fellow right-hander Tyler Keysor signed free agent contracts following the shortened five-round MLB Draft, joining the Red Sox and Reds organizations, respectively, and giving Miami four pitchers joining the professional ranks.

The 2019 season featured the emergence of redshirt junior Brian Van Belle as a standout starter for the Canes. The right-hander earned All-ACC Second Team honors and was named to the All-Starkville Regional team to cap a season in which Van Belle led the Hurricanes in wins (10), innings pitched (95.1) and had the lowest ERA among starting pitchers (3.30). Right-hander Slade Cecconi earned Freshman All-America honors, while Evan McKendry (9th round, Rays) and Gregory Veliz (15th round, Angels) headlined four pitchers selected in the MLB draft.

In 2018, Arteaga guided right-hander Evan McKendry to a breakout season on the mound, where he led the Hurricanes staff in wins (seven) and strikeouts (114), as well as compiled a 3.52 ERA - second-best among weekend starters - while earning Third-Team All-ACC honors. Fellow right-hander Daniel Federman earned Freshman All-America honors, while four Miami pitchers were selected in the MLB Draft.

Jeb Bargfeldt, Miami's ace in 2017, was named to the All-ACC Second Team in his first season working under Arteaga. The left-hander finished the season 7-3 with a 2.28 ERA over 87 innings.

Arteaga, a standout southpaw during his own four years in the Miami rotation, helped guide the Hurricanes to their second straight College World Series berth and 25th in program history in 2016. Under his direction as pitching coach in 2016, closer Bryan Garcia set the all-time saves record at Miami and became the first Hurricane to win NCBWA Stopper of the Year honors as the nation's top relief pitcher.

Garcia (sixth round, Detroit) and lefthander Danny Garcia (14th round, Seattle) were both selected in the 2016 Major League Baseball First-Year Player Draft. At least one Hurricane pitcher has been selected in the MLB Draft each year since 2004.

Arteaga recently coached lefthander Chris Diaz to ACC Co-Pitcher of the Year honors in 2014. Under his guidance, all four of Miami's starting pitchers in 2014 - Diaz, Bryan Radziewski, Javi Salas and Andy Suarez - were all drafted in the top 10 rounds of the 2014 MLB Draft.

Suarez, who elected to return to school and served as the staff ace on a 2015 team that qualified for the College World Series, was drafted in the second round (No. 67) overall by San Francisco in the 2015 MLB Draft.

Arteaga helped lead Radziewski to Rawlings All-America honors in 2013 - the first for a UM player since 2010. Two of the team's weekend starters, Radziewski and Diaz, ranked among the top three in ERA for all Atlantic Coast Conference pitchers in 2013.

Arteaga has tutored three recent first-round draft picks in the Major League Baseball Amateur Draft - Carlos Gutierrez in 2008, Chris Perez in 2006 and Cesar Carrillo in 2005. Gutierrez was the 27th overall pick in the 2008 draft by the Minnesota Twins after earning second team All-ACC honors. Perez, who came to Miami as a starting prospect, was aided by Arteaga in his transition to becoming one of the country's top closers. Carrillo started his career 24-0 as a Hurricane.

In addition to his work in converting Perez from a starter to a closer, he helped Kyle Bellamy in his transition from a traditional over-the-top throwing motion to a sidewinding delivery. The move had great rewards, as Bellamy recorded 16 saves and finished the 2009 season with a 0.97 ERA en route to numerous first team All-America honors.

Arteaga's 2008 staff boasted National Freshman Pitcher of the Year and Roger Clemens Award finalist Chris Hernandez, who finished 11-0 with a 2.72 ERA while opponents hit just .223 against him. All three starters in



2008, Hernandez, sophomore lefty Eric Erickson and senior right-hander Enrique Garcia combined to go 27-4 while the entire pitching staff combined for the fewest walks (187) in school history and eighth-most strikeouts (554).

His 2006 staff, composed almost entirely of first-time starters, recorded five shutouts, the most by a UM staff since the 1998 season. Miami also recorded the team's first postseason shutout on the road since 1976 with a 7-0 win against Ole Miss in the 2006 Oxford Super Regional.

Four pitchers from Arteaga's 2005 pitching staff signed pro contracts following the season, including the school's first pitcher drafted in the first round since the 1991 season, Carrillo. Arteaga also played a major role in Carrillo's career development and run at the NCAA record books. Carrillo, who was the 18th overall pick in the 2005 draft, ended with a career record of 25-3, was an All-American and a finalist for the Dick Howser Trophy and the Roger Clemens Award as college baseball's best pitcher in 2005.

The 2004 Miami pitching staff produced the best team ERA in (3.73) since the 2000 season (3.72).

Head coach Jim Morris named Arteaga the Hurricanes' next pitching coach on March 4, 2003, nine games deep into the season. Arteaga's style and approach to pitching was vital in J.D. Cockroft's development into the ace on Miami's 2003 club. Cockroft, a crafty left-hander, went 11-3 with a 2.72 ERA in a team-high 119 innings, including three complete games and one shutout.

Arteaga played for the Hurricanes from 1994-1997, helping UM reach the College World Series four straight seasons. He left Miami as the program's all-time wins leader with 43 and the all-time starts leader with 72. Arteaga ranks second for innings pitched in a career with 458.1.

He is also fifth on the all-time strikeouts chart with 343 career punchouts

Arteaga threw three complete games at UM and struck out career-high 11 batters on two different occasions (FSU, 4/16/95 and George Washington, 2/16/96). He posted an 11-3 record as a sophomore in 1995 and a 9-1 mark as a freshman.

Miami retired Arteaga's No. 33 on Feb. 5, 2003, prior to the season opener with Florida International. A 26th round draft choice by the New York Mets, Arteaga spent six seasons in the Mets' and Houston Astros' organizations. He had signed on with the Texas Rangers' organization in the spring of 2003, prior to accepting his post with the Hurricanes. He spent his last professional season with the Astros' Triple-A franchise New Orleans Zephyrs, compiling a 9-10 record with a 4.29 ERA in 15 starts and 42 appearances.

The left-hander came to the Hurricanes out of Westminster Christian in Miami. He won a career-best 12 games as a junior in 1996 (12-1) and came back to go 11-4 as a senior in 1997. After six seasons in professional baseball, Arteaga earned his bachelor's degree in criminal justice from the University of Miami.

He is married to the former Ysha Schettini and the couple has a daughter, Ariana. The Arteagas' son, Ari, passed away in 2018 at the age of 16. The Ari Arteaga Foundation was founded shortly afterward to honor and memorialize Ari. Its mission is to spread Ari's spirit by helping children and families overcome obstacles they may face due to unforeseen hardships. The goal is to shine Ari's light on their path of need.

MIAMI HURRICANES BASEBALL NEWS & NOTES

MIAMI IN THE NCAA TOURNAMENT: A FAMILIAR SIGHT

- Last season, Miami advanced to its first NCAA Super Regional since 2016 after going 3-1 at the 2025 NCAA Hattiesburg Regional.
- The Hurricanes opened regional play with a 5-3 victory over Alabama before defeating Columbia, 14-1, behind a complete-game outing from Griffin Hugus.
- After falling to host Southern Miss on Sunday afternoon, Miami responded with a 5-4 win the next night in the winner-take-all regional final to clinch a spot in the Super Regionals.
- Daniel Cuvet earned Hattiesburg Regional MVP honors after batting .385 with five hits, two doubles, one home run and five RBI across four games.
- AJ Ciscar earned the opening-game win over Alabama with seven strong innings, while Griffin Hugus (drafted, Seattle Mariners) struck out nine in a complete-game effort against Columbia.
- Miami's postseason run came to an end in the NCAA Louisville Super Regional, where the Hurricanes fell to Louisville, 3-2, in a winner-take-all Game 3.
- The Hurricanes enter the 2026 NCAA Tournament with the third-most NCAA Tournament appearances in Division I baseball history at 51.

THE DESTINATION IS THE SAME: OMAHA

- Miami made its second straight trip to the **College World Series in 2016**, marking the program's 25th all-time trip to Omaha, Neb.
- Miami's **25** College World Series trips are the **second-most of any program** in the country, trailing only the Texas Longhorns. The Hurricanes have won **48 games** in the College World Series, the **fourth-most** of any program; Miami's **four national championships** rank **fifth most**.
- Since the NCAA began awarding national seeds prior to 1999, Miami has been **among the top eight in eight seasons: 1999 (#1), 2001 (#2), 2003 (#8), 2004 (#3), 2008 (#1), 2015 (#5), 2016 (#3) and 2022 (#6).**

CANES RETURN TO GAINESVILLE FOR REGIONAL PLAY

- Miami will make its sixth trip to Gainesville for NCAA Regional play and first since the 2021 postseason.
- The Hurricanes have twice advanced out of the Gainesville Regional, winning the site in both 1989 and 2002.
- Overall, the Hurricanes pose a 14-10 in NCAA tournament games in Gainesville.
- Miami and Florida have previously met twice in Gainesville Regional play, with the Gators eliminating the Hurricanes in 2009 and 2011.
- The Hurricanes last traveled to Gainesville for NCAA Tournament play in 2021, when Miami was eliminated by South Alabama.
- Miami enters the 2026 NCAA Tournament with 51 all time NCAA Tournament appearances, the third-most in Division I baseball history.
- The Hurricanes earned the No. 2 seed in the Gainesville Regional after advancing to the ACC Tournament semifinals.

- Coming off earning All-ACC Freshman team honors from his fantastic regular season, catcher Alonzo after batting .583 (7-for-12) with two doubles, two home runs, four RBI and seven runs scored across Miami's three ACC Tournament games.

- Alvarez is batting .342 (13-for-38) with three doubles, six home runs and seven RBI over Miami's last 10 games entering NCAA Regional play.
- Freshman infielder Gabriel Milano batted .500 (5-for-10) during the ACC Tournament with two doubles, two RBI and three runs scored.
- Milano is batting .378 (14-for-37) over Miami's last 10 games with eight RBI and 10 runs scored.
- Freshman outfielder Dylan Dubovik hit .385 (5-for-13) with five runs scored during the ACC Tournament.
- Dubovik is batting .370 (10-for-27) over his last seven games with one home run and three RBI entering NCAA Tournament play.
- Alvarez, Milano and Dubovik combined to bat .514 (17 for-33) with four doubles, two home runs, seven RBI and 15 runs scored during the ACC Tournament.

- The Hurricanes went 2-1 during the ACC Tournament while outscoring opponents 27-15 across three games Miami also recorded 27 hits, 19 of them being for extra-bases during its ACC Tournament run.
- Freshman Alonzo Alvarez earned ACC All-Tournament Team honors after batting .500 (6-for-12) with two home runs, six RBI and five runs scored across three games.
- Alvarez delivered a career performance against Stanford on May 20, going 4-for-5 with two home runs, three RBI and three runs scored while finishing a triple shy of the cycle.

FIVE ALL-CONFERENCE CANES

- Five Hurricanes earned postseason conference honors from the ACC, highlighted by four All-ACC Second Team selections and one ACC All-Freshman Team honoree.
- Alex Sosa, Daniel Cuvet, Derek Williams and Rob Evans were each named All-ACC Second Team selections.
- Alonzo Alvarez earned ACC All-Freshman Team honors after his debut season with the Hurricanes.
- Derek Williams finished the regular season batting .389 with 15 home runs, 66 RBI and 74 hits across 53 starts. Williams also posted a .705 slugging percentage and 1.180 OPS entering postseason play.
- Alex Sosa made an immediate impact in his first season at Miami after transferring from NC State, batting .335 with 16 home runs and 64 RBI. Sosa also scored 57 runs and recorded a 1.118 OPS over 53 games during the regular season.
- Despite appearing in only 41 games, Daniel Cuvet hit .305 with 12 home runs, 45 RBI and 14 doubles. Cuvet finished the regular season with a 1.086 OPS while helping anchor Miami's lineup.
- Rob Evans emerged as one of the ACC's top starters, posting a 9-3 record with a 3.21 ERA over 13 starts. Evans struck out 88 batters across 75 2/3 innings pitched during the regular season.
- Freshman Alonzo Alvarez batted .301 with 11 doubles, four home runs and 26 RBI across 45 appearances.

SENSATIONAL SOSA

- Alex Sosa enters the NCAA Gainesville Regional batting .332 with 17 home runs, 66 RBI and a 1.110 OPS across 56 games this season.
- Over his last 10 games, Sosa is batting .366 (15-for-41) with five home runs, 13 RBI, 11 runs scored and a .732 slugging percentage entering NCAA Tournament play.
- The Viera, Fla., native enters postseason play on a four game hitting streak.
- Over Miami's final two regular season series against Louisville and Florida State, Sosa batted .455 (10-for-22) with three home runs and seven RBI.
- Sosa recorded 17 multi-hit games this season, including three three-hit performances.
- Sosa posted 18 multi-RBI games this season, including a season-high five RBI performance against Louisville on May 9.
- Since moving into the three-hole on March 20 against Creighton, Sosa is batting .325 with four home runs and 23 RBI over 22 starts batting third.
- When batting in the cleanup spot, Sosa is batting .336 with 13 home runs and 43 RBI over 34 starts in the four-hole.
- Sosa has reached base safely in 52 of his 56 appearances this season, the NC State transfer also owns a team-best 26-game reached base streak this season.
- Sosa became the fourth Hurricane to earn ACC Player of the Week honors this season, joining Derek Williams, Dylan Dubovik and Jake Ogden.

RELENTLESS ROB EVANS

- Evans has emerged as one of the ACC's top frontline starters this season, ranking fourth in the conference with a .202 opponent batting average and tied for fifth with 94 strikeouts.
- The senior left-hander became the first Miami starting pitcher since Brian Van Belle in 2019 to reach double-digit wins in a season.
- Evans has allowed two earned runs or fewer in 10 of his 15 appearances this season.
- Over his last four starts, Evans owns a 3-1 record with a 2.82 ERA and 26 strikeouts across 22.1 innings pitched.
- Evans has worked at least six innings in 11 of his 15 starts this season, helping anchor Miami's weekend rotation.
- In Miami's ACC Tournament win over Stanford, Evans tossed seven innings while allowing two runs with six strikeouts to secure his 10th victory of the season.
- Evans held opponents to two hits or fewer in six different starts this season.
- The Harlem, N.Y., native has surrendered just 60 hits across 82.2 innings pitched this year.
- Evans enters postseason play with a 1.08 WHIP and averages more than 10 strikeouts per nine innings.
