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When Head Coach Bill Callahan took the reins at Nebraska for the 2004 season he brought with him one of the most explosive offensive systems in the sport - the West Coast Offense. During his time in the NFL, Callahan's Oakland Raiders operated out of the West Coast Offense and exploited opposing defenses with a multiple attack. In fact, during a three-season span, the Oakland offense went from leading the NFL in rushing (2000) to placing first in the league in passing (2002). In 2002, the Raiders became the first team to win games in the same season while rushing at least 60 times and passing at least 60 times. The Raiders capped 2002 by capturing the AFC crown, before losing to Tampa Bay in Super Bowl XXXVII.

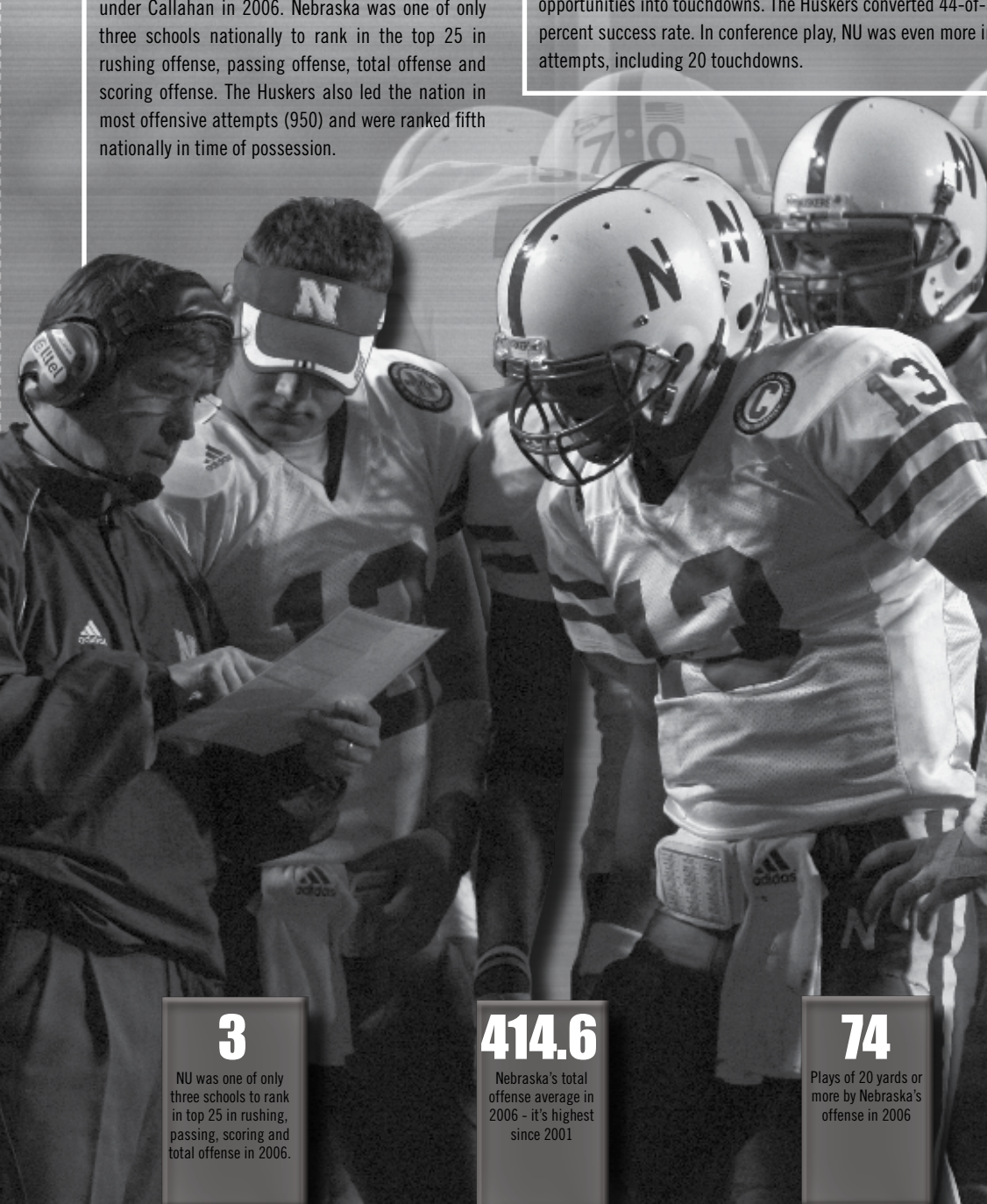
Callahan's success in the West Coast Offense translated well for Nebraska. The Huskers made remarkable strides on offense in their third year under Callahan in 2006. Nebraska was one of only three schools nationally to rank in the top 25 in rushing offense, passing offense, total offense and scoring offense. The Huskers also led the nation in most offensive attempts (950) and were ranked fifth nationally in time of possession.

RED ZONE SUCCESS

In 2006, Nebraska was ranked among the Big 12 and nation's best offenses at converting Red Zone opportunities into touchdowns. The Huskers converted 44-of-51 red zone trips into scores, an 86.3 percent success rate. In conference play, NU was even more impressive, converting 23-of-24 red zone attempts, including 20 touchdowns.

Wide receivers Terrence Nunn and Nate Swift have added their names to the Husker record books. Nunn has joined Johnny Rodgers as the only Huskers to record two 40-reception seasons in a career. Nunn's career receptions total of 101 ranks second only to Rodgers and Nunn has also caught a pass in 27 straight games entering 2007, 11 games behind Rodgers' school record.

In 2005, Swift set a Nebraska freshman record with 45 receptions, the third-most receptions in school history regardless of class. His 1,015 career receiving yards entering 2007 make him one of just 13 Huskers with 1,000 career receiving yards. Nunn and Swift have combined for 19 touchdown receptions in the past two years.

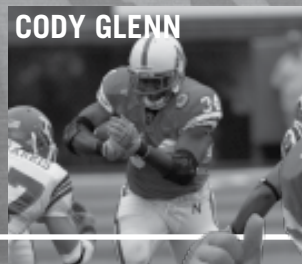

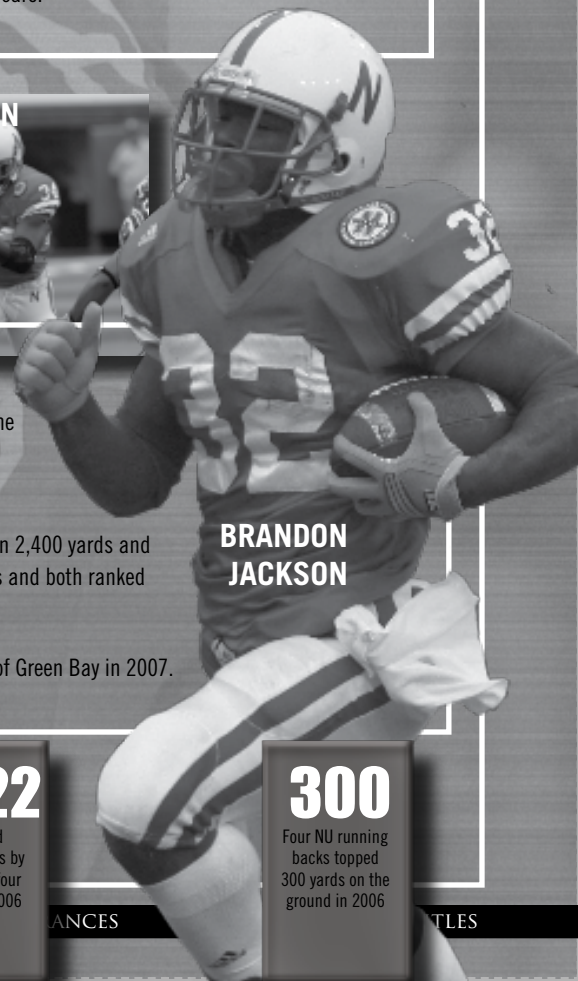


Nebraska running backs have flourished under the West Coast Offense, racking up major yards on the ground, while increasing their versatility in the NU passing game. In fact, in Nebraska's second year in the West Coast Offense in 2005, former running back Cory Ross snagged a Nebraska running back record with 43 receptions.

Nebraska's four-man running back committee also reached incredible heights in 2006, gaining more than 2,400 yards and tallying 26 touchdowns. Marlon Lucky and Brandon Jackson ended the season with more than 30 catches and both ranked among the top six in the Big 12 in all-purpose yards.

Ross was a rookie for the NFL's Baltimore Ravens in 2006, while Jackson was a second-round draft pick of Green Bay in 2007.
