Demoine (pronounced Deh-MOINE) Adams has been a key contributor for the Blackshirts at rush end for the past four years. Adams has started eight games at rush end in 2002 and 24 games at the position in his Husker career. He finished the 2002 campaign with 34 tackles and his nine tackles for loss tied for third-most among all Huskers.

Adams' hard work is not limited to the playing field. In the classroom, he received his third first-team Academic All-Big 12 honor in 2002, after also receiving the honor in 1999 and 2000. Adams graduated in August of 2001 after just three years on campus. He earned a bachelor's degree in political science and five minors. Adams has played the past two seasons with his degree in hand, while enrolled as a graduate student.

His academic achievements indicate only part of the dedication Adams has displayed throughout his career. He was the 2002 Nebraska Lifter of the Year, after he had been a finalist for the honor the previous year.

2002: Adams was one of four rush ends to see extensive action. He started eight games, including the first five at rush end before giving way to junior Trevor Johnson. Adams earned three more starts in the next four games and played a key role in NU's three-man end rotation while fellow senior Chris Kelsay was sidelined with a hamstring injury.

Adams has 34 tackles, with nine tackles for loss totaling 23 yards. He also had 3.5 sacks for 17 yards in losses and six quarterback hurries. He opened the season against Arizona State by splitting a pair of sacks and had two quarterback hurries. With Kelsay sidelined, Adams stepped up his game in a 24-13 victory over Missouri. He registered 1.5 sacks as NU limited the Tigers to just 220 total yards. The Missouri contest was the first of three straight games in which Adams had at least one tackle for loss. He capped the Texas A&M victory by pressuring Aggie quarterback Dustin Long on Philip Bland's interception late in the fourth quarter.


Career: Adams started all 12 games at right rush end in 2001 and led the Huskers with 5.5 sacks for 46 yards lost, and added eight TFL for 49 yards. Adams tied for the team lead in quarterback hurries with 12 and earned honorable-mention All-Big 12 honors. Adams played in every game in 2000 and started the first four at rush end. He finished with 12 tackles, including one for a one-yard loss, one pass breakup and five quarterback hurries. Adams played in 11 games as a backup rush end in 1999, and totaled five tackles (four solo), including two tackles for losses. He redshirted in his first season at Nebraska in 1998.

Redshirt freshman Titus Adams was one of five players to see extensive action in the Husker interior defensive front. He enters the bowl game listed No. 3 at nose tackle behind junior Ryon Bingham and senior Jon Clanton. A highly touted player out of Omaha, Adams' play was crucial for a defensive line that lost senior Jason Lohr to a knee injury in the preseason and redshirt freshman Seppo Evwaraye to a shoulder injury midway through the 2002 campaign.

2002: Adams played in 12 games this season and recorded 21 total tackles, with a season-high five stops against Utah State. He added four tackles each against Kansas and Utah State. He had three tackles for 18 yards in losses, including a pair of sacks for 17 yards. Adams had an eightyard sack against Utah State and also had an interception caused in the game. He had a sack vs. Kansas and also had a quarterback hurry that caused an interception against the Jayhawks. Adams filled in at rush end against Kansas when the Huskers were limited at that position because of injury.

Career: Adams redshirted in his first season at Nebraska. He was a highly touted recruit out of Omaha Creighton Prep, where he was a two-time all-state selection and earned prep All-America honors. Adams helped the Junior Jays to a state title in 1999 and a runner-up finish in 2000.





Senior rush end Demoine Adams has started 24 games in his Husker career, including eight in 2002. Adams recorded nine tackles for loss this fall and has 20 tackles for loss in his Nebraska career.

Ryon Bingham was a mainstay on the Husker defensive front in 2002. The junior started all 13 games at nose tackle and recorded 65 tackles, the most of any player in the Husker front four. His strong play earned him honorable-mention all-conference honors from the league's coaches. Bingham is expected to start the Huskers' bowl game, with Jon Clanton and Titus Adams also seeing action at the position.

2002: A powerful, athletic nose tackle, Bingham had been penciled in for significant duty at nose tackle, but his role increased even more when fifth-year senior Jason Lohr was lost to a knee injury in the preseason. Bingham was a more than adequate replacement for Lohr and finished the season with 65 total tackles. He recorded 1.5 sacks for nine yards and had nine tackles for loss, totaling 18 yards.

Bingham had five games this fall with seven or more tackles, with a career-high 10 stops at Kansas State. In that game, Bingham also forced a fumble and had a tackle for loss. He added nine tackles, including a tackle for loss in the regular-season finale against Colorado and had eight tackles and a pair of TFL's at Iowa State. Bingham also had a strong game against No. 7 Texas in Lincoln when he totaled seven tackles, including a seven-yard sack of Longhorn quarterback Chris Simms.

Career: Bingham saw significant action in 2001 as part of a four-man rotation at the two defensive tackle positions. Bingham saw action in all 12 of Nebraska's games, with 18 tackles, including five for 13 yards lost. He played in the Rose Bowl, recording two assisted tackles.

Bingham was expected to see action as a redshirt freshman in 2000, but a broken right foot kept him out for the entire season. He redshirted in his first season at Nebraska in 1999.

Sophomore Philip Bland made the most of his first season as a full-time starter in the Husker secondary. The versatile defender opened the season as Nebraska's starter at free safety, where he started the first seven games. The hard-hitting Bland made the switch to rover before the Oklahoma State game and started the season's final six games at that position.

He finished the regular season as Nebraska's leading tackler with 84 total tackles, including 44 solos. Bland was honored for his performances both on the field and in the classroom. He was an honorable-mention All-Big 12 selection by the coaches and was a first-team Academic All-Big 12 pick with a 3.248 grade-point average in general studies.

2002: Bland split time between the two safety spots and started all 13 games. He finished his sophomore campaign with 84 tackles to lead all Nebraska players. Bland finished the season with a career-high 13 tackles against Colorado, one of seven games in which he had seven or more stops. He added six tackles for loss and five breakups and his only career interception sealed Nebraska's 38-31 comeback victory at Texas A&M.

Bland recorded seven tackles and a pass breakup in a 31-16 win over Troy State. He had nine tackles and a breakup vs. McNeese State and posted his first career double-figure tackle game with 10 stops against Missouri, when he added a forced fumble. In addition to his interception at Texas A&M, Bland had nine tackles, including a tackle for loss. He added seven tackles vs. Texas and eight stops against Kansas State. Against the Longhorns, Bland had a quarterback hurry that caused Chris Simms to throw an interception.

Career: Bland started three games at rover as a true freshman in 2001. He appeared in 10 games and recorded 24 tackles, including nine solo stops. He had a season-high seven tackles against Troy State and had one pass breakup on the season. Bland was limited late in the season by a foot injury, but played in the 2002 Rose Bowl and recorded one solo tackle.

2002 Rose Bowl vs. Miami: Tackles, UT 1, AT 0, TT 1

Senior tight end Jon Bowling had his senior season cut short after he suffered a knee injury against Kansas State. The Lincoln native had surgery to repair ligament damage to his right knee shortly after the injury and will not be available in the bowl game. Bowling was one of four Huskers to see extensive action at tight end and supplied quarterback Jammal Lord with a strong receiving threat from the position.

Bowling had four catches as a senior, including one touchdown. The 2002 season capped a career in which Bowling appeared in 42 games and had 14 career receptions. Bowling was a big-play threat throughout his career, averaging 21.5 yards per catch this season and nearly 17 yards per reception in his Husker career.

2002: Bowling played in each of Nebraska's first 12 games as an alternate behind fellow senior Aaron Golliday at tight end. He started four games when Nebraska opened in a two-tight end formation. Bowling caught four passes for 86 yards this fall and had a two-yard touchdown reception against seventh-ranked Texas.

Bowling's first catch of the season was a career-long 62-yarder against Troy State. He had a 16-yard catch against McNeese State and a six-yard grab at Oklahoma State. His final catch of the season was the touchdown grab against the Longhorns.

Career: Bowling had four receptions for 75 yards in 2001, including a season-long 27-yard touchdown vs. Texas Tech. He caught a career-high two passes against Texas Tech and Kansas. Bowling played in the Rose Bowl, but did not have any receptions.

Bowling served as Nebraska's No. 3 tight end in 2000 and recorded four receptions for 46 yards. He scored his first career touchdown on a 13-yard grab against Missouri. In the 2000 Alamo Bowl, Bowling caught one pass for nine yards.

He played in eight games as a redshirt freshman and caught two passes for 30 yards against Texas in the Big 12 Championship Game. Against Tennessee in the Fiesta Bowl, Bowling had two catches for 45 yards. Bowling redshirted in his first season at Nebraska in 1998.





Junior linebacker Chad Buller has been a key member of Nebraska's special teams in 2002 and appeared in all 13 games. The Henderson, Neb., native has also seen limited time at Will linebacker as a reserve behind fellow juniors T.J. Hollowell and Demorrio Williams.

Buller finished the season with eight tackles. In addition to his on-field contributions, Buller was one of a league-leading 18 Huskers to receive first-team academic All-Big 12 honors.

2002: Buller played in all 13 games as a special teams stalwart. The reserve linebacker was a member of Nebraska's punt and kickoff coverage team. He finished the season with eight tackles, including a career-best three stops against Kansas. He had two tackles at Iowa State.

Career: Buller saw action against Rice and Iowa State in 2001, with an assisted tackle against the Cyclones. He did not see action in 2000 and redshirted in 1999.



Daniel Bullocks is part of a talented group of young players on the Husker defense and gained valuable experience as a redshirt freshman. Bullocks played in 11 games at rover, including a start against McNeese State. He began the season as a lower-unit player, but ascended to the top of the depth chart at midseason. Bullocks moved back to a reserve role after Philip Bland shifted to rover midway through the season. He is listed third at rover behind Bland and Aaron Terpening heading into the bowl game.

2002: Bullocks recorded 15 tackles in his first season of action for the Huskers, with a season-high three tackles at Texas A&M. He played in 11 games and was in the starting lineup against McNeese State. A left ankle injury sidelined Bullocks against Missouri the following week and forced NU to shuffle its secondary. Ironically, Bland's move to rover allowed Daniel's twin brother, Josh, to move to the top of the depth chart at free safety. Bullocks returned to action against Oklahoma State and forced a fumble that was recovered by Fabian Washington.

Career: Bullocks redshirted in his first season at Nebraska.

Redshirt freshman Josh Bullocks made a steady rise up the depth chart in the secondary and enters the bowl game as Nebraska's No. 1 free safety. Bullocks played in 12 games and made four starts on a young Husker defense. He began the season listed third at free safety, but made his first start at Oklahoma State and officially took over the starting role at the position before the Nov. 2 Texas game.


2002: Bullocks finished his rookie campaign with 39 tackles and made 25 of his tackles in the season's final six games. He added an interception and had one fumble caused in addition to a fumble recovery. Bullocks recorded a season-high seven tackles against McNeese State, including five solos. His playing time increased after his twin brother, Daniel, suffered an ankle injury and Philip Bland shifted to rover.

Bullocks made his first start at Oklahoma State and responded with five tackles, a fumble caused and a pass breakup. He also had five tackles against Texas. He had his first career interception in that game, which he returned 19 yards. Bullocks also had five tackles against Kansas State and Colorado and recovered a fumble against the Wildcats.

Career: Bullocks redshirted in his first season at Nebraska.



Senior Joe Chrisman served as Nebraska's first-team holder for place-kicking duties and is the No. 3 quarterback. He saw action in two games as a quarterback and has played in 10 games at the position in his career. The former walk-on has nine career rushes for 15 yards and has attempted four passes. Chrisman also continued to excel in the classroom, earning first-team Academic All-Big 12 honors for the second consecutive year.

2002: Chrisman served as Nebraska's top holder for the second consecutive season. Husker place-kickers connected on 13-of-17 field goals this fall and made all 45 PAT attempts. Chrisman appeared as a quarterback against Utah State and Kansas, but did not have any stats.

Career: Chrisman saw action in every game as a holder in 2001, and in two games as a quarterback. Chrisman held for extra-point kicks in the Rose Bowl. He played in four games as a reserve quarterback in 2000. Chrisman had one carry for no yards in the 2000 Alamo Bowl vs. Northwestern. He played in two games as a reserve quarterback in 1999. A walk-on, Chrisman redshirted in 1998.

Senior defensive lineman Jon Clanton showed his versatility this season by playing both positions on the interior defensive line. Clanton started the first five games at defensive tackle, then shifted to nose tackle where he shared time with Ryon Bingham. The agile Clanton finished the season with six starts and made 42 total tackles, including four tackles for loss. He is to start the bowl game at defensive tackle, but could also see action at nose tackle. Clanton is playing the bowl game as a graduate after earning his degree in special education this semester.

2002: A fifth-year senior, Clanton finished the season with 42 tackles, including 14 solo stops. His total was the third-most among NU defensive linemen, trailing Bingham and junior defensive tackle Patrick Kabongo. Clanton shifted to nose tackle after the first five games and played his best football of the season after the move.

He had 13 tackles in the first six games, but responded to the position switch with 29 tackles in NU's final seven contests. He had five or more tackles three times this season, including a career-high eight stops, and a tackle for loss in his final game at Memorial Stadium against Colorado, when he started at defensive tackle. Clanton had a stretch of three straight games with a tackle for loss that included an eight-yard sack against Texas. He also forced a pair of fumbles this season (Troy State, Kansas) and had nine quarterback hurries.

Career: Clanton finished the 2001 regular season with 24 tackles, including 2.5 sacks for 30 yards lost and eight quarterback hurries. Clanton played in all 12 games and moved into the starting lineup for the final nine games after Jason Lohr suffered a season-ending knee injury. In the 2002 Rose Bowl vs. Miami, Clanton started and had one solo tackle. Clanton played in 10 games at nose tackle in 2000 and recorded five tackles and four quarterback hurries. Clanton recorded a five-yard sack against Northwestern in the 2000 Alamo Bowl. Clanton played in seven games as a redshirt freshman in 1999, with one tackle, a solo. A scholarship athlete, Clanton redshirted his first year at NU.



Fifth-year senior Wes Cody has started every game at right offensive guard this fall and has played in 19 games in his Husker career. Cody and his offensive line mates have led Nebraska to a Big 12-leading 268.9 rushing yards per game, a mark that ranks fourth in the country. The Huskers rolled up more than 300 yards rushing five times in 2002.

Cody finished fourth on the Husker offensive line with 91 pancakes, including four double-figure pancake games. A powerful force on the offensive front, Cody was a finalist for the 2002 Nebraska Lifter-of-the-Year Award. He is one of several Huskers playing in the bowl game as a graduate after earning a bachelor's degree in communication studies.

2002: Cody took over the starting right guard duties in spring ball and held the starting job throughout the season. He finished his senior year with 91 pancakes, including a season-high 13 knock-downs against McNeese State when Nebraska rushed for a season-high 444 yards. He also reached double figures in pancakes with 11 against Utah State and 10 each against Kansas and Missouri. His 10 knock-downs against the Tigers and Jayhawks tied for the team lead.

Career: Cody played in every game in 2001 as the backup right guard to Jon Rutherford. Cody made a solid contribution as a "swing" guard, seeing extensive action on both sides and recorded 79 pancakes (6.6 ppg) to rank sixth on the team. Cody and company assisted the Huskers to a No. 1 ranking in rushing, averaging 314.7 yards per game. Cody played in the 2002 Rose Bowl, the only non-starter to see action on the offensive line.

Cody played in six games in 2000, backing up fellow sophomore Toniu Fonoti at left guard. He had seven pancakes on the season and was a member of NU's regular travel roster. Cody played in one game as a redshirt freshman. He sat out as a redshirt in 1998.

The Omaha native also played a key role on Nebraska's special teams and finished the season with seven tackles. Cooper will back up fifth-year senior Scott Shanle at Sam linebacker in the bowl game and will make a push for the starting job next spring.

2002: Cooper played in all 13 games this season and finished the year with seven total tackles. He served as Nebraska's No. 2 Sam linebacker behind senior Scott Shanle and played a key role on Nebraska's special teams. Cooper opened the year with three tackles in Nebraska's win over Arizona State and added one tackle in four other games.

Career: Cooper played in 11 games in 2001 and served as a backup Sam linebacker to Shanle. Cooper had six tackles and two quarterback hurries on the season. Cooper saw action on Husker special teams in the 2002 Rose Bowl game vs. Miami. A scholarship athlete, Cooper redshirted his first year at Nebraska in 2000.

Senior Ben Cornelsen will complete his Husker career in the 2002 bowl game. Cornelsen served as Nebraska's No. 2 wingback behind fellow senior Troy Hassebroek this fall. Cornelsen ranked fourth on the team in receptions with eight catches for 106 yards. He also served as NU's No. 2 punt returner, backing up All-American DeJuan Groce at the position. Cornelsen was a second-team Academic All-Big 12 selection and graduated last December with a degree in communication studies.

2002: Cornelsen played in all 13 games in his senior season. He caught eight passes for 106 yards to rank fourth on the team in both receptions and receiving yards. Cornelsen caught his first two passes of the season against Utah State, good for 34 yards. After single catches against Iowa State and McNeese State, he grabbed two balls for 35 yards at Oklahoma State, both on a late NU drive that cut OSU's lead to 24-21. He notched his third two-catch game of the season at Kansas State (25

yards). Cornelsen was again DeJuan Groce's backup as a punt returner, but had just two attempts for minus-three yards in 2002.

Career: Cornelsen played in 11 games as a junior in 2001. He caught one pass for 18 yards and rushed twice for 33 yards. He also returned 10 punts for 124 yards including a 71-yard touchdown at Kansas. Cornelsen played in the 2002 Rose Bowl at split end, but did not have a reception. Cornelsen played in every game for the Huskers in 2000 as a reserve wingback and member of NU's special teams. He did not have any catches, but returned three punts for 49 yards. He played in the Alamo Bowl, but did not have any catches.

As a redshirt freshman, Cornelsen saw action in one game. He redshirted in 1998. Cornelsen was a member of the 1997 scholarship class, Tom Osborne's last at Nebraska, but did not enroll until January of 1998.



Junior fullback Judd Davies was Nebraska's starting fullback for the second straight season this fall. Davies' carries were scaled back in 2002 as the Huskers' Big 12-leading running game focused on the quarterback and I-back. Davies managed to rush for 178 yards and closed the season with a strong outing against Colorado. In addition to his football accomplishments, Davies is a standout in the classroom. He earned academic all-conference honors for the third straight season and was a Verizon/CoSIDA Academic All-District VII pick for the second straight year. Davies has a 3.896 grade-point average in communication studies.

2002: Junior fullback Judd Davies served as Nebraska's starting fullback for a second straight year. He played in all 13 games with 11 starts and rushed for 178 yards on 37 carries. Davies also scored four touchdowns, with one each in four of Nebraska's first five games. Davies had four carries for 21 yards at Penn State and ran three times for 33 yards against Missouri, including a 22-yard run. He capped the regular season with a season-high 59 yards on five carries against Colorado, including a season-best 23-yard run.

Career: Davies started 11 games at the fullback position as a sophomore in 2001. He totaled 238 yards rushing on 40 carries and scored four touchdowns, including two against Baylor. He gained 119 yards against the Bears, one of four Huskers to top 100 yards in the game. Davies tallied more than 200 of his rushing yards before he suffered an ankle injury against Texas Tech that slowed him for the remainder of the year. In the 2002 Rose Bowl, Davies rushed five times for 16 yards, including a 16-yard touchdown run.

Davies played in every game as a redshirt freshman in 2000 as the backup fullback to Willie Miller. He was Nebraska's No. 2 fullback and had 18 carries for 183 yards. He rushed for one touchdown and also had three receptions for 49 yards. Davies had a season-best 65 yards rushing vs. Missouri. In the Alamo Bowl, Davies rushed for 17 yards on three carries. Davies suited up for several games as a true freshman, then decided to redshirt his first year.



Junior Josh Davis was one of the nation's top kickoff return men for the second straight season in 2002. Davis re-wrote the Nebraska kickoff return record book this fall. The second-generation Husker set new Nebraska records for single-game (186), season (889) and career (1,564) kickoff return yardage. Davis' 37 kickoff returns also set a Husker record and his 24.0 return average ranked among the nation's top 30 in the category, while placing him fourth in the Big 12 Conference.

Davis also played a key backup role at I-back for the Huskers. He ran for more than 150 yards and is a regular fixture in several of Nebraska's offensive sets. Davis is listed as the No. 3 I-back behind Dahrran Diedrick and David Horne entering the bowl game.

2002: Davis handled Nebraska's kickoff return duties for the second straight season and also contributed as a reserve I-back. Davis had 37 kickoff returns for 889 yards in 2002, both new Nebraska records. Davis had four games this season with more than 100 yards in kickoff returns. He returned six kicks for 109 yards at Iowa State, including a 41-yarder. He added four returns for 111 yards against Missouri and had five for 105 yards at Texas A&M.

Davis' final 100-yard game came against Kansas State, when he returned seven kickoffs for a school-record 186 yards, including a season-long 53 yard return. In addition to breaking Nebraska's single-game return yards record in that contest, Davis also set new Husker season and career records for return yards against the Widcats. His season total broke his own record of 675 yards set a year ago, and he broke Tyrone Hughes' previous career record of 1,493 yards. Davis finished the season with 12 returns of 25 yards or more and had at least one return of that distance in 10 of the 12 games he played.

Davis rushed 23 times for 151 yards as a reserve I-back. He scored on a 12-yard run against Kansas and had a season-long 28-yard scamper against Utah State, when he posted a career-high 51 yards on seven carries. Davis had two carries for 33 yards late in the Texas game.

Career: Davis set a then-school record in kickoff returns and return yards with 25 for 675 yards in 2001. His 27.0 average ranked sixth in the Big 12 and 14th nationally. Davis had 12 kickoff returns of 25 yards or more, including a career-best 74-yard return at Colorado. Davis had two 100-yard kickoff return games in the regular season, with 5-117 vs. Texas Tech and 5-158 at Colorado. He added five returns for 138 yards against Miami in the 2002 Rose Bowl. Davis rushed eight times for 61 yards as a reserve I-back, including a 13-yard touchdown run at Baylor.

Davis played in the first two games as a redshirt freshman in 2000, but tore his left ACL in practice and missed the remainder of the season. He redshirted in 1999. Davis' father, Tony, was a standout running back at Nebraska from 1973 to 1975.



Sophomore offensive guard Mike Erickson was one of three firstyear starters on the Husker offensive line this fall. Erickson had big shoes to fill at the start of the season, as he replaced departed All-American Toniu Fonoti. Erickson started all 13 games and helped the Nebraska offense to a No. 4 national ranking in rushing offense at 268.9 yards per game. Erickson finished third on the team in pancakes and had six doublefigure pancake games. Erickson was honored for his work in the classroom by being named to the second-team Academic All-Big 12 squad.

Career: Erickson started all 13 games at left guard and was third for the Huskers in pancakes with 101 knock-down blocks. He reached double figures in pancakes in four of Nebraska's first six games, including 14 knock-downs against McNeese State, when Nebraska rushed for a seasonhigh 444 yards. Erickson posted a career-high 16 pancakes at Texas A&M, when the offensive line posted a school-record 110 pancakes as a unit, leading Nebraska to a 38-31 comeback victory. Erickson added his sixth double-digit pancake game with 10 against Texas.


Career: Erickson was the only freshman on Nebraska's top two offensive line units in 2001. He played in six games and recorded four pancake blocks. Erickson redshirted in 2000 in his first season at Nebraska.

Senior Aaron Golliday took over the full-time starting duties at tight end in 2002 after three seasons as a key alternate at the position. Golliday is one of the most experienced Husker players on the roster, with 48 career games played and 19 starts, including 11 this season.

Golliday, a 6-4, 290-pounder, has been used primarily as a blocker throughout his Husker career. However, he has been involved in the NU passing game, including three catches with two touchdowns this fall. Golliday was an honorable-mention All-Big 12 selection by the league coaches.

2002: Fifth-year senior Aaron Golliday started 11 games for Nebraska at tight end and appeared in all 13 games. Golliday caught three passes for 29 yards this season. His first reception of the year was a season-long 16-yard grab at Penn State. Golliday's other two receptions in 2002 were touchdown catches from quarterback Jammal Lord. His one-yard touchdown just before halftime against Missouri gave NU a 14-13 advantage in a 24-13 victory. He added a 12-yard touchdown reception against Kansas. Golliday played a key role as a blocker from his tight end position and helped Nebraska to a Big 12-leading 268.9 yards per game.

Career: Golliday played in every game in 2001 and started two contests when senior Tracey Wistrom was out with an injury. Golliday was used primarily as a blocker, but had one reception for four yards against TCU. Golliday started the 2002 Rose Bowl vs. Miami when NU opened in a two tight-end formation. Golliday was Nebraska's No. 2 tight end as a sophomore in 2000 and saw action in all 11 games with three starts. He had one reception, a seven-yard grab against Iowa and also caught a two-point conversion pass at Iowa State. Golliday played in the 2000 Alamo Bowl vs. Northwestern, but did not have a reception.

Golliday played in all 13 games as a redshirt freshman in 1999, including starts in each of the last four games. He finished the season with three catches for 53 yards, including two for 29 yards against Texas A&M. Golliday had two catches for 25 yards against Tennessee in the 2000 Fiesta Bowl. He scored Nebraska's third touchdown on a 13-yard pass from Eric Crouch, capping a nine-play, 96-yard drive. Golliday suited up for the first game in 1998 before deciding to redshirt his first year as a Husker.



Senior wingback Troy Hassebroek (pronounced HASS-eh-brook) played a key role in the Husker passing game in 2002 and is one of the most decorated Huskers off the field. Hassebroek had served as a reserve wingback for three seasons, before taking over the starting role this fall. He responded with seven receptions and continued to play a key role as a downfield blocker in the Husker rushing game.

Hassebroek is also strong in the classroom and in 2002 he earned first-team academic All-Big 12 honors for the second straight season. He has been one of the most involved Huskers in the community in recent memory. For his efforts in that area, Hassebroek was one of 11 Division I-A players named to the AFCA Good Works Team. He also received the 2002 Brook Berringer Memorial Scholarship, given annually to a senior player who is active in the community. Hassebroek was also named the 2002 UNL Homecoming King at halftime of the Kansas game.

2002: The Lincoln native started seven games at wingback for the Huskers, and had seven receptions for 81 yards. Hassebroek had three games with two receptions each. He opened the season with two catches for 24 yards against Arizona State. His next reception was a 10-yard touchdown grab against McNeese State, marking the first TD of his career. He added two catches each at Oklahoma State and Kansas State, including a career-long 23-yard grab against the Wildcats.

Hassebroek also served on NU's punt coverage and kickoff return teams. He had three kickoff returns for 29 yards and added six tackles, including two each against Troy State and Kansas.

Career: Hassebroek played in all 13 games at wingback in 2001. While he did not have a reception, Hassebroek did have two kickoff returns for 44 yards. He also had four tackles on special teams duties. Hassebroek played in the 2002 Rose Bowl, but did not have any statistics. He played in all 12 games as a sophomore at wingback in 2000. Hassebroek recorded one catch for eight yards in the 2000 Alamo Bowl.

Hassebroek played in five games plus the Fiesta Bowl vs. Tennessee as a redshirt freshman in 1999, but did not have any receptions. A former walk-on, Hassebroek redshirted his first year.

True freshman Matt Herian emerged as a big-play receiving threat in 2002. Herian caught just six passes in his rookie campaign, but three of those receptions went for touchdowns. He averaged a remarkable 43.3 yards per catch and five covered 28 yards or more. Herian was selected by The Sporting News to their first-team All-Big 12 Freshman team.

Herian was one of five true freshmen to see action for the Huskers in 2002, including four offensive skill-position players. He will be one of three tight ends in Nebraska's regular rotation for the bowl game and is the only non-senior among Nebraska's top five players at the position.

2002: The Pierce, Neb., native made a splash in his first season with six catches for 260 yards, the third-most receiving yards on the team. He made his first career reception a memorable one, hauling in a 33-yard touchdown pass from Jammal Lord against Utah State.

Herian caught a 44-yard pass to set up a Husker touchdown at Oklahoma State. Against Texas, he had a 60-yard touchdown reception early in the fourth quarter to pull NU to within 20-17. Herian had a 28yard reception at Kansas State. He closed the regular season with two catches for 95 yards against Colorado, including an 80-yard touchdown catch. The 80-yard grab tied the second-longest ever by a Husker tight end.



T.J. Hollowell earned two starts and split duties at Will linebacker with fellow native Texan Demorrio Williams. Hollowell finished seventh on the team in tackles, and he and Williams combined to make 140 tackles from the position. Hollowell and Williams are expected to again share time at the spot for the Huskers in the Independence Bowl. Hollowell is a versatile performer who has experience at all three linebacker spots in his Nebraska career.

2002: Hollowell alternated at Will linebacker with fellow junior Demorrio Williams. Hollowell started only two contests (Kansas, Kansas State), but managed to finish seventh on the team in total tackles with 57 stops. He had 18 solo stops and ranked fifth on the team with nine quarterback hurries, while recording a pair of tackles for loss and a fiveyard sack against Utah State. Hollowell recorded a career-high 10 tackles at Iowa State and had six tackles each at Penn State and Kansas State. He also recovered a fumble against the Wildcats.

Career: Hollowell played in 12 games and had 26 tackles as a reserve Will linebacker in 2001. He had two tackles for loss and five quarterback hurries. He had a season-high eight tackles in NU's win over Troy State. Hollowell had his first career sack against Missouri. He had one assisted tackle against Miami in the 2002 Rose Bowl.

Hollowell saw action in all 11 games as a freshman, primarily on special teams. He had seven tackles and played in the 2000 Alamo Bowl, but did not record any tackles.

Sophomore rover Lannie Hopkins (pronounced LAY-knee) was a key fixture on Nebraska's defense and special teams in 2002. Although he is listed as the No. 4 rover, Hopkins has played a key role for the Husker defense, being utilized as a pass rushing specialist on throwing downs. The coaching staff rewarded Hopkins' contributions to the defense by giving him a Blackshirt midway through the season.

Hopkins played on the majority of Nebraska's special teams and was especially effective as a punt block threat. He blocked three punts this season, including two against Kansas.

2002: Hopkins appeared in 12 games and finished the season with 15 total tackles. He ranked third on the team with 2.5 sacks for 19 yards and had four tackles for loss. Hopkins forced a fumble against Colorado and had six quarterback hurries.


Hopkins blocked a punt in Nebraska's season opener against Arizona State and blocked two punts against Kansas. His second blocked punt against the Jayhawks was returned 30 yards for a touchdown by fellow rover Aaron Terpening. Hopkins earned Big 12 Special Teams Player-of-the-Week accolades for his performance.



True freshman David Horne burst onto the scene midway through the season and gave Nebraska's ground game a needed spark. The Omaha Central graduate did not play in the first five games, but ended his redshirt season against McNeese State. He quickly moved to second on the depth chart and split time for the rest of the year with senior Dahrran Diedrick.

Horne finished his rookie year with nearly 600 yards rushing, including three games with 100 yards or more and scored seven touchdowns. Horne posted the fifth-best rushing season ever by a Husker freshman. He was one of five true freshmen to see action in 2002, including four offensive skill position players.

2002: Horne came out of a redshirt before the McNeese State game and quickly responded with 12 carries for 81 yards in his debut. A week later, Horne played a key role with 20 carries for 88 yards and a touchdown in a 24-13 win over Missouri. In that game he tied his season-long with a 30-yard run and was NU's nominee for Big 12 Offensive Player-of-the-Week honors for the first of three times in 2002.

Horne recorded his first career 100-yard game a week later in a 24-21 loss at Oklahoma State. He rushed for 125 yards on 24 carries and scored a two-yard TD against the Cowboys. Horne became the first true freshman I-back to rush for more than 100 yards since 1996. He was the first Husker frosh at any position to top 100 yards rushing since redshirt freshman quarterback Eric Crouch had 108 yards at Kansas State in 1998.

A week later at Texas A&M, Horne responded with a season-high 128 yards on 24 carries. He scored four touchdowns in the game, including three in the second half, as Nebraska rallied from a 17-point deficit for a 38-31 win. His four touchdowns were the most by a Husker frosh since Calvin Jones rushed for a school-record six TDs at Kansas in 1991.

Horne produced his third 100-yard outing of the season with 122 yards on just nine carries against Kansas. He averaged 13.3 yards per tote against the Jayhawks and matched his season-long rush of 30 yards. Horne and Dahrran Diedrick both topped 100 yards against Kansas, the only time this season a pair of Husker running backs cracked the century mark.

Redshirt freshman offensive tackle Richie Incognito provided a glimpse of his talent in 2002. Incognito led Nebraska in pancakes and his season total of knock-down blocks ranks second in Husker history. Incognito and his offensive line mates helped the Husker offense lead the Big 12 Conference in rushing at 268.9 yards per game.

Incognito checks in at 6-3 and 305 pounds and has good mobility making him a perfect fit in Nebraska's rushing offense. He became the first Husker offensive lineman in school history to start the season opener in their first season in a Husker uniform. Incognito's play did not go unnoticed as The Sporting News selected him as a first-team freshman All-American and first-team All-Big 12 pick. The Dallas Morning News picked him secondteam all-conference and the AP and league coaches gave him honorablemention All-Big 12 honors.

2002: Incognito finished his redshirt freshman campaign as Nebraska's pancake leader with 171 knock-down blocks. His pancake total ranks as the second-most among Huskers since the statistic began being tracked in 1995. All-America guard Toniu Fonoti's 201 pancakes in 2001 is the only total to rank ahead of Incognito's 2002 effort.


Incognito had nine double-figure pancake games this season, including three consecutive games with 20 or more pancakes. He posted 28 pancakes at Texas A&M, the second-most ever by a Husker, as the offensive line set a school single-game record with 110 knock-downs. The unit paved the way for 381 rushing yards in Nebraska's 38-31 comeback victory. Incognito also topped 20 pancakes at Oklahoma State (21) and Texas (22).

He recorded double-figure pancake totals in each of Nebraska's final six games and led the Huskers in pancakes eight times during the season.

Junior rush end Trevor Johnson was a pleasant surprise on the Husker defense this fall. Johnson began the year as a reserve at the position, but moved into the starting lineup midway through the season and responded with solid play. Johnson averaged better than five tackles per game after he moved into a starting role.

Johnson has excelled in the classroom since arriving at Nebraska. This fall he was named to the first-team Academic All-Big 12 squad for the third consecutive year. He carries a 3.40 grade-point average in business administration.

2002: Johnson began the season as the No. 2 right rush end behind Demoine Adams, but took over the starting role before the McNeese State game. He showed his versatility when Chris Kelsay missed five games with a hamstring injury. During that stretch, Johnson started two games at his normal right rush end position, but switched to the left side in Kelsay's place in three contests.

The Lincoln native finished the season with 50 total tackles and his nine tackles for loss tied for the third most on the team. He also ranked second on the team in quarterback hurries with 14. Johnson had a total of five tackles in the first four games, then had a strong game at Iowa State with four tackles, including two TFL. That game earned him a starting job and he responded with eight tackles against McNeese State and seven vs. Missouri, when he added three hurries and shared a sack. Johnson had six tackles and three quarterback hurries against Texas, added seven tackles and a TFL against Kansas and recorded a five-yard sack and recovered a fumble at Kansas State.

Career: Johnson switched to rush end in the spring of 2001 and played in all 12 games last season as a backup at right rush end. He posted nine tackles, including two tackles for five yards lost. He also played on NU special teams, where he saw action in the 2002 Rose Bowl.

Johnson played in 10 games in 2000 as a backup tight end. Johnson did not have a reception, but also saw action on NU's kickoff return teams. He played in the 2000 Alamo Bowl vs. Northwestern, but did not have a catch. A scholarship athlete, Johnson redshirted in 1999.



Junior defensive tackle Patrick Kabongo moved into the starting lineup on Nebraska's interior defensive front midway through the season and had a strong first season as a starter. At 6-6, 305 pounds, Kabongo is one of Nebraska's biggest players, but he retains good mobility. Kabongo is expected to back up senior Jon Clanton at defensive tackle in the 2002 Independence Bowl.

Kabongo finished sixth on the team in tackles and was also one of the Huskers' top pass rushers. One of three Canadians on the NU roster, Kabongo's real first name is Watshidimba (pronounced Watch-chee-DIMbah). Kabongo has a strong record off the field during his time in Lincoln. He is a regular volunteer in the community and was named to the AFCA Good Works Team in 2001 and is a two-time member of the Brook Berringer Citizenship Team. Kabongo graduated with a degree in criminal justice in May of 2002 and was enrolled in graduate courses this fall.

2002: Kabongo played in all 13 games and started seven contests at defensive tackle. He took over for Jon Clanton at defensive tackle before the McNeese State game and stayed atop the depth chart until the Colorado game, when Clanton earned the start against the Buffs. Kabongo finished sixth on the team with 62 tackles this season, which ranked second among Husker defensive linemen. His nine tackles for loss tied for third on the squad, and he added two sacks and five quarterback hurries.

Kabongo alternated at defensive tackle early in the season. He shared a sack and forced a fumble against Arizona State and added a sack and two quarterback hurries against Troy State. One of his hurries against the Trojans caused an interception. He earned his starting spot after a 15-tackle performance at Iowa State, when he also had three tackles for loss. Kabongo had five tackles in his first career start against McNeese State and added four other games with five or more tackles, including seven at Kansas State and six each against Texas and Colorado.


Career: Kabongo played in eight games as a reserve defensive tackle in 2001. He recorded nine tackles and two tackles for loss with five quarterback hurries. As a redshirt freshman, Kabongo earned valuable experience as a backup defensive tackle. He played in seven games and made four tackles. In the Alamo Bowl, Kabongo recorded one tackle. Kabongo redshirted in his first season at Nebraska.


Senior wingback John Klem will complete his Nebraska career in the Independence Bowl. Klem has been a valuable contributor in the receiving corps throughout his career and continued to be a strong perimeter blocker for the Huskers' running game.

Klem is one of several Huskers who will play in the bowl game as graduates. Klem earned his bachelor's degree in finance last week. He was named to the first-team Academic All-Big 12 team this fall.

2002: Klem played in all 13 games with five starts this fall. He began the season as an alternate at split end, but moved to wingback midway through the season. He shared second-team duties at the spot with fellow senior Ben Cornelsen. Klem did not have any receptions, but played a key role as a blocker for the Huskers' Big 12-leading rushing attack.

Career: Klem played in Nebraska's first 11 games as a backup wingback before he tore his right ACL against Kansas State. He caught one pass for nine yards against Rice and was one of Nebraska's best blocking receivers. Klem played in five games as a reserve split end in 2000. He appeared in the 2000 Alamo Bowl vs. Northwestern, but did not have a reception. Klem saw action in four games in 1999, but did not have a catch. A walk-on athlete, Klem redshirted his first year at NU.

Senior David Kolowski served as Nebraska's No. 3 center this fall. However, he played a key role as Nebraska's snapper for place-kicking duties. Husker kickers made 13-of-17 field goals this season and the unit had just one failed PAT attempt. Kolowski also excels in the classroom and was a first-team Academic All-Big 12 selection this fall.

2002: Kolowski saw limited action at center, but was NU's No. 1 snapper for field goals and extra points.

Career: Kolowski played in five games in 2000 and 2001 as a backup center and deep snapper. A walk-on, Kolowski redshirted his first year at Nebraska in 1998 and did not seee action in 1999.
