TIGERS CLOSE REGULAR SEASON AGAINST ARCH RIVAL KANSAS

It's the game that most Mizzou fans circle on their calendar before the season starts, and it's finally here — Mizzou vs. Kansas, the nation's 2nd-most played rivalry and one of the most hotly-contested rivalries in all of sport.

This year's edition will take place Saturday morning in Kansas City's Arrowhead Stadium, with kickoff set for 11:30 a.m. FOX Sports Net will be televising the game.

Mizzou enters the game having won two straight contests, earning hard-fought victories the past two weeks over Big 12 North Division brethren Kansas State (W, 38-28 in Columbia on Nov. 13th) and last Saturday at Iowa State (W, 14-0 on Nov. 20th). The Tigers and Cyclones battled in frigid Ames, Iowa, a place where MU has had its share of tough times over the years. But Mizzou avoided the upset bug as the 15th-ranked Tigers rode a stifling defense and just enough big plays from its offense and special teams to turn that into its 9th win of the season — marking just the sixth time in 120 years of Mizzou Football that MU has won 9 games.

At 9-2 overall (5-2 in Big 12 Conference play), the Tigers are looking to improve their already-impressive bowl resume that has seen the Tigers claim wins over five teams who are currently bowl eligible: Oklahoma (9-2); Texas A&M (8-3); Illinois (6-5); Miami (Ohio) (7-4); San Diego State (7-4); and Kansas State (6-5), while another Tiger victim, Colorado, could be a seventh to gain bowl eligibility with a win this weekend (5-6). MU's only losses on the year came on the road to a pair of bowl-eligible teams: Nebraska (9-2) and Texas Tech (6-5).

Kansas, rebuilding in its first year under Coach Turner Gill, comes into the 2010 finale standing 3-8 overall and 1-6 in Big 12 action. The Jayhawks have wins over Georgia Tech, New Mexico State and Colorado, with the latter being an historic one that saw KU erase a 45-17 deficit in the final 11 minutes of the game to post a 52-45 win. The 28-point 4th-quarter comeback was an NCAA record for largest deficit erased in the final quarter of a win.

MIZZOU LOOKING FOR THIRD BIG 12 NORTH TITLE IN FOUR YEARS

Just because Mizzou and Kansas might be trending in different directions doesn't mean the Tigers will struggle to find motivation on Saturday. Aside from the obvious enticements of the big rivalry, a 10-win season, improving bowl positioning, etc., a win on Saturday for Mizzou would assure the Tigers of no worse than a tie for the Big 12 North Division title.

Mizzou enters the game tied atop the North standings, along with Nebraska, at 5-2. If both teams win this weekend (Nebraska hosts Colorado on Friday), they officially tie for the division crown, and Nebraska represents the North in the Big 12 Championship Game on Dec. 4th in Dallas, due to their 31-17 win over MU in Lincoln on Oct. 30th. If Colorado was to upset Nebraska on Friday, then MU would take the field Saturday against KU knowing that a win would elevate them to the title game against either Oklahoma or Oklahoma State.

But regardless of what Nebraska does Friday, a win Saturday for MU would give MU three Big 12 North Division trophies in the last four seasons, matching the ones it won in 2007 and 2008, when it played in the Big 12 Championship Game both years.

MU LOOKING FOR JUST 4TH 10-WIN SEASON IN SCHOOL HISTORY

The 2010 Tigers have already earned distinction, as they are just the 6th team in Mizzou Football history with 9 regular-season wins. Hoping it doesn't stop there, the Tigers will be going for win #10 on the year Saturday in Kansas City, a win total that has been reached only three times in MU's previous 119 years of existence (began play in 1890). The 10-win seasons include:

- 2007 (12-2)
- 2008 (10-4)

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

Head Coach Gary Pinkel is now the first Tiger coach to achieve three 9-win seasons. College Football Hall of Fame Coach Dan Devine, with two, is the only other MU coach with more than one 9-win season. Pinkel is already the only MU coach with two seasons of double-digit win totals.

TIGERS, JAYHAWKS RESUME NATION'S 2ND-MOST PLAYED RIVALRY

With roots dating back all the way to the Civil War period in American history, Missourians and Kansans have always had a fierce rivalry in everything from football, to a fierce game of Galaga in the neighborhood pub.

Not only is the rivalry a spirited one, but it has several other things going for it that makes it one of the best (and most underrated) in the country...

- The MU-KU series is the 2nd-most played in the nation, with its 118 previous meetings. Only Minnesota and Wisconsin (120 meetings including their 2010 contest won by the Badgers) have played each other more than MU and KU...

- It is one of the most even rivalries around. Amazingly, the series is a virtual deadlock, with MU holding a 55-54-9 edge in the previous 118 meetings. That makes the series the most closely-contested of the nation's top-23 most-played rivalries — those with 103 or more games played alltime...

- And like all great fierce rivalries, it's complete with controversy. Many stories abound about the bad blood between the two programs throughout the years. While the two schools maintain diplomatic relationships, they don't even agree on the series results, as both schools claim to lead the series by a 55-54-9 count. The dispute goes back to the 1960 season, when unranked KU came to Columbia and upset undefeated and #1-ranked Mizzou, 23-7. The win was later forfeited by KU after the Big 8 Conference ruled that ineligible players took the field for the Jayhawks. Kansas counts the result on the field in their record books (and the NCAA also records it as 55-54-9 for KU), while MU counts the forfeit in its win column.

The loss remains as likely the most bitter in Tiger history, as it cost MU a chance at its only national championship, as the Tigers went on to finish 10-1 on the field (11-0 in the record books with the forfeit), and ranked 5th after defeating Navy in the 1961 Orange Bowl.

MIZZOU-KANSAS SERIES HISTORY

As previously stated, MU and KU have the 2nd-most played rivalry in college football history, and this Saturday will mark the 119th meeting between the two heated rivals, with MU claiming it owns a 55-54-9 lead overall.

Last season saw one of the more exciting and dramatic games ever played in the storied series, as MU won a back-and-forth affair, getting a 27-yard Grant Ressel at the final gun to claim a 41-39 win. The Tigers trailed 14-3 at the end of the 1st quarter, and faced a 21-13 halftime deficit before rallying to take a 36-28 lead early in the 4th quarter. Kansas posted a rally of their own with 11 straight points, and the Jayhawks appeared on the verge of the upset win, as they held a 39-36 lead after a short field goal with just 5:10 to play. That probably loomed even larger when MU couldn't muster a drive and punted the ball back with three minutes left in the game. But the punt was downed inside the Jayhawk 5-yardline, and on 3rd down, Aldon Smith and Brian Coulter met in the endzone for a sack and safety on Kansas QB Todd Reesing with 2:45 to play to pull MU to within 39-38. After the ensuing free kick, MU drove downfield, thanks to some key runs by TB Derrick Washington, and the Tigers drained the clock to set up Ressel for the game-winner with no time left.

Kansas claimed a 40-37 win in Arrowhead Stadium in 2008 that was a definite gut-kick for the Tigers, who came into the game as favorites. It was a game played in cold and snowy conditions, and after Kansas surged to a 19-7 first-half lead, the Tigers worked some comeback magic and eventually would hold leads of 30-26 and 37-33 in the 4th quarter, only to see the Jayhawks post two TD drives in the final five minutes of play. The last one was capped with a play that will likely burn in the memories of Tiger fans forever, as on 4th-and-7 from the MU 26-yardline with just :27 seconds to play, Reesing avoided pressure and floated a perfect pass to a streaking Kerry Meier in the endzone for a back-breaking TD that accounted for the final score. Mizzou drove furiously downfield in short time, but had to settle for a long field goal attempt, and Jeff Wolfert's 54-yarder at the gun was partially blocked, sending Mizzou home with the defeat to drop them to 9-3 on the season.

The year before left a decidedly different taste in the mouths of Tiger fans, as Mizzou claimed a thrilling 36-28 win over KU in the inaugural game at Arrowhead Stadium. Nicknamed "Armageddon at Arrowhead," the game featured 11-0 and 2nd-ranked Kansas against 10-1 and 3rd-ranked Mizzou, with #1 LSU having been upset the night before — meaning the winner would likely ascend to #1 in the polls and control the inside track to a spot in the BCS Title Game. Mizzou rode the arm of QB Chase Daniel to a 14-0 halftime lead, and that would eventually surge to a 21-0 Tiger lead in the 3rd quarter before Kansas could get untracked. Kansas would post an admirable comeback that pulled them to within 34-28 with 2:03 to play, but after Mizzou drove into KU territory on the ensuing possession before pinning the Jayhawks inside their own 5-yardline, the Tigers sealed the deal with a sack of Reesing in the endzone for a safety with just :12 seconds left to account for the final score of 36-28. The win gave MU its first-ever Big 12 North Division title, and two days later, when the polls came out, the Tigers were the #1 team in the land.

MU Coach Gary Pinkel stands 5-4 against Kansas in his nine previous seasons at Mizzou. He won his first two contests against KU, and that made him only the 3rd coach in Tiger history to win his first 2 games over Kansas.

The series returned to Kansas City, Mo., in what was initially a two-year agreement, as both schools agreed to move home games in 2007 and 2008 to Arrowhead Stadium, home of the NFL's Kansas City Chiefs. It was announced the week of the 2008 contest that both schools had reached an agreement, in conjunction with the Chiefs and the Kansas City Sports Commission, to extend the series in Kansas City another four years, meaning the game will be played there through 2012.

Kansas City was the historical site of the MU-KU rivalry, as the city was the host of the 1st 16 games in the series, from 1891-1906, and has been now for 24 games overall. KU holds a 13-8-3 edge overall in games played in the series in Kansas City, and the 2007 game marked the first games played there since MU won in consecutive years in 1944 (28-0) and 1945 (33-12).

SATURDAY IS WORTH MORE THAN A WIN ON THE GRIDIRON

Saturday's winner will not only take home the traditional bass drum trophy given to the winner of the rivalry game, but the school will earn 3 points in the M&I Bank MU-KU Border Showdown Series.

This marks the 9th year of the Border Showdown, which records the head-to-head results between MU and KU in all sports each season. Each competition is assigned a certain amount of points during the year, and the school that wins the most at the end wins a traveling trophy and bragging rights.

Entering Saturday's football game, Mizzou holds a 6.0-to-3.5 lead thus far in the 2010-11 series.

In the previous eight years of the showdown, MU has won the series six times, claiming yearly wins in 2002-03 (32.0-to-8.5), in 2004-05 (22.5-to-17.5), in 2006-07 (25.0-to-14.0), in 2007-08 (24.0-to-15.0), in 2008-09 (23.0-to-17.0) and again last year in 2009-10 (23.0-to-16.5), with KU claiming wins in 2003-04 (21.5-to-18.5) and in 2005-06 (22.0-to-17.0).



MU-KU BASS DRUM UP FOR GRABS SATURDAY

Most every school has goofy trophies that they play rivals for each year, and Mizzou is no exception. MU and KU play annually for a bass drum. Here are details of the significance behind the drum...

MU-KU BASS DRUM — Issued to the winner of the Missouri-Kansas football game ... Originated in 1935 ... Trophy was originally conceived as an Indian War Drum in nature by a couple of Mizzou alumni, since Osage Indians roamed the plains of Kansas and Missouri long before the state universities were founded ... Original intent was to stimulate new interest in longtime series that had dwindled during the Depression of the '30s and MU's all-time low in football victories ... Supposedly authentic Indian drum was purchased in a Kansas City pawn shop, and new drum was acquired prior to 1986 game ... Autographed originally on both drum heads by KU and MU alumni ... Tradition was temporarily forgotten for a few years but resumed on an annual basis in 1947 ... The first game ended in a scoreless tie.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

LAST YEAR REWIND: MIZZOU 41, KANSAS 39

KANSAS CITY, Mo. (AP) - Missouri tackled Todd Reesing for a safety with 2:39 remaining and Grant Ressel hit a 27-yard field goal as time expired, giving the Tigers a 41-39 win over Kansas in another wild Border Showdown at Arrowhead Stadium. These rivals put on a show in 2008 and somehow topped it, trading big plays, scores and momentum seemingly with every snap.

Missouri (8-4, 4-4) had 553 total yards, but needed a safety and Ressel's fourth field goal of the game to beat its biggest rival and end coach Mark Mangino's eight-year stint at Kansas (5-7, 1-7) with a seven-game losing streak. Danario Alexander caught 15 passes for 233 yards, the third time he's eclipsed 200 yards in four games, and Derrick Washington ran for 111 yards and two scores for the Tigers.

Missouri's Blaine Gabbert threw for 303 yards and a score, and ran for 94 more yards in the 118th Border Showdown, boosting Missouri's chances of getting into a bigger bowl.

Reesing threw for a school-record 498 yards and four touchdowns - two to Kerry Meier - in his final collegiate game and Kansas had 547 total yards, but it wasn't enough to avoid the loss. Kansas' Dezmon Briscoe had 14 catches for 242 yards but lost two fumbles that led directly to Missouri touchdowns.

Like last season, when they won 40-37, the Jayhawks were in position to win.

Jacob Branstetter hit a 39-yard field goal with 5:10 left to put Kansas up 39-36, then the Jayhawks forced Missouri into a punt.

Starting the drive at its own 3, KU opted to pass instead of milking clock. After two failed passes, Brian Coulter and Aldon Smith converged on Reesing in the end zone for a safety to cut Kansas' lead to 39-38. Worse yet, the Jayhawks ran just 14 seconds off the clock, giving Missouri plenty of time to move into position for the winning score.

The Tigers did just that, getting a 27-yard run from Washington to set up Ressel's attempt. He split the uprights and, after a brief delay for a penalty on Kansas, the Tigers rushed the field for one of their wildest wins against their biggest rival.

Most of the action took place in the second half.

Trailing 21-13, Missouri marched down the field on its opening drive of the second half for Washington's 14-yard touchdown run up the middle. Kansas answered with a 2-yard pass from Reesing to Meier after Missouri's Sean Weatherspoon was called for running into the center on a made field goal.

Missouri's turn, Jerrell Jackson got the right corner on an end-around and scored on a 37-yard run. The Tigers needed just 55 seconds to score again, following Briscoe's second fumble with Alexander's catch-and-run 68-yard touchdown. Ressel's third field goal, from 37 yards, put Missouri up 36-28 early in the fourth quarter.

Kansas and Briscoe weren't done. Streaking up the sideline, Briscoe pulled down a long pass from Reesing, wobbled safety Jasper Simmons' knees near the 20, then went in for a 74-yard touchdown. Reesing hit Meier for the 2-point conversion, tying the game at 36-all.

KU got the ball back, starting inside its 1, and drove down for Branstetter's field goal to set up the final flurry.

TIGERS GET FIRST ROAD CONFERENCE SHUTOUT WIN SINCE 1967 AT ISU

Mizzou improved to 9-2 overall and 5-2 in Big 12 Conference play with a gritty 14-0 shutout win at Iowa State against a motivated Cyclone team which was going for bowl eligibility in its final game of the regular season. The Tigers held a 7-0 halftime lead thanks to a Blaine Gabbert-to-Michael Egnew TD pass of 11 yards in the 1st quarter, and they extended the lead to 14-0 on a 1-yard TD run early in the 4th quarter by TB De'Vion Moore. The Tiger defense made sure that score stood up, as it pitched the first conference road shutout by Mizzou since 1967 (W, 7-0 at Stillwater). It was MU's first road shutout overall since a 16-0 win at Houston in 1994.

The shutout was the second of the season for Mizzou (beat Colorado, 26-0, in Columbia on Oct. 9th), and that gives MU two shutouts in the same season for the first time since 1983 (W, 38-0 at home against Kansas State & W, 10-0 at home against Oklahoma).

Here are a few fun facts regarding shutouts and Big 12 Conference play:

- In the last five seasons (2006-Present), there have been five shutouts posted in Big 12 games, and Mizzou owns three of them:

EGNEW NAMED MACKEY FINALIST, LEADS ALL TE'S IN RECEPTIONS

Junior TE Michael Egnew had some pretty big shoes to fill, as he's following in the footsteps of a pair of All-American tight ends, in Martin Rucker (All-American, 2007) and Chase Coffman (All-American, 2008). The Plainview, Texas native has shown that he's quite capable of not only wearing the shoes, but filling them out nicely.

On Monday, Egnew was named as one of three finalists for the John Mackey Tight End Award, which goes annually to the nation's top player at the position. Coffman won the prestigious award in 2008, while Rucker was a finalist in 2007, meaning that MU has now had a Mackey finalist in three of the last four seasons.

Egnew finds himself as the nation's top pass-catching tight end heading into the Kansas game. After catching a total of 7 passes for 47 yards (0 TDs) in 2008 and 2009 combined, Egnew has emerged as a major weapon, with a team-best 78 receptions for 663 yards and 4 TDs through 11 games. Egnew ranks 10th in the NCAA among all players with his 7.1 receptions per game average, and his 78 receptions are most in the nation among tight ends, 24 more than the next on the list (Iowa State's Collin Franklin, with 54). He is also 2nd in the nation among tight ends in receiving yardage per game, at 58.60 yards entering Saturday's game against KU.

He's coming off an outstanding game at Iowa State, as he caught a game-high 7 passes for 77 yards and a beautiful 11-yard TD grab in the 1st quarter to give the Tigers a 7-0 lead, when he made a leaping grab in the back corner of the endzone.

Egnew has the most catches and yards among the Mackey finalists, and his 4 TDs is equal to that of the other two finalists. Here's a look at the three finalists:

Egnew began the season by snagging 10 catches for 60 yards and 1 TD against Illinois, and had an outstanding game against SDSU in game #3, as he finished the night with career highs in receptions (13) and yards (145). Both totals represented school single-game records for tight ends at Mizzou, with the old standards being 12 catches for 140 yards by former All-American Chase Coffman at Texas in 2008. He had an impactful 2-TD night against Colorado, when he caught 6 passes for 52 yards, including his pair of 10-yard and 7-yard TD grabs. He turned in a standout game at Texas A&M, where he caught 10 passes for 87 yards and also made 7 catches against Nebraska's tough secondary for 70 yards.

OPPOSING KICKERS HAVING A ROUGH GO AGAINST MIZZOU

Field goal defense isn't an official statistic in football, but if it were, the Tigers would have to rank high nationally, as Tiger opponents have now made just 8-of-17 FG tries on the year (47.1%), and that's a stark contrast to the 2009 season, when Tiger opponents could hardly miss, as they made 18-of-19 FGs against MU a year ago (94.7%).

In Big 12 play this season, opponents have made just 3-of-10 FGs against the Tigers. And it's not like they've all been from long distance, as five of the seven misses have been from 40 yards or closer, including two misses from 40 yards out by Colorado, a miss from 30 yards away by Oklahoma and misses last week by Iowa State from 38 yards and again from 27 yards out.

Certainly, MU should get partial credit for opponents struggles here, as the Tigers have been credited with blocking five FGs in 2010, and because of that, perhaps that's influenced opposing kickers when the kick isn't blocked?

EGNEW, JACQUES SMITH, GRABNER STAR IN WIN OVER CYCLONES

Junior TE Michael Egnew, junior DE Jacques Smith and senior P Matt Grabner got our unofficial nods as Mizzou's offensive, defensive, and special teams players of the game, respectively. Here's a look back at their exploits...

- Egnew, named last week as a John Mackey Award semi-finalist, lived up to his billing as one of the nation's top tight ends, as he hauled in a game-high 7 receptions for 77 yards and a TD to help the Tigers to their 14-0 win in Ames. Egnew's score came on a beautiful 11-yard leaping grab in the corner of the endzone with 1:40 to play in the 1st quarter that gave MU a 7-0 lead. It was his 4th receiving TD of the season...

- Egnew caught 7 of Blaine Gabbert's 16 completions on a night where the ISU defense clamped down pretty tightly on the Tiger passing attack, limiting MU to just 172 yards passing and the 1 TD...

- Egnew continues to be the nation's leader far and away in receptions by tight ends, as the ISU game upped his season total to 78 receptions for 663 yards and 4 TDs. That is 24 receptions more than the next-highest individual total by any tight end (54 by Iowa State's Collin Franklin), and his yardage-per game average of 60.27 is

also 2nd-best among all tight ends currently...

- — Smith was a big disruptive force in MU's historic shutout win (MU's first road conference shutout since 1967), as he had 3.0 tackles for loss, including 2.0 QB sacks, while adding a forced fumble and another QB hurry in MU's 14-0 win at Iowa State...

- — Smith was credited with 3 tackles on the night, but his active game was definitely a key in MU's overall defensive effort. It was another great overall team effort on defense, as 10 different Tigers contributed 3 or more tackles, all the way up to leading tackler, senior LB Andrew Gachkar, who led the way with 7 stops...

- — Smith now has 5.5 QB sacks on the season, and that ranks him 10th in the Big 12 Conference, while his 10.0 tackles for loss on the year also rate as 10th-best in the league...

- — Grabner, a strong-legged senior punter, merits kudos not as much for his work associated for his 8 punts in MU's 14-0 win over Iowa State, but rather for the one time he took the field and didn't punt — when he carried for 15 yards on a fake punt to jump-start a drive that led to MU's second TD of the night. With MU clinging to a 7-0 lead late in the 3rd quarter, a drive stalled on the Mizzou 28-yardline, where it was 4th-and-2. Tiger coaches called a gutsy fake, and Grabner executed it perfectly, taking his first career rush 15 yards up the gut for a huge conversion. Nine plays later, the Tigers punched in from the 1-yardline for a TD that made it 14-0 early in the 4th quarter...

- — Grabner also played a key role in helping keep the Cyclone offense bottled up on its own end of the field most of the night. He punted 8 times, and while his average of 36.9 wasn't eye-popping, 5 of his kicks finished inside the Iowa State 20-yardline. After Grabner's last 7 punts of the night, the Cyclones started possessions at their 20, 14, 9, 5, 14, 13 and 20 yardlines, respectively. Iowa State's average starting field position was its own 14-yardline in the 2nd quarter, its own 5-yardline in the 3rd quarter, and its own 20 yardline in the 4th quarter, and that undoubtedly factored heavily into the shutout victory for the Tigers...

- — Grabner, in his first year of action, enters the final week of the regular season ranked 5th in the Big 12 Conference, and 38th nationally, with his punting average of 42.66 yards per kick. The Tigers have also been outstanding in the net punting category, as they rank 13th nationally (4th in the Big 12) with a per-kick net average of 42.73 yards...

- — Twenty-six of Grabner's 61 punts on the year have been downed inside the opponent 20-yardline, and he's got 12 boots of 50 yards or more, including a long of 71 on the season...

2010 SENIOR CLASS OWNS SCHOOL WINS RECORD

Mizzou's senior class isn't very big (just 15 in all) but they've no doubt played a big role in helping the Tigers elevate the overall standing of the program in their time at MU. The 2010 senior class entered the season having collected 30 wins over the previous three years, and with 9 wins so far in 2010, they have broken the school record of 38 wins over a four-year period, which was established by the 2009 class. The current class broke the mark of 38 with MU's 14-0 win last Saturday at Iowa State, and they'll work to up the record this week vs. Kansas.

The 2009 class one-upped the record of 37, which had been established just the previous year by the 2008 class. The 2010 class has been a very key group of players and leaders who have helped push Mizzou to new heights. They have been part of two Big 12 North Division championship teams (2007, 2008), they've helped lead Mizzou to bowl games in each of the past four seasons overall (2006 Sun, 2008 Cotton, 2008 Alamo, 2009 Texas), and they were also part of the 2007 team which ascended to #1 in the BCS polls on Nov. 25th, 2007.

With the Tigers having already achieved bowl eligibility in 2010, this senior class will become only the fourth in MU history to play in four bowl games in a four-year span. The only previous classes to achieve that feat were the 1981 senior class, followed by the last two classes to come through (2008 & 2009).

Here's a look at the most prolific senior classes at Mizzou, in terms of wins...

MIZZOU HAS GONE 9-2 VS. NCAA'S 7TH-TOUGHEST SCHEDULE TO DATE

Mizzou has won 9 of its first 11 games of the 2010 season with a fairly young team overall (with only 5 senior starters), despite facing what is ranked by the NCAA as the 7th-toughest schedule in the nation to date. The NCAA figures its toughest schedule rankings in this manner according to the cumulative records of opponents played.

TIGERS ARE 16-3 AGAINST BIG 12 NORTH FOES SINCE 2007

Mizzou's ability to take of business in its own division has been instrumental in the Tigers' rise toward the top of the Big 12 heap. From 2007-10, Mizzou has gone 16-3 in North Division games (84.2%), and that's the best mark by two full games over any other North Division school. Here's a look at the comparisons (through games of Nov. 20th)...

TIGERS RANK 1ST IN BIG 12, 7TH IN NCAA IN SCORING DEFENSE

A glance at the latest batch of statistics shows that Mizzou's defense leads the Big 12 Conference, and ranks 7th in the nation, in scoring defense. Through 11 games, the Tigers, under 2nd-year Defensive Coordinator Dave Steckel, are allowing an average of 15.91 points per game. That's a nice improvement from last year, when in 13 games, MU ranked 59th nationally in scoring defense, allowing an average of 25.38 points per game.

Mizzou has allowed only 9 rushing TDs so far, and that total is the lowest in the Big 12, through 11 games.

As noted previously, MU is coming off a 14-0 shutout win at Iowa State, and that, coupled with a 26-0 shutout win earlier in the year over Colorado, gave MU two shutouts in the same season for the first time since 1983. More impressively, the whitewash was MU's first in a conference road game since 1967, when the Tigers won a 7-0 game at Oklahoma St.

Earlier, MU put together a stifling defensive effort that held Texas A&M's potent offense to a season-low 9 points on their home field. A&M came into the game averaging 35.00 points per game (ranked 27th in NCAA). Mizzou held the Aggies to 379 yards of offense, nearly 100 yards below their average of 472.60 coming in, which ranked them 15th nationally in total offense at the time.

The Tigers went up against one of the top offenses in the nation at Nebraska, and even though the Huskers gained a 31-17 win, that point total was seven points below NU's scoring average coming into the game of 38.86 points per game. Similarly, the Tiger defense was key in MU's win over BCS #1-ranked Oklahoma on Oct. 23rd, when it held the Sooners to 27 points in a 36-27 win. The Sooners came into the game averaging 36.0 points per game. Mizzou kept Texas Tech to 24 points, and that was below the Red Raiders' scoring average coming into the game of 31.88 points per outing.

TIGER RED ZONE DEFENSE 2ND NATIONALLY

It would stand to figure that a good scoring defense performs well in the red zone, and that has more often than not been the case for Mizzou's defense to this point. Through 11 games, Mizzou's defense is ranked 2nd nationally in red zone defense, as opponents have scored just 53% of the time they've gotten inside the Tiger 20-yardline.

Last Saturday was very reflective of the success MU's defense has enjoyed when it's been backed up to the red zone, as Iowa State penetrated the Tiger 20-yardline only twice, but they came up empty both times, missing on field goals of 38 yards and 27 yards.

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

Last Saturday in MU's 38-28 win over #24 (BCS) Kansas State, the Tigers got one stop in three redzone attacks by the Wildcats. While KSU got a pair of TDs on short runs (only the 8th and 9th rushing TDs allowed by MU on the season in 10 games), Mizzou did come up with a game-changing stop just before halftime with their backs against the wall. It wasn't exactly a forced error, but when K-State had C/QB exchange issues on a snap from the Tiger 1-yardline with just :15 seconds left before halftime, Tiger DE Jacques Smith gladly pounced on the ball to avert the scoring threat. That stop helped preserve MU's 21-14 halftime lead, and loomed even larger when the Tigers scored the next 17 points of the game after intermission to surge to a 38-14 lead.

Even in MU's recent defeat at Nebraska, the defense didn't give up any redzone scores, as the Huskers never took a single snap inside the Tiger 20-yardline. At Texas Tech, the Red Raiders enjoyed uncommon success, as they converted on 3-of-4 red zone tries, turning all three into TDs. Even so, the Tiger defense buckled down and made the most of the 4th Tech red zone appearance, as LB Zaviar Gooden stepped in front of a pass at the Tiger 2 for his second INT of the year, and he returned it 10 yards to the MU 12-yardline to avert the Tech scoring threat.

A perfect example of MU's ability to get key stops was on display in MU's 36-27 win against #1 (BCS) Oklahoma on Oct. 23rd, as the Sooners converted on just 3-of-6 redzone opportunities. The Tiger defense got an interception by DE Aldon Smith on its 14-yardline in the 1st quarter, and forced/recovered a fumble on its 14-yardline again, in the 2nd quarter (force by DE Michael Sam, recovered by FS Jasper Simmons). In the 3rd quarter, the Tiger defense held the Sooners to a 30-yard field goal attempt, but the kick was pulled wide left.

PINKEL LOOKING FOR CAREER WIN #150 THIS SATURDAY

Mizzou Head Coach Gary Pinkel is in his 10th season at MU (20th overall as a head coach) and touts a career record of 149-85-3 (63.5%). Following Mizzou's recent historic win over #1 (BCS) Oklahoma, the Tigers ascended to as high as #6 in the BCS rankings, and the 7-0 start to the season was only the third in school history, and the first for any Tiger team since 1960.

Pinkel, who has led MU to a combined record of 54-23 (70.1%) over the past 5+ seasons, and to bowl games in 2003, 2005, 2006, 2007, 2008, 2009 and soon-to-be again in 2010, has a 10-year record in Columbia of 76-48 (61.3%). Dating back to the 2005 Independence Bowl win over Steve Spurrier and South Carolina, Pinkel has gone 48-18 in his last 66 games overall (72.7%). MU's win in the 2008 opener against Illinois gave Pinkel his 50th MU win, and he now ranks 3rd on the coaching wins list at MU, with 76.

Pinkel is in a select group of Mizzou coaches that includes College Football Hall of Famers Don Faurot and Dan Devine, as well as Warren Powers, to be the only coaches to have an MU record of above .500 (with at least one full season coached) dating all the way back to 1935.

Here's a quick look at the top winning coaches in MU history...

For his efforts in 2007, Pinkel was a finalist for several national coach of the year awards, including the Robinson, Bryant and Munger awards. He was also named the National Coach of the Year by FieldTurf in 2007.

Mizzou's bowl appearance in 2009 means that Pinkel has led MU to 6 bowl games overall, and he now joins Devine as the only other coach to guide MU to 6 bowl games. The Tigers have already attained bowl eligibility in 2010, and that will give Pinkel an MU-record 7th bowl game appearance later this season.

Pinkel has directed Mizzou to 7 winning seasons (8-5 in 2003, 7-5 in 2005, 8-5 in 2006, 12-2 in 2007, 10-4 in 2008, 8-5 in 2009 and 9-2 in 2010), with those representing 7 of MU's 9 winning campaigns dating back to the 1983 season.

The Big 12 North Division titles won by Mizzou in 2007 and 2008 represent the first football conference title of any kind Mizzou has won since 1969 — the last time it claimed a share of the old Big Eight Conference crown.

In November of 2008, Pinkel agreed to a new seven-year contract, meaning he'll patrol the Tiger sidelines through the 2015 season.

DEFENSE HAS EXCELLED AT SUDDEN CHANGE SITUATIONS

Mizzou's defense has been outstanding at stopping opponents in "sudden change" situations, after a Tiger turnover. Thankfully, the Tiger offense has been pretty sound at holding onto the ball all year long, but when the turnovers have come, the defense has, much more often than not, gotten a stop to stem the tide.

In 11 games thus far, MU has committed 14 turnovers. Opponents have managed to convert those opportunities into only 10 points total. Against San Diego State, the Tigers committed a season-high 3 turnovers, with all 3 coming in the 4th quarter, including one inside the Tiger 10-yardline. But the defense stood strong, and got an interception near the goalline to snuff out one threat, forced a punt on one situation, and held the Aztecs to a field goal on the other.

The only Tiger turnover converted by opponents into a TD was by Oklahoma. That came on a muffed punt return by MU that the Sooners covered on the Tiger 45-yardline. OU converted by driving the short field for a TD.

By contrast, Mizzou has converted 24 opponent turnovers into 65 points.

TIGERS HAVE BEEN TOPS IN THE BIG 12 NORTH THE PAST 4 SEASONS

Over the last 4 seasons (2007-10), no team in the Big 12 North Division has been more successful than Mizzou. The Tigers rank 3rd-best in the league in overall wins (39) and 3rd in Big 12 wins (21) during the period, and that is also tops among North Division schools by a 2-game margin. GABBERT STANDS 17-7 AS A STARTER FOR THE TIGERS

After a tough couple of outings at Nebraska and Texas Tech, junior QB Blaine Gabbert regained his swagger from earlier in the season as he recently led the Tigers to a 38-28 win over #24 (BCS) Kansas State, as he accounted for 297 yards of offense and 3 total TDs on the day. Gabbert completed his first 7 passes of the game and ended 17-of-25 passing for 208 yards and 2 TDs, while changing the complexion of the game with his 89 yards on the ground, including a 32-yard TD run in the 2nd quarter. His QB rating of 156.29 was a season high, besting his previous standard of 154.13 against McNeese State.

Offensive fireworks were few and far between last Saturday in frigid Ames, Iowa, but Gabbert still led the way with an efficient outing in MU's 14-0 win, as he completed 16-of-26 passes for 172 yards and 1 TD. Gabbert also led the Tigers with 37 rushing yards on 6 attempts (a 6.2 avg.), as the Cyclones were able to clamp down on the ground game a bit.

The win pushed Gabbert's record as a starting QB to 17-7 in his 24 career starts (70.8%). Win number 15 came against BCS-#1 Oklahoma, as he became the first Tiger QB to ever lead MU to a win over a #1-ranked team (any major poll), and the first QB since former great Corby Jones to beat the Sooners (1998).

Gabbert was lights out against OU, completing 30-of-42 passes for 308 yards and 1 TD, while also running for 26 yards. He was at his best in crunch time, as he completed 8-of-9 4th-quarter passes for 95 yards and a TD (a 38-yarder to WR Jerrell Jackson that gave MU the lead for good).

Even though the Tigers tasted defeat for the first time on Oct. 30th at Nebraska, Gabbert definitely showed his toughness, as he was pressured and harassed most all day. Gabbert was sacked 6 times by the Husker defense, after going down only 7 times combined in the first 7 games of the season. Included on the day were a couple of potential helmet-to-helmet hits and at least one facemask grab against him which weren't flagged, but Gabbert kept getting up to answer the bell. He ended the day with 199 yards passing (on 18-of-42) for 1 TD and 1 INT (his first since Sept. 25th against Miami, Ohio). Gabbert also showed an ability to improvise when the pocket broke down, as he ran for 74 net yards — he actually gained 123 yards in all, but due to sack yardage, the net went down to 74.

Prior to that, Gabbert improved to 4-1 as a starter in road games as the Tigers cruised to a 30-9 win at Texas A&M, in what was among the best performances of his career. Gabbert was a solid 31-of-47 passing for 361 yards

and 3 TDs, with no interceptions as he helped lead MU to a 16-0 halftime lead, and an insurmountable 30-3 lead through 3 quarters of play. He did all of that while playing with a sore right hip/side area, after sustaining a high hip pointer the previous week against Colorado.

Against the Buffaloes, Gabbert helped guide the Tigers to a 26-0 shutout win when he put up 17-for-29 passing figures for 191 yards and 2 TDs (with zero INTs), before leaving the game early in the 4th quarter due to a high hip (right) pointer sustained earlier in the game.

Gabbert threw for 351 yards in the win over San Diego State, as he completed 28-of-51 passes, including the game-winning TD to T.J. Moe covering 68 yards with just :51 seconds left. He became the first Tiger QB to throw a game-winning TD in the final minute of play since Pete Woods beat 2nd-ranked Ohio State in Columbus in 1976 (a 22-21 win with :12 seconds left).

In limited action against McNeese State, Gabbert completed his first 15 passes, and eventually finished the game 26-of-31 (220 yards, 1 TD) to break the MU single-game completion percentage record with a mark of 83.9%, breaking the old standard of 83.8% set in 2008 by Chase Daniel vs. Buffalo.

In the opener against Illinois, Gabbert helped lead the Tigers to a 20-point 2nd half as MU rallied for its 23-13 win over Illinois in St. Louis. Gabbert finished the game 34-of-48 for 281 yards and two TDs. While he was solid in the first half (14-of-20 passing, 114 yards, QB rating of 117.88), he enjoyed a more effective 2nd half, as he completed 20-of-28 passes for 167 yards and 2 TDs (QB rating of 145.10).

MADISON LEADING THE BIG 12'S TOP-RANKED SACK ATTACK

Don't look now, but the Big 12 Conference's most disruptive pass rush resides in Columbia, Mo., as the Mizzou Tigers currently lead the league, and rank #7 nationally, with their QB sack average of 3.00 per game. The Tigers' 33 sacks in 11 games is already 2 more than the 31 the 2009 Tigers amassed in 13 games.

Five different Tigers have recorded 3 sacks or more, and that group has been led to this point by sophomore DE Brad Madison, who's not even a starter. Madison has been a "super-sub" off the bench for the Tiger defense, and he's recorded a team-best 7.5 QB sacks through 11 games, for an average of 0.68 per game which ranks him 3rd-best in the Big 12, and 29th nationally among all defenders. Madison, the younger brother of former Tiger standout offensive lineman Ryan Madison (2005-08), has been a play-making machine in his time on the field, as he's recorded a team-best 11 tackles for loss among his 29 total stops on the year. Madison made two starts during the absence of star rush end Aldon Smith, the first two starts of his career. He's coming off a 5-tackle game last Saturday at Iowa State which included a QB sack late in the game to seal the Cyclone's fate, and he might have made the defensive play of the game when he forced a fumble that was recovered by Mizzou on the Tiger 30-yardline midway through the 4th quarter as ISU was mounting a scoring threat.

Speaking of Aldon Smith, the premier rush end in the Big 12 Conference has returned from a broken leg (cracked fibula suffered in game #3 against San Diego State on Sept. 18th) and is back to wreaking the kind of havoc he brought in 2009, when he was the Big 12 Defensive Freshman of the Year. Against Kansas State, Smith had 1.5 QB sacks, including arguably the defensive play of the game, when he crushed the Wildcat QB on a blindside shot, jarring the ball loose, which led to a 53-yard scoop-and-score TD by fellow DE Jacques Smith. The sack had to feel good, as it was Aldon's first since the SDSU game. Even though he's playing at less than 100%, he's still made a big impact, as evidenced by his huge interception in his first game back, on Oct. 23rd against #1-ranked (BCS) Oklahoma, when he picked off Landry Jones on the MU 14-yardline and returned it 58 yards the other way to set up a Tiger TD. For the season, Smith has 4.5 sacks and 38 tackles in all, in his 8 games.

Jacques Smith has also been very disruptive, as he's 2nd on the sack list, with 5.5, in 11 games, including 2 sacks that he had last Saturday at Iowa State. Jacques has also recovered a pair of fumbles — both against Kansas State — and returned one of them 53 yards for a TD, while the other came on the MU 2-yardline after a C/QB exchange problem that wiped out a Wildcat scoring threat.

Sophomore LB Zaviar Gooden (MU's leading tackler currently, with 68 stops overall), and senior CB Kevin Rutland (who is tied for the team lead with 2 INTs and 5 PBUs) are the other two Tigers with 3.0 sacks apiece.

VETERAN O-LINE HAS 136 COMBINED CAREER STARTS

Those who consider themselves football purists will tell you that it all starts up front on offense. If that's the case then the Mizzou offense looked to be in pretty solid hands for the 2010 season, as the Tigers returned 4-of-5 starters from the line a year ago.

That veteran line will take the field with a combined 136 career starts heading into Saturday's game against Kansas. The front five had an outstanding effort recently in MU's 38-28 win over #24 (BCS) Kansas State, as the Tigers amassed 440 yards of total offense, including 232 rushing yards (2 TDs) and 208 passing yards (2 TDs). Mizzou had consecutive 200-yard rushing games, after going for a season-best 260 rushing yards the week before at Texas Tech.

The line recently had an absolutely stellar performance in Mizzou's win over BCS-#1 Oklahoma. Against the Sooners, the line paved the way for 486 yards of total offense, including 178 yards on the ground. They also kept QB Blaine Gabbert clean all night long, as Gabbert was not sacked one time against the talented OU front seven.

Four weeks ago at 12th-ranked Nebraska, the stellar Cornhusker defense presented a difficult challenge, and the Tigers were held to a season-low of 341 yards of total offense, and that included 6 QB sacks allowed, when the Tigers had permitted only 7 sacks total in the first 7 games of the year. The next week saw the Tigers race to a quick 14-0 lead at Texas Tech, thanks to superb blocking by the line which paved the way for long TD runs of 69 yards and 71 by running backs Marcus Murphy and Kendial Lawrence, respectively.

MU QBs have now been sacked just 17 times in 407 passing attempts on the season, and the average of 1.45 sacks allowed per game is 35th-best in the nation.

Headlining the group is third-year starting C Tim Barnes, who is on the watch lists for the Rimington and Outland trophies. Barnes has started 38 consecutive games at center, and he's only the third starter at center in Pinkel's tenure at Mizzou — A.J. Ricker started for Pinkel for 3 seasons (2001-03), followed by Adam Spieker for 4 seasons (2004-07), followed by Barnes for three (2008-10).

Also returning to the fold are bookend tackles Elvis Fisher (LT) and Dan Hoch (RT). Fisher is in his third year as a starter in 2010, as he's started every one of the last 38 games guarding the blind side of Tiger quarterbacks. Hoch became the first-ever true freshman offensive lineman to play for Gary Pinkel when he saw the field in reserve duty in 2008, and then he took over starting duties for the first time in 2009, when he made all 13 starts at the spot, and after 11 starts in 2010, he's up to 24 for his career.

The guards feature RG Austin Wuebbels, who started 13 games at left guard a year ago, and he now slides over to the right side to replace departed star Kurtis Gregory, and with 11 starts in 2010, he's also at 24 career starts. Junior LG Jayson Palmgren made his first career start in the season opener against Illinois, but he's got plenty of game experience, as he split snaps last year frequently with Wuebbels in all 13 games. Palmgren's 11 career starts, plus the 1 start notched by sophomore Jack Meiners in the Oklahoma game (when the Tigers went with a jumbo set to open the game — it worked to produce a 20-yard run by TB De'Vion Moore on the first play from scrimmage), add up to 136 career starts by the Tiger linemen.

TIGER GROUND ATTACK AVERAGING 189 YDS. IN LAST 5 GAMES

Mizzou's rushing attack doesn't garner the attention its aerial game does in the spread offense MU has employed since installing it prior to the 2005 season. However, the Tigers have shown in 2010 that their ground game can be very effective when called upon. Here are some basic factoids regarding the Tiger ground game...

- — Mizzou's average of 157.91 yards per game on the ground doesn't pop eyes (it ranks MU 54th nationally as a team), but the production has been building in recent weeks. In the last 5 games, Mizzou is averaging just under 200 yards per game (189.2) on the ground (946 yards, 183 attempts, 8 TDs), and has averaged a very solid 5.17 yards per attempt in that stretch. In its first 6 games, MU averaged 131.8 yards per game on the ground (791 yards, 181 carries, 13 TDs), with a per-carry average of 4.40...

- — Mizzou put together consecutive 200-yard ground games recently, after rushing for 232 against Kansas State, after going for a season-high 260 yards the week before at Texas Tech. The Tigers missed out on a third-straight 200-yard outing as they were held to 134 yards in all at Iowa State, even though they carried the ball a season-high 41 times...

- — It's been a tailback by committee approach, with the bulk of the carries being split by junior De'Vion Moore (83 carries, 447 yards, 6 TDs, 5.4 avg.), true freshman Henry Josey (67-376, 4 TDs, 5.6 avg.), sophomore Kendial Lawrence (57-307, 3 TDs, 5.4 avg. in 10 games), and true freshman Marcus Murphy (18-170, 2 TDs, 9.4 avg. in 10 games). Lawrence missed the McNeese game due to an injury, and Murphy did not play in the opener against Illinois...

- — Those four backs have been very potent, as they've combined to average a solid 6.2 yards per attempt (225 combined carries, 1,300 yards, 15 TDs)...

- — QB Blaine Gabbert has been more involved in the ground game of late, as well, as he's rushed for 234 net yards in the last 5 games, after going for negative 26 (-26) yards net in MU's first 6 games. He had a season-high 89-yard rushing day against Kansas State, which included a 32-yard TD run (his 3rd of the season). Gabbert also had a 74-yard rushing day at Nebraska recently, and he was MU's leading rusher last time out at Iowa State (37 yds.)...

- — Tiger wideouts were also a big factor in the rushing attack recently vs. Kansas State. T.J. Moe ran twice for 32 yards, while Jerrell Jackson and Wes Kemp each carried once for 9 yards apiece, with Jackson's going for a 9-yard TD on a perfectly-executed jet sweep...

- — Mizzou enjoyed great success on the ground recently at Texas Tech, as it rushed for a season-high 260 yards, including 69-yard and 71-yard 1st-quarter TD runs by Murphy and Lawrence, respectively. In its recent win over BCS-#1 Oklahoma, as the Tigers gashed the Sooners for 178 rushing yards, which factored heavily in MU's 36-27 win. De'Vion Moore led the way with 73 yards and 1 TD on 10 carries (7.3 avg.) and Henry Josey added 14 carries for 64 yards (4.6 avg.) in support...

MIZZOU FOOTBALL GAME NOTES

- — Mizzou has 21 rushing TDs through 11 games in 2010, and that already surpasses MU's 13-game total of 15 rushing TDs in all of 2009...
- — The Tigers have 21 rushing TDs in 364 attempts in 2010, good for a TD per 17.33 attempts. In 2009, MU had 15 rushing TDs in 444 attempts, for a ratio of one rushing TD per every 29.6 attempts...

'MOE TOUCHDOWNS, MOE PROBLEMS' FOR TIGER FOES

It was pretty clear to observers during fall training camp that QB Blaine Gabbert was in the process of developing a good chemistry with sophomore WR T.J. Moe. That comfort level has most definitely transferred to the season, as Gabbert has connected with Moe 72 times for 810 yards and 6 TDs.

Moe, who caught all of 2 passes as a true freshman in 2009, currently finds himself as the nation's #12 most prolific pass catcher through 11 games, as his 72 receptions are ranked 12th nationally entering Saturday's game against Kansas. His yardage average of 73.64 also ranks him 40th in the nation.

Moe was held in check last time out at Iowa State, as the cold and windy conditions didn't lend to a prolific offensive night. Moe caught 2 passes for 16 yards, and ran 3 times for 19 yards, as well as being Johnny-on-the-spot when he covered a 4th-quarter fumble on the ISU 6-yardline that came out after a long run by QB Blaine Gabbert. His alert play preserved a possession which ended in a Tiger TD and a 14-0 lead.

Prior to that, Moe had a very impactful day in helping guide the Tigers to a 38-28 win over #24 (BCS) Kansas State. In the game, Moe notched the first multi-TD outing of his career, as he caught TD passes of 25 yards (1st quarter) and 4 yards (4th quarter) from QB Blaine Gabbert. He ended the day with 5 receptions for 36 yards (his lowest yardage total of the season), but he also got involved in the run game, as he carried twice for 32 yards on end around sweeps. Moe has now carried the ball 7 times on the year, for a net of 61 yards (8.7 avg.).

Moe, a prolific and record-setting producer at quarterback in high school, was initially pegged to play safety when he first came to Mizzou. He made his 1st career start in the 2010 opener vs. Illinois, and proceeded to haul in 13 catches for 101 yards and 1 TD. Of course, his legend at Mizzou will be forever cemented in the history books after his 7-catch, 119-yard outing in week #3 against San Diego State, most notably for his 68-yard catch-and-run score with just :51 seconds left that gave Mizzou a dramatic 27-24 win. Moe followed by catching 7 passes for 95 yards against Miami (Ohio), despite not seeing the field much after halftime due to the lopsided score, and had a 7-catch, 85-yard outing against Colorado. He had a very efficient day at Texas A&M, where he notched 110 yards and 1 TD (a 20-yarder in the 3rd-quarter) on just 6 receptions (a season low).

Moe had a 5-catch, 71-yard, 1-TD day at Nebraska, with the score coming on a pretty 23-yard catch-and-run in the 3rd quarter which pulled the Tigers to within 24-14, and he was MU's most effective weapon in a tough offensive night at Texas Tech recently, when he had 7 catches and 62 yards — which was most of MU's passing game that totaled 12 completions for 95 yards.

RESSEL NAMED A GROZA SEMI-FINALIST

In 2009, Mizzou took to the field with the daunting task of having to replace departed PK Jeff Wolfert, who, in his three seasons (2006-08), set the NCAA combined kicking accuracy record, as he made a combined 244-of-257 kicks (59-of-72 FGs, plus 185-of-185 PATs), for a career percentage of 94.9%.

In stepped sophomore Grant Ressel, who won the kicking job in the final week of training camp, and who took the field in the 2009 season opener with exactly zero career kicks under his belt. All Ressel did during his sophomore season was establish himself as the most accurate kicker in the nation, as he made a combined 65-of-66 total kicks (98.5%) — a mark which broke the NCAA single-season record for best combined kick accuracy.

Ressel also led the NCAA in FG percentage among those with 13 or more attempts (96.3%). For the season, Ressel, who joined Mizzou in 2007 as a walk-on (he's now on scholarship), made 26-of-27 FGs, and was perfect on 39-of-39 PATs.

Through 11 games in 2010, Ressel has picked up where he left off, although he did start the year with an uncharacteristic miss against Illinois, when a high snap threw the timing off of his first attempt of the season, and his 37-yarder went just wide. After that, he made 13 consecutive kicks prior to coming up just short three weeks ago at Nebraska on what would have been a career-long 54-yarder in the 2nd quarter. The kick was right down the middle, but fell just underneath the crossbar. Ressel rebounded by making a 23-yarder in the 3rd quarter to pull the Tigers to within 31-17.

For the 2010 season, Ressel is 16-of-18 on FGs and 37-of-39 on PATs, making him 42-of-45 on FGs (93.3%) and 76-of-78 on PATs (97.4%) for his career.

For his efforts, Ressel was recently named one of 20 semi-finalists for the 2010 Lou Groza Award, which goes annually to the nation's top place-kicker.

Ressel recently made 3 pressure-packed kicks against BCS-#1 Oklahoma, to help the Tigers to a 36-27 win.

Against the Sooners, Ressel made three shorter kicks, connecting from 36 yards at the halftime gun to give MU a 17-14 lead, and he followed with a 30-yarder to make it 20-14 midway through the 3rd quarter, and ended with a 23-yarder with 9:44 to play that gave MU a 29-21 lead, which proved to be the game-winning points.

Ressel connected from 33, 27 and 34 against Illinois (the last two which came with the game still in the balance in the 4th quarter), then from 27 and 32 yards against McNeese State, followed by makes from 34 and 38 yards against San Diego State.

Against Miami (Ohio), he had a mixed bag of a day, as he nailed a 50-yard field goal in the 3rd quarter, which represented his first career make of 50 yards or more. That followed a shocking miss on an extra point attempt in the 3rd quarter where he simply pushed the kick right and banged it off the right upright. That miss broke a string of 252 consecutive made extra points by Mizzou (dating back to 2005), which left them just 10 shy of the alltime NCAA record of 262 consecutive PATs made by a school (Syracuse).

He followed that by making a 47-yarder in his only try against Colorado and hit a 21-yarder at Texas A&M right before halftime, and that gave him 12 consecutive games with a made field goal. He did have an extra point blocked at A&M, which was the first blocked PAT against MU since the 2005 season.

He forever etched his name fondly into the hearts of Tiger fans in the 2009 regular-season finale against arch-rival Kansas, when he made four FGs (43, 28, 37, 27 yards), including the game-winning 27-yarder as time expired to give Mizzou a comeback 41-39 win. Ressel's only miss on the year was a 43-yard attempt against Nebraska in terrible downpour conditions, on a play where the snap that was off a bit, which threw off the timing of the kick.

For his efforts, Ressel was named a 1st-Team All-American by Sports Illustrated, becoming MU's first-ever kicker to achieve 1st-Team All-American status.

PUNT GAME GRABBING HOLD WITH GRABNER, RANKS 13TH IN NET PUNTING

Senior P Matt Grabner is making quite an impression in his first year on the field for Mizzou. After initially attending Ole Miss, the Alton, Ill. native transferred to Mizzou and focused on school and playing club soccer. After being convinced by friends that he should take his strong kicking leg and try out for the Tiger football team, Grabner did so prior to the 2009 season, and he was invited to join the team as a preferred walk-on.

After watching the Tigers rank 4th in the NCAA in 2009 as a team in net punting (40.5 avg.) thanks to the outstanding year put together by P Jake Harry IV, Grabner had big shoes to fill in 2010. He's doing just that, and then some. For the season, Grabner has an average of 42.66 yards per kick, which ranks him 5th in the Big 12 Conference, and 38th in the NCAA. The net of his punting has been even more effective, as the Tigers rank 4th in the league, and 13th nationally, in team net punting, with an average of 38.87 yards per punt.

Grabner had a huge impact on MU's 14-0 win at Iowa State last Saturday, but it was just as much for a non-punt as anything. That's because Grabner took off on a fake punt in the 3rd quarter on a 4th-and-2 situation from the Mizzou 28-yardline, and he got free for a 15-yard gain to give MU new life. The Tigers were clinging to a 7-0 lead at the time, and Grabner's play jump-started MU on the way to what ended up in another TD drive to go up, 14-0.

And by the way, Grabner was very influential on the outcome of the game with his punts, too, even though his average of 36.9 wasn't eye-popping. Five of his eight punts ended inside the Cyclone 20-yardline, which played a big role in keeping ISU pinned deep in its own territory for most of the night.

Grabner recently had a very effective night at Texas Tech, where he averaged a career-best 53.9 yards on 8 punts, including a career-long boot of 71 yards. A whopping 5 of his 8 punts at Tech went for 50 yards or more, and 3 of them finished inside the Tech 20-yardline.

In all, 26 of Grabner's 61 punts this season have been downed inside the opponent 20-yardline, including 4 inside the 2-yardline, and he's now got 12 kicks of 50 yards or more.

Grabner punted 6 times at Texas A&M, and he averaged 43.3 yards per kick, including three which ended inside the Aggie 20-yardline, including his first two boots that kept A&M bottled up deep in their own territory early on.

The previous week against Colorado, Grabner punted 4 times, and averaged a solid 43.2 yards per kick, including a 51-yarder, and another sky kick that was downed at the CU 1-yardline, which led to a safety on the very next snap for the Tiger defense.

Grabner was called into action extensively in game #3 against San Diego State, and he delivered in fine fashion, as he averaged 45.4 yards on 8 punts. Three of his punts finished inside the Aztec 20-yardline, including one which was downed at the 1-yardline — marking the third straight game he'd gotten a punt down on the opponent 1-yardline.

Grabner's 3 punts in the 4th quarter when the game was on the line were stellar, as he had kicks of 46 yards, 58 yards (a career-long) and 47 yards. The Aztecs tried to return 4 punts in the game, but could manage only 16 yards in returns.

ST. LOUIS (AP) - Blaine Gabbert rallied Missouri from a 10-point halftime deficit with two touchdown passes and Carl Gettis made a leaping one-handed interception and downed a punt at the 1 in the fourth quarter of a season-opening 23-13 victory over Illinois.

T.J. Moe had 13 receptions for 101 yards and a touchdown, and the Tigers' defense shut out Illinois in the second half. Kenji Jackson also intercepted Nathan Scheelhaase in the fourth quarter to help seal it for Missouri, which finished the neutral-site Arch Rivalry series with six straight victories.

Mikel Leshoure had 112 yards on 20 carries for Illinois, coming off a 3-9 season. Scheelhaase, a redshirt freshman, was 9 for 23 for 81 yards with one touchdown and three interceptions. He also rushed for 76 yards on 16 carries and lost a fumble in his first career start.

Missouri was a sizeable favorite after totaling 129 points the previous three meetings, but the Tigers couldn't get untracked offensively in the first half. Illinois controlled the clock for nearly 18 minutes and scored twice in the final 2:10 to take a 13-3 lead on A.J. Jenkins' 10-yard catch and Derek Dimke's career-best 52-yard field goal to end the half.

Illinois was held to 85 yards and four first downs in the second half.

Gabbert was 34 for 48 for 281 yards, 167 of them coming in the second half.

Gettis leaped high to steal the ball away from Jenkins at the Illinois 45 early in the fourth quarter, halting Illinois' first possession after Michael Egnew's 6-yard catch put the Tigers ahead 17-13.

After Missouri's ensuing drive stalled, Gettis downed Matt Grabner's punt at the 1. That led to a three-and-out for Illinois.

Illinois took advantage of a tough two-play sequence by Mizzou in the first half. A wide open Wes Kemp couldn't haul in a pass at the Illinois 25, a gain that would have been at least 25 yards, and Gabbert was subsequently sacked on the next play for a 14-yard loss to force a punt.

Illinois' last drive ended after Leshoure was ruled out of bounds on a potential first-down catch at the Missouri 46 after officials reviewed the play. Grant Ressel added a 35-yard field goal in the final minute.

Missouri had 98 yards rushing and were led by junior De'Vion Moore, who had 78 yards on 16 carries.

Sophomore DE Aldon Smith led the way defensively for Missouri, with 10 tackles. The 2009 Big 12 Conference Defensive Freshman of the Year also had three tackles for loss and two quarterback sacks, including one which came on third down in Illinois' opening series of the 3rd quarter that appeared to give the Tigers momentum they lacked in the first half.

Gabbert then drove the Tigers 77 yards on 10 plays, and found Moe in the back of the endzone on 3rd-and-goal from the 7-yardline with 9:38 left in the 3rd quarter to cut the deficit to 13-10.

Moe's 13 receptions were just three shy of the MU single-game record of 16, set in 2002 by Justin Gage against Bowling Green.

Mizzou outgained Illinois in the 3rd quarter by a whopping margin of 147-to-10 in total yards.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) -Freshman Henry Josey scored on three of his first four carries and Blaine Gabbert completed his first 15 passes in Missouri's 50-6 rout of McNeese State at Memorial Stadium.

Josey had 112 yards on seven carries, 105 coming in the first half. He was untouched on a 62-yard scoring run, had a 34-yarder for his first carry of the game, and scored twice - both times untouched - from 6 yards for Missouri (2-0).

Josey began the game as the third-string tailback, a position already minus starter Kendial Lawrence, who was unable to play versus McNeese due to a shoulder bruise suffered the previous week against Illinois. Josey, who had one carry for 10 yards in the opener, became Missouri's first freshman to score three touchdowns since quarterback Corby Jones in 1995 against Iowa State.

His 62-yard burst also marked the longest run from scrimmage by a Tiger since the 2006 Sun Bowl, when former standout Tony Temple ran 65 yards for a touchdown against Oregon State.

Gabbert was 15 for 15 for 129 yards before his first incomplection early in the second quarter. He finished 26 for 31 for 220 yards and a touchdown. Gabbert threw a 24-yard scoring pass to Jerrell Jackson on his lone series of the third quarter for a 43-0 lead before being relieved by true freshman James Franklin.

Missouri scored touchdowns on its first four drives and added a safety for a 30-0 cushion with 10:03 left in the half en route to its fifth straight home opening victory. Michael Sam tackled quarterback Jacob Bower for the safety and later blocked a punt in the third quarter to set up one of Grant Ressel's two chip shot field goals.

Even the Tigers' first punt was a success, downed at the 1 in the second quarter. Missouri led 43-0 with 11:54 to go in the third quarter against a school ranked 13th in the FCS, and is 10-0 against teams from the lower division.

Jacob Bower was 11 for 19 for 99 yards and three interceptions for McNeese State (1-1), co-champions of the Southland Conference last year. Wes Briscoe caught a touchdown pass early in the fourth quarter for the Cowboys, who trailed 33-0 at halftime.

The Tigers' T.J. Moe reached double figures in receptions for the second straight game, catching 10 passes for 79 yards. Franklin scored on an 8-yard run late in the third quarter in what was his first collegiate game.

Leading 50-0 at the end of the third quarter, Tiger Coach Gary Pinkel called off the dogs, and instructed his team to be conservative, in hopes of not running up the score against the overmatched foe.

Mizzou's resurgent defense stifled the Cowboy offense most of the night, as 85 of McNeese's 245 total yards of offense came in the fourth quarter against reserves. McNeese was held to just 65 rushing yards on 33 attempts — just 2.0 yards per carry, and when they went to the air, the Tiger defense was up to the challenge, picking off three passes on the evening to raise the two-game season total for interceptions to six. That's only two fewer pass interceptions than Mizzou gained during the entire 2009 season in 13 games.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) — T.J. Moe came to Missouri a year ago as a decorated high school quarterback. A last-minute, 68-yard touchdown catch to lift the Tigers to a 24-20 win over San Diego State entrenched him as a star receiver.

Moe executed a backward stutter step more commonly seen on the Mizzou Arena basketball court that left Aztecs defensive back Brandon Davis on the ground clutching for air. Then Moe turned the short sideline pass from quarterback Blaine Gabbert into a score with just 51 seconds left, thanks to the help of fellow receiver Jerrell Jackson, whose block caused two San Diego State defenders to collide.

Missouri (3-0) had fallen behind by four points after a 32-yard field goal by San Diego State (2-1) with just over two minutes remaining.

Moe was modest about the play that sent Memorial Stadium into a frenzy.

"I just wanted to catch the ball and get out of bounds," Moe said. "The first thing I did was go over and thank Jerrell. Blaine and I gave him a big hug."

The St. Louis-area prep star entered the night with 23 catches in Missouri's first two games, tied for first in the country. But he was overshadowed for most of the game by his teammate, tight end Michael Egniew, who caught 13 passes for 145 yards. Moe finished with seven catches for 119 yards.

Missouri coach Gary Pinkel was more forthright with his praise for Moe, who during his first season in Columbia struggled with the position change and a lingering foot injury from high school.

"He knows he's good now," said a relieved Pinkel.

Moe's electrifying score also helped Missouri overcome an up-and-down night from Gabbert, who was 28-of-51 for 351 yards but threw two interceptions in the final five minutes. Other than his scoring toss to Moe, Gabbert's best play of the night may have been an 11-yard, first-half touchdown scamper in which

he outran three defenders while scrambling to his left to cross into the end zone untouched.

The dramatic win offset a career day by San Diego State freshman Ronnie Hillman, who ran for 228 yards and touchdowns covering 75 and 93 yards. He overshadowed his first-year counterpart Henry Josey, who had 44 yards on 10 carries for a Missouri team that totaled just 89 rushing yards.

Missouri appeared to be in control after Kevin Rutland's goal line interception following a Tiger fumble deep in their own territory preserved a 20-14 lead early in the fourth quarter.

But Memorial Stadium grew quiet after Hillman's full-field burst gave the Aztecs a one-point lead just two minutes later. Hillman's first long TD run with 35 seconds remaining in the first half similarly silenced the home crowd, trimming what had been a 10-point Missouri lead to 17-14.

Mizzou got the win despite turning the ball over three times in the fourth quarter in its own territory. But the Tiger defense — which played very well overall, aside from the two long scoring runs allowed — clamped down in crunch time and allowed only three points total by the Aztecs in their three possessions. One drive, which began at the Tiger 7-yardline after a fumble recovery by SDSU, ended when CB Kevin Rutland intercepted a pass at the goal line. The second resulted in a 25-yard field goal that made it 24-20 SDSU with 2:03 to play. The last one was a 3-and-out on a series that began at the MU 37-yardline and which forced a punt.

That last punt set up Moe for his heroics. His winning touchdown with under a minute to play marked the first time Mizzou had won a game with a touchdown in the final minute of play when trailing since 1976 at Ohio State.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP)- Carl Gettis returned a fumble 19 yards for a score on the first play of the game and was among seven Missouri players getting a touchdown apiece in a 51-13 rout of visiting Miami (Ohio).

Missouri (4-0) scored on runs of 39 yards by Kendial Lawrence and 28 yards by Henry Josey while going ahead 21-0 in the first quarter. Blaine Gabbert threw a touchdown pass and scored on a 1-yard sneak for the Tigers, who ended suspense immediately a week after getting a last-minute touchdown to beat San Diego State.

Missouri finished its pre-Big 12 schedule unbeaten for the fifth straight year after polishing off Miami of Ohio (2-2) and will get a week off before opening conference play Oct. 9 at home against Colorado. The Tigers have won 21 straight non-conference games in the regular season since 2005 and won easily without top pass rusher Aldon Smith, out with a broken bone in his right leg.

The Tigers were without four starters in all for the game, as Smith was joined on the sideline by starting LB Luke Lambert (hamstring), FS Jasper Simmons (knee) and WR Jerrell Jackson (thigh).

The lone blemish was a missed extra point kick by Grant Ressel early in the third quarter, ending the school's string of 252 in a row since 2005 by three kickers. Ressel hit the right goalpost after Wes Kemp's 33-yard scoring reception for a 34-3 lead, but recovered quickly and hit a career-long 50-yard field later in the quarter.

Armand Robinson had 10 receptions for 99 yards for Miami of Ohio, which had three turnovers in the first half and had five fumbles, losing two of them. All three turnovers led to Missouri touchdowns, starting with Gettis' tightrope walk down the left sideline after Andrew Gachkar forced a fumble on a reception by

Thomas Merriweather on the first play of the game.

Records have not been kept related to the quickest score in school history, but Mizzou officials believe the touchdown is possibly the quickest touchdown ever scored at MU.

Trevor Cook had two field goals for the RedHawks, including a career-long 40-yarder in the third quarter. The lone touchdown came on a 12-yard reception by Jamal Rodgers with 1:40 to go.

Missouri had five carries of 10 yards or better in the first quarter, two each by Josey and Lawrence. Michael Sam's interception gave the school eight overall, matching last season's total. T.J. Moe had seven catches for 95 yards

Missouri had 236 yards rushing with an average gain of 6.2 yards per carry, including 63 on six carries by Lawrence, 54 yards on eight carries by Josey, 48 yards on four carries by backup Marcus Murphy and 39 yards on three attempts by De'Vion Moore.

COLUMBIA, Mo. – Blaine Gabbert played with a hip pointer as long as he could, finally coming out at the start of the fourth quarter.

No. 24 Missouri did more than enough long before losing their quarterback, capitalizing on several big plays on special teams and a defense that had four sacks without their top pass rusher in a 26-0 victory over Colorado in a Big 12 opener. It also was the final conference meeting before the Buffaloes join the Pac-10 next year.

Gabbert was 17 for 29 for 191 yards and two touchdown passes, but was only 2 for 6 for 10 yards in the third quarter. Coach Gary Pinkel said Gabbert was hurt when hit on both sides at the start of the third quarter, and wasn't ready to project Gabbert's availability for next week at Texas A&M.

"He could hardly breath. He's a tough guy, tough, tough guy," coach Gary Pinkel said.

The Tigers (5-0, 1-0 Big 12) had four sacks and an interception in their fifth straight victory over Colorado (3-2, 0-1) by a total score of 203-40. Linebacker Zaviar Gooden had a sack among his two tackles for loss and deflected a pass to lead the charge.

This one came just a few days after the 20th anniversary of the infamous Fifth Down game in 1990, which helped the Buffaloes win their only national championship.

Missouri found the going tough most of the game offensively other than a 97-yard, 15-play drive capped by Gabbert's 10-yard touchdown pass to Michael Egnew near the end of the half. Those woes were masked by a blocked field goal, blocked punt, fake punt and safety in the school's first shutout since blanking the Buffaloes 58-0 Oct. 25, 2008 at home.

Punter Trey Barrow's 26-yard run on a fake was enough to lead Missouri until backup quarterback James Franklin passed him in the fourth quarter, finishing with 37 yards on four carries and throwing a 10-yard touchdown pass to Egnew.

Missouri was held to a season-low 116 yards rushing overall with tailbacks De'Vion Moore, Marcus Murphy, Henry Josey and Kendial Lawrence totaling 51 yards on 18 carries.

Rodney Stewart had 91 yards on 18 carries for Colorado, but quarterback Tyler Hansen was yanked near the end of the third quarter. The Buffaloes advanced to the Missouri 18 with backup Cody Hawkins before running out of downs near the end of the game.

Penalties helped to doom two fourth down chances in Missouri territory for Colorado, which has been outscored 78-7 in two road games this season.

Colorado trailed 19-0 at the half, and was outscored 86-3 the first half the last three years in the series.

Barrow and Matt Grabner had punts downed at the 2 and 1 in the first half. Eric Waters partially deflected a punt in the first half and pressure by Luke Lambert on the pass rush forced Hansen's intentional grounding call for the safety. Terrell Resonno blocked a 39-yard field goal attempt in the second quarter.

COLLEGE STATION, Texas (AP) – Blaine Gabbert moved Missouri’s offense with ease and the Tigers’ defense left Jerrod Johnson and Texas A&M’s high-powered offense stunned. It was the perfect combination to keep No. 21 Missouri undefeated with a 30-9 win over the Aggies.

Gabbert threw for 361 yards and three touchdowns, connecting with Wes Kemp for touchdowns in the first and third quarters to help the Tigers (6-0, 2-0 Big 12) improve to 6-0 for the fifth time in school history.

“I don’t know how many superstars we have, but we have a lot of good players, I guarantee you that,” Missouri coach Gary Pinkel said. “When we play well as a football team we’re pretty good.”

Missouri’s defense held quarterback Johnson and Texas A&M’s spread offense in check for most of the game, harassing him into a 7 for 21 first half and sacking him seven times overall.

Texas A&M (3-3, 0-2) finally got going in the fourth quarter, with Johnson throwing a 26-yard touchdown pass to Jeff Fuller, but it was much too late to avoid a third straight loss. It was the fewest points the Aggies scored this season.

Gabbert’s third touchdown pass was a 20-yard strike to T.J. Moe that made it 30-3 in the third quarter. Moe finished with six receptions for 110 yards.

The Tigers got the ball in the second half after Johnson was sacked three times on Texas A&M’s first possession after halftime. Gabbert hit Kemp for his second touchdown on a 10-yard pass that pushed Missouri’s lead to 23-0.

Gabbert suffered a hip pointer in the fourth quarter of last week’s game and spent the week trying to get healthy.

“I worked hard all week to get my body back to what it should be,” he said. “It’s mind over matter. When you’re focused on a specific goal nothing else matters. We were focused on the ‘W’ and we got that.”

Texas A&M had first-and-goal from the 10 after that, but the offense stalled

again and the Aggies kicked a 24-yard field goal to make it 23-3. That score ended a streak of six straight shutout quarters for Missouri’s defense after a 26-0 win over Colorado last week.

It was the first time since 1967 that Missouri had held conference opponents scoreless for six straight quarters.

Johnson finished 27 of 48 for 322 yards, but was just 15 of 31 for 141 yards entering the fourth quarter.

Texas A&M didn’t turn the ball over this week after losing the ball nine times in the last two games to up its season total to 18, but the offense sputtered anyway.

The Aggies punted on their first six possessions as Johnson struggled through tough first half. Texas A&M finally got a drive going on its last possession of the first half. But it stalled at the Missouri 43 after three straight incompletions from Johnson, including one on fourth down where he badly overthrew his receiver.

That gave Missouri the ball back with about 1 1/2 minutes before halftime. The Tigers marched down the field and looked to have scored on a reception by Kemp, but the TD was taken away after a review giving them the ball at the 1. Texas A&M’s defense held and Missouri settled for a 21-yard field goal and a 16-0 halftime lead.

Pinkel likes the focus of his team and is impressed by its development.

“We are a lot better football team now than we were three weeks ago, and we’re getting better,” he said. “Hopefully we continue to do that.”

Kendal Lawrence pushed Missouri’s lead to 13-0 when he scored from two yards out early in the second quarter. That score was set up by a 24-yard reception by Kemp.

Gabbert found Kemp on a 5-yard touchdown reception in the first quarter, but the extra point attempt was blocked so the Tigers led 6-0. It was the first time Missouri had an extra point attempt blocked since 2005.

COLUMBIA, Mo. - Missouri made a statement that it has intentions of being a player in the national title race, and did it with flair as it posted a 36-27 upset of the Oklahoma Sooners, the #1 team in the BCS standings. The Sooners' hold on the top spot in the BCS will end, thanks to a ferocious effort on both sides of the ball by Mizzou, as well as on special teams.

Jerrell Jackson spun free from a knot of tacklers on a 38-yard reception for the go-ahead score that sparked a 16-point fourth quarter over the third-ranked Sooners and put a sellout crowd of 70,004 in a celebratory mood.

Mizzou's improved defense forced Oklahoma (6-1, 2-1 Big 12) into three turnovers, out of character considering OU had only five giveaways the first six games. Two of the turnovers led to 10 points and the other squelched a drive deep in Missouri territory.

An 86-yard touchdown return Gahn McGaffie on the opening kickoff put the Tigers (7-0, 3-0) on their way to ending a seven-game losing streak in a lopsided series dating to 1998. They beat the Sooners for only the second time in the last 21 meetings.

Missouri is 7-0 for the first time since 1960 when the school ended 11-0 and finished No. 5 after beating Navy in the Orange Bowl. This one was especially satisfying, coming against a school that beaten them the last three meetings, including ending the Tigers' one-week stay at No. 1 with a 38-17 victory in the 2007 Big 12 championship game and hammering them again 62-21 in the 2008 conference title game.

Jackson had nine catches for 139 yards, both season bests. He totaled 18 catches the first six games, playing the pre-conference schedule wearing a cast from a broken left wrist.

Landry Jones threw three touchdown passes but was intercepted twice for

Oklahoma. Aldon Smith returned one 58 yards to set up a touchdown in the first quarter and Zaviar Gooden's pick in the fourth quarter led to a field goal.

Jackson's touchdown gave Missouri a 26-21 lead with 12:43 to go. Gabbert was lined up as a wide receiver on backup James Franklin's 3-yard scoring run with 6:36 left.

Trey Millard's 3-yard run cut the gap to nine for Oklahoma only 30 seconds later after Mossis Madu's 77-yard kickoff return, but the conversion pass fell incomplete and a subsequent onside kick failed when a Sooners player touched the ball before it went 10 yards.

The Oklahoma giveaways helped Missouri take a 17-14 lead, the first time the Sooners trailed at the end of a quarter all season. Grant Ressel kicked a 36-yard field goal on the final play of the half after the Tigers called timeout with one second to go after a short gain.

Missouri twice led by a touchdown earlier in the game, opening with a bang on McGaffie's kickoff return TD and capitalizing on Smith's 58-yard interception return that led to De'Vion Moore's 1-yard run early in the second quarter.

James Winchester recovered Carl Gettis' fumble on a punt, giving Oklahoma a second chance after going 3-and-out on its opening possession. Kenny Stills was wide open on a 27-yard touchdown pass to cap a four-play, 45-yard drive.

DeMarco Murray, who broke Steve Owens' 41-year-old school career touchdown record last week, got his 59th on a 4-yard swing pass to cap a 14-play, 89-yard drive that tied it at 14 late in the second.

With OU leading 21-20 at the start of the 4th quarter, MU asserted control and outgained the Sooners by a 192-to-16 margin in total offense. Mizzou's defense held OU to 0-of-7 passing in the quarter, with the one interception, and the Tigers possessed the ball for 13:15 to just 1:45 for Oklahoma in the period.

LINCOLN, Neb. (AP) - Roy Helu Jr. rushed for a school-record 307 yards, and No. 14 Nebraska knocked No. 7 Missouri from the ranks of the unbeaten with a 31-17 victory.

The Cornhuskers (7-1, 3-1 Big 12) held off Missouri after building a 24-0 lead and moved into a first-place tie with the Tigers in the Big 12 North. Nebraska, which ended a 13-game losing streak against Top 10 teams, earned the inside track to the division title by winning the head-to-head meeting.

Missouri fell to 7-1 overall and 3-1 in Big 12 play, thanks to the big hole dug in the first quarter. The Tiger offense went three-and-out in each of its first two possessions and managed only 30 yards total in its first four series, punting all four times.

Helu ran for touchdowns of 66 and 73 yards in the 1st quarter, and added a back-breaking 53-yarder in the 3rd after the Tigers had fought back to within 10 points. The Cornhuskers played without quarterback Taylor Martinez in the second half after he came up hobbling following a hit from Kenji Jackson on a run late in the second quarter. Zac Lee took over to start the third quarter.

Helu was sensational carrying the offensive load whether Martinez was in or out of the game. He totaled 228 yards after his first 10 carries on his way to breaking the Nebraska record of 294 yards set by Calvin Jones against Kansas in 1991.

Nebraska put heavy pressure on Blaine Gabbert and held him to 18-of-42 passing for 199 yards. He was sacked six times.

Helu's third touchdown eased some anxiety that crept into Memorial Stadium after Missouri pulled to 24-14 in the middle of the third quarter.

Helu took a handoff from Lee and sliced through a wide gap in the middle of the line to start his 53-yard TD, which was his sixth scoring run of longer than 50 yards this season and extended Nebraska's lead to 31-14.

Nebraska made a goal-line stand after the Tigers drove from their 20 to inside the 1. Gabbert couldn't get enough push on a quarterback sneak, Henry Josey was

stopped short and Gabbert couldn't get in when he tried to run around left end.

Josey was called for a false start after he flinched on fourth down, forcing Grant Ressel to kick a 23-yard field goal that made it 31-17.

The Tigers' comeback was hindered after they burned their last timeout of the second half less than 10 minutes into the third quarter. They punted on fourth-and-10 from their 44 with 8:40 left, and Nebraska ran out the clock, handing off mostly to Helu.

The Tigers, trying for their first back-to-back wins in Lincoln since 1976-78, found themselves playing from behind right away after Helu busted through a wide opening in the left side of the line and ran 66 yards untouched on Nebraska's first play from scrimmage.

Alex Henery kicked his school-record 18th field goal in a row, from 41 yards, and Martinez threw a 40-yard TD to Kyler Reed before Helu went untouched again, this time 73 yards for a 24-0 lead late in the first quarter.

Missouri, which rushed for 178 yards while knocking off Oklahoma last week, was held 142 by the Huskers. Gabbert ended up carrying a career-high 22 times for 74 yards. The Tigers' opening four possessions ended with punts - they went three-and-out on three of them - and Gabbert threw his first interception in four games to end their fifth series.

De'Vion Moore took a pitch 33 yards to cut Nebraska's lead to 24-7 early in the second quarter, and the Tigers' defense began to slow down Martinez and the Huskers after they amassed 256 yards in the first 15 minutes.

Missouri failed to convert its first 10 third downs before Gabbert scrambled for 25 yards to keep alive a 12-play, 78-yard touchdown drive that he ended with his 23-yard pass to T.J. Moe midway through the third quarter.

Nebraska and Missouri have played 89 straight years and 104 times overall since 1892. The series goes on hiatus with Nebraska joining the Big Ten next year.

LUBBOCK, TEXAS - Mizzou raced out to a 17-3 lead in the second quarter, thanks to a pair of long touchdown runs, but Texas Tech switched quarterbacks and rallied for a 24-17 win on the Red Raiders' Homecoming game. The loss was MU's second straight after surging to #6 in the BCS standings after getting out to the school's first 7-0 start since 1960.

Things looked good for Mizzou early — real good. On just the third play of the game, true freshman Marcus Murphy took an option pitch to the right and raced 69 yards for a touchdown and a 7-0 lead barely a minute into the game. That marked the longest play from scrimmage for the Tigers in 2010, but it lasted as the standard for exactly 5:21 of clock time, as on MU's third series, sophomore TB Kendial Lawrence scooted around left end for a 71-yard TD run to make it 14-0 with 8:36 left in the first quarter.

After Tech managed a field goal to pull to within 14-3, the Tigers drove from their own 7-yardline into the Texas Tech red zone. But the drive stalled out on the 9-yardline, and MU had to settle for a 27-yard field goal from Grant Ressel and a 17-3 lead. That red zone hold for Tech seemed to light a fire under the Red Raiders, but it was more likely due to the insertion of QB Taylor Potts into the lineup. Potts had been Tech's normal starter during the year, but he was benched in favor of Steven Sheffield for the game. Sheffield, however, was mostly ineffective, as he led only one scoring drive in seven series before he gave way to Potts.

Potts promptly led a 16-play, 82-yard drive that saw the Red Raiders convert on three 3rd downs and one 4th down along the way, and the QB closed it out with a 5-yard TD pass to Detron Lewis with just :15 seconds left in the half to cut the MU lead to 17-10.

Tech received the second half kick and took control of the momentum by

marching 70 yards in only 6 plays to tie it up at 17-apiece and get the Homecoming crowd back into the game. That marked the first time in 2010 that an opponent had scored against MU's defense on its opening possession of the third quarter.

Mizzou's offense went cold unfortunately, and a three-and-out series for MU gave the ball back to Potts, and he came up with his third straight TD drive (this one covering 92 yards) to give Tech a 24-17 lead with 6:46 left in the 3rd quarter.

The Tiger defense recovered from the onslaught to shut out the potent Red Raider attack the rest of the way, and even got an interception near the MU goal line late in the 3rd quarter to snuff out a potential Tech TD, but the offense never could regain its early rhythm, as it was shut out in the second half for the first time all season. Four of MU's six second-half possessions went three-and-out as the Tigers faced poor field position most of the half.

Mizzou did get one last prime chance to forge a tie when the defense held one more time, and the offense took over on the Tech 48-yardline following a punt with 7:19 left in the game. Gabbert hit T.J. Moe on consecutive passes that gave MU a 1st down at the Tech 36-yardline, but two straight potential TD passes into the Tech endzone on 3rd and 4th down from the 33-yardline went off the hands of Tiger receivers Wes Kemp and Jerrell Jackson to end the threat. Tech took over and killed the clock by getting two first downs to end the game.

Mizzou was done in offensively by an inability to convert in 3rd down situations, as the Tigers were just 1-of-12 on 3rd downs, in addition to going 0-of-2 on 4th down tries, while the Red Raiders converted on 10-of-23 3rd downs.

COLUMBIA, Mo. (AP) - Blaine Gabbert accounted for three touchdown in a strong bounce-back effort and No. 17 Missouri [BCS] made just as many big plays on defense in a 38-28 victory over Kansas State in its home finale.

The Tigers (8-2, 4-2 Big 12) capitalized on three fumble recoveries, two of them huge swing plays, and scored 17 straight points to put away the Wildcats (6-3, 3-4). After leading 21-14 at halftime in a back-and-forth affair, the Tigers broke it open with the 17 unanswered points, to take a commanding 38-14 lead. Kansas State had a pair of touchdown drives in mop-up time well after the outcome had been decided.

Missouri finished 6-0 at home, beat Kansas State for the fifth straight time and won for the sixth straight time in the Tigers' home finale, recovering from consecutive losses to Nebraska and Texas Tech that derailed a 7-0 start.

Kansas State had four turnovers, one of them wasting an opportunity to tie it in the final minute of the half when quarterback Carson Coffman fumbled the center snap at the Missouri 1. Jacquies Smith's fumble recovery preserved Missouri's 21-14 lead and the defensive end later scored on a 53-yard fumble return in the third quarter after Aldon Smith leveled Coffman with a sack.

Smith now has three career touchdowns, after scoring last year on an interception return and a touchdown reception on a fake field goal.

T.J. Moe caught two touchdown passes from Gabbert, who was 17

of 25 for 208 yards with an interception while running for a season-best 89 yards on 14 carries. The junior completed only 42 percent of his passes with one touchdown the previous two games.

Gabbert opened with seven straight completions, including a 25-yard scoring pass to Moe.

Coffman started for Kansas State, but the Wildcats had a lot more success with backup Collin Klein, who had 141 yards rushing on 18 carries.

Klein's running set up two short touchdown runs by Daniel Thomas in the first half.

Missouri led 38-14 before Kansas State scored a pair of late touchdowns on Klein's 35-yard pass to Adrian Hilburn and Coffman's 26-yard throw to Aubrey Quarles.

Gabbert had a big first half, going 11 of 13 for 98 yards and a touchdown and rushing for 70 yards on seven carries, including a 32-yard score.

Wide receiver Wes Kemp had a big peelback block on Gabbert's scoring scramble, leveling Terrance Sweeney. Kemp was among three wide receivers who got carries in the first half, and Jerrell Jackson's 9-yard run made it 21-14 with 4:12 to go in the half.

Thomas, who had 66 yards on 12 carries, scored two touchdowns for the second straight game, but he was held well below his season average of 122 yards per game coming in.

AMES, Iowa (AP) – Blaine Gabbert threw a touchdown pass and No. 15 Missouri turned a fake punt into another score in a 14-0 victory over Iowa State.

On a chilly night in the heartland, Missouri (9-2, 5-2 Big 12) wasn't clicking offensively for most of the game. But the Tigers' defense remained stout and they made just enough plays with the ball to deny Iowa State (5-7, 3-5) the victory it needed for bowl eligibility.

Gabbert threw an 11-yard touchdown pass to Michael Egnew in the first quarter and De'Vion Moore scored from the 1 in the second half after punter Matt Grabner kept the drive alive with a 15-yard run on fourth-and-2 at his own 28.

Missouri won its second straight after a two-game losing streak spoiled a 7-0 start. This is just the sixth time Missouri has won nine games in a season.

With the regular-season finale against Kansas and a bowl game still to go, the Tigers could reach 10 wins for the fourth time.

Iowa State, which broke out special gold jerseys for the game, had to go with sophomore Jerome Tiller at quarterback in place of injured starter Austen Arnaud. Tiller, making his third career start, gave the Cyclones a spark at times with his running, but he completed only 13 of 31 passes for 155 yards and lost a fumble at the Missouri 30 when the Cyclones were driving to cut into MU's lead in the 4th quarter.

Arnaud, a three-year starter, had his college career end when he tore ligaments in his left knee in a 34-14 loss at Colorado a week ago. He was introduced with the other seniors before kickoff and encouraged Tiller and offered him advice on the sideline during the game.

Gabbert finished 16 of 26 for 172 yards with no interceptions, while Egnew caught seven passes for 77 yards. But the Tigers' offense overall never generated much rhythm and stalled repeatedly.

Iowa State just couldn't do enough with Tiller to capitalize. The Cyclones needed one victory in their last three games to become eligible for a second straight bowl appearance, but they lost all three and wound up with their fourth losing season in five years.

Clinging to a 7-0 lead late in the third quarter, Missouri lined up in punt formation at its own 28 after falling 2 yards short of a first down. But Iowa State left the middle of the field open and Grabner sprinted straight ahead to a first down at his own 43.

Gabbert hit Egnew, his tight end, for gains of 11 and 16 yards and ran 15 yards on a quarterback draw. The Tigers got a scare when Gabbert fumbled as he was hit, but teammate T.J. Moe recovered at the ISU 6 and Moore scored two plays later.

Missouri managed to put together an 80-yard scoring drive during what was otherwise a quiet first half.

Gabbert completed passes of 26 yards to Rolandis Woodland and 24 yards to Egnew before a roughing the passer penalty gave the Tigers a first down at the Iowa State 11. On the next play, Gabbert lofted a pass toward the far right corner of the end zone, where the 6-foot-6 Egnew made a leaping catch.

Tiller moved the Cyclones at times—they ran six more plays than Missouri in the first half—but he couldn't finish the drives.

Iowa State's best chance to score in the opening half came when Alexander Robinson's 18-yard run gave the Cyclones a first down at the Missouri 23. But the next three plays netted only 3 yards and Grant Mahoney's 38-yard field goal attempt hooked wide left.

Mahoney also missed a 27-yard attempt in the third quarter and finished the season 8 for 17, missing seven of his last eight kicks.
