Huskers End Regular Season with Mid-Week Bout

Following a two-game road test over the weekend, the Husker soccer team (9-6-3, 4-5-1) returns to the Nebraska Soccer Field on Wednesday, Oct. 25 to host Loyola-Chicago (11-5-3, 5-1-1) at 4 p.m. to end the regular season.

It is the final home game for Nebraska this season and the third game in five days for the Huskers, who split a pair of games over the weekend in Oklahoma. NU dropped its first contest of the trip, 2-0, against No. 10 Oklahoma State before snapping a three-game losing streak with a 1-0 shutout of Oklahoma on Sunday in Norman.

A penalty kick in the 18th minute put Oklahoma State in the driver's seat in Friday's match, despite the Huskers outshooting the Cowgirls, 15-11. Sophomore Selenia Iacchelli led the NU offensive effort with two of Nebraska's three shots on goal, while senior Brittany Timko fired four shots, but failed to find the net. OSU scored its final goal of the evening in the 71st minute to blank Nebraska, 2-0.

After three games without a win, the Huskers changed the tide against the Sooners on Sunday with a 1-0 shutout victory. Sophomore Aysha Jamani was busy on the offensive end for Nebraska, putting two of five shots on goal and notching an assist on NU's game-winning goal. Jamani fed the ball to Iacchelli in the 32nd minute to put the Huskers in the lead, giving Iacchelli the first game-winning goal of her career. Jamani's assist was her career-high fifth of the season.

The two-game split gave the Huskers a record of 4-5-1 to end the Big 12 season. With a record of 11-5-3, the Ramblers should present a stern test for Nebraska. The Ramblers have lost just one game in their last nine contests and enter the game on a three-game unbeaten streak, scoring eight goals in those games alone. This caliber of play will be a good barometer for the Huskers to face in a non-conference opponent before heading to the Big 12 Tournament next week.

Scouting Loyola-Chicago (11-5-3, 5-1-1 Horizon League)

Loyola-Chicago presents perhaps one of the most challenging non-conference contests for the Huskers this season. The Ramblers have built an impressive record this season that includes just one loss in the Horizon League. Loyola-Chicago finished the 2006 season ranked second in the Horizon League.

The Ramblers have been competitive in every game this season, with three of their five losses coming in overtime minutes and all five setbacks by a single goal. Loyola-Chicago has faced one other Big 12 opponent this season in Missouri, which dealt the Ramblers a 3-2 loss in 90 minutes.

A well-rounded team, Loyola-Chicago averages 1.59 goals per game while holding opponents to 0.89. The Ramblers' 32 goals on the season are spread across five key players who have three goals or more, led by freshman Cynthia Morote-Ariza who has nine goals and six assists. Defensively, Loyola-Chicago has allowed just 18 goals, due in large part to an outstanding effort by senior goalkeeper Emily Peick, who has 83 saves and seven shutouts on the year for a 0.83 goals-against average.

Husker History vs. Loyola-Chicago

The Huskers are 2-0-0 all-time against the Ramblers with both games taking place in Lincoln. Nebraska first faced Loyola-Chicago in 1995, which ended in a 4-2 NU win. The two programs faced off again in 1998, with the Huskers emerging with a dominant 11-0 shutout. The win is tied for Nebraska's largest margin of victory in program history.

Jamani Sets Assists Mark

Sophomore Aysha Jamani recorded the game-winning assist in the Huskers' 1-0 win at Oklahoma last Sunday on a goal by sophomore Selenia Iacchelli. The assist was Jamani's career-best fifth of the season, eclipsing her total of four assists from 2005. Jamani ranks second on the team with five assists, while also ranking second with 11 points.

Iacchelli Scores Game-Winner

Sophomore Selenia Iacchelli scored the first game-winning goal of her career to lift Nebraska past Oklahoma, 1-0, in the Huskers' final Big 12 Conference regular-season game on Sunday. Iacchelli's goal came on her only shot of the game and marked her second goal of the season. Iacchelli has now scored six goals in her career, but Sunday's goal is her lone game-winning goal.

Klages Moves Up Charts

Sophomore goalkeeper Jamie Klages recorded six saves over the weekend to move into fourth place on the NU career saves chart. Klages has 147 saves in her career, passing Rebecca Hornbacher, who registered 141 saves for the Huskers from 1996 to 1997.

Stat of the Week

Nebraska was able to hold on to a 1-0 halftime lead at Oklahoma on Sunday, improving the Huskers to a perfect 4-0 this season when leading at the half.

Reigning Big 12 Player of the Year at it Again

Two-time Big 12 Player of the Year Brittany Timko is up to her old antics once again. After leading the Big 12 in assists in 2005 en route to her second consecutive player of the year award, Timko has come out in her senior season and is leading the conference not only in assists, but also in points. Timko's seven assists are tied for first with Oklahoma State's Niccole Grimaldi and Yolanda Odenyo, while her 29 points lead the league over Texas' Kelsey Carpenter (26) and Colorado's Nikki Marshall (26). Timko is also tied for second in goals (11) with Carpenter.

Should Timko regain her lead in goals and maintain it in the other categories, she would become the only player in the history of the Big 12 to lead the conference in points, goals and assists in a season.

Even if Timko is able to lead the Big 12 solely in points, she would become the fifth Husker to do so and the first since Christine Latham in 2001.

Timko also leads the Big 12 in points per game (1.71), while ranking second in goals per game (0.65).

Huskers Score Fastest Overtime Goal

Sophomore Aysha Jamani ripped a shot into the back of the net just 51 seconds into the first overtime period on Oct. 6 to lift the Huskers to a 2-1 victory over Baylor. Jamani's goal marked the fastest overtime goal in school history, eclipsing the previous record of 55 seconds by Christine Latham against Texas on Nov. 8, 2002.

Timko Leads Huskers

Senior Brittany Timko leads the team with 11 goals and seven assists. Timko owns a seven-goal lead over junior Jessie Bruch and a three-assist lead over sophomore Aysha Jamani for the team highs in those categories. Timko appears poised to lead the team in both goals and assists for a third straight season.

Timko led NU with 15 goals and 13 assists in her first full season at Nebraska in 2004 and again led the team with 11 goals and a Big-12 record 21 assists last year. Before Timko arrived in Lincoln, no player in school history had ever led the team in both goals and assists in the same season.

Timko has also led the team in points the previous two seasons and again leads the team with 29 points this year. She has 18 more points than Jamani. Timko appears headed to join fellow Canadian All-American Christine Latham as the only Huskers in school history to lead NU in points in three consecutive seasons.

Corner Kickin'

Nebraska, which has historically enjoyed a tremendous advantage in corner kicks, is out-cornering teams by an impressive margin.

In 18 games, the Huskers have earned 134 corner kicks to just 67 by their opponents, a testament to the endline work by both the NU offense and defense. Nebraska is especially potent in the first half, taking 71 corners in the opening 45 minutes, while that number drops to just 53 in the second period.

On Sept. 15 alone, Nebraska took a season-best 16 corners, which set a Nebraska Soccer Field record. The previous record of 15 was set against UAB on Aug. 28, 2005.

Nebraska is second in the Big 12 Conference in corners (134) behind Texas A&M (141).

Starting Fast

NU also enjoys a 155-83 advantage in shots in the opening period, while that margin shrinks to a 134-122 NU advantage in the second half.

While explosive first-half play continues to be a calling card for the Huskers, much of Nebraska's recent success has come as a direct result of second-half persistence. Against Baylor and Texas Tech, the Huskers scored three of their four goals in the second period, while enjoying a 29-12 margin in shots.

Timko Reaches 40/40

Senior Brittany Timko produced three goals and one assist Oct 6-8. With her performance, Timko increased her career totals to 41 goals and 41 assists.

Timko joined Meghan Anderson (48 goals, 50 assists) as the only players in school history to record both 40 goals and 40 assists in a career. Timko also joined Anderson as the only players in the 11-year history of the Big 12 Conference to join the 40/40 club, as well as becoming just the 35th player in NCAA history and only the third player to play her entire career in the 21st century to reach the marks.

Timko Plays a Major Hand in Husker Offense

Since her sophomore season at NU in 2004, senior Brittany Timko has been a catalyst for the Husker offense. Anyone who watches Nebraska play can see Timko's impact, while the statistics back up her pivotal role in the Huskers' goal-scoring ability.

The statistics of goals and assists measure a player's contribution to a team's scoring.

But, by looking at these two statistics in tandem and comparing them against the total number of goals in a season, one can calculate how often a player was involved in a team goal. The formula for this percentage is as follows:

$$\frac{\text{Goals + Assists}}{\text{Team's Total Goals}} = \text{Percentage of goals involving that player}$$

From the start of the 2004 season to the present, Nebraska has scored 116 goals in games in which Timko has played. In those games, she either found the back of the net herself or assisted on 78 of those goals (68 percent). Statistically speaking, Timko has had a hand in slightly better than two out of every three Husker goals scored in the past three years.

Through Timko's 17 games in 2006, she has garnered 11 goals and seven assists, involving her in 18 of Nebraska's 28 goals (67 percent).

Timko Joins Husker Elite at 100-Point Mark

Senior Brittany Timko recorded six points in Nebraska's 3-2 win over North Texas on Sept. 8 to reach a total of 103 points in her career with the Huskers. Timko is now one of just six players in NU history to ever reach 100 points or more.

The Coquitlam, British Columbia, native earned her six points on three goals against the Mean Green, earning her fourth career hat trick. She is now one hat trick away from tying Kim Engesser for the school record of five.

Injury Update

Nebraska has made it through the first seven weeks of play relatively healthy after an unfortunate preseason that included four season-ending injuries.

Sophomore Lauren Isenhower was listed as a redshirt before the Huskers even reached training camp due to a knee injury she suffered while competing with Nebraska in Europe this past summer. Junior Meghan Hungerford also suffered a season-ending injury before the season began as she fractured her ankle during summer camps.

Then came the loss of senior defender Abby Penas, who was expected to be a major contributor for the NU defense in her final season at Nebraska. However, Penas suffered a knee injury in the Huskers' exhibition match with Louisville on Aug. 19, and is out for the rest of the season.

Freshman Jackie Walsh will likely apply for a medical hardship after undergoing foot surgery.

Two players who began the season injured have now recovered and seen game time. Redshirt freshman Shannon Dickerson sat out the first week of the season with a leg injury before returning for Nebraska's 2-2 double overtime tie with Wisconsin Sept. 1.

Since then, sophomore Ali Lokanc has also returned to the lineup after rehabilitating

a broken leg she suffered early in 2005. Lokanc saw her first game action late in the first half against North Texas on Sept. 8 and has since saw consistent game time for the Huskers.

While the Huskers have enjoyed a relatively injury-free season, a few minor injuries popped up following the opening weekend of Big 12 play.

Junior Jessie Bruch suffered a slight knee injury against Missouri on Sept. 22, sidelining her for three league games. However, Bruch returned in Nebraska's 2-1 overtime win over Baylor last Friday to record three shots, including one on goal. However, Bruch was back on the injured list for Nebraska's 0-2 loss to Texas A&M on Oct. 13 and her return to the pitch is still undecided.

Sophomore Jessie Goodell also experienced a knee injury in Nebraska's loss to Iowa State on Sept. 24. Goodell did not play against Colorado or Kansas, but returned in Nebraska's win over Baylor.

Timko Lands on Watch List

Nebraska senior Brittany Timko earned her second nomination to the Hermann Watch List this season as announced by the National Soccer Coaches Association of America. Timko is one of 25 nominees compiled by a panel of coaches from the NSCAA.

The Missouri Athletic Club's Hermann Trophy honors the top male and female Division I college soccer players in the United States. The award represents the highest level of individual achievement in the sport. Over the years, the award has honored some of the biggest names in U.S. soccer. Kristine Lilly, Mia Hamm, Shannon MacMillan, Claudio Reyna, Alexi Lalas and Tony Meola are just a few of the players who won the award prior to achieving success on the international stage.

An NSCAA All-American, Timko earned her first nomination as a junior in 2005 and went on to finish among 15 semifinalists for the award. A list of this year's 15 Hermann Award semifinalists will be released in early November, with three finalists chosen later that month. The finalists will be invited to St. Louis, Mo., on Dec. 2 for the announcement of the winner, as selected through voting by the members of the NSCAA, at the NCAA Men's College Cup. The winner will receive the prestigious crystal soccer ball trophy later that evening.

Big Time in the Big 12

Since joining the conference in 1996, the Nebraska soccer program has always been considered one of the teams to beat in the Big 12. Over the last 12 seasons, the Huskers have laid claim to eight Big 12 titles and five Big 12 Tournament championships. Only Texas A&M, which matched the Huskers with its eighth Big 12 title in 2005, has earned a comparable level of success in the league.

Apart from its postseason success, Nebraska also owns a number of Big 12 team season records including most shots (656 in 2000), points (316 in 1999), goals (108 in 1999), goals per game (4.32 in 1999), assists (108 in 2000) and shutouts (16 in 2000).

Individually, Nebraska also reigns supreme, capturing a league-best 39 first-team All-Big 12 picks to Texas A&M's 28. Recently, NU senior Brittany Timko also joined the Big 12 record books as she notched a conference-record 21 assists in 2005 to topple the previous record of 17, which was set in 2003 by Oklahoma State's Nikki Wojtowicz.

NCAA Tournament Titans

For the Nebraska soccer program, the NCAA tournament isn't a goal, it's a tradition. The Huskers have been a staple in collegiate women's soccer's biggest competition for the past 10 consecutive seasons, including eight runs into the Sweet 16 and two into the Elite Eight.

NU's success, coupled with the enthusiasm and support of the Lincoln community and Husker soccer fans, have made Nebraska one of the NCAA's favorite postseason tournament sites. Lincoln has been host to opening-round action on seven occasions from 1996 to 2005. Even when the Huskers made the move to the Nebraska Soccer Field in 2005, the trend continued as the venue was once again chosen to host the opening round between Nebraska, Creighton, Iowa State and eventual national champion Portland.

The Huskers controlled much of the tempo the rest of the period, which culminated in Allen's first career goal. Trailing 1-0 with less than 10 minutes remaining in the first half, Goodell broke through the Raider defense and fired a shot on goal. Wright State goalkeeper Stephanie Comisar made a diving deflection of the shot, but Allen, playing in her first career game, found the rebound and fired the equalizer into the back of the net.

Klages made three saves in goal for NU, while Comisar stopped seven shots for Wright State to preserve the 1-1 tie.

The tie was the first for the Huskers in a season opener since NU tied perennial powerhouse North Carolina, 1-1, on Aug. 30, 2002 at the Abbott Sports Complex. Prior to Friday's game, that contest had been the only season-opening tie in Husker history.

Nebraska got on the board first in the match with a goal from Jamani. She dribbled through several Badger defenders before sending a solid shot into the left corner of the net past Wisconsin goalkeeper Stefani Szczechowski with 15:57 remaining in the first half.

The Badgers answered not long after when sophomore Taylor Walsh sent a 10 yard header past Nebraska goalkeeper Jamie Klages off of a free kick from Wisconsin junior Ann Eshun at 18:12. The goal was Walsh's second of the season.

The Badgers continued their aggressive play in the second half, which resulted in their second goal. Freshman Krista Lyskevych found a hole in the Nebraska defense at 62:51, sneaking a shot past Klages from less than 10 yards out for her second goal of the year. A season-high 551 fans caught the action at the Nebraska Soccer Field as the Huskers fired a season-best 21 shots to Drake's 13, and enjoyed 11 shots on goal while holding the Bulldogs to two.

Nebraska's victory was highlighted by several firsts for the unbeaten Huskers, including first career goals for freshmen Brittney Lanier and Julie Berkshire. The pair both found the back of the net in the second half, with Lanier's proving to be the game-winning goal.

Berkshire's first career goal was matched by her first career assist on Iacchelli's goal. Also earning their first career assists against Drake were sophomores McKensie Kirchner and Lindsay Poehling.

While the Huskers were racking up points all over the pitch, the Nebraska goalkeepers were also undergoing some novel experiences of their own. With just under 10 minutes remaining in the game, redshirt freshman Brittany Pfeil took control of the net from sophomore starter Jamie Klages. Pfeil did not see any time in the net during her freshman season in 2005. Unfortunately, the first shot Pfeil would see as a Husker found her face-to-face with a penalty kick that slipped by to give Drake its lone goal.

Head Coach John Walker utilized a range of players from the NU roster, including seven newcomers. In all, 22 of Nebraska's 23 healthy players got on the pitch for the Huskers in the win.

Timko scored first with the Huskers and with the goal had scored at least one point in eight consecutive games dating back to the 2005 season. The Nebraska record for games with at least one point is 12, which was recorded by Kim Engesser from Sept. 28 to Nov. 23 in 1997.

USC also took on North Texas for the Nebraska adidas Invitational on Sunday, with the Trojans taking the win, 2-0.

Timko, who earlier in the day was named the Big 12 Offensive Player of the Week for the fifth time in her career, earned the game-winning assist on Bruch's goal. Timko has now scored a point in nine straight matches dating back to last season, three shy of the NU record.

Nebraska dominated most of regulation, but was unable to score. The Huskers outshot the Catamounts, 8-0, in the opening half and it wasn't until the 52nd minute that Western Carolina attempted its first shot.

Senior Alesha Row was brilliant in net for Western Carolina, making seven saves, including several outstanding saves that kept the Huskers off the board. Not to be outdone, NU sophomore Jamie Klages posted her second shutout of the season by denying two shots.

For the game, Nebraska outshot Western Carolina 18-6 and the Huskers enjoyed an 8-3 shots-on-goal advantage.

Nebraska posted several single-game season-best marks including its 25 shots and a Nebraska Soccer Field record 16 corner kicks. The Huskers earned 10 corner kicks in the second half alone, more than the total number of corners Nebraska has enjoyed in a single game so far this season.

Junior Jessie Bruch led NU's scoring effort with a team best seven shots, including two on goal, one of which found its way into the back of the net for Nebraska's lone score of the evening. Senior Brittany Timko picked up her fourth assist on the second half play, while sophomore Ali Lokanc notched the first assist of her career.

As the statistics would imply, Nebraska dominated the pitch for the entire game, maintaining possession of the ball on Central Michigan's half of the field for a good portion of the 90 minute contest. But an outstanding game by both the Chippewa defense, as well as goalkeeper Anne Decker who earned six saves for the contest, kept Nebraska's scoring attempts at bay.

Nebraska came out of the locker room after half time with a clear mission and followed through quickly, putting a ball into the goal at just 46:07. Lokanc took a throw in on the north sideline that found Timko near the middle of the field, who then forwarded a perfect pass on to Bruch for the goal and a 1-0 lead.

Despite the early second half score, Central Michigan wasn't phased and quickly returned with a goal of its own at 49:33. Freshman Stephanie Martin netted her second goal of the season as she battled a flock of Husker defenders down the middle of the box and got a shot off that slid just past the outstretched hands of Klages.

With the contest tied, Nebraska's scoring chances began to come at more of a premium as the CMU forwards put more pressure on the NU defenders. Bruch was the first to take a chance on the long ball as she took a pass from sophomore Jessie Goodell at the top of the 18 and fired it into the top right corner of the TCU net at 17:21.

Taking a cue from her teammate, Timko launched a shot well beyond the 18 just 10 minutes later that was bobbed by TCU goalkeeper Katy Buchanon before landing in the goal.

After finding success in the long ball throughout the game, the Huskers also tried their luck with some short range action as Buchanon batted away a shot from Bruch that was gathered up by Raber for a goal at 35:16.

With the score 3-0 at the start of the second period, NU continued to work toward the net by adding another exciting goal at 56:59 as Timko once again took control for her second score of the game. After Bruch, who was credited with the assist, advanced the ball up the field Timko not only took on the TCU defense, but also backup goalkeeper Kelsey Vross. Timko's aggressive play pulled Vross out of the net, which allowed the 5-7 forward to showcase her ball control skills and sail a shot into the net before Vross could regain her position.

Timko struck again on a breakaway goal at 27:03. The 5-7 forward controlled a headed ball and zipped past the Tiger defenders to place a shot just beyond Forst into the right side of the net. The goal was Timko's seventh on the year and gave her a point in her 12th consecutive game, tying the Nebraska record for consecutive games with points, originally set by Kim Engesser in 1997.

Nebraska slipped to 6-2-2 overall and 1-1 in the Big 12, while the Cyclones improved to 5-6 overall and 1-1 in the league.

The Huskers enjoyed a 2-1 lead in the final minute of regulation before a Cyclone penalty kick forced NU's fourth overtime game of the season, tying the 2003 squad for the most overtime games in a season. The loss marked the first loss by the Huskers in overtime since losing to Texas, 1-0, last season. Nebraska moved to 1-1-2 in extra minutes in 2006 and 12-6-11 all-time.

The overtime loss spoiled another outstanding performance from senior Brittany Timko, who assisted on the Huskers' second goal to set a school record by scoring at least one point in her 13th straight game.

Iowa State struck first as the Cyclones capitalized on a foul just outside the 18-yard box, when ISU freshman Casey Bothwell threaded a shot past Klages for the first goal of her career at 10:43.

Nebraska earned two of its four first-half corner kicks with 10 minutes remaining in the half, with the first corner being pushed out of bounds by ISU. The second tied the score.

After being rejected by a staunch Cyclone defense on the initial attempt, senior defender Tanya Dennis was waiting at the top of the 18 to chip the ball back in play where freshman Shay Powell connected for her first career goal at 37:37. Dennis was credited with her second assist of the season.

Turning to a different kind of set play, Nebraska found success on a direct kick in the 66th minute, as Timko fed the ball in from 25 yards out to find freshman Carly Peetz, who connected on a sliding kick to put the ball in the back of the net. The goal was the first of Peetz's career, while Timko's assist extended her scoring streak to a school-record 13 straight games.

The Cyclones tied the score late in the game on a penalty shot to push the Huskers into their fourth overtime contest of the season.

Unfortunately, Nebraska couldn't hold on, and eventually Iowa State's persistence won out. The Cyclones won their fourth corner kick of the game with just 22 seconds remaining in double overtime, finding freshman defender Lauren Fader for the goal to lift ISU to its fifth win of the season. The Huskers set a new Nebraska soccer record for most double overtime matches in a season.

The goal proved to be a wake-up call for the Huskers, who held Kansas to just three more shots in the half, while earning 13 of their own.

Notes: Despite an outstanding defensive effort from the Huskers, the Nebraska soccer team suffered a 2-0 shutout loss to the eighth-ranked Texas A&M Aggies in College Station.

Defensively, Nebraska was led by an exceptional performance from sophomore goalkeeper Jamie Klages, who made 10 saves on the evening to keep the Huskers in a deadlock with one of the top teams in the country through 63 minutes of play.

However, the A&M defense played a smart game as well, holding Nebraska to season lows in both shots (4) and corner kicks (1), while the Aggie offense tallied 10 shots on goal on 21 shots.

A&M notched both of its goals on the evening in the second half. The first developed off a corner kick for a diving header by Laura Grace Robinson at 54:40, followed by another goal at 72:36 from Melissa Garey.

Senior Brittany Timko, the Big 12 leader in goals and points on the season, was largely contained by the Aggies. A&M put a lot of physical pressure on NU's leading scorer, often double-teaming Timko to neutralize her ability to break into free space. In fact, Timko was held to just one shot on the game.

Additionally, A&M took away Nebraska's potent set plays with the Huskers failing to earn a corner in the entire first half. In fact, it wasn't until more than 10 minutes into the second period that Timko got to bend her first corner of the game.

The Huskers (8-5-3 overall; 3-4-1 Big 12) had trailed by a goal in each of their previous four games and had come back to win two of those matches. In the contest, redshirt freshman Shannon Dickerson staked NU to a 1-0 lead when she scored in the 14th minute.

Dickerson's goal would not hold up, however, as Texas found the equalizer in the 34th minute and the game-winner in the 57th minute to give the Longhorns (12-3-1 overall, 5-1-1 Big 12) their fourth consecutive win.

On Senior Day, Brittany Timko teamed up with Dickerson to put the Huskers on the board first at 13:27. Timko sent a free ball into the middle of the box, where Dickerson deflected it past UT goalkeeper Dianna Pfenninger for the goal.

Dickerson's goal was the first of her career and highlighted a dominating opening 20 minutes for the Huskers. Play evened out for the rest of the first period before Texas tied the game at 33:06.

On the far sideline, NU freshman defender Anna Caniglia tried to shield a Texas player in an attempt to win a throw-in. Texas was able to keep the ball in play, however, and Kelsey Carpenter sent a ball into the box that deflected into the goal for Caitlin Kennedy's second goal of the season.

The second half provided fewer scoring opportunities for both teams, as Nebraska managed five shots and Texas just two. The Longhorns made one of their shots count, as Carpenter and Kennedy teamed up again for the game-winning goal.

Great passing kept the ball deep in Husker territory before Kennedy found Carpenter streaking through the box for the score.

The goal closed the door on Nebraska, despite a handful of missed scoring opportunities for the Huskers, including one with 20 minutes to play when sophomore Aysha Jamani crossed a ball toward the Longhorns' far post to find Selenia Iacchelli for a diving header that slipped out of bounds.

Although the Cowgirls would put a pair of goals away on the evening, the game-winning penalty shot in the 18th minute proved enough as the Huskers would never recover from the early goal.

The Huskers outshot OSU 15-11 in the loss, but earned just three shots on goal to four from the Cowgirls. Sophomore Selenia Iacchelli led the NU offensive effort with two of Nebraska's three shots on goal. Senior Brittany Timko fired four shots but failed to find the net.

The Cowgirls got on the board off a Nebraska mistake in the first period when the Huskers were called for a foul inside the box. Oklahoma State's Adrian Radtke took the resulting penalty kick at 17:36 and drove the ball past NU goalkeeper Jamie Klages for the 1-0 lead.

The Cowgirls continued to work on the Nebraska defense in the second half and eventually the tough Husker unit faltered. After Klages saved an initial shot from OSU's Jamie Markaverich, the Cowgirls were able to regain control of the ball and send it in to senior Jesyca Rosholt at the top of the box for Oklahoma State's second goal of the game and her fifth of the season at 70:19. Freshman Kasey Langdon was credited with the assist on the play.

Notes: The Husker soccer team ended conference play with a 1-0 shutout win over Oklahoma at the OU Soccer Complex in Norman. The shutout was the fourth of the season for Nebraska and its second in Big 12 play.

After an offensive slump over its previous three Big 12 matches, Nebraska got back on track against Oklahoma. Although the Huskers netted just one goal, they increased their shot accuracy, which resulted in more legitimate scoring opportunities. NU put four shots on goal in the contest and tallied 11 shots, while allowing 12 from the Sooners.

Despite notching fewer shots than the Sooners, the game was controlled by the Huskers. Sophomore Aysha Jamani led Nebraska's efforts, putting two of five shots on goal while adding the game-winning assist in the lone goal of the contest.

In the 32nd minute, Jamani played the ball in to sophomore Selenia Iacchelli, who ripped a shot past OU goalkeeper Jennifer Nichols to put the Huskers up, 1-0. The goal was Iacchelli's second of the season and the first game-winner of her career. Jamani recorded her fifth assist of the year, surpassing her previous high of four assists, set last season.

Despite a good effort, the Sooners were unable to break down the Husker defense and sophomore goalkeeper Jamie Klages, who had four saves in the match. The shutout was Klages' fourth of the season and the 10th of her career.

Senior Tanya Dennis anchors the Nebraska defense in 2006. In 18 games, Dennis and the NU defense have allowed just 85 shots on goal for 21 opponent goals this season. Thanks in large part to Dennis' work as the Huskers' central defender, NU opponents are averaging just over one goal per game and only 12.7 shots per game.

A potent offensive threat as well, Dennis sets up many Husker breakaways. In addition, the Brampton, Ontario, native has no qualms about ripping the shots herself, as she has taken 10 shots this season and put three on goal, including one against Baylor on Oct. 6 that would have found the back of the net had it not been for a leaping save by BU goalkeeper Ashley Holder. In Nebraska's 1-0 win over Oklahoma last Sunday, Dennis stepped up her offensive production as she fired a pair of shots off of set plays, but failed to find her first goal of the season.

After establishing serious offensive potential in 2005, junior Jessie Bruch came back to the pitch in 2006 as a major scoring threat. In 11 games, Bruch scored four goals while firing 12 shots on goal.

The 5-11 midfielder also became a solid set-up player, earning three assists on the season including two in Nebraska's 2-1 league win over Texas Tech on Oct. 8

Bruch ranks second in goals on the season, trailing only senior All-American Brittany Timko (11), and is tied with Timko and Aysha Jamani in game-winning goals with two. She netted the winning ball against both Western Carolina and TCU.

In all, three of Bruch's four goals have been assisted by Timko, who often finds the midfielder's imposing 5-11 target in the middle of the pack on set plays. Recently, Bruch has begun repaying the favor, as both of Bruch's assists against Texas Tech resulted in Timko goals.

Despite a terrific start to the season, Bruch has been forced to sit out Nebraska's last seven matches with a knee injury. Her return has yet to be determined.

>> 2006 Season Highlights

After leading the team in points, goals and assists en route to her second consecutive Big 12 Player-of-the-Year honor in 2005, senior Brittany Timko is at it again in her final season with the Huskers. Following the conclusion of the Big 12 regular season, Timko leads Nebraska in points (29), goals (11) and assists (7), as well as in shots on goal (28). Timko's 29 points also lead the Big 12.

The Coquitlam, British Columbia, native has again reached a number of plateaus on the year, including topping the 100-point mark for her career in Nebraska's 3-2 win over North Texas on Sept. 8. Timko produced the fourth hat trick of her career in the contest to pull within one hat trick of tying the program record of five hat tricks set by Kim Engesser.

An offensive specialist, Timko has been involved with either a goal or an assist on 17 of Nebraska's 27 goals this season (65 percent). The 5-7 forward earned another NU program record against Iowa State on Sept. 24 as she recorded an assist on a goal from freshman Carly Peetz. With the point, Timko had scored at least one point in 13 consecutive games, which topped the previous consecutive games with a point record of 12 set by Kim Engesser in 1997. Timko's streak ended at 14 games on Oct. 1 against Kansas as the Huskers were held scoreless for the first time in 16 games.

In her career at Nebraska, Timko has notched single-season records for assists (21) and game-winning assists (8), as well as holding career records for game-winning assists (17). She is chasing records for career assists, multi-assist games and hat tricks, ranking either second or third in each category.

With her 11 goals and seven assists this season, Timko has 41 goals and 42 assists in her career. With 40 goals and 40 assists, Timko joined Meghan Anderson as the only players in NU history to accomplish the feat. They are also two of just 35 players in NCAA history to accomplish this feat.

One of Timko's best performances of the season came in a two-game span against Baylor and Texas Tech on Oct. 6 and Oct. 8. Timko scored three goals and one assist in two games, including adding the game-tying goals against both teams as well as the game-winner against Texas Tech. She was also credited with the game-winning assist against Baylor on a corner kick that found Aysha Jamani in front of the net for the goal.
