SEAN MAYMI

Head Coach (Fifth Season) North Florida (2003)

Maymi said he jumped at the opportunity to chart a new course in the Husker men's tennis program, after becoming just the fourth head coach in the last 68 seasons of Nebraska tennis on June 13, 2018.

"I am thrilled to be coaching the Nebraska men's tennis team," Maymi said. "The coaching staff has held the players to a high standard both physically and mentally. The team has done a great job of embracing a growth mindset and trying to improve every day. This is a process and we will always be building and improving. I know the future is bright and this team will be the start of something very special."

In his first five seasons at Michigan from 2006-07 through 2010-11, the Wolverines advanced to five straight national tournaments and finished No. 34 or higher in the ITA national rankings all five seasons. Michigan climbed as high as No. 8 in the ITA rankings in both 2008 and 2011 before Maymi's departure from the Wolverines and then-head coach Bruce Berque.

In 2014-15, Michigan chose new leadership for its tennis program with the hiring of Adam Steinberg, who previously led Pepperdine to an NCAA team title in 2006. Steinberg brought Maymi back to the Wolverine staff for the start of the spring dual campaign.

After a losing season in 2014-15, Maymi helped Michigan to three consecutive 20-win seasons and three straight top-25 final national rankings, including a No. 14 ranking in 2017-18.

For three seasons from 2011-12 through 2013-14, Maymi stepped away from collegiate tennis to work as the general manager of the global division and director of business development for Todd Martin Tennis in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla. Martin is the current CEO of the International Tennis Hall of Fame and a former ATP Player who was ranked as high as No. 4 in the world in the 1990s. Maymi also spent six months training players at the Junior Tennis Champions Center - a world-class training center for young players in College Park, Md.

After returning to Michigan for the dual season in 2015, Maymi also served as the primary coach for current ATP player Evan King, who was ranked as high as No. 185 in the world in early 2018. King was a three-time ITA All-American and two-time Big Ten Men's Tennis Athlete of the Year (2012, 2013) as a player at Michigan.



A rising star in collegiate coaching with strong connections to the Big Ten, Florida and California, Sean Maymi (pronounced MY-mee) is in his fifth season with the Huskers in 2022-23.

Maymi helped lay the foundation for success in his first season in 2018-19, when the Huskers won double-digit matches. Maymi guided senior Toby Boyer to All-Big Ten honors, as Boyer earned 18 wins, including five upsets of nationally-ranked opponents. For his efforts, Boyer appeared in the Oracle/ITA singles rankings three times during the season. He was also named the Big Ten Player of the Week once and finished his career with 76 career victories, the sixth-most wins in program history.

Maymi also led Nebraska to a pair of conference wins that season, including an upset of No. 18 Minnesota. His second season at Nebraska in 2019-20 was cut short due to the global pandemic. Maymi challenged the Huskers with a tough schedule in his second season, as Nebraska took on five ranked teams and seven opponents from a Power Five Conference (ACC, Big Ten, Big 12, Pac-12, SEC) in its abbreviated 12-match schedule.

In 2022, Maymi had a breakout campaign for the Huskers as he notched five conference victories. It was also just the third time in program history and the first time since joining the Big Ten that Nebraska accomplished such feat. He ended the season on a three-match winning streak, the first time since Nebraska's inaugural season in the Big Ten in 2011-12. It was also the Huskers' first winning season in conference play since 1993. Signature wins on the season included defeating No. 48 UCF on the road, 4-3, and also an upset No. 53 Illinois in conference play, 4-2. He led Roni Hietaranta to 22 victories during the campaign, the 19th most in program history.

Maymi came to Nebraska following two successful stints as the associate head coach at Michigan. He helped the Wolverines to eight NCAA Tournament appearances in his nine seasons as an assistant in Ann Arbor. In 2008, Maymi was named the ITA Midwest Region Assistant Coach of the Year after aiding Michigan's run to the NCAA Tournament round of 16 and a No. 16 final national ranking.

Maymi's playing and coaching career has enabled him to establish strong connections from coast to coast. As a collegiate player, Maymi was a four-year letterwinner and two-time team captain at North Florida, helping the Ospreys to NCAA Division II Championship appearances in 1999 and 2001. He also served as an assistant coach for both the men's and women's tennis teams in 2001-02 before graduating with his bachelor's degree as a communications/advertising major in 2003.

Maymi worked with ATP professional Michael Russell in 2002-03, acting as a coach, hitting partner and strength and conditioning leader. He also served as a member of the Player Services team at ATP International Headquarters in Ponte Vedra Beach, Fla., in 2003.

In 2004, he served as an assistant coach for the men's and women's teams at Claremont-Mudd-Scripps Colleges in Claremont, Calif. He went on to work as a teaching professional while providing personal and group coaching to top-ranked junior players at the Racquet Club of Lake Bluff, Ill., in 2004-05. He also made his first connection in the Big Ten Conference as a volunteer coach for the Northwestern men's tennis team, helping the Wildcats to the NCAA Tournament.

In 2005-06, Maymi returned to California as an assistant coach at Fresno State. He helped the Bulldogs to the Western Athletic Conference title match while coaching the WAC Player of the Year and four other all-conference players before starting his first assistant coaching stint at Michigan in 2006-07.

Originally from Yorktown, Va., Sean and his wife, Samantha, have three daughters and two sons.

PETER KOBELT

Assistant Coach (First Season) Ohio State (2014)

Peter Kobelt joined the Nebraska men's tennis program as an assistant coach in June of 2022.

Prior to joining the Husker coaching staff, Kobelt served as the volunteer assistant coach at Kentucky for two seasons from 2020 to 2022, helping the Wildcat team reach the 2022 NCAA finals and a No. 7 national ranking. He was responsible for implementing the doubles strategy and on-court fitness for the entire team and coached the No. 1 ranked ITA player, Liam Draxl, through the semifinals matches at the 2021 NCAA Men's singles competition. He also played a significant role in the development of No. 4 Gabriel Diallo and No. 33 Millen Hurrior.

Kobelt was a tennis standout at Ohio State, finishing his career as one of the most successful men's tennis players

in school history. He led Ohio State to its first NCAA National Indoor Team Championship in 2014 and was selected as the 2014 ITA National Indoor Championship's Most Outstanding Player. He earned ITA All-American honors in 2013 and in 2014 and was also nominated for the 2014 Big Ten Medal of Honor award. Kobelt currently holds the Buckeye all-time record for most career doubles wins with 139 and is No. 4 in Buckeye's history with a combined 244 singles and doubles wins. During his career, he held the ITA No. 1 singles ranking and the No. 2 doubles ranking.

A native of New Albany, Ohio, Kobelt earned a bachelor's degree in financial planning from Ohio State in 2014.

Joann Ross, Ph.D., joined the academic department in May of 2013 after tutoring for the program in 2012 and 2013. She oversees academic support for men's and women's tennis and women's rifle. In addition, she serves as the Summer Bridge Coordinator and assists with policy writing and development.

Prior to her current position, Ross served as a full-time learning specialist, working primarily with men's track and field, wrestling and baseball. From 2007 to 2011, she was

Ross holds a bachelor's degree in history and psychology from Oregon and a juris doctorate from the Nebraska College of Law. She earned her Ph.D. in history at Nebraska.

TREV ALBERTS

Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics

Tournament, including hockey advancing to the Frozen Four in 2015 and men's soccer reaching the second round of the NCAA Tournament in the spring of 2021. He also expanded opportunities, adding men's golf and men's soccer in 2011 and Omaha will begin a men's swimming and diving program in 2021-22.

Throughout his tenure in Omaha, Alberts was focused on enhancing the student-athlete experience, including the construction and staffing of the Hamilton Academic Excellence Room and the development of the Ethel S. Abbott Student-Athlete Development Wing. Those efforts paid off in Nebraska-Omaha student-athletes posting consistent collective semester grade point averages above 3.3 for 18 consecutive semesters, including at least a 3.5 in each of his final three semesters.

The facilities around Omaha Athletics received a major uplift during his tenure. Maverick Park opened in March of 2021 to rave reviews as the home to the Mavericks' baseball and softball programs. Funding for the complex, which includes a 1,500-seat baseball facility and a 650-seat softball facility, were raised privately and provided both programs a permanent on-campus home for the first time.

Another crowning achievement was the opening of Baxter Arena in 2015. Alberts directed efforts to secure community support and funding to build the on-campus arena, which allowed the nationally prominent hockey program to play on campus and also serve as the home of the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Caniglia Field underwent renovations in 2012, making it one of the finest collegiate soccer facilities in the country, highlighted by a FIFA 2-star rated playing surface and one of the largest LED videoboards in a soccer-only college facility.

Alberts' work on behalf of hockey, UNO's established Division I sport, also paid dividends. He successfully guided the Mavericks into the

new National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14. The following year, Omaha reached the 2015 NCAA Frozen Four.

In addition, Alberts and his team led Omaha Athletics into a partnership with Learfield, a national leader in the marketing of collegiate athletics, and developed Omaha Sports Properties. As the exclusive corporate sponsorship sales unit for UNO Athletics, Omaha Sports Properties further enhanced revenue and increased brand prominence locally, regionally and nationally.

As part of UNO's reclassification to Division I, Alberts oversaw the rebranding of UNO athletics with new primary and secondary logos and a greater focus on strengthening the Maverick brand both regionally and nationally.

As a student-athlete, Alberts was an All-American on and off the football field as a Husker Blackshirt. He was Nebraska's first Butkus Award winner in 1993, helping Coach Tom Osborne's Huskers to an undefeated regular season and an Orange Bowl appearance against Florida State. A first-team All-American by every major publication in 1993, he was also the Football News National Defensive Player of the Year, the Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year, and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year. His No. 34 jersey was retired at the 1994 Red-White Spring Game. In 2015, he was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Off the field, Alberts earned the NCAA's highest honor, The Today's Top Six Award. A three-time academic All-Big Eight honoree, he was a CoSIDA Academic All-American in 1993. He graduated from Nebraska before his senior season.

Alberts was the fifth pick in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts and played for the Colts until 1996. Following his NFL career, he served as an analyst on college and professional football games for major national networks, including ESPN, CNN/SI and CBS Sports Network.

Alberts and his wife Angela have three children – Chase, Ashtynne and Breanna.

A veteran administrator and College Football Hall of Famer, Trev Alberts was named Vice Chancellor for Athletics at the University of Nebraska on July 14, 2021. Alberts returned to his alma mater after spending 12 years at Nebraska-Omaha, guiding the program through a successful transition to the Division I level.

Alberts' tenure leading UNO athletics was marked by successes in competition and in academics; by transitioning the university's athletic programs to NCAA Division I in 2011; and by establishing new homes for many UNO athletics teams, including Baxter Arena, the Maverick Park baseball/softball complex and the soccer pitch at Caniglia Field.

Alberts took the bold step in announcing that Omaha would reclassify from Division II to Division I in all sports in 2011 and simultaneously securing conference affiliation with the Summit League for all of the department's then-Division II programs. His vision for UNO's reclassifying teams was demonstrated even before the four-year transition period had ended. The Omaha baseball team won back-to-back Summit League regular-season championships in 2013 and 2014, while the men's basketball team made its first Division I postseason appearance in 2014 with a berth in the CollegeInsider.

During UNO's time in the Division I ranks under Alberts tenure, the Mavericks had six teams and four student-athletes qualify for the NCAA

KEITH ZIMMER

Senior Associate A.D. Life Skills/Tennis Administrator

Keith Zimmer enters his 34th year at Nebraska directing the Life Skills and Enrichment program. The Executive Associate Athletic Director for Life Skills, Zimmer also serves as the sport administrator for women's basketball, softball and men's tennis and women's tennis.

Zimmer works closely with the College of Business to assist with the administration of the Master's in Intercollegiate Athletic Administration program. Since 2015, Nebraska Life Skills implemented the Post Eligibility Scholarship provided to Huskers who have lettered, graduated and exhausted eligibility at Nebraska. Zimmer hired Nebraska Athletics Diversity and Inclusion Director DaWon Baker and together numerous initiatives have been implemented within campus and the community promoting respect acceptance and unity. Additional critical components of Nebraska Life Skills includes individual student-athlete career meetings, required 4 year tiered proactive education, community outreach, postgraduate scholarship awards life after sports transition and the offering of four leadership organizations. The N-Vest mentoring group, Inner Circle, N-Volved

and the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee further develop leadership qualities of more than 150 student-athletes annually. Zimmer also assists with the direction of Nebraska's annual student-athlete achievement event, "A Night at the Lied." Zimmer is the Life Skills sport contact for football, volleyball, softball, swimming and diving, men's tennis and women's tennis.

Zimmer, who worked in Nebraska's Academic Services area from 1987 to 2006, while pioneering Nebraska's Life Skills program, is regarded as a national leader in the life skills area. He received one of the top honors in college athletics, being selected as the Life Skills Administrator of the Year and has also received the Chancellor's Award for Exemplary Service to Students and is an honorary member of both Golden Key National Honor Society and Mortar Board.

Zimmer earned his bachelor's degree at Wayne State College and his master's in education from Springfield (Mass.) College. Zimmer and his wife Michelle, have two sons, Logan and Caden.





RONNIE GREEN

University of Nebraska-Lincoln Chancellor

Dr. Ronnie D. Green is Chancellor of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, Nebraska's flagship, Land-Grant and Big Ten institution, where he oversees an enrollment of over 25,000 students and 6,000 faculty and staff.

He received bachelor's and master's degrees in animal science from Virginia Tech and Colorado State University, respectively. His doctoral program was completed jointly at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln and the USDA-ARS U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in animal breeding and genetics.

Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, and as the national program leader for animal production research for the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and executive secretary of the White House's interagency working group on animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council. Prior to returning to NU, Green served as a global executive for Pfizer Animal Health's animal genomics business.

Green has published 130 refereed publications and abstracts, nine book chapters and 56 invited symposia papers; and has delivered invited presentations in 43 U.S. states and 21 countries around the world. He is a past-president of both the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS)

and the National Block and Bridle Club and has served in a number of leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, National Pork Board, the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences, the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities, and Alpha Gamma Rho national fraternity. He currently is a member of a number of boards including the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors, Neogen Corporation, and Supporters of Agricultural Research, and was recently named to the Presidential Forum of the NCAA representing the Big Ten Conference, and an inaugural member of the NCAA Division I Board Infractions Process Committee. He was named a fellow of ASAS in 2014 and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2015. In 2017 Dr. Green was honored with the American Society of Animal Science's Morrison Award, the highest international academic recognition for an animal scientist.

Ronnie and his wife Jane, a double UNL alumna, are the proud parents of four children – Justin, Nate, Kelli and Regan Green – all UNL graduates – and one granddaughter, Charlotte.

Faculty Athletic Representative

Scott M. Fuess Jr. was named the University of Nebraska-Lincoln faculty athletics representative on Feb. 21, 2020.

As faculty athletics representative, Fuess serves as a liaison between the Office of the Chancellor and Athletic Department. Areas of focus in the role include the welfare of student-athletes, maintaining the positive relationship between athletics and faculty, NCAA compliance, developing and responding to NCAA legislative proposals and representing the university at related NCAA and Big Ten Conference meetings.

The half-time position - which was restructured to an expected term of five years - reports directly to Chancellor Ronnie Green and consults with the Athletic Director. The representative splits academic year time equally between academic responsibilities and faculty representative duties.

Fuess, the Steinhart Distinguished Professor of Business and former chair of the College of Business' economics department, has worked at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since 1986. He serves on the Faculty Senate's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, having chaired the committee for 2018-19 and a sub-committee in 2017-18.

In August 2018, Fuess was named director of the university's cross-disciplinary master's degree program that offers a specialization in

intercollegiate athletics administration. The program - which has been completed by 48 Huskers - is built on MBA coursework, allowing students to earn hands-on experiences through Nebraska Athletics, industry professionals, other universities and alumni.

Fuess earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Delaware, as well as master's and doctoral degrees from Purdue University. His research interests revolve around issues of economics, primarily in labor, collegiate athletics and Japan.

superintendent. Under his leadership, the Naval Academy achieved a No. 1 national ranking and new records in student success and diversity. Carter previously was president of the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, R.I. A retired Vice Admiral with 38 years of service, Carter has logged more than 6,300 flying hours and holds the American record for carrier-arrested landings.

In his first year at the University of Nebraska – faced with the unexpected and unprecedented challenges presented by COVID-19 – Carter has led with a focus on the land-grant priorities of access and opportunity for students and families. He launched the Nebraska Promise, a financial aid program guaranteeing free tuition for low- and middle-income Nebraskans, and implemented a multi-year budget plan that included a two-year, across-the-board tuition freeze. The result was system-wide growth in enrollment, including record gains among underrepresented students.

Carter oversaw the awarding of a \$92 million federal contract for the university's National Strategic Research Institute, one of only 14 University-Affiliated Research Centers in the country conducting exclusive research for the Department of Defense. During Carter's tenure, the NU system has been ranked among the world's top 100 institutions for earning research patents, the Omaha campus was selected as the home for a new federal counterterrorism research center, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources launched a new effort focused on rural vitality, and the medical center opened an education, training and preparedness facility that positions Nebraska as the world leader in the fight against infectious disease.

Carter serves as the chair of the Daugherty Water for Food Global Institute's Board of Directors. He is a board member for the Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce, the Nebraska State

Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Naval Historical Foundation and the Naval Aviation Museum Foundation. Carter is also a member of the Aspen Institute's Higher Education Working Group and the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities' Council of Presidents. He is an ex-officio member on the board of the University of Nebraska Foundation, the philanthropic partner of the university system that has a \$1.7 billion endowment.

Carter earned his bachelor's degree in physics and oceanography from the U.S. Naval Academy, where he played hockey and served as team captain. He is a graduate of the Navy Fighter Weapons School (Top Gun) and holds educational credentials from the Navy Nuclear Power School, the U.S. Air Force Air War College, the Naval War College and the Armed Forces Staff College. Carter's military career includes service for the Carrier Strike Group Twelve, in which he commanded 20 ships, two nuclear-powered aircraft carriers, and two carrier wings that were deployed to Afghanistan and the Arabian Gulf.

The son of an English teacher, Carter was raised in the rural, one-high school town of Burrillville, R.I. He and his wife, Lynda, live in Lincoln and have two adult children, Brittany and Christopher.

Ted Carter became the eighth president of the University of Nebraska on Jan. 1, 2020, following a national search by the Board of Regents.

As president, Carter leads a four-campus university system that enrolls nearly 52,000 students and employs 16,000 faculty and staff on campuses in Lincoln, Omaha and Kearney, plus academic divisions and research and extension centers across the state. He serves as chief spokesman and chief executive officer for the system, which operates on a \$2.8 billion annual budget and includes a flagship Big Ten institution, a world-renowned academic health sciences center, Division I athletics programs, and preeminent institutes focused on water and agriculture, national security and defense, infectious disease and early childhood education.

Carter brought with him a distinguished record in education, partnerships and military service, having come to Nebraska from the U.S. Naval Academy, his alma mater, where he served as

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

In the fall season, Gleason boasted a 3-6 singles record. The graduate student grabbed a pair of wins at the ITA Regionals in consolation play, while also knocking off Max Damm at the FGCU Bonita Bay Classic. Alongside three different partners, Gleason notched four doubles wins in the fall. Across his four-year career, the Nebraska native now has 39 singles wins along with 25 double victories.

2021-22 SENIOR

Will Gleason saw extensive action during his senior season for the Huskers. Gleason tallied 10 singles victories for the Big Red and eight doubles victories. Gleason posted a 4-12 singles record in the spring, which was highlighted by two consecutive straight-set victories over conference foes. Gleason, who went 6-4 in singles play during the fall, posted a 1-2 mark in No. 5 singles and a 3-2 record in No. 6 singles. In the classroom, Gleason earned a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll and was named Academic All-Big Ten for the second time. Gleason also earned the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award, which is given to individuals who have distinguished themselves through citizenship and ethical behavior.

Gleason's most impressive win took place on April 5, when the Huskers faced No. 1 Ohio State. The Lincoln Southwest grad overcame Buckeye senior Martin Joyce in a three-set thriller, 7-6 (5), 1-6, 10-5 for Nebraska's lone win of the match. That was Joyce's fourth loss of the season at the time, and only his second in Big Ten play.

Gleason teamed up with senior Toby Boyer for Nebraska's No. 1 doubles team most of the season, as both upset two nationally-ranked opponents in Big Ten competition. Boyer/Gleason concluded the season at 8-11 overall

(6-10 Spring, 3-6 Big Ten).

2021-22: FRESHMAN

A strong freshman campaign by Mueller, saw him reach double-digit wins after competing primarily in the No. 2 spot. On the season, he garnered 18 total wins on the year as he quickly found a spot in the lineup as a freshman. In the spring, Mueller tallied four wins, including a pair of consecutive victories against ranked-conference opponents (Illinois and Northwestern) to earn Big Ten Athlete of the Week on April 12. Alongside William Gleason in doubles play, the duo posted a perfect 4-0 record in conference play at the No. 3 slot. They were the only team to finish the spring season with an unblemished record, notching wins over Illinois, Northwestern, Purdue and Penn State.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Calvin Mueller came to Nebraska from Germany where he had an U18 top-10 national ranking and reached as high as No. 105 in the men's German rankings. In 2019, Calvin and his teammate reached the semifinals in the ITF Futures tournament.

"Calvin will be a big part of our program over the next four years," Nebraska Head Coach Sean Maymi said. "He has great skills and will help in both singles and doubles. I can't wait to start working with him."

The son of Heike Mueller-Resler and Harald Mueller, Calvin was born June 20, 2000. Calvin is

2022-23: JUNIOR

Wiedenhorn had a great start to the fall campaign, garnering three singles wins to go along with pair of doubles victories. He recorded a victory in every tournament he competed in, ending the season with a win over Virginia Tech. His only doubles action came in the Bonita Bay Classic, teaming with William Gleason as they took two of their three weekend matches.

2021-22: SOPHOMORE

The Stuttgart, Germany native enjoyed a strong sophomore campaign going 9-12 in singles action and 16-16 in doubles competition. Wiedenhorn had five of his nine wins and the fall and ended conference play with back-to-back victories (Indiana and Penn State). He did most of his damage in doubles action, teaming with Victor Moreno Lozano exclusively in the No. 1 spot, posting a 6-9 record in that slot. The duo qualified for the ITA Fall National Championships after a strong outing in the ITA Regionals. They also recorded five wins at the Pacific Coast Doubles Championship and secured a doubles win in the Big Ten Tournament over Northwestern.

Off the court, Wiedenhorn earned the Sam Foltz 27 Leadership Award. He also claimed a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll and the Academic All-Big Ten team.

2020-21: FRESHMAN

Nic Wiedenhorn completed his first season at Nebraska with a 4-13 overall singles record. The freshman from Stuttgart, Germany, notched a win over Purdue's Santiago Galan in Wiedenhorn's Big Ten debut. He ended the season with five, Big Ten wins in singles and doubles action. Wiedenhorn played in multiple positions in the lineup with a 1-1 record at No. 4, 2-4 record at No. 5, and 1-3 record at No. 6.

NIC WIEDENHORN

In doubles, Wiedenhorn finished 5-10 on the season, with wins over Northwestern, Penn State and Minnesota.

Off the court, Wiedenhorn earned the Big Ten Sportsmanship Award. He also claimed a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the spring of 2021.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Wiedenhorn announced his intentions to join the Husker tennis team in May of 2020. A talented competitor who represented his home country's under-16 team at the European Cup, Wiedenhorn was an under-16 German champion and has been a top-five-player in Germany since the age of 12. He comes to Nebraska from the southwestern German city of Stuttgart.

"Nic has a ton of international experience and will bring a lot to our team," Nebraska Head Coach Sean Maymi said. "I am super excited to work with Nic and continue to improve his game. He will be a big part of our team over the next four years."

Wiedenhorn earned Nebraska's 2021 Big Ten Sportsmanship Award for men's tennis. He was also a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in 2021.

THE BIG TEN CONFERENCE

Known as one of intercollegiate sports' most successful undertakings, the Big Ten is home to a lineage of legendary names and an ongoing tradition of developing strong leaders. Even in its infancy, the conference established itself as the preeminent collection of institutions in the nation, where the pursuit of academic excellence prevailed as the definitive goal.

The Big Ten is a national leader in intercollegiate athletics on and off the field, as schools have combined to win more than 450 team and 1,800 individual national championships.

The history of the Big Ten traces back nearly 125 years to the Palmer House hotel in Chicago, where on Jan. 11, 1895, then-Purdue president James H. Smart and leaders from the University of Chicago, Illinois, Michigan, Minnesota, Northwestern and Wisconsin set out to organize and develop principles for the regulation of intercollegiate athletics.

At that meeting, a blueprint for the administration of college athletics under the direction of appointed faculty representatives was outlined. The presidents' first known action "restricted eligibility for athletics to bona fide, full-time students who were not delinquent in their studies." That important legislation, along with other legislation that followed in coming years, served as the primary building block for intercollegiate athletics.

On Feb. 8, 1896, one faculty member from each of those seven universities met at the same Palmer House and officially established the mechanics of the conference, which was officially incorporated as the "Intercollegiate Conference Athletic Association" in 1905.

Indiana and Iowa became the eighth and ninth members in 1899. In 1908, Michigan briefly withdrew, and in 1912 Ohio State joined the conference, bringing its membership back to nine. Upon Michigan's return in 1917, the conference was first referred to as the "Big Ten" by media members, and that name was eventually incorporated in 1897.

As the 1900s opened, faculty representatives established rules for intercollegiate athletics that were novel for the time. As early as 1904, the faculty approved legislation that required eligible athletes to meet entrance requirements and to have completed a full year's work, along with having one year of residence.

In 1901, the first Big Ten Championship event was staged when the outdoor track and field championships were held at the University of Chicago. The debut event marked what is now a staple of conference competition. Today, the Big Ten sponsors 28 official sports, 14 for men and 14 for women, including the addition of men's ice hockey and men's and women's lacrosse over the last four years. Big Ten schools compete in a total of 42 sports, furthering the conference's commitment to broad-based programming and providing more participation opportunities than any conference in the country.

One of the conference's proudest traditions began in 1902 when Michigan faced Stanford in the Rose Bowl, the nation's first bowl game. Big Ten teams appeared in Pasadena twice before the conference signed an exclusive contract with the Tournament of Roses in 1946, making it the first bowl game with permanent conference affiliations.

Coupling the academic goals set forth by the leaders of the charter members of the conference and their steadfast commitment to athletics, the conference instituted the Big Ten Medal of Honor in 1915. It is awarded annually by each conference institution to a student of the graduating class who has attained the greatest proficiency in scholarship and athletics. For more than 100 years, it has been the most prestigious honor a student competing in Big Ten athletics can receive.

In 1922, Major John L. Griffith became the conference's first "Commissioner of Athletics." Griffith was the first of six men to assume the role of commissioner in the conference's history, followed by Kenneth L. "Tug" Wilson in 1945, Bill Reed in 1961, Wayne Duke in 1971 and James E. Delany in 1989. Those five served prior to current Commissioner Kevin Warren, who assumed the role on Sept. 16, 2019. Delany announced his retirement on March 4, 2019, concluding a 30-year career with the conference on Jan. 1, 2020.

After nearly 30 years with 10 members, the conference consolidated to nine schools when the University of Chicago formally withdrew its membership in 1946. Michigan State was added to the Big Ten three years later, bringing the number of affiliated conference schools to 10 once again.

In 1955, the Big Ten formulated a revenue-sharing model designed to pool all football television rights of its members and share those proceeds equally. The conference and its members continue to utilize a revenue-sharing model, dividing media rights, bowl payouts and other profits among all institutions.

While academics have always played an integral role, presidents of the Big Ten member institutions formalized the primacy of academics with the

establishment of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation) in 1958. The Big Ten Academic Alliance is an academic consortium of all Big Ten universities. Annually, the schools currently constituting the Big Ten Academic Alliance produced over \$10 billion in funded research, \$5 billion more than any other conference.

In one of Duke's first actions as commissioner, he oversaw the adoption of the Big Ten Advisory Commission in 1972, designed to study conference programs and make suggestions which would further Big Ten objectives. The Advisory Commission enlists former students that competed in Big Ten athletics to serve as liaisons to the NCAA's Diversity and Inclusion Department, the Big Ten Student-Athlete Advisory Commission and other organizations.

In 1981, the conference presidents and chancellors endorsed a proposal that enabled universities to affiliate their women's intercollegiate programs with the conference, and the first conference championships for women were staged that fall. The Big Ten was the first conference to voluntarily adopt male and female participation goals after launching its Gender Equity Action Plan in 1992.

In December of 1989, the conference agreed in principle to invite Penn State for membership. On June 4, 1990, the Council of Presidents officially voted to integrate Penn State into the conference, giving the Big Ten 11 members.

In 2004, the Big Ten implemented a pilot program of instant replay for college football. Following the season, the conference forwarded replay proposals to the NCAA regarding the future use of instant replay, where it approved country-wide testing in 2005. In 2006, the NCAA approved the use of instant replay for all conferences.

In 2006, the Big Ten announced the creation of the first conference-owned television network, a 20-year agreement with FOX Networks to create what would become the Big Ten Network (BTN). Launched on Aug. 30, 2007, BTN now produces more than 1,800 events across all platforms each year. BTN is in almost 60 million homes in the United States and Canada via the nation's major video providers and more than 300 additional video providers across the country. BTN is also available through the majority of OTT providers, and via the Fox Sports App, which delivers live and on-demand programming to computers, smartphones and tablets. BTN Plus streams hundreds of additional events each season.

On June 11, 2010, the Big Ten Council of Presidents/Chancellors (COP/C) approved a formal membership application by Nebraska, expanding the conference to 12 institutions. Nebraska joined the Big Ten on July 1, 2011.

The conference expanded its footprint further in 2012 when the COP/C approved formal membership applications from Maryland (Nov. 19) and Rutgers (Nov. 20). Maryland and Rutgers became official Big Ten members on July 1, 2014, giving the conference almost 9,500 students participating in intercollegiate athletics and more than 11,000 participation opportunities on 350 teams.

On June 3, 2013, the Big Ten announced that Johns Hopkins had been accepted as the conference's first sport affiliate member. Johns Hopkins' addition in men's lacrosse gave the Big Ten six institutions sponsoring the sport, allowing the debut of men's lacrosse as an official conference sport and building on the Big Ten's tradition of broad-based sports competition. On June 17, 2015, the conference announced that Johns Hopkins was accepted as a sport affiliate member for women's lacrosse beginning with the 2016-17 academic year. On March 23, 2016, the conference announced that Notre Dame would join the Big Ten for men's ice hockey beginning in 2017-18.

Since opening in the fall of 2013, the Big Ten conference center hosts more than 300 meetings annually for member institutions, Big Ten Academic Alliance (formerly CIC) related committees and coaches' groups. The headquarters also features an interactive digital museum - the Big Ten Experience - which brings the conference's storied academic and athletic history to life. For more information on the Big Ten Experience, go to bigten.org.

In June 2014, the Big Ten opened a second office in New York City, featuring both office and meeting space in Midtown Manhattan. Big Ten staff members are based in the New York City office to provide expanded coverage and service, while other conference and institutional administrators utilize the space as necessary when conducting business on the East Coast. The Big Ten and its member institutions also have access to satellite office space in Washington, D.C.

The Big Ten staff works to meet the educational needs of students competing in intercollegiate athletics to allow them to excel in all areas of their lives. The conference office manages 28 different championships and tournaments, offers legislative and compliance services, oversees the production and distribution of more than 2,000 events annually, provides staff services to coaching and administrative personnel, and services media and fans interest for information on the Big Ten.





The 2009-10 Huskers made the NCAA Tournament for the first time in program history. Calin Paar (No. 70) and Chris Aumuller (No. 85) finished the season in the ITA national rankings, as Nebraska earned its best-ever team rankings at the No. 41 position.

ATHLETIC MEDICINE

Nebraska features one of the most well-trained and highly skilled athletic medicine staffs in the country. Under the guidance of Director of Athletic Medicine Dr. Lonnie Albers, Head Athletic Trainer and Physical Therapist Jerry Weber (pictured, bottom) and Football Head Athletic Trainer Mark Mayer, the 2021-22 Nebraska athletic medicine staff consists of five physicians, 13 full-time athletic trainers and eight graduate assistant athletic trainers.

Nebraska's medical facilities have long been among the nation's best, and NU's athletic medicine center within the Tom and Nancy Osborne Athletic Complex will keep the Huskers on the front line of technology for decades to come. In addition to Nebraska's North Stadium facility, Haymarket Park, the Bob Devaney Sports Center, Pinnacle Bank Arena and the Nebraska Soccer and Tennis Complex all feature athletic medicine areas. The Devaney Center's Athletic Medicine facility underwent an extensive expansion as part of the Hendricks Training Complex addition in 2011.

Nebraska uses advanced equipment, including two anti-gravity treadmills (pictured, top) to help athletes recondition after injuries. Nebraska's Athletic Medicine Center also features a hydrotherapy area that includes a three-level laned pool, as well as hot and cold plunge tanks (pictured, middle). The Hydroworx 1000 Treadmill Pool is equipped with two cameras underwater for evaluation and assessment.

SPORTS PSYCHOLOGY

Continuing its commitment to complete care for all student-athletes, Nebraska has four full-time in-house athletic psychologists and a sports psychiatrist who work directly with student-athletes, teams and coaches. Under the leadership of Director of Sports Psychology Dr. Brett Haskell, the Huskers' sports psychology staff provides counseling, psychological services, mental skills training, teambuilding and leadership development services for each of Nebraska's 24 sports and more than 600 Husker student-athletes. The staff works directly with student-athletes to help them develop skills to enhance personal well-being, address mental health and substance use issues to optimize performance.

The Life Skills staff provides proactive education fostering the acclimation to the University of Nebraska, promote total person development best preparing student-athletes for life after sport, and serve as a powerful recruiting resource for each team.

INDIVIDUAL MEETINGS

Every Nebraska student-athlete meets individually with a Life Skills staff member to create and maintain a personal resume throughout their collegiate career. Since it is critical that a student build a resume throughout their collegiate career, each student-athlete creates a resume during their first year on campus. This allows the student-athlete to learn ways to best improve their resume and take steps each year to strengthen the resume. As a student-athlete moves through their collegiate career, they will meet with their Life Skills Counselor in follow-up meetings, allowing for resume updates. Nebraska athletics is proud to boast a 100% resume completion rate.

CAREER COMMITMENT & NETWORKING

Nebraska Life Skills organizes an annual Student-Athlete Career Fair Networking Night and other career events aimed at connecting Huskers with companies desiring competitive, hard-working, accountable candidates. Athlete Network and UNL's Handshake Link provide opportunities to explore career opportunities across the country.

COMMUNITY OUTREACH

Nebraska student-athletes readily accept the role-model challenge, collectively giving more than 8,000 hours annually to impact thousands across the state of Nebraska. Outreach events include but are not limited to hospital visits, mentoring, school assemblies, statewide rallies, Make-A-Wish, School is Cool and Husker Heroes. During the 2019-20 academic year, 296 Husker student-athletes completed at least six service projects earning spot on the coveted Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

LEADERSHIP

Nebraska Life Skills provides student-athletes with countless opportunities to enhance leadership skills while distinguishing themselves from the competition. Student-athletes can be members of the Student-Athlete Advisory Committee, Nebraska Football Road Race, Inner Circle, N-Vest or N-VOLVED. UNL offers more than 600 recognized student organizations allowing athletes to collaborate with other campus leaders for common goals. Nebraska Life Skills has funded and coordinated an annual service abroad trip that allows 20 student-athletes to work together toward a common goal while enriching cultural competencies.

POST-ELIGIBILITY OPPORTUNITIES

Since 2015, every student-athlete who letters and graduates will have a three-year window to benefit from one of three post-eligibility opportunities each valued at \$7,500. Upon completion of required seminars, graduates can either study abroad, complete an internship or begin graduate school within the University of Nebraska-Lincoln or the University of Nebraska Medical Center.

DIVERSITY AND INCLUSION

The Life Skills program also is responsible for all Diversity and Inclusion initiatives for Husker Athletics. Since 2016, the Diversity and Inclusion Summit has reached all student-athletes and staff with programming emphasizing respect, acceptance and unity. Numerous other special events are coordinated in collaboration with campus departments highlighting the diversity within Husker Nation. N-Vest is a new mentoring program aimed at fostering successful transitions while connecting participating athletes with campus or community mentors to aid in personal and career development.



Academic Experience

Featuring one of the most innovative and comprehensive academic support systems in the nation, Nebraska Athletics is dedicated to helping student-athletes achieve excellence in academics, athletics and life career preparation.

Nebraska leads the nation with 347 (and counting) Academic All-Americans, an honor that recognizes student-athletes for their achievements in athletics, academics and the community, reflecting a longstanding history of providing excellent academic services and support.

Men's gymnast Anton Stephenson brought home Nebraska's nation-leading 18th NCAA Today's Top Ten Award, the most prestigious award presented to the best and brightest 10 student-athletes annually.

In 2020-21, a total of 122 Huskers earned their college degrees - the ultimate goal for all student-athletes.

Academics Student-Athlete Support Services

Led by a seasoned Senior Associate Athletics Director, 14 full-time staff members are committed to supporting student-athletes to succeed in the degree major of their choosing.

Academic Services is hosted in the state-of-the-art Dick and Peg Herman Family Student Life Complex that is open 122 hours each week and dedicated to academic support. The complex includes a state-of-the-art computer center that provides access to desktop computers installed with specialized software and "tech tables" for collaborations for class projects. A full-time computer technician and student workers are on-hand to assist with any technological issues that student-athletes may encounter.

Current and incoming student-athletes are provided an Apple MacBook Air to enhance their learning opportunities

Additional resources are available at the Dick and Peg Herman Student-Life Complex, DJ Sokol Enrichment Center, Scott Technology Center, Abbott Life Skills Center, Papik Compliance Center and Lewis Training Table (all located within the Dick and Peg Herman Family Student Life Complex).

The Athletics Department offers athletic scholarships that will neither be reduced nor canceled for injury or performance provided the student-athlete remains a member in good standing with the community, the University, and the Athletics Department.

The Athletics Department encourages and continues to provide support for scholarship student-athletes' return to Nebraska at any time to complete their undergraduate degree, as long as the student-athlete did not transfer from Nebraska and left in good academic standing.



Husker student-athletes across all sports posted a record cumulative GPA of 3.331 in the spring of 2020

Nebraska leads the nation with 347 CoSIDA/ Capital One Academic All-Americans

Nebraska leads the nation with 18 NCAA Today's Top Ten Award recipients, while the Husker football team's nine honorees is the most by any single program in the nation. Anton Stephenson (Men's Gymnastics) became Nebraska's most recent honoree in December of 2019

Nebraska had 323 student athletes earn Academic All-Big Ten recognition during the 2020-21 academic year.

A total of 112 Huskers earned Big Ten Conference Distinguished Scholar recognition during the 2020-21 academic year.

A total of 857 student-athletes were honored on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall of 2020 or spring of 2021 semesters for earning a 3.0 or better term GPA.
