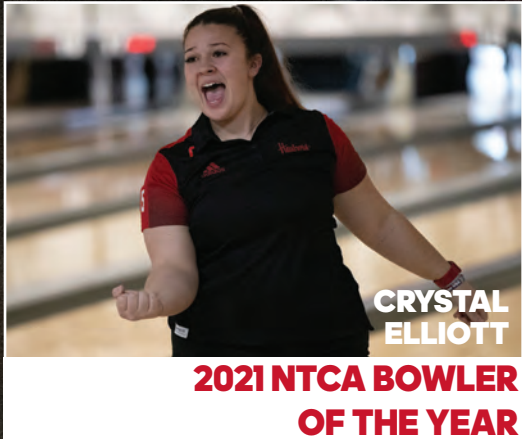

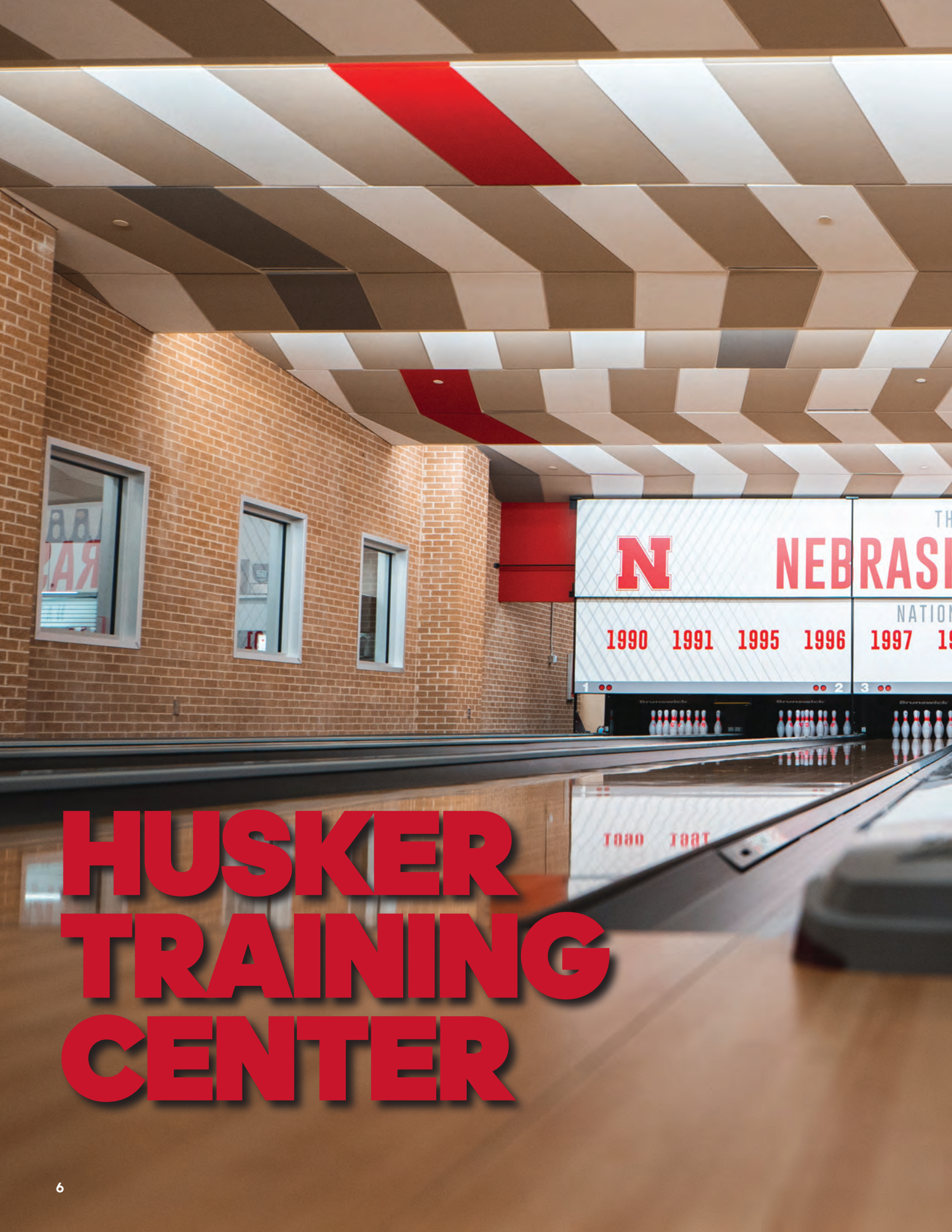

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

Eight academic counselors, three learning specialists, two assistant academic counselors and one administrative assistant are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 75-100 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. Tutorial support is provided both in-person and virtually. Nebraska's tutorial program is certified by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall within the Herman Student Life Complex that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

MENTORING

Academic staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and select returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

**STUDENT-ATHLETE
ORIENTATION**

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

All student-athletes are provided the opportunity to have a laptop for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Herman Student Life Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility. A full-time computer specialist is on-site and available to assist with technology needs.

PERFORMANCE NUTRITION

There is no place like Nebraska when it comes to the high-performance fueling of hard-working athletes. Nebraska Performance Nutrition has a long-standing tradition of setting the highest standard for the 'food first' approach to fueling. The Nebraska Performance Nutrition program is setting the standard for student-athlete welfare across collegiate athletics and beyond.

Nebraska has its own Executive Chef, Mike Steele, who innovates the menus under the guidance of Director of Performance Nutrition, Dave Ellis, who is widely considered to be a thought leader in the high-performance fueling field. Nebraska has its own kitchen and culinary staff and has the ability to source a food supply that is second to none when it comes to fresh, natural and organic sources. Athletes are taught to follow a three-step approach that was conceived right here at Nebraska over three decades ago. It's a simple system, where food is merchandised in three steps, each delivering a health and performance benefit for hard-working athletes.

Husker athletes have the chance to learn how to cook their own food in the Life Skills Kitchen. The staff also provides ready-to-eat food supply and to-go meals that offer fueling solutions when a student-athlete has class conflicts.

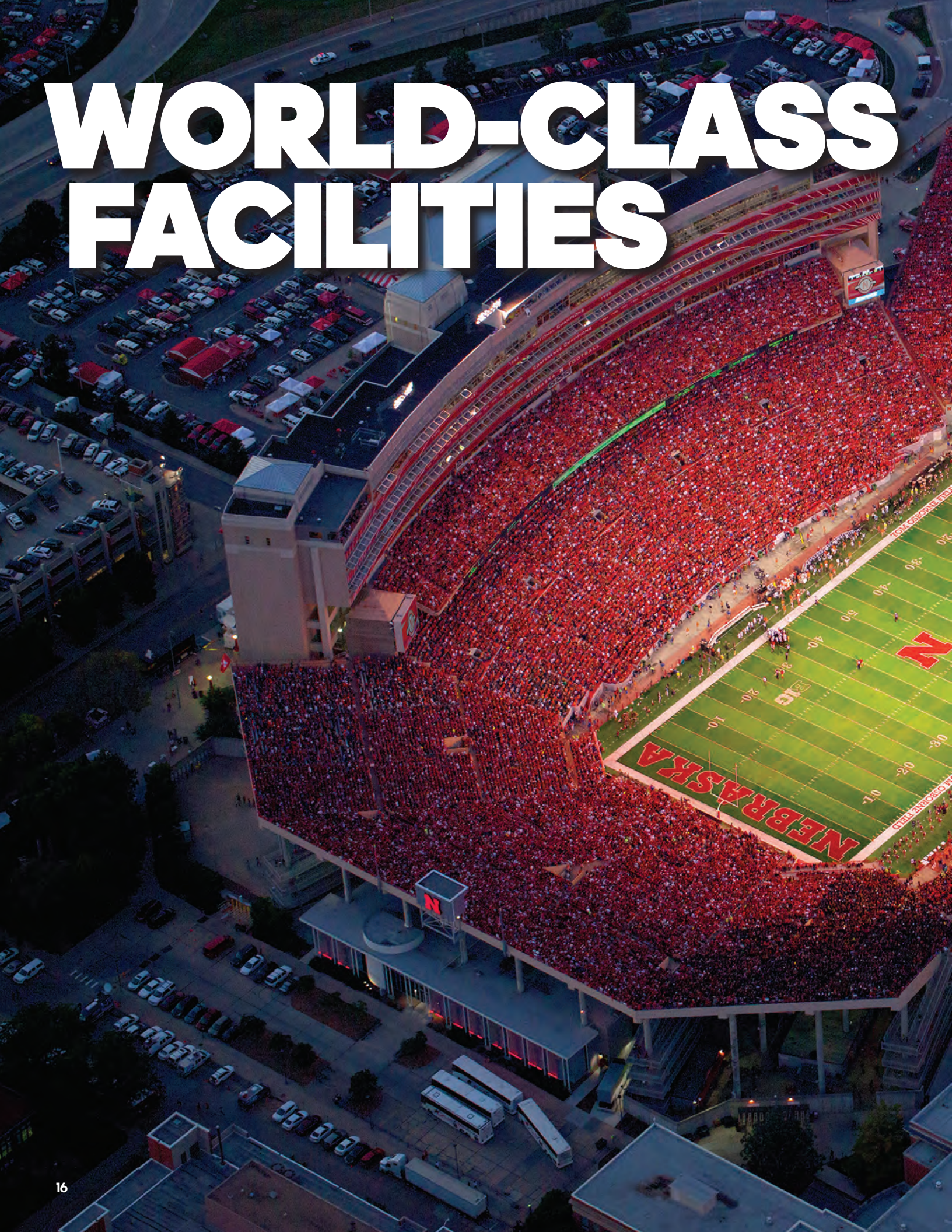
Nebraska has four, full-time registered dietitians on staff who help athletes navigate the managed food supply that is served at each meal. The registered dietitians also orchestrate meals on the road for teams and offer fueling solutions before and after workouts or competition. This attention to detail helps get those critically timed sources of fuel and fluids that hard-working muscles require in just the right amounts. To make fueling convenient when training, there are two locations adjacent to the weight rooms where grab-and-go nutrition support is available to all student-athletes.

With over six decades of collective experience, the performance nutrition staff is very knowledgeable on topics including how to help drug-tested athletes avoid inadvertent adverse analytical findings (AAFs/positive drug test) that can result from adulterated dietary supplements.

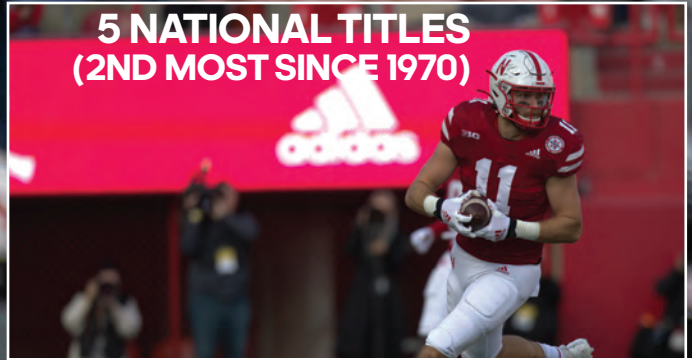

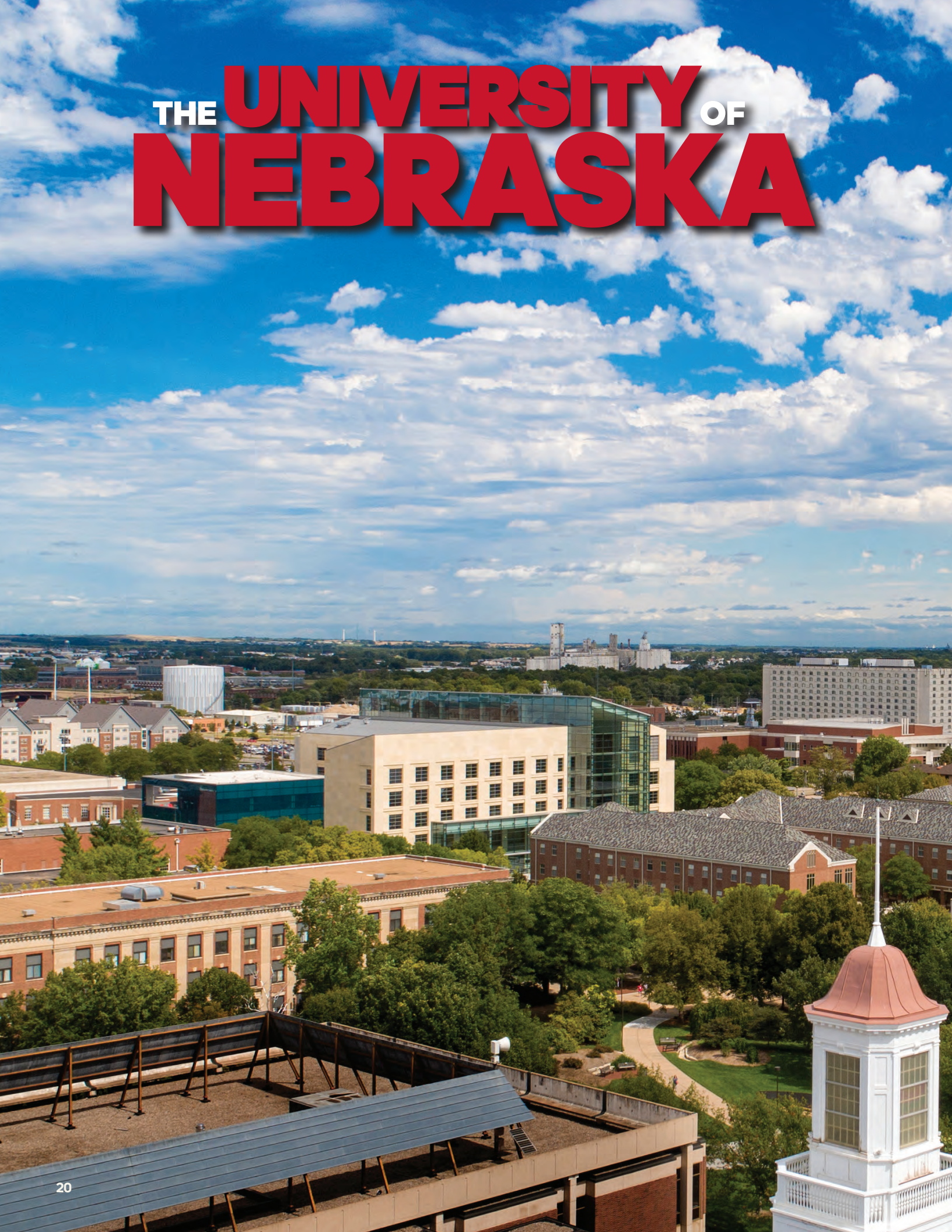

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

Chartered in Lincoln by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a university system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. The flagship University of Nebraska–Lincoln is an educational institution of international stature. Nebraska is classified within the Carnegie “R1: Doctoral Universities – Highest Research Activity” category. Nebraska is also a land-grant university and a member of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. The university is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska–Lincoln is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The Big Ten Academic Alliance and the institutions together have annual research expenditures topping \$11.5 billion — more than the Ivy League and the University of California System combined — and they educate a total of nearly 600,000 students with approximately 50,000 faculty members.

Paul Klempa begins his fourth season leading the Husker bowling program in 2022-23, as he was tabbed to replace legendary coach Bill Straub on Sept. 3, 2019.

Klempa, who has been a part of the Husker program since it was elevated to varsity status in 1997, has been instrumental in building Nebraska bowling into a dynasty over the past quarter century. Since becoming an NCAA sport in 2004, the Huskers have won a nation-leading six national titles and finished runner-up on four more occasions.

Klempa spent 22 seasons as an assistant, serving a majority of the 2013-14 season as NU's interim head coach, before taking over prior to the 2019-20 season. In his first three seasons as head coach, Klempa has put his own stamp on the program, coaching a pair of NTCA Bowlers of the Year, eight All-Americans and guiding the Huskers to the program's sixth NCAA title in 2021.

In 2022, the Huskers put together a dominant regular season and qualified for the NCAA Championships as the No. 2 overall seed. NU won five tournaments on the year and placed in the top three teams in eight of nine events. Sophomore Kayla Verstraete earned second-team NTCA All-America honors, while Cassidy Ray and Kendyl Hofmeister both earned honorable-mention accolades. Ray, a three-time All-American, was lauded for her efforts in the community as one of three Heart and Soul winners at the annual Night at the Lied event.

The 2021 season continued the Huskers' success under Klempa, as the program won its sixth NCAA title and first since 2015. Crystal Elliot was named NCAA Tournament MVP and NTCA Player of the Year, as she ranked in the top three nationally in traditional average and baker frame average. Verstraete and Ray also earned All-America honors, while NU posted top-five finishes in all six tournaments. Klempa was named the NTCA National Coach of the Year for his efforts.

While Klempa's first season was shortened by the COVID-19 pandemic, the Huskers finished the season ranked third nationally, while Raquel Orozco was named NTCA Division I Bowler of the Year and was selected as Nebraska's Female Student-Athlete of the Year.

Klempa's association with the Nebraska bowling program dates back to 1992. After a collegiate career in which he earned All-America honors as a senior in 1994, Klempa remained in Lincoln and was hired as the Huskers assistant coach in 1997 - the first season bowling became a varsity sport at Nebraska.

During his tenure at Nebraska, Klempa has helped guide the Huskers to eight national championships - including back-to-back NCAA titles in 2004 and 2005, and NCAA championships in 2009, 2013, 2015 and 2021. In the 18 years that the NCAA has sponsored bowling, Nebraska is the only program to have qualified for the NCAA Championship in every season. He has tutored eight National Collegiate Bowlers of the Year, 36 bowlers who have combined for 74 NTCA All-America awards and 14 student-athletes who went on to represent various national teams.

A native of Johnstown, N.Y., Klempa graduated from Nebraska in 1994 with a degree in psychology. He owns several 300 games and 800 series in his decorated career, has represented Nebraska in the U.S. Open and is also a State Match Game champion. Klempa and his wife, Leanna, reside in Lincoln and have two sons, Jake and Carter.

Former Husker great Julia Bond is in her second season on the Nebraska bowling coaching staff after rejoining the program in September of 2021.

Bond made a significant impact in her first season, as Nebraska earned top-three finishes in eight of nine regular-season events, including five tournament titles. The five tournament wins were NU's highest total since winning six events during the 2017-18 season. She also tutored three bowlers to NTCA All-America honors.

Bond, a four-time All-American as a collegian, returned to her alma mater after winning three events on the Professional Women's Bowling Association in 2021, highlighted by United States Bowling Congress Queens for her first career major. She has also been a member of Team

USA since 2017 and earned a silver medal at the 2022 World Games in Birmingham, Ala., this summer. Before turning professional in 2018, she won the 2017 U.S. Amateur and was the runner-up the following year.

As a Husker, Bond enjoyed one of the most decorated careers in program history. She is one of only five bowlers in school history to be a four-time NTCA All-American since the program earned varsity status in 1997-98. Bond finished her career third in career average (210.092), won six individual event titles and posted 21 top-five finishes in 49 career events. A three-time first-team NTCA All-American, she was named the Most Outstanding Bowler at the 2015 NCAA Championships in helping the Huskers to an NCAA title. She was a two-time NCAA All-Tournament selection, helping the Huskers to a national title and a pair of NCAA runner-up finishes during her four seasons as a Husker.

Bond, who graduated from Nebraska in 2019 with a degree in forensic science, also shined in the classroom. She was a two-time NTCA Scholastic All-American (2015-16) and a three-time Academic All-Big Ten selection (2016-17-18). She was a nine-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll.

In her role with the Bulls, Armstead serves as the sport administrator for men's and women's basketball, and had previous sport oversight of softball, men's soccer, women's tennis and as the secondary sport administrator for football. Armstead also oversaw several USF student-athlete support departments, including academic services, student-athlete enhancement, sports medicine, nutrition, sport psychology, student rights and responsibilities and Title IX.

Bob Burton joined the Huskers in 1998 and serves as Executive Associate Athletic Director. Burton handles the facilities master plan for the athletic department, is the liaison to Haymarket Park, working with the Lincoln Saltdogs, he helps set the budget for field and stadium operation costs and create strategic plans for the facility. Burton is also the sport administrator for the bowling, men's and women's gymnastics, men's and women's golf, swimming and diving and wrestling programs.

Burton also oversees multiple support areas within the athletic department, including facilities and maintenance, capital planning and construction, event management, computing services and concessions. He also serves on the Big Ten Sports Management Committee.

Burton joined the athletic department in 1998 as an associate athletic director for compliance/sports administration. He served in that role until 2007, ensuring that the conduct and operations of Nebraska's athletic teams were in compliance with NCAA, Big 12 and institutional rules and regulations. He also performed as the primary sports administrator for many of Nebraska's teams.

Burton filled a similar position at Oklahoma State as the assistant athletic director for sports administration and compliance from 1993 to 1997. He oversaw OSU's Olympic sports programs as well as the training and strength and conditioning, wrestling, men's and women's track and field and men's and women's tennis programs.

Burton came to Nebraska from Texas Tech, where he served as an associate athletic director for compliance for one year. While at Texas Tech, Burton helped complete the NCAA investigation into the Red Raider athletic department and analyzed the entire compliance system at the institution. He also helped identify and implement financial aid and eligibility systems, including changes in personnel and restructuring of the compliance department.

Burton, who was a member of the NCAA Division I women's soccer committee for three years and was a member of the NCAA Division I bowling committee, served as a legislative administrator for the NCAA from 1989 to 1993. At the NCAA, he was involved in the development of legislation, interpretation of regulations and reviewed legal issues related to the application of the association's regulations. He served as an NCAA liaison to committees and conducted comprehensive education to several intercollegiate athletic conferences. He has served on the National Association of Athletic Compliance Coordinators Executive Committee and the subcommittee of Big 12 Directors of Compliance.

He received his bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in 1985 and his juris doctorate from the Nebraska College of Law in 1989. A native of Falls City, Neb., Burton and his wife, Krista, have a daughter, Elly Kathryn, and sons Robert Falk, McClain John and Abram Lawslo.

SEASON OUTLOOK

The Nebraska bowling team enters the 2022-23 season with a sense of excitement and a hunger to return to the top of college bowling.

Last season, the Huskers won five regular-season tournaments – their highest total since 2018 – but fell short of repeating as NCAA champions for the seventh time.

Coach Paul Klempa, who begins his fourth season at the helm of the Husker program, returns a veteran roster which features five letterwinners among their eight returnees. It is an experienced group with four bowlers who have been in the Husker program for at least three seasons. The group is led by a trio of All-Americans in junior Kayla Verstraete (2021-22) and seniors Kendyl Hofmeister (2022) and Crystal Elliott (2021). That group is supplemented by seniors Amara Smith Speights and Gwen Maeha, who have been in the lineup at different points of their careers. They will join Hofmeister as the three captains this season.

For Klempa, having that experience is important, as four of the 10 Huskers on the roster have yet to compete in a college tournament.

“I think it is important,” Klempa said. “I think having our three captains will be able to help us break them in and help to manage their expectations. Fortunately, Anna (Callan), Marissa (Cosentini) and Alexis (Buchert) have traveled with the team and been to those tournaments and know how these things function, although they have not competed.”

The Huskers also add a pair of talented freshmen in Jillian Martin, who is considered the top recruit in college bowling in recent seasons, and Kathryn Bowman, a two-time Dexter All-American. Martin and Anna Callan, who redshirted last year, both are members of Junior Team USA.

“I feel good about all of the returnees we have, and feel like we have some stability there,” Klempa said. “With the addition of Kathryn (Bowman) and Jillian (Martin), we feel like we have some good young talent that is hungry. That changes the dynamic of the team and makes it fun to watch. I’m looking forward to seeing how our young bowlers can take the college bowling world by storm.”

The Huskers will rely on the experience of a four-member senior class of Crystal Elliott, Kendyl Hofmeister, Gwen Maeha and Amara Smith Speights.

Elliott returns to anchor the Huskers’ lineup for the third straight season. Last season, Elliott posted six top-20 finishes and averaged a 199.6 over 50 traditional games. She enjoyed her best performance at the Track Kat Klash, averaging a season-best 225.6 over five games, including a 298, on

her way to runner-up honors. She also turned in a strong performance at the Rochester Regional, averaging a team-best 213.5 over four games. Elliott is a proven performer who was the NTCA Bowler of the Year and NCAA Championship MVP in 2021. The Husker coaches believe that she is in a good position to enjoy a strong bounce back season and return to her All-American form.

“I think she’s really ready to maybe have the best season she’s had since she’s gotten here,” Klempa said. “She’s playing at a real high level.”

Hofmeister returns to the lineup after earning NTCA All-America honors for the first time in 2021-22. She was one of the Huskers most consistent performers, averaging a 207.7 in 43 traditional games and garnered four top-10 finishes. Hofmeister raised her average by more than 12 pins per game and paced NU in spare percentage in Baker matches.

“Kendyl was very solid for us last season and led us statistically across the board and was deserving of All-America honors,” Klempa said. “Our expectation for her is to continue that type of pace and development. She has been practicing very well and is someone who is very dependable and is someone we can use in our leadoff spot. No matter where we put her in the lineup, she will be ready.”

Maeha is another fifth-year senior who has been a valuable role player in the Husker lineup. She saw the most playing time of her career in 2021-22, averaging a 202.3 over 19 games, as she raised her traditional average by more than six pins per game over the previous season. Maeha, who saw limited time as a true freshman before taking a redshirt season, has been dedicated on improvement, and its been evident in her development. That work ethic is one of the reasons she was picked as a captain this year.

“The last two years she has truly bloomed,” Klempa said after she took a redshirt season in 2019-20. “She has consistently been developing and was a solid contributor for us last season. She’s been bowling at a really high level this year, and we hope she can pick up where she was at the end of last season.”

Smith Speights returns for her fourth season and looks to expand her role this year. She was tabbed as one of three captains and has postseason experience as she competed during the Huskers 2021 NCAA title run. Last year, she averaged a career-best 196.5 in eight traditional games. She has played in 14 events during her college career and has worked hard to make the 2022-23 season her best.



Two-time All-American Kayla Verstraete averaged a team high 212.0 in 45 games in 2021-22 and placed in the top 20 in all nine events last season.

SEASON OUTLOOK

"She is in her fourth year here and is a captain and the other girls look up to her," Klempa said. "The thing I appreciate about Amara is while she isn't always in the lineup, when her number is called, she is always ready. She has worked hard over the summer and has her game in really good shape. She is playing at a high level, and I feel confident about her ability to help this team."

Verstraete was one of the nation's top bowlers last season, earning All-America honors for the second straight season. She averaged a 212.0 in 45 traditional games while collecting five top-10 finishes. She closed the regular season by averaging at least 215.0 in NU's last four tournaments, capped by a season-best 228.6 average at the Big Red Invitational. Verstraete has eight top-10 finishes in 14 career events as a Husker, and the coaching staff believes that she has more untapped potential.

"We've worked with her over the summer and during the semester in trying to kick her game to another level," Klempa said. "We are striving for her to be more versatile with her shots and adding those tools will help her game improve."

After returning its entire NCAA lineup a year ago, NU will look to a strong crop of young bowlers to help fill in the lineup this season. The group consists of third-year sophomores Alexis Buchert and Marissa Cosentini, redshirt freshman Anna Callan and newcomers Kathryn Bowman and Jillian Martin. They will have ample opportunities to make an impact on the 2022-23 Huskers' fortunes.

Buchert made her Husker debut in the Track Kat Klash in her native Texas last season. She bowled nine frames in NU's Baker lineup and averaged 22.67 pins per frame.

"Alexis is really driven and wants to succeed and help our program," Klempa said. "She has really worked to make her game solid, and everyone that watches her has been impressed with how good her game is now, and the approach she takes to things. I am looking for her to help us and be a contributor this year."

Cosentini traveled with the Huskers last season, but did not get into any tournaments for the Big Red. A three-time all-state honoree in high school, Cosentini could challenge for playing time this fall.

"Marissa is playing the strongest that she has since coming to Nebraska," Klempa said. "She is hungry to get her game in good playing shape and is throwing it the strongest she has in her time here."

Callan looks to follow a similar development track as Hofmeister and Verstraete, as both bowlers used their redshirt year to adapt to the college ranks before developing into All-Americans. An accomplished high school bowler, Callan capped her redshirt year by winning the U20 title at the 2022 Junior Gold Championships. That performance earned her a spot on the Junior USA team, and Klempa hopes it springboards her into a strong campaign.

"Anna made the most of her redshirt year as she traveled with the team and worked on making improvements," Klempa said. "She made her game so much stronger than when she arrived on campus and it culminated in her win at the Junior Gold Championships over the summer. I am looking for big things out of her this year."

Bowman enters the college ranks after a decorated prep career. She was one of the nation's top high school bowlers, earning Dexter All-America honors in each of the last two seasons and was captain of the team as a senior. A three-time sectional champion, Bowman was also the valedictorian of her high school class, and that dedication to excellence will benefit her as she begins her college career.

"The thing that stands out about Kathryn is that she is coachable and easy to work with," Klempa said. "We are trying to work on some fundamentals to make her game better, and she has made nice progress in recent weeks. She will be competing for a spot on the travel roster, and she has the ability to be a strong contributor during her college career."

While Nebraska has had its share of collegiate bowlers of the year, none of them bring the resume to the college game that Martin has put together. A member of Junior Team USA since she was 14 years old, she is a two-time PBA Junior National Champion. Martin has competed on the Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour since 2019 as a non-member. She has a trio of top-three finishes on the tour, winning the PWBA BowlTV Classic as a 17-year-old. The coaches believe that Martin will make an immediate impact on the Husker roster.

"Jillian is not your typical college freshman bowler," Klempa said. "She is the first bowler to enter college with a PBWA title and is a superstar in the sport. She is really analytical about bowling and about her game and is working to shore up some things in her game so she is ready for our first event in mid-October. Jillian has been one of our top bowlers in our scrimmages and has unlimited potential."



Crystal Elliott was the 2021 NTCA Bowler of the Year and has five career top-five finishes. Elliott averaged a team-best 213.5 at the 2022 NCAA Rochester Regional.

2022-23 OUTLOOK

One of three returning All-Americans on the Husker roster, Crystal Elliott returns to anchor the Husker lineup in 2022-23. She looks to regain her 2020-21 form, when she posted four top-10 finishes in five events on her way to NTCA Player-of-the-Year honors. Elliott has a career 205.4 average during her time at Nebraska with five top-five finishes in 16 career tournaments.

2021-22 (JUNIOR)

Elliott anchored the Husker lineup for the second straight year, helping NU to five regular-season tournament titles. She posted five top-20 finishes while averaging a 199.58 over 50 traditional games. She enjoyed her best performance at the Track Kat Klash, averaging a season-best 225.6 over five games, including a 298, on her way to runner-up honors. She also turned in a strong performance at the Rochester Regional, averaging a team-best 213.5 over four games. In Baker format, Elliott ranked second on the team with an average of 20.80 per frame. Her 55.7 strike rate was best on the team and converted a team-best 70.2 percent of her spares while holding down the No. 5 spot in the lineup.

2021-22 (SOPHOMORE)

In her first season with the Huskers, Elliott was named the 2021 National Tenpin Coaches Association Bowler of the Year. Elliott was the eighth Husker to capture the award, and the first since Liz Kuhlkin in 2015. The 2021 Most Outstanding Player of the NCAA Championship match, Elliott led the team with a season average of 213.472, which placed her sixth all-time on NU's single-season list. Elliott finished the season with three top-five and four top-10 finishes highlighted by a third-place performance at the Mid-Winter Invite (228.33).

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Elliott competed at Duquesne University in 2019-20, where she was a four-time Northeast Conference Rookie of the Week. She bowled 25 traditional games for the Dukes, averaging 196.1. In all, 13 of her 25 games were over 200, including a pair of games over 240. Elliott was chosen as the NEC Bowler of the Week after averaging a 204.2 and being named the Mount Shootout MVP. Jillian Martin begins her college career as accomplished as anyone on the Nebraska roster. Martin has bowled on the Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour since 2019 as a non-member and has three top-three finishes. In 2021, she became the youngest bowler to win on the PBWA Tour, when she won the PBWA BowlTV Classic. A member of Junior Team USA since she was 14, Martin will look to make an immediate impact in Nebraska's lineup and could bid to become the fifth Husker to win NTCA Rookie of the Year.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

The top recruit in the 2022 class, Jillian Martin brings impressive credentials to the Husker program. Martin has competed as a non-member on the Professional Women's Bowling Association Tour since 2019. She won the 2021 PWBA BowlTV Classic, becoming the youngest bowler to ever win on the PWBA Tour. She also earned a runner-up finish at the 2021 PWBA ITRC Classic and placed third at the 2021 PWBA Hall of Fame Classic. Martin also competed at the 2019 PWBA East Hartford Open, where she placed 24th.

Martin is a two-time PBA Junior National Champion (2021-2022) and was the U18 Junior Gold Top Qualifier in both 2021 and 2022, bowling a 300 game at the 2021 event. She was also the top qualifier in the U20 Division in 2020 at the age of 14, making her the youngest female to make the Junior Team USA and the youngest to lead qualifying. Martin won a silver medal with Junior Team USA at the 2022 IBF World Championships. A three-year member of the Junior Team, Martin won the OHSAA state title in 2019 as a freshman. She tied for fifth at the Junior Gold Championships in both 2016 (U12) and 2018 (U15). Martin has double digit wins with the Elite Youth Tour, Storm Youth Championships and JTBA. Martin graduated with honors at Stow-Monroe Falls High School as she finished in the top 10 of her senior class. Martin chose Nebraska over Vanderbilt, McKendree, North Carolina A&T and Wichita State.

2021-22 SEASON REVIEW



The Huskers won five tournament titles in 2021-22, including the Big Red Invitational. NU posted eight top-three finishes in nine tournaments.

For the Nebraska bowling program, one bad weekend could not erase the success of the 2021-22 season.

While the Huskers fell short of their ultimate goal of a seventh NCAA title, it was a year of dominance for the Big Red. On the season, Nebraska went 84-29 on the season with five tournament titles in nine regular-season events. The five titles marked the most by a Husker team since 2017-18, as Nebraska posted top-three finishes in eight of nine tournaments during the regular season.

A trio of bowlers – Kayla Verstraete, Cassidy Ray and Kendyl Hofmeister – earned NTCA All-America honors for their efforts during the season. Verstraete and Ray were repeat selections, while Hofmeister earned the award for the first time.

Verstraete, a third-team selection, posted three top-five finishes and placed in the top 15 in seven of eight tournaments she competed in during the year. Her season was highlighted by a runner-up finish at the Columbia 300 Saints Invite with an average of 216.40. She was named to the All-Tournament team at the Prairie View Invitational, Columbia 300 Saints Invite and the Big Red Invitational.

Ray wrapped up her Husker career with her third certificate in 2022. The team co-captain averaged a 207.2 over nine tournaments and led NU with six top-10 finishes. Her best effort of the year was at the Big Red Invitational, where she placed third with an average of 234.4. Ray also excelled in the classroom and the community and was one of three Husker student-athletes awarded with the Heart and Soul Award at the 2022 Night at the Lied event.

Hofmeister made one of the biggest jumps on the team to capture All-America honors for the first time. She raised her season average by more than 12 pins, averaging a 207.8 over seven tournaments. Hofmeister was exceptionally consistent, finishing in the top 25 of all seven tournaments she competed in, highlighted by a sixth-place finish in the Bearcat Hammer Open.

The Huskers opened the season by winning all three of their tournaments during the fall season. At the Bearcat Hammer Classic, Nebraska posted 4-3 Baker match victories over Arkansas State and host McKendree, while Ray and Hofmeister earned spots on the all-tournament team. In the Track Kat Clash, the Huskers posted their second straight title defeating Sam Houston in the title match. Crystal Elliott led the Big Red with a runner-up finish en route to all-tournament honors. One week later, NU returned to the winner's circle, defeating McKendree in the championship game on the Motiv Ladyjack Classic.

The second half of the Huskers' season saw NU post three straight top-three finishes before picking up their fourth tournament title at the Mid-Winter Invitational. That weekend, the Huskers won all three matches in bracket play and won by more than 400 pins over runner-up Wisconsin Whitewater.

Nebraska returned home for its annual Big Red Invitational, which saw the Big Red put on a show in front of the home fans and a national TV audience, as NU's final match was televised by the Big Ten Network. NU averaged a 224.1 over the weekend to win its fifth event of the year, while Ray and Verstraete both earned spots on the all-tournament team for their efforts.

The Huskers headed into postseason as the No. 2 overall seed and headed to Rochester, N.Y., for regionals, but would run into trouble. Wilmington (Del.) University stunned the Huskers 2-0 in the Mega Match format in the opening round, putting NU one loss away from elimination. Similar to last season when NU lost in the opening round, the Huskers battled back with 2-0 wins over Sacred Heart and Wilmington to face Fairleigh Dickinson with a berth to nationals on the line. Unfortunately for the Big Red, the Huskers saw their season with a loss to Fairleigh Dickinson, ending Nebraska's bid for back-to-back national championships.

NEBRASKA BOWLING: UNMATCHED CHAMPIONSHIP TRADITION

In its 25 years as a varsity sport, Nebraska has become one of the top programs in the nation, winning eight national titles, including six NCAA Championships. Under Paul Klempa, who succeeded legendary coach Bill Straub in 2019, the Huskers have continued that dominance, winning a national title in 2021 and having back-to-back bowlers named the NTCA Division I Player of the Year in 2020 and 2021.

In 2021, the Huskers rebounded from losing its opening match to win seven straight matches en route to the program's first NCAA title since 2015. Crystal Elliott was named the tournament's Most Outstanding Player, capping a season where she also won NTCA Bowler of the Year. In 2020, Raquel Orozco was named the 2020 NTCA Division I Player of the Year, as the Huskers were in contention for the national crown before the season was cut short by the COVID-19 pandemic.

Straub built a legacy of success in his time at Nebraska bowling, winning seven national championships, including five NCAA titles since capturing the inaugural crown in 2004. Once bowling became an NCAA-sanctioned sport in the fall of 2003, the Huskers won back-to-back titles in 2004 and 2005 and captured another in 2009. The Huskers again added to their trophy case in 2013. After a runner-up finish in 2014, the Huskers stormed to their nation-leading fifth NCAA crown in 2015, behind National Tenpin Coaches Association Player of the Year Elizabeth Kuhlkin and NCAA Championship Most Valuable Bowler Julia Bond.

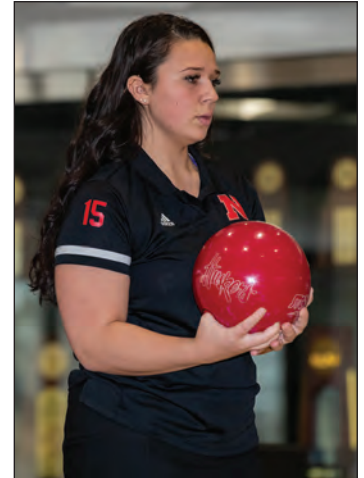
Nebraska has won 116 tournament titles in 242 competitions through the 2021-22 campaign including eight national championship tournaments. Straub and Klempa have created a dynamic foundation for Nebraska's success. With a world-wide approach to recruiting, Nebraska bowlers have been well-represented in national and international competitions.

A total of 14 Husker bowlers have qualified for their national teams, including U.S. National Team members Shannon Pluhowsky, Diandra Asbaty (Hyman), Brenda Edwards, Kayla Johnson, Elise Bolton, Elizabeth Kuhlkin and most recently Julia Bond. Recent Huskers Danielle van der Meer (Netherlands), Valerie Calberry (Canada), Shalima Zalsha (Indonesia), Tan Yan Ling (Singapore), Andrea Ruiz (Colombia), Bethany Hedley (England) and Alexandra Mosquera (Colombia) all have earned spots on their national team.

While the Husker team accomplishments have been paramount, numerous bowlers have also enjoyed individual success. NU has had at least one All-American in each of the last 29 years, dating back to the bowling club

program days. Since 1989, 37 Huskers have combined for a total of 81 All-America awards, while Kim Berke (1992), Diandra Hyman (2000), Shannon Pluhowsky (2001, 2004, 2005), Lindsay Baker (2006), Amanda Burgoyne (2007), Cassandra Leuthold (2010), Elizabeth Kuhlkin (2015), Raquel Orozco (2020) and Crystal Elliott (2021) were each chosen as the National Collegiate Bowler of the Year.

Nebraska has provided the vision of the future for collegiate bowling, championing the sport at the national level through its club program days. Straub and Klempa teamed for the first year of bowling as a varsity sport at Nebraska in 1977-98. The first year was historic in several respects, but most important was granting of the first full scholarship in the sport's history to Jennifer Daugherty, who went on to earn first-team All-America honors in both 1998 and 1999. In the 18 seasons that the NCAA has sanctioned bowling, Nebraska is the only program to qualify for the NCAA Championship every season.

As faculty athletics representative, Fuess serves as a liaison between the Office of the Chancellor and Athletic Department. He also serves on the Athletic Department's Executive Staff. Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, and as the national program leader for animal production research for the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and executive secretary of the White House's interagency working group on animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council. The half-time position - which was restructured to an expected term of five years - reports directly to Chancellor Ronnie Green and consults with Athletic Director Trev Alberts. He splits time between faculty representative duties and academic responsibilities.

Fuess, the Steinhart Distinguished Professor of Business and former chair of the College of Business' economics department, has worked at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since 1986. He serves on the Faculty Senate's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, having chaired the committee for 2018-19 and a sub-committee in 2017-18. He also has served on numerous Big Ten Conference committees, including the Sports Management Committee, the Compliance and Reinstatement Committee and the Legislative Review Committee.

Fuess earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Delaware, as well as master's and doctoral degrees from Purdue University. His research interests are labor economics, the economics of collegiate sports, and the economy of Japan. He has earned numerous "Distinguished Teaching" awards. In 2016 he received the UNL College of Business "Distinguished Service" award.

He is a past-president of both the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) and the National Block and Bridle Club and has served in several leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, National Pork Board, National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences, Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities, and Alpha Gamma Rho national fraternity. He currently is a member of several boards, including the Big Ten Council of Presidents and Chancellors, Neogen Corporation, and Supporters of Agricultural Research. He is a member of the Presidential Forum of the NCAA representing the Big Ten Conference, an inaugural member of the NCAA Division I Board Infractions Process Committee and was recently named a member of the Blue-Ribbon Panel of the National Academies to look at Enhancing Land Grant Coordination and Cooperation. He was named a fellow of ASAS in 2014 and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2015. In 2017 Dr. Green was honored with the American Society of Animal Science's Morrison Award, the highest international academic recognition for an animal scientist.

Ted Carter became the eighth president of the University of Nebraska on Jan. 1, 2020, following a national search by the Board of Regents.

As president, Carter leads a four-campus university system that enrolls nearly 52,000 students and employs 16,000 faculty and staff on campuses in Lincoln, Omaha and Kearney, plus academic divisions and research and extension centers across the state. He serves as chief spokesman and chief executive officer for the system, which operates on a \$2.8 billion annual budget and includes a flagship Big Ten institution, a world-renowned academic health sciences center,

Division I athletics programs, and preeminent institutes focused on water and agriculture, national security and defense, infectious disease and early childhood education.

Carter brought with him a distinguished record in education, partnerships and military service, having come to Nebraska from the U.S. Naval Academy, his alma mater, where he served as superintendent. Under his leadership, the Naval Academy achieved a No. 1 national ranking and new records in student success and diversity. Carter previously was president of the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, R.I. A retired Vice Admiral with 38 years of service, Carter has logged more than 6,300 flying hours and holds the American record for carrier-arrested landings.

In his first year at the University of Nebraska – faced with the unexpected and unprecedented challenges presented by COVID-19 – Carter led with a focus on the land-grant priorities of access and opportunity for students and families. He launched the Nebraska Promise, a financial aid program guaranteeing free tuition for low- and middle-income Nebraskans, and implemented a multi-year budget plan that included a two-year, across-the-board tuition freeze. The result was system-wide growth in enrollment, including record gains among underrepresented students.

Carter oversaw the awarding of a \$92 million federal contract for the university's National Strategic Research Institute, one of only 14 University-Affiliated Research Centers in the country conducting exclusive research for the Department of Defense. During Carter's tenure, the NU system has been ranked among the world's top 100 institutions for earning research patents, the Omaha campus was selected as the home for a new federal counterterrorism research center, the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources launched a new effort focused on rural vitality, and the medical center opened an education, training and preparedness facility that positions Nebraska as the world leader in the fight against infectious disease.

Carter holds a courtesy faculty appointment in aviation in the College of Public Affairs and Community Service at the University of Nebraska at Omaha. He serves as the chair of the Daugherty Water for Food Global Institute's Board of Directors and is a board member for the Greater Omaha Chamber of Commerce, the Nebraska Chamber of Commerce and Industry, the Naval Historical Foundation and the Naval Aviation Museum Foundation. Carter is also a member of the Aspen Institute's Higher Education Working Group and the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities' Council of Presidents. He is an ex-officio member on the board of the University of Nebraska Foundation, the philanthropic partner of the university system that has a \$1.7 billion endowment.

Carter earned his bachelor's degree in physics and oceanography from the U.S. Naval Academy, where he played hockey and served as team captain. He is a graduate of the Navy Fighter Weapons School (Top Gun) and holds educational credentials from the Navy Nuclear Power School, the U.S. Air Force Air War College, the Naval War College and the Armed Forces Staff College. Carter's military career includes service for the Carrier Strike Group Twelve, in which he commanded 20 ships, two nuclear-powered aircraft carriers, and two carrier wings that were deployed to Afghanistan and the Arabian Gulf.

The son of an English teacher, Carter was raised in the rural, one-high school town of Burrillville, R.I. He and his wife, Lynda, live in Lincoln and have two adult children, Brittany and Christopher.

UNIVERSITY BOARD OF REGENTS

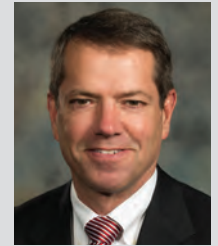

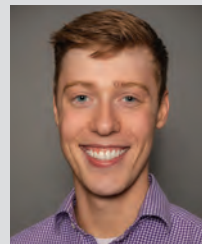

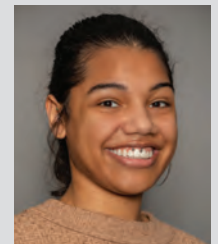

A veteran administrator and College Football Hall of Famer, Trev Alberts is entering his second year as Vice Chancellor, Director of Athletics at the University of Nebraska in 2022-23. Alberts, who was hired on July 14, 2021, returned to his alma mater after spending 12 years at Nebraska-Omaha, guiding the program through a successful transition to the Division I level.

In his first season at Nebraska in 2021-22, Alberts helped the Huskers navigate the ever-changing landscape of Name, Image and Likeness guidelines for the benefit

of Nebraska student-athletes. He led the development of the N-Vest Nebraska program to award \$5,980 per year to student-athletes who meet academic benchmarks.

Alberts also spearheaded the charge to complete the fundraising for Nebraska's Go Big Project, which will provide Nebraska football with a new facility scheduled to open in the summer of 2023. The project will also house academic, life skills, nutrition and support services for all Nebraska student-athletes.

A tireless worker who puts both the interests of student-athletes and fans first, Alberts helped orchestrate a qualitative survey of Nebraska's fan base to help shape the future of Memorial Stadium's game-day atmosphere.

Alberts has also focused much of his time on developing the first strategic plan for Nebraska Athletics in 15 years. He has also committed himself to providing intense support and a unifying vision for Nebraska's coaches across all sports.

Nebraska's athletic achievements in 2021-22 included top-five NCAA finishes from Husker volleyball, wrestling and men's gymnastics programs, while the NU women's basketball and softball teams enjoyed breakout seasons that concluded with trips to the 2022 NCAA Tournament. The women's track and field team added a 14th-place finish at the NCAA Outdoor Championships - its best showing since 2006.

Academically, Nebraska student-athletes continued to shine with a school-record 95 percent graduation rate across all sports.

Alberts' tenure leading UNO athletics was marked by successes in competition and in academics; by transitioning the university's athletic programs to NCAA Division I in 2011; and by establishing new homes for many UNO athletics teams, including Baxter Arena, the Maverick Park baseball/softball complex and the soccer pitch at Caniglia Field.

Alberts took the bold step in announcing that Omaha would reclassify from Division II to Division I in all sports in 2011 and simultaneously securing conference affiliation with the Summit League for all of the department's then-Division II programs. His vision for UNO's reclassifying teams was demonstrated even before the four-year transition period had ended. The Omaha baseball team won back-to-back Summit League regular-season championships in 2013 and 2014, while the men's basketball team made its first Division I postseason appearance in 2014 with a berth in the CollegeInsider.com Postseason Tournament.

During UNO's time in the Division I ranks under Alberts tenure, the Mavericks had six teams and four student-athletes qualify for the NCAA Tournament, including hockey advancing to the Frozen Four in 2015 and men's soccer reaching the second round of the NCAA Tournament in the spring of 2021. He also expanded opportunities, adding men's golf and men's soccer in 2011, and Omaha began a men's swimming and diving program in 2021-22.



Throughout his tenure in Omaha, Alberts was focused on enhancing the student-athlete experience, including the construction and staffing of the Hamilton Academic Excellence Room and the development of the Ethel S. Abbott Student-Athlete Development Wing. Those efforts paid off in Nebraska-Omaha student-athletes posting consistent collective semester grade point averages above 3.3 for 18 consecutive semesters, including at least a 3.5 in each of his final three semesters.

The facilities around Omaha Athletics received a major uplift during his tenure. Maverick Park opened in March of 2021 to rave reviews as the home to the Mavericks' baseball and softball programs. Funding for the complex, which includes a 1,500-seat baseball facility and a 650-seat softball facility, were raised privately and provided both programs a permanent on-campus home for the first time.

Another crowning achievement was the opening of Baxter Arena in 2015. Alberts directed efforts to secure community support and funding to build the on-campus arena, which allowed the nationally prominent hockey program to play on campus and also serve as the home of the men's and women's basketball and volleyball programs. Caniglia Field underwent renovations in 2012, making it one of the finest collegiate soccer facilities in the country, highlighted by a FIFA 2-star rated playing surface and one of the largest LED videoboards in a soccer-only college facility.

Alberts' work on behalf of hockey, UNO's established Division I sport, also paid dividends. He successfully guided the Mavericks into the new National Collegiate Hockey Conference in 2013-14. The following year, Omaha reached the 2015 NCAA Frozen Four.

In addition, Alberts and his team led Omaha Athletics into a partnership with Learfield, a national leader in the marketing of collegiate athletics, and developed Omaha Sports Properties. As the exclusive corporate sponsorship sales unit for UNO Athletics, Omaha Sports Properties further enhanced revenue and increased brand prominence locally, regionally and nationally.

As part of UNO's reclassification to Division I, Alberts oversaw the rebranding of UNO athletics with new primary and secondary logos and a greater focus on strengthening the Maverick brand both regionally and nationally.

As a student-athlete, Alberts was an All-American on and off the football field as a Husker Blackshirt. He was Nebraska's first Butkus Award winner in 1993, helping Coach Tom Osborne's Huskers to an undefeated regular season and an Orange Bowl appearance against Florida State. A first-team All-American by every major publication in 1993, he was also the Football News National Defensive Player of the Year, the Big Eight Male Athlete of the Year, and the Big Eight Defensive Player of the Year. His No. 34 jersey was retired at the 1994 Red-White Spring Game. In 2015, he was elected to the College Football Hall of Fame.

Off the field, Alberts earned the NCAA's highest honor, The Today's Top Six Award. A three-time Academic All-Big Eight honoree, he was a CoSIDA Academic All-American in 1993. He graduated from Nebraska before his senior season.

Alberts was the fifth pick in the 1994 NFL Draft by the Indianapolis Colts and played for the Colts until 1996. Following his NFL career, he served as an analyst on college and professional football games for major national networks, including ESPN, CNN/SI and CBS Sports Network.

Alberts and his wife Angela have three children – Chase (and his wife, Cassie), Ashtynne and Breanna.
