The Huskers will host the annual Big Red Invitational at Hollywood Bowl in Lincoln from Feb. 26-28. NU has won the event four times in the past 11 years.

SCHEDULE NOTES

- Nebraska is set to compete in six regular-season tournaments in 2021, after not competing during the fall semester. The Huskers' six regular-season tournaments are the fewest in program history.
- Nebraska makes its first-ever appearance at the Penguin Classic on Jan. 15-17, while the Huskers have previously competed in the other five tournaments.
- Nebraska will host the Big Red Invitational at Hollywood Bowl in Lincoln from Feb. 26-28. NU has held the tournament in 10 of the past 11 seasons, winning four times and finishing no lower than fourth.
- Nebraska has won multiple tournament titles in each of the last eight seasons.
- The NCAA Championship will get new look for 2021, as the format was going to debut in 2020, but was not held because of the COVID-19 pandemic. The national committee will pick 16 teams which will be assigned to one of four regional sites. The four regional winners will advance to the national championship.

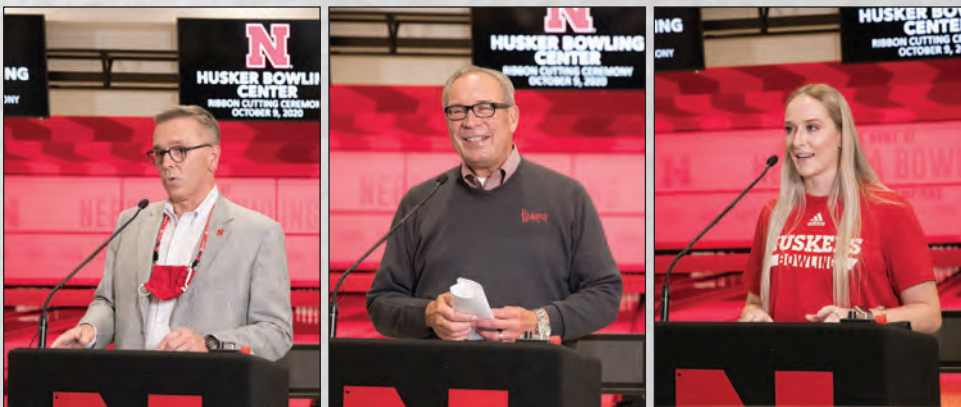

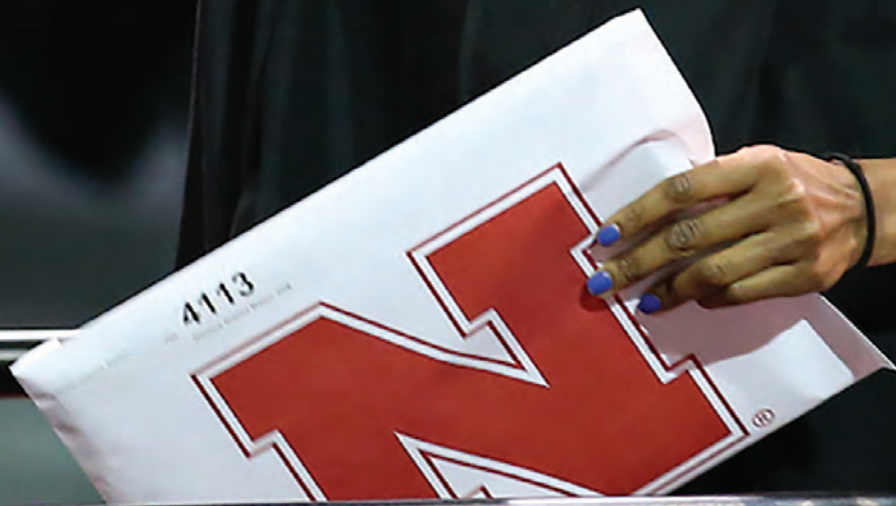

ACADEMIC COUNSELING

Eight academic counselors, three learning specialists, two assistant academic counselors and one computer specialist are in place to monitor daily academic progress, receive consistent course feedback, assist with the advising/registration process and monitor eligibility and progress toward graduation.

TUTORIAL SUPPORT

A tremendous resource for all academic abilities, unlimited tutorial support from approximately 75-100 tutors on staff is available from day one up to college graduation in all subject areas. The tutorial program is certified as a model tutoring program by the College Reading and Learning Association.

STUDY HALL

Nebraska's study hall program is housed in the Scott Technology Center within the Student Life Complex. Student-athletes attend a supervised, flex-time study hall that features day, evening and weekend hours. Student-athletes are required to complete a specific number of study hours each week as determined by their academic counselor and/or coach. Additional performance-based or tutor-based study hall also may be determined by the academic counselor.

MENTORING

Academic support staff serve as mentors to all incoming student-athletes and select returning student-athletes. The student-athletes meet with their mentor weekly to develop time management skills, gather and report academic progress information and discuss academic success strategies.

EDUCATIONAL ASSESSMENTS

Assessments are administered upon the request of the student-athlete, academic counselor, or coach. Learning specialists are available to administer and score informal assessments, which include a reading comprehension and a writing assessment. When more in-depth assessments are necessary, referrals are made to a consulting neuropsychologist who conducts the assessments. If it is determined a student-athlete has a learning disability or another medical condition that impedes the student from reaching their academic potential, appropriate accommodations are implemented by the Office of Services for Students with Disabilities.

STUDENT-ATHLETE ORIENTATION

Each new student-athlete attends an orientation at the beginning of their academic career. Student-athletes are introduced to staff, faculty, administrators, and a variety of resources that help facilitate the transition into college while enhancing awareness of support services in the Athletic Department and across campus.

PERSONAL COUNSELING

Student-athletes will find a supportive and caring environment at Nebraska. Transitional issues, stress management, time management, academic focus and problem resolution are all addressed in a proactive manner throughout the year. If necessary, counseling referrals are also made to designated practitioners.

COMPUTER RESOURCES

New laptops are provided to all student-athletes for use during their academic career at Nebraska. The Herman Student Life Complex has printers and desktop computers available for student-athletes to use in the facility.

THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

Chartered in Lincoln by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a university system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. The flagship University of Nebraska-Lincoln is an educational institution of international stature. Nebraska is classified within the Carnegie "R1: Doctoral Universities – Highest Research Activity" category. Nebraska is also a land-grant university and a member of the Association of Public and Land-grant Universities. The university is accredited by the Higher Learning Commission.

Paul Klempa begins his second season as Nebraska’s bowling coach, as he succeeded legendary coach Bill Straub on Sept. 3, 2019.

Klempa continued the Huskers’ tradition of success during his inaugural campaign, as Nebraska won four tournaments and finished the season ranked third in the nation before the postseason was canceled by COVID-19. Raquel Orozco highlighted the Huskers’ efforts, as she was named the NTCA Division

I Player of the Year and captured first-team All-America honors for the third straight year, while Cassidy Ray also earned All-America honors.

Klempa was the perfect choice to succeed Straub, who built Nebraska bowling into a national power. The pair helped Nebraska win seven national titles, including five NCAA championships, since becoming a varsity sport in 1997-98. Klempa was Straub’s top assistant for 22 years, serving as interim head coach for a majority of the 2013-14 season.

“Paul Klempa has been a leader in Nebraska Bowling since before it became a varsity sport. He has helped lay the foundation for the country’s most successful program,” Nebraska Athletic Director Bill Moos said in announcing Klempa’s hiring. “Paul was integral in building the program, has proven that he has what it takes to lead the team to success, and has earned the opportunity to take our program to even greater heights in the years to come.”

Klempa’s association with the Nebraska bowling program dates back to 1992. After a collegiate career in which he earned All-America honors as a senior in 1994, Klempa remained in Lincoln and was hired as the Huskers’ assistant coach in 1997 - the first season bowling became a varsity sport at Nebraska.

During his tenure as a coach at Nebraska, Klempa has helped guide the Huskers to seven national championships - including back-to-back NCAA titles in 2004 and 2005, along with NCAA crowns in 2009, 2013 and 2015. Nebraska has finished first or second nine times at the NCAAs since 2004. In the 17 years that the NCAA has sponsored bowling, Nebraska is the only program to have qualified for the NCAA Championship in every season.

Klempa has tutored numerous bowlers who earned All-America honors during their careers and 12 student-athletes who went on to represent various national teams.

Klempa served as interim head coach for the Nebraska bowling team for much of the 2013-14 season, while Straub recovered from a medical issue. Klempa led the Huskers to a pair of tournament titles and a No. 2 national ranking. He led the Huskers to their 11th straight NCAA Championship appearance.

Klempa helped guide Nebraska to its fifth NCAA title in 2015. Liz Kuhlkin was named the National Collegiate Bowler of the Year, while Julia Bond was named the Most Outstanding Bowler in the NCAA Championship.

In 2018-19, Klempa helped the Huskers to an 11th straight semifinals appearance at the NCAA Tournament. Nebraska won two tournament titles throughout the season. Klempa helped produce three All-Americans, with Orozco and Meghan Straub earning first-team NTCA All-America honors and Allison Morris adding honorable-mention NTCA All-America accolades.

A native of Johnstown, N.Y., Klempa graduated from Nebraska in 1994 with a degree in psychology. He owns several 300 games and 800 series in his decorated career and has represented Nebraska in the U.S. Open and is also a State Match Game champion. Klempa and his wife, Leanna, reside in Lincoln and have two sons, Jake and Carter.

One of the greatest collegiate bowlers in NCAA history, Shannon Pluhowsky is in her second season as assistant head coach for the Nebraska bowling program. She made an impact on the Husker bowling program in her first year, helping Raquel Orozco earn national Bowler-of-the-Year honors, while Cassidy Ray became an All-American for the first time in 2020. Orozco's honor continued a tradition of bowling greats at Nebraska, and built upon the legacy Pluhowsky created during her playing days at Nebraska.

Pluhowsky was a three-time Bowler of the Year as a collegian, winning as a freshman in 2001 before collecting back-to-back honors in 2004 and 2005, as she powered Nebraska to the first two NCAA titles in history. She was both Bowler of the Year and National Collegiate Bowling Coaches Association (NCBCA) Rookie of the Year in 2001. A four-time National Tenpin Coaches Association (NTCA) All-American, Pluhowsky went on to an impressive professional and international career.

The native of Phoenix, Ariz., is a 20-time member of Team USA and was the U.S. Olympic Committee Bowler of the Year in 2004. She won a gold medal in trios at the 2018 PABCON Women's Championships, while adding bronze medals in singles, doubles and all-events, while helping



Team USA to a silver medal. She produced a dominant performance at the 2011 World Championships, capturing four gold medals (doubles, trios, team, Masters) for Team USA. She added golds at the 2014 PABCON Championships (team), 2015 Pan American Games (singles), 2016 PABCON Champion of Champions (doubles) and 2016 PABCON Women's Championships (trios, Masters).

As a professional on the PWBA Tour, Pluhowsky has claimed five professional titles, including major championships at the USBC Queens in Reno (2006) and the 2014 BPAA Women's All-Star in Rockford, Illinois. Most recently, Pluhowsky finished third at the 2019 QubicaAMF PWBA Players Championship.

In 2012, Pluhowsky was inducted into the World Bowling Writers Hall of Fame, after being named the World Bowling Writers Bowler of the Year for the second time. She was a member of the inaugural induction class of the Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015, and will be inducted into the Ohio Bowling Hall of Fame in 2021.

Before embarking on her pro career, Pluhowsky was the most dominant bowler in collegiate history. She powered Nebraska to national titles in 2001, 2004 and 2005. She was named the MVP of the first NCAA Championship in 2004, before bowling her way to the 2004 Collegiate Singles Championship.

After leading the Big Red to a national title by capturing Bowler of the Year and Rookie of the Year honors in 2001, Pluhowsky was named the 2002 World Bowling Writers' International Bowler of the Year. She was also the Bowling Journal International Amateur Bowler of the Year in 2002 after winning her first AMF Bowling World Cup Championship. She added her second AMF Bowling World Cup Championship in 2004, after taking runner-up honors in the event in 2003.

During her collegiate career, Pluhowsky claimed 12 individual tournament titles, including an NCAA-record individual tournament average of 254.30 at the 2004 Whitewater Invitational, and 25 top-five finishes for the Huskers.

A three-time U.S. Bowling Congress Junior Gold Champion (1999, 2000, 2001), Pluhowsky was named the World Bowling Writers Female Player of the Year in both 2002 and 2004. She was the U.S. Amateur Champion in 2001, 2003 and 2004.

Hart joined the Huskers staff after spending the 2016-17 season as the head strength and conditioning coach for the University of South Florida men's basketball program. He also led the USF women's basketball program in 2014-15 and 2015-16, helping the Bulls to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances.

Hart was a men's basketball player at Saint Leo University before graduating in 1998. Upon his graduation, Hart served as the head strength and conditioning coach for the Saint Leo Lions from 2008 through 2014. He was responsible for designing and coordinating in- and off-season workout programs for all of 19 sports. Hart hired, supervised and trained a staff of five at Saint Leo, and assisted the Certified Athletic Training staff with rehabilitation of student-athletes.

In addition to his role as a strength and conditioning coach, Hart also served as an assistant women's basketball coach for three seasons from 2008 to 2011, breaking down film for the team, coordinating travel plans and developing a recruiting base.

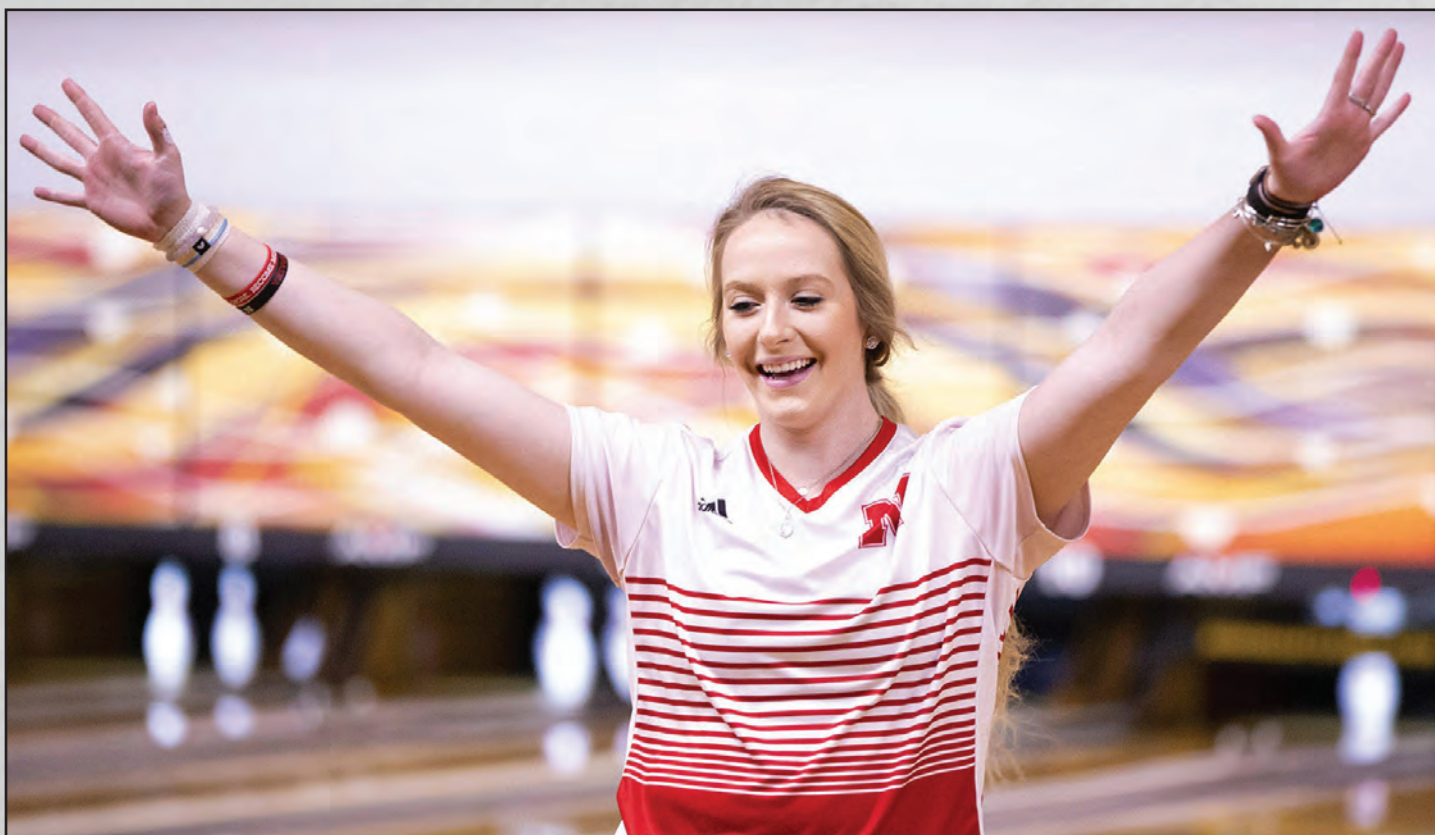

He served as an NCAA liaison to committees and conducted comprehensive education to several intercollegiate athletic conferences. He has served on the National Association of Athletic Compliance Coordinators Executive Committee and the subcommittee of Big 12 Directors of Compliance.

He received his bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in 1985 and his juris doctorate from the Nebraska College of Law in 1989. A native of Falls City, Neb., Burton and his wife, Krista, have a daughter, Elly Kathryn, and sons Robert Falk, McClain John and Abram Lawslo.

HUSKERS RELOAD IN QUEST FOR SIXTH NCAA TITLE

For Nebraska bowling Coach Paul Klempa, the 2020-21 season brings not only a newly renovated home, but new challenges as the Huskers look to contend for their sixth NCAA title.

In September, the Huskers moved back into their renovated Husker Bowling Center, their on-campus practice facility which includes the Specto data-tracking system, as well as upgraded team amenities.

Klempa also had revamp the Huskers' lineup after losing a trio of seniors who helped the Huskers to four tournament titles and a No. 3 national ranking when the 2019-20 season ended in March. Raquel Orozco was the 2020 National Bowler of the Year, while Allison Morris and Estefania Prieto were major contributors.

Despite the losses, this year's edition of the Husker bowling team is talented and potentially deeper squad than in past seasons. NU welcomes back six bowlers with experience in the Husker lineup, led by the veteran trio of Michelle Guarro, Leah Glazer and Cassidy Ray. That trio was selected as captains for the upcoming season and will help a roster that features eight freshmen and sophomores.

The pandemic has cut into the Huskers' schedule, as the team was unable to compete in fall tournaments where the staff usually gets a better grasp on this season's team. The shortened schedule makes practices more valuable for finding the best tournament lineups.

"We have a pretty competitive group," Klempa said. "It is a good mix, but what I told them is there are opportunities for playing time and travel. We will take the group that puts us in the best position to win, no matter what class they are in. With this season, I'm not shutting the door on anyone potentially helping us."

Guarro is one of the Huskers' most experienced bowlers, having competed in 19 tournaments over the past three seasons, including the 2019 NCAA Championships. Last season, she averaged a 191.8 in 16 traditional games. Guarro posted a season high of 238 at the Columbia 300 Saints Invitational en route to a 16th-place finish. She has raised her traditional average in each of her three seasons and has the ability to make another leap as a senior.

"Michelle has been a solid contributor for us during her career," Klempa said. "She has a lot of experience and is mature and level-headed. She is one of our team captains and her leadership will be needed with so much youth in the program. I am planning on Michelle being a regular starter for us this year."

Glazer made an immediate impact in her first season at Nebraska after transferring from Arkansas State. She bowled in all nine tournaments, averaging a 199.6 and posting a pair of top-10 finishes in 2019-20. She averaged a 200 or better in four tournaments, including a season-best of 214.4 at the Stormin' Blue and White Vegas Classic. Glazer earned honorable-mention All-America honors at Arkansas State in 2018, helping the Red Wolves qualify for the NCAA Championships.

"Leah has dealt with a lot over the past 18 months with an interim coach at her previous school and Coach Straub's retirement here, and it made it a challenge for her," Klempa said. "She has all those changes and unknowns behind her, and she is excited for this year. Leah is a captain and

leader in our program and has prepared well. I have a feeling it could be a really special year for her."

Ray returns to the Husker lineup after earning honorable-mention All-America honors as a sophomore. She was third on the team in scoring average (201.1), raising her average by more than 10 pins per game from the previous season. Ray recorded a pair of top-five tournament finishes, highlighted by a runner-up showing at the Track Kat Klash with a season-best average of 217.60. She is poised to put together an outstanding junior season for the Big Red.

"Cassidy made a significant leap last year and was a solid contributor and deserving of All-America honors," Klempa said. "She worked hard over the summer, once she was able to get back on the lanes and looked sharp in the fall. She has big goals for this season and will be an integral part of what we do. With such a young roster, Cassidy is one of our captains and will be counted on for leadership along with our seniors."

Amara Smith Speights was one of the rare freshmen to play a significant spot in the Husker lineup as a true freshman. She averaged a 192.2 in five tournaments in 2019-20 and posted a pair of top-20 finishes. She capped the year with her best performance, averaging a team-high 212.0 at the Music City Invitational to finish 11th overall. Smith Speights bowled her three highest scores of the season in the event, including a season-best 228, and the coaching staff believes that her trajectory will continue this winter.

"Being a starter as a freshman is a tough role, but Amara handled it really well and worked through the challenges," Klempa said. "She has a lot of potential and the sky is the limit for her. I would not be that surprised if she made one of the All-American teams this year, she is that good."

Kendyl Hofmeister was a regular on Nebraska's travel squad as a redshirt freshman, and saw time in seven tournaments. She was primarily used as a reserve in Baker Format, but was in the traditional lineup at the Track Kat Klash, where she averaged a season-high 194.50 in two games.

"Kendyl took advantage of the opportunities she had last season and really played well at times," Klempa said. "She learned a lot in terms of what it takes to be compete at this level and managing her emotions and staying composed. She returned this fall and has emerged as one of the top players on the team. Kendyl is poised to be a solid contributor to the lineup for us this season and in the future."

Alexa Fernández has been a solid reserve since joining the Husker program. A two-time member of the Costa Rican National Team, Fernández began her career at UAB in 2016-17, but has not been able to crack a talented Nebraska lineup. One of three seniors on the 2020-21 roster, the coaches are hopeful that Fernández makes a contribution this year.

"Alexa is in her third year of the program and has made some really

good strides in her game," Klempa said. "She is proving to be an asset to the program both on and off the lanes. We are lucky to have her with us."

Gwen Maeha is another veteran in the program who is making a strong push for playing time. A three-time Hawaiian state champion bowler, Maeha traveled to every tournament in 2018-19 and competed twice before taking a redshirt season last year. She impressed the Husker coaches with her dedication and improvement and will look to challenge for a spot in NU's regular lineup.

"She really worked on her game during her redshirt year and came back a much stronger bowler in the fall," Klempa said. "I told her recently that 'this is your time,' and she has a great mindset about coming out and competing. Her potential is really high."

Kayla Verstraete brings national-level experience to the Husker program and is ready to push for playing time after redshirting last year. She was a two-time state champion and the 2018 U.S. Singles Champion while leading her high school to three national titles.

"I think redshirting last year was really good for her to help her get adjusted to the college game," Klempa said. "Kayla is driven and really applied herself this summer to making herself a better bowler and that work is already paying off. She has a lot of potential, and I am looking for big things from her this season and beyond."

Crystal Elliott leads the newcomers, as she transferred to Nebraska after bowling at Duquesne last season. A four-time Northeast Conference Rookie of the Week, Elliott averaged a 196.1 last year in 25 traditional games, including a pair of games over 240. She is also a two-time Junior Team USA member and a four-time Gold Medalist at the 2019 Tournament of the America.

"She has a year of college bowling under her belt, but that pales to the experience she had before college on Junior Team USA and in national-level events," Klempa said. "She is very competitive and brings a very versatile game with a lot of power. I look for her to be a factor for us."

Alexis Buchert is three-time state tournament qualifier who won regional and district titles last season. A freshman from San Antonio, Texas, the coaches believe that her skillset will help make the transition to college bowling a smooth one.

"Alexis has the classic bowling style. Her simple approach to her game allows her to be one of the most consistent and steady performers on our team," Klempa said. "Alexis has a very bright future in our program, and I expect her to be a regular contributor in the near future."

Marissa Cosentini was one of the top high school bowlers on the East Coast, as she was a four-time Junior Gold qualifier and a two-time Teen Masters qualifier. A three-time all-state pick in New Jersey, she led the state in bowling average in 2019 and was tabbed for New Jersey's All-Decade bowling team in 2019.

"Marissa has a lot natural ability and has the potential to perform at a high level in college bowling," Klempa said. "She has a very high ceiling, and how quickly she adapts will determine who quickly she is able to contribute this season. We are happy she has joined our squad this season."

Alexia Cassman joined the team as a walk-on in October of 2019. A three-time all-state performer, Cassman will add depth to the roster in her first season as a Husker after bowling for the Husker club program during the 2019-20 season.

2020-21 (OUTLOOK)

Michelle Guarro (pronounced wah-RO) will be counted on as one of the Huskers' top returnees this season. Guarro brings experience to the NU lineup, competing in 19 career tournaments over the past three seasons, including five events last season. As a sophomore in 2019, she was in the Huskers' NCAA Championship lineup, as the Huskers finished third. She has improved her average in each of her three seasons as a Husker and is poised to continue that impact as a senior. Guarro will contend for a spot in the Huskers' starting lineup and her maturity and leadership will be important for the 2019-20 campaign. Guarro has also excelled in the classroom, earning Academic All-Big Ten honors in each of the last two years, while also being a three-time Tom Osborne Citizenship Team member.

2019-20 (JUNIOR)

Guarro was in the Huskers' lineup throughout the season, competing in five of NU's nine tournaments. She raised her numbers across the board, averaging a 191.8 in 16 traditional lineup games, while making significant improvement both strike and spare percentages in all competitions. Guarro also averaged a 193.3 per game in baker format. She bowled 200 or better in six of her 16 games in the lineup, including a season high of 238 in the Columbia 300 Saints Invitational. That was her best competition performance, as she placed 17th overall with a pinfall of 989. Guarro was named Academic All-Big Ten for the second consecutive year while also earning a spot on the Tom Osborne Citizenship team for her outreach work.

2018-19 (SOPHOMORE)

Guarro earned a spot in Nebraska's starting rotation and continued to improve throughout her sophomore year. She competed in nine of NU's 10 tournaments, recording her highest pinfall of the season (1,025) at the Columbia 300 Saints, where she finished with a 205.0 average. Guarro finished with a season average of 190.7 in traditional games, while also averaging a 180.5 in baker games. She also excelled outside the lanes, earning Academic All-Big Ten honors and a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the spring semester. She was also a member of the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

2017-18 (FRESHMAN)

Guarro added depth to the Husker lineup as a freshman, competing in five tournaments for the Big Red. Her best individual effort came at the Big Red Invitational with a total pinfall of 734. She posted a 182.1 average in traditional games, while also averaging a 192.9 in baker format. Guarro earned a spot on the NTCA All-Academic Team and was a member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She was also selected to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Guarro brought a wealth of international experience to the Huskers, as a four-time member of Junior Team Mexico. She won a gold medal competing in Team of Four at the 2014 Central America Tournament. She also won bronze medals in Master's at the 2015 CONCECABOL Tournament and at the 2016 International Friendly Competition in Doha, Qatar. Guarro-Sanchez bowled a high game of 280 and a high three-game series of 750 during her youth career. She was coached by Carlos Olivera as a youth bowler.

PERSONAL

The daughter of Francisco Guarro and Olivia Sanchez, Michelle was born Oct. 9, 1997. She has two brothers, Diego and Rodrigo. An NTCA All-Academic Team selection in 2018, she added Academic All-Big Ten honors in 2019 and 2020. She is a four-time member of the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll. She also was named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team in each of the past three seasons. She is also working with NU Life Skills in the N-Vest program which aids in the transition, retention, graduation and preparation of underrepresented student-athletes.

2020-21 (OUTLOOK)

One of three seniors on the 2020-21 Husker roster, Leah Glazer looks to build on a solid first campaign at Nebraska. Glazer, who earned honorable-mention All-America honors at Arkansas State in 2018, competed in all nine tournaments for Nebraska in 2019-20. Glazer led off the Husker lineup in Baker format, providing a steady force in the lineup. Now with a year under her belt in the program, the coaching staff believes that Glazer has the ability to flourish and potentially earn All-America honors. The Henderson, Nev., native has been exceptional in the classroom during her career, as she is a three-time NTCA All-Academic Team honoree.

2019-20 (JUNIOR)

Glazer made an immediate impact in the Huskers' lineup, bowling in all nine tournaments during the season. She was fourth on the team in season average (199.6) and placed in the top 20 four times, including a pair of top-10 finishes. In baker format, she averaged a 196.0 while competing in all nine tournaments. She averaged 200 or better in traditional games on four occasions, including a season-high average of 214.4 at the Stormin' Blue and White Vegas Classic. She also posted her individual best game (261) and finish at that tournament before following up with another top-10 showing at the Columbia 300 Saints. In all, she bowled 200 or better in 20 of her 37 individual games. She performed well in the classroom, earning a spot on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in both semesters and was named to the NTCA All-Academic Team. Glazer was also named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship team in 2020 for her work in the community.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Glazer chose to transfer to Nebraska from Arkansas State after earning honorable-mention NTCA All-America honors in 2019. As a freshman in 2017-18, Glazer posted a season average of 206.03 with a total pinfall of 7,829 over 38 traditional matches on the year. She was named the MVP of the Track Kat Klash after producing a remarkable 248.2 average (1,241 pinfall). Alexia Cassman joined the team as a walk-on in October of 2019. A three-time all-state performer, Cassman will add depth to the roster in her first season as a Husker after bowling for the Husker club program during the 2019-20 season.

BEFORE NEBRASKA

Cassman was a one of the top youth bowlers in the state of Nevada, competing for Coach Nikkole Turner at Shadow Ridge High School for four seasons. A three-time all-state performer, she was a first-team all-state pick in 2019, averaging a 190.72 and leading Shadow Ridge to a Class 4A state title. Cassman earned a pair of top-five finishes at the state tournament, placing fourth as a freshman and fifth as a senior. Cassman had a high game of 268 and a high series of 681, both set as a senior. She earned four varsity letters in both bowling and tennis in high school. In the classroom, she was a three-time scholar-athlete at Shadow Ridge.

NEW COACH, SAME SUCCESS: HUSKERS BUILD ON TRADITION IN 2019-20



Raquel Orozco became Nebraska's 10th NTCA Bowler of the Year in 2019-20, as she averaged a 211 and posted four top-five finishes. She was also named Nebraska's Female Athlete of the Year, becoming the first Husker bowler to win the honor.

While the 2019-20 Nebraska bowling season was different than any previous one in school history, its hallmark of success was the same as it has been for nearly a quarter century.

For the first time since the program earned varsity status in 1997, there was a new leader in charge, as longtime assistant coach Paul Klempa took over the reigns of the program from legendary coach Bill Straub, who retired in August of 2019. Klempa was an integral part of the Husker bowling, serving as Straub's top assistant since 1997 and playing a significant

role in the Huskers' five NCAA titles.

Klempa's team did not miss a beat, going 79-35 across all competitions, winning four tournament titles and finishing the regular season ranked third in the final national poll. The Huskers, who posted top-five finishes in seven of their nine tournaments, were a lock for their 17th straight NCAA Championship appearance before the coronavirus pandemic ended the season in early March.

The Huskers opened the year with three straight tournament titles, marking the second time in 10 years that the Huskers bowlers won

their first three tournaments of the year. The Huskers continued that momentum into the spring, putting together four top-five finishes in its first five events, including its fourth tournament title of the season at the Big Red Invitational in Lincoln.

Nebraska was led by a trio of talented seniors in Raquel Orozco, Allison Morris and Estefania Prieto, as both Orozco and Morris both earned All-America honors during their Husker careers.

Orozco closed out one of the most decorated careers in Husker bowling history, as she was not only named the NTCA Division I Bowler of the Year, but was chosen as the Huskers' Female Athlete of the Year across all sports in 2019-20. The Tijuana, Mexico, native averaged a 211 in 46 games and was a model of consistency with five top-10 finishes, including top-five finishes at the Columbia 300 Saints Invitational (third), the Prairie View A&M Invitational (fourth) and Big Red Invitational (third). She topped all Division I bowlers in Strike Percentage across all competitions (54.5 percent), Baker Double percentage (60.1 percent) and Baker Frame scoring (21.41 points per frame). A three-time

All-American at Nebraska, she posted 15 top-10 finishes in 37 career events as a Husker.

"I could not be more happy and proud for Raquel being honored as a first-team All-American and the NCAA Division I Player of the Year," Klempa said. "She deserves these honors and it is testament to her skills, hard work and perseverance. Raquel is only the 10th player of the year in the history of Nebraska Bowling which puts her in very elite company. Raquel truly has had an exceptional career as a Husker."

Morris put a solid final campaign as a Husker, averaging a 193.4 in nine tournaments in 2019-20. She posted five top-20 finishes on the season, including an eighth-place finish at the Stormin' Blue and White Vegas Invitational and a ninth-place effort at the Big Red Invitational. The Ann Arbor, Mich., product finished her career with nine top-10 finishes, highlighted by a pair of individual titles in 2018-19 when she collected All-America honors.

Prieto was a two-year mainstay in the Husker lineup and enjoyed a strong senior campaign. She was second on the team with a 203.1 average in 30 games in 2019-20, highlighted by a fourth-place finish at the Big Red Invitational. It was one of three career top-five showings for the Bogota, Colombia, native. Prieto was recognized for her work in the classroom, as she was named a first-team Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholar in June of 2020.

The senior class led both on the lanes and in the classroom, where the Huskers' posted a team GPA of 3.465 during the academic year and placed seven bowlers on the National Tenpin Coaches Association All-Academic team.

While the seniors provided a steady influence, Klempa's lineup also featured a pair of veterans who saw significant action in Cassidy Ray and Michelle Guarro along with several newcomers to the Husker lineup.

Ray's emergence in the Husker lineup was vital to the team's success, as she earned honorable-mention All-America honors for her performance. She averaged a 201.1 in 39

games and posted a pair of top-five efforts, including a runner-up showing at the Track Kat Klash. The sophomore raised her scoring average by more than 11 pins per game and was one of the Huskers' most consistent performers during the spring semester.

Guarro was in the Huskers' lineup throughout the season, competing in five of NU's nine tournaments. She averaged a 191.8 in competition and posted the best finish of her career with a 17th-place showing at the Columbia 300 Saints Invitational. A three-year letterwinner, Guarro-Sanchez will be counted on for leadership in 2020-21.

A trio of newcomers also made their Husker debuts in 2019-20, as Leah Glazer, Kendyl Hofmeister and Amara Smith-Speights all made immediate impacts for the Huskers.

Glazer, a transfer from Arkansas State, quickly became a mainstay in the Husker lineup. She was fourth on the team in season average (199.6) and finished in the top 20 four times, including a pair of top-10 finishes, showing the form which made her an All-American in 2018.

After redshirting in 2018-19, Hofmeister filled in at several spots for the Huskers in both baker and traditional lineups throughout the year. She saw action in seven of nine tournaments and cracked the starting lineup on a pair of occasions. Her best performance came in the Track Kat Klash, where she averaged a 194.5 in helping the Huskers to a tournament title.

Smith-Speights showed immense potential as a true freshman, competing in six tournaments and making the lineup on five occasions. She averaged a 192.3 over 16 games and had a pair of top-20 finishes. Smith-Speights closed the season with her best outing, averaging a team-high 212.0 at the Music City Invitational to finish 11th overall. The effort included her three-highest games of the season.

With a majority of the Husker lineup returning, including a pair of All-Americans, the outlook is bright for the Big Red to continue its tradition of success on the lanes.

NEBRASKA BOWLING: UNMATCHED CHAMPIONSHIP TRADITION

In its 23 years as a varsity sport, Nebraska has become one of the top programs in the nation. Paul Klempa started a new chapter in the history of Nebraska bowling when he became the second head coach in the programs history when he was named the successor of legendary coach Bill Straub on Sept. 3, 2019. Klempa was an assistant of Straub's for 22 years and was a part of seven national championship teams. Klempa's first season at the helm was cut short due to the COVID-19 pandemic, but he continued the development of Raquel Orozco, who was named the 2020 NTCA Division I Player of the Year.

Straub guided the Huskers to unprecedented success, winning seven national championships, including five NCAA titles since capturing the inaugural crown in 2004. Once bowling became an NCAA-sanctioned sport in the fall of 2003, the Huskers won back-to-back titles in 2004 and 2005 and captured another in 2009. The Huskers again added to their trophy case in 2013. After a runner-up finish in 2014, the Huskers stormed to their nation-leading fifth NCAA crown in 2015, behind National Tenpin Coaches Association Player of the Year Lizabeth Kuhlkin and NCAA Championship Most Valuable Bowler Julia Bond.

Nebraska has won 110 tournament titles in 226 competitions through the 2019-20 campaign including national championship tournaments. Straub and Klempa, have created a dynamic foundation for Nebraska's success. With a world-wide approach to recruiting, Nebraska bowlers have been well-represented in national and international competitions.

A total of 14 Husker bowlers have qualified for their national teams, including U.S. National Team members Shannon Pluhowsky, Diandra Asbaty (Hyman), Brenda Edwards, Kayla Johnson, Elise Bolton, Lizabeth Kuhlkin and most recently Julia Bond. Recent Huskers Danielle van der Meer (Netherlands), Valerie Calberry (Canada), Shalima Zalsha (Indonesia), Tan Yan Ling (Singapore), Andrea Ruiz (Colombia), Bethany Hedley (England) and Alexandra Mosquera (Colombia) all have earned spots on their national team.

While the Husker team accomplishments have been paramount, numerous bowlers have also enjoyed individual success. NU has had at least one All-American in each of the last 27 years, dating back to the bowling club program days. Since 1989, 34 Huskers have combined for a total of 75 All-America awards, while Kim Berke (1992), Diandra Hyman (2000), Shannon Pluhowsky (2001, 2004, 2005), Lindsay Baker (2006), Amanda

Burgoyne (2007), Cassandra Leuthold (2010), Lizabeth Kuhlkin (2015) and Raquel Orozco (2020) were each chosen as the National Collegiate Bowler of the Year.

Nebraska has provided the vision of the future for collegiate bowling, championing the sport at the national level through its club program days. Straub and Klempa teamed for the first year of bowling as a varsity sport at Nebraska in 1997-98. The first year was historic in several respects, but most important was granting of the first full scholarship in the sport's history to Jennifer Daugherty, who went on to earn first-team All-America honors in both 1998 and 1999.

In the 17 seasons that the NCAA has sanctioned bowling, Nebraska is the only program to qualify for the NCAA Championship every season.

Most recently, the Nebraska bowling team was crowned the 2015 NCAA champions at Tropicana Lanes in St. Louis, Mo. The Huskers defeated Stephen F. Austin, 4-2, for the crown. Bond was named the Most Valuable Bowler at the NCAA Championships, while Lizabeth Kuhlkin joined Bond on the all-tournament team.



Lizabeth Kuhlkin was the 2015 NTCA Collegiate Bowler of the Year and won three NTCA All-America honors, in addition to leading Nebraska to two national championships.

Green previously served as the UNL Harlan Vice Chancellor of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources and NU system Vice President for Agriculture and Natural Resources, and as UNL's interim Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs. Green received bachelor's and master's degrees in animal science from Virginia Tech and Colorado State University, respectively. His doctoral program was completed jointly at the University of Nebraska and the USDA-ARS U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in animal breeding and genetics in 1988.

Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, and as the national program leader for animal production research for the USDA's Agricultural Research Service and executive secretary of the White House's interagency working group on

animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council. Prior to returning to NU, Green served as senior global director of technical services for Pfizer Animal Health's animal genomics business.

Green has published 130 refereed publications and abstracts, nine book chapters and 56 invited symposia papers; and has delivered invited presentations in 43 U.S. states and 21 countries around the world. He is a past-president of both the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) and the National Block and Bridle Club and has served in a number of leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen's Beef Association, National Pork Board, the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences, the Association of Public and Land-Grant Universities, and Alpha Gamma Rho national fraternity. He currently is a member of a number of boards including the Big Ten Conference, Neogen Corporation, and Supporters of Agricultural Research, and was recently named to the Presidential Forum of the NCAA representing the Big Ten Conference. He was named a fellow of ASAS in 2014 and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2015, and he received the Morrison Award, the highest academic honor given to an animal scientist, in 2017.

Ronnie and his wife Jane, a double UNL alumna, are the proud parents of four children – Justin, Nate, Kelli and Regan Green – all UNL graduates – and one granddaughter, Charlotte.

As faculty athletics representative, Feuss serves as a liaison between the Office of the Chancellor and Athletic Department. Areas of focus in the role include the welfare of student-athletes, maintaining the positive relationship between athletics and faculty, NCAA compliance, developing and responding to NCAA legislative proposals and representing the university at related

NCAA and Big Ten Conference meetings.

The half-time position - which was restructured to an expected term of five years - reports directly to Chancellor Ronnie Green and consults with Athletic Director Bill Moos. The representative splits academic year time equally between academic responsibilities and faculty representative duties.

"The faculty athletics representative plays a key role as a leader dedicated to protecting and enhancing the student-athlete experience both here at Nebraska and across the NCAA," Green said in announcing Feuss' appointment. "Scott has needed experience with intercollegiate athletics and in training the next generation of athletics administrators. I know he will serve in distinction, continuing Nebraska's tradition as a national leader in the student-athlete experience."

Feuss, the Steinhart Distinguished Professor of Business and former chair of the College of Business' economics department, has worked at the University of Nebraska-Lincoln since 1986. He serves on the Faculty Senate's Intercollegiate Athletics Committee, having chaired the committee for 2018-19 and a sub-committee in 2017-18.

"It's an honor to serve the university as its faculty athletics representative," Feuss said. "I embrace the challenge to uphold and advance the university's well-earned reputation for supporting student-athlete academic success, as well as our renown for ethical leadership in intercollegiate sports."

In August 2018, Feuss was named director of the university's cross-disciplinary master's degree program that offers a specialization in intercollegiate athletics administration. The program - which has been completed by 48 Huskers - is built on MBA coursework, allowing students to earn hands-on experiences through Nebraska Athletics, industry professionals, other universities and alumni.

Feuss earned a bachelor's degree from the University of Delaware, as well as master's and doctoral degrees from Purdue University. His research interests revolve around issues of economics, primarily in labor, collegiate athletics and Japan.

UNIVERSITY SYSTEM PRESIDENT



TED CARTER

Walter "Ted" Carter Jr. began his term as the University of Nebraska's eighth president on January 1, 2020.

Carter served as superintendent of the U.S. Naval Academy in Annapolis, Md., from 2014 to 2019, the longest continuously serving superintendent in Annapolis by special request of the Secretary of the Navy and the Chief of Naval Operations. As superintendent - the Naval Academy's equivalent of a university president - Carter oversaw all functions of the institution, including leadership of 4,400 students and 1,500 faculty and staff, management of a \$500 million budget and oversight of academics, facilities, admissions and policy.

He also formed the nation's first accredited cyber operations major and accredited a nuclear engineering major at the Naval Academy. During his tenure, the academy was ranked as the nation's No. 1 public university by Forbes Magazine. Prior to that role, Carter was president of the U.S. Naval War College in Newport, R.I., where he led 1,600 resident students, 100,000-plus distance education students and 600 faculty and staff in graduate-level education.

Carter was a successful fundraiser in both roles, working with his foundations to raise a total of \$400 million in philanthropic support for academic programs. He also worked with Congress to direct \$120 million toward a new cyber operations building at the Naval Academy; the building will be named after Rear Admiral Grace Hopper, the first at any service academy to be named for a woman. Carter has extensive experience briefing members of Congress and has shared the stage at speaking events with Presidents Donald Trump and Jimmy Carter and Vice Presidents Mike Pence, Joe Biden and Dick Cheney.

Carter also boasts extensive military service, having graduated from the Navy Fighter Weapons School (Top Gun) in Miramar, Calif., in 1985. He was commander for the Carrier Strike Group Twelve, in which he commanded 20 ships, two nuclear-powered aircraft carriers and two carrier air wings that were deployed to Afghanistan and the Arabian Gulf. He is a naval flight officer with more than 6,300 flying hours, and has completed 2,016 carrier-arrested landings, an American record.

Carter earned his bachelor's degree in physics and oceanography from the U.S. Naval Academy. He also has educational credentials from the 18-month-long Navy Nuclear Power School, the U.S. Air Force Air War College, the Naval War College and the Armed Forces Staff College.

The son of an English teacher, Carter was raised in Burrillville, R.I., a rural, one-high school town in the northwest corner of the state where he became an accomplished clarinetist and baritone saxophone player. He and his wife, Lynda, have two adult children, Brittany and Christopher.

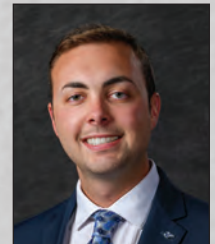

BILL MOOS

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR | THIRD YEAR
WASHINGTON STATE | 1973

Honor the past. Live the present. Create the future.

Nine simple words that carry impressive significance and undeniable responsibility. Words that Nebraska's new athletic director uses to lead his programs and set the tone for building champions in competition and in life.

William H. (Bill) Moos was named Nebraska's Athletic Director on Oct. 15, 2017, and fully assumed those responsibilities on Oct. 23.

Moos, who became the 15th athletic director in the history of the storied Cornhusker program, brought nearly 25 years of experience as an athletic director at three Division I schools (Washington State, Oregon, Montana) with him to Nebraska. More importantly, he brings an impressive track record of success in building outstanding programs, developing long-term relationships, and for doing what is best for his schools, its fans and most importantly, its student-athletes.

"When you name the top three, four, five athletic programs in the great positions as an athletic director, Nebraska is in that same breath," Moos said at his introductory press conference at Memorial Stadium. "I want you to know that my motto has always been, in the 25 years I have been a Division I athletic director and it will be here too is very simple - honor the past, live the present, create the future."

In his first six months at Nebraska, Moos made three coaching hires. He drew universal praise for hiring Scott Frost, the 2017 consensus national coach of the year, as Nebraska's head football coach in December. Following the spring semester, Moos also hired Mark Hankins to coach the men's golf team and Sean Maymi to lead the men's tennis program.

Nebraska made national headlines with the hiring of Fred Hoiberg as its new men's basketball coach in 2019. Moos made another impact move with the hiring of former Husker Will Bolt to lead the baseball program, after Major League All-Star, Gold Glove award winner and World Series champion Darin Erstad stepped down from his head coaching position after leading the Huskers to the 2019 NCAA Tournament.

Moos hired Lisa Johnson to lead the women's golf program after the retirement of long-time coach Robin Krapfl. He also hired long-time Husker assistant Paul Klempa to guide the nationally dominant bowling program after the retirement of the legendary Bill Straub, who led the program to five NCAA titles since 2004.

Former Husker national champions Heather Brink (women's gymnastics) and Rachel Martin (rifle) were also hired by Moos to lead those national championship-contending programs.

In competition, the Nebraska volleyball team claimed the 2017 NCAA title just months after Moos was hired, before adding an NCAA runner-up finish in 2018. Both the men's and women's gymnastics teams finished in the top six at the 2018 NCAA Championships, before the men added a third-place team finish in 2019 - its best team showing since 1999. The bowling team added top-three national finishes in 2018 and 2019, while the wrestling team has produced top-10 NCAA finishes both seasons. The women's basketball team made the NCAA Tournament in 2018, while the baseball team advanced to NCAA Tournament play in 2019.

Nebraska also has continued its excellence in the classroom, producing 11 CoSIDA Academic All-Americans over the last three years, bringing NU's nation-leading total to 340 all-time CoSIDA Academic All-Americans across all sports.

Moos came to Lincoln after spending seven-plus years at Washington State (2010-17). He previously served 12 highly successful seasons as the athletic director at Oregon (1995-2007).

During his time at his alma mater, Moos wasted little time in making his impact felt in Cougar Athletics, spearheading a department-wide rebranding effort with Nike while securing a 10-year, \$35 million marketing rights agreement with IMG College.

In addition, the 2004 WSU Alumni Achievement Award winner gained Regents approval for a \$130 million addition and remodel of Martin Stadium, featuring a remodeled press box with luxury seating, including suites, loge boxes and club room.

Also included in the project was a state-of-the-art video board and an 80,000-square-foot football operations building that served as the stadium's showpiece and opened in May 2014.

As the dean of Pac-12 athletic directors, Moos was at the forefront of the conference's procurement of a 12-year, \$3 billion television contract

with FOX and ESPN, a landmark agreement in college athletics. Under Moos' direction, the Cougar Athletic Fund's Annual Giving program saw an 81 percent increase in gifts while CAF donor members rose from nearly 4,000 to more than 7,500.

Additional facility enhancements under Moos included a center-hung video board in Beasley Coliseum that was installed prior to the 2011-12 season, giving Cougar basketball one of the premier fan experiences in the conference. An indoor golf hitting facility was also completed in early

2013, and Lower Soccer Field underwent a major renovation making the venue TV-ready while also providing one of the best playing surfaces on the West Coast, along with the addition of lights and a new scoreboard.

Other enhancements were made to the Moobery track facility, Bailey-Brayton Field, the basketball practice gym, Gibb Pool and the Simmelink Indoor tennis courts. In Moos' seven years at WSU, Cougar student-athletes and coaches accounted for 805 academic all-conference selections, 130 all-conference accolades, 45 All-America honors and three Pac-12 Coach-of-the-Year honors.

Moos served as Oregon's director of athletics from July of 1995 to 2007. While at Oregon he oversaw a 17-sport athletic department that grew to national prominence during his tenure. Oregon's annual athletic department budget grew from \$18.5 million in his first year to more than \$40 million by 2007, becoming 100 percent self-sufficient during that time. Under his direction the Duck Athletic Fund donor base increased from 4,930 to 12,290, resulting in an annual gifts increase from \$4.1 million to \$15.3 million.

Moos initiated more than \$160 million in facility improvements while at Oregon. Included in that was the \$90 million Autzen Stadium renovation in 2002, which added 12,000 new seats, 32 new suites, a new Club at Autzen and a new press box to the stadium. In his 12 years, the Ducks ranked first in Pac-10 football attendance 11 times, reaching 100 percent capacity in each of those seasons.

During Moos' tenure, Oregon athletics captured 13 Pac-10 championships across six different sports. He increased opportunities for women by adding two intercollegiate programs, soccer and lacrosse, and negotiated an all-inclusive shoe and apparel contract with Nike, one of only 14 in the country at the time. From an academic standpoint during Moos' tenure, Oregon student-athletes collected 722 academic all-conference selections, 34 Academic All-America selections, nine NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients and one NCAA Top Ten Award.

During his first stint as a collegiate athletic director at Montana (1990-95), Moos created an academic support program and hired its first athletic academic coordinator, developed a facility enhancement plan that created more than \$4 million in improvements, and lifted the school's fund-raising efforts to show a 300 percent increase in private and corporate gifts.

Academically, Montana student-athletes were equally successful as the athletic department achieved a graduation rate 20 percent higher than the general university enrollment. Under Moos' watch Montana garnered 269 academic all-conference selections, five Academic All-Americans and two NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients.

Moos began his athletic career as an athletic administrator in 1982 as assistant athletic director at Washington State. He also served as the school's associate athletic director (1988-90).

At Washington State, he was director of development for more than five years and associate director for nearly two years, supervising all external operations. Moos earned his bachelor's degree in history from WSU and was a three-year letterman in football before concluding his collegiate career by representing Washington State in the 1972 East-West Shrine All-Star Game in San Francisco.

He served as co-captain on the Cougars' 1972 squad and garnered first-team All-Pac-8 Conference honors. Moos and his wife Kendra have three daughters: Christa, Brittany and Kaiti; and two sons, Bo and Benjamin.
