**SCHEDULE NOTES**

- Nebraska is set to compete in nine tournaments in 2019-20, including at least seven tournaments the Huskers participated in last season (not including NCAA Championship).
- Of the nine tournaments NU is participating in this season and also competed at last season, Nebraska is the defending champion at two (Bearcat Hammer Open and the Columbia 300 Saints).
- Nebraska will host the Big Red Invitational at a new location this season at Hollywood Bowl in Lincoln, Neb. NU has held the tournament in nine of the past 10 seasons, winning three times and finishing no lower than fourth.
- The Huskers will be competing at the Track Kat Klash for the ninth consecutive season. Nebraska won in the 2014-15, 2015-16 and 2017-18 seasons. In each of the seven previous tournaments, the Big Red have posted a top-five finish, including a second-place finish last season.
- Nebraska returns to the Prairie View A&M Invitational, looking to win the tournament for the sixth time in the last eight years. The Huskers finished eighth last season at the tournament but will look to return to dominance at the event, as Nebraska won the tournament five consecutive seasons from 2013 to 2017.
- The NCAA Championship got a new look for 2019. The re-formatted tournament consists of 12 teams with selection determined by NCAA RPI rankings. Four teams are automatically placed in the championship bracket and participating at the finals site. The other eight teams participate in opening-round matches. The winners of the opening-round matches complete the eight-team bracket at the championship.

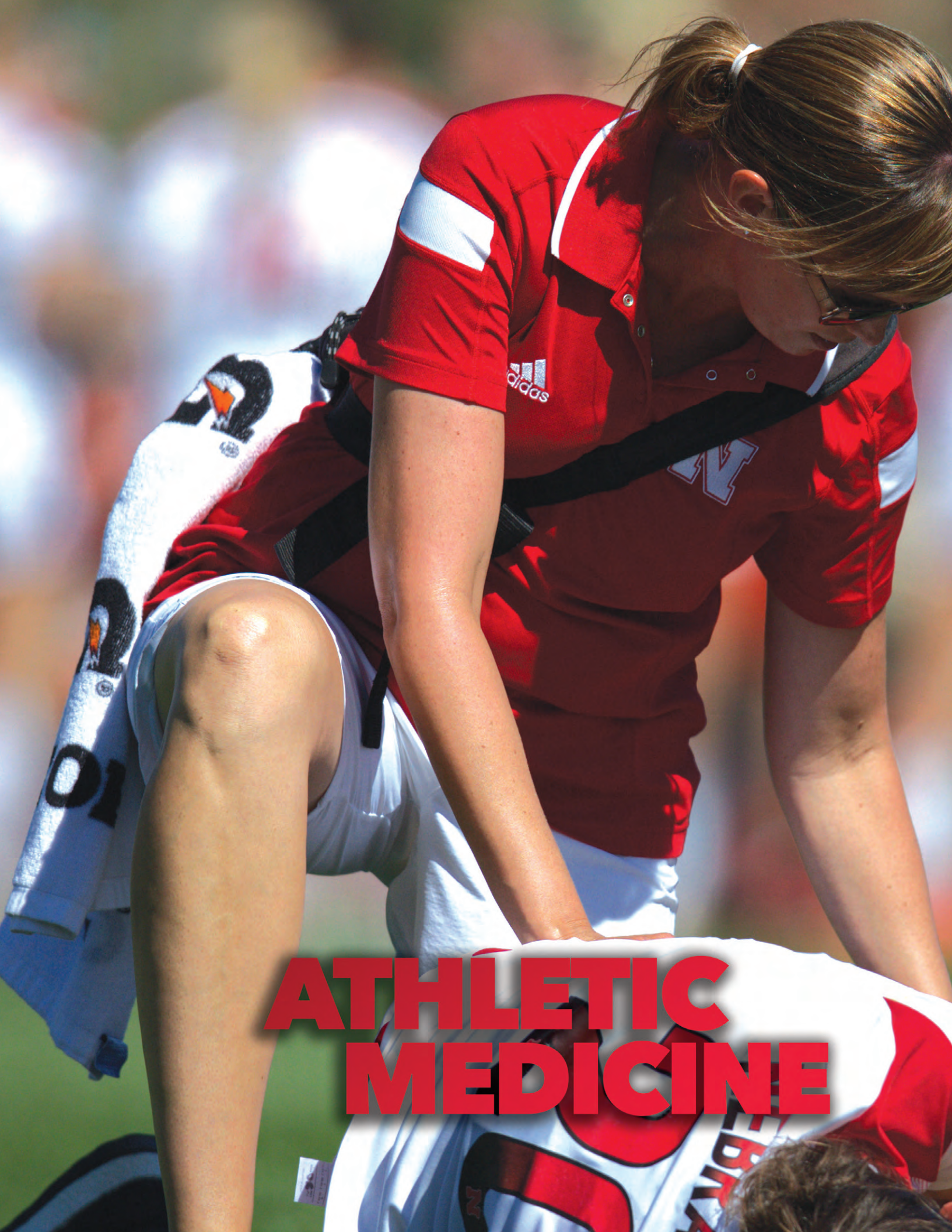

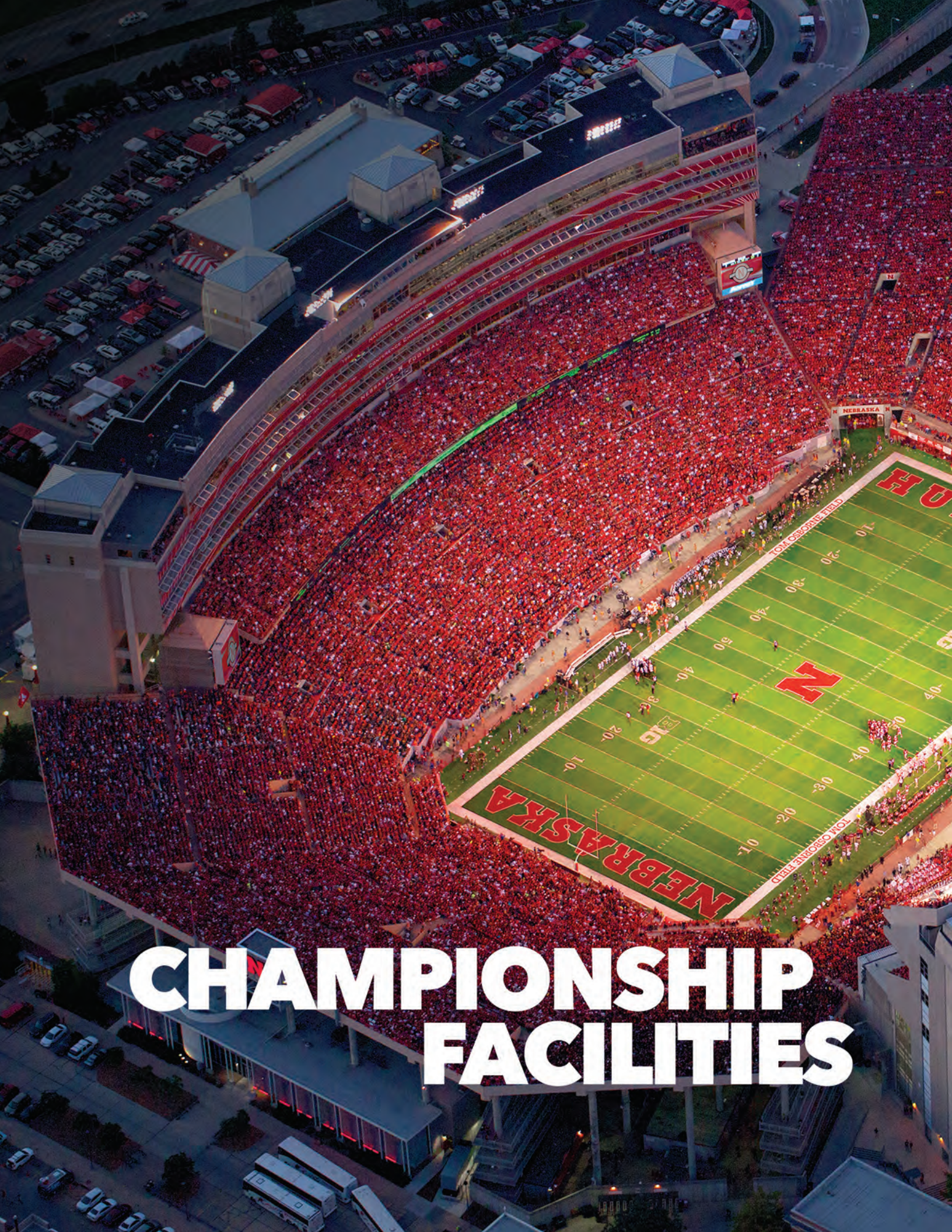

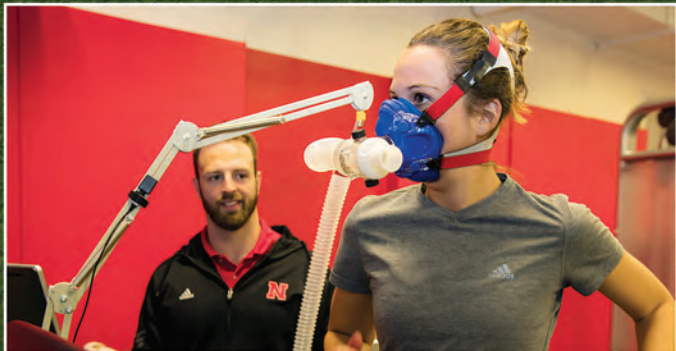

## THE UNIVERSITY OF NEBRASKA

The University of Nebraska was chartered by the Nebraska Legislature in 1869 as the state's public university and land-grant institution. Founded in Lincoln, the University of Nebraska was expanded in 1968 into a state educational system now comprising four campuses under the guidance of a Board of Regents and a central administration. Nebraska, which joined the Big Ten Conference in 2011, is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance, a consortium of Big Ten universities and the University of Chicago, which has generated unique opportunities for students and faculty by sharing expertise, leveraging resources and collaborating on programs.

## BIG TEN ACADEMIC ALLIANCE

As a member of the Big Ten, the University of Nebraska-Lincoln (UNL) is a member of the Big Ten Academic Alliance (BTAA), formerly the Committee on Institutional Cooperation, which is the academic consortium of the universities in the Big Ten Conference. The consortium was renamed on June 29, 2016. The BTAA includes all 14 Big Ten Institutions and the University of Chicago. The Big Ten Academic Alliances and the institutions together have annual research expenditures topping \$10.2 billion — more than the Ivy League and the University of California System combined — and they educate a total of nearly 600,000 students with approximately 50,000 full-time faculty members.

Paul Klempa became the second coach in the history of the Nebraska bowling program when he was named the successor to legendary coach Bill Straub on Sept. 3, 2019.

Although he begins his first official season as Nebraska’s head coach in 2019-20, Klempa brings a wealth of experience and knowledge to the

position after spending 22 seasons as a Husker assistant, including a majority of the 2013-14 campaign as NU’s interim head coach.

“Paul Klempa has been a leader in Nebraska Bowling since before it became a varsity sport. He has helped lay the foundation for the country’s most successful program,” Nebraska Athletic Director Bill Moos said. “Paul was integral in building the program, has proven that he has what it takes to lead the team to success, and has earned the opportunity to take our program to even greater heights in the years to come.”

Klempa’s association with the Nebraska bowling program dates back to 1992. After a collegiate career in which he earned All-America honors as a senior in 1994, Klempa remained in Lincoln and was hired as the Huskers’ assistant coach in 1997 - the first season bowling became a varsity sport at Nebraska.

“My family and I are truly blessed and humbled to have been granted the opportunity to lead Nebraska Bowling,” Klempa said. “I would like to thank Bill Moos and Bob Burton for their faith in me to be the next head coach of Husker Bowling. I am determined to do my level best to continue the success that Husker Bowling has achieved under the leadership of the legend, Bill Straub. I am ready to begin a new chapter of Nebraska Bowling.”

During his tenure as a coach at Nebraska, Klempa has helped guide the Huskers to seven national championships - including back-to-back NCAA titles in 2004 and 2005, and NCAA championships in 2009, 2013 and most recently, 2015. Klempa has tutored numerous bowlers who earned All-America honors during their careers and 12 student-athletes who went on to represent various national teams.

Klempa served as interim head coach for the Nebraska bowling team for much of the 2013-14 season, while Straub recovered from a medical issue. Klempa led the Huskers to a pair of tournament titles and a No. 2 national ranking. He also helped guide the Huskers to their 11th-straight NCAA Championship appearance.

Klempa helped guide Nebraska to its fifth NCAA title in 2015. Liz Kuhlkin was named the National Collegiate Bowler of the Year, while Julia Bond was named the Most Outstanding Bowler in the NCAA Championship.

In 2018-19, Klempa helped the Huskers to an 11th straight semifinals appearance at the NCAA Tournament. Nebraska won two tournament titles through the season. Klempa helped produce three All-Americans, with Raquel Orozco and Meghan Straub earning first-team NTCA All-America honors and Allison Morris adding honorable-mention NTCA All-America accolades.

In the 16 years that the NCAA has sponsored bowling, Nebraska is the only program to have qualified for the NCAA Championship in every season.

A native of Johnstown, N.Y., Klempa graduated from Nebraska in 1994 with a degree in psychology. He owns several 300 games and 800 series in his decorated career and has represented Nebraska in the U.S. Open and is also a State Match Game champion. Klempa and his wife, Leanna, reside in Lincoln and have two sons, Jake and Carter.

One of the greatest collegiate bowlers in history returns to Nebraska, as three-time National Collegiate Bowler of the Year Shannon Pluhowsky rejoins the Huskers as assistant head coach for the 2019-20 season.

Nebraska Coach Paul Klempa announced the addition of Pluhowsky to the Husker coaching staff on Sept. 24, 2019, just days after he became the second head coach in Husker history, following the legendary Bill Straub.

"I am extremely pleased that Shannon Pluhowsky has agreed to join the Nebraska Bowling staff. She brings a wealth of competitive experience from all around the world and will help our program in every facet. Shannon is a world-class athlete with multiple titles and awards, including being the most decorated player in the history of Nebraska Bowling. It is tremendous to bring Shannon back home to share her knowledge and expertise with the student-athletes in the program."

As a former Husker and one of the greatest collegiate bowlers in history, Pluhowsky will provide key leadership to the team in their pursuit for another NCAA Championship.

Pluhowsky, who won back-to-back National Bowler-of-the-Year honors in 2004 and 2005 while leading Nebraska to the first two NCAA titles in history, earned her first Bowler-of-the-Year award as a Husker freshman in 2001, when she was also the National Collegiate Bowling Coaches Association (NCBCA) Rookie of the Year. She was a first-team All-American again in 2002, before taking a redshirt year in 2003.

A four-time National Tenpin Coaches Association (NTCA) All-American, Pluhowsky has gone on to an impressive professional and international career. She was also a member of the inaugural induction class into the Nebraska Athletics Hall of Fame in 2015.

The native of Phenix, Arizona, is a 20-time member of Team USA and was the U.S. Olympic Committee Bowler of the Year in 2004. She won a gold medal in trios at the 2018 PABCON Women's Championships, while adding bronze medals in singles, doubles and all-events, while helping Team USA to a silver medal. She produced a dominant performance at the 2011 World Championships, capturing four gold medals (doubles, trios, team, Masters) for Team USA. She added golds at the 2014 PABCON Championships (team), 2015 Pan American Games (singles), 2016 PABCON Champion of Champions (doubles) and 2016 PABCON Women's Championships (trios, Masters).

In 2012, Pluhowsky was inducted into the World Bowling Writers Hall of Fame, after being named the World Bowling Writers Bowler of the Year in 2011.

As a professional on the PWBA Tour, Pluhowsky has claimed five professional titles, including major championships at the USBC Queens in Reno (2006) and the 2014 BPAA Women's All-Star in Rockford, Illinois. Most recently, Pluhowsky finished third at the 2019 QubicaAMF PWBA Players Championship in Las Vegas in early September.

Before embarking on her pro career, Pluhowsky was the most dominant bowler in collegiate history. She powered Nebraska to national titles in 2001, 2004 and 2005. She was named the MVP of the first NCAA Championship in 2004, before bowling her way to the 2004 Collegiate Singles Championship.

After leading the Big Red to a national title by capturing Bowler of the Year and Rookie of the Year honors in 2001, Pluhowsky was named the 2002 World Bowling Writers' International Bowler of the Year. She was also the Bowling Journal International Amateur Bowler of the Year in 2002 after winning her first AMF Bowling World Cup Championship. She added her second AMF Bowling World Cup Championship in 2004, after taking runner-up honors in the event in 2003.

During her illustrious collegiate career, Pluhowsky claimed 12 individual tournament titles, including an NCAA-record individual tournament average of 254.30 at the 2004 Whitewater Invitational. She finished in the top 30 in 36 career college events, including 25 top-five individual performances.

A three-time U.S. Bowling Congress Junior Gold Champion (1999, 2000, 2001), Pluhowsky was named the World Bowling Writers Female Player of the Year in both 2002 and 2004. She was the U.S. Amateur Champion in 2001, 2003 and 2004.

Born in Phenix, Arizona in 1982, Pluhowsky came to Nebraska as a student-athlete from Paradise Valley High School in Phoenix, Arizona. She was a member of Junior Team USA while still in high school.

Prior to the past season with the USF men's program, Hart led the strength and conditioning efforts of the USF women's basketball program in 2014-15 and 2015-16, helping the Bulls to back-to-back NCAA Tournament appearances.

Hart was a men's basketball player at Saint Leo University before graduating in 1998. Upon his graduation, Hart served as the head strength and conditioning coach for the Saint Leo Lions from 2008 through 2014. He was responsible for designing and coordinating in- and off-season workout programs for all of 19 sports. Hart hired, supervised and trained a staff of five at Saint Leo, and assisted the Certified Athletic Training staff with rehabilitation of student-athletes.

In addition to his role as a strength and conditioning coach, Hart also served as an assistant women's basketball coach for three seasons from 2008 to 2011, breaking down film for the team, coordinating travel plans and developing a recruiting base.

A Certified Strength and Conditioning Specialist (SCCS) by the National Strength and Conditioning Association (NSCA), Hart supervised and managed a 4,500 square-foot Fitness Center at Saint Leo, assisting University members and community patrons, while overseeing 35 student staff during that same six-year period.

His philosophy is to create a mentally and physically challenging environment to replicate and ready the student-athletes for the psychological and physiological demands of competition.

Bob Burton joined the Huskers in 1998 and was named Deputy AD in March of 2018. Burton handles the day-to-day oversight of the Nebraska football program. He also handles the facilities master plan for the athletic department, is the liaison to Haymarket Park, working with the Lincoln Saltdogs, he helps set the budget for field and stadium operation costs and create strategic plans for the facility.

Burton also oversees multiple support areas within the athletic department, including facilities and maintenance, capital planning and construction, event management, equipment, computing services and concessions.

Along with football, Burton is Nebraska's sport administrator for wrestling and bowling.

Burton joined the athletic department in 1998 as an associate athletic director for compliance/sports administration. He served in that role until 2007, ensuring that the conduct and operations of Nebraska's athletic teams were in compliance with NCAA, Big 12 and institutional rules and regulations. He also performed as the primary sports administrator for many of Nebraska's teams.

Burton filled a similar position at Oklahoma State as the assistant athletic director for sports administration and compliance from 1993 to 1997. He oversaw OSU's Olympic sports programs as well as the training and strength and conditioning, wrestling, men's and women's track and field and men's and women's tennis programs.

Burton came to Nebraska from Texas Tech, where he served as an associate athletic director for compliance for one year. While at Texas Tech, Burton helped complete the NCAA investigation into the Red Raider athletic department and analyzed the entire compliance system at the institution. He also helped identify and implement financial aid and eligibility systems, including changes in personnel and restructuring of the compliance department.

Burton, who was a member of the NCAA Division I women's soccer committee for three years and was a member of the NCAA Division I bowling committee, served as a legislative administrator for the NCAA from 1989 to 1993. At the NCAA, he was involved in the development of legislation, interpretation of regulations and reviewed legal issues related to the application of the association's regulations. He served as an NCAA liaison to committees and conducted comprehensive education to several intercollegiate athletic conferences. He has served on the National Association of Athletic Compliance Coordinators Executive Committee and the subcommittee of Big 12 Directors of Compliance.

He received his bachelor's degree in finance from Nebraska in 1985 and his juris doctorate from the Nebraska College of Law in 1989. A native of Falls City, Neb., Burton and his wife, Krista, have a daughter, Elly Kathryn, and sons Robert Falk, McClain John and Abram Lawslo.

As the 2019-20 season approaches for the Nebraska bowling team, the Cornhuskers have their sights locked on winning a sixth NCAA championship after finishing third nationally last season.

The Huskers are under new leadership this season with Paul Klempa taking over as head coach following the retirement of four-time NTCA Coach-of-the-Year Bill Straub. Klempa has been with the program since 1992. After earning All-America honors as a senior with the Nebraska men's bowling program under Straub's direction, Klempa was hired by Straub as the assistant women's bowling coach in 1997 - the first season bowling became a varsity sport at Nebraska.

Klempa has been an integral part of the success of the women's bowling program every step of the way, including spending the 2013-14 season as the interim head coach while Straub dealt with a medical issue that took him away from the team for most of the season.

With Klempa on the coaching staff, Nebraska is the only program in the nation to advance to all 16 NCAA tournaments since bowling became an NCAA-sanctioned championship sport in 2004. Klempa helped the Huskers to the first and second NCAA bowling titles in history in 2004 and 2005, before the Huskers added NCAA championships again in 2009, 2013 and 2015.

Another important piece to Nebraska's historic championship success also returns to Lincoln for the 2019-20 season, with the addition of Husker Hall of Famer Shannon Pluhowsky to the coaching staff.

Pluhowsky is the most decorated bowler in Nebraska history, winning four All-America awards. She was also the MVP of the first NCAA Championship in 2004.

"Shannon brings a wealth of competitive experience from all around the world and will help our program in every facet," Coach Klempa said. "She is a world-class athlete with multiple titles and awards, including being the most decorated player in the history of Nebraska Bowling. It is tremendous to bring Shannon back home to share her knowledge and expertise with the student-athletes in the program."

A long-time successful professional bowler and a 17-time member of Team USA, Pluhowsky will help Klempa provide the Huskers with championship-level leadership as they search for another NCAA title in 2020.

"The 2019-20 season outlook is very promising," Klempa said. "After a solid season in 2018-19, which found our team competing deep into the NCAA Tournament and ending with a third-place finish, we bring back several key contributors and add some very talented newcomers to the lineup."

The Huskers return two All-Americans this season in Raquel Orozco and Allison Morris. Orozco captured first-team NTCA All-America honors for the second straight season while helping the Huskers to the semifinals of the 2019 NCAA Championship. She finished 2018-19 with an impressive 206.6 average. During the regular season, Orozco bowled a season-best average of 222.6 at the Columbia 300 Saints tournament in January.

Morris, an honorable-mention NTCA All-American in 2019, returns to the lanes after an impressive junior season. She claimed two tournament titles in 2018-19, including wins at the Warhawk Classic and the Sunshine State Classic. Her 238.8 average at the Warhawk Classic was one of the best tournament averages in Husker history.

Estefania Prieto gives the Huskers a senior trio expected to provide leadership on and off the lanes in 2019-20. Prieto contributed in all 10 of Nebraska's tournaments last season, finishing with a 199.1 average on the season. Prieto posted three top-six showings as a junior, including a career-best third-place finish at the 2019 Big Red Invitational.

Morris, Orozco and Prieto also set the tone for the Huskers in the classroom and the community. Morris earned her bachelor's degree from Nebraska in May and will compete as a graduate student this season. She is a four-time NTCA All-Academic selection and a three-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar. Prieto has added two NTCA All-Academic selections, while Orozco earned NTCA Academic honors in 2017. The three Husker seniors have combined for seven Academic All-Big Ten awards.

Junior Michelle Guarro and sophomore Cassidy Ray look to build on their impressive 2018-19 seasons and compete in Nebraska's regular five-bowler tournament rotation. Ray competed in nine events last season as a redshirt freshman and posted a 189.6 average, while Guarro made six appearances and closed with a 190.7 average as a sophomore.

Junior transfer Leah Glazer also expects to be in the mix immediately for a spot in the Husker lineup. Glazer captured honorable-mention NTCA All-America honors last season as a sophomore at Arkansas State.

The addition of Glazer could help fill the void left by graduated first-team All-American Meghan Straub from last year's team.

Returning letterwinner Gwen Maeha also looks to contend for time, along with redshirt freshmen Kendyl Hofmeister and Brynn Lambrecht. Talented freshmen Amara Smith-Speights and Kayla Verstraete also hope to make an immediate impact on an experienced Husker lineup.

"Nebraska's 2019-20 roster is truly one of the deepest in program history," Klempa said. "There will be a high level of competition for playing time as we go forward and begin our season. I am excited to see how everything plays out and what

this group can accomplish this season. I really like the chemistry of this team and the talent is outstanding from top to bottom."

This accomplished and cohesive group comes together for 2019-20 focused on taking back the title of NCAA Champions.

Nebraska's pursuit of a sixth NCAA title begins at the Bearcat Hammer open, hosted by McKendree in Fairview Heights, Ill. (Oct. 25-27).

The Huskers then head to Houston, Texas for the Track Kat Klash before wrapping up the 2019 calendar year with the Stephen F. Austin Stormin' Ladyjacks Invitational in Kenosha, Wis.

The spring semester kicks off with the Storming Blue & Gold in Las Vegas, Nev. The Huskers then travel to Chesterfield, Mo., for the Columbia 300 Saints, before heading to Arlington, Texas for the Prairie View A&M Invitational.

The Huskers travel to Jonesboro, Ark., for the Mid-Winter Classic, hosted by Arkansas State.

Nebraska plays host to the annual Big Red Invitational on March 1-3 at Hollywood Bowl in Lincoln. Nebraska took second-place last season and will be looking to reclaim the championship at its lone home tournament of the year. The event is free all weekend to fans and promotional activities and giveaways are scheduled.

The Huskers finish the regular season at the Music City Classic in Nashville, Tenn. hosted by Vanderbilt.

The 2020 NCAA Championship is set for April 9-11 in Detroit, Mich. Nebraska is the only program to have qualified for the national championship in each of the 16 seasons that the NCAA has sponsored bowling. The Huskers have advanced to the semifinals 15 times and reached the title match in five of the last seven seasons.

### 2019-20 (OUTLOOK)

Two-time first-team NTCA All-American Raquel Orozco (pronounced Rah-KELL oh-ROZ-co) joins Allison Morris and Estefania Prieto in a talented trio of Husker seniors in 2019-20. Orozco will be counted on as a leader on and off the lanes, as Nebraska takes aim at its sixth NCAA Championship.

### 2018-19 (JUNIOR)

Orozco continued to be a powerhouse for Nebraska as a junior in 2018-19, capturing first-team NTCA All-America honors for the second consecutive season. She posted a 205.8 average and earned three individual top-10 tournament finishes while helping the Huskers to the NCAA semifinals. She competed in all 10 tournaments for the Huskers, posting a season-best pinfall of 1,336 at the Columbia 300 Saints for a season-best 222.6 average. Orozco finished sixth at the Columbia 300 Saints to help the Huskers claim the team title. She posted a season-best fifth-place finish at the Track Kat Klash with a 211.4 average, while adding a sixth-place individual finish with a 219.4 at the Warhawk Classic.

Orozco earned Academic All-Big Ten honors for the second straight season in 2019 and was named to the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in the fall and spring semesters. She also claimed a prestigious Sam Foltz Hero 27 Leadership Award in 2019 and was named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team for the third consecutive season.

### 2017-18 (SOPHOMORE)

In her second season at Nebraska, Orozco claimed first-team NTCA All-America accolades. She competed in all nine tournaments for the Huskers as a sophomore and produced an average of 211.4. Orozco recorded a pinfall of 829 in four games to help Nebraska make it to the semifinals at the NCAA Championship.

Orozco won two tournaments, had five top-five finishes and one additional top-10 finish during the season. She won both the Crusader Classic (1,073) and the Central Missouri Invitational (1,038). Her best pinfall of the season was 1,199 at the Prairie View A&M Invite. Orozco posted an average above 200 in seven of Nebraska's nine tournaments throughout the year.

She also continued her stellar work in the classroom and community. She earned an Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholar Award and claimed Academic All-Big Ten honors. She added spots on the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in both the fall and spring semesters. Orozco also continued being a role model in the community and was named to the Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

### 2016-17 (FRESHMAN)

Orozco became an immediate contributor for the Huskers as a freshman in 2016-17, competing in nine of NU's 10 events. She posted an average of 202.3 in 21 games on the season, which ranked sixth among freshmen in program history.

Orozco helped the Huskers to a runner-up finish at the NCAA Championship, as she finished 16th overall with an average of 202.6. Orozco finished 19th with an average of 204.6 at the SFA Stormin' Ladyjack Invitational to help the Huskers to a second-place finish.

In three matches at the Central Missouri Mid-America Invitational, Orozco bowled an average of 209.7 to help NU to the team title. At the Mid-Winter Invitational, she came off the bench to bowl a game of 247 on the way to helping NU claim its first tournament championship of the year.

She got off to an excellent start in the classroom and the community, as she was named to the NTCA All-Academic Team in 2017 and the Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll in fall and spring semesters of 2016-17. She was also a member of the 2017 Tom Osborne Citizenship Team.

### BEFORE NEBRASKA

Orozco was a member of Junior Team Mexico from 2013 to 2016 and is a six-time Mexican National Champion. She also won multiple medals representing her country internationally, including a gold medal in trios at the 2015 Youth Pan American Bowling Confederation Championships in Panama City, Panama. Orozco posted a high game of 300 and a high series of 790 before coming to Nebraska. She was the first bowler in history to join the Nebraska bowling program from Mexico.

Raquel is the daughter of Felipe Orozco and Maribel De Leon. Raquel was born on Jan. 4, 1998. She has one sister, Maribel. She is majoring in marketing at Nebraska, and was named to the NTCA All-Academic Team in 2017. She claimed a prestigious Sam Foltz Hero 27 Leadership Award in 2019 and is a three-time Tom Osborne Citizenship Team member. She also received the Arthur Ashe Jr. Sports Scholar Award in 2018.

### 2019-20 (OUTLOOK)

After capturing NTCA All-America honors as a junior, Allison Morris returns to Nebraska as part of a talented senior trio focused on leading the Huskers to their sixth NCAA Championship. An honorable-mention All-American last season on the lanes, Morris is also a four-time NTCA All-Academic selection and three-time Big Ten Distinguished Scholar who earned her bachelor's degree as an accounting major from Nebraska in May of 2019. She is pursuing a master's degree in finance.

### 2018-19 (JUNIOR)

Morris captured honorable-mention NTCA All-America accolades while helping the Huskers to the NCAA semifinals as a junior in 2018-19. She competed in all 10 tournaments for Nebraska, earning four top-10 finishes during the season. Morris captured the individual title at the Warhawk Classic after posting the sixth-best average in school history (238.8). She added another individual tournament title with a win at the Sunshine State Classic with a 225.8 average.

Her 203.3 average on the season (including the NCAA Tournament) trailed only first-team NTCA All-Americans Meghan Straub and Raquel Orozco among the Huskers.

Outside the lanes, Morris captured her fourth NTCA All-Academic honor and her third Big Ten Distinguished Scholar and Academic All-Big Ten awards. The eight-time Nebraska Scholar-Athlete Honor Roll selection earned her bachelor's degree as an accounting major in May of 2019.

### 2017-18 (SOPHOMORE)

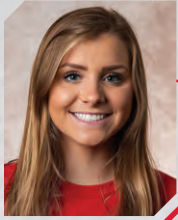

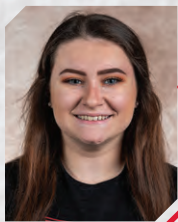

SEASON REVIEW: HUSKERS FINISH THIRD AT 2019 NCAA CHAMPIONSHIPS

Under the guidance of Head Coach Bill Straub in his final season, the Nebraska bowling team earned a third-place finish at the 2019 NCAA Championships. During the regular season, the Huskers won two tournaments while collecting three runner-up finishes along the way.

The Huskers made their 15th appearance in the NCAA semifinals, while continuing their streak as the only program in the nation to compete in all 16 championship events since bowling became an NCAA-sanctioned sport in 2003-04.

Nebraska opened the 2019 NCAA Championships by rolling past Arkansas State before defeating Sacred Heart. The wins propelled Nebraska into the semifinals to face Vanderbilt, but the

Commodores eliminated the Huskers to end the season.

Senior Meghan Straub and junior Raquel Orozco captured two of the five spots on the NTCA All-American First Team. Nebraska was the only team in the nation to feature a pair of first-team All-Americans in 2019. The Huskers added a third NTCA All-American with junior Allison Morris claiming honorable-mention accolades.

The Huskers were also a dominant force in the classroom, with Straub, Morris, Estefania Prieto and Cassidy Ray all earning spots on the NTCA All-Academic Team. The trio of Straub, Morris and Ray were also named Big Ten Distinguished Scholars, while seven Huskers including Straub, Morris, Ray, Prieto, Orozco, Alexa

Fernandez and Michelle Guarro all earned Academic All-Big Ten honors.

After a season filled with team and individual accomplishments, legendary head coach Bill Straub announced his retirement. During his tenure with Nebraska, he helped produce 33 All-Americans. Straub was the only head coach in Nebraska's women's bowling history since its addition as a varsity sport at Nebraska for the 1997-98 season.

During his time at Nebraska, Straub led the Huskers to five IBC Women's National Championships (1991, 1995, 1997, 1999, 2001) and five NCAA Championships (2004, 2005, 2009, 2013, 2015). He also coached the men's bowling team to two IBC National Championships in 1990 and 1996.

Nebraska finished Coach Straub's final season with a 79-34 record. Nebraska's two tournament titles came at the Bearcat Hammer Open and the Columbia 300 Saints Invitational.

Three-time All-American Meghan Straub brought home the Bearcat Hammer Open individual title with her 226.2 average before adding a second individual crown at the Track Kat Klash (226.6).

Morris, who claimed the first All-America award of her career, added

individual championships for the Huskers at the Warhawk Classic (238.8) and the Sunshine State Classic (225.8).

For the season, Straub led the Huskers with a 214.6 average, which ranked as the fifth-best single-season average in Nebraska history.

Orozco, a two-time, first-team All-American, ranked second among the Huskers with her 205.8 average, while Morris contributed a 203.3 average on the year.

Nebraska opened the the 2018-19 season strong, bowling its way to victory at the Bearcat Hammer Open with a perfect 13-0 record.

The Huskers continued to have success at the Track Kat Klash, where they finished as the runner-up with a 9-3 record and Straub capturing her second straight individual title.

Nebraska settled for a fifth-place team finish at the Warhawk Classic, but Morris brought home the Huskers' third consecutive individual championship to open the season.

At the Mid-Winter Classic, the Huskers battled their way to a seventh-place finish with a 5-5 mark. Orozco led the Big Red with a 15th-place individual finish.

Nebraska bounced back with a team title at the Columbia 300 Saints Invitational. Straub put up a big individual

performance with a 232.33 average to take a runner-up finish.

The Huskers managed an eighth-place team finish at the Prairie View A&M Invitational, before bouncing back with a runner-up finish at the Sunshine State Classic. Morris led the Huskers in Florida with her second individual championship of the season behind her 225.8 average.

Nebraska took fourth at the Stephen F. Austin Stormin' Ladyjack Invitational with Straub bringing home another runner-up finish with her 212.83 average.

The Huskers closed the regular season with a strong runner-up finish at the Big Red Invitational in Lincoln. Prieto led the Huskers with a second-place individual finish and a 223.6 average.

Nebraska earned its 16th consecutive NCAA Championship appearance and traveled to Wickliffe, Ohio, for the national tournament.

The Huskers got off to a strong start by sweeping both Arkansas State (2-0) and Sacred Heart (2-0) before falling to Vanderbilt. in back-to-back match-ups.

The Huskers dropped the traditional match 992-947 before bouncing back in the Baker style match to tie the contest 1-1. The Commodores took the final best-of-seven match to defeat the Huskers and eliminate the team from championship contention.

# NEBRASKA BOWLING: UNMATCHED CHAMPIONSHIP TRADITION

In its 22 years as a varsity sport, Nebraska has become one of the top programs in the nation. Legendary Nebraska Coach Bill Straub guided the Huskers to unprecedented success, winning 10 national championships, including five NCAA titles since capturing the inaugural crown in 2004.

Once bowling became an NCAA-sanctioned sport in the fall of 2003, the Huskers won back-to-back titles in 2004 and 2005 and captured another in 2009. The Huskers again added to their trophy case in 2013. After a runner-up finish in 2014, the Huskers stormed to their nation-leading fifth NCAA crown in 2015, behind National Tenpin Coaches Association Player of the Year Lizabeth Kuhlkin and NCAA Championship Most Valuable Bowler Julia Bond.

Nebraska has won 106 tournament titles in 217 competitions through the 2018-19 campaign including national championship tournaments. Straub and long-time assistant coach Paul Klempa, who took the reins of the program after Straub's retirement in the summer of 2019, created a dynamic foundation for Nebraska's success. With a world-wide approach to recruiting, Nebraska bowlers have been well-represented in national and international competitions.

A total of 14 Husker bowlers have qualified for their national teams, including U.S. National Team members Shannon Pluhowsky, Diandra Asbaty (Hyman), Brenda Edwards, Kayla Johnson, Elise Bolton, Lizabeth Kuhlkin and most recently Julia Bond. Recent Huskers Danielle van der Meer (Netherlands), Valerie Calberry (Canada), Shalima Zalsha (Indonesia), Tan Yan Ling (Singapore), Andrea Ruiz (Colombia), Bethany Hedley (England) and Alexandra Mosquera (Colombia) all have earned spots on their national team.

While the Husker team accomplishments have been paramount, numerous bowlers have also enjoyed individual success. NU has had at least one All-American in each of the last 26 years, dating back to the bowling club program days. Since 1989, 33 Huskers have combined for a total of 72 All-America awards, while Kim Berke (1992), Diandra Hyman (2000), Shannon Pluhowsky (2001, 2004, 2005), Lindsay Baker (2006), Amanda Burgoyne (2007), Cassandra Leuthold (2010) and Lizabeth Kuhlkin (2015) were each chosen as the National Collegiate Bowler of the Year.

Nebraska has provided the vision of the future for collegiate bowling, championing the sport at the national level through its club program days. Straub and Klempa teamed for the first year of bowling as a varsity sport at Nebraska in 1997-98. The first year was historic in several respects, but most important was granting of the first full scholarship in the sport's history to Jennifer Daugherty, who went on to earn first-team All-America honors in both 1998 and 1999.

College bowling has experienced rapid growth in recent seasons, as nearly 80 schools competed in 2018-19. In 2002, the NCAA announced that bowling would become an NCAA-sanctioned sport, and legislation was approved on April 24, 2003, allowing for the first NCAA Championship in the spring of 2004. Since the NCAA Championship was initiated, NU has captured the title five times in 2004, 2005, 2009, 2013 and 2015 giving NU 10 national crowns in the sport.

In the 16 seasons that the NCAA has sanctioned bowling, Nebraska is the only program to qualify for the NCAA Championship every season.

Most recently, the Nebraska bowling team was crowned the 2015 NCAA champions at Tropicana Lanes in St. Louis, Mo. The Huskers defeated Stephen F. Austin, 4-2, for the crown. Bond was named the Most Valuable Bowler at the NCAA Championships, while Lizabeth Kuhlkin joined Bond on the all-tournament team.

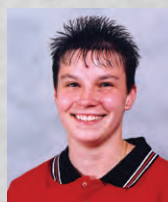

Prior to being named chancellor, Green served for six years as the Harlan Vice Chancellor of the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources. In this role, he also jointly served as the Vice President for Agriculture and Natural Resources of the University of Nebraska system. In 2015-16, Green also was UNL’s Senior Vice Chancellor for Academic Affairs, the institution’s chief academic officer.

Green received bachelor’s and master’s degrees in animal science from Virginia Tech and Colorado State University, respectively. His doctoral program was completed jointly at the University of Nebraska and the USDA-ARS U.S. Meat Animal Research Center in animal breeding and genetics. Green has served on the animal science faculties of Texas Tech University and Colorado State University, and as the national program leader for animal production research for

the USDA’s Agricultural Research Service and executive secretary of the White House’s interagency working group on animal genomics within the National Science and Technology Council. Prior to returning to NU, Green served as senior global director of technical services for Pfizer Animal Health.

Green has published 130 refereed publications and abstracts, nine book chapters and 56 invited symposia papers; and has delivered invited presentations in 43 U.S. states and 21 countries around the world. He is a past-president of both the American Society of Animal Science (ASAS) and the National Black and Bridle Club and has served in a number of leadership positions for the U.S. Beef Improvement Federation, National Cattlemen’s Beef Association, National Pork Board, and the National Research Council of the National Academy of Sciences. He currently is a member of a number of boards including the Big Ten Conference, Neogen Corporation, Alpha Gamma Rho Fraternity, and Supporters of Agricultural Research. He was named a fellow of ASAS in 2014 and a fellow of the American Association for the Advancement of Science in 2015, and he received the Morrison Award, the highest academic honor given to an animal scientist, in 2017.

In 2002, Potuto was named Outstanding Faculty Athletics Representative by the All-American Football Foundation. From 2008-09 to 2011-12 she was president of the 1A FAR (FARs from FBS institutions). Among her NCAA positions, Potuto spent nine years (the maximum) on the NCAA Division I Committee on Infractions (chair her last two years). She was one of three Big

12 Conference representatives on the NCAA Division I Management Council, and served on the NCAA Men’s Gymnastics Championship Committee and an NCAA-wide (all divisions) committee to advise NCAA staff on student-athlete issues and educational programming for coaches, staff, and student-athletes. She currently serves on the NCAA Interpretations Committee.

A sports law expert, Potuto regularly lectures on sports issues in general and NCAA processes in particular. She has presented to, among others, the Knight Commission on Intercollegiate Athletics, the National Association of College and University Attorneys, the Association of Public and Land Grant Universities, and the National Association of Collegiate Directors of Athletics, as well as numerous university and law college conferences. She is an expert witness in litigation involving sports issues and a media “go-to” person. Potuto also lectures and consults on risk management and on free speech issues.

Potuto is a past adviser to the Uniform Law Commissioners Committee to draft a sports agent statute, has drafted rules governing search and seizure and hearings for the Nebraska Racing Commission, and also has written on issues of gender equity in college athletics. She has authored numerous articles on sports law issues. She recently completed an article on how baseball hitting informs legal argument. The article is in the National Baseball Hall of Fame archives.

Potuto teaches constitutional law, procedure, federal jurisdiction, and sports law. She has been a visiting professor of law at the University of Arizona, Rutgers University, the Cardozo College of Law at New York’s Yeshiva University, the University of Oregon, the University of North Carolina, and Seton Hall University. She currently teaches in the Summer Sports Law Institute at Oregon Law School.

Potuto was project director and a drafter of the Uniform Law Commissioners Sentencing and Corrections Act, as well as the drafter for the Nebraska Supreme Court Committee to Draft Criminal Jury Instructions. She is the author of three books. She was elected to membership in the American Law Institute, the Nebraska State Bar Foundation, and the Douglass Society.

Potuto earned her bachelor’s degree in journalism at Rutgers’ Douglass College, and her master’s degree in English literature at Seton Hall. She earned her juris doctorate at the Rutgers Law College.

She is a member of the bars of Nebraska and New Jersey and is admitted to practice before the U.S. Supreme Court, the U.S. Court of Appeals for the Third Circuit, and the U.S. District Courts for Nebraska and New Jersey.

Susan M. Fritz is the interim president at the University of Nebraska, having served as the executive vice president and provost and dean of the graduate college since August 2012 and as the associate vice president for academic affairs since August 2011. Before joining the provost's office, Dr. Fritz was the associate vice chancellor for the Institute of Agriculture and Natural Resources (IANR) and interim dean of the agricultural research division. She also directed IANR's international agricultural programs and is a former associate dean of the College of Agricultural Sciences and Natural Resources and department head of the Agricultural Leadership, Education and Communications (ALEC) program.

Dr. Fritz is a 1979 graduate of the University of Nebraska-Lincoln, and she received both her master's degree (1989) and Ph.D. (1993) from UNL. In 2009, she was inducted into the Nebraska Hall of Agricultural Achievement and is the recipient of numerous awards for teaching excellence. She completed a Fulbright Senior Specialist assignment at the University of Zagreb (Croatia), served 10 years as a North Central Higher Learning Commission Consultant Evaluator and was a 2012 Baldrige Examiner with the U.S. Department of Commerce. Dr. Fritz serves as a Fulbright Evaluator, a Food Systems Leadership Institute Commissioner and a Midwest Higher Education Compact Commissioner.

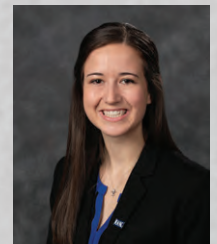

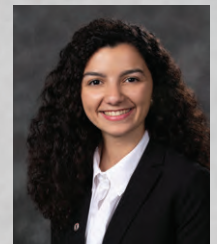

Honor the past. Live the present. Create the future.

Nine simple words that carry impressive significance and undeniable responsibility. Words that Nebraska's athletic director uses to lead his programs and set the tone for building champions in competition and in life.

William H. (Bill) Moos was named Nebraska's Athletic Director on Oct. 15, 2017, and fully assumed those responsibilities on Oct. 23.

Moos, who became the 15th athletic director in the history of the storied Cornhusker program, brought nearly 25 years of experience as an athletic director at three Division I schools (Washington State, Oregon, Montana) with him to Nebraska. More importantly, he brings an impressive track record of success in building outstanding programs, developing long-term relationships, and for doing what is best for his schools, its fans and most importantly, its student-athletes.

"When you name the top three, four, five athletic programs in the great positions as an athletic director, Nebraska is in that same breath," Moos said at his introductory press conference at Memorial Stadium. "I want you to know that my motto has always been, in the 25 years I have been a Division I athletic director and it will be here too is very simple - honor the past, live the present, create the future."

In his first six months at Nebraska, Moos made three coaching hires. He drew universal praise for hiring Scott Frost, the 2017 consensus national coach of the year, as Nebraska's head football coach in December. Following the spring semester, Moos also hired Mark Hankins to coach the men's golf team and Sean Maymi to lead the men's tennis program.

Nebraska made national headlines with the hiring of Fred Hoiberg as its new men's basketball coach in 2019. Moos made another impact move with the hiring of former Husker Will Bolt to lead the baseball program, after Major League All-Star, Gold Glove award winner and World Series champion Darin Erstad stepped down from his head coaching position after leading the Huskers to the 2019 NCAA Tournament.

Moos hired Lisa Johnson to lead the women's golf program after the retirement of long-time coach Robin Krapfl. He also hired long-time Husker assistant Paul Klempa to guide the nationally dominant bowling program after the retirement of the legendary Bill Straub, who led the program to five NCAA titles since 2004.

Former Husker national champions Heather Brink (women's gymnastics) and Rachel Martin (rifle) were also hired by Moos to lead those national championship-contending programs.

In competition, the Nebraska volleyball team claimed the 2017 NCAA title just months after Moos was hired, before adding an NCAA runner-up finish in 2018. Both the men's and women's gymnastics teams finished in the top six at the 2018 NCAA Championships, before the men added a third-place team finish in 2019 - its best team showing since 1999. The bowling team has added top-three national finishes each of the last two years, and the wrestling team has produced top-10 NCAA finishes both seasons. The women's basketball team made the NCAA Tournament in 2018, while the baseball team advanced to NCAA Tournament play in 2019.

Nebraska also has continued its excellence in the classroom, producing nine CoSIDA Academic All-Americans over the last two years, bringing NU's nation-leading total to 338 all-time CoSIDA Academic All-Americans across all sports.

Moos came to Lincoln after spending seven-plus years at Washington State (2010-17). He previously served 12 highly successful seasons as the athletic director at Oregon (1995-2007).

During his time at his alma mater, Moos wasted little time in making his impact felt in Cougar Athletics, spearheading a department-wide rebranding effort with

Nike while securing a 10-year, \$35 million marketing rights agreement with IMG College.

In addition, the 2004 WSU Alumni Achievement Award winner gained Regents approval for a \$130 million addition and remodel of Martin Stadium, featuring a remodeled press box with luxury seating, including suites, loge boxes and club room.

Also included in the project was a state-of-the-art video board and an 80,000-square-foot football operations building that served as the stadium's showpiece and opened in May 2014.

As the dean of Pac-12 athletic directors, Moos was at the forefront of the conference's procurement of a 12-year, \$3 billion television contract with FOX and ESPN, a landmark agreement in college athletics. Under Moos' direction, the Cougar Athletic Fund's Annual Giving program saw an 81 percent increase in gifts while CAF donor members rose from nearly 4,000 to more than 7,500.

Additional facility enhancements under Moos included a center-hung video board in Beasley Coliseum that was installed prior to the 2011-12 season, giving Cougar basketball one of the premier fan experiences in the conference. An indoor golf hitting facility was also completed in early 2013, and Lower Soccer Field underwent a major renovation making the venue TV-ready while also providing one of the best playing surfaces on the West Coast, along with the addition of lights and a new scoreboard.

Other enhancements were made to the Moobery track facility, Bailey-Brayton Field, the basketball practice gym, Gibb Pool and the Simmelink Indoor tennis courts. In Moos' seven years at WSU, Cougar student-athletes and coaches accounted for 805 academic all-conference selections, 130 all-conference accolades, 45 All-America honors and three Pac-12 Coach-of-the-Year honors.

Moos served as Oregon's director of athletics from July of 1995 to 2007. While at Oregon he oversaw a 17-sport athletic department that grew to national prominence during his tenure. Oregon's annual athletic department budget grew from \$18.5 million in his first year to more than \$40 million by 2007, becoming 100 percent self-sufficient during that time. Under his direction the Duck Athletic Fund donor base increased from 4,930 to 12,290, resulting in an annual gifts increase from \$4.1 million to \$15.3 million.

Moos initiated more than \$160 million in facility improvements while at Oregon. Included in that was the \$90 million Autzen Stadium renovation in 2002, which added 12,000 new seats, 32 new suites, a new Club at Autzen and a new press box to the stadium. In his 12 years, the Ducks ranked first in Pac-10 football attendance 11 times, reaching 100 percent capacity in each of those seasons.

During Moos' tenure, Oregon athletics captured 13 Pac-10 championships across six different sports. He increased opportunities for women by adding two intercollegiate programs, soccer and lacrosse, and negotiated an all-inclusive shoe and apparel contract with Nike, one of only 14 in the country at the time. From an academic standpoint during Moos' tenure, Oregon student-athletes collected 722 academic all-conference selections, 34 Academic All-America selections, nine NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients and one NCAA Top Ten Award.

During his first stint as a collegiate athletic director at Montana (1990-95), Moos created an academic support program and hired its first athletic academic coordinator, developed a facility enhancement plan that created more than \$4 million in improvements, and lifted the school's fund-raising efforts to show a 300 percent increase in private and corporate gifts.

Academically, Montana student-athletes were equally successful as the athletic department achieved a graduation rate 20 percent higher than the general university enrollment. Under Moos' watch Montana garnered 269 academic all-conference selections, five Academic All-Americans and two NCAA Postgraduate Scholarship recipients.

Moos began his athletic career as an athletic administrator in 1982 as assistant athletic director at Washington State. He also served as the school's associate athletic director (1988-90).

At Washington State, he was director of development for more than five years and associate director for nearly two years, supervising all external operations. Prior to that, he managed and owned private businesses in Washington and Oregon for eight years. He was a student assistant football coach at Washington State for the 1973 season, then spent part of 1974 in Washington, D.C., serving as a government intern.

Raised on a wheat and cattle ranch in eastern Washington, Moos attended high school in Olympia when his father served in the governor's cabinet. Moos earned his bachelor's degree in history from WSU and was a three-year letterman in football before concluding his collegiate career by representing Washington State in the 1972 East-West Shrine All-Star Game in San Francisco.

He served as co-captain on the Cougars' 1972 squad and garnered first-team All-Pac-8 Conference honors. Moos and his wife Kendra have three daughters: Christa, Brittany and Kaiti; and two sons, Bo and Benjamin.
